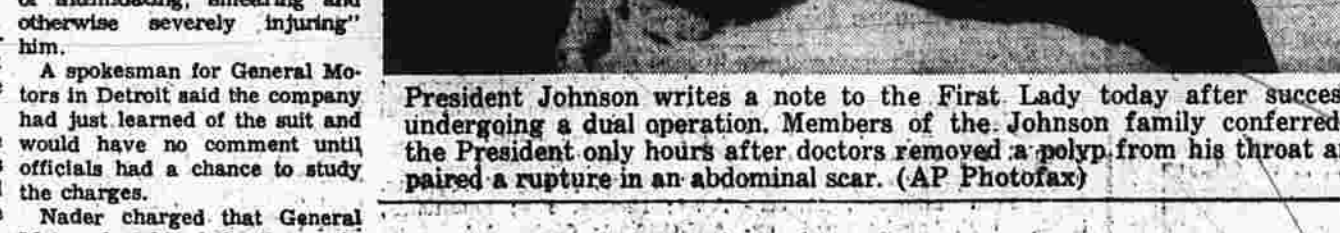

NEW YORK (AP)—Negotiations for the broadcasting network strike have broken off today, but a 16-hour season that extended beyond a Tuesday midnight deadline for a threatened strike. The strike was not called immediately.

Kenneth Grob, executive secretary of the New York local of the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists—AFTRA, said after the talks were suspended at 4:10 a.m. that no further meetings had been scheduled.

He said a group of AFTRA executives were meeting to decide whether to strike.

Grob said the situation "doesn't look good at this time." But he declined to say whether a strike was likely or when it might be called.

There was no immediate word on the progress of the talks.

Grob said only that "there are still a lot of matters open — serious matters." The unions are seeking higher fees and minimum salaries for their members.

Industry negotiators declined comment.

Early morning news shows in New York, scheduled for 1 a.m., went on as planned with the regular newscasters.

Network sources in New York indicated that a walkout by the AFTRA and the Screen Actors Guild would curtail live programming. They said, however, that filmed and taped shows would allow the networks to stay on the air indefinitely.

One network spokesman said, "The major casualty would be the soap operas."

Network programs such as "The Tonight" show and the Ed Sullivan show would have to use taped reruns of earlier programs.

Meteor Shower May Be Celestial Show of Century

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—A meteor shower after midnight tonight may produce one of the most spectacular sky shows in more than a century.

The Leonid meteors may flash through the skies about 2 a.m. (EST), toward the east and a little south. Weather, however, could obscure the show.

Leonids occurred for the greatest meteor shower on record the night of Nov. 12-13, 1833, described by one observer as "a tempest of falling stars."

Astronomers are a bit hesitant to say the show is a certainty, but Dr. William Liller of Harvard and Dr. B. S. Marston of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory believe there is a good chance.

The Leonids, whose name comes from their apparent origin in the constellation Leo, are believed to be debris from comet Tempel-Tuttle. The tiny fragments produce a glow as they hit the earth's atmosphere.

Dr. Peterson, an author, artist, scientist and photographer, will present the first show, "Galapagos—Wild Isles." He has lectured throughout this continent and abroad.

As a naturalist Dr. Peterson is internationally renowned, and his field guides have become bird students' "Bibles." He has lectured throughout this continent and abroad.

He is a Fellow of the American Ornithologist's Union and president of the Wilson Ornithological Society, and has also served as secretary of the National Audubon Society and as a member of its board of directors.

He holds doctor of science degrees from Franklin and Marshall College and Ohio State University. He has been awarded the Burroughs Medal, the Gold Medal, the Charles C. Townsend Medal, the Medal of the New York Zoological Society, and the Gold Medal of the Societe National d'Acclimatation de France.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The heels of a just-settled postal crisis in which at least one principal post office—in Chicago—was practically paralyzed with a giant backlog of undelivered mail.

The Postal Department has hired 150,000 extra Christmas workers one month early — at a cost of about \$50 million — to help keep the mails flowing.

