Present: Aldermen Hillstrom, Bates, Lang, Lendrum and Stevenson

**Also Present:** Mayor Kaufert, City Attorney Godlewski, Director of Public Works Kaiser, Director of Community Development and Assessment Haese, Police Chief Wilkinson, Superintendent of Recreation Olson, Traffic Engineer Merten, Alderman Pollnow, Forrest Bates

Minutes: Motion/Second/Carried Lang/Hillstrom to approve the minutes of the December 13, 2016, Regular Meeting. All voting aye.

Public Appearances: None.

Parks and Recreation Reciprocity with Menasha and Appleton: Committee reviewed Superintendent of Recreation Olson's December 19, 2016, memo regarding the Parks and Recreation Agreement for Reciprocity with the cities of Appleton and Menasha. In the past, these agreements have allowed residents of the three cities to participate in programs and use facilities in any of the three cities without paying non-resident fees. This type of agreement has been in place since 1995. Superintendent Olson reviewed the comparative program participation between the three communities. She noted that this does not change the two-week lead time that Neenah residents have to register for programs before residents from other communities can register. She provided the Committee with a revised version of the agreement that had been prepared by the city attorney for Appleton.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Hillstrom/Stevenson to recommend Council approve the Agreement for Reciprocity with the Cities of Menasha and Appleton for 2017-2021. All voting aye

<u>Policy - Retention of Parking Management Data</u>: Committee reviewed the draft policy for retention of parking management data. Chief Wilkinson explained the need for this policy with the upcoming implementation of the NuPark parking management system. City Attorney Godlewski noted that the record retention period in the policy is 180 days, which is 60 days longer than the retention period recommended by the State, so the policy is sufficient in that regard. Committee discussed the procedure to access records for criminal investigations. City Attorney Godlewski noted that the police chief is the keeper records for the license plate reader (LPR) system and is the appropriate approving authority. He noted that any appeal of a rejected request would be dealt with as an open records request. Committee discussed the city attorney's authority to approve data retention outside of the proposed timeframes.

Committee discussed the public information and public notification schedule for the parking management system change. Committee discussed the availability of data to the public, especially cited vehicle owners. Committee questioned the manner in which the data is stored. Traffic Engineer Merten noted that the data belongs to the city. Part of the annual subscription fee from NuPark covers the cost to have them store the data. Committee discussed the comparison between the proposed LPR data storage timeframes and typical police investigation information.

Chief Wilkinson noted that officer notes are not subject to open records disclosure but anything in a formal report is subject to disclosure. City Attorney Godlewski clarified the meaning of a public record and described the disclosure requirements at various points of an investigation and prosecution. It was noted that the LPR data is simply license plates with a date/time stamp and GPS location. City Attorney Godlewski stated that the Driver Privacy Protection Act limits access to ownership data.

Ald. Pollnow addressed the Committee to request the sources used to develop the policy. Chief Wilkinson and Traffic Engineer Merten outlined several sources that were provided by NuPark. Chief Wilkinson noted the conflicting needs to satisfy the Driver Privacy Protection Act and Wisconsin open records laws. He noted that the policy language was drafted to be a little tighter than would be technically necessary for law enforcement purposes. He also indicated a concern with the public perception of retaining this data for a long period of time. Committee questioned if there would be additional cost to store the LPR data for longer than 180 days. Traffic Engineer Merten indicated that he would not expect additional cost. City Attorney Godlewski noted that one reason for the shorter limit on surveillance tapes is the lack of storage. On questioning from Committee, Chief Wilkinson agreed that he would prefer a longer storage period while acknowledging that data requests for investigative purposes would typically happen soon after the discovery of a crime.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Stevenson/Lendrum to recommend that Council approve the Retention of Parking Management Data policy as amended to increase the data retention storage period from 180 days to 395 days and direct City Attorney Godlewski to prepare the policy in the proper format. All voting aye.

Committee requested that staff confirm prior to Council action that the proposed LPR data storage period of 395 days will not add cost for the annual subscription charge from NuPark.

Revisions to Stopping, Standing and Parking Regulations (Ordinance Draft): Traffic Engineer Merten reviewed the proposed Downtown Parking Policies and Guidelines, which serves as the guiding document for the parking ordinance changes. He noted that the changes requested by Committee at their prior discussion of the issue had been incorporated into the document. He noted a change in the fine escalation policy that arose from a recent discussion with the Downtown Parking Task Force. The task force preferred to use a rolling 365 day citation review period. Chairman Bates noted the task force discussion on combining similar citation types in that review. Traffic Engineer Merten indicated that such an approach could be done but that the policy as proposed looks at each citation type individually. Chairman Bates noted that the task force had removed the 2-hour parking zones from the 1-day pass program. Traffic Engineer Merten stated that the 1-day pass will not be implemented but is a topic for future discussion after the remainder of the parking management system is in place and normalized. Mayor Kaufert stated that the Downtown Parking Task Force is ready to implement the proposals but suggested a 1-year follow-up review of operations. The consensus of the Committee was to proceed with the policy as presented.

