

Jones County EDA welcomes new Laurel Superintendent Toy L. Watts

The Board of Directors of the Jones County Economic Development Authority and Chamber of Commerce recently hosted a reception for Dr. Toy L. Watts, the new superintendent of education for the Laurel School District.

Alecia Walker, Chamber of Commerce Chair, welcomed Watts and offered the services of the Chamber of Commerce and the EDA to her should she ever need it.

"I'm excited about being in Laurel and Jones County; it's like a dream come true," exclaimed Watts. "I really think that Laurel is properly positioned to take off. Once we get the schools right, you might as well buy property now, because you're not going to be able to get any. That's what people are waiting on and I know that. It's a big job I have ahead of me. I believe we can get there. We've got some really good people working with us, and I know it's just a matter of time before we continue to attract positive people who will continue to give us the educational foundation for our children that we need. I'm looking forward to that. I'm very glad to be here. Everybody's been so welcoming, and everybody doesn't mind sharing with me how much they've been praying for me - long before I arrived and long before they even knew who I was. I'm a woman of prayer myself. Prayer's what got me here.'

Watts was selected for the superintendent position from 22 applicants and 10 finalists. She has over 20 years' ex-

perience in education, having served as teacher, counselor, coach, principal and assistant superintendent. She has worked in multiple districts including Pass Christian, Bay St. Louis, Vicksburg-Warren, Atlanta Public Schools and Moss Point.

Watts received a Bachelor of Arts in elementary educa-

tion from Dillard University in 1996, a Master of Education in school counseling from the University of Southern Mississippi in 2001, a Specialist in Education in educational administration from USM in 2008, and a Doctor of Philosophy in educational administration from USM in 2012. She comes to Laurel from the Moss Point School District, where she has served as assistant superintendent since 2015.

Watts began working with the Laurel School District on January 1, with a yearly salary of \$135,000 and a three-anda-half year contract term.

McDaniel announces bid for the U.S. Senate

State Senator Chris McDaniel, who is adopting a campaign battle cry to "Remember Mississippi," announced Wednesday, February 28, his bid to challenge Roger Whitaker for the U.S. Senate in the GOP Primary in June.

Approximately 200 followers gathered in the auditorium of the Home and Health Services Center on the campus of Jones County Junior College in Ellisville.

"Feels good to be here again," began Mc-Daniel. "It's been four years ago, but we still remember Mississippi."

Acknowledging his two sons, Cambridge and Chamberland, and his wife, Jill, McDaniel said, "I love you all very much. I know it's hard. We've waited this long to make our announcement because we know our lives are about to be torn apart. But you know, sons, some fights are worth having."

"I'm tired of electing people from Mississippi who go to Washington to score points for the other team," stated McDaniel. "I'm tired of hearing about how we've got to reach

across the aisle and compromise for the likes of Schumer, Reed and Pelosi. When is the last time any conservative reached across any aisle and received any benefit? We've been reaching across the aisle for 50 years and what do we have? We've got 21 trillion reasons to never reach across the aisle again."

"Washington is disconnected," continued McDaniel. "If Washington looks down on us, and they do, it's because men like Roger Wicker have failed to stand with you. Roger

McDaniel encouraged the citizens of Mississippi to look at Wicker's voting record. "Don't take my word for it. There are objective score cards by which we measure these individuals. Go look up the actual data for yourself," exclaimed McDaniel. "Roger Wicker is one of the most liberal republicans in Washington and his record shows it.

"This race is a contest against very different views," continued McDaniel. "Do you want a fighter or do you want someone weak? Do you want a leader or do you want someone who follows leadership? Do you want a conservative or one who just pretends

to be one on TV? Specifically it's a referendum. It's a referendum on Mitch McConnell's failed leadership. To add insult to injury, Roger Wicker's campaign manager was Mitch McConnell's campaign manager.

Wicker has remained eerily silent for the

first 24 years of his tenure. Thank God for President Trump. He has made Roger

Wicker a conservative for about three

This is a deliciously hilarious show about a dizzy group of actors staging a new comedy - but they just can't seem to get their "act" together. Mix in lots of slamming doors with offstage romance and intrigue, and you have what's been called the "funniest farce ever written." First you see them acting the show on the stage, but then the set turns completely around, and you see what's been going on behind the scenes - and that's even crazier!

The play won Best Comedy awards on its original run in London, and then New York's Broadway production was nominated for the Best Play of the year there. A funny 1992 movie version starred Carol Burnett, Michael Caine, Marilu Henner, John Ritter and Christopher Reeve. Requiring exact timing and a ton of expertise to pull this all off, the entire cast is made up of LLT alumni. Playing the directors and stage crew of the "show within the show" are JT Robinson, Kade Lee and Logan Prince.

