### Hebron Board of Finance Appoints Frank Nicolo to Vacancy

The Hebron Board of Finance has named Frank Nicolo of Old Colchester Rd. to the vacancy on the board. The board's action was unanimous. In other action last night, the board authorized chairman Harry Wirth and clerk Albert Cooney to contact the three parties to the town report and to select one to do the printing work. Wirth reports that the material for the town report is just about ready to go to the printer with the exception of the auditor's report. The audit has not been completed as yet and the printing of the town report cannot be done until it is complete.

First Selectman P. John Parnham reported to the board that initial steps have been taken to borrow the \$40,000 authorized in the current budget to pay for capital expenditures, including the excavator recently purchased for the land fill operation at the refuse area. Kinsey Named  
First Selectman P. John Parnham has appointed Kinsey as the first selectman. The board of selectmen will hold its organizational meeting next week.

Parnham reported at the weekly selectmen's meeting last night that the excavator for the refuse area had been delivered and was being used. The fill operation will begin soon.

Effective Oct. 22, the hours of the refuse area will be changed to Tuesday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Sunday, 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The Board of Selectmen is requesting for a person to act as refuse area attendant during the hours the area is open to the public. Anyone interested in the position, is requested to contact Parnham.

It was reported at the meeting that a portion of Old Andover Rd. had been widened and graded. Work has also been done on Chestnut Hill Road and Stone House Road.

R. & H. Rehus Memorial, operators of one of the refuse pick-up services in Hebron, attended the meeting with Harvey Desrosiers, owner of Forest Park. Desrosiers, who was representing some 70 families who use the refuse pick-up service, told selectmen the families are concerned that the service might be curtailed in the winter because storms and the possibility that the refuse area might not be plowed.

Richard Holland, reported that the firm received several inquiries this week from customers about the winter situation. The firm charged that the double in the mind of the customers were the result of the competitor, Marcus Atherton, selling their customers on the dump area was the last area to be plowed in the winter. The firm further stated that it felt the Atherton, who is the third selectman, had used his position in the town to make customers change the service.

### State Gun Law Discussed for Violence Unit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Connecticut's law requiring a permit for purchase of a pistol was discussed Thursday before a President's commission on gun control. The commission is a guide for gun laws in all states for all firearms.

Two spokesmen from the gun industry told the President's commission on violence that they support licensing of all firearms owners and promised to plug proposed state legislation to regulate gun sales.

However, they continue to oppose registration of the guns as unnecessary.

The Connecticut pistol regulation was introduced by Paul A. Benke, president of the Firearms Division of Hartford.

Speaking for manufacturers who produce 90 per cent of the pistols, Benke said that the law is a requirement for the buyer of a handgun to have a permit. Permits are issued only after a police check, he explained, and persons with criminal records, minors and the mentally ill could not be licensed.

Benke appeared with Philip H. Burdick, who presided over the hearing. Burdick, who presided over the hearing, said that he had been passed by Congress and sent to the President's desk.

Benke said the pistol manufacturers would support legislation patterned after the Connecticut law when their state legislators meet next year.

The gun-fire executive questioned, however, the credibility of any reported link between the crime rate and the dramatic increase in firearms sales in recent years.

Tomorrow is the last day for eligible Connecticut applicants to register for voting in the Nov. 5 national and state elections.

At 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., voter-making sessions will be conducted tomorrow in the Manchester town clerk's office in the Municipal Building.

Eligible applicants must be at least 21 years of age, Manchester residents for at least six months, must be U.S. citizens, and must be able to read in the English language.