Traffic Engineer Merten reviewed proposed revisions to the Stopping, Standing and Parking Regulations in Chapter 16 of the Municipal Code. The code revisions are being proposed to correct and clarify provisions in the code, to provide a more logical organization to the code and to make revisions necessary to implement the parking management system. Committee discussed numerous aspects of the code including the city's ability to enforce private parking lots, unattached trailer parking on streets, reparking signing and education, clarification of the use of the word "street" or "highway" in the ordinance, and provisions for successive violations. Traffic Engineer Merten stated that the ordinance does not address proposed changes to parking permit fees. He also noted that the ordinance creates an official traffic map for off-street parking. The updated official traffic maps will be presented to Committee when the final parking ordinance is presented.

After further discussion, the consensus of the Committee was to direct City Attorney Godlewski to prepare the proposed parking ordinance in final form.

<u>Special Assessment Reports</u>: Committee reviewed the assessment report for the installation of curb, gutter and pavement on Cecil Street (Henry to Oak) and Cleveland Street (Reddin to Zemlock). The estimated assessment rate is \$40.00 per assessable front foot for single family/two-family residence and \$65.00 per assessable front foot for multi-family/commercial/industrial. Director Kaiser noted that the actual reconstruction assessment rate in 2016 for Single-Family/Two-Family uses was slightly less than \$35 per assessable front foot.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Stevenson/Hillstrom to authorize the Chairman to sign the assessment report for Preliminary Resolution No. 2016-31 for installation of curb, gutter and pavement on Cecil Street (Henry to Oak) and Cleveland Street (Reddin to Zemlock). All voting aye.

Committee reviewed the assessment report for the installation of curb, gutter and pavement on Edward Street (Western to John), Helen Street (Western to John), Higgins Avenue (Haylett to Cecil), Whippoorwill Circle (Pendleton) and Yorkshire Road (Yorkshire Ct to Sunrise Bay). The estimated assessment rate is \$23.00 per assessable front foot for single family/two-family residence and \$31.00 per assessable front foot for multi-family/commercial/industrial. Director Kaiser noted that his recommendation is to not assess the lone city parcel on Yorkshire Road because it is swampland. Committee directed Director Kaiser to contact the Town of Neenah about a cost-share on that project and to complete the assessment table showing deferred assessments for abutting Town properties.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Hillstrom/Lendrum to authorize the Chairman to sign the assessment report for Preliminary Resolution No. 2016-32 for installation of curb, gutter and pavement on Edward Street (Western to John), Helen Street (Western to John), Higgins Avenue (Haylett to Cecil), Whippoorwill Circle (Pendleton) and Yorkshire Road (Yorkshire Ct to Sunrise Bay). All voting aye.

Committee reviewed the assessment report for the installation of sanitary sewer laterals on Cecil Street (Henry to Oak), Cleveland Street (Reddin to Zemlock), Edward Street (Western to John), Helen Street (Western to John) and Higgins Avenue (Haylett to Cecil). The estimated assessment rate is \$55.00 per assessable foot of sewer lateral. Director Kaiser noted that the actual assessed cost in 2016 was \$40 per foot of sewer lateral. He noted that most bidders on the 2016 project had costs ranging from \$50 to \$60 per foot of sewer lateral. For that reason, staff proposed the estimated rate of \$55 per foot.

Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Stevenson/Hillstrom to authorize the Chairman to sign the assessment report for Preliminary Resolution No. 2016-33 for installation of sanitary sewer lateral on Cecil Street (Henry to Oak), Cleveland Street (Reddin to Zemlock), Edward Street (Western to John), Helen Street (Western to John) and Higgins Avenue (Haylett to Cecil). All voting aye.

Sanitary Sewer Lateral Repair Policy Revision: Director Kaiser reviewed the current Sanitary Sewer Lateral Repair Policy and the staff proposal to revise the assessment practice to create an incentive for property owners to replace the entire lateral from the sewer main to the building. He noted that complete lateral replacements benefit the sanitary sewer utility by reducing infiltration/inflow. The proposal is to have the utility share in up to 50% of the cost of the sewer lateral replacement for those property owners who replace the entire lateral. Based in 2016 construction figures, the proposed change would reduce the property owner's cost for a typical complete lateral replacement from \$3,400 to \$1,700. A partial lateral replacement for the portion in the street right-of-way would be about \$1,200. He noted that the proposed change would cost the utility about \$140,000 to \$150,000.

Committee discussed aspects of the proposal including the current fund balance for the sanitary sewer utility and the operational savings that could offset this cost. Ald. Pollnow addressed the Committee to note that a sanitary sewer rate study proposal request has been prepared. Director Kaiser confirmed that the RFP has been distributed and outlined the objectives of the study. He noted that a consultant recommendation will be taken to the Finance & Personnel Committee on February 6. Committee noted that it would be preferable to have the results of that study before this policy is changed. Committee requested that staff identify operational savings that could result from complete lateral replacements and provide information at the next Committee meeting.

Commercial Street, Tim Verhasselt, agent. All voting aye.

