Upgrades to rec center planned

Fresh paint, chiller replacement among the improvements slated

By BOB McCLURE

SEMINOLE - Residents that frequent the city's recreation center will notice some needed upgrades over the next few months.

City Manager Frank Edmunds told the City Council Nov. 22 that work on repainting the building has begun and the \$175,000 project will be complete well before the March 1 deadline.

On another note, Edmunds said the long-awaited replacement of the HVAC system is set to begin by Miami-based Poole and Kent Co.

The system will use chilled water, which is used to cool and dehumidify air in mid- to large-size commercial, industrial, and institutional facilities. It will be a much more efficient system than the portable system in use for the past 18 months.

Poole and Kent's base bid on the project was \$513.897 with \$26.695 for contingency and \$42.000 for equipment rental, bringing the estimated total to \$582,592. However, Edmunds said the contingency funds would likely be unnecessary, dropping the figure

After a grant reimbursement of \$316,000 from the state of Florida, the city's final cost on the project will be about \$239,897.

"It will include a fairly significant noise abatement unit, which will close the unit in a concrete structure," Edmunds said. "It's all part of being a good neighbor."

Cost of the noise abatement feature is about \$30,000, Edmunds said.

down 1.4 percent from the 11.3 percent reported in 2010 and 0.4 percent less than last month, according to a recent report from the Florida Department of Eco-

In addition, Tampa-St. Petersburg-Clearwater metro area continues to lead with over-the-year job gains. The local area added 24,100 jobs from January through October for a 2.2 percent growth rate.

The unemployment rate for the metro area, which includes Hernando, Hillsborough, Pasco and Pinellas counties, was 10.3 in October, ranking it No. 11 of 23 MSA's.

Pinellas has the lowest unemployment rate in the local MSA. Hernando has the highest with 13 percent and ranks No. 3 in the state. Pasco ranks No. 13 with 11.3 percent. Hillsborough ties with Duval County for the No. 33 spot with 10 percent unemployment. Pinellas with 9.9 percent ranks No. 35 and ties with Escambia, Baker and Gadsden

October's unemployment report also brought good news for the state of Florida with the not seasonally adjusted rate at 10.1 percent, down from 10.6 percent in September and 11.6 in Octo-

The nationwide unemployment rate for October fell to 8.5 percent, down from 8.8 percent in September and 9 percent a year

October is the 13th consecutive month of job gains in the state after three years of job losses. The industry gaining the most jobs is leisure and hospitality, followed by private education and health services. Construction continues as the industry losing the most jobs, followed by government and information.

Pinellas County Economic Development's website reports a number of success stories for local job growth thanks in part to incentives offered by the state, county and municipalities.

Dynamet Florida started work on an expansion project in September that creates jobs for 15 more people in Pinellas. An expansion by Nautical Structures in Pinellas Park increases that company's labor force by 30.

Medico's recent acquisition of Solamatrix in St. Petersburg means 60 new, high-paying jobs for local residents. An expansion by Ceridian, also located in St. Petersburg, creates 200 highwage jobs in the near future.

Commissioners debate county's no parking rules

CLEARWATER - A parking dispute this summer between businesses along 123rd Avenue North prompted Pinellas County commissioners to review staff policies during a Nov. 15 work session.

Commissioners wanted to know if policies crafted for parking management requests in residential areas would work for commercial and industrial

The question came up after property owners along 123rd Avenue, a dead end street in unincorporated Pinellas Park, requested that staff put up no parking signs to stop patrons from the Watering Trough, 12333 66th St. N., from parking on both sides of 123rd Avenue.

The complainants said patrons from the bar were parking along the road late at night, blocking access and generally causing a nuisance. The area is zoned commercial; however, two residences are located on the road, and part of the street is located in the city limits of Pinellas Park.

County staff used the process it has used for years for requests for no parking signs in a residential neighborhood. Staff installed no-parking signs along 123rd Avenue on June 22.

On July 12, Jon B. Coats Jr., a St. Petersburg attorney, representing the Watering Trough, asked the commission to reverse staff's decision. Jay Galvin of Largo, owner of the bar, said he was working with his neighbors and that parking on the street only happens a few nights a week, between about 9 p.m. and 3 a.m. Charles Turner and

Raymond Baxter, both of Largo, also asked that the no parking signs be removed.

Commissioners directed staff to cover the no parking signs and ask the city of Pinellas Park to do the same until the matter could be resolved.

The crowd was bigger when the matter came back to the commission on July 26 with parties on both sides in attendance, including Deputy Noel Dunham with the Sheriff's Office, who spoke in favor of keeping the no-parking signs. Dunham said the city of Pinellas Park also favored the signs.

The discussion became heated with allegations that Commissioners Nancy Bostock and Neil Brickfield had a conflict of interest making them favor the Watering Trough. Parties from both sides claimed the other was the offender.

