Mary and Jack Wims remembered for tireless efforts to help neighbors

— CRYSTAL RIVER dna Foster remembers her parents, Jack and Mary Wims: Each had a heart full of compassion and love for their community and each other.

As a child, watching the passion they had for wanting to better their neighborhood left an impression Foster said she carried with her into adult-

hood. But now she hopes sharing the story of her parents will touch the younger generation and show them how important

it is to do more than just exist. 'Young people don't know what our older people contributed to the community. It's not about being here," she said. "We need to make a con-

tribution to our lives." That is something she said both her parents stood for and became an essential part of the legacy they left behind.

The Wims came to Crystal River from Red Level in 1943. Foster remembers their first home being a meager, run-down shanty on Citrus Avenue that they rented for only

Youth warm up to Native American culture

YMCA camp introduces kids to dancing, crafts

HOMOSASSA SPRINGS – On Thursday, the YMCA Cultural Kids camp was nearing the end of the week when Pansey "Grey Eagle" Cleaveland and a few other members of the Red Eagle Lodge of West Central Florida paid a visit to the Y

"I want them to remember the traditions and crafts," Cleaveland said, "They need to realize and understand where it all came from.

At the headquarters of Homosassa Springs Wildlife State Park along U.S. 19, Cleaveland and her group introduced the children to elk, buffalo, fox, beaver, and muskrat hides. The kids

were allowed to touch and feel them all.

'The only thing I won't bring is the skunk hide," Cleaveland said. "Even now, if you pull its tail, it still smells like a fresh

Also, the children had the chance to view a collection of different arrowheads, bone knives, turtle shell dance rattles, drums, and different bones. Cleaveland explained to the group, "You use what you kill, no matter what.'

Once the group was taken upstairs, they were put in what Cleaveland referred to as a "powwow circle."

They began learning different Native American dances, starting with the Round Dance, which was played on the drums.

The boys were brought to the inside of the circle and the girls were placed on the outside. The entire group then spun in a clockwise

During the dance, the Hernando County Y group, which was on a field trip to the Homosassa Springs Wildlife State Park as well, joined the local Y group.

After the dance ended, they played a women's traditional song, where there are also four men in the dancing circle. The men stand on the four corners: north, south, east and west. This is a protection method for the women.

As the day progressed, the children were able to engage in more dances, and went on to make crafts such as bracelets and necklaces.

Dawsy receives national award

Forty and Eight taps sheriff as National Law Officer of the Year

Earlier this summer, Citrus County Sheriff Jeff Dawsy was named

Florida's Law Officer of the Year by an independent fraternal organization of U.S. veterans commonly known as the Forty and Eight.

Now the same organization has named him the National Law Officer of the Year.

"About a week ago I found out that I had won the national award," Dawsy said

He thanked the Voiture Nationale of La Societe des Quarante Hommes et Huit Chevaux, as the organization is formally known, and described the honor as "humbling and overwhelm-

"The whole agency shares in the award," he said.

He will accept the award in mid-September at the society's 92nd annual conference in Vancouver, Wash.

Dawsy said he had been nominated for the state award and went through an interview process that relied heav-

ily on a portfolio the organization put together about background.

"They really go through your whole career in law enforcement and they document it," Dawsy said. The interview process for the national award was not as in-depth, but he said only state award winners are eligible for the national recognition.

Dawsy's background includes his role in obtaining state and national accreditation status for the Citrus County Sheriff's Office, the Jessica Lunsford murder investigation and subsequent state legislation known as the Jessica Lunsford Act, the agency's extensive use of volunteers, and partnerships with the Citrus County School Board, the Citrus County Commission and the Florida Department of Children and Families.

The Forty and Eight formed in March 1920 by Joseph W. Breen, a member of the newly formed American Legion, and 15 other prominent Legionnaires who envisioned a new and different level of elite membership and camaraderie for leaders of the American Legion committed to charitable goals.





Former assistant county attorney in line to become TPO counsel

INVERNESS — A former assistant county attorney is in line to become new attorney for the Citrus County Transportation Planning Organization.

During a meeting Thursday night, TPO members chose Michele Lieberman over former County Attorney Robert "Butch" Battista and Inverness private attorney Denise Lyn. Three members of the TPO

- Commissioner Joe Meek, Inverness Councilman Cabot McBride and Crystal River Councilman Ron Kitchen gave the nod to Lieberman in balloting that followed interviews with all three.