Robinson graduated from William Carey, where he appeared in many productions. Lee is a senior at Stringer High School but has been in over a dozen LLT productions over the last decade. And Prince has been involved acting and stage managing shows with both LLT and Bottom of the Barrel Players.

Playing the actors in the "show within the show" are Catherine Nowicki, Scottie Corley, Jeremy Cumpton, Natalie Davis, Ethan Glenn and Jody Ridgeway.

Nowicki is well known to local audiences as LLT's Miss Hannigan in "Annie" and Louise in "Always . . . Patsy Cline." Corley, Cumpton and Ridgeway are USM graduates and were all seen last year in LLT's "The Crucible" and in productions with the Bottom of the Barrel Players.

Directing "Noises Off" is long-time LLT alumni Sam Buchanan. He's been working at LLT since he was a teenager – as an actor, light board operator, set designer and director. He's also the founder of the local performance group, the Bottom of the Barrel Players. He's a USM graduate and now works for the Hattiesburg Convention Commission. His stage manager, Olivia Chauvin, is also a graduate of USM and now works for the Hattiesburg Zoo. She's assisted on productions at both LLT and with Bottom of the Barrel.

Sullivan named Sports601 Jones **County Soccer Coach of the Year**

No one is here to deny the success Jones County has seen in high school girls soccer. The list of state championship appearances, and wins, over the past decade, is quite lengthy. Boys soccer was an afterthought.

"Was" being the keyword.

The 2017-2018 season saw two boys soccer programs make it to the semifinal round of the MHSAA playoffs. One such team, West Jones, led by head coach Josh Sullivan, earned its second consecutive semifinal round appearance.

West Jones finished the season, 15-8-1, including playoff wins over West Harrison in a thriller, 2-1, and Forest Hill, 3-1.

What happened is of less importance as to what is happening as a whole. Boys soccer is no longer playing second fiddle. For the second straight season, a Jones County boys program have either tied or outlasted a Jones County girls team in playoff advancement.

Sullivan is partially responsible for the upswing. Sullivan is Sports601's Jones County Soccer Coach of the Year.

"We're super excited about the season and our team," said the West Jones boys soccer head coach. "Returning a team that made it to the Class 5A state title game [the season prior] was exciting. Everyone got to play in that game, but unfortunately, the outcome wasn't what we wanted.

"We set our standards high this year. We had everyone take their silver medal and put it somewhere they would have to look at it every day. We wanted that opportunity to make it back to Jackson. We gave it a good run, but ran across a hurdle and had to play on back-to-back days. Long Beach is a good team, and they did a great job holding us in check."

Despite ending the season short of its intended goal, Sullivan kept his team, and himself focused on its success as a whole.

"The season was great," Sullivan said. "Our guys came out and worked hard. We had eight seniors that did a great job leading. It goes without saying, without great leadership, you can't compete in the district and region we play in. Class 5A is competitive in the South.

"But I also want to tip my hat to the players that have come before. I always like to thank my seniors from my

first year and last year. They helped get this program in the direction it needed to go."

During his time at West Jones, Sullivan has racked up quite a resume. In his first season at West Jones (2014-2015), Sullivan stepped in to coach the girls for Craig Winship who was sidelined for a season. The Lady Mustangs, under Sullivan, won the Class 5A title over Germantown, 2-1, in overtime and finished the season with an impressive 17-4-2 record.

When Winship returned, Sullivan resumed head coaching responsibilities but this time over the boy's program. In three seasons, Sullivan and company have compiled a 38-24-6 record overall. This past season, West Jones claimed its first Region 5-5A title since the 2012-2013 season.

"Coach Winship, who assist me with the boys, gives me a lot of good ideas," said Sullivan. "The guy has five or six [state title] rings. It's hard to keep up with them. He obviously knows the game, and he understands how to make kids want to play. He's helped me out a lot. He was my coach in school. He made me want to be a better coach.

"Through that, I was able to get the guys excited, and they brought into what the girls had already bought into several years ago. If you play as a team, buy into what the coach is selling and understand its not about you then its going to be a good year, even if you don't win titles."



Figueroa named Sports601 Jones County Girls Soccer Player of the Year

No one soccer player in Jones County had quite the season like Esmeralda Figueroa. Finishing her senior season with 53 goals - the most of any player in Jones County, both girls and boys alike - and tying former teammate Morgan Mansell with 155 career goals - the most ever in school history - the Northeast Jones girls striker says she has her parents to thank for her accomplishments.

