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Mosaic gets 4-year delay in DeSoto

After dispute resolution, phosphate company may apply for permits in 2023

The future for phosphate mining in DeSoto County is a little clearer now.

Following a dispute resolution hearing on Wednesday, here's what's been decided: Mosaic Fertilizer will delay its mine permit plans in DeSoto for at least four years, and that's if market conditions and other factors line up in the Fortune 500 firm's favor.


And DeSoto County over that same period will hold public workshops. Those will allow Mosaic to clarify its mission, to detail the process and its post-mining plans, and to address concerns of environmentalists and neighbors that dog the firm as it moves its mining around Florida.

And then in 2023, Mosaic can return to DeSoto County to apply for permits and zoning that, if granted, would allow the firm to mine phosphate on some 14,000 acres. Actual work would be a couple of more years down the

These terms were brokered before Terrance E. Schmidt, a Jacksonville lawyer specializing in dispute resolutions. Wednesday's public hearing gave Mosaic the chance to air its grievances dating to July, when the DeSoto **Board of County Commissioners** denied rezoning of farmland to industrial mining. Mosaic had asked for the dispute process to avoid a lawsuit for the loss of its property rights. Schmidt listened to Mosaic experts, comments from those living near Mosaic's proposed mines, and from DeSoto County staff.

Ultimately, Mosaic and DeSoto County made a deal to stage the public workshops and to place timelines on when the firm would return with rezoning, operating permit and a masterplan to mine its 14,000 acres, said Donald Conn, the county's

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Commissioner demands shelter legislation be withdrawn

Charlotte County has no hurricane shelters approved by Red Cross

The battle continues between Charlotte County Commissioner Joe Tiseo and Rep. Mike Grant (R-Port Charlotte) over an \$8 million legislative request to build a hurricane shelter at Babcock Ranch.


Tiseo on Thursday sent an email to Grant and about 35 members of the state Legislature asking Grant to withdraw the legislation that has already received level one approval from a

subcommittee. A decision is expected at the end of the month.

"This matter completely bypassed my Board without a public hearing and public input," Tiseo wrote.

Grant was defiant.

"If he wants me to withdraw the bill, let him get a majority vote from the commission, then I will gladly do it, but if he's not willing to do that, then stop throwing bombs,'



that Tiseo "shut the hell up...I don't answer to the Charlotte County commissioners and I certainly don't answer to one member."

Babcock Ranch President Syd Kitson said he too is shocked by Tiseo's accusations.

"I'm just very confused by what the controversy



Teaming together to fight red tide

FGCU, Mote Marine Lab join forces to study toxic algae species

In the wake of last year's unprecedented water crisis, Florida **Gulf Coast University** and Sarasota-based Mote Marine are joining forces to battle

toxic algae. FGCU President Mike Martin and Mote President and **CEO Michael Crosby** signed a memorandum of understanding Thursday that formally binds them in the fight against red tide

which periodically foul Southwest Florida's inland and coastal waterways.

No money changes hands in the renewable five-year agreement, but each institution pledges to collaborate on research and education while developing technology to combat the outbreaks' damages.

The recent virulent red tide and cyanobacteria emergencies

Six men arrested in sting operation

Jelks Preserve, Caspersen Beach site of 'inappropriate conduct,' sheriff says

A sting operation after accusations of "lewd behavior" at two South Sarasota County parks led to the arrests of six men on charges based on "inappropriate conduct in public," authorities said Thursday.

The crimes allegedly took place at Jelks Preserve in unincorporated Sarasota County between North Port and Venice along with Caspersen Beach in unincorporated Sarasota County near Venice city limits.

One of the men told an undercover cop he was looking for "fun in the sun" while another agreed to allow an undercover cop to take a photograph of his naked body.

The men arrested include: Charles Archibald, 61, of Lakewood Ranch;

Brian Betourney, 60, of the 9000 block of Anita Avenue in Englewood; Paul Burik, 75, of the 300 block of Tortuga Drive in Nokomis; Ronald Frost, 51, of the 300 block of Alligator Drive in Venice; Gustavo Gatell, 76, of Sarasota and Thomas Imholt, 68, of the 800 block of Bayport Circle,

"On March 27, undercover detectives monitoring the parks, picnic areas, and trails observed six men engaging in a variety of inappropriate conduct in public," the Sarasota County Sheriff's Office said in a news release. "In each instance, the suspects openly interacted with an undercover detective by exposing sexual organs or solicit-

ing lewd behavior." Each of the men is charged with indecent

exposure and posted either \$500 or \$1,000 bond on March 27 or March 28. Burik had an added charge of resisting without violence, garnering the \$1,000 bond because of it.

"The behavior of these men in a public space where there are families and children is absolutely appalling," Sheriff Tom Knight said in the news release. "Unfortunately these operations are necessary to remind offenders the seriousness of their actions. We will continue to focus on crimes like these so everyone can enjoy a safer Sarasota County."

Archibald, Betourney and Frost were arrested at Caspersen Beach at 4100 Harbor Drive; Burik, Gatell and Imholt were arrested at Jelks Preserve at 2300 North River Road.

Derelict boat pulled from **Charlotte Harbor mangroves**

Vessel owner paid for removal

A derelict boat that has been haunting Charlotte Harbor waters for several months was removed on Thursday, west of the U.S. 41 bridges.

The 23-foot vessel that recently drifted into the harbor's mangroves just north of West Retta Esplanade was declared derelict by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission in March. The owner of the vessel was contacted and hired Sea Tow Charlotte Harbor to remove it.

'The owner was out of state and wasn't aware that it was blown up here on the shore, so it took a little time to get a hold of him," said Capt. Mike DeGenaro of Sea Tow. "He's doing the right thing.

Sea Tow representatives declined to reveal the name of the owner or the expense to remove the vessel. They did say that

the vessel will be hauled to a facility owned by Sea Tow for removal of any hazardous materials like batteries and oil and sent to a landfill.

Derelict vessels are regulated by the FWC. Removing them can be a long process.

"The process to remove a vessel would have been a minimum of 45 days," said FWC spokesperson Brian Norris. "Once we declare a boat derelict and notify the owner, if we don't get a response we have to wait (another) 20 days before we sticker the vessel. Then we start the process for removal of the vessel. So it takes about two (or so) months ... if not longer."

The vessel was on the verge of FWC removal when the owner hired Sea

Norris said FWC sends a notice to the most recent registered owners of derelict vessels.

"We had a huge influx across the county all at the same time (this past

year)," Norris said. "We are trying to be proactive to remove them."

Failing to remove a derelict boat can mean civil and criminal penalties for the owner.

"We send the bill (to the owner) if they don't remove the vessel themselves," Norris said.

Owners who don't pay the bill face a first-degree misdemeanor.

"Unfortunately, owners don't (always) come forward like this gentlemen did and take care of it," Norris said. "There are so many (derelict vessels) in Charlotte County. Unfortunately (a lot of people) walk away because it is so expensive to have vessels removed. I would say that we probably (remove) 10 a year."

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
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Detectives want to speak with cold case homicide tipster

Detectives with the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office Cold Case Unit want to speak with the person who sent in an online tip earlier this year regarding the homicide of Sharon Gill in 1990.

Gill was found stabbed to death in her home on Rampart Boulevard in Deep Creek on March 21, 1990. She was home alone at the time of the incident, and there were no signs of forced entry into her residence, according to detectives. At the time of her death, she was a 42-year-old white female, 5'4" and 135 pounds with brown hair and hazel eyes.

Detectives said some of the information they have so far matches the information provided by the tipster.

"The tip is probably right on target and we would very much like to speak with the person that submitted the tip," they wrote on the Sheriff's Office website. "Please contact us. We are currently working on that case and we would appreciate any information we can get. If you absolutely

that commissioners have made a shelter a legislative priority, which Tiseo disputes.

It also highlights

Kitson's plan has been to build a field house that would also serve as a

shelter near the growing community of Babcock Ranch. Babcock sits in the previously undeveloped eastern section of the county. That region is one of the only parts of the county where elevations rise out of the high hazard flood plain. With most of the population living near the water, Charlotte County is currently one of two counties in the state with no Red Cross approved shelters, although the county has opened several schools as

The dispute has stalled

on the question of who knew what, and when. Tiseo states he never knew of the legislation until the *Sun* reported it on Feb. 25. Tiseo says he believes no staff or other commissioners knew either. Charlotte County Commissioner Stephen R. Deutsch has agreed that he did not know about the legislation, while other commissioners have not commented.

Gleason reported Thursday, however, that the county staff were informed on Feb. 11, about a week after the legislation was filed.

Kitson asserts that he told commissioners in private, during one-on-one meetings.

"We told every single one of them about the appropriation," he said.

Deutsch has taken a philosophical view, saying that as a former Rhode Island state legislator himself, he understands legislators do their own thing.

Tiseo has not backed down, however.

"The (legislative) subcommittee, based on false premises, approved an \$8 million appropriations request. They need to know that it's not right. They think the people in Charlotte County were able to exercise their first amendment rights to speak for or against the proposal.. It needs to be withdrawn because the underlying information is false."

Tiseo also objects to the fact that the shelter will serve as a regional resource, benefiting other counties that have not weighed in on the project, or offered to help pay for it. Grant countered any notion that Babcock Ranch and Kitson are using public funds for its own field house.

"If Syd Kitson wants to build a sports arena, he can do it with or without hardening it for a shelter. All he's asking for is the money for the upgrades so it can be considered Red Cross approved, which adds a considerable amount to the cost," Grant said. "He's a man of integrity. There's nobody besmirching this guy

attorney handling the negotiations on Wednesday. Schmidt, Conn said, "got us through (to) a settlement."

Once those terms are on paper, Schmidt will sign off and the agreement goes before the DeSoto Board of County Commissioners. The five-member group will likely vote to accept those recommendations on April 23. The hearing is at 6:30 p.m.

"We're pleased at the progress that was made yesterday and we look forward to the commission's review of the recommended settlement," said Jackie Barron, Mosaic's Public Affairs manager. "We continue to believe that Mosaic will

be a strong community partner in DeSoto for generations to come."

were "a transformative moment — one people aren't going to forget for a long time," said Greg Tolley, department chair of FGCU's Department of Marine and Ecological Sciences, calling the relationship an opportunity to "pool our resources and bring them to bear on one of the most pressing water issues of our time."

The idea to partner occurred to both institutions nearly simultaneously, said James L. Llorens, FGCU's interim provost and vice

president for Academic Affairs.

"We were both thinking about it at the same time," Llorens said, "And I happened to make a call to Michael Crosby, and it was like we'd both been thinking about it... so he came down to FGCU and we quickly came to the conclusion that this alliance would be mutually beneficial."

ally beneficial."
The partnership with 64-year-old Mote is a major first step for the university's new Water School, announced last

"We look at this as part of building partnerships, part of building brain trust and expertise in the region as we try to apply an even more interdisciplinary approach to solving some of these water issues, which I view as very, very connected," Tolley said. "It's by seeing them as part of a greater system that we can have much more success in terms of getting the water right."

The nonprofit Mote and the university have collaborated before
— "one-on-one, scientist-to-scientist in the past, and had a great relationship," Tolley said, "and now we're looking towards partnering more comprehensively and in a more interdisciplinary fashion to try and address

some of the issues."
Though the day-to-day

logistics are still taking shape, he expects scientists will share space, funding and even some teaching responsibilities.

"We've got language we're writing in that allows us to have kind of affiliate appointments," Tolley said. "So a faculty member at FGCU might also hold an appointment with Mote and vice versa."

Rather than have territorial divisions, Crosby said working together will be paramount.

