

# **Property taxes: It could be worse**

Maybe you've heard that property taxes in Florida are out of control.

Statistically speaking, for most homeowners, that's just not the case.

In a comparison of the average annual property tax bill for occupied homes in each state nationwide, Florida ranks right near the middle: 22 out of 50 states, according to 2006 numbers from the Tax Foundation, a nonprofit Washington, D.C.based tax research organization.

The average property tax bill for a home in Florida in 2006 was \$1.703 on a median home value of \$230,600. Compare that to New Jersey, the state with the highest average annual property tax bill at \$5,773.

So, why in recent years has there been so much noise about unfair property taxes in Florida?

For the most part, it stems from those who are not protected by Save Our Homes' 3-percent cap on annual appraised value increases - namely vacant land, second homes and commercial property.

Save Our Homes, instituted in the '90s, applies to the primary residence of a homeowner and limits the assessed value of a home. When you add in the new homestead exemption — a \$50,000 reduction on the taxable value of homes worth \$75,000 or

more - the tax bill shrinks considerably.

In recent years, as property values skyrocketed, residents protected by Save Our Homes and the homestead exemption didn't feel the effects, while

# Money firmly in River Road account

"Sumter is very important to us, but so is River Road," Commissioner Jim Blucher said.

# **Arson at Venice Arena**

Venice Arena.

Arsonists are believed to be responsible for starting a fire inside the now-vacant Venice Arena building, 1401 Ringling Drive, late Monday afternoon.

The Venice Fire Department responded to a call from an eyewitness who claimed to see smoke coming out of the boarded-up windows at around 4:30 p.m.

Firefighters were at the scene within minutes to extinguish the blaze that started beneath the bleachers located along the western wall of the building.

No one was injured during the incident and structural damage to the facility was minimal.

Fire Marshall Jack Stevenson said that there appeared to be evidence of an accelerant — a combustible liquid such as gasoline — at the scene, which led investigators to point to arson as the likely cause of the fire. He said that he also believed this fire is connected to a string of arsons that have taken place over the past week in the area.

# Vets for Vets supports blind vets

It has been almost three years since Vets for Vets sent a \$2,509.03 check to Southeastern Guide Dogs' Paws for Patriots Program.

The check was sent on Nov. 11, 2005, and just last week the Venice organization, Vets for Vets, received warming news.

Due to the money raised by Venice veteran organizations coming together as Vets for Vets, Sarge was born to one day become a guide dog for a blind veteran who has served in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars.

In 2005, Vets for Vets formed, originally to visit Haley Hospital in Tampa to thank veterans for their service to the country.

Vets for Vets is composed of Disabled American Veterans 101, Veterans of Foreign Wars 8118, Marine Corps League Gulf Coast Unit, Vietnam Brotherhood American Legion Auxiliary and Nam Knights MC Club.

Each organization sold raffle tickets and had separate fundraisers to reach their goal.

The money raised went toward homemade afghans, slippers, cookies and goody bags for every veteran there.

"That day will always be remembered," Joan Douglass, Vets for Vets member, said. "They were so very happy to see us."

### Vote for surplus

After the successful hospital visit, Vets for Vets voted to donate the leftover money, \$2,500, to Southeastern Guide Dogs Inc.

At their final meeting, Vets for Vets collectively agreed on the name "Sarge" for their spon-sored puppy. Sarge was born three years later.

Jim Mowat, chair of Vets for Vets and a veteran himself, was mailed a picture of a puppy and letter of appreciation from Southeastern Guide Dogs Inc. last week.

Their sponsored guide-dogto-be, Sarge, was inspiration enough for Mowat to reconnect Vets for Vets.

"Vets for Vets was a very closeknit organization," Mowat said. "I am going to contact them all personally to tell them our good news."

Mowat is going to hand deliver copies of Sarge's photo and the Paws for Patriots' appreciation letter.

Southeastern Guide Dogs' Paws for Patriots Program was formed to provide guide dogs to blinded soldiers.

Mowat's goal is to regroup Vets for Vets and raise more money for Sarge's potential growth as a guide dog. Raffles, military breakfasts and donations could help.

'Too many servicemen from Iraq are coming back blind," Douglass said. "This could be the difference in changing the life of an individual who risked theirs for us."



# Sarasota, Tampa men charged in bank fraud

Three Sarasota men and one from Tampa are facing numerous federal charges that they bilked banks out of almost \$83 million on several land sales in Manatee and Sarasota counties.