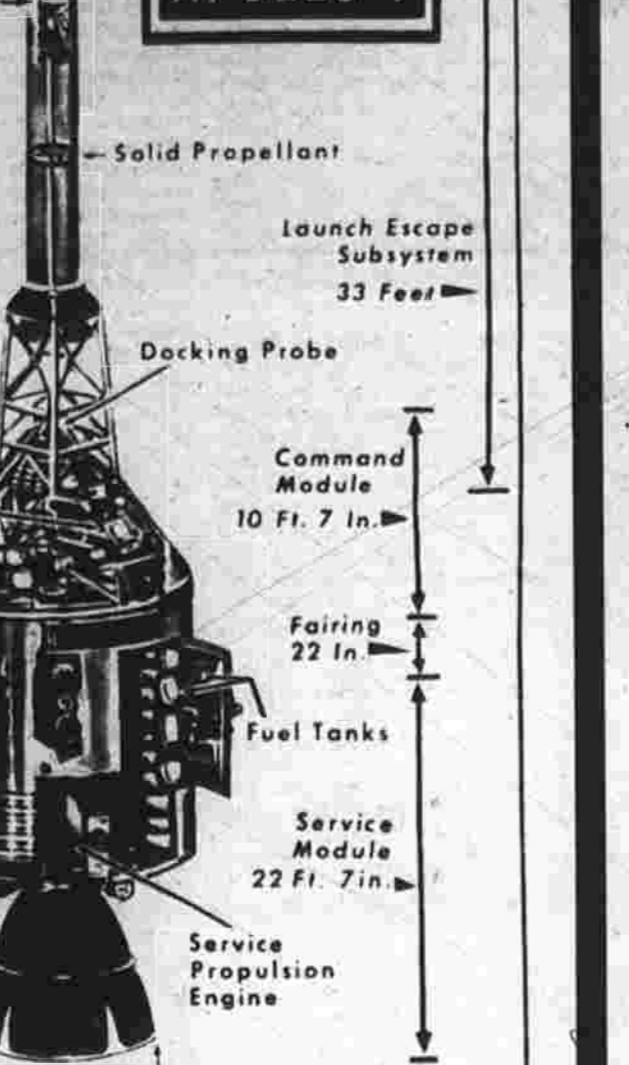

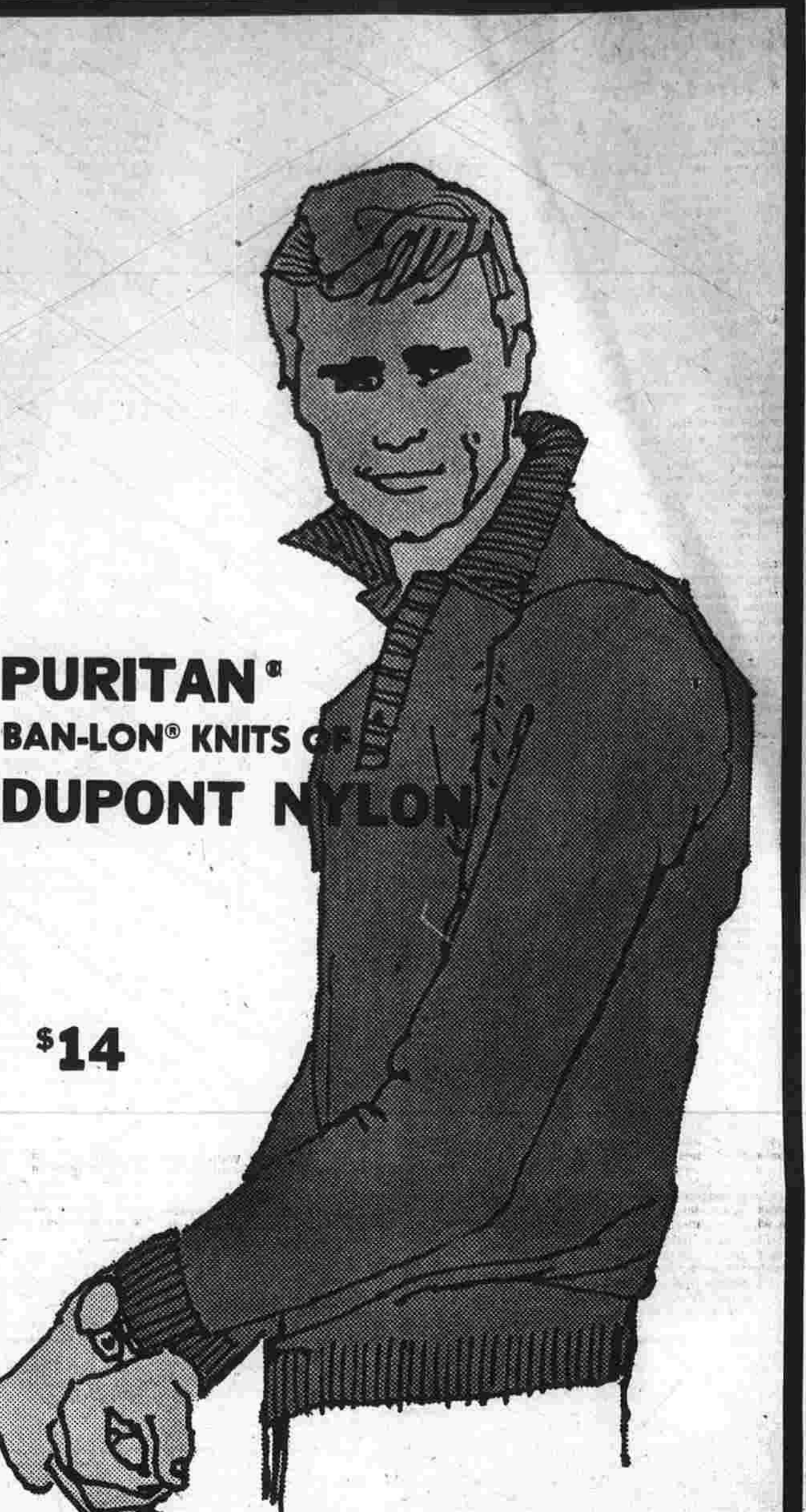

GIFFHALTER (AP)—Prime Ministers Harold Wilson of Britain and Ian Smith of Rhodesia faced a possible stumbling point today as they met for the second day in hopes of resolving the three-year dispute over the breakaway African colony. Both leaders took the expected hard stands in the opening session of the talks. Wilson, repeating views that have previously proved irresolvable, said he was "tough going" but both men are deeply committed to a thorough attempt at a settlement, returning to constitutional rule of the nation of four million Africans now governed by leaders chosen by a white minority of the big the groundwork for the next election due by 1971. He expects an upturn in Britain's economic fortunes and sees a possible Rhodesia settlement as a great feather in his cap. Failure in the Rhodesia talks would be a severe blow to his strategy. As liabilities, he listed \$45,647 in mortgages, a \$2,200 bank loan, and \$2,970 under miscellaneous.

