## Hallock Card Award Winner

Rudy Roy's work as Public Relations Chairman for the Perfins Club has earned him the 1983 Hallock Card Award.

In conjunction with the 35th anniversary of the Perfins Club, Rudy was instrumental in coordinating the development of the lighthouse perfin (US DES 50). He is also currently working on another article for the Perfins Bulletin.

Lest we assume that perfinners are myopic — Rudy is a member of the American Philatelic Society, the APS Writers Unit #30, the American Philatelic Research Library, the American Philatelic Congress, the American Revenue Association, the Canal Zone Study Group, the US Posessions Philatelic Society, and the Cuban Philatelic Society of America. He is immediate past president of the Virginia Beach Stamp Club and did such a great job as chairman of the recently concluded VAPEX'83 that he was made chairman for VAPEX'84. He is also a member of the Norfolk Philatelic Society and the Tidewater International Topics Society.

Rudy, when not working on perfins, is a specialist on Cuban stamps. He has coauthored a handbook on Cuban philately which he is planning to update in the near future.

## SERIES OF 1902 REVISITED BY HARRY RICKARD

An interesting history and analysis of perfins on the United States Regular Series of 1902 was updated by the late Ray Crow on page 5 of the January 1978 Perfins Bulletin.

Increased membership, continued publicity, and more exhibiting of perfins have brought many old perfins out of hiding. This listing is intended to update Ray's revised list — only patterns or values not listed in the 1978 listing (or in the original 1973 Corliss list) are cataloged here.

Users of this list should note that at the current time there are two patterns cataloged as 672-1A; the pattern referred to on the 1902 issues is the one with the narrow bar on the G.

### CANADA CODE SPEEDS MAIL

A recent note from Canadian member Robert C. Smith of Ottawa brings some information about the Canadian Postal Code to our attention. Since many members correspond with friends in Canada the information is relavant to many of us.

Canada has not put on a full scale advertising campaign to publicise their rules, so they are not well known. Further, letters which do not conform to the rules are not sorted in the normall processing of mails — they are hand sorted, with a subsequent delay.

The rules reprinted below are taken directly from the Canadian "Directory of Postal Codes".

- 1. Always show the CODE as the last item of the address.
- 2. Always print the CODE in block capitals.
- 3. Do not use periods or other punctuation anywhere in the CODE.
- 4. Leave a clear space, the equivalent to one character, between the two parts of the CODE.
- 5. Never underline the CODE.
- 6. Do not join the characters of the CODE in any way.
- 7. Whenever possible, place the CODE on a line by itself at the end of the address. For example:

Mr. W. M. Smith, 150 Nepean St., Apt. 5, Ottawa, Ontario K2P 0B6

In cases where it may be impossible, because of addressing machine limitations, to use a separate line for the CODE, it may be shown on the same line as the city and province, providing it is separated from whatever precedes it by a space equivalent to two characters, as in the following example:

Mr. W. M. Smith, 150 Nepean St., Apt.5, Ottawa, Ont. K2P 0b6

Letters addressed to this country from overseas should follow the same format, with the CODE on a separate line if possible, or after the word "CANADA" and separated from it by a suitable space.

 If you use any subscription or account numbers on the envelope, they should be written above the address and not placed where they could be confused with the CODE.

- 9. No part of the address should appear below the CODE on the envelope. "For attention of...." and similar messages should be shown above the address.
- 10. Please continue to write the entire address, including the street and number, and the apartment or suite number if applicable, on all mail.
- 11. All previous zone numbers are withdrawn. The zone numbers are not incorporated into the CODE.

The rules are quite clear as to where the CODE should appear. Let's help ourselves by helping the Canadian mail handlers do their job efficiently.

I was recently fortunate enough to find and purchase a copy of the 1902 Scott Stamp & Coin Co. Ld. Standard Postage Stamp Catalogue. It is fascinating to read! Over time, several significant changes have occurred in both the format and the content of the catalog.

The first and most obvious change which has taken place over the intervening years is size. In 1902 the entire world's listings fit neatly into a volume 6 1/2 X 4 1/4 X 1 inch in size (17 X 11 X 2.4 cms). The volume is 689 pages long and each page has only two columns of stamp listings. The largest number of stamps which I have seen in any column is 61 but they average around 30 listings per column.

The numbering system used by the cataloguers has been completely redone since that time. The system now used is similar in that it recognizes classes of stamps (regular and commemorative, semi-postal, air mail, postage due, etc.), but at that

time letter designators (none, B, C, and J respectively) were not used.

Number series were used; they were assigned to accomodate the relative numbers of stamps issued in each category by each country. A brief example — for Great Britain the listings are as follows: #1-126 regular issues, #201-249 revenue stamps used for postage, #301-380 official stamps (in four distinct blocks for I.R. Official, Govt. Parcels, O.W. Official, and Army Official), #401-420 & 501-522 envelopes (Government and private issues respectively), #601-678 compound envelopes, #701-705 registration envelopes, #801-815 wrappers, #1101-1107 British Offices in Levant, and, finally, #1201 envelope (Br. Ofc. in Levant).

Those familiar with the Scott Catalog of the present will notice the difference in the numbering and also the problem that came about. The numbering was inflexible — when air mail came into existence there was no place to put it, when Great Britain issued its 201st regular series stamp there was no place to put it, etc.

The change in allowable categories should also be obvious to any user of the current volumes. Scott no longer lists any postal stationary or revenue categories, nor does it catalog such items as stamps of letter cards used as postage, stamps of wrappers used as postage, telegraph stamps used as postage, and several other types of postal franking.

All this is the long way around to the point — for perfin collectors, at least. In three separate places in this catalog there are listings of perfins, an almost defunct category in the current catalog. In the 1902 version Luxembourg, Salvador, and Tunis are shown as having government issued perfins. The listings are reproduced along with this article.

The usage by both Salvador and by Luxembourg was on official stamps. Tunis (now listed as Tunesia) used their perfin to designate postage due stamps ("Unpaid Letter").

Of these three listings, only that for Salvador remains in the current catalog. They appear in the O174-O208 range in the current numbering system.

The only other specific current listing in the Scott Catalog, of which I am aware, is France C6b, the EIPA30 perfin.

The current practice in this catalog is to footnote perfins where they are of official origin and where the catalogers deem it fitting. Thus several general listings do appear but they will be no help to the specialist. Among the countries so footnoted are Canada (O.H.M.S.), Costa Rica (star), Great Britain (H.M.O.W., B.T., O.W. and S.O. with crowns and H.M.S.O. and D.S.I.R. both without crowns), Hungary (triangle), and Switzerland (cross). There is no mention of private perfins, except in the glossary.

My run through the Scott Catalog has caused me to wonder just how many of these holey stamps which we collect so avidly are known to the general collecting public; just how many of the patterns appear, either in direct listing, in footnote

form, or in illustrations, in the major catalogues of the philatelic community at large. As an example Michel refers to (but does not extensively catalogue) the POL perfins used in Germany and Yvert lists the EIPA30 perfin. Does anyone have a feel for the number of perfins which may be currently listed in the major, world stamp catalogs?

REQUESTS will be filled as rapidly as possible. Obviously, some volumes are more popular than others and there are waiting lists for them. That's why it is so important that you return material promptly.

SPECIAL LIBRARY RATE may be used to return material to the library, but the package must be clearly addressed to The Perfins Club Library, 1606 Britney Drive, Sherwood, Ark. 72116

SUGGESTIONS that will keep you in good standing with the Librarian and with the post office:

- Don't include personal notes when you return material by library rates. The USPS frowns on such and they do check. One member got stunned for \$4.75 postage due on a six-line note.
- Please make sure you return the library charge sheet included with the shipment when it is sent to you. That's how the Librarian keeps up with things.
- Please be sure to reimburse the Librarian for the postage used on the shipment to you. Reimbursement in U.S. funds or stamps only, please... no foreign stamps.




## NEW PATTERN AND BLOCK OF FOUR




Ed Haack, who is also a member of the Oregon Stamp Society, has sent along the accompanying illustration. The block of four pictured here was used to frank the OSS' August bulletin. Four hundred fifty blocks of four of the new \$.05 Pearl Buck definitive stamp were perforated with Ed's (three) and the OSS' (one) perforators. The blocks, carrying four different perfins, are very unusual items. Note also — the "Portland rose" pattern is new; introduced by Ed on May 22, 1983 during the Pan Pacific Show.

### NEW U.S. CATALOG NUMBERS ASSIGNED

Illustrated on the following two pages are quite a few newly numbered patterns. Most of them have been illustrated in Harry Rickard's Take a Look columns here in the Bulletin. A & C pages for the Catalog will eventually be prepared which will include these patterns — with better (darker) illustrations and complete catalog information. However, so that we can get on with collecting, the patterns are presented here.





There are a couple of things which need to be mentioned about these patterns. First, one of the two G72-1A's will be renumbered before publication of the A&C pages; they were inadvertantly assigned the same number. The difference in the elevation of the "H" in the two newly illustrated H&S patterns will be obvious when compared with H230 in the catalog. The differences between patterns L158A and I44 and patterns already cataloged are also obvious. However, the remainder of the patterns show only subtle differences from known patterns and careful comparison will be necessary to distinguish them from previously reported ones.

One explanation for these subtle differences is given by Harry Rickard. "Perforator manufacturers did not retain die templates indefinitely. Later, when firms ordered new machines, the look-alike, new dies, could, and probably did have subtle differences. Some are apparent....but others need to be fitted on catalog pictures..."

Keep looking — there are loads of dies and patterns out there still to be found.

\*\*\*\*

Broken pins are one of the main problems encountered when searching for new dies or (less likely but still possible) new patterns. Several letters, when broken, can appear to be the same. Thus a broken "O" can appear to be an "S" or a "C"; a broken "E" can yield an "F", an "L", or an "H"; a broken "R" yields a perfect "P", etc.







For the fun of it, can you identify these three broken US patterns — or are they new patterns? Answers next month — to allow plenty of time for frustration to set in.

## WHEN ARE PERFINNED PRECANCELS RARE? BY RUDY ROY


NEW ORLEANS LA. According to a recent article in the Bureau Specialist, journal of the Bureau Issues Association, perfins are rare when they are found on the early Bureau Print precancels. The article goes on to note that only two perfin patterns have been seen so far, and both from New Orleans, LA. These are the UFC of the United Fruit Co. (U32), and the PD/Co of the Parke Davis Co. (either P56.1 or P56.5).



What were the Experimental Bureau Precancels? In late 1916 the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) produced precancels for three cities — Augusta, ME, Springfield, MA, and New Orleans, LA, as a test to determine the capability of the BEP to produce and distribute precancels. These would be the only Bureaus produced until 1923, and today are considered as the first Bureau precancels produced.



These experimentals were printed on the 1916-17 definitives, and, for New Orleans, stamps in the one, two, three, and six cent denominations were provided.



From the information I have gleaned from the precancel collectors that I know, perfinned precancels are usually considered by them as damaged; collectable only as space fillers. Perfins collectors who also collect precancelled perfins may consider the combination more attractive. In either case, I perceive that insofar as Bureau Experimental Precancels are concerned, both the precancel and perfin add to this item's desirability.

### REVENUE QUESTIONS


In the March 1983 Bulletin, Joe Miller had a request for help locating information about US perfin D-140.

In response to his inquiry Joe received several responses showing a New York usage of the Dean Witter & Co. perfin without period, but has not heard from anyone having information about the office which used the version with the period on revenue stamps. He is hoping that there might just be a chance that this perforator was used on some postage stamps.

As before, if you have information about the D-140, pattern let Joe (Mr. Francis J. Miller) know at PO Box 173, Langlois, OR 97450.

In the same letter he wrote: "I enclose a copy of a real gem. Almost complete image of a 10-die head that seems to be typical Cummins product; well formed, accurately spaced, and good clean cut. One pin seems to be missing in partial image of extreme right die.". He observes however that it actually is a short pin, since the mirror image pattern is complete and would have been produced in the same punching operation on a folded sheet.

The pattern seen here has not been reported on postage stamps; the example is on a \$10 US revenue stamp. The user was Harriman Ripley & Co. Inc., 63 Wall St., New York, NY. This company also had offices at 30 Federal St., Boston; 1529 Walnut St., Philadelphia; and 135 South LaSalle St., Chicago.

## HOW TO DISTINGUISH CUMMINS FROM AMERICAN PERFORATOR PERFINS BY HARRY RICKARD


It is known that two different companies made perforators in the U.S.

A study of dies, shows two different types of machines have been made.


One is more common than the other, and Cummins sold more perforators than the American Perforator Co.

Logically, one must assume the most used type was made by Cummins.

The basic differences will be shown below.



The identical missing holes in W and U, shows one die made both insignias. Therefore, it passed through the die with narrow end first. The commonest method.



This Western Union pair, also has some identical missing holes, but on parallel stamps. This indicates a feed with long side leading.

This style is less common, so evidently made by an American Perforator machine.

## HOW RANDOM HOLES ARE MADE BY HARRY RICKARD


Perfins collectors have been puzzled for many years, by the appearance of extra holes in perfin stamps. Some thought them to be control holes, but their placement was not in the right positions to be such.

A short time ago, I discovered a possible reason for such random holes. It wasn't until I came across this copy of C430, that I was able to verify my previous finding.

The C430 had two random holes, plus two blind perfs, which I punched out. Fitting it out on a complete copy, it matched perfectly, including the overlooked hole in bottom margin.

Strange as it may seem, random holes are produced by an incomplete die with many pins broken, then the user punches with a more complete die, to make a better looking pattern.

Also shown below, is a copy of S208 which has 4 different random holes, and which match a complete pattern.



A later example, showing a 7 hole die punch, then complete.

### EDITORIAL COMMENTS

A brief note on page numbering of the Bulletin. A couple of requests have recently been received for "missing pages" from the Bulletin. In all cases, a quick check of the issues involved showed that the pages which had disappeared between the printers and the Club member were actually received.

Foreign catalog pages are printed so as to be included in the Bulletin. They are assigned sequential page numbers in the issue of the Bulletin in which they are published. However, in an attempt to make these pages as neat as possible, and to avoid printing problems such as "bleed through" which could mess up the final product, these assigned page numbers are not printed on the pages. Thus, in the December issue, for instance, pages 137-142 were assigned to the pages of Cuban perfins. Anyone reading the Bulletin, however, would see only the page numbers 134-136 and 143-152. Please do not assume that there are pages missing when you do not see a specific page number — anything stapled into the monthly Bulletin will normally have a page number, even if that number is not printed on the page.

Please consider the somewhat arbitrary copy deadlines which I announced in the October Bulletin — anything which is received by me after the first of the month will almost certainly not appear in the next months' Bulletin! The Bulletin is usually cut and pasted during the first week of the month so that I can get it to the publisher (now Ron Kunavich in San Diego). This leaves him only three weeks to have it printed and place 800 mailing labels on the printed product in order to have it in the mail for the first of the month of issue.

Ads will have the highest priority for publication. They will be run in the next published edition of the Bulletin. But, after the first of the month "next" will often be two calendar months away. Note that this gets doubly messy for the July/August or November/December issues where the wait can be almost three months from submitting the ad. Sorry but that is one reality of editing I am learning — DEADLINES.

Another note on ads. Consulting with Jack Gooding about Club auctions we have established a two month from publication minimum for the closing of auctions. This allows foreign members — and inefficient domestic ones — time to receive their Bulletin and to bid in the auctions. Using the same thinking, all ads for sale of collections will have closing dates set as the first of the month two months following publication of the ad — unless the advertiser specifies a different closing date. This rule of thumb will especially apply to foreign collections where access to the foreign market might cause a significantly higher bid for the seller.

# INTERPRETING BROKEN PATTERNS BY PAUL A. MISTRETTA

Last month I published three perfins with broken pins and suggested that, for fun, you try to identify the patterns. While done for fun there is a very serious side to this process. Most of the time broken patterns are considered defective and discarded. However, frequently the more valuable patterns (from as low as C rated ones) are kept by collectors as space fillers until better copies are found. Often these defective patterns are sold or traded, again as space fillers. In addition those who look for new patterns have found that often a unique item is only available as a defective copy. As a result, the identification of patterns with defects is an important sidelight to our specialty.

Each of the three patterns reproduced last month lacked only one key letter to be identifiable; or, put another way, they each had more than two thirds of the needed information. Yet each posed a real problem in identification.



I. IB Co The second and third patterns lacked letters within the pattern. In both cases the first letter was essentially readable, which somewhat simplifies the game — we have a starting point. In addition, the symmetry of the patterns suggested that each lacked only the broken pins, no space was available to have completely lost another letter. In both cases the second letter is the key to the puzzle. The second pattern is IG/Co. (I38 a C rated pattern) while the third pattern pictured is not the obvious LH//Co but rather is LB/Co (L46, also C rated).

When evaluating the first stamp the problem was compounded. The possibilities for the key broken letter were C, G, O, Q, and S, and to confuse us further the pattern itself we as to whether the broken letter was first or last in the

gives no clue as to whether the broken letter was first or last in the pattern since both H and M are totally reversable!

When the entire stamp is reproduced there is no real problem identifying the pattern. The stamp was double struck and the two impressions give the complete pattern, so the problem letter was readily resolved; the pattern is CHM. This pattern from my collection is unlisted in the current catalog. However, it corresponds completely with the upper line of C154 (which is an A rated perfin). This perfin is on a copy of Scott 811, the 6c orange in the



This perfin is on a copy of Scott 811, the 6c orange in the presidential series of 1938. The stamp has a New York cancel consistant with pattern Cl54. Yet it is obviously not C154. (Philatelic favor? Unreported use of a modified pattern? Suggestions?) This one may be one of those "finds" we all hope for!



# TAGGED CANADIAN STAMPS WITH PERFINS

The collecting of perfins on Canadian tagged stamps is an interesting and challenging sidelight to simply collecting perfins of the country. It is the only specialized area of Canadian collecting which does not require large capital outlays -- in fact, money is not enough in this specialty. The only way to increase a collection of these items is through extensive correspondence, trading and general wheeling and dealing.

The work reported here entailed many hours of work by me, Jack Bennigan, Jon Johnson, Dick Wilsey, and many other correspondents. The list is probably incomplete, due to oversight, but is presented for those interested in this specialty.

We know that several of the items on the list were punched as philatelic favors, and there are a couple which are suspect. However, all are genuine, that is, done by the correct machines. Two listings are presented here: the first is for general tagged perfins, the second is of Winnepeg tagged items. The Winnepeg tagged items are becoming increasingly difficult to find; it is only on rare occasions that Winnepeg tagged items turn up these days.