A federal grand jury in Tampa has returned a 47count indictment against Neil Mohamed Husani, 38; Larry P. Nardelli, 49; Michael A. Tringali, 46; and John A. Yanchek, 48, accusing them of conspiracy, bank fraud and money laundering, the U.S. Attorney's Office said Monday.

They are accused of defrauding seven banks through a complex scheme involving seven real-estate transactions from 2004 to 2006.

The indictment was handed down last week but was sealed until Monday, when Yanchek — a Sarasota lawyer whose license is already facing suspension — was arrested.

A federal judge released Yanchek on \$50,000 bond later in the day but ordered him to stay in Florida and surrender his passport, court records show. The judge also appointed a federal public defender to represent Yanchek at the hearing but told Yanchek to hire his own attorney within 10 days.

Nardelli, a Tampa businessman, and Tringali, a Sarasota developer, are expected to surrender to authorities, the U.S. Attorney's Office said. Husani once lived in Sarasota, but his current whereabouts are unknown, officials said. He might have fled to Jordan or Venezuela, authorities said.

Tringali and Yanchek did not return telephone messages left at their homes. No phone numbers could be located for Husani and Nardelli, and attorneys have yet to appear on any defendant's behalf.

### Crackdown

The FBI began investi-

total of \$43 million and resold them to partners for \$117 million in 2005 and 2006, according to public records. The partners obtained almost \$84 million in bank loans from those

transactions. The 2005 purchase and subsequent resale of the 254-acre ACT Ranch in Myakka City was representative of the scheme, authorities said.

Capital Force paid \$3.04 million for the land in August of that year, then sold it to Steeplechase Properties Inc. — one of Tringali's companies — for \$7.6 million a month later, records show. Tringali obtained a \$4.94 million loan from Bradenton-based Coast Bank of Florida for the deal.

But Capital Force did not yet own the land, and Steeplechase overstated its financial holdings to qualify for the loan, authorities charge. Yanchek, who handled the closings, also told the property owner's realestate agent that Capital Force had put a \$500,000 down payment in escrow when it had not, according to the indictment.

The scheme also was used in transactions involving the 1,142-acre Rusty Pot Ranch in Myakka City; a 224-acre site off Taylor Road; and 20 acres in the Creekwood area at Interstate 75 and State Road 70, the indictment states.

The men also used the same scheme on three land transactions in Sarasota County, the indictment contends.

### Victims

The ACT Ranch loan weighed heavily on an already struggling Coast Bank, which was forced to sell itself to Missouribased First Banks Inc. last year after \$110 million in bad loans to 482 borrowers — most of them investors — brought the bank to the brink of collapse.

"I think this is just the tip of the iceberg," Tramm Hudson, an adviser and spokesman for Coast Bank as it attempted to extricate itself from the loan debaconviction, shows there was cause to bring charges against them."

Other banks that authorities said were defrauded were Bank Atlantic; Fifth Third Bank; First State Bank; Mercantile Bank; Orion Bank; and Wachovia.

The indictment is just the latest trouble for Yanchek, who earned his law degree from Temple University and was admitted to the Florida Bar in 1985. Herald Staff Writers Brian Neill and Natalie Neysa Alund contributed to this report.

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
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

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# Archive intern leaves mark on Venice history

### FROM THE CITY OF VENICE

The most interesting thing about the Venice Archives and Area Historical Collection is its variety of preserved materials, said Erin Mahaney.

"It has prehistoric fossils and 1920s photos; manuscripts and artifacts, all covering a broad spectrum," Mahaney said.

Mahaney should know. As a student in the master's degree program in public history at North Carolina State University in Raleigh, she is spending the summer as an intern at the Triangle Inn, home of the Venice Archives.

The Cardinal Mooney High School graduate received a bachelor's degree from New College in Sarasota as a history major. This summer, her work at the archives has been a hands-on learning project to serve in lieu of a master's thesis.

Under the tutelage of Venice Historic Resources Director James Hagler, Mahaney has had the opportunity to learn about managing an archive, and to leave a contribution that will be useful to the city of Venice for years to come.

Since the second week of May, Mahaney has worked four days a week to create a policies and procedures manual and a manual for volunteers to be used at the archives.

tion — that is, information about historic properties in the Venice area. She also learned about the daily activities of running an archive and the duties of the various volunteers.

The volunteer manual she is putting together will have information that all new archive volunteers can use, such as the basics

of operating the computer system, elements of the collection and a list of other community resources of historical information. She is using a new computer program, Past Perfect, designed to streamline the duties of volunteers. The goal is to standardize volunteer activities, making them more efficient and

helping them provide better outreach education in the community.

