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



Food recommendation: The hip mom-and-pop restaurant Son's Addition in the Mission District-don't miss the Tuna and Uni Tostada and the Wagyu Steak Tartare

Most memorable trip: A road trip up the coast that included Mendocino, Big Sur, and Napa. Under the radar: Eat at taco stands! All the best tacos I've had have come from sidewalk vendors and trucks. Favorite destination: Big Sur! You can't beat the stunning coastal views, incredible hiking trails, and mouthwatering seafood. Food recommendation: The Spicy Oxtail Soup at Sun Nong Dan in L.A.'s Koreatown is so good it might change your life.

Most memorable trip: Driving up to Lake Tahoe from L.A. via Highway 395 Under the radar: Go see the huge trees! Sequoia National Park is not the first park on everyone's list, but it's amazing. **Favorite destination:** Palm Springs. Food recommendation: Gus's Fried Chicken on Crenshaw

Most memorable trip: Splitboarding 10 miles out to the Ostrander Ski Hut in the Yosemite wilderness. Under the radar: Death Valley is often overlooked. I recommend hiking out on the gigantic sand dunes and going to see the Artist's Palette. **Favorite destination:** Mammoth Lakes. The people, food, hot springs, and surreal beauty make it a very special place. Food recommendation: Some of my favorite spots are The Rose Venice, Gjusta, and MTN.

Megan Michelson Writer, Catch the Winter Wave, p. 52

Most memorable trip: Weekend trips to Mammoth Mountain-skiing off a high-alpine volcano by day, soaking in hot springs and stargazing by night. Under the radar: Donner Ski Ranch is a tiny, family-owned ski area that offers \$40 midweek lift tickets. Favorite destination: Alpine Meadows. I have little nooks and crannies that feel like they belong just to me. Food recommendation: Truckee's Alibi Ale Works for the gourmet nachos

Most memorable trip: Visiting Steve Dresler, the legendary brewer at Sierra Nevada. He stopped to pour the Ovila series straight from the tanks. Under the radar: Claimstake in Rancho Cordova and Flatland in Elk Grove-guality brewers in Sacramento industrial parks. Favorite destination: Auburn, a Gold Rush town that has become a craft beer minimecca. Food recommendation: Vegan sandwich at Juno's Kitchen in Sacramento

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Going Solo

Now more than ever, travelers are exploring the world alone. Solo travel has grown increasingly popular in recent years: According to a 2018 Booking.com survey, 40 percent took a solo trip in 2017, and another 21 percent intend to do so in the future.

Why the shift? "In a word, freedom," says writer Janice Waugh of Solo Traveler, a resource and community for those interested in traveling alone (*solotravelerworld.com*). "People love the ability to do what they want when they want without having to consult others." Demographics have also evolved. There are now more single than coupled adults in the United States, people are getting married later in life, and "women of all ages are more independent than ever," Waugh says, noting that there are more solo female travelers than males.

Stephanie Rosenbloom, author of Alone Time: Four Seasons, Four Cities, and the Pleasures of Solitude, sees solo travel as an opportunity to develop a deeper connection with a place. "Traveling alone allows you to slow down and really pay attention; to notice all the marvelous, everyday details that we tend to miss when we're talking with or tending to companions."

Tiki Forever

If you've ever sipped a juicy, rum-drenched drink topped with a wedge of pineapple and a flirty umbrella, you can thank California for the pleasure. Tiki cocktails and their accompanying subculture were born in Los Angeles, when a young man returned from his travels abroad to open Don's Beachcomber in 1933. Although all of the California locations of Don the Beachcomber (its later name) have since closed, the legendary bar launched a global movement that lives on today in glowing, thatch-roofed tiki dives. Nodding to Polynesia and the Caribbean but truly authentic to no single location, these tiki-themed bars are worth a visit on your next trip to the Golden State.

False Idol SAN DIEGO

Travel through a secret stainless steel door inside Little Italy's Craft & Commerce and enter this theatrical speakeasy, where the walls are enshrouded with hand-carved idols by local artist Bosko Hrnjak. **Don't miss:** The postcards, swizzle sticks, and other memorabilia on display under the glass-topped bar, like a miniature museum celebrating San Diego's tiki past.

Bootlegger Tiki PALM SPRINGS

This Palm Springs spot returns a former 1953 Don the Beachcomber location to its tiki roots, with rattan furniture, carved mugs, and potent cocktails. **Don't miss:** The New Originals section of the menu, with its distinctively modern pairing of rum with ingredients like cold brew, ancho chilies, strawberry-infused Campari, and mole bitters.

