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Committee to recommend Prop 16 modifications

The NCAA Special Committee to Review Initial-Eligibility Standards will recommend changes in Division I academic standards that are scheduled to go into effect in August 1995 and also will recommend a delay in implementation of those standards.

The standards in effect now, known as Proposition 48, would remain in effect until August 1996 under the committee's recommen-

dations. Proposition 48 requires prospective student-athletes to have achieved a minimum grade-point average of 2.000 in 11 high-school core courses and a minimum SAT score of 700 in order to receive an athletics grant-in-aid, as well as to practice and play their freshman

The standards scheduled to become effective in 1995 (1992 Convention Proposal No. 16) would increase the core-course requirement from 11 to 13 and require a grade-point average of 2.500 when combined with a 700 test score. Critics argue that the Proposal No. 16 standards will have an unfair impact on minority students and that they are not understood by current high-school students.

"We reviewed the research on the impact of these standards and the level of understanding among high-school students, coaches and counselors, and agreed unanimously that some adjustments needed to be made," said committee cochair William B. DeLauder, president of Delaware State University. "We worked hard to balance the goals of increasing graduation rates and providing access to higher education for disadvantaged students. I believe our recommendations balance these

two aims."

The committee's recommendations will be contained in a report to the NCAA Council and the NCAA Presidents Commission. The Presidents Commission meets in Kansas City on June 28-29. The details of the special committee's proposal for new standards will be released before that meeting.

Black Coaches Association seeks an end to freshman eligibility

The Black Coaches Association called for an end to freshman eligibility during its May 27-28 meeting in Orlando, Florida, and also proposed that student-athletes be allowed to work and earn up to \$1,500 per

Regarding freshman eligibility, a BCA resolution said that freshmen should be allowed to practice with their teams but should not be allowed to travel or com-

"This will give freshmen a dissect to become social ly and academically better oriented to take the initial pressure off them," said BCA Executive Director Rudy Washington, who also is men's basketball coach at Drake University. "If you want to see better graduation rates and better people, this will enhance the process."

Washington said the proposal to permit student-athletes to earn up to \$1,500 per semester was motivated by the belief that students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds have little access to spending

"Where does the athlete get the money to attend a movie like a regular student?" Washington told the Orlando Sentinel. "In many cases, these kids are from inner-city homes, and their mothers and fathers aren't in a position to send them money."

The BCA also expressed concern about the lack of African-Americans coaching women's sports and football and serving as athletics administrators.

"The NCAA plan to increase the number of sports so address gender equity, in terms of the number of participants, does not ensure there will be a reasonable increase in the number of African-American women," said University of Kansas women's basketball coach Marian Washington, immediate past president of the BCA. "We support increased participation by women, but we're concerned about the impact on African-American women."

Rudy Washington said the BCA is prepared to sin-

Minority opportunities committee tackles variety of topics at meeting

The NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee (MOIC) had few, if any, quiet moments at its recent meeting. When it gathered May 22-25 in Orlando, Florida, the committee faced a busy agenda and a discussion with the Black Coaches Association.

Most notable among the wide range of topics discussed by the committee was 1992 NCAA Convention Proposal No. 16. Committee chair Charles Whitcomb, faculty athletics representative at San Jose State University, subsequently presented the committee's position on the initial-eligibility legislation to the NCAA Special Committee to Review Initial-Eligibility

Standards, which met May 31 and June 1 in San Francisco (see related story above).

In addition to initial-eligibility standards, the committee discussed an NCAA race-demographics study and a report on the effects that reductions in athletics grants-in-aid in all sports have on minorities. The committee will complete and forward recommendations to the NCAA Council.

"We're finalizing the written portion of the demographic study on minorities, and we have not com-

Committee recommends changes to Proposal 16

An NCAA special committee has recommended changes to 1992 Convention Proposal No. 16 and also has recommended a one-year delay in the effective date for new initial-eligibility legislation for Division I.

The NCAA Special Committee to Review Initial-Eligibility Standards made its recommendations after reviewing information at a May 31-June 1 meeting in San Francisco.

The committee's specific recommendations will be forwarded to the NCAA Presidents Commission for its June 28-29 meeting and to the NCAA Council for its August 8-10 meeting. Any changes to Proposal No. 16 would have to be approved at the 1995 Convention.

Academic standards timeline

1906- The NCAA Constitution was adopted based on the belief in "home rule." to individual institutions or conferences to adopt.

1959- The NCAA time student as one taking 12 semester hours or equivalent in quarter hours.

1968- The NCAA passed legislation to allow freshmen to participate in all NCAA championship events except basketball and postseason football.

1983- The NCAA passed Proposal No. 48 (Bylaw 14.3) to take effect in 1986, requiring an SAT score of 700 or ACT score of 15 and a 2.000 high-school GPA in 11 academic core courses for freshman athletics eligibility.

1973- The NCAA abolished the 1.600 GPA rule needed for eligibility and passed a 2.000 high-school GPA for eligibility. 1992- Division I adopted Proposal No. 16 to take effect in 1995, requiring an SAT score of 700 and an ACT score of 17 (equivalent to the old ACT score of 15) with a core-curriculum of 13 core courses and a GPA of 2.500. The Convention also approved the use of an equally weighted average of a student-athlete's core-curriculum grade-point average and standardized test score but

Tennis matches costly in hours

Emory University men's tennis coach **Don Schroer** believes that some college tennis matches are much too long and, in some instances, meaningless.

Schroer suggests that the format used in Division III should be changed to reduce the amount of time required to complete matches and to increase the drama.

"Our matches are way too long, especially in relation to other sports," Schroer said. "Basketball is two hours. Soccer is two hours. Baseball is three hours. Golf is three hours. Yet, we're out there playing tennis for as long as six hours. Something has got to change

"In the Division III format, most of the time the doubles are inconsequential or not played at all. If the match score is 5-1, my players will be out on the court for doubles wondering why they are playing, or they'll be playing with a lack of intensity and purpose."

Schroer advocates switching the format to allow doubles matches to be played before singles matches, and to give the team that wins the majority of doubles matches a 1-0 scoring advantage heading into singles competition. In addition, he said Division III should adopt the Division I format of playing doubles matches with an eight-game pro set and singles matches with a best-two-of-three pro set.

"We'll be placing doubles in a spotlight," Schroer said. "You would then be saying that doubles are extremely important."

Schroer said the time-demanding tennis matches can be difficult for the players to handle.

"Our primary concern should be the welfare of the student-athletes," he said. "To be playing tennis six hours in a day leaves them little time for their academic studies. If we want our players to be good students, we have to make sure they have adequate time to study."

