Texas border tourist attractions work to label area as safe



An 'app economy' born out of thin air and the iPhone

Welcome to the "app" econ-

As the surge in popularity of wireless broadband devices like smart phones and slim tablet computers continues, there's a corresponding flood of new apps (meaning applications) that run on these devices. Even better news: This flood in apps has delivered an explosion of new jobs

According to TechNet, nearly one million apps have been created to date, and it is estimated that these apps generated nearly \$20 billion in revenue

in 2011 alone. TechNet also tells us that the invention of apps has created approximately 466,000 jobs. That is especially remarkable considering the number of app-related jobs was zero in 2007, when the iPhone was launched.

And these jobs

California. All states have benefited from the app economy including Texas, where many groundbreaking apps have been created.

DocBookMD, an Austin start-up, allows doctors to exchange texts, photos, charts, X-rays and other information over iPhones, iPads and Android phones. This app, created by husband and wife physicians Dr. Tracey Haas and Dr. Tim Gueramy, is used by 5,500 doctors in 20 states, and now they have grown to a 15-person company.

Another Texas-based tech company, Tabbedout, offers a free mobile app for iPhones and Android devices that allows bar and restaurant customers to open and close their tabs using their smart phones. Tabbedout has grown rapidly since its creation in 2009 and now serves more than 400 loca-

GYLO (GetYa Learn On), headquartered in Texas, was founded in 2008 and uses apps to produce education products. GYLO found that students report higher motivation to study when using app technology. The GYLO app includes lessons, quizzes, flashcards, calculators, and glossaries.

What may be the best display of Texas app power could be seen at the South by Southwest festival in Austin March 9-18. Abbreviated SXSW, this partconference, part-festival offers an impressive experience combining music, film and emerging technologies all in one big event. It was a showcase of the latest apps. There was even an app called SXSW to help you

find your way around the festival.

It's pretty clear that wireless apps are opening the door to new economic growth and a cultural revolution. But to keep both going, we must continue to upgrade and enhance our wireless infrastructure, which allows such over-the-top technologies to function. Significant investments are being made as wireless providers continue to transition from 2G to 3G to 4G LTE networks.

The 2012 edition is the 220th consecutive U.S. edition. Yes, it's been printed continuously for 220 of the 236 years we've been a free country!

Besides the weather forecasts, planting tables and schedules of tides, eclipses and gestation found in every issue, in 2012 we're told the best days to quit smoking, castrate, pollinate, graft (for Congressmen) and the best days to see a dentist. Although I'd submit there are no best days to see any dentist. The 2012 edition also contains interesting articles on spit, wild pigs (Ham On The Lam), the hottest peppers and biggest blowouts. The latter referring to volcanoes, not the peppers.

This year's edition has valuable information on what to do if you come face to face with a bear or a tornado, and how to properly use a broom. What do you think the average woman is going to do if, instead of a diamond engagement ring, you give her one made out of a ten penny nail? You'll get slapped and remain single, that's what!

Washington rejects Texas' voter ID bill

AUSTIN — Texas' new law supporters say is meant to prevent voter fraud got a thumbsdown from the U.S. Department of Justice on March 12.

If the federal government had allowed the law to take effect in its present form, voters would have been required to present a state-approved identification card in addition to their voter registration card at the polls in order to cast a ballot. In a March 12 news release that came out the day the Justice Department made its decision public, the Brennan Center for Justice in Washington, D.C., stated "Texas' photo ID law could prevent hundreds of thousands of eligible voters from casting a ballot, including a disproportionate number of minorities."

Although passed by the Texas Legislature as Senate Bill 14 and signed into law in 2011, the law is subject to a higher level of scrutiny by Section 5 of the U.S. Voting Rights Act of 1965. The Lone Star State, because of its history of racial discrimination in elections, under Section 5 must receive preclearance for any changes in voting qualifications, standards, practices or procedures prior to their implementation. Preclearance can be given by the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia or the U.S. Department of Justice headed by U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder.

Texas' chief elections officer, Secretary of State Hope Andrade, expressed disappointment in the Justice Department's decision but state Attorney General Greg Abbott said the action was "no surprise, given the Obama Administration's denial of a similar law in South Carolina."

Gov. Rick Perry, in a March 12 statement, said the Justice Department "has no valid reason for rejecting this important law, which requires nothing more extensive than the type of photo identification necessary to receive a library card or board an airplane."

On the other hand, Section 5 is in place to hold certain states and other jurisdictions where inequality has been a problem, to more stringent requirements to uphold the 15th Amendment's guarantee that no citizen shall be denied the right to vote on account of race or color. Several organizations came forward in support of the Justice Department's decision to deny preclearance, including the League of Women Voters, the Mexican American Legislative Caucus, the NAACP and the Texas Democratic Party.

State Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, said, "What the Justice Department said in its ruling was that Texas failed to prove that the changes in law would not have a retrogressive effect on minority voters. In other words, the new law would make it harder for minority citizens to vote than the existing requirements already set in state law."

Secretary of State Andrade, in a March 12 press release said, "My office will continue working with the Texas Attorney General's Office in seeking to implement the will of the citizens of Texas, as enacted by our duly elected representatives in the Texas Legislature."

