Moller dies in jet dragster crash

SEBRING — Katarina “Kat” Moller, 24, of Sarasota, was killed Thursday night in a jet dragster crash at Sebring International Raceway. The crash happened during the first of her two scheduled exhibition runs in her jet dragster.

Moller was in her fifth year driving for Larsen Motorsports. According to John Story, senior director of marketing for the raceway, Moller was a very popular driver at SIR. She had a large following and the respect of others in the industry.

“Larsen Motorsports is very popular everywhere across the country,” Story said. “The drivers put on amazing shows and are

always thrilled. That’s why promoters like us hire them. “Kat was a local girl, so she loved coming to Sebring to race,” he said. “She was here in the spring and as far as I know, she was driving the same car.”

Moller came from a racing family; her father, Tommy, and brother, Thomas, are both veterans of SIR. Her father used to race at Sebring in the ‘90s and her brother currently does, according to Moller’s social media posts. Her parents, perhaps her

biggest fans, were at Sebring International Raceway on Thursday night. Moller’s career started with her professional debut with the National Hot Road Association Junior Dragster

Highlands deputy arrested

Charged with attempted sexual battery on another deputy

SEBRING — A Highlands County Sheriff’s deputy has been charged with attempted sexual battery on a female deputy, who was off duty at the time. Deputy Sheriff Zachary Lehman, 29, is in Highlands County Jail on charges of sexual battery and armed kidnapping to facilitate a felony.

The Thursday arrest stems from an incident on Oct. 15, when an off-duty female deputy and two other off-duty deputies, Jason Mulligan and Brian Van Fleet, met with Lehman at South Florida State College to discuss the Sheriff’s Office Explorers program.

Lehman was on duty and in uniform, according to Sheriff’s Office arrest reports. After the meeting, Mulligan and Van Fleet had to leave for other appointments.

Once they left, Lehman gave the female deputy a tour of the campus. On the way back, he started talking about wanting to have sex with her, especially since she was getting a divorce.

She told him that talk was inappropriate, because he has a wife. He answered that “everyone has needs” and they could just have sex without a relationship.

This conversation made the deputy uncomfortable, but “this was typical behavior for the defendant and he talks inappropriately more times than not,” reports said.

The report also states that the deputy didn’t give much weight to what he was saying at that moment, “because it was just Lehman.”

This conversation occurred while they were out touring the campus on a golf cart, and it further made the deputy uncomfortable, reports said, because she and Lehman were “far out and no one was around.”

The alleged sexual battery took place back at Lehman’s on-campus office where he allegedly had to give her some paperwork pertaining to the previous meeting, reports said.

According to reports, she told him at least 50 times to stop what he was doing, but he continued to “yank” her back into the room when she tried to escape.

In his version of the story, reports said, she was receptive to him at first, but then declined, and he backed away.

Once the deputy told her supervisor about the incident, Lehman was relieved of duty and placed on administrative leave during the criminal investigation, said Scott Dressel, public information officer for the Sheriff’s Office.

Lehman has since resigned.

After the investigation, investigators submitted a probable cause affidavit to the State Attorney’s Office, reports said, and prosecutors found reason to file criminal charges.

A judge reviewed and signed the probable cause affidavit and issued a warrant. Lehman was arrested Thursday and transported to the Highlands County Jail. Sheriff Paul Blackman said the incident “disturbed him greatly.”

“All of our deputies are placed in positions of authority and given great trust. As a result, we hold them the highest standard and fully expect them to follow the law as well as enforce it,” Blackman said in a prepared statement. “They are not, and never will be, above reproach and we will always take allegations of wrongdoing very seriously.”

“These kinds of acts will not be tolerated from anyone, especially one of my deputies,” Blackman continued, “and even the hint of such behavior from a member of our agency will always draw a swift and thorough response.”

Catching up

1/2-Cent Boost, Tax generating much more than expected

SEBRING — The half-cent sales tax continues to generate many more dollars than expected for The School Board of Highlands County, providing a boost for maintenance projects, new buses and safety/security needs.

For the fiscal year July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018 the district collected \$6,308,521, which is well above the \$4.2 million the district estimated it would receive on an annual basis, said Mike Averyt, assistant superintendent of business operations.

To date, from January 2017 to October 2018, the half-cent sales tax has generated \$9,721,499.83 and the district has spent \$8,885,440.10, he said. As the district receives the tax revenue, the approved projects are funded.

The Half-Cent Citizen Advisory Committee, at its next meeting — 5:30 p.m. Monday, Nov. 26 — will be getting an updated listing of the district’s projects and the current status of the cash flow, Averyt said. The district will seek input on what projects the committee wants to continue to fund.

Advisory Committeewoman Diane Juve said since the recession, which caused a reduction of property tax revenue, the district had been way behind in addressing the needs that are now being met with the half-cent sales tax revenue.

“There was so much deferred maintenance, now we can catch up a

little bit faster, but it is still going to take a while to catch up those school buses,” she said.

The district went through a period of about eight years without purchasing any new buses, but added nine buses this year and nine last year.

“We are able to move forward on some of the security issues,” Juve said. “In the older elementary schools, we had no security cameras and now we do, and we are able to increase the numbers and placement and getting the fencing that is really needed immediately to address the safety issues.”

Will Kenilworth Lodge reopen?

SEBRING — The Kenilworth Lodge, an historic building listed on the National Register of Historic Places, sits empty and in desperate need of repairs after Hurricane Irma’s high speed winds whipped around the building. However, the owners have not received the insurance money to make the necessary repairs.

Built by the founder of Sebring, George E. Sebring, in 1916, the hotel was in continuous operation until it was condemned for occupancy by former Sebring Fire Chief Brad Batz.

Kenilworth owner Monier Rahall made the clarification that the building was condemned for occupancy, but it was not condemned. The difference is the Kenilworth

was no longer able to have hotel guests, but the building itself was not condemned.

The issue with the insurance money is complicated. The owners of the building have been in foreclosure litigation since 2012 or 2013, according to Paula Rush, a

legal expert in foreclosure litigation who is helping the Kenilworth owners. The insurance that currently covers the building was force-placed by the lender.

Rahall said windstorm insurance on the building could not be obtained due to

the building’s age. However, the lender was able to find coverage because they buy insurance in bulk, and the lender force-placed the coverage.

Rahall had not been required to have windstorm insurance when the mortgage had been held by Riverside National Bank of Florida. However, the bank was bought out by TD Bank, which demanded wind insurance.

Since the policy is a lender-placed policy, Rahall has had difficulty communicating with the insurance company. He wanted to get the money to make repairs to the main building and the outbuilding. The damage estimated for the main historic building was \$393,394.91, and the damage

Three arrested on drug charges

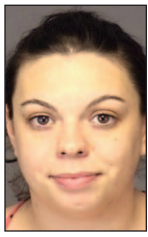

SEBRING — Three people were arrested at a home on Parkview Road in Sebring on charges of drug possession. Two of the people arrested reported previous employment with The School Board of Highlands County.

Highlands County Sheriff's Office arrested Amanda Marie Thomas, 25, of Sebring on Tuesday. Thomas was charged with possession of cocaine, possession of less than 20 grams of marijuana and possession of drug equipment.

HCSO also arrested two other people on Tuesday. Jacob Eugene Thomas, 26, of Sebring, was a former employee of Sebring Middle School. Jacob Thomas was charged with resisting an officer without violence, possession of less than 20 grams of marijuana and possession of drug equipment.

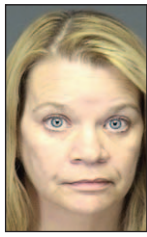
Pamela Lynn Cutler, 48, of Sebring, was arrested and charged with possession of less than

While conducting a search of the same bedroom as the previous defendant, deputies allegedly discovered

a purse belonging to Amanda Thomas. The purse contained a clear bag with a white residue, weighing 0.8 grams, that field tested positive for the presence of cocaine and a clear wrapper with a green leafy substance, weighing 0.7 grams, that field tested positive for THC.

Cutler resided in a separate bedroom. When deputies searched her bedroom, they allegedly found a multi-colored glass bong, which is commonly used for smoking cannabis. In addition, they reportedly found a clear plastic baggie with a green leafy substance that field tested positive for the presence of THC. The weight of the cannabis was 4.0 grams, the report states.

20 grams of marijuana and possession of drug equipment. Cutler was a former teacher at Sebring High School.

The Sheriff's Office obtained a search warrant for a home on Parkview Road Tuesday. Prior to entering the residence, deputies gave multiple orders for Jacob Thomas to exit his vehicle and lie on the ground. He did exit the vehicle, but refused to get on the ground.

Deputies assisted him to the ground and handcuffed him, the report states. Deputies searched his room and reportedly found a clear plastic bag with a green leafy substance that field tested positive for THC, the mind-altering chemical in cannabis. The green leafy substance weighed 16 grams, authorities said.

AVON PARK — The Avon Park special City Council meeting that was scheduled for Thursday evening (Nov. 15) has been rescheduled to 6 p.m. Monday, Nov. 19.

Mayor Garrett Anderson said Thursday morning that he rescheduled the meeting because there was a potential issue of not getting it noticed publicly in time.

"I didn't want any appearance of any kind of wrong doing," he said. "I just postponed it to

The rescheduled meeting would have followed a Main Street Community Redevelopment Agency Advisory Board meeting that was scheduled at 5:30 p.m. Monday, but that meeting has been cancelled according to the city's website.

"The CRA meetings for this week and I believe next week are being

postponed so that we can get everything in order," Anderson said. "We would like a little time to get everything set up so that we can seamlessly carry on."

The Southside CRA Advisory Board meeting that was scheduled for Nov. 14 was cancelled.

The city's website calendar has been updated to show the special City Council meeting and the rescheduling of the Nov. 26 regular council meeting so it doesn't conflict with the city's Christmas parade.

Originally the Nov. 26

meeting was cancelled, but on Tuesday the City Council rescheduled the meeting for 6 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 27.

The primary agenda item for Monday's special City Council meeting will be the search for a new city manager after the City Council decided Tuesday to accept June Fisher's resignation from the position effective immediately.

Also, after the City Council voted Tuesday to terminate its on-staff city attorney, Glinda Pruitt, council will likely discuss hiring a contract city attorney.

Garden Festival puts new twist on annual plant sale

SEBRING — The 2018 Garden Festival and Plant Sale takes over the Bert J. Harris Jr. Agricultural Center today from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Organized and sponsored by the Highlands County Master Gardeners, the fundraiser helps support scholarships for those going into horticultural fields as well as towards building the new educational pavilion in honor of volunteer Master Gardener Charlie Reynolds.

This year, however, the plant sale has extended to include 25 vendors, activities for kids, clowns, specialty booths and workshops.

"It's expanded from plant sale to full-on festival," said Master Gardener Lesa Morey.

Master Gardeners have been growing many of the plants for sale for the past year. Edibles such as blackberries, raspberries, figs, peppers and even pumpkins will all be on hand. Along with edibles, you will also find ornamental plants including dish gardens planted with succulents, plants with thickened or fleshy parts for the purpose of retaining water in arid climates.

The Garden Festival will also contain 25 vendors selling their wares, both garden related and not; from handmade crafts, art and jewelry to homemade preserves and other food. Live music will

Responsible driving is the only real fix

Three crashes caused by impaired drivers going the wrong way on Tampa Bay highways have added to the region's grim toll from these senseless tragedies. While the Florida Department of Transportation is rightly ramping up efforts to reduce these collisions using technology to detect wrong-way drivers, the recent loss of life is a reminder of the perils of impaired driving in a region where the roadways are perpetually under construction and increasingly congested.