Councilwoman Paula Wheeler of Crystal River and Jacquie Hepfer of Inverness

had Lyn atop their ballot. Com-

missioners Rebecca Bays and

Winn Webb were absent.

Lieberman was 5-0.

TPO members were pleased with the applicants.

"We can't lose with the three people we have here," Hepfer

Lieberman was Battista's assistant county attorney from 2002 to 2007. She went into private practice, though she still works for the county as its code compliance special master, ruling on code cases.

Lieberman said the only way her work with the county would create a conflict as the TPO attorney would be if the planning

organization wanted to sue the county for any reason. The TPO is completing its first year of existence. The makeup — two council members each from the cities of Inverness and

commissioners and one non-

voting member of the Citrus cleonline.com.

The final vote to have Meek County Economic Development negotiate a contract with Council—is designed to create a unified county front for transportation issues.

Lieberman will replace Tampa attorney Fred Busack, who helped create the TPO in Citrus County and crafted its bylaws.

A TPO majority in April voted to seek another attorney because of Busack's role in proposing the Port Citrus project. Council members on the TPO said they thought Busack was showing more of an allegiance to the

county commission than the TPO. The attorney's position is not full-time. Meek and Lieberman

Scott backs off a bit on public record fees

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Gov. Rick Scott has backed off slightly on the fees he slapped on requests for public records.

Scott's office on Thursday announced a couple changes to reduce the cost of obtaining records

from the governor's office. There no longer will be a fee for the first 30 minutes of staff time it takes to process any request.

Also, the charge for staff time will be \$19.43 per hour. That's the pay rate for an administrative assistant in the governor's Office of Open Government.

Previously the rates could be dramatically higher because they were based on the salaries of those staffers whose records were requested.

SANFORD — The wife of one of Casey Anthony's defense attorneys called the Seminole County Sheriff's Office because of the number of threatening phone calls they've received in recent weeks.

Reports indicate callers have left voice mails stating that Anthony "can run but she can't hide" and warning that Mason and attorney Jose Baez "better sleep with one eye open."





"The work done in this room, in this building, will never again be duplicated," he told his team before the doors opened and the center filled with dozens of past and present flight

Shuttle commander Christopher Ferguson and his crew seized every opportunity to thank the thousands of workers who got them safely to and from orbit and guided them through the 13-day flight.

"After serving the world for over 30 years, the space shuttle's earned its place in history. And it's come to a final stop," he radioed after Atlantis touched down just before dawn.

"We copy your wheels stop," Mission Control replied. 'Job well done, America.'

NASA is getting out of the business of sending cargo and astronauts to the

space station, outsourcing the job to was not exactly a dramatic way to end private companies.

The first privately operated supply several years before private companies fly astronauts to the space station, least another decade. In the meantime, NASA will rely on the Russians for rides.

The longer-term future for American space exploration is hazy, a huge concern for many at NASA. President Barack Obama has set a goal of sending astronauts to an asteroid by 2025 and Mars in the mid-2030s. But the space agency has yet to even settle on a rocket design.

Thursday, though, belonged to Atlantis and its crew: Ferguson, co-pilot Douglas Hurley, Rex Walheim and Sandra Magnus, who during their mission delivered a year's worth of food and other supplies to the space station and took out the trash.

\$1 a week. It was the only kind of home blacks could afford to live in during that time.

"There were no decent homes for blacks," Foster said.

Wims worked Marv shucking oysters and cleaning houses while Jack Wims worked many jobs including being a turpentine worker, an oyster gatherer and a cedar mill worker. But along the way, he also learned construction and in 1950, built his first home, which still sits on the corner of Northeast Sixth Terrace and Northeast Eighth Avenue.

During that same time, Foster said her father began working for Florida Rock in Brooksville, and he would haul rock from Brooksville to Crystal River to build Eighth Avenue, which at the time was just a dirt path, into a road.

Once he left Florida Rock, he started to work in construction, building more homes near his first one. Foster said her father's passion to help provide nice, affordable places for blacks to live in Crystal River grew when he became a Christian in 1954. He believed it was what the Lord wanted him to do, she said.

"He had the vision for trying to help people," Foster said.

Bertha Brooks-Walker, who knew Jack Wims, said there were times tenants couldn't pay their rent, but he would let them stay because of the children or because the parents were simply out of work.