Making wise choices

Keene State College's "Wise Choices" program, part of the NCAA's CHOICES program, is a campus-wide alcohol-education program that uses representatives from each of the college's 13 intercollegiate athletics teams as mentors for their peers and teammates. Now,

the college is making plans to take the program into high schools in the southwestern New Hampshire area.

"In a way, it's a preemptive strike," said Jim Matthews, a special assistant to the vice-president for students affairs at Keene State and director of the "Wise Choices" program. "We'll be talking to students before they get on campus, whether it is Keene State or another college."

Matthews said he and the college are awaiting approval on a Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education grant provided by the U.S. government that will finance the expansion of the "Wise Choices" program.

"If the grant comes through, we'll be able to touch the lives of students so much earlier, and that's a key factor," said **Deb Opalsk**i, a softball player at Keene State. "We're not talking about preaching or brain-washing them about the problems associated with alcohol, but attempting to make them aware of alternatives. If we do that, I think the high-school students will respect us and listen to our message."

Double-degree deal

When she was a sophomore at Muhlen-

berg College, **Kirsten Weber** wanted to work toward earning dual degrees. The college, however, offered no such option. So the volleyball player began a campaign to win approval of dual degrees at the college.

This year, as a drama and biology double major, Weber became one of the first group of students in the college's 146-year history to receive both bachelor of arts and bachelor of science degrees during commencement May 22.

In lobbying college officials, Weber directed her efforts at two presidents, four deans and numerous faculty members. In February, she made a short presentation to the faculty, then made a convincing appeal before the college's Academic Policy Committee.

"I have a great deal of satisfaction about the proposal's impact on the college, and the motivation that students in the future will have (to push academic proposals forward)," Weber told The Muhlenberg Weekly. Students need "to be confident in (their) beliefs," Weber said. "Although you might step on some toes...keep the lines of communication open."

Weber was a three-year cocaptain of the volleyball team and was a District 2 academic all-American selection in 1993.

NCAA Foundation's role, relationship to NCAA are clarified

The NCAA Administrative Committee and representatives of the NCAA Foundation recently clarified the role of the Foundation and the operating relationship among the NCAA, the NCAA Executive Committee, and the Foundation and its board of directors.

The meeting, conducted May 6 in Indian Wells, California, was brought about by several factors, including the recent reorganization of NCAA national office functions that included transferring responsibility for the administration of the life-skills program from the Foundation to the NCAA.

Other factors that led to the May 6 meeting were the search for a new president for the Foundation (the position has been vacant since Robert C. Khayat resigned in May 1992), the desire to eliminate any misunderstandings that may have developed between the board of directors and the Executive Committee, and the need to improve communication among those groups.

At the May 6 meeting, the Administrative Committee and the board representatives agreed on several points, as stated in a recent report on the meeting:

■ There is a significant need for and benefits to be derived from regular and direct communication between the NCAA Executive Committee and the Foundation board of directors, or their respective representatives.

■ Neither organization will impose a program or activity on the other. Through effective and direct communication,

the NCAA and the Foundation will concur on all activities and programs to determine if they are of mutual interest and

Although the Foundation is primarily a fund-raising entity, its board of directors has the opportunity to be creative in its relationship with the NCAA. The board of directors can be of significant benefit in this regard by suggesting new program ideas and concepts (or considering those that emanate from other sources); by analyzing them from the perspective of providing benefits to student-athletes, NCAA member institutions and conferences; and by evaluating the ability of the Foundation to raise moneys to support their implementation.

Compliance Assistant software update mailed to I, II institutions

Version 3.1 of the NCAA Compliance Assistant software program was mailed in late May to more than 400 individuals at Divisions I and II institutions who originally requested Version 3.00 of the software from the national office. Replacement pages for the user's guide and an information sheet regarding the release of Version 3.1 also was enclosed in the mailing.

Version 3.1 features many enhancements to the previous Version 3.00 of the program. An example of those enhancements includes the ability to generate the new satisfactory-progress worksheets (to certify Division I student-athletes'

eligibility according to the "25/50/75" rule, "50-percent" rule and "90/95" rule).

The new version also allows users to create their own "user-defined data fields" to track information not currently captured by the Compliance Assistant and to download data from a mainframe computer (or import and export data among computers). The ad hoc reporting feature also is included if ordered from the national office.

Individuals from Divisions I and II institutions who assisted in the testing of the update version during its development included George Young, University of North Texas;

NCAA, black colleges work for each other

The relationship between the NCAA and historically black colleges and universities is like a responsible marriage. It is like a business partnership; one cannot do without the other. We have seen good times and bad times.

I feel the relationship between historically black colleges and universities (HBCU) and the NCAA is a positive one, much more positive today than it has been in the past. Nevertheless, this relationship on the part of the NCAA is not as sensitive to the causes of HBCUs as it once was.

HBCUs have effectively acquired the ability to get legislation heard and acted upon on the Convention floor. The membership has respect for HBCU members who actively participate in the business areas and function on the various committees within the structure of the Association. The Association also is aware of the ability of the HBCUs to attract large crowds to their stadiums and arenas. The membership knows of the HBCU's ability to compete on the various fields and courts and the ability to recruit quality student-athletes into their programs.

In that vein, I feel HBCUs are more attractive now than ever before in NCAA history. However, I think the sensitivities toward the uniqueness of HBCUs have waned. The membership is not fully aware of the plights and struggles the HBCUs have endured for mere survival. The membership tends to forget that these public and private schools are greatly underfunded by their respective states in comparison to their white counterparts. I say that to point out that although the HBCUs are working vigorously to stay in step and maintain some kind of balance with other institutions, the NCAA still is not as sensitive as it once was.

In the late 1960s and early 1970s, during the Walter Byers era, the NCAA used its powerful influence and clout to ensure that there was a black presence in all of the Association's business. Without that demand, we would not have had this exposure.

The membership must be sensitive to the fact that HBCUs are basically one-dimensional. Although we extensively recruit students of other races to our universities, for reasons beyond our control we are still

Study: Education has an equity problem

The following article was provided by The College Board, a national nonprofit association that champions educational excellence for all students through the ongoing collaboration of more than 2,900 member schools, colleges, universities, educational systems and associations.

Twenty years after passage of Title IX, the law prohibiting gender discrimination in U.S. schools, most girls continue to receive a second-class education, according to four educators at American University.