In the stretch of just two weeks this fall, a suspected drunk driver made a U-turn and drove the wrong way on the Howard Frankland bridge, dying when he crashed head-on into a van, critically injuring a St. Petersburg man. Days later, a similar collision on the bridge critically injured a woman. Then a suspected drunk driver going the wrong way on the Lee Roy Selmon Expressway killed 68-year-old Bamnet Narongchai, a mechanic on his way home from a late shift.

Yet wrong-way driving — while it defies common sense — is actually quite common, a 2014 Tampa Bay Times analysis found. There were 70 incidents of drivers entering highways going the wrong way over the course of eight years in Tampa Bay, and nearly 700 wrong-way driving incidents on local roads in 2014, according to Florida Highway Patrol records. It's a problem that deserves the state's attention for changes to infrastructure that would help reduce the number of serious crashes due to wrong-way drivers.

The Department of Transportation first began to tackle the problem after a wrong-way driver killed himself and four University of South Florida fraternity members on Interstate 275 near campus in 2014, the first of six wrong-way collisions that year. After examining crash data, the department put up red flashing warning signs with radar detection at select ramps to deter wrong-way drivers. Once triggered, an alert is immediately sent to law enforcement officials, and a wrong-way driver alert is broadcast on the electronic message boards along the interstate, according to FDOT spokeswoman Kristen Carson. FDOT has also increased wrong-way signage, roadway reflectors and large painted pavement markings to help make direction of lanes and ramps even clearer. She said the data shows those measures may be working. Numbers dropped from 18 wrong-way driving crashes in the Tampa Bay area in 2016 to seven in 2017.

But the recent crashes on Howard Frankland bridge illuminate a different problem. Two wrong-way drivers recently made a U-turn in the middle of the bridge. That prompted FDOT to test new video analytics software with its cameras on the bridge to send alerts to the Traffic Management Center, dispatching troopers when there's a wrong-way driver.

These are worthwhile changes that can make Tampa Bay highways safer. But law enforcement officials are quick to point out that wrong-way driving is not an engineering issue. It's a drunk driving issue. In all but one of Tampa Bay's deadly wrong-way crashes in the last few years, the driver going the wrong way was impaired. With the availability of ride-sharing services and taxis, there's never an excuse for driving drunk — and texting while driving is just as dangerous. Only responsible driving will fix this problem. Meanwhile, FDOT's efforts are a step in the right direction to minimizing the damage wrong-way drivers cause.

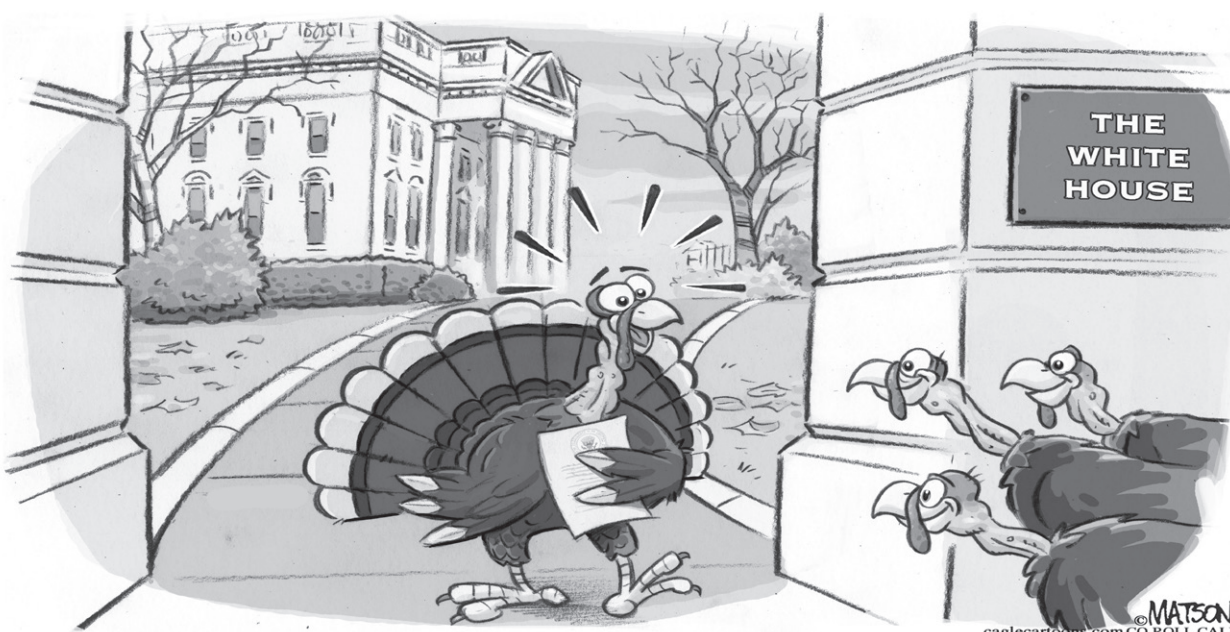

A declared presidential candidate who believes in what he has lived

WASHINGTON — The world's oldest political party has developed an aversion to discretion. The Democratic Party is manacled to an over-caffeinated base that believes that deft government can deliver parity of status to everyone while micromanaging the economy's health care sector, which is larger than all but three other foreign nations' economies. Inconveniently, the party must appeal to voters who, living in dread of their next interaction with the department of motor vehicles, yearn only for governmental adequacy.

Which is why John Delaney, who is ending a three-term tenure as a Democratic congressman from Maryland, is seeking his party's presidential nomination. His quest will test whether Democrats' detestation of Donald Trump is stronger than their enthusiasm for identity politics: A white male businessman, Delaney comes to bat with three strikes against him.

Suppose, however, Democrats are more interested in scrubbing the current presidential stain from public life than they are in virtue-signaling and colonizing the far shores of leftwingery. Delaney is much more

than an example of the If-Donald-Trump-Can-Be-Elected-So-Can-My-Cocker-Spaniel response to 2016.

His grandparents, he says, "made pencils and worked the docks." He did not become wealthy, as today's businessman-turned-president did, through a father's largesse supplemented by tax chicanery. Neither of Delaney's parents went to college. His father was a 60-year member of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. An IBEW scholarship, and support from the American Legion, VFW and Lion's Club, helped Delaney through Columbia University. After Georgetown Law School, where he met his wife, he founded a financial company and became the youngest-ever CEO on the New York Stock Exchange. His next company invests in small and midsize companies. In 2017, Fortune magazine included him among the "World's 50 Greatest Leaders."

Solidly built and impeccably tailored, Delaney, 55, is a Democrat who believes in what he has lived: upward mobility,

with assistance. He recognizes the obvious, that globalization has been "extraordinarily positive" for billions more people than it has injured, but its American casualties are real and deserve government help. He speaks with the calm confidence of one who understands, as the man he hopes to displace does not, that the lungs are not the seat of wisdom. He checks various boxes that might mollify all but the most fastidious progressives: He likes early childhood education, a carbon tax, a \$15 minimum wage and extending the Social Security tax to higher incomes. He dislikes the NRA, the Supreme Court's Citizens United decision, high interest rates on student loans and "outrageous" drug prices. He would achieve "universal" health care by offering Medicaid for all, and for those who choose to opt for private programs, as he thinks most people would, there would be federal subsidies for those who need them.

He says "the screaming top headline" from the midterm elections was that moderate Democrats won. Few not occupying safe seats won while hollering "Single payer healthcare!" and "Abolish ICE!" and

"Impeachment!"

It is Delaney's persona — think of a Joe Biden 20 years younger and half as prolix — that will distinguish him and seem either pleasingly adult or insufficiently carbonated when the prancing ponies from the U.S. Senate come cantering into Iowa. If the nomination scramble is a decibel competition, Delaney will lose — and the winning Democrat probably will lose in the November 2020 rendezvous with him who specializes in loud.

Delaney illustrates the reason for tolerating what Iowa considers a Mandate of Heaven — its entitlement to begin the nomination process. Iowans are so thin on the ground that relentless retail politicking can give a dark horse candidate a fighting chance against the ponies who, being senators and hence barely employed, have ample time to flit around the country raising money and their pretty profiles before coming to where the tall corn grows. Delaney, who is not neglecting New Hampshire, has been tilling Iowa's political soil as an announced candidate for more than 475 days, and long since exceeded

Bearcats try to knock off Knights

Cincinnati plays UCF in key conference game

CINCINNATI — Luke Fickell doesn't listen to sports talk radio while driving to his office at the University of Cincinnati each morning. He's more a fan of '80s tunes and country music.

Twitter? He follows recruits, but that's about it.

The Bearcats' second-year coach hasn't kept up with all the chatter about how he's turned around a program that had bottomed out. After winning only four games each of the last two seasons, the 19th-ranked Bearcats (9-1, 5-1 American Athletic) are back on the football map.

"If there's something out

there, I wouldn't even know about it," Fickell said. "That's

the way I've always kind of lived, and it helps me focus on

what I'm doing."

He's got the Bearcats in contention for the league title as they travel to No. 11 UCF (9-0, 6-0) for a prime-time game today on ABC, the biggest stage yet for Fickell's young team. There are 35 true freshmen on the roster and 72 percent are underclassmen — one of the reasons their emergence was so unexpected.

Not even Fickell would have predicted something like this when the season began.

"I'm not saying I would have said this team had the potential to win nine or 10 games and play for a championship in January, February, March or April this past year," Fickell said. "I wouldn't have said it in September or October, really."

Instead, Cincinnati is off to its best season since 2009, when it went 12-0 in the regular season under Brian Kelly. He left for Notre Dame before the Bearcats played in the Sugar Bowl and lost to Tim Tebow's Florida team 51-24.

The Bearcats survived a few close calls early — an end zone interception in the closing seconds saved a win over Ohio — and have grown up faster than expected.

Most of their experience is on the defense, which leads the league in fewest yards and points allowed. Three seniors anchor a line that is the unit's strength. Sophomore running back Michael Warren II has

On Dec. 1, 2018, I will host my annual High School and College Open bass tournament on Norris Lake in Tennessee. I figured it would be a good time to discuss how to go from being a student angler to becoming a Bassmaster Elite Series pro.

High school and college fishing programs are bigger and better than they've ever been, and they're sure to keep growing and improving. I can't think of a better way to start climbing the ladder to the Elites.

I know something about this because my journey

to the Elite Series began when I was a student at the University of Kentucky. In 2012 I became the first

collegiate angler to compete in the Elites.

One of the main questions I get from high school and

college anglers is: "What should the next step be for me to work toward my goal of being a professional fisherman?"

Most of the students I talk to are overly concerned about getting sponsorships. Some are almost consumed with it. They seem to believe that financial support from sponsors is the key to becoming a bass pro.

That's backward thinking in my view. I did not acquire a single financial sponsor until after I qualified for the Elite Series.

The time and energy you exert seeking and working for sponsors would be better spent fishing and competing in tournaments.

"The Divine spark of creation"

Touring the Holy Land during a peaceful time

SEBRING — When we think of Israel and the Holy Land we think of war and unrest. At last week's monthly meeting of the Heartland American Israeli Initiative, guest speaker Dr. Donna Wasson asked the audience to look at things differently for an hour. "Let's not concentrate on religion and politics this afternoon, but on the nature of Israel."

She began by telling the group of her hiking visit in 1989 where she literally sucked up the beauty of the country.

Wasson visited Israel in March 1989 as a tourist and it changed her life. She visited and hiked the Sinai Peninsula, which she said was not a place to go hiking today. She reminisced of the trip she took and memories she holds dear today.

She spoke of the bird sanctuary where more than 500 species of birds pass through on their way to Germany,

France and America. "There are literally millions of birds, eagles, hawks, pheasants, quail, wobblers, white storks — you name it," Wasson said.

Wasson was teaching school in Germany and when the opportunity arose, she could not resist to hike the Peninsula. She had as her guide a former military Israeli woman whose training equipped her to be a good teacher on how to manage the mountains.

