The following is information for the Treasurer's Report for the July 27, 2023 Board Meeting:

GENERAL FUND

Revenue

The following is the breakdown of revenue for the period ended June 30, 2023 for the North Naples Service Delivery Area ("NN SDA"), the Big Corkscrew Service ("BC SDA") and North Collier Fire Control & Rescue District. Note that these financial statements reflect the Board approved cost allocation method; per that method, there is no allocation of revenue (except for grant funds) - it remains in the SDA in which it is earned/received.

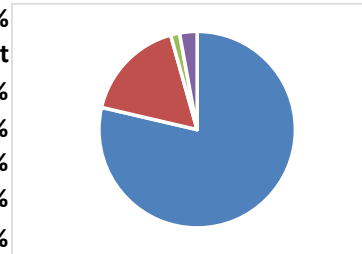
It should be noted that there are four general types of expenditures in terms of payment impact on the fiscal year:

1. Those that are paid monthly at fairly regular and predictable monthly intervals.
2. Those that are paid quarterly or annually so are not reflected in an appropriate percentage.
3. Those that are based on unpredictable need, such as building, equipment or vehicle repairs.
4. Items that were budgeted in the prior year, but were not received or invoiced until this year.

Based on these payment type exceptions, accrual or prepayment adjustments can be made to the actual expenditures, and an adjusted percent of budget determined.

When these adjustments are made, year-to-date expenditures as a percentage of budgeted expenditures, by category, are as follows:

As identified above, when adjustments are made to the actual expenses based on known prepaid and accrual adjustments, General Fund expenses are at 68.53% which is reasonable as we have completed 9 months of the 2022/2023 fiscal year (75%).

General Fund Comparison with Prior Year:

Included with the General Fund Financial Statement is a comparison to June 2022 of each service delivery area, noting the percentage of variance. In brief, total revenue in the NN SDA comparison reflects a variance of 14.48%. Expenses reflect a variance of 14.96%.

In the Big Corkscrew SDA, a variance in revenue of 29.27% is reflected due to higher interest rates. Expenses reflect a variance of 18.09%.

IMPACT FEE FUND - Comparison with Budget

As of June 30, 2023, impact fee interest revenue earned is \$204,628. NCFR has collected \$345,715 in impact fees YTD (considered deferred revenue) or 51% of the amended budget. Expenses total \$64,641 or 82% of budget for the year.

INSPECTION/PLAN REVIEW FEE FUND - Comparison with Budget

Revenue

As of June 30, 2023, total revenue received is \$1,297,136 or 62% of budgeted revenue which includes inspection fees, plan review fees and interest. Similar to the Impact Fee Fund, payments received are in arrears and are from the previous month.

Expenses

Expenses total \$1,392,947 or 62% of the total budget. Personnel costs are under budget for this time of year having completed 9 months of the 2022/2023 fiscal year (75%). This is due to turnover/retirements within the prevention bureau (applicable to the Inspection Fund).

