

## Gentry saves lives as organ donor

### LifeLink: Deputy may help dozens

SEBRING — Deputy Sheriff William J. Gentry Jr., an organ donor, stands to save five lives. On Tuesday, doctors recovered Gentry's heart, lungs, liver and kidneys.

Sadly, his heart was not able to be transplanted, but the other organs remain viable for transplant, said Betsy Edwards, senior public affairs coordinator for LifeLink Foundation Inc. After being transported early Wednesday morning to LifeLink in Tampa for

tissue donations, Gentry may help 70 more people. "With the gift of organ donation, as many as eight lives can be saved by one donor, and with the gift of tissue donation, as many as 70 lives can be saved," Edwards said.

Two people, she said, stand to regain sight from his corneas. Other typical tissue donations include bone, tendons and ligaments for reconstructive surgery, and skin for burn victims.

Other vital organs

suitable for transplant include the pancreas and the small intestine, Edwards said.

Each case depends on a person's medical condition

at the time of death, so there's no standard answer on how many organs may be viable for transplant, Edwards said. However, she said advances in organ transplant surgery have produced better success rates over the years.

"A lot of people can be really impacted by one

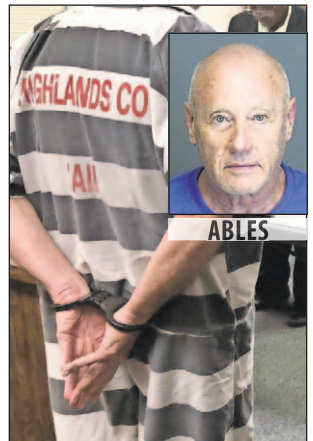
## SO releases Ables' arrest report

## Household hazardous waste collection Saturday

SEBRING — It's time for spring cleaning and that could mean throwing out items that could be hazardous. There are many items around the house that are unwanted but are known to be bad for the landfill; this Saturday is the opportunity to dispose of them properly from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at 6000 Skipper Road.

Project Manager for Highlands County Robert Diefendorf said there

would be plenty of signs to follow.

"We have this event in the spring and the fall," Diefendorf said. "We have it on Saturdays for the benefit of those who cannot attend during the weekdays." Community members can bring in unlimited quantities of oil and batteries, but small businesses will have to communicate disposal needs with the recycling department.

"People can bring items such as pesticides, household chemicals, light bulbs and oil-based

paints," Diefendorf said.

Other items that people are hesitant to pitch in the regular garbage are electronics. Diefendorf said they will be taking all sorts of end of life electronics, including cell phones, cameras, video games, printers and stereos, just to name a few.

Just about the only items not be taken are surplus and expired medicines. Those should be taken to the nearest Operation Medicine Cabinet drop off.

with a bid of \$52,955. The Town Council also has the option of installing eight new lighting outlets, adding outdoor lighting and fans for an additional \$3,000.

The bid has an allowance of \$800 for new

fans and additional lighting.

The pavilion has been an eyesore for quite some time and complaints have not been in short supply about its poor drainage and the need for more power terminals.

The new structure will fit onto the old concrete footprint, which is 32 feet by 52 feet, and will have a 10-foot ceiling. A new slab will be installed over the existing one and sloped accordingly to keep water from pooling on the floor's surface.

"It's going to be nice," Phil Williams, town administrator, said. "There were problems and it was even somewhat dangerous.

"It was made with a drain and any drain in a natural environment is going to pick up leaves and get clogged.

Then, we had the shoulders, we replaced it with permeable rocks last year in hopes that the water could get off the concrete," he said. "It got to where the soil had built up around the fringes and sort of held the water there.

"You couldn't sweep the water off if you wanted to. It lessened the water, but it didn't fix it. There were things that were rusted through," Williams said.

The new pavilion will also feature sink and plumbing hook ups, tables and concrete steps

to the barbecue area. A new ramp compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act will be designed and installed, along with a metal handrail.

"We will be doing the concrete work this week," Bill Brantley, with Brantley Construction, said. "It will be done in time for the Caladium Festival in July. That was a big priority."

The competing bid for the project was from E.O. Koch Construction Co. at \$67,778.

Stuart Park will be getting a much needed face lift along with the new pavilion — soon the caladium beds that wind through the park will be freshened up.

3. Organs that can be donated after death are the heart, liver, kidneys, lungs, pancreas and small intestines. Tissues include corneas, skin, veins, heart valves, tendons, ligaments and bones. The cornea is the most commonly transplanted tissue. More than 40,000 corneal transplants take place each year in the U.S.

4. Over 700,000 transplants have occurred in the U.S. since 1988.

5. A healthy person can become a "living donor" by donating a kidney, or a part of the liver, lung, intestine, blood or bone marrow. About 6,000 living donations occur each year. One in four donors are not biologically related to the recipient.

## The mystery of life on our beaches

Last week marked the official opening of sea turtle season and an opportunity for us to experience one of Southwest Florida's most remarkable natural phenomena.

Florida is one of the world's two largest breeding grounds for the loggerhead sea turtle species. The second is the Sultanate of Oman. Travel to Oman to see loggerhead nesting, if you have the means, or drive out to Manasota Key.

The phenomenon works the same way at all:

Female loggerheads crawl onto the sand at night to dig nests containing up to 125 eggs that are roughly the size of pingpong balls. Afterwards, they make their way back to the Gulf of Mexico, where they relax and swim around a bit before eventually returning to shore to dig more nests and lay more eggs. When they are completely spent, the loggerheads head off into the Atlantic Ocean.

Meanwhile, embryos in the nests take a couple of months to mature. When ready, they crack open their shells and make for the waters of the Gulf. It takes a ton of luck to survive predators. The odds of a baby sea turtle becoming an adult sea turtle are roughly 1,000 to one. Maybe higher.

But if a loggerhead does make it, he or she can live to be 65 years old. Loggerheads can grow to be 31/2 feet long and 375 pounds, pretty large for a sea turtle. (Kemp's Ridley turtles, by comparison, grow to 2 feet and 100 pounds. Leatherbacks grow to six feet long and 2,000 pounds.)

Perhaps the most fascinating aspect of the story is that female turtles, upon reaching sexual maturity, will return to their home turf when the time comes to lay their own eggs. The turtles you see on the beaches of Southwest Florida likely started out in nests along the beaches of this region decades ago.

It is an extraordinary life cycle — all in the family and all tied together over the ages. And it begins on our beaches.

State and federal governments go to great lengths to protect sea turtles, considered threatened or endangered species. Local governments have enacted ordinances to make turtles more welcome here.

Nesting sea turtles can become disoriented by hardened shorelines, bright lights or furniture left on the beach. When the nests are disturbed by people or dogs, the chances of survival become much worse than they already are.

Most of us take our responsibility to these creatures seriously. On Manasota Key, volunteers for the Coastal Wildlife Club patrol the beaches looking for turtle activity and marking off nests. Mote Marine Laboratory coordinates volunteers from Venice to Longboat Key. The local volunteers are key to the protection effort.

But everyone can and should follow the rules:

- Shield lights visible from the beach.
  - Don't set off fireworks. Don't use flashlights on the beach.
  - If you've dug a hole or built a sand castle in the afternoon, fill it in or smooth it out before nightfall.
  - Remove beach furniture at night.
  - Don't let dogs run on the beaches.
  - If you see a freshly dug nest, don't do anything to disturb it.
  - If you see a turtle nesting, steer clear and observe from a safe distance.

The study concludes that many of the accidents are rear-end collisions. That is enlightening to know as it shows someone in a higher comfort level smashed into someone with a lower comfort level going too slow for the flow of traffic. We also learned that a 10-ton truck going 80 around the lake takes longer to stop than if it was going 50. Who could have guessed that? Man, you learn something new every day.

This report was summed up in a 66-page document. How much

gobbledygook can you write in 66 pages to indicate "comfort levels and accidents?" In the meantime folks, nothing is going to change on U.S. 27. So drive carefully, all you wannabe NASCAR drivers, and watch your comfort level.

## Injury set wheels in motion for Foley

### Athlete goes from football to racing cars in IMSA

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. - Robby Foley may be from New Jersey, but the IMSA Prototype Challenge Presented by Mazda driver still considers Barber Motorsports Park in Birmingham, Alabama, his home track. That's because the driver of the No. 42 P1 Motorsports Ligier JS P3 attends nearby Auburn University, where he is pursuing a degree in mechanical

engineering.