A Bedouin nomad moved her supplies from campsite to campsite.

Much of the area's sandstone reminded her of Bryce Cannon and Zion in Utah. "We had to push our bodies up the mountain, ease up, push again until we got over the top. That was 29 years ago. I don't think I would have a chance to do that today," she said with a smile.

"We each wander in the wilderness and

listen to the wind. We are a part of the Divine spark of creation and we need to join together with all men and women of every race, color and creed to keep our world beautiful." She added, "We travel best with our eyes, souls and heart."

Wasson spoke of the group SPNI, The Society for the Protection of Nature in Israel. They were an influence in her desire to hike and camp under the stars. SPNI is the oldest, leading and largest environmental non-profit organization in Israel. They are doing so many things these days like desalination to help Israel solve its chronic water shortage.

At one time everyone picked the wild flowers and the children stood at roadsides selling bouquets. This caused the iris and tulips on the verge of distinction. A campaign, "Don't Pick The Wildflowers," in the 1970s and '80s helped foster a sea of change in Israeli attitudes and not

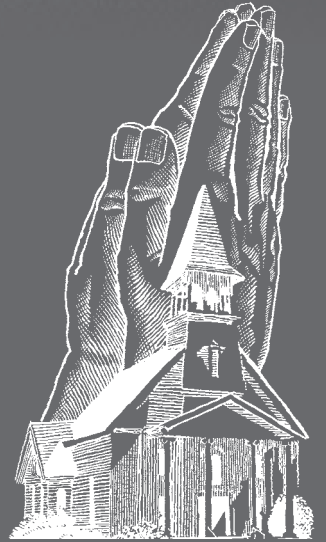

CNN's Acosta returns to White House

CNN's Jim Acosta is back at the White House after a federal judge ordered the Trump administration to immediately return his press credentials, though a lawsuit over the revocation is continuing.

The White House revoked Acosta's credentials last week after he and President Donald Trump tangled verbally during a press conference. CNN sued and asked the judge to

issue a temporary restraining order.

U.S. District Court Judge Timothy Kelly, an appointee of President Donald Trump, said Friday that Acosta's credentials must be reactivated to allow him access to the White House complex for press briefings and other events.

Trump says the White House is "writing up rules and regulations" for reporters.

Florida starts hand recount in US Senate race

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Volunteers gathered around folding tables Friday to begin a painstaking hand recount in Florida's acrimonious U.S. Senate contest, with a goal of determining the intent of about 93,000 voters whose ballots for Republican Gov. Rick Scott or Democratic Sen. Bill Nelson could not be counted by machine.

The hand recount is required by state law whenever candidates are separated by 0.25 percentage points or less. Unofficial results showed Scott ahead of Nelson by 0.15 percentage points, or fewer than 13,000 votes out of more than

8 million cast.

In Broward County, officials relied on a color-coded system to tally some of the last ballots by hand.

Ballots with clear votes for Republican Gov. Rick Scott went into a bin with a red tag. Clear votes for Democratic Sen. Bill Nelson went into one with a blue tag. Blank ballots went into a bin with a yellow tag. Anything that needed further examination by the canvassing board was dropped into one with a green tag.

Dozens of volunteers sitting behind the bins stacked on folding tables in a Broward County warehouse cheered loudly when they finished their hand recount

Paradise lost

Entire town reduced to ash

PARADISE, Calif. — There's a sweet legend about this town: On a blazing summer day in the 1850s, a lumber mill crew with a wagon and ox took a break under a grove of tall evergreens. The air was cool, the pine needles fragrant.

"Boys," said the team boss, "this is paradise."

Thus, more than 170 years ago, Paradise was born. From the start, it was enriched with gold mined from nearby hills and lumber harvested from the forests. Over generations,

thousands lived and loved here; they built homes and businesses, schools and houses of worship, parks and museums that proudly honored Paradise's place in American history.

In a matter of hours last week, it all disappeared.

Nearly 10,000 homes. Hundreds of shops and other buildings. The Safeway supermarket. The hardware store. The Dolly-O-Donuts & Gifts, where locals started their day with a blueberry fritter and a quick bit of gossip.

This California town of 27,000 literally went up in smoke in the nation's

deadliest wildfire in a century. The death toll is in the dozens, and many more are missing. And memories are all that's left for many of the survivors.

Driving past the smoldering ruins of downtown, Patrick Knuthson, a 49-year-old, fourth-generation local,

struggled to make sense of what he was seeing. He pointed out places that once were, and were no more: a saloon-style pub, his favorite Mexican restaurant, a classic California motel, the pawn shop, a real estate office,

Trump revives criticism over fires ahead of California visit

CHICO, Calif. (AP) — With the confirmed death toll at 63, authorities in Northern California on Friday searched for those who perished and those who survived the fiercest of wildfires ahead of a planned visit by President Donald Trump.

The president on Saturday is expected to get a look at the grief and damage caused by the

deadliest U.S. wildfire in a century, and he could face resentment from locals for blaming the inferno on poor forest management in California.

In an interview taped Friday and scheduled for broadcast on "Fox News Sunday," Trump said he was surprised to see images of firefighters removing dried brush near a fire, adding,

"This should have been all raked out."

As the search for bodies continued, Butte County spokeswoman Miranda Bowersox said the "unaccounted for" list of more than 600 names released by the sheriff's office late Thursday was an effort to put names out there so people can call in to say they are OK.

The roster probably includes some who fled the blaze and do not realize they've been reported missing, Sheriff Kory Honea said.

Some survivors resent that Trump took to Twitter two days after the disaster to blame the wildfires on poor forest mismanagement. He threatened to withhold federal payments from California.

Trump says he's 'very easily' answered Mueller questions

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump said Friday he had "very easily" answered written questions from special counsel Robert Mueller, though he speculated that the questions had been "tricked up" to try to catch him in a lie. He said he hadn't submitted his answers to investigators yet.

"You have to always be careful when you answer questions with people that probably have bad intentions," Trump told reporters in his latest swipe at the probe into 2016 election interference and possible ties between Moscow and

the president's campaign.

The president did not say when he would turn over the answers to Mueller, but his attorney, Rudy Giuliani, indicated it could happen next week. The special counsel has signaled a willingness to accept written answers on matters related to collusion with Russia. But Giuliani has said repeatedly the president would not answer Mueller's questions on possible obstruction of justice.

During months of back-and-forth negotiations with the special counsel office, Trump's lawyers have repeatedly counseled the president against sitting down for an in-person interview.

Trump's written response, though not

yet delivered, signals a new phase in the Mueller probe, the year-and-a-half-long investigation that has produced guilty pleas and convictions from several top Trump aides even as the special counsel and the White House have engaged in lengthy negotiations about how — or if — the president would testify.

Though he spent hours with his attorneys, Trump insisted: "My lawyers don't write answers, I write answers."

The president's remarks were fresh evidence of his return to the ominous rhythms of the Russia probe after spending heady weeks enjoying adulation-soaked campaign rallies before the midterm elections.

US intel says Saudi prince ordered Khashoggi killing

WASHINGTON — U.S. intelligence officials have concluded that Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman ordered the killing of journalist Jamal Khashoggi, a U.S. official said Friday. The Saudi government has denied the claim.

The conclusion will bolster efforts in Congress to further punish the close U.S. ally for the killing. The Trump administration this week sanctioned 17 Saudi officials for their alleged role in the killing, but lawmakers have called on the administration to curtail arms sales to Saudi Arabia or take other harsher punitive measures.

The U.S. official familiar with the intelligence agencies' conclusion was unauthorized to speak publicly about it and spoke on condition of anonymity. It was first reported by The Washington Post.

Saudi Arabia's top diplomat has said the crown prince had "absolutely" nothing to do with the killing.

Khashoggi, a Saudi who lived in the United States, was a columnist for the Post and often criticized the royal family. He was killed Oct. 2 at the Saudi Consulate in Istanbul. Turkish and Saudi authorities say he was killed inside the consulate by a team from the kingdom after he went there to get marriage documents.

This week, U.S. intelligence officials briefed members of the Senate and House intelligence committees and the Treasury Department announced economic sanctions on 17 Saudi officials suspected of being responsible for or complicit in the killing.

Among those targeted for sanctions were Mohammed al-Otaibi, the diplomat in charge of the consulate, and Maher Mutreb, who was part of the crown prince's entourage on trips abroad.

The sanctions freeze any assets the 17 may have in the U.S. and prohibit any Americans from doing business with them.

Also this week, the top prosecutor in Saudi Arabia announced he will seek the death penalty against five men suspected in the killing. The prosecutor's announcement sought to quiet the global outcry over Khashoggi's death and distance the killers and their operation from the kingdom's leadership, primarily the crown prince.

President Donald Trump has called the killing a botched operation that was carried out very poorly and has said "the cover-up was one of the worst cover-ups in the history of cover-ups."

Adoption scheme: Woman accused of defrauding 2 couples

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — A Florida woman is accused of defrauding two sets of would-be parents, telling both that they would adopt her baby.

Now 33-year-old Christina Bay is awaiting trial, along with childbirth. Daytona Beach police tell news outlets Bay was arrested Wednesday on charges of adoption deception and fraud.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports that on Oct. 22, adoption attorney Brian Kelly told police that a couple he represents funded a \$15,000 escrow account to cover Bay's living expenses for six months. The couple thought they were adopting Bay's baby, due Nov. 22.

A police report shows another couple also signed a contract in September to adopt the same baby.

Police said Bay took \$14,254 from the first couple and \$3,942 from the second couple.

Florida unemployment 3.4 percent, lowest since January 2007

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida's unemployment rate is 3.4 percent, which is the lowest level since January 2007.

The state released figures Friday

that show October unemployment dropped slightly from September's rate of 3.5 percent. There were 350,000 Floridians without jobs out of a workforce of 10.2 million people.

Florida's unemployment rate was below the national rate of 3.7 percent.

Monroe and Okaloosa counties had the lowest unemployment rate at 2.4 percent, followed by St. Johns, Wakulla and Walton counties at 2.5 percent.

Hendry County had the highest unemployment rate at 5.4 percent, followed by Hardee County at 4.5 percent and Citrus and Sumter counties at 4.3 percent.

Police: Doc OK'd pot for patients via closed-circuit TV

PEMBROKE PINES (AP) — Police in South Florida say a 66-year-old doctor is accused of giving patients medical marijuana cards without meeting them in person, conducting physical exams or requiring a debilitating medical condition.

The SunSentinel reports Tommy Louisville used closed-circuit television to evaluate patients who came to Miracle Leaf Health Center in Pembroke Pines. Louisville was arrested Thursday and had his medical license restricted. Prosecutors say he appears to be the first Florida doctor charged with illegally prescribing marijuana since voters legalized the drug in 2016.

Police said Louisville approved a prescription for one patient who said his employer drug-tested him and he needed an excuse for his positive results.

Coast Guard seizes about \$500 million worth of cocaine

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — The United States Coast Guard seized cocaine with an estimated street value of around \$500 million during a series of interdictions in international waters.

The 18.5 tons of cocaine was unloaded at Port Everglades in Fort Lauderdale Thursday.

The operation also led to the arrests of 49 people who will be prosecuted in South Florida.

13 adults injured in school bus crash on Florida highway

KISSIMMEE (AP) — Authorities say 13 adults suffered minor injuries when a school bus crashed on Florida's Turnpike.

The Orlando Sentinel reports the crash happened Thursday morning in Osceola County. Florida Highway Patrol says the bus driver was trying to change lanes to make a U-turn but got in the direct way of a semi-truck.

The bus was knocked onto its right side, and the semi-truck came to a stop nearby.

Florida school massacre: Panel to look at medical response

SUNRISE (AP) — For months, members of the panel investigating Florida's high school massacre have called the sheriff's deputy assigned to guard the campus "a coward" for hiding and not rushing inside in an attempt to stop the shooter.