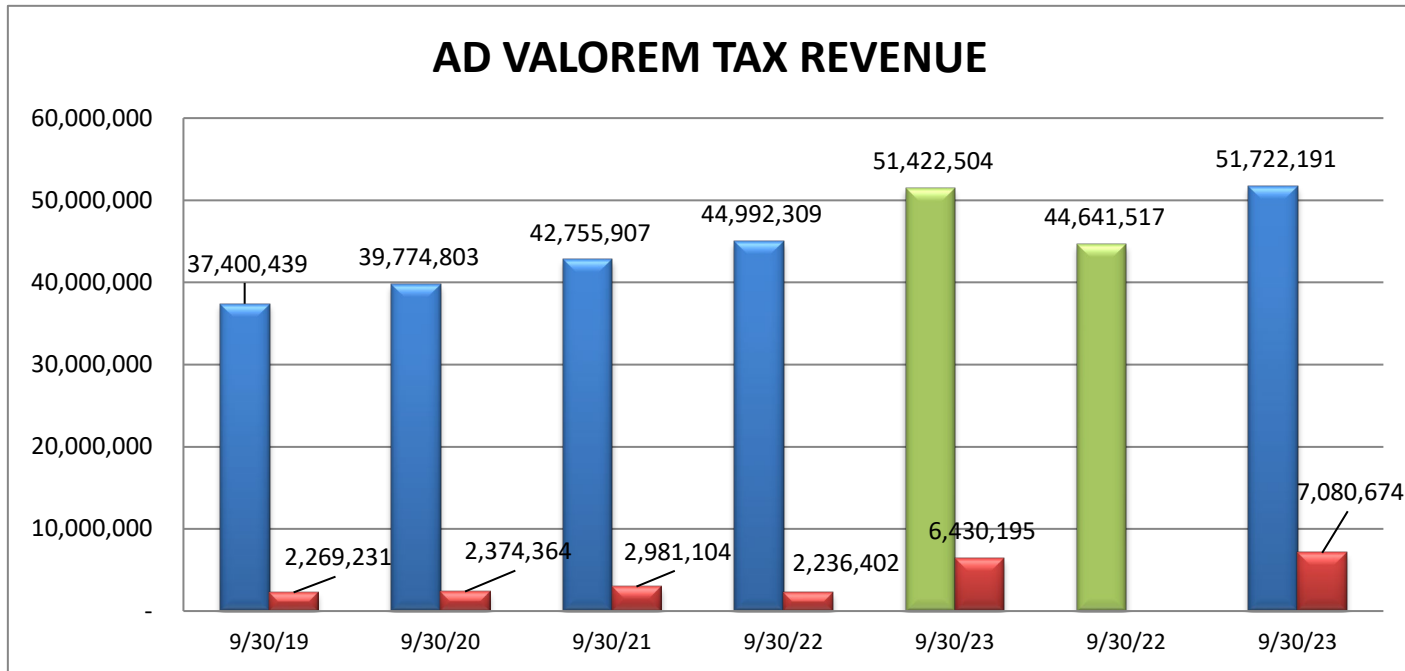

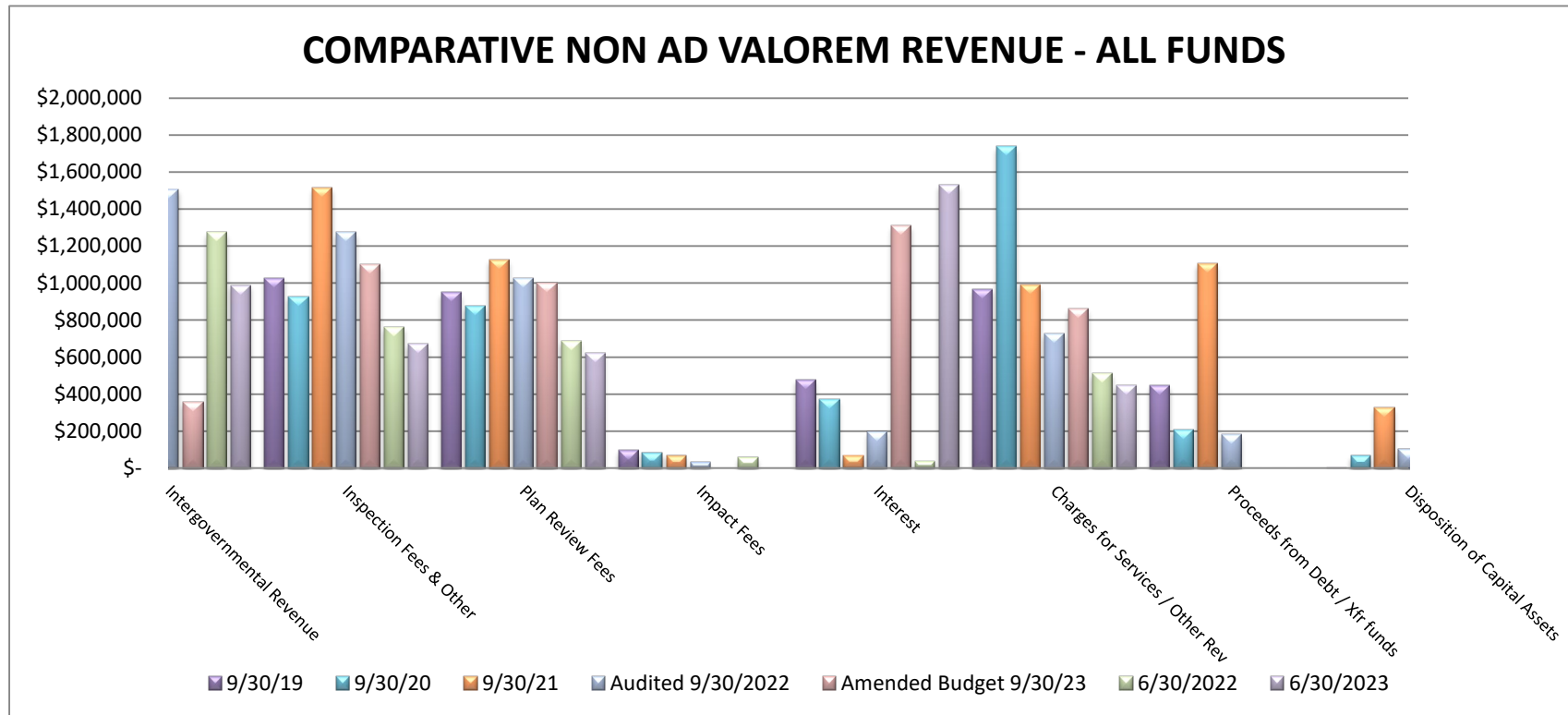

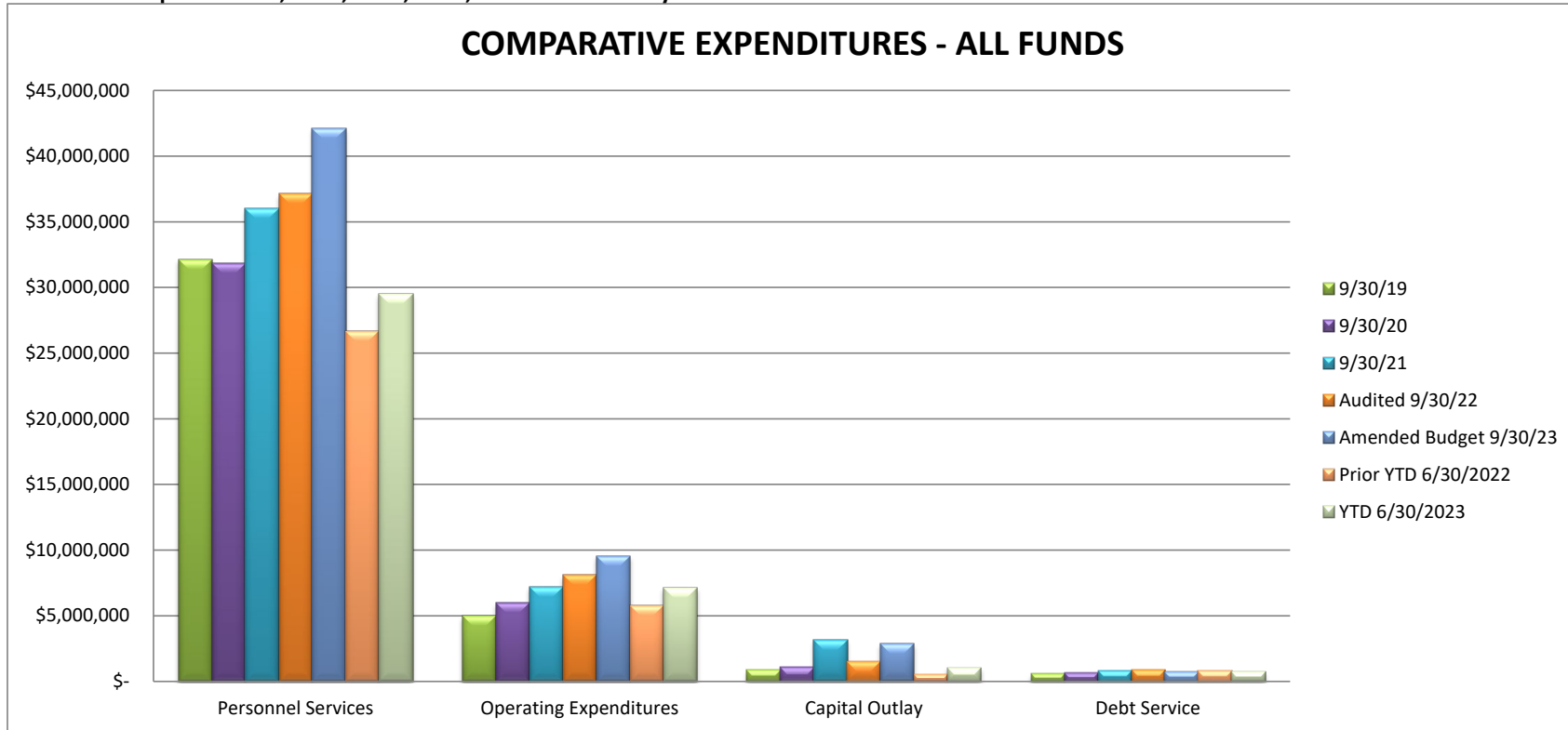

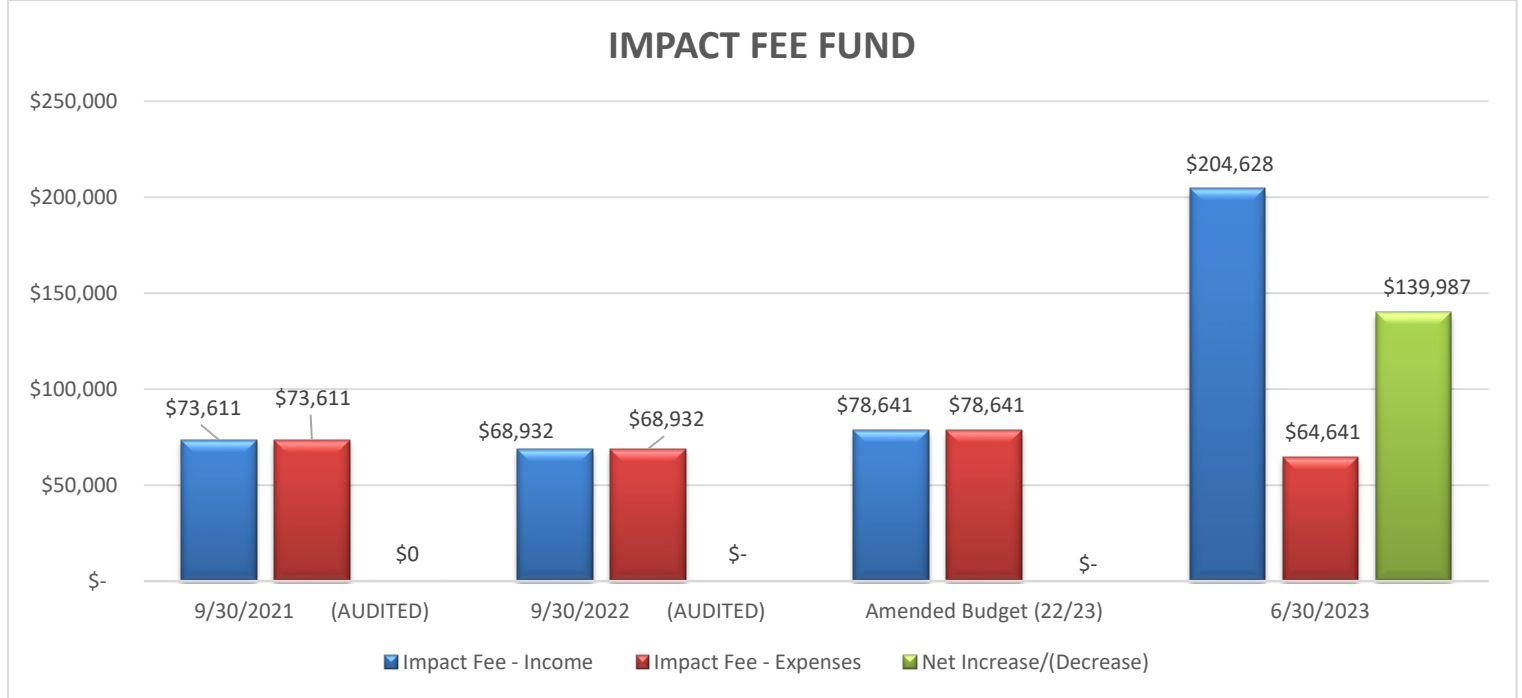

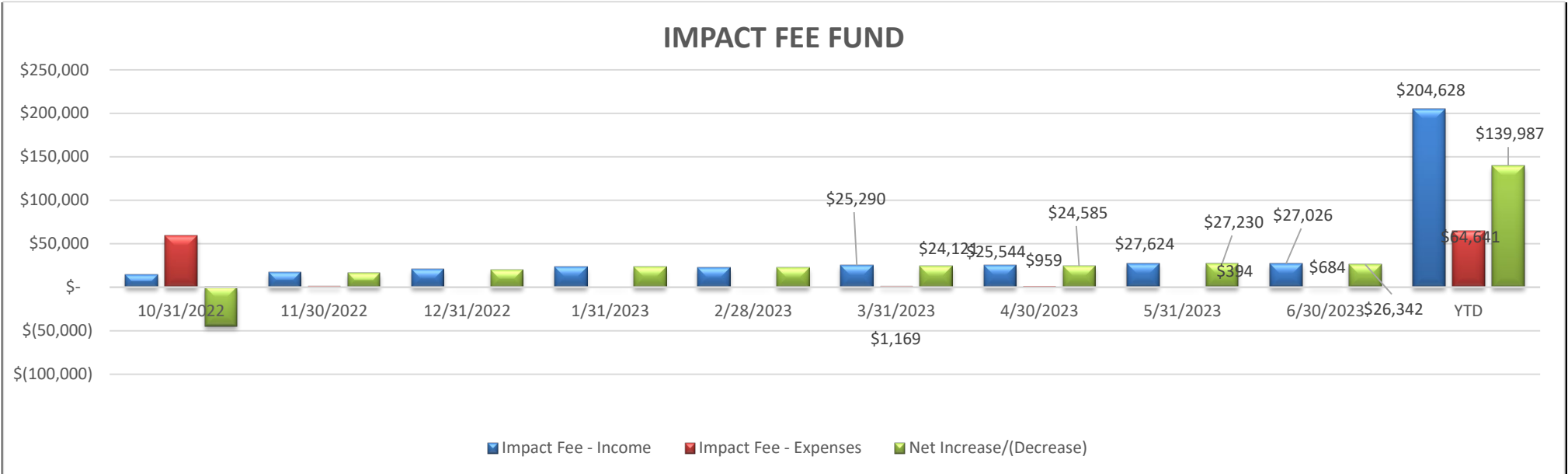

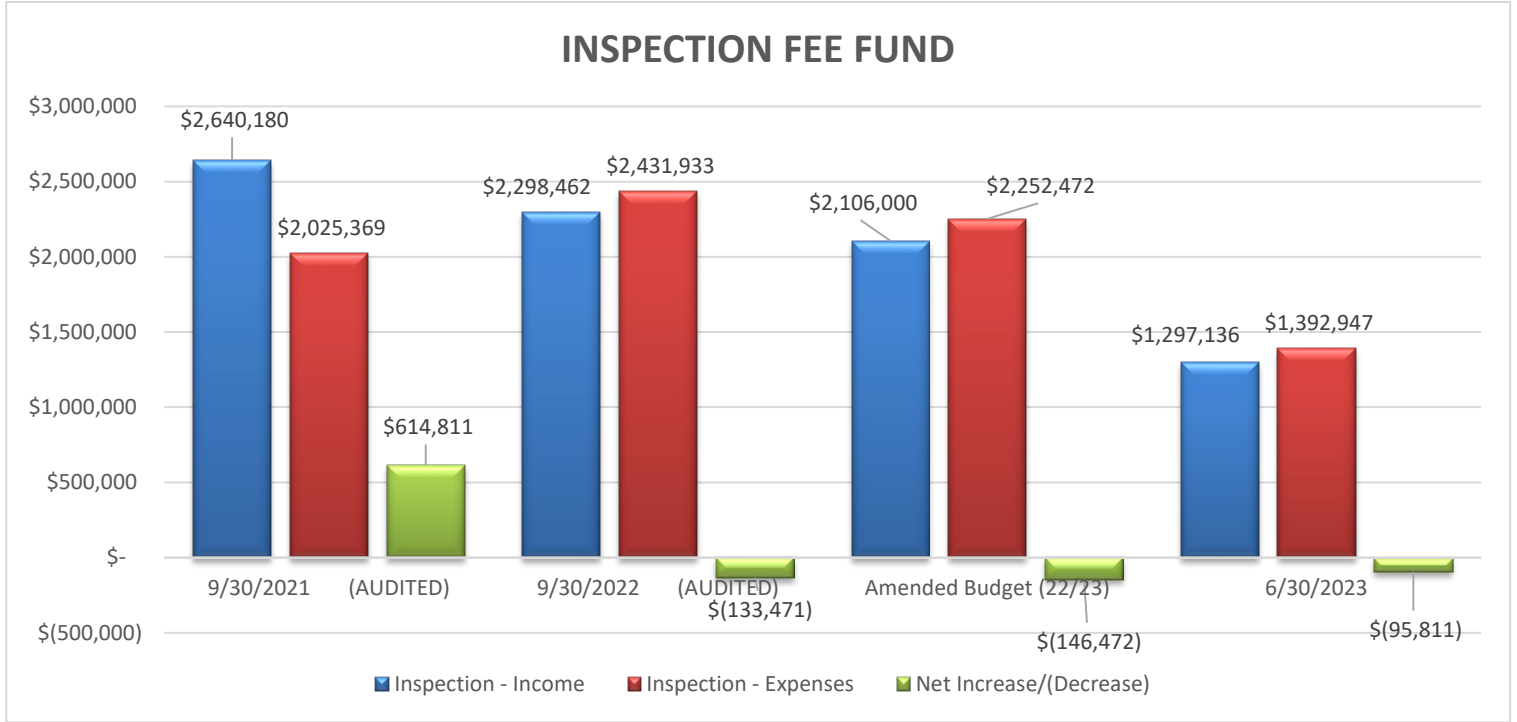

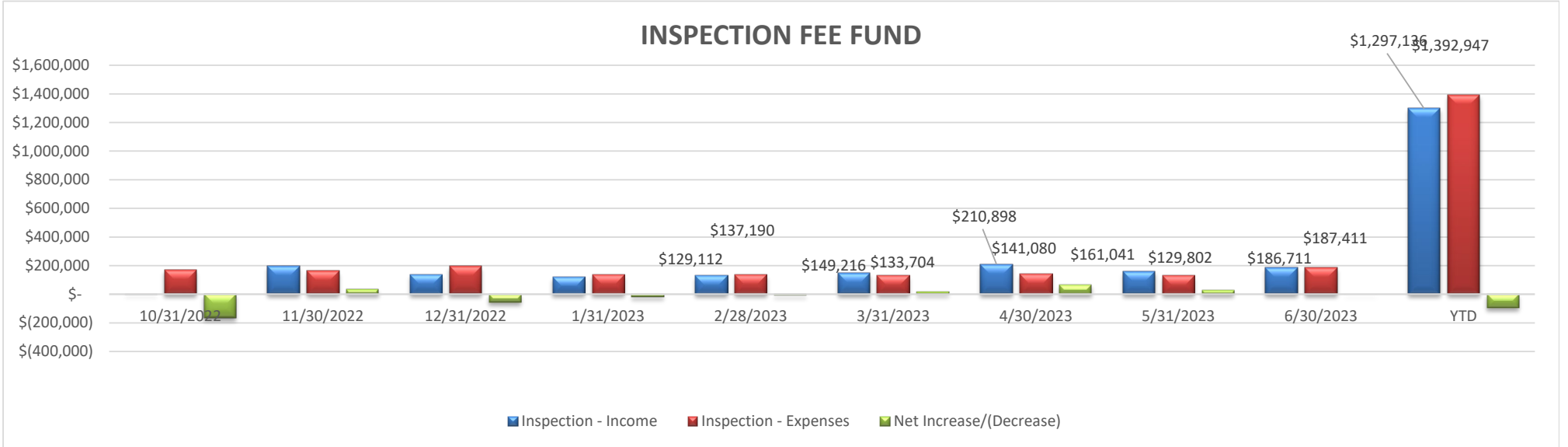

Subject: Request for Board Approval to Submit Form DR-420-MM-P Maximum Millage Levy Calculation Preliminary Disclosure for the Big Corkscrew Island Service Delivery Area and the North Naples Service Delivery Area as Required by the Florida Department of Revenue

Objective

Establish the maximum millage rate the Board can levy for the 2023-2024 fiscal year in the Big Corkscrew Island Service Delivery Area ("Big Corkscrew SDA") and the North Naples Service Delivery Area ("North Naples SDA") and comply with the statutory requirement to submit the DR 420 MM-P Form no later than August 4, 2023.

Background Information

At the June 2007 Special Legislative Session, property tax reform legislation (HB 1) was passed by the House and Senate, and signed into law on June 21, 2007 by Governor Crist.

Prior to the enactment of this legislation, the District received a Certification of Taxable Value from the Collier County Property Appraiser, Form DR-420. This form not only provided the District with the preliminary taxable value of the property within the District; it also provided for the submission of the District's "Current Year Proposed Aggregate Millage Rate". Staff always inserted the maximum millage rate allowable by the District's Enabling Act.

As a result of the 2007 property tax reform legislation, the Department of Revenue created a companion form to the DR-420 – Certification of Taxable Value issued by the Collier County Tax Appraiser to identify the maximum millage rate the Board will adopt for the coming fiscal year in each service delivery area. This companion form, DR- 420 MM-P - Maximum Millage Levy Calculation Preliminary Disclosure (Attachments 1 and 2), requires the submission of the proposed millage rate for each service delivery area based on the options identified in the legislation:

- Majority Vote of the Governing Body
This would be the millage rate necessary to generate the same Ad Valorem revenue as was generated in the 2022-2023 fiscal year (the rolled back rate), plus the allowance for the growth in per capital Florida personal income (as provided by the Florida Department of Revenue on line 12 of form DR-420 MM-P). In the North Naples SDA, this millage rate would be **1.0959 (line 13)**. Note that this millage rate exceeds the maximum millage rate which can be levied pursuant to the District's Enabling Act. In the Big Corkscrew SDA, this millage rate would be **3.8639 (line 13)**. Note that this millage rate exceeds the maximum millage rate which can be levied pursuant to the District's Enabling Act.

- Two-Thirds Vote of the Governing Body
This rate would consider the provisions of the majority vote identified above, plus the statutory allowance of an additional 10%, which would result in a millage rate of **1.2055 (line 14)** in the North Naples SDA and **4.2503 (line 14)** in the Big Corkscrew SDA. Again, in both service delivery areas, this rate exceeds the maximum millage rate which can be levied pursuant to the District's Enabling Act.
- Unanimous Vote of the Governing Body
This would allow an even greater rate than the maximum rate identified above, if provided for in the District's Enabling Act. In both service delivery areas, this rate exceeds the maximum millage rate which can be levied pursuant to the District's Enabling Act

Considerations

The District is required to submit this form no later than August 4, 2023, well before the Board will adopt tentative and final millage rates at the September hearings. In most prior years, both Big Corkscrew SDA and North Naples SDA have opted to identify their service delivery area's maximum millage rates of 1.00 and 3.75 mils, acknowledging that providing the maximum millage rate (and indicating the voting method to adopt such rate) does not obligate the Board to actually adopt the stated rate; it only identifies the MAXIMUM rate which can be adopted. The Board cannot