Although girls are taught side by side with boys in American classrooms, they receive an entirely different education, according to Myra Sadker, dean and professor, and David Sadker, professor, at the university's school of education. The Sadkers are authors of "Failing at Fairness: How America's Schools Cheat

Girls" and contributors to The College Board Review with Lynn Fox, assistant professor, and Melinda Salata, graduate research assistant.

"Women are the only students who actually lose ground the longer they stay in school," the authors write. Girls begin elementary school ahead of boys academically but begin a downward spiral by middle school that continues through high school, college and even graduate school.

The authors cite troubling education practices that conspire against girls — trends uncovered after a decade of investigation in elementary, secondary and college classrooms. For example, on a daily basis, girls receive less teacher attention and feedback. Girls talk significantly less than boys do in class and are less likely to call out in class.

"Teachers call on male students more

frequently than females and allow boys to call out more often," the authors explain. "This imbalance in instructional attention is greatest at the college level. As male students talk and call out more, teachers are drawn to the noisier male sections of the class."

This environment silences girls and has profound consequences on learning and self-esteem, the researchers conclude.

Another factor that holds back girls and women is a low expectation of their abilities, which discourages them from taking the advanced math and science courses that often are the gateway to high-paying careers.

"Walls of subtle bias continue to create different educational environments, channeling women and men toward separate and unequal futures," the researchers conclude.

Clearinghouse ultimately aids students

Discussing the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse:

"No one wishes to add cost to any process; however, the need for an organized and simplified procedure that the clearinghouse brings to the whole college recruiting process is believed to be of ultimate benefit to the student. The high-school student and counselor have to complete the (48-H) form only once, and the clearinghouse is responsible for all inquiries from NCAA member institutions.

"It also is important to keep in mind that the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse is not a recruiting service. It simply documents whether a prospective student-athlete has met the core-course requirements and is eligible to compete as a freshman at an NCAA Division I or II institution....

"While the actual task of completing the form and sending it to the clearinghouse clearly rests with the student and high-school guidance counselor, athletics directors play an important and vital role in this process. It is imperative that the athletics director communicate with all college prospects in the school to make certain they understand this new process and to make sure that they follow through and work with the school counselor to complete necessary steps."

"Who'll be next?

"Always, we blame the players. They take the money. We make it seem so simple.

"It is not.

"Ignorance is not bliss. Ignorance is this: The NCAA expecting its players to live on nothing but room, board, (tuition), meal money and adulation. You are 19 or 20 years old, maybe from a poor background. You are part of the football machine that earns your university millions of dollars. You can't have even a little sliver of the pie, though. You can't have a legitimate job during the season.

"What an unholy mess college athletics has created for itself.

"How many more uncovered problems must occur before the NCAA fundamentally restructures the way it deals with the cash cow, football?"

Gender equity

"Although men represent 72 percent of college athletes at the University of Illinois, Champaign, men swimmers are suing the university for sex discrimination. They claim

that since the women's swim program was retained, their program was dropped for gender reasons. In reality, men's swimming was dropped because some other men's sports, like football and basketball, dominate college athletics and squeeze out less popular sports. Why are they blaming women for this?

"The fact is that in sports, men have been privileged and women underprivileged for so long that male athletes have developed a strong sense of entitlement, so much so that they can't seem to focus on the real issue.

"Smaller men's sports teams are losing out because the larger ones are over-represented, but it doesn't occur to them to blame other men, who are, of course, "entitled" to use up as much revenue as they wish.

approximately 90 percent black in composition. Thus, the Association must understand that although the HBCUs perform by the same rules, these rules cannot be any more restrictive on us than they are on the rest of the membership. For example, it is unfair when, because of standardized criteria, approximately 75 percent of nonminority students are eligible to attend college and receive athletics aid, whereas only about 25 percent of black students are eligible to attend college and receive athletics aid. There is not that big of a gap between the races!

I want to strongly emphasize that all of the HBCUs are totally of one accord for improved academic standards and improved educational criteria for our student-athletes. We also recognize there is a need to have standardized guidelines, but those guidelines cannot allow an unfair advantage for one

HBCUs have made great strides within the structure of the NCAA, but the Association needs to be aware that there is a great need for the voice of the HBCUs to be heard. The Association also needs to increase its sensitivity to the needs of the HBCUs to be active in the current organizational structure of the NCAA. There is no future for HBCUs without the NCAA, but there can be no future for the NCAA without the historically black colleges and universities.

Group's role is clarified by Administrative Committee, representatives from Foundation board

The NCAA Executive Committee has the opportunity to concur on such ideas and concepts before they are implemented. Those that come to fruition through the mutual agreement of the Executive Committee and the Foundation board likely will be administered by the NCAA. However, the Foundation, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee, may become involved to some degree in the operation of programs and serve as an "incubator" for other new projects.

■ The NCAA executive director is ultimately responsible to the NCAA Executive Committee, and the Foundation president is ultimately responsible to the Foun-

dation board of directors. The NCAA executive director and Foundation president must have an effective day-to-day working relationship in order to facilitate communication and cooperation between the two entities toward their mutual goals.

The two groups also reviewed the March 1993 report of the NCAA Special Committee to Review the Mission of the Foundation and reaffirmed four basic principles contained in that committee's report. Those principles are:

■ Although closely related, the NCAA and the Foundation should be separate and independent of one another. A high degree of autonomy for the Foundation will appeal to donors. It will facilitate

decision-making in the allocation of resources to the most productive uses, and it will create an environment of authority and responsibility that brings out the best in the board members. An integration of the Foundation with the Association should be sought through agreement upon mutual objectives and realized through effective communication, rather than through a legalistic structure of checks and balances.

The Foundation should be first and foremost a resource-development entity. Attempts to administer programs tend to spread the staff too thin and distract it from its primary activity. Funds should be raised and, with the Executive Committee's concurrence, allocated to the best programs proposed by the NCAA and others who specialize in developing and operating programs. Proposals generally should come directly from the Association (i.e., through the NCAA staff and committee structure); but this does not preclude consideration of those from NCAA member conferences, institutions, affiliated organizations or of the Foundation itself.

■ It should be clearly established that the Association and the Foundation share common objectives and that they can work together with synergy, accomplishing much more together than they could working independently. To that end, it is important that the general public, including potential donors, see both philosophical and

financial support of the Foundation by the Association. It is likewise important that the NCAA members see the financial resources of the Foundation clearly directed to programs of interest to NCAA institutions. This fact, along with the Foundation's intentional focus on "national" fund sources, will alleviate the concern regarding perceived Foundation infringement upon traditional institutional or conference fund sources.