Given an opportunity to confront his critics Thursday, now-retired Broward Sheriff's Deputy Scot Peterson sent his attorney instead before the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission.

Attorney Joseph DiRuzzo III told the 14-member panel he had filed a lawsuit hours earlier attempting to block their subpoena. DiRuzzo dropped a copy on the lectern and then walked away.

The panel, which has been meeting periodically since April, has a Jan. 1 deadline to report its findings to Gov. Rick Scott on the shooting's causes and recommendations for avoiding future school massacres. On Friday, the commission is scheduled to learn about the medical response to the shooting and begin debating its findings. The panel includes law enforcement, education and mental health officials, a legislator and the fathers of two dead students.

North Korea deports American as it boasts of new weapon

WASHINGTON — North Korea on Friday deported an American citizen it says it detained for illegal entry, a U.S. official said, an apparent concession that came even as the reclusive nation announced the test of a newly developed but unspecified "ultramodern" weapon that will be seen as a pressuring tactic by Washington.

The two whiplash announcements, which seemed aimed at both appeasing and annoying Washington, suggest North Korea wants to keep alive dialogue with the United States, even as it struggles to express its frustration at stalled nuclear diplomacy.

North Korea in the past has held arrested American citizens for an extended period before high-profile U.S. figures traveled to Pyongyang to secure their freedom. Last year, American university student Otto Warmbier died

days after he was released in a coma from North Korea after 17 months in captivity.

On Friday, the Korean Central News Agency said American national Bruce Byron Lowrance was detained on Oct. 16 for illegally entering the country from China. It said he told investigators that he was under the "manipulation" of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency. It was not clear if the North's spelling of the man's name was correct, and past reports from Pyongyang have contained incorrect spellings.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Friday expressed appreciation for the cooperation of North Korea and the embassy of Sweden — which handles consular issues for U.S. citizens in North Korea — "in facilitating the release of an American citizen." His brief statement provided no further details.

A U.S. official said the man had left North Korea and was on a flight back

to the United States. The official, who was not authorized to discuss the matter publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity. He provided no other details.

The North's decision matches its general push for engagement and diplomacy with the United States this year after a string of weapons tests in 2017,

and a furious U.S. response, had some fearing war on the Korean Peninsula.

In May, North Korea released three American detainees in a goodwill gesture weeks ahead of leader Kim Jong Un's June 12 summit with President Donald Trump in Singapore. The three Americans returned home

on a flight with Pompeo.

The United States, South Korea and others have previously accused North Korea of using foreign detainees to wrest diplomatic concessions.

Some foreigners have said after their release that their declarations of guilt had been coerced while in North Korean custody.

Warmbier and other previous American detainees in the North were imprisoned over a variety of alleged crimes, including subversion, anti-state activities and spying.

The latest detained American is likely a man that South Korea deported last year, according to South Korean police.

In November 2017, a 58-year-old man from Louisiana was caught in South Korea after spending two nights in the woods in a civilian-restricted area near the border with North Korea. The name written in his passport was Lowrance Bruce Byron, said police officers at Gyeonggi Bukbu Provincial Police Agency.

Before his deportation, the man told interrogators that he "knows lots of people in the Trump administration so that he wants to work as a bridge between the United States and North Korea to help improve their ties worsened by Warmbier's death," said one of the police officers who investigated the man.

Brexit, Italy, trade: Risks piling up for Europe's economy

FRANKFURT, Germany — Europe's five-year economic expansion is facing a mid-life crisis as it copes with potential debt troubles in Italy, a U.S.-China trade war and the risk of a disorderly British exit from the European Union.

How those risks play out will decide whether the economic upswing that began in early 2013 and has created 9.5 million more jobs ages gracefully for several more years — or meets an early demise.

The economy of the 19 countries that use the euro stumbled in July-September, when quarterly growth halved to 0.2 percent.

Some see that as a natural slowdown after much stronger, trade-fueled expansion of 0.7 percent at the end of last year.

But worries rose this week after new data showed Germany's economy, the currency union's largest, shrank 0.2 percent in the third quarter. Much of the fall can be attributed to delays faced by major automakers like Daimler and Volkswagen in getting cars certified under new emissions rules. However, a slowdown in exports also played a role, raising questions of how much more pain the U.S. trade war and uncertainties like Brexit could create for Europe's many exporters.

Holger Schmieding, chief economist at Berenberg Bank in London, says that surveys of business activity "point to a further loss of momentum in late 2018."

A key risk is the conflict between Italy's populist government, which wants to spend more on social welfare, and the European Union's executive Commission, which is demanding Italy lower its budget deficit under the rules that go with belonging to the euro. The danger is that if the Italian government persists in running larger deficits, its borrowing costs rise to unsustainable levels and the country is unable to roll over its debt at an affordable interest rate. Debt costs spiked in 2011 but fell after a reform-minded government took office and the European Central Bank promised to backstop the debt of countries that are facing high debt costs but show a willingness to correct their finances.

Italy is "the most serious risk facing the eurozone," Schmieding says.

He says an Italian financial crisis could erupt next year, but that it is more likely that the country would muddle through until a new recession — perhaps in 2021 — exposes the weaknesses in the economy.

Then there's Brexit. European officials are waiting to see if Prime Minister Theresa May can push through a deal on an orderly exit from the European Union. If the deal is rejected in parliament, in a vote that could be held in December, Britain could wind up leaving in March 2019 without a settled trade relationship with its biggest trading partner, the EU. That could reinstate tariffs and border checks on trade worth hundreds of billions of dollars.

Netanyahu's main coalition partner pushes for early election

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel moved closer to early elections Friday after Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's main coalition partner, the ultra-nationalist Jewish Home party, said it wants a vote "as soon as possible," and will press for consultations on a date on Sunday.

The call for early elections came after a meeting Friday between Netanyahu and Education Minister and Jewish Home leader Naftali Bennett. The two men have been locked in a tense rivalry, with Bennett often criticizing Netanyahu from the right.

Bennett had demanded the post of defense minister, after the incumbent, Avigdor Lieberman, resigned earlier this week in protest over Netanyahu's Gaza policies.

Nearly 270,000 Syrian refugees returned home

MOSCOW (AP) — The Russian military said nearly 270,000 Syrian refugees have returned home in recent months, a fraction of the estimated 5.6 million Syrians who have fanned out across the world fleeing the seven-year conflict.

Moscow and the government in Damascus have been encouraging refugees to repatriate, arguing that the violence has subsided. Russia launched

military operations to help Syrian President Bashar Assad in 2015, changing the tide of the war in his favor.

Western governments have, however, argued that it's too early to encourage return. Rights groups and the U.N. fear refugees would face persecution returning to government-controlled areas in the absence of a comprehensive political agreement.

Iraq resumes Kirkuk oil exports after yearlong pause

BAGHDAD (AP) — Iraq began piping oil from its fields around the disputed city of Kirkuk on Friday, more than a year after exports were halted over troubles with the autonomous Kurdish administration north of the country.

The region will export between 50,000 to 100,000 barrels of crude oil per day through a pipeline to Turkey, said Oil Ministry spokesman Assem Jihad after a deal was reached to break the deadlock between Iraq's capital Baghdad and the Kurdish Regional Government based in Irbil.

Federal forces seized Kirkuk and the surrounding oil fields in October 2017 after the KRG organized a symbolic but controversial referendum for Kurdish independence.

Exports were terminated in the wake of the takeover, costing both sides billions of dollars in revenues as they haggled over revenues and pipeline fees.

Cyclone kills 13 in southern India, 80K people evacuated

NEW DELHI (AP) — A cyclone hit the coast of southern India on Friday, killing at least 13 people, damaging homes and forcing the evacuation of more than 80,000 residents.

Cyclone Gaja blew ashore in Tamil Nadu state with heavy rains and winds of 55 miles per hour, said Narendra Kumar, a National Disaster Response Force official. The storm weakened after coming onshore.

People living in low-lying areas had been taken to more than 470 relief centers in six districts, and fishermen were warned to stay away from the sea.

The state's top elected official, K. Palaniswami, told reporters the storm had killed 13 people in the state.

Initial reports indicate the deaths were caused by wall collapses and electrocution, said National Disaster Response Force official Umesh, who uses one name.

The storm heavily damaged a 16th century Roman Catholic Shrine Basilica at Velankanni, a small town in Nagapattinam district, Press Trust of India said.

The cyclone destroyed or partially damaged nearly 1,600 mud huts and uprooted more than 5,000 trees in the area, state authorities said.

Tamil Nadu state is prone to cyclones that develop in the Bay of Bengal. In 1999, a cyclone killed more than 15,000 people in eastern Orissa.

Senior liberation: Rejecting the prescription addictions

Boxing legend Muhammad Ali used the rope-a-dope during his 1974 Rumble in the Jungle match against George Foreman to bring his opponent to his knees. But we're pretty sure he never imagined that 44 years later, pharmaceutical companies would be using a take-a-dope technique to wear down the elderly and bring them to their knees — all for a profit. (OxyContin has made over \$31 billion in sales.)

That's just what a suit by the state of Oregon against Purdue Pharma claims. Using the Elderly Persons and Persons with Disabilities Abuse Prevention Act, the Oregon Department of Justice says that Purdue (the makers of OxyContin) targeted the elderly. In 2015, for every 100,000 seniors in Oregon, nearly 700 people 65 and older were sent to the hospital because of opioids. And, says the suit, the company focused on long-term-care facilities and urged doctors to prescribe opioids at higher dosages than were safe for people over 65.

The lawsuit also states: Purdue minimized the risks of abuse and addiction of its opioids. It also alleges Purdue falsely claimed that OxyContin posed a lower threat of abuse and addiction than other painkillers and increased function for patients with chronic pain. That's tough stuff, but they're not the only folks saying it. From Colorado to Tennessee, states across the country are filing suits against the company. And as far back as 2007, the company and three executives pleaded guilty in federal court to criminal charges

that they misled regulators, doctors and patients about OxyContin's addictive powers and agreed to pay to more than \$600 million in fines and other payments.

Guess that's why the United States has 4.6 percent of the world's population, but consumes 80 percent of the world's opioids! But OxyContin isn't the only medication that's got older folks on the ropes. Take the recent study that found 25 percent of older Americans who are prescribed Xanax or Valium to help them sleep or quell anxiety become hooked. Unbelievable! Since 9 to 12 percent of women and about 5 to 6 percent of men 65 or older are prescribed the drug, that's up to 2,205,000 addicted oldsters.

As a society we look for shortcuts. We give or take a pill instead of exerting the effort necessary to improve well-being through lifestyle choices.

Whatever the cause, these days it's fair to say that we're living in a society where many people don't know how to age with vigor and

dignity. Witness the fact that 90 million of you have diabetes or prediabetes, 100 million live with chronic pain and around 60 million experienced an anxiety disorder during the past year. Many of these conditions can be remedied with proper diet and exercise.

Dems struggle over Pelosi bid, with no end game in sight

WASHINGTON — Democrats won the majority. Now they just need a speaker of the House. The standoff over Nancy Pelosi's bid to regain the gavel intensified Friday as Democrats left Washington for the Thanksgiving holiday, an unsettling finish to an otherwise triumphant week that saw them welcome a historic class of newcomers to Capitol Hill and prepare to take control. Pelosi was certain that she will be speaker once more, reviving her role as

the first woman to wield the gavel. But her foes were equally confident they have the votes to stop her. For now, it's a band of disgruntled Democrats, led mostly by men, standing against the sweep of nationally-known Pelosi allies. With a test vote looming in late November, and at least one potential Pelosi challenger stepping forward, Democrats faced the grim prospect of the internal squabble over the Jan. 3 speaker's vote dragging on for weeks, with no clear end game in sight. "I think chaos is good if it's productive. I think chaos is bad if it is too

disruptive and it divides us too much," said Rep. Pramila Jayapal, D-Wash., a co-chair of the Congressional Progressive Caucus, whose leaders were upbeat after meeting with Pelosi this week. "We don't have a lot of time," Jayapal said. "We need to put forward the vision of who we are as a party and what we're fighting for and so that needs to happen very, very quickly." Pelosi was expected to work the phones from California after meeting privately Friday with newly-elected Democrats who could be crucial to her bid for House speaker.