Beverage Operator License Application (New) - Delinquent Fee: The Committee reviewed the beverage operator license application for Sean Mueller. Mr. Mueller currently has a delinquent utility bill of \$188.54. Following discussion, Motion/Second/Carried Lendrum/Lang to recommend Council approve the beverage operator license application (new) for Sean Mueller contingent upon payment of a delinquent utility bill of \$188.54 and any other outstanding City fees. All voting aye.

#### Public Works General Construction and Department Activity:

- 1. Forest Manor Lighting Staff has received design and cost information. Several questions are being clarified. An assessment report will be brought to the next Committee meeting.
- 2. Training Center/Clinic The building upgrades are complete. An open house is scheduled for January 25.
- 3. Street Construction Plans Draft plans and specifications have been prepared for the Cecil Street reconstruction project. Design work is ongoing for the remaining streets in the program.
- 4. Parking Lot Construction Plans Plans are being prepared for parking lots targeted to the TID 10 office project in preparation for spring construction.
- 5. Martens Street Razing 5 of the 6 contracted homes along Martens Street have been razed and brought to original grade.
- 6. Fox Valley Energy Concrete Pile Concrete crushing is expected to start within the next two weeks.
- 7. Sanitary Sewer Rate Study An RFP has been distributed for the rate study. Proposals are due on January 27. As was done in 2008, consultant selection will be routed through the Finance & Personnel Committee.
- 8. Christmas Tree Collection Collection started on January 9.

#### 2016 City of Neenah Annual Building Permit Report

#### **Overview**

Construction totals for 2016 remained steady in comparison to 2015 levels. Housing starts were again above average at 49 single and two-family homes, down slightly from the year prior. Commercial and industrial development was again strong in 2016. Total value of all construction in 2016 was \$49,341,662, down from \$66,019,807 in 2015.

#### Notable Projects

Notable projects in 2016 include:

- Gateway Building at 120 Main Street. This 85,000 square foot, four-story office building will add \$13,500,000 in construction value to the City and will attract 300 additional employees to Neenah's Downtown.
- Neenah-Menasha YMCA at 110 W. North Water Street. The YMCA is completing a \$700,000 renovation to 2,200 square feet of locker room space.
- Bent Tube, Inc., 304 Stone Crest Court, is adding a 22,000 square foot warehouse addition with an estimated improvement cost of \$800,000.
- American Grand at 900 Meadow Lane. This assisted living facility will add 27 living units in the second phase of their development. The 24,500 square foot addition has an estimated cost of \$3,100,000.
- Kimberly Clark Corporation South, 2001 Marathon Avenue, is renovating testing labs at an estimated cost of \$3,963,475.

Several dozen smaller commercial and industrial projects are in various stages of completion throughout the City as well.

#### **Outlook**

Neenah is well positioned to provide additional commercial and industrial growth in planned business centers and on prime development sites within the City. The available residential lot supply has been depleted by continued expansion of the City's housing development, which has dropped the City-wide available lot count to approximately 50 lots. The City will continue to explore options to improve the number, and overall distribution, of available lots to ensure continued growth of the City's single family housing market.



**RE:** Ordinance 2017-6: Parking Regulations

In preparation of implementing the NuPark parking management system, staff has prepared ordinance 2017-6 so that the primary recommendations from the 2015 Downtown Parking Analysis and Management Plan may be smoothly integrated into the transition into the new system. Ordinance 2017-6 is proposed to revise stopping, standing and parking regulations of Chapter 16 of the city code. The ordinance was drafted from the parking policy and guidelines proposal that was reviewed and amended at the following meetings:

- Downtown Parking Task Force December 2, 2016
- Public Services & Safety Committee December 13, 2016
- Downtown Parking Task Force January 5, 2017
- Public Services & Safety Committee January 10, 2017

A draft of the parking ordinance was also reviewed on January 10, 2017 by the Public Services & Safety Committee. The draft has been put into ordinance format by City Attorney Godlewski with corrections and minor modifications.

Ordinance 2017-6 also introduces the Off-Street Parking Official Map and revises the On-Street Parking Official Map. The revisions in the On-Street Parking Official Map are listed in the attached spreadsheet. Please note there are two tasks with the revised map: (1) to make changes to regulations downtown and (2) to update the map for changes/trials that have occurred since the map's last revision in 2013. Due to scale of the maps, they have not been attached to this memo. They instead can be viewed online at: <a href="www.neenahgov.org/traffic-resources#Official-Traffic-Maps">www.neenahgov.org/traffic-resources#Official-Traffic-Maps</a>.

Staff recommends approval of Ordinance 2017-6.

ORDINANCE NO. 2017-6

Introduced: February 1, 2017

Committee/Commission Action:

### **AN ORDINANCE**

The Common Council of the City of Neenah, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

**Section 1.** Section 16-1 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Neenah is amended by adding the highlighted language to read as follows:

#### Sec. 16-1. - State traffic laws adopted.

Except as otherwise specifically provided in this Code, the statutory provisions in Wis. Stats. chs. 340—348, describing and defining regulations and terms with respect to vehicles and traffic, exclusive of any provisions therein relating to penalties to be imposed and exclusive of any regulations for which the statutory penalty is a fine or term of imprisonment are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this Code as if fully set forth herein. Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this Code. Any future amendments, revisions or modifications of the statutes incorporated herein are intended to be made part of this Code in order to secure uniform statewide regulation of traffic on the highways, streets and alleys of the State. In addition, all rules and regulations promulgated by the State pursuant to Wis. Stats. chs. 340—350 are adopted by reference. Any future amendments, revisions or modifications of such rules and regulations are incorporated herein.