"I've learned a lot from the volunteers," Mahaney said. "Because the archives is staffed by volunteers, everyone who is there wants to be there. It gives a very positive feel. There are great possibilities in a small institution."

The procedures and policy manual establishes standards for the archives, such as how and when to lend materials, the selection criteria, reasons for accepting or refusing donations and a process for the deposit of materials, Mahaney said.

"One example of why a donation might not be

accepted is duplication: the archives already has the item offered for donation," Mahaney said.

"One of the things the archives does well is working with other area historical collections, by not duplicating those collections," she said.

"It's been a lot of fun learning about running an archive," said Mahaney, who hopes to do that for a living someday. "Getting to work with a collection that is so small but so varied has been very interesting."

Mahaney will return to North Carolina in August and take with her things she learned this summer that she can put into practice.

"When I first came to the archives, I was impressed with how well things were preserved and the standards set for preservation," Mahaney said. "The principles I've been taught in school are that archives should be user friendly. They should protect, preserve and make historic materials available.

"This archive is an example of that principle. When you see it applied, it all comes together."







Q. I use two hearing aids and am about to purchase a new cell phone. I do not know which phone I should buy that will work best with my hearing aids. Any suggestions?

Hearing aids using the microphone mode will be rated from M1 to M4. A higher rating means you will hear less noise and have a better connection. The rating for the telecoil will be from T1 to T4. A higher rating means you will be able to hear better in the telecoil mode. Next, add up the M or T rating for the phone and hearing aid. A rating of 6 is excellent, a rating of 5 is good for normal use, a rating of 4 is usable for calls but not brief acceptable for normal use. Most new hearing aids will have an M2/T2 rating. Ask your audiologist at

Audiologists at Woodmere Hearing & Balance Centers, Inc. about the rating of your hearing aids by call (941) 492-4327. The rating system does not apply to cochlear implants. (941) 492-4327.

those who were not shielded were at the will of the market.

And those who were unprotected became extremely vocal, bringing the issue to the forefront of Florida's political discussion in 2007. That sentiment carried Amendment 1 to an overwhelming success with voters in January.

### Trapped

Of course, railing against taxes is an easy bandwagon to jump on especially when those taxes come in the form of one large lump, annual sum.

"Except for new homeowners or people that have had to move or nonhomestead residential or businesses, no one else has really been complaining about their taxes," said Kurt Wenner, director of tax research with Florida TaxWatch, a Tallahasseebased nonpartisan public policy research group. "The complaining for everybody started really when people started saying there was a tax crisis in Florida and portraying that it affected everybody.'

As a result, many whose taxes compare with the rest of the nation — those with the majority \$1,703 average 2006 tax bill chimed in against Florida's property tax system, passing Amendment 1.

As Florida Rep. Michael Grant pointed out, this is a democracy, and what the people want (and vote for), they will get. In this with that money," Tower said. "That seems to be our

"Let's be real careful with that," Commissioner Vanessa Carusone said. "We may have Price (Boulevard to widen) and who knows what the future holds.'

Commissioner Dick Lockhart predicted Sarasota County would not act on widening River Road north of U.S. 41 for at least four or five years.

# **Snowbirds bear brunt of property tax**

For most Floridians, annual home property taxes are on par with the rest of the country.

But for snowbirds like Sharon and George Sousa, property taxes in Florida come without the protection of Save Our Homes' 3 percent cap on assessment increases. As a result, the Sousas — who live and work most of the year in Massachusetts — help to pay a disproportionate burden of the tax bill in Florida. Even as the average

occupied home property tax bill in the Sunshine State ranks just 22nd highest out of 50 states, that number is skewed: It does not represent the smaller but still significant number of unprotected second homes.

Further, those totals do not include vacant land or businesses, both of which also pay a larger proportionate share of Florida's taxes.

It's frustrating for Sharon Sousa, a 61-year-old professor at the University of Massachusetts.

"One way or another you're going to pay," Sousa said from her home in Taunton, Mass. "But from a snowbird point of view, I think it's made it difficult."

The Sousas' 1,500-



annual tax bill of more than \$3,000 — well more than their home in Massachusetts. The sales tax is higher in Florida as well, Sousa said.

She and her husband currently live in their Florida home just more than two months out of the year. They hope to retire and become yearround residents in the next four years.

But since they bought their retirement home, they've found their Florida property taxes have become an unexpectedly large burden.

Taxes are getting pretty hard, and we're finding ourselves working double," she said.

Amendment 1, property tax reform passed by voters in January, has helped — it put a 10-percent annual property value increase cap in place for some. But with property values currently declining, the cap has no real effect.