A postal spokesman said ZIP code information — the result of last month's national ZIP Code Week promotion — is being used to help keep the mails flowing.

Rockville Chamber Board Changes Title of Executive
 Directors of the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce have changed the title of the organization's executive secretary to executive director, on recommendation of the executive committee.

The change was approved at the monthly meeting of the board Tuesday at the Ellington Ridge Country Club.

The executive committee recommended the change because it felt the new title is more meaningful, although responsibilities will remain the same. William Bush recently took over the executive post.

The treasurer's report showed a cash balance of \$10,410 as of Oct. 1. The new president, Charles Chubb reported that of \$12,200 billed for dues of Tuesday \$9,881 had been collected. This leaves a \$2,417 balance due.

The proposed budget for 1966-67 was presented. Among expenses are \$9,900 for salaries of the executive director and secretary; \$1,300 for the annual dinner; \$3,045 for planned projects which include \$150 for the "Welcome Teachers" program; \$400 for the Christmas parade and \$2,495 for miscellaneous projects.

These items, plus \$1,020 for rent are the only large items in the budget. The rest are operating expenses.

Committee chairmen and members were named for the 1966-67 year.

Richard Rose will head the programs and projects committee. This committee will continue an active program to obtain better roads and develop other feasible projects for the betterment of the community.

The economic and development committee will be headed by Warren Gottler. It will be the committee's job to promote industrial, retail and residential growth in the area and coordinate efforts with the Rockville Redevelopment Commission to rebuild the redevelopment area.

Headquarters Unit
 The air and water pollution committee, with Frank Gregory as chairman, will establish a program to keep chamber members informed and alerted to federal, state and local legislation and governmental actions in the field of air and water pollution for the purpose of developing programs that benefit the community.

The membership committee, to enlist more business and individuals as members of the chamber, will be headed by John Mirabito.

The education committee is headed by Dr. Raymond Ramsdell. Directors of this committee will be directed to coordinate efforts with the community school system through a student work program and other activities to support community educational responsibilities.

A new committee is the legislation action committee. It will be headed by Gerald Allen, the town's representative to the General Assembly. It will be the duty of this committee to establish a program to keep chamber members informed and alerted to federal, state and local legislation and governmental actions which will affect business in the Rockville area.

