

# Around the world in 4 months — with 3 small kids

For John and Mary Carroll of Grosse Pointe Park, their trip around the world with three small children went from a mother's nightmare to a trip they will never forget.

The trip began easy enough, with the first leg of the journey beginning in Hawaii.

"The children were surprised to find hand-made Easter baskets filled with candy and lined with grass," Mrs. Carroll said. "They wanted to know how the Easter bunny got across the water."

Just prior to that, however,

their son Kevin, 8, disappeared at the airport.

"We looked around and Kevin was nowhere to be found," Carroll said. "Our bus was leaving and we were scrambling to find him. It worked out in the end though."

As the couple told tale after tale of their four-month trip around the world which encompassed four continents and 11 countries, they told of the lessons they learned.

"You really have to trust people," he said. "And you really have to trust that everything will work out in the end. We trusted our house with someone,

our luggage was left with strangers for several days at a time.

The more you trust the more it frees you."

The Carrolls' trust in a happy ending was put to the test time and time again during their adventure.

When the family was horseback riding in the mountains of New Zealand, Mrs. Carroll worried when a strong wind blew the gate open and 20 horses stampeded to freedom.

The problem was that Kevin and his younger sister, Caitlin, 6, were on two of the runaway horses.

"They were hanging on for

dear life," she said.

Her husband told of the New Zealand horse farmer running down to catch the horses, swearing and carrying on the whole time.

Shopping in the local markets, Mrs. Carroll found that the English spoken by the natives was hard to understand.

"All the food had different names. Rice Krispies were called Rice Bubbles," she said. "The shopping trip took over three hours. Over the next several days we did all the cooking in a rented camper van. We had a lot of lamb and mutton burgers.

"One of the things we wanted

to do was to show the kids how other kids of the world lived. And one thing that united the kids with others from all around the world were video games," she said.

The games made the three children popular in other countries. So popular, in fact, that a couple of the New Zealand youngsters made off with Caitlin's hand-held game.

The family's "things will work out" attitude was again put to the test when they arrived in Australia and found their 15-day accommodations had fallen through.

They later ended up staying

overnight at a pigeon farm outside Sydney, where much to the delight of the Carrolls, the farmer had two daughters the same age as Molly, 4, and Caitlin.

After returning from a 45-minute trip, the parents were greeted with a stage show performed by the kids. The farmer's wife had organized the youths into a mini-stage review with dialogue, songs, skits and makeup complete with masks.

Kevin was more impressed with the snakes, wombats, koala bears and kangaroos he had seen

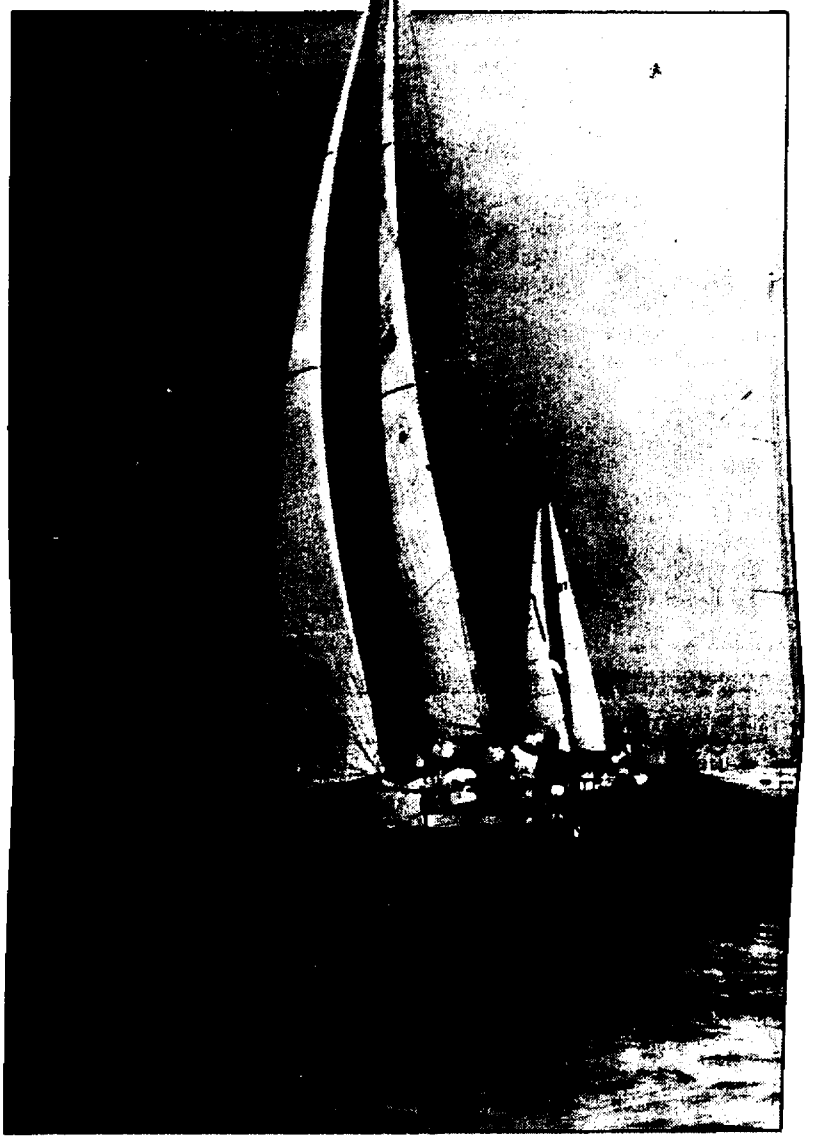

### Pointer of Interest Lisa Southwell

Lisa Southwell is not resting much this summer vacation.

During her summer break from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N.Y., this 20 year old Grosse Pointe Shores resident is a researcher — one of the youngest — at the Michigan Cancer Foundation's Meyer L. Prentis Cancer Center in Detroit.

Additionally, she holds a part-time job and in her spare time — if there is any — she is studying for her Medical College Acceptance Tests which she plans on taking soon.

A chance meeting by her parents allowed Southwell the opportunity to spend her summer doing an internship that provides her with experience she may need when she goes on to med school.

Southwell's parents met Dr. Sandra Wolman, who is director of genetics at the Michigan Cancer Foundation, and mentioned that Southwell was a biology and pre-med major. Wolman, a fellow Grosse Pointer, told them to have Southwell call her and she would arrange a tour of the offices.

Wolman apparently thought enough of Southwell to offer her a summer internship in the research department. "It was totally random and very lucky," Southwell says. "I'm very fortunate to have been given a chance to get such excellent experience."

Working daily with cells taken from the body of a 61-year-old man who had died of leukemia, Southwell studies and records the abnormalities in the chromosomal structure in the hopes of finding some pattern, or reason for the leukemia.

She is not working on a cure for leukemia, but perhaps someday the work done at this laboratory may provide clues to why leukemia develops.

"I really enjoy my work," Southwell says. "What we're working on now may lead to a

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### Farms voters to pare field for judgeship in primary Aug. 8

Officials from the city of Grosse Pointe Farms have scheduled a primary election for Tuesday, Aug. 8 to narrow the field of four candidates running for municipal judge.

The first primary held in more than a quarter century, according to City Manager Andrew Bremer, will pare the field to two candidates.

The seat is held by Judge Matthew Rumora, whose term expires in December. Rumora, 40, was appointed to the seat in spring 1988.

Prior to becoming judge, he served as a city prosecutor in the Farms and was a practicing attorney for 15 years.

"I'm running because I enjoy the job and enjoy working with people in the court. I enjoy using my talents and expertise as a service to the community."

Among the goals Rumora has for a second term is to keep the court's caseload under control and to make sure justice is not delayed because of a full docket.

"I'll do whatever is necessary and I'm always available to come in for an arraignment or when a search warrant is

needed. Sometimes you can't wait until the next day to take a blood test for evidence, as in a drunk driving case."

There are no current issues in the city, Rumora said.

"The court is doing good and the docket is not blocked up. I have heard no complaints relative to the courts, either from the police department, the court staff or from members of the community.

"I try to accommodate police officers, attorneys and members of the community," he added.

### Teens assaulted by man with badge

Two Grosse Pointe Woods teenagers were assaulted last week by a man who pulled out what he claimed to be a police badge.

The incident occurred at 11:28 a.m. July 21 when a 16-year-old girl was driving eastbound on Hampton behind another car that was moving slowly. The front car stopped on Hampton and had no turn signals on, the girl told police.

As the girl was passing the other car on the left, the front car began to make a left turn. The girl swerved to avoid the other car, and a verbal exchange followed between the motorists.

When she stopped at Goethe,

the man in the other car blocked her off and jumped out of his car. He confronted the Woods girl by displaying a small silver badge and saying he was a Detroit police officer. He demanded that she show him her identification.

When she questioned his authority, he grabbed her coat by the collar and again demanded her identification. She handed over her driver's license.

A 16-year-old male companion in the car then too began questioning the police officer's authority. The boy demanded to see the man's badge and police identification. The alleged police officer complied by again pulling

the badge and reaching inside the car and hitting the boy twice in the face, according to Woods police reports.

The self-proclaimed police officer then returned to his car and took off with the girl's license. Police were told by witnesses that the man lived at a house in the 1800 block of Hampton. Police found the vehicle described by the teenagers in the driveway at the home.

According to one officer's report, the man at the address is known to pull the badge during traffic stops.

Both teens want to press charges against the man.

Rumora is a lifelong resident of the Grosse Pointes and a graduate of Grosse Pointe High School. He is a member of the State Bar of Michigan, the Macomb County Bar Association and holds memberships in the Michigan and American Trial Lawyers Association.

Rumora volunteers as a probation officer in Grosse Pointe City.

One of his three challengers is Richard Roosen, who has visited most district courts in the state and wants the Farms to toughen laws for drunk drivers.

"In many cases repeat offenders just pay the fine and attend an alcohol rehabilitation program and they go free. I would advocate jail time, even for the first offense."

"I think first offenders should be given three days in jail. I recognize that many have jobs and I don't want to jeopardize that, but by giving them three days (in jail) at least you give them a message. This is serious. A car can be a weapon."

"We've got to give respect to the legal system to deter repeat offenders."

Roosen, 33, sees a rise in crime as an important issue for the upcoming campaign.

"The criminal element is coming our way. I would like to see strict enforcement of traffic coming into the community. It may deter party areas along the borders."

Roosen said the rise in civil litigation has bogged the courts down and that a civil mediation panel would keep several civil cases off court dockets.

"I'm also a strong advocate of using telephone conferences for

pre-trial examinations in civil cases. This would free the courts to devote more time to criminal cases."

Roosen is an associate of the law firm of Muller, Muller, Richmond, Harms, Myers and Sgroi of Birmingham. He and his wife Sue Ann have two children.

He is a graduate of the University of Michigan-Dearborn and the Detroit College of Law.

His professional memberships include the State Bar of Michigan, the Macomb County Bar Association, the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association and the Commercial Law League of America.

Paul C. Gracey, another challenger for the municipal judge seat, is an assistant vice president and counsel for DMR Financial Services Inc.

A 29-year resident of the Grosse Pointes, Gracey said, "I want to serve my community and its residents to, in some small way, repay what the community has given me and my wife and nine children."

"I believe I am well-qualified for the position by reason of my professional and practical background. I am a corporate attorney, not self-employed, and have the time and commitment to be available."

Gracey, 59, has many goals, with the court responding to community need at the top of his list.

"I want to insure that local residents and others having contact with the court are fully advised of procedures and receive a fair hearing."

Gracey wants to retain the municipal system rather than the district court system used in other parts of the state.

Currently the five Grosse Pointes and East Detroit are the only communities in the state using municipal courts.

"Because of the strong sense of community unique to the Pointes, our present system must be retained and any moves toward a district court system must be strenuously resisted," Gracey said.

He is a graduate of the University of Michigan Law School and the Wayne State University School of Business Administration.

Gracey is a member of the international legal fraternity of Phi Delta Phi.

A fourth candidate, Eugene Casazza, is a partner with the Mount Clemens law firm of Elliott, Knight and Casazza.

Of his bid for municipal judge, Casazza, 43, said, "I love the community and by serving in this office, I'd have the opportunity to give back to my community which has given so much to me and my family."

"If elected I would bring my sense of fairness to that court. I would be working in my term to speed the docket along. I would hope to provide the community with access to the court and a prompt resolution of disputes."

Regarding issues, Casazza said, "Attorneys, according to the canon of ethics, really should not

comment on what is going on in the courts. I think it's unwise for a candidate for municipal judge to comment on specifics.

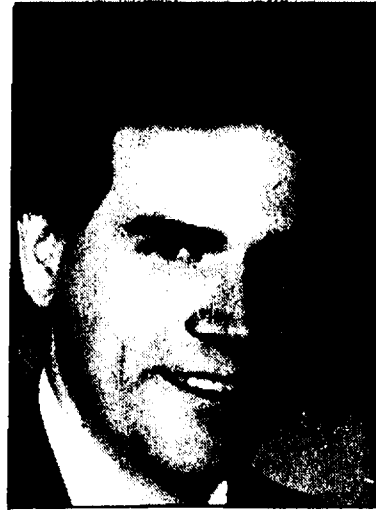
"I feel I'm the best candidate based on my experience and training for the position of municipal judge."

Casazza and his wife Linda have four children.

He is a graduate of Austin High School and the University of Detroit School of Law.

His professional memberships include the Michigan Bar Association, the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association and the Macomb County Bar Association.

The Farms municipal judge is elected to a four-year term and is responsible for arraignments in

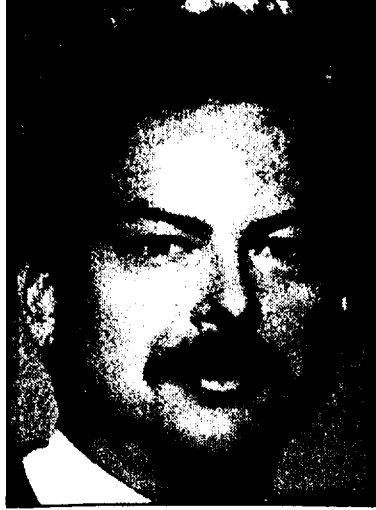

criminal cases and preliminary examinations in felony cases.

The judge presides over trials of all misdemeanor violations, civil cases up to \$1,500, including small claims, landlord-tenant disputes and all traffic violations.

pal Court is held regularly on the second and fourth Monday of each month. Responsibilities for judge include being available 24 hours a day, every day, for arraignments, to sign warrants, and to attend to urgent matters of the court as they arise.

Salary is \$12,000 a year.

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# Grosse Pointe foundations:

## 'Putting final touches on the community'

### City of Grosse Pointe

The newest in the Pointes, the City's foundation is starting out small and working toward larger projects.

The trustee board is basically the City Council, with Mayor Lorenzo Browning acting as president.

The first fundraiser concluded in April 1988 and raised just more than \$10,000. Combined with funds from the City's general budget, that money went for a new entranceway, gate and landscaping at Neff Park.

But all of the donations to the foundation haven't been money. A weathervane that now sits atop city hall was donated by Wild Wings Gallery and John and Julie Dyle. The Dyles will also be donating three signs to be placed at the entrance to the city.

Chris Matthew, administrative assistant, said that the foundation has a good number of members, but had no percentage of residents who donated. A person needs only donate \$10 to become a member of the city's foundation.

"We'd like everyone to join," Matthew said. "A lot of people want to share in the beauty of the city, and we hope we continue with our beautification work. We're really very proud of our foundation."

The next project is still under discussion.

### Grosse Pointe Farms

The Farms Foundation is the oldest in the Pointes. Its first meeting was held in late 1980. It is also the most active.

Since then, the more than \$250,000 that has been collected has gone to projects such as the Pier Park recreation building. The recreation building was funded primarily by a bequest from the estate of Benjamin H. Long. The rest was funded by donations.

Another project undertaken by the Farms Foundation was the beautification of Kercheval on the Hill, which now contains a gazebo and picnic tables.

"We could have just put in flowers and a picnic table, but we felt it would be a more attractive idea to put a gazebo in and create a home-town type feel," said Dan Grady, president of the foundation.

The foundation's most recent project was the new entranceway and wrought iron gate at Pier Park. Also included in that project was the wall and plaque in commemoration of former Mayor James Dingeman, and landscaping of the park.

"We want people to see what their money is going to," Grady said. "We try to serve a whole variety of needs of the people. We listen to ideas as to what they want to see. It's a pretty popular concept, sort of like a town meeting."

To date, the foundation has solicited funds only through mailings. Approximately 10 percent of the residents have donated money with amounts ranging from \$25 to \$50,000.

"We take it all," Grady said, expressing hope that more peo-

ple will see the foundation as a way to help the community.

"This is an attempt to do what should be done," he said. "It's putting the final touches on good projects and making them better."

The next likely projects on the agenda are an upgrade of the Hill parking areas and beautification of the pumping station on Lakeshore and Moross.

### Grosse Pointe Park

Founded in 1984, the Grosse Pointe Park Foundation is still young, but it is quite busy. It was recently recognized by the state as a charitable organization, so that half of all donations now become a credit toward the state taxes.

Of the \$279,400 that has been collected, some \$258,000 has been spent to beautify the city.

The first project for the foundation was the recently completed Tompkins Community Center at Windmill Pointe Park.

The center was the former bathhouse and recreation building at the park and was renovated for more than \$200,000. It will be available to Park residents year-round.

But the foundation isn't resting. Another fundraising mailing is being prepared and the 21-member board of trustees is setting its sights on Patterson Park next where they are looking into plans for a boardwalk along the lake.

"We have a long way to go. We're just looking into it, but it looks like a pretty good project," said City Manager Dale Krajniak, who is also the agent for the foundation.

Also, according to foundation President John C. Prost, another

project coming in the somewhat-distant future is a new entryway for Windmill Pointe Park. The foundation is waiting before going ahead with plans for that because the city of Detroit is building a new bridge at the foot of Alter Road and Windmill Pointe Drive.

"Basically we look into beautification-type improvements," Krajniak said. "There's a lot of competition for tax dollars, and usually they go to things that need to be done. These are projects that are the little extras."

### Grosse Pointe Shores

It was in 1984 when then-village President Gerald Schroeder decided the Shores needed a foundation; the main impetus to beautify Lakeshore.

"What they had tried to do and what I hope we're still doing is to make the Shores the gateway to the Pointes," said current foundation President Mary Matuja.

So they began collecting money. Then it was \$30 for a yearly membership, now it's \$50 a year, but donations of more than \$5,000 have been collected. More than \$375,000 has been raised to date with 426 households contributing. All but \$20,000 has been spent.