Please note that the catalog numbers are from the Canadian Specialized Catalog. For those most familiar with the Scott Catalog this catalog is published by Canada Specialized Ltd., 330 Bay St Suite 7003, Toronto, Ontario, Canada M5H 2S8. The 1981 edition was used for the numbering. This was the last time that they came close to conforming to Scott's numbering. They have since renumbered every stamp and the numbering is totally different from previous listings. The numbers in the list are very close to those in Scott with the exception of the Centennial Issue where Scott simply did not do justice to the wide variety of papers, flourescences, gums, taggings, etc.

# SURVEY RESULTS FOR A & B PERFINS BY HARRY RICKARD

The results of the 1981-1982 survey of A and B rated perfins was certainly a revalation. Many A rated perfins were found to be much more common than formerly shown. They have been rerated. At the same time several of the B rated items were scarcer than previously reported, while others were more common. Again rerating was done. In addition, the committee created a new F rating and relegated some extremely common perfins to that rating.

Those without a US Catalog should consider using the ratings in the US Checklist (published between October 1983 and February 1984) as a guide. Those with a Catalog probably will want to make the rating changes in the catalog.

In order to buy, sell, or trade A and B rated items it is necessary to know the relative scarcity of the items in question. Five or fewer copies are known of items carrying the A rating. A rating of B indicates a slightly larger spread -- six to fifty copies are known for these patterns.

When considering bidding for items in auction it helps to know the relative scarcity of the items. Compare this scarcity with prices realized for similar items in the last three or four auctions. Always remember that specialty items (airs, special delivery, parcel post stamps, etc.) normally realize higher prices than other stamps with the same pattern.

If you do not have copies of the most recent Prices Realized sections from the Bulletin, they are available from librarian B. L. Timmermman in library files PB-33 and PB-34. You pay postage both ways, or can have copies made at \$.15 per page. (The average Prices Realized runs between 2 and 3 pages.)

# REVIEW -- HANDBOOK ON DANISH PERFINS BY PAUL NISTRETTA

I have recently had the pleasure of reviewing the new "Handbook on Danish Perfins. 2. Section - Catalog", by Peter Englebrecht (Club Member #1741).

The catalog includes 1010 numbered patterns of which three quarters are identified to company and city of use. Of the remainder all except about 35 are identified to city of use. Also listed is the date of first and latest reported use of each pattern (where known) and a relative rating of the value of the pattern. The rating is alphabetic A (very scarce) through E (very common) and should be very familiar to the US user.

This catalog is completely renumbered from its predecessors, so the numbering is continuous within each letter, and there are no ".5" or "A" numbers.

Best of all is the quality of the illustrations. Of the 1000+ patterns illustrated only one (S9) is incomplete. All are intense black and meticulously placed within the alloted rectangle.

Layout is standard, written information on the left page and illustrations on the right. The written information appears to be once reduced type but is completely readable in that size. This catalog is 120 pages long in an approximately 5" x 8" format. The pages are unbound.

Copies of this catalog should be available from the editor (address on last page) by the time you recieve this Bulletin. The price is \$8.00 postpaid and well worth it.

# PERFINS ON DANISH PARCEL POST CARDS BY JACOB KISHER

With these two attractive items, Perfins Club member Jacob Kisner (#2168) demonstrates the fact that "perfins on cover" often can be both aesthetically and philatelically desirable.

Here we have two old parcel post cards from Denmark.

The first bears a block of four of Scott #168-169 se-tenant, as well as one each of #122 & #128, with perfin HW of Henningsen & Wolf-Jurgensen of Kobenhaven (Copenhagen). This card, which gives advice of the arrival of a parcel in Finland, is postmarked December 20, 1924, also has a Christmas seal and the Malmo, Sweden transit mark. What makes this item especially scarce is the supurb strike of the scarce Turku ship cancellation. This cancel has an added premium of 300% according to the Facit Catalog.

The second item is an old postal card from Denmark with a pair of Scott #118, a Scott #125, and two #128's with the perfin HP of Holegr Petersen of Kobenhaven. Again, there is a fine strike of the Turku ship cancellation.

Jacob advises that both of these items (as well as other old parcel cards with perfins from Denmark, Sweden, and Finland) are looking for an appreciative home. However, he cautions that in most cases these seldom seen cards are not exactly inexpensive. Interested persons can contact him at 254 Park Avenue South, Penthouse F, New York, NY 10010. ### GETTING TO KNOW YOU

Peter Englebrecht (#1741) has recently published a catalog of Danish perfins (reviewed in this issue). Peter is also Editor of The Perfinist, a bilingual (Danish and English) periodical covering the field of Danish perfins, which has been published since March 1979.

Peter worked in Bremerhaven with the US Army from 1946 to 1949. Most recently, he was a teacher of foreign languages at a commercial school. He took an early retirement (disability retirement due to heart disease) and now spends his time with his family and his stamps.

Peter's wife is an American girl whose father settled in Oregon around 1910. Until recently Peter had a brother-in-law living in Hemphill, TX.

Of perfins Peter writes: "..since I started collecting stamps 50 years ago, I have never had as much fun as the perfins give me. I believe that perfins are one of the most interesting fields within philately as such and I have had so much pleasure from them.." Peter was fortunate to purchase the Ostergaard collection about four years after the death of that pioneer collector of Danish perfins.

Editor's Note: Beginning with The Perfinist No. 9 (the next issue to be published) Peter intends to begin compiling Part 1 of his Handbook of Danish Perfins. (Part 2 of the Handbook is the Catalog reviewed in this Bulletin.) The majority of the 24 pages of each future issue of the Perfinist are to be reserved for Handbook information. By including this information in The Perfinist, Peter hopes to have a reference of 400 or so pages, treating every possible aspect of Danish perfins, which will be published over a period of 4 to 5 years. The Perfinist is available from Peter for \$5.00 for #9 & 10.

He is also attempting to start a Danish perfins exchange. Apparently Danish laws regarding lists of names are even more strict than those we encounter with the US Freedom of Information Act -- but the bugs seem to have been worked out -- and a form will be included with The Perfinist #9 for those who wish to register with Peter for this exchange.

# THE PURPOSE OF THE U.S. CHECKLIST BY PAUL NISTRETTA

I would like to rerun a disclaimer from the October Bulletin (P. 117). Several new members and quite a few old ones obviously were unaware of this short note.

"Beginning with this issue I am compiling a checklist of US perfins. This list is keyed to the current US catalog (Balough, J. J. & D. Balough. 1979. Catalog of United States Perfins. Priv. Publ. by the Perfins Club. 547 p.) and includes the information published as A&C pages set 1 (1982) and the rerating information printed in the July/August 1982 Bulletin."

The 22 pages published in the Bulletin were designed to be a checklist with currently printed information concerning values. No recataloging was done by me during the preparation of these pages, only editing and updating of the list from published sources. Several people have written with the same problem. The A&C pages had approximately 20 changes to ratings made in the written but not illustrated section. Many seem to have missed that information and only made changes where a pattern was illustrated.

For those new to collecting, checklists are simply record keeping devices. In the space provided at the front of the record some symbol is used to designate that the particular pattern is owned by the person using the checklist. The space can be coded in any number of ways to give lots of information at a glance. I use a simple three way code on mine: • means I have a satisfactory copy; (·) means that I have a poor copy which I need to replace; and, O means that I have the perfin on a revenue stamp (and need to replace it in my postally used collection). Other equally simple systems can be devised, but in all cases the main purpose of the list is inventory; an inventory which does not require that you mark up your catalog.



# POLISH COMMEMORATIVE PERFINS IN BRITAIN BY PAUL MISTRETTA

A study of recent British perfins will rapidly bring the collector into contact with the S. F. P. (Stowarzyszenie Filatelistow Polskich) or, translated, the Polish Philatelists Association in the United Kingdom. This Association has been extremely active over the last three years in producing philatelic mementos which include new perfins produced for and commemorative of specific occasions.

Four of the five perfins produced by this group since 1980 are of the commemorative type. The fifth is the Association's own F/SP perfin. Unlike the more common perfins, some strong documentation exists as to both production and usage of these special items.

Before proceeding in this review of the S. F. P.'s perfin activity I would like to acknowledge the assistance of W.Z.J. Nowicki, Secretary of the S.F.P., for the information and help he has provided in putting together this article. Several of his articles will be cited along with other material supplied by Mr. Nowicki in response to a note which I wrote to him after receiving photocopies of several of his articles from Rudy Roy (#1124).




The first perfin used by the Association was the F/SP (Stowarzyszenie Filatelistow Polskich) perfin. The use of the perfin was "to distinguish and safeguard the official issues of souvenir postcards from the exhibition organized by "The Polish Philatelists Association" in the United Kingdom".

The F/SP perfin was used for the first time on July 4, 1980 to frank special event postcards prepared for Philapol 80. The exhibition had been organized under the title of the "40th Anniversary of the Polish Air Force in the Battle of Britain". Two different cachets were used as was a special cancellation. These are reproduced on the next page.

The F/SP perfin was also used at Philapol 81 (illustrated) which commemorated "Scouting in Philately" (May 15, 1981); on a set of four souvenir postcards commemorating "Polish Community Day in Nottingham" (June 13, 1981); and to commemorate the "40th Anniversary of Resumption of Polish Postal Service" on both December 15, 1981 (actual anniversary) and on February 6, 1982 (exhibition date at the Polish Institute and General Sikorski Museum, London). In addition, the Association has used the perfin on correspondence, and many members have purchased unused copies for their own correspondence or collections.




The second perfin issued by the Association was the JP/II (John Paul II) Type I illustrated at the right. The purpose of this perfin was to commemorate the first visit of a Pope to Great Britain. The first use of this pattern was made at Gatewick Airport on May 28, 1982. Cacheted postcards were prepared for cancellation in commemoration of the arrival of the Pontiff.



On May 30, 1982 the perfin was again used on a special postcard (illustrated) which commemorated the Papal Visit to the Polish Community. Cancelled at the Crystal Palace, this postcard also shows the first instance of an official British G.P.O. handstamp being atuhorized in the Polish language.

Three additional authorized uses were made of this perfin. They were: May 31, 1982, first day of the Papal visit to Scotland, postcards were franked with perfinned Scotland regional definitives and were cancelled at Edinburg; June 2, 1982, first Papal visit to Wales, postcards were franked with perfinned regional definitive for Wales and posted at Cardiff; and, on postcards posted at Westminster Cathedral Hall on July 23 & 24, 1982, during the stamp exhibition organized by the S.F.P. "Papal Visits in Philately since 1978" (illustrated). In addition, uncancelled copies were made available to the members of the Association for their use.







These commemorative postcards were franked with the 15 1/2d Queen Elizabeth II (Q.E.II) definitive stamp. Numbers 1, 7, 13, and 15 were franked with perfinned stamps as described above. Copies of the cancels used are reproduced (numbered according to the above list).

Counts of the perfinned stamps were reported as follows. Seven thousand 15 1/2d Q.E.II definitive stamps were perfinned for the papal visit. Two thousand were used for the Crystal Palace stop; 2,500 for the other events during May 28 - June 2; 2,000 were used on July 23 for S.F.P. exhibition souvenirs; and the remaining 500 were used on correspondence by the S.F.P. during the Papal visit and the show.

In addition to the 7,000 15 1/2d stamps, 50 sets of 40 stamps each (1/2d - L5.00 in the Q.E.II definitive series) were perfinned. Four complete sets were used at Gatewick Airport (#1 above), 3 complete sets at Crystal Palace, and one set at the stamp exhibition (July 23, 1982). Thirty complete sets of Scotland regionals (13 stamps each) were prepared. Four sets were used May 31 in Edinburgh (#13 in list). And, finally, 30 complete sets (15 stamps) were prepared for the Wales regional visit. Four of these sets were handstamped in Cardiff on June 2 (#15 in the list).

As mentioned above, the final "official" usage of this perfin was for the S.F.P. show held on July 23, 1982.



The third perfin to be issued by the S.F.P. was one which read PR/CF (Polish Regimental Colors Foundation). This perfin was used by the Polish Institute and General Sikorski Museum in London to commemorate "Annual Reunion Day" on August 13, 1983. Special postcards were cacheted franked with a perfinned 16d Royal Scots (the Royal Regiment) stamp and tied to the post card with a special event handstamp.

The fourth perfin created by the Polish Philatelists commemorated the 300th anniversary of the battle of Vienna. Polish troops were led by King Joannes III Sobieski. The perfin JS/III was punched on the 16d Royal Scots stamp to frank cacheted commemorative postcards used by the General Sikorski Museum during a special exhibition. The special 300th anniversary cancel is dated Sept. 12, 1983.



While I have mentioned only the 16d Scots Regiment stamp for the above two issues, other denominations (especially in the Q.E.II definitive series) were perfinned.


Most recently the S.F.P. issued a perfin, again using the pattern JPII. This Type II pattern is found on a single line and is



perforated in an arc. This perfin was used on the 15th of October 1983 on postcards commemorating the 5th anniversary of the pontificate of John Paul II. The handstamp used to cancel these special postcards is bilingual (Polish and English) and the cachet is in Latin (see illustration). This item is a special event cover from a specially organized stamp exhibition held on the 15th and 16th of As for all other issues, the major portion of the perfins

October.

produced were used for the special event covers, however, some unused copies were later applied to club correspondence or sold to Association members for their use.



This closes the story of Polish perfins in the United Kingdom to the present time. However, the recent activity of the Polish Philatelists Association in the United Kingdom suggests that there will be more interesting perfins produced in the near future. Collectors of Great Britain take note.

## Brazil

Of those perfins reported to date, half appear on postal issues and the other half appear on fiscal issues, with three designs common to both. Certain 1890 and later fiscal stamps appear with large numerals (perhaps dates) punched through stamp and document. The earliest commercial perfin is All, found on stamps of the 1876-1883 period. According to the Perfins Bulletin, two firms had official permission to perforate stamps, but no examples have been reported: Cia Armour do Brazil (1921) of Sao Paulo, and Leite Nunes & Cia. of Porte Alegre.

This Constitution and Bylaws was approved by the membership January 1, 1974. Minor revisions now included were approved July 15, 1975, January 1, 1980 and December 1, 1981.

## THE PERFINS CLUB

## CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I: NAME AND OBJECTIVES

- I-1. NAME: The name of this organization shall be THE PERFINS CLUB.
- I-2. OBJECTIVES: The objectives of the Club shall be the study and dissemination of information about all aspects of the use of perforated insigned and security endorsements as applied to postal paper, to facilitate contact between collectors, and to encourage and aid collectors in their efforts to study and form collections of these items.
- I-3. GOVERNANCE: The Club shall be governed by the Constitution and the Bylaws, and by such other actions and rules as the officers and executive committee shall from time to time make consistent therewith.

## ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

- II-1. CLASSES OF MEMBERSHIP: Membership in the Club shall be comprised of such classes as may be provided in the Bylaws.
- II-2. ELIGIBILITY, PROVISIONS, AND LIMITATIONS: Membership, as provided in the Bylaws, shall be open to all philatelists and philatelic organizations agreeing to subscribe to the objectives of the Club and abide by its Constitution and Bylaws.

## ARTICLE III: OFFICERS

- III-1. OFFICERS: The elective officers of the Club shall be a president, a vice president, a secretary, and a treasurer.
- III-2. QUALIFICATIONS: Any member in good standing who is 18 years of age or older shall be eligible to hold any office in the Club.
- III-3. TERM OF OFFICE: Terms of office shall be for three years as described in the Bylaws.

#### ARTICLE IV: EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- IV-1. COMPOSITION: The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers, the <u>Bulletin</u> editor, the editor of U.S. catalogs, the editor of foreign catalogs, the publisher, and the immediate past president.
- IV-2. DUTIES: The executive committee shall have control over the

policies of the Club. All appointments are to be approved by this committee. Decisions of the officers and committee chairperson in matters of policy are to be approved by the committee.

## ARTICLE V: WORKING COMMITTEES AND APPOINTMENTS

V-1. APPOINTMENTS: The President shall appoint to the working committees with the approval of the executive committee.

V-2. OTHER APPOINTMENTS: The president shall appoint to temporary and other committees as may be required for development of Club activities.

## ARTICLE VI: ELECTIONS

VI-1. ELECTIONS: Elections shall be held each year for such offices as may become vacant at that time.

VI-2. PROCEDURES: Procedures for nominating and electing shall be followed as indicated in the Bylaws.

## ARTICLE VII: CHARGES AND APPEALS

VII-1. APPEALS: Procedures shall be established for charging officers and members with unsatisfactory activities and for appealing their actions.

VII-2. SATISFACTION: Procedures shall be established for satisfying appeals against officers and members.

## ARTICLE VIII: AMENDMENTS AND ADDITIONS

VIII-1. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS: Amendments to the Constitution shall be proposed and acted upon as indicated in the Bylaws.

VIII-2. BYLAWS AMENDMENTS: Amendments to the Bylaws shall be proposed and acted upon as indicated in the Bylaws.

## ARTICLE IX: EXHIBITS

IX-1. EXHIBITS: Procedures for holding an annual exhibit shall be followed as indicated in the Bylaws.

IX-2. AWARDS: Awards will be given as indicated in the Bylaws.

## ARTICLE X: HALLOCK CARD AWARD

X-1. AWARD: Each year a member who has contributed the most in furthering the aims of the Perfins Club will be awarded the Hallock Card Award.

X-2. SELECTION: The winner will be selected as indicated in the Bylaws.

X-3. TROPHY: A trophy of the nature indicated in the Bylaws will be given to the winner.

## 2-1. CLASSES

A. There shall be three classes of membership: Active, Life, and Family.

B. Active membership shall be open to any person or organization agreeing to be bound by the Constitution and Bylaws, and who

is accepted as a qualified member.

C. Life membership shall be open to any member who applies for such membership and meets the financial requirements. Members who have been members for 25 years and have reached their sixty-fifth birthday shall, upon application, be made Life Members, and the financial requirements of life membership shall be waived, all benefits of such membership to be given without cost.

D. Family memberships shall be open to the spouse of a member or to other family members living in the same domicile.

2-2. ELIGIBILITY, PROVISIONS, AND LIMITATIONS

A. Application for membership in the Club shall be on the official application blank, or in lieu of said form at the time of application, the secretary shall request such form to be completed before acceptance is established.

B. The secretary shall act upon applications for membership within a 30-day period. If any application is to be rejected after investigation, the concurrence of the executive committee shall be required. If said investigation and decision shall take more than the 30 days, the applicant shall be notified that such additional time is necessary.

#### 2-3. DUES

A. Annual dues for active members shall be determined by the executive committee. The membership shall take effect with the payment of the dues and shall continue for 12 calendar months for each year of payment. If the application is not accepted, the accompanying dues shall be returned to the applicant.