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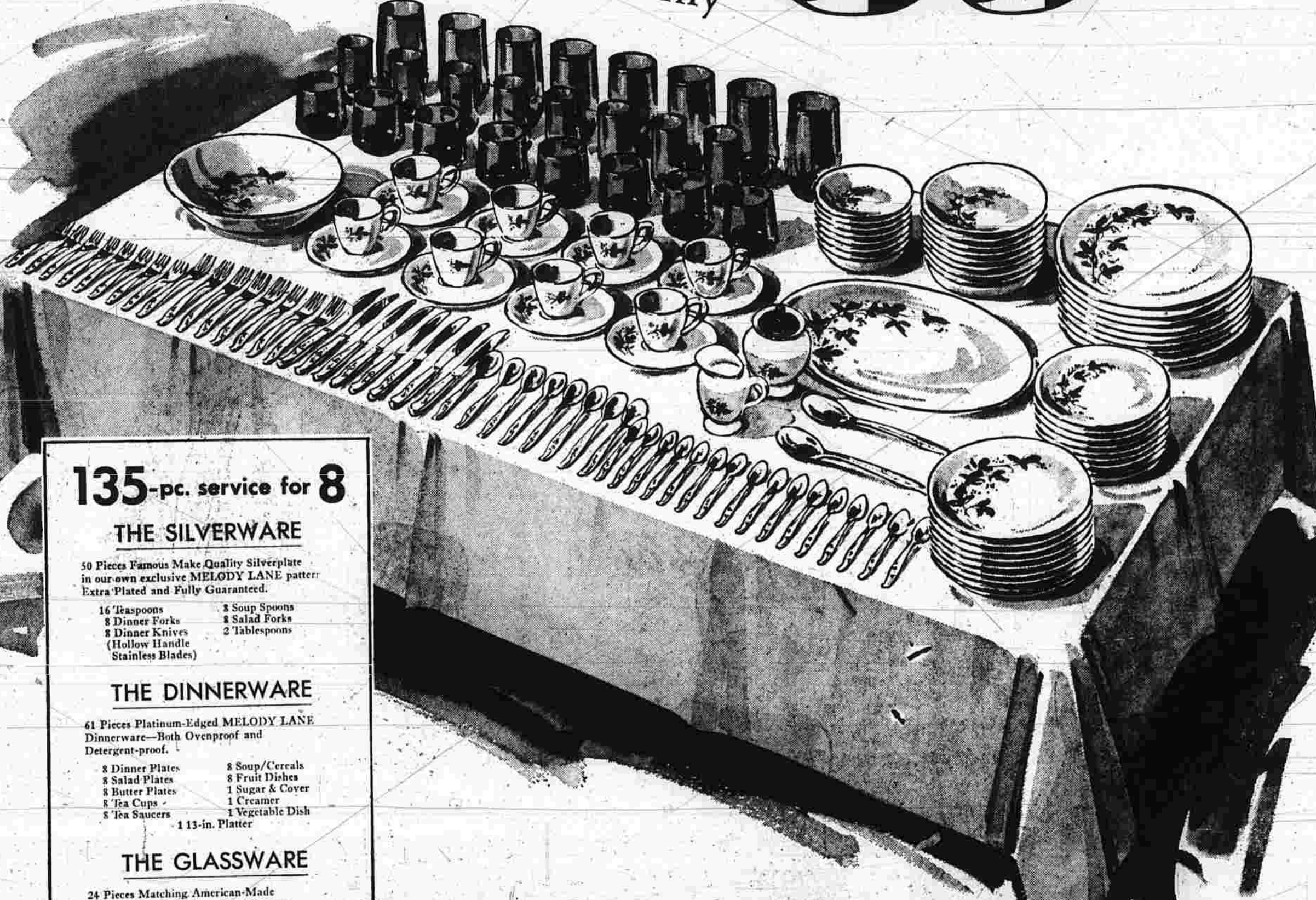

Two More Schools Proposed by 1969

A school building program to include a new elementary school by 1967, another by 1969 and an addition to Rockville High School by 1969 or 1970 was recommended in a report given to the board of education last night by Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools.

Dr. Ramsdell based his recommendation on the enrollment figures of the past two years. He noted in June 1965 the enrollment was 5,219 and in September of that year it was 5,722. On Oct. 1, 1966 the enrollment was 6,507 an increase of 585 students over the June 1965 enrollment.

Dr. Ramsdell predicts this trend will continue into the '70s, forecasting an enrollment of about 8,000 by 1971. A new junior high school, opened this year housing Grades 5 through 8, is already full except for two rooms, and Dr. Ramsdell pointed out these will not accommodate the 600 plus increase that will enter the schools in September 1967.

The superintendent also pointed out that the major change in the school system this past year was the organization of a "middle school" at the new junior high.

He explained the major advantage of this grouping is to keep the senior high school intact as a four-year vocational and college preparatory unit. He also noted the middle school offers the added advantage of combining Grades 5 and 6 together with Grades 7 and 8 for departmentalized instruction and team teaching.

The board spent considerable time on making various motions concerning the continuation of the summer projects, science camp, reading clinic and Operation Head Start.

At the last meeting of the board a motion made by Arthur Callahan to continue the whole program with the stipulation that staff members contracted on an 11-month basis be excluded from participating in the program was tabled.

Continuing discussion on this motion last night, Callahan said he felt it is a direct conflict of interest for these people to work on a six-month program when they only have one month's vacation. Callahan's motion was defeated with four opposing, three in favor and one abstention.

A motion made by James Brennan was also defeated. Brennan asked that the program continue with the stipulation that no member of the administrative staff on 11-month appointment receive remuneration beyond the one-month salary. In addition, he asked that the number of culturally deprived children eligible for the program be indicated by April 15.