Florida Rep. Michael Grant, R-Dictrict 71, said he would prefer a 5-percent cap, which could be in place if voters approve Amendment 5 this fall. Regardless, he said more needs to be done that will, over time, address the disparities in Florida's property tax system.

"I think that we are taking steps in the state of Florida to try to protect those individuals by limiting the increases in assessments that can be charged on them, which in the long run will make our system fairer," Grant said.

That greater share of the tax burden still carried by snowbirds, businesses and investors has become a sticking point for Florida TaxWatch, a Tallahasseebased nonpartisan public policy research group.

"We have two different systems of property taxes: one for Save Our Homes protected homesteaded properties, and one for those who are not," said Robert Weissert, research analyst with Florida Tax-Watch. "The ones who are

not really get the short end of the stick. They really bear a disproportionate burden of the taxes.'

Florida's property tax divisions can essentially be broken down into thirds

One-third are primary residents, protected by Save Our Homes and beneficiaries of a homestead exemption that reduces the taxable value of a home by as much as \$50,000.

Another third includes second homes, vacant properties and rentals, now covered by a 10-percent annual taxable valuation increase cap, thanks to Amendment 1's passage in January.

And the last group is commercial properties, beneficiaries of the 10percent cap as well as a \$25,000 valuation exemption due to Amendment 1.

Most of the benefit of Amendment 1 - 80 percent — was felt by those who were already protected by Save Our Homes, according to Kurt Wenner, director of tax research for Florida TaxWatch.

Sousa said she hopes more is done to help snowbirds such as herself, because, in her eyes, the current system is broken.

"I think," she said, "it discourages people from investing in Florida." nhughes@ sun-herald.com



participation is noteworthy. "People are much more involved in civic matters here than they were in California, where it tends to be a younger popula-

lot more involved." All of this is not to say there isn't still a problem with Florida's tax system. Wenner and Florida Tax-Watch believe the disparities caused by Save Our Homes and homestead exemptions have created unfair inequities in Florida's tax burden.

Grant said though Amendment 1 was a good first step, more needs to be done to protect taxpayers from market fluctuations. And Slattery feels that the general taxpayer revolt is a statement against a system that relies on nontangible financial gains.

"It was really a tax on a phantom asset," Slattery said. "Unless you sold your house during the boom, you really did not realize any gain.'

### Magnet

In an effort to fix Florida's tax woes, some, such as Florida Speaker of the House Marco Rubio, have suggested eradicating the property tax system in favor of a higher sales tax.

Already a minimum of 6 percent statewide, sales tax is another piece of the tax puzzle. In Florida and most other states, taxes and the overall burden on citizens go well beyond property. In fact, beyond just property taxes, the state and local tax burden in Florida in 2007 ranked well below the middle-ground 38th out of 50 states, according to the Tax Foundation. When the federal tax burden is included. Florida's overall ranking jumps to 12th. And just dissecting property taxes from state to state could be viewed as a comparison of apples and oranges. Consider, for example, that Florida does not have a state income tax. "That is one reason that O.J. Simpson moved to Florida; that's why Bill O'Reilly lives here," Slattery said. "That's why this state is a magnet for people with money." A point that sums up Florida's confusing tax situation in a nutshell: Some people move here to pay the taxes, and others consider leaving the state to avoid them.

Contributing was the fact that Save Our Homes left many residents feeling trapped in their homes unable to move without losing their property tax exemptions. Exemption portability in Amendment 1 addressed that issue. helping it gain voter approval.

"It was a definite reaction to what I would call out-of-control tax increases on nonhomesteaded property," Grant said. "People voted for (Amendment) 1 because they perceived that the property tax system was being unfair to them."

# Change can be good — when it's necessary

et's say you hire an architect to draw plans for your house. You give him some general idea of what you're hoping for, then turn him loose to use his talent and experience to come up with a design that matches the image in your head.

Finally, he brings you the plans and, frankly, you're disappointed. They're not bad, and they meet the applicable codes and standards, but they just don't look like what you expected.

Do you:

A) Sit down with the architect and explain what you like and what you don't and give him an opportunity to revise the plans to your liking, or

B) Convey your displeasure indirectly and, when the architect doesn't make the first move to fix things, hire another one to do the job?

If "you" are the Venice City Council, and your "architect" is airport consultant MEA Group, your answer is "B." And that bothers us.

Now, we have no allegiance to MEA. Our goal is the same as council's: to get an acceptable airport master plan update and airport layout plan approved and to the Federal Aviation Administration as quickly and cheaply as possible. We just find it hard to believe MEA hasn't been given a chance to do that.

