CONFEDERACIÓN ARGENTINA 1855 - 1861

TREASURY NOTES 1860 - 61

Due to the increasing lack of cash, the Argentine Confederation, on October 1, 1860 enacted a law that prohibited the subscription of customs duties until the outstanding bonds had been redeemed. The government, on the other hand, was allowed to issue fixed-term treasury notes- three, six or twelve months - bearing monthly interest of 1% and redeemable at the rate of 17 pesos per ounce of gold. These were again banknotes of necessity like those of the Province of Buenos Aires of 1820/21.



However, significantly more care has been taken with these notes than with the previous ones. Thus, the paper shows in the watermark the value in letters for each denomination, and each of them has its own color. However, the names of the engraver and printer are unknown. The numbering is done by machine, in blue (1/2, 10, 20 and 50 s) or in black (1, 2, 5 and 100 s). On the blank reverse were noted the interest paid and the names of the cities where the vouchers had circulated.



He was director of the Banco

Hipotecario de la Nación Argentina and of the Banco de Londres y Río de la Plata. The notes are signed by the Minister of Finances N. de la Riestra (a) or Vicente del Castillo (b)

Vicente del Castillo (5.4.1807 – 3.7.1874) was the successor of Norberto de la Riestra as the8th and last Minister of Finance of the Argentine Confederation with headquarters in Paraná, province of Entre Ríos, under the presidency of Santiago Derqui (1860 – 1862).

All notes are hand dated.



On some of them, one can find at the top left a black stamp with a B to the right of a cartridge with horizontal lines. For the moment, it is not possible to say if it is possibly a mark applied during the refund.

The banknotes dated October 15, 1861 also have a blue oval stamp of about 25 x 21 mm, with the coat of arms in the center and, in emphasis, EMISION DEL 15 DE OCTUBRE / 1861. These notes were put into circulation after the defeat of Urquiza at the Battle of Pavón on September 17, 1861.



Most banknotes bearing this stamp do not have an indicated due date.

Refunded notes are cancelled with a blue oval rubber stamp, approximately 43 x 54mm, placed on the obverse or on the reverse :







TREASURY NOTES 1860 - 61

These notes printed by Lit. San Martín in Buenos Aires were issued for a brief period in 1866 during a financial crisis. They had an interest of ¾ % monthly. These are the first banknotes to mention República Argentina as issuer. However, faced with rejection by the population, they were quickly withdrawn. Moreover, they could only be used in customs offices for the payment of duties. It is therefore in no way paper money in the true sense of the word.