The freshmen entering and exiting Pelosi's stately office off the House floor indicated they were having good meetings with the leader, though few said the talks had changed their minds to vote to support her as speaker. Incoming Rep.-elect Abigail Spanberger of Virginia said she had a "wonderful conversation" about her district's priorities, but "will not be voting for leader Pelosi." "It isn't about her, it's about wanting new leadership," said Spanberger, a former CIA operative who defeated tea party Republican Rep.

Abrams ends challenge in Georgia governor's race, says she'll file suit

ATLANTA — Democrat Stacey Abrams ended 10 days of post-election drama in Georgia's closely watched and even more closely contested race for governor Friday, acknowledging Republican Brian Kemp as the victor while defiantly refusing to concede to the man she blamed for "gross mismanagement" of a bitterly fought election. The speech Abrams delivered at her campaign headquarters Friday

evening marked the close of the 44-year-old attorney and former lawmaker's unsuccessful attempt to make history as America's first black woman governor. Since Election Day her campaign fought on, insisting efforts to suppress turnout had left thousands of ballots uncounted that otherwise could erode Kemp's lead and force a runoff election. Kemp, the 55-year-old businessman who oversaw the election as Georgia's secretary of state, will keep the governor's office in GOP

hands as the state's third Republican governor since Reconstruction. He responded to Abrams

ending her campaign by calling for unity and praising his opponent's "passion, hard work, and commitment to public service." The kind words came just days after Kemp's campaign spokesman derided Abrams' efforts to have contested ballots counted as a "disgrace to democracy." Abrams made no such retreat from her criticisms of Kemp, saying she refused "to say nice things and accept my fate." Instead, she announced plans to file a federal lawsuit to challenge the way

Georgia's elections are run. She accused Kemp of using the secretary of state's office to aggressively purge the rolls of inactive voters, enforce an "exact match" policy for checking voters' identities that left thousands of registrations in limbo and other measures to tilt the outcome in his favor. "Let's be clear: This is not a speech of concession," Abrams said. "Because concession means to acknowledge an action is right, true or proper. As a woman of conscience and faith, I cannot concede that."

a liquor store, the thrift center and auto repair shop, the remodeled Jack in the Box burger outlet, entire trailer parks. At the ruined Gold Nugget Museum, the ground was crunchy and hot, a few birds chirped nearby, and a half dozen soot-covered deer stood eerily still under a blackened tree. Paradise was a town where families put down roots, and visitors opted to stay. Children could bike to the park, go fishing in the town pond, shoot bows and arrows at the nearby archery range. As they got older, they would kayak in the canyons or hike in the forests after school. "We could tell the kids to go outside and play, and be back when the street lights come on," said Kaitlin Norton, whose uncle is still missing. She does not know if her home still stands. Like all places, Paradise had problems. There were issues with addiction and poverty, but residents felt safe. And while prices were rising, it was still

affordable for many in a state where housing costs have soared. "You would never miss a meal here," said Terry Prill, 63, who often sought lunch and dinner at community churches. "The people are good people. They don't look down at you." The pace was relaxed. Neighbors waved to each other in the morning, shouting hello as they headed off to work on tree-lined, winding streets and cul-de-sacs. Families kept tidy gardens and planted vegetables, trading their bounty up and down the block. Louise Branch, 93, says Paradise was a lovely place to retire. "It's a slow town, really. People have yards and dogs," she said. "I especially liked it in the fall when the trees are full of color." Parks burst with bright-orange California poppies and wildflowers in the spring and soften with light snow in the winter. At 2,500 feet, on a ridge that rises above deep canyons carved by the Feather River and Butte Creek, Paradise offers cool respite from hot, dry weather in the

valleys below. Spanning the creek was the Honey Run Covered Bridge, built in 1886. It was put on the National Register of Historic Places in 1988 and was the only covered bridge in America with three unequal sections. It, too, is gone. Glenn Harrington raised two sons in Paradise. He found it so picturesque he started the Visions of Paradise page on Facebook; image after image chronicles the town's history and spirit, its seasonal colors and its many festivals. Each spring, there were Gold Nugget Days, marking the discovery of a 54-pound lump in 1859. The Donkey Derby in nearby Old Magalia would get silly, as locals recreated how miners heaved the famous chunk of gold into town. The highlight was a parade of homemade floats. "My daughter's going out for the Gold Nugget Queen this year," said Krystin Harvey, whose mobile home burned down. "Well, it's been going for 100 years, but we don't know — there's no town now."

Migrants won't see armed US soldiers on border

SAN DIEGO (AP) — As thousands of migrants in a caravan of Central American asylum-seekers converge on the doorstep of the United States, what they won't find are armed American soldiers standing guard. Instead they will see cranes installing towering panels of metal bars and troops wrapping concertina wire around barriers while military helicopters fly overhead, carrying border patrol agents to and from locations along the U.S.-Mexico border. That's because U.S. military troops are prohibited from carrying out law enforcement duties. What's more, the bulk of the troops are in Texas — hundreds of miles away from the caravan that started arriving this week in Tijuana on Mexico's border with California after walking and hitching rides for the past month. Still, for many migrants the barriers and barbed wire were an imposing show of force. On Friday, people walking through one

of the world's busiest border crossings into Mexico passed by a pair of Marines on a 20-foot lift installing razor wire above a turnstile. The U.S. military has deployed 5,800 active-duty troops to the U.S.-Mexico border. Another 2,100 National Guard troops are also been deployed since April as part of a separate mission. Like the military troops, they are not allowed to detain illegal crossers. Instead, they have been monitoring cameras and helping to erect barriers. Of the 5,800 soldiers and Marines, more than 2,800 are in Texas, while about 1,500 are in Arizona and another 1,300 are in California. All U.S. military branches, except the Coast Guard, are barred from performing law enforcement duties. That means there will be no visible show of armed troops, said Army Maj. Scott McCullough, adding that the mission is to provide support to Customs and Border Protection.

Friday morning. Results were not immediately announced. At the election supervisor's office in Tampa, volunteers were joined by observers from both political parties at 12 tables as the recount started. The ballots were in a locked wire basket on a rolling cart when they were delivered to the room. An elections office employee cut the lock off the basket, and the ballots were distributed to the tables, where teams of two volunteers examined each one. The hand recount does not review all votes. It involves ballots that were not recorded by voting machines because voters cast either two votes for one race, which is called an overvote, or appeared to choose no candidate, which is an undervote.

The idea is to figure out a voter's intent. Broward County — which experienced numerous problems throughout the election — had the most overvotes and undervotes of any Florida county — almost 31,000. Just a day earlier, the county missed the deadline to submit its machine recount results by two minutes. But it finished its manual recount in just a few hours, which Elections Supervisor Brenda Snipes attributed to the large number of volunteers assembled for the task. The contest for governor appeared all but over Thursday, with a machine recount showing Republican DeSantis with a large enough advantage over Democrat Andrew Gillum to avoid a hand recount in that race, which had a margin of 0.41 percent. Gillum, who conceded on election night only

to retract his concession later, said in a statement that "it is not over until every legally casted vote is counted." The overall recount has been fraught with problems. One large Democratic stronghold in South Florida could not finish its machine recount by the Thursday deadline because of machines breaking down. A federal judge rejected a request to extend the recount deadline. "We gave a heroic effort," said Palm Beach Supervisor of Elections Susan Bucher. If the county had three or four more hours, it would have made the deadline to recount ballots in the Senate race, she said. Two election-related lawsuits were pending in federal court in Tallahassee. On Thursday, the situation drew the ire of U.S. District Judge Mark Walker, who slammed the

state for repeatedly failing to anticipate election problems. He also said the state law on recounts appears to violate the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that decided the presidency in 2000. "We have been the laughingstock of the world, election after election, and we chose not to fix this," Walker said at a hearing. Incoming Florida Senate President Bill Galvano said Friday that lawmakers will discuss changes to the state's election laws. By the next election cycle, he said, "voters are going to want to have more in terms of assurance that their votes are going to be properly counted." In the meantime, Florida voters have until 5 p.m. Saturday to show a valid identification and fix their ballots if they haven't been counted due to mismatched signatures. State officials testified that nearly 4,000 mail-in ballots were set aside because local officials

decided the signatures on the envelopes did not match the signatures on file. If those voters can prove their identity, their votes will now be counted and included in final official returns due from each county by noon Sunday. Also Friday, Walker rejected a lawsuit that challenged Florida's vote-by-mail deadlines. A veterans' voting rights group and Democrats challenged the law that said ballots mailed inside the United States could not be counted unless they were received by 7 p.m. on Election Day. The groups said that was unconstitutional and asked that the ballots be counted as long as they are postmarked by Election Day and received within 10 days after the election. Walker said those rules were in place for more than a decade and to change them now would "undermine the electoral process."

Rolling in toilet paper: Sheriff buys 24K extra rolls of TP

GUNTERSVILLE, Ala. (AP) — Officials in an Alabama county have a financial mess to wipe up after the sheriff's department mistakenly ordered 24,000 extra rolls of toilet paper. WAFF-TV reports the Marshall County Sheriff's Office mistakenly spent \$22,000 on toilet paper and another \$9,000 for 450 cases of trash bags. That's a big problem, because its entire budget for janitorial supplies for next year is only \$15,000. County commissioners have negotiated a bill of more than \$30,000 down by about half, but there's another problem: Storing an extra two years' worth of toilet paper. While the Sheriff's Department isn't commenting, Commission Chairman James Hutcheson says workers realized the mistake when a notice came in from the vendor. The newly elected sheriff, Phil Sims, says he will work with commissioners to address the problem.

Seven former Lightning goalies make The Hockey News' list of the top 100 of all-time

Is Tampa Bay the cradle of goaltenders?

Hardly. Still, no fewer than seven (!) former Lightning net-minders were named to The Hockey News' list of the Top 100 goalies of all-time.

Not bad for a franchise that only recently celebrated its 25th anniversary.

Nikolai Khabibulin, who backstopped the Lightning's sole Stanley Cup championship squad in 2003-04, is ranked 58th.

Khabibulin, nicknamed "The Bulin Wall," tied a league record with three shutouts in a first-round series win over the Islanders in 2004 and "was a force all the way to Tampa's Game 7 Cup victory over Calgary," Matt Larkin writes.

"There's Evgeni Nabokov and Sergei Bobrovsky," Larkin writes, "but the 'best Russian NHL goalie' debate never happens without Nikolai Khabibulin."

Many of the goalies with Lightning ties made their marks with other teams: No. 56 Evgeni Nabokov (Sharks), No. 61 Bill Ranford (Oilers), No. 64 Olaf Kolzig (Capitals) and No. 69 Sean Burke (Coyotes).

Ben Bishop, who played with the Lightning from 2013-17 and helped the team to the Stanley Cup final in 2015, is No. 88. Despite being traded to the Kings in 2017 (and later signing with the Stars), he continues to lead the Lightning in every major goaltending category.

At 6-foot-7, Bishop is "the biggest man ever to protect an NHL crease," Larkin writes.

ORLANDO — UCF and Cincinnati are Top 25 teams eager to show the college football world what they and the American Athletic Conference are all about.

The undefeated, 11th-ranked Knights and once-beaten No. 19 Bearcats are ready to state their case Saturday night in a prime time, nationally televised matchup with league championship implications.

