STATE CHAMP!

The drought is finally over.

Alexis Benjamin-Graham earned the Florida High School Athletic Association's 2018 Track & Field State Title in girl's shot put last Saturday in a stunning come-from-behind victory at Jacksonville's University of North Florida.

"It was crazy," Benjamin-Graham said. "That was not expected at all."

Earning her slot at state after finishing first in both shot put and discus at the Class 2A Region 3 meet late last month at Wesley Chapel, Benjamin-Graham faced her most stiff competition of the year.

Discus – her first competition of the day – proved a disappointment.

"Discus didn't go so great for Alexis," said coach Rob Beatty.

Throwing in the second seed, the student-athlete's effort of 107-00.00 was not enough to propel her into the finals as she finished 13th in the 24-athlete pack.

Benjamin-Graham holds the Hardee Senior High School record in the event – a feat she accomplished during the Class 2A District 9 meet earlier this year.

Title glory, though, remained within her sights as she headed to the shot put ring.

"The shot put is where things got exciting," said Beatty.

Landing in the second flight of competitors, Benjamin-Graham watched as the first round of 12 players made their attempts.

"One of the first flight girls had a pretty decent throw," Beatty said.

The pressure was mounting: only the top eight overall players would advance to the finals.

Seeded third overall entering the event, the Wildcat was sandwiched between a trio of top contenders from Hallandale High School.

Luck was with the orange and blue, though, as one by one the first-round throws of the Hallandale players fell below their averages.

"I guess the ladies that were supposed to beat me had altered their work," Benjamin-Graham said. "It looked as if they were throwing way further than me. That was not the case at all."

Fate, though, seemed to shift again as Benjamin-Graham scratched as her shot put landed out of bounds on her first attempt.

"First throw, I scratched that," Benjamin-Graham said. "I have never gotten my first throw."

Opting to punch her second throw "safely in bounds," the Lady Wildcat inched up the rankings to around "8th or 9th," according to Beatty.

Hallandale's players, though, were not down for the count. "On the third round, things got interesting and some of the attempts improved – it put her second attempt at risk of not making it.

With the title hopes on the line, Benjamin-Graham re-entered the ring.

"I usually psych myself out," she said. "I was completely calm. I was ready and I was focused."

Mother's Day is this Sunday.

The Herald-Advocate has some very good writers. A fine commentary on Mother's Day can be found this week written by Rev. Clay Smith in his column entitled "Directions."

Clay grew up in Hardee County and works for a newspaper in South Carolina. He shares his weekly column with us. Clay is a Baptist Church pastor.

My childhood friend Eddie Whidden had a wonderful mother Natalie who passed away recently after a long and productive life.

It has been said that a mother's love for her child is the strongest love among humans, surpassing her love for her husband or siblings, stronger than a father's love for his children. There are exceptions to just about everything in life, however.

As Clay Smith noted, not all mothers are perfect, and he had some other mother figures in his life. Maybe no mother is perfect, as in no humans are perfect.

I remember my mother as a wonderful mother. She was loyal, faithful, an excellent cook, stable, a great card player (Bridge), tolerant, enjoyed some yard work, and had a strong faith, taking us children to St. Michael Catholic Church every Sunday. She was rewarded with a long life of over 100 years.

I have seen firsthand how my wife Jean is and has been an A-plus mother.

The late Curtis Ezelle was named by this newspaper once as Hardee County Mother of the Year after he nurtured his children Carmen and Marcus after their mother Virginia passed away when they were young. Curtis, the longest serving county tax collector in the nation's history (just shy of 48 years), combined fatherhood and motherhood for many years.

Internet research reveals Mother's Day was founded in the United States in 1908 by Anna Jarvis to honor her mother Ann, who in 1868 organized a Mother's Friendship Day to promote family reconciliation after the end of the Civil War.

President Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation making Mother's Day a national holiday in 1914. By 1920 Anna Jarvis became dismayed that Mother's Day had become so commercialized.

It has been estimated about \$2 billion is spent for flowers on Mother's Day, and over 130 million cards exchanged annually for the holiday. Telephone calls increase over 30 percent on that day, to about 120 million calls.

Carnations are the most common flower for this day—pink and red for living mothers and white for those who have passed away.

Other common gifts include dinner or lunch at a restaurant, jewelry, clothing, roses, orchids, gift cards, CDs, books, candy, breakfast in bed, candles, fruit, trip to a spa, housewares, even gardening tools, birdfeeders, iPads, wind chimes, cookbooks, and fitness trackers.

Former Corrections Officer Now On Wrong Side Of Bars

A corrections officer at Hardee Correctional Institution who was accused of selling drugs from his home there and who later racked up nearly a dozen more narcotics charges is now on the wrong side of the bars he once patrolled.

John Cody Vandiver, 27, most recently of 275 Shaw Road, Wauchula, was set to go to trial last month on varied methamphetamine-related charges but instead entered into a plea agreement with the prosecution.

Vandiver pleaded to possession of methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine with intent to sell and sale of methamphetamine. In exchange, the State Attorney's Office dropped all other counts against him.

Following the change of plea, Circuit Judge Marcus J. Ezelle imposed a split sentence of three years in Florida State Prison followed by five years of drug-offender probation.

Further, the judge ordered Vandiver to undergo a substance abuse evaluation.

The former corrections officer is now an inmate at the Central Florida Reception

Center in Orlando.

Vandiver first found himself on the wrong side of the law on Dec. 28, 2016, when he was arrested on two counts sale of methamphetamine, two counts sale of methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of a public institution, one count possession of a controlled substance without a prescription, two counts possession of narcotics equipment, one count possession/delivery of narcotics equipment, and two counts use of a two-way communications device in the commission of a crime.