"It's not a 'You get this, and we get that,' idea, but more of a 'What can we do together with every aspect of this?' Us working in their facilities, them working in our facilities, us jointly conducting field research, field monitoring, field testing new technologies. I see us working very, very closely with each other," Crosby said. "If anything, this (agreement) is trying to bring down those artificial silos that often separate research institutions."

With a \$22 million annual budget, Mote has developed expertise in fundraising over its 64-year history, which it can leverage to help both institutions, he said, which will be key to finding solutions.

"The problems we're facing, and any initiatives that we're developing — they're bigger than a single institution can handle bigger than any one individual. It's bigger than any one field of science. And the only way that we are going to be able to attack red tide impacts, and the impacts of other harmful algae blooms is if we all work together and partner," Crosby said. "I think the bottom line is this is another very significant step forward with two premier organizations coming together to address major environmental challenges that the state of Florida is facing."

Gator poacher gets 3 years prison

First of four in Arcadia ring to be sentenced

ARCADIA — The first of four defendants alleged to have operated an illegal alligator harvesting ring has negotiated a plea bargain with the state to spend three years in prison.

Robert Kelly Albritton, 38, of Arcadia, pleaded guilty to racketeering, conspiracy to commit racketeering and scheming to defraud, plus 13 counts of the illegal killing, possessing or capturing of alligators or alligator eggs.

He turned himself in to the DeSoto County Jail. The original charges had a potential of more than a century behind bars.

Following his release in about three years, he will be under probation for the next 10 years.

He is barred from any professional contact with three alleged co-conspirators: Robert Beasley and Carl Wayne Pickle Jr., of Arcadia, and David Wentwort Nellis, of Punta Gorda. He must pay \$82,254.40 in restitution to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, plus \$25,417.44 in investigation costs and \$2,936.81 in court costs.

Florida FWC regulates



ALBRITTON the collection, possession and transport of alligators and alligator eggs. Operations such as harvesting eggs from nests are supervised and licensed by the state, and detailed reports are

required. In 2013, FWC began to investigate suspected unlawful possession of alligators and eggs. They set up an undercover business, "Sunshine Alligator Farm" in DeSoto County, staffed with undercover FWC agents.

Over the course of the investigation, Albritton reportedly purchased or collected more than 13,000 eggs or hatchlings, which he then delivered to a farm in Louisiana.

The operation is detailed in the 54-page probable cause affidavit. There were numerous harvesting excursions when Albritton and one or more of the alleged co-conspirators went to collect eggs.

Although there was a daily limit on the



number of eggs that could lawfully be taken, during these trips more eggs were collected than allowed by law.

Under state permits, they were only allowed to look at up to 50 percent of the nests they found; an empty nest had to be counted as one of the 50 percent. But the PCA indicates they routinely examined all of the nests they found and covered up empty nests so they could claim they were in the unopened 50 percent. Because they routinely kept more eggs than were allowed under state law, they were also paying smaller fees to the state than they should have.

The PCA describes egg-collecting trips made to public lands such as the Cecil Webb Wildlife Management Area, as well as private properties such as the 2 X 4 Ranch, Tiger Bay Ranch and Rum Creek Ranch in DeSoto County. The operation included filing false reports understating the number of eggs

collected and underpaying the required fees. The PCA indicates

Albritton was "laundering" eggs through the Seminole Tribe by filing documents indicating eggs had been purchased from the tribe, or that an authorized tribe member participated in the collection. Documents filed with the state were sometimes reportedly falsified, for example, signed by the certified biologist that he was present during the examination and collection of eggs from the nests, when in fact he was not there. Many of the eggs were shipped to a business in Louisiana, and Albritton and others were receiving checks from that business.

Charges are pending against the other three codefendants. The trio are charged with conspiracy to engage in racketeering. In addition, Beasley was charged with six counts of illegally killing, possessing or capturing alligators or eggs, Pickle with four counts, and Nellis with one count along with one count of uttering a forged instrument.

Albritton had not yet been transported to the Department of Corrections as of press



Punta Gorda City Council approves payment method for canal project

Public opinion falls on deaf ears for Buckley's Pass in Punta Gorda

Decades in the works, the controversial Buckley's Pass project is finally

moving forward in Punta Gorda.

On Wednesday, the City Council approved the final assessment resolution during a public hearing at the Charlotte Harbor Event and Conference Center in Punta Gorda that identified the special assessment district property owners responsible for paying for the nautical cut-through.

The crowd of nearly 600 people was mostly supportive of the project, albeit not how it would be funded.

"It seems people want to speak in favor of the project, but not all are in the favor of the assessment funding method," Irene Gargerman, of Punta Gorda Isles, told the Sun.

"All of PGI residents should pay for it," said one PGI resident at the public hearing. "This is only pitting people against each other.'

The council approved the final assessment resolution despite the apprehension from the community. The assessment method requires only a portion of PGI and surrounding communities to pay for the pass, including the "Bird Cut section" dubbed for its bird-based street names.

The approved assessment district encompasses properties south of Aqui Esta Drive, west of Almar Drive and city limits, and largely east of Bal Harbor Boulevard. Those in the district have been deemed to benefit from the project

when completed. Over the next four months, the city will complete its construction bid for the project and seek out companies interested in the work, according to City Communications Manager Melissa Reichert.

Those bids will be evaluated and awarded, and notices will be sent to all of those properties that could benefit from prepayment time frames.

"My husband and I are real estate brokers for over 50 years," said Diane Simmons. "Your

methodology to assess only the Bird Section is wrong. Buckley's Pass is for water craft that is allowall PGI and it will attract more people. I m being assessed for two water access units since I fall within this arbitrary 85foot rule with 100 feet so I'm expected to pay \$2,000 and I don't have a boat."

The project, named for the late Capt. John "Jay" Buckley who spearheaded the project in the '90s, will create a nautical cut-through in the Bird Section of Punta Gorda Isles that will create a shorter, more direct and convenient route that connects the PGI canal system to Charlotte Harbor and leads boaters through the existing Ponce de Leon Inlet harbor access point.

Based on the city's last projected total cost of \$3.15 million for the project, property owners in the district would pay \$983 up front or \$399.53 per year, if paid over three years using the water access unit assessment method, which includes 2,785 water access units.

A "Water Access Unit" or "WAU" is defined as

a dock, lift, slip or other structure for receiving able under existing code regulations and will be the standard unit for assessment calculation of each parcel. A property of 84.99 feet or less would be permitted to have a dock and one boat lift or up to three outpilings, therefore one WAU payment. Parcels more than 85 feet are permitted to have a dock and two boat lifts, one boat lift and three to six outpilings, so two or more WAUs.

The City Council's vote for the assessment method was not unanimous. The final vote was 3-2 with Vice Mayor Lynne Matthews and Council Member Debby Carey dissenting.

"I totally support the Buckley's Pass project and want it to go forward expeditiously," said Vice Mayor Lynne Matthews, "however, I do not agree with the assessment methodology, as I feel it is not fair and equitable, and will be a financial burden to a lot of citizens who are affected by the assessment."

A homeless woman was lucky to survive a four-acre brush fire in north Englewood Wednesday morning. She suffered smoke inhalation, was treated at Englewood Community Hospital and released Wednesday afternoon.

Forestry investigating Englewood blaze

ENGLEWOOD — A homeless woman woke suddenly Wednesday from intense heat and crackling noises in her camp in a wooded area of north Englewood.

The woman woke to a four-acre brush fire surrounding her and her

She had to crawl out on her hands and knees to safety, said Karen Dega, curator of the farmer's Market That Cares. Dega has known the two women who made the camp for themselves in the woods for several years. The location of the second homeless woman is unknown, Dega said Thursday.

The Englewood Area Fire Control District and other first responders constrained the fire to the undeveloped property between Artists Avenue and Celia Court, McCall Road and North Indiana Avenue.

The homeless woman called 911. She would later be treated for smoke inhalation at Englewood Community Hospital and released from the hospital Wednesday afternoon. Dega said the woman also warned the store owners on North Indiana Avenue of the fire.

Some have speculated if it was a campfire that got out of control.

"There was no fire in that camp," Dega said. "The last time they had a fire was that cold night several weeks ago. They had that fire in a large metal container, and all the brush was cleared 25 feet or more away from the container."



A pair of clay angels was all that was left after a brush fire burned a homeless camp in Englewood.

The fire scorched the camp, but two small clay angel figurines Dega gave the women survived the blaze. After the fire, the Christ Lutheran Church provided the woman with a quilt, and others gave her clothing, Dega said.

Fred Barrett, the only homeowner on Celia Court, saw the fire burn right up to his back property line, but he wasn't worried, commending firefighters who returned Thursday and doused hot spots. Barrett suspected the homeless established a

camp a few weeks ago. But the homeless didn't bother Barrett since they have been bedding down on several different wooded areas in north Englewood.

Artist Avenue resident

Melissa Brew worried she might lose her home, which bordered the fire, but she also worried the homeless, that they were safe. Her parents, who live next door to her, suspected the homeless established a camp behind their houses.

"I don't want them there, but there's nothing I can do about it," Artist Avenue resident William Galasso said. He was at work Wednesday and wasn't aware that a fire

raged behind his home. The Florida Division of Forestry is now investigating the cause of that fire, as well other smaller fires in the area, **Englewood Fire Chief** Scott Lane said. Forestry hadn't reported a cause for the fire Thursday,

Local control: Whose interests being served?

OUR POSITION: Once again, Florida Legislature moves toward preemption of local control.

lastic straws are handy items

So convenient, National Geographic reported recently, that some 500 million straws supposedly are used every day throughout the world.

Handy and disposable. One study, according to National Geographic, claims as many as 8.3 billion plastic straws are scattered on beaches worldwide.

Then comes reports of wildlife harmed by plastic items: plastic bags, plastic six-pack rings, plastic straws. One pathetic viral video shows rescuers trying to extract a plastic straw from the nostril of a sea turtle.

Tugs at the heart strings. A lot of heart strings, it turns out.

On trips to the beaches around here, we haven't noticed plastic straws to be a particularly obvious little problem. Cigarette butts, yes. But straws don't seem to be clogging the shoreline.

Nevertheless, straws are now the posterized enemy of environmental groups advocating against disposable plastics. Seattle was the first U.S. city to ban plastic straws and utensils in 2018. Other West Coast cities have fallen in line: San Francisco, Oakland and Malibu. Portland will soon fine restaurants \$500 if they automatically give patrons plastic straws or utensils.

When does it end? So what's a sensible politician to do?

If they're in the Florida Legislature, try to cut it off as early as possible with a sweeping measure intended to stop the movement before it catches hold.

That's the idea behind a measure from Sen. Travis Hutson, R-Elkton, which would place a five-year moratorium on local ordinances that ban disposable plastic straws. Hutson's bill would give the state Department of Environmental Protection five years to study the impact of plastic straws on wildlife and the environment. The measure passed the Senate Commerce and Tourism Committee last

This is just another affront to the idea of local control and the constitutional concept of home rule for Florida cities and counties. It surfaces from time to time when local governments begin to enact local regulations that conflict with the wishes of business and industry. Legislative "preemption" in the form of a state "study" was used back in 2008 to thwart local bans of Styrofoam and plastic bags, according to the South Florida Sun Sentinel. That's five years for

a simple study.

The straw ban is catching on.
Bans are in place, or are being phased in, in Delray Beach, Coral Gable, Miami Beach and Fort Lauderdale. Nationally, cities are responding. Big business too: Disney, McDonald's and Starbucks have committed to eliminating single-use disposable

Justifying his preemption measure, Hutson labeled the local laws "government overreach." He's right. But it's state government overreach.