adopt any rate higher than the rate provided on this form. Submitting this form with any other rate would prohibit the Board from adopting the maximum rate provided for in the District's Enabling Act (1.00 mil in North Naples SDA and 3.75 mils in Big Corkscrew SDA). Identifying a lower rate than the maximum would limit the Board's flexibility as it moves through the budgeting process.

It is important to note **the Board is NOT adopting a millage rate at this time**. That will not be done until the final Budget Hearing in September.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Board identify as the maximum millage rate for each service delivery area the maximum rates identified in the District's enabling legislation – 1.00 for North Naples SDA and 3.75 for Big Corkscrew SDA to avoid limiting the Board's ability to budget with consideration for reserves.

Subject: Request for Board Approval to Renew Health Insurance Coverage for the period October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024

Objective

To obtain Board approval to renew the District's health insurance coverage for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024.

Background Information

At the July 28, 2022 Board of Fire Commissioners Meeting, the Board voted to retain the plan as identified in the Collective Bargaining Agreement (Florida Options Plan 5192/5193) and coverage provided by Florida Blue for health insurance for the period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023.

M.E. Wilson (Employee Benefits Plan Advisory Service provider) requested renewal proposals for the District's health, dental, life, short term disability and long-term disability insurance coverages for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024. Health insurance proposals were received from the current carrier, Florida Blue based on guidance from the District's Insurance Committee. The Committee met with M.E. Wilson representatives and discussed renewal options with the current carrier. The following information was reviewed and the committee recommendation is below.