The Foundation and the Association should work together to inform NCAA members of the long-term benefits of the Foundation and to help the general public better understand the important and high-quality work that the Association does on behalf of student-athletes.

c. Denied a request by the Eligibility Committee that the two incoming members whose terms on the committee begin September 1 be reimbursed travel, lodging and per diem expenses to attend the committee's June 13-15 meeting, for the reasons outlined in Minute No. 2-b-(1).

d. Approved a request by the Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee that travel, lodging and per diem expenses be provided for a nine-person focus group to attend a one-day workshop to discuss training for future diversity workshop presentations; but noted that these expenses should be paid from the \$100,000 previously allocated for the pilot diversity workshop.

e. Approved a description of the operating relationship between the NCAA and the NCAA Foundation, which included points on which consensus was reached during the Administrative Committee's May 6 meeting with representatives of the NCAA Foundation board of directors; noted that the chairman of the Foundation board also had approved the document, and directed the staff to provide the document to the NCAA Executive Committee. Southern California edges Stanford to win second straight I men's tennis championship

For only the second time in 18 years, the NCAA Division I Men's Tennis Championships were held at a site other than Athens, Georgia. This year's event was played at Notre Dame, but to many, it may have seemed like Hollywood.

Using a script befitting a movie, Jon Leach, son of Southern California coach Dick Leach, rallied from a one-set deficit to record the title-clinching victory and propel the Trojans to their second consecutive team championship.

Southern California, the championships' No. 1 seed, edged No. 2 seed Stanford, 4-3, during the May 21-29 championships.

Mark Merklein of Florida won the singles title, and Laurent Miquelard and Joe Simmons of Mississippi State captured the doubles crown.

The championships featured for the first time a "3-6" team format. Under the format, three eightgame, pro-set doubles matches were contested for one team point, followed by six singles matches that were played best-of-three sets and worth one team point each. It took four points to win. ■ See complete results: Page 11.

Leach, playing at No. 2 singles, rallied from a one-set deficit to outlast Stanford's Jeff Salzenstein, 6-7 (2), 6-3, 6-3. It was the first time in three matches this year that Leach has beaten Salzenstein.

"...You couldn't ask for a better script, to watch your son play for a national championship," said Dick Leach. "Jon has won two huge points for us in the last two years at the NCAAs."

Southern California, which advanced to the final by blanking No. 3 seed Mississippi State, 4-0, in the semifinals, broke out to a 1-0 lead by claiming two of the three doubles matches. Wayne Black and Leach combined at No. 1 doubles to beat Chris Cocotos and Michael Flanagan, 8-5, and Lukas Hovorka and Adam Peterson outlasted Robert Devens and Salzenstein, 9-7 at No. 9

Stanford rallied to knot the score at 3-3, getting singles victories from Cocotos at No. 3, Jim Thomas at No. 5 and Vimal Patel at No. 6. But the


Cardinal bid for its 13th team title and fifth in the last seven years fell short when Leach rallied past Salzenstein.

Merklein became Florida's first individual champion by upsetting Black, the top seed, 6-2, 6-7 (8), 6-4. Merklein advanced to the championship match by ousting the tournament's No. 2 seed, Marcus Hilpert of Arkansas, 6-4, 6-3. The second set against Black was the only set Merklein lost during the tournament. Black did not lose a set before the championship match.

"Before I won this, I don't think anybody believed that I could play tennis at this level," Merklein said. "Maybe this will catch people's eyes."

Merklein teamed with David Blair to win Florida's first doubles crown last year.

Miquelard and Simmons made it two consecutive doubles titles for the Southeastern Conference by beating Black and Leach, 7-6 (5), 2-6, 6-3, in the final. The Bulldog duo advanced with the help of a quarterfinal win over the top-seeded tandem of Paul Rosner and Vaughn Snyman of Alabama-Birmingham in straight sets.

Arizona State grabs team, individual titles in women's golf

Heavily favored Arizona State staked its claim as the dominant team in women's golf by sweeping both team and individual honors at the National Collegiate Women's Golf Championships May 25-28 in West Linn, Oregon.

Not only did the Sun Devils run away with the team title, but sophomore Emilee Klein and junior Wendy Ward finished first and second, respectively, in the individual championship. The team title was the Sun Devils' second in a row and third overall. Klein is the second Sun Devil medalist.

Southern California matched Arizona State stroke for stroke through two rounds, but the Sun ■ See complete results: Page 11.

Devils put together a 289 third round — the lowest round by any team in the tournament — to pull away from the field. Klein and Ward shot 70 and 74, respectively, during that pivotal round, and teammates Heather Bowie and Tracy Cone shot 72 and 73.

In all, Arizona State golfers shot seven rounds of par or better golf — including Klein's first-round 69 and Ward's second-round 68, which matched the first-round score posted by Wake Forest's Caroline Peek as the low round of the tournament. Arizona State entered the championships with the top four players (by stroke average) in the country; and none of its five competitors in the tourney were seniors.

"This year, the biggest challenge was keeping them all happy," said Sun Devil coach Linda Vollstedt, who has led Arizona State to all three of its championships. "They got along really well and you could feel the positive energy between them. I didn't think there would be this much pressure for us to repeat. The girls were ready and excited to play when we got here."

Southern Cal's second-place finish was its highest in the championships. Jill McGill completed the

final three rounds four under par to finish fourth overall, and teamrnates Heidi Voorhees, Jennifer Biehn and Jill Hamasaki finished in the top 30.

"I honestly thought we could win," said Trojan coach Renee Baumgartner, "but we finished second to the best women's team in history. I'm proud of Jill. She was four over at the turn (in the final round), then played the back very well."

Klein protected a two-shot lead over Ward heading into the final round by matching Ward's 74. Peek, tied with Ward after three rounds, shot a final-round 76 and finished third.

"She has a great inner confidence," Baumgartner said of Klein.
"She knew exactly what club she wanted to hit each time. She's a hard worker and she deserved to win this championship."

After the championships, Klein announced she will become a professional at the end of the summer. She is the third consecutive medalist to join the professional ranks after the championships.

Despite Klein's departure, Arizona State may be the team to beat for a number years to come. "The scary thing is," Baumgartner said, "I think Arizona State may be even better next year."

Near-perfect Parra again leads Arizona to softball title

Arizona pitcher Susie Parra topped herself this year in the NCAA Division I Women's Softball Championship.

After allowing only two hits in last year's championship victory over UCLA, Parra stopped Cal State Northridge on just one hit this year as the Wildcats won their second consecutive title, 4-0, May 30 in Oklahoma City.

The championship was Arizona's third in four years.