A driver with a passion for engineering may not be all that unique, but the circumstances that led the 21-year-old to the IMSA paddock and Auburn certainly is.

Growing up around racing, Foley had a passion for cars and began racing karts. It was when he entered high school, however, he decided to focus on stick and ball sports like football and baseball. That all changed on

Sept. 11, 2010, when as a freshman in high school he suffered a devastating and career-ending leg injury in a football game.

The damage included a torn LCL, ACL and PCL, a broken tibia, fibula and ankle, and a nerve injury that caused a complete foot drop.

"It kind of kickstarted the idea to go racing," said Foley. "I was home-schooled for the better part of my freshman year [after the injury] so my dad said if I could

get straight A's he would send me to Skip Barber to drive a Mazda MX-5. Naturally with that motivation I did. The leg injury was a tough deal for sure, it took me out of doing anything for pretty much a year - I didn't really move for seven months - but in the end I probably wouldn't be here doing what I'm doing without that scenario."

## Wesley Strader notches Bassmaster Elite Series win

### Veteran angler earns first victory On Kentucky Lake

PARIS, Tenn. — The final day of the Berkley Bassmaster Elite at Kentucky Lake presented by Abu Garcia threw Wesley Strader the right pitch, and he knocked it out of the park.

Strader, a first-year Elite Series pro from Spring City, Tenn., caught a final-day limit of five bass that weighed 20 pounds, 11 ounces and earned his first Elite Series victory with a four-day total of 80-4.

After sitting in 16th place on Day 1 with 19-6, Strader added 17-13 Saturday and improved to 11th, before taking over the Day 3 lead with 22-6 — the biggest catch of Sunday's semifinal round.

His final-day catch cemented

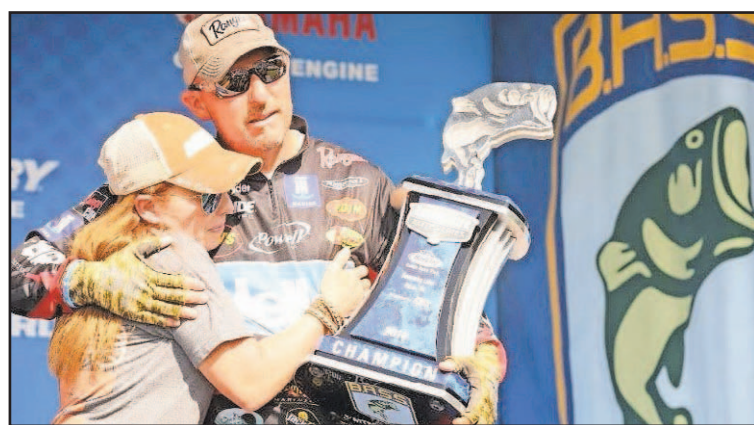

a \$100,000 payday.

"Yesterday, I figured out that the fish were positioning under the walkways on the docks," he said. "Today, that went away; they got out under the floats.

It seemed like, as the sun got higher, the shade got tighter to the docks and you could pretty much pinpoint where they'd

bite. "I didn't think the shad spawn was that big of a deal for me today. But I pulled up on a stretch of docks that I had not fished early in the morning and just about every cast, when I'd reel my bait out from underneath the floats, there would be two or three threadfin shad following my spinnerbait." Unlike the previous days, Strader was unable to leverage the early-morning shad spawn. But he put several keepers in the boat by

alternating between a 5/8-ounce Stan Sloan Bango Blade spinnerbait with a white swimbait trailer, a buzzbait, a popping frog and a white Zoom Z-Craw that he swam through shallow bushes. He still found some early productivity. But it was a magical, one-hour midday flurry that vaulted Strader into the unofficial BASSTrakk lead. Flipping shallow bushes in a small pocket off Big Sandy Creek, Strader added three solid keepers — all 4-plus pounds — to his livewell. That left him releasing fish he normally would not cull.

"That's a good problem to have — catching 3-pounders and they can't help you," said Strader, as he chuckled during a BASS Live segment. Strader caught his flipping fish on a Texas-rigged Reaction Innovations Sweet Beaver with a 5/16-ounce Reins Tungsten sinker and a 5/0 Trokar hook fished on 20-pound Gamma Edge fluorocarbon. The Tramp Stamp color, he said, has proven productive in all his previous Kentucky Lake events. Trusting that pattern Monday proved to be a winning decision. "For some reason, in this tea-colored water,

they like that color," he said. Strader said his fish were probably postspawners. Targeting likely staging areas with vertical falls was key. "I think I was just on a hot pocket where they were either coming out or guarding fry; I don't think they were spawning," he said. "They were just in those bushes chilling, and it was all on the initial fall of the bait." Auburn, Calif., superstar Skeet Reese missed his limit by one fish. But his four bass weighed 17-10 and he still finished second with 76-6. Reese spent much of his final day throwing a 7-inch line-through swimbait,

but some of his key bites during the tournament came on a Lucky Craft Magnum SKT squarebill. "That's a giant squarebill," Reese said. "These fish aren't eating little threadfin shad. They're eating gizzard shad. They're eating carp. So I did key in on the big baits this week. I caught some 4s, 5s and 6s on it. Kelly Jaye of Dadeville, Ala., added a solid limit of 18-7 on the final day and improved two spots

to third place with 73-6. Jaye caught all of his fish on a Megabass Vision 110 jerkbait in the matte shad color. Jason Christie of Park Hill, Okla., placed fourth with 71-8, and Fred Roumbanis of Russellville, Ark., placed fifth with 70-5. Bradley Roy was awarded \$1,000 for the leading the Toyota Bassmaster Angler of the Year points race at the end of the event.

## Spotlight On Some Area Lakes

The county's Parks and Natural Resources Department maintains more than 40 public boat ramps. In addition, each city (Avon Park, Lake Placid, Lorida, and Sebring) also maintains public facilities to access and enjoy our refreshing waters.

**Lake Denton** is a 66-acre freshwater lake that is known for its clarity and visibility. Located between Avon Park and Sebring, Lake Denton's maximum depth is 51 feet. The lake has a public boat ramp and parking area.

At nearly 28,000 acres, **Lake Istokpoga** is the fifth largest lake in Florida. Anglers from all over the state and nation come to the area to fish at this lake, which features four public and several private launch ramps. Lake Istokpoga is ranked as one of the best bass lakes in the Southeast by Bassmasters, and it is number one in the state for 10+ pound bass.

**Lake Jackson** is the centerpiece of Sebring. At approximately 25 feet at its deepest, most of the lake is just 9-16 feet deep. The water is clear and the shores are sandy. The lake has one boat ramp at Veterans Beach on the lake's west side. The city of Sebring maintains four public swimming beaches at Veterans Beach, City Pier Beach, Crescent Beach, and Hidden Beach. Leisure boating, water sports, skiing, and fishing are popular activities on the lake, and a public fishing dock is located at the City Pier Beach.

Lake Placid's **Lake June-in-Winter** is the county's second largest lake at 3,504 acres. It is the largest of the ridge lakes, and is frequented by boaters, swimmers, and fishing anglers. More than 800 acres on the west shore of the lake is preserved area known as Lake June-in-Winter Scrub Park, which offers unique opportunities to explore rare habitat. Bishop Park (located on the northeast portion of the lake) and Lake June Park are large public recreational areas with boat launches, public swimming, and picnic facilities.

**Lake Tulane** is located in the southern part of Avon Park and is a fairly deep lake with a public boat ramp on the west side. Though small at 89 acres, this lake has been estimated to be more than 50,000 years old, making it older than any other documented lake in North America. It is a prime example of a Ridge-type lake and is one of the clearest in the county with visibility extending down to 30 feet below the water's surface.