According to a Hardee County Sheriff's Office arrest report, Vandiver met with a confidential informant at his home at about 4:55 p.m. that

day to sell \$20 worth of meth. The transaction was monitored by detectives with the Drug Task Force.

Vandiver, sheriff's Capt. Eddie Davis noted, resided in a mobile home within the Hardee Correctional Institution compound at the time.

Less than two hours later, at 6:40 p.m., Drug Task Force members watched as Vandiver, dressed in a brown Department of Corrections uniform, walked from his home to the main compound to report for duty.

He was apprehended along the way, Davis said.

In a subsequent interview with detectives, Vandiver admitted to using meth and to selling both cocaine and meth.

A search warrant for Vandiver's residence was obtained, the captain said, and the search revealed 1.6 grams of methamphetamine, a glass pipe with meth residue, digital scales as used in portioning narcotics for sale, and several items considered as drug paraphernalia, including tin foil and plastic straws.

Vandiver was subsequently booked into the Hardee County Jail and terminated from his employment at HCI.

Man Gets 15 Years In Violent Sexual Attack

A man who raped and choked the woman he claimed he loved will now be spending 15 years behind bars.

Pablo Macias, 46, formerly of Wauchula and most recently of Auburndale, also has been labeled a violent offender of special concern and a sexual offender.

He was found guilty in December of sexual battery with threat of force, a first-degree felony, and domestic battery strangulation, a third-degree felony.

Jurors acquitted him of a third charge, kidnapping, a first-degree felony.

Macias, who faced a possible maximum sentence of life in prison, remained in the Hardee County Jail while waiting to hear his fate.

And at his sentencing in Hardee Circuit Court, Circuit Judge Marcus J. Ezelle handed down a 15-year prison term

and ordered Macias designated as a sexual and violent offender.

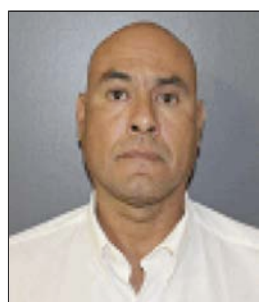
Further, the judge assessed \$1,473 in fines, fees and court costs.

The Wauchula Police Department had arrested Macias on May 7, 2014, just two days after the attack occurred and one day after it was reported.

The victim, 22 at the time, said Macias, then 42, had accused her of sleeping with another man. As they argued, he rebuffed her denials and instead removed his belt and put it around her neck, choking her, Wauchula police Lt. Matthew Whatley said in arresting Macias.

Macias demanded the woman confess, while slapping and punching her as he continued to choke her, the lieutenant said.

Thinking he would stop, the woman told Macias what he wanted to hear, that she had slept with the other man.

That, however, is when Macias assaulted the woman, forcing her to remove her clothing and sexually battering her with a broom handle.

That broomstick and photos of the woman's injuries were entered into evidence by Wauchula police and presented to the jury at trial.

Macias has been transferred to Liberty Correctional Institution in Bristol to serve his time. His release date is estimated at Nov. 13, 2032.

Her eyes closed — an odd quirk of the Wildcat's technique — Benjamin-Graham released and sent the shot put gliding a distance of 41-04.75 before landing with a dull thud.

"I guess the pressure made her kick it up a notch, and she threw her way from about 10th to first, with what ended up being her winning distance," Beatty said.

Benjamin-Graham's effort easily held through the finals, but the winning came dauntingly close to the edge of disaster.

"If I had dropped my foot a millimeter of a second later, I would have been out of the ring," said Benjamin-Graham. "I was a hair away from the outside of the ring, and that was my winning throw right there."

The individual state title in shot put is a first for the Wildcats and the first state athletic title in more than 20 years. The last Wildcat state title was earned by Jason Chagoya, who ran the 3200 meter in 9:26.81 to win the Class 4A title in 1997.

Graduating this month from Hardee High, Benjamin-Graham is packing her bags this week for the next leg of her journey as a student-athlete, traveling to Jacksonville on Saturday to begin a full-ride scholarship at Edward Waters College.

Benjamin-Graham seemed largely unaffected by the glory of her title as she braved the Monday afternoon sun for some practice throws at Wildcat Stadium.

"It was just one of those things," she said.

To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. ROACH: My wife, age 70, complains frequently of a sour taste in her mouth soon after eating. I thought she had esophageal reflux, but I did not find that sour taste is one of the symptoms.

—B.P.

ANSWER: Gastroesophageal reflux disease can have no symptoms, or many. Sour taste is, in fact, a common symptom. This is the "reflux" of the condition's name, since it refers to the backward movement of stomach acid — all the way into the back of the throat or even into the mouth.

Antacids neutralize the acid in the stomach but do not prevent the reflux of stomach contents. Widely prescribed medications, including H2 blockers like Zantac or Pepcid and proton pump inhibitors like Prilosec or Nexium, also act on the acid in the stomach, and do not reduce reflux.

In order to reduce reflux, I recommend eating smaller

meals, not reclining for two to three hours after eating, losing weight if appropriate and avoiding products that weaken the lower esophageal sphincter, the valve-like muscle at the bottom of the esophagus. Alcohol and tobacco are the biggest offenders.

Raising the head of the bed (traditionally with a brick, but foam wedges also are good) uses gravity to help the refluxed acid get out of the esophagus. Reducing reflux or acid at night is most important. While the body is in a horizontal position, the acid can stay longer in the esophagus and cause damage.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am very concerned about my 81-year-old sister. She is 4 feet 10 inches tall and weighs 78 pounds. This is a new low weight for her. She recently had bloodwork done and was told she has an underactive thyroid and should take medication for it. She also has a colon problem and COPD.