B. Life membership shall be open to any member upon the payment of the equivalent of 15 times the current membership fee. A life member shall thereafter be exempt from all dues and

assessments. Approved January 1, 1980.

C. Family memberships shall be open to others in a member's family who live in the same household who shall apply for membership and pay an additional yearly dues of \$1.00. Family members shall be entitled to all rights of members and will be subject to all responsibilities of membership. Family members will not be entitled to receive the Perfins Bulletin or the publications of the Club as part of their membership. In order to maintain a family membership, there

must be at least one active or life member in the household. 2-4. DISSOLVEMENT OF MEMBERSHIP

- A. Resignations shall be submitted to the secretary and published in the Bulletin and shall become effective immediately.
- B. Notice of death of a member shall be published in the Bulletin.
- C. Any member who is in arrears in the payment of dues for a period of two months may be dropped from membership without notification and the information will be published in the Bulletin.
- D. Any member found guilty by the Executive Committee of conduct unbecoming a member may be expelled from the Club. Charges of such conduct shall be sent to the secretary in writing and may be preferred by any member in good standing. Such action shall be developed as indicated in Section 7 of the Bylaws.

## 2-5. REINSTATEMENT

- A. A former member may make application for reinstatement.
- B. The member will be reinstated, providing his application for reinstatement is accepted, as of the date of his new application, or at his request may be considered as a continuing member with no lost time, and an effort will be made to provide missing copies of the <u>Bulletin</u>. Financial arrangements will be made accordingly.

# 3 OFFICERS

## 3-1. TERMS OF OFFICE

- A. Terms of office are set up so that the Club will not lose all officers in any one year. Terms shall take effect as follows and shall extend until the third anniversary date thereafter: President -- beginning January 1, 1973; Vice President -- beginning January 1, 1975; Secretary -- beginning January 1, 1975; and Treasurer -- beginning January 1, 1974.
- B. Vacancies occurring by reasons of death, resignation, incapacity; or disqualification shall be filled as follows.
- 1. The Vice President shall assume the Presidency until the end of the current calendar year, at which time the unexpired portion of the term shall be filled by an election in the regular manner. The Vice President (unless elected to the Presidency) shall then return to the office of Vice President to complete the term of which elected.
  - 2. The President shall fill by appointment any vacancies of the offices of Vice President, Secretary, or Treasurer. Such appointments shall run to the next regular election, when the position shall be filled for the unexpired term.
- 3. At the election for unexpired terms, the vacancy shall be filled by elected candidates. The basic terms of office shall remain unchanged, thus affording elections each year, and always having officers with experience in some of the elective offices.

## 3-2. DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS

- A. President. The President is charged with the overall operation of the Club and is to provide the leadership and direction for the membership. He shall appoint all standing or special committees, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, and shall be an ex-officio member of such committees. He shall require quarterly reports from all officers, committees, and appointees. He shall act as chairperson of the Executive Committee and shall coordinate the activities of the Club.
  - B. Vice President. The Vice President shall be available to replace the President should such a need arise. The Vice President shall chair the membership committee.
- C. Secretary. The Secretary shall handle the details of membership, receive applications and dues, and continue or dissolve memberships according to the provisions of the Bylaws. He shall forward to the treasurer all receipts with adequate records thereof. He is to be the recipient of correspondence directed to the Executive Committee. He shall be considered as the official Club correspondent.
- D. Treasurer. The Treasurer is charged with handling all Club monies and is to keep an adequate set of records of all transactions. Separate accounts are to be kept for various Club activities as needed. Officers and committee chairpersons are to regularly submit vouchers for expenditures and for receipts to the treasurer with records for same.

## 4-1. ORGANIZATION - A BASINING BASINING

- A. The President shall be the chairperson of the Executive Committee
- B. The Secretary shall receive and distribute communications to and from the Committee.

## 4-2. PROCEDURES To any the second distribution of the second seco

- A. All matters of a controversial nature in the operation of the Club are to be channeled through this Committee.
- B. All matters of policy shall be overseen by this Committee.

## 5 WORKING COMMITTEES AND APPOINTMENTS

## 5-1. TENURE "D dame to migizo edt wode liede pointes respective?

- A. All committee appointments and individual appointments shall begin and expire with the term of office of the appointing President. It is the right and duty of a new President to either continue committee appointments or to reappoint as is most suitable.
- B. When a Vice President finishes out a year for the President, the appointments shall remain as appointed by the President.

## 5-2. BULLETIN EDITOR

- A. The Editor shall be appointed by the President.
- B. The Editor shall prepare and cause to be published and distributed a monthly <u>Bulletin</u> of a size and quality consistant with good journalistic standards and the financial position of the organization. Approved July 15, 1975.

C. The content, style and makeup of the <u>Bulletin</u> are the decisions of the Editor. It is expected that the <u>Bulletin</u> shall contain in each issue the listing of membership changes, general news and information, and several pages of catalog or study work. Catalog and study work may be replaced by the Club membership roster, auction lists, or like material. A complete listing of officers and appointments shall be included at least twice a year.

## 5-3. PUBLISHER

A. The President shall appoint a Club Publisher.

B. The Publisher shall prepare materials submitted to him for publication. He shall establish costs and selling prices, and he shall have such prices approved by the Executive committee prior to publications. The <u>Bulletin</u> is an exception to the need for approval since it is a continuing item, established and regulated by the Bylaws.

C. The Publisher shall establish a schedule for all publications that will be presented other than through the <u>Bulletin</u>, and he shall have such schedule approved by the Executive Committee. Catalog work to be presented through the Bulletin

shall be coordinated with the Bulletin editor.

D. Publications shall be sold to non-members at a price higher than that charged members. The price to members shall be as low as practical to cover the costs of publication.

E. All copies of publications given gratis, and all publications sold to non-members at member prices, shall be approved by

the Executive Committee.

F. Publications previously sold by other members or former publishers may be continued by them until such time as the present supply is depleted and reprints are necessary. Such persons shall supply the President with quarterly reports concerning the status of such publications.

## 5-4. EDITOR OF U.S. CATALOGS

A. The President shall appoint an Editor of U.S. Catalogs.

B. The U.S. Catalog Editor shall be charged with providing upto-date catalogs of U.S. Perfins.

C. There may be other members working with the U.S. Catalog Editor if desired. Such members shall be chosen by the U.S. Catalog Editor and appointed by the President.

D. The U.S. Catalog Editor shall maintain a master catalog for the benefit of his successors and as the property of the Club. Such master catalog shall show the origin of each entry in the catalog and the basis on which it was made.

## 5-5. EDITOR OF FOREIGN CATALOGS

A. The President shall appoint an Editor of Foreign Catalogs.

B. The Foreign Catalog Editor shall be charged with providing up-to-date catalogs of foreign Perfins.

C. There may be other members working with the Foreign Catalog Editor if desired. Such members shall be chosen by the Foreign Catalog Editor and appointed by the President.

D. The Foreign Catalog Editor shall prepare all materials concerned with foreign Perfins and shall submit this material to the Publisher.

E. The Foreign Catalog Editor shall, whenever practical, maintain for the benefit of his successors, and as the property of the Club, the master catalogs, recording the origin of each entry in the catalogs and the basis on which it was made.

F. The Foreign Catalog Editor shall develop a schedule of production of foreign catalogs that will cover a number of years in an effort to provide as many different catalogs as practical.

## 5-6. DIRECTOR OF PUBLICITY

A. The President shall appoint a Director of Publicity.

B. The Director of Publicity shall be charged with keeping the name and activities of the Perfins Club in constant view of the philatelic press.

C. The Director of Publicity shall prepare or approve all material released to the press. Others who submit material must do so through the Director of Publicity.

D. Other members may be appointed by the President to assist the Director of Publicity.

## 5-7. MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

- A. The Vice President shall serve as chairperson of the membership committee.
- B. Other members may be appointed to the committee by the President.
- C. It shall be the duty of this committee to take an interest in both the present and prospective members. This committee shall consider the sending of information kits to prospective members as its primary obligation. Offering to help new members is an important part of the committee's work.
  - D. This committee shall keep the records of the special interests of each member and shall facilitate the exchange of stamps and information.

## 5-8. OTHER APPOINTMENTS

A. The President shall appoint such committees or members as needed to fill positions not herein named--such as Historian, Exchange Chairperson, Librarian, and such other positions as will develop the workings of the Club.

B. Such appointees shall have such responsibilities as are specifically assigned them by the President. Such responsibilities shall not be assigned in conflict with these Bylaws.

## 6 ELECTIONS TO BOOT IMMED BY LIBERT BOOK OF BEST AND PROPERTY OF

## 6-1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- A. The President shall appoint a nominating committee no later than July 1 prior to an election.
- B. The committee shall receive recommendations of candidates from members prior to September 1.
- C. All recommendations must be signed by at least two members and must contain the written agreement of the person so nominated that he is willing to serve.
- D. The nominating committee will notify the membership of its proposals via the October issue of the Bulletin.

## 6-2. ELECTION PROCEDURE

A. Should there be a contest for any office, the Secretary will mail ballots to all members as of November 1, to be returned not later than December 1.

B. Should there be no contest, the Secretary will cast the ballot for the membership.

# 7 CHARGES AND APPEALS

## 7-1. CHARGES

- A. Any member who is dissatisfied with the actions of any officer, committee member, or other member, may file a charge letter with the secretary for presentation to the Executive Committee.
  - B. Such charge letter must be filed within 60 days of the action.

## 7-2. PROCEDURES

- A. The secretary, within ten days of the receipt of a charge letter, shall submit true copies of said letter to all members of the Executive Committee, and to the person or persons being charged. The person or persons being charged shall be advised by the secretary at this time that it is the obligation of the charged to supply the executive committee with information in defense of the action. The person or persons making the charge shall be advised that any additional proof must be submitted within 30 days.
  - B. The executive committee shall take action on the charges within 60 days of the initial charge.
- C. A charge will be sustained if a majority of the membership of the executive committee eligible to vote thereon shall vote in favor of the appeal. Otherwise the charge will be disallowed. Both parties will be advised by the secretary of the decision. No member of the executive committee who is directly involved in a charge will be eligible to vote thereon.

## 7-3. APPEALS TO THE MEMBERSHIP

- A. Appeals may be taken to the membership only when such action is against the executive committee or when the decision on a charge by the executive committee is not accepted, and provided the appellant shall deposit a sum of money to be determined by the secretary that will be sufficient to bear the cost of such appeal, such sum of money to be refunded to the appellant in the event of his winning his appeal.
  - B. When an appeal is to be taken to the membership, all materials previously submitted to the executive committee shall be submitted to the membership, and a vote requested. A simple majority of all votes cast will determine, provided a minimum of 25% of the membership has voted. A count of the votes by a disinterested party shall be made at a date 60 days from the date of the mailing of the ballots to the membership.

## 8 AMENDMENTS AND ADDITIONS

## 8-1. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

- A. Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed by a petition signed by at least three members and presented to the executive committee.
- B. The proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be presented to the membership by publication in the Perfins Bulletin.

C. After a period of 60 days, the membership shall be polled by a ballot prepared and mailed to each member.

The Constitution may then be amended by a three-fourths

majority of the membership voting.

## 8-2. AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

- A. Amendments to the Bylaws shall be proposed by a petition signed by at least three members and presented to the executive committee.
- B. The proposed amendment to the Bylaws shall be presented in writing to the membership in the Perfins Bulletin.
- C. A ballot shall be presented to the membership in the next Bulletin published by the Club. Members will submit their ballot to the secretary or other designated person within 60 days of the mailing of said Bulletin.

D. The Bylaws may then be amended by a simple majority of the

ballots cast.

## 9 EXHIBITS

## 9-1. YEARLY EXHIBIT

A. Each year the executive committee may select a show which will will host the national Perfins exhibit.

B. If a show is to be held, the executive committee will appoint a member of the Perfins Club to act as <u>Perfins Coordinator</u> with the host organization.

. The best exhibit of Perfins, shown by a member of the club, will

receive a suitably inscribed award.

D. Other awards may be given at the discretion of the executive committee.

#### 9-2. AWARDS

A. The cost of awards will not exceed the monetary limits set by the executive committee on a yearly basis. Approved December 1,1981.

### 10 HALLOCK CARD AWARD

### 10-1. SELECTION

- A. The President shall appoint the immediate past recipient and two previous recipients as a committee to determine the recipient of the award. The chairperson shall be the immediate past recipient.
- B. The committee will select the winner of the award from nominations received from the membership.

## 10-2. AWARD

A. The award will be suitably inscribed with recipients name and the honor for which awarded. Approved December 1, 1981.

## 10-3 ALTERNATIVES

- A. If there is no member deemed worthy of the award, the committee will make a recommendation of the executive committee to that effect.
- B. The executive committee will make the final decision in the event of such a recommendation.

#### BEGINNERS CORNER #1

#### BY HARRY RICKARD

I hope that each of you newer collectors will enjoy perfin collecting as much as I have. With a little bit of help and information, I'm sure that you will.

During the next few months I will offer tips and suggestions to help further your collecting interests. If there is specific information you need or would like to see in this column write me and include a SASE (self addressed stamped envelope). Each month, new members join us in our Club. Most don't know any of the information which has been given in the previous Bulletins. I will repeat some brief bits, but for the specific information you will need to contact the Librarian for copies of articles. More on that later.

Our U.S. Catalog project was funded by the sale of an immense holding of perfins, donated to the Club by the late Al Bartleson. The previous edition of the catalog (1966) evolved over a long period of time through the efforts of many Club members and was funded mostly by the members themselves.

Currently, various members of the Club are contributing to the production of foreign catalogs by adding to and editing "Worksheets". Worksheets are alphabetic listings of designs, measurements, and the number of holes in each pattern (where needed). Unusual patterns, without letters included, are listed either in the Number or the Design section of the catalog or worksheet. After sufficient work has been done these worksheets are converted into catalogs. The production of catalogs requires a variety of talents (see "British Catalog To Be Updated" in this Bulletin) and willing hands are always welcome. One thing that all of us should understand is that there is no complete catalog -- new discoveries are very possible.

GETTING STARTED is as simple as writing the Sales Manager for sales circuit material from the area of your own interest. U.S. E-rated perfins (very common patterns) are currently selling for \$.05 each, D-rated (still common) patterns sell for \$.15 each. If you have started with a fair sized collection, the next step may be to request a book of C-rated patterns at \$.40 each, or, begin bidding in Club auctions.

ALWAYS ask stamp dealers if they have any perfins. Many will segregate these stamps as "defective". Often these defectives turn out to be bargain perfins! Attend stamp shows as there is a larger concentration of dealers present in one place than normally possible. Keep your ears open! Someone asking for perfins may turn out to be a new friend -- you never know where your next perfin will come from.

Foreign collectors can also receive packets from the Sales Department. The prices for these stamps vary from country to country -- generally based on demand for the material.

Sellers may send packets or mounted books of C-rated and better perfins to the Sales Department.

PERFINS ARE GENERALLY MOUNTED FACE DOWN on a black background, so that the design (and not the stamp issue) is emphasized.

For the new collector, I can not overemphasize the need for good catalogs and other literature. Most of the US material referred to in this Bulletin will have catalog numbers from the current US Perfins Catalog by Balough and Balough, while the stamps will generally be referred to by numbers from the Scott catalog of US stamps. Foreign worksheet information is invaluable to the foreign collector.

# BRITISH CATALOG TO BE UPDATED BY DICK NEWHINNEY

How about YOU? There will be several Club projects developing during the next several months. The more people working, the more rewarding for all of us.

The particular project to be discussed here is a big one, perhaps the biggest for a while. We have the opportunity to produce a new, up-to-date British Catalog. Dr. Harvey Tilles has offered the Club all of the materials used to produce the current Catalog which is now completely sold out. Existing copies of this catalog are selling for as much as L75 in Great Britain.

Bob McKee has agreed to coordinate the project of compiling the new catalog. Bob, along with Basil Tompkins of Great Britain, was the editor of the present catalog. These two men have more knowledge and information available to them than most of the rest of us put together. With the production material from the present catalog, the Club has a long head start in editing this new catalog.

Since the current catalog is out of print it would be impractical to simply prepare A&C pages. The current catalog contains over 14,000 entries but the new version is expected to have 18,000 plus listings!

So your help is needed!! We can use all the help that we can get. There are a variey of jobs to be done including pasting, typing, listing, checking, proof reading, and (hopefully) computerizing some of this information. One of the biggest tasks will be the addition of the three thousand plus patterns into the numbering system. This will be most readily accomplished in a computer listing which can be made from the current catalog and then easily edited in the machine. Hard copy would then be easy to generate and use.

We will let you know in late summer how this project is coming along. Hopefully we will have a committee working by then.

## THE PERFINS CLUB SALES DEPARTMENT

Sales manager Dick Mewhinney has established some guidelines for members wishing to use the Sales Department to buy or sell perfins.

ONLY MEMBERS of the Perfins Club may use the service of the Sales Department. The Club will charge a 20% commission on all sales to help cover the expenses of the Department. Members who receive consignments from the Department must return the perfins which they do not purchase, along with payment for those they keep, within 10 days of receipt.

Because purchases of less than \$8 do not cover expenses for a shipment, a member who purchases less than \$8 worth of perfins at a time must pay postage both ways.

Buyers may request shipments of the following types of material.

- A. U.S. books of stamps with a rating of C or better.
- B. U.S. envelopes of D-rated stamps.
- C. U.S. envelopes of E-rated stamps.
- D. U.S. envelopes of specialties such as railroads, precancels, or parce! post stamps.
- E. Foreign envelopes. Please specify the country or countries.

Purchasers must keep an accurate account of what is taken from each book or envelope and make a full report to the Sales Manager when they return the shipment.

Members who wish to sell material through the Sales Department are invited to prepare either books or envelopes according to the above list.

The Sales Manager will provide up to three sales books without charge to members who wish to fill them and offer them for sale through the Department. Additional sales books are \$.25 each.


The books each hold 100 stamps and should be filled with stamps selling for at least \$.25 each to make it worthwhile for prospective buyers. Each stamp in the book is to be marked with the US Perfins Catalog number, the rating, and the price.

Envelopes should be #3 glassines (2 1/2 by 4 1/2 inches) or similar size (use new glassines please) and should contain up to 150 perfins. D and E rated perfins should not be mixed in the same envelope. Countries should not be mixed. There skould be no more than three of the same design in each envelope.

Pricing is left up to the seller. The law of supply and demand is very much the rule. if you have no idea how to price your perfins, ask the Sales Manager for help, but do not expect that pricing will be done for you.