A final motion made by Peter Humphrey was passed with three for, two against and two abstentions. Humphrey's motion provides for the continuation of the program giving the administration mandate to

appoint those most qualified to run the program.

Votes to Join ASK
 The board also voted to participate in the operation of an auxiliary services program (project ASK). A study grant has already been received for this project from the federal government and this new agreement will put into motion the process of asking for an operational grant.

This project would provide a regional type center offering special services to surrounding towns.

The board delayed action on a proposal made by the Vernon police department to post signs on all of the school entrances which would not allow for any trespassing on the school properties after school hours unless on business or school sponsored.

Callahan felt the signs should be reworded as this would preclude the 600 plus increase that will enter the schools in September 1967.

Damage had been reported at some of the schools and several of the parking lots have been used improperly as dog runs. The police chief said the only way his department could control the actions was to have signs posted. A committee of the board will consult with the police chief or the town counsel to see if arrangements can be made whereby those using the grounds properly would not be arrested.

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Children Asleep Reveal Some Secrets of Asthma

DENVER, Colo. (AP) — and disruptions of normal sleeping children are telling our system activity all lead to asthma attacks — a condition known as "asthma" by different names — and sometimes deadly disease that grips five million Americans.

Machines record the pulse, breathing, heart beat and brain waves of these youngsters in a number — and it also records the very movement of their eyes as they dream.

Researchers here are looking for patterns that develop before an asthma attack — a constriction of breathing passages that "makes the victim feel like he is suffocating. A severe attack can bring death."

Dr. William W. Hahn is conducting the study at the Children's Asthma Research Institute and Hospital. The hospital offers treatment to youngsters to it from the United States and abroad.

Admission is based on the severity of the case and is limited to children who get no relief from conventional treatment.

Dr. Hahn has completed a study based on tests of waking children which shows that asthma attacks have different heart beat and breathing rates than healthy youngsters.

"What I'm interested in is what in the nervous system is responsible for triggering this asthma attack," said Dr. Hahn.

He explained that the heart rate and similar body functions are controlled by the autonomic nervous system, composed of two branches which work in opposition to each other.

One speeds up the heart, the other slows it down. Normally, said Dr. Hahn, they achieve a balance or harmony. But he believes in asthma the balance is disturbed.

Doctors believe that emotion, all problems can cause asthma, as well as physical factors such as allergies.

Dr. Hahn is hopeful that the study will show whether emotional stress can trigger an asthma attack. His machines measure psychological reaction by tracing the brain wave pattern, he said.

He also wants to determine in which of the four stages of sleep asthma attacks occur. Stage one, in which a person dreams, is the stage of lightest sleep. The deepest sleep is in stage four.

Rapid eye movements recorded by the machine show when a child is dreaming, said Dr. Hahn. Every time he said, although some don't remember their dreams when they awaken.

NEW YORK (AP) — Those amount the young 20th century tribesmen must pay to secure a dutiful, hard-working wife."

Founder Denies Black Power Bid Hostile to Whites

NEW HAVEN (AP) — "Black power" is not negative, violent, nor anti-white, says Stokely Carmichael, head of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, but positive, constructive, and pro-Negro.

Speaking before a crowd of nearly 1,000 on the Yale University campus Tuesday, Carmichael said the term "black power" has been distorted by the "white American press," which he said "has stressed sensationalism, but failed to give accounts of the dialogue which is taking place in the black community and in church and intellectual circles."

Carmichael also spoke at a Temple Mishkan Israel in an older brother, James, 2, were urban Hamden before a crowd of over 1,000.

He said black power is essentially the Negro liberating himself from "dependent colonial status" while at the same time "expressing his cultural integrity."

Black power, he said, is the Negro's attempt to take over and run his own community, not an attempt to take over the nation.

So far, however, Carmichael said, this has been prevented by the "racist, Democratic Party in the South and the political machines of the North."

If Negro ghettoes are not organized by Negroes, he said, in 30 years the cities will become "black concentration camps."

