Arrange Passover Services for Servicemen in Armed Forces

A Passover service and dinner for men and women in the armed forces will be held on Thursday evening, March 29, at 7:45 o'clock in the Jewish Community Center, it was announced this week by Robert Brown, chairman of the Passover committee of the Army and Navy committee of the Jewish Welfare Board, under whose auspices the service has been arranged.

It is expected that Commodore Wyatt, of the U. S. Naval Air Station, Quonset Point, Captain Fred Rogers, USN, Commander Hunter of Camp Endicott and Comman-

der Blancke will be present at the service.

Chaplain Benjamin Kreitman will conduct the services and a dinner which constitutes a part of the ritual will be served.

A Passover Message

Once again it is our privilege to extend greetings to our congregants, as well as to all the people of our community in the spirit of Passover, the feast of freedom. Perhaps never before in history has this holiday had such deep world-wide meaning as it has today.

For us of this day, the Passover is symbolic of the desperate struggle in which we are engaged. King Pharaoh of ancient Egypt who enslaved and tortured ancient Israel and whose tyranny and cruelty are rehearsed in the course of the Passover ritual, pales into insignificance alongside the tyrants and oppressors of today. It is not Israel alone that is sighing and groaning because of the bondage to which they are subjected to, but a great part of Europe is still enslaved and writhing in the clutches of the foulest and most dreadful tyranny known in history. But even as redemption came to Israel of old, so are we witnessing in our day the process of redemption and liberation coming not only to our own people, but to all who have been enslaved by the Pharaohs of our time.

The Passover story must keep us firm and unwavering in the faith that a just and merciful God will hear the cries of the oppressed and will champion our cause. We call upon the Jewish people of Rhode Island to join with their fellow Americans of other faiths in furthering the great war effort of our country. To a man, we must support our valiant President, our Government, and all the various agencies created to cooperate with the armed forces of this nation in the great task that confronts us.

Let us, during this coming holiday, assemble in our Houses of Worship, and with all the sincerity and fervor of which we are capable, pray for our boys in the various branches of the service, who, on land and sea, are defending the cause of liberty and justice. May the Almighty God shield them and grant them complete and speedy victory.

Rogge Defers

Action on Sedition Trial Motion

WASHINGTON — Action on a motion for dismissal charges or a speedy retrial, brought by Ernest Elmhurst, Robert Noble and Ellis Jones, defendants at last year's mass sedition trial in Washington, has been postponed for two weeks by District Court Justice T. A. Goldsborough. Special Government Prosecutor O. John Rogge stated that the Government was not opposed to a speedy retrial, but wants the matter referred to the Chief Justice of the District Court who will assign a judge and trial date.

Demand Representation at San Francisco Conference

NEW YORK — A demand that Jewish representation be permitted at the United Nations conference in San Francisco next month was made last week in a formal statement of the American Zionist Emergency Council.

Following similar demands made by the World Zionist Organization in Jerusalem this week, the statement was issued from the New York headquarters of the American Zionist Emergency Council, which represents all major Zionist groups in the United States.

Pointing out that Arab nations will be represented, the organization stated that Jewish Palestine should be allowed to take part in making decisions that will affect its future.

Congress Declines "Unity" Conclave

Refuses Judge Proskauer Invitation

NEW YORK — The American Jewish Congress announced that it has declined the invitation of Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, president of the American Jewish Committee, to join in "an informal conference" with a view toward developing common action on the basis of a three-point post-war program presented by its "Peace Problems Committee."

In a letter to Judge Proskauer, Rabbi Irving Miller, chairman of the Congress Executive Committee, declared that the Congress as a constituent part of the American Jewish Conference cannot undertake to join with Jewish bodies which are outside of the conference. Such action, the letter declared, would be destructive of the unity of American Jewry

Roosevelt Reaffirms Pledge to Aid Establishment of Jewish Palestine

Says Position Declared Oct. 15 Remains Unchanged

WASHINGTON, D. C. — President Franklin D. Roosevelt this week reaffirmed the pledge he made in his historic message of October 15th addressed to the 47th annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America, in which the chief executive promised to "effectuate the establishment of Palestine as a free and democratic Jewish Commonwealth."

