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# SWORN INQUIRY AT DUNGARVAN.

## L.G.B. INSPECTOR AND TOWN CLERK.

### MR. RYAN'S EVIDENCE.

#### Orders that Were Not Conveyed to Him in Writing.

On Thursday Mr. A. D. Price, L. G. Board Inspector, opened a sworn inquiry at the Town Hall, Dungarvan, into charges of neglect of duty preferred by the Urban Council against Mr. J. A. Ryan, G.E., their Borough Surveyor.

Mr. Ryan, G.E., Borough Surveyor, appeared for Mr. Ryan, and Mr. J. F. Williams, G.E., Town Clerk, for the Urban Council.

The Town Clerk Cross-Examined by Mr. Buggy.

The Town Clerk was cross-examined by Mr. Buggy. Mr. Buggy asked for the list of duties and he said that he had a list of the original advancement for Borough Surveyors, but he did not attend meetings.

Town Clerk—In my opinion he was bound to attend meetings of the Council. Why? Because the resolution, Mr. Buggy, says to do it.

Is there anything to that effect in the advertisement?—I don't see it now at all.

Mr. Buggy—Now about the first charge about the rate at Mrs. Wash's. Did that originate at the sanitary meeting?—It was at the sanitary meeting.

Is that sanitary committee elected by the Council?—There are sanitary committees elected by the Council.

Is there a Sanitary Committee?—There is a Sanitary Committee elected by the Council.

Is that the meeting that originated at?—No, at a general meeting of the Council.

You have a committee under the sanitary act?—Yes.

Mr. Buggy asked for the records of the committee and the Town Clerk produced a report from the Streets, Roads and Public Health Committee, which he said he submitted to the Council.

What was the next meeting after the 12th?—The 17th July.

And it is common knowledge that he was suspended?—He was.

About the specification which he was directed to submit to the painter for the old market house, did he submit that?—Yes, he submitted the specification for painting it, but he was also directed to get it for repairs, which he did not submit.

On the 12th July you got a report about the water works from Mr. Ryan?—Yes.

Mr. Ryan said that if the level fell further the committee would have to consider the advisability of taking on the old supply. Did you have any committee and there was serious danger of having to fall back on the old supply according to the engineer?—Yes.

And you are very reasonable that he did not flush the sewers at that time?—At that period it was; that is my opinion.

As to charge four which is, that Mr. Ryan did not submit a report as to the work done at the bathing place. Was there a contract entered into for the execution of that work?—Yes, Mr. Ryan's report was that the work would cost £100 and £200 and Mr. Stokes' tender was accepted for £100 in the year 1910, but the work was never carried out.

Mr. Ryan—It was referred to me by Mr. Williams. I am going to examine the minutes of the meeting to check up on the fact that Mr. Williams gave the case in charge, that he took of the Harbour Committee.

Examined on proceedings with—I remember a meeting of the 24th April. It was decided that a meeting of the Harbour Committee should be held with Mr. Ryan, Surveyor, to attend.

Mr. Buggy—Was it at the meeting it was decided?

Inspector—Yes, at the meeting. On the day following the meeting Mr. Ryan was called on and he had a conversation with me. He said that the day fixed for the meeting was on an inconvenient day for him, and we made an arrangement that the meeting was to be held on the following Wednesday when he would visit the harbour.

Inspector—I suppose that would be a meeting of the Harbour Committee?—No, it was a meeting of the Harbour Committee.

Mr. Williams—The object of the meeting was to inspect the quay and the bridge and portion of the harbour. It was a business meeting near the quay.

Mr. Williams—You were present at that meeting?—Yes, I was.

Inspector—Did you see the minutes of the meeting?—Yes, I did.

Mr. Ryan—The minutes of the meeting were sent to the Local Government Board.

Town Clerk—No, they were not sent to the Local Government Board.

Inspector—It is bearing on this inquiry. You were present at the meeting of the Harbour Committee on the 15th October?—Yes, I was.

Inspector—That meeting was called for on the previous meeting to inquire into the duties of the various officers.

Mr. Buggy—And then they thought they would bring pressure to bear on him and get him into trouble with the L. G. Board.

Mr. Williams—Don't answer that. Mr. Buggy—Anyway at the next meeting of the Harbour Committee, a report and certificate—On the 3rd July a resolution was passed that Phelan be suspended from the Borough Surveyor's duties.

Mr. Williams—I see the point plainly. The charge might not be very well documented. But they got no notification one way or the other from Mr. Ryan. That is their complaint, that he simply ignored the order of the Council.

Mr. Buggy—All we got was a proposal that the contractor for the bathing place be suspended. That is simply a proposal. It is not a resolution. We called it an illegal act, and Mr. Mulcahy took it up before the auditor on his next visit.

Town Clerk—I do not.
