

The first National Convention of the Demo-cratic party assembled at Baltimore on the 22d of May, 1832, in response to a suggestion of the Democratic members of the New Hampshire Legislature. Under the old system of Congressional cancuses those districts and States that dld not have members In Congress, but still had a large Democratic popular vote, had no voice lu the selection of candidates. It was to obviate this inequality of representation that the Convention system was suggested by the Democracy of New Hampshire. Gen. Jackson had been designated by his friends in all parts of the Union, at an early period after the commence-ment of his Administration, as a candidate for recicction. Hence a National Convention was necessary only to formally ratify this nomination and nominate a candidate for Vice President. At that convention Gen. Robert Lucas, of Ohio, presided, and the following resolution, reported y a committee, of which Hon. Wm. R. King, of Alabama, was chairman, was adopted for the gov-

Alabama, was chairman, was adopted for the governance of the convention:

Resolved, That the delegates from each State be entitled to as many votes in the selection of a candidate for the office of Vice President of the United States as such State shall be entitled to in the apportionment bill recently passed by the House of Representatives; and that two-thirds of the whole number be required to constitute a majority. An attempt was made to substitute the ma.