## OUR READERS WRITE




Bill Turney (#1538) writes with a question which is deceptively simple. Reproduced at the left is a block of four stamps perfinned with pattern F8 of the E. L. Faber Pencil Co. Bill's question is "How was this punch accomplished?" My immediate reaction was that it was a simple foldover perfin giving mirror punches, but a slightly longer look shows that the horizontal alignment is not correct for mirror pairs. To further confuse the picture the patterns are extremely well aligned vertically -- but the

distance between the patterns in the right and left pairs is not the same. So, HOW WERE these patterns produced in this alignment?

Bill Cummings (LM25) writes with comments on two different articles recently published in the Bulletin.

His first comments have to do with the CHM pattern reproduced in my article about broken patterns (PB 37(Feb.):30;1984). "The CHM pattern is the former C153.5 and was described as the top line of of a C154 punch." To further confirm Bill's information I reproduce at the right a block of four submitted by Harry Rickard which shows the two patterns attached. Bill also spotted what may be a minor problem. The Cain rating for C154 is D while the new catalog has it as an A. Both Bill and I have evidence that the A rating is wrong, but is the previous D rating correct?



The second set of comments by Bill had to do with the article by Rudy Roy on perfins on the experimental precancels (PB 37(Feb):21;1984). He writes:

"The UFC perfin comes only on the 1c stamps. Fairly common. Enough around to take care of precancelled perfin collectors and enough copies without perfin to satisfy bureau precancel collectors so the UFC's do not sell for a premium.

"The 6c comes only with the Parke Davis perfin, P56.5. The stamp itself is so rare that the perfin seldom affects the price, in fact some prefer it that way. I will pay \$500 up for a copy, 'nuff said?

"This brings up another subject, definitely in line with the page 21 article. The catalog attributes both P56.1 and P56.5 to New Orleans. I have P56.1 on 27 values of the 50 listed -- from BALTIMORE. These cover issues from 1912 through 1926! I feel that P56.1 is either misattributed OR the "New Orleans" copies are P56.5 missing the second control hole."



#### PERFIN ARTICLES TWO EARLY BY DICK NEWHINNEY

President Dick Mewhinney has recently submitted the following two short articles. They were found in a notebook that housed the collection of former member Mrs. T. S Farquharson (#51) which was tranferred by Ivan Ley to Dick. Mrs. Farquharson passed away in 1968 Before formal life memberships were available she at the age of 102. was awarded life membership in the Club when, at the age of 94, she paid her dues two years ahead!

These articles are among the first about perfins to appear in the press. They appeared in the American Boy, an outstanding pre World War II magazine for youth. They were evidently written by Willard O. Wylie the editor of Meekel's Weekly, one of the largest stamp publications of that time. Since the first perfins were produced after Federal approval in 1908, these are very early articles. article with illustration appeared in February 1909 and the one without in May 1911. The articles are reprinted below.



We have noted the issue of stamps privately perforated with initials as a protection against thievery by employes. By a recent order this practice has been authorized and the collecting of these stamps will form an interesting "side line." It is, of course, readily appreciated that they have no pecuniary value, but the excitement and pleasure of quest will be appreciated. We illustrate a few current "perforations":

## Stamps Perforated With Initials

Are stamps perforated with initials collectible is a question frequently asked of us, and we are always compelled to reply that they are not so far as any commercial value is concerned. Stamp collectors who desire a side-line will find stamps of this kind of interest and every stamp album should show a page upon which these stamps are represented. It will be noted that curious designs are used by some firms and the letters are arranged in quite an artistic manner. In mounting the stamps it is wise to note underneath the name of the firm in full using the same. The perforating of stamps in this manner is not a new idea, and as may be imagined it is done by firms to protect themselves from petty thievery upon the part of employees.

## THEMATIC PERFINS



A thematic stamp collection is not limited only to stamps, covers, postcards, and FDC's of which only the front (stamped side) with the postmark, or the illustrated side, is important to the chosen theme. Stamps themselves can show some distinguishing features which are very interesting, and can be included in the collection without hesitation. An example might be errors in stamps, like printing mistakes and "misperforation". Also, deliberate extra perforations.

One special kind of extra perforation is the perfin (firmaperforaties or bedrijfsperforaties). Of course, this type of perforation is allowed in a thematic stamp collection; as single stamps, or as those on covers or letters.

Perfins were allowed in Holland by the Postmaster General through a special Postal Order (no. 955, article 2) on March 31, 1875. The complete text of that article goes as follows:

"On request to this Department made by the party concerned, is granted the license, to prevent the misuse by persons in their employ of stamps which are bought for postage and are bought in quantity, to print a dry mark or to perforate them



keep track of, on behalf of the licensee, the use (or misuse) of these stamps by authorized persons."

interest in this
type of licensing

dropped off completely,

primarily due to the general use of postal metering machines; so the Postmaster General decided to stop issuing new licenses.

## The Rise of Coil Stamps and Perfins.



About 50 years ago a new kind of office machine was developed; the automatic stamp machine. This machine could perfin a roll of stamps placed in it and then affix the stamps to mail. This last capability was, of course, an enormous time saver for commercial mail rooms. Most of the postal clerks in user firms were very happy with this new machine.

In 1922 Mr. Dehlinger became the general sales manager for these machines in Netherlands; the machines are called POKO's.

In 1911 this type of machine was imported from Belgium. These older types required rolls of stamps made from complete sheets of stamps. The sheets were glued together lengthwise and later cut into strips one stamp wide. The end product was a roll of 500 or 1000 stamps.



From June 1911 these rolls were available for private clients.

However, the PMG (Post Master General) constantly received complaints about the premature separation of the stamps in the POKO machines,

generally at the perforation.



Mr. Dehlinger sent a letter with several test rolls to the PMG at the Hauge. These test rolls were made with small perforations, smaller than in current use. For example, he used some German stamps with small hole perf. 14. He also suggested some tests with stronger papers. Neither gave the

anticipated success.

At the request of the PMG Mr. Dehlinger showed his machine to the printer of Dutch stamps, the firm of J. Enschede and Sons in Haarlem. The firm made some tests with the machine. Coincidentally the firm was already involved in a testing program of new papers for photogravure printing. The new kind of paper and the new printing process were needed for planned stamp issues.

At the end of that year a brand new idea was born at J. Enschede & Sons. The idea was to remove some of the perforating pins and create a kind of paper bridge between the stamps. The syncopated-perforation was born. (See for example the "T" perfin illustrated -- note the upper perforations).



This idea was a great stimulant for the sale of POKO machines. Many copanies decided to buy a POKO machine, now that the machines worked. These new machines also allowed the perforation of the firms initials or logo in the stamp.

Misuse of the companies stamps was no longer possible; robbery by employees was precluded.

Because many firms started to use the POKO machines, a boom in the use of 2, 5, and 10c stamps with syncopated perforations resulted.

In the meantime (1935) the PMG decided that many stamp vending machines ought to be placed in several cities, to allow private patrons to purchase stamps after the closing time of the post offices. Stamps of the 1 1/2, 5, and 6 cent denominations were thereby sold in enormous quantities.

The printing house of J. Enschede & Sons bought a new rotary-screen-gravure printing press on which they could print continuous coils of stamps. This was, of course, the death of the handmade coils prepared from sheets.

Thematic Perfins are Interesting.

Within the category of known perfins of the Netherlands are several perfins which are very interesting in themselves -- and are collected as such.

Examples of these perfins are found in the Table. The Table shows us, by main groupings like printing houses, publishers, etc., the perfins used, the number of holes, the town of emission, and the firm name. Different towns with the same perfin are recognizable only by postmark.

Besides these identified perfins there were several other firms which had a POKO machine. It is a pity that we do not know the perfins belonging to these companies. While their initials are known their perfins are not. Pertinent to our theme (paper manufacturers and users) the following are important:

and an unknown firm which did promotions for "Het Beste" and "Time Life"

Some of the perfins are known lacking one or more holes. The reason for this problem is the breaking off of one or more of the perforating pins in the POKO.

Many patterns are known without knowledge of the user. There is no file maintained from the old days. And the files of Mr. Dehlinger are lost.

The rise of the postal meter was the end of the POKO machine. The latest known POKO perfin is dated from June 1942. After thirty years of loyal service there came an end to this important episode in philatelic history.

Finally in 1965 the (true) coil stamp took a firm place in the postal system. At that time the first coil stamp dispenser was put out, which had expanded postal service including both stamp variety

and other services. The collector was given a broad new collecting interest, the coil stamp itself.

Thanks to both Mr. van den Oudenalder and Druck Doende for the cooperation extended to me and the Perfins Club in permitting the reprinting of this article.



## TAKE ANOTHER LOOK

BY HARRY A. RICKARD

Here are some more patterns which deserve a close look. They are reproduced along with the pattern illustration from the current catalog of US perfins. The comparison should help. Catalog illustration will be on the left and the variety on the right.




This variety of N54 has a slightly taller N, the top of the C is narrower, and the spacing is different for the diagonal of the N (from the upright stroke).

The placement of the pattern on an angle suggests that the machine from which the impression was made was probably a single die machine.

This variety of S99 was found on the offset printing of the 1c green Washington. The hole placement is not the same as on more recent stamps with the S99 pattern.

The top two holes of the S are at a different angle, as is true for the 3rd and 4th holes from the bottom of the S. Also note the spacing difference between the top holes of the D.







Here is a variety of S228. This designers look-alike is close -- but not the same.

Note how the bottom of the S winds up slightly lower on the variety and the P is in a slightly different position.

This N175 variety is commonly found incomplete on early issues. The missing pin in the W will help.

The most obvious key to this variety is the placement of the diagonals in the N's.







Here is a new variety of G29.

The G appears taller than in the catalog illustration, and the spacing between the bottom holes of the A and G are different for the two.

And finally, a new variety of M111. M111 is itself a scarce pattern (A rated) and now we have a new, similar design with a narower M and a larger C. This one is probably also truly scarce since no other has yet surfaced.








Member Bob Foley has submitted this apparently new LM/C pattern. The shape of the C makes it stand out from those already cataloged.

And now here are some items which raise the opposite question. Are these patterns derived from broken pin punches of the base pattern reported in the catalog?

The first pattern illustrated is a single commemorative size US stamp with beautifully aligned punches of W72-21 (left) and W72-78. This suggests that W72-78 is a broken pin variety of W72-21



Here we have an attached pair of regular series stamps. The perfins on the stamps are, however, cataloged differently; C219 on the left, C216 on the right. This pair suggests that C216 is a broken pin variety of C219, and also raises questions about the relationship of the various CNB patterns (since this impression was obviously

made with a multiple die perforator).

Here is a REAL beauty! These two patterns found on a single US commemorative illustrate clearly the relation between four different US patterns. The patterns shown are V27A (left) and a broken pin variety of V28 (right). This pair of patterns strongly suggests that patterns V27,

es of the same pattern th all the pins needed

V27A, V28, and V28A are all broken pin varieties of the same pattern -- necessarily V28 since it is the only one with all the pins needed to create the other patterns.

## Chile

In contrast to the relatively few commercial perfins found on the postage stamps of Chile, there are probably more than two hundred perfins on the fiscal stamps of Chile. From the size and placement of the letters, most of these fiscal punches can be considered cancelling devices rather than true perfins. Because there are so few photocopies of the fiscal perfins, only a list of these items will be provided as part of this catalog. If more information can be collected, a supplementary catalog of Chile fiscal perfins will be published later.

In addition to punch holes of various designs, other cancelling devices on postal issues include PAGADO and ANNULADO in letters of two or more different sizes.

In addition to these Bill Cummings (LM-25) writes that I mised at least one pattern listed in the Scott Catalog. It is Bavaria (E).

# THE MISSING LINK BY PHILIP E. GEHRING

I am very new to the field of collecting perfins, having received my Catalog as a gift only last Christmas. I put it on my list since the Bulletin didn't make much sense to me.

I originally became interested in perfins as they occurred on precancels. I've been saving perf-initialed precancels for over ten years. Since Christmas I have been busy cataloging and identifying this accumulation.

This find, however, came from my other collecting interest -- Great Lakes ships on picture postcards. I purchased the illustrated card some time ago. It shows a nice view of a Great Lakes type of passenger ship. At the time I purchased the card, I noted that it formed a missing link between my collecting interests. I already had precancelled perfins and ship postcards with precancelled stamps, but here was a ship postcard with a perfin.

Only after I received my catalog did I realize that there was more to this cover than I had at first realized. The post card says that the ship pictured on the front was equipped with a triple expansion engine built by the Marine Iron Works, 7 Dominick St., Chicago. The company's specialty was marine machinery. The card, mailed from Chicago's Kinzie Station on April 7, 1909, was franked with a copy of Scott #331 with perfin M141 (MIW).

In the Catalog the pattern is A-rated and the user of the pattern is unidentified. Unfortunately some of the excitement was lost when the pattern was rerated "B", but at least here is a new identification!


While I am not interested in selling the card I would appreciate help in identifying the ship. (Philip E. Gehring, 275 Beeler Dr., Berea, OH 44017.)

# MAKING A PHOTOCOPIED CATALOG MORE USEFUL

Edward S. Hoyt (#292) writes unat he has used a little trick to make use of photocopied catalogs somewhat easier.

As many of you know, copying a catalog will often give you a page with illustration on the left side, descriptive material on the right, and blank space on the back. If you wish to retain the original appearance of the catalog you now fold the pages in half so that the illustrations face the written material, and when all of the pages are done you staple the half size book at the back.

However, Ed suggests that before you staple the book together you take a straight edge and a razor blade (in a holder) and shave the left edge of each page. Now fold and staple. All of the right sides stick out farther than the left sides, so when you thumb through the book you will always open it to pages with information -- and not to the blank backs. (Incidentally, if you thumb through from the back all you will see is the blank backs.)

The covers themselves are not obviously impressive -- until you realize what they represent. Both are franked with the Western Union perfin (W199-9) used at Pittsburgh, PA and one is on a Western Union Messenger Service envelope.

But wait a minute! The envelopes are cancelled at Savannah, GA. Both appear to be written by the same person; the return addressee, Mrs. J. E. Clancy, Jr. Both letters are addressed to her husband. On the surface it appears that Mr. Baucher has found an unauthorized use of Western Union's Pittsburgh perfin, and in one case, an official company envelope -- for personal correspondence between husband and wife. Naughty, naughty.

So go out to those flea markets!! And, thanks Eli for sharing your good fortune with the Club.

#### GETTING TO KNOW YOU -- R. K. LODHA

Last month we reported having accepted a new member from Kathmandu, Nepal. Rajesh Kumar Lodha, who is probably our most remote member, sent along an impressive listing of philatelic credentials when he applied.

Mr. Lodha is a member of the Indian Study Circle (London), Foreschungmeinschaft Indien BdPh (West Germany), the American Philatelic Society, the American Revenue Association, and The Empire of India Philatelic Society (Bombay). He is a life member of the Nepal Philatelic Study Society (Khatmandu); Executive Committee Member of the Indian Stamp Dealers Association; and a Representative and member of both the Nepal and Tibet Study Circle (London) and the Burma Philatelic Study Circle (Canada). #### NEED HELP WITH AN IDENTIFICATION ...

Ivan Ley writes that he needs help with an unusual item. It is a 1902 regular series stamp on which are pressed the initials "R.N." and two triangles (one above and one below the initials.) The thing which

makes this item curious is that the periods after the R and the N are perforated through the stamp; making it appear to be a perfin. Is this some sort of perfin created before perforators were available here?

## BEGINNER'S CORNER BY HARRY A. RICKARD

Wonderment and caution are built-ins for new perfins collectors. To ease your journey I'll offer a few more suggestions this month.

The January Bulletin had a complete Library list. Make good use of it to order a series of earlier Bulletins. You'll learn what has happened and what you have missed. You'll also learn a lot in general about this new hobby of yours.

With perfins the old "don't buy a straight-edged stamp" taboo doesn't hold. Nor does the heavy cancel phobia -- unless it affects the readability of the perfin by bleeding through the stamp and affecting the BACK of the stamp.

Perfin collectors ARE careful about purchasing incomplete patterns of the perfin itself. The missing hole perfin (created either by breakage of some perforator pins, or when the perfin was applied too near to the edge of the stamp) will often do until a better copy is found. Indeed, some of the scarce patterns are known only from incomplete patterns. However, these stamps rarely command a premium, and normally are considered defective and LESS valuable than rating would indicate.

Learn to read backwards! That is the way that most perfins are read. They are most commonly punched with the stamps face up on the perforator. Identifying these patterns from the back will cause the letters to appear backwards. In some cases sheets are folded before being perforated and these sheets will result in stamps which read both backwards and frontwards -- but these tend to be less common.

There are several mirror image letters, and several complicated patterns can be read either frontwards or backwards. Letters involved in this problem include; A, H, I, M, O, T, U, V, W, X, Y, O, 1, and 8. For the purposes of determining which is the correct sequence of characters in a mirror pattern, begin by assuming that the lowest alphabetic character will be the one under which the pattern is reported. Thus if you have a pattern TOH, begin looking under the H's in the catalog. If the user's company name began with an H OR if the user is unknown, the pattern should be found under H. If, however, the pattern is not found under H then try under T. Commonly in foreign catalogs -- less so in the US catalog -- the pattern is filed by users name. When this happens, T could become the appropriate place to look. Try both ways to make sure of pattern identification.

In addition, look-alike patterns need to be considered to make sure of the proper identification. Learning the fundamentals of perf position at an early stage can lead to the discovery of new varieties which turn up in unexpected places.

No one stays a beginner long. Collecting C rated patterns (or higher valued ones) will lead to greater fun. But how do you determine fair market price for an item? Check the prices from previous auctions being careful to note the Scott number of the stamp. There are specialty items such as 319, 479, and most of the C, E, and Q numbers

which draw premium price because of the stamp. Look for trends of "normal" stamps, rather than the value of a specific item. Values within a given rating (C, B, or A) generally reflect the scarcity of an item -- but not always!

Club auctions offer a variety of material -- from singles to packets, US or foreign. Two sales are held each year; one in the spring and one in the fall. The results of the auction will be found in the Bulletin or are available from the Club Library as CF-1, "Auction Lists and Prices Realized."

And so we have come full circle in this article, beginning and ending at the Library. READ!! It is the only way to become a knowledgeable collector. The Club Librarian, B. L. "Tim" Timmerman, can be contacted at 1606 Britney Dr., Sherwood, AR 72116. The Club asks that the user pay postage both from and back to Tim (usually by including uncancelled stamps in the return package). And remember, please, Tim is a volunteer with a full time job; don't fret if it takes slightly longer than you think it should to get a piece of literature.