ANSWER: The thyroid gland in the neck produces thyroid hormone, which affects every tissue in the body. People with an underactive gland (called hypothyroid) tend to gain weight, may have dry skin, and slow bowel movements, and can be lethargic or sluggish. People with overactive thyroid (hyperthyroid) usually are the opposite: full of energy, thin and intolerant of heat.

However, these common conditions occasionally look very different from the normal. I have seen people with severe hyperthyroidism be lethargic to the point of apathy.

However, with severe COPD, weight loss is almost universal. The COPD may be a bigger contributor to her weight loss. But with a body mass index of 16.3, she is dangerously underweight and needs further evaluation and treatment.

County Opposes Potential Closure Of Hammock Road

Hardee County commissioners passed a resolution last week opposing the potential closure of one of only three through roads connecting Hardee and Highlands counties.

Vaughn Road, which connects with North Hammock Road in Hardee County and runs through Highlands Hammock State Park before reverting back to Hammock Road on the other side in Highlands County, is being considered for permanent closure as a through road, with a gate being installed near the county line.

The Florida Department of Transportation recently inspected and condemned the road's one-lane wooden bridge over Little Charlie Bowlegs Creek, which was first built in 1932 according to historical archives.

An article published in the Highlands News Sun on April 28 stated Highlands County commissioners have "no problem" with closing the road.

Highlands County must fix the bridge before it can officially vacate the road and give it to the Park Service, which would then close it to all through traffic, meaning people coming or going between the two counties must either use State Road 66 south of Sebring or State Road 64 in Avon Park.

Hardee County Commissioner Mike Thompson informed commissioners he was made aware that Highlands County was "very far into the process of closing the road" used by many residents going to Sebring.

"I don't know what we can do about it, but we need to express our objections," he said.

Rick Knight said the closure "would be terrible" for the residents living on the east side of the county.

"I think it would affect their (Highlands County) trade and be a bad idea," he said, also noting businesses located in eastern Hardee County probably have workers coming from Highlands County.

Chairman Russ Melendy said it was probably a budget decision being made by the Highlands Commission, which is responsible for repairing the bridge and maintaining the dirt road through the park.

He questioned whether a formal resolution was necessary versus commissioners calling their colleagues in Highlands County.

Commissioner Sue Birge objected to the "strong wording" in the resolution that was prepared by County Manager Lex Albritton and County Engineer Ken Wheeler.

Commissioner Colon Lambert stated he had no problem with passing a formal resolution, and tweaked the wording

to get the full support of the board.

The resolution, which eventually passed unanimously, stated Hardee County opposes the closure and asked Highlands County to reconsider its position.

A copy of the resolution was also to be sent to State Rep. Ben Albritton and State Sen. Denise Grimsley, who both represent Highlands and Hardee counties.

The latest traffic counts, taken in 2016, showed an average daily count of 377 vehicles on North Hammock Road in Hardee County and 103 vehicles traveling on South Hammock Road.

Get Rid Of Haz-Waste For Free On Saturday

Graduation is just around the corner. Mother's Day is Sunday and Father's Day follows closely behind in June.

If you're planning on any new electronic gifts for your son or daughter, mother or father, also plan to properly dispose of the old ones during this Saturday's Household Hazardous Waste Clean-Up Day.

From 8 a.m. to noon, the public will be able to dispose of up to 60 pounds of hazardous waste per household for free.

The collection center is at the Hardee County Sanitary Landfill. To reach it, go east on Main Street about two miles. Turn north onto Airport Road and follow it until the pavement ends.

Turn left into the entrance to the landfill, at 685 Airport Road. Follow signs to the Hazardous Waste Collection Center at the southeast portion of the landfill property.

There're a lot of things to collect for Haz-Waste Day, things which could create health risks to the environment and water if left along the roadside or placed in the usual garbage, where they can leak dangerous chemicals and compounds into the groundwater or landfill drain waters, creating all kinds of issues.

Look in the garage, shed, closets and drawers to see if there are hazardous materials you should get rid of in addition to those old electronics/technology items. Box up everything and go out to the landfill on Saturday morning.

Check the shed for old pesticides, insecticides, herbicides or pool chemicals. Look in the garage for old petroleum, transmission flu-

ids or antifreeze.

Old oil or paint-stained rags can become combustible easily in a hot, closed space. Old home projects may leave paint cans or sprays, wood stain, preservatives and turpentine to be thrown out.

Each household can bring up to 60 pounds free. If you don't have that much, stop by your elderly neighbors and see if they need help to dispose of old batteries or fluorescent light bulbs.

Look in the kitchen or bathroom for old cleansers and sprays, anything with a chemical base which needs safe disposal.

While you're at it, gather newspapers and cardboard, both also combustible, for the recycling bins at the landfill. Putting them out with the regular trash means they will take 10 to 30 years to decompose. Recycling is a better idea.

Used oil and old batteries can also be properly taken care of at the landfill.

Don't bring gas cylinders, ammunition, explosives or radioactive, biohazardous or infectious waste to the landfill. There are other, safer ways to dispose of them.

Businesses which generate less than 220 pounds of hazardous waste per month are allowed to bring it on hazard collection day, but will have to pay current contract prices.

Businesses that generate more than 220 pounds but less than 2,200 pounds per month cannot bring it on Saturday, but can call for pickup at their place of business, again at current contract prices.

