The Revival that Was Born in a Christmas Convention

FOR many years we have seen the need of a Bible School in Liberia, and when Miss Bingeman and I were home on our previous furlough she wrote to me, asking if I would be willing to help in Bible School work. I replied that I was ready to do whatever the Lord had for me to do. I returned to our field and I shall never forget those days on the steamer. If ever God gave me a vision of the work and its needs He gave it to me on that trip, after I had left England. He showed me the necessity of the Pauline method of evangelizing in our work. I said, "Lord if this is of You, You will have to speak to the other missionaries also."

I arrived in Africa about December 1st and three weeks later when Miss Bingeman arrived I found that she felt the very same way as I did. I sent a letter to our chairman telling him how we had been led, and this letter was taken to the Christmas Convention and read before all the missionaries. They said, "This is just exactly what has been on our hearts for a long time but we didn't see how it could be put across since our methods have been so different." Everyone was agreed that if this plan was of God He would work it out.

Our previous method of working had been that of having large schools where we gathered the boys and girls and young people and assumed every responsibility for their support and training. This consumed the most of our time—some evangelistic work was done but our method did not create Christian homes for these young people to go back to, after they were saved in our mission schools. That was one of the greatest difficulties of our work.

When God made plain to us His will concerning the new method we prayed much as to the place this Bible School should be established and He revealed to us that Feloka was the place. We put the proposition for the new plan before the town people, told them we would not support nor care for their children; that we would have the church in the town instead of in a separate mission station as before, and that each child would have to pay for his own school supplies and clothing. Instead of the people complaining about this "new way" as we had expected, they said, "We like this. It pleases our hearts to think that the church and the school are to be right in our town. We feel

it will really belong to us instead of the missionaries."

Miss Bingeman and I moved into their town and lived in a tiny hut for six weeks. The village people carried our loads of cargo, and our goods and various pieces of furniture were all stacked into this little hut. Our beds were put up, our cook stove, our dining table, and then we put up two long boards, and this is where we accommodated the people who came for prayer. Practically every bit of floor space was being used. The people had never had a missionary in their town before and they were so curious to watch our every action; we never ate a meal without people staring at us to see how we ate; they were amazed at our white table cloth and thought that eating with knives and forks was the strangest thing they ever saw. But it wasn't long till they got hungry for God. Soon after we located in their town we began to have prayer meetings every night in various huts—wherever we were asked to go. At first only a few men would attend but in answer to prayer the interest soon grew. They began to get saved and soon there was not a hut large enough to accommodate all the people. The women too began to attend—at first they were very distant and would not come near but the Lord got hold of their hearts and many among the women were saved.

I remember so well the wife of the man who was the first to receive the Baptism with the Spirit in that revival. She had been very bitter against us. The husband was anxious for his wife to get saved so when she was in the hut at a prayer meeting I tried to shake hands with her and make her welcome. But she just looked the other way and was very angry because I had offered to shake hands with her. I said to her, "You know when I leave this world I am going to God's country and I want you to go along with me." She made no reply but we earnestly prayed and by

and by that woman was gloriously saved. I have never seen a greater change in any woman than I saw in her; she now wears the sweetest smile instead of the former scowl.

Coming home from a prayer-meeting one night I said to one of the men, "How are your women now? They used to give you so much trouble. Do they give you trouble now?" "Oh, no," he said, "since our women got saved they don't give us any trouble at all. They behave themselves well." At first it was rare to see any women in church. Now one half is for the women and the other half for the men, and the women fill up their part of the church just as well as do the men. And this is true of every town in the revival district; there are just as many women as men. This has been one of the wonderful features about the revival. It is marvelous how their lives have been changed. It was so hard at first to get any women to accept the Gospel but not so any longer.

After the revival had started in our town it was but a few weeks till great interest was manifested in other towns and the people would come from the surrounding districts to our meetings until our little mud hut was filled to overflowing. People crowded in at the windows and the doors; the children sat on the floor until every bit of floor space was taken and to get up the aisle one had to pick his way, stepping over the women and children. The whole place seemed a solid mass of humanity and we had barely room enough to stand to speak. And how they did listen! At first some complained about the long services but when the power of God began to fall and souls were saved at the altar, in their seats and on the floor, we couldn't stop the services. It was nothing unusual for them to go on for three and four hours and the people wouldn't leave then till we missionaries walked out.

At first we had a regular order of proceedings; we would have a song, then requests for prayer and testimonies and prayer; then we would read from the Word, after which we had final prayer. But soon the tide ran so high that we could not have prayer till after the reading of the Word, for if we gave them a chance to pray we could not get them stopped, and we felt they needed the Word too. So we always had that part of the service first and many times they prayed till long after midnight.



The prayer meetings, which continued on through the revival, have been the secret of it all. These people have learned to pray and during the two years about a thousand people were saved.

In connection with all these prayer and revival meetings we also conducted the Bible School. We had seen the need of this for many years but wanted these young people to be self supporting. God helped us in finding ways and means for them to support themselves. We would conduct the school for three months and then these young people would go out to the different towns which had asked for a preacher and there would hold meetings. We had told these inquiring people that if they wanted a preacher they would have to build a little chapel and then we would send them one. The people pay him so much a month which helps to defray his expenses in Bible School.