- **Section 2.** Section 16-2(3)a. c. of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Neenah is deleting the stricken language and adding the highlighted language to read as follows:.
  - (3) Stopping and Parking parking violations: see secs. 16-149 & 16-150.
    - a. Handicapped parking. Any person who violates Wis. Stats. § 346.505(2), pertaining to handicapped parking, shall pay no less than \$50.00 nor more than \$200.00.

b. Other violations. Except as provided in Subsection (3)a of this section, any person who violates Wis. Stats. §§ 5.346.51 through 5.346.55 or Sections 16-69, 16-70, 16-99 through 16-102 or 19-1(c) of this Code shall pay to the City a forfeiture of \$10.00 if paid within ten days of date of violation.

c. Penalties. Penalties assessed on all violations not paid within ten days shall be doubled. Failure to pay the forfeiture, including all assessments under this subsection, within 28 days of the issuance of said ticket, will result in an additional assessment of \$50.00 and will also result in the suspension of the owner or operator's vehicle registration pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 345.28.

**Section 3.** Section `16-10 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Neenah is created to read as follows:

## Sec. 16-10. – Storage of Equipment and Materials on Streets or Highways.

No person may place, temporary or otherwise, any equipment, container, dumpster, or property on a street or highway unless authorized by the Public Works Department.

Secs. 16-11—16-34. - Reserved.

- **Section 4.** Section 16-36(a)(1) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Neenah is amended by deleting the stricken language and adding the highlighted language to read as follows:
  - (a) Official traffic maps.
  - (1) Official traffic map established. There is hereby established and adopted an official traffic map consisting of the following specific maps (which may be collectively referred to as the City of Neenah Official Traffic Map or Official Traffic Map):
    - a. Speed Limits Map;
    - b. One-Way, Turns and Lanes Map;
    - c. On-Street Parking Map;
    - e.d. Off-Street Parking Map;
    - d.e. Heavy Traffic Routes Map;
    - e.f. Controlled Intersections Map.

These maps may be amended or modified by the Common Council by ordinance from time to time and shall be amended when the laws of the state require the erection or use of official traffic control devices to enforce such restrictions or limitations and those restrictions or limitations are modified.

- **Section 5.** The following Official Traffic Maps adopted pursuant to Section 16-36(a)(1) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Neenah are repealed and recreated (On-Street Parking Map ) or created (Off-Street Parking Map) as the following Official Traffic Maps:
  - On-Street Parking Map dated January 20, 2017
  - Off-Street Parking Map dated January 20, 2017

The remaining Official Traffic Maps listed in Section 16-36(a)(1) remain unchanged from their last revision date.

**Section 6.** Article III of Chapter 16 (Sections 16-69 through 16-159) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Neenah is repealed and recreated to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE III. - STOPPING, STANDING AND PARKING

#### **DIVISION 1. -- ADMINISTRATION**

Sec. 16-69. – Applicability.

This article regulates stopping, standing and parking on City of Neenah owned or operated property, including but not limited to surface parking lots, parking structures and designated parking areas; and public right-of-ways, including but not limited to streets, designated parking areas, bridges, terraces and sidewalks.

#### Sec. 16-70. – Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

*Curb Marking* means a pavement marking along the paved edge of a roadway indicating a parking or stopping regulation directly adjacent the marking.

*Holidays* means the following days: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

*Parking Space* means an area duly designated for the parking of a single vehicle by signs, by appropriate markings on the pavement or curb, or both, or where no such markings are provided the area necessary to accommodate a single vehicle.

*Parking Zone* means a series of adjacent Parking Spaces where an official traffic sign has been erected giving notice of a parking regulation.

Repark means the moving of a parked vehicle from one Parking Space to another Parking Space, regardless of the amount of time the vehicle is parked in either space. Moving a parked vehicle to reoccupy the same Parking Space shall constitute an act of Reparking.

*Terrace* means that portion of City property between the curb line of the street and the curbside edge of the sidewalk.

## Sec. 16-71. – Authority to designate stopping, standing and parking regulations.

- (a) Authority to restrict parking on narrow streets. Whenever construction, snow accumulations or other obstructions narrow any given street to a travel portion of less than 30 feet in width, and it is determined that this constitutes a traffic hazard, the Traffic Engineer may restrict the parking of vehicles on one or both sides of such street. Such restriction shall apply when the side or both sides of such streets are posted with proper signs and shall terminate when the street is again returned to normal widths.
- (b) Authority to restrict stopping, standing or parking near hazardous or congested places. The Traffic Engineer is hereby authorized to determine and designate by proper signs or Curb Markings those places not exceeding 100 feet in length in which the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles would create an especially hazardous condition or would cause unusual delay to traffic.
- (c) Authority to establish loading zones. The Traffic Engineer is hereby authorized to determine the location of loading zones in Section 16-91(d) and shall place and maintain appropriate signs indicating the same and stating the hours during which the provisions of this section are applicable. The Traffic Engineer shall establish such zones upon a showing of need and a further showing that their establishment will not interfere with the flow of traffic or endanger public safety.
- (d) Authority to prohibit parking for maintenance. The Traffic Engineer is hereby authorized when notice has been given by either public declaration through the area news media or by official traffic signs or markers having been placed or erected indicating such restrictions or limitations, to prohibit parking to permit maintenance of an area.

