Georgiades Lays Foundation for Ahepa in the Bahamas

DEAR BROTHER CHEBITHES:

I am in this small but beautiful and hos I am in this small but beautiful and hospitable island of Nassau in the Bahamas. By a very happy coincidence Archbishop Athenagoras flew here from Havana on the day I arrived. I have been with him ever since he came, and I cannot easily describe the entusiasm of the Hellenic community. He spoke twice yesterday in the church for three or four hours in all, covering every phase of Hellenic life in the United States. I can assure you that he knows his subject so well sure you that he knows his subject so well that no one can contradict him. I always had high respect and admiration for him but I will have still greater hereafter. He fulfills his mission so successfully that I do not think that the Hellenic Church or Government or the race in general could find a more suitable person for the job.

The Hellenic community on this island num-

The Hellenic community on this island numbers 102 souls, of which 32 are men, 47 are children and the rest women. They are mostly from the island of Calymnos and a few from Crete. They have a little but beautiful church which they huilt at a cost of about £1,000. Their Rector is well educated in the French and English languages, besides in the Hellenic. He is their school teacher as well as priest. The main business of these people is priest. The main business of these people is the sponge industry. They buy sponges from the natives, trim, season, classify and export them to all parts of the world. Unfortunately them to all parts of the world. Unfortunately this industry (the sponge) is at a standstill just now due to the fact that nature has stopped producing sponges. They hope, how-ever, that in 3 or 4 years they will begin to grow again.

ACROSS THE EDITOR'S DESK

Ahepa Dramatized

By George Recas President, Hollywood, Cal., Chapter Mill

Hollywood, California—Herodotus the historian once said, "The ear is a less trustworthy witness than the eye," an axiom which closely approximates the ancient and oft-quoted Chinese proverb, "A good picture is worth a thousand words."

In common with our fellow-men, we of Hollywood Chapter admire the talented orator and writer, but by the very nature of our surroundings and our daily pursuits (for most of us are identified, in one way or another, with the motion picture industry) we have a keeper response to the visual form of presentation, he it drams or education.

The idea of a motion picture as a potent and far reaching medium to propagate and enlarge the ideals of Ahepa is by no means original with the writer of this article, nor perhaps with any other single member of our Hollywood Chapter, but it is one to which we have given much thought and carnest discussion among ourselves.

When I was privileged to attend the National Convention of Ahepa at Providence, R. I., last August, I broached the possibilities of such a motion picture to fellow-delegates from chapters in widely scattered sections of the nation. In almost every instance I was urged to formulate details for such an undertaking and submit them for consideration.

Unquestionably the heat medium for such a proposal is in the pages of Tur Antran, and for that reason I shall endeavor to set forth here the highlights of the project.

The world-wide influence of the motion picture is well known to all. In particular, the films emanating from Hollywood have demonstrated their universal appeal. Surmounting the barriers of language, pictures evoke a response denied to either the orator or the writer. Furthermore, in the manner of their making and distribution they give the widest circulation at a single time to the message which they convey. Pictures can be seen simultaneously by a great number of spectators and they can be shown repeatedly if desired. In this dimension of time and space and effectiveness they far excell either radio broadcasting or the printed page of newspaper, magazine or book.

We of Hollywood Chapter feel that a feature-length motion picture, produced and distributed under auspices of the Order of Ahepa, and planned and produced by experienced writers and artists, can be a source of manifold benefits to all Ahepans.

The three salient results of such an undertaking would be:

1. An increase in membership.

2. Substantial additions to henevolent funds.

A greater public appreciation of the ideals and talents of American citizens of Greek descent.

Over and above the actual production cost of such a motion picture production, all monies accruing from the exhibition of the picture would go to the charitable and educational funds of the Order of Ahepa.

This production would be a six-reel feature film based on a dramatic scenario of modern times. Into the telling of the story on the screen would be woven the history of Ahepa the story of the Order's founding and an exposition of its ideals for better American citizenship and reverence for Greece, the land of our fathers.

To the American public at large such a motion picture would be a welcome declaration of the loyalty and sense of duty which actuates every member of Ahepa. A source of pride to all Americans of Greek ancestry, this presentation would stimulate a desire for membership in Ahepa and it would be a forceful medium to combat subsersive influences in the United States.

Simultaneously, the production could be filmed in both English and Greek language versions, opening up avenues of exhibitions not only in the United States but in other Greek communities throughout the world and in Greece, too.

A comparatively moderate investment would be required. Each of the several handred chapters of the Order in the United States would form the nucleus of an audience that, collectively, would number many thousands. As the feature attraction for meetings and hanquest to the pictore would not only afford insteresting dramatic entertainment for such local gatherings, but it would also bring to each of these localities an impressive presentation compounded on a national scale that would be beyond the facilities of any single chapter. The picture could have a filmed prologue presenting the Supreme President of Ahepa in a harief introduction of the drama and the purposes for which it has been made.

Hollywood Chapter No. 318 is a very young member of Ahepa and it is most anxious to devote its talents and experiences to such an undertaking for the Order at large. Founded in December, 1938, with twenty-six members, our chapter now has over seventy members and it continues to grow in size and enthusiasm. On the roster of our membership are men who have had many years' active experience in the studios of Hollywood and they are all eager to contribute their talents to this enterprise. Through their offices, too, we could select and employ the finest technicians to be had in the Hollywood film industry, which, as you all know, is the leader in world motion picture production.

As a further means of publicity and income for the Order and its benevolent funds, it would be possible to conduct, through the hundreds of local Ahepa chapters, a nation-wide contest for a talented young man and woman to be brought to Hollywood and trained for the leading roles in this drama. It is altogether likely that such a competition may bring to favorable notice—in the same manner now employed by Hollywood studios through traveling "talent scouts"—an exceptionally talented young actor or actress, or both, who could go on to successive achievements in Hollywood films.

In that case it would be altogether fitting that the Order itself reserve for its benevolent funds a legal percentage of the surnings of such embryo film stars in the future. Furthermore, and quite aside from the financial aspects of such a realization, the favorable publicity which would accrue to a young man or woman of Greek descent among Hollywood notables would be a source of enhanced good will and appreciation for all Americans of Greek ancestry among the American people as a whole.

We of Hollywood Chapter urge each and every Ahepan who reads these lines to give this proposal thorough consideration and then convey your own reactions in a letter to the Editor of The Ahepan. By such purposeful discussion, we feel that we may create for the Order of Ahepa an instrument of genuine service and progress. We respectfully submit it to you in the spirit of Pittacus who said, "Know your opportunity." We are of the unanimous opinion that this is a very real opportunity for Ahepa.

Ahepan Accomplishments

Los Angeles, California—Peter N. Orphanos, in a letter listing a few of the things accomplished by the Order of Abepa, says in part:

I. "Ahepa made the American people conscious of the Hellenic existence. Through this Order the public has learned that the American citizens of Hellenic descent are a well organized, united group of farreaching potentalities; that they are loyal to the American flag and interested in the welfare of the country; that they are industrious, enterprising and progressive. This has elevated our standing and has inercased our prestige and influence.

2. "The regularly held meetings have done much towards the unification of the Hellenic element. These meetings have become a habit. Through them the members meet old friends, acquire new ones, and become better acquainted with each other. In large cities it is a question if the people would have ever met or known each other at all if it had not been for the Ahepa.

3. "The District and National Conventions of the Order have enabled the membership to extend its knowledge, influence, interests and acquaintance beyond the borders of its own city and state. These conclaves may well be compared to the Olympiads of ancient Hellas. The result is of the same type, only we receive greater benefits from the Ahrpa gatherings because we need each other more. It is one sure way of maintaining the old customs and traditions, becoming interested in our common problems, and thus preserve our unity.

4. "The educational factor of the Ahepa must not be overlooked. We learn a lot from each other and we learn a lot from lecturers brought in from outside of the organization. The very fact, however, that we operate upon pure democratic principles, have open discussion and vote upon all questions, brings out a lot of points that make us think. These open discussions sharpen our wits and step-up to higher speed our thinking apparatus. To have poise, to think on your feet, and to speak in public without being self-conscious are great advantages, and one acquires all of that from his activities as a member of the Ahepa.

5. "Through the various social functions sponsored by the Ahepa the young people of the Hellenic race are brought together and the results are many weddings that would never have happened had not the Ahepa

The New Minister From Greece

Extremely well educated, speaking English surprisingly well, is the new Minister Kimon Diamantopoulos who arrived recently from Greece. Accompanied by his wife, Mr. Diamantopoulos is already enthused and pleased with his present diplomatic post here in Washington.

Before coming to this country, he was stationed in Sofia, Bulgaria, for the past four years. He stayed in Athens a short time before accepting his new post here.

From his earliest youth he showed an intense interest in schooling. He attended schools in Paris, where he received his LLB. Later be entered the Diplomatic School of Political Sciences in Paris, and soon after graduation, he entered the foreign service. In 1910 he went to Cairo, Egypt, where he first showed signs of his diplomatic shility. After several years in Cairo he began a round of diplomatic service in the principal cities of Europe.

From 1919 to 1923 he was charge de affairs in Belgrade. He served in London as Consul General for one year, and later was chosen to represent his government from 1926 to 1929, as a delegate to the "Mixed Commission for the Eachange of Greek and Turkish Populations." Later by was elected for two years head of the Press Department in Athens, and then was sent to Albania for three years as minister to that rountry.

Mr. Diamantopoulos expressed his sincere feelings recently when he said: "I am very happy that relations between these two mountries, the great American republic, and the small but glorious, by her past, Greece are based on the most sincere friendship." The Minister further pointed out in highest praise the accomplishments of Ahepa in this country among the Greek people. "I am also prand," he said, "to see how the organization has influenced itself with the real Greek spirit, and has achieved the respect and admiration and cooperation of the American people."

Claims Calendar Cock-eyed

Athens, Greece. According to several pamphlets and newspaper articles published by Mr. Ulysses M. Calcherinos, the author claims that he has discovered the calendar used by the ancient Greeks and Helm as which is different, but much nearer to being absolutely corner than the calendar we use today.

Mr. Calcherings contends that it is a serious error to add a day to every fourth year. He claims that the year is not 365 days 6 hours and 11 minutes, as calculated by the Gregorian, but 565 days 6 hours, 7 minutes and 12 seconds a difference of 3 minutes and 68 seconds? Another mistake was to add 13 days to the Julian Calcular instead of subtracting that many from it.

In consequence of these errors the calendar we use today is about 22 days off being correct.

All can be made right, however, according to Mr. Coloherinos, if we just start with the 25d day of September, call it the los day of September, and go on from that point same as if the first 22 days of that particular September never dawned and never happened.

These Charming People



SUMMER CAMPS

Planning and Organization

By RAY STUART
Director of Camp Olympic, Washington, D. C.

T this time when practically all introspection, there is need to pause and reflect on what our oryouth is going thru a period of ganizations are doing in the development and conditioning of personalities as a means of producing "a better citizen." The writer, who has been organizing and directing summer camps in Massa chusetts and New York state for the past eight years for American-Greek boys and girls has had the opportunity to observe the carry-over value of such a project. Furthermore, on survey conducted in the summer of 1937 of all organized summer camps in New England. it was found that 355 Greek boys and girls attended American summer comps. Hence, we see ut once that the Ahepa or the Sons of Pericles are in a strategic position to influence the lives of the

boys or girls by organizing their own summer camps.

What is a Summer camp? A summer camp is an institution where youth may continue their character building education thru a wide variety of skills in swimming, diving, life saving, archery, baseball and safety education activities. The potential opportunity is present for youth to develop personality thru self expression in games and individual skills. Throughout these activities there is opportunity for guidance in thoughtfulness, honesty, leadership, cheerlulness, cooperation, and effort; in other words, opportunity to shape personality. I will be challenged by theorists as to the extent and nature of the carry-over learnings in a camp activity. I say that the practice and habits in activity are accompanied by attitudes and appreciations which condition one's outlook in life. Who will deny that diving practice may influence throughout life how one will carry the head in walking or align the fingers of the hand? Adequate training leads to automatic execution of physical grace. A swimmer who has learned the "feel" of rhythm and efficient mechanics of motion will thereafter be conditioned in attitudes towards the water. Likewise, it goes on this mental conditioning thru hundreds of relationships.

Selecting a Camp Site—The basic consideration in organizing a summer camp is that of first selecting a proper site. No other factor surpasses this in prime importance. No matter how elaborate the equipment, how splendid the staff, how varied and interesting the program of activities, if the site is unsuitable or unhealthy, a camp is doomed to a limited growth. A camp site should be accessible by rail and by good auto road, yet it should be far enough removed from both railroad and the main travelled roads to give much needed seclusion. The road leading into camp should be as private as possible so that public transportation will not interfere with camp activities. Of course the camp road should be passable, so that the fetching of supplies and the movements of the rampers and their visiting relatives will be facilitated.

An ideal camp site should of course combine both woods and cleared fields. The presence of open spaces is paramount, for sunshine is a great medicinal power. The sleeping quarters of the campers should not be surrounded by too many trees, since these will shut off both sunshine and tree circulation of fresh air, and create dampness which is not conducive to the health of campers.

Waterfront Salety—The greatest problem in camping today is safety, and there are a number of camps that have given little or no consideration to the complete safety of their campers. Every parent in sending

a child to camp is vitally concerned that the camp will adequately safeguard their child. The adequate safeguarding of campers at the waterfront is not a very difficult problem. It demands, however, a conscientious realization of a definitely assumed responsibility and the employment of trained certified life savers who have been trained not only in life saving, but in the methods of teaching swimming and water safety.

The visiting parents problem is probably the greatest one that the swimming counsellor has to contend with. Those same parents who decide that a certain camp is the one best fitted for their child because of its safety supervision, are the first to insist on breaking the rules at the waterfront.

Selection of Counsellors Perhaps one of the most difficult problems for the

camp director is to select his staff for the various departments. A counsellor is chosen because of his moral character, leadership, and personality. American Greek boys and girls who are studying law, medicine, engineering, art and those in the teaching profession can make a wonderful contribution to their community by accepting counsellorships in their district summer camp. Instead of applying for an Ahepa scholarship they can go out and earn it by guiding their little brothers and sisters to find a better world.

Who Will Direct the Camp? At the last Ahepa convention in Providence, Rhode Island, the "Sons" decided that each district must make an effort to organize a summer camp. Nick Anderson, governor of his district and one of my best campers was appointed camp director. His chief duty was to study the possibilities of organizing a summer campfor his district. As it has been discussed an ambitious young "Ahepan" or a "Son" with an analytical mind will come to a definite conclusion that this is a job that demands time and patience.

After the camp site is found, the counsellors secured, chef and nurse have been selected, then the question arises who will direct the camp? The president of the chapter or the district governor? Who is the best leader? John or Nick?

Leadership Vitally Important—What is a leader as we know him? A leader is one who symbolizes the needs and wants of the group. He makes it possible for the group to fulfill itself. Without that, his leadership is fruitless or impaired. He represents a goal to be reached. A swimming leader, a dramatic leader, in order to function, must give to the group what it wants: swimming and dramatics. The very easence in leadership is doing. Leadership, in the good sense, builds up on what the individual is, and on what his interests are.

Leadership is effective to the extent to which the group accepts the leader. Ask hoys or girls what they like most about a leader, and the answer is, emphatically, "He helps me." The essence of leadership is service, and it is that service to which the group responds and that makes the leader acceptable.

Conclusion—In this article, the writer has attempted to focus the attention of some American-Greek boys or girls who have been thinking of such a project in their own communities. There the boy or girl will be surrounded by the amphitheater of nature and soon will become a

Success in the florist business depends upon the degree of art attained in it, according to Mr. George N. Prokon, proprietor of the Buchanan Florist, located at Forty-eighth St. and Third Avenue, New York City. Mr. Prokon, who has been selling flowers for more than eighteen years, has spent eight of these years at his present location.

He talked about flower merchandising in terms of renewed appraisals, reviewing the growth of the business and the increasing consciousness of the average luyer with respect to garden products. A pleasant, interesting personality, Mr. Prokon is not a florist by accident. From his youth onwards he was brought up among flowers and today, as one who makes a living in flower-selling, he is quick to resent the easy, careless disposal of plants as so much staple or drug on the market. Talking about the general aspects of the business, he said:

"To what extent," we queried, "do you

find window design and interior arrangement influences the prospective buyer?"

Mr. Proken hesitated a moment. "Before answering this question," he began, "I'll tell you some of my experiences in this direction."

"On numerous instances," Mr. Prokon continued, "I have had passershy stop off and say to me. I started out this morning without the least intention of buying flowers, when I passed your windows and saw your beautiful chrysanthemums, your dablias, I just couldn't resist and had to come in. On one occasion, a woman came in, brought her friend so that both could see how I had arranged the various plants and flowers so that the color and hue of each were contrasted. Her friend, a painter, thought the entire scheme so interesting, she told me it gave her an idea for a picture. More to the point, both women became my customers and, subsequently, recommended others. Does this answer your question about the value of design and artistry in arrangement of window and store?

Took up Mr. Prokon: "If the prospective customer mentions something about being attracted by my display or if, not mentioning it, I sense it, I know at once how I am to proceed with the man or woman. This does not mean that I make up my mind to soak this individual. Were I to do this because I felt that being interested, the customer wouldn't mind, I would soon find, I am sure, some startling surprises. An interested buyer is not, therefore, a gullible one, and a florist or any other business men who make that mistake, will pay for it in the end, in diminishing trade.

American Waters Blessed by Prelates of Hellenic Orthodox Church

Epiphany Ceremonies

Observing an ancient custom of the Hellenic Orthodox Church, the waters round about and running through America bearing the navies and commerce of the nation, were ilessed by the high churchmen of Hellenic Orthodoxy on this continent. The impressive ceremonies were performed on Epiphany Day, January 6, 1940, at Tarpon Springs, Florida, and Atlantic City, New Jersey. He stated that the organization is composed of 352 chapters in the United States; that there are about 900, 000 Greeks in the United States and 460 churches, headed by Archbishop Athanagoras, of the Holy Greek Orthodox Church. The organization, he said, maintains a sanatorium at Albuquerque, N. M., and has recently purchased 360 acres of land near Tarpon Springs. where an old people's home will be erected. Plans are also being made to found an or phanage.

Mr. O'Connell, who was made a member of the Ahepa at the last State convention, praised the work of the eisters of Penelope and of Ahepa. He stated that during his tenure of office as municipal judge, as a State attorney, he has never had a Greek brought before him for any crime.

Madame Sikelianos loves Greece, land of her adoption, as much as though she were native born, and she has done much to bring to life the ideals of ancient Greece, and to bring back ancient festivals and observances. She and her husband were inspired to revise the ancient Delphic festivals and they did so at great expense, their ventures being declared an artistic, although not a financial succ

The Greek influence is strongly emphasized by Ted Shawn in his dances. One section of the program is called "Excursions into Visible Song," which include a Pyrrhic dance from words of one of the Spartan poets; parts of the "Song of the Open Road" by Walt Whitman, and part of the 52d chapter of Isaiah. All of these three numbers are based on the Greek theory of music, and in all of them the dancers will sing as they dance, and there will be no other accompaniment.

This is the first time on any professional stage, it is said, that the Greek theory of music to drama and to dancing has been recognized, and Madame Sikelianos says she feels the occasion is important for all who are interested in furthering Greek ideals, and it is the beginning of something which may develop into something very fine for Greece, and for art in general.

In a letter written to a local Greek resident she says "The whole of 'The Dome' includes magnificent dancing, and I feel sure the Greeks and others in your part of the world will greatly enjoy it. Ted Shawn is the greatest American dancer, and the only one whose spirit has been consistently Greek, even though his outward manifestations usually are American. He is a devoted friend of everything Greek, and he is the first artist who has understood that Greek ideals are concerned not with the past, but with the future of the world."

"I saw many improvements in Greece during my stay there," Mr. Mousouliotes said. "The government is helping the farmers cultivate their lands and helping them market their products. Conditions there are on the upgrade, as there are many jobs and there is no shortage of currency.

"As far as I could gather, the people look to the United States as a guiding factor in all negotiations and the majority of the people with whom I had contact refer to the United States as the 'model' country."



It is a matter of high principle with the members of this Order to be guided by reason rather than by sentiment in exercising their duties as American citizens

LET IT, THEN, BE DISTINCTLY UNDER-STOOD, once and for all, that the annual visits of the Supreme Lodge to the White-House are inspired solely from a desire to salute the chief executive of the nation, to extend to him the felicitations and best wishes of the members, and to reassure him of the Order's loyalty and cooperation in any policy or undertaking for the advancement of our

- 4. The increase in revenue from additional business promised with a monthly periodical, and a slight reduction in the number of pages now contained in each issue, will more than off-set the increased cost which the change will involve.
- 5. THE ABERAN coming out every month, instead of every two, will give better service and greater satisfaction both to its subscribers and advertising clients, whose patronage, we sincerely believe, will increase many fold from their ads in this magazine, because of the thange.



ARM THE EAGLE RIGHT!

It Takes Two to Be Neutral

O THE OUESTION: "WHO CAN BE NEUTRAL?" raised in the September-October, 1939, issue of The Ahepan, the answer given was: "only neuters!" Since last September, however, the development, maturity and transition of many events have revealed the insufficiency of this answer. The whole world is now coming to the stern realization that nobody-nation or individual-can, of itself, be neutral, regardless how it may strive to maintain that status. The reason is simple; just as it takes two to carry on a fight, so it requires at least that many to keep one neutral. Shakespeare's statement concerning greatness may very aptly be applied to fighting: some inherit a fight and feel honor-bound to keep it alive and hand it down to their posterity; some, by diligent effort, steadfast perseverance and cunning ingenuity, manage to "achieve" a fight; and others, without any pretext or provocation, have a fight "thrust upon them." In either case, the would-be neutral, guilty or innocent of any wrongdoing, finds a fight on his hands, and it is too bad if he is not prepared to meet the assaults of the aggressor.

Our own self-respect as fearless freemen; our self-defense, safety and security as a nation; and "a decent respect for the opinions of mankind" require that our government drop every pretense of neutrality, declare the position of its people regarding international brigandage, take a positive stand on the side of honesty, integrity and justice, and prepare to defend its position against any and all challengers.

The charge of practicing virtue on the "half shell," of denouncing the murderous methods of armed bandits with our tongue in our cheek, can be sustained against us when we tolerate and officially recognize in our Capital the accredited agents of rapacious, stick-up governments. It is neither right, reasonable, nor consistent with common sense and decency, for the Chief Executive, the Secretary of State, Congress and the people of the United States to issue forth strong expressions of disapprobation of unlawful exercise of force, and at the same time in official society, dine, drink and dance with the representatives of the nations against whom these "strong expressions of disapprobation" are directed; and actually sell to these very unlawful users of force, arms, munitions, materials and supplies with which to carry on their pusillanimous campaigns of pillage, plunder and pollution against their defenseless neighbors! Such a policy practiced by any other nation would arouse the wrath and bring down the righteous indignation of every red-blooded American. Is it possible that we cannot see ourselves as we see others? Is aiding and abetting international robberies, organized and perpetrated on enormous proportions and frightful violence, not a crime when committed by the United States? Or, are we so enslaved to the "keep-out-ofthe-war" sentiment that we dare not offend these megalomaniacs by inviting their Ambassadors to leave and recalling ours home from their mad-gone countries?

Complete severance of diplomatic and commercial relations with violators of international law, breakers of treaties, marauders and despoilers, does not necessarily mean that we shall be forthwith compelled to take up arms, cross the ocean and join in the fray. On the contrary, such a bold policy inaugurated and strictly enforced by the United States, is sure to have a sobering effect on the power-drunken paranoiacs who have again unleashed the dogs of war and turned them loose and unrestrained upon civilization.

The greatest comfort and encouragement the international stick-up gentry ever had came from our oft-repeated determination to remain "neutral at any cost or hazard." Here we are: the richest, happiest, furthest-advanced-in-civilization, most coveted and best hated nation in the world; witnessing the most horrible catastrophes that greed, perfidity, revengefulness, trickery, treachery and treason ever devised and inflicted upon the human race; and we still talk of our "splendid isolation," "entangling alliances," "minding our own business," and "keeping out of European and Asiatic embroilments," just as if the United States was on a different planet from Europe and Asia where fierce battles are now raging on land and sea. We speak in flowing, glowing, martial words about "defending our neutrality," and in the same breath vell for "economy" and urge the cutting down of proposed appropriations for armaments, defensive measures and military equipment! We think, act, talk and vote as if we never heard of the recently enacted tragedies in the awful drama staged in China, Ethiopia, Albania, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Finland, Denmark, Norway and in other countries. Little as we may realize it, the war is closer to us than it seems. Our possessions and vital interests in Alaska, the Panama Canal, the Philippine Islands, Guam and the East Indies bring the war to our very door. The grim shadow is spreading—lengthening in our direction. The me-thodical process of destruction, subjugation and enslavement on the installment plan is working directly towards us.

The fate of the late lamented countries mentioned should impress us with the cold, sad fact that diplomatic protests without the support of superior force amount to nothing more than platonic platitudes, which availeth nothing. We speak glibly about "defending our neutrality"-but with what? How does our armed strength compare with that of other nations? The conflagration of war is raging. The wind is blowing in our direction. If we are unalterably determined not to join the "water-bucket-brigade" and try helping to stop the fire, but will stay on our front porch until the fire comes to us, then there are a few possibilities worthy of our most serious consideration:

First, let us bear in mind that when a mighty ship is caught in a storm and the waves are dashing it towards the rocks and reefs, all those on shore watching and waiting for it to meet its doom are not waiting to lend a helping hand, but to plunder the bunkers of the ship and carry away as much of the loot as possible. Sometimes these human vultures fight among themselves over the prospective prey. Secondly, let us recollect and take at its face value the statement that the United States is the "most royeted and best hated country in the world." Few, very few, are the countries who have any love or sympathy for as, and those few are now struggling for their very existence.

Suppose that we stick to our pretense at neutrality, take no hand, directly or indirectly in this war, until and unless we are actually attacked. It is reasonable, but not safe, to presume that none of the nations now at war will attack us unless one deals a knockout blow, wins a complete victory, and then looks for "new worlds to conquer." It is reasonably safe to presume that if the Allies - England and France win the war, they will make no attacks on the United States.

Let us, however, speculate upon the possibility-no matter how remote it might be-that Germany is the ultimate winner of this war: that the might of France and England have gone

IMMIGRATION

Address Delivered by Edward J. Shaughnessy at a Meeting Held Under the Auspices of Capital Chapter No. 236, Order of Ahepa-Washington, D. C.

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen

When Mr. Papanicolasinvited me to say a few words to your lodge, I was delighted and frightened at This comthe same time. fused statement bears out exactly what the beloved Supreme President of your national organization, Mr. Chebithes, very wisely, ably, and yet facetiously stated at your banquet of two years ago (I have been fortunate enough to be one of your guests at your last three banquets), when he stated the speaker and his audience at least have one thing in common both are wondering what he is going

I was delighted to speak. but was frightened at the thought of an Irishman, whose talent, if he has any, is certainly not oratory, speaking to a group of Greeks whose natural heritage is that of declamation.

Getting down now to the

serious question of immigration, I may start out by pointing out to you why I am speaking on the subject of immigration before Mr. Nettleton addresses you on the subject of naturaliza-tion. The reason is simple. If the immigrant did not migrate to the United States there would be no one to naturalize. So it is proper that immigration should always precede naturalization.

First, suppose we ask ourselves the question, "Who are our aliens?" I find the answer to this question depends entirely upon the viewpoint of the person making the reply. The "alien" to some people invariably spells "criminal," which is a most mistaken idea, as evidenced by that comparatively small group which, under the law, has made itself subject to deportation, Even deportees who have failed to conform to some technical requirement of the immigration laws exhibit a loyalty and affection for this country which would do credit to a native-born citizen. An instance of this kind comes to mind.

I had occasion some years ago to pick up in Washington on a deportation warrant, a little Belgian, a deserting seaman. went up to his small room on one of the back streets of Washington while he packed his belongings. As we entered, he picked up the few worldly goods he had, and the last thing he did was to take down two little silk American flags which were hanging crisscrossed above the door. I asked him what he was going to do with them, and it was something of a shock to have him reply, "They mean everything to me, Mister. You see, my family were all killed during the War. America came to mean

something to me then. And I have been here just long enough to know it always will. I'm coming back legally some day - I don't know right now how or when-but I'm taking these with me till I can." with that he broke off the sticks and carefully fitted the two little flags into his old battered suitcase.

The social service worker will reply that our aliens are the Popovichs, the Tonettis, and the Samorrasfamilies whose case histories the worker knows. His point of view will be one of sympathetic interest, and one of his main concerns the solving of the social problems arising from the inter-relationships of the individuals or of the family groups with which he deals.

Mention of "our aliens" to the educator will call to his mind the picture of scores of English and citizenship classes, members of

which are made up from many lands, now gathered in classrooms studying our language, our Government and our customs.

The average citizen views the alien with mixed feelings. Usually he thinks of him as a foreigner who lives in another city and not as the person he knows in his daily contacts. The barber, whom he has greeted for years, the man who runs the dairy, the fruit vendor-these are not "aliens" to the average man; they are Tony, or Lars, or Nick.

To the writer or historian, the alien is quite another person. Our history is rich with the contributions of men who have come from other countries and who have given of their ability and genius to the culture of this country. Michael Anagnos, famous for his work with the blind; Lauis Agassiz, the scientist; Edward Bok, the journalist; Percy Grainger, the musician; John Philip Holland, inventor of the submarine; Joseph Pulitzer and so on through a long and distinguished list.

And so, to the Immigration and Naturalization Service, which has to deal with the situation from various angles, the aliens whose cases we handle have come to mean a composite of various viewpoints, including the recognition that they are human beings. To begin with I will tell you frankly that no one knows, although many people guess. However, it is possible to make what is believed to be a fairly accurate estimate based upon certain definite factors.

March-April, 1940

Beginning with the 1930 Census of the population of the United States, it is shown that on April 1, 1930, the foreign-born population of this country consisted of 14,204,149 persons, of whom 7,969,536 are estimated to have been naturalized citizens. There were, therefore, at the time of the 1930 Census, 6,234,613 foreign-born residents in the United States not reported as having been naturalized.