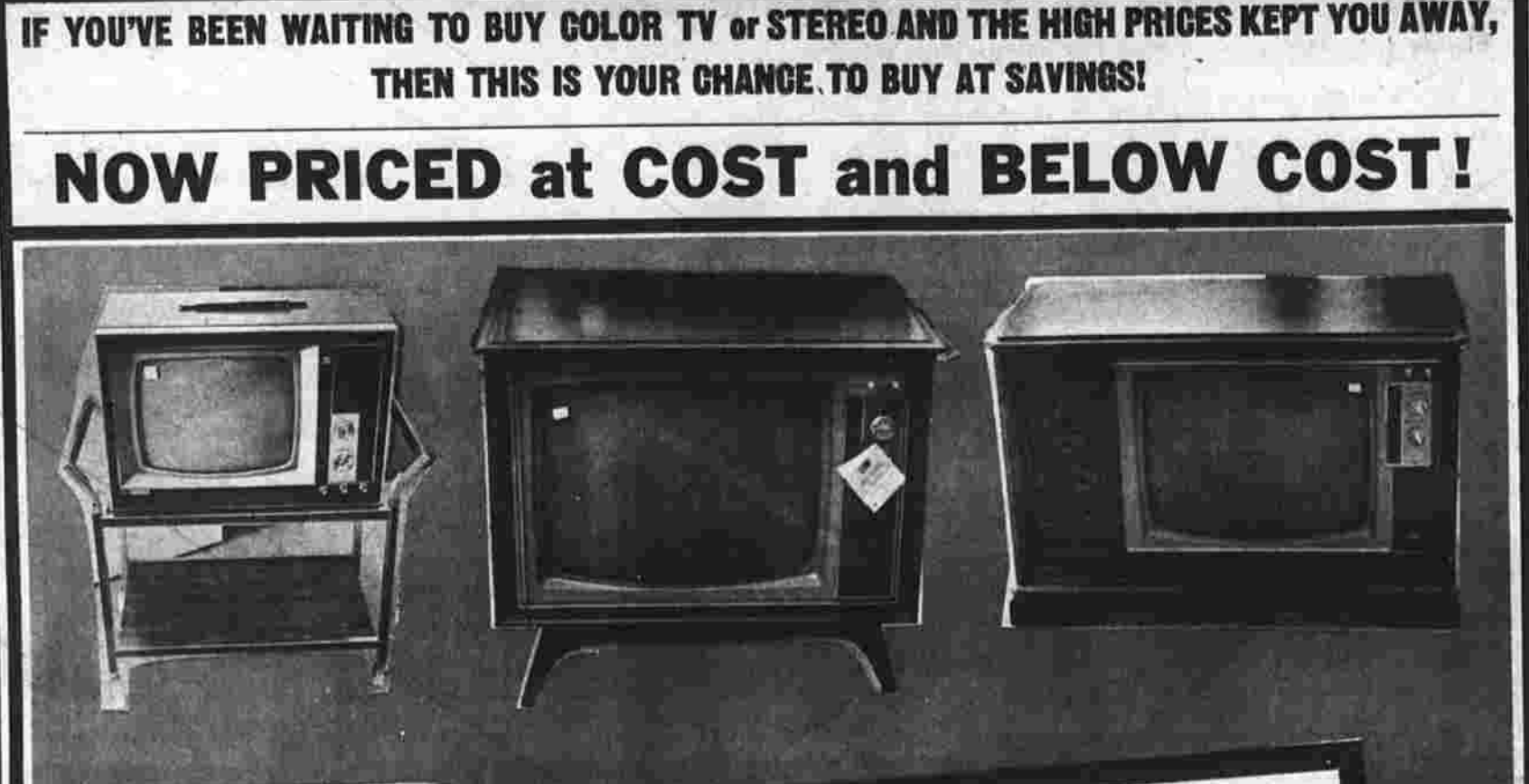

### George White Dies at 74; Filmed 'Scandals' in 30s

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — George White, out-time theatrical producer whose "Scandals" were leading Broadway shows last Thursday in Mt. Sinai Hospital. He was 74.

### In 10-Day Chase U.S. Army Sergeant Escapes North Viets

MAN ME THOUT, Vietnam struck out again when a heavy rain began to fall.

On the night of Oct. 5, he saw a fire and figured it was in a South Vietnamese camp. He was in a 10-day flight through Cambodia, and South Vietnamese troops were not sure he had escaped until they broke through the central highlands, military sources reported today.

They said Sgt. Buddy Wright, of Wallonia, Ohio, stumbled into a South Vietnamese army camp last Sunday pointing to his stomach and saying, "Chop chop, chop chop" which means food to the Vietnamese.

The sources said Wright gave this account of his capture and escape.

He became separated from his platoon Sept. 22 when it moved out during an operation and North Vietnamese seized him southeast of the Duc Lap Special Forces camp near the Cambodian border, 128 miles north of Saigon.

He said the North Vietnamese troops marched him west for two days so he thought he was in Cambodia. They did not treat him, but took his wallet, identity tag and boots to prevent him from escaping.

North Vietnamese interrogators asked him the name of his unit, which is the 1st Battalion, 2nd Infantry, 4th Division. But Wright told him he did not know.

The interrogators asked him what kind of a noncommissioned officer didn't even know his unit.

He said he was a very stupid NCO.

The North Vietnamese had an assault rifle pointed at him during the interrogation. At night, a guard came by every 30 minutes and pointed a light at him.

During his fifth night of captivity, Wright escaped. He ran all night and all the next day. The North Vietnamese chased him.

"When I saw the North Vietnamese my first thought was, 'I am dead,'" Wright later told other American soldiers. "When they didn't kill me, my will to survive came pretty strong and I decided I will try hard to escape. When I first escaped, I felt I could make it."

He thought it was directly west of Duc Lap and had to run east. After two days I became weak and I was not quite sure where I was. I thought I was losing my way and I was scared.

On the second day of his escape, he could see North Vietnamese troops still looking for him. He hid eight hours then

### Post Office Alters Strategy For Anti-Smut Campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Post Office has abandoned censorship as a weapon in the war against smut and is training its guns only on dealers who mail pornography to people who complain.

Main goal of this new strategy, says Chief Postal Inspector Harry B. Montague, is to keep advertisements for smut out of the hands of children and young people.

Montague indicates the best way to halt the flow of mail obscenity is to exchange obscene photographs and reading matter.

Montague said in an interview that since 1967, the courts and the Justice Department have hindered the Post Office in its fight against pornography, and battle lines had to be redrawn.