This week's statement by the President was issued following a visit to the White House by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, chairman of the American Zionist Emergency Council, who conferred with the President for three quarters of an hour. The President's statement follows:

"I made my position on Zionism clear in October. That position I have not changed and shall continue to seek to bring about its earliest realization."

In his October declaration which was brought in person by Senator Robert F. Wagner, to the 47th annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America in Atlantic City, President Roosevelt clarified his position on Zionism in the following message:

Dear Bob: "Knowing that you are to attend the 47th Annual Convention of the Zionist Organization of America, I ask you to convey to the delegates assembled my most cordial greetings. Please express my satisfaction that in accord with traditional American policy, and in keeping with the spirit of the Four Freedoms, the Democratic Party at its July convention this year included the following plank in its platform:

"We favor the opening of Palestine to unrestricted Jewish immigration and colonization, and such a policy as to result in the establishment there of a free and democratic Commonwealth." "Efforts will be made to find appropriate ways and means of effectuating this policy as soon as practicable."

Press Attacks Magnes' Proposals

TEL AVIV — Dr. J. L. Magnes, president of the Hebrew University, whose proposals for numerical and political parity between Jews and Arabs have received wide publicity in the American and British press, is being accused by the Hebrew press of doing harm to Jewish Palestine and world Jewry and of confusing the friends of the Jewish effort. The Hebrew press attack on Dr. Magnes came through a series of editorials referring to the reported Arab-Cairo proposal for the admission of a limited number of Jews in excess of the White Paper quota, but with a provision limiting the Jews to one-third of the country's total population.

Prof. Charges Scholarships At Harvard Not for Jews

BOSTON — A brilliant Harvard student, who headed a list of scholarship applicant, was refused a scholarship because a "gentlemen's agreement" barred Jews from receiving such grants, it has been charged by a Harvard chemistry professor at a legislative hearing on an anti-discrimination bill patterned after the new Ives law in New York.

Dr. Albert S. Coolidge, lecturer in physical chemistry at Harvard and head of the Massachusetts Civil Liberties Union, said the "gentlemen's agreement" was with the chemical concern donating the scholarship. The understanding was that it would not be given to a Jew.

"We know perfectly well," Dr. Coolidge said, "that names ending in 'berg' and 'stein' have to be skipped by the board in the selection of students for the scholarship."

Jews in Rumania List Complaints

BUCHAREST — With the formation of a new cabinet in Rumania, leaders of the Jewish Party are in a position, for the first time since the liberation of the country, to reveal that although Jews enjoyed freedom under the Radescu cabinet, which was formed after the overthrow of the pro-German Antonescu Government, they nevertheless had many grounds for complaints.

PASSOVER RECIPES

Wine Cake

12 eggs, separated
1 cup wine or milk or water
1 cup sugar
1 cup cake meal
½ teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup ground walnuts
Beat together egg yolks and sugar until very light. Add wine. Sift and add cake meal. Add salt, cinnamon and nuts. Beat egg whites stiff, and fold in. Bake at 325 degrees for an hour. After removing from oven, invert pan and let cake cool before removing from pan.

Cheese Pancakes

½ pound cottage cheese
4 eggs, well beaten
1 teaspoon butter
½ cup matzo meal
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 teaspoons sugar, if desired
Mix cheese with eggs, stir other ingredients in slowly. Fry in a liberal amount of butter until light brown on both sides. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and cinnamon, if desired, and serve hot.

Matzo Pancakes

2 matzos
2 eggs
½ cup water
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
3 tablespoons fat
2/3 cup (about) matzo meal

Cut each matzo into four parts, moisten them and place in a strainer set over boiling water. Let steam until soft. Combine water and matzo meal to make a soft batter, add salt and pepper and spread on one side of the pieces of matzo. Heat fat in frying pan, place pieces of matzo in frying pan batter side down. Fry until brown. Then spread batter over top of pieces of matzo, turn and fry until brown on this side also. The matzos may be omitted and the batter dropped into hot fat by tablespoons.

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SNAPSHOTS OF BIG SHOTS:
(This Is What Comes from Reading Books!)