Most of that money has gone to make Lakeshore more beautiful. Grading and sodding of the medians in the road, as well as planting of trees and installation of sprinklers, has been the main project.

Last year, most of the sod on the medians died with the drought and is being replaced, but new sprinklers, which draw water directly from the lake, should make sure that doesn't

happen again this year.

The original fundraiser for the work on Lakeshore was a mailing and the foundation collected enough to do the work south of Vernier. A door-to-door campaign of residents on Lakeshore asked them to donate enough to improve just what is in front of their house. The rest of the work will be completed later this summer.

The next project — Phase IV of the Lakeshore redevelopment — will be placing lighted street signs at each of the streets which dead end at Lakeshore.

There are now two different signs, one at Lakeshore and Roslyn, and one at Lakeshore and Hawthorne. Residents are being asked to take a look at the two signs and vote on their preference. Whichever wins will be installed all along Lakeshore.

With a donation of a certain amount of money to be decided later, residents can also dedicate a street sign to someone. A plaque will be placed at the base saying who is memorialized by the sign.

"I just feel that the community should have an input on what they like," Matuja said. "We like them to know what we're doing."

Future projects, for now are on the back burner while the foundation finishes what it started, will be conversion of the Vernier School for community use and park improvements.

### Grosse Pointe Woods

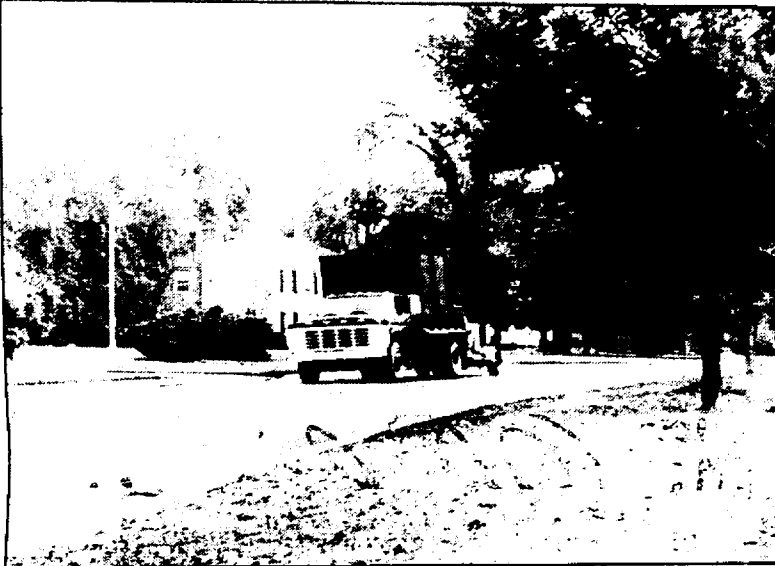
The Woods is the only city in the Pointes without a formal foundation, however, the city established funds for residents to make charitable donations to their city, according to city attorney George Catlin.

Of the funds, one is earmarked for donations to the general beautification of the Woods, and one is for work done to the Veterans Memorial Parkway — the median at the corner of Mack

and Vernier.

"A number of the Pointes have set up foundations and we felt there might be people who want to donate to the city and we set this up as a way for them to do that," Mayor George Freeman said.

The funds were set up within the last five years and the money collected — there is no sure figure as to how much — has been spent on a number of smaller projects.

## Why foundations?

"Many people feel that a foundation is formed only when a city is doing poorly," said Grosse Pointe Farms Foundation President Dan Grady. "But that's not true. It's only when the city's doing well."

There are more than 40 community foundations in the state, four of which are in the Grosse Pointes. Combined, close to \$1 million has been collected to, as Grady says, "put the final touches on city projects."

But why do people donate to community foundations in addition to paying taxes to the city?

"There are a lot of projects that just plain can't be afforded with taxes," Grady said. Projects done by the foundations are usually the icing on the cake.

"It's a chance for people to say, 'See that? I helped build that,'" says Chris Matthew, Grosse Pointe City administrative assistant. "It's better than pointing to a garbage truck and saying, 'I own a piece of that.'"

The whole idea of foundations is for people to show how proud they are of their community and to enhance the city without raising the taxes.

"When there's a need," said Mary Matuja of the Shores Improvement Foundation, "Grosse Pointers respond. They've been so generous with their time and their donations."

Not everyone donates to their city foundations. Many people may feel their taxes are enough, and others may not want change. Although exact figures are not available, most cities believe approximately 10 percent of its residents donate to foundations. The Shores, however, measures its membership at nearly 30 percent.

"There is an extreme amount of pride we have in our community, and people like to show it," said Dale Krajniak, Park city manager. "In most foundations, you can earmark your donation for a certain project, and people like that."

All foundations work closely with their city council and beautification commission. Each of the councils appoint members to their commission. The trustees then serve on the board without compensation.

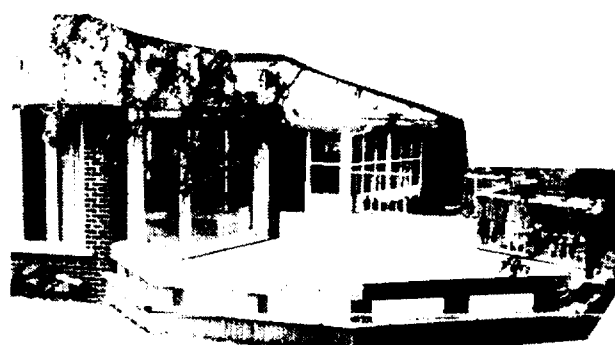

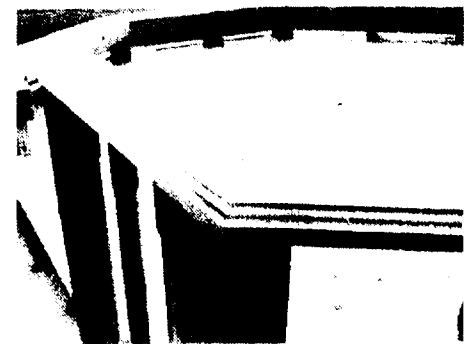
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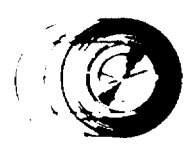
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## Don't read and drive

The hostess was startled and called out the manager's name. When the manager started to come forward, the suspect fled without getting any money. He was last seen heading east through the parking lot.

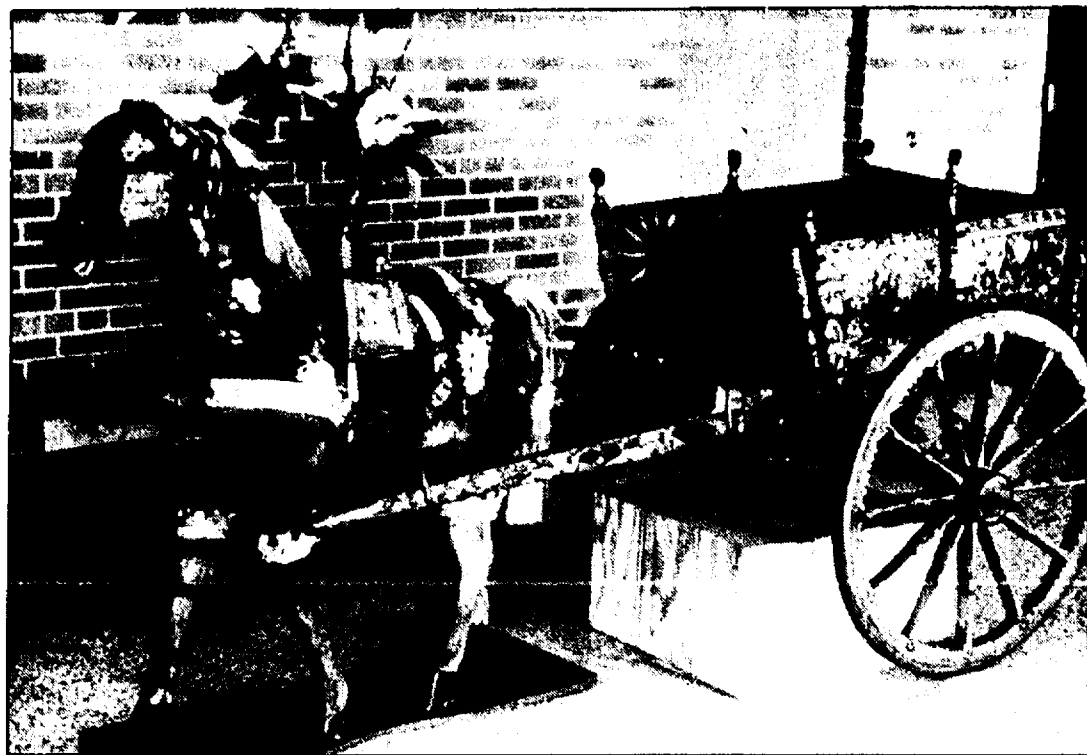

## Drunk driving arrests made in Pointes

A Woods family was arrested July 21 when the man, 20, was caught driving drunk and his mother and sister interfered with police attempting to lock him up.

The man was stopped on Mack at 3:45 a.m. when police saw him driving erratically.

His blood alcohol content was .11 when checked at the station. He was not wearing a seat belt and his license plates were expired. Police also found that he was wanted on a misdemeanor charge in East Detroit.

When East Detroit police arrived at the Woods station to take him into custody, the man's mother and sister took up positions at the doors leading to the circular drive, according to police reports. The sister grabbed a Woods officer by the arm with both hands, then the mother

went after both East Detroit officers.

Both women were placed under arrest.

A Grosse Pointe Shores man, 20, was arrested for drunk driving July 20 when a Shores officer found him driving 40 miles an hour on Michaux Court.

A preliminary breath test registered a .20 blood alcohol content; subsequent tests showed .18 and .17. The legal level for intoxication is .10.

Police found 24 empty beer cans in the back seat of the car and two empties and two full cans in the front. There was also a billy club between the front seats, according to the police report.

The man's driver's license was restricted to driving with family members only, but his passenger was a friend. He was kept overnight in the Shores lockup.

A Northville man, 21, was arrested July 15 for drunk driving on Lakeshore when police caught him driving 57 mph in a 35 mph zone. He told the officer he thought he was driving on Metropolitan Parkway. His blood alcohol content registered .19 in a preliminary test.

A 35-year-old Grosse Pointe Shores woman was arrested by Grosse Pointe City police for drunk driving at 1:23 a.m. June 22.

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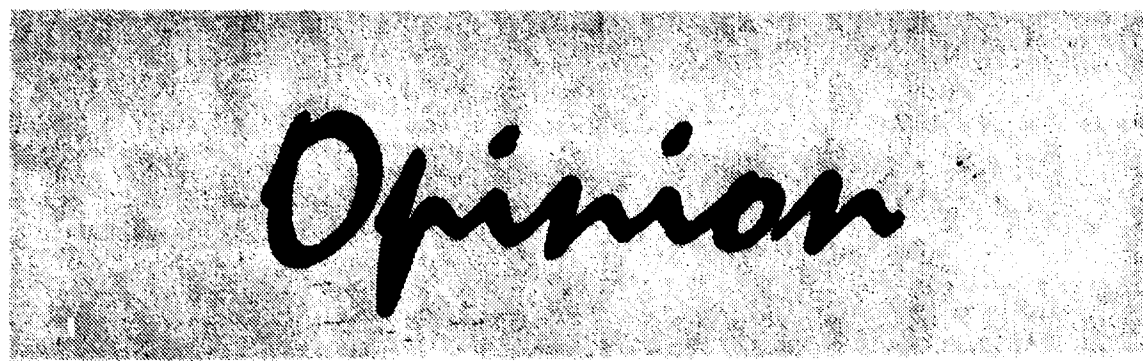
# Local schools exceed state's new standard

A spokesman for the Grosse Pointe schools last week offered a good explanation for the fact that the local schools do not meet state standards for graduation in all respects.

The comment by Roger McCaig, director of research and evaluation, was that most Grosse Pointe students exceed the minimum requirements recommended by the state Board of Education and take courses that are more challenging than they need to be to meet the state standards. And he offered specific examples to support that contention.

At the same time, however, he promised to look into the local system's failure to meet two of the state's specific recommendations and to check again on the local requirements.

In fact, the only areas in which the Grosse Pointe schools fail to meet the state's standards are in computer education and social science. The state recom-



mends a half-year of computer education and three years of social science, including history. The Pointe schools do not require computer education and the local standards call for only 2-1/2 years of social studies.

Yet 82 percent of the local students in 1988 took three years of social science. While the 2-1/2 year local requirement covers one year of U.S. history, one semester of government, one semester of world history and one semester of social studies, many students take a year of civics and a second semester of world history to supplement the requirement.

As for the computer education recommendation, many Grosse Pointe students take non-required computer courses and many others also get word processing ex-

perience on the school's computers in their regular course work.

In math, 97 percent of the 1988 graduates took one year of college-bound algebra, at least, when a basic arithmetic course would have filled the requirement. In science 75 percent of the graduates took three years, as contrasted with the state recommendation of two years.

Grosse Pointe students also are heavily into foreign language studies although they are not required either by the state or local boards. In Grosse Pointe, 82 percent of all 1988 graduates had studied a foreign language for one year and 31 percent had taken four years by the time they had left school.

While the state recommends three years of communications, which could include

English, writing and speech, the Grosse Pointe schools require four years of communication. In addition, they require 1-1/2 years of fine and practical arts, in which the state makes no recommendations.

Overall, state recommendations call for 210 credits for graduation but more than 90 percent of the Grosse Pointe graduates accumulate 230 credits and 75 percent obtain 245 credits.

Those are impressive answers to the state finding that the Grosse Pointe School District is one of more than 250 that do not meet the state Board of Education recommendations on minimum graduation requirements. In fact, a comparison of the standards recommended by the state and those required in the Pointes raises more questions about the state's low standards than about the Pointe's failure to meet two of the state's recommendations.

As McCaig says, Grosse Pointe does have a good program. Many of us would say that it offers a superior education as a result of its long tradition of seeking excellence. That doesn't mean, however, the schools can rest on their reputation. They, too, must keep pace with change to make sure they prepare students as well as possible for today's world. The evidence to date indicates they are doing well in this important respect.

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## Medicare surtax cut hinted

Testifying to the potency of the lobbying efforts of elderly Americans, Congress and the administration appear to be softening their opposition to reductions in the Medicare surtax on senior citizens.

Even the chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, Illinois Democrat, last week proposed to shift some Medicare insurance costs to recipients with higher incomes but require the 33 million beneficiaries to pay more of their direct costs.

The chairman's plan would reduce the surtax by two-thirds to \$7.50 for each \$150 of federal tax liability, from \$22.50, but wealthier elderly people still would have to pay the \$800 maximum surtax because higher levels of income would be subject to the levy.

Rostenkowski's move came a day after the Bush administration, through Richard G. Darman, director of management and budget, told the Ways and Means Committee that it could accept a higher Social Security tax on some seniors if it would mean the elimination of the surtax on some others. Such an increase would not violate President George Bush's pledge of no new taxes because the two steps would amount to a net tax reduction.

Whatever happens, it is clear that the American Association of Retired People and other organizations representing sen-

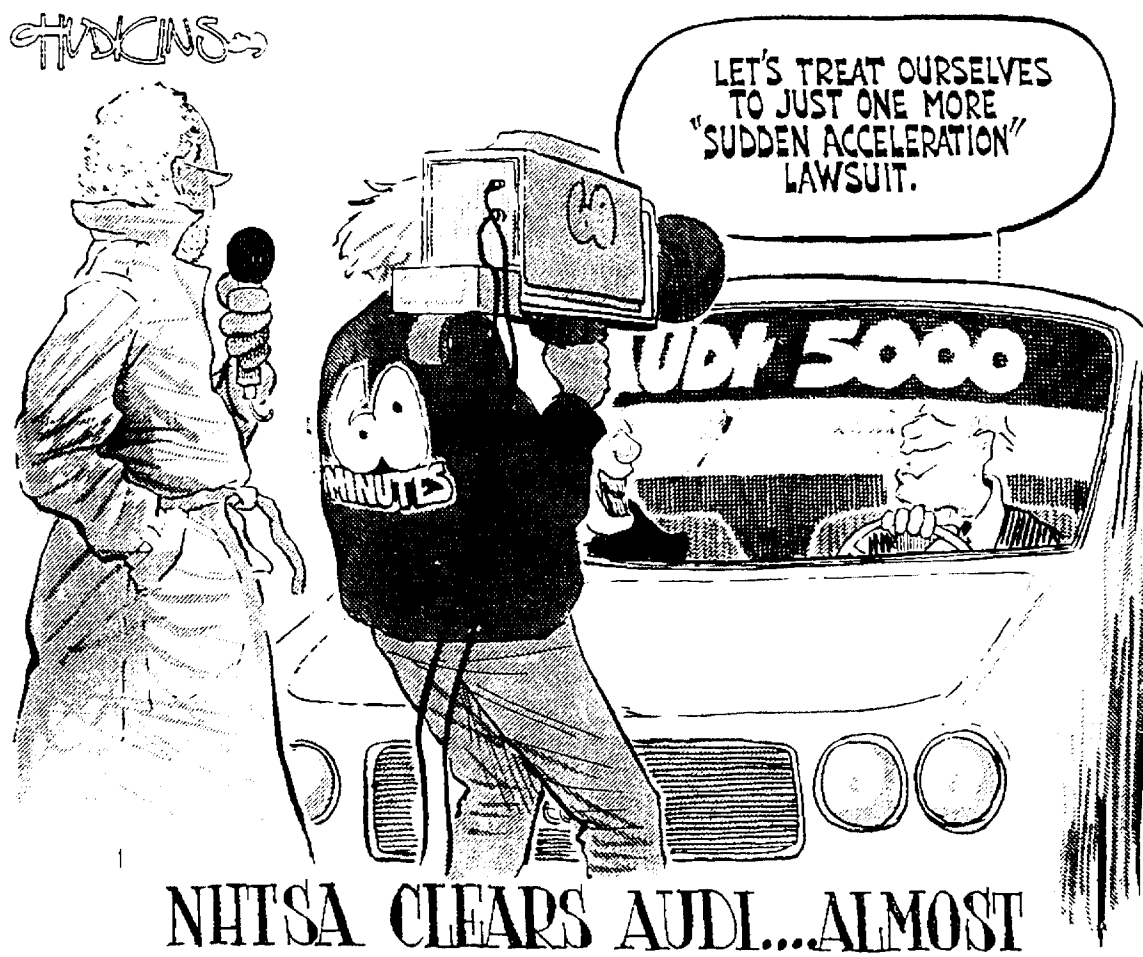
ior citizens have raised such a howl over the big tax increases imposed this year on Medicare recipients that Congress is going to try to do something about it.