Considerations

Pursuant to the terms of Article 34 – Insurance of the Collective Bargaining Agreement, the District has agreed to fully fund the cost of health insurance for employees and dependents. The health savings account contributions rates (for employees) will be the IRS-maximum rate for single (\$3,850 for 2023) and \$5,000 for dependent/family. The District does retain the right to change insurance carriers, as long as the scope of benefits is consistent with the current plan.

It is important to note that there are three primary components of the cost of a partially self-funded plan:

1. Fixed costs – the costs of the third party administrator (“TPA”) to process claims and provide administrative services and the cost premiums for the stop loss insurance (to pay the cost of claims over the District's maximum liability. The negotiated renewal includes the provision to maintain the individual stop loss coverage at \$150,000.
2. Claims cost – identified as “expected” and “maximum” (we use expected for budgetary purposes).
3. Run In/Out Exposure – this is the cost of claims if the District moves from a partially self-funded platform to a fully funded platform in the following fiscal year or changes carriers.

The negotiated renewal from Florida Blue reflects fixed cost – Specific Stop Loss Premiums increasing by 12% and overall max cost increases of 8%. This also includes maintaining the individual stop loss coverage at \$150,000 (see below).

Note that Florida Blue also offers a pharmacy rebate program which will yield refunds to the District. The estimated Rx Rebate for FY 23/24 will be \$214,000 using the Florida Blue plan.

Fiscal Impact

The fiscal impact of the Florida Blue renewal is a 12% increase in fixed costs. However, the actuarial analysis of anticipated claims indicates an overall increase of 11% or \$486,000. As noted, the actual dollar amount of that is contingent upon actual claims paid.

Recommendation

The Insurance Committee recommends the Board accept the renewal proposal from Florida Blue for health insurance coverage for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024 (Plans 5192 and 5193), maintaining the individual stop loss amount at \$150,000.

Objective

To obtain Board approval to renew the District's dental insurance coverage for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024

Background Information

At the July 28, 2022 Board of Fire Commissioners' Meeting, the Board voted unanimously to approve renewal of a self-funded dental insurance plan for the District by Guardian for the period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023.

Considerations

The District's benefit administrator, M.E. Wilson, recommends renewal and continues to recommend the District stay with a self-funded dental insurance plan as this plan structure continues to provide savings to the District as opposed to a fully insured plan.

Fiscal Impact

As with all employee benefit lines of coverage, actual cost is dependent upon the number of employees, which will be determined in the budgeting process. However, based on the current number of employees, there will be no increase in annual premiums as compared to the current year. The annual premium remains the same at \$283,386.

Recommendation

Pursuant to District Policy 212-Procurement, the District is required to place insurance coverage out for bid every three years, or at the direction of the Board. Staff recommends the Board does not place dental insurance coverage out for bid and accept the proposal from Guardian for dental coverage using the self-funded platform for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024 for the annual premium of \$283,836.

Subject: Request for Board Approval to Renew Firefighter Cancer Insurance Benefits for the period October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024 from United Badges

Objective

To secure firefighter cancer insurance for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024 upon expiration of current policy on September 30, 2023.

Background Information

At the August 27, 2020 Board of Commissioners Meeting, the District unanimously approved an insurance policy via United Badges to cover the potential exposure to the District applicable to the cancer provisions of F.S. 112.1816. The plan, administered by Provident Insurance Services and underwritten by Axis Insurance Company, covered the statutory and additional benefits. The District’s plan also includes a piggyback provision for which neighboring Fire Districts, Bayshore Fire and Immokalee Fire, will also be able to benefit. Each District paid for benefits through North Collier’s Policy.

Considerations

The District is required to provide these benefits as noted by Florida State Statute 112.1816, regardless of insurance coverage. However, the District still deems coverage beneficial due to unknown exposure. The current policy covers current/active firefighters and retirees that are still on the District’s insurance plan.

North Collier Fire has subsequently added two additional benefits to the plan as follows:

- 1) Coverage to civilian (non-firefighter) personnel as available per the policy; and
- 2) Extended coverage beyond the statutory twenty-one (21) cancers per F.S. 112.1816, also available under the insurance policy.

These provisions have been adopted by the Fire Districts that piggy-back on North Collier’s policy (as they have to be identical).

Pursuant to District Policy 212-Procurement, the District is required to place insurance coverage out for bid every three years, or at the direction of the Board. Management is proposing to remain with United Badges to provide cancer insurance coverage, while allowing Bayshore Fire and Immokalee Fire to remain on the policy utilizing the “piggyback” provision.

Fiscal Impact

The proposal includes no changes to the cost per covered individual. This is the 3rd year in a row with no rate changes. Including the policy benefit changes, the District’s annual premium is still estimated to be less than **\$53,000**.



Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Board accepts the renewal proposal from United Badges for firefighter cancer insurance benefits coverage for the period of October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024 and allow Bayshore Fire and Immokalee Fire to piggy-back as allowable.



DEFINITIONS

Company means AXIS Insurance Company.

Coverage Effective Date means the date shown on the *Policy Schedule*.

Diagnosed/Diagnosis – means a definitive and unequivocal diagnosis identifiable by a code under the most current ICD code structure made by a Physician who specializes in the condition for which benefits are being claimed:

1. based upon the use of clinical and/or laboratory investigations as supported by the Insured Person's medical records; and
2. meeting any Diagnostic Requirements set forth in this Policy for Line of Duty Cancer. The disease or infirmity shall be presumed to have been caused by or to have resulted from the work performed. This presumption shall be rebuttable by evidence meeting judicial standards.

Employer means a state board, commission, department, division, bureau or agency, or a county, municipality, or other political subdivision of the state.

Firefighter means an individual employed as a full-time firefighter within the fire department or public safety department of an Employer whose primary responsibilities are the prevention and extinguishing of fires; the protection of life and property; and the enforcement of municipal, county, and state fire prevention codes and laws pertaining to the prevention and control of fires.

Immediate Family Member means a person who is related to the Insured Person in any of the following ways: Spouse, domestic partner, parent (includes stepparent), brother or sister (includes stepbrother or stepsister), child (includes legally adopted or stepchild), grandparent, grandchild, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, daughter-in-law, son-in-law, mother-in-law, or father-in-law.

Insured Person means a person in an Eligible Class, as defined on the *Policy Schedule*, for whom required premium has been paid when due and for whom coverage under this Policy remains in force.

Line of Duty Cancer means:

1. Bladder cancer.
2. Brain cancer.
3. Breast cancer.
4. Cervical cancer.
5. Colon cancer.
6. Esophageal cancer.
7. Invasive skin cancer.
8. Kidney cancer.
9. Large intestinal cancer.
10. Lung cancer.
11. Malignant melanoma.
12. Mesothelioma.
13. Multiple myeloma.
14. Non-Hodgkin's lymphoma.
15. Oral cavity and pharynx cancer.
16. Ovarian cancer.
17. Prostate cancer.
18. Rectal cancer.
19. Stomach cancer.
20. Testicular cancer.
21. Thyroid cancer.

Medically Necessary means medical services that:

1. are essential for Diagnosis, treatment or care of the Line of Duty Cancer for which it is prescribed or performed;
2. meets generally accepted standards of medical practice; and
3. are ordered by a Physician and performed under his or her care, supervision or order.

Named Insured means any organization listed on the *Policy Schedule*.

Physician means a licensed health care provider practicing within the scope of his or her license and rendering care and treatment to the Insured Person that is appropriate for the condition and locality, and who is not:

1. the Insured Person;
2. an Immediate Family Member of either the Insured Person or the Insured Person's Spouse;
3. a person living in the Insured Person's household;
4. a person employed or retained by the Employer; or
5. a person providing homeopathic, aroma-therapeutic, or herbal therapeutic services.