For the period of 9 years and 3 months between April 1, 1930, and July 1, 1939 (the end of the fiscal year for the Immigration and Naturalization Service), it is possible to quote some actual figures which, with estimates of certain other figures, are the basis for the estimated alien population as of July 1, 1939.

In the endeavor to determine the possible decrease of the alien population of the United States since April 1, 1930, we must list 1,329,128 persons who have become naturalized upon their individual applications; 269,943 persons who have derived citizenship through parentage, and an estimated 929,173 deaths, making a total estimated decrease for the period in question of 2,528,244. To this must be added the excess of departures over entries for the same period, 78,266, bringing the figure to 2,606,510. Deducting this number from the 1930 figure of 6,234,613 leaves the estimated alien population as of July 1, 1939, 3,628,103.

It is true that during the 10 years leading up to the beginning of the World War in 1914, 10,121,940 aliens had entered the United States (an average of more than a million a year), with the lowest number for any year of that period more than threequarters of a million and the highest, 1,285,349, which is the

In contrast with this great flood, let us refer to the mere dribble for the 10-year period from 1930-1939, inclusive. In 1931, the departures exceeded the arrivals by more than 10,000; in 1932, by more than 110,000; in 1933, by more than 90,000; in 1934, by more than 10,000; in 1935, by more than 9,000; in 1936, by more than 2,000. While economic, social and other conditions caused a greater influx in the remaining period (less than 4 years) since the 1930 Census, the total departures still exceeded the entries for the period since April 1, 1930, by 78,266.

Thus far we have discussed briefly the subjects (1) "Who are our aliens?" and (2) the number of aliens in the United States. Now let us take just a brief glance at the general history and development of the immigration laws. Way back in the early days of our country the individual states attempted to control immigration. However, before long the Federal Government took over the entire jurisdiction of the alien.

It is interesting to note that the immigration or alien question in the United States has always been what may be referred to as a very sharp two-edged sword. It is a subject upon which you will find no one properly classed as neutral or indifferent. It seems that every one is definitely for a liberal policy dealing with the alien or just as definitely for a strict policy dealing with aliens. And this situation is not new. We find that as early as the Colonial days, when there were but 13 states on the eastern seaboard of the United States and when the inhabitants of those 13 states didn't even know what lay beyond the Appalachian range of mountains, there were groups who "harped" upon the alien menace.

One of the great statesmen of that day wrote a letter to a friend discussing the alien in which he stated it was his wish that a wall of fire could be built in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean to prevent further hordes of aliens from coming to the United States. Fortunately all did not share his views. We do not find any real serious or effective immigration laws until along towards the latter part of the 19th century. In 1830 the United States negotiated an immigration treaty with China (and incidentally this is the only straight immigration treaty that has ever been negotiated with any foreign country). As a result of that treaty we find that in 1832 the first Chinese exclusion law was passed and since that time many supplementary laws have been passed further restricting the coming to the United States of Chinese.

In 1907 the so-called Gentleman's Agreement between the United States and Japan was entered into. In a general way, by the terms of that agreement, only certain classes of persons would be issued passports by the Japanese Government to come to the United States. Some of our earliest exclusion laws dealing with immigrants of all classes and races, are the so-called contract labor laws. This was to prevent mass importations of unskilled manual labor by employers in the United States who preferred this method of recruitment rather than employing labor within the United States who had their own versions of the value of their labors.

In 1907 a fairly substantial exclusion and deportation act was passed but it was not until as recently as 1917 that a real effective exclusion law made its appearance in the statute books. This is what we refer to as the basic Immigration Law of 1917. You will recall that in that Act the literacy provision first made its appearance and it likewise provided many other causes of exclusion and deportation not theretofore existing. This was known as the Selective Act as distinguished from the Quota Act which came into existence for the first time in 1921.

In discussing the Quota Act we are coming to a point which naturally affects persons born in Greece, as it does affect persons born in all so-called quota countries. In the first place, the quota has never applied to Canada or the independent countries of the Western Hemisphere.

The first Quota Act provided for the admission to the United States of not to exceed three per cent of the number of foreignborn persons of such nationality resident in the United States under the Census of 1910. This meant that the total quota was placed at approximately 356,000 persons. There were slight amendments in the 1922 Act, the details of which are not of sufficient importance to discuss herein. However, by the terms of the Act of May 26, 1924, drastic changes were made. It was provided therein that the quota, until July 1, 1927, or until such time thereafter as future quota determinations could be made, should be based upon two per cent of the number of foreignborn individuals of such nationality resident in continental United States under the 1890 Census, with a minimum of 100 for all countries. This reduced the quota from approximately 356,000 to approximately 165,000. Beginning with July 1, 1929, the so-called national origin principle was adopted. Under this determination the quota was fixed at approximately 153.000.

You will note that under the two per cent basis of the 1890 Census a drastic change was involved from the 1921 basis. In other words, the percentage was reduced from three to two and it was based on the Census of 1890, or twenty years earlier. Naturally it resulted in a drastic reduction in the number of persons theretofore permitted to come under the first Quota Act. While the national origin provision did not result in reducing the total number, it did result in drastically affecting the number that could come from the individual countries. Unfortunately the country of Greece was seriously affected because the Census of 1890 shows that there were only 1.887 native-born Greeks in the United States at that time, whereas in 1910 the Census showed a Greek-born population of 101,282. The result was a reduction in the Greek quota of from 3,294 in 1923 to 3,063 under the original 1924 basis - a drop to 100 a year from 1925 to 1929 under the two per cent provision and an increase to 307 per-(Continued on page 14)

NATURALIZATION

Address Delivered by Leigh L. Nettleton Before a Meeting Held Under the Auspices of Capital Chapter No. 236, Order of Ahepa—Washington, D. C.

I have long had knowledge of the Ahepa and held it in high regard, but this is the first opportunity afforded me to attend one of your gatherings. Shaughnessy has told me from time to time of his pleasure at being with you. and yesterday, Mr. Papanicolas favored me with a call at my office. When the matter of my addressing you was first proposed to me I. like Mr. Shaughnessy, experienced a feeling of fright and delight, and I told Mr. Papanicolas that if agreeable to him I would talk informally and somewhat at random. However, as the time grew near, the fright overcame me and I felt the necessity for putting my thoughts on paper in ad-

It has been so long I have known of the Ahepa, and let me add, that always it has been with favorable impressions, that it was with considerable surprise

I ascertained the Ahepa was organized so recently as 1922. Any organization which has made itself felt so prominently in so wide an area and in so short a period as has the Ahepa has certainly had the benefit of a strong leadership and is founded on sound objectives.

Mr. Papanicolas informs me of your wish to encourage persons of your race residing in the United States to become naturalized citizens. The naturalization of aliens has occupied my time for many years. In the United States we have two sources of citizenship—birth and naturalization. I acquired mine by birth. No credit is due me, therefore, for my being a citizen, for my status as such is due entirely to circumstances of my birth. The naturalized citizen, however, is a citizen by choice, and by exercising the choice of change of allegiance from the old to the new he has paid us in the United States a distinct compliment.

Our Government was established as a Government of the people—an organization whereby the people might govern themselves. Hence, when an alien becomes naturalized in the United States he does not become a subject of the Government but becomes a member of government—a member in a political organization in which, by his vote, he has a voice in its affairs equal with that of any other citizen. A citizen is one of the people, and the people constitute the Government.

It is, therefore, in keeping with the spirit of America that one who is a permanent resident should become naturalized and

thus become a member of the community in a political sense as by his residence he is a part of the industrial and social life. As a citizen, an individual enjoys certain benefits and privileges which are denied to an alien. For instance, here in the District of Columbia, only a citizen may lawfully own real estate. Throughout the States the right to vote is limited to citizens of the United States. Passports are issued by the United States only to its citizens. Local regulations commonly require citizenship as a requisite for the obtaining of certain licenses. Likewise, it is good for the community that its residents be citizens, and the same thing applies to the Nation. It is a citizen to whom the Government must look for support. There are reciprocal obligations between the citizen and the Government; the Government to

protect the citizen, and the citizen to support the Government. The Government, therefore, encourages worthy aliens to secure naturalization and extends to them helpful cooperation to that end.

The first Congress of the United States in 1790 enacted a naturalization law. From that time down to the present, provision has existed for the naturalization of aliens in the United States. For the past twenty or thirty years, the number of aliens naturalized each year has averaged 150,000. The current year gives promise of exceeding all previous records, a fact which speaks loudly for the popularity of Uncle Sam.

The number of Greek applicants for naturalization have, I believe, been considerably greater than those of aliens of certain other nationalities who compose a larger portion of our population. I notice that in the most recent year, for which statistics are available to me of the number of aliens naturalized by nationalities, Greece stood No. 11 on the list of Nations.

A word about the qualifications and procedure for naturalization. For more than a century, five years of residence in the United States; a declaration of intention or so-called "first paper" at least two years old; good moral character; attachment to the principles of the Constitution of the United States and good disposition to the United States have been basic requisites for naturalization. More recently there was added requirement for legal residence in the United States. Long residence here does not enable an alien (Continued on page 25)

Human Life Priceless

Measure of All Values

CKIN for skin, yea, all that a man hath will be give for his life." This statement is quoted from the fourth verse, second chapter of the Book of Job in the Old Testament. Coming from the Bible, one would naturally suppose that these words of truth and wisdom were uttered either by God or by one of His great prophets or patriarchs. But that is not so. They were spoken not by a Holy Saint, but by horny Satan himself-and to no lesser a Being than the Lord of all creation. The record of that conversation indicates that the Lord confirmed the truth of the statement.

The source, age and circumstances of the remark do not in any way affect its correctness. A more accurate and enduring characterization of man's love for life has never been made. Though the statement is older than the hills, it is also more enduring, notwithstanding the instability of its author. From the dawn of creation till sunrise this morning, the precious thing in life has been, is and forever will be life itself.

True it is that men and women have either wisely or foolishly sacrificed their lives but always to preserve, enrich, or gratify some other life. The sacrifice of human life upon the altar of any cause always represented, as Lincoln put it, "the last full measure of devotion." So it is written that: "greater love than this hath no man that he lay down his life for a friend," and, "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him shall not perish. but have life everlasting."

Life-human life-is the standard by which the value of all things, visible and invisible, is measured. There is nothing of value unless it is known to humans, and they use it for their health or happiness. Mother Nature can find no takers for her products unless she labels them "Useful to Human Life." Not only the "Sabbath," but the entire world "was made for man." Without human life there would be no purpose, no ultimate in Nature. No need for the existence of a Supreme Being. Humans, in their search for the embodiment of perfection by which they might measure their own worth, and for the fulfillment of their burning desire for life to continue in a brighter and better world even after it ceased to exist in this one, discovered God. Ever since that great discovery, God has depended upon man to interpret and obey His will, pleasure, wrath, laws and commandments to worship, praise, adore and glorify Him. He must, at one and the same time become what each individual-the Hottentot, the Whirling Dervish, the Hindu fakir and the Christian-conceives Him to be. Such is the power of the heart, brain, hand and foot of a human being.

Even though we seldom speak or think of it, the fact is that the value of anything depends solely and entirely upon its nearness and utility to human life. The value of land and buildings depend upon how many people are near them every day. The landlord and the shopkeeper may not realize nor appreciate the fact, but it is nonetheless true that you and I increase the value of their property and business by the simple act of walking by their establishments. The further a thing is from human life the less its worth and usefulness. The value of potatoes, meat, beans, silk, cotton, barges, ferryboats, battleships and airplanes depends upon the need and desire of human beings to have and use them. The whole world and everything in it exists for and has no other use than to minister to the needs and appetites of mankind.

Human life, being the only standard by which the worth and utility of anything can be measured, is itself priceless and invaluable. No one may presume to evaluate or put a price

upon the life of another. The Biblical statement: "As a man thinketh in his heart so is he," may be paraphrased into: "A man is worth what he thinks he's worth." A person may appraise his own life on whatever basis and according to whatever standard he chooses. But no civilized person would venture to estimate the worth of another's life. The old man who, The old man who, speaking of his bald head, said he wouldn't take the world for the one he had, and wouldn't give a penny for another one like it, summed up the gist of the whole matter. One old man's life was valued more than the whole world because the appraiser happened to be the owner of the life appraised. You and I feel the same way about our own heads, whether they are bald or thickly thatched with hair; whether they are old or young; whether they are ugly or beautiful. So would anybody feel about his own life-wouldn't take the world for it. "That's

only natural," we shout in perfect agreement.
Yes, "that's only natural" for anyone to be "that way inclined" about his own life, but is it also natural for us to feel that way about the lives of others? Or, is it natural for us to feel that the life of our fellowman, our compatriot, our fellow-worshiper, our Brother Ahepan, is not quite as valuable as our own? How can we place so high a value upon our own lives, and so low upon the lives of others? How can we continue accepting, using and enjoying the blessings of health, home, family life, work and the happy exchange of social pleasures, and at the same time deny even a little help to those who are fighting for the prolongation of their threatened and endangered lives?

Is it natural for me to say: "they will die anyway, so why help them! . . . There are other places to which they can go besides the Ahepa Sanatorium. . . . I was never in favor of the Sanatorium. . . . The Ahepa needs other things-orphanages, schools, old people's homes, and cemeteries - much worse than it does a sanatorium. . . . I don't like Chebithes, Essaris, Kossarides, Janetis, Alexander and Zervas. . . . There's no authority for them to collect money for the Sanatorium, noway ... It's a White Elephant.... A sore spot on the Ahepa.....
It will be the death of the Order!"

No! No true Ahepan, no patriotic son of Hellas, no Christian of the Hellenic Orthodox Church, no reasonable, rational person, no man sensible to human suffering, no one able to comprehend and appreciate the importance of human life will ever use such mean-spirited arguments as excuses for withholding his moral and financial support to the Ahepa Sanatorium.

Anniversary of Greek Independence

Speech of Hon, Herman P. Eberharter of Pennsylvania in the House of Representatives, March 25, 1940:

MR. EBERHARTER: Mr. Speaker, today marks the one hundred and nineteenth anniversary of the independence of Greece, an independence that was achieved after 7 years of continuous struggle on the part of a subjugated, yet indomitable, race against the then mighty Turkish Empire, whose domain extended over large parts of Asia, Europe, and Africa, This latter fact, in itself, makes the success of the Greeks of the third decade of the nineteenth century the more admirable. Our own independence, also achieved a few decades earlier, under very difficult circumstances. had undoubtedly influenced the Grecian patriots in their own determination to free themselves, no matter what the cost in blood and suffering would be.

During the time that has elapsed since March 25, 1821, when the Archbishop of old Patras blessed the upris-

ing of the people of the historic Grecian mainland and the islands of the Aegean Sea, Greece has grown in territory, and has vastly advanced in every field of human endeavor. As an example, I may mention the Greek merchant marine, many units of which are daily touching our American ports along both oceans and the Gulf, and are proudly flying the Greek flag throughout the watery expanse of our globe—about 700 of them—making an aggregate of approximately 2,000,000 tons. It comes next to that of France, and is the ninth largest in the world.

Greece and Turkey have put aside animosities of the past and, for several years now, have been showing the way to genuine cooperation and mutual respect among nations. They are doing more than quite a few other nations are doing to promote civilization, good will and peace, in this war-tired era of ours, when international lawlessness reigns, and small or weak nations are being devoured by larger or strong ones.

Greece, along with brave Finland and Hungary, has not forgotten her debt to the United States—in recent years. Of course, what she pays represents only partial payments on account of

The second Grecian

civilization was ended when, on May 29, 1453, the Turks captured famous Constantinople, the capital of the 1,000-year-old Byzantine Empire. A period of 368 unhappy years followed. Then on the 25th of March, 1821, Archbishop Germanos, of Old Patras, blessed the widespread revolution of continental Greece and the islands which at that time formed a part of the mighty and cruel Ottoman Empire.

For more than three and one-half centuries the historic land of Greece was darkened by the sinister clouds of barbarian rule. Fate had it that the enlightened and progressive Grecian people should become subservient to a race of religious fanatics, who descended upon the Greek Empire's thriving Provinces in Asia Minor, in Europe, and throughout the Mediterranean, rushing from far-off Turkestan with a fury and lust for blood unprecedented in the history of the human race.

During that period, despite fierce persecution and untold suffering, the Greeks never lost faith in the future of their proud race. Thoughts of a brilliant past kindled their patriotism and their undying love for liberty. Throughout those disheartening centuries they found comfort and (Continued on page 14)

America's Aid to Hellenic Independence

By PETER T. KOURIDES, Lawyer, New York City

It was March 25th, 1821, that His Holiness, Germanos, the Metropolitan of Patras, raised the standard of revolution against the tyranny of Turkish oppression. This uprising was not a solitary effort for liberation but was in effect the sequence of an extensive, obstinate and sanguinars exertion of four centuries. This was not the sudden rebellion of a people which had been awakened by the resurrectionary movements of other races. This was, on the contrary, the outcome of a long evidence of the segment of the Byzantine Empire and continuing for nearly four hundred years until the signing of the London Protocol of February 3rd, 1830, which unreservedly recognized the sov-

creign and political independence of the Hellemic nation.

The desperate struggle which the Hellemes were making during these nine long years for the establishment of an independent homeland was followed nowhere with greater sympathy than in the United States. The Senate, moved by the eloquence of Daniel Webster, passed resolutions of encouragement, public meetings were held in many cities, philhellenic societies were formed and many Americans, eminent in private and public life, espoused the cause of freedom and liberation which was being so gallantly defended by a handful of almost resourceless rehels against the might and power of the Ottoman Empire. The senerable Thomas Jefferson counseled the Hellenic patriots concerning the form of government best suited to their needs; men like Edward Everett roused public sentiment to undertake measures of practical aid; and Dr. Samuel Gridley Howe gained imperishable fame by going to Hellas and devoting his splendid talents to the amelioration of pain and suffering.

With equal sympathy the American people have followed the steady progress which we have made since then toward the unification of the Hellenic race. This friendly attitude of the United States toward Hellas and its aspirations for national unity was again most strikingly shown

With equal sympathy the American people have followed the steady progress which we have made since then toward the unification of the Hellenic race. This friendly attitude of the United States toward Hellas and its aspirations for national unity was again most strikingly shown during the peace negotiations following the World War when the Senate passed a resolution moved by the Senior Senator from Massachusetts, the Late Henry Cabot Lodge, declaring that Northern Epirus, Thrace, the Dodecanese and the Hellenic portions of Asia Minor should and must be incorporated in the Kingdom of Hellas and both major political parties inserted similar declarations in their platforms on foreign policy. Old precently, Hon. Edward J. Kelly, Mayor of Chicago, issued a proclamation setting aside the 25th of March as Hellenic Day and directing that the Hellenic flag be displayed on all public buildings: "so that this great metropolis may pay homage not only to the birth and freedom of the significant contributions of the American Hellenic citizenry to American

sivilization."

So we, American citizens of Hellenic descent, commemorate this eventful occasion in the making of modern Hellas, and express as well our sleht and gratitude to America and its people who have consistently and unselfishly come to the aid of our motherland whenever there was a need to do so.

May we assure our fellow citizens in these troubled times that, though the Hellenes may be deemed a decidedly nationalistic race, they constitute an element of peace, progress and civilization in the Near East. So protound is their desire to live not only in peace but in friendly cooperation with their neighbors and the nations of the world that Hellas has even become the staunch friend and ally of the Turkish nation, her aloned enemy for centuries.

Cyprus Islanders, Politically Uneasy, Request Autonomy

| From "The Evening Star," February 10, 1940, Washington, D. C.]

The Island of Cyprus, in the northeastern Mediterranean, has petitioned the British colonial office for autonomy.

"Dissatisfaction on the part of the people of Cyprus was shown before when, in 1931, they tin from the National Geographic Society.

"This island of Control of Control

"This island of Greek people, with Turkish customs and British rule, has a population of 375,000, of whom one fifth are Mohammedan. The bulk of the islanders are of the Greek Orthodox faith. Their language is a local dialect of modern Greek with many Turkish, French, Italian and English origin.

"The poverty of the Cyprus farmers, largely because the rainfall averages but 20 inches a year, is one of the chief reasons for the political uneasiness of islanders. Short rainstorms in the mountains flood the rivers in the winter: in summer the rivers are dry and irrigation dependent upon questionable supplies of water from springs and wells. Government engineers report that the general configuration of the island and other natural conditions make the island obsoited for large-scale irrigation.

POPULATION HAS DOUBLED

"Consequently, such a staple as flour must be imported at an annual cost of more than a million dollars, and wheat imports approach the balf million dollar figure. The population of Cyprus has doubled in the past 50 years of Cyprus has doubled in the past 50 years and crop production recently has been decreasing.

"Pnerto Rico, with an area only a little larger than that of Cyprus, has four times the population of the Mediterranean island, but it also has 3½ times the rainfall of Cyprus. The two-thousand-took Kyrenia Mountain The two-thousand-toot Kyrenia Mountain Range borders the northern shore of Cyprus; the south and west are mountainous areas culminating in Troodos, the Cypriote Olympus, 6,406 feet above the sea. East and west beeen extend the broad treeless plains of Mesacria.

"A little more than a sixth of the island is in forests. To the scarcity of trees is attributed the arid condition. The island was once well wooded, but the mines of the Phoenicians and the fleets of Alexander and Venice destroyed vast areas of the forests. The disastrons process of denudation has continued. In the World War cypress trees were cut to supply British needs in Palestine and treeless Egypt. The islanders import more than a half million dollars in timber annually.

"The port of Famagusta has the island's only good harbor. The 486-mile coastline, with its many capes, has many bays, but at Limassol, Paphos and other ports passengers must land in small boats. It is from Famagusta that tourists begin their scenie tour of Cyprus and through this port come sacationists from Palestine, Egypt and even far-off London tothe mountain and seaside resorts.

"Famagusta is a medieval walled town when camels still are seen trudging through the main street. The low buildings magnify the 14th century Gothic Cathedral of St. Nicholas. now a Turkish mosque. Cyprox was an early convert to Christianity and Famagusta once had 400 churches.

"Travel on Cyprus is done mostly by motor cars, though a railway traverses a part of the island lengthwise, connecting the port with the capital, Nicosia. The capital is more modern than Famagusta, but it is also surrounded by the remnants of a circular wall with 11 bastions and originally had four gates. Its streets are made more narrow by overhanging balconies, with many modern buildings and hotels in the residential section. The native quarter has an udded Oriental touch in the street

hope in their devotion to the religion of the Nazarene. Thus the church had become the nation's ark.

The book of history records in countless pages the unparalleled sacrifices and the su-perhuman efforts that the Greeks exerted in perhanan efforts that the Greeks exerted in their uneven struggle to free themselves from the tentacles of the Turkish octopus that had gradually become deeply entrenched over vast parts of Asia, Europe, and Africa. There were times when the road to liberty seemed endless and hopeless. Nevertheless, the struggle went on from 1453 to 1821, mostly without effect. But the conflagration that began 119 years igo today and lasted until 1829 resulted in the liberation of continental Greece, the Pelopounesus, and several of the islands, and brought about the beginning of the end of the once formidable empire of the Turks.

The human mind will forever remember and

revere such places as: Missolonghi, where a small army of brave men repulsed the Turks during three sieges and blockades, which kept the city under the fire of a large Turkish army and may from 1822 to 1826, bringing death to 50,000 Turks. When finally the defenders, lacking food and ammonition, decided on an exodus, only 1,300 managed to break through the Turkish lines alive. The aged, the disabled veterans of many battles, as well as the emacisted women and children, who remained in the city, applied the torch to the powder magazine, choosing a gruesome death rather than surrender to the Turks. Deservedly, therefore, Missolonghi is known as the Sacred City of modern Greece.

Psara, a tiny island, but the birthplace of Constantine Canaris and many other fearless men of the sea, whose ships worked wonders against the oppressors during the revolution. There, to avenge the victories of Canaris and his renowned sailors, the Turks sent an army of 14,000 men and 140 men-of-war that devas-tated the island. Of its 53,000 inhabitants and refugees from Chios and Smyrna, only about 3,000 escaped. The others were butchered. Chios, where the people hoisted the flag of

therty, although they completely lacked means of warfare and defense. Their love of free dom resulted in rivers of blood, when 70,000 of its population of 100,000 were massacred or sold as slaves by Rear Admiral Cara Ali, who was subsequently burned to death when Ca-naris destroyed his flagship.

Spetsae and Hydra, the two small islands whose merchant marine, led by Admiral Miaculis and by Bouboulina, the only woman admiral in the history of the world, cooperated with that of Peara in routing the Turkish Navy in almost every engagement, and in bringing food and supplies to the besieged rities, towns, and islands.

AGRICULTURE CHIEF SUPPORT

"Despite the lack of abundant water supply, Cypros is an agricultural island. A majority the people are employed in the growing of grains and segetables, oranges and olives, cotton and tobacco. The grape harvest has recently doubled and the export of wine has reached 1,500,000 gallons. Exports from copper mines were valued at \$6,250,000 in 1938

and asbestos exports have exceeded \$600,000.
"There is a small export trade in silk fabrics made in the home, where the women also make embroideries and a lace similar to Venetian point. Six cigarette factories use mostly Greek tobacco; the Cyprus grown is shipped to Lon-don for cigarette making. Other factories on the island tan leather, make pottery, soap, olive oil, roofing tiles, brick and cement tiles, betters and feestings. buttons and furniture.

Colocotronis, who shattered Turkish forts and dispersed Turkish armies in the Peloponnesus; Marcos Botsaris and his indomitable Suliotes, the beloved George Caraiskakis, who swept the tyrants from continental Greece; also, among other great patriots, Alexander Ypsi-lantis, who relinquished his high office with the Russian Government and hastened to fire the first shot of the insurrection in distant Rumania, where he and his 300 scions of prominent Greek families, living in that then Turkish Province, challenged the supremacy of the barbarians and died in glory.

year, under the present national origin plan. Thus, we find that the Greek quota of 307 per annum is entirely insufficient to meet the demands of the number of persons of Greek nationality who desire annually to migrate to the United States, with the result that the Greek quota is generally exhausted for a number of years to come.

It is significant to note the contributions being made to the United States by incoming immigrants. All immigrant aliens are not the burren, empty-handed persons that so many would have us believe. I need not mention to this group, whose heritage is so rich in culanything of the gifts in art and literature

which have been brought to America by them. The appreciation for the opportunity to come to this country, to live and earn in peace has been expressed in a very material way by many immigrants.

For example, one textile man formerly owned a factory in Europe, his chief market being South America. Because of unsettled world conditions, he came to the United States. transferred his factory to his new country, and is employing American labor to supply his former market.1

AHEPA CAPTURES HEART OF AMERICA

National Banquet Enthralls Capital; Tenets of the Order Saluted as Patriotic Palladiums

LTHOUGH "the Greeks have a word" for nearly everything, their lexicographers are hard pressed to produce one, which standing alone, can come anywhere near describing, even with the scantiest measure of justice, the Fifth Biennial National Banquet of the Ahepa held on the 4th of March, 1940, in the Mayflower Hotel, Washington, D. C. For this event we should borrow no fewer than two words from the Hellenic lexicon. As to which two it will be, we find a cue in the telegram received from His Grace, the Most Reverend Archbishop Athenagoras, and choose: "enthôxôtātōs thriāmvos" ("tho" as in though, "thri" as in thrill) —"a most glorious triumph." These words are imposing enough in looks, sound and meaning, but fall far short of depicting accurately the salient characteristics and profound effects of this stately occasion.

A SPECTRUM OF AMERICAN LIFE

The gathering as a whole has so many different sides or "angles," each revealing individual subjects of interest, that it is not unlike a chromatic spectrum which consists of all the rays which are capable of affecting the eye. And, just as the spectrum reveals every color of the rainbow spectrum which consists of an the tays which are capable of affecting the eye. And, just as the spectrum reveals every color of the rainbow when radiant energy is diffused over it by a beam of light, and these colors arrange themselves in series, according to their respective wave lengths, so do these national conclaves consist of representatives from practically every walk and calling of American life, drawn together once every two years by the Order of Ahepa for an evening of happy convivisitive and a free interchange of ideas.

Looking at it from another point of view, it may well be likened unto the dramatization of an epic in which the Ahepa and its accomplishments are treated in a heroic style and proportions. Viewing it from still other angles one may see it as a great symphony, wherein different instruments, varying widely in tone, quality and amplitude, are played har-moniously together; or as a rhapsody wherein a number of miscellaneous pieces have been collected and "stitched" together to form a composi-tion which is played, sung or recited in harmony with the central theme Americanism.

A TONIC AND AN ANTIDOTE

Regardless of how or from how many its sides the more than eight hundred different participants viewed this social spectrum, it is agreed, for the most part, that the gathering presented a spectacle of unity, solidarity and community of purpose; that the aims, objects, ideals and aspirations of the Ahepa are in keeping with the best American traditions; and that the doctrinal creeds broadcast by the Ahepans and their guests served both as an invigorating patriotic stimulant, and as an antidote against the mischievous effects of the unamerican activities of some subservive groups.

HOW A PLAIN PERSON SAW IT FROM ALL SIDES

A plain, everyday person, accustomed to hang around the Ahepa Head quarters and move easily, not to say lazily, about the streets of Washington, knowing nothing and caring less about chromatic spectrums, epics, rhapsodies, tonics and antidotes, watched the Abepa National Banquet congeal out of thin air, bud out, blossom into full bloom and tade away, leaving but a pleasant memory—all in less than thirty-six

The first noticeable indication that an event of extraordinary impor-tance was about to take place in the history of the Order, was an un-usually heavy traffic at Headquarters; artists, printers, cuts, proofs and lots of talk about program, lists, tickets and seating arrangements; tele-phone and telegraph messages, and important looking mail coming in

and going out in rapid transit.

The next thing of interest was the extremely large number of promi-The next thing of interest was the extremely large number of prominent Ahepans in town. They kept coming in until the hotel lobbies and street corners around the Investment Building were cluttered with them. By Sunday morning every nook and corner, from the Mayflower Hotel to the Church of St. Sophia, where Archbishop Athenagoras was conducting service, was clogged and overflowing with out of town Ahepans, their families and friends. By midnight the whole city assumed the appearance, tone and language of an Ahepa National Consention. Comes now Monday evening, March the 4th, at the Mayflower Hotel-Among the very first arrivals is Sam Orphanos, the natty little chairman of the committee on arrangements. So busy a man is he, that he seems to be busier than he really is. He marshals his flock of beautiful hos-tesses and his line of ushers into action. Now there a a commotion: "the tesses and his line of ushers into action. Now there's a commotion: the banquet hall is not ready yet!"..."the guests are crowding the doors."