Tiki-Ti HOLLYWOOD

Opened in 1961 by one of the original Don the Beachcomber bartenders, this Hollywood dive covered in twinkle lights and license plates still serves 94 tropical cocktails. **Don't miss:** The handheld Wheel of Tiki-Ti Drinks—give it a strong spin and leave your fate to the beverage gods.

The Pacific Seas LOS ANGELES

Climb the hidden staircase to reach this bamboo-decked dreamland above Clifton's in downtown L.A., where the decor is as polished as the carefully poured cocktails. **Don't miss:** The Mai Tai, deliciously bright featuring fresh ingredients.

Tiki-Ko BAKERSFIELD

This "shady place for sunny people" welcomes visitors to a black-lit paradise, where drinkers seated beneath glowing Puffer Fish lamps sip on cocktails inspired by *Gilligan's Island* and *The Big Lebowski*. **Don't miss:** The Mauna Ahi, a fruity booze bowl served in a flaming volcano vessel with its own signature chant.

Smuggler's Cove SAN FRANCISCO


Created by cocktail guru Martin Cate, this destination drinkery—which is part pirate ship—stocks more than 550 rums. **Don't miss:** The selection of rare international rums, available for sampling at up to about \$300 an ounce.

Tonga Room & Hurricane Bar SAN FRANCISCO

Built in 1945 around a swimming pool of the Fairmont Hotel, the Tonga Room in Nob Hill is a glorious throwback. More than 70 years later, it's still an exotic respite and one of the town's most entertaining tables. **Don't miss:** The Island Groove Band, which plays on a floating stage on the restaurant's turquoise "lagoon."

The Jungle Bird SACRAMENTO

This escapist saloon brings island vibes inland with tropical decor, a thatched-roof bar, boozy drinks, and pu-pu platters. **Don't miss:** The Maiden Voyage, with two kinds of rum, pineapple, and real Dole Whip.



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Sound Advice

California Now Podcast host and NPR veteran Soterios Johnson shares what he's learned while interviewing guests

The Channel Islands are the perfect place to get away from civilization near civilization. "After speaking with author Ken McAlpine, I learned that five of the islands off the coast of Southern California are part of Channel Islands National Park. The islands offer no services, like restaurants or lodging, so visitors need to pack supplies and plan to camp if staying overnight. The payoff includes communing with nature, stunning views, and solitude."

California deserts offers excellent stargazing. "Astronomer Dennis Mammana. who leads Borrego Night Sky Tours in the Golden State's only International Dark Sky Community, makes it easy to enjoy the cosmos by providing telescopes and expertise in a setting devoid of light pollution.

The Redwood Coast is home to the biggest, tallest trees on the planet. "While interviewing Lonely Planet's Alison Bing, I learned that the majestic redwoods are clustered in forests along the northern coast. A good place to appreciate them is the Avenue of the Giants, a 31-mile portion of old Highway 101. The southern end is about a three-hour drive north of San Francisco."

It's easy to find breweries all over the state. "The craft beer movement in the U.S. started in California, and the state boasts more than 900 craft breweries. Documentary filmmaker Jeff Smith blew my mind with the fact that San Diego alone has more than 150 microbreweries."

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Gone Glamping

Connect with nature—without sacrificing resort-style amenities

Outdoor luxury may seem like an oxymoron, but not in California, where numerous glamping resorts give visitors the opportunity to be surrounded by nature and get a comfy night's sleep.

In addition to furnished tents, AutoCamp offers Airstream trailers decked out with modern interiors in Sonoma's Russian River Valley, Santa Barbara, and Yosemite (as of early 2019). The new location sits near the historic mining town of Mariposa. Wake up and breathe in the mountain air, then grab a coffee in the mid-century modern clubhouse. Head out for a hike or canoe on the camp's shimmering pond. All that, and you're still less than 40 miles from Yosemite Valley.

Along the coast, stay in a yurt at Big Sur's Treebones Resort or El Capitan Canyon near Santa Barbara. There are luxury tents among the redwoods in Mendocino Grove on the North Coast and more Airstreams near Joshua Tree National Park at Kate's Lazy Desert, owned by B-52's singer Kate Pierson.

Back up in the mountains, a one-mile hike leads to tent cabins and gourmet cuisine served in a beautiful pavilion at the Sequoia High Sierra Camp. In Lassen Volcanic National Park, stay in one of the 20 rustic accommodations at Manzanita Lake Camping Cabins. Sign up for an amenity package, and you'll be provided with wood, cooking essentials, and a s'mores kit.