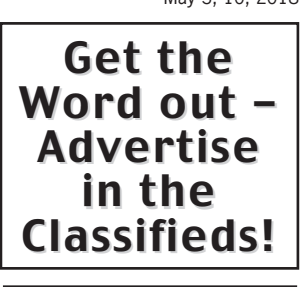

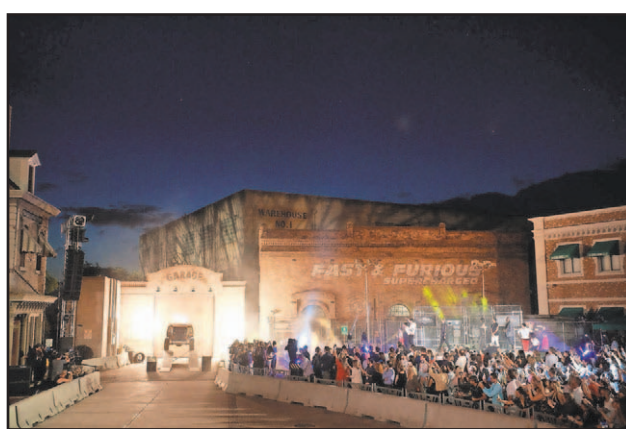

## After dumping Iran deal, White House focuses on North Korea

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration says scrapping a nuclear agreement with Iran strengthens its hand in negotiations with North Korea, signaling that President Donald Trump will accept only a “real deal” that eliminates Pyongyang’s nuclear arsenal.

But Trump’s exit from the Iran deal may in fact make reaching its goal with North Korea more difficult, leaving U.S. credibility in doubt as it embarks on an even tougher negotiation.

Unlike with Iran, which halted its nuclear program before testing a weapon, Trump is asking North Korean leader Kim Jong Un to give up dozens of weapons and missiles that already exist while demanding intrusive inspections in a closed country with a long history of cheating on international agreements.

“Pyongyang likely sees the decision as proof the United States cannot be trusted — that any deal reached with one president can be discarded by the next,” said Ivo Daalder, president of the Chicago Council on Global Affairs. “That will make reaching any agreement with North Korea that much more difficult.”

Trump, speaking to reporters Wednesday at the White House ahead of a Cabinet meeting, sought to rebut such criticism, portraying his strategies toward Iran and North Korea as parts of the same policy.

“We have a chance at something really great for the world and great for North Korea, and great for everyone,” Trump said, adding that “people never thought” he’d be able to pull it off. Within minutes, he also was lambasting the Iranians.

Administration officials say they do not believe Kim is necessarily watching the Iran episode. If he is, they say, the message he will take away will be one of U.S. resolve that will make him more eager to sit down with Trump in a nuclear summit expected to take place within weeks.

## Freed detainees head home for big welcome, featuring Trump

WASHINGTON — Freed after more than a year in prison, three Americans flew homeward from North Korea late Tuesday toward a big middle-of-the-night celebration featuring President Donald Trump — the latest sign of improving relations between longtime adversaries in the buildup to a historic summit between Trump and North Korea’s Kim Jong Un.

Trump promised “quite a scene” at Joint Base Andrews outside Washington for the detainees, who were released as Secretary of State Mike Pompeo visited North Korea on Wednesday to finalize plans for the summit. Singapore was the likely site, late this month or in early June, for Trump’s most ambitious foreign policy effort yet.

Shortly after they touched down on American soil in Alaska — for a refueling stop Wednesday afternoon — the State Department released a statement from the freed men.

“We would like to express our deep appreciation to the United States government, President Trump, Secretary Pompeo, and the people of the United States for bringing us home,” they said. “We thank God, and all our families and friends who prayed for us and for our return. God Bless America, the greatest nation in the world.”

The men had boarded Pompeo’s plane out of North Korea without assistance and then transferred in Japan to a separate aircraft with more extensive medical facilities. They are expected to arrive at Joint Base Andrews outside Washington in the wee hours of Thursday morning.

Trump made a point of publicly thanking North Korea’s leader for the prisoners’ release — “I appreciate Kim Jong Un doing this” — and hailed it as a sign of cooling tensions and growing opportunity on the Korean peninsula. Kim decided to grant amnesty to the three Americans at the “official suggestion” of the U.S. president, said North Korea’s official news agency, KCNA.

North Korea had accused Kim Dong Chul, Kim Hak Song and Tony Kim, all Korean-Americans, of anti-state activities. Their arrests were widely seen as politically motivated and had compounded the dire state of relations over the isolated nation’s nuclear weapons.

## Geologist warn of possible explosive event at Hawaii volcano

PAHOA, Hawaii (AP) — Geologists warned Wednesday that Hawaii’s Kilauea volcano could erupt explosively and send boulders, rocks and ash into the air around its summit in the coming weeks.

The U.S. Geological Survey said the risk will rise if the lava drops below the groundwater level beneath the summit’s caldera.

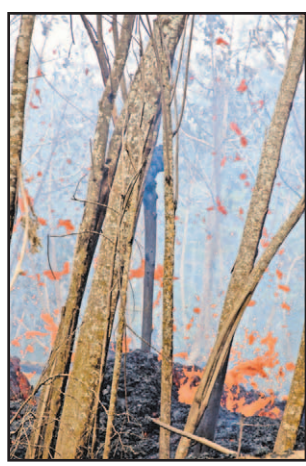
An influx of water inside could cause steam-driven explosions. There’s also potential for ash, steam and sulfur dioxide emissions.

Kilauea is one of the world’s most active volcanoes.

It has destroyed 36 structures since it began releasing lava into fissures that opened in a Big Island residential neighborhood last week.

Since the eruptions began, 14 such fissures have opened in a subdivision and destroyed dozens of structures, including 26 homes.

In the weeks ahead, the volcano could eject blocks up to two yards in diameter a little less than a mile away, the USGS said. It may also send pebbles

## Study finds little bang for the buck in Zika blood testing

NEWYORK (AP) — Screening blood donations for the Zika virus netted only a few infections at a cost of more than \$5 million for each positive test result, according to new research.

The study was the first large look at the impact of guidelines set two years ago, when the Zika epidemic was an unfolding menace in the U.S. and health officials were scrambling to prevent new infections.

The study, published Wednesday by the New England Journal of Medicine, found that the

blood donation testing requirements offered little bang for the buck. It also raised questions about whether a cheaper testing method should be used.

In more than 4 million blood donations checked in the United States, nine tested positive for the Zika virus. Of those, three were considered an infection threat.

“We can’t afford to spend that kind of money to find a single case,” said Dr. W. Ian Lipkin, a Columbia University infectious diseases expert who was not involved in the research.

Zika infections swept across Latin America and the Caribbean in 2015 and 2016, with a few very small outbreaks in the southern United States. The virus is mainly spread by tropical mosquitoes, but scientists also discovered some infections were spread through sex.

Fearing Zika might also spread through transfusions, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration in 2016 called on all blood banks to screen for it.

“The risk from transfusion was poorly

## Police look for victims of suspected Michigan serial killer

DETROIT — A Michigan man serving life in prison for killing a 13-year-old girl is a suspected serial killer, police said Wednesday as they dug up part of a forest in a search for as many as seven other girls who have been missing for decades.

Using earth-moving equipment, as well as shovels and rakes, authorities have spent two days excavating a wooded site about 30 miles northeast of Detroit in the belief that Arthur Ream buried all of his victims in the same general area.

The police commissioner in nearby Warren appealed to the inmate to help investigators find the remains.

“You want to be a man about it?” Bill Dwyer said. “Let’s help the families out. Give them some closure. That’s what it’s all about.”

Ream is no stranger to the area. Following his 2008 conviction for killing Cindy Zarzycki, he led investigators to her remains, which had been buried there for more than 20 years.

The current search area spans about 24 acres. Searchers are trying to narrow that down to a more manageable size, police said.

Police interviewed Ream a few months ago after fellow prisoners said he boasted about killing four to six other people. He later failed a lie-detector test, Dwyer said.

Ream, who turned 69 on Wednesday, was sentenced in

1998 to 15 years in prison for criminal sexual conduct and taking indecent liberties with a child less than two years earlier.

Cindy was last seen on April 20, 1986, after going to a Dairy Queen in Eastpointe, a mostly blue-collar suburb north of Detroit.

Other possible victims include 12-year-old Kimberly King, who disappeared in 1979 while visiting her grandmother in Warren; Kim Larrow, who was 15 when she was last seen in 1981 in Canton Township, west of Detroit; and Kellie Brownlee, who was 17 when she vanished in 1982 from suburban Novi.

Authorities are also searching for additional victims who have not been publicly identified.