... "Somebody misplaced the lists!"... "Get a table here!"... "You sit there."... "You stand there."... "You go upstairs ...!" Soon the little "Samoleon" has his "co-ed army" in actual service, the dining room is ready, the doors are opened and the orderly process of seating the guests is underway.

guests is underway.

Seated in one of the easy chairs of the spacious corridor, watching save after wave of smiling, mirthful, vivacious, gaily-clad young ladies, trimly attired young men, sedate matrons, serious-minded merchants, portly statesmen and dignified diplomats, billow through the ponderous revolving doors and float through to the banquet hall in a riot of color, amid the rustling of silk and the "break" of muslin, in an atmosphere surcharged with the rich scents of rare perfumes almost to the point of saturation, one could not but compare these scenes with those of older days, and feel his bosom swell with pride and admiration at the difference.

At a long last the guests are seated—more than 800 men and women from practically every point of the compass, and from every profession, socation and avocation, station and calling of life—all but those who will occupy the head table.

Where are they? The crowd is impatient, even though everyone seems to be having a good time.

Here they come—in two lines. One comes through the west entrance,

One comes through the west entrance, and headed by none other than the tall, stately Archbishop Athenagoras, elothed in the flowing robes and carrying the staff of his office, and the other headed by the newly arrived Minister of Hellas, His Excellency and Mme. Kimon Diamantopoulos. The assembly rises as they enter. They proceed to the dais and stand at their position. George Papanichola, president of Ahepa Chapter 236 and general chairman of the dance committee, stands in the center, then, alternating to his right and left: Supreme President and Mrs. Chehithes, Archbishop Athenagoras, Senator Burton K. Most Reverend Archbishop Athenagoras, Your Excellencies Turkish Ambassador and Royal Hellenic Minister. Senators and Congressmen of the United States, representatives of the Federal dejartments, representatives of the press, members of the Order of Aheja and its auxiliaries, ladies and gentlemen, on behalf of the chapters, the district lodges, the supreme lodge, and the entire membership of the Order of Aheja, I am happy, and I consider it a privilege and an honor to extend to you all a most cordial and hearty welcome to this our fifth brennial banquet in Washington.

The Aheja, which means the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association, is a national fraternal order, conceived in

The Ahepa, which means the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association, is a national fraternal order, conceived in the minds and been from the hearts of American citizens of Hellenic ancestry, it is established upon faith in God and belief in the divinity of Jesus Christ, and is dedicated to the task of inculcating respect for the inalienable rights of man, loyalty to the United States of America, love for its free institutions, and reverence for its sacred history and noble traditions. The infillment of its mission is entrusted to the efficacies of a free democratic government, mustual understanding, united effort, and cooperative action. Through this order we trach and learn the tenets and fundamental principles of self-government; acquire due appreciation of the rights of citizenship and a clearer realization of the duties accompanying the privilege of being citizens of a free country. Through this order we labor for the perfection of our moral sense.

for the promotion of good fellowship, altruism, and mutual help-juliess, pointing out the heauties of sacrifice and the deformities of selfishness. Through this order we strive to augment the educa-tional advantages of this country by opening and maintaining new channels for facilitating the dissemination of culture and learning. Finally, through this order we seek to discourage calumnies; re-strain our tongues from evil and our lips from speaking guile; and

strain our tongues from evil and our lips from speaking guile; and to teach by precept and example that: to live is to serve, to rule is to obey, to rise is to lift up the fallen, and to gain the greatest good in life is to give our best for a great and good cause.

The purpose of these great biennial Aheva banquets, honored, as this one is tonight, by so many Senators, Congressmen, and representatives of the Federal departments, by so many diplomats, and by so high officials of church and State, is neither selfish nor ulterior. The Order of Ahepa has no ax to grind. We seek no special privileges; we are not interested in any pet plan or legislation designed to give special rights or advantages to us as a classor a group of citizens. What is good for the rest of the country is good erough for us. We are patriotic and law-abiding citizens by natural inclinations and by historical traditions. We were never known to demand anything that was not right or submit to anything that was wrong. Illegal practices, unlawful means and methods, and obnoxious tactics are not in our line. We abhor and detest them in others and most certainly will not tolerate them among us

among us.

So I invite our distinguished guests to be carefree, light of heart, and easy of mind. Your hosts of tonight will not be your beseigers or persecutors tomorrow. You will not meet any of us wearing a black shirt, carrying a red rag, or a hooked-cross banner, or an ex-cored bundle of sticks, demanding the keys to public and private stores of food and arms, the combinations to Uncle Sam's treasuries, and a safe conduct to some fureign country. Neither will any of you face any of me on the witness stand position the treasures, and a safe conduct to some threign country. Neither will any sit you face any of us on the witness stand pointing the finger of scorn or accusation against you. Perish such thoughts. We wave nothing but Old Glory, carry high nothing but our privilege of American citizenship, and demand nothing but what is guaranteed to us by the preamble and Bill of Rights of the Constitution. And, insofar as accusing you of wrongdoing is concerned, it's out of the question. We investigated every prospective guest before he was actually invited. Our report is the same as that of the California sheriff who was sent to investigate some purported irregularties in a pudist colony. His report was that

purported irregulartiles in a nudist colony. His report was that he "couldn't pun anything on anybody."

In all seriousness, there are no ulterior motives or purposes directly or indirectly connected with this affair. Its sole and only purpose is to bring us together as citizens of a common country. purpose is to bring us together as citizens of a common country having a common interest in its progress, peace, and prosperity; to become better acquainted with each other, to exchange ideas, to discuss frankly, freely, and openly the problems that are now hard pressing upon us and civilization in general, to learn what we can do to help solve the problems, serve the needs, and preserve the interests of America in these critical times, and to commend, compliment, and encourage those who have labored faithfully in the loyal discharge of their respective duties, thus advancing the interests, strengthening the position, enriching the prestige, and enhancing the influence and power of America. cy. Past Supreme President Achilles Catsonis, who is scatted in the audience and whose name is not on the program, is called upon to pinch hit for Senator King who is present but slightly indisposed. Catsonis rises, goes before the microphone and delivers the following speech, which, as a declaration of Ahepan principles, has no superior, and which also was reported in the Congressional Record of April 12, 1940, page 6715, by Senator O'Mahoney:

THE AHEPA Not a Shady Front, But a Patriotic Flame

ADDRESS BY ACHILLES CATSONIS AT AHEPA BANQUET

MR. O'MAHONEY: Mr. President, Members of the Senate and the House of Representatives who were privileged to attend the banquet of the Order of Ahepa, at the Mayflower Hotel on March 4, were all greatly impressed by the appearance and the ability of the American citizens of Greek origin who spoke at that function. Their addresses called to mind the great debt which society owes to the ancient Greeks. These people have handed down to us in the modern world not only an example of outstanding accomplishment in literature and art but also a most impressive example of unfailing devotion to the fundamental principles of democratic government. One of the very interesting speeches made that evening was delivered by Mr. Achilles Catsonis. I ask unanimous consent that his remarks may be printed in the Appendix of the Record.

There being no objection, the address was ordered to be printed in the Record, as follows:

Mr. "Symposiarch," good old fashioned American toastmaster: hardly much could be added more appropriate to the occasion than your opening remarks " " " I have been reading lately a book entitled "The Lost Continent of Mu." Colonel James Churchward, the author, who states has spent more than fifty years in search of man's first habitat " " " makes the startling reselation and asserts it as his belief that more

than fifty thousand years ago, stretching across the Pacific easterly from Central America and westerly well nigh touching the opposite shores, was couched a vast continent, larger than the United States by some two thousand miles, known as "The Land of Mu," and as "The Lands of the West," that a superior civilization flourished upon this continent, that thousands of years ago, due to solicanic upheavals emanating from the Earth's center and breaking through its crust the entire continent was submerged with its 64,000,000 of people, that this was the Greek Alphabet when accurately deciphered is a short history of the description of Mu. Challenging and informative, and if true, makes the Greek immigrant of today not a recent comer to the Western Hemisphere but a long lost wanderer who having ventured the round of the world, returns now to the point of beginning. Perhaps that accounts for his being at home in America!

And well may be feel at home for, laying aside for the moment the theory of Colonel Churchward, and viewing the Greek as among the recent corners to our shores, we find he was teserived by Americans of earlier adsent not as a strange and unassimilable addition to the body politic but as a kind and kindred spirit, wholly sympathetic and in foil accord with, the basic philosophy of American life. To him as to all others who honestly tried to find in America a fresh outlook on life, and who believe that vibrant, dynamic and constructive efforts are indispensable prerequisites to a useful life. America has been a haven and a field of opportunity. The institutions established by the founding fathers and maintained by successive generations of Americans at luge sacrifices and constant vigilance have been his to enjoy equally with those who link their ancestry to the Mayflower. For him as for all others who have come within its jurisdiction the Constitution has been a protective mantle, a veritable palladium of the rights of man as conclusated in that immortal document.

Thus impelled and motivated the American Hellene sought to find his proper place in the social structure of his new country. In his own traditionally individualistic temper and by constant application to what daily tasks he has demonstrated that he is not lacking in the qualities which should characterize a good citizen. Indoctrinated in the belief that law is the sine qua non of a well ordered society this new ventures upon these shores has been responsive to his obligations as a law abiding citizen. As a token to his industry you will seldom find him depending on public assistance. As the head of his family he is fully cognizant of his responsibilities and strives to make possible for his children opportunities not available to him. Nor is he wanting in the traits requisite of a public spirited citizen, well remembering and moulding his conduct in that regard by the exhortation of Pericles to the youth of Athens to pass their city on to their successors, not only not less but greater than they found it.

Yet, creditable as admittedly has been the record of this reborn American as an individual, he felt as he grew with America, that more was possible by way of cooperative effort, that he had much to contribute to

its welfare, that not only in taking but in giving even with greater measure, does the true citizen and patriot find happiness and contentment, and that his cherished rights, precious though they are, become consecrated only when he is willing to match them with their correlative doties and sacrifices.

With such thoughts in mind a group of Hellenes, in 1922, sought and obtained from the State of Georgia a charter to establish the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association, popularly known as The Aliena, to instruct the Greeks of America in the tenets of American government; to strengthen and confirm their belief in the fundamental institutions of this country; to promote loyalty to its flag, instill reverence and respect for its traditions. More, to take an active part as good citisens in the life of America, and in addition, to marshal into active service for America the noblest attributes of Hellenic culture, believing that no nation has a monopoly on virtue, and that regardless of race or creed those who have joined the tanks of America have inherent cultural virture worthy of preservation and diffusion into the body politic-all to the end that the tace of man shall continue to live in an America of peace, happiness and contentment. Not the words of a "front" these, but the spontaneous declaration of the founders, and connote exactly what they denote. Here mind and heart meet to reveal the wholesome faith of a simple people in the future of America, for indeed the founders of the Ahepa are plain ordinary citizens, strangers to the latent implications of "fronts," frank in their intentions, having nothing to conceal and therelore in no need of "frontal" adumbrations.

Starting in Atlanta, nurtured in the South, the Ahepa in course of time spread its influence throughout the land and in its path has left a wholesome atmosphere. Not alone Greeks but others as well compose its membership. Many influential Americans honor us with membership because they believe in the aims of Ahepa. The press generally approves its work and public opinion looks upon it as an unofficial Arm of the government.

In the 18 years of its existence the Ahepa has been the cynosure of bellenic activity in the United States; it has given in a tangible and practical way instruction in the essential likeness of Americanism and Hellenism, thereby adducing the conclusion that the American Hellene should feel en rapport with the spirit of America; that for him there is neither room nor excuse for acts inimical to America; that his being a treek means less to us if his conduct is subversive to American institutions and more if it reflects credit on his race.

In its auxiliary organizations the Ahepa has sought to find constructive activities for the women of Hellenic lineage, it has diverted from random environment the younger generation of Americans of Greek parentage and in various ways is endeavoring to make easier the transition and bridge the gap that generally exists between the first generation of Americans and their transplanted parents. In the course of this practical instruction we have sought to extirpate from the minds and hearts of our children any inceptive seeds of racial hatred and implant instead the spirit of brotherhood as more in consonance with the dignity of man. Moreover, the children of today as the citizens of tomorrow can not with hatred in their hearts live in happiness and contentment with each other, all to the detriment of America. In brief, the Ahepa attempts to build citizens who should be found on the asset side of the citizenship ledger. In this connection I cite Will Durant, who in his "The Life of Greece," reiterates and emphasizes what many others be fore him have said, that the first defeat of a nation comes from within. Racial hatred, class wars, doctrinal bigotry, unleavened citizenry, political infiltration and corruption breed discontent. When discontent assomes sizable proportions the temper of the people is turned from constructive to destructive effort. That is negative citizenship and we are against it. The American Hellene desires to be a positive citizen. We are here not to destroy but to build.

Having briefly explained its work I am ready to tell you what the Abepa is, by first telling you what it is not.

I repeat, the Ahepa is mot a "front" of any kind, Christian or pagan, remporal or secular, because it has nothing to conceal and its doors are utile open; it is not a parasitic growth sapping the strength of America, as it gives and does not take; it is not an alien intruder engrather, as it gives and does not take; it is not an alien intruder engrather of the hation, as it is founded on proved and approved principles and in harmony with the spirit of America. Neither is it the instrument of elements subsersive to America. It draws its sinews solely turn its members. It owes and pays one only and undivided allegiance to the 1 nited States. It does not depend for its existence upon the favor of any special interest. It neither owes nor pays homage to any financial magnate, political pontiff or professional agitator, foreign or domestic. Nor does it make obeisance to any of their ilk.

It is though, a fraternal order, in the basic sense of the word, deriving its authority from the State of Georgia; its charter on record in Fulton

County of that State clearly reveals its objects to be to teach its members pure and undefiled Americanism; to elicit virtues inherent in hellenic character and blend and harmonize them with indigenous American culture; to direct the activities of its members in such channels as would make them happy in their environment and American proud of their achievements; to implement their native talents with preparation conductive to a more receptive attitude toward and a better understanding of American aims, ideals, traditions, and aspirations; and to instill in the American of Hellenic extraction as it should in the American of every other brand including the native, an unshakable belief in the manifest destiny of America, so that we may all wish, with Henry Ward Beecher, that Old Glory, whose stars redeem the night from darkness and whose beams give color to the morning, may float forever over a united, a happy and a prosperous people.

It is plainly seen now that the Symposiarch is pressed for time, and must set a good example of brevity by putting aside all jokes and confining his remarks to bare, monosyllabic introductions.

remarks in the Record, I include the following address delivered by me before the Order of Abepa on March 4, 1940:

"Where liberty dwells, there is my country!" It was in these words that a Hellenic patriot of years gone by expressed the thoughts and the festings which have permeated the very life of our great people from ancient days to modern times. Today, as we glance about us, and as we take note of the positive contributions of the Hellenic immigrants to the various fields of American endeavor, we become even more impressed with the full truth of endeavor, we become even more impressed with the full truth of

that patriot's declaration.

The Hellenic devotion, our devotion, to the basic principles of

The Hellenic devotion, our devotion, to the basic principles of democracy reached the zenith of its crowning glory during the World War, when more than 60,000 Hellenic sons, your sens, marched off to battle and offered their "last full measure of devotion" upon the altar of American liberty and democracy.

In peace, as in war, you continue to carry on, yielding to none mountly of purpose or patriotic loyalty. For yourselves and your families you desire only those common endearments of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, guaranteed by the Constitution. This is not strange, for your people today are basically not null ke your forefathers of years gone by.

Thus, Lam reminded of the oration delivered by Pericles in honor of the Atheniana who fell in the Peloponnesian War, He there defined democracy as being that government in which each one has a place, and from which none are excluded, except idlers.

one has a place, and from which none are excluded, except idlers sho are useless to the state. Did he not thus trace for us a model to follow

Greek democracy has indeed happily permeated our American democracy. Our debt to Greece is immeasurable.

We often hear of the "Greek miracle," and particularly as pointed out by the famous French writer, Reman. It is that creation of heavy as exemplified in the great Greek masters of prose, poetry, philosophy, painting, and sculpture. What a profound effect this Greek miracle has had upon modern thought.

modern artistry-upon democracy-upon our very lives! It is only the departure from the "Greek blessing" that has caused world's travail and the trials and tribulations that now grip nations abroad

It is ever well to contemplate our sacred debt of gratitude to-ward Greece. We must love ancient and modern Greece, or rather, we cannot cease to love her without rejecting what is best in our-

we cannot cease to love her without rejecting what is best in ourselves. To turn away from Greece, to disown her, the human mind
must be utterly changed, so firmly are our lives interwoven with
the Hellenic laws of reason and its principles of art.

I do not overstate the case when I affirm that Greek civilization is superior to that of all the other races which people the
Balkan Peninsula. Educator of the European and Asiatic worlds
in ancient times. Hellas continued to be so up to the conclusion
of the Byzantine period. In the Middle Ages, when western
Europe was plunged into the abysmal depths of ignorance, despair, and darkness, Greece flourished with her culture and refusment. It was so again at the leganting of modern times by its ment. It was so again at the beginning of modern times by its participation in the Italian Renaissance.

Some may contend that this supremacy is more relative than absolute; even so, it is not the less significant. The ancient Greeks lacked, of course, the distinctively modern appliances which have so largely increased human efficiency. The mighty blocks of the Partheron were lifted into place by muscle rather than by steem power. The education of the Athenian citizen was accomplished without the printing press. Decidedly, in the matter of plant, our civilization is superior.

But is it not clear that this very fact increases the marvel of Greek achievement? If they could produce such temples and such personalities with their meager appliances, what ought we to produce with ours? If we measure civilization by its plant, ours is

duce with ours? If we measure civilization by its plant, ours is easily ahead. But if we measure by ratio of product to plant, ours bears no comparison. Decidedly, the Greek was a success at the task of living. It is this, How to Live, which we of today must

Nor can I proceed without pointing out some striking traits of the Greek character, which are also marked features of our own the Greek character, which are also marked features of our own nationality. Ready wit, audacity, resourcefulness, practicality—all these we have in common with the Greeks. We are versatile as they were; we moralize as they moralized; our Franklin is as their Theognis. But their delightful tolerance we today unfortunately do not possess in abundant quantity. I refer to that which was and I believe still is, a national Greek virtue, called "epiekeia," which has been translated into English by Mathew Arnold as sweet reasonableness", and it is this "sweet reasonableness", this readiness to put up with things, this large allowance for individual failings, this good humor in the crowded mart of life—which many due should try to enlitivate. should try to cultivate.

I should like to see more of this tolerance, more of this Hellenic sweet reasonableness" in the Senate and in the House, and, especially, when we consider legislation applicable to aliens. How intolerant are some of the authorsts of our own Members. They forger what Abraham Lincoln said in writing the Republican Party platform of 1864:

to proceed toward naturalization of the residence be in violation of the immigration law. In 1906, the law was made to require that an applicant be able to speak the English language, and that he sign his petition for naturalization in his own handsriting. Experience in the administration of the law demonstrated that aliens who had been deprived of educational apportunities in early life needed assistance to meet the educational standardirequisite to a proper understanding of the duties and responsibility of citizenship. Hence, public schools and local civic organizationshave provided Americanization classes for the instruction of adults, sifering instruction in English and Government. Many naturalization courts, such as the one in the District of Colombia, require applicants for naturalization to attend such schools or in lieu thereof, to pass a satisfactory test. I have long been consinced that attendance upon such schools would be beneficial to a fair portion of our nature extrems, many of whom have failed to acquire a knowledge of American Government equal to that possessed by our naturalized stitues.

Formerly, the naturalization of the head of a family conferred citizenship upon his wife and minor children who resided in the United States. In 1922, Congress recognized the desire of somes for independence from their



A True Love Created a Wine

In the year 1850 a frail young man landed at Patras, Greece, from England. This young man was Gustave Clauss. The English doctors at home advised him that if he wanted to live he should move to a warmer elimate, and suggested that the sunny land of Greece would be ideal for his health.

At Patras, in those days, there was an Eng-

lish firm under the name of Fels & Co. This firm was first established in one of the Ionian Islands, then under the English rule, a few decades before Lord Byron came to Greece to dight and die for her liberty. This was before Greece was liberated from Turkish rule. When Greece became free, Fels & Co. established an export and import office at Patras. To them, the frail Mr. Gustave Clauss came with letter-of introduction and found employment there upon his arrival.

The young man who nearly died in England, hegan to regenerate after a short stay in Greece, the healthy climate of which gave him new life. He took to light sports which helped him not only to regain his health, but to become a good pedestrian. Clauss loved nature. He spent his week-ends taking long walks to the hills that surrounded the heautiful City of Patras. He came to know every inch of them. These short expeditions helped him regain his health totally and give him a new occupation, that of collecting war relies, left scattered on the battlefields during the Greek war of Independence against the Turks. When the frost season came fand the fruits in this section of the country are delicious and plentiful), he fullowed a fruit diet. Twice a week he atending but grapes or currants. He was so enthusiastic over the beautiful country which had given him back his health that he decided to settle permanently there. He bought a deserted plateau at the spot where the factories of the Achaia Clauss stand today, built a small bungalow and lived there. He went to work at Patras, a distance of about five miles, riding there every day on horseback.

With the aid of his Greek farmer friends, who lived around his place, be started putting up a little wine for himself and sorted it in barrels. Later on he bottled part if this delicious wine and sent gilts of it to his relative and friends in England. These presents were the start of a great wine business and led to the establishment of the oldest wine firm in Greece. The Achaia Wine Co. of Patras.

The recipients of Clause presents in England were so delighted with the excellent quality of the wines, that they showed samples of them to some of the well established wine firms in London. This first transaction brought Clause enough memory with which, adding also his savings, he started his first wine reserve. The pressing of the grapes was done in the open. It was the year 1855. During the train, at the grape season, he put up a new and larger wine reserve so that he might let it age, and so have a reserve of dad wates in after years. Clause himself by this time was an expert in wine making. The peasants who worked in making sine for Clause inherited the technique through generation after generation from their ancestors of past rulture. down in defeat and that the hooked cross floats over central Europe, the Scandinavian countries, India, Africa and the Dominion of Canada! Then what! Is the United States going to rely upon the neighborly spirit of Germany, or upon her word to keep the peace and respect the integrity of America? The history of Germany, from the days of Frederick William of Prussia (1688) down to sunrise this morning, has been one of ruthless aggression; of keeping her neighbors in a dreadful sense of insecurity; of breaking her word, violating her treaties, and stopping at nothing she deemed expedient to satiate her lust for more and more power. It is not likely that she can be trusted or even tolerated, either as a neighbor or as a party to a mutual agreement.

The only alternative will be for the United States to remain always prepared and on her guard for any eventuality. But let us hasten to consider the certain fact that, if Germany shows signs or prospects of victory, then—and then only—Italy, Russia and Japan, with their puppet principalities and dependent allies, will march on the side of Germany in order that they may share in the division of the loot. So, when it comes to attacking the United States, the countries mentioned, never being accused or even suspected of having any love for us, will rush to be in on "the kill." And it is not unlikely that Mexico can be induced to join them. It is obvious, therefore, that we must be ready to meet the combined sea, land and air forces of the countries mentioned, if the Allies alone can't, and we won't help them defeat Germany where she is now.

Regardless of what will be the outcome of the European and Asiatic conflicts, and irrespective of our foreign policy, the Congress of the United States should make sufficient appropriations to build planes, submarines, cruisers and battleships; strengthen the coast defenses, enlarge the size of the standing army, and equip our land, sea and air forces with the best implements of war that American ingenuity can devise and money can buy. The country should offer special inducements for young men to join its fighting forces. If enough men are not available through volunteer enlistments then an equitable system of compulsory military training should be devised and put into force. It is better to require military training in time of peace than military service of untrained men in time of war.

The fact is that all of the money thus far poured into WPA's, CCC's, and other similar projects, should have been used on preparedness. The Philippines need forts, men and guns; Guam, Alaska, the Panama Canal, and the long coast lines of our mainland need extensive fortifications, airports, and trained men. The cost for these defensive measures may be enormous, and "buttermilk statesmen" and millionaire "paytriots" may scream "confiscation!" But the cost of providing America with invincible defenses, no matter how high, is ridiculously low when compared with the price of unpreparedness.

Let us, then, irrespective of individual pet policies or petty politics, unite our voice in demanding that the grand old American Engle be armed, and armed right! That our country be provided with strong, impregnable, inviolable and invincible defenses, so that every American citizen will glory in the knowledge that all the Armies of Europe, Asia and Africa combined, with all the wealth of the world (our own excepted) in their military chests, and with a Napoleon Bonaparte as a commander, could not by force take a drink out of the Potomac or pluck an orange from the groves on the sunny coast of California.

present law, both parents must become citisens in order for the child to become a citizen if his residence in the United States begins after his sixteenth birthday. If only one parent becomes a citizen, the child must begin to reside here before his sixteenth birthday, and citizenship is sested in him only after he has resided in the United States for five years. The residence necessary for a child to take citizenship through the naturalization of one or both parents is lawful residence established

after full compliance with the immigration law. Congress recently granted authority to the Department of Labor to issue certificates of citizenship to persons who acquired citizenship through the naturalization of a husband or parent. Formerly, such persons were dependent upon the paper issued to the naturalized citizen in order to prove their citizen-ship. The issuance of these so-called certificates of derivative citizenship has proved a


Possibly, applicants for naturalization have felt that the Covernment is unduly cautious in determining whether to grant naturalization. If so, I would remind you that our purpose is to secure compliance with the law. Naturalization without such compliance leads to complications and at times such situations can be outed only by undoing the whole procedure through the process of cancellation of the cer-tificate of citizenship by a court and thus placing the unfortunate individual concerned in a position where he can proceed anew toward naturalization. It is a matter of utmost importance to the individual concerned that when he receives a certificate of citizenship he recrives one which has been issued in conformity with law.

Admission to citizenship includes the taking of an oath . . . to support and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic.

The United States is a Nation of immigrants and descendants of immigrants, and we have long been impressed with the contri-bution which immigrants have made to our cultural and social life and to science. Unfortunately, there are those among us who do not fully appreciate the value of our heritage of American citizenship, but you who have lived in another land perhaps are in a better position by comparison to judge of the value of life in America. We take it from your program to encourage naturalization that you are convinced of the preference for American citi-

ISOLATION IS NOT INDEPENDENCE

(Continued from page 1)

and the actual declaration of war between dictatorships and democracies failed to impress upon us the awful fact that we, holding and cherishing everything that is hateful to the totalitarians, constitute the ultimate target of their destructive aims. Neither our own experiences in the first World War nor the experiences of so many hapless nations in this one seem to have taught us where our interests lie

UR PET PEEVE has been the balance due America from the war materials purchased here by our Allies and used while fighting be our side in the first World War. The subject of "Europe's war debite to America" has been a very popular issue. Every demagogue, from Bailiff to Senator, made it the No. 1 plank in his platform. "Why should France and England spend so much on armaments when they owe hillions to the taxpayers of America? Elect me, and I'll make them pay."

THE SWARM OF LONG-WINDED, short-sighted, thoughtless dema gogues made us believe that the sole security of our institutions and the safety of our liberties lay in the strict observance of the solemn warnings contained in George Washington's Farewell Address. The historical truth is that Washington's warnings though ideally beautiful. torical truth is that Washington's warnings though ideally beautiful, never had anything to do with keeping America out of European "enjanglements." Less than 20 years after the famous Farewell Addresses published, the United States was so much "entangled" in European affairs that this country was invaded and the Capitol in Washington was actually burned! Not to our aloofness from, but to our cooperation and understanding with the countries of Europe do we owe our independence and "splendid isolation." The diplomacy of Benjamin Franklin in Paris, the Louisiana Purchase, and the Monroe Doctrine, all dealing directly with European powers, have done more towards the creation of the conditions under which we have lived in comparative peace than anything else since the landing of the Pilgrims.

T IS NOT POSSIBLE for the United States to be "in the world, but not of the world." It has too much in common with other nations for at. America is so rich, upon it we have discovered so much wealth. developed so many limitless opportunities, set up so high a standard of living, established such a government and practice such policies as to arouse the admiration, envy and enmity of many peoples. With this peoples we are compelled to maintain diplomatic relations, commercial intercourse and pacts of peace. While we have much in common with some, we also have vital interests which are in conflict with and decided hindrances to, the ambitions of others. This state of affairs makes it necessary for us to favor some and oppose others—to stand with our friends against our enemies. We cannot be friendly and at peace with everybody because everybody is not of the same character and disposition. Therefore, since there are vital differences between the moral political and commercial standards of nations, there must necessarily be discretionary distinction and discrimination on our part. We must stand on one side or the other of an important issue and must, of course, choose between the nations involved in the issue. When we make our choice we must be able to defend it. Otherwise our position will not be respected and the prestige of our independence will fall.

N THE FRONTISPIECE of this issue, The Ameran envisages invasion casting ominous shadows over the United States. The American Eagle, alarmed by this strange sight bursting suddenly over his realing swiftly takes to the sky and flutters furiously in the path of the invaders. His bold and fearless stand against the flock of flying fortresses is characteristic of the courage, bravery and determination of the American people to defend this country against all odds and to preserve it free from foreign domination. The admirable recklessness with which the "Grand Old Eagle" goes forth to pit his wings of flesh and feather against the enemy's fire and steel is also characteristic of American herdless, heroic dash and abandon to patriotic impulses. These truly great qualities, coordinated with modern military training and equipment would make us invincible; the recognition of our invincibility would guarantee the respect for our declarations and the inviolability of our possessions.