Bostock insisted that the decision be made according to policy and was concerned that the use of a petition process designed for residential areas would not work in a commercial area. Commissioner Norm Roche agreed, saying the process staff followed did not apply to the situation on 123rd

Bostock said the only reason she would support no parking signs in a commercial or industrial zone was when there was a safety issue.

Pete Yauch, director of Transportation and Stormwater, said that the area did not meet the county's criteria related to safety, or infrastructure damage and traffic flow because there was not a documentable safety concern. He also said the petition process had never been used in a commercial or industrial area.

Commissioner Karen Seel said staff had followed policy and supported the no parking signs. Brickfield did not, saying parking along that road when the other businesses were closed should not be a problem. He suggested if a safety issue existed, the parking ban be imposed on only one side of the street, not both.

In the end, Commission Chair Susan Latvala said no board action was required and suggested the policy issue be a subject for a future work session. She said a board meeting was not the place to resolve a neighborhood dispute.

No one involved in the 123rd Avenue dispute showed up for the Nov. 15 work session.

Yauch took commissioners through the process that staff with Traffic Engineering department uses to administer its parking management program. He said staff had successfully resolved requests for no parking signs from 15 residential areas since

He gave several examples. He said two of the requests related to Seminole High School students parking along side streets near the school. Another request came from a neighborhood where a church was located and another from a neighborhood where someone had a business located in their

Staff can install parking restrictions if there is a safety issue, problems with access to right of way for maintenance or erosion problems, or if there is a request from the Sheriff's Office or fire depart-

If no clear reason for a parking sign exists, staff

can initiate the parking management program, aka petition process, which begins with a letter to Traffic Engineering requesting a no parking area and the reasons, which could be a problem with mail delivery, garbage pickup, access to property, aesthetics, etc. Homeowners associations are required to include the meeting minutes where the restriction was discussed and approved. The letter also needs to specify the days and times for the parking restrictions, day or night, certain days of the week,

A contact person from the neighborhood is asked to talk with others neighbors in the area where the restriction would take place. After talking to the neighbors, if the contact person wants to proceed, county staff prepares petitions with maps.

Owners of multiple properties are allowed one vote only. Only property owners can vote - not renters. Policy dictates that 90 percent of the property owners have to be notified and 60 percent must show support for the petition.

If the contact person gets 60 percent of the neighbors to support the petition, the county can use certified mail to attempt to ensure 90 percent of those affected are notified.

Commissioners had no problem with the process for residential areas, but some weren't convinced it was appropriate to use in commercial and industrial zones.

Bostock suggested the petition process be used to gather information before bringing the request to



the commission for approval.

"There are too many nuances (in commercial areas) to write hard and fast rules to apply to every situation," she said.

Roche suggested having two policies since there are clear differences between what is allowed in a residential area and a commercial zone. Bostock said requests for parking restrictions should have more of a need than in residential areas to prevent businesses trying to limit parking to harm another business.

Seel said the current petition process should work for all kinds of property.

Seel said the danger is putting the commission "smack in the middle" when dealing with busi-

nesses with differing views. "I can't support two policies,"

Latvala did not favor any policy that required the matter to come before the commission.

Bostock said reasons to restrict parking in commercial areas should be different.

"Does it substantially negatively impact versus I don't like it," she said should be consid-

Roche added at the core it should come down to a safety issue.

Yauch suggested adding a requirement to have documented damage to the criteria to approve parking restrictions in commercial areas. The commission agreed; however, Bostock said that criteria should apply with all requests. Yauch then suggested adding documented, recurring and widespread damage as a reason to grant a request.

Latvala said with any process used, citizens and business owners still could come before the commission to ask for help.

"I'd rather craft a process we can stand by," Bostock said.

Roche said he wasn't "keen on the idea that requests have to come to us, but I do think there needs to be a clear difference in the process for residential and commercial."

Brickfield suggested the county use a tiered approach and he objected to the county doing anything that would facilitate conflicts with competing business owners using parking restrictions as a weapon.

"Who are we trying to protect,"

Yauch said staff could work on

a policy with a tiered system. Bostock said above all, the policy needed to be flexible.

"We need a clear goal, something that will not adversely affect businesses," Latvala said.



Santa sighting



Both meetings will start at 7 p.m. The city normally conducts its meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month. The change was made to facilitate holiday plans by councilors.

• The city's annual Holiday Tree Lighting and Winterfest will take place Friday, Dec. 9 at the Recreation Center. The annual Bright Before Your Eyes Holiday Night Parade will be held Sunday, Dec. 11, beginning at 6:30 p.m., on 113th Street. The parade begins at the Seminole Mall and finishes at the Recreation Center. The city's annual Breakfast With Santa event is Saturday, Dec. 17, 9 a.m., at the Recreation Center.

"I restored it myself a couple of times, but lately it had gotten bad again and some parts were actually falling off," he said.