Parra struck out 13 batters and allowed only one walk in cruising to her third win of the tournament and 33rd of the season, against only one loss. Arizona finished 64-3, while Cal State Northridge wrapped up a 52-10 campaign with its highest finish in the championship.

Cal State Northridge's Beth Calcante got the Matadors' lone hit in the first inning with a two-out double, but was stranded when Parra fanned Tamara Ivie. The Wildcats then took a 1-0 lead in the bottom of the inning off losing pitcher Jennifer Richardson when Laura Espinoza singled home Leah O'Brien, who had doubled with

The Wildcats added another run in the second after Nancy Evans led off with a single, advanced to second on Parra's sacrifice and went to third on a wild pitch. Susie Duarte's fielder's choice scored

Arizona catcher Leah Braatz singled home O'Brien in the third and the Wildcats added another run in the fifth on two singles, a wild pitch and Jenny Dalton's run-scoring grounder.

But the real story was Parra, who struck out 10 of the first 12 batters she faced. She struck out the side in the third and ended the game by striking out Scia Maumausolo.

"Today it was all Susie Parra," said Wildcat head coach Mike Candrea. 'To go out after four years like she did with a one-hitter is incredible. I told this team a long time ago that I thought they were

very special. They've given me a ride I'll never forget."

Parra shut out Fresno State in Game 5 on just four hits, then stopped UCLA on six hits and four strikeouts in pivotal Game 11. In that game, Arizona snapped a 2-2 tie in the top of the fourth on a runscoring single by Amy Chellevold and Duarte's sacrifice fly. Parra snuffed out Bruin rallies in the last two innings as UCLA stranded four

Cal State Northridge advanced to the championship game with a 4-2 victory over Oklahoma State in Game 13, after losing to the Cowgirls in a 15-inning marathon in Game 12. The Matadors' Shannon Jones and Laura Quiroz homered during a four-run fourth inning to seal Cal State Northridge's Game 13 victory.

Parra headed the all-tournament

team and was joined by teammates Braatz, Chellevold (first base), Dalton (second base) and O'Brien (outfield). Cal State Northridge's Jones (third base), Calcante (outfield) and Jen Fleming (outfield) also were selected, as were April Austin (shortstop), Amy Day (pitcher) and Kim Ward (at large) of Oklahoma State and UCLA's Ginny Mike (at large).

Wisconsin-Oshkosh coasts to III baseball championship

Wisconsin-Oshkosh got a complete game from pitcher Jarrod Washburn and jumped into the lead on a first-inning home run by leftfielder Jeff Zappa in a 6-2 victory over Wesleyan (Connecticut) that clinched the Titans' second NCAA Division III Baseball Championship title.

It was the fifth championshipgame appearance in nine years for Wisconsin-Oshkosh, which also won in 1985.

The Titans dominated the eightteam tournament -- played May 26-31 in Battle Creek, Michigan — by outscoring opponents by a combined score of 49-7. They allowed only two earned runs in 45 innings, a championship-series record.

Zappa's home run set the tone for a championship afternoon.

The Titans, 41-4, put the game away with three runs in the third inning. After Brent Pattridge was hit by a pitch, Tim Jorgensen who was named the tournament's most outstanding player -- singled Pattridge to third. Aaron Richartz doubled to score Pattridge, then Craig Lieder was intentionally walked. Craig Pautz's single made the score 4-0.

Doubles in the ninth inning by Derek Butts and Chris Stenwall and a single by Jon Churchill gave Wesleyan its only runs and spoiled Washburn's shutout. The freshman lefthander allowed nine hits and struck out eight.

Joining Jorgensen on the all-tournament team were teammates Kevin Ulwelling, catcher; Lieder, first base; Richartz, third base; Pattridge, outfield, and Kevin Mlodik, pitcher. Also named to the team were second baseman Len Atkins, Carthage, third baseman Ricardo Ramirez, UC San Diego; and outfielders Will Brandenburger and Josh Pepe and pitcher Craig Brewer, Wesleyan.

Princeton goes into overtime to snatch I men's lacrosse title

After being stifled for four quarters, high-scoring attackman Kevin Lowe scored on a pass from Jeff MacBean 42 seconds into overtime and lifted Princeton over Virginia, 9-8, in the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship.

A record crowd of 24,730 watched Princeton win its second title in three years May 30 at Maryland's Byrd Stadium.

The goal came shortly after Princeton's Paul Murphy beat Tony Nugent of Virginia in the overtime's opening face-off. The Tigers quickly called a timeout.

"On the last play, we wanted to draw attention to Kevin Lowe," Princeton coach Bill Tierney said. "We felt that if we could get the ball to Kevin, we could get something."

Like the winning goal.

"The ball bounced into my stick, and I finally found the back of the net," Lowe said. "It is just a great feeling that I will have forever."

Princeton, whose women's team won its first national championship on the same field one week earlier, set its trademark deliberate pace against the running Cavaliers and held a 4-3 advantage at half time.

"This was a classic lacrosse game at our speed," Tierney said.

"We needed to let the play come to us," said Virginia coach Dom Starsia. "At half time, I was pleased with the way we had played."

Scott Conklin's third goal, assisted by MacBean, gave the Tigers their biggest lead 2:49 into the third quarter. But Virginia, showing the resilience it had displayed in overcoming a big fourth-quarter deficit May 28 to beat defending champion Syracuse, answered with two goals and knotted the score at 5-5.

Conklin's fourth goal, assisted by Lowe, gave Princeton the 6-5 lead it carried into the fourth quarter.

Again Virginia tied the score, and again Princeton answered with a pair of goals from Scott Reinhardt to lead, 8-6, with 7:29 left in regulation.

Virginia's Doug Knight followed teammate David Jones' goal with another game-tying score with 1:20 left in regulation, forcing the sudden-death overtime and setting the stage for Lowe's game-winner.

Princeton's Scott Bacigalupo made 14 saves and was named the tournament's most outstanding player. Virginia's James Ireland made 15 saves.

"As bad as it is for someone to

will see a lot of Virginia in the future," Tierney predicted.

Princeton finished 14-1, with the only loss coming against Brown—the team the Tigers defeated, 10-7, in the semifinals. Virginia finished 13-4.

As memorable as the final was, Virginia's 15-14 semifinal victory over Syracuse may be remembered even longer by lacrosse fans.

The Orangemen seemed ready to run away from Virginia, building a 5-1 first-quarter lead. In the second half, Syracuse led, 12-8, and

found itself with a two-man advantage after penalties for slashing and illegal team action.