# Watchdog agency signals less focus on student loan abuses

NEW YORK — The Trump administration signaled Wednesday that it intends to pull back on investigating potential abuses by companies in the \$1.5 trillion student loan market. The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau will shutter its student lending office, according to a memo written by its acting director, Mick Mulvaney. The student loan office at the CFPB had been responsible for returning

\$750 million in relief. Its responsibilities are being moved under the broad umbrella of “financial education.” The office had been primarily responsible for an investigation into the troubled student lender Navient, which the CFPB sued last year for unfair and abusive practices. The company also investigated and sued for-profit education company Corinthian Colleges. A bureau spokesman did not respond to multiple

requests for comment on whether the bureau plans to maintain the number of investigators at the bureau looking at student loans, or whether it plans to move forward with the lawsuit against Navient. This isn't the first time Mulvaney has reshuffled the bureau to change the CFPB's priorities. He took similar action with the bureau's Office of Fair Lending earlier this year, moving the entire department under the bureau's education department. That office had

been focused on discrimination issues, particularly in the auto lending industry. Mulvaney has said that he planned to curtail the bureau's operations to only what it is required by law. He had been a long-time critic of the bureau while he was a Congressman from South Carolina, and while acting director has pleaded with Congress to trim the bureau's mandate and make it more subject to Congressional oversight. While the housing and stock market have recovered

from the 2008 financial crisis, the problems in the student loan market have only become more exacerbated. Roughly 4.6 million Americans are in default on their student loans as of Dec. 31, 2017, according to the Department of Education, more than double what it was four years ago. That's more than 10 percent of the total 42.8 million Americans who currently have a student loan outstanding backed by the Department of Education.

known. We put this testing in place as a precaution without really having solid data about the necessity for it,” said Dr. Darrell Triulzi, a University of Pittsburgh transfusion medicine specialist. The new study is the first large one to evaluate whether the testing made

sense, he added. The researchers looked at the results of screenings done by the American Red Cross, which collects 42 percent of the U.S. blood supply. They focused on donations from the Lower 48 states from June 2016 to September 2017. Health officials say there have been four transfusion-related Zika cases reported in Brazil, but none in the United States.

In a related journal article, four Johns Hopkins University medical experts questioned whether it makes sense to maintain intensive testing for Zika. The FDA has never before revoked a recommendation to test blood donations for a potentially harmful germ, and it's unlikely the agency would do that now, experts said. But the agency could call for a less intensive

screening called mini-pool testing. Rather than running a test on each separate donor, mini-pool testing involves mixing samples from 16 donors and testing the batch. When a batch tests positive, individual testing is done to find the tainted donation. That's what's done with West Nile virus and other germs, experts said. Mini-pool testing would cut the cost of Zika testing

in half, said Susan Stramer, one of the study's authors and vice president of scientific affairs at the Red Cross. Details from the study were presented to an FDA advisory committee in December. The committee voted against the idea of eliminating Zika testing of blood donations but endorsed mini-pool testing. The FDA has not yet acted on the panel's recommendation.

shooting into the air several miles away, the USGS said. In the Leilani Estates subdivision, police went door-to-door Tuesday to roust residents near

two new volcanic vents emitting dangerous gases in areas where lava has poured into streets and backyards. Authorities previously ordered nearly 2,000 residents to leave the two communities in the mostly rural district of Puna on Hawaii's Big

Island last Thursday. But some ignored the order and stayed to watch over their property. The emergence of the two new vents prompted Hawaii County to issue a cellphone alert ordering stragglers in the Lanipuna Gardens neighborhood to get out immediately.

Police followed up with personal visits. Both communities are in a forested, remote part of the Big Island on the eastern flank of Kilauea volcano, which has been erupting continuously since 1983. In recent years the volcano has mostly released

lava in hard-to-reach areas inside a national park or along the coastline. But last week, vents popped open and released lava, gas and steam inside neighborhoods. There's no indication when the eruption might stop, or how far the lava might spread.

Trump entered office as an emboldened North Korea developed new generations of nuclear weapons and ballistic missiles capable of hitting the continental U.S. Those advances were the subject of President Barack Obama's starkest warning shortly before Trump took office, and this is a crisis he's

convinced his negotiating skills can resolve. Crediting himself for recent progress, Trump has pointed to Kim's willingness to come to the negotiating table as validating U.S. moves to tighten sanctions — branded “maximum pressure” by the president. The wee-hours ceremony Thursday was to be an early celebration for an issue that has already put the prospect of a Nobel Peace Prize on Trump's mind.

“Everyone thinks so, but I would never say it,” he said Wednesday when asked if the award was deserved. The release capped a dramatic day of diplomacy in Pyongyang. After Pompeo's 90-minute meeting with Kim Jong Un, he gave reporters a fingers-crossed sign when asked about the prisoners as he returned to his hotel. It was only after a North Korean emissary arrived a bit later to inform him that the

release was confirmed. The three had been held for periods ranging from one and two years. They were the latest in a series of Americans who have been detained by North Korea in recent years for seemingly small offenses and typically freed when senior U.S. officials or statesmen personally visited to bail them out. The last American to be released before this, college student Otto Warmbier, died in June

2017, days after he was repatriated to the U.S. with severe brain damage. On Capitol Hill, Senate Democratic leader Chuck Schumer celebrated the detainees' return but warned that “we'll see many more hostages” if the administration provides an incentive for imprisoning Americans. “We are happy they've returned, but North Korea shouldn't gain by taking Americans and then releasing them,” he said.

# CIA nominee says torture doesn't work as interrogation tool

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's CIA nominee said Wednesday at her confirmation hearing that she doesn't believe torture works as an interrogation technique and that her "strong moral compass" would prevent her from carrying out any presidential order she found objectionable.

Under questioning by members of the Senate Intelligence Committee, acting CIA Director Gina Haspel said she would not permit the spy agency to restart the kind of harsh detention and interrogation program it ran at black sites after Sept. 11. It was one of the darkest chapters of the CIA's history and tainted America's image worldwide.

Senators asked how she would respond if Trump — who has said he supports harsh interrogation techniques like waterboarding

and "a hell of a lot worse" — ordered her to do something she found morally objectionable.

"I would not allow CIA to undertake activity that I thought was immoral, even if it was technically legal," said Haspel, a 33-year veteran of the agency. "I would absolutely not permit it."

When asked if she agrees with the president's assertion that torture works, Haspel said: "I don't believe that torture works." She added that she doesn't think Trump would ask the CIA to resume waterboarding, which simulates drowning.

She faces what will likely be a close confirmation vote in the full Senate. The CIA director position opened up after Mike Pompeo was named secretary of state. Haspel would be the first female CIA director.

While she has deep experience, her nomination is contentious because she was chief of base of a covert detention site

in Thailand where terror suspects were waterboarded. There also have been questions about how she drafted a cable that her boss used to order the destruction of videotapes of interrogation sessions conducted at the site.

Protesters disrupted the hearing shouting, "Prosecute the torturers!" and "Bloody Gina!" Haspel remained stone-faced as police escorted them out of the room.

"I realize that there are strong disagreements on the effectiveness of the CIA's detention and interrogation program," Haspel wrote in answers to more than 100 questions submitted by committee members and released at her hearing.

"In my view — a view shared by all nine former directors and acting directors — the CIA was able to collect valuable intelligence that contributed to

the prevention of further terrorist attacks. That said, it is impossible to know whether the CIA could have obtained the same information in another way," she wrote.

She also said there is little question that the program harmed CIA officers who participated and that it damaged U.S. relations with allies.

Being in the public spotlight is new for Haspel. She spent more than 30 years working undercover, acquiring secret information from dead drops and at meetings in dusty back alleys of third-world capitals.

Still, the 61-year-old intelligence professional portrayed herself as a "typical middle-class American" with a "strong sense of right and wrong." She said she was born in Kentucky as the eldest of five children. While her family has deep roots there, she grew up as an Air Force brat, following her father to postings all over the world.

She staunchly defended her role in the 2005 destruction of the videotapes. She said that she never saw the videos and was not depicted on them, but that the destruction was important at the time to protect the CIA personnel showed on the tapes from being targeted by militants. She said, however, that she would not support destroying them today.

The Justice Department investigated the destruction of the tapes, but no charges were filed. Six Democratic senators wrote Attorney General Jeff Sessions on Wednesday saying that all senators should be able to see the Justice Department's investigative report on the destruction of the tapes. The Democrats wrote that they "believe that no senator can consider Ms. Haspel's nomination in good conscience without first reviewing this document."