The protesters are unhappy for several reasons: The law finances the expanded program by taxes only on the elderly, at what they claim is excessive cost, rather than by taxes on all age groups. It provides benefits many do not need. And it fails to address a major need, financial help for long-term convalescent care.

Under present law, elderly taxpayers with an income of \$35,000 to \$40,000 this year are being required to pay the maximum \$800 surtax while under Rostenkowski's plan the ceiling would not be reached until income reached \$55,000 to \$60,000.

This change would cost the Treasury \$3.5 billion. To offset this revenue loss, Rostenkowski's plan would increase by \$3.50 the \$31.90 fee paid by all Medicare beneficiaries and increase the amount that beneficiaries would have to pay before being eligible for the program's benefits.

In view of the positions taken on the tax revisions by both the Bush administration and the chairman of the tax-writing committee, some changes in the Medicare tax increases that became effective this year appear increasingly likely. In fairness to senior citizens, some revisions are needed, especially to cut the higher taxes on those eligible for Medicare.

## How the mighty have fallen

What a difference a year makes to a politician. A year ago Michael Dukakis was riding high as the Democratic nominee for president and, in fact, was leading in the early public opinion polls. Today he has lost much of his popularity, even in his home state.

What happened to the governor of Massachusetts?

He was, of course, soundly beaten by the Republican nominee, George Bush, but even in Massachusetts his popularity has plummeted. It has been a "dizzying descent," according to the headline on a column by David Nyhan of the Boston Globe.

Nyhan contends that what happened to Dukakis in the last year "was largely self-inflicted." As a result, Nyhan goes on, "Duke is a lame-duck governor of decreasing influence, playing a largely irrelevant role in the state fiscal mess, mocked by opponents, ignored by his Legislature, baffling to even his own core constituency."

A United Press International story out of Boston last week reported that 81 percent of the people of Massachusetts, in a recent public opinion poll, had disapproved of his performance as governor and critics even called for his impeachment.

"His actions last week hardly made him any more popular," the UPI story went on. "The three-term governor, who campaigned for president on his managerial and budget-balancing ability, on Thursday slashed almost a half-billion dollars in state spending in a move that brought out-

cries from the poor and elderly."

Even worse, in the minds of some critics, the Legislature was forced to enact a temporary 15 percent increase in the state income tax, giving Massachusetts the nation's highest tax rate.

Massachusetts state officials have blamed the nation's economic slowdown and changes in federal tax laws, which hurt tax revenues in many states, for the state mess, which caused even the Massachusetts bond rating to fall. But many also held Dukakis responsible, at least in part, for the state's overspending and its economic ills.

Columnist Nyhan, critical of Dukakis for failing to respond to criticism during the presidential campaign and the Massachusetts legislative session, declared the governor "will not regain the respect of the electorate or the political community until he stops behaving like an amnesia victim and starts inflicting damage on those who demean him at will."

"A strong leader is one who vanquishes his foes," Nyhan went on. "Dukakis hasn't vanquished anybody but himself in a long, long time."

Meanwhile, the 1988 victor, George Bush, who has just completed his first six months in office, is flying high after a successful tour of Europe that improved his own standing with world leaders and the American people.

As we've said, what a difference a year makes.

## EMS

To the Editor:

I am writing regarding the article, "Park EMS goes on line with automatic defibrillator," which appeared in the Grosse Pointe News on July 20. I have followed the controversy regarding EMS services in the Grosse Pointes with interest.

I moved here five years ago from the Washington, D.C. area and was amazed at the level of emergency services available in Michigan which I feel are deficient compared to the rest of the country. The City of Detroit statistically has one of the worst EMS services in the country. One would expect that the Grosse Pointes could do better given revenues that are available and the general awareness of residents.

That is why I found it absurd that Dr. Ronald Laskowski, emergency room director at Bon Secours Hospital, was quoted as recommending that Grosse Pointe Park not invest in advanced life support. He said the city is too small to justify this and said the limited number of calls would not enable the staff to "stay sharp." He said "it would be like an emergency room

trying to maintain optimum skills while serving only two patients a day."

I hope the citizens of Grosse Pointe Park and city officials don't buy this ridiculous line of reasoning. Does the police department fail to carry firearms because they only use them every few years? Does the fire department fail to purchase fire engines because a major fire only happens now and then? Has Dr. Laskowski never heard of training?

That is what public safety agencies live by, training. If advanced EMS saved one life each year, one person's child, father, mother, wife or husband, it would be worth it. Many other communities see it this way. Taxpayers have the absolute right to demand the best for their community.

Why do so many cities in this state thrive on mediocrity? If one were to follow Dr. Laskowski's line of reasoning regarding an emergency room maintaining optimum skills, they would not go to Bon Secours Hospital for any serious injury. They would go to the east side trauma center, St. John Hospital.

I have no quarrel with Bon Secours Hospital or Dr. Laskowski, but it irks me to see a so-called "expert and

professional" try to influence decisions that will literally affect the lives of area residents.

that what a person exposes to the public is not protected by the fourth amendment, which protects us against unreasonable searches and seizures. Relying on this principle, the Court has upheld the government's use of such surveillance devices as electronic beepers, placed on cars to track their whereabouts, and pen registers

that trace the numbers dialed from a telephone. The Court also had upheld airplane and helicopter surveillance of private property.

In terms of intrusiveness and offensiveness, the open use of surveillance cameras in public parks does not begin to compare either to the use of beepers and pen registers, which are employed surreptitiously rather than

openly, or to the use of helicopters or aircraft to observe not public but private property. Moreover, if Mr. Grossman's three conditions of legality were valid, one could not sustain government mandated airport surveillance, which every court to consider the issue has sustained. It simply does not invade reasonable expectations of privacy for the government to observe what everyone else can observe in a public place like a park.

The ACLU's plan to put the city to the expense of defending this suit shows once again that it too often is willing to use the courts in an attempt to defend not the constitution that we actually have but the constitution it would prefer that we have. There may be good policy reasons to oppose surveillance cameras, but given our constitution, this is an issue for the people of the Woods, through their elected representatives, to decide. Not content to accept the results of the democratic process, Mr. Grossman and the ACLU want to use the courts to impose their own view of the good society on the people.

I need only add that the ACLU's view of the good society, a view that too often leaves communities disabled from adequately addressing serious problems, is one that many people do not share. It is small wonder that in the last presidential election, the ACLU was such an inviting target.

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# Ancient game of horseshoes hasn't caught on here yet

George Bush is doing a lot of pitching these days, and not just to the Congress.

The president has developed more than a casual interest in pitching horseshoes.

Many claim that the sport has grown in popularity since Bush showed up at the National Horseshoe Pitching Association championship in Columbus, Ohio, during his presidential campaign.

Stanley Swarthout, veteran horseshoe pitcher, was there and saw Bush and his running mate, Dan Quayle, pitch a couple games.

"Bush was pretty good," said Swarthout, of Milan. "He threw about 30 percent ringers. He's a very avid player."

Bush picked up the game from Secret Service agents while he was vice president and vacationing in Kennebunkport, Maine. Upon his return to Washington, the vice president promptly had a horseshoe pit installed at his office residence.

Pits have now been installed at the White House and Camp David.

Bush is just one of nearly 10 million Americans who play the sport at least once a year, according to the national association.

Some claim shoe pitching is about 2,000 years old. Others say the conquering Norman soldiers brought the game to England in the 11th century. The game was brought to America by early settlers.

In 20th century rural America, game pieces were worn-out shoes taken from work horses. A standardized throwing shoe was introduced in the 1920s. Today, the NHPA has a sanctioned shoe for competition which features hooks on both legs.

Swarthout has been in organized horseshoe pitching competition for about 22 years, but he's been a backyard pitcher since he was 11 on his family farm. His wife, Jean, also an avid pitcher, is a six-time ladies state champion. She set a state record by pitching 91.7 percent ringers, ringing 22 of 24 attempts.

"She is much better than I am," he said. "She beats me a lot."

On top of the horseshoe heap is Canadian Elmer Hohl, a world record holder, pitching two perfect games and a streak of 32 games at 88.8 percent.

"He is the greatest player who ever lived," Swarthout said.

Hohl set the record at one of the many annual friendship tournaments between the United States and Canada.

Swarthout said a professional set of horseshoes made of stainless steel can cost up to \$70. For the money, you get a well-balanced set of four shoes and two stakes, all of measured weight.

"But that's for the professional," he said.

Les Seppala, owner of Harper Sport Shop in Detroit, says you can pick up a good set for about \$25. He usually sells about 50 sets per year, but this year Seppala has noted an increase in sales, mostly to senior citizens.

Ron Demski, salesperson at Burke's Sport Haven in East Detroit, said he sells horseshoe sets to people 20 years old on up, for about the same price.

"Mostly we sell sets to families on their way to a picnic," he said. "It's not a real popular sport with teenagers."

Local parks and recreation directors say the game has not been very popular in the five Grosse Pointes with any age group.

Though the Park and Woods

have two pits each, the park directors say there is not much of a demand.

According to Swarthout, that may change soon.

"More people are hearing about it and the sport is growing every year." Nationally, at least, the numbers support his contention. Clubs joining the NHPA have gone from 4,000 to 15,000 in just five years. Plans are under way for 100 indoor arenas nationwide and a new synthetic clay permits indoor play without a big mess.

Rules are fairly simple. Stakes are placed 40 feet apart. A ringer is three points. A leaner against the stake or within six inches of the stake is one point. A looser interpretation omits the

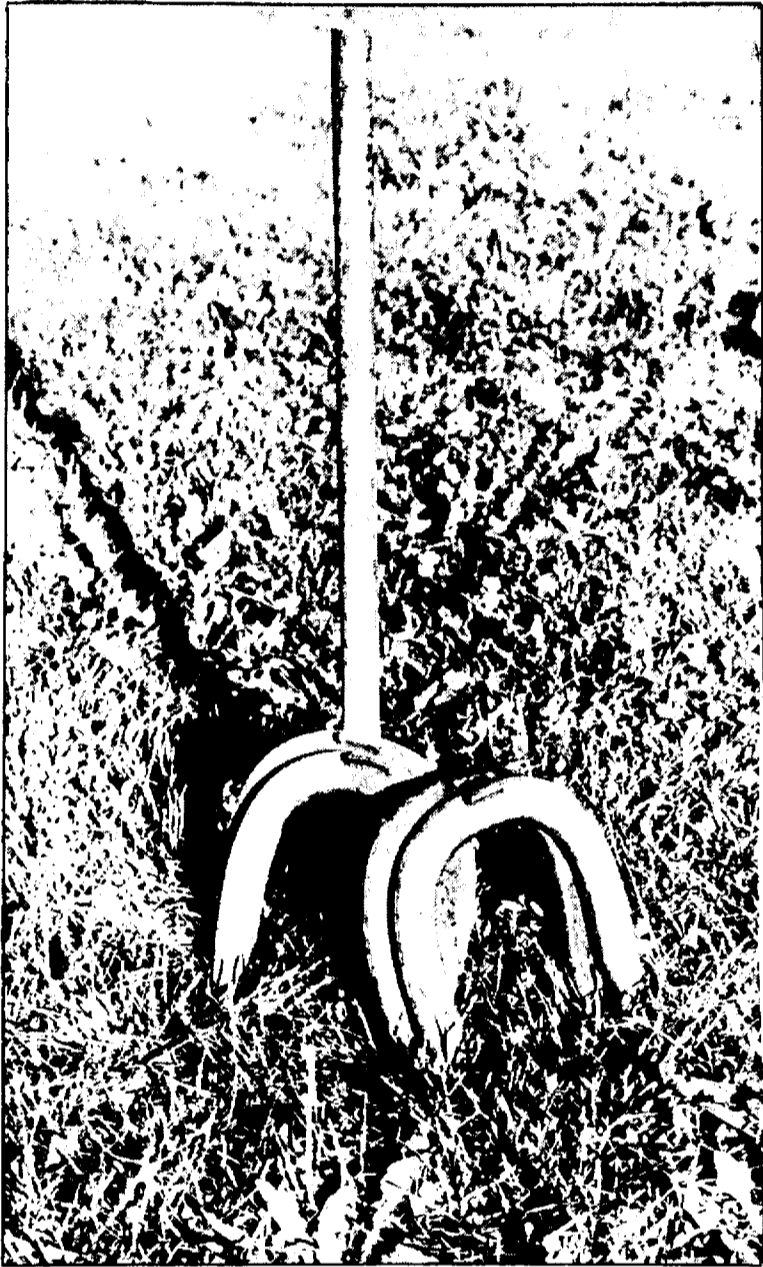
six-inch rule and the closest shoe to the stake is one point. Players take turns throwing two shoes each, usually red and green, and alternate between the two stakes.

"It's a great sport. It's good for your health," Swarthout said.

He should know. In 1979 he had a heart attack requiring double bypass surgery. He got the OK from his doctor to pitch and the following year was runner-up for the Michigan state championship, pitching 65 percent.

"I didn't do too bad. I won 10 games and lost one."

It's good competition," Swarthout said. "Most people who pitch horseshoes are good sports. They're a good bunch of people."

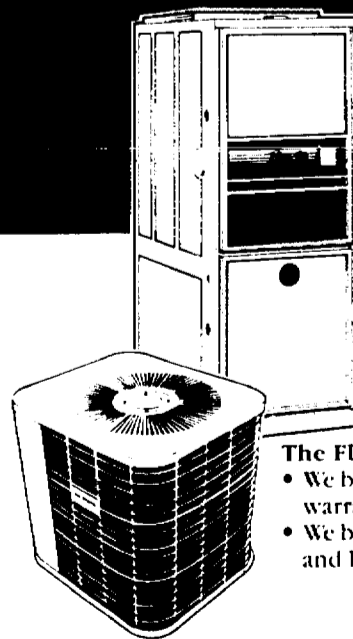

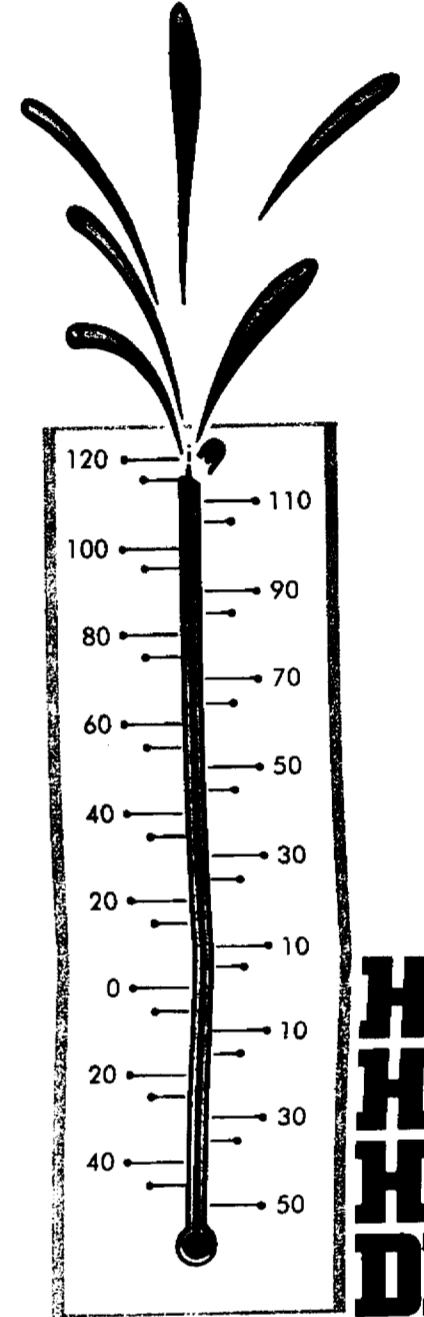

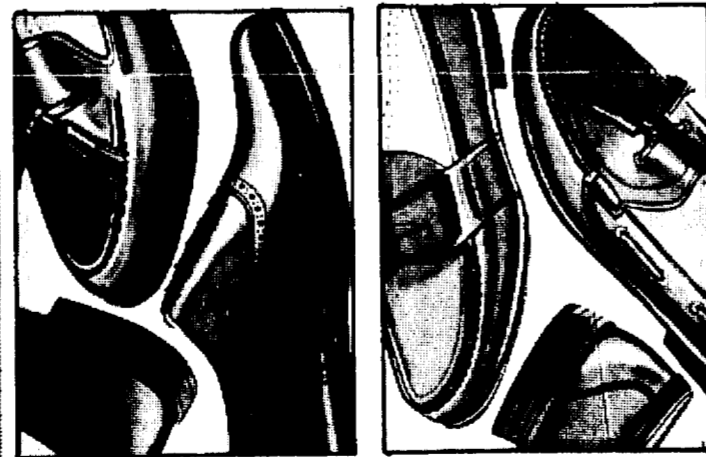

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# Automobiles: Each decade has its own look, style

You hear it a lot. Most car fans have said it themselves. "Cars all look the same today. They don't have personality like they used to."

General Motors is lashed in the automotive press for building scores of different models that all look alike. Now Chevrolet's new Lumina seems to complete the takeover of '80s auto styling by the rounded, swoopy "aero" look. Almost all the current crop of new cars, whether American,

ent if you inspect them side by side, but their overall appearance is similar and their similarities tie them together much more tightly than their differences distinguish them. They are both of a styling mode that might be called the '30s look.

Most cars in the '30s had a long hood, flaring fenders, a large passenger greenhouse and an abbreviated trunk or just a straight drop from roof to rear bumper. The look was started by

but this approach gave a distinctive look to pre-stylist-era cars.

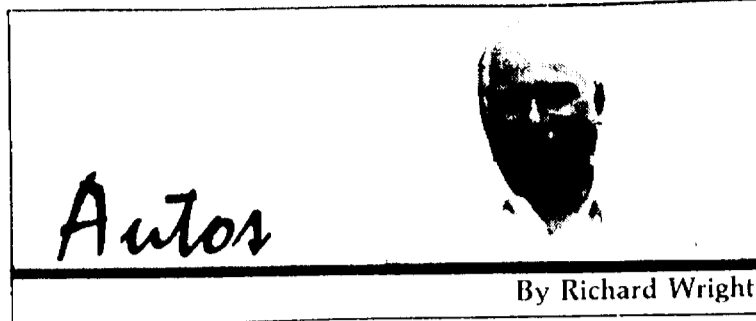
The pressure to conform is great. Car buyers seem more conservative than the stylists. The Chrysler Airflow of the '30s was a radical look which embodied numerous technological advances, but it was a sales flop and Chrysler retreated to styling more in line with the '30s look.

