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In Case Of Fire Dial 7070

A Christmas tree is traditionally a thing of beauty. It can also be a thing of horror. A few seconds is all it takes to transform its tinseled loveliness into a roaring holocaust. The National Board of Fire Underwriters stated: "Few people realize that the Chritmas tree can be one of the most flammable objects known. It is filled with pitch and resin. Once ignited it is very difficult to extinguish."

And always, remember, some human agency is responsible. A tiny spark from an electric train speeding along the miniature right of way, might ignite tinder-dry decorations into a blazing inferno. Neglecting to check faulty electri wiring could cause that.

It has been recorded that fires have been started by the heat of small light globes resting against over-dry branches of the tree.

There is no known manner in which the hazard of fire can be completely eliminated. But it can be reduced. Fire prevention officials offer a few suggestions to minimize the dan-

Pick out a fresh, green tree. Leave it outside, standing in a pail of water until you are ready to use it. When you bring it in, select a stand capable of containing water or wet sand.

Cut the base of the tree diagonally. If it has already been cut in that manner, trim it again. The old cut may have sealed somewhat, reducing the ability of the tree to suck up mois-

Don't place the tree near an open fireplace, where popping sparks might fly into it, or into which the tree itself might fall.

Don't fail to check all wiring, and eliminate worn wire and faulty connections.

Do not leave the tree lights burning when you go to bed CHURCH OF JESUS OF LATTER or when you leave the house.

Caution should be exercised while smoking near a tree, especially if the decorations are combustible.

Finally, get rid of the tree by New Year's Day, or earlier if it shows signs of excessive drying.

Remember, it is the humans who are responsible for fires, tree is just the destroying element. The NBFU records the burning to death of 115 persons in Christmas tree fires during the past two holiday seasons. But there is no report that a Christmas tree, itself, ever blazed up without human assistance somewhere along the line.