Foster said while her dad worked on building and buying homes, her mother managed them. Ethel Joyner said Mary Wims would call her sometimes and they would talk about the problems and joys of being their husbands' bookkeepers.

Jack Wims brought about 10 units to the city before dying suddenly on June 26, 1986. Foster said her mother continued to manage the homes until 1984, when she and her brother, James, took Crystal River. She also was

Mary Wims died Feb. 6, 2001.

Even now, Foster said people still come up to her and thank her for all that her parents gave to Crystal River.

"They were friends to many people," she said.

Samuel Joyner met Jack Wims during the summer of his last year in high school, when they both were working on building County Road from Lecanto to Brooksville. Ever since their first meeting, Joyner said they became good friends and worked on other projects together.

They had good times together, like the time they were racing cars down U.S 19 and were chased by police. Joyner said Jack Wims turned on State Road 44 and headed to Inverness while he drove around town for a while before heading to Inverness.

Eventually Joyner said one of the officers found him and hauled him off to jail. When he got there, Jack

their daughter, she became like family. "This was like home. I never felt like a stranger or visitor," she said. "Mr. Jack was just like a second father to me. They were a loving couple and always welcomed me like another daughter."

■ Cassandra Wims: Cassandra Wims said the key to her in-laws' mark on the community was their giving nature.

"They were both very strong, quiet people, and when they spoke, you listened," she said in an email. "Our youngest son learned that as a toddler. 

PAG-ASA ISLAND, South China Sea — This speck of a sun-splashed island in the turquoise South China Sea has little sign of the tensions that have consumed politicians and diplomats in distant Asian capitals.

Six different nations are pressing their stake to all or part of these potentially oiland gas-rich waters teeming with fish. Most recently, the Philippines and Viet-

nam have been wrangling with China in a noisy territorial dispute that is dominating this week's Asian security forum in Bali. And yet, here on Pag-

asa, the only sounds are the waves slapping the shore and the wind whistling in the ears. At high noon, fighting off sleep is a struggle. There are no cars,

newspapers, Internet connections or shopping malls on an island that mostly consists of a

single gravel airstrip and some structures. Assembly Thursday, Deputy Prime Minis-This, one of the nine islands, reefs and shoals occupied by Philippine troops, is also claimed by China, whose looming presence is a worry for outgunned neighbors.

Two Filipino police officers, looking bored, say there hasn't been a single crime for years. "One big problem really is how to kill

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

The veto threat came a day before the House was to vote on the GOP legislation - a debate to be held on the very day the bureau officially opens. The agency overhaul measure, which year ago Thursday as a response to the 2008 financial

Gadhafi boobytrapped oil installations, rebels claim

MADRID — Libyan ruler Moammar Gadhafi's troops have boobytrapped petroleum installations in the strategic oil port of Brega so they can be blown up if his regime loses the town, a top rebel official said Thursday.

Mahmoud Jibril, the rebels' diplomatic chief, also said Gadhafi's forces have boobytrapped oil fields. He did not state which fields. While Brega is a key oil processing and shipment hub, the fields that feed it lie far to the south in the Libyan desert.

"Unfortunately, Brega is a big minefield right now," Jibril told reporters after meeting with Spanish Foreign Minister Trinidad Jimenez. "We discovered that they planted mines all over the place. Even some oil establishments, some oil fields, have been full of bombs, explosives.

Rebels and pro-Gadhafi forces have been locked in a stalemate, despite a NATO air campaign against Gadhafi's forces. Rebels hold most of eastern Libya, but their push to seize Brega since last week unraveled Tuesday when 27 rebels were killed in shelling by Gadhafi's troops.

With the NATO-led air campaign entering its fifth month, Britain's military reported its first death related to the campaign after an airman died in a traffic accident in southern Italy.

Express Scripts buying Medco for \$29.1 billion

The top two U.S. companies managing prescription drug benefits are uniting in a \$29.1 billion deal they say will help achieve key goals of the health care overhaul: reining in costs and improving patients' health.

Express Scripts Inc. announced an agreement Thursday to buy larger rival Medco Health Solutions Inc. Together, they would handle the prescriptions of about 135 million people, more than one in three Americans. That will give them even more clout in de-

manding discounts from drugmakers, who are dealing with falling or stagnant revenue as an unprecedented number of blockbuster drugs taken daily by millions is getting cheaper generic competition

Together, Express Scripts and Medco handled more than 1.7 billion prescriptions in 2010 and reported almost \$110 billion in revenue, although Medco recently lost several contracts covering millions of people. They have razor-thin profit

More people sought jobless benefits last week

WASHINGTON — More people applied for unemployment benefits last week, evidence that layoffs are rising and the job market is weak.