A time-honored conservative principle holds that governments closest to the people tend to govern best. Local governments. In this and other cases, concerned individuals approach local elected officials and make a pitch for regulations they feel strongly about. Local governments respond, yea or nay.

That's how it's supposed to work: government of the people. Government responsive to local

people.
Why is it that, when it comes to matters affecting big business and their lobbyists, that ideal is so easily discarded by the nannyish state?

Pelosi, not Lopez Obrador, is driving border crisis

hen historians look back to this era, they will wonder why we insisted on outsourcing our border control to a foreign country.

President Donald Trump's threat to close down the southern border with Mexico isn't a sign of strength, but of frustration fading into desperation.

He is reacting with understandable alarm at a spiraling migrant crisis on the border, and is looking to Mexico to address it because we are unwilling to do it on our own — not unable, unwilling.

There were more than 100,000 apprehensions at the border in March, an increase from the 76,000 in February. The numbers for both months were the highest in 10 years. The total for the fiscal year could

hit a million, a historic surge completely overwhelming our capabilities.

We built our border facilities to hold single men, back when illegal migrants were largely adult males from Mexico, rather than family units from Central America. This means that they are ill-suited for the needs of women and children. Regardless, the sheer numbers are leading to authorities releasing migrants almost as soon as they are caught.

Secretary of Homeland Security Kirstjen Nielsen warned Congress last week of "the real-time

dissolution of the immigration system."

It's not that border control has been tried and failed; it hasn't been tried. Thanks to court decrees and congressional enactments, we don't permit ourselves to quickly return minors from Central American countries, or to detain them for any significant period of time. They get released, along with the adults accompanying them.

The asylum process is broken. The initial so-called credible-fear interview to determine whether asylum-seekers get to the next step of the process approves almost all of them, even if they are unlikely ultimately to win asylum. In the meantime, they are waved into the country and probably never removed.

The migrants coming in increasing numbers realize that we are helpless to exclude them and, indeed, surrender to Border Patrol agents when they get here.

Congress could fix all this in an afternoon, with a few key changes in the law. Trump has a Nancy Pelosi problem much more than an Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador problem. But, since Pelosi is unmovable, Trump has to try to work the Mexican president, known by his initials, AMLO.

Mexico has done more to play ball with the U.S. under Trump than most people would have thought possible, yet all the migrants showing up at our border are still traveling through the country. Mexico doesn't make controlling these migrants a high priority

here, not there.

The talk of cutting off the border isn't aimed at the migrants, who largely don't come through ports of entry, but at forcing the Mexican government to do more. Maybe the mere threat of the resulting economic disruption will work.

But if Trump goes through with closing the border, the strategy has some of the same weaknesses as the government shutdown earlier this year. Where does it end? If Mexico doesn't act quickly, how long are we going to keep the border closed? The longer it's closed, the more pain will be felt in the U.S. economy at a time when there are already signs of softness. What if Mexico initially buckles, then backslides? Will we shut down the

because they will end up border again, or threaten to?

Even if this gambit were guaranteed to succeed, it's insane that a sovereign country of unparalleled power has tied its own hands such that it must try to bully and cajole a foreign nation to do immigration enforcement for it.

In a more rational world, Congress would take seriously the spectacle of U.S. officials - and humanitarian organizations scrambling to handle a flood of humanity showing up every day, and give them the legal authorities and resources to get the situation under control. That it won't is a dereliction of duty of the highest order

Crisis Center, provided a two-year funding grant to Charlotte County for two people. Staff launched a planning effort in anticipation of this grant in November at the same time the Charlotte Harbor MOAA chapter contacted the county about establishing the Mission United model.

The county is now ready to proceed and the Charlotte County commissioners have approved the contract and accepted the state grant money. This new initiative

will be referred to as MyCharlotteFloridaVet and partners with the 2-1-1 program.

Charlotte County Veterans' Service will still provide health and human services information to veterans. There are many other resources in the county available for veterans that will require new partnerships. It's important to gather databases from organizations already servicing veterans to ensure accurate, comprehensive and consolidated service

wherever possible. Charlotte Harbor

MOAA members are supportive of this effort. Collaboration with the trained, caring and industrious MyCharlotteFLVet team will provide the necessary 24/7 coverage for veterans and their families in Charlotte County. The transition to this new concept will be seamless and is the right thing to do.

SMH fails to meet North Port's needs for hospital care

♦ here is a millage tax that all homeowners pay to Sarasota Memorial Hospital. This tax is to take care of any indigent patients unable to pay or not having any type of stay or services at the

hospital. Over the past 10 years, North Port has been taxed over \$30 million. The question has to be: Did North Port get its responsible coverage for this sum of taxation?

Let's explore the circumstances: It takes approximately one hour to travel to Sarasota Memorial Hospital from North Port. If airlifted by helicopter, the cost is over \$20,000. If a patient is hospitalized and the spouse or parent needs to run back and forth from the hospital to take care of other family members, how much time does that caregiver spend on the road daily?

Is that convenient? With all the expansions of Sarasota Memorial Hospital in the past tew years, does it make sense that North Port, being the largest city in Sarasota County with close to 70,000 residents, does not have a critical care hospital extension of Sarasota Memorial within

its city boundaries? When approached by the city and other concerned agencies within North Port, Sarasota Memorial decision-makers come up with spurious comments, like North Port doesn't have enough physicians to support a hospital. If physician counts were to be taken to neighboring cities and towns like Englewood, Punta Gorda and Port Charlotte, who all have hospitals and in

some cases two hospitals, one could readily see the non-genuine response SMH constantly offers as

an excuse. Back in 2008, the city of North Port and the Community Health Action Team of Nort Port met with Sarasota Memorial CEO Gwen Mackenzie to discuss the need for an immediate care facility to be built in North Port until such time as a critical care hospital could be built. The North Port Emergency Room is the result of this cooperative effort and has served the community well since that time with anywhere from 80 to 100 patient

visits daily. At that time, the population of North Port was approximately 30,000 residents. Mackenzie has since left SMH for greener pastures and her successor has found fit to continue to delay the construction of a hospital

in North Port. The size of the hospital that would serve North Port well would be a 200-bed critical care hospital.

Though we are proud of the emergency room facility in North Port, it does not take the place of a critical care hospital. There must be a place where illnesses like hypertension, diabetes, renal failure, congestive heart failure, just to name a few, can be treated and

controlled. There are several options North Port should consider exploring if SMH continues to stonewall the construction of a hospital in this city.

• To consider doing a search for a hospital willing to come to North Port by applying for a state certificate of need. North Port has plenty of ways to incentivize this

offer. Only hospitals with great track records with their evaluations should be considered. One such hospital is Doctors Hospital in Sarasota.

• To consider getting the city legal department to find ways of getting the millage taxation away from SMH and making it available to any hospital willing to come to the city or to take the indigent citizens to their local hospitals.

• To consider getting state legislators to pass a law to take the millage taxation and put it in an escrow account and when an indigent patient is served in any hospital within the community, that hospital can draw on that escrow account to pay for its services.

It is always better to try to build bridges than fences in any situation, but North Port has gone

way beyond the pale to get SMH to work with them to bring quality

health care to this city. As long as SMH continues to push North Port around and continues to take from \$3 million-\$5 million in taxation from them annually, SMH has no immediate need to respond to the needs of

this city. It is time for North Port to play hardball with this county-based hospital and stop being the redheaded stepchild of this

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Amendment 4 will likely cost 'millions' to carry out. Here's why.

Lawmakers might have to create a statewide system for tracking victim restitution, one of the few aspects of a criminal sentence that isn't tracked.

As Florida lawmakers debate how to carry out Amendment 4, which aimed to restore the right to vote to more than a million felons who completed their sentences, there is one thing the House and Senate seem to agree on.

Restitution — the money that felons have to pay out to the victims of their crimes — must be repaid in full before they're allowed to vote.

There's just one small problem, though: No one tracks restitution.

County clerks, who log nearly all other aspects of a criminal case, don't. Florida's Department of Corrections doesn't.

Even felons sometimes don't know how much they owe, or even who they owe it to.

As thousands of felons register to vote, state officials might have to create a statewide system to verify one of the most complicated aspects of someone's sentence. It's not going to be cheap. If not done properly, it could delay or prevent thousands of felons from

"I think it's going to be expensive," said state Sen. Jeff Brandes, the St. Petersburg Republican who is helping craft the Senate version of the bill. "It's going to be in the millions of dollars."

For many, it's an unanticipated complication of Amendment 4, which 64.5 percent of voters approved last year. The amendment overturned Florida's policy of permanent felon disenfranchisement, allowing former felons to vote if they completed "all terms of their sentence including parole or probation."

Republican lawmakers and some key supporters of Amendment 4 believe sentences includes restitution. Others disagree. (Republicans in the House and Senate differ on whether a sentence should include two other costs — court fees and fines - after they are converted to civil liens.)

For felons, restitution is a fundamental part

of someone's sentence and helps ensure the victim is "made whole," according to Neil Volz, political director for the Florida Rights Restoration Coalition, which advocated for Amendment 4.

Yet he believes Amendment 4 was selfimplementing, and that the Legislature doesn't need to do anything.

"Adding new bureaucracies and spending millions of dollars tracking down paperwork from 30 years ago is not what the voters voted for in November," he said.

What is restitution?

So what exactly is restitution? It's the term used for the amounts determined by the courts to cover a victim's loss, and they're handed down when judges sentence someone to prison or probation.

It sounds simple. In Florida, it's not.

Each county in Florida and each judge can handle restitution differently. They could order the felon to pay the victim directly. Or they could have the court clerk collect it.

Further complicating things is that while in prison or on probation, the Department of Corrections collects restitution from the felon and gives it to victims.

Because the amounts can be in the thousands or millions of dollars, felons are required to pay a certain amount each month. They often haven't paid it off by the time they finish probation. (One woman told lawmakers last week that she owes \$59 million in restitution, which she'll never pay off, therefore preventing her from ever voting.)

Once a person is off probation, however, the Department of Corrections stops collecting restitution. By that point, the amount has usually been converted into a civil lien, and felons pay either a debt collector, their local clerk of court or the victim directly.

But when felons leave custody, the Department of Corrections does

not automatically tell them nor court clerks how much of their debt remains outstanding.

Paying back restitution in the years following release can be more complicated still. What happens when the victim you've been paying dies? Or the company that you burglarized goes out of business?

And even victims who are still around don't know what to do with the restitution checks they get, according to Carolyn Timmann, Martin County's clerk of the circuit court and comptroller, who has been on the forefront of the issue.

"Some of the really big corporations might get a check for \$15 and they don't even bother to cash it," Timmann said. "They don't know what to do with it."

She said felons who keep paying restitution to a victim that doesn't exist can see the money go to the state's unclaimed property system.

The result is that no one in Florida knows how many felons owe restitution, or how much they still owe. Brandes said the number of felons unable to vote because of such debts could be in the thousands or hundreds of thousands.

Solving the problem might be left up to a working group made up of state and local officials proposed in the Senate's bill.

At the least, Timmann said requiring the Department of Corrections to tell clerks how much someone owes when they're released would help. She also suggested having some state entity collect and distribute restitution so it could be consistently tracked.

One of the few states that does collect and distribute restitution is Vermont. It's paid for by a 15 percent surcharge on criminal and traffic fines and collected by the Center for Crime Victim Services.

Created in 2004, it has a staff of nine people for a state with a population the size of Polk County. That's about 3 percent of Florida's entire population.



Want to save money on your power bill?

FPL giving surveys to help customers save

Florida Power & Light estimates it can save customers up to \$300 per year on their electric and water bills.