Enter Treasure Island Police Cpl. Kathi Lovelace. In making her rounds she often noticed the mailbox's deterioration and decided to do something about it. So, with the Entwistle's blessing she took the mailbox and with the help of Cpl. Aaron DeShay and the city's chief mechanic, Don Sytsma, they completely refurbished the mailbox.

Sytsma rebuilt parts of the plane that had fallen off or rotted and DeShay, who paints model cars as a hobby, did the paint job, right down to the original colors and with the correct registration numbers. He also put a special protective coating over it to help preserve it for a longer time.

With the job done, they re-installed the mailbox much to the delight of Charlie Entwistle.

"It was fantastic," Charlie said. "It is as good as brand new. I didn't expect anybody to do this at all, they surprised me. They did a wonderful job."

Lovelace said she wanted to fix the mailbox because of its iconic stature on Paradise Island.

"The Entwistles have been here for a long time," she said. "We just wanted to make it look better for them. They have been a big part of this community." Sixteen years ago the Treasure Island City Com-

mission wanted to standardize all mailboxes in the city. That meant that anyone with a mailbox out of the ordinary would have to change. There was controversy and many residents who owned unique mailboxes, showed up at City Commission meetings to complain.

When reminded of that controversy, which almost saw him lose his mailbox, Entwistle laughed.

"They said they wanted to standardize the mailboxes so that cars wouldn't hit them," he said. "But I asked them how many mailboxes had been hit by cars in the city. They said none. So I asked them why are we doing it?"

It was then that Entwistle was assured by the City Commission that his mailbox would be grandfathered in no matter what regulations were passed.

As for the aircraft that inspired all this, it is now with a new owner in California. Back in 2000 Charlie gave the plane to his son in Massachusetts. He has since replaced it with a new one. The original was sold to a man in California and ironically has since been completely restored, much like its mailbox counterpart.

Charlie fondly remembers his old plane, however. "In all the years I owned it; it never, ever, ever failed to start," he said. "I can remember one very cold day up north when a group of us were going flying and my plane was the only one that would

It is unlikely he will ever forget his Beechcraft Bonanza. Every time he checks the mail he is reminded, not only of his airplane, but also of some good community spirit that is keeping it alive.

Madeira names Wisconsin official new city manager

MADEIRA BEACH - The Board of Commissioners has picked a deputy county administrator from Wisconsin to be the next city manager.

Shane Benjamin Crawford, 34, of Walworth County (population: 100,000, budget: \$155 million) was chosen over five other can-

didates at the commission's Nov. 22 regular meeting.

Using a straw ballot process recommended by a recruiter, the commission was able to wrap up the selection of Crawford in less than 20 minutes. Picked as a backup choice was Callaway, Fla., city manager Judy Whitis.

Making a No. 2 selection was recommended by recruiter Colin Baenziger, especially considering the commission has had three previous city manager picks either withdraw or turn down the job during contract negotiations.

Crawford had been the first choice of two commissioner members - Mayor Travis Palladeno and Commissioner Robin Vander Velde - on the first vote. That number grew to four with the addition of Commissioners Carol Reynolds and Nancy Oakley when he was matched against runner-up candidates Whitis and Danielle Pitt Slaterpryce, a project manager out of Miramar Beach.

A motion to hire Crawford passed 4-1, with Commissioner Terry Lister opposed. Lister then made a motion to endorse Crawford, which was unanimously approved.

Lister said the appearance of unity in Crawford's selection was important. The commission had been narrowly divided in its previous city manager selections.

Commissioners' one-on-one interviews with the candidates were closed to the public.

An interview with Crawford released by recruiter Baenziger and Associates describes him as "straightforward, intelligent, ambitious and capable. Very personable and knowledgeable. Energetic and enthusiastic."

According to the recruiter, Crawford views Madeira Beach as an opportunity to tackle new and exciting challenges.

"(Crawford) recognizes much is expected and that he will have a very small staff but that is what excites him. He feels some structural change will be necessary and some streamlining will need to take place but he is ready to do that," the interviewer

Crawford also indicated he is in line to be offered the Walworth County administrator position when the current administrator leaves next year. However, he also "feels it is time to explore new challenges." Crawford further indicated he is "ready to get out of the ice and snow."

Salary could be an issue in hiring Crawford. His current pay is \$117,000. The commission has set a salary range of \$90,000 to \$120,000 and indicated they would like to pay less than the maximum.

Although Crawford's current position incorporates public works, Lister said following the meeting that he is under the impression Crawford "does not want to do public works."

However, the recruiter's report does not indicate

any reluctance by Crawford to take on both city manager and public works responsibilities.

The commission plans to have a special meeting Dec. 7 to finalize the hiring of the city manager.

Mallory vs. Madden

The city manager selection was preceded by a long and contentious discussion involving residents, fire chief Bill Mallory and interim city manager Jim Madden over issues related to Mallory's resignation and later dismissal by Madden.

At one point during the community forum, Mallory spoke and accused Madden of refusing to pay him beyond Nov. 18, the day he was told to leave by Madden. Mallory had given two weeks notice in his resignation letter the previous day, saying his last day on the job would be Dec. 2.