Kitchen Diva

Sexy Salt

Salt has been used since ancient times and in many ways, from a condiment and a preservative to a valuable form of currency. Roman soldiers were paid in salt. The English word for salary is derived from the Latin word "salarium," which means "payment in salt." Salt was once so difficult to obtain that it was the catalyst for several wars.

Now everything old is new again, and salt is no exception. Sea salt, which is, well, as old as the sea, has become a fashionable, trendy ingredient. It's the reigning queen of the culinary world, and that popularity has increased its price. Sea salt is imported from around the world and comes in a flavorful assortment of vibrant colors, including French gray, Peruvian pink, Hawaiian red and Indian black.

Combining salt with water and spices to make a brining solution is a delicious way to add flavor to your meal prepa-

ration. Brining meats provides moisture by hydrating the cells of the meat's muscle tissue. That's why brining turkey and chicken makes the meat so moist. Brining also is used during the cheese-making process, and as a preservative for a variety of vegetables.

My vegetable bin often contains what I call "sad" vegetables. Perhaps the cucumbers or the celery aren't as crisp, or there's one or two unloved radishes or carrots left over. Brining the vegetables gives them a savory flavor, a vibrant color and preserves them. My slightly wrinkled mushrooms, squash or eggplants, the neglected broccoli or cauliflower or that bunch of limp herbs is rejuvenated in this zesty brine. It also provides me with a new way to present a colorful array of vegetables at the dinner table.

I love the way that brining with salt and spices seasons ordinary meats and vegetables. The combination of salt, black pepper and sugar provides a spicy, sultry burst of flavor that tickles your tongue. If you're a foodie, salt is sexy.

1 cup loosely packed flat-leaf parsley leaves
1 tablespoon vegetable oil

1. Boil water, sugar, garlic, peppercorns and 3 tablespoons salt in a 4-quart pot, uncovered, for 10 minutes.

2. While brine is boiling, halve cucumbers lengthwise and cut crosswise into 1/3-inch-thick slices.

3. Remove brine from heat and add cucumbers and radishes. Let stand, uncovered, 10 minutes, then drain in a colander, discarding garlic and peppercorns. Transfer cucumbers and radishes to a bowl of ice and cold water to cool, then drain well in colander.

4. Toss cucumbers and radishes with parsley, oil and remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt in a large bowl and chill, uncovered, about 20 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

5. The salad can be made ahead and refrigerated. Delicious when served with broiled or pan-seared fish.

ELECTIONS: Judicial Field Final

Deadline To Qualify By Petition Is May 21

With the official qualifying period for judicial candidates now closed, the ballot for county judge is sealed.

Running to fill the vacancy created by the mandatory retirement of County Judge Jeff McKibben are three hopefuls, Kenneth Evers, David Horton and James Pyle.

Lawyers Evers and Horton are current residents of Hardee County. Pyle, who resides in Highlands County but practices law throughout the 10th Judicial Circuit which includes Hardee County, would have to move here before taking office.

And for the Group 11 seat on the Circuit Court bench, currently presided over by retiring Circuit Judge Marcus Ezelle, two candidates will do battle, Steve Pincket of Lake-

land and Dana Moore of Winter Haven.

The official qualifying period for judicial races opens and closes earlier than that of other elected offices. It ended last Friday at noon.

To become a candidate for judge, one must be a licensed lawyer and a member of the Florida Bar for five years.

County judge candidates must reside in the county they seek to serve or move there by the time they take office. They hear traffic, misdemeanor and small claims cases. They are paid \$151,822 a year.

Circuit judges serve within the entire 10th Judicial Circuit, which is comprised of Hardee, Highlands and Polk counties, and as such may reside in any of the three counties. They rule over felony criminal cases, lawsuits in excess of \$15,000, juvenile matters, domestic re-

lations and probate. They earn \$160,688 annually.

Judicial races are non-partisan. They will be on the Aug. 28 primary ballot.

Also up for election this year are two seats on the Hardee County Commission and three slots on the Hardee County School Board.

County commissioners earn \$32,545 a year. School Board members are paid \$27,656 annually.

The official qualifying period for these offices is from noon on Monday, June 18, to noon on Friday, June 22.

Meanwhile, the deadline for placing your name on the ballot via voter petition rather than paying a qualifying fee is Monday, May 21. You will need only 118 signatures from registered voters.

Up for grabs is the County Commission District 2 spot

currently held by Sue Birge. Already pushing a challenge is Noey Flores.

For District 4, incumbent Russell Melendy has no opponents as yet.

On the School Board front, District 1 incumbent Paul Samuels faces a challenge from Melony Cureton. District 4's Garry McWhorter still has drawn no opponents. And District 5's slot, being vacated by Thomas Trevino, has two hopefuls to date, Mark Gilliard and Mindy Castillo.

There remains plenty of time for more candidates to join in these county races.

If no one surfaces for County Commission District 4 and School Board District 4, the incumbents will each receive another four-year term without the need for a vote.

Those with opposition will face voters on Aug. 28.

ALPHABET MAN

Every child has to learn the alphabet before learning to read, so some toys for those under 5 years old have been "teaching toys." Blocks were the first. The oldest mention of alphabet blocks was in 1693 in England. But blocks with letters and pictures were not available for most families until 1820 when large numbers of sets were made in a factory. Well-to-do young girls educated in the 18th century learned the alphabet while sewing samplers. They had to be able to stitch identification on all the family linens when they married. Most toys were made to teach religion, like a carved wooden Noah's ark, or to teach a skill like cooking using a toy stove, pots and pans. Toy makers created a few teaching toys, cards with letters

and cloth alphabet books.