Secs. 16-72 - 16-88. - Reserved.

#### **DIVISION 2. – REGULATIONS**

#### Sec. 16-89 – Curb markings to indicate parking regulations.

- (a) Regulations established.
  - (1) *Red markings.* Red means no stopping, standing or parking at any time. A violation of this subsection shall constitute a violation of Section 16-91(b) and the penalty thereof.
  - (2) Yellow markings. Yellow means no parking at any time. A violation of this subsection shall constitute a violation of Section 16-91(c) and the penalty thereof.
  - (3) *Blue markings.* Blue means no stopping, standing or parking at any time except vehicles which display a distinguishing license plate or valid placard issued to handicapped and disabled persons and disabled veterans pursuant to Wis. Stats.

- § 346.505. A violation of this subsection shall constitute a violation of Section 16-91(h) and the penalty thereof.
- (b) *Curb markings regulated.* No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle adjacent to any authorized Curb Marking in violation of any of the provisions of this section.
- (c) Obstruction of curb markings. When Curb Markings are obscured by snow or ice accumulation, temporary official traffic signs may be used to indicate the extent and regulation of the Curb Marking.
- (d) *Curb markings to indicate extent.* Where accompanied with official traffic signs, Curb Markings shall have precedence to explicitly indicate the extent of regulation along the pavement edge or the roadway.

#### Sec. 16-90 – Stopping and parking regulations generally (city-wide).

- (a) Stopping prohibited in certain specified places. No person may stop or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended and whether temporarily or otherwise, in any of the following places:
  - (1) Within an intersection.
  - (2) On a crosswalk.
  - (3) Within a safety zone.
  - (4) On a sidewalk, Terrace, or sidewalk area, except when parking on the sidewalk or sidewalk area is clearly indicated by official traffic signs, Curb Markings, pavement markings, or parking meters.
  - (5) Alongside or opposite any street or highway excavation or obstruction when stopping or standing at that place would obstruct traffic or when pedestrian traffic would be required to travel in the roadway.
  - (6) On the roadway side of any parked vehicle unless double parking is clearly indicated by official traffic signs or pavement markings.
  - (7) Adjacent to an intersecting driveway, alley, or private street.
  - (8) In a lane dedicated for the travel of vehicles, including but not limited to traffic lanes, bike lanes and parking lot drive aisles.
- (b) Parking prohibited in certain specified places. No person shall stop or leave any vehicle standing in any of the following places except temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers and while the vehicle is attended by a licensed operator so that it may promptly be moved in case of an emergency or to avoid obstruction of traffic:
  - (1) In an alley in a business district.
  - (2) Adjacent to a handicap curb ramp intended for pedestrian access to or from a sidewalk or sidewalk area.

- (3) Within 10 feet of a fire hydrant.
- (4) Within 4 feet of the entrance to an alley or a private road or driveway.
- (5) Within 10 feet of a mailbox.
- (6) Closer than 15 feet to the near limits of a crosswalk.
- (7) Within a distance greater than indicated in Subsections (3) through (6) if indicated by an official traffic sign or Curb Marking. A violation of this subsection shall constitute a violation of Section 16-91(c) and the penalty thereof.
- (c) *Maximum time limit.* No person shall park a vehicle longer than a 24-hour period.
  - (d) Overnight parking.
    - (1) No person shall park any vehicle between 2:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m.
    - (2) Exceptions.
      - a. Seasonal alternate side parking. From April 1 to October 31 of each year in the residential areas, defined as R-1, R-2, M-1 and M-2 on the Official Zoning District Map, persons may park their vehicles on the evennumbered side of a street on even-numbered days before 12:00 a.m. midnight, and on the odd-numbered side of a street on odd-numbered days before 12:00 a.m. midnight.
      - b. *Hardship cases.* From April 1 to October 31 of each year in any area where a hardship exists because of roadway design (courts, cul de sacs and streets with parking restricted on one side), persons shall be permitted to park their vehicles.
      - c. *Temporary parking.* The Police Department may grant permission to so park a vehicle on a temporary basis in unusual circumstances.
      - d. Exempted locations. A vehicle may be so parked on the parking lots or portions of parking lots indicated in the Off-Street Parking Map or on the following streets or portions of streets: Walnut Street on the east side of the street from East Franklin Avenue to East Doty Avenue.
- (e) Snow emergencies. Whenever the Mayor shall, by reason of heavy snow storm or blizzard, proclaim a snow emergency pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 323.11, no person shall park, stop, or leave standing any vehicle during the hours set forth in said proclamation.
- (f) *Trailer parking.* Unless authorized by the Police Department or the Public Works Department, no person shall stop, stand, or park any trailer unattached to a vehicle by which it may be propelled or drawn, except to stop temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading property. Any trailer in violation of this subsection may be removed or towed at the owner's expense.