FPL scheduled more than 70 appointments for home energy surveys in the area this week.

During a typical survey, an energy expert from FPL goes out to the customers home to analyze their current energy and water usage, and identify areas where they could potentially save money.

Wanda Cantres, an FPL energy expert, paid a visit to Susan Green in Port Charlotte to see how she may be able to reduce her

The first thing she does when she goes to a home is check the thermostat.

This is the quickest way to find savings. "Air conditioner is

the number one driver of high bills," said FPL spokesperson Florencia Olivera.

FPL recommends

homeowners set their thermostat at 78 degrees, or as close to that as possible when home, and up to 82 when away. FPL estimates you can save 5 percent on monthly cooling costs for each degree you increase the temperature.

"We have found that is the setting that is most cost-effective and comfortable," Olivera said.

In Green's home, Cantres said she found the air filter was not fitted properly, which would allow dirt to pass through.

"The filter is crucial," Cantres said, "That was about the only problem."

Cantres added two improvements that would allow Green's appliances to work more efficiently: insulation around their water heater pipes to keep hot water in, and a new sink faucet head, to cut water waste.

Green saves additional dollars by enrolling in the "On Call Savings Program." The program allows FPL to switch off select appliances for up

to three hours during high demand times, in exchange for a monthly credit on your bill. Customers can earn up to \$137 in credit annually, depending on which appliances they select.

Green has her AC on this program, which will equate to \$9 per month in the summer and \$4 a month through the rest of the year, or \$83 annually.

Each energy expert spends an average of one hour at the customer's house during a survey. Time can go up or down depending on the size of the home, and how many questions the homeowner has for the expert.

FPL also held an event at the Family Service Center in Port Charlotte Wednesday to provide customers with information about how to save money on their bill.

"We like to offer customers takeaways they can implement at home,' Olivera said.

FPL likes to schedule these types of events before summer, when

bills tend to go up.

"I'd like to have someone come do the survey at my house to see what we can do better and conserve energy," said Kathy Padula of North Port, who was at the event.

She scheduled an appointment for the next

First steps to new housing on Henry Street OK'd

Neighbors concerned how the development will affect traffic in the area

A new housing development could be on the way in Punta Gorda along West Henry Street, and it has some neighbors worried about overcrowding.

"I understand that there is a need for housing in this area," said Mary Eichman, a neighbor to the property at 200 W. Henry Street. "But I stand in front of my house and I see walkers all around, but there are no sidewalks on Henry or Grace (Street). There is (already) a speeding problem here. You have residents passing each other (all the time) while driving on Henry Street ... which is only two

meeting, the City Council approved the first reading of a rezoning proposal for property at 200 W. Henry St. that would allow for 13 new single-story apartment units.

The rezoning still has to come back before the City Council for final approval before any action at the property can be taken. The current zoning allows for a commercial business aspect that is inconsistent with the surrounding

neighborhoods. We would like to develop six duplexes and one, single unit on this property to provide 13 (rental spaces)," said Juergen Siewer, who is looking to develop the land. "Īt's also planned that the units will be

20 feet in height."

The property being considered for the 13 units sits between West Grace Street and West Henry Street on just under one acre of land. The new zoning allows for 15 units per one acre of land. The two-bedroom, one-bath units would run between \$1,000 and \$1,200 a month per annual lease, according to

Area resident Laura Hutt is also concerned about increased traffic in the area.

"There could be 26 cars for 13, two-bedroom units," Hutt said. "To me 26 cars is already (too much to put into) less than an acre ... plus visitor parking. There is

(Street) nor Henry street. So there could be no (additional) parking on those streets.'

Siewer said he surveyed the property for parking options and can provide at least 24 car parking spaces comfortably. He plans for a Key Weststyle development in the area that will "mesh well" with the current area's

overall appearance. Vice Mayor Lynne

Matthews thinks the new apartments would be a good fit for the area.

"This fits perfectly into that zone that we are looking to increase (housing)," Matthews said. "This also fits in the surrounding community zoning for all the other properties around it."

Hutt said the area has enough housing options already.

"There are plenty of rentals in that area ... Anne Street has duplexes and rentals," Hutt said. "I walk my dog on those streets everyday. There is no shoulder and people drive very fast down those



School Board approves charter school contract, extends grade level

SARASOTA — The Sarasota County School Board approved amending a contract with Student Leadership Academy, allowing the charter middle school to extend its grade level to include ninth grade.

The contract passed in a 4-1 vote Tuesday night, with Robinson dissenting, noting that he would have preferred to have the charter review committee take a look at the contract before casting his vote.

"I want to hear from the collection of people in the charter review committee and have their input before I decide on matters such as charter schools," Robinson said. "I think it actually helps the charter schools hearing from a variety of disciplines and how they look at the charter school application and I think that SLA would've benefited from hearing from our staff on this process."

The contract was tabled at a March 5 meeting after all five board members argued that it would disadvantage students to keep them from moving on to high school. The board further discussed the proposal, which would allow the Venice school to add up to 50 ninth grade students, at a March 26 workshop.

Despite the board's opposition, a state law permits the high performing charter school to expand its grade level. The might be the inevitable, board was given 90 days to modify the contract with the school.

Representatives from the school presented their proposal to the board during the workshop.

Jonathan Cooley, principal of Student Leadership Academy, said the purpose of the expansion is to give students who aren't socially and emotionally ready to enter a larger school an extra year to mature and develop coping skills to help them succeed in high school.

Cooley noted a majority of parents send their children to the school due to the smaller class sizes and individualized attention that students receive. He said many students start to struggle academically because of the stress of being in a larger school environment.

"For a lot of kids that's overwhelming," Cooley said. "It creates a lot of anxiety, which affects their personal life, their home life and their academics."

School Board member Shirley Brown argued that the transition into high school would be more difficult for students if they miss the first year.

you're really going to be making a big difference to make it so that these kids will really be able to then come into school in 10th grade or if we're just pushing this down the road and the kids are going to have the same problem," Brown said. "I still think you're

"If they come into Venice High School and all of their cohort people During the meeting, Brown, who voted in favor in the contract, said she still had concerns about keeping students from moving on.

But noted that allowing students to complete ninth grade at the charter school would reduce the stress of being at a large high school and help them maintain a good grade point average.

"I know that it'll be problematic for some students, but that's a decision that we need to leave to these parents," Brown said. "It's up to the parents to decide whether they want to allow their children to go to the four-year high school right away or if they want to leave them in the more protective environment of their charter school. But I think that it's something that parents need to think about long and hard before

they make the decision." School Board member Bridget Ziegler pointed out that she also had concerns about the expansion, but recognized the school's efforts to meet the needs of students through its expansion.

"I know that moving into high school is really, it's a different beast, in my opinion, but I understand that trying to adapt and respond to the needs of your school community," Ziegler said. "So my hope is that it's in the best interest of those students."

Publix stopped giving to politicians after NRA controversy. But now they're back in business.

Publix is back in the

political arena. The Lakeland-based grocery chain donated \$33,000 to Florida lawmakers in February, the company's first contributions since halting all political giving last year during a national firestorm related to the Parkland shooting.

Last May, Publix generated significant backlash after the Tampa Bay Times reported the company and its current and former leaders and founders had donated \$670,000 to Adam Putnam's campaign for governor. It was the most by far that Publix had ever donated to a single political campaign.

Gun violence survivors and activists were outraged that the popular supermarket chain had thrown its support behind Putnam in the wake of the deadly shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland. Putnam, a Republican, declared himself a "proud NRA sellout" in 2017.

Parkland students led by David Hogg encouraged a boycott of Publix and activists staged die-ins at its stores. In its damage control, Publix responded by halting all contributions indefinitely and internally told employees it was reviewing its political giving policies.

That pause, though, ended in February. The company donated \$1,000 to 33 lawmakers, including Democrats and Republicans, just before the start of the legislative session.

Publix spokesman Brian West declined to comment on any changes to the company's policies, but he acknowledged company money was flowing to campaign coffers again.

"The important work done by our elected officials has significant impacts on Publix, our associates and our customers," West said. "As such, Publix has made the decision to reengage in the political process.

In response to the Times' story Monday, Hogg tweeted: "Who's ready for another boycott?"

Amid the fallout, Publix distanced itself from the NRA, declaring it supported Putnam because of his Polk County roots and not because of his allegiance to the controversial gun-rights group. Nevertheless, the company halted donations during a contentious governor's race, even after Putnam lost the primary to Ron DeSantis.

Prior to last year, Publix, the state's largest private company with about 800 Florida locations, was a heavy hitter come election season. Since 2010. Publix had delivered \$4.5 million to candidates, committees and parties, both directly and through its contributions to the Florida Retail Federation, a closely affiliated political committee.

Sen. Joe Gruters, R-Sarasota, said he didn't expect Publix to re-enter the political fray but he's glad it has. Publix gave Gruters, the chairman of the Florida Republican Party, \$1,000 on Feb. 22.

"You can't sit on the sidelines and think you're going to be able to accomplish your legislative goals at the end of the year," said Gruters said. "It's like sticking your head in the sand. It doesn't work. You gotta participate. They're the largest employer in Florida and they have a lot to lose "

Publix's five-man obbying team is working on about three dozen bills filed during the 2019 legislative

session, according to state disclosure reports, including legislation related to pharmacies, workers' compensation and trucking. One of the bills would eliminate a state law that disallows localities from instituting plastic bag bans. Another is a bill that would have required state employers to verify the eligibility of workers via e-verify.

Gruters said he hadn't heard yet from Publix's lobbyists. But he added: "There are so many complicated issues and contributions don't buy votes, but it does help." (After the story published, Gruters said he meant that, "You can't buy votes, period, but it does help to participate in the process.")

While Republicans have mostly benefited from Publix's largess over the years, 13 of the 33 lawmakers to get a check from the company were Democrats. Many of those Democrats have worked alongside the same gun violence activists who called for the Publix boycotts.

Among those is Rep. Shevrin Jones, a Democrat representing West Park in Broward County and one of the loudest critics of state gun laws. Jones said Publix "is a staple in our state" and was appeased by the company's political hiatus.

"I don't think it would be fair for me to say whether or not the criticism (of Publix) was fair. I don't speak down on anyone's activism," Jones said. "Our first amendment gives us that right to voice our concerns and protest things we don't agree with. I'm more or less hopeful that during that time of reevaluation that they've looked at how they do these things going forward to make sure that kind of thing doesn't happen again

Publix donated to \$1,000 to Jones' campaign on Feb. 18.

"They got this vision what this corner could be, since it right in the middle of everything," said Pastor Dan Prine.


Unfortunately, soon after the church moved in, Hurricane Charley swept through in 2004, damaging a large

portion of the building.

"Parts of the roof were torn off, the old worship area was ruined, but it wasn't nearly as bad as some other places got," Prine said. That serving the community aspect has really been our main focus since."

Now, the church members do everything they can to reach out and give back to the surrounding area, from a food pantry to their next-door thrift shop.

One of their largest ministries is the bike ministry, which receives donations from Port Charlotte Town Center security and other local organizations. A team of volunteers fixes them up and matches people in need with quality bicycles every Wednesday.

"We just try to connect as much as we can with the community," said Prine.



"Our mission statement is 'helping people meet, know and serve Jesus' so our goal is, whatever we are doing, to bring God into it, too."

And to do so, the church has a multitude of services, including one in their newly started North Port campus.

"We found that around 300 of our families live in North Port and drive all the way down here," said Prine. "For years, we've been involved in North Port with the Poinsettia Festival, with their Fourth

of July celebration, at North Port High School, so it's nice to actually have one of our services over there."