(Continued from Page One) U.S. officials readily acknowledged the diversion of American AID goods to the Viet Cong. They say there is no way to pin-point, on even estimates, the dollar value of the losses. This is because much of the goods passes into Vietnamese commercial channels and U.S. controls diminish almost to the vanishing point, except for some spot checking. Vietnamese civilian trucks hauling food, fertilizer, building materials and other AID goods travel the roads unescorted. Thus, they are wide open to Viet Cong extortion. "Unless you put a military guard on every convoy, you can't stop the VC shakedown," said one American military enforcement officer. "And if we do that, we wouldn't have enough men to fight the war." The Vietnamese police and armed forces do not provide protection for most of the truck traffic outside the cities, though they have established check-points along key routes. It's an entirely different story where military arms, ammunition and supplies are concerned. The U.S. forces maintain a very close guard over their gear in transit or in depots. And American military authorities say they have found no evidence of any significant amount of U.S.-supplied arms or equipment finding its way to the Viet Cong through connivance of the South Vietnamese military. Back when the South Vietnamese army was doing most of the ground fighting, the number of weapons lost to the Reds just about balanced the number taken from the Viet Cong. But with the big U.S. troop buildup, the edge turned against the Communists by a 2-3 margin in the first half of 1966. The draft of drugs and food to the Viet Cong is another matter. "There are many channels of leakage to the Viet Cong and medicines represent one of the most serious leakages of all the commodities we pay for," said a top official of the Agency for International Development. Lt. Gen. Jonathan Seaman, a top field commander, said medical supplies found in Communist caches often bear American brand names. There is no way of knowing how they got there, he said. They could have been stolen from AID or military stocks, smuggled from Cambodia or Europe, or just bought over the counter in Saigon. AID authorities claim to have tightened up a great deal on dispensing of drugs to Vietnamese

Job Corps Plan Seeks Enrollees

Some day, we suppose, we will reread the full text of a lecture Arthur Schlesinger, Jr. delivered in his new capacity as Albert Schweitzer Professor of Humanities at the City University in New York the other day.

For the moment all we have is the report of the generalities with which he prefaced and closed his discussion. He began by asking himself the following questions:

"If intellectuals do take part in public affairs, are they to be permitted by their fellows any role save that of intransigent opposition?"

"If they accept political responsibility, must they be chastised by intellectual excommunication?"

Or, to put it more bluntly: Can an intellectual go into public life and responsibility and still retain his own intellectual honesty and self respect?

Professor Schlesinger, himself a shining example of the intellectual community's gift to politics, answered his own questions with such reassurances as these:

"The recognition of political realities does not implicitly mean the relinquishment of political principles."

"It is entirely possible to deal with practical realities without yielding inner convictions; it is entirely possible to compromise in program and action without compromising in ideas and values."

Somehow we thought that what he was going to say. And some day, perhaps, we will come upon all the text in between the question and the answer, and see whether or not the Professor has offered concrete examples of what he meant.

Meanwhile, we submit a slightly unkind judgment of our own. It is that the typical intellectual succumbs to the lures and temptations of power just as quickly as anybody else, and that, therefore, he seldom hesitates to join the kind of world and kind of operation he himself has always pretended to scorn and criticize.