A bit of history: MEA (now Hanson) prepared an update and a layout plan for the city on the FAA's dime — about \$350,000. Both the prior council and the current one had issues with the documents and rejected them.

But it appears no one communicated to MEA what the problems with the plans were. At least that's what Lisa Waters of the firm said at last Tuesday's council meeting, and it was essentially confirmed in a press conference on Thursday by Mayor Ed Martin and soon-to-be Interim City Manager Nancy Woodley.

MEA, they said, should have known from newspaper accounts and other sources that its work wasn't acceptable and come to council to ask what needed to be done to make it right.

The firm surely did know there were issues and should have been more proactive. We think, though, that there was also a duty on the city's part to bring MEA back, list the issues and ask that they be addressed. That never happened, and the city is now advertising for a new consultant — who will use MEA's work as a jumping-off point.

Council members are individually reviewing the plans in order to meet with the new consultant and define the work that needs to be done. What, then, was the basis for rejecting the plans in the first place? And why, if the city is trying not to reinvent the wheel, isn't the original consultant being brought back to do its work right, within the terms of its original contract?

If that could be done, we think the city would save a lot of time and money. The estimated cost of having a new consultant do the work is \$450,000, though that would be for starting from scratch, which council finally made clear only last week was not its desire.

The complaints about MEA seem to be that its work adhered too closely to the FAA's requirements and didn't adequately present options to protect the golf course and Gulf Shores, and that MEA personnel were arrogant and unresponsive.

The first shortcoming is understandable — the FAA was paying the bill, and MEA works with the agency all the time. But the city is the client, and the client is in charge.

Woodley charitably chalked up some of the problems between council and MEA to miscommunication, at least part of which was council's failure to give the firm clear direction. Council members are belatedly doing their homework to fix that.

The second shortcoming should be easy to deal with. MEA hasn't been fully paid, and we have to think the airport planning business has been hit at least as hard by the recession as any other business. Plus, the firm's reputation is on the line. Council members won't have any problems being heard now.

Waters said at last week's council meeting that her firm still wants to work with the city but just hasn't been given the chance. While it's true, as Council Member Sue Lang said, that MEA can compete with other potential consultants to do the work — under a new contract, presumably — it seems to us that council could meet with MEA now and find out whether the firm can make the desired changes as part of its original contract.

That would advance the process by weeks, if not months, and keep city taxpayers from spending a dime that doesn't need to be spent. If it can't be worked out, bring in someone new; the process to find that firm is already in motion. What do we have to lose?

With the economy in a state of chaos, it seemed like a good escape to attend my high school reunion in Urbana, Ill. It was good therapy.


It was only about eight weeks ago that I was in Illinois and found the fields had been deluged with 9 inches of rain (the Iowa floods). Last weekend as I drove down Route 150 through Farmer City and Leroy and some of the other farm communities, it was amazing that the corn in some cases was 10 feet high. While that is not true with those fields that were replanted, it looks like they will make it to harvest The class of '62 was a class of 245, of which about 30 percent returned. Strangely, it was our 46th anniversary. We had our 38th reunion in 2000 to see what the turn of the century did to one another. Last Friday we just had social time over a few brews. It was great reminiscing and finding out what people were doing and sharing some good stories. The cost to produce corn was about \$235 per acre last year and about \$100 more this year. Next year it is predicted the cost will be more than \$500. This in part is because of doubled fertilizer and pesticide costs and, of course, gasoline prices. While that would normally be catastrophic, the bushel price has gone from around \$2 just more than a year ago to \$5 now. They said the ethanol craze seems to be slowing down; maybe the cost of corn is driving them out of business. A couple of pro-

posed plants have been put on hold or companies just bailed out. Maybe someone is using common sense on this one.

The lady that chaired the gathering had collected all of the class photos of all of the elementary schools. I was pretty cute in first grade (even my mother said so). Not sure what happened.

It was not a huge surprise to see that, other than those residing in Illinois, the most grads live in Florida, several in Sarasota County and one in Venice. There was also a western contingent, from Arizona and California.

I found that most of the people were retired, many for years. The ones that seemed to not be retired were the attorneys, the farmers and a few other professionals. We had no one particularly famous in our class, although some pretty talented folks. One swindled money from lots of people in central Illinois and now has all of his money in Switzerland. # Venice City Council working on five priorities

Interim City Manager Nancy Woodley and I met with a leadership team of city employees July 24 to exchange information and organize priorities for the city, as Woodley makes the transition to her new duties.