The '36 Cord had a breathtakingly modern design - it still looks modern today - but was the last Cord, although no one blames the styling. It may be instructive, however, that the dies for this beautiful car were used in building the last Graham and the last Hupmobile, both of which were beautiful in looks but not in sales.

The same shape that dominated American cars in the '30s prevailed in Europe and Japan. In fact, some British makers kept the '30s look into the '50s.

The '40s look was more rounded, introduced by a number of makers in '38 and most notably by Ford and the new Mercury for '39. It is distinguishable from the '30s look, but was a variation of it. The first radical change that took hold and swept the industry came in 1947 when Studebaker introduced the modern look - fenders integrated into the body, hood and rear deck of similar length and passenger greenhouse in the middle of the body.

Comedians had a good time with the Studebaker, joking that it looked the same coming or going, but the public liked it and

it bought Studebaker another 10 years of life it might not otherwise have had.

Kaiser-Fraser followed suit the same year with a fenderless upside-down bathtub look foreshadowing designs to come. In 1948, Hudson introduced its long, low "step-down" model and Nash weighted it with its own upside-down bathtub Airflite. The Chrysler Airflow had just been too far ahead of its time.

Then in '49 the Big Three bought out their modern entries. Chrysler Corp., which had been No. 2 in sales, had the least modern-looking lineup and it slipped behind Ford, never to regain second spot. The old look was gone, fenders had gone the way of running boards and each year cars got longer, lower and more chromed.

Portending the next look was a styling feature of the '48 Cadillac. Harley Earl, impressed with the look of the World War II P-38 fighter plane, housed the tail-lights of the '48 Caddy in small tailfins at the end of the rear fenders. Through the '50s these developed into great soaring ap-

pendages, irritating critics but delighting car buyers.

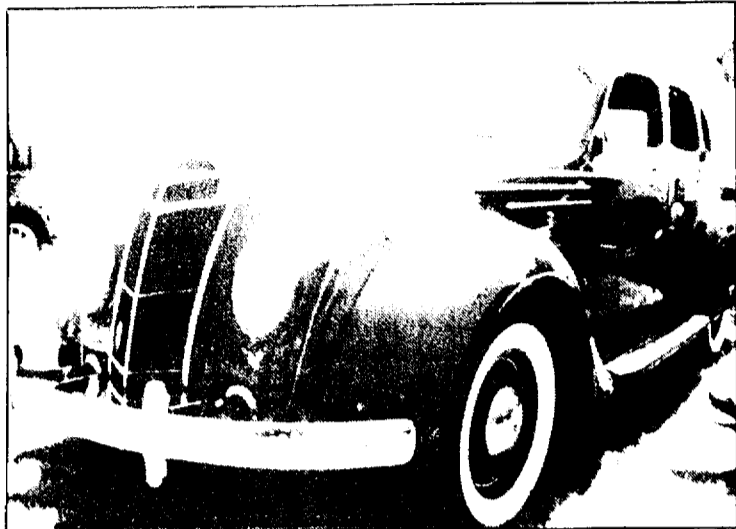
Fins had no effect on handling or stability, but they had an enormous effect on sales. Chrysler's "Forward Look" incorporated ridiculously large but oddly handsome fins and the '59

Cadillac has become a collector's classic on the strength of its outrageous, almost grotesque fins.

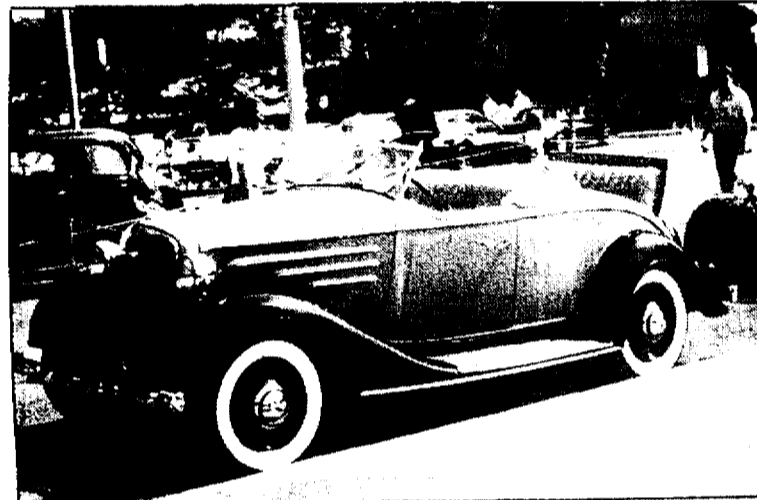
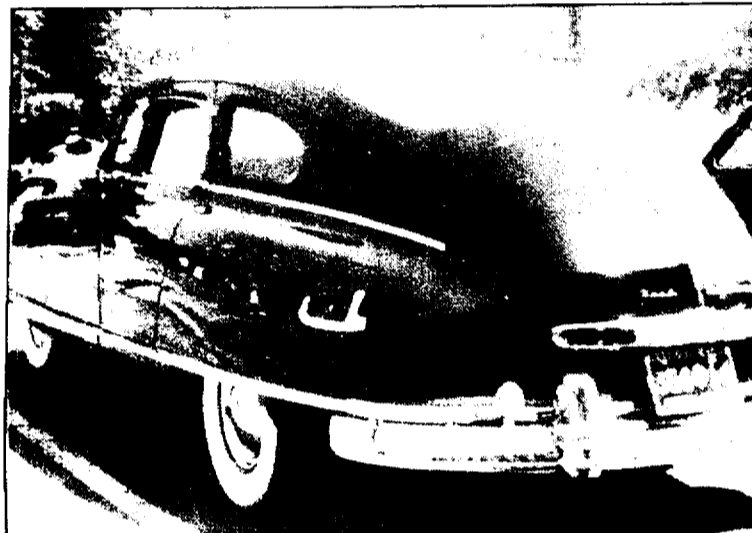
The fins craze subsided in the early '60s, but not until it had spread like some weird virus to such unlikely places as the resolutely unfashionable Rambler and that bastion of conservative styling, Mercedes-Benz.

Through the '60s and into the '70s, the car kept the basic shape of a long box with a shorter box perched atop it with roughly equal hood and rear deck and fenders integrated into slab sides. Compact cars had roughly the same shape, as did intermediates. They were smaller ver-

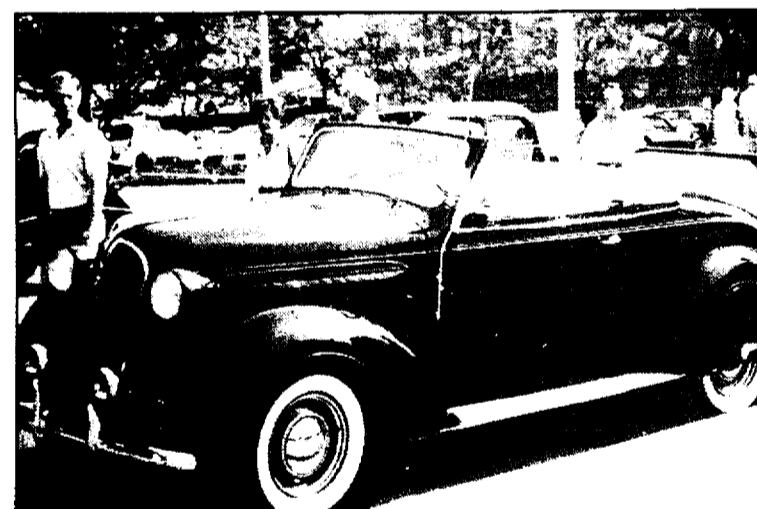

European or Japanese, high-priced or low, have similar shapes.

Park a Chevy Lumina or Corsica next to a Ford Taurus and you can easily tell them apart. But when you see them separated on the road, they do have a lot in common. A new Lumina is really quite different in its styling from Taurus. But it looks a lot more like a Taurus than it does a '78 Chevrolet, which looks like a '78 Ford.

It was only a few years ago when the look that currently dominates was viewed with mixed feelings. Pioneered by Audi and Ford of Europe, the smooth rounded look introduced on the 1983 Ford Thunderbird and Mercury Cougar was derided as "jellybean" or "flying potato."

But the look quickly spread through the Ford lineup and then through the entire industry, each maker producing a variation of this '80s styling theme. And it has always been this way. There have been at least seven or eight distinct looks since systematic automotive styling began in 1927. And the first car with a very different look of ten does not do well in sales.

The differences between a '37 Ford and a '37 Chevy are appar-

the 1927 Cadillac LaSalle, designed by Harley Earl, Hollywood designer of custom cars for the stars. GM hired Earl to head Detroit's first styling studio and the '28 Cadillac established a look which was adapted by the competition. They did not steal the design, they did variations of it because it sold and it used current technology.

The pressure on car makers to adapt successful styling approaches is intense. Technological advances and pressures of the marketplace result in distinctive looks for almost all cars of a particular era. The cars of the '30s, despite their ads which indicated enormous differences between them, look very much alike to the modern eye.

Until stylists were introduced by GM in the late '20s, the chassis was designed by engineers, then a passenger compartment designed by a body maker would be attached to it. The car might look good overall or it might not,


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


sions of big cars, but in Europe and Japan, stylists were designing cars intended to be small and not looking like little big cars. And there was the Ford Mustang.

The Mustang had a long hood and short rear deck, which became the look of the "pony car" and opened up a new market frontier.

In the '70s, big cars kept the slab-sided box look, but the Volkswagen Rabbit defined the shape of the econobox.

Then the '83 T-Bird introduced to the United States the current favored look, the "jellybean," although Roger Rowand, veteran Automotive News writer, claims the look was introduced by American Motors on its Pacer.

What is next? Well at the Detroit auto show last winter there were a number of concept cars that looked like smooth, plastic toys with bright colors and funny shaped headlights. And Mazda had just introduced its Miata Sports car, which has that look. (They are not plastic but the new paint techniques give

them the deep gloss look of new plastic.)

There always seems to be a joker in the deck which ruins all the carefully constructed theories and the joker in the styling deck is the Volkswagen Beetle, designed in the mid-'30s, best seller in the United States well into the '70s, still built in Mexico and Brazil into the '80s.

The Beetle's unique styling defies classification. And even though it was the biggest-selling design in history, surpassing even the Ford Model T, no one ever imitated it.

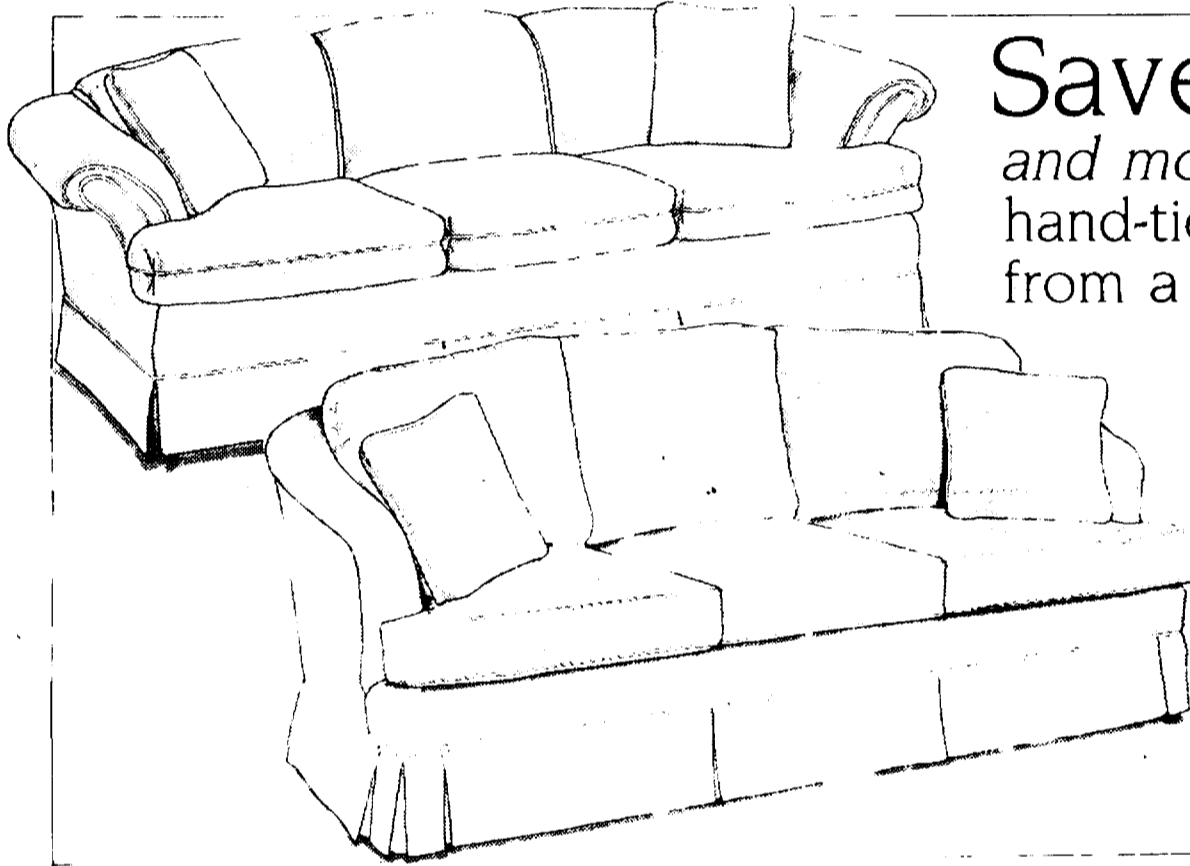

While driving down a mountain road, the Carrolls came upon a curve which Carroll said required people to drive on the wrong side. Their van smashed into a parked car, head-on. Luckily no one was hurt.

Since the accident happened in front of a courthouse, he went in to explain what happened and was told that people simply do not report small things like that. When he requested an officer, he was informed that people don't call the police for auto accidents. They just keep driving, the clerk explained.

Their experience in Hong Kong was a scene out of Chevy Chase's "European Vacation."

In crossing a busy street, the rest of the family had gone ahead and Carroll was behind carrying a mountain of luggage on rolling racks. Each time he attempted to cross the street, the luggage would spill into the busy thoroughfare.

After several attempts, he finally gave up and carried the bags across, making several trips.

We had to take foul-tasting pills to guard against malaria and Molly would not swallow one. She held it in her mouth for 15 minutes and finally spit up all over dad."

As with the other mishaps, things worked out all right.

The Carrolls then ventured to Greece, where they were up all night battling mosquitos in a room with no screens.

In what they described as a "boat ride to hell," the family decided to take an overnight

boat to the Greek island of Crete. They slept in open bunks on a boat with no private rooms.

Carroll kept the money, passports, identification and travelers checks in a sack that was wrapped around him during the night.

Upon awakening, they found the sack was gone.

They explained their plight to the ship's captain, who told them, "Don't worry, the bag will appear."

Three hours later it did — minus the money.

Next it was off to England's Buckingham Palace for the changing of the guard.

The sight was so captivating for the 8-year-old Kevin, that he

pushed his head through the large iron gates and couldn't get loose. But by this time, the Carrolls were not fazed by anything and they eventually freed their son.

"The people we met made the trip," Mrs. Carroll said. "Even the problems we had are funny, and being a family is what really made the trip special.

"It was nice being able to see the kids mature and to interact with other children of the 'world,'" she said.

"If there is anything we would do differently," her husband said, "is we would spend six months instead of four. It wasn't easy, but it was well worth it."

A few days later, the family woke up and noticed a strange quiet had befallen the German countryside. John needed cash to pay for their room and to buy food. Having great trouble, he drove nearly 20 miles and stopped in four villages trying to speak English with someone before discovering it was a national holiday and he would not be able to cash any traveler's checks.

Surviving the ordeal, the Carrolls ventured to Kenya where they embarked on an African safari. Unfortunately Mrs. Carroll's faith was temporarily dashed.

Between the dust, the smells, the poor roads and the food, she said, "I cried the first night. I thought we wouldn't make it, it was a real experience."

Her husband added, "The roads were so terrible it felt like our insides would come right out of our bodies. We got stuck in the mud in rhino country and

discovery, but I won't be here long enough to see that, though.

"My dad has this big dream that one day there will be a Lisa Southwell cure to cancer," she says with a laugh.

The 40 unpaid hours a week she spends in the lab have advanced her knowledge of genetics and of the research process. She has also learned a lot about herself.

"I took genetics in college and I came out knowing what genes were and what mitosis is, but I'm learning so much more about it than when I left that class," she says. "I feel my knowledge has increased probably 14 times what I learned in class."

She adds: "Research gets real slow, especially in my position. You can get real down. You don't know if you're doing anything that is going to be helpful or not. Like (the specific cell development) we're looking at now.

It may never ever happen in a person, just in a lab. We may not ever know.

"It's easy to get depressed. Somedays I go home and talk and talk and talk at the dinner table about everything that's going on, and it's really interesting, but then there are some days..."

And she learned about herself. "I don't think I want to go into research," she said. "I really want to work with people and medicine is a very personal field, research isn't. I don't know if this research will get me to where I want to be, but I think it's giving me a head start into the better medical schools."

Southwell has always had her mind set on a career in the medical field, and she had the full support of her parents.

"When I was in second grade, my parents sat me and my brother Todd down and told us that we shouldn't be afraid to strive for the top, and to do

whatever we wanted to and that they would give us full support both financially and emotionally," she said. "It was kind of strange, right after that I started saying that I wanted to be a doctor, and my brother Todd started saying he wanted to be a lawyer. This fall he's going to be a freshman at the University of Dayton and he still wants to be a lawyer. It was their support that kept us going."

The support helped, but a natural talent for science made the road a little easier for Southwell. As a junior at Grosse Pointe North High School, she took a senior level microbiology course. "It came very easy for me." As a senior, she was the assistant for the teacher.

In high school Southwell was busy, too. Not only did she play classical piano, but she lettered three times in track — as a shot putter and discus thrower — once in volleyball, and additionally was on the junior varsity tennis team.

She will play varsity tennis at Rensselaer when she returns in the fall.

"I won't be so busy this year, because I got most of the big lab classes out of the way," she said. She will complete the four-year program in 3-1/2 years.

"I've got a lot of directions to go in," she says. "I'm not sure what way I'm going to go."

But one thing's for sure — Southwell is planning on going places.

Woods supports national crime watch effort

In the proclamation, the National Neighborhood Crime Watch Group declared Tuesday, Aug. 8 as "National Night Out"

and is urging homeowners, apartment dwellers and businesses to turn on their exterior lights for security and as a symbolic gesture demonstrating solidarity against crime.