But Virginia managed to take the ball away from the Orangemen, and Woody Moore fed Tim Whiteley for a short-handed goal with 12:55 left in the game.

Just 1:34 later, Michael Watson tied the game at 12, then Whiteley gave the Cavaliers their first lead, 13-12, eight seconds later.

The game eventually went into overtime, where Watson scored the winning goal 2:30 into the period with an assist from Matt Crisp.

Princeton's Reinhardt, Conklin and Lowe joined Bacigalupo on the all-tournament team. Virginia's Watson, Whiteley, Ireland and Crisp also made the team, as did Dom Fin of Syracuse and Rob Gutheil of Brown.

St. Augustine's men win II track by one-point margin

Many expected the NCAA Division II Men's Outdoor Track and Field Championships to be a two-team contest between St. Augustine's and Abilene Christian, and that's just what it was.

The two teams ran away from the rest of the field May 26-28, then battled to the closest finish in championships history. When the final results were in, St. Augustine's had recorded 118 points — a mere point better than Abilene Christian.

That difference gave the Falcons their sixth consecutive team title. Abilene Christian, meanwhile, finished as runner-up for the third consecutive year.

Ashland placed third, 72 points behind the champions. Cal State Stanislaus and Adams State claimed the fourth and fifth spots, respectively.

St. Augustine's, which hosted its first NCAA outdoor championships, scored in 12 events and posted 12 top-three finishes, including five individual championships. Randall Evans led the way, posting first-place finishes in the 100- and 200-meter dashes. Marco Morgan added the 400-meter hurdles title—the Falcons' fifth in a row in that event—and St. Augustine's also claimed the 400- and 1,600-meter relay crowns.

Abilene Christian, which recorded three first-place showings,

scored in 13 events — including the 1,500-meter run, in which the Wildcats claimed first, second and fourth places.

Savieri Ngidhi, who won the 800and 1,500-meter-run titles indoors earlier this year, repeated the feat outdoors. Ngidhi edged teammate Joseph Tengelei by less than one second in both events.

Brian Amos, defending champion in the 110-meter hurdles, captured a championships-record-tying third consecutive title in the event. Amos joined Charles Johnson (1989-91) of St. Augustine's as the only individuals to win three consecutive 110-meter hurdles titles.

Charles Mulinga of Lewis turned in the championships' most impressive individual performance, shattering meet records in both the 5,000- and 10,000-meter runs. In winning his third title in 1994 — he also won the 5,000-meter run indoors — Mulinga eclipsed by nearly two seconds the 5,000-meter run record set by Charles Cheruiyot of Mount St. Mary's (Maryland) in 1986. In the 10,000-meter run record, he cut nearly 21 seconds off the record set by Jim Schankel of Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in 1980.

Alabama A&M breezes to II women's track championship

When Alabama A&M didn't attend the Division II Women's Indoor Track Championships earlier this year, there was disappointment that the Lady Bulldogs wouldn't be squaring off against Abilene Christian.

The teams finally did compete against each other at the NCAA Division II Women's Outdoor Championships May 26-28 at St. Augustine's, but the showdown did not live up to the advance billing.

Alabama A&M claimed five individual-event titles and coasted to a

third consecutive team title. Its 117 points were the highest since 1984, when Cal Poly San Luis Obispo registered $169\frac{1}{2}$ points. Abilene Christian finished as runner-up for the second consecutive year with $81\frac{1}{2}$ points.

Cal State Los Angeles (69 points), Adams State (57) and St. Augustine's (37) took third, fourth and fifth places, respectively.

The Lady Bulldogs' titlists included Shelly Beckford in the 400-meter dash, Ifeanyi Aduba in the high jump and Elechi Oluchi in the long jump and heptathlon. Alabama A&M also claimed a second consecutive 1,600-meter relay crown.

Alabama A&M showed impressive depth. The Lady Bulldogs placed three individuals in the finals of three events — including the heptathlon, in which Oluchi, Chinweoke Chikwelu and Patience Itanyi placed first, second and third,

respectively.

Abilene Christian, which has claimed four team championships, won two individual-event titles. Hermin Joseph won the 100-meter dash crown, and the Wildcats also claimed a second consecutive 400-meter-relay title.

Carrie Luis of Cal State Stanislaus and Janet Hill of Cal State Los Angeles joined Oluchi as the only individuals to win two events. Luis successfully defended her 800- and 1,500-meter run titles, while Hill again captured the shot put and discus throw.

Elva Dryer of Western State was the only other individual to successfully defend a title, as she claimed her second consecutive 3,000-meter run crown.

Karlene Haughton of St. Augustine's entered the championships records book with a 400-meter hurdles crown. Haughton ran the event in 57.43 seconds, equaling the championships mark set by Marsha Guialdo of Cal State Los Angeles in 1993.

Salisbury State cruises to III lacrosse crown

Salisbury State answered every challenge thrown its way — with near disdain — in advancing to its first NCAA Division III Men's Lacrosse Championship title May 29 at Maryland's Byrd Stadium.

First, there was previously undefeated regular-season challenger and perennial power Nazareth (New York) until this year, the only team other than Hobart to ever win a title. The Sea Gulls beat the Flyers at Nazareth, 21-2.

Then the Sca Gulls blitzed their first two tournament championship opponents, Washington (Maryland) and Gettysburg, by a combined 44-16 score.

That brought forth possibly the biggest challenge yet: Could the Sea Gulls beat 13-time champion and defending titlist Hobart in the final?

The Statesmen, who are moving to Division I next year, prepped for the championship with a steady diet of Division I competition. Hobart defeated eventual Division I quarterfinalist Duke and lost only to Division I semifinalist Syracuse and another Division I tournament team, Notre Dame.

Salisbury State met that challenge, too, beating Hobart, 15-9.

"We knew we had our hands full," said Hobart coach B. J. O'Hara. "We were facing a team that was undefeated and that had won many of its games convincingly.

While Salisbury State's championship win may not have been as one-sided as its other victories, the Sea Gulls were in control throughout and never trailed.

A high-scoring first quarter gave Salisbury State a 5-4 lead in front of a record crowd of 12,142 (the previous record was 9,597, also set at Maryland last year). That advantage grew to 9-6 at half time, and the Sea Gulls maintained a three-goal advantage into the fourth quarter.

But Hobart has a recent history of storming back in tournament play, something for which Salisbury State coach Jim Berkman was ready.


"I knew that Hobart would come after us for 60 minutes," he said. "Not many teams could do that."

As it turned out, Hobart couldn't

Salisbury State's defense handed the Statesmen the collar in the fourth quarter and the Sea Gulls found the net three more times to claim their first championship.