Policy Effective Date means the date the Policy takes effect for the Policyholder.

Policy Term means the time period defined for the Policyholder shown on the *Policy Schedule*.

Policyholder means the Employer named on the *Policy Schedule*. This includes additional organizations identified by endorsement attached to the Policy.

Spouse means the Insured Person's lawful Spouse. The term Spouse will include domestic partner.

BENEFITS

LINE OF DUTY CANCER INITIAL DIAGNOSIS BENEFIT

If, while coverage under this Policy is in force, an Insured Person is Diagnosed with Line of Duty Cancer, by a Physician in the medical specialty appropriate for the type of cancer Diagnosed, the Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits* subject to the Lifetime Maximum Benefit, Diagnostic Requirements and Benefit Payment Conditions.

Once a Line of Duty Cancer has been so Diagnosed and an Initial Diagnosis Benefit has become payable to an Insured Person, no benefits are payable to that Insured Person with respect to a subsequently Diagnosed recurrence of the same Line of Duty Cancer or a subsequently Diagnosed separate Line of Duty Cancer.

Diagnostic Requirements

The Company reserves the right to have any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis reviewed by a Physician of its choosing. In the event of any dispute or disagreement regarding the appropriateness or correctness of the Diagnosis, the Company shall have the right to request an examination of either the Insured Person or the evidence used in arriving at such Diagnosis by an independently acknowledged expert selected by the Company in the applicable field of medicine.

The Line of Duty Cancer must be positively Diagnosed by a Physician certified to practice pathological anatomy or osteopathic pathology, upon the basis of a microscopic examination of fixed tissues, or preparations from the hemic system. Such Diagnosis shall be based solely on the accepted criteria of malignancy after a study of the histocytologic architecture or pattern of the suspected tumor, tissue and/or specimen. Clinical Diagnosis alone does not meet this standard.

The opinion of such expert as to such Diagnosis shall be binding on both the Insured Person and the Company.

Benefit Payment Conditions

Payment of benefits upon the Diagnosis of Line of Duty Cancer is subject to:

1. the Diagnosis is made while the Insured Person's coverage is in force under the Policy;
2. the Insured Person has been employed as a Firefighter with the Employer for at least five (5) continuous years;
3. the Insured Person has not used tobacco products for at least five (5) years preceding Diagnosis; and
4. the Insured Person has not been employed in any other position in the five (5) years preceding Diagnosis which is proven to create a higher risk for any cancer.

No benefits will be payable for:

1. any disease, sickness or incapacity other than Line of Duty Cancer as defined; this is so even though such disease, sickness or incapacity may have been complicated, affected (directly or indirectly) or caused by Line of Duty Cancer;
2. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Policy Effective date;
3. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Insured Person's Coverage Effective Date;
4. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Policy terminates;
5. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Insured Person's coverage terminates.

Termination of Employment

If an Insured Person terminates employment with the Employer, the Line of Duty Cancer Initial Diagnosis Benefit is payable upon Diagnosis of Line of Duty Cancer for 10 years following the date on which the Firefighter terminates his or her employment. The Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits* subject to the Lifetime Maximum Benefit, Diagnostic Requirements and Benefit Payment Conditions.

Benefit Payment Conditions

After termination of employment, payment of benefits upon the Diagnosis of Line of Duty Cancer is subject to:

1. the Diagnosis is made while the Insured Person's coverage is in force under the Policy;
2. after termination of employment, the Insured Person continued coverage in the Employer-sponsored health plan or Employer-sponsored group health insurance trust fund;
3. after termination of employment, the Insured Person was not subsequently employed as a Firefighter;
4. prior to termination of employment, the Insured Person was employed as a Firefighter with the Employer for at least five (5) continuous years;

5. the Insured Person has not used tobacco products for at least five (5) years preceding Diagnosis; and
6. the Insured Person has not been employed in any other position in the five (5) years preceding Diagnosis which is proven to create a higher risk for any cancer.

No benefits will be payable for:

1. any disease, sickness or incapacity other than Line of Duty Cancer as defined; this is so even though such disease, sickness or incapacity may have been complicated, affected (directly or indirectly) or caused by Line of Duty Cancer;
2. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Policy Effective date;
3. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Insured Person's Coverage Effective Date;
4. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Policy terminates;
5. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Insured Person's coverage terminates.

An Insured Person is not eligible for benefits under this policy if the Insured Person is already paid workers' compensation benefits under chapter 440.

LINE OF DUTY CANCER DEATH BENEFIT - CLASS 1 ONLY

If, while coverage under this Policy is in force, an Insured Person dies as a result of Line of Duty Cancer or from circumstances that arise out of the treatment of Line of Duty Cancer, the Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits*, subject to the Benefit Payment Conditions.

Benefit Payment Conditions

Payment of Line of Duty Cancer Death Benefit is subject to the following:

1. the death must occur while the Insured Person's coverage is in force under the Policy; and
2. acceptable proof must be provided to the Company, or its authorized claims payor, that such death was a result of Line of Duty Cancer or circumstances that arise out of the treatment of the Line of Duty Cancer.

No benefits will be payable for:

1. any death that occurs due to any disease, sickness or incapacity other than Line of Duty Cancer as defined herein; even though such disease, sickness or incapacity may have been complicated, affected (directly or indirectly) or caused by Line of Duty Cancer;
2. any Line of Duty Cancer death that occurs prior to the Policy Effective Date;
3. any Line of Duty Cancer death that occurs prior to the Insured Person's Coverage Effective Date;
4. any Line of Duty Cancer death occurring after the Policy terminates; or
5. any Line of Duty Cancer death occurring after the Insured Person's coverage terminates.

CLAIMS PROVISIONS

CLAIM FORMS

Our administrator will send claim forms to the claimant upon receipt of a written notice of claim. If such forms are not sent within 15 days after the Company received notice of claim, the claimant will be deemed to have met the proof of loss requirements upon submitting, within the time fixed in the Policy for filing proof of loss, written proof covering the occurrence, the character and the extent of the loss for which the claim is made. The notice should include the Insured Person's name, the Policyholder name and the Policy number. Any forms that may be required to be provided under this subsection may be provided in electronic or paper form.

NOTICE OF CLAIM

Written notice of claim must be given to Our administrator within 20 days after the Diagnosis of the Insured Person's covered Line of Duty Cancer or as soon thereafter as reasonably possible but in no event more than a year (12 months) after first knowledge of the Line of Duty Cancer. Notice given by or on behalf of the claimant to the Company or to its designated authorized agent, with information sufficient to identify the Insured Person, is deemed notice to the Company. Any notices that may be required to be provided under this subsection may be provided in electronic or paper form.

PROOF OF LOSS

Written proof of loss must be sent to Us or Our authorized representative. Written proof must be given within 120 days after the date of loss. Failure to furnish such proof within such time will not invalidate or reduce any claim if it can be shown not to have been reasonably possible to furnish such proof within such time, provided proof was furnished as soon as reasonably possible. If We require additional information in order to make a claim determination, We shall provide written notice to the claimant. The additional information must be provided within 45 days from the date of the request.

The Insured Person is responsible for providing all necessary information to substantiate the validity of their claim. Any forms that may be required to be provided under this subsection may be provided in electronic or paper form.