Freeman is urging Woods residents to support the effort along with 6,100 communities in the United States by turning on exterior lights.

"The main thing is that it will make people aware of the crime watch," Freeman said. "I thought it was a good idea to support it."

Freeman said that although there is no crime problem in the Woods, it's a good idea to raise the awareness of the national effort.

During recent years, the crime watch effort has attracted millions of supporters nationwide. Last year the national group claimed 18.5 million supporters joining in the one-night effort.

# Program helps drunk drivers see the consequences

Denial is the biggest obstacle to recovering from drug dependence. A new program, held at Cottage Hospital under the auspices of the Maple Grove Treatment Center, teaches abusers and addicts to recognize their problem.

The idea specifically is to help drunk drivers turn an arrest into a step toward help.

"Our philosophy is to try therapeutic things before jail," said Suzanne O'Shea of Grosse Pointe's Volunteer Probation program. According to the center, she has referred about half of the clients so far.

The Maple Groves Alternatives Program uses a drug- or alcohol-related event, such as a drunk driving offense, to force the participant to examine the role of chemicals in his life.

"We focus attention on the individual," said Charles Coyne, a therapist with the program. "The setting encourages sharing. We begin to talk about their social life and why they feel the need to use chemicals."

The program is offered two weekends a month, with an orientation on Thursday for participants and family members, followed by a hospital stay from Saturday morning to Sunday evening. More than 80 people have completed the program since it began in January.

"One thing I like is that the family is involved," O'Shea said. "That's very, very helpful, because it is a family problem."

After participants have faced themselves for two days, talking, listening, analyzing, writing about their problem, they begin to let down their defenses and recognize their weakness. They also learn to "de-moralize," or take their disease out of the realm of good and evil.

"They have to learn to look upon it as a disease. That's one

of the reasons it's in a hospital setting," Coyne said.

"The first step in the process of recovery is acceptance." The participants share with the others how embarrassed, ashamed and guilty their chemical use has made them feel, how it has alienated them from family members, cost them money and created problems at work.

"We all share the same five feelings," said Coyne. "Mad, glad, sad, afraid and ashamed. By putting pen to paper (and talking about it), these issues suddenly don't seem so insurmountable."

Once participants have faced their dependency, they are ready to move on to support groups to overcome it.

"We can see some changes in behavior," O'Shea said, "but you

have to see somebody over a very long period of time before you know whether the changes are permanent. I can tell you we are doubly pleased that the program is in our area."

Drunk drivers have long been required to attend highway safety programs provided through the courts. Many of the Maple Grove participants have already had this education.

But the addicted drinker will continue to drink and drive in spite of the law. The Alternatives Program starts with the assumption that many of the participants are addicted and focuses on getting them to recognize that addiction.

The program was developed in cooperation with the district courts in Birmingham and Southfield. The courts insisted

on an overnight stay as part of the treatment.

This makes it a realistic alternative to a weekend in jail, and according to program officials, it is the part of the program that participants dislike, complaining that it makes them feel trapped.

Referrals may be made through lawyers and the courts — and employers, doctors, clergy and family. A doctor reviews the referrals and orders appropriate tests to screen for the physical

consequences of alcohol/drug use.

The cost of the program is \$285 and is covered entirely by the participant.

Although the program at Cottage has only been in operation for six months, a similar program in Ohio has been studied. The evaluation showed that the re-arrest rate dropped from 23 percent for those jailed to 13 percent for program participants, that more participants remained accident-free and that recidivism

was reduced by almost 25 percent through a combination of program attendance and alcohol counseling.

"It's an opportunity to cross a bridge versus walking a plank," Coyne said.

O'Shea said one young participant told her the program is so valuable from the point of view of self-knowledge that "you shouldn't be allowed to start college without going through it."

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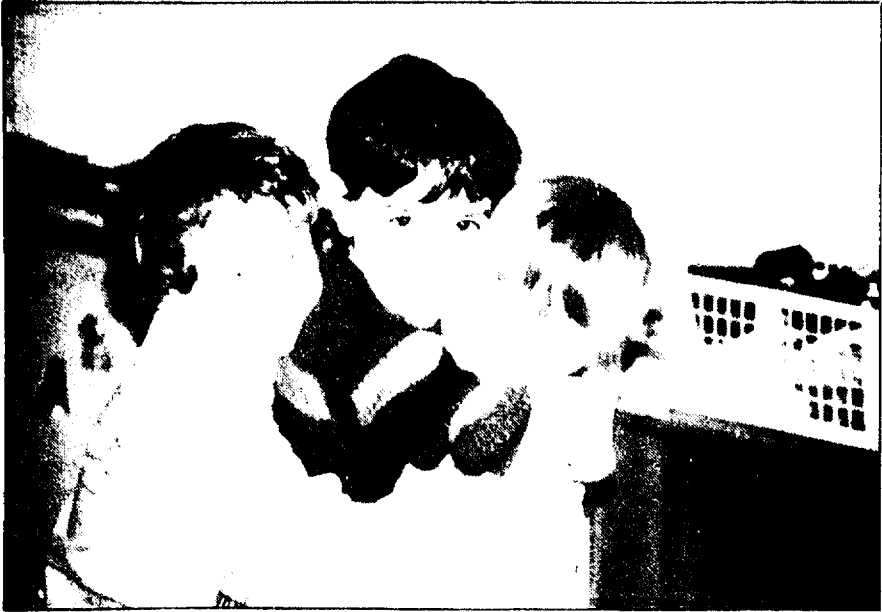

## Center serves community at large, promotes Italian culture

More than 30 years ago, a small group of people founded the Italian American Cultural Society.

"It was a true cultural society," said Jack Grifo, former president and Grosse Pointe City resident. "They played violins and met in homes on a high cultural plane."

Then in 1971 Anthony Belanca, Grifo and others provided the impetus to expand and reach more of the community through a private fundraiser that netted \$11,000. The group incorporated and bought a church on Frazho Road in St. Clair Shores. Belanca was the first president; Grifo followed the next year.

The organization grew, and five years ago, it bought a junior high school from the Warren school board.

Today the Italian American Cultural Society is the largest of its kind in the United States. The center's building consists of more than 87,000 square feet and is located on 16 acres of land in Warren, near 12 Mile and Hoover. It serves 125,000 people every year — all people, not just Italian Americans.

Some of the services the center provides include:

- A Montessori nursery school, open daily from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., with an enrollment of about 200 children.

- Daily nutritional lunches for senior citizens, served in the cafeteria to about 40 seniors a day, or more than 10,000 meals a year.

- A senior center with a weekly schedule of daytime activities, including games, dances, cards — all free of charge.

- Adult day care that provides supervised day care and activities for about 30 older adults who cannot be left alone during the day. The center also sponsors support groups, seminars and counseling for people who care for older adults at home.

- An art gallery with the largest exhibit space in Macomb County. About four exhibits a year are presented here, ranging from the Detroit Institute of Arts to the Smithsonian Institution to a recent photography exhibit by Tony Spina, retired chief photographer of the Detroit Free Press.

- Subsidized senior citizen housing with 88 units and a long waiting list.

- Special interest seminars, sports and fitness classes in the center's gymnasium and on its playing fields. There are soccer leagues, basketball and volleyball as well as bocce courts and aerobics classes.

- Cultural programs that include the center's choral group, opera, plays, dances. Cultural exchanges with the Polish community have included two dinner programs, a photographic exhibit and poetry reading.

- Class offerings in foreign languages, dance, cooking, music and arts.

- Pasta dinners every Wednesday with discounts for senior citizens and children.

- Banquet facilities for private and community social affairs.

The non-profit center is open to everyone. "It's a busy place," Grifo said, adding that the parking lot is filled from morning to night.

The purpose of the center, to provide an arena for Italian culture, language and the arts, does not take a back seat to all the

community programs, however. Anthony Fioritto, executive director for the past five years, has a strong sense of keeping Italian culture alive for Italian Americans.

"It's important to understand your roots and your heritage," he said. "Out of that you will have more of a sense of what and who you are. I call it an oversoul."

Fioritto, who graduated from Austin High School, has a degree in business, philosophy and sociology from Western Michigan University. He studied in Italy for one year where he met Rita, whom he married.

It was his wife who suggested a heritage wall for the center.

The wall, to be dedicated next year, will be a memorial tribute to Italian immigrants. The floor-to-ceiling monument inside the center will consist of panels, either marble or granite, of engraved names surrounding immigrant murals.

People may submit names of an individual or husband and wife together for a \$100 donation. For more information about the heritage wall, call the center at 751-2855, weekdays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The center also houses a library and archives and is in the process of collecting videotaped oral histories of Italian immigrants, books, photographs, tapes, personal letters and memorabilia from prominent Michigan Italian Americans.

Fioritto said there are plans to develop one wing of the center's building into a medical wing for health screening, blood pressure reading, nutrition, care for the elderly and wellness programs. Working with the center is Dr.

Madeleine Leininger, A Wayne State University anthropologist who worked with Margaret Mead. Leininger is noted for her work in transcultural medicine, which trains health care professionals in the culture and customs of other countries.

work in transcultural medicine, which trains health care professionals in the culture and customs of other countries.

More than 50 Italian American clubs use the center's facilities, which is the umbrella organization for all the groups in southeastern Michigan.

"Italians like a lot of events and events take a lot of effort," Fioritto said. Recent past events reflect the diversity of interest. They have included the first minestrone cook-off that brought professional and amateur chefs from throughout the area in competition, an all-day Molise conference that featured speakers from New York, Pennsylvania, North Carolina and California as well as the University of Michigan, and an Italian wine tasting dinner with a wine expert from Florence, Italy.

With a \$1 million annual operating budget, the center sustains itself through fees generated from the use of the facilities, fees for classes, donations from individuals and fundraising activities. Some of the programs are supported through grants from the Michigan Council for the Arts, Area Agency on Aging, corporate sponsorships and private donations.

"A great deal of funding comes from within the organization," Grifo said.

Members of the organization, about 15,000, elect the 24-member board of directors. The board president is elected by the board. It takes about a dozen people to run the center and maintain it. There are also a number of volunteers.

The society's monthly newspaper, *The Italian American*, consists of all volunteers. With a

circulation of 10,000, Fioritto said it ranks in the top five of Italian American papers in the country. "It'll soon be No. 1," he added.

There are a number of Grosse Pointe residents who are active in the Italian American Cultural Center, including John Floreno, who is president of the organization. Janet Ballanca coordinated the publication of a cookbook that benefits the society and Caroline Bonanni-Bullock is director of the Cultural Center Nursery School. Grifo was a major force behind the development of Tivoli Manor, the subsidized senior citizen housing located on the center grounds.

"Jack's role in Tivoli Manor was monumental," Fioritto said. "By providing senior housing, we just took one giant step in a leadership role in the community."

The Italian of yesterday who was more concerned with family affairs has evolved into an Italian American today concerned with community affairs, Fioritto said.

"What's happening is the center is the extension of our family, because as the family is becoming mainstream, it's not what it used to be," he said. "By coming here, their sense of Italian is intensified."

A walk through the center building brings that into focus. The Caffè Italiano serves cappuccino, espresso and pannino. Italian sandwiches. A large screen broadcasts soccer games from Italy via satellite.

Beginning its 33rd year as an organization, the Italian American Cultural Center is "constantly expanding, always evolving," he added.

While Dalton may lack that Connery magnetism, he is not lacking in the do-or-die department. There is as much action and suspense in "Licence to Kill" as in any of the other Bond movies and probably more.

John Glen, who directed five Bond films, is known as a good action director and this is his biggest and most sustained of his efforts.

Some of this is due to the fact that he was working from a plot devised by the filmmakers and

may have had more leeway in creating more violence than the norm in Bond movies. All of the Fleming plots have been used up. Only the title is his.

Before the credits roll, the audience is initiated into what is to come with a mini-film.

Bond on a holiday in Key West, Fla. is on his way to a wedding. He is to be best man for a CIA pal who is now in charge of drug enforcement in

murders the bride and badly mutilates the groom by throwing him in a tank with a great white shark.

Bond immediately books a flight to the fictional city of Isthmus, Sanchez's home base. Before he leaves, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency officials warn him they want no part of the case. His boss back home in London flies in an agent to issue a similar warning. When Bond refuses to drop the case, his licence to kill is revoked and he is ordered to turn over his Walther PPK. He is on his own.

This doesn't stop him. Without hesitating, he takes off, determined to avenge his friend.

It's a mission that tests Bond's skill and daring on land, in the air and in the depths of the sea. We see him dangling from airplanes, pursued by an army of deep sea divers, tied to a chain saw apparatus that moves close to a blade that will shred him, speeding over mountainous roads

Florida.

Appropriately dressed in a gray cutaway, tails and all, he is informed midway that an international drug lord is in the city. Without hesitation he jumps out, takes off after the drug czar and after a wild sky chase brings him down and turns him over to the authorities.

With that deed accomplished he climbs aboard a helicopter and as the bride and her party peer up at the sky in front of the church, parachutes down in time for the ceremony. The wedding party enters the church with the parachute billowing behind them like a bride's veil. Supposedly the case is closed, but it is only a set-up for what is to come.

The main film opens at the wedding reception. Bond and the groom are elated over the capture of Franz Sanchez (Robert Davi), the vicious drug lord, who has so long eluded arrest. Their joy is short-lived. Sanchez escapes from the federal agents,

in a tanker truck chase.

Something, actually someone, new has been added to this latest Bond adventure, a woman who is his equal in brains and beauty. She is Pam Bouvier (Carrie Lowell), a bush pilot.

She is not the traditional Bond girl. She is as willing to go into enemy territory as Bond himself and in more than one incident saves his life.

Sanchez's sexy girl friend, Lupe Lamora (Talisa Soto) is a contender for Bond's attention. She is the typical Bond girl, difficult to ignore.

Robert Davi's Sanchez is as smooth as velvet and deadly as a poisonous viper. Without a shudder he can watch a victim being lowered into a tank where a shark is gnashing his teeth in

anticipation.

There is no doubt that this villain's strong sadistic streak accounts for a more graphic violence than has been seen in previous Bond movies.

Wayne Newton, cast as a leader of a television cult, injects some humor into the film with his televised pleas for money. His church is actually a cocaine production factory.

Another interesting character is Desmond Llewelyn as the gadget man who shows up with a bag of ingenious items that appear harmless but are actually deadly weapons.

"Licence to Kill" is a super adventure thriller. Fans of 007 will not come away disappointed with this film nor will first-time Bond audiences.

## 'UHF' stands for Unbelievably Horrible Failure

Hoo boy. If you ask the Federal Communications Commission what UHF stands for they'll tell you it's ultra-high frequency. But ask me what it stands for, especially after seeing "Weird Al" Yankovic's film of that name, and my response would be slightly different.

Unbelievably Horrible Failure.

Undeniably Half-witted and Feeble.

This is not just a bad movie; the type of picture you watch and laugh at and then forget. It's worse than that. It's the type of picture you watch (but only out of the corner of your eye), don't laugh at, then forget before you leave the theater.

"UHF" is just plain silly. Center stage is Yankovic, who's made a modest name for

himself doing parodies of popular songs — "Eat It," for example, sung to the tune of Michael Jackson's "Beat It." Unfortunately, his satirical ability does not translate well to the big screen. On records and M-TV, he

limits himself to one, closely defined theme. In the film, we are forced to watch not only lame and disjointed parody material, but lame filler material between the parodies.

In his big screen debut — and, one hopes, his big-screen finale — Yankovic plays a perpetual loser who ends up running a small-time television station won by his uncle in a poker game.

This, he figures, suits his abilities just fine, since he doesn't know how to do anything else but daydream and pretend. He

doesn't know the first thing about running a television station, of course. But the ruthless television executive who runs the competing station still wants Yankovic's Channel 62 off the air.

That's enough to provide a basic conflict. All that's still necessary is some interesting — or, better yet, funny — material. We never see that material.

It's not for lack of trying. Yankovic sends up everything from "Indiana Jones" to "Rambo," "Ghandi" to "Conan the Barbarian;" low budget spatula commercials to low budget graphics.

Very little of it is worthwhile. Except for Yankovic's depiction of Rambo yelling his lungs out as he rescues a friend, there is little here that elicits anything more than a slight smile.

Too bad. Everybody likes a good laugh, especially when it's at the expense of something as self-centered as the institution of Hollywood.

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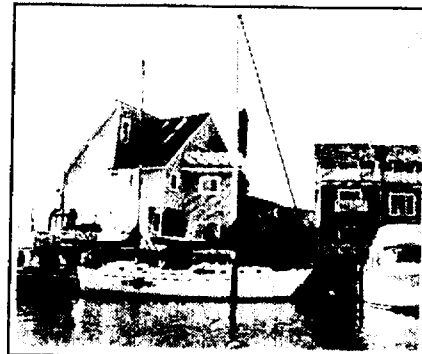
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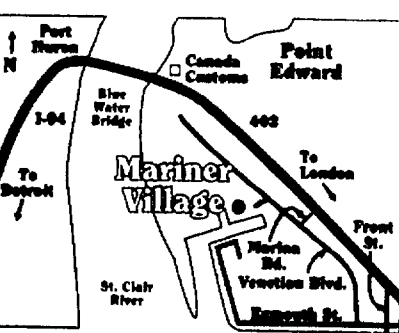

### After just six years in community, Michigan Bell chief leaves his mark

Although William P. Vititoe only lived in Grosse Pointe

Farms for six years while serving as president of Michigan Bell, his business and social impact in the Detroit area will be long-felt.

On July 15, Vititoe, 50, began a new position as president of Ameritech Enterprise Group, the Chicago-based umbrella for Ameritech's non-regulated business units.

Relocating, however, is a way of life for a telephone company executive and his wife. The transfer to Chicago is the 19th relocation the Vititoes have had to make.

"We certainly have very mixed emotions about leaving," said Vititoe, who has been commuting to Chicago from his Farms home. He said he and his family will miss the friends and the "super community" he found in metro Detroit.

# Woods' Bob DuRant brings his big band to the Park

The big band sound of the 1940s will fill Patterson Park Sunday, July 30 when Woods orchestra leader and composer Bob DuRant brings in a 10-piece band for Grosse Pointe Park's ninth annual Concert in the Park.

While DuRant will be bringing 10 pieces instead of the more traditional 16 or 17 pieces of the true big band, the music will still fulfill the tradition of Glenn Miller and Tommy Dorsey.

DuRant, 66, has been in the music business for more than 32 years. He formed his own band in 1957 after working as a sideman for many different leaders and doing musical commercials.