Mallory also said Madden wrote him a disciplinary letter via email, with a "cc" to his personnel file, relating to repairing the roof of the public works building. The letter was written after Mallory was terminated. In the letter, Madden contended Mallory, when he was interim city manager, did not have proper approval from the commission to issue a purchase order for the roof repair.

"The charges in the letter are unfounded," Mallory said. He said he had given the commission status reports on the roof at almost every meeting, and the commission voted 5-0 on Aug. 9 to authorize him to get the roof repaired. "This entire commission voted, 5-0, and gave me

instructions to get the roof repaired. If that is not permission by the commission to get the roof repaired, I don't know what is," Mallory said.

Addressing Madden, Mallory said, "So Jim, either you're lying, or you made a grave mistake. Which is

"I think you are mistaken," Madden said.

Mallory then produced a recording device, and proceeded to play the portion of the meeting on Aug. where Mallory said the Public Works roof needed emergency repairs, and requested the authority to have the work done.

"We need the roof fixed," Palladeno is heard saying. "I agree," said Oakley. After hearing the yes votes on the tape, the audience broke into loud ap-

"Mr. Madden, nothing (should be put) in Mr. Mallory's file," Palladeno said.

Mallory then asked the commission to further instruct Madden to place him on administrative leave for two weeks, effectively reinstating the two-week notice period. A motion was made by Lister and seconded by Reynolds to do that.

Oakley objected, saying the commission had no right to interfere with personnel decisions made by the city manager. But city attorney Thomas Trask read a part of the city code that said the commission can give directions to the city manager relating to personnel matters.

The commission voted 3-2 (Palladeno, Lister, and Reynolds in favor, Oakley and Vander Velde opposed) to pay Mallory and put him on administra-

tive leave for the two-week notice period. Residents attending the meeting had plenty to say about Mallory and Madden.

Former commissioner Steve Kochick said Madden was "highly irresponsible" to dismiss Mallory after he had given two weeks notice of his intentions to

recently relocated Oshkosh Specialty Vehicles and merged with Frontline Communications in Clearwater to create 50 new manufacturing and office positions.

The Florida Retail Federation estimates that retail employers will hire as many as 35,000 during November and December. Rick McAllister, president and CEO of the Florida Retail Federation, says that's a good sign for future job growth.

"For the past two years now, retail sales have been trending up," he said. "That's a sign that we're getting back to a normal growth cycle, and that has made retailers more confident in their hiring."

Manpower's Employment Outlook Survey of employer's hiring plans for the remainder of 2011 isn't quite as positive as McAllister's assessment for the state of Florida - still the outlook is encouraging.

"The Quarter 4 2011 survey results show slightly

weaker hiring plans compared to Quarter 3 2011 when the net employment outlook was 7 percent," said Manpower spokesperson Michael Doyle. "Compared to one year ago when the net employment outlook was 3 percent, employers are similarly optimistic about their staffing plans."

The net employment outlook is the difference between employers expecting to hire and those expecting to decrease their workforce.

Nineteen percent of employers surveyed by Manpower in the local metro area expect to hire additional employees and 14 percent plan to reduce staff. Sixty-four percent say they'll keep the status quo and 3 percent were uncertain. "Hiring activity is expected to stay the same dur-

ing the fourth quarter of 2011 compared to Quarter 3 when the net employment outlook was 5 percent," said Judy Leppla, Manpower spokesperson. "Employers expect slightly stronger employment prospects compared to one year ago when net employment outlook was 4 percent."

Police Department investigators say thanks to tips generated by media coverage, the display was returned and provided back to the owner. No charges were filed.

The theft marked the second consecutive year the inflatable beer display disappeared during Sanding Ovations.

Sheriff's detectives solve 2006 homicide

LARGO – Neal A. "Pooh" Lloyd is only 22 years old. He is serving a life sentence for the 2007 Valentine's Day murder of a Clearwater man.

Lloyd was 18 at the time of the murder. His victim was 25.

Pinellas County sheriff's detectives announced Nov. 23 that Lloyd also is responsible for the 2006 homicide of Hoeschele Thomas, who was shot Oct. 29, 2006, outside a residence in Largo.

Lloyd was a resident of Largo at the time of the shooting. Now he lives in a cell at the Taylor

Correctional Institution in Perry.
Thomas, also a resident of

Largo, was 48 at the time of the shooting. According to the sheriffs report, he was walking home from work when a vehicle approached and the occupants offered to sell him drugs. Thomas refused, an argument ensued and a passenger in the vehicle shot and killed him.

Sheriff's detectives found only a single bullet casing at the scene, which was submitted to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement for analysis. Detectives spent months investigating Thomas' death. They talked to people, followed up leads and anonymous tips that came in at the time, but the case remained unsolved.