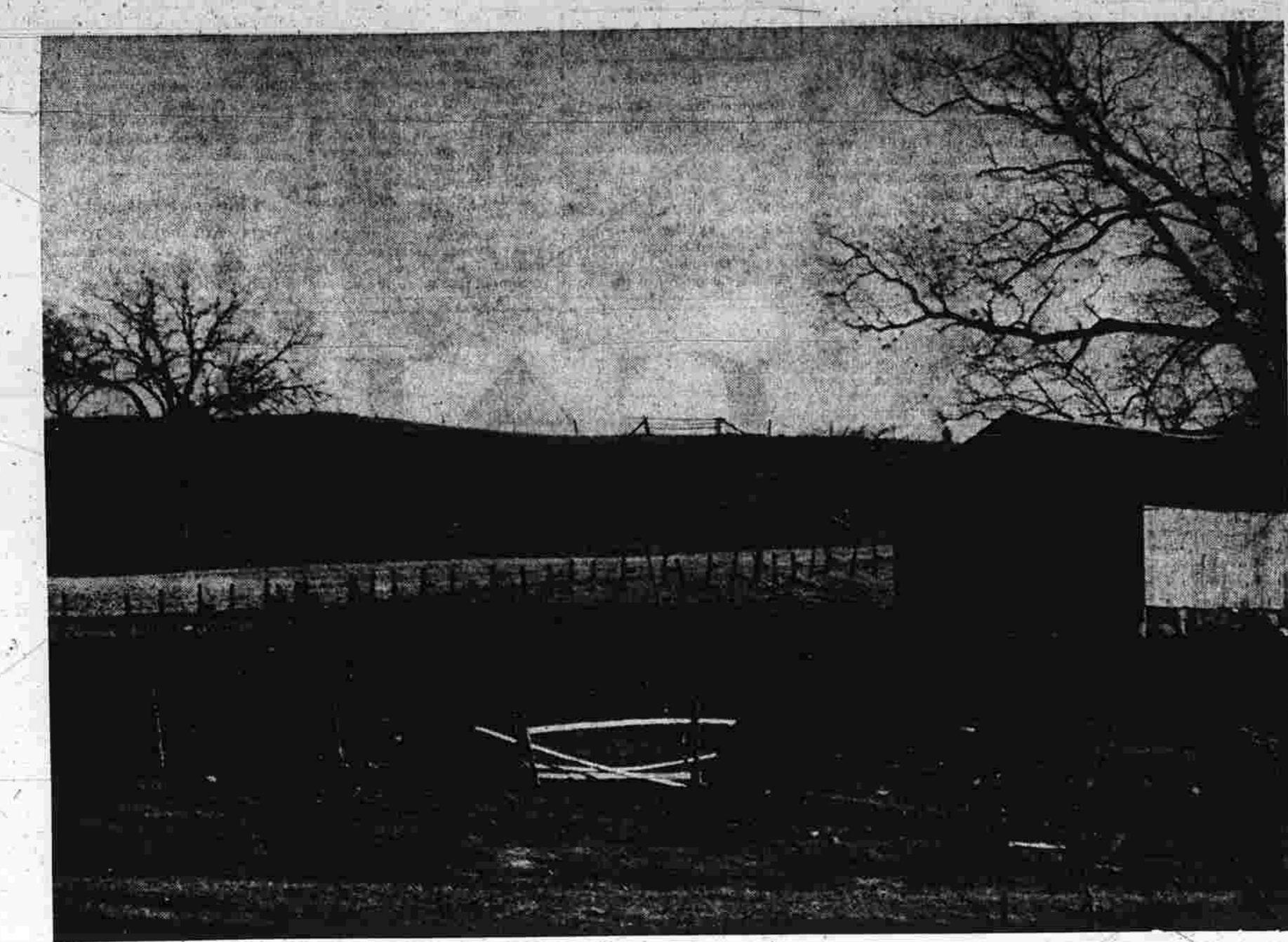

SEN LUC, SOUTH VIETNAM. Without fanfare, the U.S. government has now taken the momentous decision to commit at least two brigades of American soldiers to the swasty rice paddies and teeming population of the famous Mekong River delta south of Saigon.

Here in the tiny hamlet of Ben Luc, a single battalion of the 25th Infantry Division has pitched camp and is now conducting joint search and sweep operations with one regiment of the 25th South Vietnamese Division. These American soldiers, who replaced an initial U.S. battalion that first appeared here on Sept. 14, are the guinea pigs for unprecendented U.S. military operations of a character that, until very recently, had been flatly ruled out as wholly impractical.

The mere fact that the decision has been made, moreover, illustrates how very badly the war has been going in the delta. In contrast to the North, with some 60 per cent of the entire population of South Viet Nam here in the delta, this was considered the last place to commit U.S. troops to the risks of close-in hamlet fighting where, inevitably, innocent civilians—"friends," as they are called—would become victims of U.S. guns.