Many of these towns also have a Christian day-school and we wanted these schools to be self-supporting so we asked the children to pay their way. But the people said, "We have no money," to which we replied, "Then let each child bring a cup of rice." "Oh," they said, "we can do that." So they each bring two or three cups of rice a month and we sell this rice and use the money for the upkeep of the school. Sometimes they bring a chicken to pay for their books or slates. If a child needs a new loin cloth he can bring us several cups of rice and we give the loin cloth in exchange.

The people in that part of the country are fetish worshipers. They believe that their disembodied spirits dwell in stones, in sticks of wood or in animals. Every town has many "powerful" idols which they worship. One day they came to us and asked us to help them tear down the powerful idols which they had worshiped for over fifty years; it was just an elephant's tusk but they had believed in its power to protect them. So one Sun-

day we gathered around; the chief who presented it to us, though he had lost faith in its power, said to us, "Now when I give this idol over to you I want you missionaries to begin to sing, because I don't know what the devil might do." So we sang a native chorus of Jesus' power to save and His blood to protect. This chief and another man

they asked us to pray, saying, "Since we don't trust in the devil and the idols any longer we want you to ask God to take care of us." So we lifted our hearts in prayer and very earnestly committed them to the loving care of our heavenly Father.

In a near-by town where a church had been erected and God had saved many people, there was a devil doctor who said he would never serve God. All the rest of them could do "God way" but he never, for he was going to follow the devil. One afternoon some little children who had attended the services, together with some women, were singing in his hut. He scolded them for doing so, saying, "I am tired of hearing these songs about God all the time." Soon a very bright light from heaven shone down upon that hut and the old man fell to the ground. At once all the people fell on their faces and began to pray. Soon this devil doctor who had been the most influential man in all that country, began to pray as best he knew, and he kept it up till, as he put it, "the chickens began to talk the next morning." He was a leper and some of his toes and fingers were gone. God wonderfully dealt with him that night and showed him how all this witchery which he was carrying on was wrong and that his

heart was not right with the Lord. That very night he was wonderfully saved. With the first peep of morning he said to his wife, "I don't want these things any longer. I want to carry all this medicine and all these things which I have used in making idols to our native preacher," and he did even as he said. That day the native preacher sent a letter asking for one of us to come and have a service with them and then went on to tell us about the conversion of the devil doctor.

In the afternoon I went over and to my surprise I found that no one in the

brought eighteen idols to be burned.

In another town the people decided they no longer wanted to trust in their idols so they called for the missionaries to be present when they destroyed them. They said, "We know these idols have no power and we want to trust in the living God." So we gathered in the clearing in the center of the town where the heads of families had gathered hundreds of idols, great and small, and piled them all in a heap right in the middle of the town and there we made a huge bonfire while the unbroken circle of Christian natives and missionaries sang, "There is power in the blood." A Special Christmas Gift



IN GERMANY and Poland there are many homes for children and old folks that have been established by a meek and lowly spirited woman of faith, Sister Eva of Friedenshort. We will let her tell her own story of a special Christmas gift she received:

"It was at Christmas time in 1901. Into the little cottage, which two carpenters from the Eulengebirge had built for me, came a widow with four children and asked for warm clothes and shoes. As the clothes had first to be made, she was to come back a few days later with her children. At the appointed time the little coats and jackets, shoes and stockings, lay ready in the little room, with its floor, walls and tables of white, planed pine wood, and the brown tiled stove sent forth a stream of comforting warmth to the visitors.

"Mother and children took the gifts, and as they were preparing to leave, the mother pushed her smallest, a three-year-old girl, towards me and said in Polish, 'You just keep her. I give her to you for your own.' The small Agneska, with her little, white, oval face and great, light-blue eyes, came up to me, took my hand and stood quietly beside me, as her mother and sisters went off with the customary greeting.

"Only when the door was closed the child realized the parting and began to weep. I sat down on the little white bench by the stove, took my little child on my knee, laid the fair head on my shoulder and let her quietly cry herself out. The tears gradually dried as I stroked her softly. Agneska's heart was won, she felt herself at home and did not leave my side. In the little bedroom, a small, white pine wood bed, with a pink flowered pillow, was placed

close to my bed and the child soon fell asleep, tired out with all the new impressions."

This was Agneska's coming, and Mother Eva also experienced her going away. Mother Eva further writes:

"Agneska was eighteen and as beautiful as a white rose in her girlish bloom. I often felt as if I could not stop looking at the pure loveliness of this young flower of Heaven, who seemed unfitted for the garden of earth. Agneska never spoke of dying. At first she kept hoping that she would grow strong. On the first morning of Advent she said to the Nurse-Sister, who came into her room: 'The bells are ringing. Soon they will ring for me. I am dying—but I wish it might be quick. Pray that this may be so.' Then the Sister had prayed and Agneska asked them to call me. As I entered I saw the change in her features, and the shadow of approaching death. The girl who was usually so silent asked with great decision that they would all leave the room—'I must speak to you alone.' As I knelt by her bed, she raised herself, put her arm around my neck and said in her hoarse, toneless voice as distinctly as she could: 'I have still got something on my mind. I must put it right—or else I can't die.—That time—in the cottage—about the shoes—I always wanted to have them—do you remember? Will you forgive me?—Will the Saviour forgive me?—And then in Altdorf—it was I, who took the bread—and I—I put on Paula's stockings—will Sister Elizabeth be able to forgive me? Is everything all right now? Do I need to be afraid any more when I go to the Saviour?'