A rare, famous teaching toy is the "Alphabet Man" or "Yankee Schoolmaster." The 10-inch-tall iron figure of a man had an arm that moved when a lever was pushed. The man blinked his eyes, raised his left arm and pointed to a hole high on his chest. A letter appeared and the student had to name it. The man is dressed like a schoolmaster and looks like a stern teacher. No one knows who made this complicated toy that was patented in 1884. Or why his right arm is held behind his back and his index finger is pointing to the side. Several of the men have sold in the past decade. The pictured toy with some missing paint sold at Bertoia Auctions in New Jersey for \$23,600.

Q: I have my mother's an-

tique satin wedding dress from 1931. It's in perfect condition. I would like to know if it's worth anything or if anyone would want it.

A: Yes, there is interest in old wedding dresses and gowns. You could donate it to a local historical museum or an organization that will resell it for a charitable cause. You could sell it to a vintage clothing store. Or it could be turned into something else. Old wedding dresses can be used to make christening gowns or bride or princess outfits for small children who like to play dress-up. The fabric can be repurposed to make pillows or enclosed in a locket, frame or Christmas ornament. It also can be used to make scarves, decorate baby blankets, bassinet skirts or wedding or baby photograph albums.

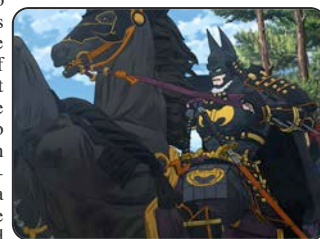

PICKS OF THE WEEK

"Fifty Shades Freed" (R) — Christian Grey (Jamie Dornan) has made an honest woman of Anastasia Steele (Dakota Fanning), and they settle into married bliss, which is not necessarily a paradise of perfection. Threats lurk. Insecurities arise. Jealousy strikes. Despite their billions of dollars and their charmed, exacting existence, the Greys have dangers to deal with that have nothing to do with handcuffs or whips. Even Christian cannot exert control over the past, which has its own punishment to mete out. If you tolerated the pain of the first two films, this is much the same. If you just don't have the time to invest in this culmination of a masterpiece trilogy (and who would blame you), here it is in capsule form: big wedding, sexy time, material delights, danger, sexy time, turmoil, danger, sexy time, the end.

"Batman Ninja" (PG-13) — Fans of anime and comic heroes and villains will delight in "Batman Ninja," a stunningly drawn extension of the DC hero universe. Batman is transported back in time to feudal Japan, where it is revealed that the Joker and other villains — Harley Quinn, Two-Face, the Penguin, Poison Ivy, etc. — are battling it out to rewrite history with themselves at the center. Batman must rebuild (without the technological delights of his home base) as a warrior ninja. He will fight alongside Catwoman, Robin and other allies to break the criminals' hold on history and bring themselves home to Gotham. The DVD set includes both the Japanese version and the rewritten American version, which is slightly different.



"Human Flow" (NR) — Filmed by Ai Weiwei in 23 different countries, this Netflix original demonstrates the breadth and diversity of people who have been displaced from their homes by war, famine, instability and other unlivable conditions in the course of a year. A mother leaves her home to wander with her children through unfamiliar lands; others board a ship crossing treacherous waters only to arrive at an uncertain shore where, at best, more adversity is expected. This film does not pretend to be unbiased. It comes down hard on the side of opening our eyes to what is happening right now to our fellow man. It's haunting to watch, but a necessary view for those of us sitting in the good seats.

"Paradox" (NR) — Director Wilson Yip (of "Ip Man" fame) brings his brand of deadly choreographed fighting to "Paradox," starring Louis Koo as Lee, a Hong Kong cop whose daughter, Chi (Hanna Chan), goes missing while on vacation. Lee sets out to find her in the gritty underbelly of Thailand. There, he is assisted in his search by his Thai counterpart Tak, played by Tony Jaa, and the two must weave through a web of corruption and intrigue to rescue the innocent girl.