How to Taste Olive Oil

Learn the proper tasting techniques, then explore the bright flavors of freshly pressed oils at a California tasting room

Thom Curry knows one thing for sure: "California has the best olive oil in the world." Curry, the founder of Temecula Olive Oil, a family-owned-and-operated ranch, credits the state's gold standard to the combination of innovation and exceptional weather. He explains the best way to taste olive oil below.

TASTING TECHNIQUES Time it right

"The best time to do a tasting is before you eat, when you're just a little hungry," Curry recommends. He prefers a few hours after breakfast to ensure a clean palate.

Ditch the perfume

Curry says, "It's similar to wine tasting; you're looking for the same organoleptic qualities, but you have to work a little harder." To best appreciate the subtle flavors, leave your fragrance at home.

Drink up

Olive oil is best enjoyed on its own. "The yeast in bread can interact with the flavor," says Curry. Hold the stemless snifter in your palm for warmth, then sip a bit of oil, aerating it in your mouth before swallowing.

Note flavor profiles

Look for three central attributes: fruitiness, bitterness, and pungency. What do you taste and prefer on each scale?

Keep it clean

Curry recommends cleansing your palate with a slice of green apple and some sparkling water between each tasting. For strong-tasting oils, try plain yogurt.

Go light to strong

As in wine tasting, you'll try oils from delicate to aggressive. Unlike wine, when it comes to olive oil, the fresher, the better. "It's simply fruit juice," Curry explains.

Trust your judgment

"I like to tell people it doesn't matter what anyone else thinks.... [The question is,] hedonistically, is this enjoyable for you?" says Curry.

FIND A TASTING ROOM

Given that California is responsible for 99 percent of the country's olive oil production, there are plenty of places to stop in for a sip (listed from north to south). Make sure to call ahead as many require a



Granted, it would be challenging to recreate some of the Carlsbad park's creations. The 27,000 models that dot the grounds include the Golden Gate Bridge in Miniland, the underwater creatures at the Deep Sea Adventure, and the giant 20th-anniversary LEGO cake for the 2019 celebration.

Slagle grew up in nearby Poway and was one of the first visitors when the park opened in 1999. In college, he got a job in LEGOLAND's Big Shop, where he first recognized that he could have a career as a builder. "I realized this was my natural job," he says, "so I got out all my LEGO bricks and started building again." Slagle spends his days creating new pieces while also giving some TLC to

older models. Visitors love to peer through the Model Shop's glass window and offer suggestions. His advice to aspiring LEGO masters? "Never stop building," he says. "Then take it apart and make changes. Forget the instructions—you can do whatever you want."

DISNEYLAND RESORT

Rhonda Wood, Urban Forester

s a child, Rhonda Wood visited Disneyland every year with her grandparents. "It was our family's happy place," says Wood, now the resort's Urban Forester.

After a breakfast of Mickey Mouse pancakes at the River Belle Terrace, Wood and her family would often start at the Jungle Cruise. "I remember how excited I was every time my family and I boarded the Jungle Cruise—the smell of the water amongst the giant trees, along with enjoying the funny skipper's jokes."

The attraction is still her favorite. In college, while working for a plant nursery, Wood read an article about Morgan "Bill" Evans, Disneyland's original landscaper, and was inspired to write him. Her correspondence led to a job. "I started off pruning and climbing the trees inside the Jungle Cruise—those trees are enormous."

Now, her day-to-day routine highlights the attention to detail that Disneyland superfans love; the landscaping team starts around 2 a.m. to do maintenance before opening. That Mickey-shaped bed of flowers outside the entrance? It gets replanted nine times a year.

Her biggest project right now is the landscaping for Galaxy's Edge, the Star Wars-themed area set to open in 2019. The interplanetary zone will reflect "a diverse landscape that you might not see in a collection anywhere else," says Wood. "One thing that the guests will love are some petrified trees that have, at the base of them, a planting that gives the guests the perspective of ancient trees that have new trees growing from them."

But she still makes it a point to get back to her roots. "During training [for new landscapers], I always manage to make my way into the Jungle Cruise for a day of climbing the trees."

SEAWORLD SAN DIEGO

Jody Westberg, Stranded Animal Coordinator

hey say you should "dress for the job you want." A 13-year-old Jody Westberg took that advice literally. The South Dakota native first visited SeaWorld San Diego in 1986 and decided to dress like her idolsthe employees. "I planned my outfit so that I would look like the people at SeaWorld," she recalls. "I wore white shorts and a blue and white buttoned-down shirt. My dream was always to work at SeaWorld San Diego."