Edgar Allan Poe was a dollar-a-year-man too.....He spent 10 years writing and rewriting "The Raven" and got 10 bucks for it.....The original manuscript sold the last time for \$10,000.....Poe paid \$3 a month rent for his honeymoon cottage on Grand Concourse (in the Bronx), which is now a New York state historical shrine. If it hadn't been a grand neighborhood for dandelions he and his bride would have starved.

Marconi, son of an Italian father and Irish mother, was 27 when he invented radio, and even then there were people who wanted to kill him.....These cranks said electrical waves were passing through their bodies, destroying their nerves and making it impossible for them to sleep.

Barnum, who said "there's one born every minute," was one himself. He lost a fortune on a bear's grease hair tonic, was swindled out of another selling illustrated bibles, trimmed again on a fire extinguisher that wouldn't extinguish, went into bankruptcy for half a million making alarm clocks.....Without a dime to his name he wrote a lecture on "How to

Foundation Historian



Maurice Stollerman, former executive director of the Jewish Children's Home, and at present superintendent of the Miriam Hospital, has been selected to write a history of the Jewish Children's Home and Foundation of R. I. It was announced this week by Dr. Archie Albert, president of the Foundation. Mr. Stollerman has written many articles on child care, including a book entitled, "Child Guidance." Several years ago he conducted a survey of the State institutions.

"Make Money," grossing \$1,000 a night.....And that's how the famous Barnumism was born.

Alexander Dumas, one-fourth Negro, whose book "The Three Musketeers," was a best seller for almost 100 years, used to boast that he had more than 500 children and swore he would never marry.....He changed his mind when a smart sweetheart bought up all his debts and gave him a choice between marriage and jail.....He wrote novels on blue paper, poetry on yellow, articles on red, and nothing else would do.....He wrote more than 1,200 volumes of plays, novels and histories, made over 5 million dollars and died broke living off the charity of his son.

Woolworth started his five-and-dime stores on a capital of \$300, and his first three failed. Thirty years later he was able to pay \$14,000,000 cash for the building bearing his name, then the world's highest office building.

George Gershwin sold his first song for \$5; nine years later a Hollywood studio paid \$50,000 just to use "Rhapsody in Blue," which he wrote in his spare time, in a single picture.

Sir Isaac Newton was so absent-minded he once rammed his niece's fingers into his pipe..... Trying to fix himself a three-minute egg, he boiled his watch while watching the egg.....When he went to fetch anything he usually came back without it.....He was usually last in his class at school.....He was a woman hater and never married.....He always claimed he solved many of his mathematical problems in his sleep.

Dr. Samuel Johnson continually distorted his face by violent grimaces.....When walking in the street he touched every post he passed and if he missed one he always returned. He always made a point of entering or leaving a door on a certain foot but his biographer, Boswell, wasn't sure which one.

Lord Byron was so emotional that once a theatrical performance put him into convulsions.....In a fit of temper he threw his watch into the fire and hammered it to pieces with the poker.....He also

fired a pistol in the bedroom of his wife, who left him after a year of marriage.....So he went to Venice and bought a harem.

Schiller liked to keep his feet in ice while working.....He once wrote a full and perfect description of the Swiss land and people—although he knew neither..... Coleridge, who wrote "Kubla Khan" under the influence of an opiate, could remember only 54 lines when he sufficiently recovered to write.....Rochefoucauld at times imagined himself to be a horse and neighed, trotted and jumped like one.....Beau Brummel, the fashion plate (who taught the Prince of Wales how to dress), died in rags in an insane asylum.

Beethoven had a passion for moving and sometimes was paying rent on two or three places at once, but Mozart, who died at 35, starved and frozen, never could pay rent on one.

Chopin walked out on the biggest love of his life because she didn't offer him a chair before she offered one to others in the room.....In his will he ordered himself buried in white tie, dress shoes and silken knee breeches.

Soldier, Parents Reunited in Cologne

COLOGNE — M/Sgt. Bernard Bernkof of Camden, N. J., German born interpreter with the U. S. 1st Army, was reunited with his father and mother whom he had not seen in 12 years, 12 hours after U. S. forces entered Cologne. Sgt. Bernkof, who hadn't heard from his parents since 1941, found his father on the streets of Cologne and his mother safe in a nearby house.