Jake Bergey led the champions with five goals while Todd Cliggett had three goals and one assist. Goalkeeper Erik Miller, who was relieved by Russ Hewitt with less than a minute left, made 16 saves.

"There are a lot of kids on this team who can score," Berkman said. "The heart and soul of this team is defense. Defense won this

game today."

O'Hara, whose team was led by Eric Curry's three goals and Cabell Maddux's two goals and two assists, praised the new champions.

The 20-point margin of victory was the largest since 1988, when Christopher Newport outdistanced Massachusetts-Boston, 95-66.

Copps' performance in the 10,000-meter run was especially impressive as she outdistanced the field by nearly 50 seconds. The title is her second in a row in the event.

Eleena Zhelezov of Brandeis and Tammie Miller of Cortland State also turned in noteworthy performances, with each claiming a third consecutive victory in her specialty. Zhelezov won the triple jump, while Miller claimed the 3,000-meter run. Miller is the first athlete to win three consecutive 3,000-meter championships. Zhelezov joined Vera Stenhouse of Tufts (1989 through 1991) as the only three-time triple-jump titlists.

Cardinal men nip defending champions by one point

Dan Mayer claimed two individual events and North Central scored points in nine events to edge three-time defending champion Wisconsin-La Crosse and win its second NCAA Division III Men's Outdoor Track and Field Championships team title May 25-28 at North Central.

North Central, which won the 1989 championship, registered eight top-four finishes to amass 75 points, one more than Wisconsin-La Crosse. The margin was the closest in championships history. The previous mark was two points, set in 1976 when Southern-New Orleans edged Brandeis, 46-44.

Nebraska Wesleyan (54 points), Lincoln (Pennsylvania) (50 points) and Albany (New York) (44) rounded out the top five.

Mayer, who claimed the 5,000- and 10,000meter runs in 1993, repeated the feat. His performance in the 10,000-meter run not only ■ See complete results: Page 12.

earned him his second consecutive title, it also shattered the championships record in the event. Mayer crossed the finish line in 28 minutes, 53.22 seconds, nearly 22 seconds better than the previous mark.

Brian Fennelly joined Mayer in the winner's circle for the Cardinals, winning his first discus title.

Although the Cardinals won three events, it was their depth that proved to be the difference. That depth was clearly evident in the 5,000- and 10,000-meter runs as the Cardinals claimed four of eight scoring places in the 5,000 and three of eight in the 10,000.

Wisconsin-La Crosse, like North Central,

won three events. David Coates led the way for the Eagles, winning the 200- and 400-meter dashes. Coates equaled the championships record in winning the 200-meter dash in 20.87 seconds.

Mike Schnurr accounted for the Eagles' other individual championship, winning the pole vault. Schnurr, who also claimed the indoor title earlier this year, smashed the championships record by vaulting 16 feet, 8 inches

The mark was one-half inch better than the standard set by Chad Thomas of Muskingum at the 1992 championships.

Kris Theriault of Fitchburg State also set a championships records with his performance in the javelin throw. Theriault registered a mark of 236 feet, 6 inches, eclipsing the previous mark by about nine feet.

Christopher Newport won the women's team title, but Kelly Copps of St. Thomas (Minnesota) stole the individual show. Copps won both the 5,000-and 10,000-meter runs, beating the field in the 10,000-meter run by almost 50 seconds. The title was her second straight in the event.

The recommendations also will be presented to the NCAA Council at its August 8-10 meeting. Legislation on the recommendations would be proposed for consideration at the NCAA's annual Convention in January.

Richard E. Peck, president of the University of New Mexico, cochaired the special committee with DeLauder. The committee reviewed pertinent initial-eligibility background information, including the NCAA Academic Performance Study.

The results of that study, presented by John J. McArdle of the University of Virginia, demonstrated a disparate impact that Proposal No. 16 would have on minorities.

That study has been criticized by some because of the relationship between its researchers and research psychologist Raymond Cattell, who has promoted eugenics in some of his writings. However, two independent evaluations of the

research found no problems.

The evaluations were done by Ewart A. C. Thomas, professor of psychology at Stanford University, and John A. Hartigan from the department of statistics at Yale University.

"My general conclusion is that

the study provides unequivocally valuable data on the academic performance of athletes, that the statistical analyses are based on appropriate and well-judged techniques, and that your scientists are well-versed in the relevant psychometrics and educational research literature," Hartigan wrote.

A survey by Lou Harris and Associates did reveal problems in

student-athletes."

The survey noted that minority prospective student-athletes and prospects from the South tended to be most aware of the new standards.

The survey also showed that high-school coaches and counselors think they are aware of the standards, but are in reality frequently ill-informed.



Correction Figure 15-1 — 1994-95 NCAA Manual

As a result of 1994 NCAA Convention Proposal No. 79 (effective August 1, 1994), institutions should note that in accordance with NCAA Bylaw 15.02.4.1-(a), on-campus employment (including work-study program assistance) in the department of athletics and on-campus employment (including work-study program assistance) outside the athletics department for which the athletics interests of the institution intercede on behalf of the student-athlete (other than institutional staff members responsible for assisting all students in securing on-campus employment, including work study, in the same manner) are considered to be institutional financial aid.

Please note that Figure 15-1 (page 203) in the 1994-95 Manual incorrectly indicates that work-study assistance is included in the institutional sport limitations if a student-athlete is considered a counter per Bylaw 15.5. Work-study assistance that is outside the department of athletics and for which athletics interests do not intercede on behalf of the student-athlete to secure such employment is not considered institutional and, thus, never is included in the institution's financial aid limits in the applicable sport. The institutional sport limitation column for work-study assistance should read identical to the institutional sport limitation column for employment on-campus during term time. Accordingly, the institutional sport limitation column for work-study assistance should read, "Yes, if athletics interests intercede."

Bylaw 15.3.5 Renewal of financial aid

Institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaw

15.3.5.1, the renewal of institutional financial aid must be made on or before July 1 prior to the academic year in which it is to become effective. Institutions shall notify promptly in writing each student-athlete who has received an award the previous academic year and who has eligibility remaining (under Bylaw 14.2 or 14.1.8.2) for the ensuing academic year, whether the grant has been renewed or not renewed. Notification of financial aid renewals and nonrenewals must come from the institution's regular financial aid authority and not from the institution's athletics department.