TIME OF PAYMENT OF CLAIMS

All benefits will be paid in United States currency. After We received written proof of loss of time due to disability, disability benefits payable under the Policy for loss of time will be paid monthly during the continuance of the period for which the Company is liable. Benefits for any other loss covered by this Policy will be paid as soon as We receive proper proof of loss. We will reimburse all claims or any portion of any claim from the Insured Person or the Insured Person's assignee within 45 days after receipt of the claim. If We contest a claim or any portion of a claim, We will notify the Insured Person or the Insured Person's assignee in writing which identifies the contested portion of the claim and the reasons for contesting it. This notice will be sent within 45 days after receipt of the claim. Upon Our receipt of additional information requested from the Insured Person or the Insured Person's assignees, We will pay or deny the contested claim or portion of the contest claim within 60 days. All claims will be paid or denied no later than 120 days after Our receipt of the claim. Payment will be treated as being made on the date a draft or other valid instrument which is equivalent to payment was placed in the US mail in a properly addressed, postpaid envelope or, if not posted, on the date of delivery. Any overdue payments will include interest at the rate of 10% per year. Upon written notification by an Insured Person, We will investigate any claim of improper billing by a physician, hospital, or other health care provider. We will determine if the Insured Person was properly billed for only those procedures and services that were actually received. If We determine that the Insured Person has been improperly billed, We will notify the Insured Person and the provider of Our findings and reduce the amount of payment to the provider by the amount determined to be improperly billed. If a reduction is made due to such notification by the Insured Person, We will pay to the Insured Person 20% of the amount of the reduction up to \$500.

PAYMENT OF CLAIMS

In consideration of the Policyholder's payment of the entire premium, the Policyholder shall be the Insured Person's assignee under the Policy.

PAYMENT OF LOSS OF LIFE CLAIMS

Upon receipt of due written proof of Line of Duty Cancer Death, benefits for a loss of life claim will be paid to the beneficiary named by an Insured Person when he or she or she became covered under this Policy. An Insured Person has the right to change his or her beneficiary at any time by completing a form, approved by us, and submitting it to the Policyholder. The new beneficiary designation will be effective as of the date an Insured Person

signed the required form. However, if We have taken any action or made any claim payment before the Policyholder receives an Insured Person's request to change his or her beneficiary, that change will not go into effect.

If an Insured Person does not name a beneficiary or names more than one beneficiary but does not designate their order or share of payments, the beneficiaries will share equally. The share of a beneficiary who dies before an Insured Person, or the share of a beneficiary who is disqualified will pass to any surviving beneficiaries in the order designated by an Insured Person.

If an Insured Person does not name a beneficiary, or if a named beneficiary is disqualified, or if all named beneficiaries die before an Insured Person, We have the option of paying death benefits to an Insured Person's estate or surviving family members in the order listed below:

1. Spouse, domestic partner, partner in a civil union;
2. child or children, equally if living, otherwise to their descendants per stirpes;
3. mother or father, equally or to the survivor; or
4. sisters or brothers, equally or to the survivor or survivors.

COOPERATION OF THE INSURED PERSON

Coverage under this Policy may terminate for any Insured Person who fails to cooperate with the Company in the administration of the claim. Such cooperation includes, but is not limited to, providing any information or documents needed to determine whether benefits are payable or the actual benefit amount due.

RIGHT TO OFFSET

If We determine that an overpayment of any benefit payable under this Policy has been made to an Insured Person due to fraud or any error We make in processing a claim, We reserve the right to:

1. offset said overpayment against any amounts otherwise payable to an Insured Person;
2. request reimbursement from an Insured Person for any overpayment made; or
3. bring legal action against an Insured Person to recover any overpayment.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

We, at Our expense, have the right to have an Insured Person examined as often as is reasonable while a claim is pending. We may also request to have an Insured Person examined, at Our expense, as proof of continued loss. We reserve the right to select the examiner.

LEGAL ACTIONS

No action at law or in equity shall be brought to recover on this Policy prior to the expiration of sixty (60) days after the required proof of loss is furnished in accordance with the terms of this Policy. No action shall be brought at all unless brought within the applicable statute of limitations from the time within which proof of loss is required to be given.

ARBITRATION

Any controversy or claim, or any breach of contract, arising out of or relating to this Policy shall, upon express written agreement by both parties to this Policy, be settled by arbitration administered by the American Arbitration Association in accordance with its Commercial Arbitration Rules, and judgment on the award rendered by the arbitrator(s) may be entered in any court having jurisdiction. The arbitration will occur at the offices of the American Arbitration Association nearest to the Insured Person or person claiming to be the beneficiary. The arbitrators(s) will not award consequential or punitive damages in any arbitration under this section. This provision does not apply if the Insured Person or the person claiming to be the beneficiary is a resident of a state where the law does not allow binding arbitration in an insurance policy, but only if this Policy is subject to its laws. In such a case, binding arbitration does not apply. This provision bars the institution of any individual or class action lawsuit brought by the Insured Person, his or her legal representatives, or beneficiary.

PREMIUMS AND RENEWALS PROVISIONS

POLICY TERM AND RENEWAL

The first term of this Policy starts on the Effective Date shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits* and ends on the Expiration Date, also shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits*. The Policy will remain in effect for the duration of the Policy Term if the premium is paid according to the agreed upon terms. Later terms will be the periods for which the Policyholder pays renewal premiums agreed upon when due. All terms will begin and end at 12:01 A.M., Standard Time, at the location of the Policyholder.

The Company may terminate this Policy on any anniversary of the first Renewal Date by giving the other party written notice at least sixty (60) days prior to that date. The Company is not required to provide such notice if cancellation is due to nonpayment of premiums. The Policyholder may terminate this Policy on any anniversary of the first Renewal Date by giving the other party written notice at least sixty (60) days prior to that date. In these events, this Policy will terminate on the specified anniversary date at 12:01 A.M., Standard Time. Any premium rate guarantee will not affect the Company's or the Policyholder's right to terminate this Policy. Termination or nonrenewal will be without prejudice to the rights of any Insured Person with respect to any benefits payable under this Policy that began while this Policy was in force.

PREMIUMS

Premiums are paid at the Company's Home Office or to the Company's authorized agent. Any premium remitted by the Policyholder to its agent or broker will not be considered paid until it is received by us at Our office. If any premium is not paid when due, this Policy will be cancelled at the end of the last period for which premium was paid, except as provided in the Grace Period provision.

The first premium is due on the Effective Date shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits*. The renewal premium for each term will be due on the day the preceding term ends, subject to the Grace Period, unless the Policyholder and the Company agree to another mode of premium payment.

We may change the premium rate on any Renewal Date of this Policy or whenever the terms or conditions of the Policy are changed.

PREMIUM RATE CHANGES

After the initial twelve months of coverage the Company may change premium rates at the end of any Policy Term with at least sixty (60) days prior advance written notice mailed to the last known address of the Policyholder. The Company will not increase premium rates during the initial twelve (12) months of coverage and, following the initial twelve (12) month period, not more than once in any six (6) month period, unless one of the events described below occurs.

The Company may change the premium rate during a Policy Term if any one of the following occurs:

1. the terms of this Policy change;
2. coverage is reinstated following failure to pay premium during the Grace Period;
3. a change in Insured Persons or Eligible Person's to be covered which would, on a manual rate basis, require a change of 25% or more in the premium rate;
4. a change in any federal or state law or regulation is enacted, adopted or amended to the extent it affects the Company's benefit obligations under this Policy; or
5. the Policyholder fails to provide sufficient information, as required by the Company, to confirm adequacy of premiums and rates currently being paid.