"I could hardly understand the words that were as if pushed out with a great effort, and did not know the connecting links, but by reason of the Atoning Blood I could assure the dying child of full forgiveness—and, as she sank back exhausted on the pillow, a gleam of joy spread over her face and her eyes lit up with wonderful brightness. She put her hand on her heart and said: 'Now I feel so light, so well; now I can die in peace—I have nothing more to trouble about.'

"When I came in again, about two

hours later, the whole body was moving rhythmically, the feet seemed to climb upwards as if in a measured beat, the hands and arms rose and fell as if in a dance and seemed to lift the heart upwards. The sweet face, in spite of the grey paleness of death, shone with joy and peace. The eyes were wide open as if they looked into another, far-off, bright world that was still hidden from us. With amazement we saw this child, in spite of her lying position, hurrying from us as in the movements of a dance, and I asked: 'Agneska, are you in Heaven already among the angels? Can you hear them sing?' She nodded, with a joyful smile.

"Then—I shall never forget it—she began to play the fiddle on her left arm, as if she wanted to accompany the choir above. To sing was not indeed possible any more for the little dumb nightingale, and yet she felt she had to praise God with holy music and to enter the heavenly joy with the rhythm of dancing. Three Sisters had meantime come into the room and were singing the hymn: 'In that golden city, built by God on Zion's height, there are great gates of pearl, wondrous, beautiful, and bright.' With the last words of the last verse: 'And lead me in, pure and clear through the gates of pearl,' her breathing ceased. The door had opened, she was at Home.

"In the little mortuary chapel Agneska lay dressed in white, in a white coffin, my white rose of Heaven! I have never seen anything on earth so beautiful. I cannot describe it. The Madonna face, as if hewn out of white marble, the wreath of myrtle on the pure brow and the fair, smooth plaits lying on each side in front, the hands folded and the peaceful smile about the mouth—this was how I saw, for the last time, the child who had been entrusted to me among green fir branches and white Christmas roses. A picture of heavenly peace and blessed fulfilment—my soul bowed in adoration and praise to God."

upon or overshadow a virgin than to overshadow and move upon the deep, black waters of chaotic mass. The inanimate, dark waters answered to the moving of the Spirit. And the quickened, responsive, spiritual soul of Mary answered readily to the promise of God and the operation of the Spirit. The incarnation was the result of the divine coming upon the human and thereby bringing forth that harmonious combination called Immanuel—God with us. "The Desire of All Nations Shall Come"

Eve was the first to voice this great longing: when Cain was born she spoke words as obscure as an oracle: "I

have got a man, even Jehovah" (KANI-THI ISH ETH-JEHOVAH). At least this is how many godly scholars translate this phrase, though others prefer the rendering of the authorized version. God had promised that the SEED of the woman should bruise the serpent's head, and Eve doubtless believed her first-born son to be the Messiah. The reverse was true. Cain was a type of the Beast, and his descendants, through their wickedness and violence, caused the judgment and ruin of the ancient world.

"Everywhere in antiquity there was the cherished tradition of an expected Conqueror of the serpent, who was to come as a divine Person born of a Virgin, and that this Person was to be a great sufferer in the conflict, but ultimately he should triumph gloriously." (Seiss)

The ancient people had the Star Bible, and they understood the meaning of the constellation of Virgo (the Virgin), with a spray of wheat in one hand and a branch in the other, which shows the two advents of the Lord—one as wheat to fall into the ground and die, and the other the Branch of righteousness. The three decans or side pieces of Virgo were: *Coma*, the very word for *Desire* used in Haggai 2:7, which was shown as a virgin with a boy in her lap; another decan was the Centaur, that means undivided Kingship and power, which is shown in the heavens just above the Southern Cross; and third was Bootes, coming with a sickle in his hand to reap the earth.

The constellation of Libra which shows the death of this Mighty One, seems never to have been understood. All of the Ancients, including the Jews, desired the God-Man to come in mighty power and reign.

Immediately after the Flood, this longing for a super-man as ruler seems to have taken possession of the world. Cuneiform tablets have been unearthed at Nineveh which originally were

written by Gilgamesh (Nimrod) telling of a goddess or priestess Ishtar who persecuted him, and seems finally to have gained possession of the throne. This Ishtar established an elaborate religious system with vast temples and a great number of priests, the head of which was called Pontifex Maximus. Ishtar claimed that her son Adonis was the son of ADONAI, the Lord.

Ishtar was the first Anti-Madonna, and her son was the first Anti-Christ. The people separating from Babylon through the confusion of tongues, seem to have taken the worship of this self-styled goddess Ishtar with them to the countries to which they migrated, for we find this Babylonian religion in all ancient countries. In Egypt, Ishtar was worshiped as Isis, the wife of Osirus, and the mother of Horus. In Palestine she was Ashtoroth, and her son was known as Tammuz (Judges 2:13 and Ezek. 8:14); in Greece she was Athene; in Rome, Minerva; in China, Gwang Yin, the Queen of Heaven (See Jeremiah 44:18, 19). The most beautiful building in the world, the Parthenon, on the Acropolis at Athens, was built in honor of this so-called Virgin.

When Babylon was captured, the high priest, Pontifex Maximus, moved his headquarters to Pergamos, and later, this title was presented to Julius Cæsar, and is now claimed and worn by the Pope of Rome, and the worship of the Madonna has prevailed down to the present day. In the seventeenth chapter of Revelation, Babylon is spoken of as "Mother of the abominations of the earth."