In accordance with Bylaw 15.3.5.1.1, if the institution decides not to renew or decides to reduce financial aid for the ensuing academic year, the institution must inform the student-athlete that he or she, upon request, must be provided a hearing before the institutional agency making the award. The institution must have established reasonable procedures for promptly hearing such a request, and may not delegate the responsibility for conducting a nonrenewal hearing to the institution's athletics department or its faculty athletics committee. The decision to renew or not to renew the financial aid is left to the discretion of the institution to be determined in accordance with its normal practice for students generally.

During its November 19, 1992, telephone conference, the NCAA Interpretations Committee determined that the reference to "institutional financial aid" set forth in Bylaw 15.3.5.1 refers only to institutional aid that is based in any degree on athletics ability. Thus, if a student-athlete is receiving institutional aid unrelated to athletics ability, and such aid is reduced or not renewed for the ensuing academic year, the institution is not obligated to provide an opportunity for a hearing before the institutional agency making the award, except as provided under institutional policy applicable to all students.

Finally, per Bylaw 15.5.1.5, if the institution does not renew financial aid for a counter in the subsequent year

and a hearing before the institution's regular financial aid authority results in a successful appeal for restoration of aid, the student-athlete must continue to be a counter if the individual continues to receive athletically related aid. However, the student-athlete would not be a counter if he or she receives institutionally arranged or awarded nonathletically related financial aid available to all students, provided such financial aid was granted or arranged without regard in any degree to athletics ability. If the student-athlete ever participates again in intercollegiate athletics at the institution, he or she would be considered to have been a counter during each year the financial aid was received.

Summer workout sessions in individual sports Divisions I and II

Divisions I and II institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaw 17.02.1.2.2, in individual sports only, a coach may participate in individual workout sessions with a student-athlete from the coach's team during the summer, provided the request for such assistance is initiated by the student-athlete. It is not permissible for the institution to pay fees for the use of a facility. However, pursuant to Bylaw 17.02.1.2-(p), in individual sports in Divisions I and II, it is permissible for an institution's coach to reserve the use of its athletics facilities in the summer to participate in individual workout sessions with a student-athlete from the coach's team, provided the request for such assistance is initiated by the student-athlete.

pleted the report on grant reductions," Whitcomb said.

The committee's joint meeting with the Black Coaches Asso-

ciation did not result in recommendations to the NCAA Presidents Commission, Executive Committee or Council, but it did provide the groups with a course for dialogue. "It was an opportunity for the BCA and the MOIC to meet and discuss issues that were of concern to both groups," Whitcomb said.

"We talked about some common goals and concerns that we have."

Other highlights

In other actions at its May 22-25 meeting in Orlando, Florida, the Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee:

■ Discussed and supported the concept of National Girls Sports Days, which have been endorsed by the NCAA Presidents Commission.

■ Announced a June 10 meeting with a focus group charged with evaluating the NCAA Pilot Diversity-Training Workshop, which was April 11-12 in Kansas City, Missouri.

Reaffirmed its position on 1994 Convention Proposal No. 55, a proposal to add graduate assistant coaches in Division I-A football that was defeated by the membership. The committee said it would support any legislation mandating that at least one of the two current graduate assistant positions be held by an ethnic minority. Proposal No. 55 would have permitted an institution to employ an additional graduate assistant coach in Division I-A football, provided at least one of the three graduate assistant coaches was an ethnic minority.

■ Discussed how it could better assist historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) in addressing their concerns with the NCAA, and created a subcommittee that will focus on issues facing HBCUs.

Agreed to determine the number of minority vendors and/or suppliers that contract with the NCAA and to develop and distribute to minority businesses an outline of the process the NCAA uses in agreeing to work with vendors.

■ Discussed the National Football League's Coaches Fellowship Program and concluded that it is meeting its objectives. However, the committee expressed concern that there is a lack of coaches from Division III institutions participating in the program.

Discussed the NCAA Conference Grant Program and indicated that the committee will continue to study the effect that separation of the women's and ethnic-minority enhancement components of program requirements will have on opportunities for ethnic minorities. The separation of the components is effective with the 1994-95 fiscal year.

Recruiting Committee considers proposals relating to Bylaw 13

The NCAA Recruiting Committee reviewed more than 20 proposals for legislative changes in NCAA Bylaw 13 — including some proposed by coaches associations—during its May 19-20 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri.

Some of the proposals relating to the recruiting bylaws will be recommended to the NCAA Council as proposed legislation for the 1995 NCAA Convention. Other proposals will be referred to coaches associations or other NCAA committees for comment.

One of the proposals upon which the committee will be soliciting input from coaches associations is the establishment of a maximum number of recruiting opportunities, paired with greater flexibility in the number of contacts or evaluations per prospect.

"This meeting exemplified the intent of the committee over the past several years to request possible legislation changes from the various coaches associations and to solicit input on proposals that affect the coaches from institutions, conferences and other NCAA commit-

tees," said committee chair Jody Conradt of the University of Texas at Austin.

Conradt said the Recruiting Committee encourages coaches associations to submit possible proposals to the committee, and added that the committee will contact each association about proposals forwarded to the Council that would affect that association.

"While the committee is not opposed to sport-specific recruiting legislation," Conradt added, "it is helpful if associations jointly develop legislation in order to decrease the proliferation of sport-specific recruiting legislation."

She cited, as an example, five joint legislative proposals received by the committee from the National Association of Basketball Coaches and Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

To promote cooperation, the committee discussed the possibility of encouraging the executive directors of coaches associations to meet annually and determine the possibility of jointly sponsoring uniform recruiting legislation.

gle out NCAA institutions that ignore BCA concerns and to take action, if it deems it necessary.

The convention elected Dale Clayton, men's basketball coach at Carson-Newman College, to replace Marian Washington as president. More than 500 individuals attended the event, including NCAA Executive Director Cedric W. Dempsey.

In an interview with the Orlando paper, Rudy Washington said he did not regard the NCAA as an adversary. Earlier this year, the Community Relations Service of the U.S. Justice Department mediated differences between the organiza-

tions.

"If there is one thing we really need to change about our organization," Washington said, "it is a perception that we are bad guys, racists and troublemakers. We don't regard the NCAA as the enemy. We have a good relationship with them. We are just a group that is asking questions."

Other highlights

In other actions at its May 19-20 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, the Recruiting Committee:

■ Waived the one-month waiting period for retaking a failed coaches' certification exam for a coach who used a 1993-94 NCAA Manual to take a test based on legislation in the 1994-95 NCAA Manual.

Asked the NCAA Council to consider amending NCAA Bylaw 11.5.1.1 to require a coach to take the coaches' certification exam every two years, instead of annually.