They are among the 100 surviving Jews out of Cologne's post-war Jewish population of 16,000. They were harbored by Gentiles and moved from place to place to escape the Gestapo who were rounding up the last remnants of Jews in the Rhineland cities.

Zionists to Present Scroll to Weizmann

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Revealing that plans are now under way to tender Dr. Chaim Weizmann a reception of national scope upon his arrival in this country, the national headquarters of the Zionist Organization of America, in a call made public here, designated the week of Passover for an intensified effort in behalf of the 100,000 Membership Class launched in tribute to the world Zionist leader.

Issued over the signatures of Dr. Israel Goldstein, president, and Saul S. Spiro, secretary, the call emphasizes the significance of Weizmann's mission to the United States in relation to the forthcoming conference of the United Nations in San Francisco. It is planned to make the presentation of the Membership Scroll to Dr. Weizmann during the San Francisco Conference.

JDC Announces Relief Goal of 46 Million in '45

NEW YORK — To save and aid the greatest number possible of nearly a million destitute Jews in liberated Europe, and many in other overseas areas, the Joint Distribution Committee will seek to raise \$46,570,000 in a country-wide appeal, Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, national chairman of the relief organization's campaign, made known this week. The relief goal was set by the JDC national Campaign Organization Committee meeting at the Hotel Biltmore.

Rabbi Wise told the gathering that in its thirty years of existence, during which it has served as the principal American relief-giving agency for Jews overseas, the JDC has never had to face a task as enormous as this year's.

At the same time, Joseph C. Hyman, executive vice-chairman of the JDC, told how the organization is currently providing emergency assistance in some sixteen countries in Europe and North Africa, aids in emigration to Palestine, and assists in other areas affected by the global war.

Rabbi Wise, in his remarks, said the nearly one million Jews needing help make up the greater part of an estimated million and a half

Jews still in continental Europe who survived Hitler's planned destruction of the Jewish population there. He stated: "To neglect those who escaped Hitler's policy of extermination is to give tacit approval to his monstrous plan for the total destruction of the nine-million Jews in Europe before the rise of Nazism."

Former Internee Now in U. S. Army Foils Nazi Plan

NEW YORK — A former internee in a Hitler concentration camp, now serving as a Lieutenant in the U. S. Army, was instrumental in thwarting a Nazi plot to unleash 170,000,000 tons of water in an 18-foot tide directly in the path of the advancing American First Army.

Lieut. Ernest Kaufman, of Philadelphia, fighting on the Siegfried line on terrain familiar from childhood, apprised his commanding officer of the impending danger from the Schwammenauel dam which he knew had a concrete core under millions of tons of pyramided earth.

As soon as Aachen was taken, he headed for the power company where he succeeded in unearthing the German blueprint for flooding the entire Roer Valley.

Many Farmers Have Telephone Service

Evidence that telephone service has been made readily available to New England farmers is found in figures published by the United States Census Bureau as a result of the 1940 census, according to a statement by the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company. "In the New England States," the Company says, "nearly half of all farms had telephone service, a figure nearly equal to telephone use in urban areas ranging up to big-city size. And the United States leads all the world in scope and quality of its telephone service."

Vets Oppose Taft FEPC Bill

Agency Would Have Little Power

NEW YORK — Opposition to the substitute bill introduced by Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio to establish a permanent Fair Employment Practice Commission with purely investigatory and advisory duties was voiced this week by Archie E. Greenberg, national commander of the Jewish War Veterans of the U. S.

Speaking for the 250,000 Jewish veterans of World War I and the more than 500,000 Jews now in service, Commander Greenberg reiterated the support of the Jewish War Veterans for S.101, the bi-partisan bill for a permanent FEPC with enforcement powers, the successor bill to S. 2048 originally introduced in the 78th Congress.

"The Taft bill," said Commander Greenberg, "is nothing more than a pious expression against discrimination in unemployment. It doesn't provide the permanent Fair Employment Practice Commission with the power to enforce its decisions and doesn't compel employers to live up to non-discriminatory fair employment practices."