All ancient nations have claimed that their kings were sons of gods: the Egyptian kings worshiped themselves as gods. Pharaoh's daughter doubtless represented Moses as the son of the Nile God, which would have made him acceptable as a god-king.

Hat-shep-sut (Hatasu) had the story engraved at Thebes that her mother was a consort of a god, and that she was their offspring.

Isaiah knew of the claims of these ancient nations, and under divine inspiration he prophesied exultantly, "For UNTO US a child is born, UNTO US a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called WONDERFUL (Miracle), Counsellor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace." Isa. 9:6. This Desire of all Nations was to come UNTO US: He is to be our own king. More than the ancient nations had claimed, Isaiah claimed—not only was this Ruler so long desired to be a God-Man, but He was to be *Immanuel—God with us*.

"The Desire of all nations shall come." How often have we wondered about this scripture. No nation on earth today wants Jesus Christ. They reject His crystal-clear justice; they do not want His righteousness; they shun His ethics as given on the Mount, Matthew 5 to 7.

No nation on earth today would dare have the Lord Jesus search through the archives of their diplomatic intrigues, and yet the words of Holy Writ stand eternally true! "The desire of all nations," the one that all are looking for, is not the righteous and holy, crucified Saviour, but the "Super-Man" of overwhelming power to conquer all other nations and subdue them. Each nation wishes the "Superman" or "God-man" to be *its own ruler* that they may go forth to triumph with him. The rulers of many nations today would like to present themselves as the god-man. The Chinese emperors always called themselves "sons of heaven." We read lately that "according to the Shinto doctrine, the Emperor of Japan



is a descendant of the gods, and he is himself a god." The BEAST is soon to be revealed "so that he as god sitteth in the temple of God, showing himself that he is God." 2 Thess. 2:4.

Finally, this ancient desire of Ishtar of Babylon, "the mother of the abominations of the earth," will reach its final development in the Beast-king. It is plain to see why this final unification of religion and world-state is called Babylon in Revelation 17 and 18, and it is now plain to us why the nations all desire the reign of the Super-man.

More than a hundred years before Jesus was born at Bethlehem, a temporary star had burst forth in the head of the infant in the arms of the Virgin called Coma, *Desire*, and this great star shone during His whole lifetime and for many years thereafter. There were three conjunctions of Jupiter and Saturn in the constellation of the Fishes (Israel) in one year which caused the Wise Men to begin their journey to find the Desire of all Nations. His birth was a miracle, His whole life was a miracle, His death a miracle, His resurrection a miracle, His ascension a miracle: He shall be called Wonderful (Miracle in Hebrew).

The three conjunctions of Jupiter and Saturn within a year of time, will occur again in 1940-41, in the constellation of Aries, *the Lamb*. We cannot set any dates for our translation or for the Lord's coming again from heaven, but WE MUST BE READY!

Let this Christmas be different from all previous ones: let us remember that we celebrate HIS BIRTHDAY, not ours. Let us bear in mind that the FIRST CHRISTMAS GIFT was from God: "For God so loved that He gave His only begotten Son." Let us look up, on that glad day, and wish HIM a HAPPY BIRTHDAY, and let us try to make Him happy by our absolute and utter devotion to HIM. Let us tell Him that we desire that He come quickly and reign over the war-torn earth, that we may have what the angels promised in their glad song: "Peace on earth!"

The Cradled Christ

Will any one reflect on what our Lord Jesus Christ gave up who left Heaven's throne to be cradled in a manger; who, having filled all things and wielded omnipotence, became a feeble infant and was wrapped in swaddling clothes; who being the Loved One of the Father, never unappreciated, never misunderstood, and receiving the ceaseless adoration of the hierarchies of heaven, became a despised Nazarene, misunderstood by His most faithful followers, suspected by

those whom He came to bless, neglected and rejected by those who owed to Him their very being, and whose salvation He had come to seek; and, finally, mocked and spit upon, crucified and slain, with thieves, bandits, and outlaws.

The heavenly hosts had sung with wondering gladness when chaos was clothed with beauty; and the work of creation was completed. But now they see with greater wonder the Creator Himself veiled in human form and self-emptying, lying in a manger. They knew the grace of our Lord, as never before, when they saw Him as Jesus Christ, who "though He was rich, yet for our sakes became poor." The Wisdom of God, and the Power of God has undertaken our deliverance, and in order to accomplish it seeks no alliance with the wisdom, the wealth, the nobility of earth,



but intelligently takes the lowest place as that best adapted for carrying out His purpose of love and grace.

Have we learned this lesson? Are we willing to learn it? "As the Father hath sent Me into the world, even so send I you." Or, are we going to repeat the oft-made experiment—which has always failed and always must fail—of trying to improve upon God's plan? The poverty and weakness of apostolic missions necessitated reliance upon God alone, and issued in wonderful success, and in modern missions it will invariably be found that in proportion to the non-reliance on wealth, or education, or political power, and in proportion to the self-emptying with which they are carried on, the issues are encouraging.

Can those who at home or abroad are ambitious for the highest success as fishers of men find a wiser or safer example than that of Him who called His

first disciples to leave all and follow Him, and who Himself, "though He was rich, yet for our sakes become poor"? "Let this mind be in you."—Hudson Taylor.