He began playing the piano when he was 10 years old, but after high school he enrolled at the Detroit Institute of Technology in accounting. World War II, however, interfered with his numbers-crunching career.

Once in Uncle Sam's armed forces, he became a member of the U.S. Navy Band on board the USS Monticello, and he's been the music business in some form or another ever since. After the war, he was affiliated with the WWJ Studio Orchestra. He then joined Sam Donahue's Band in New York, before settling down in the Detroit area. He moved to Grosse Pointe Woods with his wife Loretta in 1955.

"It seemed to be what I wanted to do," he says of his career in music, adding that he has no intention of giving up music, especially while he and his wife are fortunate enough to enjoy good health.

"We thank the Lord," he said, "and I thank him each day."

DuRant performs throughout the Detroit area, and has done gigs locally at the Lochmoor and Grosse Pointe Yacht clubs. He also has performed at the Macomb Center for the Performing Arts, Meadowbrook Country Club of Detroit and the Detroit Athletic Club. DuRant also does a lot of free entertaining at nursing homes and hospitals.

For either charity or paid performances, he sometimes brings along the entire band, sometimes just a few of the musicians get together. Sometimes they do big band swing, and sometimes it's Dixieland. Often, DuRant goes alone and plays piano.

When the DuRants spend a few months in West Palm Beach, Fla., each winter, it's not all rest and relaxation. DuRant said he solos on the piano, which keeps him busy during the winter.

For those who like DuRant's big band sound at Patterson

Park, he will bring along copies of his album for sale at \$10 apiece. Titled "Bob DuRant Big Band," the album includes the oldies and some contemporary numbers. Song titles include "Tangerine," "Bob's Tune," "Tenderly," "Bluesette," "I Write the Songs" and "Gonna Fly Now," which is the theme from "Rocky."

Following the concert, big band buffs might want to corner DuRant and hear his many stories about the music business and those he's worked with.

DuRant, for example, has arranged or conducted music for big-name performers such as Johnny Ray, Eddie Fisher, Frankie Laine, Dorothy Lamour, Ford and Hines, Tex Beneke and

The Modernaires, Gaylord and Holiday, Johnny Mathis, Harmonicats, Danny Thomas and Bobby Vinton, just to name a few.

His band even backed up the Three Stooges when they went on the road to do stand-up acts. Another famous musician — at least to Detroiters — whom DuRant worked with was former Tiger pitcher Denny McLain. "He (McLain) plays the organ quite well, in fact," DuRant said.

The Concert in the Park begins at 7 p.m. and is open to residents from all the Grosse Pointes who have park passes. The concert is sponsored by the Park City Council and the Recreation Commission. Admission is free.

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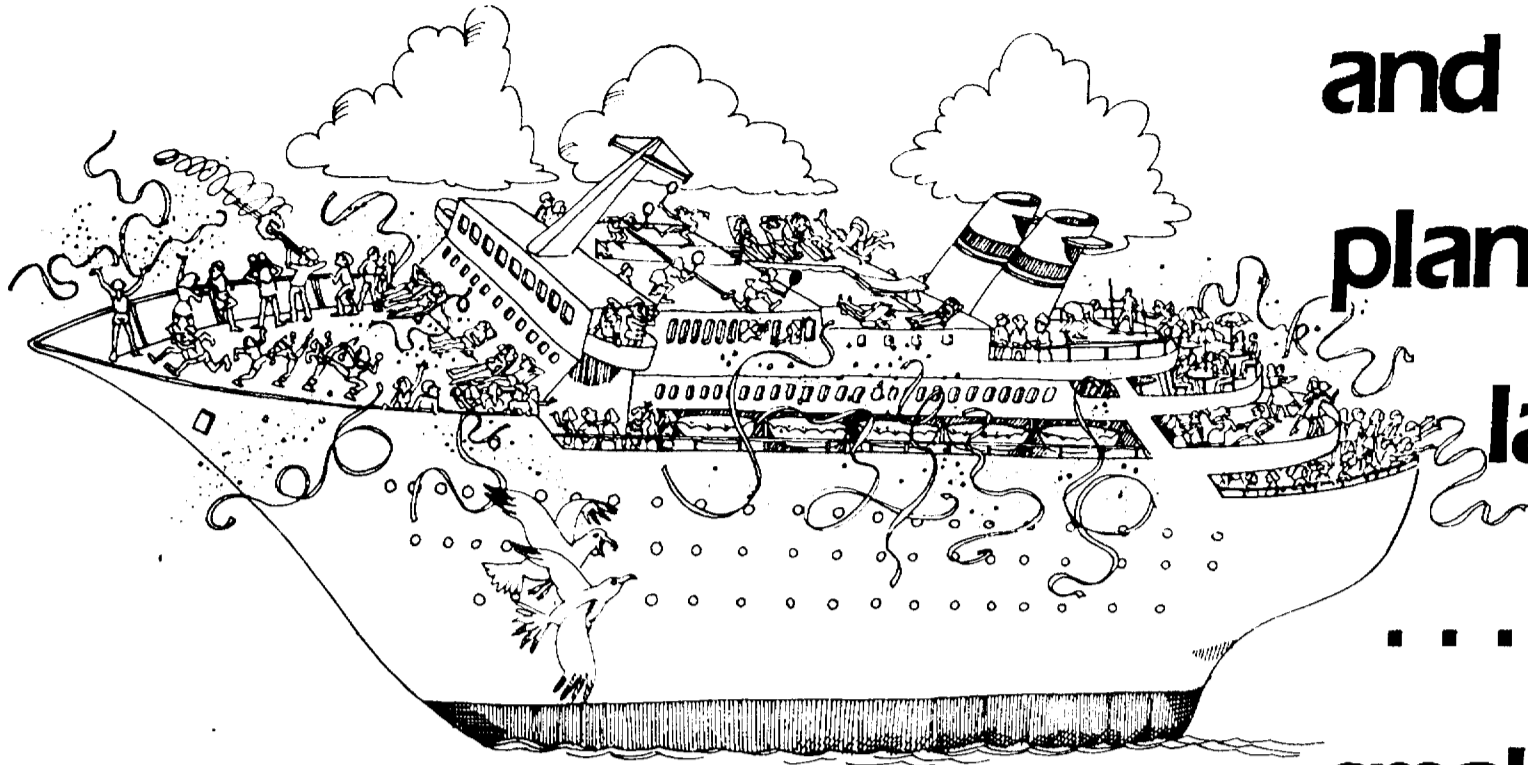
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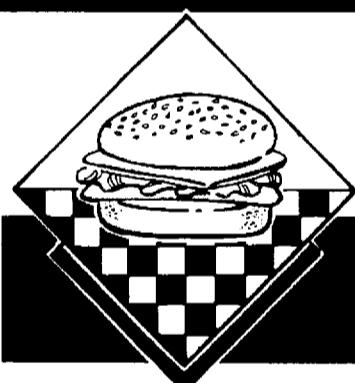


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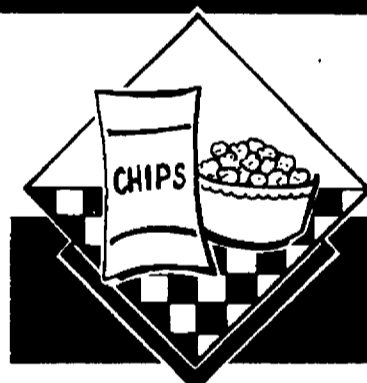


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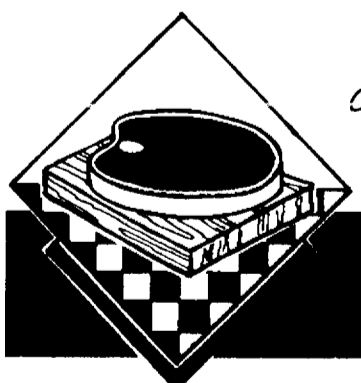
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# What are Grosse Pointers reading this summer?

Summer is prime time for leisure reading for many Grosse Pointers.

Faced with a chunk of free time on a warm summer afternoon, what could be more satisfying than plopping down on a chaise lounge in a shady garden spot with a cool drink and a fascinating book?

Many said they do most of their leisure reading while on vacation — beside pools, on beaches, on planes, in cars. Most Grosse Pointers also said they read every day — mostly in the evenings before going to bed.

Almost everyone reads more than one book at a time.

A large proportion of Grosse Pointers indicated that, when they choose to read for pleasure, they like mysteries, spy novels and biographies. Most Grosse Pointers are reading new books. Nobody claimed to be re-reading "War and Peace," reviewing the complete works of Shakespeare or studying the Bible.

When they get a chance to read — just for fun — what do Grosse Pointers choose?

David Lawrence, publisher and chairman of the Detroit Free Press, is reading two books: "Parting the Waters: America in the King Years 1954-1963" by Taylor Branch and "From Beirut to Jerusalem" by Thomas L. Friedman, in preparation for a Book and Author Luncheon where he'll introduce Friedman.

"One of my weaknesses," Lawrence said, "is that I read only non-fiction."

He said he reads a book every couple of weeks, in addition to keeping up with the Detroit Free Press, The Detroit News, the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, Time, Newsweek, The New Yorker, Smithsonian, Business Week and American Heritage.

"I squeeze in reading on plane trips, weekends, while on vacation. I'm a great skimmer," he said.

Herold McC. Deason, attorney for Grosse Pointe Park, is reading four books: "Citizens" by Simon Schama, which is about the French Revolution; a great book about computers whose title he has forgotten; "The Last Billable Hour" by Susan Wolfe; and "Killshot" by Dutch Leonard.

Deason said he reads whenever he gets a chance, usually in the evenings. He also scans two Detroit papers and USA Today every day and the Grosse Pointe News every week. He reads the New York Times and the Wall Street Journal thoroughly every day.

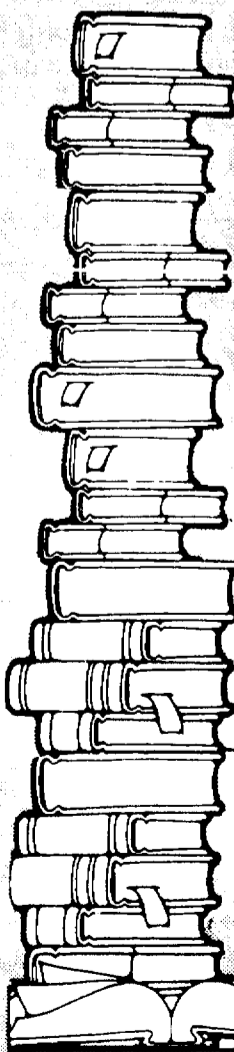

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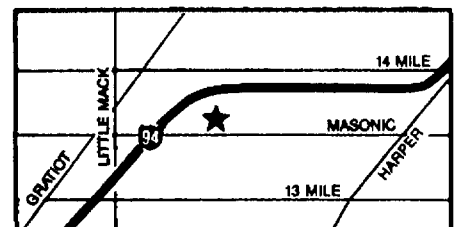
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# Fash Bash — a fundraiser with flair, flounce, flash

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## The Pastor's Corner

## Seconds of Hope

On the wall to my left is a round and mostly plastic clock. It is fairly new and is powered by a double A battery. As I sit here at my desk I am aware of the two alternating sounds this clock makes.

I do not really hear "tick, tock."

It is more like "thick, thud" — each sound marking the movement of the second hand to a new position.

A melancholy thought grabs hold of me. At some point the "thud" will be me, or my wife, or one of my children. Some day the tens of thousands of seconds will lead to one not followed by a new "thick." The line will be drawn and the sum total of all the moments of my life or theirs will be complete.

Lewis Smedes has pointed out that there are really only two alternatives with regard to this fact in his book "How Can It Be All Right When Everything is Wrong?"

Either it is just an end, a point at which I join the rats and worms. Or it is in fact a beginning, a start of a new life. Either I am play-acting about my value and dignity and ability, or there is something qualitatively more available in a final way to me.

In fact, this latter opinion is, as Smedes points out, the heart of Christian hope. The central message that is good news to humans is that there really is something more, something better.

We are not consigned to work and struggle away all our seconds only to have all our life wiped away in a sudden rending sigh. The Christian message is not of interminable struggle, nor of pointless brief flashes of effort. The Christian message is that there is life which follows and fulfills the moments we know now.

Now it must be added that this hope of a life to come is not a means to avoid the life here and now. The truly Christian life is all one piece. What is coming (joy, peace, justice, good, comfort) begins now as Christians live in the passing seconds of their lives. Any avoidance of present responsibilities has no true basis in the Christian comfort and hope.

And finally, it must be said that this hope is Christian only when it recognizes its source in Jesus the Christ, who faced the last second and broke death's hold on human flesh. St. Paul once said (pardon my paraphrase): "If Christ did not actually rise from death, we Christians are the greatest fools ever."

You get hope when you accept as true that Christ lives beyond death and promises the same to you. Death is not the final word.

Thud is not the final beat of time. For those who live in Christ, there is hope now and always.

## Teenagers donate labor, time, money to rehabilitate east side neighborhood

Nearly four dozen youngsters, ages 14-19, have come from Iowa, South Dakota, Ontario, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota and Indiana for the special privilege of working hard for a week: pulling weeds, planting grass seed and flowers, digging out stubborn tree stumps, trimming overgrown bushes, climbing up on ladders to scrape flakes of faded paint from houses, and painting.

They're working for nothing. They're sleeping on the floor. And they're walking to work or riding city buses.

More incredible: they each paid \$100 — plus travel expenses — for the opportunity.

They're part of the Young Calvinist Federation, an organization of Christian Reformed youth groups, and a pilot project called Serve.

Serve is sending groups of young people around the country to work in inner city areas helping people who are down on their fortunes.

The First Christian Reformed Church in Grosse Pointe Park is the local sponsor for the project. Church volunteers are providing support services for the visiting youngsters. They're cooking and providing transportation and equipment for the local renovation projects.

Some supplies were provided at reduced cost from K mart; others are provided by People in Faith United, a local coalition of churches dedicated to revitalizing the eastside neighborhood.

"This is a fairly easy opportunity for young people to get in-

involved in caring for the poor and hurting," said William DeVries, pastor of First Christian Reformed Church. "It's also an educational experience for the kids, often a cross-cultural experience.

Kathy Broege of Grosse Pointe Park is project coordinator for the Detroit Serve program.

Char Merz, national coordinator for Serve, said, "Some of these kids have never seen anything like Detroit's streets. Some are from small towns. Some never rode a city bus before; or a People Mover.

"This is a chance to break down barriers about race and economic differences."

"It's also a way for kids to live out what they've been taught about what it is to be a good Christian — and even to pay for the opportunity to do it," said DeVries. He added that as a member of the PIFU board, he also sees this as an opportunity to help rehabilitate and revitalize a neighborhood on Detroit's east side.

"We're taking about 15 homes that were a source of concern, and in one week, making them a source of pride," he said. "This is the difference between despair and hope for some."

With the help of People in Faith United, DeVries said, about 15 houses were selected on Ashland, Manistique and Alter roads in Detroit, near the Grosse Pointe border. Owners of the homes had physical and financial hardships and needed help.

For a week in mid-July, the 47 youngsters and adults of Serve have been living at Faith Lutheran Church, sleeping on the floor, eating in the church's fellowship hall.

Each morning, after devotions and breakfast, they make their own sack lunches and set out, on foot, carrying ladders and equipment to work in the neighborhood.

They work until 3:30; clean up; hike home. Evenings are filled with devotional activities, games, free time, a trip to a local park, a bus ride to Greek Town and a ride on Detroit's People Mover.

"I thought there would be more racism in Detroit," said Jeremy VanEssen, of Edgerton, Minn. "I thought people wouldn't accept us. But they did."

"Detroit wasn't as bad as I thought it would be," said Steve Westra, of Sioux Center, Iowa. "I expected the houses to be junky shacks. It's not as bad."

Troy Prinsen of Sioux Center said he was surprised at the openness of people, the friendliness, the acceptance. "I also got to know 46 new people. I'm learning new things, like how to paint, how to make lunches."

Carisa De Jong of Sioux Falls, S.D. said she's getting a good feeling from what she's doing. "And some new boyfriends too," she smiled.

"We're not getting paid," said Michelle DeVries of Grand Rapids, "but we really are. It's inside."

**Adult workshop**

For those who are thinking about new approaches to life, the Focus on Women program at Henry Ford Community College is offering a Re-Entry Day for Adults on Monday, Aug. 14.

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# Education can be senior citizens' compass in an alien land

Oliver Wendell Holmes, an American writer of essays, poems and novels — best known for "The Autocrat of the Breakfast Table," wrote: "To be 70 years old is sometimes more hopeful than to be 40 years old." The key word is hopeful. Involved in that is the concept of will, or determination to remain a part of the dynamic world and the resolution never to retreat to a status quo of static living. It is not an easy choice to make. To retreat to the comfort and security of past achievements, established habits and never-yield convictions is much less strenuous than moving on to new accomplishments, changed attitudes and modified views. Margaret Mead, the late an-

thropologist, once said: "Only the young are natives of the modern world — the rest of us are immigrant strangers in a new land." When you look at the world and how much it has changed during the lives of older citizens, this point of view seems a perceptive one. Made foreign by scientific discoveries, complex economic theories, media-modified politics, free-to-be standards of living, America can become an alien land to older people. That is unless time is invested in translating the complex present into terms that can be understood and accepted by the natives of this different era. There are many ways of keeping abreast of

changes and avoiding that alien feeling. Newspapers, magazines, study clubs and carefully chosen radio and television programs can help chart a course through the confusing landscape of the nuclear world. Going back to the classroom can be one of the best ways to put the immigrant back in touch with the natives of the modern world. As one student put it: "People my age (I am 66 but can easily pass for 65 1/2) come from a far distance indeed, bringing with them strange customs and attitudes, even somewhat different dress and language." She then relates how she set out like an immigrant to find out what had been happening in the world while she was cooped up in a job for half a century. She wanted to find a place in this world. She admitted that sometimes she felt like an undesirable alien: "The natives seemed to regard a retired person as something like a retired office file to be put away with other obsolete material." She was persistent. She wrote that if she couldn't be a native she would at least become a naturalized citizen. After all, America is made up of immigrants. She held fast to the belief that older people can adapt to today's world and add to the American mix, like other immigrant groups. America's older population is not deportable. Nor will it disappear. Those in their 60s will be around 10, 20, or even 30 years from now. As a group, they will comprise one-fifth of the population. That is too large a group to

be culturally, intellectually and socially illiterate. Life, as long as it lasts, is to be lived. Unless the effort is made to enlarge our vista, our private world can narrow to the point where it becomes boring and intolerable. Communication is important. It is not easy to communicate with those whom we don't understand and who really don't care to understand where we are coming from. The world changes. The world as we knew it is gone. It is up to us to find our way in it or be lost. Education can provide a compass. Going back to school may seem incongruous for those who have known many successes in their careers and feel that they should be teachers rather than students. In their particular field they may be true. But there are other worlds to conquer. Learning does not need to be arduous and forbidding. Education can be as stimulating at 60 as it was at 16. The opportunities are there. Locally there are community colleges, adult education programs, classes at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, the College of Lifelong Learning and branches of universities.