(g) Parking heavy vehicles in residential districts. No operators of a motor truck, truck-tractor, trailer, or semi-trailer or any other commercial vehicle or combination of commercial vehicles as defined at Code Subsection 26-550(1)(g) shall park such vehicle on any street or highway other than a routed state trunk highway in any residential district, defined as R-1, R-2, M-1 and M-2 on the Official Zoning District Map, except for such time as is reasonably necessary to facilitate the loading or unloading of the vehicle. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in order to facilitate the efficient transportation of students to schools, school buses may be parked in any residential district, on streets where parking is otherwise permitted.

#### Sec. 16-91. – Stopping and parking regulations posted for specific locations.

- (a) Parking or stopping contrary to posted sign or curb marking. No vehicle shall be parked, stopped or left standing contrary to any official traffic sign or Curb Marking regulating parking or stopping on a public way. This subsection shall include any authorized temporary restrictions posted for the purposes of emergencies, maintenance of streets or parking lots, traffic hazards, special events or special conditions. A citation for a violation of this subsection may not be issued in lieu of a violation of Subsections 16-91(b) through (h).
- (b) *No stopping zones.* No person shall park, stop or leave standing any vehicle at any time, unless for only a time period indicated on official traffic signs.
- (c) *No parking zones.* No vehicle shall be parked at any time, unless for only a time period indicated on official traffic signs.

#### (d) Loading zones.

- (1) Passenger loading zone. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle for any purpose or length of time other than for the expeditious unloading and drop-off or pick-up and loading of passengers or property in any place marked as a loading zone during the hours when the provisions applicable to such zones are in effect. In no case shall the stop for loading and unloading of passengers or property exceed 5 minutes.
- (2) Truck loading zone. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle for any purpose or length of time other than for the expeditious unloading and delivery or pick-up and loading of materials in any place marked as a truck loading zone during the hours when the provisions applicable to such zones are in effect. In no case shall the stop for loading and unloading of materials exceed 30 minutes. The driver of a vehicle may stop temporarily at a loading zone for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading passengers when such stopping does not interfere with any vehicle which is waiting to enter or about to enter such zone to load or unload property.
- (3) Bus loading zone. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle in any place marked as a bus loading zone except to stop temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading passengers or property when

- such stopping does not interfere with any motor bus which is waiting to enter or about to enter such zone. Only a motor bus may park in any place marked as a bus loading zone.
- (e) *Time limit zones.* No vehicle shall be parked beyond the time limit indicated on official traffic signs. Unless otherwise posted, time limits shall apply from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., except Sundays and Holidays.
- (f) Re-parking restricted zones. No person shall Repark within any Parking Zone indicated as a "Reparking Restricted Zone" on official traffic signs until four hours has lapsed from when the vehicle is moved. Unless otherwise posted, the re-parking restriction shall apply from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., except Sundays and Holidays.
- (g) *Permit zones.* No vehicle shall be parked unless a valid parking permit has been issued by the City to the vehicle for the permit type indicated on official traffic signs and the identification of said parking permit is properly displayed as required by the City. Unless otherwise posted, permit parking shall apply from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., except Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays. Permit holders and permitted vehicles are subject to all traffic laws and regulations not explicitly superseded by the permit.
- (h) *Handicap zones.* No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle in violation of Wis. Stats. § 346.505(2).

#### Sec. 16-92. – Parking orientation.

- (a) Parking within stall markings. Where individual Parking Spaces are marked on the pavement, no person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle in any orientation other than entirely within the limits of the space so designated.
- (b) Required parking distances. No vehicle shall be parked on any street greater than 12 inches from the curb or edge of the street where parking is permitted, nor shall any vehicle be parked within 2 feet of another vehicle, unless a different system of parking is clearly indicated by official traffic signs or pavement markings.
- (c) Parallel parking. Upon a street where traffic is permitted to move in both directions simultaneously and where front-in angle or back-in angle parking is not clearly designated by official traffic signs or pavement markings, a vehicle must be parked parallel to the edge of the street, headed in the direction of traffic on the right side of the street. Upon a one-way or divided street where parking on the left side of the roadway is clearly authorized by official traffic signs or pavement markings, vehicles may be parked only as indicated by the signs or pavement markings.
- (d) Front-in angle parking. Where angle parking is clearly authorized by official traffic signs or pavement markings, vehicles shall be parked with the rear of the vehicle oriented closest to the traffic lane at the angle indicated and within the spaces indicated.
- (e) Back-in angle parking. Where back-in angle parking is clearly authorized by official traffic signs and pavement markings, vehicles shall be parked with the rear of the

vehicle oriented furthest from the traffic lane at the angle indicated and within the spaces indicated.

Secs. 16-93 – 16-128. – Reserved.

**DIVISION 3. – ENFORCEMENT** 

Sec. 16-129. – Responsibility of owner.