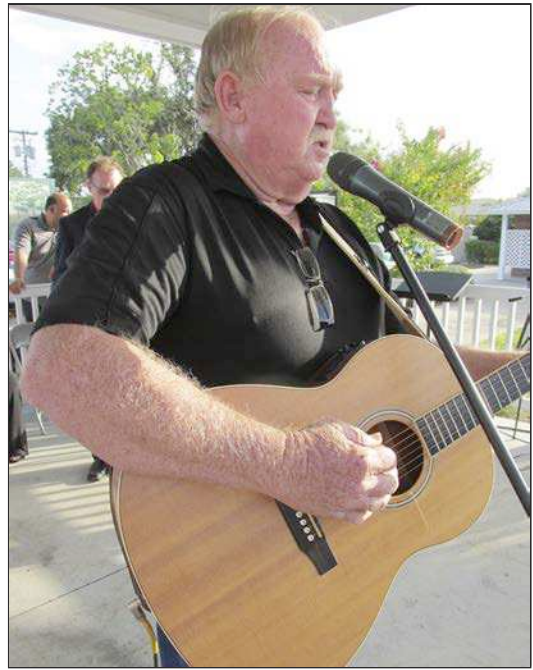

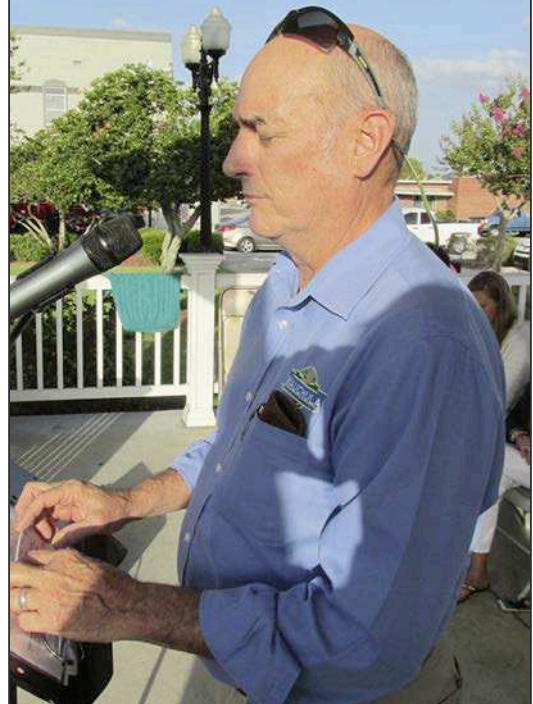

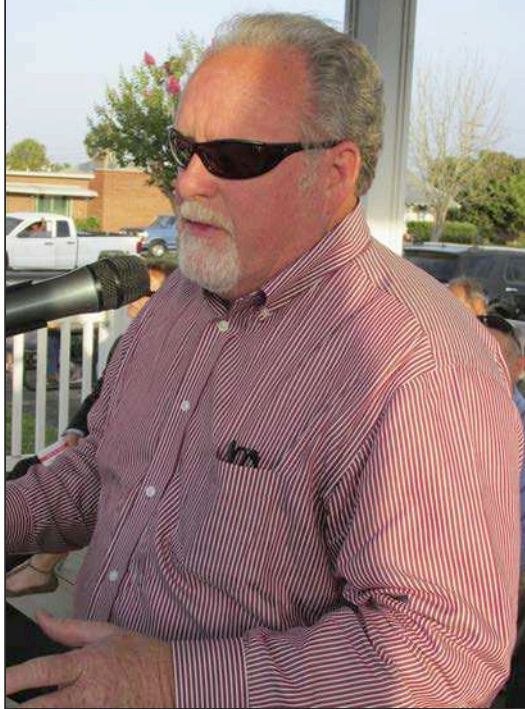

Crop Update

May 7, 2018

General: According to the National Agricultural Statistics Service in Florida, there were 6.8 days suitable for fieldwork for the week ending Sunday, May 7, 2018. Precipitation estimates ranged from no rain in multiple locations to 2.0 inches in Lakeland (Polk County). The average mean temperature ranged from 63.9°F in Jasper (Hamilton County) to 81.1°F in Marathon (Monroe County).

Citrus: Temperatures were seasonably warm for this time of year in the citrus growing region. Most daytime highs were in the low to high 80s; nighttime temperatures were in the high 50s to low 60s. The highest temperature was in Avon Park (Highlands County) at 92°F. Clermont (Lake County) and Plant City (Hillsborough County) both reached 91°F.

Scattered precipitation over the weekend brought between less than a tenth of an inch of rain and just under an inch of rain to the citrus growing region. Several locations in the citrus belt did not record any rainfall all week. According to the May 3, 2018 U.S. Drought Monitor, only Collier County and a portion of Lee County experienced severe drought. Hendry County in the southern citrus area along with its surrounding counties experienced moderate drought. Brevard and Osceola counties in the northern citrus area and portions of Orange County and Indian River County experienced moderate drought. Several of the remaining citrus producing counties were abnormally dry.

Valencia harvest has begun to slow. Processing plants were winding down with most planning on finishing by the end of May. Packinghouses will continue running fresh Valencia oranges as long as quality fruit is still available. Several houses have finished or will be finishing in the next week or so.

Next season's fruit is progressing as normal. Oranges, on average, are between marble and golf-ball size. Grapefruit are slightly larger. Some trees are still dropping small fruit, adjusting for what they can carry until harvest. Field work is picking up with caretakers pushing old trees and putting them in burn piles. Irrigation is being run regularly. Grove owners are conducting general grove maintenance, including applying herbicides and fertilizers.

Fruits and Vegetables: Crops planted included bitter melon, boniato, malanga, okra, and sunflowers. Crops harvested included blueberries, cucumber, eggplant, green beans, malanga, peaches, peppers, radishes, squash, sweet corn, tomatoes, and watermelons.

Livestock and Pastures: Due to hit-or-miss rainfall in many counties over the last several weeks, pasture quality has varied across the state, but in general, livestock has continued to require feed supplements.

Field Crops: Soil moisture in several counties was barely enough to continue planting row crops. The condition of irrigated crops was good, but non-irrigated crops were stressed. Tobacco planting was underway in Hamilton and Lafayette counties. Potato harvest progressed. Sugarcane harvest continued in Glades and Hendry counties with an extended harvest expected due to delays earlier in the season. Producers in Okeechobee County baled and stored hay.

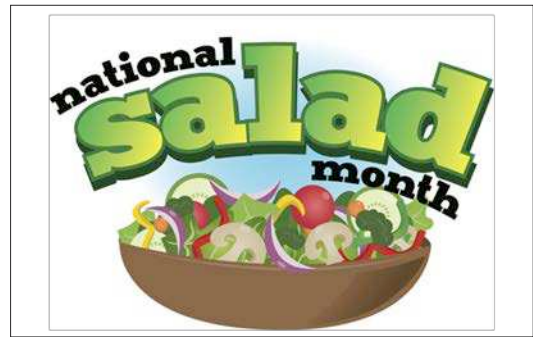

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I'd like to help make life better for animals, but I'm not able to volunteer at a local shelter because my job and family take up too much time. I don't have a lot of extra cash to give away, either. Is there anything else I can do?