The church also offers a service time specifically for those going through tough times, called Celebrate Recovery on Monday evenings.

"It's for people with all sorts of hurts, habits and hangups so there are folks with addiction issues, people going through divorce, people with anger issues. Those services have really become a big source of support for those who are struggling," Prine said.

While most of the services are contemporary, those

was an avid golfer at Deep Creek Golf Club, carrying on a passion that began playing on his high school golf team, before, he said, his knees dictated other less strenuous pursuits.

During his installation, Father Riley told a full church that it wasn't so much a signature event just for him, but rather a celebration for the entire parish. "As God's people," he said, "each of us has a contribution to make. We're all in this together."

In a later interview, he said, "I'm honored to be here. Such nice people. It's a vibrant, active parish, all kinds of great things going on here. The people have been very gracious, warm, pleasant, welcoming. It's a great experience.

"The Lord has blessed us on our journey to the Kingdom of God," he said. "This is our spiritual home."

Father Riley, 63, is a native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where he played on his high school golf team and graduated from the University of Iowa before being ordained.

He discovered Florida visiting his retired parents in 1992 in Naples, and now, he says he's here to stay.

He carries with him a rich Irish sense of humor, and admits, smiling, to making crass remarks at times. Like the time, he recalls, a parishioner, reminding him of the rapidly revolving door for San Antonio administrators in recent years, asked him," How long are you going to be here?"

"I'm 63 years old," he replied. "I'm not going anywhere. This is my last rodeo."

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

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

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

Congress challenges Trump on Yemen

President expected to veto measure passed by House

WASHINGTON — Rejecting a plank of President Donald Trump's foreign policy, the House on Thursday invoked never-before-used powers to demand that his administration withdraw support from the Saudi-led war in Yemen. The Senate passed the same resolution in March with bipartisan support.

Trump is expected to issue a veto of the measure, his second as president, and Congress does not have the votes to override him. But the action

was nonetheless a milestone for lawmakers, who have shown a renewed willingness to assert their war-making powers after letting them atrophy for decades under presidents from both parties.

"The president will have to face the reality that Congress is no longer going to ignore its constitutional obligations when it comes to foreign policy," said Democratic Rep. Eliot Engel of New York, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

Yemen was plunged into a civil war in September 2014, when rebels known as

Houthis swept into the capital and overthrew the country's internationally recognized government. The Saudi-led coalition began fighting the rebels months later in a campaign that Saudi Arabia said was aimed at curbing Iranian influence. At the time, the Houthis were allied with forces backed by Iran; in the years that followed, Iran's role in the conflict has grown.

The conflict has been a bloody stalemate for years. Thousands have been killed in Saudi airstrikes on civilian

Colleges strive to ease student stress

WALTHAM, Mass. — Bentley University has plenty of success stories among its faculty and alumni. But one recent evening, the school invited students to hear about the failures.

Speaking to a crowded auditorium, one professor recounted the time he sank a \$21 million company. Another recalled failing her college statistics course. One graduate described his past struggles with drug addiction. Each story reinforced the same message: Even

successful people sometimes that you're not taking fail.

"Failure is normal. It's healthy. And I think people on this panel would argue it actually is transformative," Peter Forkner, director of Bentley's counseling center, told students. "If you're not

failing, it probably means

enough risks.'

Bentley, a private business school near Boston, joins a growing number of U.S. colleges trying to ease students' anxieties around failure and teach them to

Trump backs off border shutdown

President threatens tariffs on cars from Mexico

WASHINGTON — Abandoning his threat to immediately seal the southern border, President Donald Trump warned instead on Thursday that he'd slap tariffs on cars coming to the U.S. from Mexico unless the Mexicans do more to stop the flow of migrants and drugs to the U.S.

In his latest backtrack in recent days, Trump told reporters he would try the "less drastic measure" before resorting to his standing border-closure threat.

"Mexico understands that we're going to close the border or I'm going to tariff the cars. I'll do one or the other. And probably start off with the tariffs," Trump said. He added later: "I don't think we'll ever have to close the border because the penalty of tariffs on cars coming into the United States from Mexico, at 25 percent, will be massive.'

It was the latest, seemingly sudden attempt at new leverage by a president struggling to solve what his administration has called a border "crisis." And

Florida House passes \$89.9B budget; Senate negotiations next

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida House on Thursday passed its \$89.9 billion budget for the fiscal year that begins in July, setting the stage for negotiations to begin with the Senate on a final state spending plan.

The vote was 105-8 for the Republican-crafted plan, with the handful of no votes coming from Democrats. The GOP-led Senate unanimously passed its \$90.3 billion version Wednesday. Both legislative blueprints are below the \$91.3 billion budget recommended by Gov. Ron DeSantis, also

a Republican.

Budget negotiations now will consume much of the remaining weeks of the annual legislative session, which is scheduled to end in May. Funding for education, health care, higher education reforms, the environment, school safety and student mental health services, affordable housing and Hurricane Michael recovery are among the major topics

of discussion. House Speaker Jose Oliva said after the vote there are many differences to bridge among lawmakers and interest groups on these and other topics in the days ahead. A state budget is

the only bill lawmakers are required to pass during the session.

"You have to bring people together to come to a general agreement and hopefully to get most of what everyone wants, but it's impossible to get everything everyone wants," said Oliva, a Miami Lakes Republican.

"Our toughest time is still ahead of us."

Although most House Democrats voted for the budget to keep the process moving, many took the floor to raise concerns that spending levels were far too low. In public K-12 education, for example,

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Judge rejects lawsuit from sheriff fired in Parkland shooting

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — A judge on Thursday dismissed a lawsuit filed by the Florida sheriff whom Gov. Ron DeSantis suspended after accusing him of failing to prevent the Parkland school shooting.

Broward Circuit Judge David Haimes ruled that DeSantis' executive order removing Scott Israel from his position as Broward County sheriff was consistent with the Florida Constitution. The judge didn't assess the merits of the specific allegations against Israel.

DeSantis, who suspended Israel from his elected position in January and appointed an acting sheriff, accused Israel of neglect of duty and incompetence. The governor has said Israel displayed poor

leadership and failed to keep families and children safe before and during the Feb. 14, 2018, shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School that left 17 people dead.

"I am pleased that the court recognizes my authority as governor to suspend a public official for reasons of neglect of duty and incompetence," DeSantis said in a prepared statement. "Now, I will ask the Senate to move forward with the process of the formal removal of Scott Israel. Broward County deserves professional law enforcement leadership that will safeguard the best interests of the community and work diligently for the protection of life.'

Israel has said DeSantis overstepped his constitutional authority and

interfered with the public's right to determine their elected official. His attorney said they're appealing Thursday's decision.

"The governor's disagreement with Sheriff Israel's decisions is not a basis to remove him from office," attorney Benedict Kuehne said in a prepared statement. "Only the voters of Broward County, who overwhelmingly elected Scott Israel as sheriff, should have the authority to decide who is their elected sheriff. The Fourth District Court of Appeal will be asked to decide this important constitutional question."

The Florida Legislature, which must approve DeSantis' decision to suspend Israel, is reviewing the matter. The Senate president has appointed a special master to preside over a hearing on the suspension. Senate President Bill Galvano previously said the Senate would wait for Israel's court proceedings to play out first.

Before the shooting, Israel had changed his department's policy to say deputies "may" confront shooters, instead of "shall." Critics say that gave eight deputies an excuse for not confronting the gunman during the shooting.

Several parents of slain students had pushed the newly elected Republican governor to remove Ísrael, a Democrat. Calls for Israel's ouster began

shortly after the shooting when it was revealed that the deputy assigned to guard the school, Scot Peterson, had not gone into the building to confront the shooter, but took cover outside.

The pressure increased after it was learned the sheriff's office received and disregarded a call in 2016 and another in 2017 warning that suspect Nikolas Cruz, now 20, was a potential school shooter. Deputies also had about 20 contacts with Cruz as a juvenile — mostly over arguments with his now-deceased mother.

Israel has said none of those contacts warranted an arrest. Law enforcement members of the state commission investigating the shooting have agreed with that conclusion.

Florida bill adds new restriction on leftover campaign cash

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida political candidates wouldn't be able to donate leftover campaign cash to a charity if either they or an immediate family member run the organization under a bill heading to the House

The House State Affairs Committee unanimously approved the bill Thursday.

Candidates for state office have limited ways they can dispose of leftover campaign money, including donating it to charity.

But bill sponsor Republican Rep. Bobby Payne said candidates shouldn't essentially give themselves campaign money in the form of

a donation to a charity where they draw a salary.

A Senate companion bill has one more committee stop before reaching the full chamber.

Driving on empty: Florida could expand selfdriving car law

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Self-driving vehicles could be operated in Florida without a human backup under a bill going to the House floor.

Tampa Fire Rescue spokesman Jason Penny says the agency will make a determination on his status once the report from the sheriff's office is reviewed.

Sheriff Chad Chronister tells news outlets Hartzler's arrest is part of an operation against human trafficking. Three other men were also arrested.

An attorney wasn't listed for Hartzler.

Police: Child porn suspect kills self during traffic stop

KISSIMMEE (AP) — Police say a suspect in a Florida child

pornography case fatally shot himself Wednesday evening after officers took his children during a traffic stop near Orlando.

Officers stopped the vehicle after recognizing 48-year-old Luis Valentin as a suspect in the child porn case. Kissimmee police spokeswoman Bailey Myers told news outlets that officers didn't realize at first that Valentin had his two children — ages 7 and 11 — inside.

Myers said Valentin shot himself and died at the scene shortly after the children were taken from the vehicle. His ex-wife, Ana Valentin, also was at the scene. She told WFTV that he "always said that before he would be in jail he would kill himself."

Myers said a responding officer suffered minor injuries when his patrol car flipped over.

Ethiopian report says faulty sensor data led to jet crash

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia - A doomed Ethiopian Airlines jet suffered from faulty readings by a key sensor, and pilots followed Boeing's recommended procedures when the plane started to nose dive but could not avoid crashing, according to a preliminary report released Thursday by

the Ethiopian government. The findings, including the faulty sensor data, drew the strongest link yet between the March 10 crash in Ethiopia and an October crash off the coast of Indonesia, which both involved Boeing 737 Max 8 jetliners. All 346 people on the two planes were killed. Both planes had an

automated system that pushed the nose down when sensors readings detected the danger of an aerodynamic stall, but it now appears that sensors malfunctioned on both planes.

Thursday's report, based on flight data and cockpit voice recorders on the Ethiopian Airlines jetliner, showed that a faulty sensor on the plane touched off a series of events that caused the pilots to lose control of the plane. The report from Ethiopia's Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau said the sensor problems began about a minute after the plane was cleared for takeoff.

It said air speed and altitude values on the left side of the 737 Max

conflicted with data from the right sensor, causing flight control problems. Eventually the Ethiopian Airlines pilots couldn't keep the plane from crashing into the ground, killing all 157 people onboard.

The problems are similar to those reported on the Indonesian Lion Air flight that crashed last October. Investigators found that software on that plane took readings from the sensor and pointed the nose down. Thursday's revelations raise questions about repeated assertions by Boeing and U.S. regulators that pilots could regain control in some emergencies by following steps that include turning off an anti-stall system designed specifically for the Max.

UK government, opposition search for a Brexit plan

LONDON — The British government and senior opposition figures tried Thursday to overcome intractable differences and forge a new plan for departing the European Union, as the bloc warned of dire consequences if the U.K. leaves the EU without an agreement next week.

Prime Minister Theresa May was trying to avert a chaotic "no-deal" Brexit — and also tamp down divisions within her Conservative Party inflamed by her shift toward compromise.