Her plan worked well. As she explored the park, she says, "we'd run into team members and I would talk to them about how they got their jobs. One team member told me I should write a letter and tell them what I wanted to do-and I did." She exchanged a number of letters with the park's curator, Jim Antrim, and several years later, landed an office job with SeaWorld.

Westberg eventually worked her way onto the SeaWorld Animal Rescue Team, of which she is now director. Her team is on the receiving end of calls from first responders and beachgoers who report distressed animals along the Southern California coastline.

"I don't have a typical day—that's one of the things I love about my job," she says. "I don't know if I'll be rescuing a giant seabird or responding to a [call about an] 18,000-pound whale who's gotten entangled." If need be, her team brings the animal back to the park for medical help so that they can be returned to the wild.

Back at the park, some things have not changed since Westberg first arrived at age 13. "Our blue and white uniforms still fall around those same guidelines," she says.


Jon Corfino, Senior Director of Universal Creative

ick your favorite blockbuster movie and consider its characters, storyline, setting, and everything the filmmakers did to create a world that came to life for 100 or so minutes. Now, imagine distilling that same movie into a theme park attraction. That's what Jon Corfino does.

From creating a storyline to developing a ride's mechanics and overseeing costume design, he makes sure every detail of a new attraction is true to the movie that inspired it. As the Senior Director of Universal Creative, Corfino has overseen projects including Despicable Me Minion Mayhem and the DreamWorks Theatre Featuring Kung Fu Panda. Minion Mayhem, which debuted in 2014, is a crowd-pleasing ride that appeals to both little kids and grown-up animation fans: It combines a simulator ride with 3-D technology and stars the movie series' hapless villain Gru. Outside, the carnival-style rides of Super Silly Fun Land very much mirror the amusement park featured in the first Despicable Me.

"The whole trick is to bring the movie to life so you can literally walk into it—and that means dimensionalizing it," Corfino once said in an interview about Universal's behind-the-scenes world. "It's important to be able to pick moments, and create moments, where you're totally immersed...and create the environment that you saw within the movie."

And the innovation never ends. Next up, Corfino is overseeing the highly anticipated Jurassic World, set to open in late 2019. The ride will feature new technology, scenes, and characters, and Corfino has been involved in every stepright down to the texture of the raptors' scaly skin. "We have a lot of surprises in store for next year," he promises.

Catch the Winter Wave

The Golden State may be known for its sunny beaches, but its ski resorts provide plenty of dazzle too. Come experience a surf-meets-ski culture you won't find anywhere else.

That proximity to other sports has a big kick-back, adrenaline-loving spirit extends from the Pacific Coast to the snowy peaks in the High Sierra



tricks out of 22-foot halfpipes, and après ski is as much a part of the culture as the skiing itself.

Plus, the quality and accessibility of skiing and snowboarding in California are some of its biggest draws. Jones moved to the Lake Tahoe area from his native Massachusetts to snowboard over two decades ago and never left. He built his career on the famed steeps of Squaw Valley Alpine Meadows. He then went on to launch the nonprofit Protect Our Winters and his snowboarding company, Jones Snowboards, in the town of Truckee, where he lives with his family.

"I just fell in love with this place—big mountains, close to the ocean, an easy-to-reach airport. It's a very happy, easy place to be," Jones says. "I've traveled all over the world, and I just kept coming back to Tahoe."

The Golden State's bright sun not only shines on the coast-it also beams on the high-elevation peaks and world-class ski resorts, which get blanketed in snow. Mammoth Mountain somehow manages to score 300 days of sun a year and an annual average of 400 inches of snow, which is usually enough to keep the mountain open well into June. This is also the home of ski destinations like Kirk-

wood, where two-foot dumps are a common occurrence, and Sugar Bowl, which received a whopping 751 inches of snow during the record-breaking 2017 winter. You won't find this unique combination of sunshine and powder days anywhere else on the planet.

The best part about California resorts? The welcome mat is rolled out for every type of skier and snowboarder, from total newbies to hard-charging experts with Olympic dreams. You'll find everything from steep chutes to mellow beginner slopes, plus lessons and clinics that cater to every

level. Even those who don't want to ski will find plenty of things to do in California's ski towns, on and off the snow.

Snow for Every Level

Some of the most accomplished pro skiers and riders have developed their skills on the famously extreme terrain around California. Freeskiing pioneers like the late Shane McConkey made the cliffs of Squaw Valley famous in ski movies, while Olympic champions such as skier Julia Mancuso and snowboarder Chloe Kim got their starts as kids at

Squaw and Mountain High, respectively.