PECENT ACTS OF CONGRESS, following the President's recommendations, are sources of rejoicing to those who firmly believe that the death struggles now going on in Europe and Asia, over the supremacy of the land, air and sea, constitute a challenge to American liberties, as direct as if New York was being bomharded and bombers were zooming over the Capitol in Washington. This, the greatest challenge we have ever confronted, we are the least prepared to meet. What we are pleased to sall Americanism is hated most vehemently by strongly armed and violent nations, and nothing but superior force can save instanties from their greed for power and last for domination. Congresshas shown that it now comprehends the gravity of the situation and has, at long last, taken the step of first importance—appropriated money for armaments. Had France and England spent more money or had we

loaned them more to spend on military preparations, they would probably have had the war won by now and we would have been sparred this expense and inconvenience. But they were not prepared as they should have been and we inherit the struggle.

T SHOULD BE SAID that neither the British, nor the French, nor the American civil and military by the American civil and military leaders are to blame for our state of onpreparedness. The awful truth is that the great masses of the deonpreparedness. The awful truth is that the great masses of the de-mocracies, in America most of all, were bitterly opposed to spending any money on war equipment or materials. They believed that another hig war was impossible, that nobody would be foolish enough to start one, and that the war-provoking flares we saw were just bluffs. "We want peace," was the response to every appeal for armaments. Nobody could have been elected to any office on a preparedness platform. So, it is re-freshing and heartening, indeed, to see Congress, the President and natreating and heartening, indeed, to see Congress, the President and national leaders indicate a yielding to the rising sentiment of the American public for adequate military preparation to defend this country against all odds and, what is of almost equal importance, for immediate aid to those of our former Allies who are again fighting the battles of freedom, democracy and civilization.

"DIVIDE AND DOMINATE" is a strategy older than history; yet, like the old "con" game, it still finds customers. Even now, there are to be found among us persons who oppose a program of preparedness, urge a policy of stiff and strict neutrality, press the argument paredness, urge a policy of stiff and strict neutrality, press the argument that we are not and have not been threatened, and insist that we should sit tight and wait until we are actually invaded before doing anythir g about our defenseless condition. Such people argue as if they never heard of what happened to Denmark, Norway, Holland and Beigium. Up to the moment they were ruthlessly invaded and brutally attracked, each of them had been "assured" and "reassured" that it was safe even from the very thought of invasion. In fact, the more emphatic and numerous "assurances" of security we have, the more alert should be our vigilance and the greater our efforts for stronger defenses.

() UR TASK IS FAR FROM BEING COMPLETE. Congress has soted the money, public sentiment is overwhelmingly in tavor of nulitary preparedness and giving immediate aid to the Allies, but neither money nor sentiment, of itself, can be called a preparation to fight and win battles. The money must be converted into battleships, airplanes, tanks, cannon, gans, munitions, food and medical supplies, uniforms and other military facilities and equipment. The sentiment must be translated into modern, well drilled and trained soldiers to pilot the planes, sail the ships, man the guns, and wear the uniforms with courage and daring, and with the spirit and will to fight. We may fool ourselves and each other as to whether or not we actually have the mer and noterials necessary to win, but of one thing we may be absolutely certain, we can not fool the enemy he knows what we now have, and will be kept posted all slong.

HE TIME HAS COME FOR AMERICA to adopt a system of compulsory military training. This suggestion was offered in the March April, 1940, issue of THE AREFAN and is hereby repeated. The idea is not popular. Upon the strong aversion to compulsory military training in democratic countries dictatorships base their accusations that you in democracies are soft, effeminate, selfish, greedy and cowardly. We are challenged to prove the falsity of this accusation. It is most unfair for a democratic government to keep its young men subject to compulsory military service without compulsory training. Compulsory military training should become a part and parcel of our educational system. A thorough knowledge of the handling and use of modern implements of war, military strategies and tactic cannot but be useful in every-day life, even if it is never used in actual warfare. Ancient democracies, like Switzerland, have practiced compulsory military training to a great advantage without injurious effects to anything or anybody

AY WE REALIZE that the hour of America's destiny has struck The brittle threads of civilization are snapping, the free demo-cratic in citations of the world are shaken to their very foundations, the greatest democracies of the old world are stricken, and we are called upon to gird outselves to the task of preserving what our forehears achieved, and of maintaining a throne for liberty until order is returned and sanity is reestablished in the world. We have come to the point where we must choose between confipotent defense and emicorous "protection." Domestic defense, at any cost, is cheaper than foreign "protection." On the perasion of the National Banquet, the Supreme Lodge held itmid-year meeting at the Headquarters in Washington. Every member was present, excepting the Special Supreme Governor for the Dominion of Canada, Constantine Halikas of Montreal. The first official session was held on Tuesday, March 5, 1940, at which

The first official session was held on Tuesday, March 5, 1940, at which the progress of the Fraternity was reviewed and much serious discussion had as to ways, means and methods of effecting better and closer coordinative action between the various units to the end that the state of the Order may be improved. Several plans were evolved through the discussion, some of which will be offered to the District and Chapter officers for enforcement.

ENTHUSIASTIC COOPERATION SORELY NEEDED

The Supreme Lodge unanimously agreed that no plan, scheme or device, no matter how good, can bring the results of which it is capable, without the enthusiastic cooperation of the officers and members of every unit within the jurisdiction of the Ahepa Domain. At the same time, the Supreme Lodge is equally positive in its belief that no plan, such device, no matter bow had, can fail to produce good results, when properly promoted by the officers and supported by the members.

ENTHUSIASM-KEYNOTE OF SUCCESS

It is doubtful if everyone knows or realizes what is this thing we call "enthusiasm", whence comes the word, and what does it mean? Well, to those who know, the reminder will be refreshing, and to those who do not, it might be interesting to learn that the word comes from entheosis ("the" as in thermos), meaning to be endowed with Gedl's powers or to be possessed of Divine inspiration.

This bit of information about the origin of the word should be sofficient to make us realize that "enthusiasm" should be the higgest and foremost factor in any prospect, especially in the humanitarian enterprises of the Ahepa. It is our source of energy; our "itch" to fall in line and do things for the Order. Our degree of enthusiasm is the thing which tells whether we are in a class or outclassed. It is a sure indicator of what our standing will be tomorrow. Enthusiasm is the external evidence of internal convictions. Enthusiasm in the membership for anything undertaken by the Order proves that the lackbone of the Ahepa is exactly

where it ought to be in the individual Abepan. Finally, the power generated by enthusiasm tightens our grip on the Ahepa cross of faith, so that, when the storms of criticism blow about us; when the mad waters of dissension surge about us; and when the poisoned arrows of accusation fall upon our heads, we are able to hold on to the high ideals of the Order and labor the harder for their realization. Order and labor the harder for their realization

ENTHUSIASM IS CONTAGIOUS

This power is catching. One who has it can transmit it to another—no matter how strongly that other has been vaccinated against it.

The Supreme Lodge proceeds upon the basis that all chapter officers are infested with enthusiasm, and they, in turn, will spread it among the members. It stands to reason that if a member is not keenly intersted in the affairs of his chapter, sufficiently to carry on with sim, vigor and vitality, he would not accept an office; and if he mistakenly did so, he would get out of the way and let some other member who can show speed, style and endurance, take the office.

SANATORIUM DRIVE ENDORSED

The drive to raise funds for the Ahepa Silver District Sanatorium was heartily endorsed by the Supreme Lodge and expressed the hope that every chapter will raise its quota for the Sanatorium this year, which is a minimum of \$10.00 per member.

OUESTION OF SANATORIUM DISCUSSED AND ANALYZED

The question of the Sanatorium has been the subject of so much discussion, speculation and guess-work, that an official statement, clarifying the matter for the entire membership is considered timely at this stage:

1. The Ahepa Silver District Sanatorium is a corporation separate and apart from the Order of Ahepa, organized under the laws of the State of New Mexico, for the purpose of owning, conducting and operating a

tuberculosis sanatorium, charitably and for no monetary profit.

2. This corporation has no stock and no stockholders. Its charter and by laws provide that its Board of Directors shall be 9 in number, that 4 of them shall be chosen annually by the Convention of District No. 17, where the Sanatorium is located, 4 of them by the National Convention of the Order and the 9th shall always be the Supreme President of the

Order.

3. The National Convention of the Ahepa reserves the exclusive right to amend the charter and by-laws of the corporation.

4. The property of the Sanatorium consists of one and one-halt blocks of land in the city of Albuquerque, New Mexico, on which there are three large buildings and some small cabins. Only two of the buildings are in use. The other is badly in need of repairs and requires about \$15,000.00 to renovate, furnish and put it in usable condition as a

There are on an average of 16 men and nomen patients in the

Sanatorium, most of them young—under thirty.

6. The Sanatorium staff or personnel consists of 1 medical director, 1 superintendent, 1 secretary and bookkeeper, 4 mosters, 1 chef, 1 assistant to the chef, 1 dishwasher, 1 waiter, 1 waitress, 2 chamber-maids and 2 janitors. The combined payroll for all amounts to approximately

\$1,100,00 per month.

7. It also requires about \$2,000,00 per month for food, fuel, light, ater, laundry, medicines, and other ossentials to the proper functioning

the Sanatorium.

 Since it was officially opened on March 25, 1937, about 200 patients have received treatment there. The treatment and all necessities of life are free to the patients.

9. The Sanatorium, requiring approximately \$3,000.00 per month, has been kept up and maintained by individual contributions made directly for it through the Supreme Lodge, by affairs—such as dances, picuics, shows, etc.,—given by different chapters for its benefit, and by some small

The amounts thus contributed from time to time have been just nough to meet the current expenses of operation. But nothing has been

left to pay on the mortgage which is considerable.

11. The Supreme Lodge is well aware that there is some sentiment throughout the Order to the effect that a Sanatorium, while good, is not among the first needs of the Order; that some are of the opinion that a school an orphanage or a home for the agend would constitute better objectives for the Order, and that the Sanatorium should be dropped in the order of a project or institution as one of these mortioned. Still other favor of a project or institution as one of those mentioned. Still others have expressed the opinion that the upkeep and maintenance of a sana-turium is beyond the financial ability of the Hellenic people in America, and that the amount of money spent is too much for the amount of good accomplished thereby good accomplished thereby.

12. The Supreme Ledge is not justified in assuming the role of a judge, to decide which of the institutions mentioned is mustly needed by or would best serve the interests of Hellenism. All are good, all are needed, and all of them are within the Abepa program of contemplated accomplishments. Our belief is that Hellenism in America can support of them in fine shape, without taxing itself for more than one dollar

(\$1.00) per year per person.

13. The whole of Hellenism in America, Aliejan and non-Ahejian alike, is well aware that this Order has purchased the ground to Florida, and has alreads began the accommission of minery is a special tond for the establishment of an orphianage and a home for those who have re-

tired from business activities. These institutions will be built and put into service as soon as money enough has been collected for this pur Anyone desiring to contribute to this fund is more than welco

in fact urged, to do so.

14. The Sanatorium is a responsibility sponsored and assumed by the Abepa. The Supreme Lodge is bound by the mandate of the Convention to find ways and means of keeping the Sanatorium open. Those who have the milk of human kindness in their breast cannot be indifferent to one series utilities and succor another. A kind heart cannot he partial to a perbrand of misery. No man can be trusted who says, "I will let the consumptive die without help, but will build a home for the old," when he can do both.

Neither can we be thought consistent when we say that the Sana torium is beyond our financial means, but we will build an orphanag-

If we can't support the one, we can't support the other.

16. The man who won't give a dollar to save the life of the father or mother of a little girl or boy, cannot be expected to give a damn for little girls and boys after their parents are dead. Neither can this same man convince anybody into believing that he would help build a home and making comfortable for the aged in their declining years, when he would give nothing to comfort them in their sickness and save their lives while they are young. they are young.

The wisest, manliest, noblest thing to do is for everyone of us to do his bit in this campaign. Let's pay the mortgage; let's fix up the place; and let's stop looking for filmsy reasons or excuses to avoid our responsibility. That's not Ahepa-like. Let's each of us, raise his \$10.00 and send it to headquarters, and feel proud in our share of the succession.

THE AHEPA EMERGENCY FUND AND THE MEMBERS

Despite the efforts made by Headquarters to explain the operation of the Ahepa Emergency Fund, there still seems to be a worful lot of misunderstanding about it and in many instances by those who should

IT'S NOT AN INSURANCE

First of all, let every one get it clearly settled in his mood that this not an insurance. Neither the constitution nor the application for membership mention "insurance." It is a "fund," a savings account, laid aside by Headquarters to meet the emergency which inevitably rise-upon the death of a member, and to render financial aid to the family

That the fund may be equitably and impartially administered, and that the same may not be abused, the convention creating the fund also placed upon it certain restrictions which the Headquarters must observe

These restrictions are

Any person who became a member of the Order since September L 1937, and was more than 60 years of age at the time of his initiation, is not entitled to share in the Emergency Fund.

2. Any delinquent or suspended member who became reinstated since

2. Any delinquent or suspended member who became reputated since September 1. 1940, and was more than 60 years of age at the time of his reinstatement is not entitled to share in the Emergency Fund.

3. Any member who dies before a full year shall have lapsed between the time of his initiation or reinstatement and the event of his death, is not entitled to share in the Ahepa Emergency Fund.

4. No member's beneficiary is entitled to share in the Ahepa Emergency Fund, if the member was, at the time of his death, more than 6

months behind with his payment of dues.

5. The extent to which any deceased members beneficiary may receive and from the Emergency Fund is \$200,00.

PUTTING THE RULES POSITIVELY

6. Any member's beneficiary will reveive \$200.00 from the Alequa Emergency Fund provided that the member, at the time of his death, had been initiated or reinstated for not less than a year; that if he was initiated or reinstated since September 1, 1937, he was not more than hit years of age at the time of his initiation or reinstatement; and was not more than six months behind with the payment of his does.

SKILL, SPEED AND TEAMWORK are the topmost qualities which gave the edge to the hardy lads of the Ahepa All-Star team over their worthy opponents and helped them walk away with the coveted championship crown of the Tenth Annual National Hellenic Invitational Basketball Tournament.

The hard-frought contest was staged on the spacious floor of the Lovola University gym at Chicago, with a vast throng of cheering, jeering and stampeding baskethall fans looking on. The hattle was fast and furious and all participants length saliantly. Nobody gave

nor asked for quarter. No punches were pulled nor basket-shots wasted.

Many crack teams from far and near journeyed to the midwestern metropolis to enter the lists and battle for the title. Such famous quintets as St. Mary's of Akron, Ohio; Epsilon P of Denver, Colorado, Club Sar of Cary, Indiana; the "Pride of New England," St. Mary's of Lynn, Mass.; the Garfield Park, the Olympians, and the Hallhouse Centaurs of Chicago, all famous for their athletic prowess, and renowned in hasketball lore—were among the challengers.

They entered the arena and played to win. They thrilled the spectators with frequent exhibitions of reckless courage and resolute determination, but they lacked the benefits of drilled discipline, the technique of coordinative cooperation and, above all, the enheartening spirit and ennobling inspiration that comes only from the knowledge that you represent a great Order; that invisible eyes by the tens of thousands are centered on you, that thousands

sands of hearts are hoping, praying, cheering for you to win; that in every nook and corner of the country there are Brothers waiting to hear that you have won! These elements, lacking in all other teams, were uppermost in the mind and heart of every player on the Ahepa All-Stars.

A goodly share of the credit goes, without stint, or fear of contradiction, to the National Director of Athletics and Supreme Vice-President, Van A. Nomikos of Chicago, who took the Ahepa All-Stars team under his wing. showed a personal interest in each individual member of the squad, saw to it that they were kept in trim, and properly piloted in the ways of victory. Under the personal observation of the National Director of Ahepa Athletic Department, this team ran as smoothly, and quote as effectively, as a motorized unit of the United States Army. That's how they looked from the side lines, and that is undoubtedly how they must have impressed the fighting fives of St. Mary's of Lynn, Mass.; the Hallhouse Centaurs, the Olympians (both of Chicago) and Club Sar of Gary, Ind., all of whom they met and eliminated in the order named. The final game of the tournament the Ahepa All-Stars won from Club Sar by a score of 31 to

The sporting style, unerring precision, and endless endurance of the winners surprised and enraptured even the veteran devotess of the game. They had seen many come and go, but nothing that could equal these tripping-skipping, hurling, hopping and shooting dervishes of the Ahepa:

Sam Sotos, Captain, ex-Hyde Park High School, Chicago, and University of Illinois Star, all-state center, while at High School. Sam was originally a member of the Ypsilanti Sons of Pericles Basketball team and has distinguished himself in every field of sport as a member of that Chapter, and now as a member of Woodlawn Ahepa Chapter, and is the iddest of five Sotos brothers, the other four of whom are following Sam's tootsteps and threaten to overshadow their illustrious brothers in all athletic activities.

Gus Elliott, probably the most sereatile man on the squad, is also a product of the Chicago Public High Schools, and later distinguished himself in haskethall, baseball, and football at the University of Illinois. Gus played every minute of the semi-final and final games, and son a place on the All-Tournament team. He also is ex-Son of Pericles and is now a member of the North Shore Chapter No. 94 of the Order of Ahepa. In the semi-final game against the Olympians, Gos scored fourteen of the thirty seven points.

George Kartsunes may well be called the strong man of the All-Star five. "I believe in ability," he said. "Develop to the utmost the ability you have. Whatever you do you must be sincere. One can learn to benefit by others' mistakes if he observes other people. Aim for the highest goal. Your body is the best thing you have. Don't abuse it by staying out late at night and by drinking.

"Everyone has a purpose in life," he declared. "Think of the life occupation you would like better. In this, the world's great country, there are opportunities for everyone."

Clentzos, of Los Angeles, Califassistant national director, who is in charge of athletics in the Western Zone, has formulated preliminary plans for the Ahepa's blue-ribbon event and will work together with the Seattle convention committee in arranging the event.

Assisting in the Olympiad preparations will be Nicholas Conteas, of Wankegan, Ill., George T. Gavaris, of New York City, and Deno Saclarides, Tarpon Springs, Fla., all zone directors, and George J. Bacalles, of Corning, N. Y., Ahepa sports editor, who will be chief scorer.

"We have Hellenic athletes," said Mr. Nomikos, "that are creditable performers. Some attempt should be made to bring these performers together so that our people may see them in action. Members and officers should cooperate and make plans to send their stellar athletes to the National Olympiad."

District Governors of the Sons of Periclescan contribute to the success of the national Olympiad by making plans for a District Olympiad and sending the winners to the national event, it was pointed out by Mr. Clentzos, who said in part:

"Olympiads mean fun-competition and add glory to our athletes. What other event is there on the athletic program that can bring out individuals" performances other than track and field?"

Copies of the Olympiad syllabus have been sent to District Governors and may be obtained from Mr. Nomikos, whose address is 6228 South Halsted Street, Chicago, III.

There will be no entry fee for athletes in the national event. Any age limit is permitted and competition will be limited to varsity division only. Each athlete is permitted to enter three events, two track and one field, in addition to the relay. Only competitors of Hellenic extraction are invited.

The events, the current Olympiad records, and other details will be outlined in next month's AREPAN.



HE GREAT TRUTH of the foregoing declaration, uttered by Abraham Lincoln more than four score years ago, is more applicable to the hidden and treacherous undercurrents through which our ship of state is now labering than to the open storms through which he sailed it in his day. OUNTERFEIT PATRIOTS are as common as counterfeit dollars and quite as difficult to detect. Not all "conscientious objectors" are prompted by the compunctions of a conscience. Not all pacifists are faithful followers of the "Prince of Peace." Not all who argue against spending for defense think in terms of money. Not all who cry think in terms of money. Not all who cry out the fouriest against universal military out the loudest against universal military training are concerned about the effect such a training will have on the youth of the land. There are so many brands and varieties of "Americanism" flying about us that it behooves every person, really interested in the preservation of the American way of life, to analyze carefully—"shake well," so to speak—each proffered potion "before using"—especially when intended to be taken internally.

NNOCENT, WELL-MEANING people may ignorantly spread dangerous doctrines and propagate derrimental ideas just as innocent, well-meaning people may ignorantly spread and propagate germs of disease. Such people are more to be pittied than blamed, more are more to be pithed than blamed, more to be taught than punished. Great care should be exercised to distinguish and discriminate between the wilful inculcator of pernicious political philosophies and the innocent victim of wrong thinking. Both may be equally dangerous, but they are not to be treated the same.



advantage over an opponent. But, when it comes to questions, plans and policies involving the safety, military strength and integrity of America, there is no room for differences or political chicanery. It is far better to be prepared for war and military service—and never use the skill and equipment—than be compelled to fight a war without a properly trained and equipped soldiery.

"Do UNTO OTHERS AS THEY WOULD DO UNTO YOU—BUT DO IT FIRST!" That's the order of the grand and awful age in which we live. It may not meet with the unanimous approval of our citizenry, but it is the best, safest, most economical and most humane policy we can adopt and porsue. War, with all of its horrible consequences, should be carried to the home of the aggressors and would be aggressors as quickly and as fercely as possible. Striking at the source of misery is the best way to stop it. Had the United States interfered with the invasion of Manchuria. China would never have been invaded and we would not have to put up with so much impudence from that quarter today. Had England and France interfered with and prevented the invasion of Ethiopia. Austria and the Sudeten region, there would be no war today in Europe, France would be whole and England at peace. It positively does not pay to let the other fellow get the "drop" on you. Neither does it prove to be of any advantage to wait until you are attacked and fight the war on your own soil. Even defensive wars can be fought on the hone ground of the offender-so that his people may know what it is like to have their homes and families can be fought on the home ground of the offender—so that his people may know what it is like to have their homes and families blown to bits. SUCH POLITICALLY EXPEDIENT POLICIES as expressed in the advertisement "to send no American troops to Europe" are wholly responsible for the utter disrespect in which our form of government, our doctrines, our ideas, ideals and traditionare held by totalitarian up-starts. Big dollar marks and numbers do not impress totalitarians. They are affected by actualities only—actual guns, actual planes, actual pilots, and above all, actual will and determination to fight. Our lack of courage to stand by the dictates of our patriotic convictions, when they are unpopular and likely to turn the electorate against us, is the chief handicap of democracies. It is hard to believe, after all that has been said and written on the subject, racies. It is hard to believe, after all that has been said and written on the subject that the leaders of both political parties have failed to grasp the gravity of the situation, and cannot see the advantage of fighting a potential insuder on his home ground, and while the help of others is still available, rather than wait for him to strike the first blow within our gates. If they do see the folly of their policies, but promulgate them for political expediency, then democracies do, indeed, have dangerous shortcomings. Such a handicap cannot but contain seeds of destruction; therefore the safety of the country tion; therefore the safety of the country demands that it be quickly obliterated from our system of government.

THE ANTIDOTE for milk and water statemanship is red-blooded, vigorous martial spirit. We need to foster and develop in this country the good old American will to fight—even the old love and joy of fighting. Let us prove to ourselves and to the world that Americans have not "grown soft," that America is not asleep, but wide awake and has a first that can knock down a whole universe of totalitarian imperialists who threaten to rule or ruin the whole world. Then, and only then, will America come into her pristine greatness and have the exterm, respect and greatness and have the esterm, respect and consideration she deserves. Let us abandon our enervating, self-indulgent, pleasure secking wave of living. Let us cease inculcating upon our young men and somen a revulsion against war. Let us not, by any means, mistake appropriations for preparedness or war implements for warriors. We may spend hil-lions upon billions for the largest possible number of the finest planes, tanks, hattleships. armor and armaments in the world; set they would be worthless, even dangerous possessions, unless we have men with the courage and daring to use them.

What Attitude Should Be Taken by American Citizens of Hellenic Descent Towards Greece, Its People and Government?

Today, in the midst of the shifting currents of public opinion, and governmental restrictions, the American Citizen of Hellenic Descent faces a problem in relation to his attitude and sympathies towards Greece, his mother country. This problem is one that needs careful delineation and discussion as well of both mental attitude and actual participation as regards the political, social, and economic activities of Greece.

We are calling for opinions from you as readers—not only from members of the Sons of Pericles, but from those of all ages and both sexes—on this problem. Those letters deemed most appropriate will be published. Names will be published as well, unless otherwise designated. We do not want mere opinions, but opinions based on facts and experiences. Let's hear from you. . . .

Among the problems are these:

- 1. Is one "better off" if he relinquishes all thoughts and ties with the land of his birth, Greece—or should he maintain an active interest in her affairs and government?
- 2. Does the fact that one's parents, and grandparents reside in Greece presuppose an interest and wish to aid not only those relatives but the government of that country as well?
- 3. In event that the Greek government is involved in war with another nation, is an American citizen of Hellenic descent justified in enlisting in the armed forces of Greece?
- 4. Would the Greek-American be justified in contributing towards, and sending money to the Greek government to be used in the purchase of ammunition and implements of war in event that such a call was made from that government?
- 5. The government of Greece does not relinquish a citizen from her lists, despite the fact that he may have left Greece over thirty years ago, and resided since that time in the United States, and have become a citizen of the United States. Is the government of Greece justified in taking this view, and in regarding all emigrants from her shores to America as still citizens of Greece?

There are many other angles and views of the subject as well—but we will sidestep them for the present, and ask for your unbiased, honest opinion on the above questions. Their importance is growing daily—and we want to hear the answers of those born in Greece, and of those born in the United States—in both instances, of American citizenship. Also, we would be glad to hear from those who are not American citizens (who must be in the minority), but whose opinions will be of value and of interest.

Saddle for Mountebanks

By James Harlie Kalemis (Foot note on a decadent decade)

You agree then, said I, that this shall be the second model by which we are to speak and to compose concerning the gods: that they are neither mountebanks to change themselves, nor to mislead us by lies either in word or deed?—The Republic of Plato, Spens Transl. II. 67.

The extraordinary days of September 1929 have sprouted into full fledged years of despair and disillusionment; and the ten days of crisis have grown into ten crucial years, epochal and pivotal in the final determination of the future direction of American destiny. Each of these years has witnessed the birth or resurgence of political ideology foreign to the democratic heritage of our Republic and at swords with rights of men, institutions to which patriots, aristocrats, and commoners alike gave life by sacrificing theirs since the dawn of classic Greece.

Instincts, old as man himself, have led our peoples blinded by panic and bent on saving themselves at any cost into a bewildering maze of political tents with tints ranging like Joseph's coat from Stalin's red shirt to Mussolini's black. A drowning man will clutch at the proverbial straw, and ask questions later. In the same manner, a chaste and staid husband discovering seeming betrayals from his wife will allow himself to be plucked by the first floorie on the corner. He'll get even! So he thinks. The identical psychological atmosphere prevails today, and makes it soft pickings for unprincipled political demagogues in the profitable business of seducing the uncritical. According to a congressional committee investigator, there are at least a million American adults in subversive movements pledged to getting even.

Mere ambitious administrations on a sick body, if misapplied, do not indicate a favorable recovery for the patient. Despite a multitude of plans and schemes, myopic vision, a profusion of left-handed threads on right-handed screws, have failed to put the American machine in working order. In the realms beyond economic and political planes we may be able to afford satisfaction based on beauty of execution and delivery, and attach secondary importance to pragmatic considerations; but not so in everyday life. The commerce in essentials of life through necessity has never been poetic, thus critical realism forces judgment of the means by the end. In view of such circumstances, our decade sans sporadic exceptions, on the whole is decadent.

Why and how decadent? Asks the indignant.

Whenever a social system experiences frequent ailments with increasing inability to rally, then it may be said to be suffering from internal decadence. Diagnosis will reveal the toxins responsible as civil poisons, recognized since antiquity as softness of the ethic fibre, individual laxity in civic duties such as voting, etc., greed, waste, degenerate appetites created by a rotting moral fabric. . All of these resolve themselves into anti-Somebody-or-Other attitudes of moral breakdown and uncritical acquiescence to civil criminal negligence, or the twilight shielding the mountebank as he cinches the saidle on the people's back.

The Hellenic idea is the ideal of the philhellenic American forefathers, who drafted for us a constitution intended to guard against this kind of negligence and providing expressly for critical participation of the whole civil body in regulating its affairs. Failure to exercise this obligation spells decadence, and creates a factional honeycomb, which is paradise for honey-tongued rogues. It is these latter who set themselves up as gods come to save man and begin by perverting his mind and end by devouring it; these are Plato's gods in contradistinction.

There is no citizenship in the robot regime. Criticism is outlawed, and the functions which give meaning to political participation are forbidden. Where men rebelled against state ineptness, they find after the putsch, that they have encircled their own necks in submission to a will of steel. If they deviate in the slightest from the road off comes the head that couldn't endure the past iniquities, and which brought its present doom down upon itself. The silvery strands of poetic diatribe, the thundering bolts of contempt at free exercise of will, of individual direction and execution of destiny, destroy pride of citizenship. The entrails are torn from freedom, and once where stood a man, there stands a burnt out husk with a mechanical set of echo chords for a

Upon a subject which bears so much personal sympathy, it is easy for a specialized class of jingoists to enlist considerable sentiment under questionable banners, and certainly upon misleading predicates. This mischief is the principal occupation of omniscient "liberals," opportunistic professionals, found beating the drum only when it is popular and profitable to do, but absent from the ranks when the political clouds indicate greener pastures in other camps. These then are the "thinkers" who would have us believe that the world is at the mercy of a 'mad man." However, as a matter of fact, civilization is at the mercy of her baser appetites from unlicensed greed, from traitorous sellouts from its own mass products. The dictator is but a salesman. The He could not instant his followers stop patronizing him, he is done. stay if the people had not sold democracy short and delivered themselves into his hands. Sufficient numbers still support him in sincerity, so that we cannot rehash the world-war bait. It is not a mad man, but shrewd, daring, super-salesman who feeds lies to frustrated appetites. The danger is that there is a national urge of a people who seek fulfilment of their wishes under the whip of one Leader, a demigod. If the Leader is mad, then the people are mad. To further investigate this thought would perforce lead to an exhaustive documentation of the dictatorial state. This is neither the time nor the place, suffice it to ay, that this then is the lesson we learn when peoples stray from the Hellenic ideal of government and deliver themselves to demagogues. This is not and never has been the Hellenic idea. The Hellenes were the first people who thought of ways in which the people, or citizens, could govern themselves instead of being dictated to by a ruler. And certainly, it is true, that the early Hellenic states governed themselves better than any states since.