UCF (9-0, 6-0 AAC, CFP No. 11) can clinch

Florida hosts Idaho with eye on New York's 6 bowl

GAINESVILLE — Florida's postseason possibilities are promising, especially after finishing 4-7 last year, losing consecutive games by a combined 40 points in the last month and needing two of the largest comebacks in school history to beat Vanderbilt and South Carolina.

The 15th-ranked Gators likely would land a spot in a New Year's Six bowl with victories against Idaho and rival Florida State.

The first part of Florida's path comes

Saturday in the Swamp, when the Gators (7-3, No. 13 CFP) host seemingly overmatched Idaho (4-6) of the Football Championship Subdivision.

LeBron James' return to Miami again a speculative market

INDIANAPOLIS — It has been the ultimate speculative market in recent years, whether LeBron James would play in Miami.

Now, with James' shift to the Western Conference and his Los Angeles Lakers making their lone visit to South Florida this Sunday, the guesswork comes at a significant risk.

According to TickPick, a secondary-market seller, prices to see Sunday's 6 p.m. game between the Lakers and Heat are 158 percent more expensive than the Heat's season average, with a current average listing price, according to the outlet, of \$560.

According to a release issued Friday, the TickPick "get-in" price at AmericanAirlines Arena is \$97. By comparison, tickets to the following game on the Heat's two-game homestand, Tuesday night against the

Brooklyn Nets, are available for as low as \$10.

According to the Heat's official ticket outlet, tickets for the Lakers' visit are available, as of Friday, starting at \$103.50, plus fees, in the top-tier balcony level. The costliest ticket, as of Friday, was \$3,450 for a Row 1 ticket in Section 120.

Somewhat complicating the equation is that the Lakers will be coming off a Saturday 7 p.m. game against the Orlando Magic at the Amway Center. James, however, not only has appeared in each of the Lakers' 14 games to this stage, he also appeared in every game last season for the Cleveland Cavaliers, including their lone visit to AmericanAirlines Arena.

James spent four seasons with the Heat, advancing to the Finals each year from 2011 to 2014, with NBA championships in 2012 and '13 alongside Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh.

Wade is expected to miss Sunday's game as

he's away from the team following the birth of his daughter in the Los Angeles area two weeks ago.

While the Heat presented a commemorative video that drew hearty applause during his first game back at AmericanAirlines Arena following his July 2014 return to the Cavaliers in

free agency, James also has been met with derision for sitting out games at AmericanAirlines Arena, including a 2015 chant of "LeBron is tired!"

At one stage, James sat out of three games in a stretch of four Cavaliers visits to South Florida.

Prior to last season's appearance, James had not played at

AmericanAirlines Arena since March 19, 2015.

James is 0-5 in games he has played in Miami since leaving for the Cavaliers.

Sunday stands as a unique Sunday showcase for the Heat during NFL season beyond James' visit, with the Miami Dolphins in their bye week.

Moller killed in crash at Sebring International Raceway

SEBRING — Investigators are asking spectators to turn over any video they may have recorded of a jet dragster crash that took place Thursday night, claiming the life of 24-year-old driver Katarina Moller of Sarasota.

Moller was making her first run in the car during a regular drag racing event at Sebring International Raceway, according to a statement from the track.

The cause of the crash is being investigated by

the Highland County Sheriff's Office. Spectators who were in attendance and recorded Moller's run can contact investigators at (863) 402-7250.

Moller, who went by the nickname "Kat," was a popular racer at local short tracks and a jet dragster driver for Larsen Motorsports, according to track officials.

"Kat has been part of our racing family for five years and we cannot begin to express our sorrow," Chris Larsen, chief executive of Larsen Motorsports in Palm Bay, said on the company's website.

"We knew Kat well and were big fans of her personality and her driving skill. Sebring International Raceway and the entire racing community are heartbroken," said a statement from Wayne Estes, president and general manager of the Sebring track.

As a 19-year-old sophomore majoring in mechanical engineering at the University of South Florida, Moller competed in the Jet Dragster division of the International Hot Rod Association as one of four drivers on an an-female Larsen

Motorsports team.

"I grew up racing at Bradenton," Moller, a Sarasota native, said in an interview then with the Tampa Bay Times. "Every track is slightly different. The track conditions are different, and there are bumps in different places."

The car she drove at the time burned 25 gallons of fuel per quarter-mile pass in turbocharged General Electric J85 engines, used in small jet aircraft. Dragsters are a crowd pleaser for their speed, jet-like roar and big plumes of flame and smoke.

Laksa tears ACL, delivering crushing blow to the Bulls

Senior guard will miss rest of the season but is still eligible to return next year if she doesn't go pro

USF senior guard Kitija Laksa suffered a season-ending knee injury in Thursday's victory against Bethune-Cookman.

USF senior shooting guard Kitija Laksa, an All-America candidate and the Bulls' top scorer, will miss the remainder of the season with a torn right ACL sustained in Thursday's 88-39 romp of Bethune-Cookman.

Latvia sustained the injury in the third quarter, landing awkwardly near the baseline after trying to catch a long pass in transition.

"This is obviously a very difficult blow for Kitija, who is one of the

top players in the nation, and our team," USF coach Jose Fernandez said in a statement released by the school.

"I know with Kitija's will and determination, she will get through this and be back on the floor as a top-level player. It is very tough for our team to lose Kitija's ability and leadership on the floor, but we still have our goals ahead of us and we will continue to work to accomplish those."

The injury represents a crushing blow to the No. 21 Bulls' postseason aspirations. With Laksa, the program's No. 6 all-time scorer (1,764 points), best free-throw shooter and a 38.8-percent career 3-point specialist, USF

seemed equipped for a run at the program's first Sweet 16 berth.

Now, they suddenly lack depth at wing, not to mention the outside scoring presence that can stretch a defense and free up the Bulls' assortment of post players.

A 6-foot Latvia native, Laksa averaged 21.1 points and shot 38.2 percent (126-for-330) from 3-point range last season, earning first-team All-American Athletic Conference honors and being named a finalist for the Ann Meyers Drysdale Award (nation's top shooting guard).

Last December, she set an NCAA single-game record with 11 consecutive 3-pointers in a rout of Southern University. She also finished the season with the best free-throw percentage (111-for-115, 96.5) of all NCAA divisions, male or female.

In September, she played for her native country in the FIBA Women's World Cup in Spain.

Because she played in only three games, Laksa qualifies for a medical redshirt and fifth season of eligibility. But she may be more inclined to bypass another season of college and embark on a professional career.

Clerveaux catches up with deserved breakthrough

Receiver has overcome injuries, family tragedy to develop into leading offensive star for the Bulls

TAMPA — He's a beaming, ball-snagging portrait of irony.

Even as his team drifts closer to the nether region of the bowl landscape, USF receiver Stanley Clerveaux is in a really good place. In a year of swooning, he's smiling. The season is going to pieces, but for a change, Clerveaux isn't.

"Yeah man, it's awesome," he said recently.

Don't begrudge him. While a bright disposition amid a three-game skid may be bad optics, afford Clerveaux this contentment.

In recent years, the Miami native hasn't been able to enjoy much of anything, including the Bulls' resurgence. First came the physical setbacks, followed by tragedy. In his first four years on campus, Clerveaux caught three passes and zero breaks.

"On the field you couldn't see it, but outside of football you could see it," said fellow fifth-year receiver Ryeshene Bronson, Clerveaux's best

friend on the team. "It was very hard for him."

Hence the reason Clerveaux could barely suppress his jubilation in the wake of USF's 57-36 loss at Houston. On one of the season's more dismal days, Clerveaux had a career-high five receptions for 62 yards.

On Friday, he headed to Philadelphia — where the Bulls (7-3, 3-3) face Temple this afternoon — with 16 receptions on the year.

"My dad called me the other day saying he saw me catch some balls and stuff," Clerveaux said a few days after the Houston defeat. "He was just happy that I was out there playing. I'm just trying to keep a smile on my daddy's face and stuff."

The previous years had been equally unkind to Serge Clerveaux, a father of nine who cooks at a downtown Miami hotel. Nov. 9 marked the one-year anniversary of his wife's death from stroke and blood-pressure complications. Marie France Cherry, the stepmom who began raising Stanley when he was 7, was

only 56.

"Stanley cried for her many times," Serge said in a Haitian accent thicker than his renowned spaghetti sauce. "Stanley loved, loved, loved his stepmother."

Grief was preceded by grimacing, lots of it.

A three-star prospect out of North Miami High, Clerveaux arrived in Tampa in 2014 as a sleeper recruit brimming with physical upside (6-foot-3). But before his first midterm, he tore his left labrum, requiring surgery and a redshirt season.

He was flashing his potential the following preseason when adversity broke his route again. Clerveaux ran a slant pattern on the Bulls' synthetic-turf practice field, where cornerback Mazzi Wilkins landed on him at the end of the play. He arose with a torn left ACL.

"After my knee surgery, that first two weeks was just hard," Clerveaux recalled.

"I called my momma crying, I called my daddy crying, I didn't want to be here. I really just wanted to go home, and Coach T (Willie Taggart)...

called me to his office and just said don't worry about it, just keep working hard and stuff. But yeah, it was tough."

The setbacks stifled his development, banishing him to the depth chart's basement as Taggart continued fortifying his receiving corps. In 2016, his first healthy season, Clerveaux finished with one catch.

The following year, he had two, both in an early-season romp of Illinois. By then, his stepmother was in hospice care.

"Stan went into a shell," Bronson said. "He wasn't playing, so he was just like, wondering why all this crazy stuff was going on."

Pep talks from Bronson arrived almost daily. Former Bulls return specialist Lindsey Lamar, a special assistant to Coach Charlie Strong, also reached out regularly.

As a result, the roster outcast evolved into an officer of sorts, spurning the emotional tug of returning home and forging onward. In March, Clerveaux, who has added 30 pounds (to 226) since arriving at USE,

learned the NCAA had granted him a sixth season of eligibility.

Then, he enjoyed a breakthrough spring camp, highlighted by a two-touchdown scrimmage.

A couple of months later, Clerveaux earned his criminology degree. He made his second career start in the season opener against Elon and had three catches, equaling his career total to that point.

He has started six more games since, following the five-reception effort at Houston with another career-best night (five catches, 50 yards) in the Bulls' 41-15 home loss to Tulane.

"He's kind of the old man of that group," Strong said.

"You look at him and it's nothing like, 'Wow, who is that guy out there?' But then he makes the catches. He does everything he's supposed to do, he can block. ... Of all our receivers, he's probably been the most consistent."

And in an otherwise depressing season, the most content.

"It's amazing," Clerveaux said.

Cal-Stanford Big Game postponed because of wildfire smoke

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — The annual Big Game between Stanford and California scheduled for Saturday was postponed two weeks because of the unhealthy air quality in the Bay Area from a wildfire some 150 miles to the north.

Cal announced Friday that the game would be played Dec. 1 with a noon kickoff at Memorial Stadium.

"First and foremost our thoughts are with everyone who has been affected by the tragic California wildfires," Golden Bears football coach Justin Wilcox said in a Twitter post. "While we realize the importance of the Big Game right now, our thoughts are centered around so many who have been so deeply affected. Our primary factors in making the decision to postpone the game were centered around the health and safety of our student-athletes, fans and everyone involved in putting on the game. We look forward to seeing you in Berkeley on Dec. 1."

This is the just the second postponement of the Big Game between Cal (6-4, 3-4 Pac-12) and Stanford (6-4, 4-3). It was delayed one week in 1963 following the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. The rival schools have been playing each year since 1892 with the exception of breaks during World Wars I and II.

