COMMUNICATED. For the Maryland Gazette, HORTICULTURAL.

Mr. GARY. On Thursday last, I had a mass of green Peas, corn, and cucumbers, and the ensuing day cucumbers in Maryland, and in blossom. I also have a vine of what is commonly called the cow pea, but I term it the cow pea, and indeed might add, since it is an abundant bearer, measuring in length upwards of ten feet, being somewhat more than three feet longer than the remarkable plant mentioned in the American Farmer, which was seven feet long. One of the pods measures nine inches. J. F. B. Annapolis October 3d, 1831.

HYDROPHOBIA.

An interesting little girl, aged about six years, the daughter of Mr. Russell who resides in Long Island, about two miles from Williamsburg Ferry, New York, was bitten by a mad dog nine weeks ago. The child died a few days ago—exactly eight weeks after it was bitten—of hydrophobia—accompanied by all the terrible symptoms of this appalling malady. The same dog after biting the child, attacked a boy—the animal shortly after became mad, and beat his own brains out against the barn wall of his owner.

A letter from Montego Bay, Jamaica, dated Aug. 25 says, the rains have been seasonable, and the crops promise well especially sugar. There are some apprehensions about the blacks.

The Bank of the United States has loaned to the City of Cincinnati one hundred thousand dollars, at 5 per centum—the stock redeemable at the expiration of forty years.

The Secretary of State has given notice to the holders of the 4 1/2 per cent. Stock, of \$5,000,000 created in pursuance of an Act of Congress, passed on the 26th day of May, 1825, that it will be paid off on the 1st day of January next. Also that the 5 per cent. stock created by law on the 15th of May, 1820, amounting to \$999,900, and thirteen cents, will be paid on the 2d day of January next, to the proprietors thereof.

TRIBUTE OF RESPECT TO THE PRESIDENT.

On Saturday the first of October, the Mail Contractors at the Seat of Government, assembled at Brown's Hotel, on Pennsylvania Avenue, for the purpose of making arrangements for paying their respects to the President of the United States—Col. JOHN H. AVERY, was called to the Chair, and ASHER MINER, appointed Secretary.

After an interchange of sentiment, the following gentlemen were appointed a committee to wait on the President, announce the intentions of the meeting, and ascertain whether it would be agreeable to receive their visit. Committee Gen. Geo. House, of Ohio. Mr. Edward P. Johnson, of Kentucky, Mr. Miner, of Pennsylvania. Col. Dood, of New Jersey. Mr. Stokes, of Maryland. Mr. Porter, of Delaware, and Mr. Woodworth, of Michigan.

The committee having performed the duty assigned them, reported to the meeting the annexed answer of the President.

"WASHINGTON CITY, Oct. 1st, 1831. Gentlemen—It will afford me pleasure to see the Mail Contractors on Monday, the 3d instant, at 12 o'clock. I have the honor to be, Sir, your obedient servant. "ANDREW JACKSON."

Messrs. Gen. Geo. House, Ed. P. Johnson, A. Miner, Col. Dodd, Mr. Stokes, Alex. Porter, Mr. Woodworth, Committee. At 11 o'clock on Monday, a procession was formed on Pennsylvania Avenue, under the direction of the above named committee, who had, for that purpose, been appointed a committee of arrangement, and had invited strangers at the seat of Government to unite with them. They were assisted by Colonel Reese, of Pennsylvania, who was appointed Marshal of the day, and had called to his aid, Colonel Jno. H. Avery, of New York, and Major Childs, of Kentucky. At half past eleven, the procession moved, the committee in front, accompanied by the Assistant and Chief Clerks of the Postmaster General, and were met at the President's House by the Postmaster General, (whose feeble health did not permit him to walk,) and by the Hon. James Buchanan, recently appointed Minister to Russia.

The committee were introduced to the President by the Assistants of the Postmaster General, and every member of the company received a personal introduction, and had the pleasure of a cordial shake of the hand from the old General.

After this ceremony, the committee, through their Chairman, Mr. Miner, thus addressed the President: "Gen. Jackson—The Mail Contractors of the Middle District, (some of whom have grown grey in the service,) present their united and their individual respects to the President of the United States; and through their committee, they wish you health, happiness, and the confidence and support of a free people. To which the President feelingly replied:—"Gentlemen—I thank you—and hope I may continue to deserve it." After this, refreshments, of various kinds, were furnished—a free conversation ensued between the President and his guests, and many gentlemen seemed to appreciate the blessings of a republican government—under whose auspicious influence, the humblest citizen may approach and hold social intercourse with the Chief Magistrate.

The committee were agreeably aided by Colonel Reese and his efficient assistants, under whose direction the procession returned with great order to the Avenue in front of Brown's, and was dismissed at about half past one, P. M.

MAIL ROBBERY.