Detective John Spoor began reviewing the case file once again in June of this year and was able to draw a connection between the weapon used in the Thomas

homicide (a .380 caliber firearm) and the weapon used in a drive-by shooting that occurred in Clearwater Police Department's jurisdiction (just three weeks later) on Nov. 18, 2006. Through review of the FDLE submission on the two shooting cases, the detective learned that the casings found at both crime scenes were fired from the same gun.

Spoor then interviewed multiple subjects associated with the drive-by shooting in Clearwater who revealed information that implicated Lloyd in both crimes. One source told Spoor that Lloyd had pointed toward a funeral flyer showing Thomas' photo and said, "He did that."

Another source told Spoor that Lloyd had admitted to Thomas' murder, and a third source said he had seen Lloyd shoot Thomas. Spoor worked with the Florida Department of Corrections to arrange several prison interviews. He worked with Hillsborough County State Attorney's Office, a Hillsborough County judge, and a private attorney on the arrest of a witness, who they later made a deal with in exchange for his cooperation.

Spoor also coordinated interviews with other witnesses and worked closely with the Pinellas Pasco State Attorney's Office. On Nov. 18, the Sheriff's Office issued a warrant for Lloyd, who will be extradited to Pinellas

County in the near future.

Lloyd is currently serving four five year sentences for the crimes committed in 2006 and 2007, including grand theft, armed burglary, armed robbery, grand theft of a motor vehicle, as well as a life sentence for 2007 Valentine's Day murder in Clearwater.

Baby dolphin rescue is a happy ending story

carded fishing line since July was successfully rescued in a sheltered cove and set free Tuesday,

The textbook example of how to rescue a wild dolphin started at first light and lasted until the sun, hidden behind fog, was nearly at its noon position. It was the longest morning of my life. Undoubtedly, it will be a most memorable morning for the mother dolphin Valiant and her baby

Last week, Dolphin Watch called the rescue of a wild dolphin a seaside search for a needle in a

haystack. The almost impossible challenge was to have all the essential pieces come

together at the same time. Here's how they did it.

The rescue team was a massive assembly of 38 people; it took all of us to make the rescue successful.

We were marine mammal veterinarians, aquarium curators, pathologists, animal handlers, animal trainers, researchers, boat captains, animal behaviorists, and people with the amazing skill of handling a large fishing net.

We were from Argosy University Sarasota, Sea World Orlando, University of Florida Gainesville, Tampa Bay Aquarium, Clearwater Marine Aquarium, Marine Mammal Pathobiology Lab, Florida Wildlife Commission, National Marine Fisheries Service, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and Mote Marine Aquarium.

The most critical part of this flawlessly executed rescue was the other worldly cooperation of the dolphins involved.

Capt. John Heidemann and I set out at dawn to find the injured calf Vidalia and its shy mother Valiant. We've done this quite often lately. But this was the day of the rescue, the day when dozens of people and boats from Port Charlotte to Clearwater and Gainesville were heading our way. Our hearts have been under pressure since sighting Vidalia's fishing line body noose. But this was a new kind of pressure. Today, we HAD

In a mystical moment I could never explain, we found them almost immediately. They swam slowly around a small island near the rescuers' rendezvous point. The dolphins' location could not have been better for the rescue than if they'd

Our little local dolphin calf entangled in dis- hovered off the boat ramp and got into the net themselves. That was the first time I wanted to

> Next, we had to stay with them until the rescuers drove across the state, arrived at the boat ramp, completed a half-hour debriefing, launched their boats, and ultimately paraded over. This took 2.5 hours from the time we first found dolphins Valiant and Vidalia.

> Dolphin Watch has repeatedly emphasized that a boat that is "on dolphins" is only "on dolphins" because the dolphins allow it. Even the most experienced dolphin aficionados can be, and undoubtedly have been, ditched by dolphins who do not wish to be observed. If dolphins are near a boat, it is because they wish to be. You cannot force this to happen, only wish for it very

> However, dolphins more often wish to be around boats handled with the splendid flow of boat captains who know how to drive around them. Granted, the dolphins' cooperation was essential that morning. Capt. Heidemann's silky management of our research boat in those trying hours of staying near, but not too near or too far, was another textbook example of the day.

> Miraculously, Valiant and Vidalia allowed us to remain near until the rescuers were on the water, the net was set, the dolphins captured and the baby dolphin carefully tended by vets. The mom dolphin waited, watching and whistling to her baby nearby (but never threatening the rescuers in any way). The net opened like a yawn and the two dolphins raced back to each other's

> Focused on the rescue scheduled for three days after Veteran's Day, the rescuers probably didn't consciously realize that they saved the baby dolphin in the shallow waters off the shores of the Bay Pines Veteran's Administration Hospital, a sprawling facility charged with the care of veterans wounded in combat. At least soldiers know that someone is shooting at them.

> Later that day, Capt. Jack Steves and First Mate Lani Grano of Hubbard's Sea Adventure called me. They were watching Vidalia jumping and leaping. This time, they felt sure he was jumping for joy.