## Walrus surprise residents in remote Alaska village

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Residents of a remote Alaska village have been spotting Pacific walrus in unusual places.

Hundreds of walrus were photographed last month on the Alaska Peninsula, the land mass that juts out toward the Aleutians.

Port Heiden Tribal Council President John Christensen, Jr. says he was out for a beach ride on his four-wheeler and photographed about 200 walrus on a beach.

He says he's never seen more than one or two in the area. Two weeks later, Christensen saw more than a thousand walrus gathered about 20 miles outside the village.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist Joel Garlich-Miller says male walrus traditionally spend summers near Bristol Bay about 130 miles to the north.

He says the animals may be looking for new areas to forage.

## Trump suggests revoking reporters' credentials

WASHINGTON (AP) — In his latest volley against the free press, President Donald Trump on Wednesday suggested that reporters have their credentials revoked for reporting negative news about him, calling such reporting "fake."

In a tweet, Trump complained that "despite the tremendous success we are having with the economy & all things else," most of the network news about him is "negative (Fake)."

"Why do we work so hard in working with the media when it is corrupt?" Trump went on to ask, adding: "Take away credentials?"

Reporters require credentials to access the White House grounds and cover the president's official and re-election campaign events.

White House spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders, however, insisted the

administration is "very committed to a free press" and demonstrates that commitment through near-daily press briefings and access to the president.

"The fact that I'm standing here taking questions, the fact that the president took questions from your colleagues just two hours ago demonstrates this White House's commitment to accessibility, and to providing information to the American public," she said. "At the same time, the press has a responsibility to put out accurate information."

Since the early days of his candidacy, Trump has railed against the media, going as far as to call it "the enemy of the people." He has also mused about changing libel laws to make it easier to sue reporters for inaccurate stories (though he has no such authority) and has blamed reporters for his low approval ratings.

## Indictment: Missing man was killed by wife, friend

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A Florida man reported missing 17 years ago didn't suffer a duck-hunting mishap, and he wasn't eaten by alligators.

An indictment made public Wednesday accuses Mike Williams' widow of plotting his death for months before his best friend shot him.

Denise Williams was ordered held without bond Wednesday after pleading not guilty. She was arrested Tuesday on charges of first-degree murder, conspiracy to commit murder and accessory after the fact in her husband's December 2000 killing.

The indictment by a Leon County grand

jury alleges that she conspired with Brian Winchester for more than nine months to kill Williams. Winchester helped him write a \$1 million insurance policy six months before he disappeared, and later married his widow.

Tallahassee attorney Ethan Way says Denise Williams had nothing to do with her husband's disappearance and murder.

"The most troubling is the indictment spells out that Winchester killed Mike Williams and he has not been charged. Obviously Mr. Winchester has admitted to killing Mike Williams," Way said. "Denise has had to live with the drumbeat of

speculation for 17 years. She has cooperated with law enforcement from the beginning."

The case has been considered suspicious for years and has been covered extensively by the Tallahassee Democrat.

Without a body, Denise Williams later petitioned to have him declared dead due to accidental drowning while duck hunting alone and being eaten by alligators. She married Winchester in December 2005, but the relationship soured and they divorced in 2016.

Last year, Winchester pleaded no contest to kidnapping his ex-wife at gunpoint, and was sentenced to 20 years in prison. The very next day,

authorities announced that Mike Williams' remains were found at the end of a dead-end road after they received "new information." The body had been discovered two months earlier, but the state's Department of Law Enforcement needed to confirm through DNA tests that it was actually Mike Williams.

Williams and Winchester could also face insurance fraud charges. Florida Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis said Wednesday that he has directed the state's Division of Investigative and Forensic Services to investigate alleged life insurance fraud in the case.

#### Romaine lettuce outbreak: 149 sick in 29 states

NEW YORK (AP) — Four more states are reporting illnesses in a food poisoning outbreak linked to romaine lettuce.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated its numbers on the outbreak Wednesday, revealing that 149 people in 29 states had gotten sick.

Florida, Minnesota, North Dakota and Texas have joined the list of states reporting at least one E. coli illness linked to the outbreak.

Health officials have tied the outbreak to romaine lettuce grown in Yuma, Arizona, which provides most of the romaine sold in the U.S. during the winter.

#### Man sentenced to life in killing livestreamed on Facebook

JACKSON, Mich. (AP) — A Michigan man convicted of murder after he was accused of breaking into a home and shooting a woman while livestreaming the attack on Facebook has been sentenced to life in prison without parole.

Twenty-year-old Anthony Gelia was given the mandatory punishment Wednesday. He was convicted in March of first-degree murder and other charges stemming from the November 2016 killing of 26-year-old Brittany Southwell.

Jurors watched a Facebook Live recording recovered from Gelia's cellphone showing him kicking in a door and opening fire.

#### Seattle sugary drink tax generates \$4M in 3 months

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle officials say the city's sugary beverages tax generated more than \$4 million in revenue in its first three months.

Finance and Administrative Services department spokeswoman Julie Moore says the office had received more than \$4 million in first-quarter tax payments as of last Friday.

#### Diverging values lead to Mormon retreat from Boy Scouts

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Mormon church is ending its centurylong alliance with the Boy Scouts of America, sending two organizations whose values had diverged in recent years on separate and uncertain paths.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will bank on nurturing its youth in a still-to-be developed program set to launch in 2020. It will likely include outdoor activities and character building similar to Boy Scouts but be tailored for the church's doctrine and designed to roll out around the globe.

The 425,000 Mormon boys who will be leaving in 2020 represent about 18.5 percent of 2.3 million youth in the Boy Scouts.

#### Trump promotes federal government hiring of military spouses

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump signed an executive order Wednesday to promote the hiring of military spouses by the federal government.

Trump signed the order at a Mother's Day event at the White House that recognized the contributions of military mothers and spouses. Trump said military spouses too often don't get the recognition they deserve for enduring long separations during deployments, multiple family relocations and keeping their households running and the family's spirit high.

A report released Wednesday by the president's Council of Economic Advisers said military spouses also suffer financial disadvantages because of their frequent moves and other sacrifices. They earn at least \$12,000 a year less than other workers as a result, which adds up to estimated losses of nearly \$190,000 over a 20-year military career, the report said.

#### Court says border agents need suspicion to search cellphones

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A federal appeals court in Virginia has ruled that U.S. border authorities cannot search the cellphones of travelers without having some reason to believe a particular traveler has committed a crime.

The 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled Wednesday in the case of a Turkish national who was arrested at Dulles International Airport after agents found firearm parts in his luggage.

A lower court judge refused to suppress evidence obtained from a warrantless search of Hamza Kolsuz's phone.

The 4th Circuit upheld that ruling and also found that a forensic search of electronic devices requires "individualized suspicion" of wrongdoing. The court said agents had that suspicion because Kolsuz had made two previous attempts to smuggle weapons parts out of the U.S.

#### Afghan detained despite helping US is freed after 14 months

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — An Afghan man detained by the U.S. for more than a year despite having a special visa for people who helped the United States has been released.

The American Civil Liberties Union says the man worked for five years in dining services for the U.S. Armed Forces and the U.S. Embassy Forces. He held a visa reserved for Afghan citizens who worked for the American government or its contractors.

The ACLU says his service to the U.S. military would have put his life at risk in Afghanistan.

The man hasn't been identified because of safety issues. He was detained at Newark Liberty International Airport in March 2017 and held at a federal facility in New Jersey during deportation proceedings.

He was released Tuesday night.

# Crohn's disease presents issues sticking to healthy diet

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am 61 years old and in good shape. I have Crohn's disease, which makes eating a good diet difficult. Fruit and fresh vegetables go right through me. I can digest a banana. My doctor just told me that my total cholesterol is 215, HDL 45 and LDL 146. Should I consider medication? He also said that I need to watch my sugar and not eat so many carbs. My fasting glucose is 100, and triglycerides were 105. I am worried because my dad had a heart attack at 49 and a five-way bypass at 70, but he ate terribly and was overweight. He lived until 90. Diabetes does run in my family. I am 5 feet, 9 inches tall and weigh only 150 pounds. Can you please tell me what I can eat to stay healthy? — G.G.

with what your digestive system will tolerate.