This is the state that bred big-mountain skier Cody Townsend, Olympic gold medalist Jonny Moseley, and slopestyle snowboard star Jamie Anderson. Many of these athletes came to California for the steep terrain and abundant snowfall the state is known for, but they stayed for one main reason: They fell in love with the vibe, culture, and community of the place.

If you're an expert skier or rider, there's plenty of terrain to challenge you. Famous chairlifts and runs like Squaw Valley's KT-

22, Mammoth's Chair 23, or Kirkwood's The Wall will push your limits. Want to uplevel your experience? "Hire a guide," says Townsend. "A guide will help you find the secret powder stashes, get to the resort-accessed backcountry, and enjoy your time that much more."

Expedition: Kirkwood offers guided backcountry tours, avalanche education, and steep-terrain clinics. In 2017, Alpenglow Expeditions began offering first-of-its-kind guided side-country tours into previously closed terrain outside the boundary at Squaw Valley, enabling skiers to explore

Terrain parks at Big Bear Mountain Resort, ranked top 10 best in North America by *TransWorld SNOWboarding* coveted zones like Tram Ridge and National Geographic Bowl.

"This is truly some of the best terrain in Tahoe," says Adrian Ballinger, founder of Alpenglow Expeditions. "You'll get 1,500vertical-foot runs on incredible terrain. It feels different out there and our groups can now access this terrain via a 15-minute bootpack from the lift."

Of course, you don't need to be an expert or backcountry skier to enjoy California's mountains. Resorts across the state offer creative and game-changing lessons for everyone from first-timers to those with disabilities. Heavenly Mountain Resort recently launched a GoPro lesson, where guests learn how to use GoPro cameras to capture their experiences, and Mountain High offers virtual snow simulators to let you test new skills in a controlled environment before taking them to the slopes.

At Big Bear Mountain Resort, instructors help newbies as young as four years old learn the ropes at terrain-based Skill Builder Parks. At Sierra-at-Tahoe, in addition to affordable lessons for the whole family, a technology called Smart Terrain offers gently sloped runs that are custom-designed for learners. "Snow sports can feel hard to get into," says Steve Hemphill, the director of marketing at Sierra-at-Tahoe. "But at Sierra, we want to see as many people learning to ski and ride as possible." For riders with disabilities, Achieve Tahoe teaches lessons at Alpine Meadows and Disabled Sports Eastern Sierra serves up half-day and full-day lessons as well as longer camps at Mammoth Mountain.

Beyond Skis and Boards

Even if you don't ski or snowboard, California's mountain towns offer countless activities that embrace the Golden State's classic sense of adventure. Many offerings take notes from popular beach activities.

If you can ride a beach cruiser, you could handle fat tire biking with Tahoe Mountain Guides, which leads trips on the growing number of snowy trails around Truckee. Or take the kids snow tubing at Tube Town in Soda Springs, with 20 lanes, tube rentals, and a lift to carry you to the top. If you love long, peaceful hikes, head to Royal Gorge, atop Donner Summit, where you'll find more than 20 miles of designated snowshoe trails, plus snowshoe rentals and nine rustic backcountry warming huts you can tuck into for a hot chocolate along the way.

The thrill of kiting across a surface isn't just for the ocean. The Sierra Snowkite Center, the first of its kind in California, opened in 2012 near Sugar Bowl ski resort. Founder Tyler Brown, a ski-racer-turned-kitesurfer, teaches lessons for first-time snowkiters on more gentle terrain and experienced kiters looking






to access steeper backcountry slopes. "You don't need much experience to learn to snowkite," says Brown. "We can teach anyone and everyone."

Surf vibes come out in full force during spring skiing, when it's common to see girls in bikini tops and guys in T-shirts swooshing down the mountain. At Squaw Valley Alpine Meadows, you can ride an aerial tram to the mountaintop's newly revamped High Camp, where you can go ice skating or soak in the world's most picturesque hot tub at 8,200 feet.

A snow trip in California isn't complete without experiencing the lively après-ski scene. At Northstar, you can enjoy a free champagne bar at 2 p.m. on a midmountain slope or splurge for an upgraded setup with a bottle of bubbly, a meat-and-cheese platter, and your own private fire pit. At Heavenly, DJs spin music atop a retrofitted snowcat that roams the mountain for one of the rowdiest après dance parties around. For a more relaxed ending to your day, The Ritz-Carlton, Lake Tahoe at Northstar California hosts nightly "marshmology" and astronomy lessons, where you'll learn the history of the marshmallow and stargaze through a telescope while roasting s'mores over a campfire.