Where is He that is born King of the Jews? for we have seen His star in the east and are come to worship Him. Matt. 2:2.

Another Christmas season is here. Once more the world will be made conscious of the fact of divine love that moved God to give to us His best. Many thousands will no doubt make it a time of merry-making, of reveling and such like. How far the message of divine love will go into the hearts and lives of the masses can be reckoned only by the practical results that will follow.

That the Christmas season bears a message peculiar to itself is evident to all observers. There is no message quite like it. Heathen tradition has tried to simulate it in many points, but none can ever approximate or match its worth. It is one of the high points in the message of redemption, that God has compelled a world, even against its own will, to accept and acknowledge the birth of His only begotten Son.

The Fact of the Birth of Christ

This was no ordinary event. Prophets wrote and Psalmists sang of this hour. The details of Christ's birth were all told in simple and clear language centuries before. In this we have one of the greatest of miracles in any literature. Consider the import and worth of this thought and you find yourself confronted with the facts of *Divine Inspiration*. The prophetic miracle of utterance. This peculiar fact is found in no other literature. It is the common property of the Bible which is the only book that would dare to describe events in minute detail centuries before they come to pass. The fact of Christ's birth was so well described, through holy men of God, "who spake as they were moved upon by the Holy Spirit" that the scribes and chief priests had no trouble locating this birth as to be in Bethlehem and so instructed Herod and the wise men. It is a matter of authentic record that of all who ever appeared before the Jewish elders as their Messiah, Jesus was the only one who completely filled out the prophetic portrait. How these men could view the fulfillment of their prophetic Scriptures and still reject

Christ as their Messiah can be answered only by considering the depth and darkness of unbelief. "Hath God said?"

was spoken in the "garden" and has followed down throughout the ages to the present time wherever the Word of God has been preached or published. The tap root of all our present world difficulties finds fertile soil in our modern sordid doctrines of unbelief in the scriptures. "He that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him."

The Wise Men from the East

The Christmas story would be incomplete without these. Who they were seems to be quite a mystery to some Bible expositors. Many conjectures have been made and much discussion has taken place about these men. But apart from all conjecture there are certain things about them that stand out. First of all they were looking for and expecting the Messiah. Secondly, the Holy Spirit tells us that they were wise men. They seemed to display quite a knowledge of astronomy and an understanding of God's plan of redemption. At least they were looking for their help and guidance from above and they were not disappointed. That "every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning," seemed to be well understood by these wise men.

"The fear of God is the beginning of wisdom," is a truth calling for the serious consideration of the so called wise men of our day. Men today are looking for salvation and deliverance in every other direction than from above. God has been moved out of the picture. Recovery is based on how much money we can get piled up and in circulation; how many men we can get back to work; by a multitude of committees and organizations and human efforts. But no sincere looking to God; no watching the heavens; no examining of the Scriptures to see the how, the where, and the when of important events in the divine program. "O that men were wise, that they knew this, that they would consider their latter end." The wise men waited, they watched and they saw "his star" in the east. It is from the east that hope will arise. The light will again break out of the east at His second coming. Are you watching the heavens; are you searching the Scriptures to see when the Lord will return to earth again?

The Gifts

These wise men brought appropriate gifts to offer to the new born Babe. These gifts were at once complimentary and prophetic. They were expressions of their faith and adoration in Him as the world's Saviour prince sent from God. The gold is expressive of His divine nature; the frankincense, of His priestly office; the myrrh, of His suffering and death. The gold tells of His royalty and kingliness; the frankincense speaks of His service in our behalf as He ministers constantly before the Father; the myrrh predicts His great agony in satisfying the claims of a broken law as He dies in our stead. No man was so divine as this man; no man



could pray and intercede as He; no one has ever suffered and died as this man suffered and died.

The Star—His Star

Stars are luminous, heavenly bodies. They are lights penetrating the dark. They minister to the world in the absence of the light of day. Their message is one of glory and majesty. They have their origin in God and their domain is the heavens above. God created them and gave to them their power to shine. Today men are searching for the truth. Everything is taken into the laboratory and submitted to the test tube. Everywhere the search is on and the ceaseless hunt for the secrets of light and life. One is reminded of a person hunting for hidden treasure in the confines of an old castle. Having first drawn the blinds and shut out all the light of heaven he proceeds to search with the aid of a tallow dip.

Men talk about Christ. They laud His teachings and class Him as one of the greatest of earth's benefactors. They draw the blinds of their hearts and close themselves in from any aid from heaven above and then proceed to rummage about in the dust and rubbish of the centuries with the feeble flicker of a benighted intellect and a limited knowledge of the true purpose behind all life. That Star

that shone over Bethlehem, shed all its light upon the one who not only brought truth, but who said, "I am the way, the truth and the life." God's light-witness from heaven always draws its focus on Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ is God's central theme in His plan of redemption. You may take away all the ritual known to religion; strip the church of its present ministry; dispense with all places of worship, gather together all books and literature on religious subjects both true and false and burn these, and proceed to eradicate every trace of religion from among men; still you have not touched the vital force of God's plan of redemption. God has vouchsafed our redemption by found-



ing it in the character and person of His son Jesus Christ. Remove Him from the plan and though we retain all the other things mentioned above we have nothing.