Five priority areas were identified for current emphasis: the completion of the comprehensive plan update, the development of the new budget, the completion of planning for the airport, completion of negotiations with the employee union, AFSCME, and the hiring of a new city manager.

The city council completed its detailed study of the massive comprehensive plan, and the process

is now in the hands of the planning staff and the city's consultants. After they include the council's suggested changes, the plan will be available for review by the city's appointed committees and the public. Their input will be considered by council prior to final approval in public meetings. Department directors

Department directors will be presenting their budget requests to the council in upcoming workshops. The range of funds available for next year, depending on the millage rate to be approved by council, would be about \$2 million less than the current year at the low end, and about \$100,000 more at the top of the millage range. The public will have the chance to discuss the items which might be added or removed in relation to the level of millage adopted.

Council members have copies of the airport master plan update prepared last year by a consulting firm. The plan was not approved by the past or current council.

Each council member is being asked to review

the plan indicating changes that should be made, as well as parts that are acceptable. Staff will collate these comments for council consideration. They should provide a basis for working with the consultant the city is seeking to hire. This will hopefully limit the new consultant's scope of work.

Preparation for negotiations with the union is under way. Administrative Services Director Alan Bullock is the lead on this project. Details are not available at this time. The city does not anticipate

having to lay off more workers, but will leave some vacancies unfilled under proposed budget levels.

A request for qualifications has been drafted for search firms to assist in the process of identifying candidates for city manager. It should be released soon.

I want to assist Woodley, and the potential new city manager, by becoming as familiar as possible with the issues, and by understanding how staff views them. I also want to

This is how the scam works.

The con artist strikes up an acquaintance with the intended victim. This could occur at various locations, but in most cases it is a social setting.

The information given to the victim portrays the con artist as a very impressive and successful person with an almost unbelievable resume that seems too good to be true.

Over a period of time a relationship usually ensues. In this time frame the con artist behaves in ways that gain the victim's trust and affection. Marriage may be discussed or in some cases actually occur.

(In one of my cases I arrested an individual who was married four times, fathered a number of children and had stolen more than a \$1 million from a number of individuals. He was also leading a double and sometimes triple life with two or three other victims in various locations at the same time. He covered his absences by stating he had to go away on business trips.)

When the con artist feels the victim is ripe for the picking he or she makes a pitch for money. A story is told about the need

When apprehended, the crook usually claims to have been in a relationship and that the monies were gifts given voluntarily, hoping that defense will preclude prosecution.

This con is successful because victims initially refuse to believe that the person they are involved with does not care for them or have their best interests at heart. When they finally accept the truth, it is usually too late. Here are two extreme

cases:

In Greensboro, N.C., James Anthony Savage was arrested by the FBI for defrauding several women out of more than \$7 million. He was convicted on 32 counts of conspiracy, mail fraud, wire fraud and money laundering.

In Tampa, Robert W. Best, a convicted felon, was arrested for swindling a woman living in North Carolina out of more than \$1 million. She was living on a large financial settlement from a botched eye operation. After developing a romantic relationship, he told the woman he could secure their financial future for a large investment in Best International Investments Inc. Records show that Best had been married twice before, once for nine months and another time for three years.

Be careful when meeting new people and be especially alert should your friend request money from you for any of the reasons listed above. Never give anyone access to your finances unless you can trust him or her implicitly. Report suspicions to family members

# Vitale: Sox in Sarasota a no-brainer

Dick Vitale was among the supporters of bringing the Boston Red Sox to Sarasota for spring training at a Citizens For Sox rally Tuesday.

Support and optimism still abound for bringing the Boston Red Sox to Sarasota for spring training, even after the plan to build a new ballpark facility at the current site of the fairgrounds seems to be all but dead.

Sarasota County commissioners rejected a three-way land swap that involved moving the fairgrounds from Fruitville Road to Twin Lakes Park last week. That move would have opened up a 98acre chunk of land for a ballpark near downtown Sarasota.

But that didn't discourage some of the area's most prominent figures from expressing their support at a public Citizens For Sox rally at the Hyatt Regency Sarasota Tuesday night.

"I would say it's an M&Mer, a total mismatch. An N.C. — no contest," said ESPN college basketball analyst Dick Vitale, who resides in Sarasota. "To me, the only logical decision is to bring the Boston Red Sox to the best place in the land, Sarasota, Florida."

According to the recently released Economic Impact Report, Ed Smith Stadium & Sports

Complex generates an estimated \$24.5 million in economic output with the Cincinnati Reds as its spring training tenant. When the Cincinnati Reds leave in 2010 for Arizona, the complex will generate an estimated \$5.5 million. A new baseball complex with the Boston Red Sox as the spring training tenant would generate an estimated \$46.5 million.