Lassen Volcanic National Park gets so much snow that it can take two months to clear the park highway. But all that white stuff makes Lassen a wonderland for snowshoeing. From the easy loop around Reflection Lake to a challenging trek up the 9,250-foot Brokeoff Mountain, Lassen has routes for all skill levels. And on weekends from January through April, ranger-led walks explore the forest near the Kohm Yah-mah-nee Visitor Center. nps.gov/lavo

Surfers aren't the only dudes in California: At Marble Mountain Ranch, the dudes wear cowboy hats and saddle

up for trail rides into the Klamath National Forest. This guest ranch also offers rafting on the Klamath River, as well as fly-fishing for steelhead. You'll stay in private Western-style cottages, some with kitchens and up to three bedrooms. And after a long day, nothing beats classic California ranch cuisine like tri-tip smoked over wood from local fruit trees.



SEE

You might be surprised to learn that one of Lassen National Forest's most memorable walks is completely in the dark. And underground. Near Old Station, walk a short trail to explore the Subway Cave Lava Tube, formed around 20,000 years ago. Descend a staircase into the tube (which maintains a chilly 46 degrees), then use your flashlight (you'll need one!) to pick out details such as a partial collapse of the cave's ceiling. Rangers lead tours on weekends from mid-June through Labor Day. fs.usda.gov



North of Fort Bragg in Mendocino County, a beautiful waterfall flows into the ocean near the town of Westport off Highway 1. California's North Coast region has miles of stunning oceanfront locations, most of which are wild, rugged, and delightfully peaceful.

FLOAT

Rent a kayak or paddleboard at Trinidad's Stone Lagoon Visitor Center and explore the cluster of brackish lagoons and marshes at Humboldt Lagoons State Park. Pack your binoculars for views of Roosevelt elk, river otters, pygmy owls, and belted kingfishers. Take a dip in Stone Lagoon's warm(ish) waters, stroll Big Lagoon's sandbar, or paddle yourself to sleep at Ryan's Cove boat-in campground, nestled in a grove of Sitka spruce. parks.ca.gov





DRIVE

Howland Hill Road is a 10-mile-long version of a drive-thru tree. Find the best seats outside on the Pacific-view patio or join the indoor fun: Sunday trivia games, pool tables, and Pac-Man. sixriversbrewery.com

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Wander the blufftop trails at Jug Handle State Natural Reserve and you may spot gray whales spout as they pass by on their annual migration to Alaska (mid-December to mid-April). Or hike the Ecological Staircase Trail that ascends three wave-cut terraces, each 100,000 years older than the last. At trail's end, find a pygmy forest of miniaturized pines and cypress, where two-foot-high trees are more than a century old. parks.ca.gov







San Francisco's most iconic landmark is a total showstopper from every angle. The bridge can be explored in plenty of creative ways: Hike around its base in the Golden Gate Recreational Area, ride across its bike-friendly path to Sausalito, or cruise below its steel curves on a scenic boat tour.



TOUR

The under-the-radar Morcom Municipal Rose Garden is an Oakland oasis that has drawn visitors since 1933, when the mayor planted the first rose. Morcom's seven acres have changed little in the intervening years, still criss-crossed by walking paths, dotted with pools and fountains, and full of 6,000 glorious rose bushes in heirloom varieties that exist nowhere else. Visit from late April to October when the garden's signature flowers burst into bloom. *friendsofoaklandrose.org*

SHOP

In Marin County, just 14 miles north of San Francisco, the Mill Valley Lumber Yard greeted arrivals for more than 100 years before a local couple bought it with visions of transforming it into a contemporary gathering spot. Today, the historic site has been reborn as a sweet retail village where shoppers browse artisan housewares and fresh flowers. then enjoy snacks from a glutenfree bakery around the fire pit or creekside picnic tables. millvalleylumberyard.com

SIP

One of the Bay Area's best booze crawls is **Spirits** Alley at Alameda Point, a former Naval Air Station reinvented as a drinking destination with breweries, distilleries, and wineries for your tasting pleasure. Start with a guided tour at St. George Spirits or Hangar 1 Vodka, then chase the hard stuff with a glass of local



grape juice from Rock Wall or Building 43 Winery. Close your crawl on the patio at Faction Brewing, where the beer is cold and the San Francisco skyline spreads before you like a mirage. alamedaca.gov/visitors/spirits-alley