The mail between this city and Elizabeth town has been frequently robbed, and all attempts to ferret out the thief, until yesterday, proved fruitless. A man named Henry Jackson, who has been for several years employed by the contractor in carrying the mail to and from Jersey City, was yesterday morning arrested on suspicion of being the person who has committed these depredations. The arrest was made under the following circumstances. One of the Clerks in the Post Office saw him take a small package of letters from the mail bag and put it into his coat pocket. The Post Master was immediately made acquainted with the fact, when he sent for Mr. Hays, and had him arrested. He was forthwith conveyed to the Police office, but he would not make any disclosures. He was then taken to Judge Betts, and fully committed on the evidence of the Clerk. He has heretofore borne a good character, and suspected never before, and it is to be regretted that his name is so associated with the name of a thief. The amount of his depredations cannot be ascertained, but it is no doubt exceeds \$3000. One gentleman has \$3000 which was mailed about six weeks since at Elizabethtown. It is supposed that he had to comply, and hopes are entertained that he will make a full disclosure. N. J. Gazette.

COMMERCE.

We have received from our correspondent at Washington, the Report of the Secretary of the Treasury, relative to the commerce and navigation of the United States, during the year ending the 30th September, 1830. The imports during the year, amounted to \$70,876,920; of which \$66,033,739 were imported in American vessels, and 4,841,181 in foreign. The exports amounted to \$73,849,508; of which \$59,462,029 were of domestic, and \$14,387,479 of foreign articles; of the Domestic Articles, \$51,104,189 were exported in American vessels, and \$3,353,840 in foreign vessels, of the foreign articles, \$12,776,529 were exported in American vessels, and \$1,610,950 in foreign vessels; \$67,227 tons of American shipping entered, and 971,740 cleared from the ports of the United States; 131,900 tons of foreign shipping entered, and 133,436 tons cleared during the same period. The registered tonnage, as corrected at the Register's office, for the 31st December, 1829, is stated at 650,142; the enrolled and licensed tonnage at 508,838; and the fishing vessel shipping entered, and 133,436 tons cleared during the same period. There were employed in the whole fishery, 57,284. Total 1,260,797. Journal of Commerce.

ENDICOTT PEAR TREE.

The Salem Gazette mentions that the famous pear tree planted by Gov. Endicott in 1623, on his farm in Danvers, has borne three bushels of pears the present year. The speckled is Bon Christien. This tree has survived many generations of men, and is almost the only first settler remaining.

DEATH OF LIEUT. HAYNE.

We have heretofore stated that the Yellow Fever was prevailing on board the U. S. ship Vincennes. It will be seen from the following letter that Lieut. Hayne has fallen a victim to it.

Extract of a letter from Captain Edward R. Shubrick commanding the U. S. ship Vincennes, to his friend in Charleston, S. C. dated, NAVY YARD, PENNSACOLA, September 14. "I informed you in my letter of the 12th, of the illness of Lieut. Hayne. The fever that made its appearance on board the Vincennes, has gone through nearly all the officers and men. Lieut. H. after his return from the Cantonment with the crew, remained a few nights on board, and was taken extremely ill. He was immediately removed to the Quarters of the Hospital Surgeon; where, notwithstanding the known skill of Drs. Kearney, and Wheelan, and every attention that humanity, skill and affection could suggest, he expired this morning about four o'clock. This distressing event has thrown a gloom over both officers and crew of the Vincennes—that so young, so honourable, and so worthy a man should be taken from them. As a friend, I most sincerely sympathize with you in this most heart-rending bereavement, and as his Commander, I truly regret that by this dispensation of Divine Providence, the country is deprived of one of the most promising officers in the Navy. I was with him to his last moments." "He was interred at this place late this evening with the honours of war, and was attended to the grave by sincere mourners." Extract of a letter from Dr. Kearney, dated, Naval Hospital—Near Pensacola, Sept. 18, 1831. A service of more than twenty years has never imposed on me a more painful task than that of communicating the death of my friend Lieut. Hayne. You must have been aware before now, that direful scourge—the Yellow Fever having visited the devoted ship Vincennes. I have hardly mind enough to tell you of my affliction at the loss of poor Hayne. He was my bosom companion, and died in my arms.

Communicated. At a numerous meeting of the Free People of Colour of the city of Annapolis, and its vicinity, convened in the African Methodist Episcopal Church, on the evening of October 4th, 1831,—to take into consideration the propriety and expediency of adopting certain resolutions expressive of their views, wishes and desires. The object of the meeting having been explained by the Chairman, the following Preamble and Resolutions were adopted. Whereas certain rumors, accompanied with insinuations of an unfavourable character, have been in circulation through the country respecting the coloured population, calculated to destroy that confidence which the white population have reposed in them. Resolved therefore, That we deeply and sincerely regret that any circumstance should have transpired to create these suspicions.

Resolved, That we who reside in this city, and its vicinity, who now compose this meeting, cannot refrain from expressing our grateful acknowledgments in possessing the assurance that the confidence of their white friends are still reposed in them, and that no rumor has been able to fill their minds. Resolved, That as we are not licentious of the friends we have among the white population, and that many of them have laboured to ameliorate our condition, we pledge ourselves, that our future conduct and deportment shall continue to be such as will be calculated to increase and continue their confidence and good wishes.

Resolved, That should any thing occur contrary to our views of good order, peace and tranquillity, as intimated in the word of God, we will use every means, and all our influence, to put it down. Resolved, That we are grateful to Almighty God for the revelation of his will to man, and that revelation teaches us, that it is our highest wisdom to live soberly, righteously and gently, in this present world, that in the world to come we may be sharers of eternal life.