Applications for unemployment benefits rose by 10,000 to a seasonally adjusted 418,000, the Labor Department said Thursday. The four-week average, a less volatile measure, dipped to 421,250. Applications have topped 400,000 for 15

straight weeks, a sign of sluggish hiring. Applications had fallen in February to 375,000, a level that signals healthy job growth. They stayed below 400,000 for two months. But applications surged to an eight-month high of 478,000 in April and have declined slowly since then.

Leading indicators rise, signal slow growth

NEW YORK — A private research group forecast that the economy will grow slowly as summer turns into fall — if U.S. politicians can agree to raise the amount the government can borrow.

The political impasse means the government could default on its debts next month, potentially setting off a financial crisis. If a deal is reached by an Aug. 2 deadline, that "headwind" would recede, and the economy should resume its modest recovery, said Conference Board economist Ken Goldstein.

The Conference Board said Thursday that its index of leading economic indicators rose 0.3 percent in June. The index had rebounded 0.8 percent in May after dropping 0.3 percent in April. The April decline was the first since June 2010. The June rise in leading indicators suggests

that the recent slowdown in growth won't worsen into a recession over the next few months, even with high unemployment and a weak housing market.

iFraud: Entire Apple stores being faked in China

BEIJING — It looks almost exactly like a sleek Apple store. Sales assistants in blue T-shirts with the company's logo chat with customers. Signs advertising the iPad 2 hang on the white walls. Outside, the famous logo sits next to the words "Apple Store" — one of the few clues that the whole thing is a fake. China, long known for producing counterfeit

consumer gadgets, software and brand name clothing, has reached a new piracy milestone fake Apple stores. An American who lives in Kunming in southern

Yunnan province said Thursday that she and her husband stumbled on three shops masquerading as bona fide Apple stores in the city a few days ago. She took photos and posted them on her BirdAbroad blog.

The 27-year-old blogger, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the setup of the stores was so convincing that the employees themselves seemed to believe they worked for Apple.

Regulators balk at demands for foreclosure reports WASHINGTON — Banking regulators refused

to commit to releasing details of their investigations into illegal foreclosure practices by the nation's largest banks. Appearing before a Senate panel Thursday,

Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke and Acting Comptroller of the Currency John Walsh said they had not decided whether to release reports on illegal practices by individual banks. Sen. Robert Menendez, D-N.J, had pressed

them to release the reports, banks' individual action plans and agreements with the consultants that investigated the banks. Menendez cited a report by The Associated Press this week that said banks are continuing to foreclose without doing the necessary paperwork, eight months after they had promised to stop.



Murdoch will pay the piper

upert Murdoch's ability to intimidate is gone, along with his power to expand his empire. The rapid descent is an astonishing turnabout for the media baron, and an instructive warning about the power of money and how money blinds people to reprehensible acts in the name of journalism.

Politicians revered Murdoch in public because they feared him, and to take him on would threaten their careers and their livelihoods. But for those who Murdoch, pretending they're shocked that his company went over the line is truly a Casablanca moment.

Murdoch pushing the edge of respectability is as shocking as gambling going on in Rick's Café. The Australian-born Murdoch originally made his money by dumbing down and sensationalizing the newspaper he inherited from his father. The formula worked, and as his empire grew, he insinuated himself through power and money into the political class, forging top-tier connections now embarrassingly visible in the United Kingdom.

People in authority in the British government and in Scotland Yard were in on the deception that allowed the media properties associated with Murdoch in London to hack into private cell phone records of British 9/11 victims and to bribe public officials for juicy tidbits on horrific crimes, interfering with police investigations.

The head of Scotland Yard and seeing him deflated, holding him his deputy have resigned, and the coalition government headed by Conservative Prime Minister David Cameron could face a noconfidence vote.

Top editors have been arrested and detained for questioning, and as the circle tightens around Murdoch and his son, James, who's been running the media conglomerate in London, it's unlikely that those caught up in the scandal will fall on their sword to protect the higher-ups.

The drip, drip of the evolving story as it spreads is reminiscent of the Watergate scandal. Investigators are asking what Murdoch knew and when did he know it, the signature question that led to the jailing of several top officials in the Nixon administration, and finally to the resignation in 1974 of President Nixon.