The Star was placed only as a witness—Christ was the object of worship. The star lighted the pathway and illuminated the hearts of the Christ seekers. Its ministry was completed when hungry seekers were led to the manger. There is no record that these wise men ever returned to Bethlehem and erected any altar or shrine to the Star that led them. No religion to the star was ever fostered by these souls truly grateful for the light and glory of this heavenly body. No, my friends. From this we gather that God never intended that the gospel of redemption should ever be degraded into a system of human rights and ceremonies built upon the avenues of light and revelation.

Religion is the saviour of no man. Only true faith in the person of Christ can bridge the gulf between a lost man and a God of Love. Respect and proper reverence are due to all the channels through which God has sent light and help to a lost world. But to Him only belongeth worship, honor, power, might, and dominion. How much could be said at this point! Volumes could be written of religious movements that have started in power and might; how they continued a

space in the enjoyment of the divine presence, only to find themselves building about a theory and erecting shrines to the worship of doctrines and dogmas. The church of Ephesus was condemned and her candlestick removed because she departed from her first love to Christ and began building on her works and ideals. May the good Lord of heaven save us from these pitfalls and cause us to awaken and return to a humble place of repentance and prayer; seek His face and again lay our all in entire consecration at His glorious feet.

God has graciously blessed the Pentecostal work with heavenly light and blessing, but the question arises, will it soon wane and disappear forever. Where shall we stop, call a halt and refuse to be allured by the painted faced Jezebels and the philosophies of a Baalam so anxious to introduce another spirit into our places of worship? Shall we continue to build altars and burn incense to the crowds and work for the false praise of the numbers while the sacred Spirit of Christ and holiness slowly leaks out on every hand?

Beloved friends, we are in a serious time. The heaven is at work throughout the world and soon there will arise a "king who knew not Joseph" and all the sacred truths and blessings of pure holy worship to the Lamb of God will be gone and we shall be left with the memories of other days. Now is the time to turn back to God. Turn our attention to the thing that has always brought revivals and seek the face of our Lord and Christ until He come and rain righteousness upon us. Mary, the manger, the star, the wise men, the gifts are only appropriate channels through which God has presented the power and life of His dear son to a lost world. Are we going to permit His sacred presence to slip out of our midst, while we cling tenaciously to a developed form and untried ritual? That we may hear the voice of God and set other things aside and seek again the face of the Lord is my earnest prayer.

The Neglected Bible

A remarkable story about an exceedingly costly jewel that for many years was considered of no more value than a mere pebble was related in *The Youth's Companion*.

Gustaf Gillman, a Chicago lapidary, was at work in his shop, according to the narrative, when John Mihok, of Omaha, entered. Mihok, who was a laborer, drew out of his pocket a rough, red stone and handed it to Gillman. "I want you to cut and polish this," said Mihok. "Where did you get it?" gasped Gillman, as his eyes almost popped out of his head. "My father picked it up in Hungary fifty years ago," was the reply of Mihok. "He thought

it was a pretty pebble. When I landed in this country I found it in my valise. It has been lying around the house ever since. The children played with it. My last baby cut his teeth on it.

"One night I dreamed it was a diamond and worth a lot of money; but it's not a diamond. It's red." "No, it's a pigeon's-blood ruby," said Gillman. "What might it be worth?" was the question of Mihok. "I'd say anywhere from \$100,000 to 250,000," replied Gillman; and Mihok leaned against the door.

The big, rough stone, we are told, cut to a flawless ruby of twenty-three and nine-tenths carats. It is believed to be the largest ruby in the world.

How sad it is that in many homes the Book that is worth more than many jewels is neglected and considered of little value!

Marvelous Miracles in France

Douglas R. Scott writes from Marseille, France:

"I will give you a little account of what I saw at Lisieux, and seeing this is not my work at all, I can speak with perfect freedom. It was simply wonderful, the Lord doing 'exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think.' First of all, let me explain that Lisieux is a place of pilgrimage to the latest Catholic saint, St. Therese, and it might even rival Lourdes. There have been supposed Catholic miracles and a shrine has been built costing 140 millions of francs. Our evangelist opened up in a transformed granary on the first floor, and God has given him some remarkable healings. I listened to the following testimonies: A little girl who was blind from birth had her eyes opened by the Lord, another little girl who was deaf and dumb can now both hear and speak. Cases of cancer have been healed. A woman who had a short leg, after being prayed for, found that her leg had grown two inches in one night, and the next day she had to change her shoes. There were also many who had been brought back from the edge of the grave through the prayer of faith and the laying on of hands in Jesus' name. The number of people attending the meetings varied from about 400 to 650 and most of them were from Lisieux and the surrounding country. Some had come on pilgrimage to the shrine, and had been directed by the hotel keepers into our meetings. It is Ephesus over again, God working special miracles by the hand of His servant, Mr. Le Marie. There are 30 people at least who are asking for water baptism, and I fully believe that God will make this place a center of revival which will touch thousands and thousands of hearts.

A Mother's Song

Lesson for Jan. 5, 1936. Lesson text, Luke 1.

Luke writes his Gospel that we might know the "certainty" of the things most surely believed among us. There are no cunningly devised fables in the Word. Our faith has a foundation of sure and certain facts. At the beginning of his Gospel Luke tells us of the fulfillment of the Scriptures given aforetime to the prophet Isaiah; first, in the coming of the forerunner who was to prepare the way for the Lord; and second, in the coming of the Lord Himself, a coming wholly supernatural according to the prophet's word, "Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Isa. 7:14. The mother of the forerunner and the mother of our Lord were not picked by any nominating committee appointed by the Sanhedrin—they were chosen of God.