Montague, chief inspector of mail, says the department reported a record 1,089 mail fraud arrests—a 52 per cent increase over fiscal 1967—and inspectors will get an assist in this field by a law enacted earlier this month by Congress.

In the past, the Post Office has been required to present an irrefutable case proving intent to defraud before taking legal action to halt the flow of mail back to an operator. The new law, awaiting President Johnson's signature, will permit the postal department to halt shady schemes—at least temporarily—merely by proving misrepresentation.

Acting under this statute, the Post Office has received since April nearly 75,000 complaints about material which recipients said they'd received through the mails and which was "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

The new law makes it possible for individuals to demand that pornography peddlers be ordered to remove their names from any mailing list the peddler has or controls.

Violations are referred to the Justice Department, which can apply to federal courts to force compliance with the law.

# In the Children's Ward at Manchester Hospital

"Mommy, don't leave me!" . . . A child's plaintive cry from a hospital bed is a heart-breaking moment for worried parents. Tense scenes of this sort are almost a thing of the past at Manchester Memorial Hospital. A policy established last year by the hospital's Pediatric Department permits parents to visit their children at all hours of the day or night. Family members are, in fact, encouraged to participate in the child's care by feeding, dressing and helping with other simple tasks. It gives peace of mind to the child and is at the same time a valuable assistance to the pediatric staff.

Our liberal visiting hours combined with parental assistance in child care has produced remarkable results," says Dr. Frank H. Horton, chief of the hospital's Pediatric Division. "Parents worry less, and their child adjusts more readily to the strange environment, which often makes for a more rapid recovery," he adds.

Pediatrics maintains its own special care unit for critically ill children and post-operative cases. Constant bedside care on a round-the-clock schedule is given in this unit by registered nurses especially trained for pediatric duties.

Unlike most of the other hospital units, the Pediatric Department at MCHH has been treating fewer patients in recent years. Antibiotics, inoculations and improved health care are some of the factors that contribute to this improved health picture.

Almost three-quarters of the 1,600 children admitted to Pediatrics last year were there for surgery. Many underwent tonsillectomy operations, and many more were orthopedic cases involving fractured bones. Medical cases were in the minority.

Patients ranging in age from infants through the teens are cared for by the Pediatric Division. One reason many teens choose this department over others may be that the popular specialty catered menu features hot dogs, hamburgers, ice cream, etc. Another chief attraction here is the big color television set, plus an aquarium and lots of toys and games.

One thing missing that the eight pediatric doctors on the staff hope for in the future is a conference room where parents and doctors may hold consultations. A fund has been established by the pediatric staff to furnish such a room, but space is not available now.

The hospital's Pediatric Department was established by the late Dr. Howard Boyd. He served as chief of Pediatrics for over 20 years.

Members of the Women's Auxiliary at MCHH are frequent and popular visitors in the Pediatric Department. Some of these women act as foster mothers to the youngsters, cuddling the lonely ones whose parents cannot be there and reading bedtime stories until the lights go out.

The Auxiliary volunteers also operate a special arts and crafts room for children, providing instruction and supervision on a regular scheduled basis.

# 3 Plans Weighed to Meet Student Rise

The Board of Education is considering three alternatives to the school enrollment problems anticipated next year when an additional 600 to 800 students enter the local schools.

The alternatives include construction of the planned eight-room addition to Meadowbrook School, the leasing of portable classrooms, or the use of all available storage rooms, closets and the Hicks cafeteria as permanent classrooms for the year.

Enrollment at the three local schools presently stands at 7,071 students. Next year's expected increase, based on present home construction estimates prepared by the Planning and Zoning Commission, will add from 625 to 800 students for the second consecutive year, bringing the local student enrollment to 7,696 to 7,871.

The school board, in reviewing the enrollment projections, requested Superintendent Robert Brantion to prepare more detailed alternatives and solutions to the problem, including comparisons with the present enrollment breakdowns.

Brantion noted the 425 to 500 student increase is about equal to 25 per cent of the present enrollment. Added to Superintendent's 30 per cent increase, the local schools will be absorbing a 55 per cent increase in enrollment in a two-year period.

The superintendent presented a plan for playing the expected increase within the present buildings, already considered tied to capacity.

Class size averages at Hicks would increase to 26 for the second grade, 23 1/2 for the third grade, and 30 for the fourth grade.

Class size averages for the middle school grades five through eighth and for the high school would not be provided.