If any vehicle is found in violation of any provisions of this article or State law and the identity of the driver cannot really be determined, the person in whose name such vehicle is registered shall be held prima facie responsible for such violation.

#### Sec. 16-130. – Report of police officers.

Whenever any person parks any vehicle in violation of any regulation, the police officers of the City shall report the facts thereof, knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violation. Each such officer shall attach to such vehicle a notice to the owner or operator thereof that such vehicle had been parked in violation of a City ordinance. Such notice shall state that each such owner or operator may pay to the City a forfeiture as provided in Section 16-149.

#### Sec. 16-131. – Interfering with enforcement actions.

- (a) No person shall interfere with the enforcement actions of the police officers, nor shall any person erase, obliterate, cover up or remove chalk marks placed on tires by police officers for parking enforcement purposes, other than by normal use of the motor vehicle after it is moved from the Parking Space.
  - (b) No person shall move his motor vehicle within a Parking Space for the purpose of extending or avoiding the parking time limit, nor shall he or she reoccupy the same space unless the motor vehicle is moved at least 20 feet.

#### Sec. 16-132. – Successive violations.

- (a) After a citation for overtime parking has been issued and the cited vehicle remains parked or stopped where parked when cited for the previous violation, a separate violation occurs upon the expiration of each successive maximum period of parking time as designated by official signs, markings, or meters. A separate citation may be issued for each successive violation.
- (b) After a citation for unlawful parking other than overtime parking is issued and the cited vehicle remains parked or stopped where parked when cited for the previous violation and continues to park in violation of parking law(s), a separate violation occurs on the next calendar day from when the last citation was issued. A separate citation may be issued for each successive violation.

#### Sec. 16-133. – Removal of illegally parked vehicles.

Any police officer may cause any vehicle parked in violation of this chapter or State law which interferes with the movement of traffic, snow removal or the maintenance of street or City owned or leased parking lots to be moved to a public parking lot garage or private towing company designated by the police department. The cost of moving and storage of the vehicle shall be paid by the owner or operator of such vehicle, and the Police Department shall hold such vehicle until all such costs have been paid.

#### Secs. 16-134 – 16-148. – Reserved.

#### **DIVISION 4. – PENALTIES & FEES**

#### Sec. 16-149. – Penalty for stopping and parking violations.

- (a) Class A. Any person who violates Section 16-91(h) shall pay to the City a forfeiture of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) within ten days of when the citation was issued.
- (b) *Class B.* Penalties for violating Code Sections 16-7(f), 16-90(a) through 16-90(b)(3), 16-90(c) through 16-90(f), 16-91(a) through 16-91(d), 16-92 or 16-131 shall be as follows:
  - (1) First offense. Any person to whom was issued their first citation of any given violation shall forfeit sixteen dollars (\$16) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.
  - (2) Second offense. Any person to whom was issued a second citation for the same violation shall forfeit twenty dollars (\$20) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.
  - (3) *Third offense.* Any person to whom was issued a third citation for the same violation shall forfeit twenty-eight dollars (\$28) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.
  - (4) Fourth and subsequent offenses. Any person to whom was issued a fourth citation or any citation thereafter for the same violation shall forfeit forty-four dollars (\$44) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.
  - (5) Effective period of offenses. Each citation issued shall constitute an offense of that specified violation of the Code subsection indicated in the citation for a 365 day period following the date of issuance of said citation.
- (c) Class C. Penalties for violating Code Sections 16-90(b)(4) through 16-90(b)(6), 16-90(g) or 16-91(e) through 16-91(g) shall be as follows:
  - (1) First offense. Any person to whom was issued their first citation of any given violation shall be issued a written warning.
  - (2) Second offense. Any person to whom was issued a second citation for the same violation shall forfeit sixteen dollars (\$16) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.

- (3) *Third offense.* Any person to whom was issued a third citation for the same violation shall forfeit twenty dollars (\$20) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.
- (4) Fourth offense. Any person to whom was issued a fourth citation or any citation thereafter for the same violation shall forfeit twenty-eight dollars (\$28) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.
- (5) Fifth and subsequent offenses. Any person to whom was issued a fifth citation or any citation thereafter for the same violation shall forfeit forty-four dollars (\$44) to the City within ten days of when the citation was issued.
- (6) Effective period of offenses. Each citation issued shall constitute an offense of that specified violation of the Code subsection indicated in the citation for a 365 day period following the date of issuance of said citation.

#### Sec. 16-150. – Penalties for unpaid citations.

- (a) If the forfeiture resulting from a citation issued pursuant to Section 16-149 is not paid within ten days following issuance of said citation, a forfeiture of ten dollars (\$10) shall be added to the amount due.
- (b) If the forfeiture resulting from a citation issued pursuant to Section 16-149 is not paid within twenty-eight days following issuance of said citation, a forfeiture of fifty dollars (\$50) shall be added to the amount due and suspension of the owner or operator's vehicle registration pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 345.28 will result.
- (c) When a vehicle is the subject to ten or more outstanding, unpaid parking citations issued in accordance with this article, the vehicle may be considered in chronic violation of the parking ordinances until such time that all outstanding parking citations are paid in full. Further, upon a subsequent violation, a vehicle considered in chronic violation of the parking ordinance pursuant to this section may be towed and impounded at the owner's expense.

