## Churchill Declares British Sea Position Eased by Nazi Dash

LONDON (AP)—Far from being worsened, the British position in the Atlantic has in fact been "definitely eased" by the dash of important German fleet units through the Dover strait, Winston Churchill told parliament and the allied world yesterday in the most reassuring message of all the recent black weeks.

## Axis Sub Sinks Brazilian Ship

A German submarine has sunk the 5,152-ton Brazilian steamer, Buarque, in the bitter battle being fought along American shipping lanes off the Atlantic coast and the Brazilian government, fearful of anti-axis demonstrations, has taken immediate steps to cushion the reaction to the act.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Petroleum Coordinator Harold Ickes disclosed yesterday that preliminary plans have been made to ration gasoline to motorists, if that becomes necessary, and to require eastern industrial plants using fuel oil to convert to coal where possible.

## Passing the Buck

Burly Steve Mizen, the Chicago end who was expected to play an important part in Iowa's grid football before he was drafted last last summer, is now stationed at Honolulu. Mizen, who earned a letter a year ago but had just come into his own last spring, wrote to Judge Mike McKinley of Chicago from Hawaii and seems to like it very well.

Outside of being seafarer for the first couple of days, Steve writes, he had a good trip going over, and says, "Now I can see why so many people come here on their vacations." His big aim right now is to get a pass into town to visit Walki Beach. "That's the life," says he.

Mizen mentioned that he listened to the East-West game at New Orleans by short wave, and heard Al Couppes mentioned several times. "And the message was concluded in typical Mizen style, 'This is all for now, Judge—have to get ready for now'."

City high fans and players will remember Dick Amrine, the Kansas boy who played a year of scintillating football, basketball and track for the Hawkeyes, and then matriculated at Kansas university with honors in football. According to a report from the Jayhawk institution, Dick has been commissioned as a second lieutenant in the marine air corps.

The item reads, "Dick Amrine, shirt-tail flapping halfback of the Jayhawk football team from 1937 to 1939, was commissioned the other day as a second lieutenant in the U.S. marine corps reserve at Corpus Christi, Tex. He enlisted last March in Kansas City and was appointed a cadet June 12. While at Corpus Christi Dick specialized in flying the navy's fast fighting planes (the type used aboard carriers) during the advance training stage."

According to a weekly bulletin from the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball, edited by Dick Dunkel, Illinois is only the second best team in the country, as of Feb. 13. The Illinois lead the midwestern division, but Colorado plays the nation. West Texas State's skyscrapers are a third, and Washington fourth. Iowa received no mention in the sectional ratings, even though Wisconsin, Michigan and Ohio State, all Hawkeye victims, were.

Wisconsin's athletic department has dedicated its last basketball game of the season, Iowa to the Golden Jubilee movement. Proceeds from the game will be contributed toward the construction of a Temple of Basketball—a memorial to the inventor of the game, Dr. James Naismith, and to the ideals and traditions of the game. The national committee, however, will first use the money to purchase defense bonds, which will be later converted into the necessary cash for the temple.

"The Pride of the Yankees," featuring Gary Cooper as Lou Gehrig, went into production Monday. In the cast are Babe Ruth, Bill Dickey, Bob Meusel, Lefty O'Doul and Babe Herman. Ernie Adams portrays Miller Huggins, and Sam Wood, a former minor leaguer, will direct. Even the sports writers get a break, with Walter Brennan and Dan Duray taking the part of the inseparable writing mentors of Ruth and Gehrig.

Undoubtedly the outstanding wrestling match in the country will be staged tonight at Cedar Falls in the Iowa State-Wisconsin Teachers match. In the 175-pound class, George Gast, former state high school and national amateur champion, meets Lee (Champ) Martin, unbeaten in two years of collegiate competition. Martin earned a close decision in the two met in the Midwest college meet at Ames early in the year.

Iowa's basketball team has the best offensive average in the conference, 47.4 points per game. Illinois is second with a 47.2 mark, and Indiana third with 46.3. The reason the Illinois are on top is made clear by their defensive average, 38.6, second only to Purdue's 35.4. Iowa has a 42.8 mark in this department.

NEW YORK (Wide World)—It looks like they might have to put extra pockets on the major league first divisions this year to hold all the clubs which promise to travel along with the upper crust.

Just recently we have netted three quotations from players or managers, all three statements garnished with unadulterated optimism, to wit:

**Rick Ferrell** — The Browns should finish in the first division this year.

**Al Simmons** — The Athletics should finish in the first division this year.

**Mel Ott** — The Giants should finish in the first division this year.

The funny part about these bursts of originality is that all may be right, the future being as uncertain as it is. There is nothing more uncertain than baseball, unless it is a blend of baseball and war, in which case it isn't only a question of when a team will finish, but if it will finish.

We can expect a steady drip of these priceless quotations now that the training season is at hand, as every barnyard oracle who has his name on a roster will be asked what he thinks of his club's chances, and will spout corny phrases to the effect it will be up there close to the top, even though he's been out hunting and hasn't seen a newspaper for two months. We know. We've quoted them ourselves.

But what could you expect them to say? As they say, a silly question deserves a silly answer, and asking a ball player what his club's outlook is really is a silly question, as there is only one answer possible. Or at least discreet.

About three years ago Oscar Vilt was condemned as everything from a quitter to a disgrace to the game for expressing the opinion the Yankees were unbeatable and in a class by themselves. It made no difference that what he said was true as gospel and he was just bringing to light the concealed thoughts of the other baseball men. He just shouldn't have said it, that's all.

For Rick Ferrell or Al Simmons or Mel Ott to say that their clubs were made up of two-base errors and comic opera hitters and would do well to finish the week before Christmas would be high treason, even though they were convinced it was true enough.

That's the difference between professional and amateur sports. For an amateur to drool words of praise for his team, interspersed with a few choice remarks concerning the corner-lot quality of the opposition, wouldn't be cricket and the drooler would be marked down as a braggar who should have his ears pinned back.

This is particularly true in football, where the coaches spend their time on the shady side of the barn and never see a ray of sunlight, even though they are sitting on the best material they ever had and are pretty sure they can use the third team to mop up most of the opposition.

Annually Bernie Bierman has beamed his losses and painted a bleak picture of the future, and almost annually Bernie Bierman has come up with unbeatable teams. Frank Leahy could see nothing but the hole in the doughnut when he took over at Notre Dame, but Frank Leahy came up with an undefeated team last fall.

Were the professionals to spread gloom as freely, the gate would suffer, and when the gate suffers the professionals suffer. It's an odd trail of the sports fan that he expects the pros to tell how good they are, and condemn the amateurs for doing the same thing. It doesn't make sense.

"Realize that the worst of this war is over, psychologically; we're no longer defending ourselves against a shadow but attacking a real opponent who is ripe for a licking..."

"Expect setbacks and they won't trouble you..."

"Protect your mind from insidious assault. Reject enemy news bulletins, propaganda, rumors, defeatist suggestions and attempts to foment confusion and discontent..."

"Give all you have to the fight and in your living share the triumph of victory..."

Don't wrinkle your brow over meal planning during Lent. Whether or not you observe this season, you'll find meatless dishes give you variety and economy.