DEAR SARAH: Few of us can really dedicate the time or money we'd like to give to improve animal welfare. All we can do sometimes is look for an opportunity that fits what we are able to give. More and more individuals and businesses are coming up with creative ways for their community to help pets and their owners. For example, a store in Fort Gratiot, Michigan, converted a walk-in cigar humidor to a pantry for donated pet food and treats, encouraging members of the community to donate to it with the goal of helping elderly

residents feed their pets. A program begun by the Humane Society of the United States, called Pets for Life, helps animal-care and social-welfare advocates start community outreach programs that can put needy pet owners in touch with agencies or charities that can help their pets get food, medical care or other assistance.

And of course, there was the community-driven assistance given to pets and rescue organizations on the Gulf Coast in the wake of two terrible hurricanes in 2017, which enabled the rescue of stranded and lost pets, and the rehoming of adoptable pets to shelters in other areas of the U.S.

So keep an ear to the ground and an eye open for the chance to help where and when you can.

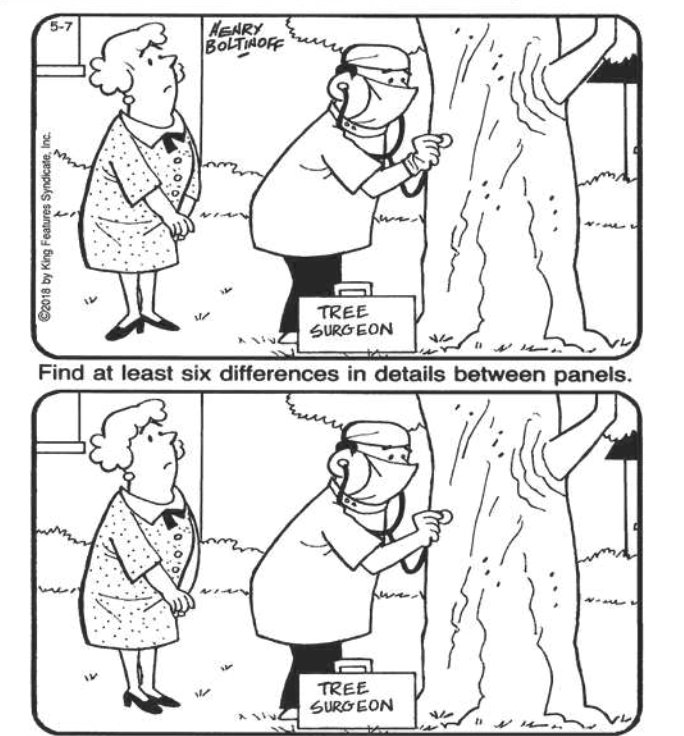

Get Snapping On That Alligator Hunt Permit!

Native Floridian and Cocoa resident Capt. Grayson Padrick doesn't need anyone reminding him of when to apply for alligator hunt permits.

He's been taking part in Florida's alligator harvest program for 20 years and knows to apply for Phase I permits in May.

"I love the fast-paced adrenaline rush that I get when hunting alligators," Padrick said. "And I really enjoy introducing youth and new people to gator hunting, especially those who've never been in the marsh or on an airboat."

Padrick's largest harvested alligator measured 13 feet, 2 inches, and it was a 16-year-old girl who Padrick guided that is credited as the lucky hunter.

Padrick sells his alligator hides or turns them into leather, and loves the taste of alligator meat.

Since 1988, the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission has offered hunters the opportunity to take part in its annual recreational alligator harvest, which always runs Aug. 15 to Nov. 1.

These special night hunts provide a hunting adventure unlike any other.

Costs

The alligator trapping license/harvest permit and two hide validation tags cost \$272 for Florida residents, \$22 for those with a Florida Resident Persons with Disabilities Hunting & Fishing License, and \$1,022 for nonresidents.

The cost for applicants who already have an alligator trapping license is \$62.

Phase II & III

Any permits remaining after the first phase

will be offered during the Phase II random drawing June 1-11. Those who were awarded a permit in Phase I may not apply during Phase II. Remaining permits will be available in Phase III to anyone who did not draw a permit in either of the first two phases, and they may be applied for June 15-25.

Leftover Phase

If any permits remain after Phase III, there will be a fourth-phase issuance period beginning at 10 a.m. on June 28 until all permits are sold.

Anyone may apply during Phase IV, even if they were awarded a permit in one of the earlier phases. Customers who get to purchase additional permits will be charged \$62, regardless of residency or disability.

If You Get Drawn

Within three days of an application period closing, applicants may expect to see an authorization hold on their credit card, verifying there is a sufficient balance to cover the cost of the permit. However, this does not mean they were awarded a permit.

Once the credit card authorization process is complete, the lottery drawing will be held.

All successful applicants will be charged, while those who were unsuccessful will have the authorization hold lifted from their credit cards.

Successful applicants should expect to receive their alligator trapping license/harvest permit and two alligator tags in the mail within six weeks of payment. Alligator trapping licenses are nontransferable. All sales are final, and no refunds will be made.

Phase I

The application period for the Phase I random drawing begins Friday, May 18, at 10 a.m. and runs through Monday, May 28. More than 6,000 alligator harvest permits will be available.

Hunters may submit their application for a permit that allows the harvest of two alligators on a designated harvest unit or county. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age by Aug. 15 and have a valid credit or debit card to apply.

Applications may be submitted at any county tax collector's office, license agent (most retail outlets that sell hunting and fishing supplies) and at GoOutdoorsFlori-da.com. Applicants must provide their credit card information when they apply.

If you change your mind on where you'd like to hunt, or need to update your credit card information, you are able to make changes up until the application period closes.

Some times when I first get up in the morning I just sit here in my chair and let my mind wander wherever it may. This morning I was thinking of a time when life was so much simpler.