The Watergate scandal unfolded over a period of almost two years, but events happen faster in a parliamentary system, which Cameron recognizes. He is behaving as though his government could fall, ordering an investigation and calling for resignations in an effort to contain the scandal whose tentacles reach throughout the government and into the police and judicial

Murdoch stepped on a lot of people on his way up the corporate ladder, and now that it's evident he has feet of clay, they're not rushing to his defense. Rather, they're taking pleasure in up as a symbol of a media that's out of control

It's unclear if other media outlets employ the kind of tactics Murdoch's people resort to when they want information. But it is clear that bribery and phone hacking is illegal, and if there is evidence that Murdoch's minions broke the law, and that he knew about it, or tolerated it, his money will not be able to save him.

Most companies the size of Murdoch's are highly leveraged when it comes to debt versus assets. If Murdoch has significant debt, he could be in real trouble. This scandal is moving so fast that his creditors could come demanding payment, and if he is unable to satisfy them, he could be forced to put some of his properties up for sale.

In the U.S., Murdoch is known principally for the Fox News Network, the highest-rated cable network and a showcase for Republican candidates, the New York Post, a cheeky tabloid, and the Wall Street Journal, one of America's great newspapers. Keeping the taint of this scandal from overwhelming his American operations is a huge challenge for Murdoch now that he can no longer scare his critics or creditors into silence.

How dare Dave Bruns, acting state AARP director, call for finding common ground and bipartisanship? Was that the tune AARP and the democrats were singing during the debate over Obamacare? The perpetuation of the returns that a Ponzi scheme advertises and pays requires an ever-increasing flow of money from investors to keep the scheme going. The system is destined to collapse because the earnings, if any, are less than the payments to in-

rity, you will see some amazing

That's the assessment three weeks after a broken Exxon Mobil pipeline spilled 1,000 barrels of oil into the Yellowstone River.

Lawmakers are raising alarms that another spill could be imminent unless the government steps up oversight of the pipeline industry.

PHOENIX — Lawyers for the suspect in the Tucson shooting rampage said prison officials have resumed forcibly medicating their client with a psychotropic drug.

Jared Loughner's attorneys questioned in filings Thursday whether the forced medication violates an earlier order by the 9th Circuit Court of Appeal.

State officials at the federal prison facility in Missouri resumed the forced medication on an emergency basis because Loughner had become an immediate threat to himself. He has been on 24-hour suicide watch.

SANAA, Yemen — A senior leader of Yemen's al-Qaida branch has been killed in fighting in the nearly lawless south of the country, the Defense Ministry Thursday.

A ministry statement said Ayed al-Shabwani was killed in fighting on Tuesday near the town of Zinjibar, a provincial capital that has been held by al-Qaida-linked militants since May.

The statement said one of the leader's cousins, Awad al-Shabwani, was also killed in the fighting, but it gave no further details.

Ayed al-Shabwani has been on the government's list of mostwanted al-Qaida linked militants. He escaped death in January when Yemeni warplanes bombed the Wadi Adeeda area, 115 miles east of Sanaa, Yemen's capital, in Marib province.

The government then claimed the airstrike killed al-Shabwani along with al-Qaida's military chief, Qassim al-Raimi, and four other operatives of the group. But al-Qaida released a statement shortly afterward denying any of its men were killed in the

Al-Shabwani is from the al-Shabwani tribe in the province of Shabwa and is believed to have his tribe's protection. He is accused of providing sanctuary for top al-Qaida figures in the country and was implicated in several fatal attacks on security troops and police

Al-Qaida in Yemen has been taking advantage of the turmoil arising from months of anti-regime protests across much of the poor Arab nation, seizing and holding territory in the south. Al-Qaida's growing presence in Yemen has been a source of serious concern to the United States and Yemen's rich Arab Gulf neighbors.

States ignore federal school law

BOISE, Idaho — At least three states are vowing to ignore the latest requirements under the No Child Left Behind law in an act of defiance against the federal government that demonstrates their growing frustration over an education program they say sets unrealistic benchmarks for schools.

The law sets a goal of having 100 percent of students proficient in math and reading by 2014, but states were allowed to establish how much schools must improve each year. Many states saved the biggest leaps for the final years, anticipating the law would be changed.

But it hasn't, and states like Idaho, Montana and South Dakota are fed up. They are preparing to reject the latest requirements for determining school progress under the 9-yearold law — even if the move toward noncompliance may put them at risk of losing some federal funding.