"It was a great year," said Figueroa. "But I didn't get here by myself. My mom made me read books because [the game of] soccer is not all physical and tactical, its also mental. And daddy helped me train, and he was a huge impact for me this season."

Figueroa earns the high honor or being named the first-ever Sports601 Jones County Girls Soccer Player of the Year.

"From the time she was a seventh grader, we knew she would be great and had a lot of talent," said Northeast Jones girls head coach Matt Reid. "Especially this year, her senior year, it wasn't just her play on the field. She made huge strides as a [team] captain. Her leadership and her attitude were so good this year that it bled over into the field and caused her to have more success than even she thought she could have."

Figueroa's 53 goals this year broke the school's singleseason record. She could have broken, instead of tying, the record for most goals in a career at Northeast Jones had she began her career as a striker in the seventh grade.

"Coach Tyson coached her during her seventh-grade

career," said Reid. "She was an outside defender then. And halfway through my first year of coaching [here at NEJ], I kept her at defender. One game I needed to find another striker, so I moved her because I saw she had the potential. She scored a big goal for us in one of the games I put her in, so I kept her there. And she hasn't looked back." The JCJC signee said she grew to love the position years ago.

"On defense, you just get the ball and kick it out, or kick it to a forward," said Figueroa. "When I moved to striker, I had to learn a lot more things. You have to learn to connect with people and find the back of the net as well as a lot more things. It's fun though."

Above all, though, Figueroa is a team player. On occasions, Reid has moved her to defender or center-mid, or to the outside edge to isolate her for more one-on-one situations.

"She is so versatile," Reid said. "When you have the talent she has, you can play any position. I guess she'll play striker [at JCJC], but she could really play any-where."

Figueroa chooses JCJC over several D1 colleges, including Northwestern State and Southern Miss, and fouryear universities such as William Carey, SUNY Farmingdale State in New York, West Alabama and West Florida just to name a few.

She will join her sister, Araceli Figueroa, at JCJC. Both made their decision public on Monday inside Northeast Jones' Media Center. A total of eight Northeast Jones players will play soccer at the next level.

"JCJC is a good option because they're good both athletically and academically," said Figueroa. "And I've known Dolores (Lady Bobcats head coach) forever. Hopefully, she can prepare me more, athletically and academically, for a chance at a D1 or SEC school. Plus, to get to play with my sister is amazing."

Sykes named Sports601 Jones Co. Boys Soccer Player of the Year

It wasn't just the quantity of goals that made Northeast Jones forward Cole Sykes' senior season stand out. It was the timely manner of his goals that made his year unforgettable.

Nagging injuries didn't stop Sykes from competing every game says his head coach.



South Carolina won their fourth straight SEC Women's Basketball Tournament as they downed undefeated Mississippi State, 62-51, in the championship game Sunday in Nashville. The Lady Bulldogs will definitely be one of the top four seeds in the NCAA tournament along with undefeated UConn. Louis-

ville and Notre Dame could join the Lady Huskies and the Lady Bulldogs. The NCAA bracket will be announced Monday, on March 12, at 6 p.m. on ESPN.



Ole Miss, on the other hand, fired their women's coach Matt Insell after a fiveyear tenure. The Lady Rebels ended the season at 1-15 in the SEC and 12-19 overall. Ole Miss last made the NCAA tournament in 2007.

The SEC, Big 12 and Big East set their tournament brackets over the weekend. In the SEC, Auburn and Tennessee tied for the regular season title. The Tigers own the top seed in the tournament, which begins Wednesday in St. Louis. Auburn has not won the SEC regular season since 1999, and this was only their third title in school history. Tennessee may be playing their best basketball as they won 11 of their last 13 games in tying Auburn for the regular season crown. Kansas has the top seed in the Big 12, Xavier is the top seed in the Big East, and Cincinnati is the top seed in the American Athletic Conference. Michigan got a big start on the NCAA Tournament as they wrapped up the Big 10 crown with a win over No. 8 Purdue.

The Mississippi State Bulldogs lost to Tennessee and LSU last week to doom their chances of a ticket to the "Big Dance." The Bulldogs will go to the SEC tournament as the No. 7 seed and will face their final regular season opponent No. 10 seed LSU. The winner meets Tennessee. Ole Miss with their weekend loss to Vanderbilt finished last in the SEC and will battle No. 11 seed South Carolina. The winner moves on to face No. 6 seed Arkansas.