No, we didn't have all the conveniences we have today, but we didn't know about them. Therefore, we didn't miss them.

I can remember helping Mama hang the clothes on a clothesline after she had washed and rinsed the clothes in metal wash tubs, after scrubbing them on a scrub board to get them clean.

We didn't have electric or gas appliances or lights, but our food still got cooked on a cast-iron wood stove that was fueled by wood you had chopped by hand with an ax.

If you needed water to drink or for washing dishes or clothes you either had a well with a rope or chain attached to a bucket which you lowered by way of a pulley to bring your water up out of the well. If you were fortunate enough to have a pitcher pump, you had to keep a good supply of water on hand to prime your pump. You always had a good supply of water, it was just harder to get to it.

What would people today do if they didn't have a vehicle to get around in? When I was growing up you either walked or you hitched the wagon up to the horse, and that was your transportation for going longer distances. It was always an adventure for us kids because we didn't go any distance from home very often.

We grew just about everything we ate. All our vegetables came from the garden. We had chickens and hogs we raised for eggs and for our meat. If we wanted something different there was a creek not far from the house, so if we wanted fish all we had to do was go fishing.

Our Mama was a very resourceful lady. We didn't have all the candy and sweets the kids have today, but she would make us blackberry cobbles from the berries we picked which grew wild where we lived. She also made us tea cakes which looked like home-baked cookies, and I can still remember the smell as they came out of the oven. There was no other smell like it.

As kids we always found things to keep us busy. We didn't need the toys and gadgets the kids today have. We invented our own toys with things like empty spools, rubber bands, empty containers and anything else that our minds could conjure up.

Would I go back to that time? Yes, to some of the things like the respect the kids showed their parents and all others, and like the work ethics we taught our kids back then, back to a way of life where killings and violence were not such a way of life as they are today.

There is good in today's world, but there is so much I wish we could just wave a magic wand over and it would go away. We have to strive to do what we can to make our world a better place to live and ask God's help and guidance in everything we do.

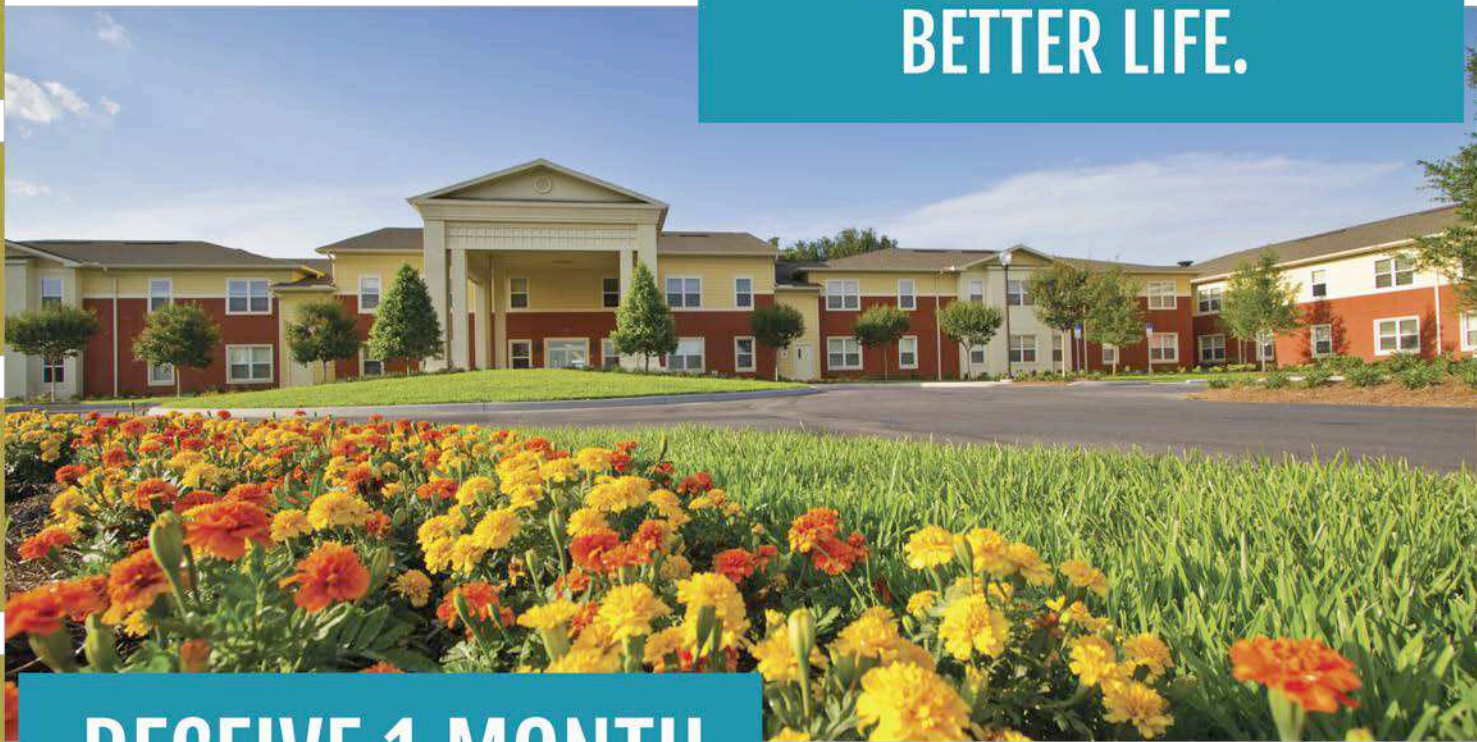