#### BOOK REVIEW

THE HANDBOOK OF BRITISH PERFINS by John S. Nelson

2nd Edition, published 1983 by the Security Endorsement and Perfins Society of Great Britain (S.E.P.S.)
Card cover,  $6" \times 8 \ 3/4"$ ,  $32 \ p$ . Very well illustrated.

Only two general handbooks on British perfins have ever been published: "British stamps perforated with firms initials" by F. H. Valency, which has been out of print since the late 1940's, and John Nelson's book which has been out of print since 1967. Both of these books are in constant demand from new recruits to perfin collecting, and so S. E. P. S. decided to again make them available by means of a reprint. Unfortunately, the the holder of the copyright to the Valency book could not be located, but John Nelson, S. E. P. S. President, willingly permitted the Society to reprint his handbook.

The method of perforating postage stamps with initials or designs to prevent theft was invented in England by Joseph Sloper in the 1860's. Full details of his battles with the General Post Office establishment, to obtain permission to use his invention, are presented by means of copies of his letters and the G. P. O. replies. This is followed by a brief history of Sloper and his competitors during the 19th century. The remainder of the book is dedicated to illustrations of about 150 of the most interesting British perfins, and includes notes and anecdotes about these patterns.

### REVIEW -- THE PERFINNIST #8 AND #9

I have received two volumes of The Perfinnist from Peter Engelbrecht. This publication is produced by Peter to present information about Danish perfins to interested collectors. It is written with Danish and English text to permit a significantly larger audience.

Number 8; published May 5, 1983; 12p.

Contains five articles or lists which include: 1) Corrections to the Ostergaard list; 2) an illustrated discussion of perforator deterioration; 3) a discussion of perfins from registration machines; 4) the second half of a chronological listing of perfin permits issued by the PMG's office; and, 5) brief notes from Peter.

Number 9; published Jan. 1984; 8p. + a 16p appendix.

The main body of this number contains two articles: 1) about a machine designed to perfin revenue stamps; and, 2) the first set of additions and corrections to the catalog of Danish perfins produced by Peter and reviewed in the March Bulletin. The 16 page appendix presents the first pages for Part 1 of Peters catalog. These pages include the cover sheet, index, and introduction (8p.), a cross reference of Ostergaard to Engelbrecht numbers, and a cross reference listing of Danish perfins by provence and town in which they were used. Also included with The Perfinnist no. 9 is a registration form to include your name in an exchange group (Danish perfins) which Peter is forming.

The Perfinnist has consistently presented useful information about Danish perfins. However, with the beginning of publication of Part 1 of Peter's catalog, it has become indispensible to the collector of the perfins of Denmark.

The Perfinnist is available from Peter Engelbrecht, Bogelundvej 23, DK 5464, Brenderup Fyn, Denmark. Numbers 9 and 10 (which was expected to be available for distribution by the end of April) are \$5. Contact Peter for information about earlier issues of this bulletin.

\$5,000 RED DOCUMENTARY PERFIN

William Brown (#1912), our Canadian representative, has submitted a couple of articles from Linn's having to do with perfins. One of these articles should be of general interest, and I have written for permission to reprint.

The second article is from Richard Freidberg's column "U.S. Revenues" on page 26 of the February 13, 1984 issue of Linn's. The article entitled "Number of \$5,000 red dated docs tallied" reports on a very specialized group of US Revenue stamps; the \$5,000 red documentary stamps cancelled between 1952 and 1958. These stamps, Scott numbered R618, R652, R686, R695, R7004, R713, and R722 for the years 1952 - 1958 respectively, are relatively rare with a cumulative total of only 39 known. Only a single copy of R695 was reported, while only 11 copies of the most common (R713) are known. The reason for our interest is that the illustration accompanying the article shows a copy of R713 -- perfinned! Cancelling by perfinning revenue stamps was a common practice for many companies. Stamps so treated are normally considered "damaged" by purists. But with only 11 copies of the stamp known, I'll bet the perfin doesn't harm the value of that stamp.

Thanks again to Mr. William Brown for locating this information.

THE DES ARC. MO. COVER STORY
BY HARRY RICKARD

One of the big thrills of stamp collecting is locating previously unknown old covers. This note is about such a recent find; covers primarily from the 1910-1926 period. I was only a secondary participant.

In the town of Des Arc, Mo., the firm of Graves and Stamp operated a retail business, selling general merchandise ranging from clothing and wallpaper to roofing and axe handles.

The resultant broad array of correspondence created a tremendous potential for cover collectors. Fortunately, one member of the firm (undoubtedly Mr. Stamp) was a "saver". All envelopes (or at least a large number of them) were saved, generally with letters and invoices tucked inside.

During 1980 one of Mr. Stamp's grandsons approached an acquaintance of mine, asking if he might be interested in some old covers. The seller, aware of the possiblity of desirable material, would only release the material piece-meal, thereby building both the tension and the price.

The buyer was required to purchase all covers, not pick and choose (which would leave the undesirables). Having no outlet for perfinned materials, the buyer worked with a friend who, fortunately, contacted me to find out if I was interested in the material.

Initially through pictures, and later the actual covers, we reached a satisfactory agreement.

I have been using some of the gems in my exhibits. Through these covers, some needed information has been obtained both as to the identity of, and the relationship between, several firms of that period. I plan to share some of this information on the following pages and in upcoming Bulletins.






JACKSON BOULEVARD AT GREEN STREET THE HOUSE BEHIND THE MOST PERFECT TAILORING UNDER THE SUN.

Fred Kaufman probably portrayed his personality in the things he did. It is reflected in the words -- The American Tailor -- on the cover, in his having the building and printing all done in green (because he was located at the corner of Green St.), and in the choice of a horseshoe to grace his perforated stamps.

A horseshoe was a symbol of good luck at one time. Many homes had them fastened above a door, inside and out. He was truly an individualist.

Until this cover was found, the user of DES27 was unknown. Des27A is listed for Metropolitan Tailors, which I believe to be one of Fred Kaufman's operations.

As I will show on subsequent covers, tailoring firms operated under several names, offering different brands.




Note the G68 perfin on the cover. The catalog shows Garden City Tailoring of Cincinnati as the user of the G68 pattern. The D in this perfin apparently represents Dixie Tailoring.


So we have a single perfin in use by at least two tailoring firms, which suggests common ownership. (What is the relationship of The Chicago Tailoring Company listed under Supplemental Information in the catalog to these two companies?)


G68 has been verified by cover from Cincinnati, this cover verifies Chicago usage by Dixie Tailoring. Were there two perforators in use or were the stamps mailed from one location to the other?


Who can give the year of usage in Cincinnati?

The next cover will also show a multiple usage by one person or firm. Also a mystery.









As on the first cover we have a 1910 usage.

The Danforth Mills used an odd brand name "Crack-a-Jack". Might it have been chosen for its similarity to the popular confection of the period, Cracker Jack, which is still marketed?

The cover bears perfin T87. The catalog also shows three other similar designs, each having control hole(s). Each of these three is credited to The Royal Tailors, whose initials match the pattern.

The location for users of the designs bearing control holes have not been verified. It is unlikely that they will be found with Chicago usage.

It is possible that Danforth Mills bought out The Royal Tilors and subsequently used their perforator on Chicago mailings, such as the above.

A brief period of usage would account for the scarcity of the T88.5 pattern and the relative scarcity of the others. Incidentally, the T88.5 was reported in only two collections in the 1981 survey (both copies on Scott #332).



#### A CAVE IN CEYLON

Did you see the recent article in Jim Czyl's "Cinderella Scene" in Linns? This article "'Cave' overprints kept employees honest" (p.40; 2/27/84) talked about the seven known patterns of overprint used by Cave and Co. Ltd., Colombo, Ceylon. The company sold books and stationary, and operated a print shop; they also imported music, musical instruments, and billiards tables and accesories.

The Cave overprint was used to discourage employee theft of company stamps. It also protected the company from losing stamped material to unscrupulous "runners" who carried mail to the post office. These runners often destroyed the mailed material in order to "recycle" the stamps. The overprint can be found on stamps of Ceylon issued from 1884 to 1908.

In 1908 the overprint was superceded by a perfin ('CAVE').

## A POSSIBLE FORGERY BY C. JEAN KILNER

Please BE WARNED of a possible forgery among us! All of us have yearned for a windmill "Perfin" to fill a place in our collections. The current on-going price of such a stamp (when one is found!) -- is in the neighborhood of \$15 to \$20 U.S. each! Not only do we windmill collectors look for them, but some nearly 800 active members of The Perfins Club, an organization devoted to specifically collecting perfins only, wish to have this stamp grace their collections as well!

According to writings of (our now president) Wim Bosman (#34), published in WINDMILL WHISPERS ISSUE Vol. III, No. 1, p. 3, "In the Netherlands one firm has used a perfin showing a windmill, being the "Eerst Nederlandse Coop. Kunstmest Fabriek" (First Dutch Cooperative Factory of Fertilizers at Vlaardingen) now called Windmill Holland B.V., which still uses a windmill as emblem even for some time on a kind of prepayment-cancel (in use by big firms to prepay without stamps), which is rated as real philatelic matter over here (Netherlands). Unfortunately, the firm has no copies left of either the cancel or the perfin: the latter being not so strange, as it was used in 1932! In any case, the conclusion may be that this firm has used the windmill emblem already for over 40 years now." (No further definitive materials have been published in W/W since. -- Ed.)

According to James E. Lunney (#101) our Secretary-Treasurer, who "discovered" this forgery possibility, ".....the case of this "modern" perfin, which is about all we can call it at this point, considering our lack of evidence at this time (that it is really a fake), the clue is its denomination; prior to 1978, Dutch semi-postal stamps had much lower denominations! I hope the man from whom I purchased it recently will let me know where he bought it; I think it came from a Perfin Club Auction, and that's why I think we all should be alerted. It seems a shame that such a desirable item should be so exploited -- if such be the case!

My original copy (also shown above) is the 6c Netherlands Sc. #173,

and the perforation measures 12 1/2, which authenticates it, according to Scott's. If you will notice, also, the "new" windmill perforation, although exactly similar, has been perforated from the wrong side of the stamp -- it is turned backward! The figures on the "new" stamp, three children dancing, two with crowns on their heads and the other one holding a crown in his hand, and the denomination (70+30c) indicating it is a semi-postal issue, and the fact that it seems strange that any company would find it necessary to "protect" such a stamp with its perforation or "brand" of its own since the stamp is used for not only regular postage, but takes a charity or surtax excess of regular postage. (ref. "Sutton's Stamp Collectors Encyclopedia" -- Ed.) Since the 1984 Scott's Catalog does not show any new Netherlands semi-postals issued after the year date of Nov. 16, 1982, by which this stamp can be identified, until this stamp can be actually identified with a modern Dutch Company, it must be assumed to be a forged perfin!

Our Vice-Pres., Don Muggeridge (#53), is continuing to research this matter and any further information available from the membership or anyone else, for that matter, will be much appreciated. Forward such information you may have to Don Muggeridge, Jim Lunney or your Editor, and we will see that it is given out as quickly as possible.

In the meantime, if you wish to purchase one of these "new" perfins, finding such an one available, do so with the knowledge that it MAY BE A FORGERY!--(until you are better informed!)

(STOP THE PRESSES!! Later info. just received!)
dateline, Midland, Texas, Feb. 9, 1984:

"I had a telephone call from Vice-President Donald last night, and he has identified the stamp on the "modern" perfin! He found it in Scott's Monthly Journal in the "new issues" and it is marked Scott B599, the 1983 Christmas issue with the surcharge for child welfare. The issue date was Nov. 16, 1983, so it is less than three months old! This gives continued suspicion that someone out there is actively engaged in applying this perfin right now; and will presumably continue to do so.

Perhaps some of our Dutch members can check with Windmill Holland B.V., at Zoaardingen to see if they have revived the device.

By the way, my "original" perfin seems to be authenticated, since "INGEN" is clearly visible in the cancellation"

Editors Notes: The above article refers to the possibility of "forgery" of the Dutch windmill perfin. Overlaying the copy of the "new" pattern on the copy of the old pattern indicates that they were made by the same machine -- or by a supurb duplicate. Only if the latter situation (a newly fabricated machine) has ocurred can this

item be truly called a forgery.

The degree of similarity of the old and new perfin suggests that the original perforator has been resurrected. If this is the case it will not be the first time that philatelic use of a perforator has ocurred -- remember the recent "forged" Canadian OH/MS perfins which were indistinguishable from the "genuine" ones?

Reference to the van Oudenalder article in last months Bulletin would indicate that the use of this perfin would have to be done using a pre-1970 postal license, since the issuance of new permits was discontinued in that year by the Dutch postal authority.

Two questions do arise from this article, however. First, has the company (or a private individual) reactivated this perforator? And, do the old perfins come facing only in one direction, or were perfins produced from folded sheets -- thus facing either right or left?

One good thing about dating the Dutch stamp on which this perfin was found -- Jack Gooding and the Perfins Club auction are DEFINITELY NOT the source of this item as suggested in the article!!

If you have any information about this perfin write me at 326 Choctaw Dr., Pineville, LA 71360. I will pass the information on to the Windmill Study Unit -- and will include it in the Bulletin -- PAM.

All collectors of the perfins of Great Britain know the pattern "PAC". The latest catalog-album by Robert McKee and Basil Thomkins shows nine different dies for this pattern and each is attributed to the Prudential Assurance Company Ltd. A tenth pattern is found on the larger sized Elizabethian high values. PAC usage began in the late Victorian era, my earliest is on a one penny lilac postmarked May 27, 1899 (illustrated as Fig. 1).

In February of this year I acquired a cover which suggests a change to at least one of the PAC entries. The stamp franking the cover is a King George V, 1 1/2d, block watermarked stamp (Scott 189) with a London postmark of Apr. 9, 1932. The perfin shown in Figure 2 is one of the nine -- yet the return address printed on the flap of the envelope is for the "Pearl Assurance Company Ltd., High Holborn, London, W.C.1."

The question arises, is there a relationship between the Pearl Assurance Co. and the Prudential Assurance Co., or is a change needed in the catalog?

This listing isn't really very good as you can't really see the differences in the dies from the scanty info provided.

"The German FM official is mentioned along with the LU/POST/A perfin. The quantity that were perfinned is given for the latter. I think I also recall some mention of the private perfins of companies that were nationalized (C.Z., J.P., etc.)

"Bavaria has listings of four or five of the semi-official perfins and most are priced. Some of the values in the sets are hard to come by.

"The Venezuela G.N. used to be cataloged in Sanabria and others. Not sure if this is still the case.

"... Michel actually added the crossed hammers perfins after (I bought) my last copy of the Deutschland-Spezial..."

John goes on to make a very instructive point: "Unfortunately, the worst thing that can happen to perfinners is to have priced catalog recognition. This gives the perfin an aura of respectability among the non-collectors and immediately places dollar signs on the material they might run into."

#### \*\*\*\*\*

Ed. note -- As John says, the Spanish item mentioned (a color variety of Scott #307) cataloged at \$1250 in my 1982 Scott catalog. Similar inflated prices are placed on many of the specialty items from our our specialty area which appear in formal catalogs.

Mr. W. T. Brown (#1912), our Canadian representative, reports finding a Canadian W8 with an 1887 cancel. The cancel is light and on a 3c red. This predates the earliest previously reported usage (Oct 17, 1889) by a full two years.

## LIST OF AGENCIES WITH PERFORATORS BY COMPAD N. TREMBLAY

#### INTRODUCTION

In this article I limit myself to tips, differences and facts which show the differences in some of the perforators used by the Sun Life Company in Canada. I will not discuss the historic side (either development or spread) of this insurance company in Canada. The single goal of the following information is to help you get started sorting some of your own Sun Life perfins; and to help you get more enjoyment out of this great specialty.

I have been studying this pattern for the past 18 months and it was by no means easy to find ways to identify them for this new classification. It was necessary to pay close attention to postmarks to determine the city of origin of the specific Sun Life agency that perfinned the stamps during the period studied.

So far I have contact printed almost 10,000 stamps to check the hole positions and to make it easier to compare the patterns. This process helped me to spot an infinite number of differences that characterize each of the perforators used in various cities. Without the photos it would have been impossible for me to pursue such a detailed study of a pattern with 63 holes. The pictures are



permanent documents that you can handle without damaging the stamps. You can look at them over and over, make accurate measurements with a 40% microscope (if you own one), and use the built in scale to measure in thousandths of an inch.

Of the stamps photographed, 7,000 came from a dealer. He got them from a former Sun Life employee who worked at the head office of the company (formerly Montreal, recently moved to Toronto). All Sun Life agencies throughout Canada had to send reports to this office, and were also required to routinely forward all kinds of documents there. That accumulation of stamps covered a five year period. They are (in varying quantities) as follows (Scott Catalog Numbers): 175, 190, 192, 195, 196, 197, 197b (die 1), 198, 199 and 200.

#### HOW IT ALL STARTED

Jean-Guy Dalpe (a friend) learned that the above-mentioned dealer had the accumulation of Sun Life perfins. That was all I needed! I went with him, and we bought several of each issue, selecting (at first)



only the most readable city cancels in sufficieint numbers of each of the eight positions to satisfy our collections and our exchange partners. Jean-Guy had previously noticed a low pin in the top "S" of a perfin with a Vancouver cancel on the stamp (hole S2 - fig. 19a). He reported it to our president Jon and also published a note in the Perforator Vol. 2, No. 7, August 1981. He asked if others in the study group had noticed the same variety. Jon also had perfins with the low pin in the S,

but had no explanation for the variety at that time.

This was enough to stimulate my curiosity -- especially with so many stamps available with different city cancels from coast to coast.

#### LIST OF SUN LIFE AGENCIES IN CANADA

Immediately below is presented a listing of the Sun Life agencies in Canada. Each has been assigned a Figure number to which all illustrations from that machine will refer. The basic pattern will be assigned the base number; varieties will be designated "a", "b", "c", etc. as needed. (Thus fig. 19a is the first discussed variety of pattern 19 -- the perfin used in Vancouver, BC.) Cancels discussed will also use these Figure numbers.

#### EASY IDENTIFICATIONS

Figure 19a is from the number 1 position of a 5-die perforator located at the Vancouver office. (Position 1 is the leftmost position produced by a multiple head perforator where the perfin is readable (right side up).) From all of the Vancouver cancelled stamps I have seen this low pin occurs on an average of one out of every five stamps. This variety has not been seen cancelled in any city other than Vancouver and this establishes it as a die exclusively used in Vancouver. All of the Vancouver perfins are found in the A position, with rare copies in the C position. So far I have only found a single copy punched in the F position (using the old classification).

(Editors note. Canadian perfins have traditionally been more closely reported with reference to position of the perfin than have US patterns. See the Beginners Corner later in this issue for a fuller explanation of the meanings of positions etc. used in this article.)