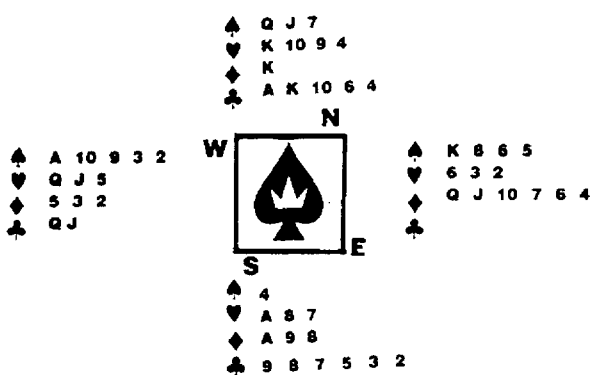
You can learn about the whys and wherefores of local government, world politics, economics, science or any other subject that will make you feel less a stranger in your own land. move on to the university to study for a degree. Others simply enlarge their vistas on life. All of them acquire an increased sense of self-worth and self-confidence. The world does not pass these students by. They are very much a part of it as they compare interpretations of the e.e. cummings poems or whether the procession of the equinoxes fulfills astronomy. Sound difficult? Take heart. We are told that the only part of an older person that normally is as good as ever — and usually better — is the brain. Brain cells die but there are always trillions more. Even Aristotle used only a fraction of the human brain power available. The brain, unlike any other part of the body, becomes flabby unless it is exercised. It is necessary to give it a real workout if we want to keep it fit enough to get along with the natives in this new land. Actually, courses at any institution of learning should be free for older people. They have supported these institutions of higher learning with taxes all of their working years. They have earned the privilege of free entrance into the academic world if they choose to go. Locally it would be an incentive for older students who want to take courses to have an institution such as the Fromm Institute for Lifelong Learning in California. At Fromm, retired people are taught courses at high academic levels by emeritus professors. They study with their peers but are surrounded by thousands of young students who make them feel part of the student body. Some of the older students

HAVE A PLEASANT TRY AT PERFECTION

THE PASTEBOARD PASTIME

A couple of Sunday's ago, I wrote about the importance of bidding correctly, carefully describing your hand so that the partnership could reach the optimum contract to achieve the best playing result. Sometimes the thirteen cards dealt make this difficult, but experience, skill and good judgement are very helpful requisites. Here's an interesting hand recently played in the neighborhood that motivated a myriad of bids among the eighteen duplicate tables in session:



You can see that six Clubs is the pinnacle declarer placement. Of course, looking at fifty two cards, it's obvious that careful play delivers twelve tricks... or is it? Note a brilliant East can find the lead that scuttles this result. Also note that an even more brilliant West can defeat the contract if Spades aren't led by East at trick one.

Here are the three most common bidding sequences:  
First, the passive E/W:

EAST	SOUTH	WEST	NORTH
PASS	PASS	PASS	1C
PASS	3C	PASS	3NT
PASS	PASS	PASS	

Ten or eleven tricks are easily collectable in No Trump. Against the weak 2D call by East:

EAST	SOUTH	WEST	NORTH
2D	PASS	PASS	3C
PASS	3D	PASS	3H
PASS	4C	PASS	5C
PASS	PASS	PASS	

In this sequence, a few Norths passed 4 C, but eleven tricks are available and 5 C was favored.

Against the active E/W, one partnership found the reasonable Slam and brought home twelve tricks after an unfortunate small Spade lead by East.

PASS	4C	PASS	5C
PASS	6C	PASS	PASS

Not unnaturally, one South bid 4 H over North's 3 H call and even with the Moysean Fit, was able to garner ten tricks comfortably.

Oh, what a game! No wonder so many consider it the greatest intellectual challenge in the card world.

# Tea: Romantic tale begins in China; spreads to Britain, U.S.

What could be more refreshing on a hot summer day than a pitcher of iced tea in the garden or, for that matter, nicer than a steaming cup of hot tea beside the fireplace on a wintry afternoon?

Tea has a venerable history and in many ways a romantic one. It is an evergreen shrub, *Thea Sinensis*, a native of China and India, but has for many centuries also been grown in Ceylon, Japan, Java, Nepal, and in Africa.

The best quality teas for commerce are produced from the tips

of the shoots and are the dried tender leaves. This grade of tea is called pekoe. Larger, less tender leaves produce the quality of tea known as souchong, and more inferior teas are labelled congos. At the very bottom of the quality scale is gunpowder tea, filled with bits of twigs and tea-leaf dust.

The name tea comes from the Dutch rendering of the Chinese dialect name for this plant. It is always grown on hillsides and the leaves are carefully picked by hand. In the 18th century, when tea was newly introduced into England and was all the

rage, the tea plant and the gathering of tea leaves were often depicted on the tea caddies which graced every lady's tea tray. Tea and camellias are cousins and the camellias which proliferate in the southern states can grow to a height of 20 feet or more.

It was in the 12th century that priests of the Zen sect brought to Japan the finest kinds of Chinese teas and began a ritual of tea-tasting among elite groups of warriors and court officials who, assuming the role of connoisseurs, classified the delicate brews according to color and bouquet. The famous tea ceremony had had its beginnings then.

At first only men participated in the stylized ritual of tea-drinking and it became in many ways symbolic of court etiquette and even morality. It was at least 300 years more before the tea ceremony, as it is known today, came into being. The ceremony is described as a national sacrament devoted to admiring the beautiful and gracious amid the sordid facts of everyday life. In feudal Japan it was of immense importance and even today stands as a national symbol evoked by patriotic Japanese to offset the disintegrating influence of Western customs.

The tea ceremony reached its peak of development in the early 16th century at about the same time that the flower-arranging

art of ikebana, the creating of sand paintings, and the Noh style of drama came into being.

In its earliest days in England, a country now considered almost synonymous with tea

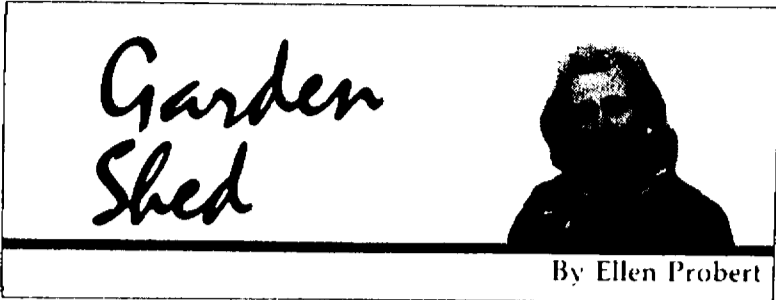
through the centuries in trade and commerce and in politics. (Remember the famous Boston Tea Party in American history?) Fortunes have been won or lost according to the fate of desert-

party with miniature tea sets and their dolls as guests copied the parlor manners of their mothers in pouring tea and making polite conversation as they sipped. Real tea was then considered too potent to brew for children so the beverage in their little teapots was "cambric tea" — merely hot water to which they added milk from a diminutive pitcher and sugar lumps from a diminutive sugar bowl with miniature tongs. It was probably good practice for later when they were ladies serving afternoon tea in their own parlors.

Tea is often an ingredient in the punch bowl at a party. Perhaps it will be there in some form in the refreshments offered to visitors at the Council of Grosse Pointe Garden Clubs 16th annual garden tour scheduled for this weekend. This important event is one that is eagerly anticipated city-wide. This year's offering of seven beautiful gardens promises to be the loveliest one yet.

Rain or shine on Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m., the gardens will offer fragrance and beauty with a lavish hand. The Detroit Garden Center will have a boutique of treasures at the Thornton garden at 1040 Lakeshore, and complimentary refreshments, (tea perhaps?) will be available at the Abbott garden at 430 University.

**Live from  
Mackinac**

I'm not quite an "Old Goat," but I am experiencing one of the greatest spectacles on the Great Lakes again this year.

This year I decided to make the trek to Mackinac Island and watch the finish of the 65th running of the Bayview Yacht Club's Port Huron to Mackinac Race. I didn't, however, make the trip by boat — my wife Sandy and I made it by land.

It's been a fabulous visit. The bats keep the island virtually mosquito free, and the nights here get a little colder than down South where y'all are. The taxis are horse drawn and it's nice to stay in a place that has no cars. And the cannon shots from the Fort keep us on our toes.

The islanders really pull out the red carpet, but I can't imagine the level of their patience. It was just less than one week ago when the Chicago to Mackinac contingent landed, and now another fleet has poured in on an island whose residency grows from 600 to more than 3000 in two days.

The locals insist the bats won't hurt you, but I'd like to argue with them. Rush-hour traffic occurs only when the bicycles all stop to watch the boats, and when you want to make a call to another location on the island, you dial only four numbers. Skateboards are banned from the island because the boards may scare horses, and locals call daily visitors "Fudgies" — usually identified as someone with a camera and a pound of fudge.

Life up here is very relaxed, casual and never nerve-wracking. Mackinac Island is a paradise that even Mr. Rourke and Tatoo could be proud of. It's a lifestyle all its own. No fires are allowed. No camping is permitted. Everything is within a swift walk or bike ride away, and yes, you can purchase a lottery ticket for the state drawing — it's not that far removed from reality.

This trip, mind you, was not intended to be pleasure. I was a working stiff for three days because I was covering the boat race. However, there was plenty of time for tea and crumpets.

On Sunday (July 23) Sandy and I joined Governor James Blanchard for a brunch (as did 100 other people), and then we toured the island. The docks were barren, but we knew that within 24 hours the celebration would begin as the slips would be filled with vessels.

I shared a room with 10 other media guys and at times I didn't have a bed. I was, however, fortunate to have a roof over my head and a shower around the corner. Sandy shared a room with Shirley

## Where's the wind?

### Boats straggle in to harbor

Sports Editor Rob Fulton, at Mackinac to cover the race, reports that at 3 p.m. Tuesday, the Coast Guard listed about 150 boats still out.

At 8:33 p.m. Monday, Dick Jennings' Pied Piper was the first yacht to cross the finish line in the 65th running of the Port Huron-to-Mackinac race.

Traditionally a two-day race, this year's 259-mile trek up Lake Huron was marred by light winds of one-to-three knots for more than two days.

Jennings, with a crew of 16 from the Chicago Yacht Club, managed to catch slightly heavier winds with 10 miles to go and pulled his 66-foot Bill Lee boat in with a corrected time of 53 hours, 57 minutes and eight seconds, the second slowest time ever recorded.

"This was really a tremendous thrill," said Jennings, who was also the first to cross the line in last week's Chicago race. "It was another long one, but we do have lunch and breakfast left on the boat."

Pied Piper, which has now crossed the finish line first in six of its last eight Mackinac races, is the apparent overall winner in IOR A. If Jennings hoists the overall flag, it'll be his first in eight races.

Before rounding Cove Island, the halfway point, Pied Piper was battling Stripes and Sassy for the lead. Forty miles south of Cove Island, Pied Piper eluded Sassy and near the Duck Islands, Jennings began to pull away from Stripes, skippered by Bill Martin of race host Bayview Yacht Club. Stripes crossed third, but fell to ninth in its class and 20th in division with a corrected time of 57:12.14.

Sassy, skippered by Dutch Schmidt of Bayview, crossed second. In a corrected time of 56:47.10, Sassy finished seventh in its class and 15th overall.

"Last night (Sunday) was real tough," said Jennings. "We were in a tacking duel with Stripes. We tacked on them about 10 times. It was some great competition."

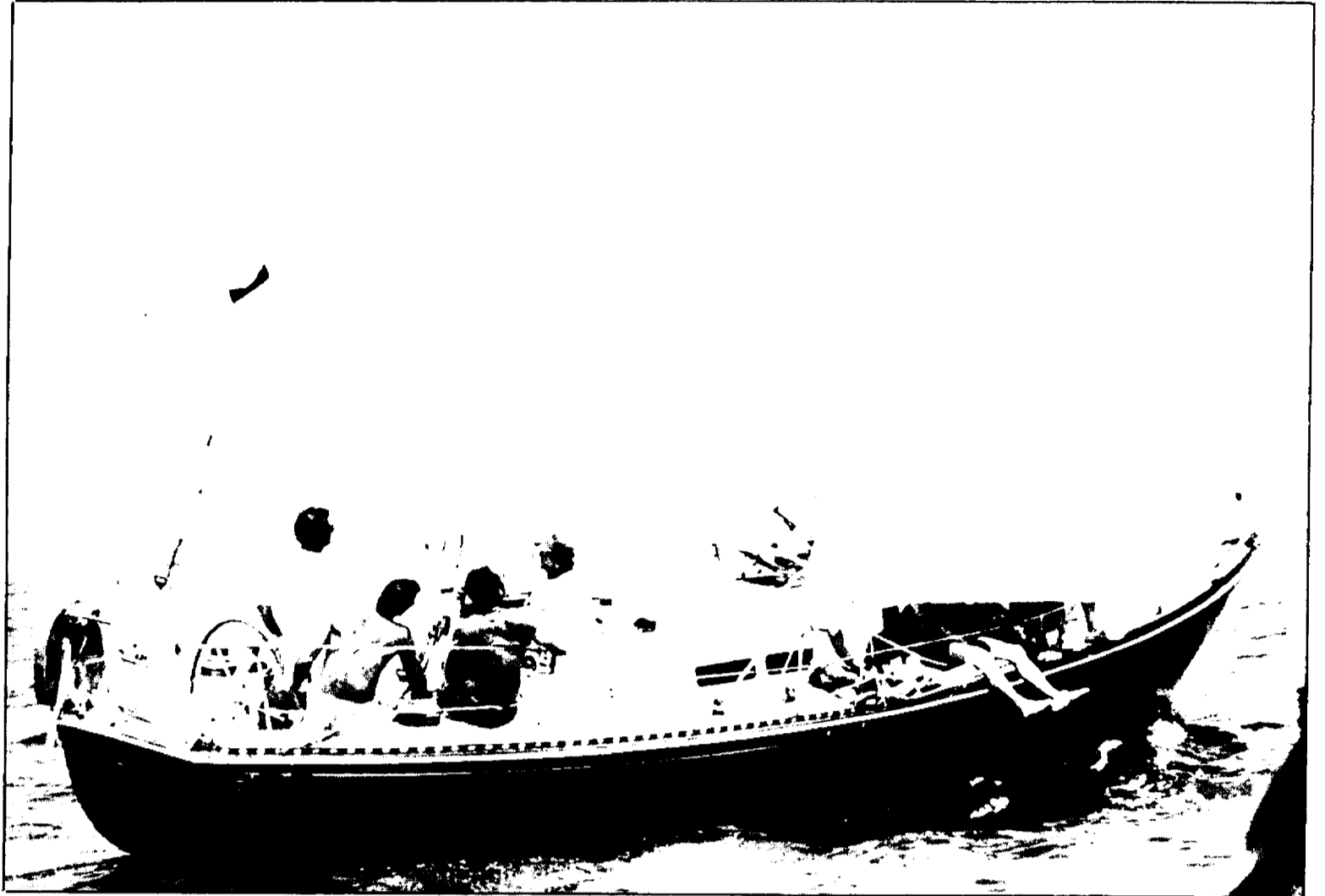
It wasn't much fun for Stripes, however.

"We had a very good race going with Pied Piper," said Stripes navigator Steve Rudner. "Near Cove Island, (Pied Piper) was ahead of us by 15 minutes and we were ahead of Sassy by 45. We pulled even with Piper near the Duck Islands."

The Duck Islands are approximately 80 miles from Mackinac.

The tacking intensified for the two maxi boats, but Stripes fell further behind when Pied Piper made its move.

"Every time she tacked, we tacked with her," said Rudner.

a long wait, as the first boat didn't appear on the horizon off Mackinac Island until Monday afternoon. Tomahawk is owned by T.K. Lowry of Grosse Pointe Shores.

"We didn't let him escape, but he went into the shoreline, where the wind was. By the time we tacked and moved into the shoreline, the wind was gone and all we did was sit. There was no catching it."

"We went for the shoreline and picked up the thermal breezes," said Jennings. "We took a chance and it paid off."

Leading Edge, skippered by Bayview's Eugene Mondry, led the Grosse Pointe contingent by finishing fourth in IOR A in a corrected time of 55:20.24, good for seventh in his division.

The Grosse Pointe Yacht Club was well represented, as Ed Grant skippered American Eagle to a fifth-place finish in IOR A at 62:07.04. Grant's corrected time was 55:51.08, good for 11th in his division.

"It wasn't that bad out there," said Grant. "You just have to figure that's the way it is out there and you just adapt to it." Grant did just that.

"We had a good rhumb line from Cove Island," Grant said. "We picked up Margaret Rintoul IV and Renegade after Cove Island by following the rhumb line as much as possible."

## Olympic medalist to speak on exercise-induced asthma

## F-C-P Babe Ruth team beaten in finals

The host of the 13-year-old Babe Ruth State Tournament almost wasn't around to see the finals.

However, after losing its first game, the Farms-City-Park Babe Ruth team won three straight before losing, 4-3, to L'Anse Creuse in the finals at Kerby Field.

From the onset it looked as if the Farms-City-Park team, consisting of the best players from the three Pointes, wouldn't last more than the standard two game knockout, but coaches Pat DeLaere, Dr. Michael Prysak and Jim Harrington rallied the troops after suffering a 10-0 defeat to L'Anse Creuse in the opener.

"We sat the kids down after that loss and told them if they wanted to win the tournament, that nobody could stand in their way," said DeLaere. "After that, the guys just went out and did the job."

"A lot of people counted us out before the tournament started and then they began believing we were done after the loss," DeLaere continued. "Eventually, we proved a lot of people wrong."

In game two, the Farms-City-Park found itself virtually face-to-face with elimination, but a two-run rally in the bottom of the seventh provided enough runs to take a 5-4 decision over Alpena.

Paul Coyro held Alpena hitless through the final two innings to earn the win, but more important was the chance to continue playing.

"From the start, this team has always wanted to play more," said DeLaere. "We'd get done with practice and they'd be disappointed that it was over. That, I think was the character of the team."