Black Friday shoppers set historical records

Retailers are reaping the rewards of a successful start to the Christmas shopping season. Shoppers turned out in droves over the Thanksgiving weekend setting records for numbers and money spent.

According to a survey conducted by BIGresearch for the National Retail Federation, a record 226 million people visited stores and websites over the Black Friday weekend, up from 212 million in 2010. Shoppers also spent more, an average of \$398.62, compared to \$364.34 last year. Online shoppers spent an average of \$150.53 - 37.8 percent of their weekend spending.

"Stuffed to the brim from their holiday meals and eager to shop, more consumers than ever turned out for retailers' Black Friday promotions, a promising sign for the economic recovery," said Matthew Shay, NRF president and CEO. "After an historic holiday weekend, retailers know the holiday season is far from over and will continue to look for ways to excite holiday shoppers and build on the momentum we've seen thus far."

Fifty-six percent of those surveyed shopped Thursday, Friday, Saturday or Sunday, up from 53 percent in 2010 and 52 percent in 2009. And more Americans shopped on Thanksgiving Day - 28.7 million, compared to 22.2 million last year.

Stores that opened their doors early took advantage of shoppers' desires to start Black Friday early with 24 percent arriving at midnight. Only 9.5 percent arrived by midnight in 2010 and 3.3 percent in

"The appetite for these early openings is only getting stronger among holiday shoppers, and retailers did a great job providing Americans just what they wanted this weekend - the ability to shop on Black Friday without having to get out of bed before dawn," said Phil Rist, executive vice president of BI-Gresearch.

Organization releases real estate statistics

The Pinellas Realtor Organization recently released its real estate statistics for October 2011.

The organization reports that as the holiday season approaches, it is seeing the usual end of year slowdown in sales. The same trends seen for the last few months continued in October. Overall, listings are continuing to drop.

In the single-family market there was a small month-to-month increase in median price. The median sales price for condos fell to its lowest point so far this year, something that happened at this time last year also. More than 37 percent of condo sales were at \$50,000 or less and of that number nearly 11 percent were sold for less than \$30,000.

According to the organization, overall residential unit sales increased from 890 to 1,079, or 21 percent from October 2010 to October 2011. The median sales price dropped 18 percent from \$131,000 to \$107,000 compared to 2010, but is up \$18,000 year to date. Active listings continued to slide by 32 percent from October 2010 to October 2011, for 10 straight months of reduction in inventory.

Condo sales from October 2010 to October 2011

were up nearly 16 percent. The median sales price for condos had a significant drop from \$104,000 to \$75,000 and condo listings decreased from 5,484 to 4,127, or down 25 percent year over year.

Single-family listings are down from 6,666 to 4,129, or 38 percent. The median sales price is down from \$156,000 to \$127,000 year over year. Single-family sales increased from 528 to 659, or a 25 percent increase from October 2010 to October

According to the organization, the biggest news for the month is the drop off in year over year unit sales for single-family properties under \$100,000. In October 2010 these homes accounted for 40 percent of the single-family market. In October 2011 they accounted for 31 percent of single-family

The organization said that the decreases are most likely due to a steeper decline in inventory of properties less than \$100,000 when compared to \$100,000 and above.

Foreclosure actions in Pinellas did see modest increases in October, but they are still well below what they were a year ago. Compared to the rest of the state Pinellas County has 1 in 442 homes with foreclosure actions versus the state with 1 in 268.

I was one of several individuals who volunteered to speak to students during the Great American Teach-In, Nov. 17. Reviewing wreckage of Penn State

I went to college at Bucknell, about 60 miles away from Penn State. We heard Penn State was a great party school, and on some weekends a few carloads of Bucknellians would head down the road to State College, Pa., to confirm the rumor. On the way they'd pass Penn State students headed for Bucknell, which had its own minor reputation as a party school.

Over the years my awareness of Penn State was about the same as yours. I knew it was a big school that had some fearsome football teams, coached by a respected, horn-rimmed little guy named Joe Paterno. Penn State was JoePa and vice versa. That was all I knew or needed to know.

No more. Today the whole world is getting a bellyful of learning about Penn State, Paterno, the assistant coach named Sandusky, and the sad and frightening ease by which a university's reputation can be demolished. The months ahead will, I hope, give us the full truth and scope of what appears to be a shameful tragedy.

Are there any lessons that we can pull out of the wreckage? Let's hope so.