20,000 Jews in UNRRA Camps

WASHINGTON — There are less than twenty thousand Jews in all UNRRA camps, Fred K. Koehler, director of the Displaced Persons Bureau of UNRRA, declared on his arrival here after eight months overseas. Stating that he could not estimate the number of stateless Jews, Mr. Koehler declared that of the 15,000,000 displaced persons in Europe, some two million were stateless or of unspecified nationality, and these "doubtlessly included many Jews."

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FIRST NATIONAL STORES

A Story of The Jewish Community of Providence

By BERNARD SEGAL, M.S.

On an afternoon of a Spring-like day last week, I found myself strolling along North Main street. I leaned against the iron railing and watched the muddy waters of the Mooshasuck River, lapping lustily against the stone foundations of a mattress factory and disappearing underground. From there, I passed on to the Roger Williams Spring and lingered at that remarkable shrine. For the hundredth plus time, I read the bronze tablets and reflected on the historical appropriateness of this memorial.

From the first Jew who enjoyed the fruits of religious equality in this city, a memorial to the first white man, who came here to enjoy religious freedom.

As I looked around me my eyes met the names of Marcus, Fain, Feinstein and Rosen on either side of the oldest street in Providence. Three hundred some years back, we are told, these were the dwelling sites of the Olneys, the Dexters, the Scotts and the Mantons, all neighbors of Roger Williams, who laid out the road for their Town Street, now North Main.

How did this transformation come about? Who were the first

Pioneers of the Jewish race? How did they fare? What share do they have in making this city the second largest community in New England?

Time Is Ripe for the Story

The Jewish community of Providence is coming of age. There are no longer many among the living, who can tell of the early days here. One of our Synagogues is observing the first century of its incorporation. There are, no doubt, evidences of organized communal life of even an earlier date. A careful search will unearth a wealth of legends treasured within the family circles of the older settlers. Many of our present day institutions are outgrowths of early efforts, now extinct. Organizations once vital to the preservation of the group, have long outlived their usefulness and have passed from the scene. Their struggles and aspirations are buried in the dusty records of their proceedings and will eventually be lost forever.

All these, legends, as well as facts, will go to make up the story

of the Jewish Community in Providence.

We need this story for ourselves. It will serve us as a "Din W'cheshbon", a stock taking of our achievements.

We need the story for the coming generations. The post-war period will bring about changes in our economic and social lives. These changes we can but vaguely visualize, but it is certain that they will occur against the background of the past.

That past must be evaluated now at this turning point of history.

Not A One Man Job

The reconstruction of our past in this city is not the task of one individual. Nor is it the task of one segment of the community. For the story to be complete and objective it must be approached as a community project.

The Jewish group, like the general population of Providence, is not uniform. There are and always have been multicolored patterns in the web of our life. Rich and poor, employer and employee, Orthodox and Reformed, conformist and dissenter, conservative and radical, all have contributed their share. All must be reflected in the story of the group.

No Easy Task

Nor is it an easy task. It involves laborious searches into family traditions, legal documents, state records, organization minutes, institution archives and regional publications.

The cooperation of the Rhode Island Historical Society must be sought in this project. Also the facilities of our public and private libraries will have to be obtained for this job.

Nor will the city boundaries limit the story. Just as the history of Providence is closely knit with the fortunes of the near-by cities and towns regardless of city and state limits, so will the story of the Jewish community prove to be inter-related and bound up with the fortunes and misfortunes of our neighbors across the State lines.

Cultural, Economic Background

And similarly, just as in the case of the early settlers of these Plantations, the story will have to cross the ocean for the cultural and economic background of the various groups whose descendants make up our present day Jewish community. East and West, North, South and Central Europe have sent forth sons and daughters to the shores of the Great Salt River. Each point of origin contributed a distinct feature to the communal structure. All of them have their merits. Neither of them should be ignored or minimized in a complete story of the community.

Relations With Other Religious Groups

Every school child can recite the story of Roger Williams and his friends. This Spring on North Main Street is the fountain head of religious freedom in America. In telling the story of the Jewish community in Providence this chapter will assume an especial importance. How were the first worshippers of the God of Israel

received by the community? What aid, and obstacles if any, did they find in this birthplace of freedom of conscience? How did the first Minian (congregation of ten) grow and multiply to fill a dozen houses of worship today?