First, I would try slowly expanding your diet and using a food diary. Try some fruits that you haven't had before. Mangoes, peeled pears and avocados are well-tolerated by many people with Crohn's disease, but only a trial will tell you for sure. Similarly, legumes, like lentils and chickpeas, may be better tolerated. Butter lettuce and roasted peppers are good choices for many with Crohn's. Nuts and nut butters are great sources of protein and healthy fats. Breads

should be enjoyed less often; choose breads with whole grains if you can tolerate those.

As far as medicine for heart disease goes, it seems unlikely that you are at high enough risk to meet the guidelines for treatment (unless your blood pressure is quite elevated). However, given that your fasting blood glucose is 100, you just qualify for a diagnosis of pre-diabetes. Your family history makes the advice your doctor gave you about simple sugars and processed carbohydrates very important.

Along with diet, exercise is the other key factor in avoiding diabetes, so I would advocate a half-hour or more daily of moderate exercise.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** What is your opinion of Neti pots? I use one as a preventive measure once a week, and if I have any symptoms of a cold or a stuffy head, I'll use it more often. I haven't had a cold or any bronchial problems in seven years. I'm 68 years old. — F.

**ANSWER:** It's hard to argue with success, but you may be breaking out the Neti pot more

than you need to. A Neti pot uses saline solution to irrigate the nasal passages. The fluid gets rid of allergens, bacteria and mucus. Some people don't mind the fluid sensation; others cannot tolerate it.

Using a Neti pot at the onset of congestion makes sense. I'm not sure you need to use it as a preventive, but if you have symptoms when you don't use it, it's perfectly reasonable.

The side effects usually are local and mild, such as nasal irritation and occasional nosebleeds.

The convenience factor is a plus, but the Food and Drug Administration (www.FDA.gov) agrees that these prepared fruits and vegetables may not be the healthiest selection you can make. Why?

When a fruit or vegetable is cut during the production process, pathogens can sneak under the flesh, and

then the moist environment of the plastic packaging can be the perfect breeding ground for these pathogens to thrive. And no heat is used to kill bacteria.

Your best bet may be to grab a whole piece of fruit, or a whole vegetable. This'll be easier on your pocket-book, too. — Heloise

## Can Ronald Jones II fix Bucs' run game?

Explosiveness. It's a major reason why the Tampa Bay Buccaneers chose running back Ronald Jones II in the second round of April's draft. "He's a real explosive runner," general manager Jason Licht said soon after making the pick. "He's explosive, and he's going to help," coach Dirk Koetter said moments later.

For Tampa Bay, explosiveness isn't just a trait. It's also a measure of productivity.

Koetter regularly cites the importance of explosive plays. He believes that — besides turnovers — they're the biggest factor in deciding who wins and who loses. The definition varies, but the standard for Koetter is a pass play of at least 16 yards or a run play of at least 12 yards.

Last season, Bucs running backs were about as

explosive as an ice bath. The team had 19 explosive runs last season, tied with Washington for second fewest. (The Cardinals were last with 17.)

It was the second straight season in which the Bucs saw a decline in explosive runs. They went from 42 in 2015 to 25 in 2016.

It's no wonder the Bucs made their run game a priority this offseason. In addition to drafting Jones, they signed Ryan Jensen to play center,

which will allow Ali Marpet to move back to guard, his original position. They also traded up to draft guard/tackle Alex Cappa in the third round.

Will Jones deliver the explosive runs the Bucs offense has so sorely lacked? To get a better sense of his big-play potential, I revisited his college career and tallied his runs of at least 12 yards.

# Ovechkin, Trotz in new territory with Washington in East final

ARLINGTON, Va. — The smiling side of a handshake line at the end of the second round was a brand-new experience for Alex Ovechkin and Barry Trotz.

Ovechkin received a message of good luck and a pat on the chest from Sidney Crosby, while Trotz got to enjoy a happy moment with longtime coaching friend Jacques Martin. Ovechkin acknowledged he'd been in that position a lot of times — though never as the one moving on to the third round.

Until now.

The Washington Capitals reaching the Eastern Conference final for the first time since 1998 is perhaps most special to the superstar captain and his coach who had never made it out of the second round before. No coach in NHL history had been behind the bench for more games than Trotz and no active player had been in as many playoff games as Ovechkin without reaching the conference finals.

"There is a kinship there, there's no question," Trotz said. "I've been at this for a while and it's so hard to move forward sometimes. It's always thrown in your face everywhere your turn. I know it's thrown in Ovi's face everywhere

he turns, and he's a great player in this league. ... I knew the frustration because you're so close and you just can't get it, and you just got to stay with it."

After 51 playoff games together, Ovechkin and Trotz will take part in their first East final starting Friday night in Tampa Bay against the Lightning. Now that they've gotten over a hump that defined their respective careers, Ovechkin, Trotz and the Capitals are in unfamiliar territory.

"It's something new for us and cool," Ovechkin said Wednesday, less than 48 hours after Washington eliminated the defending champion Pittsburgh Penguins.

"Right now it's just satisfaction we beat the Stanley Cup champions finally and we move forward and now we're going to play against a very good team, against very good goaltending and solid players over there."

The Atlantic Division-champion Lightning present a formidable challenge, but the Capitals had to overcome something altogether different after losing in the first or second round in all nine playoff appearances that have come during the Ovechkin era dating to 2008. Beating the rival Penguins in overtime in a Game 6 on the road made the breakthrough even more emotional.

"We should be proud of that," defenseman Matt Niskanen said. "It's a big achievement. But I think we've got to be greedy. We've got to want more because this is a heck of a run. I don't know if there is a group out there that knows how hard it is to get to this point."

The Capitals are at this point with Ovechkin on top of his game with eight goals and seven assists, his best playoff output since 2009. And they're here in large part because of Trotz, a well-respected, 19-year NHL coach who does not have a contract for next season.

"I had a summer which was very enlightening to me, and I just look at everything way differently than I ever have," Trotz said. "I just recognized that I can only control what I can control, and the other stuff I can't."

Trotz can't control upper-body injuries to Nicklas Backstrom and Andre Burakovsky or a three-game suspension handed out to winger Tom Wilson, only the decisions he makes in replacing them. So far, Trotz has pushed the right buttons, like putting Braden Holtby back in net in Game 2 of the first round and promoting Jakub Vrana to the top line in Game 5 against Pittsburgh.

## Dwane Casey voted by peers as NBA coach of the year

Casey was announced Wednesday as the coach-of-the-year selection by the National Basketball Coaches Association. The award, named for longtime NBCA executive director Michael H. Goldberg, is voted on only by the league's head coaches.

A media panel voted separately for the NBA's Coach of the Year award, which will be announced June 25.

"To be honored by your peers is incredibly gratifying, and I am so thankful to my colleagues across the league for this recognition," Casey said. "I'm also grateful to the talented and dedicated coaching staff I work with every day in Toronto. To be recognized with an award that bears Michael H. Goldberg's name is very special."

Casey won after

a season in which Toronto went a franchise-best 59-23 and finished with the No. 1 seed in the Eastern Conference, before getting swept by Cleveland in the second round of the playoffs.

Other coaches who received votes were Philadelphia's Brett Brown, Houston's Mike D'Antoni, Indiana's Nate McMillan, San Antonio's Gregg Popovich, the Los Angeles Clippers' Doc Rivers, Utah's Quin Snyder and Portland's Terry Stotts.

NBCA President Rick Carlisle, the Dallas Mavericks' coach, called the Goldberg award "one of the most meaningful in all of pro sports."

"Dwane Casey once again maximized the Toronto roster to achieve the top record in the Eastern Conference," Carlisle said.

D'Antoni and Miami's Erik Spoelstra shared the NBCA award when it was presented for the first time last season. Casey will receive the award at the NBCA's annual meeting in September.

## Predators, Jets lean heavily on Rinne, Hellebuyck

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Predators goalie Pekka Rinne has years of postseason experience, including a couple Game 7s and a Stanley Cup Final.

Connor Hellebuyck has the Winnipeg Jets on the verge of their first Western Conference final in his first playoff appearance, and the best comparison he can make to the looming Game 7 in Nashville is playing for Hockey East

championships back in college.