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Directors Inclined To Sell College Land

The Manchester Board of Directors last night was given a Dec. 8 deadline to come up with at least an application for the sale of 150 acres of Globe Hollow land for Manchester Community College, and comments by directors indicated that such an assurance would be forthcoming.

College President Frederick Lowe, in asking for the assurance, explained the need for the urgency and listed the timetable which the college is trying to follow.

He said that the State Board of Community Colleges has set Dec. 8 as the date on which it must be informed of three possible sites for the college.

The local college advisory board, Lowe said, has stuck by its guns, with only the one site—Globe Hollow land, "and now, in effect, must put up or shut up."

The state board, at a subsequent December meeting, will approve a site, clearing the way for including Manchester Community College expansion costs in the state's education budget.

The state school budget will then be presented to the 1967 State Legislature, for February consideration.

Although the Board of Directors was meeting informally last night, and couldn't take any formal vote or action, indications pointed to a favorable action when a vote on the sale does come up.

Democratic Director Francis Mahoney, former board chairman, said after the meeting that the Democratic minority was in a record for approving the sale.

Republican Mayor Nathan Arolinelli said, "The town is proud of the college, and we will do everything within our means to keep it here."

Longtime Republican Director Harold A. Turkington said, "I am in favor of the sale of the land to the college. There is sufficient land there to sell the college, and it is a good thing."

"In fact," Turkington added, "we might consider selling and a mistake to underestimate them any part of the area not needed by the town and by the Manchester Country Club."

Turkington asked that complete reports be submitted by available: Globe Hollow land town agencies regarding town need of the land.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Several New England members of Congress will move to higher places on committees in the 90th Congress convening in January.

The election results cause the changes under the congressional seniority system.

The Republican gains, particularly in the House, could bring some change in the predominant Democratic ratios, but deletions or additions always are at the bottom of committee lists. For those re-elected and staying with present committee assignments, the only route is upward.

Thus, Sen. Margaret Chase Smith of Maine, through retirement of Sen. Everett Ruess, will move to the top of the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts, become ranking Republican on the important Armed Services Committee and is in line for the chairmanship in the event of a reversal in party power.

Also, through Saltonstall's retirement and her own re-election, Mrs. Smith becomes third ranking Republican on the powerful Appropriations Committee while retaining her top party position on the Aeronautics and Space Sciences Committee.

Sen. George D. Aiken of Vermont continues as 6th ranking Republican and Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut as 7th ranking Democrat on the Space Sciences Committee.

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticut moved from 10th to 8th Democrat on the Finance Committee in the event of a reversal in party power.

New England positions on the Foreign Relations Committee held by Dodd of Connecticut and Chalmers B. Dyer of Rhode Island as are expected yearly.

Split Votes Excessive in Last Election

WASHINGTON (AP)—So many voters split tickets in the Nov. 8 election that it's impossible to categorize them strictly as Democratic or Republican.

In 10 of the 22 states which elected both a governor and a senator last week, a Republican won one race and a Democrat won the other.

The 10 were Alaska, unless a recount retains the democratic governor; Arkansas, Maine, Minnesota, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas.

In Nevada, a Republican was elected governor while the state's two House members, a Democrat, was returned to office by a 2-1 ratio.

In Rhode Island, for example, Gov. John H. Chafee, a Republican, and Sen. Chalmers Pell, a Democrat, each won re-election by a 2-1 ratio.

Davis 'Can't Remember' Details of Mass Slaying

NEW HAVEN (AP)—Arthur J. Davis took the stand in his own defense at his murder trial Tuesday and said he was unable to recall his actions on the day of a shooting rampage that took place in a New Haven apartment building.

Davis, 26, told the three Superior Court judges hearing his trial that he had been drinking heavily.

And he said he remembered visiting the New Haven apartment building on the night of the slaying—on Aug. 25, the day before the tragedy.

"The next thing I remember after that," he testified, "I was driving around crying. The next thing after that I was in New York in a bar."

"I don't know how I got there," he said. "I don't know from New Jersey," he testified.