In addition to the economic benefits outlined in the report, many of the speakers at the rally cited the publicity factor of having the Red Sox in Sarasota. County Commissioner Joe Barbetta said the Red Sox could bring hightech, high-income jobs to Sarasota just by getting the attention of businesses in New England.

"It's not just about baseball, not just about bringing the players here for that period of time. But what other opportunities exist?" Barbetta asked. "We know our hotels welcome spring training. They say they love having baseball here ... The economic vibrancy of the whole community will certainly get brighter if we land the Red Sox. We're going to do our best."


In fact, Sarasota Mayor Lou Ann Palmer said that the city has received endorsements for bringing the Red Sox to town from the Chamber of Commerce, Coalition of Business Association, Argus Foundation, Sarasota Association of Realtors, Sarasota/Manatee Hotel Sales Committee, Sarasota Convention and Visitors Bureau and many local neighborhood associations.

"I'm not putting down the Cincinnati Reds in any way, shape or form, but we all know what the Boston Red Sox mean to Sarasota," Palmer said.

Since Sarasota lost the Reds, already Ed Smith Complex has lost the FHSAA Baseball Finals. Jason Puckett, sports marketing coordinator for the Sarasota Convention and Visitors Bureau, suspects Ed Smith and Sarasota will also lose the AAU Baseball national championship tournament in the coming years due to uncertainty surrounding the facility's future upkeep without a spring training and minor league baseball tenant. With the Red Sox in town, Puckett says Sarasota could easily get those events, which pump tourist dollars into the local economy, back.

The fairgrounds may no longer be an option, but the plan to get the Red Sox is still in motion thanks to support from those groups as well as the Citizens For Sox. According to their Web site, Citizens For Sox is a grass-roots organization committed to bring "clear and accurate information to the residents and taxpayers of Sarasota and surrounding communities about the positive potential impact of relocation of the Boston Red Sox to Sarasota for spring training."

I've never been to a game at Fenway Park, but I imagine it's kind of like this.

The first thing I noticed was the popcorn smell. Not exactly peanuts and Cracker Jacks, but close enough.

# **Board's stormwater debate to resume soon**

The stormwater mitigation debate continued during a meeting of the Community Redevelopment Area's advisory board at Lemon Bay Park.

The board decided to delay voting until August on endorsing a grant program by board member Todd Tracy over planned stormwater vaults for Dearborn Street.

By then, the board hopes the overall financial picture might be clearer to make a better decision on vaults versus grants.

"I think (the board will) come around (to my plan)," Tracy said after the meeting. "In these changing times, the responsible thing to do is change. And the grant program solves a lot of problems."

Among the largest of those problems, Tracy said, was finding \$6 million in the stressed economic climate to build the vault system.

"I think it's inevitable my plan will prevail, because the dollars simply aren't there right now (to fund the vaults)," Tracy said.

Tracy's plan would allow the private sector to pursue and purchase lessexpensive systems through low-impact development solutions such as green roofs, permeable parking lots and cisterns.

Low-impact development encompasses stormwater management contained mostly within a single site. The vaulting system proposed beneath Dearborn Street, by contrast, would have stormwater traveling to another location.

"I want you as an enduse consumer to be free to choose whatever stormwater (mitigation) you want," Tracy said. "It gets us out of the loop. We don't have to borrow money. We don't have anything to maintain. All we have is a small paper trail we've established for the granting program."

Tracy's program would include an endowment based on square footage of a property owner's lot. The amount would be determined through public input.

His own grant estimate was based on the 10.36 acres of land he believed had the best chance of being developed in Englewood over the next six years within the proposed mitigation area. At his estimate of \$2.24 per square foot, the total awards would cost the CRA a little more than \$1 million.

### Sitting there

Tracy's plan challenged the 21.5 acres of Englewood property projected to be served by the vaults. He conceded that while many of those acres might be somewhat improved, they would not actually require stormwater mitigation.

Tracy failed to win over board members Harry Colburn and John Davison. Colburn said that \$378,217 has already been spent for the vault system design with the backing of the Southwest Florida Water Management District, the

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body responsible for allowing permitting for stormwater-mitigation systems. Low-impact development, he added, has yet to receive Swiftmud endorsement.

Davison sided with Colburn.

"We've already spent a lot of money on the vault system," Davison said. "Some experts think that's the way to go and I'm trying to listen to the experts."