Idaho will no longer raise the benchmarks that public schools have to meet under No Child Left Behind, nor will it punish the schools that do not meet these higher testing goals, said Tom Luna, the state's superintendent of public schools.

The federal requirements are unrealistic for schools to meet while they wait for the government to enact new education standards, he said.

'We've waited as long as we can," Luna said.

Montana and South Dakota are also rejecting the latest No Child Left Behind targets, while Kentucky is seeking a waiver that would allow the state to use a different method to measure whether students are making adequate progress under the program.

And more states could follow in seeking relief from the federal requirements.

Federal officials recently warned Montana to get in line with the No Child Left Behind requirements by Aug. 15 or the federal government could withhold funds under an education program. The state receives more than \$44 million in federal funding for that program, though it is unclear just how much of that money is at risk. In Idaho, that program is worth more than

\$54 million.

becomes a 'cramp'. A muscle cramp is defined as an 'involuntarily and forceful muscle contraction that does not relax'. Cramps may last from seconds to fifteen minutes or longer. It is common for a cramp to recur several times until it finally goes away.

Any muscle can cramp. Cramps affect muscles of the hamstrings, groin, feet and calf most frequently. A 'Charley horse' seems to apply to almost any cramp, especially one that awakens you out of a deep sleep.

Why is it that athletes cramp when you watch football games, tennis matches and even golf matches in elevated temperatures? The answer is excessive fluid as well as electrolytes loss from sweat known as 'dehydration'. Dehydration increases the likelihood of "true" cramps and is a sign of heat stroke. Prevention of dehydration is the best

treatment of cramping. Regardless of conditioning, cramps are due to vigorous muscle activity resulting in muscle fatigue. Even doing unaccustomed muscle activity, such as women wearing high heels can result in cramping during the activity or later, sometimes hours later.



A video of a broadcast ad featuring a smiling, dark-haired woman who bears a resemblance to the real Kardashian has been viewed more than two million times on Old Navy's YouTube channel.

Kardashian's lawsuit claims consumers may be confused by the ads and the model's actual endorsements, which include her own clothing store and shoe line. A commercial, titled, "Super C-U-T-E," began airing in February and Old Navy is still using some of the promotions, the lawsuit states.

The model in the ads, **Melissa Molinaro**, is not named in the lawsuit. She expressed exasperation that the resemblance was being pointed out again.

"Were (sic) still talking about this," she posted on Twitter, noting the ad ran five months ago. "Some people have too much time on (their) hands."

Scotland Yard investigates phone 'pinging'

LONDON — Scotland Yard, still reeling from the alleged police role in Britain's phone hacking scandal, was asked Thursday to investigate another explosive claim: that journalists bribed officers to locate people by tracking their cell phone

The practice is known as "pinging" because of the way cell phone signals bounce off relay towers as they try to find reception.

Jenny Jones, a member of the board that oversees the Metropolitan Police Authority, cited claims that reporters at the now-defunct News of the World tabloid paid off corrupt police officers to trace cell phones.

The allegation was made by the late Sean Hoare, a former News of the World reporter who spoke to the New York Times about skullduggery at the tabloid. Hoare — who was fired in 2005 — said that officers were paid nearly \$500 per trace. The paper cited a second unnamed former News of the World journalist as corroborating Hoare's claim.

Hoare was found dead on Monday at his home near London; po-

lice say the death is not suspicious. Jones asked Scotland Yard to examine the records of all cases in which police accessed phone-track-

In an interview with The Associated Press, Jones said that going through the cell phone tracing requests "is a relatively simple way of finding corrupt officers" given that it would be clear who was being targeted and when.

"The information is there and you can check," she said.

Pinging joins a host of alleged media misdeeds being put under the microscope as police, politicians, and the public weigh allegations that journalists at Rupert Murdoch's News of the World engaged in years of lawless behavior to get scoops.

What began in 2005 as a slowburning scandal over one reporter's efforts to spy on voice mails left on the phones of Britain's royal house hold has exploded into a crisis that has shaken Murdoch's media empire and led to resignations of two of Scotland Yard's most senior officers.

British politicians have felt the heat too, with the country's top two party leaders falling over each other to distance themselves from papers they once both courted assiduously.