Davis is charged with six counts of murder. Five persons were found dead in the apartment where relatives of his girl friend, Gloria Bakerville, lived. A sixth victim died later.

Davis, 26, of New Haven, said he went to the apartment that took place during the slaying in the out where Miss Bakerville was

"used to play with" a .30 caliber carbine and "point it at me."

"He always said if I have to use this to shoot anyone, I'm going to take a whole lot with me," she said.

These found dead were Mrs. Mary McClesse, 51, in whose apartment the shootings took place; Mrs. Carolyn Sykes, 34, and her son Michael Sykes, 6; Neal White, 77; and Richard Lashley, 27. Frankie McClure, 14, died Sept. 4 of her wounds.

Mrs. Leatrice McClure, Miss Bakerville's mother, escaped injury by pretending she had been shot.

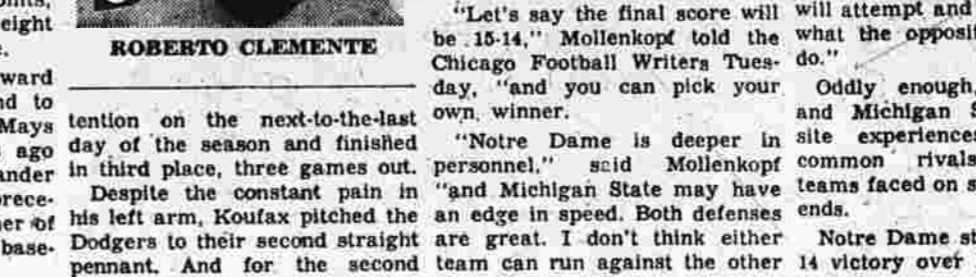

College Cost Up; UConn Holds Line

WASHINGTON (AP)—College is getting more expensive for most students. Students at three of every four state colleges and universities are paying more this year for tuition, fees, room and board than they paid last year.

Results of a survey of the 97 members of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and of the 200 members of the Association of State Colleges and Universities (ASCU) were presented Monday to the first joint meeting of the two organizations by their jointly sponsored Office of Institutional Research.

Members of the two higher education groups announced that one half of all students in the nation's colleges and universities pay more for tuition than last year.

Tuition figures are up about 7 per cent with the most dramatic rise in costs to out-of-state students. Two years ago only nine state university and land-grant college members charged non-residents 500 or more, the number this year has jumped to 23.

The median yearly cost of tuition, room and board for in-state students living at the public institutions was about \$1,000. For out-of-state students it ranged from about \$1,200 at ASCU schools to \$1,900 at the state university and land grant college group.

The highest tuitions are found in the East and Midwest. Cornell University leads the list, followed in order by the University of Vermont, University of New Hampshire, Rutgers University (N.J.), Miami University (Ohio), Kent State University (Ohio), Ohio University, Clemson University (S.C.), University of Virginia and Pennsylvania State University.

However, the University Park campus of Penn State reduced out-of-state tuition by \$300. Institutions ranging from the University of Connecticut in the East to the University of Nebraska in the Midwest and the University of Washington in the West held the line.

Room and board increases varied widely with the highest being women at ASCU schools. For them, room costs were up 25 per cent and food charges up 1 per cent.

Christmas Trés Face Inspection

Don't deck the halls with gypsy motifs, the U.S. Department of Agriculture wants to stop its annual reminder to shoppers of Christmas trees and other holiday greens.

Christmas greenery in areas under federal quarantine for gypsy moths must be inspected and certified free of gypsy moth eggs before it can be shipped out.

The area under regulation includes the entire States of Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island, most of New Hampshire and Vermont, and parts of Maine, New York and New Jersey.

Gypsy moth caterpillars each year devour foliage in infested areas and are capable of defoliating entire forests. One or two successive defoliations of a hardwood tree can kill it.

This year, there were pests defoliated more than 32,000 acres of forest. Most of the damage this year was in New York (over 15,000 acres) and Con-

Callaway and Maddox were denied a majority by write-in votes for Ellis G. Arnall, a former governor.