It is the reactionary who bids us turn back, turn back. He would reverse the hands of the clock so they would turn backward; he is anti-progress. But one is not a reactionary if he says, "Go ahead America, but study the past. Review once again the sources upon which you have based your American way. Absorb the lessons of the first and greatest Democracy. Pledge anew your faith in man. Renew, refresh your love in the common man. Lastly, fan brighter still the torch of freedom he holds in his hand, and vow that only death will suffer it to be snuffed out!"

We of Hellenic descent are proud of democracy. It is our greatest contribution to western civilization, and in spite of the pessimisms of Spengler, to us it can never be an empty word. We alone fought the od fight for thousands of years, and its finest luster bears the polish of Hellenic blood spilt thru the ages for its honor. The Soulites fought for no year or two, but for centuries, and against inconceivable odds as viewed from the modern luxurious point of view. The Soulites chose beds of rocks and rags to riches, their roofs were the barren mountain crags, and their neighbors were the beasts of the wilds; they endured inhuman, impossible, incredible atrocities so that we today might enjoy the warmth of the democratic fire; if it were not for their kind, to nourish the tiny spark thru the dark ages against Asiatic hordes, would we be the same people, would our blessings be the same? . . . in their "mad men" came and went, and today they are forgotten, but the soulites are immortal. It is this I would point out to pessimistic profiteering prophets.

If we are to escape the valedictory hideousness paraded as modern Utopias or as futuristic Hells in Europe, we will heed well Plato's words and shun deceitful valentine vagaries from the butcher-boys.

FODAY IN THE U. S. A.

Nations like individuals stand for an ideal or an idea. Mean ideas create hateful men. Selfish ambitions inspire men with selfish aims and objectives in life.

It requires a long time for a new thought stream to purify the currents of the ages. If for generations men have maintained a polluted stream of thought or a poisoned stream of blood, then the lusts of low ideals and corrupt heritage may at any time appear in the activities of life or the expressions of the mind. Such men cherish halreds, and hatreds find expression in wicked plans and loathsome deeds.

Nations incarnate the ideals of forceful or clever men. It is just as easy to corrupt as it is to purify the thought and life of a nation. Corrupt leaders create corrupt societies and then the festering sores of national life become offensive to neighbors. In a small degree, society, climate, institutions mould the lives and characters of men, but in a much greater degree strong minds and men create and mould both national character and policy, and enlist the support of their less able citizens. less able citizens.

The four or five most powerful nations of the present time amply justify and sustain this philosophy. Whether we live in a Democracy or a Republic, whether under an Autocracy or a Dictator, we are no longer "free men." We may exercise free speech and under that longer "tree men. We may exercise tree speech and under that very guarantee, give daily utterance and support to policies which if adopted would completely destroy the freedom we think we have. We rejoice in a free press even if the press frequently abuse the guarantee. But all these constitutional rights and guarantees are limited. In some countries we have one master mind, one set of ideas, one group of aims and objectives and one allegiance.



FLOATING CONCRETE BRIDGE

Newest link in Seattle's highway system is this amazing floating bridge lead-ing from Seattle across Lake Washington, span-ning the lake and Mercer Island to connect with Eastern highways.

T HE STATE OF WASHINGTON, with its I mighty snow-clad mountains standing like grim, white-hooded sentinels on guard at the northwestern outpost of continental United States, is in itself and of its own right an "Empire" of distinctive beauty and wealth incalculable. It is rich in agriculture, minerals. timber, game, fur, fish, history and romance

W ALLA WALLA and the rolling hills of the fertile Palouse wheat-producing sections stretch southward from the plateau which holds nestled in its bosom the beautiful City of Spokane. Through this country flows Snake River, down which the memorable Lewis and Clark expedition made its perilous journey to the Western coast. Here are innumerable vacational and recreational possibilities amid the lakes, streams, pine, fir, cedar and tamarac.

N CENTRAL WASHINGTON, along the lava banks of rivers and at the feet of hills that bespeak a tempestuous past, grow the world's best apples. In this section, extending for 60 miles deep into the Cascades, is Lake Chelan, winding through a canyon of unsurpassed beauty. Petrified trees of tropical species in Gingko State Park tell the story of another climatic era in this country, before lava flows and glaciers buried its verdure. The Gingko tree, heretofore known as native only to the imperial gardens of China, has been exposed along with some 200 other petrified specimens in this park.

HE COLUMBIA RIVER with its far-flung tributaries of Canada and Idaho sets out on its 1,200-mile journey to the sea from the Northern part of Washington. This vast and mighty stream threads and winds its way between lofty mountains, over swift rapids, across spacious plateaus through the scenic splendor of the Columbia Gorge, turning wheels of industry, bearing the burden of commerce on its breast and quenching the thirst of fertile soil as it rolls on, until finally it cuts its way through the rugged Cascade Range and pours itself into the Pacific.

TWENTY-FOUR GOLF COURSES—such as this, overlooking lakes and Sound with snow-capped mountains beyond, await conventioners who are invited to get in on the golf tournament.



D LIGET SOUND provides the picturesque and extensive harbors of both Scattle and Tacoma. It consists of a nearly 2,000-mile winding, forest-bordered waterway, generously dotted with farms, villages, hamlets and waterfront cities. Southernmost point of the inside passage to the North Pacific, Puget Sound is the gateway of the United States to Alaska and the Orient. Whidby Island, in Puget Sound, second largest insular area in continental United States, is connected with the mainland by the picturesque Deception Pass Bridges. There are over 500 other islands and reefs in the Sound comprising the San Juan group. One can hardly imagine a more delightful trip than where days may be spent wandering from one island to another in the peace and quiet, and the cool comfort, of the ever-moderate temperature of Puget Sound.

HE OLYMPIC PENINSULA lies between Puget Sound and the Pacific Ocean, where the snow-capped summits of the Olympic Mountain range look across the Straight of Joan de Fuca (whence the Ahepa Chapter in Seattle derives its name) to Vancouver Island in the Province of British Columbia. Six hundred forty-two thousand acres of the Olympic Peninsula, constituting the "last of the West." has been established by Congress into Mount Olympus National Park. A scenic state highway, running along Hood Canal, a narrow arm of Puget Sound, completely encircles the Olympic Peninsula. On this section, along the shores and inland, fish and game exist in great quantities.

OUNT RAINIER, perpetually cloaked in a mantle of snow, rises majestically above the Cascade Mountain Range to a beight of 14,408 feet above sea level. Around its slopes spreads Mount Rainier National Park consisting of 241,782 acres preserved in its original state and is set aside as a year-around public playground. This Park may be entered at Longmire Paradise Valley on the south, at Sunrise on the north, at Mowich on the northwest and at White Pass on the southeast following the Ohanapecosh River and over Caynae Pass to a connection with the National Park Highway east of Chinook Pass.

RAND COULEF and more particularly the Dry Falls of the Columbia River is one of the greatest natural wonders of the world. It cuts through the plateau of central Washington in ave-inspiring vistas of lavastrewn beauty. It is estimated that the Dry Falls were equal to forty Niagaras. This precipitous ledge now stands dry, a mute witness of the ancient battle of Nature's forces which went on for centuries between relentless glarial ices, recurring flows of molten lava and the torrential river.

reau of Reclamation, is the largest power dam in the world. It is 4,300 feet from axis to axis, and will impound the waters of the Columbia into an artificial lake of 141 miles in length. It will provide 2,520,000 horsepower at the cheapest rates in the country, and will reclaim 1,200,000 acres of fertile land.

IGHWAYS. The State of Washington offers the traveler an unexcelled highway transportation system consisting of 4,000 miles of primary state highways and 2,242 miles of secondary state highways, supplemented by 30,000 miles of county roads. Beside ocean, lake and stream, through virgin forests and under lofty peaks, along river canyon and across arid plains, these modern state highways make motoring safe and pleasant. Note worthy among present highway improvements are two large bridges now under construction: The Tacoma Narrows suspension bridge spanning the mile-wide turbulent tidal waters of The Narrows of Puget Sound connecting the City of Tacoma with the Kitsap Peninsula; and the Lake Washington bridge and approaches extending for 6.6 miles from the City of Seattle to Mercer Island and the easterly shore of Lake Washington as a part of the Sunset Highway, including in its construction 1.3 miles of modern four-lane super highway carried on immense concrete pontoons, the largest floating structure in the world.

He not only placed the Sanatorium on a higher plane, but he also explained the Ahepa and its mission, pointing out its uses and possibilities. We were mighty glad to have him in our midst and hope he will find it convenient to return.

PORTUM

ANASTASIA APOSTOLOS By the Very Reverend A. C. Larned, Rector of St. Matthew's, Jamestown, R. J.

Fitehburg, Mass.—Ten years ago when I was connected with the Episcopal City Mission of Boston I met Miss Anastasia Apostolos, of Gardner, Massachusetts, in a Boston sanatorium for tuberculosis. Her cheerfulness, bravery, and Hellenic spirit impressed me greatly. For ten years I visited her in the various sanatoriums she went, administering to her as an Episcopal Priest, until she passed away in the Worcester County Sanatorium.

An Appreciation of the Late

It is a great privilege to look after the spiritual welfare of a young person condemned to die by a terrible disease, especially when that person knows there is no hope of a cure, and takes the realization in a cheerful and philosophic spirit, typical of a Hellenic Orthodox Christian. At her funeral service in the Orthodox Church in Fitchburg, the pastor, Reverend John Michaelides, most courteosuly allowed me to speak of the bravery, the long suffering, and the sweetness of character of his young parishioner.

Ever since I was a boy at Groton School in Massachusetts, I have been interested in the history and language of Hellas, the little country that so completely defeated the gigantic hordes of its barbarian invaders from Asia, and saved our European ancestors from becoming the slaves of Asiatic despots. Nobody can exaggerate the debt we owe to the ancient democratic spirit of those who fought at Marathon. Thermopolae, Salamis and Platea.

The Hellenic mind teaches the great lesson of how to think. "Know thyself," said the ancient philosopher, and that is what is so terribly needed in our American education today. The point is that we are in danger of losing the truth that education does not exist to cram a lot of facts in our head, but to use well the brain God has given us. Democracy is a result of Hellenic thought. Another great gift we inherit from ancient Hellas is reverence for the past. We are obsessed with the idea that only what is new is important, and forget that what we are is simply a result of what we were. I do not mean that inventions are not useful, of course they are; but after all they are but the result of man's experiments and thought in the past. When it comes to philosophy, art, architecture, the ancient Hellenes surpass us. When it comes to the art of government, who would not prefer the democracy of Athens to the dictatorship of any country? Who would not even prefer the martial law of Sparta to the base inhumanity of com-

If ever I fulfill the desire of my life to visit Helias, I shall return to my home thrilled, not simply because I shall have seen Athens, Sparta, Corinth and Argos, or because I shall have watched the moon rise over the Acropolis or the snow glisten on Mt. Taygetos, but largely because I shall have been in the land where the language of the New Testament is speken, and because I shall have visited the land where a person of so heautiful a character and of so heav a soul as the late lamented Amastasia Apostolos was born.

Mr. Hartley appealed to the Hellenic congregation to become a part of their city, pointing out that the city needs what they have to offer toward peaceful and well-organized living.

V. I. Chebithes, supreme president of the Ahepa, spoke, telling the Hellenes to maintain their identity and not to lose their heritage. He told them they had much to contribute to the way of living in America and urged them to become a part of the civic scene.

Delivering part of his address in Hellenic and part in English, Mr. Chebithes told the congregation to become Americans but not to forget their Hellenic ancestry and the fine things for which it stands. Judge Lee N. Murlin of the common pleas court spoke briefly on the place of the American citizen of Hellenic stock in the community's life and urged them to give expression to their impulses, and to become a more active part of the life of their adopted city.

"Today the Greeks of Toledo are celebrating the independence of their nation. To them it was the turning point in Greek history, when a cultured and resourceful people was freed from the domination of cruel and ravishing oppressors.

The story of Greece follows a typical pattern in the development of any people or nation. There was the struggle for homes, sutenence and security, then came rivalry within the nation. Athens and Sparta, and other closeiv knit communities. These rivalries helped to keep the Greek keen and alert.

"Then came invaders from the outside. This drew the Greeks together to fight a common enemy, and made them stronger. Then came Alexander the Great, a conquerer who cut paths to the east, building cities as he went, and who founded the rity of Alexandria along the Mediterranean.

"The Greeks have had considerable experience with government. They have known tyrants, both of their own people and those appointed by dominating nations. One after another, these syrants were overthrown, and democracy in many forms rose and fell with the passing of the centuries.

The Greeks have lived through the whole story of civilization. There is much that we in America, and we in Toledo, can learn from them. They have seen it all. In their blood runs experience, patience and above all a high culture in the art of living."—Toledo Sunday Times, March 31, 1940.

America ican frontiers are co-extensive with American principles, interests and lives; they begin wherever and whenever the life and interestof Americans need protection; wherever and whenever the independence, honor and integrity of America are threatened, questioned or involved; and they continue running as boug and as far as American principles, interest-and lives are admitted and recognized without threat, menace or danger. Such would be the sound, safe and sensible policy.



Dear Brother:

On May 1, 1940, the records of the Ahepa Headquarters listed your name among the had standing Ahepans—those who are not entitled to receive the password or the magazine, attend meetings, wear the button and fez, nor have \$200 share in the Ahepa Emergency Fund. Being surprised to see your name on that list, I double-checked the record for a possible mistake. Caustical Retorts Won't Correct the Record

Not that the Supreme President "can't take it," but caustical resolutions of the type passed by the Pullman Chapter will not help the Headquarters' staff correct the records.

Copies of the above letter were mailed to approximately 8,000 members who had been listed as delinquent. Out of this number about 1,700 reinstated themselves; about 150 expressed their deep regrets they could not reinstate themselves at this time but were glad of the opportunity to subscribe for This. Authen at \$2,00 a year; and about 75 winde and said that they were in good standing and that the Headquarters' records must be wrong.

A re-examination of each of the lastly men tioned cases revealed that some were listed twice and three times under a different spelling of the same name; some had not been properly and completely transferred from one chapter to another, with the result that they were listed in both—as delinquent in the one and as good standing in the other; some had placed themselves in good standing after the envelopes had been addressed, but before they were mailed; in some cases members had given the secretaries of their respective chapters checks for their dues and the checks were mislaid and forgotten; some had paid their dues but neglected to mail their cards and the secretary overlooked the payment of their per capita tax; in some cases the records of the Headquarters were wrong; and there were few cases in which members in good standing claimed to have received a copy of this letter, but how or sely, it is still a mystery-they were never delinquent and their names were never, at any time, on the delinquent list.

At any rate and whatever the reason, in each case where the letter went to the wrong party, and the party responded, the record

In cases where the letter went to the wrong party, and the party did not apprise Head-quarters of the error, but went about delivering aimless criticism, the record still remains incorrect. The Supreme President does not claim the grace of infallibility either for himself or the help at Headquarters. In checking up, classifying, assorting and tabulating tens of thousands of names—sometimes the same name spelled differently every time it appears, catalogued in the "C's" and in the "K's," other times listed with the membership of two or three chapters—mistakes and inadvertances are practically unavoidable. And it is not putting too much of a strain on the fraternal tie to expect the members involved to show a tolerant, if not a cheerful, disposition towards any efforts to discover and correct such mistakes and inadvertences.

An Open Letter to the Supreme President of the Order of Ahepa

WASHINGTON CHAPTER NO. 31 Washington, D. C.

July I. 1940.

Dear Brother Chebithes:

In order that you, and the members of our organization throughout the country, may have additional first-hand information about this year's Ahepa National Banquet, we are transmitting to you and to the members of the Order, under direct authorization of our Chapters, the "lasting impressions" of the members of the Washington Chapters of the Order of Ahepa.

We hesitated to answer your charge of "pernicious" reporting as stated in your circular to the Presidents of the Chapters in which you wrote:

"However, I trust that this letter with the accompanying enclosures will be sufficient to give you a proper conception of the magnitude, far-reaching influence and lasting impressions of this truly great event—notwithstanding pernicious reports to the contrary from prejudiced, irresponsible, officious persons."

But, when you repeated that erroneous, uncalled for charge in THE AHERA Magazine you left us no alternative.

The majority of our members are of the opinion that your letter to the Presidents of the Ahepa Chapters was not sufficient to give all members of the Order of Ahepa a "proper, true, and complete conception" of the 1940 Ahepa National Banquet.

We know that you will dismiss this letter as just one more of the "foolish things" that the Washington Chapters do-but you can neither dismiss not disregard the fact that as a result of your intolerant attitude

toward the Washington Ahepans, you have not only disgusted the large majority of them, but you have also succeeded in turning hundreds the Washington Greeks against the Washington Chapters in particular and the Order of Ahepa in general.

We know that you will attempt to explain, with cleverly-worded phrases, that this letter is the outgrowth of personal antagonism towards you by certain members of the Washington Chapters—but can you explain in simple English language, why Congressmen and Senators and newspaper men left long before the Banquet was over; why so many distinguished guests were forced to eat bread rolls while waiting from 7 P. M. to 8:50 P. M. for the Banquet to start; why you did not have a main speaker, and why you did not have a speaker to represent the Order of Ahepa until an hour or so before the Banquet began, and all the other which the attached report, prepared by a specially appointed committee of the Capital Chapter No. 236, raises.

Neither the attached report nor this letter are "permicious" reports. They are rather statements of true facts-which we stand ready to sub-

stantiate at any time or place.

This letter and this report are not from "prejudiced, irresponsible, officious persons." They are rather from long-standing members of the Order of Ahepa, who defy anyone to question their sincerity and belief in the Order. It is from Ahepans who believe that it is about time we stopped covering up, glossing over, and hiding our faults. It is from responsible Ahepans who have a sincere, unselfish desire to see the Ahepa succeed, and who believe that only through immediate correction of its faults it can succeed.

April 22, 1940.

TO THE MEMBERS OF CAPITAL CHAPTER NO. 236 Brothers

The following is a report of the National Banquet investigation committee.

This banquet was held on March 4, 1940, in the main ballroom of the Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D. C. This committee was appointed for the sole purpose of establishing the facts in connection with the banquet and to verify whether or not any errors had been committed which justified discussion and ill-criticism regarding the management of the banquet.

We submit the following headings under which we make our frank and impartial comment according to information obtained from members and from outsiders who attended the banquet:

Planning and Arrangements

The committee finds that although there was complete supervision in the planning of the banquet by the Supreme President, Brother Chebithes, he was reluctant to accept any physical help from members who had had experience on planning such affairs. The chairman on arrangements, we assume, was Brother Sam Orfanos. According to his testimony, he had practically nothing to do with the arrangements other than to handle the sale of tickets for the banquet to Washingtonians and to call such meetings as may have been ordered by the Supreme President, and to make such table arrangements at the time that the Supreme President ordered him to do so. We believe that had there been such complete supervision and distribution of the detailed work to the various members of the Banquet Committee there would have been less detail for the Supreme President to handle, thus giving him more time to concentrate on inviting the proper speakers for the evening. According to the testimony of the Supreme President, the main speaker was originally intended to be the Honorable Key Pittman. It seems that Senator Pittman was either not properly notified, or his acceptance was not promptly acknowledged. Therefore, on Friday, March 1st, the Supreme President was notified that he could not accept. He immediately contacted Senator Wheeler to take the main speaker's part, who accepted. The seating arrangement at the speakers' table which should be the most important item of the evening, was negligently disregarded. We understand that although a list had been prepared, said list was lost and did not show up until half an hour before the banquet began. The error committed here is that this list should not only have been duplicated, but separate and special seating cards should have been made and placed at the

The attendance at this banquet was large. The committee believes, however, that an error was committed when the Supreme President undertook the task of acting as host, toastmaster, and entertainer. The Banquet Committee had been given typewritten seating lists, and had much trouble in seating the guests due to, first, delay in the preparing of the hall by the Mayflower Hotel; secondly, in the irregularity and inconsistency of the lists submitted, and third, the confusion caused by improper management of the committee on the seating.

3. Entertainment

We find that although the entertainment arranged for this banquet was fairly adequate, it could have been on a more elaborate scale due to the importance of the occasion.

4 Speakers

The committee on arrangements having reserved a room to entertain the speakers of the evening, made no plan to properly and punctually escort the speakers in their proper order, if it had been so desired, to the speakers' table. The committee finds that on the eve of the banquet, Brother Papanicolas had the list which should have been copied for placement cards at the speakers' table, and prolonged the beginning of the banquet by his neglect in not having placed the guest cards sooner. The Supreme President informs this committee that all the speakers had met at the designated room and were ready to proceed to the banquet hall by 7:45 P. M. He states that he had appointed Brother Papanicolas to supervise the arrangements of the evening and especially to notify him when the proper time had come to escort the speakers to their places, The Supreme President states that at 8:35 P. M. he was given word by Brother Papanicolas to enter the banquet hall. This committee feels that an error had been committed at this time, in that the speakers could have arrived at their proper places upon their arrival at the hotel and not wait for word to make one grand appearance. This committee also feels that had the Supreme President fulfilled his promise given to the dance committee, the banquet would have started not later than 7:30 and would have ended not later than 10:30 P. M. The main speaker of the evening spoke for one minute. This committee finds that Senator Wheeler explaind to Brother Nicholson the evening of the banquet that he had not prepared any speech due to lack of time. This committee believes that, first, because of the lateness in starting the banquet, and second, because of the fact that the main speaker himself was in no condition to make a speech, the number of speakers and the time allotted for the speakers should have been cut in order that the banquet could finish at a safe time. This committee also believes that after hearing the talks of the various speakers there was no direct emphasis as to the purpose of the affair. There was no AHEPA speaker on the program. Past Supreme President Catsonis was called upon to speak from the floor without previous notification.

5. Presentations

This committee finds that there were many social errors committed in presenting the guests of the evening. For instance, among the guests at the speakers' table was Mme. Diamantopoulos, the wife of the Minister of Greece. She was not introduced.

6. Publicity

The publicity of this affair was managed by Brother Soterios Nicholson. This committee believes that because of the fact that this affair is one of national importance in the social and business world, no great amount of money should have been expended to obtain publicity. The newspapers normally recognize such great affairs as this and send proper representation for proper newspaper coverage. We understand that Brother Nicholson was given forty banquet tickets for distribution to the press. Most of these tickets were given to officials of the local newspaper companies. Such an expenditure should have never been made as it lowers the importance and prestige of the affair.

This committee consists of Brothers Peter Chumbris, Nicholas Panautsopoulos and Nicholas J. Libert. We hereby make the following recommendations:

 That future banquets should be held under the guidance, and not complete supervision of the Supreme President.

That the committee on seating at such affairs should rehearse and completely understand the rules of social etiquette in the seating of official guests.

 That no one person should take responsibility to solely arrange the seating.

Seattle is Scene of Second Annual Olympiad

"Thirteen events will comprise the second National Ahepan Olympiad, to be held Wednesday, August 14, at the Civic Stadium, Seattle, Washington, in connection with the national convention of the Order of Ahepa," Supreme Vice-President and National Athletic Director Van A. Nomikos has announced.

A bigger and better Olympiad, scaled after the ancient games of vesteryears, has been developed by Mr. Nomikos and his staff, which consists of Peter D. Clentzos of Los Angeles, Calif.; George T. Gavaris of New York City; Nick Conteas of Waukegan, Ill.; Deno Saclarides of Tarpon Springs, Fla., all zone directors, and George J. Bacalles, Ahepa sports editor, Corning, N. Y.

The schedule of events follows:

2 P. M., high jump and shotput; 3 P. M., pole vault, broad jump and discus; 2 P. M., one mile run; 2:10 P. M., 100 vard dash; 2:20 P. M., 440 yard dash; 2:30 P. M., 70 yard high hurdles; 2:40 P. M., 330 vard run; 2:50 P. M., 220 yard dash; 3 P. M., 120 yard low hurdles; 3:15 P. M., half mile relay.

Handsome trophies will be awarded the winner of each event, and second and third place winners will receive medals, said Mr. Nomikos. No team trophy is given at the present time although points are awarded on a basis of five for first, three for second and one for third.

The deadline for entries is August 8th and they should be sent to 1300 Vane Bldg., Seattle, Wash.

The Olympiad chairman emphasized, however, that entries will be accepted on the day of the meet, at the athletic registration headquarters, which will be located in the main registration building.

The AAU sanctioned meet will be conducted under the rules and regulations of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The competition will be open to all, there will not be any classification and, to be eligible, one must be of Hellenic descent. Being an in-law will not suffice. Each athlete may enter two track and one field meet or vice-versa in addition to the relay.

SPECIAL NOTE: Documents and evidence supporting the above statements are attached (in the original report). These documents serve to uphold the charges of mismanagement and inefficiency which were made in a newspaper article prepared by a member of this Chapter, and to which article the Supreme President took offense and attempted to "smear" both the report and the Brother, in a weak attempt at self-defense.—The Committee.

"The Legs of the Lame Are Not Equal"

One would have to search long and diligently to find a greater demonstration of the truth in the Biblical proverb that "The legs of the lame are not equal" than that presented by the three foregoing documents. Two of them typify the "Twin Oaks of Law and Prophecy" of Washington Chapter No. 31, and the third

exemplifies most admirably the graces of "Prudence, Etiquette and Precision" as conceived, developed and practiced by Capital Chapter No. 236. All three travelled in the same envelope which is postmarked "Washington, D. C., July 24, I. A. M., 1940."

Who's Teaching Who What?

The chief complaints carried by these documents that have been broadcast to the Abepa Chapters are directed against certain allegedly unauthorized actions of the Supreme Lodge, and against the tardy habits of the Supreme President and his worful lack of understanding of the rules of social etiquette.

While considering the question of unanthorized and illegal actions it sannot but be recalled that the delegates to the National Conventions have repeatedly gone on record prohibiting the circularization of the chapteror members by any chapter or member with out the consent of the Supreme Lodge. It is also recalled that the constitution vests the Supreme Counsellor of the Order with the power and authority to interpret the constitution, and the acts of National Conventions. Therefore, Washington Chapter No. 31 acted illegally and without authority under the constitution in deciding that the transfer of fundwas "without actual authorization by the National Convention," and in circularizing the chapters without the permission of the Supreme Lodge, If Washington Chapter believed that the Supreme Lodge acted without authority it should have proceeded to settle the question in accordance with the provisions of

the constitution, and not by a method of its own. Such an act is, to say the least, "officious." And those who have no respect or regard for the orderly processes prescribed by the constitution cannot be heard to complain about unauthorized actions on the part of others.

While considering the question of social etiquette it might be observed that the protesting and complaining chapters are in the same city with the Headquarters of the Order; that the Supreme Lodge met in Washington after the transfers referred to were made and after the banquet was held; that on this occasion the Supreme Lodge members visited a combined meeting of the Washington Chapters; and that the question of money transferred in December, 1939, or the conduct of the banquet that week, March, 1940, was not raised by anyloody in or out of the chapters meeting.

The Supreme President may or may not have "rehearsed and completely understand the rules of social etiquette in the seating of official guests," but the self-appointed mentors who presume to teach him should have a better understanding of "fraternal etiquette" than has been demonstrated by the sponsors of this circularization campaign.

Common civility, perhaps too common to be stitten in their book of etiquette and therefore overlooked, requires that a letter or letters requesting some explanation of the grave questions involved should have been addressed in the Supreme Lodge or the Supreme President, before the triple-barreled blunderhus

A Glance of their Progress and Accomplishments

expect that the Maids of Athens, the youngest of Ahepa-sponsored organizations, would be the most progressive and enterprising, because it has had the benefit of the knowledge and experiences acquired by the parent Order in its efforts to establish the Sons of Pericles and the Daughters of Penelope. But regardless how much might have been expected of this fair offspring of the Ahepa, it was hardly possible to antici-

pate the progress accomplished by the "Maids" in the short time since it was officially recognized as a Young Girls' Auxiliary of the Ahepa, five years ago. Of course, the Order had a good start before it was recognized by the Ahepa, and its National Headquarters established in Washington. At the time of the Chicago Convention in 1935, there were five active chapters of the Maids of Athens; two in the State of Washington, one in Oregon, one in New York, one in New Jersey, and one

in British Columbia. So, the "Maids" organization was not what might be called a "babe in arms" when the Order of Ahepa adopted it and assumed the responsibility of supervising its growth and guiding its progress.

Although the first Maids of Athens organization established under the auspices of the Order of Ahepa was instituted by the then Supreme Covernor, Mr. Elias Janetis, at Springfield, Mass., during the winter of 1928, the idea of sponsoring and maintaining Junior Girls' or Senior Ladies' Auxiliaries on a national scale, had not yet been adopted. Consequently, this original "Maids of Athens" never became a part of the present Young Girls' Auxiliary bearing that name and functioning under the auspices of the Order of Ahepa.

Therefore, Chapter No. 1 of the Maids of Athens, at Tacoma, Wash., is the first link in the chain of chapters which is destined to-draw the Ahepans closer to their younger "sisters." Chapter No. 2 was established in Seattle, and from there on the Order grew in every direction and now has sixty-one active chapters, and a dozen or more in the process of organization. These chapters cover twenty-live States of the Union and three-Provinces of Canada. They have more than 1,500 enthusiastic, optimistic and loyal members.

It is remarkable, too, how the members of the "Maids" cooperate and get along with the officers and members of the Ahepa. Since the establishment of their national office in the Ahepa Headquarters three years ago, no complaints have been registered involving a chapter or a member of the "Maids." Reports recrived from all quarters indicate that the relationship between the Ahepa and the Maids of Athens has been mutually pleasant, harmomous and helpful. All of us have followed with pride the general progress of this young organization, and read with consuming interest about the varied and various activities of the different chapters and the soccessful ways in which they conduct their meetings and their social functions. There isn't any doubt but that wherever a chapter of the "Maids" has been established, it has introduced a new, higher, more wholesome and more enjoyable type of social life and entertainment. It is also noticeable that the District Convention of the Order of Ahepa are more colorful, brighter, much more cheerful and interesting because so many members of this young and growing Ahepa Auxiliary participate in the various functions they inject color, zest, youth and life into what once were dull and gayless gatherings.