I. MARY'S YIELDEDNESS

Angelic Prophecy. The angel Gabriel, who revealed himself to Mary, a simple virgin of Nazareth, made known to her that she was the favored one who would be the mother of the long-looked-for Messiah. He showed her that there would be no human father of the Babe she was to bear, but He was to be "the Son of the Highest." Gabriel indicated that the Lord God would give to Him the throne of His father David (for David would be counted as His father through the lineage of Joseph to whom Mary was betrothed), and declared, "of his kingdom there shall be no end." The angel explained how this miracle could be. "The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God."

Mary was willing for anything that was in the will of God, and declared, "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." This simple maid of Nazareth had early learned the secret of a life of overcoming—the secret of rendering quick glad some yieldedness to the perfect will of God in everything. How blessed to be able always to look up into the face of the Lord and say, "Not my will, O Lord, but thine be done." The apostle Paul passes on the great secret of victory in Rom. 6:13, "Yield yourselves unto God . . . and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God."

II. MARY'S FAITH

Elisabeth's Encouragement. Mary did not discuss these matters with her neighbors in Nazareth. There was such an atmosphere of unbelief in Nazareth that at a later date it was said of Mary's Son, "He could do no mighty works there because of their

unbelief." Mary's neighbors would doubtless have tried to persuade her that she was deluded. So she went off to see her cousin Elisabeth. And what a witness the godly Elisabeth was able to bear as, filled with the Spirit, she declared, "Blessed is the fruit of thy womb. And whence is this to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me?" And she further declared in the Spirit, "Blessed is she that believed; for there shall be a performance of those things which were told her from the Lord." It has been said, "It is still possible for human beings to believe God for anything, for nothing would ever exceed that for which Mary believed." Eve believed the lie of the serpent, and it resulted in the fall of the race; Mary believed the truth told her of the Lord, and it resulted in the redemption of the race. We used to circulate a motto in the early days of Pentecost: "What would happen if we believed God?" Paul declared when on a vessel that was apparently to be wrecked, "Sirs, I believe God," and God preserved his life and the life of all that were with him. As Sister Sisson used to say, "Faith opens the door and God walks in."

III. MARY'S SONG

Praise in the Spirit. Then there came forth Mary's ecstatic psalm of praise. Centuries before David had said, "Let such as love thy salvation say continually, The Lord be magnified." Psa. 40:16. And down in the cave of Adullam David had said to his army of D. D.'s, every one that was in Distress, in Debt, and Discontented, (1 Sam. 22:2), "O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt his name together." It is well for us to magnify the Lord continually. Said Spurgeon, "To magnify the Lord is the greatest thing mortals can do, it is the occupation of heaven. To magnify Him is, to use an old Saxon expression, 'to greatness God,' or to show forth His greatness." Has the Lord shown you any favor? If so, magnify Him for such. All of us who have been saved through the atoning work of this blessed Son of Mary, and have been filled with the Spirit by Him, can surely say with Mary: "For he that is mighty hath done to me great things; and holy is his name."

IV. MARY'S VISION

Faith's Outlook. Mary in her prophetic song sang of the glorious work of her Messiah Son just as if such were already accomplished. Faith always embraces the promises. Faith always accepts the word of the Master, "Believe that ye receive, and ye shall have," and praises that the promise is indeed hers. Faith ever looks beyond the things seen, which are only temporal, to the things not seen which are eternal. Mary declared, "He hath scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts," thus declaring the fate of the lofty of earth. God hates pride and will have none of it. I remember when in South Africa going to the Wolhuter gold mine

and being told the fate of the man that once owned it. He sat in a saloon one night and lit the many cigars he smoked with five pound notes (bills worth approximately twenty-five dollars each), and boastfully declared, "I defy God Almighty to make me a poor man." God accepted his challenge. A few months later he lost all his money, and at that time he would go around continually to the home of a missionary friend of mine to beg a loaf of bread (only to barter it later for whiskey).

Exalting the Humble. But this coming One who would debase the proud and put down the mighty from their seats, Mary saw would "exalt them of low degree." While the proud presumptuous Herod would meet the fate of being eaten of worms, the lowly Mary of Bethany who sat constantly at His feet would have her name immortalized wherever the gospel is preached. And many a like lowly Mary who prays and gives in secret is going to have a great exaltation when the Master returns. "His reward is with him," and even the giving of a cup of cold water humbly in His name will have wondrous compensation by Him on that day.