May faced fury from anti-EU Conservatives after she agreed to talks with Labour Party leader Jeremy Corbyn, who favors a softer

form of Brexit than the plan advocated by the government. Two junior ministers have resigned, and more could follow.

Senior government and Labour officials held four and a half hours of talks Thursday, after an initial two-hour session between May and Corbyn the day before.

Both sides gave little away about what progress was made, but said the talks would continue Friday.

Treasury chief Philip Hammond said both parties needed to be flexible to break the

Brexit impasse. "When you enter into a negotiation like this to find a compromise way forward, both parties have to give something

up," he told broadcaster

ITV. "There is going to be

pain on both sides." The political paralysis over Brexit has left Britain facing a possible chaotic departure from the EU in just over a

After U.K. lawmakers three times rejected May's agreement with the bloc that was struck late last year, the EU gave Britain until April 12 to approve a withdrawal plan, change course and seek a further delay to Brexit, or crash out of the EU with no deal to cushion the shock.

Economists and business leaders warn that a no-deal Brexit would lead to huge disruptions in trade and travel, with tariffs and customs checks causing gridlock at British ports and possible shortages of goods.

Police had earlier filed a single, representative murder charge against 28-yearold Australian Brenton Harrison Tarrant. He is due to appear via video link during a brief hearing on Friday, and won't be required to enter a plea.

Fifty people died in the March 15 attacks on two mosques and another 50 were injured.

Police said in a brief statement that they were considering filing more charges against Tarrant but couldn't comment further as the case was before the court.

Cholera is surging once again in war-ravaged Yemen

SANAA, Yemen (AP) — Cholera is surging once again in Yemen, with the U.N. reporting that the number of suspected cases has doubled in March over previous months and doctors in overwhelmed health facilities fearing it could rival a 2017 outbreak that spiraled into the

The surge underscores how Yemen, which has endured multiple outbreaks of cholera amid four years of civil war, still isn't able to stop its spread.

At al-Sabeen Hospital in the capital of Sanaa, beds are full and patients sleep in tents in a courtyard. Some of them wait for treatment by lying on cardboard under trees, with IVs dangling from the branches.

There were 76,152 new suspected cases and 195 deaths in March, compared to about 32,000 cases in February and 39,000 in January. The March toll brought the number of those believed to have died from cholera this year to nearly 300.

English-speaking men can face arrest for antics in Poland

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Police in southern Poland say they are investigating four English-speaking tourists spotted last week in the historic city of Krakow wearing only mankinis.

The four men were caught on CCTV and by an Associated Press photographer Friday as they walked in the picturesque Renaissance Market Square and got into a horse cab. They were wearing lime green mankinis, as worn by Borat, the fictional Kazakh alter ego of comic actor Sacha Baron Cohen.

Barr defends handling of Mueller's Russia report

WASHINGTON —
Attorney General William
Barr on Thursday defended his handling of special
counsel Robert Mueller's
report on the Russia
investigation, saying
the document contains
sensitive grand jury
material that prevented it
from being immediately
released to the public.

The statement came as Barr confronts concerns that his four-page letter summarizing Mueller's conclusions unduly sanitized the full report in President Donald Trump's favor, including on the key question of whether the president obstructed

justice. House Democrats on Wednesday approved subpoenas for Mueller's entire report and any exhibits and other underlying evidence that the Justice Department might withhold.

The disparity in length between Barr's letter and Mueller's full report, which totals nearly 400 pages, raises the likelihood of additional significant information that was put forward by the special counsel's office but not immediately shared by the attorney general.

In his statement, Barr defended the decision to release a brief summary letter two days after receiving the report on March 22. He previously

said he wanted to release the entire document in gradual or piecemeal fashion. He is now expected to release the entire report, with some redactions, by mid-April.
"Given the extraordi-

"Given the extraordinary public interest in the matter, the Attorney General decided to release the report's bottom-line findings and his conclusions immediately — without attempting to summarize the report — with the understanding that the report itself would be released after the redaction process," Barr's statement said.

The statement also said that every page of Mueller's report was marked that it may contain grand jury material "and therefore could not immediately be released."

A Justice Department official, speaking Thursday on condition of anonymity to discuss a confidential process, said summaries of the findings that Mueller's team included as part of its report also contained grand jury information.

Barr has said that while Mueller did not establish a criminal conspiracy between Russia and the Trump campaign, the special counsel left open a decision on whether the president had tried to obstruct the Russia investigation. The Mueller team laid out evidence on both sides of the question in a way that neither alleged a crime nor exonerated Trump, according to Barr's letter from last month.

Barr said he was continuing to work with Mueller's office on redactions to the report so that it could be released to Congress and the public.

Mormons repeal ban on baptisms for children of gay parents

SALT LAKE CITY — The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on Thursday repealed rules banning baptisms for children of gay parents and making gay marriage a sin eligible for expulsion — marking a reversal of policies condemned as jarring detours from a push by the faith to be more compassionate about LGBTQ issues.

The 2015 rules that were approved by global church leaders had prohibited baptisms for children living with gay parents until the children turned 18 and disavowed same-sex relationships.

With the change, children of gay parents can now be baptized as long as their parents approve the baptisms and acknowledge that the children will be taught church doctrine, the church said in a statement from its highest leadership group called the First Presidency.

The faith widely known as the Mormon church said in a statement that it is not changing its doctrinal opposition to gay marriage and still considers same-sex relationships to be a "serious transgression."

But people in same-sex relationships will no longer be considered "apostates" who can be kicked out of the religion, the statement said. That label given to same-sex couples in the 2015 policy was widely condemned by LGBTQ members and allies as being demeaning and hurtful to people who already struggle to find acceptance in the faith.

"The very positive policies announced this morning should help affected families," church leaders said in the statement. "In addition, our members' efforts to show more understanding, compassion and love should increase respect and understanding among all people of goodwill. We want to reduce the hate and contention so common today."

Stock indexes finish mostly higher after a wobbly day

Another wobbly day of trading on Wall Street ended Thursday with modest gains, nudging the market's winning streak to a sixth straight day.

Markets have been wobbly throughout the week as investors wait for the government's jobs report on Friday and prepare for a new round of corporate earnings

strategist at Federated Investors.

The S&P 500 index rose 5.99 points, or 0.2 percent, to 2,879.39. The Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 166.50 points, or 0.6 percent, to 26,384.63. The Nasdaq fell 3.77 points, or 0.1 percent, to 7,891.78. The Russell 2000 index of smaller company stocks picked up 6.58 points, or 0.4 percent, to 1,567.49.

FBI rejects teen's claim to be long-missing boy

CINCINNATI — DNA tests disproved a teenager's claim of being an Illinois boy who disappeared eight years ago, the FBI said Thursday, dashing hopes that the baffling case had finally been solved.

For a day and a half, a breakthrough seemed to be at hand when a teenager found wandering the streets of Newport, Kentucky, on Wednesday identified himself as 14-year-old Timmothy Pitzen and claimed he had just escaped from two men in the Cincinnati area who had held him captive for seven years.

Timmothy Pitzen was the name of a boy from Aurora, Illinois, who disappeared in 2011 around the time of his mother's suicide, and there have been a multitude of false sightings and hoaxes over the years.

"DNA results have been returned indicating the person in question is not Timmothy Pitzen," FBI spokesman Timothy Beam in Louisville said in a statement. "A local investigation continues into this person's true identity."

He added: "Law enforcement has not and will not forget Timmothy, and we hope to one day reunite him with his family. Unfortunately, that day will not be today."

Timmothy vanished at age 6 after his mother pulled him out of kindergarten early one day, took him on a two-day road trip to the zoo and a water park, and then killed herself at a hotel. Amy Fry-Pitzen left a note saying that her son was safe with people who would love and care for him, and added: "You will never find him."

After the teenager came forward, Aurora police and the FBI began checking out his story. Authorities and Timmothy's family had reacted cautiously to the latest turn in the case after a multitude of disappointments over the years.

"There have been so many tips and sightings and


whatnot, and you try not to panic or be overly excited," said Timmothy's grandmother, Alana Anderson. "Every day you hope, and every day you worry."

She didn't answer a phone call immediately after the FBI announcement.

Police have said
Timmothy's mother might
have dropped the boy off
with a friend, noting that the
boy's car seat and SpiderMan backpack were gone.
Police also found credit card
receipts showing she bought
children's clothing and toys
in Wisconsin.

Timmothy's grandmother said Thursday that her daughter had fought depression for years and was having problems in her marriage to Timmothy's father. Some news reports suggested she was afraid she would lose custody of the boy in a divorce because of her mental instability.

At the time of the boy's disappearance, police searched for him in Illinois, Wisconsin and Iowa.

"We've probably had thousands of tips of him popping up in different areas," Aurora police Sgt. Bill Rowley said Wednesday.

At Greenman Elementary, Timmothy's schoolmates, teachers and parents tied hundreds of yellow ribbons around trees and signs. A garden was planted in his memory.

The \$1 billion ask: Trump all-in on fundraising for 2020

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump is well on his way to raising the \$1 billion his campaign believes it will take for him to win another term in the White House, building a fundraising machine that will prove difficult for Democrate to match


Democrats to match. Trump's bring-it-on fundraising approach which will be on display during a stop in Los Angeles on Friday — is a far cry from his stance in 2015, when the billionaire reality TV star and developer launched his first bid for president promising to use his own money to finance his campaign. It's also an indication of how he has made his political apparatus more professional for Round 2.

For all presidents, incumbency has its advantages. Trump, who formalized his re-election effort the day after he took office, moved especially early to leverage his incumbency for 2020.

As Trump brings in millions, his would-be opponents are scrambling to raise enough money to earn themselves a spot on the primary debate stages. And the Democratic National Committee remains in debt from previous campaigns.

"Whoever the Democratic nominee is, they'll be depleted, and they'll have to start from zero — well under zero, the DNC has a debt," said Michael Glassner, the Trump campaign's chief operating officer. He called Trump's decision to keep the campaign in operation during his first two years in office the "new model" for future presidents.

Through the end of 2018, the last date for which figures are publicly

available, the Trump campaign had brought in more than \$129 million. President Barack Obama, by comparison, didn't even begin his 2012 re-election campaign until 2011.

Artist who created first paint-by-numbers pictures dies

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — Dan Robbins, an artist who created the first paint-by-numbers pictures and helped turn the kits into an American sensation during the 1950s, has died. He was 93.

Robbins, whose works were dismissed by some critics but later celebrated by the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History, died Monday in Sylvania, Ohio, said his son, Larry Robbins.

He had been in good health until a series of falls in recent months, his son said.

Robbins was working as a package designer for the Palmer Paint Company in Detroit when he came up with the idea for paint-bynumbers in the late 1940s. He said his inspiration came from Leonardo da Vinci.

"I remembered hearing that Leonardo used numbered background patterns for his students and apprentices, and I decided to try something like that," Robbins said in 2004.

He showed his first attempt — an abstract still life — to his boss, Max Klein, who promptly told Robbins he hated it.

But Klein saw potential with the overall concept and told Robbins to come up with something people would want to paint. The first versions were of landscapes, and then he branched out to horses, puppies and kittens.

"I did the first 30 or 35 subjects myself, then I started farming them out to other artists," said Robbins, who mainly stuck to landscapes.

Amazon's Jeff Bezos and wife MacKenzie finalize divorce

NEW YORK (AP) — Amazon said Thursday that founder and CEO Jeff Bezos has finalized his divorce with wife MacKenzie, who will end up with a stake in the online shopping giant

worth more than \$35 billion.