Washington, D. C .- The Royal Minister of Hellas to the United States, Cimon Diamantopoulos, escorted by a special attachment of motorcycle police and accompanied by Minister Consular George S. Depasta; Supreme President V. I. Chebithes, of the Order of Ahepa; past Supreme Counsellor Saterios Nicholson; President of Saint Sofia Hellenic Orthodox Church, Charles Charabas; President of Capital Chapter 235, George Papanirolas, and A. Th. Polyzoides, member of the faculty of the University of Southern California and special representative of the Los Angeles Times, journeyed to Arlington National Cemetery, where His Excellency, the Minister, laid a wreath at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, on behalf of the Hellenic Veterans who fought on the side of the Allies during the World War.

Highlights of the ceremonies were the 21-gow salute fired when the Minister's party went through the gates of Arlington Cemetery; the reception accurated to the Minister by Brig. Gen. Jacob L. Devers and Col. George B. Lyman; the drawn ranks of armed men between which the Minister passed to lay the wirath; his special following and, finally, the

sounding of taps.

The non-papers of the Capital City published several pictures that were taken on the occasion and hailed the gesture as a sign of friendship and nutual understanding of the principles on which the two countries stand and for which they are willing to fight.

Plan for Liquidating Sanatorium Mortgage

Lancaster, Penna.—A plan, adopted by Red Rose Chapter 71 of the Order of Ahepa, for eventually liquidating the mortgage against the Ahepa Silver District Tuberculosis Sanatorium, calls for laying aside by each chapter of the Order one dollar from the annual dues paid by each individual member. This, of course, would decrease the income of each chapter by one dollar per member but it is suggested that chapters which cannot afford this decrease may raise the dues by une dollar per year per member.



splattered its great load of peas, beans, bird seed and untruths all over the country.

The question of promptness, or the lack of it—tardiness, is even more difficult to discuss in connection with this tremendous trinity of "true lacts."

It is noted that the circular "protesting" against transfers made in December, 1939, be gine "April 5, 1940," and is "done in the District of Columbia, March 12, 1940," Apparently the resolution was passed immediately after the Supreme Lodge left the city without the courtesy of referring the matter to it, or ask ing its permission to circularize the chapters. It seems to have been prepared for mailing April 5, 1940. The "open letter to the S preme President of the Ahepa" is dated July L. 1940, and the report of the "National Banquet investigation committee is dated April 22, 1940. Yet, they all got together in the same envelope and sarted on their journey to "all chapters in the United States and Canat one o'clock in the morning of July 24, 1940-18 days before the National Con vention in Seattle!

Is There Method in the Madness?

One cannot but wonder if there isn't some 'method" in this "madness." Perhaps the de lays, the proximity of the convention to the mailing date of this flimsy barrage, and the breach of etiquette in withholding the mat ter from the Supreme Lodge were not "coincidental," but rather the planned strategy of some uninspired aspirant to the office of the officer attacked yea? no? After all, what good is it to mail the "protest" to the chapters July 24, when it is known that the chap ters do not meet in August and that the Na tion Convention will pass upon and decide the matter before the chapters will have a chance to consider it? The act of writing such virculars and mailing them July 24 might be as dumb and brainless as it looks, but there are dark doubts and deep suspicions to the

The "open letter" and the "report" of the committee. If not pernicious, and be charitably dubbed great confessions of ignorance about the symple subjects they attempt to approach and discuss. Each of the two big paragraphs start out with "We know that you will. " If that is not a prophery. then it is presumption, rank and impudent "Cleverly worded phrases" are not the stock and store of the Supreme President. He will neither affirm nor deny the suggestions of the authors that this letter is "one more of the 'foolish things' that the Washington Chapters do" and that it "is the outgrowth of personal antagonism towards the Supreme President on the part of certain members of the Washington Chapters. It might be both foolish and personal, but the Supreme President takeit that it is the "outgrowth" of misguidance. missonceptions and mistaken ideas of the high aims, real purposes, worthy accomplishments and lofty ideals of the Order of Ahepa.

The charge of intolerant attitude cannot stand against the Supreme President because he has always published every criticism levelled against him or his acts; he has never refused to listen in anyone who was kind enough to advise him; and he has never failed

to respect the convictions of others. He has neither time nor patience for pernicious trouble-makers and blackhearted individuals.

With reference to the statement that the So preme President has disgusted a large ma jority of Washington Alapans and succeeded in turning hundreds of Washington Greeks against the Washington Chapters and the Order, the record shows that there were 7,380 members in a sod standing in the entire Order when he took office in September, 1935; day there are 16,476 in good standing. When the Supreme President came to Washington in September, 1935, Washington Chapter 31 had 116 and Capital Chapter No. 236 had 38 members in good standing. Today, July 27, 1940, Washington Chapter No. 31 has 229 and Capital Chapter No. 236 has 65 mem bers in good standing. Doing very well, thank you, under the administration of this "intolerant, disgusting Supreme President!" Or, maybe the records of the Headquarters are false and the chapters should be enlightened with another circular? This is proof No. 1 that the authors of the "open letter" did not know what they were talking about, or else they deliberately misstated the "true facts."

The questions why any guests left before the banquet was over; and why so many distinguished guests are bread rolls while waiting for the banquet to start, will be answered as soon as those who want to know furnish the Supreme President with the names of those who left and of those who are bread rolls. Eating the bread rolls is such an ancient and religiously observed Hellenic rustom that the distinguished guests felt they should observe it with us that evening. Many of the guests stated in their letters of acceptance that they would not be able to stay through the evening because of other appointments. Senator Schwallenback had to speak over the radio; Senator King was sick the campaigners know the "true facts," they simply won't give them, that's all.

Perhaps not "their sincerity and belief in the Order," but there is something "to question" about "long-standing members of the Order of Ahepa" who find fault with a letter sent out by the Supreme President telling of the success of an Ahepa affair, who praise and uphold those who publicly, selfishly and perniclously minimize the successes of the Order to the delight of its enemies and who feel that they have discovered something radically wrong and a grievous "fault" if a guest left before the banquet was over or ate a bread roll while waiting for it to start. No, not the 'sincerity and belief' but the sensibility and brains of such members need to be questioned. examined and treated. If such Ahepans "Lelieve that it is about time" they "stopped rosering up, glossing over, and hiding" their they can proceed to uncover. they will not reveal anything that has not been long-known to everybody but to them.

In the opinion of the Supreme President all three of these circulars are pernicious, because they do harm and no good; prejudicial, because they are partial, take and misleading officious, because they are issued without authority in for any good, practical purpose; treasonable, lecause they give aid and combot to the enemies of our Order, and childish.

because they deal with small, petty, matters of no importance. They are a poor imitation of "much ado about nothing." The persons who inspired these circulars and the lackies who signed and mailed them, like the opossum-hunting old darky in the story, think they see an opossum on the tree, but all they are shooting at is a louse in their own eye-brow. Even if there was "a "possum on the tree," they couldn't harm him with bread rolls and scaling arrangements.

"The Committee Finds"

Comes now the "frank and impartial comment" of the committee which admits "was appointed for the sole purpose of establishing the facts in connection with the banquet and to verify whether or not any errors had been committed which justified discussion and illcriticism regarding the management of the banquet."

A Hammer and Anvil Chorus

Thus the first and most important fact established at the very outset is that this is a fault-finding committee. Their self-confessed purpose is to find and verify any mistakes which justified ill-criticism. Now, some committees try to find out everything about the subject of their investigation, the good and the bad, the favorable and the unfavorable, to weigh the relative good of the one and the harm of the other; and, if they have any milk of human kindness in their breast, if they try to practice, ever so little, the humanitarian, Christian principles preached by the Ahepa. lo, these many years, they will throw the mantle of charity over the faults of their fellowhumans, cause the light of brotherly love to shine upon their successes and their triumphs. that others may see their good works and be encouraged in their ambitions to serve.

Well, this wasn't that kind of a committee; its avowed purpose was to dig dirt and justify ill-criticism; the successful features of the banquet held no interest or attraction for them; errors, mistakes, faults, failures which "justified discussion and ill-criticism"—that was their game, those were the objects of their search. They were looking for something to jeer, not to cheer. It is hard to believe that three men, Abepans, could be found in the entire Ahepan domain, who would serve on such a committee—much less three such in one chapter!

The most surprising thing of all is that they failed to establish any facts on which ill criticism could be based. Aside from revealing their own "good intentions" they "estab lished" no fact at all. Of course, the report sets forth a few positive statements, some of which are known to be correct and some of which are known to be incorrect. But no attempt is made to establish either set. In the "special mote" the "frank and impartial comment" is made that documents and evidence supporting the committee's statements, and to refute the Supreme President's "weak attempt at self-defense," are attached (in the original report). But why hold them back? Is it expected that the members who received this frank and impurtial" report will journey to Washington to verify the "charges?"


Returns from Study Abroad

fact" is that it is easy to accuse-"charge." as they call it-but it is difficult to proveespecially when the "charges" are the figments of an obsessed mind.

Sift the Wheat from the Chaff

The statements to the effect that the banquet was held March 4, 1940, in the main ballroom of the Mayflower Hotel in Washington; that the Supreme President had supervision over it; that the attendance was large; and that Mme. Diamantopoulos was not introduced are correct.

The statements to the effect that the Supreme President was reluctant to accept any physical help from experienced members; that the chairman on arrangements had practically nothing to do and the implication that he did as much; that there were many social errors committed in presenting the guests; and that most of the free tickets were given to officials of the local newspaper companies are incorrect. The members of the Washington Chapters of the Ahepa, Maids of Athens and Daughters of Penelope used 42 free tickets.

The rest of the statements based on the assumption, the beliefs, the understandings, the feelings, the conceptions of what appeared or seemed to the committee, are purely guess work, with a generous sprinkling of fanciesbut no facts-and are, perhaps, made for the sole purpose of showing that the committee is "frank and impartial."

The question as to whether or not Brother Catsonis had "previous notification" permits no discussion. The "frank and impartial" committee does not know. But the questionas to wether he needed or wanted "previous notice" can be disposed of by saying that he did not. A man of the intelligence, education, experience, talent and special training of Brother Catsonis needs neither previous notice, oor text nor even a pretext-to make the best speech that can be made on the Abepa. It may well be submitted here, that a committee which reports that "the seating arrangements of the speakers' table should be the most important item of evening" is not competent to recognize a "direct emphasis as to the purpose of the affair."

Brother Catsonis certainly steered clear of what, in the opinion of the committee, should have been "the most important item of the evening"-but, in the opinion of the Senators and Congressmen and other distinguished guests, he made as good a speech as anybody could make-except, perhaps the members of the "frank and impartial" committee. They could have done so much better, for themselves, had they a free hand with the seating arrangements, that there is no doubt but what they assume, feel and believe they could have made better speeches than those who spoke.

The speeches of Catsonis, the Supreme President and Congressman Cellers were good enough to be inserted in the Congressional Record, and that's more than we can say about any other Ahepa affair. In fact the files of the Headquarters and of the chapters represented are full to overflowing with praise and applause from prominent guests who attended. The Supreme President has thus far attended 10 District Conventions and at the hanquet of each he heard praises proudly expressed about

the magnitude, splendor and good impressions derived from the Ahepa National Banquet. Everybody is pleased, proud and happy over it-except some members of the Washington Chapters. After all, why should a Congress man or a Senator presume that he knows what is a good speech or a successful hanquet?

"There Are Reasons"

The reasons for and the purposes of this hostile attitude from certain quarters in Washington against the National Banquet are not clearly seen from the surface of these letters. one has to know something of the events that have gone before to arrive at an understanding of the present state of affairs. The story is long, but it can be cut short-here it is:

The National Banquet is an institution of some ten or twelve years. Up to the spring of 1936 the Washington Chapters ran it as they pleased under the Chairmanship of Brother George Vournas; made a little money out of it, had a lot of fun and good time with it; and everybody was glad. In 1936 Brother Vournas was again appointed Chairman as usual, with full power and authority to make all arrangements and appoint those whom he wanted to help him carry out his plans. He appointed his committee and went to work. On the eve of the affair the Supreme Lodge met and decided to invite a certain personage as the guest of the Order. The Supreme Lodge was informed that the personage in question was not acceptable to the committee. This objection on the part of the committee resulted in, not serious, but unpleasant, consequences. The personage left town and the expected "show-down" was not staged. The question asto whether the tail shall wag the dog, or the dog the tail was postponed until the National Convention at St. Paul. There the delegates gave the Supreme President full power and authority over all matters connected with the National Banquet. Ever since that time it has been impossible to hold a banquet to the liking of the old members of the National Banquet Regime. They can hardly wait for the event to be over before they mail their critivism to the newspapers-indeed, the swiftness with which some pernicious articles appear in the press leads to the impression that they were written in advance.

The prognosticators start weeks, nay, months ahead of event. The rumors get around that nobody is going, that the chapters will not support it this year, that the affair was so badly conducted the last time that nobody will go this time.

When it is finally over and the turn-out was bigger, better than ever before; more chapters participated, more Congressmen, Senators, and other distinguished guests attended; more letters received in praise of the affair; the Wash ington chapters get more free tickets (42 this year to help the Supreme President do it all by himself) and make more money out of it, then they grow weary and desperate. They come out with such silly stuff as there were too many; one or two of the people there slid not wear dress soits; some of the guests atbread rolls while waiting; the seating wasn't right; some one was or was not at the speakere' table; was or was not introduced-there's trouble in either case; the speakers were either

too many or too few, and either spoke too long or not long enough-this year they did both. On the one hand the committee says that the number of speakers and the length of speeches should have been limited and, on the other hand, they complain because Senator Wheeler spoke for one minute.

The Supreme President has been around Washington long enough, has had enough phases of the National Banquet come up enough times and by enough different people to know the "true facts" without having to snoop around for them or create them out of whole cloth

The trouble is neither with the time of starting and stopping not with the speakers and the speeches - they have always been good. Neither does anybody care whether a guest eats bread rolls and butter while he waits; nor does anybody care whether Cat-sonis has "previous notice" that he is going to speak; nor does anybody care how much or how little the Supreme President does. With two or three exceptions, neither the committee nor the man who inspired them cares anything about any of the things mentioned in any of these circulars—these men are not quite as foolish as these circulars in-

The important exceptions are:

L. The Ahepa National Banquet, like the National Home Fund, must be considered and conceded to be the exclusive property of the Washington Chapters. The Chapters may contribute to both, but must not claim a share or authority in either. There is scarcely a day, when the Supreme President is in Washington, that some Brother Ahepan does not present him with "just the building the Ahepa needs and must buy for a National Home. And the funny part of it is that the purchase price of each is just about what the agent thinks the Ahepa has for that purpose

2. That every member of the Washington Chapters must be on the banquet committee. receive a free ticket, and have his name on

the program.

3. Every member of the Washington Chapters must be permitted to select his table for himself, his family and friends, and sit either at the speakers' table or no further than two table lengths from it.

From these three points rise all of the troubles. The Supreme President disagrees with their views-all of them.

This year, more than in the past, the Supreme President has held strictly to and scrupulously practiced the idea that the Ahepa National Banquet belongs to all of the chapters, and that the two in Washington have no more say or do about it than the two in San Francisco, Detroit or Canton; that the honor guests of the chapters must be seated first and the members, their families and friends will take what is left, after the guests have been taken care of as they should; and that only those who work, cooperate and obey or dere are entitled to the privilege of being on the committee.

The only way to a peaceful, efficient and economical management of the National Banquet is for it to be given under the sole and exclusive management of the Supreme Presi-

In Remembrance



Christie Geankoplis

Minneapolis, Minnesota—No greater shock could have come to as many Ahepans throughout the Domain of the Order than the sad report announcing the death of Brother Christie Geankoplis (Christos Gianakopoulos) of this city. He was born in Chicago, Ill., in 1898, the son of Mr. Nicholas Gianakopoulos, and died in Minneapolis in 1940—scarcely 42 years of life.

His life was brief, but fruitful. "Christie," as he was affectionately called by his intimate friends, was ambitious to make his mark in the world and took advantage of every opportunity to advance his position and prepare himself for the service of others. He educated himself in both the English and Hellenic languages by pursuing his studies in Athens and in the Minnesota College of Law. He graduated from the latter in 1923 and had since been associated in the practice of his profession with the law firm of Fowler, Carlson, Ferber and Johnson in Minneapolis.

He joined the Ahepa through Demosthenes Chapter No. 66 of Minneapolis in 1927 and was active to the end. He served his Chapter as president, his District as Governor, the National Convention as delegate and chairman of many important committees, and his community as counsellor.

He is survived by his widow, Ethel, who served with distinction as Governor of the Daughters of Penelope; by his son, Nicholas, 21; his daughter, Jean, 17; his father, Nicholas, and his sister, Mrs. Constantine Rollis, all of Minneapolis.

THE SANATORIUM

A Living Light of Hellenic Charity

Crowning Glory of Ahepa Achievements

VER since the founding of this Hellenic House of Health in America, the Ahepa Silver District Tuberculosis Sanatorium, our first national trial at systematic, practical and continuous charity, the official voice of the Order has never reased speaking for the success of its great and good purpose. With THE ABEPAN, the life and work of the Ahepa Sanatorium have been sacred and holy—above personalities, "politics" or petty differences. This magazine has consistently and uncompromisingly persevered in its moral and material support of the Sanatorium, publishing articles for and pictures of the Sanatorium, as well as endless lists of contributors. These activities, aside from the tremendous amount of time and labor they consumed, have cost the magazine sums of money totaling up to tens of thousands of dollars. But the time, money and energy have been well spent, so there are no regrets or complaints as Tite AHEPAN comes again to record the results of another successful year for the Ahepa Sanatorium, and present the names of those who have contributed outright and directly to the support of the Sanatorium, beside and in addition to whatever time and money they spent for the success of local affairs staged for the benefit of this institution.

The efforts exerted this year, and the results obtained for the Sanatorium, have been greater than ever before. This might be due to the rumors that the Sanatorium was in danger of being closed, to the extraordinary means employed, and to the consequent realization of what this house of "faith, hope and charity" means to the Hellenic people in America,

One does not have to be a fanatic to understand the meaning of this institution. Just as no rational person could maintain that the annual awards of 6 to 10 thousand dollars made by the Ahepa are enough to solve the educational problems of all deserving students of Hellenic descent, or that the 200 dollars paid upon the death of a member solves the financial problems of his widow and orphans, or that the 2 or 3 thousand dollars annually given by the Ahepans to the Holy Cross Theological School at Pomfret keep it open the whole year round, so it could not be reasonably argued that the Ahepa Silver District Tuberculosis Sanatorium, with a present capacity of 50 patients, is sufficient to care for all who need and are entitled to receive free hospitalization and treatment there. Neither can it be claimed that every tubercular patient who enters the Ahepa Sanatorium will, eventually, walk out in perfect health. None but fanatical and thoughtless people would make such claims.

On the other hand, it would be equally unreasonable, if not inhuman, for any one to contend that since the Order of Ahepa cannot solve ALL of the problems confronting the Hellenic people in America, it should refrain from doing anything—even what it can—towards the solution of any problem, the serving of any need, or the protection and preservation of any interest. Such a policy of "do nothing" would be unworthy of our Order and would soon lead us down to the dismal realm of mediocre littleness.

The traditional awards systematically made by the Order of Ahepa in scholarships, in gifts to schools and churches, in benefits to widows and orphans, and in the maintenance of the Ahepa Sanatorium—while not sufficient to solve a single problem, serve a single need or protect a single interest—taken together, reflect the character, culture and charity of the Ahepans, and "provide a living practical proof of our ability to act as a united people." So, this institution, although insufficient to heal ALL of our people who might be in need of the free services it has to offer, it is, nonetheless, a beacon sufficiently bright to show our good intentions, our love for education and culture, our devotion to the faith of our fathers, and our gentle, charitable, human instincts and attributes.

What light is to the lamp, gentle charity is to the Ahepathe crowning glory of its Hellenic soul. Whosever desires to snuff out this light and darken this beacon, desires to render vain and ineffectual the sacrifices of those who lit and kept it burning, blast the hopes of those who followed its cheerful rays to their source, needlessly and unjustly stigmatize our beloved Order as an incompetent weakling and to besmirch the longestablished and universally recognized humane characteristics of the Hellenic people.

With the knowledge and experiences of each year that passes, the methods and processes of securing funds for the Sanatorium become better and more efficient; the Hellenie public gains larger, clearer and more comprehensive understanding of Ahepa's program for charities, and an ever increasing number of people rally to the support of that program.

This year, the most important improvement made in the method of bringing home to the public the practical idealism of the Sanatorium was the introduction of field lecturers. Though hastily prepared and scheduled, and often confronted with difficult, embarrassing and adverse situations, they won glory for themselves and gained substantial support for the Sanatorium. These men, chief of whom are Past Supreme Governor Elias Janetis, Past District Governor William Essaris, District Governor Captain Jean M. Kossarides, and Brothers William Alexander and Peter Zervas, labored valiantly to give the people a close-up, inside view of the Sanatorium.

They marched out into a field wildly over-run with a thick undergrowth of adverse rumors; they mounted the rostrum in forums infested with hostile sentiment; and confronted opposition from within and without the ranks. Yet, they not only stood their ground, but forged ahead. They cut through the wild undergrowth of irresponsible rumors, pierced the hostile sentiment and reached the hearts of the people with their message, and appealed to them in behalf of those helpless ones who pinned their hope of life on the continuance of the Sanatorium. The physical, mental and psychological hardships endured and overcome by these evangelists of charity, entitle them to a place of honor in the galaxy of Ahepa's roll of heroes. Too much cannot be said in praise of their good work. At a time when the outlook was darkest for the Sanatorium, they stepped to the front, dispelled the clouds of gloom, and made it the brightest year the Sanatorium ever had.

These lectures and the lecturers were received with great interest and enthusiasm, have been instructive and popular, and should be continued along broader and more systematic lines.

"V. I. Chebithes"

BY JOHN G. THEVOS

· The following article taken from the "Ahepa Voice," official organ of Garden State (N. J.) District No. 5, is received with grateful appreciation of the free and frank spirit in which it was written and published by that princely exponent of American Hellenic youth, John G. Theros, of Paterson, N. J., an illustrious graduate of the Sons of Pericles, and a good Ahepan in whom there is no guile.

The quality of friendship, like that of mercy, "is not strained." But the proof of it in this spontaneous outpouring of a tree, friendly heart, is as admirable as it is rare; as priceless as it is genuine. The greatest satisfaction in life is that which comes from the knowledge that one's efforts to do

good have not gone by unnoticed.

The slars and slanders of mine enemies worry me not. I publish them for the entertainment of the public. But I zealously cherish the thoughts and utterances of my friends. I publish them for the edification of those who believe in me. For

"I live for those who love me; For those who are kind and true; For the Heaven that smiles above me And waits my spirit, too."-ED.

The Seattle Convention has closed another chapter in the history of V. I. Chebithes and by the same stroke, in the history of the Ahepa. This does not mean that the book or the saga has been completed or ended. For as long as "V. I." physically inhabits this terrestrial sphere, the Ahepa has protective insurance for the continuation of its dynamic policies and restless, forward-moving forces. What is this chapter?

In 1924 the Ahrpa was a loose-fitting chain of a few chapters in some vities on the Atlantic scaloard, with its national aspirations and power, limited, circumscribed and bleak. The malady was disgnosed by the 1921 Washington, D. C., convention. The diagnosis pointed to an inexorable death because of a dearth of crusading, resurgent leadership.

From shadows of that convention stepped V. I. Chebithes, and the prescription followed the diagnosis. Action, nation-wide and enthusiastic replaced the sectional gains of the early years. Chebithes had a program. He had a following - all right-thinking Hellenism from const to coast. Acclaimed everywhere he went, young, vibrant, and a peer-less leader, he drew into the fold of the Ahepa by the sheer weight of his eloquence and inspiring personality, the thousands of Americans of Hellenie extraction who craved the sanctuary of such an organization as the Ahepa promised them to be.

Hectic years and restless years to these first three years of Chebithes' rule. From the convention in Washington in 1924, to Chicago in 1925, to the almost disastrous Philadelphia of 1926 and thence to Miami in 1927, the Ahepa phalanxes were swelled with new recruits called "Archons." V. I. Chebithes dominated the scene. He was a living symbol at all four conventions men-

Perhaps the greatest single accomplishment that these years brought was the increase in chapters and membership. This was followed closely by the proud teaching by Chebithes, as the first apostle of Hellenism in America, to Americans, that the Greek was an American patriot and a citizen first and foremost; that every humble Hellene who resided in his adopted country, America, had established a permanent residence, and wanted to give, as well as partake in the blessings of this great land; lastly, that the melting pot of America could be best fused and made to work as the realistic philosophy of American statesmanship envisaged, by actual and planned effort by the Hellenes themselves. The Greek did not have to be taught by others. As always, he taught himself. This time he picked his own agent to do the work. That agent was the Ahepa.

This catalogues the main achievements of the first three Chebithes administrations with one exception, but by far the most important from an internal, organizational viewpoint. This accomplishment of a unique form of fraternal order; -- a fraternity with purely democratic ideals in its entire structure. The convention remains the final arbiter. It can change by a mere two-thirds vote the fundamental precepts which the conventions themselves have created. The Chehithes Administrations have strengthened this form of government. Paradoxically, this has caused an anomalous situation in the second string of Chebithes administrations just terminated. For from 1935 to date, those opposed to "V. I." have used the tactic that the Supreme President has nullified the Acts of Conventions and has adopted dictatorial methods. This is truly fallacious, Supreme power from the first days of Ahepa's history has been vested in the Ahepa Convention, constituted by duly elected delegates of the chapters, and members of the Supreme Lodge, which, in the early years was a cumbersome and large body of men. The convention is both a legislative and judicial body, in that it initiates all legislation and judges the administration of its acts by its Supreme Lodge at succeeding Conventions. The deep and ever-changing character of V. I. Chebithes' thinking has affected the Convention. For, in between Conventions, V. I. Chehithes interpreted convention legislation and translated it into deeds and action. But, here lies the rub. V. I. Chebithes is a liberal, and a seeker of formulas to achieve ends. The formulas have always been secondary, The ends primary. If a formula decreed as the august wish of the convention was found by "V. I." in its application to be wanting and in his opinion to threaten the success of the ends in view, he promptly and unceremoniously discarded it for another of his own design and creation. This practice would be the subject of heated debate among those, who sincerely or insincerely doubted the wisdom of "Chebithean" policies, and those, a distinct minority, who felt that the Chehithes' strokes of statesmanship were an unwarranted exercise of power which properly belonged to the convention as the fount of all power.

The consequence of this has been twofold. (1) That the convention which meets for five or six days a year, as an instrument of power has recognized its own inherent weakness in not being able to make or translate the Ahepa's work into any consistent pattern except as certain leaders have guided and moulded its opinions. (2) As a result of the first, the convention has endorsed at subsequent conventions, the actions of V. I. Chebithes and has by the same token approved the ends gained.

The real result of this counter-balancing of executive and legislative power, the constant clash at conventions between the leaders of minority groups of the conventions with the leadership of the Supreme President and the effort by each convention to appraise the work of the Supreme President in the light of prior enactments by conventions and as to their execution, has brought about a truly democratic form of government in the Ahepa. This, many believe is the greatest triumph wrought by "V. I."

1935 to 1940 marks the second successive Chebithes administrations. In the first three, "V. I." was a young enthusiastic, effervescent leader. After a lapse of eight years, he returned to power and to the helm of the Order in Chicago in 1935. The fraternity was at a low-ebb, the lowest in all its history. Its membership depleted, its energies spent, and its actions futile.

"V. I." in 1935 was a nature liberal, serious, progressive, yet cautious. The fraternity witnessed and felt a revitalizing force which emanated from within the deepest recesses of its experience. All of us know the factual record of three years. The Ahepa has matched the maturity of its leader by coming of age in its own right. The new concept of the Ahepa Emergency Fund, Ahepa Sanatorium and Ahepa Orphanage have replaced the exuberance of early years. Membership in good standing trebled from the members reported at the 1935 Chicago Convention. The fraternity was re-dedicated to the principle of service to its own members and in a large sense to Hellenism in America. As uredly this is but the

URGES THE SUPREME PRESIDENT IN HIS FIRST MESSAGE

My dear Brethren:

In this, my first official communication as Supreme President of the Ahepa, I extend to you and through you to the officers and members within your jurisdiction, my fraternal greetings, and assure you of my deepest appreciation for the great honor bestowed upon me by the Seventeenth Grand Convention at Scattle.

The aims, purposes and policies of our Order are too well known to be repeated here, and too well established to be repeated or radically changed by any Supreme Lodge. Therefore, unless conditions warrant otherwise, our efforts during the coming year will be devoted largely toward the accomplishment of the accepted purposes, rather than to the setting up of new objectives and the opening up of new courses. All of us desire the Ahepa to have higher prestige, stronger influence, richer resources and greater ability to serve the needs of our people. Every loyal Ahepan will be happy to see the Order have more chapters, more members, and more money at Cincinnati next August than it had when the 17th convention met in Seattle.

All of us will be glad to know, as we travel along toward the accomplishment of our several aims, that every project and department under our jurisdiction—the Senior and Junior Auxiliaries, the National Headquarters, the Ahepa Emergency, the National Home, the Orphanage and Magazine funds—are operating efficiently, smoothly, independently, and without losses. And I know that the whole of Hellenism in America will rejoice to see the Ahepa National Sanatorium fully paid for and doubled in capacity during the coming year.

It shall be the task of this administration to fulfill the desires, realize the ambitions and justify the faith that our members and the general public have in this Order.

Every officer and member, individually and collectively, has a duty to perform. But our respective duties are so interrelated and we are so interdependent upon each other that the ultimate result depends solely upon our own cooperative action. The success, prosperity and progress of the Ahepa demand that each of us does his Ahepan duty and exercises his official authority in coordination, and not in interference with the duties and powers of others. When this demand of the Order is met and honored, the result will be accepted as the best that can be obtained under our system.

The chapter is the foundation of our Order. The chapter officers and members constitute the first line of Ahepa aggressive and defensive operations. They are expected to initiate the new and reinstate the delinquent members. They will boost The Ahepa magazine and "go to town" for the Sanatorium. They will sponsor the Junior and Auxiliary organizations. They will carry out the plans of the Order as transmitted to them by the District or Supreme Lodge and will cooperate for the success of every Ahepa undertaking.