"The entire Stanford

Athletics community recognizes this has been an extremely challenging time for so many people who have been affected by the wildfires, both in the Bay Area and throughout the state. Our thoughts are with them, first and foremost," Stanford athletic director Bernard Muir said. "We are thankful to the University of California for collaborating with us on the logistical challenges of rescheduling the Big Game, and are looking forward to playing the game on Dec. 1."

Stanford noted the schools tried to hold off a final decision until Saturday but the forecast

shows air quality isn't expected to sufficiently improve.

The schools, which also utilized the NCAA and Pac-12 guidelines on air quality in making the decision, offered thoughts to those affected by the devastating Northern California fire.

"We have been carefully tracking air quality in Berkeley and the Bay Area over the past week, relying on the best data and guidance available to us from medical and environmental experts. The forecasts we have received show a minimal chance of the improvement necessary to hold the game on Saturday,"

Cal athletic director Jim Knowlton said. "While we would have preferred to play the Big Game on its scheduled date, once we realized that air quality would likely not return to acceptable levels, we made the decision to postpone for the health and safety of our student-athletes, coaches, gameday staff, students, band and spirit groups, alumni and fans."

In the NFL, the Oakland Raiders were unable to practice outdoors Thursday and Friday, so they instead held indoor walkthroughs. They play at Arizona on Sunday. The San Francisco 49ers have

their bye week.

Cal and Stanford each also canceled men's basketball games, while the No. 7 Cardinal women's home basketball game Sunday against Ohio State was called off. The Buckeyes also had their scheduled game Friday night at Sacramento State canceled.

Stanford won't reschedule its canceled men's basketball game against Wofford that had been set for Friday night. The Cal men's basketball game against Detroit Mercy was canceled Thursday night, while San Francisco postponed its Friday home men's game against Arizona

State. The Dons also moved their Sunday game with LIU Brooklyn and the USF women's game with Cal Poly down the coast for a doubleheader at Cal State Monterey Bay.

Several other college sporting events in Northern California were impacted this week. Some were moved, rescheduled or canceled.

San Jose State changed the time of Saturday's home football game against Nevada two hours earlier for a noon kickoff.

UC Davis' football game against Sacramento State was moved to Reno, Nevada.

Florida State's beleaguered rush defense faces Boston College's Dillon

TALLAHASSEE — A.J. Dillon is among the top running backs in the country and has been the driving force in Boston College's success this season. The only thing that has slowed down the sophomore has been an injured ankle.

Dillon, a 240-pound sophomore, has run for 936 yards and eight touchdowns in just eight

games. He missed two games in October due to the ankle injury but averages 5.3 yards per carry.

"He has good vision and feet," first-year FSU defensive coordinator Harlon Barnett said. "He's very nimble to be so big. I think those are great qualities of a good running back. He's not a slow, big guy. He can run."

Florida State couldn't stop Dillon in 2017. As a freshman, Dillon

ran for 149 yards and a touchdown in BC's 35-3 rout of the Seminoles. Now Florida State (4-6, 2-5 Atlantic Coast Conference) must minimize the damage that Dillon inflicts if they hope to defeat No. 22 BC (7-3, 4-2) and keep the Seminoles' bowl hopes alive.

Dillon is ranked 25th in the FBS in rushing yards despite missing two games. And he is ninth in rushing yards per game

(117.0).

BC coach Steve Addazio said that Dillon practiced more this week than usual. Dillon often rests his ankle in practices early in the week but was a full participant on Wednesday, Addazio said.

"Those are all positive things," Addazio said. "He's not completely healed yet. But we'll take the improvement and the opportunity to get him back on the practice field."

Since returning from injury, in which BC lost at NC State and defeated Louisville, Dillon ran for 149 yards in the win over Miami on Oct. 26 and 96 yards in a victory over Virginia Tech. He re-injured the ankle in the fourth quarter of Saturday's loss to Clemson after rushing for just 39 yards on 16 carries.

Dillon will be quite a handful for the Seminoles. Florida State

has allowed 122, 177 and 365 rushing yards in consecutive losses to Clemson, NC State and Notre Dame.

Taggart said for Florida State it's a "want to" stop Dillon.

"Our guys see it, they watch the same film," Taggart said. "You know going in it's going to be a physical ball game, you can't bow down to that physicality you got to face physicality with physicality."

STRENGTHS

UCF, led by QB McKenzie Milton, is third in the nation in total offense and eighth in scoring. Cincinnati has the AAC's top defense. The Bearcats lead the conference in rushing defense, scoring defense, total defense and fewest first downs allowed.

Heupel doesn't want the Knights to get caught up in the magnitude of the matchup.

"We don't need to do anything differently than what we've done. There's going to be a ton of emotion in the ball game. It will be electric," the UCF coach said. "But at the end of day, it's 11 on 11. Florida agreed to pay Idaho the full \$975,000 for the game.

SENIOR DAY

Twenty Florida players will take part in "senior day" festivities before the game.

The class has been a part of two SEC Eastern Division titles and compiled a 30-18 record, including 21-11 in

Southeastern Conference play.

Vick again leads No. 2 Kansas in 89-76 win over La-Lafayette

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — Lagerald Vick hit seven 3-pointers and had a career-high 33 points, Dedric Lawson and Udoka Azubuike came alive late and second-ranked Kansas beat pesky Louisiana-Lafayette 89-76 on Friday night.

Vick also had nine rebounds for the Jayhawks (3-0) while topping his 32-point outburst earlier in the week against Vermont. Lawson added 19 points and Azubuike had 17 points and eight rebounds.

Justin Miller scored all 22 of his points in the first half to lead four players in double figures for Louisiana-Lafayette (1-2). JaKeenan Grant finished with 18 points, Malik Marquetti had 14 and Cedric Russell had 10 points and five assists.

Miller and the Ragin' Cajuns had the Jayhawks on the ropes most of the way.

Taking advantage of Kansas' slow start, Louisiana-Lafayette ripped off an early 15-2 run that was capped by a five-point trip down the floor. Gant knocked down a 3-pointer, Jayhawks coach Bill Self lit into an official to earn a technical foul, and Marcus Stroman hit both the free throws to give the reigning Sun Belt champions a 32-20 lead with about 10 minutes left in the first half.

The Jayhawks finally woke up with a 10-0 run of their own. Then, after Miller hit his fourth 3 of the half, Kansas went on another brief run to take a 44-41 lead into the break.

It was a two-man show at that point: Miller had scored all his points while Vick had 18.

Miller cooled down in the second half but the Ragin' Cajuns refused to go away, even when foul trouble set in. The Jayhawks were clinging to a 65-64 lead with 8:40 to go when they started to pound the ball inside, taking advantage of their size for the

first time all game.

Lawson and Azubuike combined to score 16 straight before Vick, who was 8 for 8 from beyond the arc against the Catamounts, poured in his final 3-pointer to give himself a new career high.

No. 7 North Carolina 108, Tennessee Tech 58

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — The ball came Seventh Woods' way in transition and he didn't hesitate.

The North Carolina junior immediately flipped the ball behind his back to Cameron Johnson for a corner 3-pointer, one of several blowout-producing baskets for the seventh-ranked Tar Heels after halftime in Friday night's 108-58 win against Tennessee Tech.

It was part of an encouraging night for UNC (4-0) at the point, where Woods and freshman starter Coby White need to develop into reliable tempo-pushing floor leaders if the Tar Heels are going to contend for an Atlantic Coast Conference championship after the departure of multi-year starter and former Final Four most outstanding player Joel Berry II.

Yes, this was a blowout against an overmatched team, but Woods and White both had solid games by setting up teammates for scores and avoiding turnovers.

"I'm pretty doggone pleased with our point guard position," UNC coach Roy Williams said. "I'm never going to be satisfied. ... I want both of them to keep playing and getting better and better."

White, a McDonald's All-American who set an in-state prep career scoring record, had 11 points and four assists with two turnovers in 20 minutes. But Woods perhaps stood out more, simply by standing out at all.

He's a gifted athlete who arrived at UNC known as a YouTube dunking sensation, but he had struggled to find a steady role while averaging just 1.4 points through his first two seasons. But he had seven points and a career-best eight assists, including the crowd-wower to Johnson for a 65-30 lead with 15:54 left.

Along the way, he looked comfortable finding teammates in transition and even hit a 3-pointer — only the third of his career and first since November 2016.

"It's definitely a confidence builder," Woods said. "It's just trying to build off it in every way possible. And I realize I still have to get better on both ends of the court."

North Carolina shot 55 percent on a night filled with impressive statistics, while Micaiah Henry scored 20 points to lead the Golden Eagles (0-4) — who shot 36 percent and had 22 turnovers.

"We just need to get better," Tennessee Tech coach Steve Payne said. "We knew what (challenge) we had tonight. We were going to have to play our tails off and things would have to go great to have a chance late — and it didn't."

No. 22 LSU 74, Louisiana Tech 67

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Javonte Smart scored 16 points, and his late 3-pointer put No. 22 LSU ahead for good in a back-and-forth 74-67 victory over Louisiana Tech on Friday night.

The Bulldogs tied it at 62 on a jumper by Daquan Bracey with 2:29 remaining, but Smart hit his 3 on the next possession for the Tigers (4-0). LSU increased its lead to eight points on a layup by Kavell Bigby-Williams and three free throws by Skylar Mays.

Tremont Waters had 14 points for LSU, and Mays and Daryl Edwards each

scored 12.

Anthony Duruji led the Bulldogs (3-1) with 22 points. Sophomore Exavian Christon matched his career high with 15 points and Amorie Archibald had 10.

Archibald's 3-pointer brought Louisiana Tech within 70-65 with 31 seconds remaining, but Waters and Edwards each hit a pair of free throws to seal the victory.

LSU led by as many as nine points in the first half, but Louisiana Tech closed within 36-33 at the break.

The Bulldogs took an eight-point lead with 12:39 remaining in the game. Duruji had nine points as Louisiana Tech outscored LSU 21-10 to start the second half. The Tigers responded with a 16-4 run to go ahead 62-58. Waters had five points during that stretch.

Iowa 91, UConn 72

NEW YORK (AP) — Luka Garza scored 18 of his 22 points in the first half, and Iowa beat Connecticut 91-72 in the 2K Classic championship game on Friday night.

Garza was named MVP of the tournament. He also joined Tyler Cook, UConn's Eric Cobb, Oregon's Bol Bol and Syracuse's Jalen Carey on the all-tournament team.

Bol led No. 13 Oregon to an 80-65 victory over No. 15 Syracuse in the consolation game. He finished with 26 points and nine rebounds.

Payton Pritchard had 18 points for the Ducks (3-1) and Kenny Wooten scored 12 in the first-ever meeting between the ACC and Pac-12 programs.

Syracuse (2-2) lost on consecutive nights, also falling 83-76 to UConn on Thursday night. The Orange shot 35 percent (18 for 51) from the field.

Tyus Battle scored 17 points for Syracuse, and Elijah Hughes and Jalen

Carey each had 14.

Iowa improved to 3-1 all-time against UConn. It was the first meeting between the schools since Iowa's 70-68 win on Nov. 11, 1999, at Madison Square Garden.

Cook had 26 points and Connor McCaffery added 19 for the Hawkeyes (4-0). Jalen Adams led the Huskies (3-1) with 20 points. Cobb finished with 16.

UConn coach Danny Hurley was ejected with 1:44 left. He received his first technical foul earlier in the half.

Cincinnati 74, Milwaukee 63

CINCINNATI (AP) — Trevon Scott and Nysier Brooks each had a double-double, and Cincinnati broke open a close game in the second half, pulling away to a 74-63 victory over Milwaukee on Friday night.

Cane Broome had 17 points for the Bearcats (2-1), who finished with five players in double figures. Scott had 15 points and 10 rebounds, while Brooks got 12 and 10 — the first set of Cincinnati players with double-doubles since Gary Clark and Kyle Washington pulled it off at Iowa State on Dec. 1, 2016.