In a tweet, MacKenzie Bezos said she is giving Jeff Bezos all her interest in The Washington Post, the newspaper that he bought in 2013, and Blue Origin, the space exploration company he founded.

"I'm grateful for her support and for her kindness in this process," Jeff Bezos said in a tweet Thursday. "And am very much looking forward to our new relationship as friends and co-parents."

When the divorce is complete, which is expected to happen in about 90 days, MacKenzie Bezos will have a 4 percent stake in Amazon. Jeff Bezos, one of the world's richest people, will have a 12 percent stake in the company, valued at more than \$108 billion on Thursday.

He'll be Amazon's largest shareholder, and he'll also keep voting control of MacKenzie Bezos's shares, according to a filling with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Turmeric supplements are safe to try for arthritis relief

DEAR DR. ROACH: | recently read about turmeric for osteoarthritis. I'm on a limited income. Please tell me more about it, like how much it costs and where I

can get it. — W.C. **ANSWER:** Turmeric, a spice that has been used for millennia, is the source of curcumin, which has been shown to improve symptoms of osteoarthritis, at least in short-term studies. It is generally thought to be safe, as most people have no side effects or only occasional stomach upset, nausea or diarrhea

A theoretical concern is bleeding, in combination with anticoagulants, but this appears to be rare. I have had many patients try curcumin, and it has improved symptoms in about half of those who tried it.

Turmeric is easy to find at any grocery store, but when curcumin is used as a supplement, it is usually combined with other supplements to help with absorption. A common one is piperine, derived from black pepper. It's difficult to

use turmeric from food to get a pharmacologic effect. The usual dose is 400-500 mg two or three times daily. A month's supply from a reliable online retailer I found cost about \$10.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I need information about vaginal atrophy. I am 75 years old and have suffered for two and a half years. I am in miserv. — H.

ANSWER: Vaginal atrophy is a common condition of older women, or any woman who is more than a few years post-menopause. The lining of the vagina is

dependent on estrogen to maintain its normal health. As estrogen levels decrease after menopause, the lining of the vagina may become thinned, leading to symptoms of dryness and discomfort. Women often find that sexual intercourse is painful. Recurrent urinary tract infections may be the first way the problem is recognized. The vulva is affected, too, and in severe cases, the labia can even fuse.

I routinely see women with symptoms who haven't been diagnosed. I don't often see women who have been diagnosed and who are still suffering. The hard part, at least in my experience, is making the diagnosis: Some women don't know to ask, or are embarrassed to do so, and some doctors don't routinely ask or perform a regular examination. Once the diagnosis is made, treatment is straightforward and effective: an estrogen cream or gel usually does a good job of relieving symptoms and reducing urine infection risk.

Estradiol, the bioidentical female hormone, works well topically and is not absorbed very much into the blood, so it is considered safe. However, women with a history of estrogen-sensitive breast or uterine tumors absolutely should discuss use of vulvovaginal estrogen with the doctors taking care of these cancers. Men can be reassured that there is no risk to them, although one expert group recommends estrogen be applied at least 12 hours prior to intercourse.

I am sometimes asked about laser treatment. Since I last wrote about vaginal atrophy, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has issued a warning against laser devices that purport to treat symptoms or improve the appearance of the vulva and vagina. The FDA warned, and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists agreed, that the effectiveness of these devices is unproven and that they have the potential to cause harm, including burns and scarring that result in worsening pain. Until there is better data to support the efficacy and safety of these treatments, I recommend against them.





South went up with dummy's king on the opening club lead to play a diamond to his ace and then ruff a

diamond in dummy. He crossed back to his hand with the ace of clubs and ruffed another diamond. South could have made his contract at this point by cashing the ace and king of spades, then discarding his last diamond on the jack of spades after the queen falls.

When declarer cashed dummy's ace of spades, West casually followed suit with the queen! South had no reason to doubt the honesty of this card, so he led a club from dummy. East continued the defensive deception by playing his queen of clubs! South ruffed and led his last diamond, ruffing with dummy's nine of hearts. East overruffed with the 10 and led the 10 of clubs, shocking South and delighting West. South ruffed with the eight of hearts, but West discarded a spade rather than overruffing. Declarer led the king of hearts, losing to West's ace. West got out with a diamond and claimed two more tricks with the queen-seven of hearts sitting over declarer's jack-six. Take that, champs!

Trump says US, China 'rounding the turn' in trade talks

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said Thursday that the U.S. and China are "rounding the turn" in a lengthy negotiation over trade and predicted that "something monumental" for both countries could be announced in a matter of weeks.

"We have a ways to go but not very far," Trump said during an Oval Office appearance with both

countries' negotiating

Vice Premier Liu He, China's top trade negotiator, agreed, telling Trump that "because of your direct involvement, we do have great progress." The talks resume Friday.

China and the U.S. are working to end a standoff that has shaken financial markets and darkened the outlook for the world economy.

The U.S. and Chinese negotiators on Wednesday began their ninth round of talks to resolve the dispute American imports.

over American allegations that Beijing is using predatory tactics in a campaign to challenge U.S. technological dominance. China has denied the allegations. These tactics, the U.S. says, include cybertheft and forcing American companies to turn over trade secrets in exchange for access to the Chinese market.

Trump has slapped tariffs on \$250 billion in Chinese products. In retaliation, China has targeted \$110 billion in

"Anxiety is rising like crazy," said Nance Roy, a psychologist who works

Stanford University encourages its students to celebrate their failures through song, poetry and other creative outlets at an annual event called "Stanford, I Screwed Up! Colorado State University invites students to take a pledge to embrace failure and persist through it.

"Normalize failure. It's part of life. It's one way we learn," the message says. "Sometimes students need to fail, and not be given an undeserved grade by a sympathetic faculty member."

it was a dramatic departure for Trump, who last week tweeted that he would close the border or large swaths of it this week unless Mexico immediately halted "ALL illegal immigration coming into the United States" — a seemingly impossible task.

Trump said at the time that he was "not kidding around," and his acting chief of staff Mick Mulvaney said in a television interview Sunday that it would take "something dramatic" for Trump not to close down the crossings.

Since then, however, White House advisers, border city leaders and U.S. economists have warned that such a move would have enormous economic consequences

on both sides of the border, interrupting supply chains and boosting U.S. consumer prices on everything from avocadoes to autos.

Trump in recent days has also backtracked on his push for Republicans to again take on health care and surprised his own education secretary by reversing a plan to ax federal aid for the Special Olympics.

Those actions have only added to longstanding concerns about whether Trump's words can be trusted. Trump, who has long said his unpredictability is one of his greatest negotiating assets, has also followed through with some of his most bombastic threats, including forcing the country's longest-ever government shutdown over border funding.

Trump had already

appeared to be easing off his border threat earlier this week. Though he said Tuesday all options remained on the table, he shifted his goal posts, calling on Congress to pass immigration legislation to avert a closure and praising the Mexican government for doing more to apprehend migrants traveling through the country from Central America though it's unclear anything has changed.

Marcelo Ebrard, Mexico's foreign relations secretary, said Tuesday his government had not changed its policies. And on Thursday, Mexico's ambassador to the U.S. Martha Barcena told The Associated Press the country was working to make its own border "more orderly" but "migration will never be stopped."



It came exactly 10 years after the Hurricanes clinched their most recent playoff berth on April 4, 2009, when they beat Pittsburgh. These Hurricanes will enter their regular-season finale with 97 points — matching that 2009 team for second-most in club history.

Andy Greene scored and Cory Schneider stopped 22 shots for the Devils, who have lost three of four and have clinched last place in the Metropolitan Division.



Tampa Bay meets face to face with Longoria

Friday will be team's first game against All-Star since 2017 trade sent him to San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO — He left behind memories, including several of the most iconic moments in franchise history. Numbers, too, nearly a dozen team records.

When the Rays come face to face for the first time with their greatest player on Friday in San Francisco, the admiration between them and Evan Longoria will be extremely mutual.

"It's going to be weird, it's going to be different," Longoria said. "It's exciting. A lot of the team has changed over the year-and-a-half. There's really only a few guys that I know, that I played with there, but it doesn't make it any less special or meaningful."

Longoria's impact on the franchise, which wasn't coincidental with its rise to prominence, is measured in myriad ways beyond the homer and 260 others he hit, 150 games played a season, three All-Star appearances and Gold Gloves won.

Such as the \$50 million Kevin Kiermaier got.

Sharing a previously untold story, Kiermaier said when he was called up in June 2014 for what was supposed to be a cameo and played well, Longoria went to Rays management and insisted they keep him around.

"Longo said 'you're sending someone else down, you're not going to send KK down. He was our best player this weekend and we're trying to win. You're not sending him down."

The plea bought Kiermaier three extra days in the majors until the Rays had to make a roster move.

The payoff came three years later, when Kiermaier made the cut, by one day of service time, for Super 2 arbitration status. And the Rays, as a result of his eligibility, offered the long-term deal he took and guaranteed him \$53.5 million.

"If I never got those extra

three days, who knows what my situation is as far as contracts," Kiermaier said. "I'll never forget what Longo did. ... To have the guy I look up to, who I didn't know very well at the time, for him to do that, it brought tears to my eyes. That's why I said I'll go to battle with that man any day of the week. ...

"It speaks volumes for his leadership, his being a veteran, a true professional. I am forever grateful for that reason, along with all the things he'd done for me and everybody else over the years."

There are stories, from Kiermaier and the six other active Rays — yes, only seven total — left from 2017, Longoria's final season before being traded to the Giants, about how he helped the team play better, and his mates become better players, stressing preparation, priorities and, above all else, winning.

"I'll have respect for that man forever," Kiermaier said. "He showed me how to be a true professional on and off the field. ... Now I'm trying to pass on the things he taught me to other guys."


Manager Kevin Cash said there was and still is "so much appreciation" for what Longoria meant to the Tampa Bay organization, that "there's still a lot of people that really respect him as a player and, more importantly, as a friend."

The decision to trade the face of the franchise on December 2017 wasn't as shocking as some saw it.;

The Rays planned to transition to a younger core and saved about \$60 million of the \$86 million they owed Longoria on his under-market deal. They added another talented young player in Christian Arroyo.

But that didn't make it any easier for Longoria to accept.

"When I was there, I never really took it for granted and I enjoyed all the memories and moments I had there," Longoria said. "I talked to you guys about wanting to be there

my whole career, wanting to be a Ray, and made that clear with the contracts I signed there.

"So it was tough to kind of have to come to grips with that. But I guess that's just the nature of the game, and everybody is trying to better their team in any way they can. So I don't have any resentment or hard feelings.

"I think my family wishes we were still there from the sheer fact it was easier and comfortable and we had everything set up (in St. Petersburg)," he said. "When you know what you're going into it's much easier to play this game. I really enjoyed my time there. And I do look fondly back at the memories."

He still keeps up with the team he spent 10 years with, noting "for them to do what they did last year and put together the team they have now, it's pretty nice to see."

And he keeps in touch, texting with Kiermaier and

manager Kevin Cash, checking in with signing scout Fred Repke, playing in a fantasy golf league with special assistant/ former coach Tom Foley and others.

Also with Matt Duffy, the currently injured third baseman. "Duffy is living in my (St. Petersburg) house so I've kind of got to keep tabs on him to make sure he's a happy tenant."

Longoria's first season as a Giant, he admits, was a "tough" one.

His much-hyped arrival was followed by a slow start followed by a six-week disabled list stint due to a broken left hand. He finished with career lows in batting average (.244), homers (16) and OPS (.694).

Knowing who's who and where to go, while getting less attention, has him more comfortable, at 33, for his second season in San Francisco, with three more guaranteed plus a 2023 option. "Not being the

guy, I think I did maybe two interviews the whole spring, which was nice," he said.