Figure 3a (from Quebec) shows a constant pin missing in the middle bar of the E (hole E6). This variety is found about once in five stamps with the Quebec cancel, confirming the existence of a five die perforator in that city. This E variety is from the middle punch (die 3) of the perforator and has not been found with any other cancel. The earliest stamp found with the missing pin is #107 in the Admiral Series.




Fig. 14a Fig. 14b

Figures 14a and 14b are from the Winnipeg office. Here again, each of these dies is seen about once in five stamps, proving the existence of a 5-die machine in the Winnipeg office. In fig. 14a the pins missing are N2 and E5. The 14b variety from Winnipeg shows a high U6 hole, making a wide gap between that hole and the F2 hole; the bottom of the U goes uphill

instead of being almost horizontal.




Fig. 1a Fig. 19b

Halifax (fig. 1a) is one of the easier ones to identify. Almost all of the perfins found with the Halifax cancel are punched sideways, though rare exceptions are found punched upright. Compare fig. 1a

with fig. 19b which is a Vancouver incomplete perfin punched in the A position. Notice the totally different appearance of these two figures. These incomplete perfins were the result of too many sheets of stamps being punched at once. The shorter pins do not completely perforate the stamps, leaving either blind perforations or no perforatior mark at all. Only one other office (Quebec) punched stamps sideways, but in relatively

small quantities compared to Halifax. These latter stamps are found only with a Quebec cancel, on stamps #175, 190, 198, 199 and 200, and all are complete (except for the variety shown in fig. 19a -- stamps with a missing pin in the E.)

Almost half of the perfins from Regina (fig. 15a) have blind or missing perforations. This is the only other town besides the ones mentioned above to have incomplete designs. These show a different picture; they are easily readable if compared to the average Halifax or Vancouver punches. Regina punches are found in the A and C positions, C's representing about one third of all perfins from that city.

#### ODDS AND ENDS ON OTHER CITIES

Figure 8 (London), figure 9 (Guelph) and figure 10 (Windsor) all show the old S11a pattern. These perfins are not easily separated. Although they look basically similar they were punched by different dies. On pictorial issues they are easily separated by the different cancels proper to each city. The cancels are shown as figs. 8a, 9a and 10a. Note that an occasional roller cancel can be seen from London.





London and Guelph perfins are normally found in the A and B positions, but are rarely seen in the C and D positions. The Windsor perfins are found exclusively in the A position, and so far, I have found none of the 3 cents red (#197a - die 1) perforated with the Windsor perforator of the Sun Life Company.


Figures 6 and 11 (from Ottawa and North Bay, Ont.

respectively) are very different if you compare the S8 and S9 pins. The Ottawa (fig. 6) punches are closer together and go slightly downhill, while the North Bay are wide apart and horizontal (among many other differences).

Similar differences for the S8 and S9 pins are found in fig. 12 (Petersborough, Ont.) and fig. 13 (Fort Williams, Ont.), but a close look at pin E1 shows that it is to the left of the N9 pin. This is the only die with such a pronounced shift. Only plating these perforators and comparing them closely with the die reconstruction will allow a positive identification.



Trois Rivieres (fig. 4) and Sherbrooke (fig. 5) differ from Quebec (fig. 3) by the S8 and S9 differences. Also you will notice a characteristic unique to Trois Rivieres -- the bottom crossbar of the E goes uphill. If we compare the ways the sheets of stamps were punched we find: all perfins from Trois Rivieres are punched in the A position; Sherbrooke comes punched in the A and C positions, with an occasional B; and, Quebec also appears both A and C with an occasional B punch.

Pay attention to the cancel -- if it is a Sun Life perfin the cancel is the easiest way to identify the office of use.

Saint John, N. B. (fig. 2) usually has a fine cancel with CANADA at the bottom. That inscription can also be found for Ottawa, Winnipeg, Halifax and Quebec. A few "Station A" cancels were also found for Saint John.

Calgary (fig. 18) and Vancouver gave me a major problem (at first) due to a much larger quantity of perfins found for each of these cities. I had thought of the possibility of a 10-die

perforator for both of these offices, but I have found only five different dies for each of these locations. In both of these post offices the postal clerks were using a sharp round hammer (not a duplex) and were determined to hit the stamp without a miss. Some of the stamps from Calgary have up to four hammer strikes (cancels) each! This is rather unusual and unique, especially during the early 30's. The bulk of the Calgary perfins are punched in the A and B positions with an odd inverted C punch.

I also found a lot of partial cancels to identify, especially those ending in the letters "ON". In the list of cities three end in ON; London, Saskatoon and Edmonton. The first one is easy to identify being in a class by itself, as we have seen before. The Saskatoon hammer (fig. 16a) is sharp and lightly inked to make a fine dark cancel. On the other hand, the Edmonton hammer

(fig. 17a) is flattened down or possibly made deliberately wide, leaving a bold but very light impression, as if the ink used was a light gray.

This illustrates that the cancel specialist would have a field day identifying Sun Life perfinned stamps without paying much attention to the perforator pattern.

#### CONCLUSION

To summarize this first article, I suggest that it won't be easy to conclusively separate all of your Sun Life perfins. At this stage I have demonstrated the existence of 19 different perforators located at one time in as many different offices (cities), each with a mail clerk with his own habits of perforating stamps for use by the office. the outline presented in this article, I am sure that you now can identify 20 - 25% of your Canadian Sun Life perfins to office of use.

In another article I will present data for each of the perforators including quantities, positions and measurements made during the plating of these stamps. Also included will be illustrations which will assist in plating these stamps. Happy hunting!!

## HALLOCK CARD AWARD - A BRIEF HISTORY EDITED AND UPDATED FROM AN ARTICLE IN THE AUGUST 1968 PERFINS BULLETIN

Hallock Card, a printer who lived in Otselic, N. Y., was not the first person to collect perfins. He was, however the first to recognize that the fun of collecting perfins could be greatly enhanced if there were enough collectors -- all interested in perfins -- who could form a group, club or society. Thoughts led to action and, unaided, Hallock started mailing circulars to see if he could generate interest in forming a Club.

Through his efforts the Perfins Club was founded in 1943. He worked hard over the formation of the Club and his work was of a permanent nature; all of you receiving The Perfins Bulletin are members of the Club which he founded. Things went well for the Club, it flourished and grew, but, unhappily, things did not go as well for Hallock. His health failed, a serious auto accident took its toll, and later his eyes went bad. In 1956 he closed his albums for the last time. Happily, the foundation which he laid endured in the Perfins Club.

In 1967 it was decided to perpetuate his memory by making an annual award to recognize the member of the Perfins Club who had donemething significant in the field of Perfins Philately or for the Perfins Club.

The first Hallock Card Award was made at the end of 1967 and was announced in the January 1968 Perfins Bulletin. K. F. Lougee recieved this first Award for "His work as editor of the new illustrated catalog of the Perfins Club and for his many years of service as Catalog Chairman of the Perfins Club."

Subsequent recipients of this Award read like a Who's Who of Perfins Philately. They are -- in chronological order:

- 1968 -- David C. Stump -- "for his work as editor of the Perfins Bulletin and for his long service to the Perfins Club."
- 1969 -- Leonard H. Paul -- "for his service in helping to print and prepare for mailing the Perfins Bulletin. For seventeen years..."
- 1970 -- Dorothy L. Savage -- "...for her services as Vice-President of the Perffins Club."
- 1971 -- James P. Harris -- "...for his work as editor of the Perfins Railroad Catalog and for his work with the committee that published and distributed the Perfins Club Illustrated Catalog."
- 1972 -- L. R. Murray -- For work as Club photographer over many years, as Sales Manager for the Club, and as assistant to K. F. Lougee on many projects involving cataloging perfins.
- 1973 -- Richard L. Mewhinney -- In recognition of his activity as Secretary of the Perfins Club, his history of the Perfins Club (published in 1969), and recognizing his work as chairman of the committee to prepare the Club's Constitution and Bylaws.

- 1974 -- Vojtech Maxa -- "Maxa has probably been the most influential person in developing interest in Perfins among collectors in his area of the world." (Czechoslovakia).
- 1975 -- Ivan Ley -- For service to the Club as Sales Manager during the last five years.
- 1976 -- Floyd A. Walker -- For service to the Club including; Editor of The Perfins Bulletin, 1971 1974; Club Secretary 1975 1976; and Club Librarian, in which capacity he was instrumental in cataloging and compiling the Library holdings as we now have them.
- 1977 -- Robert J. Woolley -- "Bob Woolley's name is synonymous with Canadian Perfins research and it is long past time ... to pay tribute to this learned and generous philatelist."
- 1978 -- No Award made.
- 1979 -- Joe and Dorothy Balough -- For "not just their joint efforts on the United States Perfins Catalog, but also for their long-time contributions to the Perfins Club and to perfins philately."
- 1980 -- Jack Gooding -- "Nearly a decade ago Jack offered his help to the Club... He has guided the financial affairs of the Club since that time... Jack volunteered again when we needed an auction chairman..."
- 1981 -- Robert J. Schwerdt -- "Schwerdt has served as foreign catalog editor for more than five years. Since he assumed responsibility for directing foreign perfins research efforts, the number of foreign worksheets in the Library has grown from 30 to nearly 130 and interest in foreign perfins has mushroomed."
- 1982 -- John Needham -- "His work as secretary and his work on foreign perfins, most especially on German perfins, made him unanimous choice for the 1982 Hallock Card Award."
- 1983 -- Rudy Roy -- For "...work as Public Relations Chairman for the Perfins Club..."

This brings us to the present. Time is approaching when a decision will be made for the memmber who will receive the Hallock Card Award for this year. Obviously this is not a popularity contest; the Award is for someone who has really done something for the Club or for Perfins Philately in general. It is a service award.

## WORDS -- WORDS -- WORDS (#1) BY PAUL A. MISTRETTA


Those of you who collect only United States perfins by pattern were probably somewhat confused by the references to "position A", B, C, etc. in the Sun Life article earlier in this issue. Hopefully, when you finish this article these references will make sense.

PATTERNS -- When a perfin collector refers to patterns he should have a specific concept in mind. A perfin pattern is any letter, number, or design -- used either alone or in combination with other letters, numbers, or designs -- which is perforated through the stamp and which has a different shape from other patterns (whether reported or not). Each separate perforator head (DIE) will punch a subtly different pattern. These different patterns are what the Sun Life article is all about. When reported, new patterns are accorded catalog status by being assigned a new catalog number consistant with the numbering system used by the cataloger.

It should be noted that "different shape" can be a very subtle and difficult concept to apply. Patterns punched when a perforator is new are usually sharp and precise. As the perforator wears, or when several sheets are punched simultaneously, the holes punched by the perforator can become less precise (generally bigger holes). Also, pins break off the perforator die or do not completely perforate through multiple sheets. These anomalies are not new patterns but rather are <u>VARIETIES</u>. Varieties are not assigned discrete catalog numbers although they are often cross referenced or assigned a sequence or variety number under a previously assigned number.


Many catalogs blurr the distinction by not establishing and following a defined numbering hierarchy before assigning numbers to patterns and varieties. In fairness to the catalogers, having spent millions of dollars on cataloging, the Library of Congress has still not come up with an adequate system of cataloging books. ANY system of cataloging (of any items) will have inherent problems -- some of them irreconcilable. So if you are a novice and confused, don't be discouraged -- so are most of the true experts.

To illustrate these points:



Different PATERNS, each having a discrete catalog number.





VARIETIES of recognized patterns (pattern first with variety following.)

ISSUES -- When used by a perfinner, this word refers to the stamp on which the perfin occurs, not to the perfin itself. Any distinct stamp, seal, item of postal stationary, or other philatelic item is considered an issue. I have possibly broadened this definition from that used by many of the "purist" school, but I believe that seals, revenue stamps, and other Back-of-the-Book or Cinderella items must be dealt with in the collection of perfins. An issue collection is possible for each known pattern. With approximately six thousand known patterns and several hundred known perfinned issues, a pattern by issue collection becomes a real challange!! -- And there are a few of us sufficiently masochistic to pursue this passtime. Saving graces in the collection of issues are; it is a tremendous challange, every new stamp in an issue collection adds to the accumulated knowlwdge concerning perfin usage, if you stick to D and E rated perfins it is one of the few inexpensive (relatively) pursuits available, and although there are hundreds of known perfinned issues all were not perfinned for each pattern so there is a theoretical limit to the number of stamps to collect.


POSITIONS -- This word, used by a perfin collector, refers to the position of the pattern with relation to the vignette (picture or art) on the stamp or other item. All philatelic items have a natural right-side-up in which the stamp or other item can be interpreted as intended by the artist who prepared the issue. Right-side-up is not always obvious (witness the current tempest in a teapot concerning the National Archives issue), but there IS almost always a proper face side top to an issue. (There is only one exception with which I am familiar. It is a Cinderella item designed to be rotated top/bottom with the same vignette appearing in either position.)

Looking at an issue in the its natural position there are eight different positions in which a perfin can appear. These positions of pattern result from the direction in which the sheet of stamps is fed through the perforator. Die and stamp position cause the position of the pattern on the issue.


Historically these eight positions have been distinguished in catalogs of Canadian official perfins (specifically those edited by Roy Wrigley, and the BNAPS Perfins Study Group). These eight positions, which have been designated A through H in previous works, are illustrated below.

MIRROR PAIRS -- Using the designations for position, mirror pairs are very easily understood. Any attached pair of stamps with the pattern in position A on one stamp and in position B on the other (or with C/D, E/F, or G/H combinations) is a mirror pair. They result from the operator of the perforator folding the sheet of stamps to be perforated in half (for a five die perforator) or into an accordian pleated stack of ten stamps (for a single die perforator). True mirror pairs will show identical respective position in the vignette of the two stamps. False mirror pairs do exist but they are apparently therapy for a bored employee who wanted to see how many varieties he could create -- these will show the perfins misaligned between the two stamps. Two mirror pairs are illustrated below, one true and one false.

#### Colombia

Perfins are found on Colombian stamps in use from 1917 to 1940. Of the eight users, only one remains to be identified. At least one of the commercial perfins was used on fiscal issues. To date, one SCADTA airmail perfin overprinted for use to France has been found; these stamps probably were perfinned in Mulhouse and returned to Colombia.

Many cancelling devices are evident. PAGADO and numerous punch holes of various types are found on postal and fiscal stamps. An ANULADA punch in several sizes is found on postal, postal tax, and fiscal stamps from low to high values. On some ANULADA punches, the word ANULADA is in the cancel or is additionally handstamped. RdeC in punched letters appears on parcel receipts. An article by Rudy Roy in the October 1977 Perfins Bulletin treats Colombian perfins further.

## LITERATURE REVIEWED BY PAUL MISTRETTA

#### IRELAND ...

Mewhinney, Richard L. 1984. Ireland: Catalog of Perfins. Priv. Publ. The Perfins Club. 34p. (8  $1/2 \times 11$ ", three hole punched, unbound, with heavy weight paper covers.)

At last -- a catalog of Irish perfins. This new work replaces a set of worksheets and articles currently available through the Club Library. Having this information in catalog form is a major step forward.

This catalog follows the basic pattern of others published by the Perfins Club in recent years: 2 pages of introductory material, 30 pages (15 pairs of pages) with descriptive material on the left- and illustrations on the right-hand page, and an extremely useful inovation - two pages of "wish list".

The body of the work presents the 260 patterns (about half identified to user) which Dick was able photograph using actual stamps. The wish list presents a listing of 50 additional patterns which have been reported, but which he was unable to authenticate.

Considering the difficulty which I am having collecting complete, undamaged copies of Irish perfins, I was impressed by the quality of the illustrative material. Although there are a few broken patterns and one or two incompletes, the vast majority of the illustrations are prepared from complete, readable perfins. The printing is true black and white (not grey and white) and very readable.

This excellent compilation of Irish perfins should become the standard reference for Irish perfin collectors in very short order.

#### AND DENMARK ...

The Perfinnist no. 10. May 1984. 24 (5 1/2 x 8 1/2") p.

This issue of The Perfinnist contains three articles: A) A set of A&C pages for Peter's Danish catalog (eight new patterns and three corrections); B) A note on the future publication schedule for The Perfinnist; and C) Appendix material -- Pages 23.1-23.8 and 44.1-44.12 of Peter's Danish Handbook. The Handbook material is a discussion of specific differences between look alike patterns (23.1-23.8) and a very clear, illustrated discussion of perforator head deterioration as it affects patterns (44.1-44.12).

Privately published by Peter Engelbrecht, this publication is extremely well printed and quite readable. It is bilingual (Danish and English). For those interested in the perfins of Denmark this periodical is essential.


#### MORE ON US CHM/CO

Rudy Roy (#1124) has written with more information about the CHM/CO perfin first reproduced on page 30 of the February 1984 Bulletin.

"I have a block of 20 (4h x 5w) of the CHM/CO pattern with one row with only the CHM. This is a vertical row, from the left corner of a sheet of the 3c 1938 Washington. Would appear that, from this and the one of Harry's you illustrated (p. 73, Apr. 1984), that it is from a multi-headed perforator, and that the first die to the left is missing the CO. I agree that an A rating is too high, D may be correct."

## COLLECTING WITHOUT ALBUMS

Edward S. Hoyt (#292) writes to share his method of storing foreign perfins for which he has no catalog or album.



Using black paper cut to the size of a 4 7/8 x 3 1/4" glassine envelope he mounts the perfins face down sorted country and letter of the alphabet. He then stores the sheetlets in glassines (2 sheetlets back-to-back per envelope) where they are easily saved and referred to at a You later date. don't have to remove the sheetlets from the glassine to compare with new material which you

get. An example of a sheetlet (stamps mounted without regard for pattern) which shows the fit of 12 stamps (3x4).

Ed. Note -- This is an extremely useful idea, allowing the collector to conserve his or her album money and spend it on stamps rather than on albums. It also will allow a tremendous amount of freedom to reorganize the material as new patterns are added.

But -- I suggest that you do not use simple construction paper for the black sheetlets. Construction paper is a cheap, utility paper which contains active chemicals (as a result of the manufacturing process.) Sulfur products (chiefly sulfuric acid) in these papers will eventually burn stamps. The stamps become discolored (yellowed to browned) and brittle. If you adopt Ed's idea be sure to use a high quality ("fine") paper which is chemically neutral (as close to pH 7.0 as you can possibly get.)

# A NEW U.S. PERFIN

Ed Haack ((#770) writes saying that he has retired -- from his second job. A carpenter for twenty years, Ed gave that up in 1967 and then in 1973 took a job with Multnomah Co. They eliminated his job last summer. However, like so many of you who take the trouble to write, he hasn't been idle. Since November 1981 Ed has been involved in putting out a bulletin for his local post card club (32 pages four times a year.