On March 14, Abbott filed a motion to revise the state's pending complaint seeking preclearance. The revised motion challenges the constitutionality of Section 5 itself. After filing the motion Abbott explained, "As recently as two months ago, (U.S. Supreme Court) Justice (Anthony) Kennedy stated from the bench that Section 5 places Texas at a disadvantage compared to other states. 

according to an industry profile report by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. A subsequent state report said the industry grew in 2010, after struggling through the economic downturn.

More tourists visited South Padre Island, where tourism is a big driver for the economy of the Rio Grande Valley as a whole. Hotel occupancy tax proceeds increased an estimated 5.6 percent in 2011 after rising 5.2 percent in 2010 and 4.6 percent in 2009, according to City Manager Joni Clarke.

Clarke emphasized that South Padre is safe and immune, so far, from the drug violence in Mexico.

"We are an island, and we don't have a lot of issues that you would see in the news typically," Clarke said. "We're very aware of the concern, and I know that our police department gets regular updates. We have an extremely high ratio of lofficers to civilians on the island, with 10 officers per 1,000, where it's usually normal to only have one per 1,000. Of course it's because our population spikes with tourism during summer and other events like that."

"I'm a single woman who lives alone, I walk my dogs at night, and I feel incredibly safe here," Clarke said.

She said that a stabilizing economy and recently opened air service from Monterrey, Mexico, to Brownsville by Aero-Mexico have contributed to the boost in tourism. The City of South Padre Island has adopted a marketing strategy that encourages "vacationship" and the idea of keeping consumer dollars in Texas, Clarke said.

Proximity to Mexico used to be one of the island's attractions, but day-trip tours south of the border have vanished. The Rio RV Park in nearby Brownsville states on its website that, "The free day trips ... (to) Matamoros and Progresso, Mexico, are no longer [available] due to the news media's stories.'

"The entire world is aware of what's going on in Mexico,'

Clarke said. "A lot of the attraction in the area is visiting Mexico, and it's not something that we advise. We don't take an official position on the situation, but we take our stance from what the national travel advisory is.

The Texas Department of Public Safety released this year's travel advisory against travel to Mexico for spring break. DPS spokesman Tom Vinger says that the report is proactive in trying to help people make informed decisions about their travel plans, but by no means does it warn against traveling to the Texas side of the border. According to Vinger, the risk isn't compa-

"We don't discourage anyone from going to South Padre Island," he said. "You can't compare Mexico and the United States. The violence in Mexico is far greater, far more brutal than the United States. We don't see beheadings, car bombings [or]... assassinations of police officials."

Fartner west, the violence in Mexico is a concern to tourism businesses in the Big Bend National Park. The recent State Department advisory issued on Feb. 8 cautioned against visiting the Mexican states of Chihuahua and Coahuila bordering Big Bend National Park, even though it did not report any nearby violence, on either side of the border area.

Danny Ferguson, the general manager of the Chisos Mountain Lodge, located within the park, said the alerts have caused people to frequently ask: "Is it safe down there?"

Like Clarke, he uses the examples from his personal life to show how secure the area is.

car. I leave my doors unlocked at my house," said Ferguson, who also serves on the marketing committee for the Brewster County Tourism Council. "Most people don't realize it's safe down here, and they consider all the border to be dangerous when they think of the negative issues going on."

Vinger does acknowledge that there are drug smuggling issues along the border, but they ultimately affect the entire country, not just border

The foremost goal is to educate travelers planning on going to Mexico, not border at-

"People are going to make up their own mind," he said. "We want people to be informed, to look at multiple sources and not just people who have a financial interest in them going somewhere."

Ferguson says the statewide drought and wildfires have also decreased tourism to his area but that the re-opening of the Boquillas, Mexico, the border entry point at Big Bend, scheduled for March, should help reverse the trend.

While tourism close to the border has suffered, the violence in Mexico hasn't had a significant effect on business at the well-known Gage Hotel in Marathon, according to its general manager. If anything, Carol Peterson said, business at the hotel is improving because of the economy.

"We're still booking a lot of weddings," she said. "We had a wedding at the end of last fall and most of the people were from Juarez and El Paso, and it's an example of something that might not have happened here if it weren't for the events in that area.'

Police spent 19 hours searching for Orona after he committed the crime.

Orona was still wearing the same shoes when he turned himself into law enforcement officials, and DNA evidence showed that Mayra's blood was on them, Gonzales said.

DNA evidence provided that Orona's shoes still had Mayra's blood on them.

The surveillance camera at Stripes also caught part of the incident, and was played at the trial.

"The facts were incriminating," Gonzales said.

Mayra was a 2003 gradu-ate of Ozona High School. Her parents, Fernando and Rosa Fernandez and two sisters, Irma Ortiz and Mo¬niqua Fernandez, live in Ozona, and her brother, Fernando Fernandez Jr., lives in Eldorado.

According to friends and family, Mayra had moved away from her family in Ozona to Fort Stockton to be with her husband and she was working at Stripes, but Mayra and her husband had trouble in their marriage.

The family was presented throughout the trial.

"This is tough for them," Gonzales said. "They are good people. It's tragic that they had to go through something like this."

Two categories earned the highest honor of Distinguished Merit for photography and ads/community.


Closing thoughts by the judge included a comment stating "You have a book that you and your school can be proud of...'