#### Secs. 16-151 – 16-159. – Reserved.

- **Section 7. Severability.** In the event any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held illegal, invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this ordinance. It is the legislative intent of the Common Council that this ordinance would have been adopted if such illegal provision had not been included or any illegal application had not been made.
- **Section 8. Repeal and Effective Date.** All ordinances or parts of ordinances and resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.

**RE:** Purchase Order Request for Winneconne/Zemlock Crosswalk Beacons

In 2016, the Common Council budgeted \$20,000 for installation of pedestrian beacons for the crosswalk on W. Winneconne Avenue at Zemlock Avenue. The project scope includes poles and mast arms on both sides to mount the beacons overhead, similar to the systems at S. Commercial St. & Olde School Rd. and Main St. & Western Ave. Due to the narrow terrace and overhead utilities, the project was delayed to address how beacons could be mounted overhead. It appeared at the time the only option to mount the beacons was to utilize a much larger, significantly more costly apparatus to get beacons installed overhead from one side. However, staff has been able to work with the utility companies to raise their lines, keeping minimum tolerance requirements, so that proposed pole could fit underneath. Given the ability to keep the project within budget, the funds were carry forwarded to the 2017 capital improvement program and the lines have been raised in early January at no cost to the City.

Attached is a quote from TAPCO for the equipment for the installation of Rectangular Rapid Flash Beacons (RRFB) for the crosswalk on W. Winneconne Avenue at Zemlock Avenue. Two options were priced out for Committee/Council decision:

- Option 1: \$10,082.28 for the system on raw aluminum poles and mast arms
- Option 2: \$10,882.28 for the system with black powder coated poles and mast arms

Staff recommends purchase from TAPCO of the RRFB beacon system with black powder coated poles and mast arms in the amount of \$10,882.28.

**RE:** Assessment Report – Forest Manor Street Lighting

Attached is the assessment report for street lighting in the Forest Manor Plat and several items associated with the project:

- Lighting options comparison
- Map of the assessable parcels
- Parcel listing

The budget for this project is \$65,000. Staff had requested costs for several lighting options from We Energies – from standard lighting to decorative fixture/pole. The lowest cost option is the standard wood pole. This option can be done within budget. At a slightly higher cost is the decorative post-top fixture on a smooth fiberglass pole. We have a number of similar installations of this type in the city. This option can also be done within budget. At a much higher cost are the decorative post-top fixture on a decorative pole. This option will exceed the budget. The city's ongoing charges for the latter two options is not affected by the pole style, but the assessable installation cost difference is considerable.

After reviewing the available options and having heard from several residents in the area, I am recommending that the city pursue Option 3 - a decorative acorn post-top fixture on a smooth fiberglass pole. This recommendation is being made for several reasons:

- 1. The street light has a nicer appearance than the standard lighting units. Unit aesthetics has been a concern expressed by area residents.
- The photometrics provide lightly more coverage along the roadway than the coach fixture. While the street lighting is being designed to residential street lighting levels, it is still desirable to cover as much street area as we can with each light.
- 3. While the acorn unit has more house-side light spill than the coach light, a house-side shield can be placed to limit that spill.
- 4. The project stays within budget. I would have no issue if there is an overwhelming desire of the neighborhood to use a decorative pole, but the cost difference was too dramatic for my comfort.

The lots to be assessed for the installation are shown on the attached map. Those lots that are more than one lot away from an existing street light were included in the assessment area.

### MEMORANDUM

FROM: Gerry Kaiser, Director of Public Works

RE: Public Works General Activity

Training Center/Clinic – The open house is scheduled for January 25 from 2:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

- Street Construction Plans Draft plans and specifications have been prepared for the Cecil Street reconstruction project. Design work is ongoing for the remaining streets in the program. Public hearings are scheduled for the February 15 meeting of the Common Council. The public hearing notice and project information have been mailed to the affected property owners.
- 3. Parking Lot Construction Plans Plans are being prepared for parking lots targeted to the TID 10 office project in preparation for spring construction.
- 4. Martens Street Razing The sixth of the contracted homes along Martens Street his being razed and brought to original grade.
- 5. Fox Valley Energy Concrete Pile The concrete crushing rig is on-site.
- 6. Sanitary Sewer Rate Study An RFP has been distributed for the rate study. Proposals are due on January 27.
- Pendleton Park Traffic Impact Study Staff met with engineers from OMNNI to review traffic projections for the study. OMNNI will now look at design alternatives for the CTH JJ/CTH CB intersection.
- 8. Salt Supply As of January 18, we had about 900 tons of salt in the storage building and commitments for another 1000 tons. The total of 1,900 tons is the amount that we would need for a light winter. To extend our supply, we are mixing stone chips with the salt. We are exploring alternative salt sources in case we need to purchase more.
- 9. Sanitary sewer agreements Staff has been reviewing sanitary sewer agreements with Sanitary District 2 and with the City of Menasha.