Ed (owner of three perforators) has now answered a question which I have had for a long time. The answer; this "new pattern, the Beaver, I made myself." So now we know -- it is possible to fabricate your own perforator. Ed writes:



"I have often wondered if it would be possible to use one of the old corporate seals, which work on the same lever action. I was able to purchase some this spring at a Salem flea market... It took me a little while to find the carbon steel pins... using a hack saw...(I) reduced the size of the embosser... drilled the holes with a drill press...

The main problem I had was to get the glue for the metal to Super Glue is still holding from four days ago..."

Ed's one complaint: "I would have liked the (beaver's) tail longer, but to stay in the 1/2" size was not possible."

FANTASTIC!!!

### DUTCH ARTICLE COMMENT

Laurence H. Rehm (Perfins Club Member #808) is Vice President of the American Society for Netherlands Philately and is Co-editor of their bulletin "Netherlands Philately". Mr. Rehm writes:

"I was interested in reading the account of Dutch perfins by A. C. van den Oudenalder which appeared in the May 1984 issue of the Perfins Bulletin.

"The author has understandably stressed the use of the intriguing POKO machine in his coverage of the Dutch perfin scene. However, it should be pointed out that while POKOs hold considerable interest within Dutch perfin philately, they are far from dominating it.

"Exhaustive research by a number of specialists in the field, including long-time Perfin Club member E. J. Enschede, established that just 65 different POKO perfins were ever in use in the Netherlands. In addition to this total, some 35 firms were thought to have used a POKO machine to frank their mail but did not employ a perfin die.

"Against this figure of 65 different POKO perfins, several hundred Dutch firms have employed single and multiple head perforators of one type or another...

"It is from sources like these that the great majority of Dutch perfins were produced. POKOs, while admittedly interesting, actually form a very small part in the overall use of perfins in the Netherlands.

"One small item of correction; the author stated that POKOs were discontinued in June 1942. The last known POKO to see postal use was AL/M, used on a 7 1/2 ct. wartime coil (Scott#243E) by Leder Maatschappij of Amsterdam on February 1, 1944."

#### A NEW BRITISH PERFIN

To commemorate the 40th anniversary of the Battle of Monte Cassino,

Italy in 1944, The Committee of the Polish Philatelists

Association in the United Kingdom decided to organize a stamp exhibition in London on the 20th of May 1984. They issued a commemorative postcard and a new perfin for the occasion. The new pattern (40/MC) is illustrated. Known to be perforated with this new pattern are the 1/2, 1, 3, and 4p QE II stamps in the current British definitive series.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

- This exhibition is open to all individual collectors. The material exhibited must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. Material with dual or corporate ownership is respectfully declined.
- 2. An entry form for each exhibit, along with the entry fee of \$7.00 (Junior \$3.50) per frame, must be mailed to the Exhibit Chairman before September 10, 1984.
- 3. The exhibits will be judged by APS accredited judges, whose decisions will be final. Each exhibit will be judged on its own merits on an open show basis. There will be five levels of awards. A grand award will be awarded to the best exhibit in the show. A Junior award will be awarded to the best exhibit in the junior section. Special awards will be awarded if the required criteria are met. All exhibitors will be given a complimentary pass and exhibition program.
- 4. Each frame will hold 16 pages, 9"x12". Slightly larger pages can be accommodated with some overlapping. Each page must be inserted into a transparent protective sleeve and should bear progressive numbers on the back. Entries with odd size pages must obtain committee approval before an entry form may be submitted for consideration.
- 5. An exhibitor may enter more than one collection provided a separate entry form is submitted for each entry. The maximum number of frames per exhibit is 10 (Junior 5). The minimum number is 2. Collectors who have not reached their 21st birthday as of October 12, 1984, may exhibit, at their option, in the Junior section. Final acceptance will be made after September 10, 1984. The Exhibit Committee reserves the right to refuse any exhibit. All fees paid will be refunded in case of refusal.

- 6. All exhibits should be mailed to Guy R. Dillaway, Exhibit Chairman, Box 181, Weston, MA 02193, to arrive not earlier than September 30, nor later than October 6. Persons wishing to send their exhibits by means other than USPS must make prior special arrangements.
- 7. Personally delivered exhibits will be accepted at the Registration Desk of Philatelic Show (Plaza Castle) Thursday, October 11, from 4 to 8 P.M.
- 8. All exhibits not delivered in person must be forwarded prepaid. Exhibitor must include with the entry fee \$7 for the prepayment of the return of his exhibit by parcel post, insured for \$400, special handling; or \$15 for return by registered mail at full valuation to a maximum of \$25,000. Exhibitors personally retrieving their exhibits on Sunday, October 14, after the show closes, need not remit for the return of their exhibits.
- 9. Owners must provide their own insurance. All reasonable care will be taken to ensure the safety of the exhibits. However, no responsibility shall be attached to Philatelic Show, the Northeastern Federation of Stamp Clubs, Inc., or the Boston Park Plaza Hotel, Plaza Castle, including their officers, members, or employees, for any loss whatsoever.



Thanks to the four Club Members who have sent information about the windmill perfin (Dick Mewhinney (President & LM60), John Needham (LM41), Ivan Pfalzer (#765) and C. Jean Kilmer (#2287)). I will not publish the name of the user of the perforator without direct permission of the individual but, as the following letter will show, he used the original perforator with the permission of the owner Windmill Holland B.V.

Mrs. Margrethe Adderley, a member of the Windmill Study Unit wrote to L. Dirks, Office Manager of Windmill Holland B.V. The pertinent part of Mr. Dirks' reply to her letter is reproduced from the March-April Windmill Whispers (p.7). Thanks Jean!

"We have not started using the perforator again but the following has happened:


- -- A local stamp collector became aware that the perforator still existed and asked us if he could borrow it for some time.
- -- He then, as a joke, mailed some envelopes with perforated stamps to a number of relations of his.
- -- Via one or more of these relations this perforation must have come onto the market.

"Consequently the showed perfin is not a forgery but we have not

started using the perforator again and have no intention to do so."

Three of the four reported that the perforator had been used -- on the envelope and stationery -- but only one reports the receipt of a perfinned stamp (and he already had a classic copy!)

These perfins are NOT forgeries. They are authentic; punched from the original perforating device with the permission of the owner.

Two weeks elapsed before I received a phone call from my friend informing me that indeed there was something at his office which might interest me. Could I make it over at the end of his workday and have a look to decide for myself if the material was of interest.

Documentary stamps on them (Scott R242 and R244). All had the perfin SAL plus a four numeral date on the second line.

Not long ago an illustration and a short article by F. J. Miller explaining the find of an old embarkation coupon with the SAL perfin of the Scandinavian-American Line caught my eye. I immediately recognized the item illustrated as one from my cache of these old documents.

A second small illustration at the head of Miller's article showed a perfin reading SAL/12+94. The perfin had been punched squarely through the \$5.00 Documentary stamp but from the illustration of the perfin or the document illustrating the article one could not determine if the punch had been used as a cancelling device tying stamp to document, or if the SAL perfin was a "true" perfin punched through the stamp only.

Knowing that I still had quite a bit of my hoard of these documents left, I located the box of old steamship tickets and proceeded to check

through each and every copy I had left. I quickly realized that the SAL perfin plus date was used as a validating device, and was not a "true" perfin.

At this point, I should mention that the SAL perfin assigned, number S27 in the Balough & Balough Catalog of United States Perfins, is not the same SAL straightline perfin used on these documents. The one in the Balough & Balough catalog is identified as belonging to the Swedish American Line, NYC, and is 7 millimeters high - while the SAL perfin of the Scandinavian-American Line is 6 millimeters high.

The documents themselves are an interesting record of the travels of certain persons going by steamship to Euope and Scandinavia in a much more relaxed age. The steamships encountered are the "United States", the "Frederik VIII", the "Hellig Olav", etc. Destination points included Danzig, Copenhagen, Malmo (Sweden), Abo (Finland), etc.

On many of the documents, there is a stamped reminder that "U. S. revenue tax \$\_\_\_\_\_ collected stamp affixed to revenue coupon". The \$5.00 stamps paid the tax for adults; the \$3.00 for juniors. The stamps were all then tied to the documents by a SAL perfin. The embarkation coupon was not valid without the tax stamps.

Should any Perfins Club member want one or more of these old documents with SAL perfin, they can be obtained by sending me \$3.00 plus \$.50 postage for each document wanted. My address is - 254 Park Avenue South, Penthouse F, New York, N. Y. 10010. Documents sent will be in good condition, and will have either one or two Documentary stamps attached. The documents illustrating this article with the multiples are unusual and scarce as such, and are retained in my own reference collection.

# ANOTHER CATALOGED PERFIN

In 1882, British Guiana was having a problem with people trying to defraud the post office by either introducing fakes of their typeset stamps or using stamps stolen from postal facilities. Scott has an interesting set listed as #s 103 to 106, four stamps in all, perforated "SPECIMEN" diagonally (4 1/2 mm x 26 mm, small holes) that were postally valid only when perfinned. The curious thing, of course, is that the stamps were not specimens as such, but a perforator that was handy was used to control an issue that had been subject to fraud.

Gibbons notes that the perfin "SPECIMEN" on these stamps is known double, and all catalogs listing these issues also list and price the stamps without perfin. It is possible that the stamps were first released without perfin, and running into some kind of trouble, the postal authorities used a control in the form of the perfin "SPECIMEN". Whether these stamps with perfin were accepted in international mails is another story, and perhaps some other Perfins Club member might have the information on this. I would imagine the precaution taken of using such a perfin would make the issue valid for local use only. It would be interesting to see one on cover, if such cover exists.

# A WESTERN PACIFIC QUESTION

BY PAUL MISTRETTA (FROM AN ILLUSTRATION SENT IN BY BOB GRAY)

Bob Gray (LM-80) has sent the following item which proved to be very interesting. The illustrated strip of 10 is of the Western Pacific patterns cataloged as W154A and W154B (Railroad catalog numbers R197

and R198). The strip appears to have been punched by a 10 die perforator. Mr. Gray was concerned that there were two separate catalog numbers for these patterns.

Using the definition of pattern published in last months Bulletin, we see here a 10 PATTERN strip. The strangest feature of this strip is the 9:1 ratio of the current B:A patterns. The A pattern has an additional pin in the W when compared to the B pattern. Do we assume that 9 of 10 heads on the perforator are broken from their original configuration, and that the same pin broke on all 9?? Not likely. Sabotage of the heads? Again, not likely.

Observations on this strip:

- -- My conclusion that this is a 10 die perforator is supported by a couple of facts; first, all patterns appear in the same orientation; second, the A pattern appears only once in the strip as does the true broken pin variety showing in position 7; and third, there are several other distinct (see later comments) non repeating patterns in the strip. Thus, 10 distinct dies.
- -- If you haven't separated the cataloged patterns yet, the A pattern is the leftmost perfin in the strip.
- -- The 9:1 ratio is consistent with the relative ratings; the B pattern is rated F, the A pattern A.
- -- Those patterns which would be cataloged as W154B right are actually a set of obviously different patterns.
- -- The most obvious unrecognized difference is the position of the topmost pin in the vertical stroke of the P; those in perfin #2, 5, 7 and 8 (from the left) show a distinctly low pin in this position.
- -- The vertical stroke of the P in perfin #6 is not in good alignment; the top three holes do not line up with the bottom three.
- -- The gap between the 3rd and 4th pins in the bow of the P is inconsistent; it is most emphasized in the 4th pattern, and least obvious in patterns 8 and 9.

From this discussion it should be obvious that, while Bob questioned cataloging two different patterns from this strip, my conclusion is that there should actually be eight more. I will leave final disposition of these comments to the US Catalog Committee headed by Joe Baalough. But what IS the explanation for the one oddball (W154A) perfin in this strip of W154B's? Suggestions?





The overalled man of 1917 stands with his left arm at his side while holding a wrench in his right. He is wearing a full formed cap and looks left.







The 1923 cover shows the firms new address and a new man. Note the rolled up sleeves and the oil can in the right hand. overalls are better fitting and with his new hat he is looking right.

After the war, and higher prices, the large logo was reduced and the 1917 man reappears. The firms name has been added but the 1923 address remains.

The three covers show changes in the ownership of the recipient; beginning as a partnership, then a solo (1923), and finally with a son (1925).

Three are found on fiscals, one of those a probable cancelling device. ANULADO and PAGADO in various styles and punch holes in various shapes are also found on both postal and fiscal stamps.

# THE CUBAN REPUBLIC'S FIRST POSTAL CARD

When the supply of 1 centavo stamps (Scott #227) was exhausted due to a contest sponsored by El Figaro, a Habana newspaper, Cuban Postmaster General Fernando Figueredo ordered the local surcharging of 200,000 surplus 3 centavo stamps (Scott #229) revalued to 1 centavo (Scott 232) in order to meet the unexpected demand for additional 1 centavo postage stamps. Both major and minor surcharge varieties occurred due to lack of proper equipment and the rush to complete this task. The first postage stamp of the young Republic of Cuba, a provisional issue (Scott #232), went on sale September 30, 1902 and the entire stock of overprinted stamps was sold out to collectors, speculators, and the general public by October 2.



The Cuban Republic's first postal card (H&G #38) had its origin under similar When the U. S. circumstances. Post Office Department relinquished its control of the island's postal system, Cuban postal officials continued using the two U. S. postal cards overprinted for Cuba under American administration. The U. S. 1c black postal card (UPSS S-17, H&G 36) overprinted "CUBA.-1c. de Peso" (fig. 1) was utilized for domestic purposes while the U. S. 2c black postal card (UPSS S-20, H&G 37) overprinted "CUBA.-2c. de Peso" (fig. 2) was intended for overseas communications. Sometime in late 1903 Cuban postal authorities realized that the supply of ic. de Peso overprinted postal cards was soon to be depleted. This particular card was popular with the general public because it afforded a fast, inexpensive way of acknowledging business transactions, advertising goods and services, announcing club and social functions, and contacting friends and Until new 1 centavo relatives.

and 2 centavo postal cards could be ordered and issued by the Republic, it was decided to create a provisional 1 centavo postal card by perforating a numeral "1" over the 2c. of the "2c. de Peso." overprint of the H&G 37 postal card (fig.3). Unlike its adhesive counterpart, there was no previous announcement concerning the revaluation and distribution of this item to either philatelists or the general public. As a result, the Cuban Republic's first postal card, a provisional issue, went virtually unnoticed.



Why were the postal cards revalued by means of a perforated numeral instead of merely overprinting the new value? When the Republic released its first provisional postage stamp (Scott #232), the worldwide philatelic press severely criticized it as a purely speculative issue. Recognizing that more overprinted items would further damage the reputation of the Cuban Post Office in the eyes of the philatelic world, The Sociedad Filatelica Cubana urged that utmost care be exercised to avoid issuing other overprinted items. Heeding this warning, Postmaster General Figuerdo ordered the postal cards revalued by perforation rather than overprinting.

The perforated numeral "1" consists of a total of 17 holes: four holes in the base, six pairs of holes in the body of the number, and a single hole on the left to complete the numeral, as illustrated in Figure 4. Often one or more holes may be missing in the numeral "1" due to the breaking of the perforating pins during the revaluing process. Although there have been no major errors or varieties reported, the location of the perforated numeral "1" shifts from card to card (figs. 5-7).

The exact quantity of these provisional postal cards has never been revealed. An extract from an official letter of Cuban Postmaster Genera! Figueredo indicates that the revaluing process was ongoing and would cease upon arrival of the new 1 centavo card. It is quite likely that records were never kept on the number of cards perforated. From the perspective of a postal stationery collector, both mint and used copies of H&G 38 are found less frequently than its contemporaries, H&G 36 and 37.

Thus far I have collected data on 21 used perf "1" postal cards:

As can be observed, the earliest known use for H&G 38 is January 20, 1904, although it is possible that there may be even an earlier date eventually reported during the first or second week of January 1904. It seems natural that most cards bear a Habana cancel since the greatest demand would logically be located in the metropolitan Habana area where population would be greatest and literacy rate highest. The rather late usage at Guines (fig. 8) can perhaps be attributed to a quantity of provisional postal cards remaining at a small rural post office even though the new regular 1 centavo postal card (fig. 9) was issued by the Republic during the first week of January 1905. The card cancelled in Trinidad on April 27, 1908 is an unusually late usage. It may have been sitting in the bottom of a desk drawer for a considerable amount of time before the owner noticed it and decided to use it. Also with the addition of 1 centavo in postage, the postal cards cancelled on August 16th, November 21st, December 5th, and December 22 were dispatched to overseas destinations; Berlin, Potsdam and Paris respectively.

Next time you read or hear about a Cuban postal card with a perforated numeral "1", you will know the story behind this unique piece of postal history.

#### PATTERN A176 RESEARCHING BY HARRY RICKARD

An old Bulletin mentioned that pattern A176 was replaced in 1959 with a new perforator, because of missing pins. Thus, was born A176.5.

This recalled to mind my having a new variety of A176 that also fitted M18 except for two missing holes in the center of the M. So, checking my spare A176's, I found them postmarked from many cities.

A St. Louis copy matched the catalog picture, as did one from Milwaukee. However, Chicago and Poughkeepsie cancelled items did not match the catalog at all.

The new variety, shown on Scott 506, has a 1923 date and "SS" cancel, probably Mass. It gives a perfect match on M18 but not on A176.

The partial matches the new variety and M18, but not A176, showing M18 and the partial were produced by the same perforator losing its pins. Because some cities match and others don't, it is evident that the branch office machines were made over a period of years, as business grew. Templates were only used for multiple, simultaneous orders.

A difficult thing for many perfins collectors to learn, is how to properly check for new varieties. Bear in mind that any white space showing, would be metal on a perforator plate. For pins to penetrate holes, the fit must be exact. That's why pins and plates are drilled as a unit.

When overlaying a copy on a catalog picture, match one side, or a top or bottom of one letter, not the overall pattern. If alike, a perfect fit on any portion will automatically cover the remainder. If white space shows on any part of the pattern, you are seeing a different pattern.


Following these instructions, I show the following results:

When checking for new patterns similar to A176, carefully fit the lower right corner hole, then align the row. My new pattern shows the top hole of the M extending above that pictured for A176 and the M is narrower. Measuring confirms these observations.

The Chicago copy is wider than A176, M18 and the new variety; measurement also confirms this observation.

Summary: The new patttern appears to be a complete M18 and M18 appears to be a variety of this new pattern. The Chicago items appear to be a new pattern. Let me know of any town cancels you have.