Present enrollment in the various grades is listed as follows:

The Hicks School is expected to absorb 128 additional students in grades 2 through 4 including five second grade classes, 10 third grade classrooms and eight fourth grade classes.

Combined middle school and high school enrollment projections at the high school indicate a 200-student increase next year.

Teachers in Classes

The plan would use all available supply rooms and closets at the schools (particularly the high school), turning them into classrooms. The partitions for the Hicks Memorial School would be again put up separating the cafeteria into two classrooms.

The only reason large closets and supply rooms at Meadowbrook and Hicks schools were not recommended as classrooms is that the majority are being used for their purpose or as school libraries.

The reading teacher at Hicks is located in a closet, and teacher aides at Meadowbrook are housed in a still smaller closet. The teachers and aides sometimes work with students in the closets.

The perpetually handicapped class is located on the stage at Hicks, and the library is located in the locker rooms. The music class is in a storage room, which has been moved to the shower area.

Specialized teachers such as music and art and reading have to transport their equipment with them, since there are no remaining rooms at the schools to house them.

The situation at the high school is somewhat better but even there the Guidance Room, designed for testing and committee purposes this year, is being used for typing classes, and the lecture room and cafeteria double as study halls when not set up for their original purposes.

The 50-member band is practicing in an earth science class-

room which will be needed for classes next year.

Cafeteria Problems

The problems of feeding the students will be complicated if Brantion's proposal is adopted. It would result in the closing of the Hicks cafeteria again, resulting in the 600 students in second through fourth grade eating in their classrooms.

The high school cafeteria lunch at 10:30 and ending at 1:30 if it is to accommodate the number of students in the school, which will house 200 more students than it was designed to accommodate.

School systems are required by state law to provide teachers with duty free lunch periods according to school board chairman David Cook, which would result in the need of hiring over 100 teacher aides to supervise the classes for the half-hour lunch period, which is termed an impossible situation by both board members and Brantion.

# Meadowbrook Addition Favored

Viewing the three alternatives designed to meet the heavy enrollment increase in local schools next year, the Board of Education and Superintendent of Schools Robert Brantion appeared Wednesday to favor the immediate construction of eight additional classrooms to the Meadowbrook School.

Other measures would probably have to accompany the plan, but would also be required if the school board opted for the leasing of portable classrooms.

The eight-room addition was planned for in the design of the core facilities of the school, including the all-purpose symposium cafeteria.

Working plans are in existence and have already been including Chairman David Cook and Secretary Mrs. Barbara Kalas, voiced the opinion that the cost of the addition could possibly be paid for out of the town budget eliminating the need for paying interest charges over a long period. State aid reimbursement would then be expected to cut the actual school construction costs in half.

The eight-room addition, originally proposed as part of the Meadowbrook School in 1960, was voted down at a town meeting. The bid costs for the addition were \$90,000 at that time, and would now be estimated

at \$250,000, if both Hartford and Bolton to be explained, due to the increase in building costs since then.

The eight-classroom addition would be built immediately, and scheduled to open in September, the board hoped.

It would be ready a year before the Middle School which is still in the process of having working drawings made before being sent out to bid. The bid can be erected in a day.

The costs rise, however, if the bathroom or lavatory facilities are included. The town would be responsible for connecting the buildings to a water supply and to sewer lines or septic system installations, including the portable classrooms involved.

The portable classrooms would be leased by a "hydro-matic" electric heat system, as described by Brantion as electric hot water heat.

Brantion did indicate the town would probably settle down to about 500 students a year, a possible total school enrollment for the school year 1974-75 (five years away) finally proposed as part of the Meadowbrook School in 1960, was voted down at a town meeting. The bid costs for the addition were \$90,000 at that time, and would now be estimated

at \$250,000, if both Hartford and Bolton to be explained, due to the increase in building costs since then.

The rooms can be leased on a two-to-five-year basis, at costs of \$3,000 each for a two-year period, \$2,000 for three years or \$2,500 for five years, or bought outright for \$9,500 each.

They can be constructed on regular blacktop, according to Brantion, if permitted by local zoning regulations. The school can be ready for use until September 1970 at the earliest.

The bathroom or lavatory facilities are included. The town would be responsible for connecting the buildings to a water supply and to sewer lines or septic system installations, including the portable classrooms involved.