For example: if you're a young athlete, steer clear of coaches or any other adults who want to shower with the players. Or for that matter, who want to do anything with the players after practice sessions are finished. When I was in high school, we didn't have any fancypants hokum about the importance of "bonding" between coaches and players. The coach was simply the boss. During the game, you did what he told you to do. Whether he liked you, or you liked him, didn't matter. His wife didn't hold pizza parties for the team. And if any coach, naked or otherwise, had entered

the shower room when the players were cleaning up, we would have had the same response: "What is that creepy guy doing in

In the old days, mistrust of adults was pervasive among kids. It probably saved millions of us from the kind of "bonding" that Jerry Sandusky allegedly practiced with his boys. If a coach or adult counselor put his arm around you or slapped you on your butt as he said, "Good work, Charlie!", alarm bells went off in our heads. Grown-ups were, in many ways, the enemy. We tried to respect them, but we didn't want them as buddies or confidantes. Hugging was suspect. Hands-off was the default mode. Obviously that has changed over the years.

Maybe I lived in a dream world, but my memory of my early years was that if you saw anyone - adult or otherwise - making unwanted sexual advances on another person (male or female), the only acceptable response was to assault the aggressor, maim him, or at the very least raise such a noise that half the town would come running. To me, the most horrible aspect of the Penn State scandal is the failure of eyewitnesses to do anything like that when they saw Sandusky molesting young boys.

But that didn't happen at Penn State. If Sandusky had been a nobody, he'd have been in jail - or crucified - within hours. But he was a coach, a well-known part of Penn State's idolized and profitable football machine. Anyone (including Joe Paterno and the university's president) pointing a finger at Sandusky would have been taking a huge risk. The last thing anyone seemed to care about was whether a powerful pedophile was loose on campus. Much higher on the priority list was the \$106 million in revenue the football program had brought in during 2010. Today it looks as if Penn State may need every dollar of that income to settle the lawsuits likely to be filed by Sandusky's victims and their families.

The Penn State story is a dirty one. You read all the angles to it and you want to take a shower (preferably alone). It has all the ingredients for a sensational movie, or several movies. It has cowardice, sexual perversion, cover-ups, wealth, ambition and the fall from grace of a much-loved man. I'll bet that jockeying for the publishing and screen rights has already begun.

Will Penn State survive this chapter? Of course; it's still an important center of learning. Will Joe Paterno's legend survive? Not likely. Will Penn State reform its football program? Never. Would you send your son or daughter to Penn State? That's the question thousands of parents will ask themselves in the years ahead. The university's admissions office is pondering it right now. Nervously.

In Fla. casino fight, all bets are off

An international resort company wants to build a huge casino on the shore of Biscayne Bay, where the Miami Herald now stands.

Journalists aren't sentimental but they do appreciate irony. Having editorially crusaded for decades against opening South Florida to Vegas-style gaming, the Herald will soon be humbly relocated to make way for an extrav-

agant \$2 billion palace of wagering. Given the wheezing state of the newspaper industry, we should have negotiated with the buyers to save a little corner of their casino for our newsroom. The weekly take from one row of slot machines would probably cover the payroll for a dozen first-rate reporters

and editors. The casino project by Genting Americas would be one of three mega-resorts permitted in Florida under a bill filed in the Legislature. The deal is no slam-dunk, even though the gambling industry has enough dough to

paper the halls of the state capitol. Here's the glitch. There's this little outfit up in Orlando that doesn't like the casino plan one bit. Disney is the name, and it has the money, the lobbyists and the insider connections to fight back and win.

Disney sees big-time gambling as big-time competition. One argument is demographic the people who'd fly all the way to Miami just to play craps aren't necessarily the same people who'd shlep their kids up to the Magic Kingdom. At least, they won't do it on the same trip.

The counter argument is that, like the major resorts in Vegas and Nassau, South Florida mega-casinos would market heavily toward a wholesome family experience. All sorts of cool distractions would be available for Mom and the kids, while Dad fritters away their college fund at the roulette wheel.

It's a free country, and people can spend their money however wisely or stupidly they choose. Gamblers inevitably lose, which is why casino companies are so rich and Dis-

Every dollar spent in the casino is a dollar unspent elsewhere. That's why opposition to the casinos now includes the Florida Retail Federation, the Restaurant and Lodging Association, the Florida Chamber of Commerce and basically the entire theme-park indus-

Gambling's top political ally, state Sen. Ellyn Bogdanoff, recently said: "It blows my mind that a business group would say competition is a bad thing.'

Apparently, the Fort Lauderdale Republican dwells in some weird parallel universe where Ford salesmen are elated to see Honda open a dealership down the street.

Last week, Genting Americas traveled to Tallahassee to wow lawmakers with its plans

for Resorts World Miami. A top executive from the firm made the kind of sky-high promises that might charitably be described as fanciful. The president, Colin Au, predicted the

casino bill would produce \$1.7 billion in state revenues, along with 100,000 permanent jobs. A study commissioned by Genting said income from the combined three gambling resorts could be as high as \$6 billion annually - more than all the joints on the Vegas strip put together.

Floridians accustomed to preposterous hype will hoot at these numbers. Even Bogdanoff cautioned the gaming company not to go overboard with its pitch.