Tracy said that the \$5 million in estimated savings could go to more worthy CRA projects.

"We have some sidewalk issues. We have lots of waterfront park land that's just sitting there (needing improvement). We could kick in for the performing arts center as they look to raise money," Tracy said. "There's lots of things we can do to stimulate downtown other than mitigating stormwater for \$6 million."

# **Englewood Loop route in danger**

It looks like the end of the line for the Englewood Loop.

According to Anthony Beckford, general manager of Sarasota County Area Transit, the infrequently used Route 21 — which serves Englewood Community Hospital, Dearborn Street, Kiwanis Park and the Englewood Sports Complex — will probably face the chopping block in October.

"I can't eliminate a (bus) route without (Sarasota County Commission) approval," Beckford said. "But it has a strong possibility to be eliminated, because it's not doing very well."

Beckford said that despite efforts to improve the route, such as offering reservation-oriented "flex" service, ridership has not gone up. In fact, he said, it has actually gone down — to the tune of only four total riders per trip.

"That's resources that can be put to better uses," Beckford said. "So rather than wasting money on a service that's not being utilized, we'd like to reallocate those resources to something else."

Those resources amount to almost \$200,000 a year, he added.

"We're looking to enhance service on Route 16," Beckford said. "It will pick up some of the slack, though it won't pick up everything."



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


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

### Lymphedema: Know the Symptoms. Seek Treatment From the Experts.

Lymphedema, often noticed as a swelling in the arms or legs, can worsen over time if left untreated. It's crucial to recognize the symptoms of the disease early and to seek help from a specially trained medical professional.

### Causes of Lymphedema

Lymphedema is the accumulation of protein rich fluid in the soft tissue that causes swelling, most often in the arms or legs, and occasionally in other parts of the body. It develops when lymphatic vessels are missing or impaired (primary lymphedema), or when lymph vessels are damaged or removed (secondary lymphedema).

Secondary lymphedema can develop as a result of trauma, infection, radiation, or surgery. Specific surgeries, such as a radical mastectomy or lumpectomy with lymph node removal, put patients at risk for developing secondary lymphedema.

### Symptoms of Lymphedema

Signs or symptoms of lymphedema include swelling, a sensation of heaviness or skin tightness, muscle fatigue in the affected limb, and decreased movement of the hand, wrist, or ankle due to swelling of the affected limb.

The symptoms of swelling and redness, warmth, increased discomfort, fever, or rash may indicate an infection and require immediate evaluation by a physician.



DEAR ABBY: I just finished reading your June 9 column and am shocked at what I read. Your response regarding autism was way off base. You said, "Autism is a mental health disorder ... some people consider ... to be shameful."

Autism is a neurological disorder, NOT a mental health disorder. Families who have a child with autism have many challenges ahead of them as

they try to bring normalcy to their child's life and to their family. I am very surprised that you got this one wrong! Autism is reaching epidemic proportions. These families need support, not misprints. — MELISSA IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

DEAR MELISSA: My thanks to you — and the many other readers who wrote to correct me. After reading the letters and e-mail that came in, I spoke with William Barbaresi, M.D., the chair of the Division of Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics and co-director of the Mayo Clinic-Dana Child Development and Learning Disorders Program in Rochester, Minn., who told me that autism is often considered a mental health disorder because it affects behavior, cognitive ability and social skills. However, it is genetically predetermined — biologically based.

Experts clearly agree that autism is a neurologically based condition. The current criteria used to diagnose autism are contained in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, a publication of the American Psychiatric Association. However, this does not mean that autism is a "mental illness." Autism is most accurately described as a "neurodevelopmental disorder."

While there is no cure for autism, intervention and treatments are available. And for the most upto-date information on effective therapies, interested parties should read "Autism: A Review of the State of the Science for Primary Health Care Clinicians" by going to

www.archpediatrics.com and searching for "autism."

• At the end of the term period, the policy may contain a provision permitting it to be renewed without a medical exam, although the premium rate will probably be higher.

 Some term life insurance policies include an option to convert to a permanent life insurance policy.

• Traditional term life insurance provides a death benefit only; the policies do not offer an opportunity to build cash value.

Some policies may include terms that are more customizable and that can be linked to specific life events, including retirement, the payoff of a mortgage or a child's graduation from college. But they might also provide more affordable coverage for people in a variety of situations

For instance, if an individual wants to purchase term insurance but has high cholesterol, a 30-year policy may be too expensive. However, the individual could be covered on a 26- or 27-year policy that might be a better fit for his or her monthly budget.



The couple resides in Jacksonville Beach.



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