The District Lodge, under the leadership of its Governor, is relied upon to supervise the work of the chapters in its jurisdiction, help the alling, reorganize the inactive and establish new chapters wherever in its judgment they are needed to advance the work of the fraternity. The District Lodge officers will study the reports on the work of their chapters and will visit them as often as possible, especially those which are not progressing according to their opportunities, in which cases every possible aid should be extended to them.

The Supreme Lodge is expected and looked upon to shape the program and the national policies of the Order, to execute their individual and collective duties as prescribed by the Constitution, to enforce the laws and carry out the mandates of the Grand Convention, to draw the plans and mark out the course for the successful accomplishment of any undertaking, to provide the personnel for the performance of the services needed, and to do all things necessary and proper for the general advancement of the entire Order.

Thus, we see that under the system governing Ahepa operations and activities, every officer and member has specific duties to perform at specific times and places. Our success depends upon each of us sticking to his place and doing his duty like a soldier. When one of us deserts his post or tries to do that which he has neither power nor authority to do, or, being at his post, does not do his duty well and interferes with those who try to do theirs, trouble is sure to come and the progress of the Order is bound to be arrested and retarded. Needless to say, the present administration will look with great disfavor upon any trouble makers and will not be overpatient with flagrant and willful violations of the Ahepa laws and usages.

I avail myself of this opportunity to inform you of the following important arrangements made by the Supreme Lodge under the Constitution and as authorized or directed by the convention:

1. Executive Secretary.—Brother C, B, Johannides of St, Louis, Missouri, who has served his chapter for many years as President and Secretary and his District as Governor and Lieutenant Governor, and who has attended as Delegate practically every national convention, has been appointed to the position of Executive Secretary at the National Headquarters in Washington, D. C. District and Chapter officers are kindly requested and fraternally urged to cooperate with Brother Johannides in the performance of his duties and to be patient with his efforts to serve the Order while he is familiarizing himself with the routine of his new position.

2. The Sanatorium.—The Sanatorium, hitherto known as the Ahepa Silver District Sanatorium and governed by a board of nine directors, is now exclusively under the complete control, supervision and management of the Supreme Lodge, without any outside interference, and the title has been changed to "The Ahepa National Sanatorium."

Last year's campaign to raise funds for the Sanatorium, while not 100% successful, was far from being a failure. It netted enough money to operate the Sanatorium for fifteen months and pay for more than half the indebtedness against the institution.

Since the then Supreme President, V. I. Chebithes, succeeded in conducting the drive efficiently and economically, despite obstacles, the Supreme Lodge has requested him to accept the task of supervising the campaign for Sanatorium funds again this year. We sincerely believe that the experience gained by Brother Chebithes will be very useful to the Sanatorium, and we urgently request every officer and member of the Order to

cooperate with him in his efforts to raise the most money at the least possible expense. Brother Chebithes has high hopes that this year's campaign will net enough to complete payment for the property (about \$20,000), to double its capacity by remodeling and refurnishing one of the big buildings at the cost of about \$20,000, and, of course, to continue present operations at the expense of thirty to thirty-five thousand dollars. In other words, his goal is \$75,000. Let us surprise him with \$100,000his strong faith in Hellenism and the Sanatorium deserves it.

3. "The Ahepan." - Based on what he has learned from experience, Brother Chebithes presented a plan showing how THE AHEPAN can be published without a deficit. The Supreme Lodge, therefore, appointed him to edit and publish THE AHEPAN, with the understanding that none but paid up members shall be entitled to receive the magazine, that the expense of printing pictures will be paid for by the persons requesting their publication, and that the magazine will be self-sustained.

4. Insurance Plan. — Past Supreme Secretary, Louis P. Maniatis, who has given considerable study to an insurance plan for the Ahepa as outlined in a recommendation made in his report to the national convention at Seattle, was appointed Chairman of a committee to study the plan and present its findings to the next convention. Others on the committee include Brother James L. Sardonis of Nashua, New Hampshire, and George Nikolopoulos of Chicago.

Many other matters will be discussed in later communications. In the meantime, I seek your cooperation and offer mine for any matter appertaining to the welfare of the Ahepa.



Ahepa in the Midst of a National Crisis

Ahepa was not in being during the last World War. She came into existence some four years after the Armistice and now for the first time faces the additional responsibilities that are imposed on organizations as well as individuals during a national crisis such as the one that America finds herself in today. With Japan joining the axis powers, the threat to America becomes a very real one. No longer can we argue that what goes on abroad is none of America's lousiness. Whether we care to admit it or not, democracy, liberty and all the things that we have held dear for generations are seriously

endangered by the combined nemesis of the axis powers.

We, as Americans, can no longer remain complacent in the face of the certain danger that lies ahead for our country. The time has come when both as an organization and as individuals we must take an aggressive and positive stand on the important issues confronting America.

The Seattle National Convention took cognizance of the existent crisis by adopting unanimously a series of significant resolutions affecting not only the current preparedness and de-fense of the nation but its future policy as well. Without a single dissenting vote, the convention went on record favoring immediate conscription of men, industry, and capital and in identical telegrams to the President of the United States, the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate pledged her man-power and resources to the national defense. In addition, the delegates, fully cognizant of the courageous resistance that the British Empire is waging in an effort to prevent an invasion of the British Isles, voted in favor of the delivery of the fifty old destroyers to her in exchange for the leasing of naval bases offered on the Caribbean, Bermuda and North Atlantic. And as a purely humanitarian gesture, the convention favored the immediate evacuation by American boats of as many English children as possible.

With the passage of the conscription bill, the Ahepa, nationally as well as locally, must do all it can to assist the government in its various tasks that lie ahead. The Supreme Lodge should take the lead in offering itself as an organization to the President of the United States ready to do whatever it may be called upon in effectively preparing the one million Americans of Greek descent for the defense of this nation. If men are needed, Ahepa must take the initiative in gathering them. If there is to be a conscription of industry and capital, again Ahepa must be in the forefront in doing its bit. Locally, the District Lodges and the individual chapters should be doing the same things—aiding the local draft boards, raising funds for the Red Cross, et cetera. In the event that the European situation becomes worse, this phase of Ahepan activity may become

A Business Administration

Ever since I became an Ahepan, somewhere back in 1925, and began to attend National and District Conventions, the one thing which I heard mentioned, discussed and harped upon more than any other is the phrase "Business Administration." Myself being a business man and claiming to know at least the elementary principles of sound business, always joined in the demand and agreed that the Order of Ahepa should have a "business administration." This year at the 17th Grand Convention of our Order in Seattle I was nominated and elected to the office of Supreme

While I am very grateful of the honor and confidence bestowed upon me, I was really induced to accept this office by my desire to give the Ahepa the "business administration" which the membership and their representatives have been wasting. However, since my induction to office and my examination of the records, correspondence, system, personnel and general conditions at the National Headquarters of the Order, I have come to the conclusion that while those in charge of Aheps affairs in the past may not have been the less business-people in the world, set according to the facts of record, thry have applied far sounder principles as administrators of our business than we have as members of the Order.

One outstanding example is the abuse of the six-months grace period within which we are given to pay our dues to the chapters, which coupled with the unreasonable delay in the payment of per capita tax in Headquarters is responsible for more than half of our troubles.

Is there any of us who clamor for a "business administration" in the Ahepa willing or able to carry more than 50% of his customers on a basis of six months' credit? Yet, that is exactly what we have, not only required, but compelled the Supreme Lodge to do in our Ahepa business. We have fallen into the bad habit of calling ourselves in good standing, demanding services from the Order, even though we take six months and more to pay for the cost of those Services.

Let us take as a concrete example the Ahepa magazine. Every memher knows that it shows a deficit. If we ask "why?" the ready response is "bad business management—we should have a businessman in charge of it and it will make money." Passing over the question that we have never been willing to pay a businessman to take charge of it. I hasten to point out that no businessman can stay in business and keep out of

the red when his customers don't pay their bills. Yes, our magazine is in the red. We have about 17,000 members in good standing-17,000 who are less than six months behind with the payment of their dues-but only about 7,000 of them have paid dues or the chapter secretaries have paid per capita tax for to Headquarters. The per capita tax of the other 10,000 is yet to come. But these 10,000 have received the July, August and September issues of the Magazine. The \$5,000.00 due the magazine from those 10,000 members will be more than enough to wipe off the deficit. Let me ask then who has been lax in this husiness, those who send us the magazine, or we who receive it and wait six months to pay for it? Will the printer wait that long for his money? Would any of us? The most charitable answer we can give to this question is that both groups have been lax-the administrators and the members. We, as Supreme Lodge Members, cannot compel the prompt payment of dues and per capita tax, but we can, and have, set up a policy that from now on, only those whose per capita tax is paid upshall receive the Magazine. If any member feels that this policy is not based on solid business basis, we shall be more than glad to have his

I have also found, to my great amazement, some of our members who are businessmen, and who have often charged past administrations with incompetence in the transaction of Ahepa business, contending for the payment of claims against the Ahepa Emergency Fund, when the facts on record clearly show that the claim is illegal and chould not be paid.

Without making this, my first message as Supreme Treasurer, longer than it should be, I will conclude with the declaration that I shall do all within my power to administer the affairs of my office as I would my own on a strictly husiness basis. It takes more than one party to complete a business transaction. Neither the Supreme Treasurer, nor any other officer, nor the Supreme Lodge as a whole can carry on in a business way unless the members also adopt a business attitude and pay their dues, and the Chapter Secretaries remit promptly the per capita tax due Headquarters. The Supreme Treasury of the Order cannot con tinue pouring out money for six months at a time unless in the meanwhile it is being continuously replenished.

tending of greetings to the members by the Grand President, the election of Convention Officers took place, resulting in Chairman, Mrs. Emanuel Apostolides, Grand President; Vice-Chairman, Miss Josephine Pandel, Grand Governor; Secretary, Miss Melpa Manos; and Assistant Secretary, Miss Marie Zuras, Grand Secretary, With the appointment of the various conventional committees and the presenting of the reports of the respective Grand Lodge Officers, the conclave swept into full swing, "hard work" being the motto of each delegate.

Every legislative step taken, every constitutional change considered, was done so with the consciousness in mind of the "National" scope of the Order. The past year saw the collecting of the first National per capita tax, a major portion of the foundation work accomplished in the structure of a National Headquarters with the setting up of the various files and records, and the naturally resulting tendency of more responsibility being placed on and expected from the Headquarters. Undoubtedly, the most important groundwork accomplishment to be accredited to this Convention was the realization of the necessity of having a financially independent Order, an Order 'National" not only in name but in deed and in service, and an Order with its "own house in such a condition as to be able to later sponsor and lend material support to its own be decided" projects and to those of the Ahepa. With this end in mind, the per capita tax was substantially raised to the amount of \$1.00 per member in good standing, \$25 of which is to be routed to the Districts con-

A further accomplishment, important from the standpoint of fostering greater cooperation between the Order of Ahepa and its Senior Ladies Auxiliary, was the resolution, resulting as a consequence of the joint meeting of the Ahepan Auxiliary Committee with representatives of the "Daughters," to the effect that the Supreme Lodge of the Ahepa review and adopt formally the "Daughters" constitution, subject to any corrections or changes which they may deem advisable. Such a procedure will result in a non-conflict of principles and in a clearer understanding of the fundamentals of the Auxiliary Order.

Eligible for listing also in the category of accomplishments are quite a few minor constitutional and parliamentary procedural changes. However, they are not of sufficient external interest to be here mentioned.

Friday afternoon, in response to invitations issued, the delegation had the honor to be visited and addressed by Mr. V. I. The Social Side

Everybody in Seattle, during the week of August 12, 1940, did as the Ahepans, because the entire city was turned over to them to have and to hold for the duration of their Seventeenth Grand Convention. From every point of the compass the Ahepans came, and coming they marvelled at the vast expanse of the great country over which they travelled and were charmed by the beauty of their host city.

The round-trip to Seattle from the distant cities east and south of it was to all who made it pleasant interesting and educational. It brought the wayfarers face to face with the incomprehensible magnitude of America, endowed them with a slight conception of her vast and varied resources, and gave them a faint idea of what could be meant by the phrase: "Wide open spaces." Any attempt at a description of what one saw on the way there and back would be a sacrilege. If one had all the adjectives of all the languages in the world and with the skill of Demosthenes weaved them into a thousand garlands of rhetoric, they would not be sufficient to even approach a true description of the rugged grandeur, solemn majesty, simple beauty, endless ferundity, inexhaustible wealth and enduring magnificence of the country that lies between San Diego, Calveston, Miami, New York, Boston, Cincinnati and Seattle. Happy are those who made the sacrifice necessary to attend the Ahepa Convention in Seattle. Not one of them has been heard to utter a word of complaint or regret.

The trip, while truly delightful, was far from being the "whole thing." The Convention was equally pleasant and crowded with joyful moments. Under the able leadership of Past Supreme Governor Thomas D. Lentgis. General Chairman of the Convention Committee, loyally and capably assisted by Past Supreme Governor, Dr. N. S. Checkos, District Governor E. T. Moriese, Chapter President Steve Anastos, and Brothers George Cotronis, Sam Pishue, George H. Pappas, Dr. George Chatalas, William Chatalas, Gus Gumas, Clarence Mandas, Mitchell P. Angel, John Lucas, Nick Zefkeles, Nick Carras and others, the subcommittees to which the sundry tasks and duties of the Convention were assigned, were well organized and functioned in clock-like precision.

We must, therefore, content ourselves with the broad but uncontradictable statement that every function for the Ahepans, the "Daughters," the "Maids" and the "Sons," was excellently conducted and immensely enjoyed by all participants.

Even though this Convention was held away up in the northeastern frontier corner of the United States, yet the magnetic power of the Ahepa was strong enough to attract a large number of notables from every part of the country-if not of the world. Most prominent among those who honored the occasion with their presence, besides the most Reverend Archbishop Athenagoras, were: His Excellency C. Diamantopoulos, Hellenic Envoy at Washington, D. C., with Mrs. Diamantopoulos; Mme Munir Ertegun, wife of the Turkish Ambassador to the U.S.; Hon. Elias Picheon, Royal Consul General of Helias at San Francisco with Mrs. Picheon; Mr. V. Vla-vianos, owner of the New York "National Herald," with Mrs. Vlavianos; Mr. E. Janetis, noted journalist and writer; Mr. A. Papulias, publisher of the Pacific Coast Review; Prof. Michael Dorizas of the University of Pennsylvania; Mr. Demetrios; Tofalus, fabulous strong man of Olympian Game fame, and Steve Katapothis ,the first and for a long time sole member of the Ahepa Chapter at Seattle. They added much to the dignity and prestige of the gathering.

Official Business

In the afternoon of Monday, August 12, 1940, the members of the Seventeenth Grand Convention were called to order in the Olympic Bowl of the Olympic Hotel by Supreme President V. I. Chebithes who, after a brief address of welcome, proceeded to receive the report of the previously-appointed Committee on Credentials and pave the way for organizing the Convention. The final report of the Committee's Chairman, Aleck Kuches, was that there were present and qualified to participate in the business of the Grand Convention: 8 Supreme Lodge officers (including the Special Supreme Governor for the Dominion of Canada), I Member of the Mother Lodge, 1 Past Supreme President, 13 District Governors and 179 delegates representing 110 chapters, 64 of the delegates having I vote and 92 of them having 1/2 vote each. The full voting strength of the Convention, therefore, was 133 votes. Following the acceptance of the report from the Credentials Committee, the Convention organized itself by electing George C. Vournas, Chairman; P. S. Marthakis, Vice-Chairman, and Peter T. Kourides, Secretary.

After hearing and receiving a report from each individual officer of the Supreme Lodge, the Supreme President of the Sons of Pericles, the Editor of THE AREPAN, the Superintendent of the Ahepa Sanatorium, and after examining the report of the anditors, and questioning the various officers connected with administration of Ahepa affairs, the Convention proceeded to study (sometimes by resolving itself into a committee of the whole and sometimes through special committees appointed for the purpose) the various phases of the business and problems of the Order, to seek ways and means of hettering its condition, and to make such provisions in its laws and policies as were calculated to aid the members to archieve the objectives of the fraternity.

It is neither feasible not desirable to narrate here the various and sondry proposals and counter-proposals which were presented during the week, or mention any part of the voluminous discussions and debates evoked by the different measures which were brought on the floor for consideration. The membership is more vitally interested in the net results in the grain which was garnered, rather than in what has been winnowed away with the chaff.

Therefore, the substance of the results achieved during the week of official study, deliberation, con-



templation, debate and parlance may be taken to be represented in the following paragraphs:

RESOLUTIONS — Appropriate resolutions endorsing the efforts of Congress to bolster up the defenses of America, urging complete preparedness in men and arms, regardless of cost or sacrifice, reaffirming the Ahepans' faith in and loyalty to America, and pledging the support of the entire Order of any legislation enacted to preserve the American philosophy of life were unanimously adopted and acclaimed.

Resolutions rededicating the Order and its members to the principles of democracy and human freedom, renouncing tyranny and despotism, and urging immediate aid to England in her struggle against the dictatorships were unanimously enacted.

The Convention also resolved that the Supreme Lodge appoint five members of the Order to be known as the "Ahepa Board of Education" whose function it shall be to devise ways and means to assist the schools. The functions and funds, if any, of this Eoard shall be subject to the supervisory authority of the Supreme Lodge.

Resolutions were also passed urging the establishment of a Federal Department of Education. The usual resolutions thanking all those who contributed towards the success of the Convention, those who honored it with their presence, and those who publicized its activities were also approved.

CONVENTION CITY—Cincinnati, Ohio, was chosen to be the meeting place of the Grand Convention in 1941.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS—The Constitution was amended to provide that:

a. No Supreme Lodge, nor any officer thereof, nor any other officer or member of the Fraternity, shall have the right or power, except by authority of the Grand Convention to transfer more than 25% from one designated fond to another. The penalty for violation of this provision being removal from office and possible expulsion from the Order.

b. The Supreme President, Supreme Treasurer and Executive Secretary shall be bonded in the sum of \$10,000 each, and shall not be eligible to assume their respective offices until such bonds have been furnished and approved.

c. No person shall be eligible to hold any office of a District Lodge, unless he shall have previously served in an elective office of a Chapter. District or the Supreme Lodge. The office of a delegate to a District or National Convention of the Order is not considered an "elective office" within the meaning of this amendment. And hereafter no person shall hold more than one elective office at one and the same time in this Order.

d. The immediate retiring District Governor shall be a member of his District Convention following his retirement, and shall have the right to speak and vote therein, provided that he is in good standing with the Order.

 All members of the District Lodge shall have the right to participate and site in the District Convention.

6. A retiring Supreme President who has served one full term shall have the right to attend the Grand Convention of the Order immediately following his retirement, with the right to deliberate and cust his vote, and his expenses within the jurisdiction of the Order, to, from and while attending such Convention shall be paid from the Supreme Treasury of

the Order. All other Past Supreme Presidents shall have the right to attend the National Convention and take part in the deliberations thereof, and be entitled to cast their vote, at their own expense, provided, however, that all such Past Supreme Presidents shall be in good standing with their Chapters.

g. Any gift or donation, or any appropriation in excess of \$200 for any other purpose except the operating expenses of the Fraternity and the Junior Order of the Sons of Perioles shall require a two-thirds vote of the National Convention.

h. Delinquent members complying with the requirements for reinstatement shall be reinstated only by majority vote of the Chapter.

i. Every candidate initiated into the Order of Ahepa shall, in addition to the oath prescribed in Article XIX, Sec. 2, receive the following oath: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one Nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

j. No Supreme Lodge, nor any Supreme Lodge Officer or any other person, shall have the right to pay any money or moneys to the family of a deceased brother or to the beneficiary designated by the deceased brother, or to any other person, from the Ahepa Emergency Fund unless the following requirements and conditions shall have been complied with as a condition of payment:

(a) A letter signed by the Chapter President and Chapter Secretary certifying that a brother from the Chapter has died; that he was in good standing with the Chapter continuously for the twelve months immediately preceding his death, and that he was of a certain age at the time of his initiation or reinstatement, as the case may be; and

(b) A certified copy of the certificate of death; and

(c) A certified copy of the appointment of an administrator or executor in the event no beneficiary is designated.

ATHLETICS—The Convention adopted the following recommendations submitted by the Committee on Athletics:

1. That Chapters encourage lighter forms of athletic activities for the women of our Ahepan family. 2. That all Chapters adopt some form of sports program. 3. That District Conventions set aside a part of the program for the honoring of selected athletes. 4. That all district lodges encourage participation in National Athletic Tournaments or Competitions.

And that the Supreme Lodge he authorized and directed to appoint a National Director of Athletics who, in turn, shall appoint as many Assistant Directors as he may see fit, with full power to revoke the appointment and make new appointments if the original appointees are not fit or refuse to do the work, and that the several zone directors, together with the National Director of Athletics, shall get in touch with the District Convention Committees ann outline to them a program whereby they may have some sort of Athletic activities during the week of the District Convention; and that at the same time the National Director shall get in touch with the National Convention Committee and arrange with them to have as many athletic activities as they think feasible during the week of the National Convention. on such terms and under such conditions as the National Director and the Committee may SONS OF PERICLES—The recommendations of the Committee on this subject to abolish the Supreme Council and National Congress of the Sons and substitute in lieu thereof a National Governing Board to be appointed by the Supreme Lodge were approved by the Convention.

DAUGHTERS OF PENELOPE—With regard to the Daughters of Penelope, the following recommendations were unanimously adopted:

"That the incoming Supreme Lodge of the Order of Ahepa at their earliest possible convenience study the Constitution of the Daughters of Penelope and legislation passed by them at their Convention in Seattle, and approve or revise accordingly in keeping with Sections 1 and 2 of Article XXXIV and Article XXXVI of the Ahepa Constitution; that upon the adoption of the Constitution of the Daughters of Penelope the Supreme Lodge shall circularize the Chapters of the Order of Ahepa, explaining to them the exact relationship between the Ahepa chapters and the Chapters of the Daughters of Penelope with a view to insuring closer coordination and harmony and that the Daughters of Penelope present a yearly officers' report to the Ahepa National Con-

MAIDS OF ATHENS—The status of this auxiliary remains as it was before the Convention.

APPROPRIATIONS - Approximately \$23,-000.00 were appropriated for the operating expenses of the Supreme Lodge and the National Headquarters and \$5,000 for the Na-tional Convention. The Convention also appropriated about \$7,000.00 for gifts and donations to various institutions, causes and per-This includes a \$1,000.00 donation to sons. the Theological School at Pomfret (in addition to the \$1,000.00 donated by members of the Order in the Convention Hall), \$1,700 to finish paying for the Samuel Gridley Howe Memorial on the Brown University Campus at Providence, R. I., \$500.00 to the Hellenic Red Cross, matched with an equal amount of personal contributions by Ahepans in the Convention Hall; \$2,000.00 for the Sons of Pericles, \$1,000.00 for Athletics, \$250.00 for a special scholarship to a blind boy-Len Pappas of St. Louis, and a number of smaller donations.

NATIONAL PROJECTS—The following recommendations submitted by the Committee on this subject were adopted:

(a) To continue the present system of administering the Ahepa Emergency Fund. (b) To appoint a Committee to study the insurance plan outlined in the report of the Supreme Secretary. (c) To leave the continuation of Scholarship Awards to the discretion of the Supreme Lodge. (d) To authorize the Supreme Lodge to create a Committee or agency to receive throughout the year collections and donations for any Ahepa National projects in existence today.

"I. That the Managing Editor of the Magazine be selected by the Supreme Lodge. It is also recommended that the Advertising Manager of the Magazine be appointed by the Supreme Lodge.

"2. That the Magazine be continued as a bi-monthly publication until such time that twenty-five per cent of the space is taken by paid advertisements, and at no time shall the publication exceed thirty-two printed pages including the cover, except when needed for paid advertisements.

"3. That the Magazine have a self-cover and a better quality paper be used. This, we feel, will result in a saving of \$200 per issue.

"4. That the Magazine Editor immediately upon assuming office print in the Magazine in bold type to the effect that no picture will be accepted unless accompanied with money to cover cost of the cut.

"5. That no more than four full pages be allowed for pictures and that only one page of this be allocated to the discretion of the Supreme Lodge, for which they will not be charged. We wish to firmly state that the cuts for the other three pages must and should be paid for.

"6. We reaffirm the recommendation of last year's Magazine Committee to the effect that material appearing in the Magazine must be of educational, civic, economic and business interest. Further, that the members of the Order be constantly reminded to mention Tun. American when dealing with prospective national advertisers and to assist in procuring such.

"7. That should it be necessary to exceed the 32-page limit in order to promote any Ahepa national project or activity, same shall be charged for the actual cost and not an arbitrary amount. In the printing of special Convention or Excursion Issues other means must be found to cover the cost, such as asking the steamship company for advertisements in liru of some of the complimentary tickets and asking the Convention hotels to contribute in the form of advertisements."

THE AHEPA NATIONAL SANATORIUM

With reference to this institution the Convention enacted legislation and approved measures as follows:

"I. That the Sanatorium be kept as an Ahepa National Sanatorium.

"2. That the Supreme Lodge be authorized to negotiate the purchase of the property where the Sanatorium is located as soon as conveniently possible, in such corporate name as the Supreme Lodge may see fit and proper.

"3. The Supreme Lodge is to be in full charge of the Sanatorium.

"4. All funds collected or derived from any source or to be collected or derived from any source for the Sanatorium shall be immediately turned over to the Supreme Lodge to be used for the purposes for which they were collected.

Grace. Grit and Gumption

THE WATCHWORD, password and keyword to success in any undertaking is one and the same—"Progress." The progressive man keeps his feet on solid ground, his hands firmly gripped to the present, his eves keenly fixed on the future, and his heart attuned to the rhythm of marching time. He never waits for an opportunity to "happen" along. He goes where he reasons it should be and if it fails to meet him there he creates one out of nothing but his will and determination to gain his goal.

Men of this type and stamp—fearless pioneers and daring pathfinders though rare in less selective groups, are far from being scarce in the ranks of our Order. Some few of these are more or less widely known, but there are many of whose progress and achievements in various fields of endeavor the general public should be better informed. This Aherran has appropriated the just pride and genuine pleasure of introducing such progressive Ahepans to its readers, and opens the series with the presentation of Brother Louis Preonas of Dayton, Ohio, whose success in the pie-haking business has excited the wonder and won the admiration of all who know him.

Brother Preonas is a native of Thessaly, came to America while yet in his 'teens and has given a good account of himself during his sojourn in this country.

The story of his early life in the United States, checkered with sunshine and shadows, marches and retreats, trials and triumphs, strifes and struggles, successes and disappointments, does not differ very greatly from that of thousands of other immigrants who came to the New World under similar circumstances and conditions. Those who left their homes and families and came here to establish new ones, and at the same time exact means of subsistence for themselves and their loved ones, met up with difficulties which put their fibre and mettle to the acid test.

So, while it would be extremely interesting, it would not be new or different to relate that Brother Presonas was born in a small, primitive village of an ancient province in the old world to a family of moderate means; that he had no play times in childhood and no comforts or luxuries in adolescence; that he grew up knowing nothing but the elementary principles of education, austerity of his parents and teachers,

The old immigrants of the late 18 and the early 19 hundreds might be

The old immigrants of the late 18 and the early 19 hundreds might be made to remember their own experiences, but would not be surprised to read that he had to put in long hours at menial tasks for a pittance of 3 or 4 dollars per week, that he had to share his small room with two or three others, wash and mend his own clothes and, in short, was compelled by stern necessity to do some high thinking and the simplest of simple living to "get by" and keep well.

Every entered apprentice from Hellas to learn the art of living in America 30 or 40 years ago was compelled to undergo severe tests. Every "student" who entered America's "University of Hard Knocks," in any "class" between 1890 and 1910, seeking the high degree of American citizenship had to put up with an awful lot of hazing by the "upper classmen" and post-graduates of this famous institution who thought it smart to abuse, ridicule and exploit the "freshmen" from across the seas. They all suffered, but few of them endured through their hardships, overcame their difficulties, survived their ordeals and climbed high on the ladder of fame and fortune.

Brother Preonas is one of those few who succeeded. He entered the race at the same point with the others, played the game according to the rules and asked for no handicap. He had no more money, no greater business training, no higher education and no more of an "Uncle in Corona" than the average immigrant from Hellas in his day.

Brother Preonas, however, did and continues to have an inexhaustible supply of grace, grit and gumption. The first element is from God and his parents. It is the priceless gift of good health—a "sound mind in a sound body." He inherited it, preserved it and used, but did not "ab-use" it. The second element, grit, is unyielding, unrelenting courage; intestinal fortitude; in prize-ring parlance, plain "guts." The third element, gumption, is nothing more nor less than every-day common sense; that native instinct or intuition which enables plain men and women to tell good from bad, right from wrong, the way to success from the way to failure.

Equipped with an abundant supply of these invaluable ingredients, grace, grit and gumption, as his only stock in trade. Brother Preonas proceeded to use them as his only tools to carse out a place for himself under the American sun. He chose baking as the field of his endeavors. It required courage, ability, sound, sensible and solver management; devotion to duty, sacrifice and self-denial—of which Brother Preonas had in superabundance and gave cheerfully to his business, to his employees and to his customers. Sons National Set-up Altered: Ahepa Gives Decision at Meeting

A new structural set-up, nationally, has been given the Junior Order, by which the National Congress, Supreme Council, and Supreme Advisory Board have been abolished, and a new national governing board initiated.

The Governing Board will be composed of three Ahepans, who will be under the supervision of the Supreme Lodge of Ahepa, which body will appoint the Board. The Sons will also have a National President, four National Governors, and an Executive Secretary at Headquarters, all of whom will be appointed by the National Governing Board. The Board is intended as a body to determine the policies and to help formulate the plans for the Junior

The National Governing Board, as announced by the Supreme Lodge of the Ahepa, is as follows: Senior Brother Stanley Stacy of Milwaukee, Wisc., Chairman; Senior Brother John Thevos, Paterson, N. J., Vice-Chairman; Senior Brother George C. Peterson, San Francisco, Calif., Treasurer.

The four National Governors will be announced shortly. The Chairman of the National Governing Board will serve for three years, the Vice-Chairman for two years, and the Treasurer for one year. In this manner, there will be a new appointment each year, to the Board. After the first year of operation, all appointments will be for three years, to maintain the rotation of appointments.