The gap between reason and whimsy is vast. A recent report by state economists projected that the new casinos might generate \$980 million in gaming revenues, which is only about \$5.1 billion shy of Genting's sunny forecast. Anticipating pushback from the theme

parks, Au also guaranteed nonstop airline service to Miami from Asia, where the company is based and where much of the gambling business is expected to come from. He added: "I'm even prepared to guarantee

Disney 100,000 tickets that we will sell for them in our resort."

What Au didn't say, and will never say, is that Genting's casinos have the same basic mission as Disney World and Universal: to separate tourists from as much of their money as possible before they go anyplace

By the time they get to Orlando, Dad might have a theme-park ticket in his wallet but little else. On the bright side, spending the night in a minivan at the Simba parking lot will be an unforgettable bonding experience for the whole family.





Still, a veritable parade of films will open in limited release as both American and international filmmakers rush to get potential Oscar contenders on the big screen before the end of the year. 'Answers to Nothing'

Against the backdrop of a missing girl case, lost souls throughout Los Angeles search for meaning and redemption and affect each other in ways they don't always see.

Ryan and Kate are in a strained marriage. They are trying to have a baby, but instead of bringing them closer together the difficulties are tearing them apart. Two strangers, sharing a home, they each lead private lives unbeknownst to each other. Ryan, grew up listening to the impossible romantic story of his grandparents' courtship, but isn't even sure he believes in love. He hates his mother for believing that his father is coming back, even though he left her 10 years ago, and he hates himself for following in his father's steps of infidelity.

Tara is a young singer at the center of Ryan's infidelity who despite all her ferocious self-confidence on stage can't seem to stand up for herself when it comes to Ryan.

Despite his inability to take care of his own personal life, Ryan is a therapist who tries to help others find their way. Allegra is his patient who is trying to understand her own type of self-hatred - the resentment of her own race. 





Theater review

'Sensuous Senator' parodies private lives of politicians

As the country hurtles toward the primary season and Republican candidates vying for the presidential nomination perform Punch-and-Judy antics in a series of televised debates, accusations and insults are flying and at least one former frontrunner has been undermined by scandal.

The timing couldn't be any better for Early Bird

Dinner Theatre's production of Michael Parker's "The Sensuous Senator," running through Dec. 23, at the Ital-



ian American Club, 200 S. McMullen Booth Road. "The Sensuous Senator" takes place in the 1990s and was probably at least partially inspired by that decade's many alleged indignities which besmirched politicians and public servants in every branch of

government and on either side of the aisle. As the farce opens, Parker introduces Senator Harry Douglas. In Harry, the playwright has crafted a smooth-talking presidential candidate who has based his campaign on morality and family values. In announcing his candidacy, Harry boasts about his fidelity, his moral fiber and his integrity - and protests vehemently when a reporter from the "National Intruder" questions him about his relationship with his secretary.

A short while later, after his wife leaves for an engagement in Chicago, Harry finds himself alone and immediately phones his secretary, Veronica, and invites her to spend the night.

When she reports that she has other plans, Harry immediately calls an escort agency and arranges for an escort.

Of course, this is a farce – so everything that can go wrong with Harry's scheme does, leading to nonstop amusement.

 $\bar{\text{Toby}}$ Manion stars as Harry in one of his best performances to date. In the opening scene, when Harry is announcing his intention to run for president, Manion projects the perfect mixture of charisma and bluster.

Suave and silver-tongued one minute and impishly libidinous the next, Manion's possesses an

ability to maintain an aura of plausible deniability as the situation he created through his own deceit and disloyalty quickly spirals out of control. It's that overconfidence on the part of the main character that Harry can still control the outcome - that makes the endless improbabilities so much more hi-

Equally talented in this production is Rick Kistner who plays a senior Congressman and friend of Harry, Clyde Salt. Clyde's ill-timed arrival at Harry's house sets into motion the series of events that thwart the intended tryst. It's unfair to categorize "The Sensuous Senator" strictly as a bedroom farce because a significant number of laughs are generated not by classic farce moments but by political satire. Clyde's mocking commentary on modern politics will keep this play topical for decades to come, and Kistner injects an understated cynicism to his character to underscore the sardonic observations.

Ian MacCallum plays Harry's nephew, Jack Maguire, a first-term Congressman. After he drinks a brandy - laced with sleeping powder intended for Clyde - poor novice Jack finds himself pursued by Harry's persistent escort. MacCallum does a great job of making the character institutionally ignorant and terminally gullible.

Barbara Anthony is excellent as Fiona, the escort trying to keep Jack from nodding off; and Tracy Borgatti's rendition of the imposing Veronica is outstanding whether she's scolding Harry for botching their rendezvous or playing hide-and-seek above and beneath the bed.

Solid performances also are given by Francine Wolf as Lois Douglas, Susan Dearden as the reporter Miss Morrison and Brent Ballard as the Po-

The satire never overwhelms the inherent silliness of "The Sensuous Senator." Parker's farce is a gift to those already growing weary of election-year politics: It's enjoyable escapist fun that elicits lots of laughter with well-crafted political caricatures.