"I have yet to be scored on in one, so I like those odds," Hellebuyck said. "This has nothing to do with that. This is whole new level and you've just got to get into the game as much as you can."

Nobody has reflected the roller-coaster ride of this thrilling Western Conference semifinal between the NHL's top two teams in the regular season than their Vezina Trophy finalists. Rinne has been pulled from not one but two

games — both on his own ice — before staving off elimination in Game 6 with his second shutout this postseason.

"When you think about Game 7, as a team, as an individual, you're just going to give it all and do your best and do it as a team and trust your teammates," Rinne said Wednesday. "I think that's the best formula and focus on your own team."

Hellebuyck's stats include a 2-1 record in Nashville in this series, which ends Thursday

night (8 p.m. ET, NBCSN) in the only Game 7 of the second round this postseason. Hellebuyck gave up three goals in a 4-0 home loss Monday night, turning this into a winner-take-all game for the right to play Vegas in the conference final.

"We know it's all on the line, and nothing in the past is going to bother us," Hellebuyck said. "We can't let it. This is going to be the most fun game we're going to play and I think a lot of us are going to enjoy ourselves."

Tampa Bay has been here before. This is the third time in four seasons that it has reached the conference final. Enough times to know that it isn't good enough. Thus, the business-like approach even as the players were still wiping off the sweat of the Boston series.

The Lightning's goal this season wasn't just to make the playoffs or even to get back to the final. Nothing less than a Stanley Cup will do. That has been the mission for four years now and the mission has yet to be accomplished.

The Lightning eventually needs to win a Cup to be considered a success during this current run with players such as Steven Stamkos, Victor Hedman, Nikita Kucherov and so on.

Now, let's be clear: the Caps have the exact same goal of winning a Cup. Following its second-round elimination of the Penguins, Caps coach Barry Trotz sounded just like Calahan when he said, "We haven't done anything yet."

Goalie Braden Holtby said, "The third round isn't the Stanley Cup."

But having said that, did you see the reaction — the huge sigh of relief — the Caps had when they beat the Penguins on Monday night? Captain Alex Ovechkin looked like the world was removed from his shoulders.

Granted, it was in overtime of a tense series against a hated opponent, but the Caps looked like a team that was pretty satisfied, as if they accomplished something huge. In a way, Washington had. It exorcised its personal demon and did something no one was convinced it could do, beat the Pens to reach the conference final for the first time in the Ovechkin era.

Frankly, the Caps looked like a team that was fulfilled. You have to wonder if they are in for a letdown. You have to wonder if they think the highest hurdle has been cleared when, in fact, it's about to get much tougher.

Washington has a few days to come off its high and get refocused. But it sure seems like the Lightning's emotions are in better check.

### What happened was

Against each other during the regular season, the Lightning and the Capitals ... uh, who cares?

If the playoffs have taught us anything, it's that the regular season doesn't mean a thing. The Devils were 3-0 against the Lightning this season and Tampa Bay dismantled them in five games.

Next? The Bruins, who were 3-1 against the Lightning in the regular season and pretty much owned Tampa Bay throughout the Lightning's history. Lightning coach Jon Cooper said the Bruins "waxed" Tampa Bay earlier this season. So what happened when the teams met in the playoffs? The Lightning lost Game 1 of the Eastern Conference semifinals, then won four straight in dominating fashion.

Clearly, the postseason is a different animal than the regular season and what happened in the regular season does not carry over into the playoffs.

For example, the Lightning went 2-1 against the Caps during the regular season, but one of the Lightning's victories came when Washington

was playing the second game in two nights in two different cities.

Was there anything that can be learned from the three meetings?

Well, we saw that this Lightning team was able to better stand up physically to the Caps than it had in the past couple of seasons. There was a time not that long ago that Washington could manhandle the Lightning. Not anymore.

And the most surprising aspect of the Lightning's victory against the Bruins was just how physical Tampa Bay was. Not only did it withstand Boston's physical game, it took the physical game to the Bruins.

"I think maybe we did surprise them a little bit with that," Stamkos said after that series.

### It all comes down to ...

Goaltending, of course. We always say that. But it's true. Holtby is a former Vezina Trophy winner. The Lightning's Andrei Vasilevich is a finalist for the Vezina. Both are superb. But which one is more likely to give up a softie at a bad time? My guess is Holtby, giving the Lightning a slight edge in goal.

And the talking will most definitely continue over the next few days. With five full off days between the Warriors' and Rockets' respective second-round clinchers on Tuesday and Game 1 of their series, a lot of people will be saying a lot of somethings.

"I think it's going to be a great series," said New Orleans coach Alvin Gentry, whose Pelicans fell in five games to the Warriors in the West semifinals. "I think it will be very entertaining. I think the people will have a great time watching that series, because you have great players out there. ... I'm looking forward to it."

He's hardly alone. For as great as LeBron James has been, again, the West matchup is going to overshadow the East finals between

Cleveland and either Boston or Philadelphia. That's no disrespect to the East; that's just reality given the seasons that the Warriors and Rockets have had, and the collision course that seemed so inevitable for either to avoid.

"The whole world's been waiting for this matchup," Hall of Famer Shaquille O'Neal said in his role as an analyst Tuesday night on TNT.

The three Warriors-Rockets games were about as anticipated as any in the regular season: Golden State lost two of the three, and the final combined score of those matchups was Warriors 353, Rockets 352.

"That was so long ago," Warriors forward Kevin Durant said. "I think both teams are different and playing better. So you know, I try not to look at those games but we kind of know, they know what we do and they know what we do."

# McIlroy still searching for the secret to Sawgrass

PONTE VEDRA BEACH — Rory McIlroy didn't break par until his fourth time at The Players Championship.

The next step is having a chance on Sunday.

The four-time major champion has learned to love the TPC Sawgrass — “learned to like,” he quickly clarified with a smile — and he has taken small steps toward contention. The Stadium Course has a history of not favoring any one style of play, and the list of winners at the PGA Tour's premier event illustrates that, going from Greg Norman to Lee Janzen, from Tiger Woods to Craig Perks, from Henrik Stenson to Tim Clark.

“I felt like it handcuffed me,” McIlroy said. “I felt like I was just being stubborn, trying to hit driver where there's no point in hitting drive. So I've learned to take it for what it is — a very positional golf course.”

Attitude is everything in golf, especially on this Pete Dye-designed course created on land that used to be a swamp.

McIlroy said he now looks forward to The Players Championship, even though he has yet to finish closer than four shots of the winner. Much of that has to do with the water, just not any found on the golf course.

“I started staying on the beach a few years ago, and that's made the event a lot more enjoyable,” McIlroy said.

McIlroy is not alone in his struggles.

Jordan Spieth has gone the opposite direction. He nearly won the first time he played and didn't even make a bogey until his 59th

hole. He tied for fourth. And that was the last time he played on the weekend at Sawgrass.

“I just kind of assumed that it would come easy to me,” Spieth said.

Dustin Johnson has never finished better than a tie for 12th. That was last year, and he had to close with a 68 to finish that high. Even more remarkable for the No. 1 player in the world is that he has shot in the 60s just three times in 30 rounds.

It all starts to unfold Thursday, the final time The Players Championship will be held in May after a 12-year run before returning to the pre-Masters date in March.

The star attraction is Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson paired in the same group for the first time since the 2014 PGA Championship. This is only the second time they have played with each other on the Stadium Course. The other was the third round in 2001, when Woods holed a birdie putt from one end of the island green to the other on the par-3 17th and wound up winning the next day.

Woods has won twice at Sawgrass. He has never missed the cut. But he has been perplexed by the Stadium Course, just like so many others. He has finished out of the top 20 in just over half his appearances, some of those when he was the most dominant player in golf.

“There's no way of faking it around this golf course,” said Woods, who won his first U.S. Amateur at Sawgrass in 1994. “The golf course negates a lot of different things. We're all playing from basically the same spots off the tees with our approach shots.”

Mickelson has said of his 2007 victory, “I can't believe I won here.”

The purse has been raised to \$11 million, with the winner getting just under \$2 million for a week's work. The field is always among the strongest — last year, only the three full-field majors had a higher-rated field.

And while it has an All-Star roster of champions, equally impressive is the list of players who haven't won. That includes the top five players in the world, all of whom have a

mathematical chance to be No. 1 by the end of the week.

First, they have to figure out Sawgrass.