Then there is the story of relations with other ethnic groups in the city. Providence is a mosaic of many creeds, colors, and peoples. Yankee and Irish, Pole and Italian, Armenian and German, Jew and Portuguese, rub elbows in the city squares and streets and avenues. How much did we influence and in what ways were we influenced by our neighbors?

A glance at the social map of the Jewish community reveals a bewildering number of organizations, clubs and fraternities. How did they originate? What were the causes that brought them into existence? What purposes did

they serve? What needs did they fulfill?

Our institutions we have built, do they stand the test of time? Have we well provided for the poor and the orphan and the needy?

The Jewish community in Providence is relatively old by the age standards of the New World. The time has come for a balance sheet of our achievements and contributions. Yes, our failures and shortcomings.

We have an interesting and inspiring story to tell, and we should make provisions for the story to be told.

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Are Jewish Women United For Action in Providence?

Of the more than three thousand women who are members of various Jewish organizations in the city of Providence, how many are actively engaged in the work of groups to which they belong? You will be surprised to learn that there are less than six hundred women who participate in the different projects pertaining to the clubs with which they are affiliated. This proves two things conclusively—the first, that the less than six hundred women who are considered workers are doing a remarkable job, and secondly—if the remaining twenty-four hundred would only partly emulate the work of these tireless women, the overall picture would result in far greater accomplishments, and would distribute more widely the joy and satisfaction resulting from a job well done.

Organization "Isolation"
On the other hand, in appraising the interests of these six hundred indefatigable workers, we occasionally find a condition existing which can be called a form of "isolationism", if I may quote Rabbi Israel M. Goldman, in a recent sermon. So many women become so completely identified with one particular affiliation, that they figuratively wear "blinders" when it comes to an appreciation and understanding of another organization.

This is to be deplored, of course. There is no question about the value of existing interests in our city. Each has a function and a place in the community. But there are antagonisms rampant and often times there is much

overlapping. It has been my experience to meet with leaders of women's federations of other cities, and I have discovered that they have overcome this difficulty to a great degree. Many of the civic projects have been channeled through the established federations of women's organizations. This in itself is of great assistance to presidents of individual clubs. Whenever appeals of a community-wide nature are made, such as the Sale for the Blind, Women's Field Army for the Control of Cancer, Sale of Tuberculosis Seals and appeals for volunteers to staff booths to receive contributions for a gift to the USS Providence, the League forms an over-all committee comprising chairmen from each constituent organization. The mechanics and responsibilities are then

assumed by the League for the successful conclusion of each drive.

Facilitate Civic Work

It is the hope of the Rhode Island League of Jewish Women's Organizations to further facilitate this civic work, by compiling a city-wide list of all affiliated women and establishing a permanent card system. Each woman will have a card stating all her memberships in the various clubs. In this way we will achieve a master list that will do away with all duplication, and present a working listing to be used by League chairmen for all departments which cover Health, Legislation, Education and Social Welfare.

In the final analysis, the primary interest of the League is to present a united and dignified Jewish front, and by having a single responsible agency we can thus present an integrated picture of social service to the community.

Welfare Fund Cities to Have Only 1 Campaign

NEW YORK — Welfare fund communities will conduct one joint campaign and their contributors will be called on to make one overall gift for national and overseas causes despite the failure of the JDC, UPA and NRS to reconstitute the United Jewish Appeal for 1945. Pledges have been given by the three agencies formerly in the UJA not to conduct independent fund raising in welfare fund communities.

To Have Palestine Appeal Sabbath

NEW YORK — Jews throughout the nation were urged to observe Saturday, March 31, as Passover United Palestine Appeal Sabbath, in a proclamation signed by outstanding leaders in the American rabbinate, which declared that the Jewish National Home in Palestine "offers the strongest bridgehead to the shores of true freedom and true deliverance for our brothers in Israel."