The SEC tournament is up for grabs this year more than ever before. Auburn, Tennessee, Florida, Kentucky, Arkansas, Texas A&M and hometown favorite Missouri all have chances to cut down the nets and earn their ticket to "March Madness."

The C-USA tournament for the guys and ladies are this week in Frisco, Texas, at the Star. The No. 9 seed USM Golden Eagles will face FIU on Wednesday, and the winner will meet No. 1 seed Middle Tennessee. The Lady Eagles are a No. 8 seed and will face UTEP, with the winner meeting regular season champion UAB.

Congratulations to former Jones County Junior College basketball coach Jay Ladner. His Southeastern Louisiana men's basketball team won the Southland Conference regular season title and will be the No. 1 seed in the conference tournament in Katy, Texas, this week. It is the first conference title for the Lions since 2004-05. The Lions (21-10) have secured an automatic bid to the NIT as the top seed in the Southland Conference and will look to punch a ticket to the NCAA tournament with a championship this week.

SENATOBIA – Fifth-ranked Jones County Junior College has done it again. The Lady Bobcats jumped out to a 16-2 lead midway through the first quarter and went on to whip Copiah-Lincoln 78-53 in the MACJC Tournament championship game hereThursday night at Howard Coliseum. It was the second straight state title for head coach Missy Bilderback's Lady Bobcats.

"I'm really proud of our team," Bilderback said. "I thought we really raised the level of our play this week. We beat three really good basketball teams and played well."

It marked the third straight decisive game of the tournament for Jones. JCJC, now 23-3, opened the tournament with an 89-59 win over Itawamba and followed that up with a 77-53 decision over Holmes in the semifinals.

"We beat three really good basketball teams," Bilderback said. "I thought Co-Lin was one of the hottest teams in the league and Itawamba is very dangerous. They have great guard play. Holmes has been playing great and they had some bigs that could give us trouble."

The Lady Bobcats got off to exceptional starts in each game, outscoring each opponent by a 43-3 margin early in all three games combined. They led Itawamba 18-1 and Holmes 9-0, in addition to the hot start vs. Co-Lin.

"I'm just really proud of the way we elevated our play," Bilderback said. "Our kids are just really good this time of year. They want to win and they are competitors and I'm really proud of the way they have stepped up."

In Bilderback's second season as head coach last year,



the Lady Bobcats captured the state title at home in A.B. Howard Gymnasium. To be able to win it this season in a different environment was quite a feat.

"It's a hard thing to win and to be able to come up here and win it on the road is awesome," Bilderback said. "Last year, we had an advantage at home, but to be able to do this on the road is really special."

Nique Cherry (Heidelberg) scored on the opening possession of the game and the Lady Bobcats were off and running again. An Alexis Tolefree (Conway, Arkansas) trey made it 16-2 with 4:02 left in the first quarter. Jones led 20-8 after the opening period. The Lady Bobcats would take a 41-19 lead into the locker room at halftime when Camryn London (Birmingham, Alabama) scored with 13 seconds showing in the second quarter. JCJC took its longest lead of the game at 54-23 with 3:46 left in the third quarter when Mackenzie Thompson (East Rankin Academy) made a 3-pointer from left wing. The Lady Bobcats led 58-32 after three quarters. The closest Co-Lin got in the final period was 65-45 with 5:57 remaining on a T'Kyra Hicks' basket. Tolefree led JCJC with 21 points, Cherry had 19 and Chrystal Ezechukwu (Stone Mountain, Georgia) added 10.

The Lady Bobcats, 23-3, will now compete in the Region 23 Tournament March 6-9 at Mississippi College. JCJC is set to play Northwest at 3 p.m. Wednesday. The official tournament bracket will be released on Friday. The winner of the Region 23 Tournament qualifies for the NJ-CAA Division I National Tournament March 19-24 in Lubbock, Texas. JCJC won the region last year and went 2-1 in nationals.


Bilderback said winning the region is the goal now, but she knows it will be tough. "The target is on your back and you are getting everybody's best shot," she said. "I'm proud of our consistency and our daily work and I'm just excited for them that they can be rewarded with a state championship. But we have got one more to go because we really want that region. We are going to give them a day or so off and go back to work and see if we can't get ourselves back out to Lubbock."

Thursday's victory marked the seventh MACJC title in women's basketball for JCJC and it was the Lady Bobcats' third championship in the last five years. The Lady Bobcats have won state titles in 1947-48, 2000-01, 2008-09, 2009-10, 2013-14, 2016-17 and 2017-18.