“It's a golf course that can frustrate you,” McIlroy said. “I think that's what Pete Dye does so well. He can frustrate you by the design of his golf courses, and you feel like you're getting bad breaks, and that can get under your skin a little bit. ... I think the mental side of golf is way more important than the physical. You can struggle with your swing and struggle with your putting, but if your mental side is on point, you're going to have a chance to win every week.”

McIlroy has his own star group with Spieth and Justin Thomas, three players in their 20s who have combined for eight majors.

The forecast is for warm temperatures, which should translate into a firm, fast course.

“When it gets firm and fast, it's hard,” Thomas said. “It's the hardest par 72 we'll play. You have to just take what it gives you, and take your medicine when you get out of position.”

## Djokovic loses to Edmund in Madrid; Rafael Nadal cruises

MADRID — Novak Djokovic added another early elimination to his disappointing season, while Rafael Nadal continued to look invincible on clay.

Djokovic lost to Kyle Edmund 6-3, 2-6, 6-3 on Wednesday in the second round of the Madrid Open, the sixth straight tournament in which he has failed to reach the quarterfinals.

Nadal later cruised past Gael Monfils 6-3, 6-1, extending his record of consecutive sets won on clay to 48. The 16-time Grand Slam champion, coming off titles in Monte Carlo and Barcelona, has won 37 of his last 38 matches on the surface, including 20 straight.

Djokovic has struggled this year after saying he returned to action too quickly following a lingering right elbow injury.

“There are obvious things that are not working well for me,” the 12-time Grand Slam champion said. “But I have to keep working on them and pray that ... and hope that my game will get stronger.”

Djokovic lost in the third round in Monte

Carlo and in the second round in both Miami and Indian Wells. The 12th-ranked Serb also failed to advance past the last 16 at the Australian Open.

“One or two points decide really these kind of matches,” Djokovic said. “Luck was on his side a little bit. But, also, he was courageous enough to attack the balls when it mattered and deserved to win.”

Djokovic played poorly in the first set but recovered to comfortably win the second. He had a chance to go up a break early in the third set but lost five straight points to allow Edmund to come back from 0-40. The unseeded British player then broke Djokovic's serve to go up 5-3 and easily closed out the match on his serve.

“I just felt good today, felt I was hitting the ball well,” Edmund said. “I just knew that if I put myself in the match hopefully in the closing stages I would give myself a chance. That game in the third set was very key. When Novak gets a lead it's very hard to break him down because he becomes a bit more aggressive.”

## Timbers tease Sounders before match

PORTLAND, Ore. — The salvos are being launched well before Sunday's rivalry game between the Portland Timbers and the Seattle Sounders.

It will be the 100th meeting between the two Pacific Northwest teams, dating back to a rainy May day in 1975 when both teams were in the North American Soccer League.

The Timbers put out a mock-documentary

about the rivalry Tuesday, poking fun at Seattle's traffic, the departure of the Super-Sonics and even Clint Dempsey's ill-fated attempt at rap. It points out that Portland won its MLS Cup championship before the Sounders got theirs.

Despite the chiding, the Sounders rule the all-time series 50-35-14 across all competitions. There have been many memorable (or notorious) moments, including the U.S. Open Cup match in 2008 when Seattle's

Roger Levesque mimicked chopping down a tree after scoring on Portland's field, drawing the ire of fans.

The mockumentary came after the Sounders set up a special (and more serious) website to commemorate the 100th meeting, highlighting mostly Seattle's triumphs, calling it the “most important soccer rivalry in the U.S.”

Sunday's match features a pair of teams had appeared headed in different directions.

The Timbers, after

losing the first five games of the season (all on the road), have won three straight, including last weekend's 1-0 victory at San Jose.

“We've been building exactly for these type of matches,” Portland coach Giovanni Savarese said. “Once you build the mentality, once you build the group that wants to play together, we go (in the game) with an idea. But the important thing is, throughout the match, the guys have to be mature and be able to achieve a good result.”

Barkley, Rashaad Penny, Sony Michel and Nick Chubb.

Jones didn't have the highest rate of explosive runs, but he and Barkley — the second overall pick — were nearly even.

Perhaps Penny wasn't as much of a reach as many draft analysts have suggested, at least by this measure. Recent history suggests a high rate of explosive runs in college signals NFL success. When I did this exercise last year, Alvin Kamara and Kareem Hunt — eventual third-round picks — ranked higher than Leonard Fournette and Christian McCaffrey — eventual first-round picks. In their rookie seasons, Kamara and Hunt proved to be the greater explosive threats.

It can be difficult to isolate how much of a running back's success is the result of his vision, speed and elusiveness and how much is the result of the blocking in front of him or the quality of the opponent.

With that in mind, I also looked at each running back's rate of explosive runs against opponents in the Power 5 conferences (ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC). Penny still led, though his sample of carries was by far the smallest. Jones' effectiveness didn't slip much at all — almost 90 percent of his explosive runs came against Power 5 opponents.

Last season, Kamara and Hunt set the bar ridiculously high for rookie running backs. Jones probably won't have the same immediate impact, but if he can help the Bucs' rushing attack return to anywhere near 2015 efficiency, he'll be on track to proving he was worth the second-round pick.

Darnold and Palmer are serving as advisory staff members for Wilson, which makes the official balls used by the NFL. The Chicago-based company has been incorporating technology and performance-based data with its Wilson X Connected Football, which debuted two years ago. Now, Darnold and Palmer are helping develop the next-generation version that will enhance film sessions and, possibly, on-field production.

“I think it's really cool to come out here with Wilson and give them my feedback on what it really takes to be a quarterback and what I'm looking for in this data,” Darnold said in a video provided by Wilson, “and help kind of build the prototype that is going to push this game to the next level.”

Wilson hopes to have the 2.0 version of its Connected Football technology available for a wide release to college and pro teams later this year. In the meantime, the company is gathering feedback from some players and coaches at both levels, including Darnold and Palmer.

“Before this technology, it was really just based on the eye, the naked eye,” Darnold said, “being able to look at the film and based on a throw, you might look

at your feet, your hips or something like that, to tell you what might have happened, what might have gone wrong.

“Now with this technology, it gives us hard evidence, hard data to be able to look back on and figure out exactly what happened and what might have gone wrong and what we can improve on and keep improving as a quarterback.”

Darnold's involvement with the Wilson technology began over a year ago when he was working with Palmer, who played in the NFL for parts of eight seasons and has become one of the country's elite quarterback trainers. One of the biggest criticisms of Darnold at USC before last season was a glaring flaw in his mechanics: an elongated motion with which he'd drop his right arm a bit when he wanted to air out a pass. After one of Palmer's buddies told him about the first-generation Wilson X Connected ball, he decided to use it — and it confirmed his theory.

“I knew kind of how to fix it because it's really just retraining muscle memory,” Palmer said in a phone interview. “I knew that, but to try to get it to where it was digestible and understandable, where I could prove definitively that he shouldn't do that, I just needed data to back that up.”

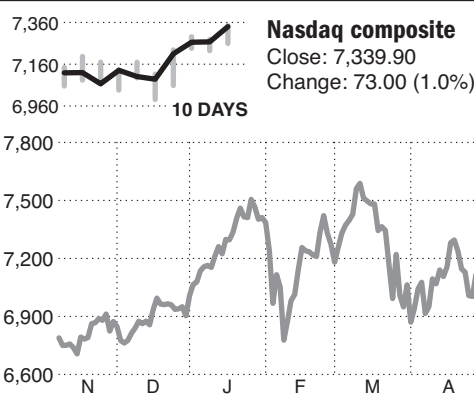
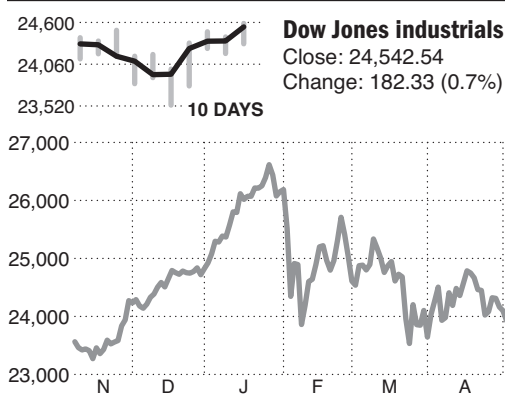