Among those who signed the declaration emphasizing the importance of the United Palestine Appeal as the agency for the rescue and redemption of the survivors of Hitlerism were: Rabbis Barnett R. Brickner of Cleveland, Solomon Goldman of Chicago, Israel Goldstein of New York, Julius Gordon of St. Louis, James G. Heller of Cincinnati, Joshua L. Liebman of Boston, Irving Miller of New York, Abba Hillel Silver of Cleveland and Stephen S. Wise of New York.

Rosbach Freed From Nazi Camp

NEW YORK — Captain Richard M. Rosbach, of New York City, a nephew of UNRRA director and former Governor Herbert H. Lehman, and a cousin of Mrs. Henry Morgenthau, Jr., wife of the Secretary of the Treasury, has been freed from a German prison camp in Eastern Germany by liberating Russian forces. An officer in the U. S. armored division and holder of the Bronze and Silver Stars, Captain Rosbach made five unsuccessful attempts at escape from German camps.

CELLER RESOLUTION

WASHINGTON — Rep. Emanuel Celler introduced in Congress a joint resolution requesting the President to appoint a committee with the duty to cooperate with the United Nations' War Crimes Commission and similar agencies.

Rabbi Chill will deliver a Passover sermon over Station WEAN at 10:35 o'clock, Sunday morning, March 25. His topic will be "What Is This Freedom?"

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A CALL To The Jews of Providence

Representatives of 39 nations will shortly meet in San Francisco to draw up a World Charter. The Jewish people, first and most tragic object of Nazi hate and aggression, is the only people denied seat at this conference. Blood of five million Jewish dead cries out in protest against stifling of Jewish voice. Common decency and justice, the sacrifices of the Jewish community of Palestine and million Jewish soldiers fighting on battlefields demand immediate rectification of wrong by according Jewish people same right as other peoples.

The demand for representation at San Francisco will be presented by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, World Zionist President, now en route to the U. S. A. Simultaneously a nationwide demonstration is being launched under auspices of American Zionist Emergency Council for opening of doors of Palestine to hundreds of thousands of Jews now living in physical and spiritual degradation.

The Zionist Organization of America urgently calls upon all its regional and district officers and workers throughout the country to take the lead in enlisting the support of all elements of the population both Jews and non-Jews for the following threefold demand:

1. A Jewish Commonwealth of Palestine.
2. Immediate opening of doors of Palestine to unrestricted immigration.
3. Representation for Jewish Palestine at San Francisco.

Never was it more imperative for every Jew to stand up and be counted. Every American Jew concerned with the fate of his people is duty bound to demonstrate his concrete identification with our cause through membership in the Zionist organization of America. Our goal of 200,000 members including a 200,000 membership class in tribute to Dr. Weizmann must be achieved. Now is the time to act. Join the organized ranks of the ZOA.

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Issues Warning on Conversion Intermarriages Rise in England

LONDON — A warning that British Jewry was "facing disaster" due to conversions and intermarriages, was sounded by Dr. Cecil Roth, noted historian, in a letter to the Jewish Chronicle. Referring to conditions at Oxford, among the student body and faculty, Dr. Roth said that Oxford is, in this respect, a microcosm of the whole country. Among the local refugee residents at Oxford, there have occurred some 50 conversions to the Anglican Church. Members of well-known Jewish families, British and refugee, are

prominent in the Student Christian Movement. Intermarriages have reached a new high, and a scanning of "society" notes in the press reveals that weddings of Anglo-Jewish families in which both parties are Jewish are in a minority.

The number of American Jewish soldiers taking Christian wives is great, but the proportion of marriages between German Jewish refugee girls and English soldiers of the Christian faith is especially high.

Novelist-dramatist Sham Desmond advocated inter-marriage as a means of breaking down race barriers.

Hospital Refuses to Admit U.S.-Japanese; M.D. Resigns

CHICAGO — Dr. Selig A. Shevin, staff member of the Jackson Park Hospital for seventeen years, has resigned to protest the hospital's refusal to admit an American-born Japanese patient.

Dr. Shevin's resignation followed a meeting at which staff members unanimously upheld Superintendent L. W. Hilton's action in

refusing to accept nineteen-year-old Toyoko Murayama, an emergency case.