Sporting a 1-1 record and still facing elimination, DeLaere sent Coyro to the mound to face Port Huron. Coyro picked up the win, but Steve Booher saved it for him by tossing five scoreless innings. Bill Gough, who endured 32 innings of catching through the tourney, led the offense with two hits in three trips.

Ryan Messacar and Bill Palazzo each had two hits in game four, as the Farms-City-Park eliminated Niles, 5-4.

Paul Gentile worked on the mound for the win that catapulted the Farms-City-Park into the finals against L'Anse Creuse.

"The key for us in winning three straight games was determination," said DeLaere. "We just didn't let down, and after every inning we would huddle up and say, 'We can do it.' That became sort of our team motto."

The Farms-City-Park team, which practiced together for two weeks before entering the tourney, only had 15 hits in five games, but it was the keen eyes that did the job.

"The key to the tourney was making the opponents throw strikes," DeLaere said. "We became more patient at the plate and that created base runners."

In five games, they picked up 31 walks, but couldn't drive home the run in crucial situations.

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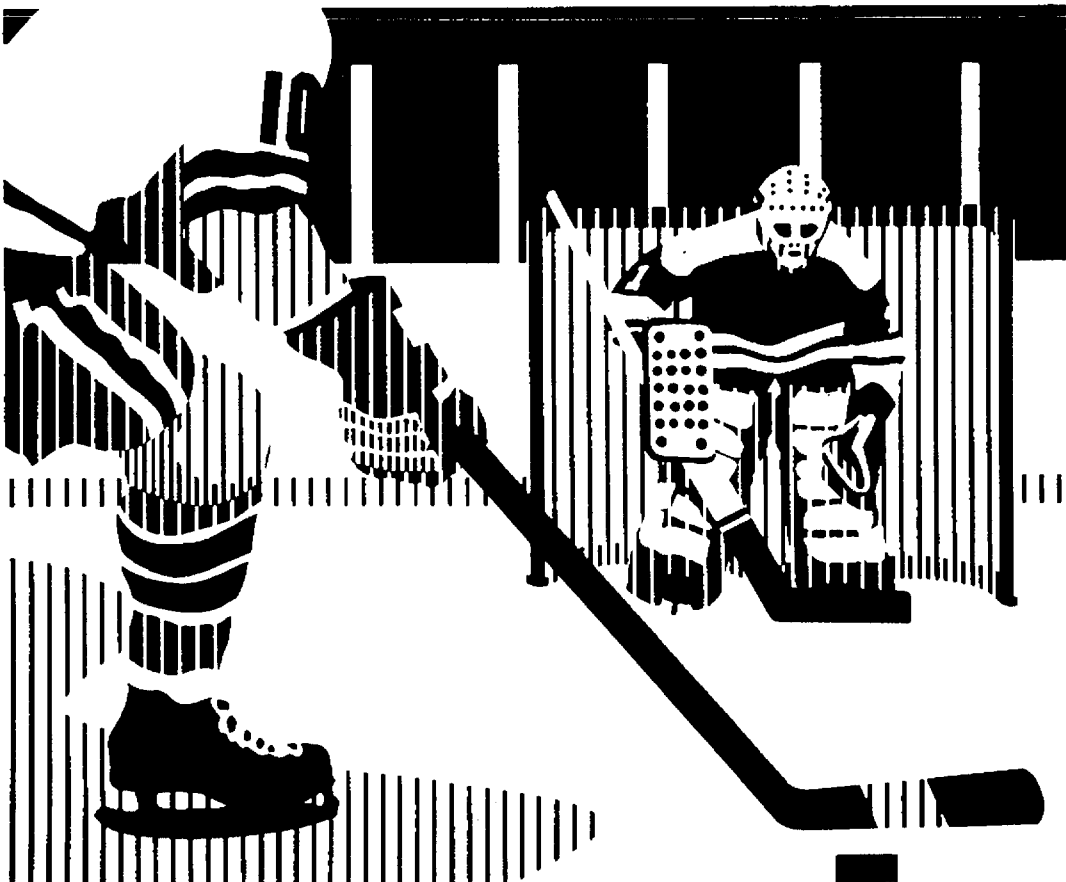
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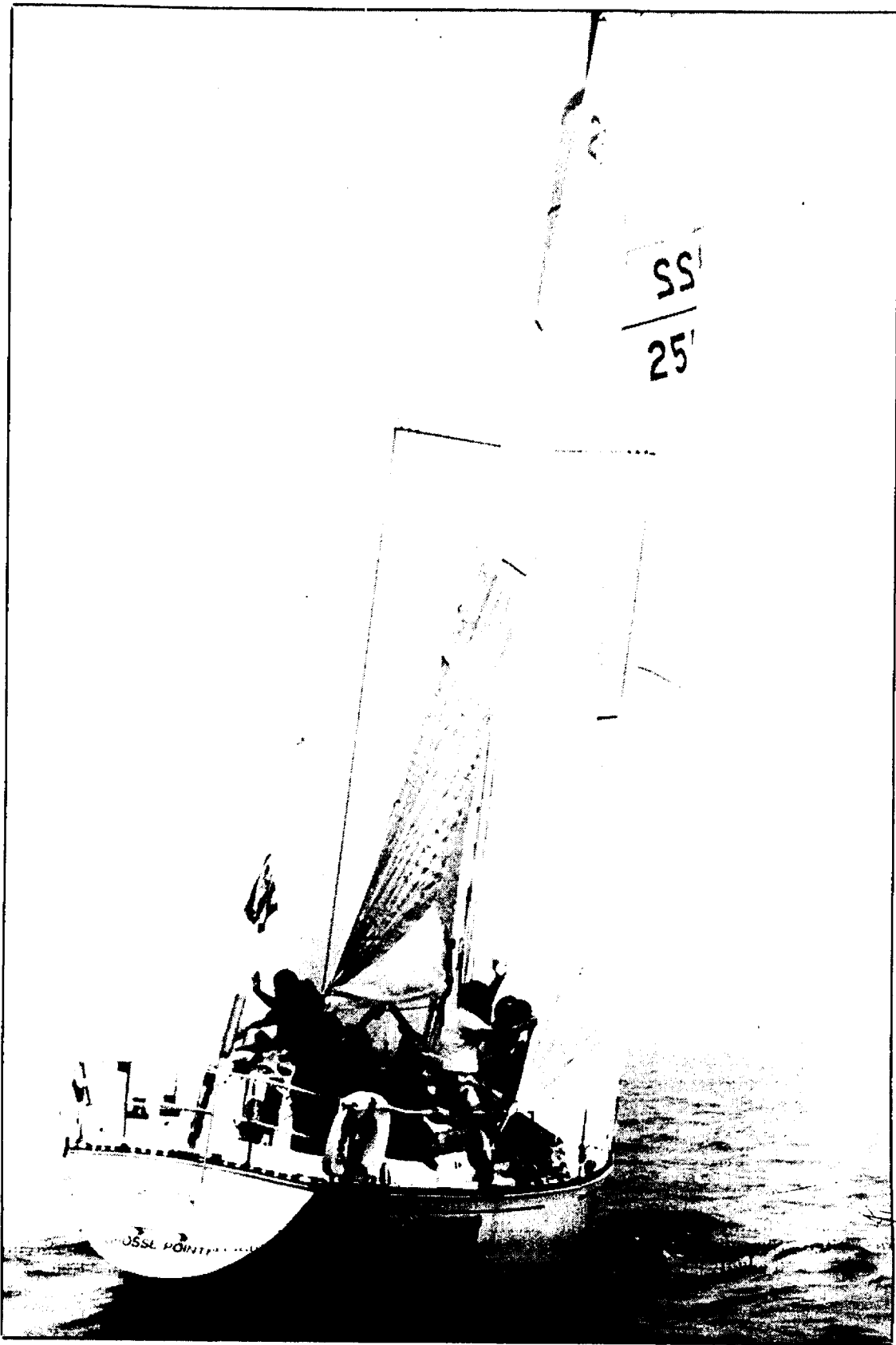
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# Wind proves as fickle as in Chicago race

Grant, from the GPYC, ran his shoot for four to five hours after rounding Cove Island and gambled by heading south of the rhumb line.

"We stayed a mile or two further south and that's how we caught those boats," he said. "Staying down there made the difference and that's why we finished just about an hour ahead of them."

Renegade, last week's overall Chicago winner, skippered by Bayview's Ken Meade, finished eighth in IOR A and 19th in the division with a corrected time of 57:09.16. Meade's elapsed time was 63:07.05.

"We kind of finished on our own," said Renegade crewman John Upton. "We didn't see our sister ships (the other 50-footers) after Duck Island. We stayed north of the line to the Ducks and then went south the rest of the way."

Inconsistent winds, which at times never blew, dominated the race. According to Sprint 3 skipper John Stevens, the fluctuating winds really played havoc.

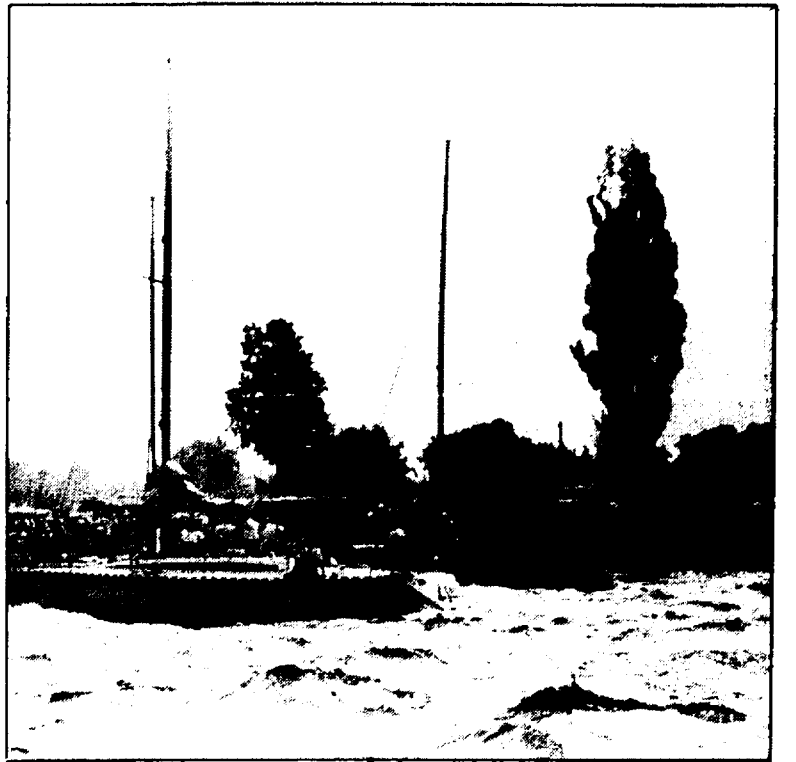
So did the flat waters that never got over three feet.

"We were really in tremendous shape, but we sat for two hours just five miles from the finish line," said Stevens, who finished third in IOR B and sixth overall with a corrected time of 55:13.34.

"The first leg of the race (to Cove), everyone ran into the doldrums. The lake looked like a mirror and that caused a lot of boats to make moves at night when some of the wind picked up. As a result, we had a lot more changes to make because you couldn't see the competition."

From Cove Island to Mackinac, the entire fleet bobbed as winds were down to nothing.

"We stopped, went a mile, stopped again," said GPYC's Fred Detwiler, who skippered

Trader to a sixth-place finish in IOR B (55:49.21). "This race was even more frustrating than the Chicago race because four or five times we actually had no wind. In Chicago, we were at least going one or two knots."

"For a while we were going six or seven knots, then bang!

we were right back to sitting," said Stevens. "Then again, so was everybody else."

As of noon Tuesday, approximately 60 boats were in, with another 200 still struggling to get in.

"That's pretty much the story," said Stevens.

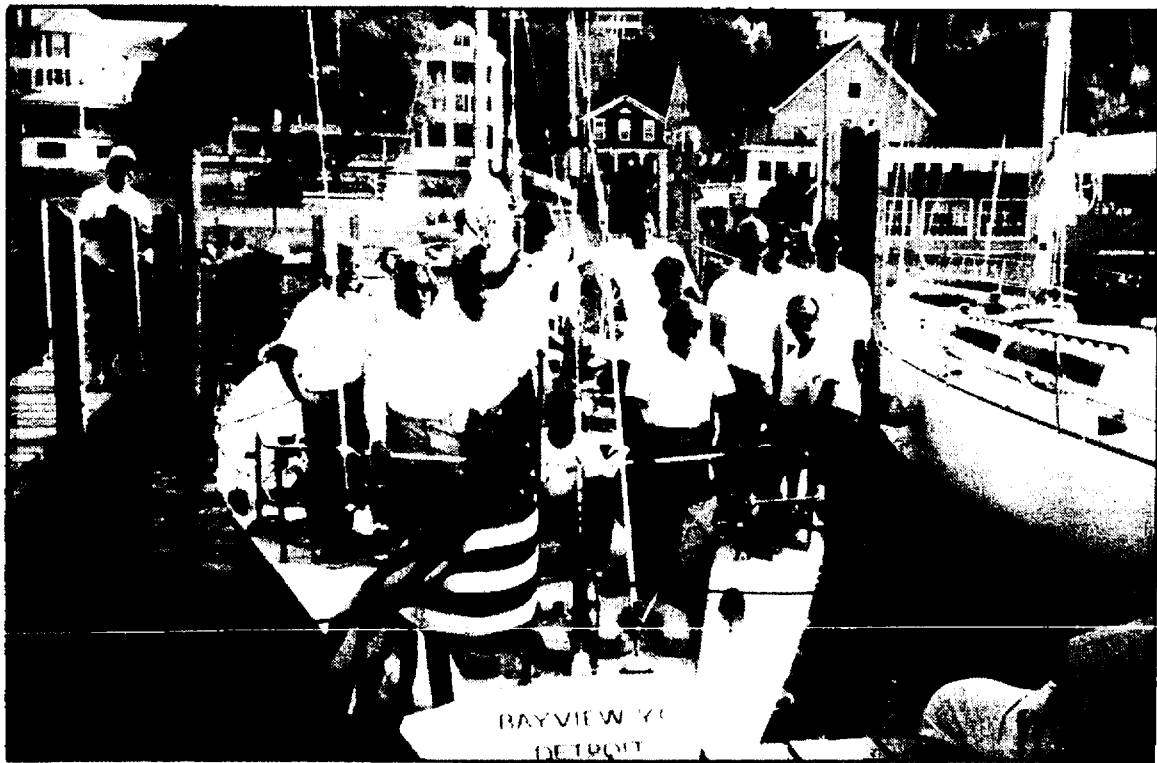

# Chicago-to-Mackinac race was 'Renegade'-made

On Saturday, July 15, hundreds of boats set sail from Chicago to Mackinac for what is traditionally a two-day long-distance race. However, tradition gave way to no winds and calm waters, causing a huge delay in the completion of the oldest sailboat race on the Great Lakes.

The 82nd running of the Chicago to Mackinac sailboat race, which began at noon on July 15, saw more than 65 boats drop out. But it also saw Ken Meade hoist the overall flag on his 50-foot Trers, *Renegade*.

Meade also earned the International Offshore Rule (IOR) A flag.

Meade, who leases *Renegade*, crossed the line in fourth place behind *Pied Piper*, *Sassy* and

*Stripes*. However, after his handicaps were computed, he graciously accepted the overall flag with a corrected time of 57 hours, 14 minutes, and 12 seconds.

"Our boat is an extremely good boat in light wind," said Meade. "We just wanted to go as fast as we could no matter what course we took."

Meade and helmsman Wally Cross determined that it was best to stay away from either the Wisconsin or Michigan shorelines.

"Most of the guys took off and headed for the Wisconsin shoreline," Meade explained. "We didn't want to get next to any shoreline because of the fluky air."

Fluky air may be putting it mildly. At times, skippers re-

ported their boats were going no faster than one to three knots, but patient crews prevailed.

"It was tough to wake up Sunday morning (one day after the race started) and still see Chicago," Meade said. "We woke up Sunday and said, 'What am I doing here?' We then looked around and all the big boats were behind, so we said, 'It can't be too bad if we're ahead of the maxi boats, so we kept going.'"

And going, and going, and going — very slowly.

"It seemed like we were stuck on one or two knots for days," Meade said. "We really couldn't do a whole lot, but neither could the other boats. It was very hot on the boat and at times boring, but we just tried to be patient. In fact, we even played a few hands of gin rummy."

The hand Mother Nature dealt the entire fleet was not stacked. Some boats began dropping out, while others desperately waited for a slight puff.

"We kept moving even though it was very discouraging to see Chicago Sunday," said Fred Detwiler, Grosse Pointe and skipper of IOR B champ, *Trader*. "We were going one or two knots, and then all of a sudden we'd get up to four. We were very excited then."

*Trader's* corrected time of 58:44.51 earned a finish of second overall.

Tongue-in-cheek comments, such as the one above, kept Detwiler's crew sharp. So did a brief swim in Lake Michigan.

"It was pretty boring, so we read a lot of magazines and told jokes," he said. "At one point, we weren't moving and the crew was hot and tired, so we went for a swim."

The swim revived a rather listless crew and *Trader* went on to win its fourth Mackinac race since 1987. In 1987, Detwiler won the Chicago and Port Huron races, and in 1988 won the Port Huron race. In 1987, he set a race record on his way to an overall win in the Chicago race, and now he's got one more IOR B flag to fly from the '89 campaign.

"This is really a nice win," he said. "I'm very proud of the crew."

Most skippers tried to pass the first test finding wind, but Detwiler believes endurance was the second part of the test.

"Races like that are a test of endurance and depth," he said. "We have a very deep crew and did very well. We found out who has a deep crew and who doesn't. Those who survived this race endured, those who didn't, well..."

After catching winds of nine to 11 knots, *Renegade* and others began to make progress. Meade

stuck to the middle of the lake with his .6 ounce spinnaker, but once he hit Gray's Reef, the wind died — literally.

"The nutty part about this whole thing was when we rounded Gray's Reef we had about 20 miles to the bridge and then about five more to the finish, but the winds just died again," Meade recalled. "We then went from waiting, to cruising, back to waiting, and waiting, and waiting."

But even after finishing, the *Renegade* crew still had to wait.

"We knew we had our class won, but we had to worry about

whether or not we won the overall," said Meade. "We stuck around just to make sure we won the thing."

Detwiler also stuck around.

"We thought we had the overall when we hit Gray's Reef," he said. "But, then we were back to looking for wind. We rounded the Reef, but we couldn't catch the wind because there wasn't any."

That was pretty much the story of the 1989 Chicago to Mackinac race.

"Races like that are rough, but it makes it all worth while when you win," said Meade.