Like many of us, Longoria wishes MLB had worked it out during the once-every-three-years inter-league rotation for the Giants to instead be playing at the Trop (though the Rays are making their first trip to San Francisco since 2002.)

Are the Lightning the best hockey team ever?

Yahoo Sports columnist thinks so due to more evenly distributed competition, salary cap

The Lightning has v

The Lightning has yet to play a postseason game. It squandered its

chance to set a new single-season NHL record for victories. It still has to win its fi-

nal two games to even tie the 1995-96 Red Wings' mark of 62.

Never mind all that. The 2018-19 Lightning, which takes a 60-16-4 record into tonight's game against the Maple Leafs, is the best hockey team ever assembled, according to Yahoo! Sports hockey columnist Ryan Lambert.

"There was little doubt that this wouldn't be one of the best teams in the league," Lambert writes. "Probably the favorite for the Presidents' Trophy, if we're being honest. Instead, they ended up becoming the best of all time."

The Lightning managed to become just

the third team in NHL history to win 60 games, despite playing at a time when teams' spending is constrained by a salary cap and the league is more competitive than ever, Lambert writes.

The '95-'96 Red Wings and '76-'77 Canadiens
— the only other teams besides the Lightning to win 60 or more games
— had the benefit of playing before the salary cap, Lambert points out.

The Wings, who played five teams with fewer

than 27 wins a total of 18 times, padded their win total against weaker competition, recent expansion teams and underfunded clubs. Plus, they spent lavishly on their roster.

Meanwhile, more than half — 10 of 17 — of the other teams in the league the year the Canadiens reached the 60-win mark had records below .500. They also benefitted from seeing a style of play the rest of the

league never did thanks

to scheduled exhibitions against the Soviet team.

"As for the Lightning, well, they can still tie Detroit's record of 62 wins, and at a time when there's more talent being distributed more evenly than ever throughout the league," Lambert writes.

"There's more travel than ever. Everyone's smarter, in better shape, all that stuff. Teams actively play to get to overtime and the shootout just to get the loser point. Even the absolute worst teams in the league aren't as bad as the worst the Red Wings or Canadiens would have faced.

"It hasn't much mattered."

Of course, Lambert acknowledged, there's still work to be done.

"They can't hit 132 (points), and whether they hit or miss 62 wins, this Lightning team is the best ever assembled.," Lambert writes. "They just gotta win a Cup, I guess."

Some might call it a distraction from the game. Others say it simply adds fuel to the

"It definitely makes it a little more spicy," said former WNBA player and basketball analyst Rebecca Lobo. "Everything has more flavor when it has more spice. And Coach Auriemma and Muffet McGraw going back and forth with their comments makes things more spicy. That's just another subplot that adds to the great rivalry."

Despite the words that have been exchanged in the past, McGraw doesn't shy away from dishing out credit where it's due.

The disparity between the programs has shrunk in recent years — Notre Dame has appeared in the Final Four seven of the past 10 years, while UConn hasn't missed

the national semifinal since 2006.

But much earlier than that, when the teams played in the same conference, the Huskies couldn't be touched.

"In the early days of the Big East, they were the team to beat, they were the team to measure yourself against," said McGraw, who has been the head coach at Notre Dame since 1987.

"They were the team that you just looked at what they were doing and you said, 'That's where I want to get to'"

Now Notre Dame has a chance to further prove that it has arrived.

The Irish have won four of their seven previous Final Four or national championship matchups with UConn, which owns 11 national titles. The Huskies, though, already found a way to beat them once this season in a game Notre Dame has reviewed over and over again in hopes of

improving their mistakes the second time around.

"I think anytime you lose, you go back and you look at absolutely everything that went on in the game — offense, defense, what did we do wrong, substitutions, man, zone, what did we play," McGraw said. "That's why you play those games early in the year, because you want to know what your weaknesses are. You want to know how teams are going to attack you."

For UConn, that'll likely be with Collier and Katie Lou Samuelson, seniors who average nearly 40 points per game. But Notre Dame's got its own veteran leadership and Ogunbowale's clutch, buzzer-beating shots, which she used twice last year to carry Notre Dame to the title.

But perhaps most important of all, the Irish have the confidence that they can compete against a team that has many more where that came from. "Notre Dame doesn't ever play scared of us," Samuelson said. "A lot of times, you can feel teams be scared of the name UConn. That's something (Notre Dame has) never had an issue with, they've never felt that way, and that's what makes them so dangerous."

Final Four features three newcomers, one veteran

Michigan State's Tom Izzo has experience edge over Virginia, Texas Tech and Auburn

MINNEAPOLIS — Tom Izzo certainly knows his way around the Final Four, even if the longtime Michigan State coach had never toured U.S. Bank Stadium until the Spartans arrived for practice Thursday.

The rest of his coaching compatriots? They could probably use a road map.

It's not just getting around that is challenging, though Texas Tech coach Chris Beard spent a few seconds outside his locker room deciding which way to the press conference (left) and which way to the floor (right).

It's also navigating everything else that comes with the pomp and circumstance of college basketball's biggest weekend, from the ticket requests to the fans to the media crush.

So when Beard called Izzo out of the blue this week — a rarity in the regular season, much less in the run-up to a national semifinal — the Spartans' coach gave the Final Four newcomer some help.

"My only advice I'm going to give you," Izzo recalled telling Beard, "has nothing to do with the game, but has a lot to do with: get your tickets and hotels done today."

Beard laughed. But it's probably good advice. Good advice for Virginia coach Tony Bennett and Auburn counterpart Bruce Pearl,

None of those three have been a head coach in a Final Four, which means just like their starstruck players gazing in wonder at the cavernous home of the Minnesota Vikings, this is all new to them: the golf carts to whisk them around the arena, the demanding press schedule, the constant attention back home and now in downtown Minneapolis, where their pictures are displayed just about everywhere.

Outside their locker rooms, for example. Texas Tech star Jarrett Culver stopped to take photos and admire a massive image of himself and his teammates plastered on the cinderblock wall.

"We know it's our first time and we just want to enjoy it," said Culver, the Big 12's player of the year. "Just being here for the first time and making history, we know it's so special."

How special? Ask teammate Davide Moretti, who grew up in Bologna, Italy.

"The first thing I saw on Instagram was actually a website that's kind of like ESPN for us called SkySports, where they always talk about soccer or something like that," Moretti said. "Then I saw my picture and it was about how a basketball player like me playing in the Final Four is kind of a big deal, so everyone was texting me and saying, 'Wow! That's crazy.'"

Fans back in Lubbock made sure to give the Red Raiders a festive send-off, just like the pigskin-loving Auburn fans did for their first Final Four team. Toilet paper was still hanging from the trees in Toomer's Corner when the Tigers departed for the airport, and it was their jaws that were hanging open when they walked onto the court for their first practice Thursday.

"It's so huge. The court looks so small in comparison to everything around it," said the Tigers' Anfernee McLemore. "But I don't think it will really hit us until the building fills up. When we were out there shooting, it felt just like basketball."

Maybe that will change Friday, when fans are invited inside for open practices.

"It's very rare for this to happen at a place like Auburn," said Steven Pearl, an assistant on his dad's staff. "Coach tells them enjoy it, but at the same time understand what you're doing here. We still have two games

left. Enjoy the moment, look around, take it all in, but understand we have a job to do."

Virginia should have no trouble keeping focus.

Remember, the Cavaliers let it lapse in the first round a year ago and became the first No. 1 seed to lose to a No. 16 seed.

The defeat was so humiliating that Virginia star Kyle Guy used a frame from the loss to UMBC as

his screensaver, almost as if he was serving penance.

It also shouldn't be much trouble for Michigan State.

This is the second time in five years and eighth time overall Izzo has been to the Final Four, the fifth-most of any coach in college basketball history. The only current coaches who know their way around any better are Mike Krzyzewski and

Roy Williams, and both of their teams are sitting at home.

You can bet Izzo will point his team in the right direction at the Final Four.

"We don't think about the past games. We don't think about the future games. We think about the one game ahead of us," the Spartans' Cassius Winston said, "and that's been our approach all year."

Gustafson player of year, Mulkey coach of year

Iowa center led nation in scoring for second year; Baylor coach guided team to 35-1 record

TAMPA, Fla. — Megan Gustafson rewrote the women's basketball record book at Iowa.

The 6-foot-3 center led the nation in scoring for the second straight season, averaging 27.9 points, and became the fourth player to reach 1,000 points in a year. On Thursday, she won The Associated Press women's college basketball player of the year award.

"She's an amazing young woman who left an incredible legacy at this school," Iowa coach Lisa Bluder said.

Led by Gustafson, the Hawkeyes reached the Elite Eight for the first time since 1993. That season, coach Kim Mulkey and Baylor ended their season.

Mulkey was also honored Thursday, taking the AP coach of the year award for the second time. She has led top-ranked Baylor to a 35-1 record and helped the Lady Bears reach the Final Four for the first time since 2012. That was when Mulkey won the coach of the year, leading Baylor to a 40-0 record and the national championship.

Gustafson set an NCAA record this season with 412 field goals. She tied the mark for double-doubles with 33. She shot 69.7 percent from the field this season and finished her career by making nearly 66 percent of her shots.

The Iowa staff surprised Gustafson that she had won the award by slipping in a note while she was reading letters from fans.

"I was not expecting it at all. I love my coaches and they've been so supportive of me," Gustafson said. "It's been an incredible ride. I'm in a little bit in shock right now, really excited to have represented Iowa."

She received 15 votes Thursday from the 28-member national media panel. Voting was done before the NCAA Tournament.

Sabrina Ionescu of Oregon received seven votes while Napheesa Collier of UConn three. Asia Durr of Louisville had two votes and Teaira McCowan of Mississippi State one.

Mulkey received 17 votes while Wes Moore of North Carolina State and Vic Schaefer of Mississippi State each received five.





"Listen, any award that I receive, you know good and well that goes back to the kids you coach, period," Mulkey said. "We are only as good as those kids on that floor, and I've been blessed to coach numerous great players. And I would trade any

award for every one of them to experience a national championship. Let's get that straight.

"But at the end of the day, that award brings recognition to the program, to the players, and to the school first. And what it does for

me, it just gathers dust that I have to get a little cloth and dust off. But I'm humbled. It can go to so many people. You just want to be relevant, and you want to just give these kids an opportunity to experience a Final Four and a national championship."

Mulkey said she's grown as a coach since her last

trip to the Final Four.

"You know when to laugh more, and you know to cut up with them more, and when to be serious," she said.

"It's your job as a coach to figure out those personalities and what motivates them, and make sure that you've got great leadership in that locker room."

Chiefs bring back cornerback Reaser after AAF stint

Chiefs' playoff game against the Tennessee Titans.


Reaser's progress with the Chiefs was derailed by a quad injury during 2018 training camp, and it ultimately led him to be placed on IR.

gallery owner suggested she should turn them into paintings. "So, I did," she said. "I did water color art on paper then took it to canvas with acrylic and oil. When I moved here, Florida gave me a burst of color and my palette exploded compared to Minnesota black and neutral colors.

It's hard to decide whether her fashion design inspires her art or vice versa, for she seamlessly straddles both worlds. Case in point: she often paints on her fashions.

Be it art-inspired fashion or fashion-inspired art, she has developed a signature look all her own – bold, bright, colorful, glamorous, kind of art-decoish, if that's a word. Gerro used to make most of her clothes, a time consuming and labor intensive process. She's now pondering a more efficient approach to getting fashion to the market.

"I'm thinking about putting wearable art on my website – fine stitchery with



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