A Helper of Israel. Mary in her prophetic song saw her Son as the helper of Israel. But first there had to be fulfilled the word that the godly Simeon said to her, "Behold, this child is set for the fall and rising again of many in Israel; and for a sign which shall be spoken against; (Yea, a sword shall pierce through thy own soul also)." Christ came to His own, and His own received Him not. Like Joseph, He was rejected of His brethren. But one day the children of Israel will see that this One they rejected is indeed their Saviour. He will prove to be the perserver of Israel. And how ashamed they will be when they shall look upon Him whom they have pierced. Zech. 12:10. But on that day He will have a word for them similar to the one Joseph gave to his brethren: "But as for you, ye thought evil against me; but God meant it unto good, to bring to pass, as it is this day, to save much people alive. Now therefore fear ye not: I will nourish you, and your little ones." Gen. 50:20, 21.—S. H. F.

whole town had gone to the farms as was their daily custom. They were all waiting for this special meeting and were celebrating because of what God had done for the devil doctor. As soon as we neared the church it quickly filled to overflowing with people and a wonderful service followed. The devil doctor stood up and told of his marvelous experience with God the night before. There on the platform beside him lay a large leather bag made of the skin of an animal filled with gourds of different kinds, with all the paraphernalia which he had used in making his witch medicine which he had claimed was so powerful. He was throwing it all aside and as he talked his old ebony face just shone with the glory of God. I couldn't help but think, "You poor thing, you are not much to look at in this world but the glory of God is surely shining out in your face." As he finished talking a number of the leading men in the town said, "We don't have any more faith in our idols and have decided to do away with them. We want to get them out of our houses and burn them." So I said, "Go get them."

When he had everything piled up we set fire to the heap while all stood in a circle singing praises to God and thanking Him for the precious blood of Christ that had cleansed their hearts. As the shades of evening began to fall all those idols and other heathen trophies of worship were fast going up in smoke and before the precious band of redeemed souls disbanded we lifted our hearts to God, committing that town and its people to the loving care of Him who had saved them from heathen darkness.

"I do not think that there is any chance of our getting puffed up, for besides the victories that we have, there are many defeats. All do not get saved who come to the meetings, neither are all healed for whom we pray, and there are some demon possessed who are not delivered. Therefore, with so many defeats we have to recognize that we are far from being all-powerful."

A Testimony to God's Faithfulness

Twenty-five years ago this month, I arrived in Egypt, Oct. 26, 1910. He has never failed me all these years and we are being fed like the sparrows, who have no barns or store-rooms. Seven hundred little ones. We are still looking to the Lord for our hourly needs. O! He is such a wonderful Saviour!

About two weeks ago I had to rush out early on an important matter, and as I was going out one of our boys, who is in charge of the meals said: "Fize, I haven't one cent, and I am going to be late unless I leave immediately." I went about half a block when I noticed a man waving an umbrella. I wondered what was the matter. He came right up to me and took out his pocket book and said: "Miss Lillian some one who does not want his name known gave me this \$50.00 for you." I sent for Fize and told him to send the donkey cart to town and get all of the needs.

Yesterday we were without any money for bread; the mail only brought \$5.00. I was very busy taking care of a very ill baby. (I have three tiny infants whom I am caring for in my rooms.) When the mail came I just looked up and said: "O Lord, surely you would not have me leave this sick child and go try to find bread for the children! I'll take care of the baby and you please send the food." I thought that perhaps some money orders may have come to the Post Office which I would not get until the afternoon mail, so I telephoned to the Post Office. (They all know how urgent my needs are sometimes, so they are all willing to help). They said: "Why, yes a money order for nearly \$40.00 has just come in." It was from South Africa. O, thank God for His wonderful care.

Last Sunday we had no money for bread. I went to visit a lady who had been ill. She said: "O, Lillian, I have just been wanting to see you. I have \$25.00 with which I want you to buy a beef for the Children's dinner, and here is \$25.00 more for any need of the Orphanage." Just a week before the lady's sister gave me \$25.00 for beef. (It takes that much for meat for one meal.) The next day I was again without any money, and we had no soap, sugar, or flour. (Our flour costs \$560.00 a month). I was just going to see one of our girls off at the station as she had just been married and was now going to her new home when a strange man walked up and handed me an envelope. There was \$25.00 and no letter. He refused to give his name. At the station a friend handed me \$5.00 and I was able to get all of the needs. Thank God.

"AT PEACE"

A Christian worker on a visit to China, visited the Leper Hospital at Hangchow. She had photographed a group of lepers, when down the stair was helped an elderly woman in a most pitiable condition; her sightless eyes, without their lids, were covered by a wollen mutch. A cry was raised that Chang Ma had missed having her picture taken, so the visitor prepared to take another with her in the midst. As she was focusing her camera, that worst leper of all started to sing, "There is a Happy Land," and suddenly, instead of poor lepers, the visitor was seeing them as "saints in glory . . . bright, bright as day." She was taken to see one who was dying, and wondered what she could say to him. Steadying her voice, she called to him with the politeness that China teaches, "Elder Brother, art thou at peace?" And from that frame, almost unrecognizable as human, with an affected tongue and from a lipless mouth, came a voice, cracked yet steadfast, "Yes, at peace, at peace. And I shall soon see my Lord."

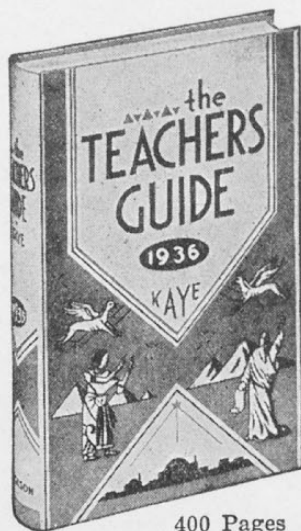
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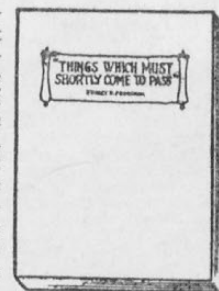
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