Prime Minister David Cameron's former communications director — Murdoch newspapers veteran Andy - came under fresh scrutiny Thursday after it was reported that he did not have a toplevel security clearance, which spared him from the most stringent

type of vetting. And there was further intrigue injected into the scandal after Britain's Cabinet Office released to be intensifying.

ior official believed he had had his phone broken into as recently as last year, when Coulson was already in government.

The unnamed senior bureaucrat believed that someone was trying to intercept his calls to settle a political score, according to a letter signed by David Bell, who works as permanent secretary to the Department for Education. The letter was forwarded to journalists late Thursday after the issue was raised in Parliament.

Bell emphasized that the official did not believe he'd been targeted by Coulson or anyone else at Cameron's Downing Street office. He added that neither police nor the man's phone company found any evidence of wrongdoing.

Still, the revelation suggests that at least one top official believed he was being spied on by journalists well after Coulson and his former News of the World colleagues insisted the practice was dead and

Although the issue had been covered off-and-on over the years, almost exclusively by the Guardian, allegations of illegal behavior at the News of the World have received feverish attention since a July 4 report alleged that someone at the tabloid hacked the phone of 13year-old murder victim Milly Dowler in 2002 while police were still searching for her.

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

Winnie the Pooh' a bother

t had been a while since I last read a "Winnie the Pooh" book or seen a "Pooh" animation — but this latest "Pooh" movie did little to rekindle my

Sure, the old-fashioned aesthetic, including antique toys and old storybooks

(not to mention traditional animation), is charming. But the magic stops at the look.


"Pooh" is pointless. No one can expect stuffed animals to have juicy dilemmas, but the hourlong feature hinges on a misunderstood 'back soon" note. With its ridiculous premise, "Pooh" gets

boring pretty quick. Pooh (voiced by Jim Cummings) and his friends Piglet, Eeyore, Kanga, Roo, Owl and Rabbit are shocked to find their boy Christopher Robin (voiced by Jack Boulter) gone. Owl takes it upon himself to read the note Christopher left behind. The blustery bird confuses the reassuring "back soon" for "Backson," and cooks up a horrific tale about Christopher being nabbed by a Backson monster. While everyone scrambles to rescue Christopher, Pooh tries and fails to keep his mind off honey.

For the most part, these "Pooh" characters revel in their iconic personalities: Pooh dull; Piglet timid; Eeyore depressed; Kanga motherly; Owl verbose; Rabbit prying; and Tigger rambunctious. But deep down, they feel like small-brained imposters. Falling for their own booby traps and disguises, these poor dolls become stooges to swell a trying plot.

More than celebrating classic "Pooh" characters, it seems filmmakers grope for the 60-minute length.

Still, John Cleese's narration and the presence of storybook text add a sprinkle of magic. Watching Pooh amble over sentences describing his past, present and fu-

ture actions has this fascinating destiny slant. Cleese's narration buzzing around every Hundred Acre Woods inhabitant is neat enough. But Pooh clambering through page numbers borders on time travel.


Nevertheless, the characters are disinteresting and, alas, the quasi-sci-fi touch did not save "Pooh."

Since it revisits not only a Disney but literary classic, it is especially disappointing to find this "Winnie the Pooh" merely mediocre.

Plus, it does not help that the preceding short, "The Ballad of Nessie," is 10 times more charming than the feature.

I give "Winnie the Pooh" a C+, and only recommend it for those eager enough to see Nessie on the big screen. With a running time of 69 minutes, "Winnie the Pooh" is rated G.

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

Some players would make a mistake in this deal and perhaps not realize they had erred. How do those players declare in three notrump and what should they have done? The first trick goes heart seven, two, jack, queen.

With a low doubleton and just enough points for game, use Stayman. If North-South had a 4-4 spade fit, four spades would often be a better contract than three no-

trump. South starts with five top tricks:

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

two spades, two hearts (given trick one) and one diamond. And looking at those lovely diamonds, many players would immediately take a diamond finesse. However, when the finesse loses and a heart comes back, suddenly the contract has no chance. With only eight winners, declarer must play a club, but West takes the trick and cashes one heart winner too many.

Old Christine

Yes, it is unlucky that hearts are 5-3, the diamond finesse loses, and West has the club ace, but South erred. At trick two, he should have

played a club. Suppose West takes the trick and leads a heart. Declarer ducks, takes the next heart, and runs the diamond nine. The finesse loses, but East does not have a heart left (and if he did, the suit would be 4-4 and South would lose only two hearts, one diamond and one club).