P. S. - A good pocket size magnifying glass is needed for perfin examinations.

### Peru

Five types of Peruvian stamps are known to exist with perfins: postal, air post, postal tax, postage due, and fiscal. The postage due stamps may have been perfinned when they were used as postage because of a shortage of regular stamps. The postage series of 1918 appears to be the first with commercial perfins. A block of four is needed to determine the exact design of A7. Various style punch holes are found on postal and fiscal issues, and a PAID punch is found on some fiscal stamps. B1-B3 vary slightly in the loops of the B and the shape of the T and are listed separately.

# UNOFFICIAL PERFIN USE -- ONE EXPLANATION BY ELWOOD MESCHTER

Like the Baughers I try to attend flea markets looking for stamps on cover. At a church sale near Kankakee, Ill., I found two post cards with perfins, both obviously unauthorized usage.

One postmarked HERSCHER, ILL. has a copy of A22, "AAM" from Acetylene Chemical Co., Chicago, and the other is F221, Fidelity & Casualty Co., New York, on a card postmarked Buffalo.

The first usage is very curious since Herscher is a small country village, a farming community, about 15 miles west of Kankakee and nearly 100 miles south of Chicago. It is difficult to visualize how a chemical company's stamp could get into the hands of what appears to be a farm laborer. On the other hand, the young man "Dick" may have been an insurance agent who used company stamps to write his "dearie".

When I was a salesman for Link-Belt Co. in Chicago, it was a regular practice for the cashier to issue perfinned stamps to each salesman to insure that he would make daily reports from whatever city he was visiting. While you were supposed to return the excess stamps, the cashier's control often wasn't too strict. Thus, it was possible that a salesman would use company stamps on personal mail.



### A NEW PATTERN FOR SECURITY PURPOSES



Thanks to the initiative of Cora Davison (#1402) and her husband Merle we have some unusually complete information about a new "W(U)" pattern which is now being used by the University of Wisconsin in Madison. After seeing a brief article (reproduced below) which appeared in the Wisconsin State Journal on May 29, 1984, the Davisons wrote the University for more information.

The Assistant Risk Manager of the University responded to the Davison's request for information. In part she wrote:

"During calendar year 1982, the University of Wisconsin-Madison was plagued by a series of stamp thefts totalling more than \$8,000. Out of concern for this problem, a stamp perforator was purchased from the Cummins-Allison Corporation, Chicago, Illinois. The machine is a Model 385 and is capable of perforating 3-4 sheets at one time with a field of 15 standard issue stamps.

"The machine was ordered in September, 1982, arrived in January, 1983 and was first used in February, 1983.

"It is required that all departments which purchase stamps, perforate them. Due to the volume of postage used, some departments use postage meters - some departments have begun this practice since the arrival of the perforator, citing the irconvenience of perforating stamps. In number, however, these departments are in the minority.

".... Perforated stamps are readily identifiable as property of the University and are much more difficult to get rid of as a "fencable" item, both of which seem to have contributed to the reduction in stamp thefts. Since July, 1983, UW-Madison has had no stamp thefts."

# UW thieves change taste during 1983

Thieves on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus changed their preference last year from stamps to electronic balances, according to the 1983 annual report issued by University Police and Security.


Although more than \$8,000 worth of stamps were stolen in 1982, that amount was reduced to \$3,500 worth taken last year due to the purchase of a stamp perforator, which makes stamps purchased by the university easy to identify.


All the stamps stolen last year were purchased before the perforator was acquired, the report said.

While police apparently licked the stamp theft problem, they were faced with a new problem last year when \$19,500 worth of electronic balances were stolen. Three stolen balances later were recovered during narcotics investigations.

Computer equipment thefts from university buildings also continued last year with nearly \$30,000 worth of equipment taken compared to \$39,000 in equipment stolen the previous year.

An instruction sheet printed by the Office of Business Services of the University (undated) required that: "Effective February, 1983, all postage stamps purchased by Madison Campus departments must be perforated to indicate restrictive use for University of Wisconsin purposes only".








According to the instructions there are six steps to be followed when purchasing stamps for departmental use. Steps 1-3 deal with the process of requisitioning stamps, steps 4-6 deal with the perforation and subsequent treatment of the stamps. Summarizing 4-6 the rules are: purchase regular issue sized stamps; perforate all stamps; return stamps to a secure location in the departmental office; use as needed for official purposes.

Included in the information provided by the University was a copy of the Cummins-Allison Corp. layout sheet which had been submitted to the University for approval. Illustrated on this sheet are two alternate, subsequently rejected patterns. It is doubtful that essays of these patterns were produced. The rejected illustrations are reproduced below.

The new pattern supercedes pattern W200. The obsolete perforator which produced pattern W200 is now in the museum of the Wisconsin State Historical Society. It's condition is unknown at the present time, but it is possible that its' existence was forgotten while the new machine was being purchased.






On the previous page is reproduced a copy of the Cummins information sheet which describes Model 385, and several other models of Cummins' perforating machine.

Thanks to the Davisons for their work in documenting this new perfin pattern.

#### CONGRATULATIONS ED!

Ed Haack (#770) has done it again -- exhibited, that is. Congratulations on the Silver-Bronze medal earned at PIPEX in Portland last May. Ed showed US material, stamps and covers (perfinned) from the 1908 - 1918 era.

He has also created a new block of four perfins using four different perforators, all his. This block is similar to one used by ed last August (1983) and illustrated in the January 1984 Bulletin.

### THE PERFINS CLUB SALES DEPARTMENT

Sales manager Dick Mewhinney has established some guidelines for members wishing to use the Sales Department to buy or sell perfins.

ONLY MEMBERS of the Perfins Club may use the service of the Sales Department. The Club will charge a 20% commission on all sales to help cover the expenses of the Department. Members who receive consignments from the Department must return the perfins which they do not purchase, along with payment for those they keep, within 10 days of receipt.

Because purchases of less than \$8 do not cover expenses for a shipment, a member who purchases less than \$8 worth of perfins at a time must pay postage both ways.

Buyers may request shipments of the following types of material.

- A. U.S. books of stamps with a rating of C or better.
- B. U.S. envelopes of D-rated stamps.
- C. U.S. envelopes of E-rated stamps.
- D. U.S. envelopes of specialties such as railroads, precancels, or parcel post stamps.
- E. Foreign envelopes. Please specify the country or countries.

Purchasers must keep an accurate account of what is taken from each book or envelope and make a full report to the Sales Manager when they return the shipment.

Members who wish to sell material through the Sales Department are invited to prepare either books or envelopes according to the above list.

The Sales Manager will provide up to three sales books without charge to members who wish to fill them and offer them for sale through the Department. Additional sales books are \$.25 each.

The books each hold 100 stamps and should be filled with stamps selling for at least \$.25 each to make it worthwhile for prospective buyers. Each stamp in the book is to be marked with the US Perfins Catalog number, the rating, and the price.

Envelopes should be #3 glassines (2 1/2 by 4 1/2 inches) or similar size (use new glassines please) and should contain up to 150 perfins. D and E rated perfins should not be mixed in the same envelope. Countries should not be mixed. There should be no more than three of the same design in each envelope.

Pricing is left up to the seller. The law of supply and demand is very much the rule. If you have no idea how to price your perfins, ask the Sales Manager for help, but do not expect that pricing will be done for you.

### IS US B224A FOR REAL? BY HARRY RICKARD

Brown Shoe Co. was a major shoe manufacturer for many years in St. Louis, Mo.

During the early part of this century the company used the characters Buster Brown and Tige in their advertising and for their logos. Two different logos are reproduced .

At the time of the 1966 Catalog there was no Brown Shoe Co. listing. In the 1979 Catalog, however, a partial design from a damaged cover was reconstructed to yield pattern B224A.

More recent evidence suggests that this pattern may actually not be valid.

The most telling evidence for this conclusion is that B224, used by the Bethlehem Steel Co., fits perfectly over B224A. In addition, the covers presented do not show use of the B224A presumed perfin; the 1910 cover, a stamped envelope, is not perfinned; the 1921 and 1926 covers show the use of unperfinned coil stamps dispensed by a machine (as evidenced by the stamps having clipped perforations); and the 1931 air mail cover also shows the absence of a perfinned stamp. B224 was in use during the time that B224A was supposed to have been in use; the same era as these unperfinned stamps were used on cover.

Finally, about 10 years ago I recieved the information that the Brown Shoe Company had no record (or recollection) of ever having had a perforating machine. This information was recieved indirectly from the company (through the correspondence of another Club member with a representative of the Brown Shoe Co.).

For comparison, many of the Bethlehem Steel perfins are precancelled (Bureau) "St. Louis, Mo.". The only stamp I have seen identified as B224A was precancelled St. Louis and was, in fact B224.

Without seeing the actual cover from which B224A was reconstructed I can only speculate as to the use of the perfin on the cover. We know of unauthorized usage of perfins -- why not Bethlehem Steel perfins on a Brown Shoe Comapany envelope. While it would require two different jobs -- one at Bethlehem Steel and one at Brown Shoe -- why not. Someone who uses company envelopes probably would not worry about using another companies stamps.


At this point in time, the negative data seems to outweigh the information supporting the existence of this pattern. Does anyone have definite evidence for the existence of this pattern? If so, let me know (Harry Rickard, 2163 Cumbre Pl., El Cajon, CA 92020).

# PERFINS AND YOUR POCKETBOOK

This might prove to be the most unpopular article ever to have appeared in The Perins Bulletin. At the very least, I expect that the following words will result in a storm of criticism from my brother and sister perfinners, and meet a wall of resistance that will make the Roman emperor Hadrian's wall in Britain look like a child's sand work at Coney Island.

In the July-August issue of the Perfins Bulletin, John Needham is quoted as saying that "the worst thing that can happen to perfinners is to have priced catalog recognition." Examples of perfins listed in the Scott and Michel catalogs are cited, and the editor elaborates on one example mentioned by Needham -- a very expensive perfin, Spain #307, variety 4p lake perfinned B.H.A., catalogued at an astounding \$1,250.00.

Somewhere in the Bible it says: Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." Perfin collectors have been doing just that for years. Now the monster, money, rears its ugly head and threatens to spoil the fun -- the idyllic relationship that the perfinner has had with his hobby from the very beginning.

Flashback! When I first decided on a part-time dealership in the stamp business many years back, I made the rounds of the wholesalers here in New York City looking for likely supplies to start with. I recall one of my first visits to a supplier where I made known the purpose of my call. I was advised to "buy bundles of foreign stamps," so that I might make up packets to sell.

On the sidelines, another retailer waiting his turn watched me with interest. When the wholesaler went back to get an assortment of bundles, the fellow at my elbow quickly whispered to me, "Don't buy his bundles -- they're loaded with perfins!"

At that moment, I couldn't quite make sense out of the admonition thrown at me -- what in the world could be wrong with perfins? When the wholesaler returned I bought the bundles which he brought out without hesitation.

When I arrived home, I didn't waste any time, I sat down and began opening up one bundle after another. Sure enough! The bundles I had purchased were loaded with perfins -- I recall at least fifteen perfins in each bundle of one hundred stamps. There they were -- those unsightly "holey" stamps that the other dealer had warned me about.

A few years ago -- again contrary to the advice of several other seasoned dealers -- I decided to try to build up a stock of worldwide perfins. There was little chance of competetion since most dealers wouldn't touch the specialty with the proverbial ten-foot pole. Not

only did perfins really hold a fascination for me, but there in one corner of my stockroom I had squirrled away some eight to ten thousand of the little buggers; and I was a dealer.

Today perfins are growing in popularity: membership in the Perfins Club is bound to go over the thousand mark sooner or later; and catalogs of perfins, sometimes priced, sometimes with rarity ratings, are coming more quickly off the presses. A good example is the excellent perfin catalog, Svenska Skyddsperforeringar, published recently by the Sverges Filatelist-Forbund. This catalog alone is credited with tripling the number of perfin collectors in Sweden -- and as a direct result, Swedish perfins are selling as fast as they can be found in dealers' stock.

My own specialty, Finland, is another case in point worth noting. There are only ten Finnish patterns known -- ASEA, FORD, F&CO., J.G.W., K.B., N., S., TKT, V, V.E. And what specialist in Finnish perfins wouldn't like to get his or her hands on all ten. During my own in depth experience with Finnish material, I have only come across perhaps 200 to 250 Finnish perfins, with only five of the ten known patterns represented. I have never had any problems retailing what I had. Fifty to seventy five cents each would not be unreasonable to ask considering the tremendous demand for Finnish material.

In other words, I am saying here loud and clear to all my fellow perfinners: Supply being what it is -- demand being what it is -- we have to recognize the fact that we can't go on buying perfins "without money and without price." Perfins are catalogued more and more, and perfins are gaining in respectability and popularity.

For the very near future, I would say that you should expect a situation where the 2c to 5c perfin -- like the 5c cigar of my dad's time -- becomes a thing of the past. If you doubt that this is happening, I would suggest that you visit your friendly local stamp dealer now, and ask him what he has in perfins and what he wants for them. (If they are from Japan, Finland, Sweden, Canada, or any of the other hot sellers, I would advise that you hold on to your hat when he tells you the price he is asking.)

Yes, perfins are now worth money -- and those big city dealers who not so long ago smirked, scoffed and snickered when they heard you are a perfins collector are now rolling their sleeves up and getting ready to give you a hearty welcome.

And should you be sorry that this is happening? My answer is NO. With the increased demand which results from the growing number of perfins collectors, with more research being done, with new priced catalogs being published, and yes, even with retail prices of perfins reaching levels to which we are unaccustomed, there will be more and greater benefits to be reaped by one and all involved in our specialty.



# STUDYING MULTIPLE HEAD PERFORATORS (FROM IMPORNATION PROVIDED BY JOE MILLER)

Last December we showed a sheet reconstruction which Joe Miller had done for pattern S191 (Perf. Bull. 36:134-135). Joe wished to demonstrate clearly the lateral feed of a sheet through a multiple die Cummins perforator (which differs from the more normal vertical feed of these machines). In addition Joe reports that patterns B275, R154, S284 and U41 are products of laterally fed machines. The pictured multiple of B275 shows clearly that the sheet was fed laterally through the perforator. The top pattern is intact, the center pattern has two broken pins in the ampersand and the bottom pattern has a different pin broken in the ampersand.

Since that time Joe has sent in a list of multiple die heads which he knows are being studied.

The illustration below is the largest multiple of pattern
T121 which he has been able to locate. Note that there are
slight differences in the 7 1/2 patterns (primarily in the
vertical lines of the M and the T, and the center of the
M). Joe would like further information about the actual
position of these eight dies on the perforator head; the strip does
not establish their position for certain, except in relation to each
other. Incidentally, the reason the patterns do not seem to fit on
the stamps is that the strip is of New York State stock transfer
stamps.



A complete listing of the multiple die patterns which are currently being studied (of which Joe is aware) is presented below.

## Uruguay

Uruguay A4 and Paraguay A1 are duplicate designs. These twins are among the earliest of South American perfins. Stamps of the 1928-1932 Artigas design were affixed to square advertising labels and then punched with the A1 design. Because of the advertising, these stamps could be bought for less than the face value. Designs A5 and A6 may be types of invalidating punches rather than commercial perfins, but they are listed in the A section for the time being. Various punch holes in the shape of stars, quatrefoils, hearts, and so on, are found on postage, airmail, and official stamps used by government officials. Some revenue stamps are found punched with a set of numerals. ## Venezuela

No commercial perfins are found on the stamps of Venezuela. Only two revenue perfins, punched at various angles, are generally found on 'instruccion' fiscals. Two types of official punches exist: GN/1910 in solid letters found on both postal and fiscal issues, and the perforated GN found on more than 100 postal, one semi-postal, and more than 100 airmail stamps. There may be slight variations in the solid punch varieties. Some fiscal stamps are punched with solid Vs, holes, and squares. Check the Perfins Club Library for further information about Venezuelan punches and perfins.



# PERFINS OF THE KOSANGAS COMPANY BY EDWARD HOYT (FROM INFORMATION PROVIDED BY PETER ENGELBRECHT)

The Kosangas Company is a Danish company which distributes liquid butane gas in large metal cylinders. These butane cylinders were used where no city electricity or gas was available, such as summer residence areas.

Pattern K44 (KOSAN) was the first perfin used by this company. It has been found from Kobenhaven, Koge, Middlefart, Nykobing Fl., Norresundby and Aarhus between 1955 and 1958.

Perfin SYM4 shows the gas cylinder in stylized form. Used after December 1957 this pattern is known from all of the mentioned towns.

From early 1967 four of the branch offices (Aarhus, Koge, Middlefart and Norresundby) each has used its their own perforator.





The main office in Copenhagen (Kobenhaven) is still using the flask pattern; it has been seen on cancelled Margrethe II stamps.

#### A WARNING!

A CAUTION: Rudy Roy recently wrote expressing concern about a "perfin" (the Cuban card discussed in the Tyx article last month) for sale. "Recently there was offered by a New York auction firm a copy of this card with the perforation reported as "double". I have it on unimpeachable authority, from a Cuba collector/student/expert who saw the card that it was 'less than genuine' - the holes of one of the 1's being reversed relative to the other."

Joe continues his interest in perfins on revenue stamps. The letter in which this information was sent included the often repeated warning -- perfin ratings (A-F) are based on perfins punched on postage stamps. The same pattern on a revenue stamp often has a completely diefferent value. Some uncommon postage stamp patterns are very common on revenues and vice-versa.

So take care when buying patterns with a high catalog rating -- make sure you get what you pay for!

# MORE POLISH PERFINS FROM BRITAIN INFORMATION PROVIDED BY V. Z. J. NOVICKI


The perfin 40/MC announced in the July/August is the first used by the newly formed Polish Philatelic Federation in Great Britain. This Federation was formed from the two existing groups of Polish philatelists in England; the Polish Philatelic Society (formed in 1952) and the Polish Philatelists Association (formed in 1979). Since that time three additional perfins have been issued by this federation.



The DM/C perfin was issued to celebrate the 30th anniversary of the Polish Divine Mercy College in Fawley Court - Henley on Thames - Oxon. As previously, the anniversary was commemorated with a special pictorial cancel, cacheted envelopes and official perfinned postcards. The bulk of the perfins were used to frank these items on June 6, 1984.

The perfin P/FF was issued by the P(olska) F(ederacja) F(ilatelistyczna) w W. Brytanii, the Polish Philatelic Federation in Great Britain, to frank future souvenir

postcards, letters, Bulletins, etc. First use was July 7, 1984.



Finally, the AK/44 perfin has also been issued by this group. No information has yet come to me about this item, but it is reproduced on the left pending further information.