Cincinnati point guard Justin Jenifer had a stomach virus and didn't play.

The Bearcats have won two straight after an opening 64-56 loss at home to Ohio State.

Carson Warren-Newsome had 18 points for Milwaukee (0-4), which was outrebounded 37-25. The Panthers are 0-4 for the first time since 1994-95, when they dropped their first seven games.

The Panthers opened the game with a 12-3 run, making five of their first seven shots, and kept it close most of the way.

The Panthers led 49-48 when Jarron Cumberland made a 3-pointer, Broome hit a pull-up jumper,

and Cumberland made a floater in the lane for a six-point lead the Bearcats wouldn't relinquish. Broome added a pair of baskets that pushed the lead to 11 points.

Louisville 86, Vermont 78

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Jordan Nwora scored a season-high 22 points, Ryan McMahon made six critical free throws down the stretch and Louisville held off Vermont 86-78 on Friday night.

Nwora continued to spark the Cardinals (3-0) off the bench, scoring eight points with consecutive 3s during a 13-2 spurt for a 45-35 lead at the break. After Steven Enoch scored Louisville's first 10 points of the second half, Nwora followed with a jumper to start a 9-0 run over 3:17 for a 66-45 lead with 11:33 remaining.

The Catamounts didn't wilt and got within 80-72 on Stef Smith's 3-pointer with 3 minutes left. Nwora answered with a pair of free throws, Darius Perry made a jumper with 1:31 left and McMahon (eight points) sank two more from the line with a minute left, building a cushion to survive the Catamounts (2-2) and win their second game of the NIT Season Tip-Off.

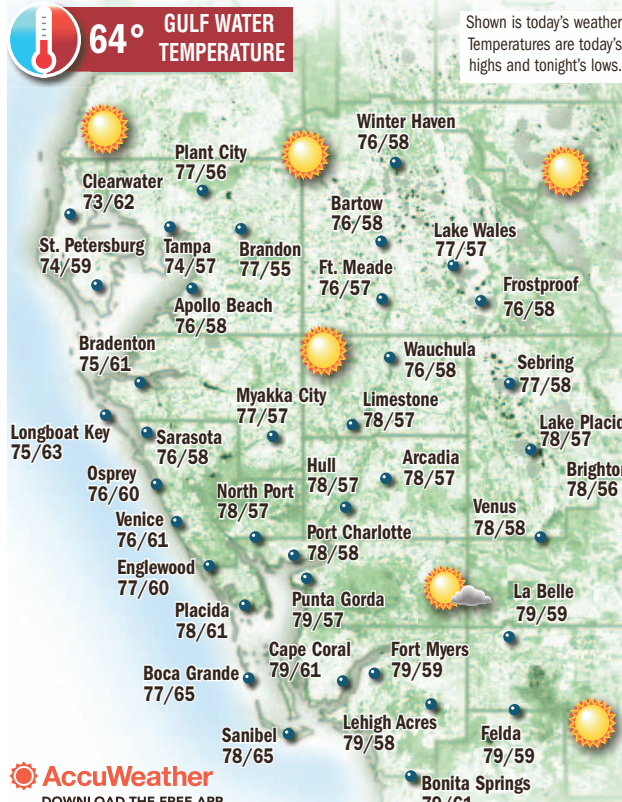

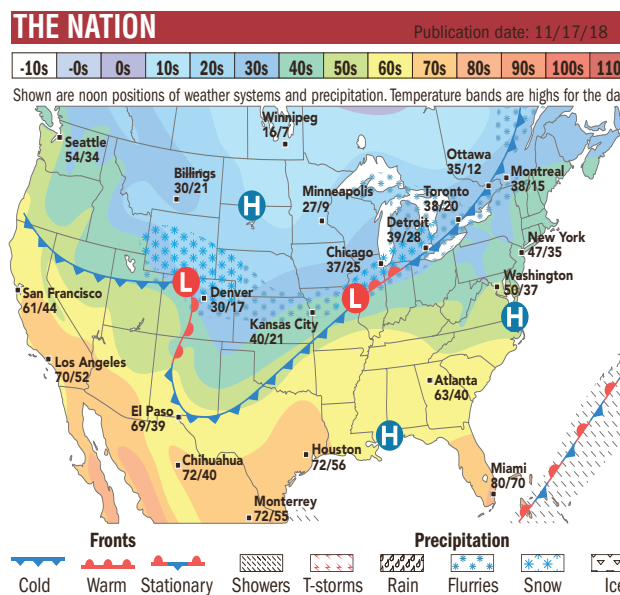

HBO's First Foreign Language Production True to Dialect

BY DAN RICE

When the elderly Elena Greco finds that her dearest and most important friend has vanished without a trace, she begins writing about their six decades of kinship and rivalry in Naples, wrought with hardship and danger, on the eight-episode drama "My Brilliant Friend," premiering Sunday at 9 p.m. on HBO. Based on the first book of the bestselling quadrilogy by Elena Ferrante, who co-wrote the teleplay, the miniseries is HBO's first foreign language production, presented with English subtitles.

According to writer/director Saverio Costanzo ("In Treatment"), staying true to the language of the source novel goes even further. "Because it was like, [HBO drama chief] Francesca [Orsi] asking us, 'This story's going to be in Neapolitan dialect?' And I was like very shocked. I said, 'Yes, but, I mean, why you care so much? For you, it's going to be with subtitles anyway.' And she was like, 'Yeah, but we want something authentic.' And she understood specifically that that story could not be in any other language than the Neapolitan dialect. And also, Elena Ferrante was very strict in that. Because the dialect that is part of the dramaturgy tells a lot about how these girls learn how to speak Italian. So, dialect is part of the story."

"This goal of authenticity has been so important for us, this show is going to be subtitled in Italy, too," reveals producer Lorenzo Mieli. "Because we don't understand the Neapolitan dialect. I mean, we come from Rome, so we don't understand at least 70 percent of the dialogues, even in Italian. And that makes the big difference from the books. Because the books, they don't have dialogues. So, it's the first time also for the readers to really feel something really authentic and real."

"I think one of the key things that Ferrante does beautifully in her book is use dialect to separate out class and education and make differentiations between that," adds executive producer Jennifer Schuur, "and I think that was a big challenge, especially to try to create nuance for the worldwide audience. Italian-speakers, I do think will grasp that dialect and nuance very easily, but I think that was one of the challenges

that we face and hopefully did a great job of trying to translate that into an English language understandability."

The story begins in the 1950s, when young Elena (Elisa Del Genio) meets Lila (Ludovica Nasti) in the first year of primary school. They are both at the top of their class, although very different individuals. When the girls happen to discover the hideout of neighborhood crime boss Don Achille (Antonio

Pennarella), they face their fears together and decide to confront him, thus forming the bonds of their friendship through their teenage years (Margherita Mazzucco, Gaia Girace) and beyond.

The casting process was also dedicated to authenticity, taking place over eight months exclusively in the Campania region of Southern Italy. "We cast something like 8,000 kids just in the area of Naples," Costanzo elaborates. "Because the series is in Neapolitan dialect, we were looking for someone who really knows that

kind of dialect. The funny stuff is that these four girls are the only option we had. It's a miracle, somehow. Because we did not have a second choice. We just have them. It was terrifying."

The setting of "My Brilliant Friend" depicts a harsh period when Naples was under the sway of rising crime, widespread unemployment and poverty, with little value given to the education of girls. While the youthful actresses have no personal experience of the time, it is certainly within their familial history.

"I didn't know much about the '50s,' Nasti explains, "but my dad certainly did. And my uncles and aunts knew a lot about it as well, because they were there. And they told me about this,

"The main problem is not the difference between women and men, for example," Costanzo notes about modern Naples. "Education is the problem above all, of course. Ignorance is the problem above all, but there is no difference between sex. That's not the matter nowadays. What Elena Ferrante told with her novel was the beginning of what Naples became afterwards. So, this is exactly where Naples changed after the war. There was a lot of poetry in the difficulties in Naples in the '50s that you barely see nowadays. But we see how Mafia-Camorra starts to work into the society of Naples."

Q: Is it true that Martina McBride has a cooking show? So many singers and actors are putting out cookbooks or have their own TV shows on the Food Network. I enjoy her music, but what kind of experience does Martina have in the kitchen? — Daisy G.

A: You're right in that country music star Martina McBride is the latest to demonstrate her way around a saucepan. She follows in the footsteps of Trisha Yearwood by having a culinary show on the Food Network.

"Martina's Table" premieres Sunday, Nov. 18, at 12 p.m. ET. She has always loved cooking, and her recipes are inspired by her Midwestern roots. Upcoming episodes

will see Martina creating a buffet-style menu for her band and road crew, and preparing a full Thanksgiving menu. Her superstar friends Faith Hill and Sheryl Crow also will be featured.

Q: Actor Nathan Fillion played Castle on the TV series of the same name, yet his picture is on the cover of books that [Richard] Castle wrote. Can you clarify? — B.L.C.

A: The novels that you see by Richard Castle are a tie-in with the hit show "Castle," which ran from 2009 to 2016. As you know, Richard Castle is the name of Nathan Fillion's character, and by having his picture somewhere on the book covers, it draws attention to them and increases sales.

The mysteries are actually ghostwritten by Tom Straw and have all been bestsellers. He told "Mystery Scene" magazine that

he doesn't mind Fillion's fictional character getting the credit. He said, however, that when Fillion would appear at book signings as the "author," if asked by fans he would always be truthful and tell them that he was not the "real" author.

The books continue even though the TV series has ended. The next novel is "Crashing Heat," which is set for a 2019 release.

Q: How has Demi Lovato been doing since her overdose a few months ago? Is she out of rehab? — Janelle P.

A: As of the end of October, singer Lovato has been in rehab for 90 days, which is great because she really needs it to work this time. She was found unconscious July 24 in her home, and paramedics had to administer the life-saving drug Narcan.

She issued a statement to her fans just a few weeks into her recovery: "What I've learned is that this illness is not something that disappears or fades with time. It is something I must continue to overcome and have not done yet."

Lovato also was one of the first major celebrities to speak openly about her mental-health issues. Back in 2010, after finally being diagnosed with bipolar disorder, she stated she had suicidal thoughts as young as age 7 (when she was a regular on the children's series "Barney"). She has since established the Lovato Treatment Scholarship, which provides mental-health care for those who cannot normally afford it.

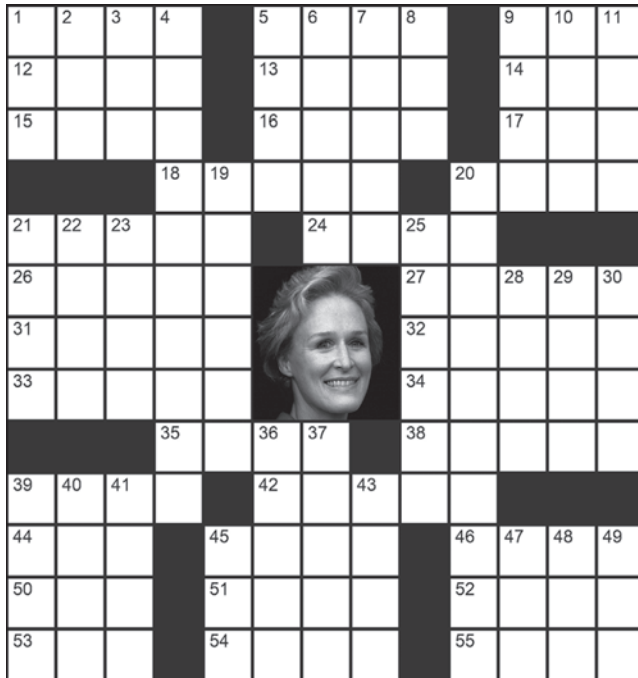