The girl was sent to the hospital by Dr. Shevin and remained there from 9:30 a. m. to 1:40 p. m. when she was ordered out, Dr. Shevin said. Superintendent Hilton said the institution was a private hospital and "some of our patients might object to such close bed contact to a Japanese."

Dr. Shevin said Miss Murayama was an American citizen, born in this country, and had two close relatives in the Army and a brother about to be inducted.

Red Army Decorates 63,000 Jews

MOSCOW — More than 63,000 Jewish officers and men of the Red Army have been decorated for bravery since the outbreak of the war, it is reported here. Jews rank fifth among the 182 nationalities of the Soviet Union.

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"Disfigured" Vet Just the Same to Girl Back Home

NEW YORK — To Irene Goldstein, S/Sgt. Wallace Kirschner, severely disfigured by facial burns, "hasn't changed at all."

She wanted to marry him four years ago; she wanted to marry him all during the 18 months he has been overseas; and now she will be his wife as soon as the doctors permit it.

She was nervous when she saw him for the first time at Halloran General Hospital where he was sent when the Gripaholm delivered him home from a German prison camp. She was nervous mostly for him. But her unabashed joy on seeing him instantly dispelled both their doubts, and they made a bad job of restraining themselves before reporters.

"He wanted to be alone the first time we saw each other," she explained laughing, "and look."

Her gesture took in the battery of reporters who surrounded them.

While Kirschner, 22, told the story of his imprisonment and repatriation, Irene stood outside, bubbling out her happiness.

Marriage Long Planned

"I guess we'll have to wait another year to get married," she said ruefully. "He wants to have all the plastic surgery done first. And as long as that's the way he wants it, I guess I'll have to be Miss Goldstein for a while longer."

She explained that they had known each other for four years, that Kirschner had passed up a scholarship at NYU because he wanted to earn the money to get married, and that she has been working as a medical stenographer at Mt. Sinai Hospital while he was away.

Their plans now are simple. As soon as possible they will be married and raise a family, "like everyone else," Irene said.

"We are the lucky ones," Irene said. "He is home, he is alive and safe. And he is just the same as always."

ASKS ABROGATION

LONDON — A motion aimed at the abrogation of the White Paper was introduced by Lord Strabolgi in the House of Lords. It calls for granting additional immigration certificates to Jews in liberated areas.

Score Lawyers For Secret Ballot On Judgeship

NEW YORK — Washington lawyers, members of the District of Columbia Bar Association, have voted, by secret ballot, 804 to 200, against President Roosevelt's appointment of Judge Nathan Margold, former solicitor of the Department of Interior, as Municipal Court judge, the only Jew on the 12 men bench, according to Drew Pearson, Bell Syndicate Washington correspondent, reporting in the Daily Mirror. Senator Chandler of Kentucky is conducting a one-man campaign for Judge Margold in the Senate Judiciary Committee urging them to stamp out the practice of "letting lawyers elect judges," Mr. Pearson reports.

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Obituary

DR. LOUIS B. WOLFENSON

Funeral services were held yesterday, in Madison, Wisconsin, for Dr. Louis B. Wolfenson, former superintendent of the State Home and School and executive director of the former Jewish Orphanage of R. I. Dr. Wolfenson died at the Rhode Island Hospital after an illness of several weeks.

Dr. Wolfenson had been a resident of Providence for the past 15 years. He was born in La Crosse, Wisconsin, and was graduated from the University of Wisconsin with the Class of 1904, the next year receiving his Master's degree from that university. He was elected to Phi Beta Kappa during his senior year, and was named University Fellow for three years from 1900.

He received his Doctor of Philosophy degree from Johns Hopkins in 1907 and for 14 years, after 1908, he was chairman of the Department of Semitics of the University of Wisconsin and from 1922 to 1924 was a professor at the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati.

Turning from teaching to administrative social work, Dr. Wolfenson was made superintendent of the Home for Jewish Children, Boston, Mass., in 1924, remaining at that post until he came to Providence in 1930 as executive director of the Jewish Orphanage in this city, filling that post for the next three years. In 1940, he won civil service appointment as superintendent of the State Home and School, remaining at that institution for 13 months. Since leaving the home and until his recent illness, he was employed as an interviewer in the Pawtucket office of the United States Employment Service, WMC.