DINE

After meeting at Lisbon's acclaimed Restaurant Eleven, chef couple David Costa and Jessica Carreira returned to the latter's hometown to open Adega, a comfortable-vetrefined eatery in San Jose's Little Portugal. Here Costa creates elevated dishes rooted in traditional Portuguese flavors, Carreira turns out brilliant desserts, and the wine list boasts vintages rarely seen this side of the Atlantic. The pair's efforts earned the city its first Michelin star and transformed a modest restaurant into a dining destination. adegarest.com



SEE The massive

elephant seals at Año Nuevo State Park near Pescadero cut a distinctive silhouette, with the males sporting giant fleshy snouts used to attract females and fend off challengers. While the creatures went nearly extinct in the late 1800s, they've rebounded tremendously, with nearly 10,000 animals returning to this park annually to mate, give birth, and molt. The best way to get to know the seals is on a guided walk-docents lead guests on a distinctly Californian safari past newborn pups and 4,000-pound alphas.

1. Sierraville



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
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

ASK A PARK RANGER

Robert Lewis

Bear sightings, pepperoni pizza, and alpine hikes are all part of a day's work for Robert Lewis, a park ranger at Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks. We asked him to share his best tips for enjoying the majestic parks.

Best easy hike for visitors? Head for Moro Rock before 9 a.m., climb to the top, and look down into the Central Valley and enjoy the views. Visibility can be hazy depending on the air quality, which can lead to a good discussion about what we can do to reduce ozone pollution.

What's your favorite park animal? The mountain chickadee, which I call the "cheeseburger bird" because of the way its call sounds. After several days in the backcountry, the chickadee's call reminds me of what I crave-a cheeseburger, fries, and an ice-cold Diet Coke.

/here should visitors go to see bears? Go to a place like Crescent Meadow or Halstead Meadow at sunset or sunrise. Walk silently and listen for the sound of bears rooting around. (And don't forget to protect our bears by storing food and scented items in bear boxes.)

What's your favorite park holiday? Labor Day. The crowds disperse, there are less mosquitoes, it's cooler during the day, and evenings are perfect for sleeping outdoors. Soon the fall colors will begin.


Favorite food stop in the parks? I get a pepperoni pizza at Stony Creek Lodge whenever I'm driving between the two parks.

Favorite sunset spot? In winter, it's Triple Divide Pass, where three crests come together.

Favorite spot to begin the day? In summer, I love seeing the sunrise in the aptly named Evolution Basin as the new day dawns.

How can visitors help protect Sequoia and Kings Canyon? Leave the areas you visit cleaner than you found them and leave no trace of your visit. Become stewards of the park

What's the best part of your job? Sometimes when the visitor center is closed, a motivated parent will track me down to administer the Junior Ranger oath to their child. It's a great feeling to pin the new recruit into the order. nps.gov/seki

ASK A WINEMAKER Nora & Enrique Torres

Winemaker Enrique Torres recently opened Diablo Paso, a downtown Paso Robles tasting room, with his wife, Nora. They share their favorite area destinations.

What's so special about Paso Robles?

Nora: It's really a place where you can bring every one in the family, from your pets to your grandma. And it's a great value—the quality of wine here is so good for the price. And we're not at all snobby.

Where's a good place to start? Enrique: The microclimates are incredible, and every winemaker has [his or her] own style. I usually ask people what varietals they like and what direction they're traveling. One good place to start is Taste in the Alley in downtown. They carry mostly small producers and you can try pretty much any Central Coast wine.

Where would you go for picnic supplies? Nora: Di Raimondo's Italian Market & Cheese

Shop. They have wonderful fresh-baked bread, two kinds of baguettes that they get from a woman in San Miguel up the road. There's an amazing selection of cheeses and meats. Enrique: I go more for the small producers, and I personally like Brecon Estate on the west side. They have beautiful outdoor seating under the oak trees for picnics, and I'm a big fan of their wines. The staff is amazing too.

Any out-of-the-ordinary wine tasting experi-ences? Nora: The LXV Wine Lounge downtown does an interactive cheese-and-spice pairing.

They take one kind of cheese, then roll that cheese in different spice blends to pair with different wines. It's an amazing experience.

What if you're not that into wine in Paso? Nora: Wine is still king, but the microbrews and

the distilleries are on the rise here. There's really something for everyone. **Enrique:** Tin City (a collection of winemakers and brewers in an industrial area) is just explod-

ing; there's just so much happening. I usually go to the BarrelHouse Brewing Co., and the ciders are great at Tin City Cider diablopasowines.com







As chief concierge at Montage Laguna Beach, Linda Hauser doesn't work far from where she grew up in Newport Beach. She loves Laguna for its unique blend of natural beauty and culture, and shares her favorites below.