The National President is Nicholas L Strike, past Supreme President. George J. Leber is the Executive Secretary. These appointments were made by the Supreme Lodge of the Ahepa.

The new plan alters only the national set-up. There are no changes in the District organization set-up. In fact, under the new plan, districts will be given a more intensive program than ever before.

The decision of the Supreme Lodge of the Ahepa, approving of the new plan offered by the Grand Convention of Ahepa at Seattle in August, was made at its meeting in Washington, D. C., on September 21.

Greece had hoosted the price of her attempted invasion to heights beyond the reach of her would-be-invaders, had driven them from her sacred soil in headlong flight toward the sea, deflated the bloated ego of an arrogant dictator and started him tumbling toward the dismal abyss of ignoble oblivion, had definitely taken the offensive and, with sturdy guts, barefeet and bayonette, blazed the way to glorious victory-all in less than four weeks!

When it was learned that the world's champion back stabber was out stilettoing for Greece, her friends sadly, tearfully and reluctantly gave her less than four weeks in which to share the fate of Ethiopia and Albania. They were helplessly resigned to the foregone conclusion that Bully Brigand Benito would make good his threat to "break her back." It seems that neither the friends of Greece nor the Italian stiletto-wielder ever thought that Greece might turn her breast instead of her back to meet the assault of the maladroit marauder. Well, she did turn, and with fixed bayonette faced her would-be despoiler! Blustering Benito was not prepared for a fair fight; he had not the intestinal fortitude to face the gleam of cold steel clutched in steady hands of a brave soldier fighting for home, country and the ancient and unsullied honor of illustrious ancestors; and, as is often the case of bully who meets determined resistance of superior intelligence, he turned and fled, seeking to avoid the righteous wrath of an aroused and enraged country.

In the grand drama recently enacted on the stormswept tops, around the jaggy crags and cliffs and in the narrow, snow-glutted passes of proud Pindus, the Greeks, fighting against odds which most people were led to believe insuperable, have thrilled their friends, bewildered their enemies to point of helplessness, astonished the curious hystanders, and won the respect, wonder and admiration of all. Their brave and tenacious defense of the land where they and their children were born, where their dead sleep and where they, too, shall be buried; their valiant fight for the preservation of their national honor, liberty and independence; have proved beyond every shadow of doubt that the courage and Thermopylae, Marathon, Platea and Salamis, still lives in the Greeks of today.

The "dauntless dash," the "gallantry of soul," the "amazing hardihood," the thousand and one soldierly qualities ascribed to the Greeks by the eve-witnesses of these epic events are neither new nor strange to those who are familiar with Hellenic history, attributes and traditions. That same nobility of heroism which, time and again, inspired their long line of progenitors to undergo the darkness of sorrow, to endure the years of strife and to drink deep of the Cup of Gethsemane that their ideals of freedom and justice might live, is now inspiring, enthusing and sustaining the Greeks in this struggle.

It has always been so with the Greeks. From time immemorial, liberty has been enthroned in their mountains, they drank freedom as from a cup, shouted deafening defiance to despotism's banded myriads, trooped to battle as to a dance, and crowded their way to death as to a festival.

From ancient times, it has been the misfortune of the Greeks to be surrounded by barbarian neighbors who were conscious of strength and forgetful of right. This compelled them to be always on the alert: "eternal vigilance," said they, "is the price of liberty." They placed no confidence in the secret artifices of war, but relied upon the native fires of their souls; upon the dauntless courage of their hearts; upon the unconquerable force of their inbred love for their home and country.

As they were outnumbered by the hordes of Xerxes so are they now by the motley mobs of Mussolini. And, as they then relied upon and won by the superiority of their strategism, courage and intellect, so are they now relying upon the same attributes and winning by the same tokens. They consider a truly great military leader, not the swelled-chested, pin-headed braggadocio, but the calm, cool and collected soldier who possesses the skill and intelligence to foresee the motives, explore the intrigues and outwit the craft of the enemy-when the enemy displays signs of possessing craft and wit.

By every rule of logic and reason, Mussolini and his confidants, if he dares have any, should have known the reaction and anticipated the results of an attack upon Greece. He admits that the Greeks are extremely sensitive about the subject of their independence and would rather die, to their last man, woman and child, than surrender one whit of their liberty to the Italians. Yet, he expected to intimidate them into subjugation without a struggle. When the Italians marched into Greece and met no opposition they were too dumb to suspect a trap. but screamed of "gains with the scared Greeks fleeing in great disorder before them!" When the trap was sprung and the "bearded ladies of hell" fell upon them, valor of their ancestors in classic times, the spirit of they threw away their arms and surrendered. Then Verginio became more circumspect in his claims—he confined himself to speaking of "brilliant reconnaissance" and of what may soon be expected. He didn't say that the Italians would be home by Christmas, but they will, at the rate they are "advancing" towards the mainland of Italy.

A casual glance at the record of the Imperial Wizard of the Palazzo Venezia shows that his crystal gazing is a bit off center-his guessing average is pretty low. He guessed the Germans would lord it over England within a month after the fall of France; now he finds that he entered the war years-not months-too soon. In fact he is beginning to think it was a bad mistake for him to enter at all. Rumor has it that Hitler now shares that feeling. He guessed that he could march from Lybia to the Suez. He did not see in the crystal the British men of war dropping shells on his troops, but they were there and did. That stalled the campaign in the desert. He guessed that his bombers could share in the raids against England, but he forgot to train them for the job-British resistance reminded him of the oversight so he withdrew them. Then came his super stupid guess that Greece would bend the knee and bow her head in submission as soon as a bargeful of Italians crossed the Adriatic!

Mussolini does not now have to guess that the Greeks are in Albania to stay and that British planes will soon be flying from there to Italy; that the realization of his dreams about Nice, Corsica, Tunisia, and Marseilles will be postponed—perhaps indefinitely; that his days on the Duodecanese are fewer than the hairs on his head; that his supply of raw materials and a large percentage of his foodstuffs depend upon the willingness of Hitler to dole them out to him; in fact, braying Benito's lot is not a very enviable one at this time.

Be it as it may with the vexed little end of the nefarious Axis, the big end is still formidable and it might sacrifice some of its own resources rather than risk the complete collapse of the little end. It is against that eventuality that Greece must prepare now.

Greece, like Britain, has refused to grovel at the feet of the dictators; has refused to surrender her principles; has refused to die, and has become another bulwark in the chain of defenses for the Americas. By this action she has incurred the wrath and has been made the target of the totalitarian powers. She has proved that she "can take it" as well as "dish it out." The score is most decidedly in her favor, although the odds are overwhelmingly against her. Her "head is bloody but unbowed."

It is elementary logic to say that an ever-increasing number of man-power, bombing planes, tanks, destroyers, submarines and other deadly machines of war hurled against her will render it extremely difficult for her to sustain her pace or hold her ground, even with the greatest human gallantry and sacrifice. She must strike again and again.

Therefore, it is imperative that Greece be helped with all speed and courage. She shares with Britain the right

to call upon the Americas for help. She needs swift and effective aid. She has said so in all frankness—and must have it now if she is to escape the fate of Finland. Let us show the gratitude in our hearts for little Greece who has shown her determination to fight on to death for the truths of God and the rights of human beings as set forth in the American Declaration of Independence.

Hon. William H. King, U. S. Senator from Utah, Speaks in Behalf of Greece

On November 15, 1940, Senator William H. King of Utah, a long standing friend of Greece and her people delivered the following address in the Senate of the United States:

WAR BETWEEN ITALY AND GREECE

Mr. KING. Mr. President, I have left the chair and have taken my place upon the floor for the purpose of submitting a few observations concerning the wanton, unprovoked, and cowardly attack upon Greece by Mussolini and his military forces. Evidences are accumulating that four great powers are executing a conspiracy aimed at the destruction of all democratic nations, and a division of the world among the conspirators. Italy, under this plan, is to control the Mediterranean and North Africa and to have her seizure of Albania confirmed and her attack upon Greece approved.

Mussolini assembled a large military force and launched a vigorous attack upon Greece. Undoubtedly he has the support of Hitler, and expected an easy conquest; but the Greeks of today, like the Greeks of earlier days, love freedom and liberty, and though attacked by powerful foes they are courageously and heroically defending their territory against the foul and barbarous assaults of

Mussolini.

I cannot help but believe that this attack upon Greece was not understood by the mass of the Italian people. They have not been the enemies of Greece; indeed, there have been friendly relations between the people of Italy and the people of Greece. During the World War Italy was attacked by the powerful military machine The Italian people repelled these assaults made of the Kaiser. upon it and welcomed the cooperation of the Greeks when they entered the conflict upon the side of the Allies. There were ties of friendship forged in that memorable conflict and there was every reason to believe, as well as to hope, that those ties would not be broken; but now Mussolini, with his military cabal, has attempted to invade Greece and has declared that his legions would speedily conquer a brave and heroic people who for centuries have defended democratic principles and have raised high the standard of culture and of civilization.

The news which comes to us of the invasion demonstrates the courage and the valor of the Greek forces. The bleak and icy hills along the Albanian and Greek border give evidence of the courage and the valor of the Greeks. They repelled the invaders whose ranks were scattered and broken, and thousands of Italian assailants met death face to face in the mountain fastnesses.

I am reminded of the words spoken by Lord Byron at Missolonghi on January 22, 1824. He, as we all know, gave support to the Greeks in the conflict in which they were then engaged in the defense of their country. We remember his words:

> The sword, the banner, and the field. Glory and Greece, around me see! The Spartan, horne upon his shield, Was not more free.

Awake! Not Greece—she is awake! Awake, my spirit! Think through whom Thy lifeblood tracks its parent lake, And then strike home!

Seek out—less often sought than found— A soldier's grave, for thee the best; Then look around and choose thy ground, And take thy rest.

the descendants of those of whom Byron spoke in 1924, in their brilliant delense against Mussolini's forces of aggression.

It is an inspiration to us all to know that the descendants of the fighters of Marathon have taken an irrevocable and unwavering stand, with no fear or thought of risks and dangers. The foe was at their border, invading their homes and altars; that was enough. He had to be resisted, and he is being resisted most bravely.

There is a historical parallel to that invasion. Signor Mussolini has made the same mistake that the King-Emperor of Persia made nearly two and one-half thousand years ago. The Persian King felt that the Greeks would be put to flight at the very sight of his legions; but Marathon is an eternal monument to his folly. is with Mussolini. He felt that the Greeks in the Pindus Mountains would fall back and raise the white flag, or that some forces within the nation would bring about an appeasement. He, too, has received a bitter lesson. There has been no appeasement in Greece. There has been no withdrawal. The voices of the counselors of defeatism have been silenced and drowned by the epic battle of the Greek soldiers in the mountain passes.

The parallel may be carried further: The triumph of the Greek armies during the Persian Wars resulted in a democracy and the development of the civilization in which we live. The struggle now going on in the mountains of Epirus may be the long-awaited favorable omen, and the dawn of the day of democracy's triumph every-

As I have indicated, the invasion of Greece is but a part of the conspiracy of those who seek the destruction of democratic nations. and there are many who believe that the outcome of this almost world-wide conflagration will determine whether democracy shall continue to be a living force or whether it shall be replaced by tyranny. Democracy as never before is engaged in a life and death struggle, the extent of which is globe-wide. It is not only that blood is being shed on the battlefields of Greece, England, and China for the preservation of democratic ideals; sacrifices are being made everywhere, even within Germany and Italy, as well as among the people of the conquered nations.

At this crucial time, however, the Greek nation with its valiant defenders in Epirus is enhancing the morale of the forces of democracy everywhere. Each day records successful efforts to repel the assaults of the invaders and furnishes conclusive evidence of the heroic qualities and patriotic efforts of those who are defend-The press carries reports of the disordered retreat of the invaders, of the demoralization of their ranks, and of the capture of large numbers of Italian combat forces, and of the large number of lifeless bodies which cover hills and valleys and moun-

tain fastness

James Aldridge, an American reporter of standing and ability, in his dispatch appearing in the New York Times, of the 14th instant, writes from the battlefield and recounts the annihilation of one of the Italian divisions. Many of the hundreds captured and killed were Italian peasants, led to a tragic end by one greedy for power and indifferent to the rights of human beings. Mr. Aldridge's dispatch is as follows:

The story of the trapped division is probably already famous in the outside world. It is known how the Greeks allowed the Alpini division to enter the pass, how a relief column was also permitted to come in, how both ends of the pass were blocked by heavy weapons, and how the Greeks from vantage points on the mountainside poured hell into the Italians strung along beneath them on the

valley road.

"The slaughter was terrific. Now the battlefield resembles Guada lajara. It begins on a rise, with a solitary Italian soldier stretched out in the mud. He lay right on top of the rise, with his chest and head smashed by machine-gun bullets. His tin hat had leaped off his head when he fell and lay brim down in a muddy hole yards ahead. Nobody bothered to move him for quite a while.

The Italian dead in the woods were practically always in groups and they were spread out or heaped on dry leaves in awkward shapes. Twice there were bayonet attacks by the Greeks in the earliest battle for the pass, one at the rear and one from a rocky crag that hangs over a slope in a great sweep to the road.

Most of the Italians did not even have bayonets fixed to their rifles, so they could not do much anyway, but there are unsheathed

bayonets lying around everywhere.

"Occasionally off to the northwest one can still hear the bark of mountain artiflers. Here and there are small groups of ruddyfaced, unshaven Greek soldiers cleaning up the mess or marching with fixed buyanets. Some of these have got grenades now, which they did not have before. The captured Italian equipment is already being used by the Greeks.

They have all died with their faces in the mud. their gloved hands stretched out before them in the red, wet earth, and with smashed equipment around them. Small defensive positions made out of rock were blown sky high by shells. Great coils of field telephone wire in confusion are tied up with the sprawling figures.

'One dead Roman had his arms locked around a tree as he died. Some young boys lay with their trousers still creased and their tin hats smashed in. Dead horses were under the trees. There was much paper scattered around from the soldiers' pockets and pictures of their mothers, wives, and habies were now a dirty, yellow

mess in the red mud of the road."

But Greece is a small nation of 7,000,000 or so. It lacks the industrial base and material resources to effectively carry out a long and bitter campaign against Mussolini. Mussolini todayand most certainly against Hitler on the morrow-because Hitler. it may be truthfully said, is the guiding spirit in the attacks which are being made upon European nations. It was he who destroyed Austria, and Poland, and Norway, and Holland, and Belgium, and France, and who, uniting with Stalin, seeks the conquest of all democratic nations. Heroic England protects the torch of civili-zation from those who would extinguish it in the English Channel and the British Isles, and her assistance to the heroic Greek nation must necessarily have limitations; but it may be said that Great Britain and Greece today are courageously fighting for humanity and for civilization.

In this hour of world crisis, when the fate of democracy and those things which we hold dear are at stake, what will be the attitude of this, the world's greatest nation, in industrial and moral strength and power? Greece and Great Britain are struggling against mighty foes to defend the cause of justice and freedom and liberty not only in their own lands but throughout the world. What, in this tragic hour, is the duty or the obligation of America? Certainly not to remain silent until democratic nations are destroyed and the forces of evil are directed against our shores. Are e to remain mute when words of encouragement mean much in fortifying the spirit of the defenders of freedom and democracy? Our contributions will not be merely words but material aid. Do we realize that the bitter struggle in the mountain of Epirus and the English Channel is essentially the same fight that this Republic may be called upon to continue if the gallant and heroic defenders perish?

Senators will recall the attitude of President Monroe, Webster, Clay, and Calhoun, and other great American statesmen, when Greece was lighting for independence more than a hundred years ago. Then the bravery and the heroism of the Greeks aroused the enthusiasm of the American people, who urged not only moral support but material aid in order that the Greeks might achieve inde President Monroe, in his message to Congress on De-

pendence. cember 2, 1823, said:

"A strong hope has been long entertained, founded on the heroic struggle of the Greeks, that they would succeed in their contest and resume their equal station among the nations of the earth. It is believed that the whole civilized world take a deep interest in their welfare. Although no power was declared in their fasor, yet none, according to our information, has taken part against them. Their cause and their name have protected them from dangers which might ere this have overwhelmed any other people. ordinary calculations of interest and of acquisition with a view to aggrandizement, which mingles so much in the transactions of na tions, seems to have had no effect in regard to them. From the facts which have come to our knowledge, there is good cause to believe that their enemy has lost forever all dominion over them; that Greece will become again an independent nation. may obtain that rank is the object of our most ardent wishes.

Greece has, for years, enjoyed independence and has exhibited those great qualities of mind that gave preeminence to Greece for centuries before and after the Christian era. Greece seeks no conquest; she desires peace and to occupy an bonored position in the council of nations. She is guilty of no offense; and yet, as I have indicated, a greedy and ruthless dictator seeks her destruction and the enslavement of her people. Only vesterday we read in the morning press that Molotov, representing Stalin, conferred with Hitler; and doubtless representatives of other members at the Axis were in the offing. India is to be allocated to Stalin; Mussolini is to have a free hand in the Mediterranean; and Hitler is to be the overlord of Europe. Japan, now a silent partner, is to extend her authority over the greater part of Asia.

Mr. President, dark clouds overhang the world, and if the democratic nations should be destroyed, the Western Hemisphere would be the object against which the Axis Powers would direct their

efforts.

I heartily approve of the statements made by the President in his Columbus Day address at Dayton, Ohio, on October 12. Among

other things he said:

"We are building a total defense on land and sea and in the air sufficient to repel attack from any part of the world. Forewarned by the deliberate attacks of the dictators upon free peoples, the United States for the first time in its history has undertaken the mustering of its men in peacetime."

He further stated:

"No combination of dictator countries of Europe and Asia will halt us in the path we see ahead for ourselves and for democracy. No combination of dictator countries of Europe and Asia will stop the help we are giving to almost the last free people fighting to hold them at bay."

He further stated:

"We will continue to help those who resist aggression and who now hold the aggressors far from our shores."

The President further added:

"It can no longer be disputed that forces of evil which are bent on conquest of the world will destroy whomever and whenever they can destroy. We have learned the lessons of recent years. We know now that if we seek to appease them by withholding aid from those who stand in their way we only hasten the day of their attack

Great Britain and Greece are being assailed by the Axis Powers. They stand in the way of the mad ambitions of such powers, who desire to crush every free people and destroy the democratic forces

throughout the world.

I sincerely hope that the Members of this legislative body will lift their voices, as did Webster, Clay, and Calhoun, in the defense of liberty, and that they will properly appraise the responsibilities resting upon them and upon our country, and support measures that will afford assistance to those peoples and countries who are now fighting for liberty and for civilization.

It is our hope that the Greek spirit will continue undaunted before the Fascist legions, adding pages of glory to its noble history. We know that it will; but if insurmountable obstacles and forces overwhelm and crush them, then in our sorrow we will recall Tennyson's tribute to them in his immortal Ulysses:

> We are not now that strength which in old days Moved earth and heaven; that which we are, we are; One equal temper of heroic hearts, Made weak by time and fate, but strong in will To strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield.

Senator King Again, November 19, 1940, Spoke in the Senate as Follows:

AMERICAN AID TO GREECE

Mr. KING. Mr. President, on the 15th instant I addressed the Senate concerning the unprovoked aggression upon Greece by Mussolini. I called attention to the former friendship between Greece and Italy when Greece associated herself with the Allies in the World War. Italy then was glad to have the assistance of the valiant and intrepid Greeks. They rendered important aid in the World War. We all know that Italy is the beneficiary of classical Greece. Her literature and in part her laws, her civilization, stemmed largely from Greece. There can be no justification for the assault which Italy is now making upon Greece.

It has been suggested that Mussolini and Hitler and Stalin have agreed upon the division not only of Europe but of other parts of the world; and perhaps to Italy has been allocated the task of destroying Greece. I can only say that she will have an impossible task, notwithstanding the heast of Mussolini that he will destroy Greece and annihilate Great Britain. This hoast of Mussolini's is not creditable to him; indeed, it reveals a mentality reminiscent of

the Dark Ages, when nations and peoples received "stalss in the

In my address I quoted from a dispatch by Mr. Aldridge, a representative of the New York Times, in which he described the battle then raging between the Greek and Italian forces. I am happy to learn that the Greek resistance against the invader continues most favorably.

Another point that has afforded satisfaction to the friends of Greece and of democracy is found in the fact that the Albanian people, who were subjugated by Italy, are not responding as Mussolini would desire, to his demands, and that Albanians are organizing themselves to throw off the Italian yoke. The New York Times reports from Istanbul, under the date line of November 16, that the consul general of Albania in that city has called on all Albanians resident in Turkey to report in order that they may organize themselves into a fighting unit on the side of the Greeks and against the Italians.

In the mountain fastnesses of Albania and Greece the conflict etween the Italian and Greek forces is continuing; and the hero-

between the Italian and Greek forces is continuing; and the heroism and courage and successes of Greece have won the admiration of all democratic nations. The conduct of the Greek forces is reminiscent of the bravery and courage of the Greeks at Thermopylae and Salamis. But we are advised of the fact that the Greeks are lacking in military equipment and are in need of medical supplies, food, and clothing. We are cognizant of the fact that Greece depends on the outside world for 60 per cent of her food supplies and many of her necessities. It is therefore imperative that the friends of Greece should take cognizance of her need and exert themselves to meet her urgent requirements.

I note an appeal made by Elias Krimbas, Minister of Public Welfare for Greece, addressed to the United States, imploring the immediate dispatch of a list of necessities. Here is a partial list:

"Powdered milk, cocoa, various meat extracts, flannel and woolen goods for adults and children, clothing of any kind, raincoats, and tents. In the field of medicine, cod-liver oil, iodine, iodoform and antitetanus, antimeningitis, antigangrene, antistreptococcus, antidysentery, antidiphtheria serums, and antiseptic gauze, bandages, surgical instruments, and installations. In addition to that, due to the destruction by Italian aviators of agricultural products stored in warrhouses, the following foods are needed: Rice, tea. coffee, sugar, canned goods, dry beans and peas."

In order that immediate relief may be provided, a committee composed of some of our public-spirited citizens, together with members of the Order of Ahepa, a fraternal organization of Americans of Greek ancestry, to whose ranks a great number of citizens of non-Hellenic ancestry belong, have organized a relief association which will conduct a systematic campaign which will bring to the American people the needs of Greece, and effect such organization as may be necessary to obtain the desired relief. Harold S. Vanderbilt, Richard Mellon and Winthrop Aldrich—to name only a few—have already enlisted their services in this worthy cause.

I may add that I should consider it a privilege to aid the organization in its worthy efforts, and I have no doubt that others in the legislative and other branches of the Government will do likewise.

It has been suggested by some who are well acquainted with the former Minister of Greece, Mr. Demetrios Sicilianos, that he be assigned an important part in organizing and extending relief throughout Greece. While Minister of Greece in the United States, he was universally respected; and American citizens who are desirous of aiding Greece will be glad if he is actively associated with the relief organization formed in the United States.

It is known that in many of the universities and other educational institutions there are Greek-letter fraternities and sororities; and it is believed that they will be responsive to the needs of Greece in this hour, and will associate themselves with local or other organizations engaged in obtaining funds and supplies great-

ly needed by Greece at this time.

In this dark hour for the democratic nations, Great Britain and Greece are valorously and heroically combating the forces of evil and tyranny. The people of America cannot be otherwise than deeply concerned in the contest, and I feel sure they will extend not only their sympathy but their aid to Greece and to Great Britain, who, as I have indicated, are upholding the cause of freedom, and who almost alone are fighting against assaults by nations which seek to impose despotic rule upon the world.

The dictators' challenge to democracy is world-wide, and the struggle is indivisible. It is believed by many that the security of



Ahepans in Canada Loyal to the Cause Raise Money for Mother England-Praised by Prime Minister

Regina, Saskatchewan, Dominion of Canada-George Plasteras. Secretary Royal Canadian District No. 24 of the Order of Ahepa dispatched the following message to Prime Minister Right Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King of Canada:

"DEAR MR. PRIME MINISTER:-

"Western Canadians of Greek birth or descent have been interested in this war from the beginning, and from the beginning our hopes and prayers have centered on victory for the British allies. We are personally interested in the maintenance of Democracy, for it is back to our beloved Athens of ancient times that civilization goes for its first experiment in the democratic system.

We have endeavored to support Canada's effort in this war by playing our part in the payment of war taxes and by subscriptions to various war charity campaigns as they have presented themselves. But it has been our desire to go a little further than this. Accordingly, we enclose a bank money order for \$1,860.00, to be applied by you to the prosecution of the war on Canada's part as you may think best.

"This money has been subscribed by members of the Anglo-Hellenic-Educational-Progressive Association, known as the Order of Ahepa, in the three prairie provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, and by other western Canadians of Greek origin.

"We join with you, Sir, in the hope that. ere long, bright days will descend upon the

allied military effort. Meanwhile, "God save the King," and may we all pull together for Canadian unity and for victory which inevitably must accrue to the just cause for which we fight in this struggle.

Mackenzie King's Reply

"DEAR MR. PLASTERAS:

"I have received your letter of October the 10th and send the cordial thanks of the government of Canada to the members of the Order of Ahepa, for their generous gift of \$1,860 towards the prosecution of Canada's war effort. I have forwarded your cheque to the Minister of Finance.

"My colleagues and I are deeply grateful to the Western Canadians of Greek birth and descent whom you represent, for so splendid an expression of their hopes and prayers for the victory of Canada and Great Britain.

"At this time, when Greece, an ancient source of liberty and freedom is again threatened, the people of Canada will learn with deep satisfaction that their fellow citizens of Greek descent hold honourably and steadfastly to the example so nobly set by their forefathers.

W. L. MACKENZIE KING."

mortal clay. And with a bit of luck, they may even upset the totalitarian hot chestnut-card so effectively that it can never again be put back upon its wobbly wheels.

"But seven million people cannot hope to hold out forever without some material support from the outside. Those Greek soldiers who are now fighting our battle, those Athenian and Spartan regiments, have wives and children at home who need food and clothes and medical supplies. We can contribute the money needed for that food and those medical supplies."

RABBI STEPHEN S. WISE:

"Americans of every race and creed should contribute eagerly and generously toward Greek war relief needs. Every American who loves freedom and cherishes the democratic ideal must gratefully rejoice in the extraordinarily gallant defense of their land by the Greeks.

"I have telegraphed to the Chief Rabbi of Salonika, who urged protest against the ruthless Italian bombing of civilians, that in common with millions of Americans, American Jews prayerfully hope that the Greek army may continue its triumphant and classical defense of Heias against the invalidation.

"With all Americans I rejoice in Greek triumph and hope for the ultimate and complete Greek victory over totalitarianism and tyranny. Every American, I repeat, must contribute towards Greek war relief needs."

TRUSLOW ADADS, the Historian:

"We who are their heirs owe them an incalculable debt. Today, two milleuniums later, the Greeks are again in the vanguard of small nations fighting the new despotism which aims to crush the minds and souls of free men throughout the world.

"It is assuredly not asking much of us Americans, who also believe

in freedom, that we should contribute somewhat of our resources and wealth to help a small but heroic people who are fighting our battle for us against terrific odds.

"If we are not fighting ourseives, at least we can help a little to bind the wounds and diminish the suffering of those who are."

JOHN ERSKINE:

"If the cause of democracy deserves aid anywhere it is in Greece, where the noblest spirit of the ancient world has come alive again. To-day, every American is in some sense a child of the Acropolis."

BOOTH TARKINGTON:

"Since last winter, unprovoked bloody attacks have been made upon one small country after another while we could only look on from across the seas, astounded and helpless to help the victims," Mr. Tarkington declared.

"Now, at last, one little nation has been able to resist long and stoutly enough for us to try to send some relief and assistance to those who suffer behind the fighting lines.

"The hurning indignation of the world should not burn itself out in mere words of sympathy for the Greeks. Great cohorts are gathering against them and their case is desperately hard.

"Heroes are made as well as born, and soldiers are better content to be shot for their country if they know that wounded, they will be cared for, and that their wives and children are not starving at home."

J. P. MORGAN:

"I am very glad to become one of the sponsors for the Greek War Relief appeal. Here is a nation which has been through great trials in the last war and during the reconstruction period between that war and the present one, making a noble stand against a strong and predatory enemy that expected Greece to surrender without a fight.

"The bravery and character of the Greeks, in view of their financial weakness and of the hardships that they have been and still are going through, are very impressive. They should certainly have the help they so much need and so well deserve."

Death Claims Dr. William A. Ganfield, Supreme Governor, 1925-27

Chicago, Ill.—On October 18, 1940, Dr. William A. Ganfield. Past Supreme Governor of the Order of Ahepa died in this city at the age of 67. He was known and beloved throughout the Ahepa Domain as a pillar of strength and a fountain of wise rounsel to the membership. He joined the Order in 1925 at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, at the suggestion of the then Supreme President, V. I. Chebithes, his student at Centre College of Danville, Ky., when Dr. Ganfield was president of that an

cient institution of learning.

He retained his great interest in the Order and the friendship of the Hellenic people to the end of his life. Dr. Ganfield never missed an opportunity to serve the Order of Ahepa. He attended many conventions, honored many Ahepa gatherings throughout the country and delivered many stirring, inspirational addresses. Only last Summer he attended and spoke at the District Conventions of the Order in Hammond, Indiana, and Milwankee, Wisconsin, and contributed an article "Today in the U. S. A." to the 1940 July August issue of The Anterna Page 9.

Before going to Centre, Dr. Ganfield had been pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Green Bay, Wis. After leaving Danville he served 18 years as president of Carroll College and guided that institution through its great-

est years of growth and prosperity.

Dr. Ganfield was a member of the Republican National Advisory Committee, which the late Dr. Glenn Frank headed. He ran for the United States Senate in Wisconsin in 1922. losing to Robert M. LaFollette. The widow, four daughters, one of whom is Mrs. Dorothy Sowler, professor of history at Hunter College in New York, and a son survive. Funeral services were held in the Wankesha Presbynerian Church.

He was president of Centre College during the years when the "Praying Colonels" of football achieved the peak of their fame. He was greatly believed by students, alumni and all who had the privilege of knowing him.

It is with a heart heavy with surrow that THE AMERICA records the death of so great and good a member, and extends sympathy to the hereaved family.