What sets Laguna Beach apart from other beach towns? The first thing I

think of is the art. Laguna is known for its plein air painting history, and the Redfern Gallery is excellent for that. Three of my other favorites are Sue Greenwood Fine Art, Salt Fine Art, and Peter Blake Gallery. They're more contemporary and really have outstanding art.

What about art festivals? I always hit the Sawdust Art & Crafts Festival. There's the charm of the sawdust and all of the different music—country bands and reggae. It's also kid-friendly, and you have local artists with everything from clothing to jewelry to paintings. Then, the Festival of Arts has juried art and is very upscale.

Any beach recommendations?

Laguna's beaches are in coves, so each has its own character. The Montage is right at Treasure Island Beach, which has amazing tide pools. Brooks Street Beach is great for surfing, while Victoria Beach is the best for skimboarding. And when our guests hear about Thousand Steps Beach just south of us, they're really intrigued. It's not literally a thousand steps, but there are a lot that lead all the way down to a beautiful, pristine beach.

Is it easy to get out on the water? We work with La Vida Laguna, and they have kayak and paddleboarding tours that leave from Fisherman's Cove. You go by Seal Rock and up the coast, with amazing views of the cliffs and houses.

What about some casual local lunch spots? Tacc Locc is very local and people just love it, especially for the fish tacos. It's casual—right on the street, with great people-watching. Another spot is La Sirena Grill for Mexican. There's one right across from us and also downtown. They have the charm of the old Laguna.

Any suggestions for a more elegant dinner? Our restaurant Studio sits right on the bluff and has views up and down the coast. But when people want to go off-property, I recommend Selanne Steak Tavern for steak and seafood in a charming, historic building. And Broadway by Amar Santana, who has been on Top Chef, has vore verabling Americane usicing

Dax Shepard

The actor and podcast host shares his Golden State favorites, ranging from fine dining to off-roading



ike a lot of young dreamers, Dax Shepard first came to Los Angeles to pursue a career in acting. His big break came in 2003 when he

debuted in Ashton Kutcher's practical joke show, *Punk'd*, and he has worked nonstop ever since—occasionally alongside his wife, Kristen Bell.

Until recently, Shepard was perhaps best known for his five-year run on the TV series *Parenthood* and for the 2017 film *CHiPs*, which he wrote, directed, and starred in. But that all changed in February 2018 when the Michigan native launched a celebrity-chat podcast, Armchair Expert. We asked Shepard to share some of his favorite spots in L.A. and beyond.

Where do you live? Los Feliz. I don't think it's officially a legal postal code but it's a neighborhood within Los Angeles.

Why there? I compare it to the West Village in New York City. It's very artsy, a lot of great restaurants, and there's still, like, twisty roads. There's a lot of 100-plusyear-old houses, like the Cecil B. DeMille compound. It's pretty fantastic.

Who or what is your greatest California

love? I'm an avid motorcycle rider, but probably my biggest passion is off-roading and California has the best in the country, with, I'm pretty sure, the biggest sand dunes. When I was younger and didn't mind getting surgery I used to ride a dirt bike, but now I drive a dune buggy.

What is the biggest misperception

about Californians? We have this reputation for being health conscious, and sometimes people inadvertently feel judged. In Michigan we called Californians "Fruits



and Nutties" because there was some implication they were judgmental. But we're not, we're just doing our own thing.

What is the stereotype that most holds

true? People are pretty healthy. It is far easier to be healthy here because you have the option of being outside so much. And there's a trillion healthy food options. The fact that we are growing 80 percent of the food farmed in this country is helpful.

What is your favorite Golden State

splurge? A splurge for us has been going to Calistoga Ranch. It's pretty spectacular. I like all the nice stuff in Napa, and the more rustic stuff. I love the mineral pool above Calistoga. That place is awesome.

Time for a road trip. Where are you

going? My favorite road trip is a motorcycle trip to Death Valley from L.A. Stay off the highways, because you keep cresting mountain ridges and entering valleys where you can see 70 miles across. I also love the drive to Mammoth, which is lovely.

If you could decree an official state

culinary experience, what would it be? I think the Mexican-inspired food in California is outstanding. I love Yuccas Taco a cute stand on the side of Hillhurst—and Tacos Tu Madre.

Best California song? America's "Ventura Highway." And Tupac's "California Love." I put that song in *CHiPs* ... that's a darn good one.

How would your California dream day

unfold? Snowboard or snowmobile all morning in Mammoth and then take a helicopter to Glamis and then do some night sand duning. A double adventure.

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