Any increase or decrease in rate will take effect on the date of the applicable change specified above. A pro rata adjustment will apply from the date of the change to the end of any period for which premium has been paid.

GRACE PERIOD

A grace period of thirty-one (31) days will be provided for the payment of any premium due after the first. During the grace period, the Policy shall continue in force, unless the Policyholder has given written notice of discontinuance in advance of the premium due date and in accordance with the Policy Term and Renewal provision.

Any renewal premium due must be paid, to Us, within the grace period following the renewal premium due date. If renewal premium is not paid within the thirty-one (31) day grace period, this Policy will automatically terminate at

the end of the grace period. The Policyholder will be liable for the payment of a pro rata premium for the time the Policy was in force during the grace period.

PREMIUM AUDIT

The Company will have the right to audit books and records of the Policyholder at its place of business and during its regularly-scheduled business hours, in order to determine the accuracy of premiums paid.

REINSTATEMENT

This Policy may be reinstated if it lapsed for nonpayment of premium. Requirements for reinstatement are a written application of the Policyholder satisfactory to the Company and payment of all overdue premiums. Any premium accepted in connection with a reinstatement will be applied to a period for which premium was not previously paid. No premiums will be applied to any period more than 60 days before the reinstatement date.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

ENTIRE CONTRACT

This Policy, including the application (if any) and any attached amendments, endorsements, riders and/or attached papers represents the entire contract between the Policyholder and the Company. All statements made by the officers or trustees of the Policyholder shall, in the absence of fraud, be deemed representations and not warranties. No statement made by an Insured Person will be used in any contest under this Policy unless a copy of the statement is furnished to the Insured Person, or in the event of death or incapacity of the Insured Person, to the Insured Person's beneficiary or personal representative. No change in this Policy will be effective until approved by one of Our officers. This approval must be in writing and endorsed on or attached to this Policy. No agent can change this Policy or waive any of its provisions.

CONFORMITY WITH STATE STATUTES

Any provision of this Policy which is in conflict with the requirements of any state or federal law that applies to this Policy is changed to conform to the minimum requirements of such laws. Premiums may be changed, in accordance with the Premium Rate Change provision, to reflect these requirements.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

This Policy is not in lieu of and does not affect any requirements for coverage by any Workers' Compensation Act or similar law. This Policy is not a Workers' Compensation Policy. It does not provide Workers' Compensation benefits.

ADDITION OF NEW INSURED PERSONS

All Insured Persons added to the Classes of Eligible Persons on the *Policy Schedule* are eligible for insurance under this Policy.

ASSIGNMENT

The rights and benefits provided by this Policy, except as provided herein, may not be assigned. The payee may, after a benefit or series of benefits has become payable, assign only those benefits. Such assignment will be valid only if the Company receives it before any of those benefits have been paid and only for benefits payable for claims arising from the same Line of Duty Cancer claim. Any other attempt to assign will be void.

This insurance may not be levied on, attached, garnished, or otherwise taken for a person's debts unless contrary to law.

CLERICAL ERROR

An Insured Person's coverage will not be affected by error or delay in keeping records of insurance under this Policy. If such error or delay is found, the Company will adjust the premium fairly.

EXAMINATION OF THE POLICY

This Policy will be available for inspection at the Policyholder's office during regular business hours.

INCONTESTABILITY

The validity of the Policy will not be contested for any claim incurred after it has been in force for two years from the Policy Effective Date, except for non-payment of premium, material misrepresentation or fraud.

No misrepresentation will void or defeat recovery under this Policy unless such misrepresentation is material.

Absent a showing of intentional fraud, no statement made by any Insured Person relating to insurability shall be used in contesting the validity of the insurance with respect to which the statement was made after the insurance has been in force prior to the contest for a period of two (2) years during the person's lifetime nor unless the statement is contained in a written instrument signed by the person making the statement.

However, the Company may contest coverage at any time based upon the Insured Person's ineligibility for coverage under the Policy or upon other provisions in the Policy.

MISSTATEMENT OF FACT

If the Policyholder has misstated any fact, all amounts payable under this Policy will be such as the premium paid would have purchased had such fact been correctly stated.

NONCOMPLIANCE WITH POLICY REQUIREMENTS

Any express or implied waiver by the Company of any requirements of this Policy is not a continuing waiver of such requirements. Any failure by the Company to enforce any Policy provision will not be a waiver or amendment of that provision.

RECORDS

The Policyholder or its authorized Administrator will maintain the records of the Insured Person's insurance under this Policy. The Company will be permitted to examine the Policyholder's records relating to the insurance under this Policy at any reasonable time. The Policyholder is acting as an agent of the Insured Person for transactions relating to this insurance. The actions of the Policyholder will not be considered the actions of the Company.

ELIGIBILITY, EFFECTIVE DATE, AND TERMINATION PROVISIONS

POLICY EFFECTIVE DATE

The Company agrees to provide the benefits described in this Policy in consideration of the Policyholder's application and payment of the initial premium when due. Insurance coverage begins on the Policy Effective Date shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits*.

INSURED PERSON'S EFFECTIVE DATE

For a person in an Eligible Class shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits*, coverage will become effective on the latest of the following dates:

1. the Policy Effective Date;
2. the date the person becomes a member of an Eligible Class; and
3. the date for which the first premium for the person's coverage is paid.

In no event will insurance for the Eligible Person become effective before the Policy Effective Date.

INSURED PERSON'S TERMINATION DATE

An Insured Person's coverage under the Policy will end on the earliest of the following dates:

1. the premium due date, if premiums are not paid when due (subject to the Grace Period provision);
2. the date the Insured Person ceases to be a member of an Eligible Class;
3. the date the Policy terminates.

Termination does not affect a claim due to any Covered Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs before the termination date.

EFFECTIVE DATE OF CHANGES

Any increase or decrease in the amount of insurance for the Insured Person resulting from a change in benefits provided by this Policy or a change in the Insured Person's covered class will take effect on the date of such change.

ELIGIBILITY

A person is eligible for insurance under this Policy on the date he or she meets all of the requirements of one of the Eligible Classes shown on the *Policy Schedule of Benefits*. An Eligible Person may be insured under only one covered class, even though he or she may be eligible under more than one covered class.



HIPAA PRIVACY NOTICE

THIS NOTICE DESCRIBES HOW MEDICAL INFORMATION ABOUT YOU MAY BE USED AND DISCLOSED AND HOW YOU CAN GET ACCESS TO THIS INFORMATION. PLEASE REVIEW IT CAREFULLY.

AXIS Insurance Company values its relationship with you. Protecting the privacy of the information we have about you is of great importance to us. We want you to understand how we protect the confidentiality of information as well as how and why we use and disclose it. We are required by law to maintain the privacy of protected health information and to provide you with notice of our legal duties and privacy practices with respect to this information. "Protected health information" includes any individually identifiable information that we obtain from you or others that relates to your physical or mental health, the health care you have received, or payment for your healthcare.

This privacy policy applies to policies underwritten by AXIS Insurance Company. This notice explains your rights. It also explains our legal duties and privacy practices. We are required by federal law to give you this notice. We reserve the right to change the terms of this notice, and should that occur, we will provide you with a copy of the new notice.

HOW WE MAY USE AND DISCLOSE YOUR PROTECTED HEALTH INFORMATION

We use and disclose your Protected Health Information (PHI) for the purposes of your treatment, for payment and for health care operations. Not every use or disclosure in a category is listed. However all of the ways that we may use or disclose PHI will fall within one of these categories.

Your Authorization: Except as outlined below, we will not use or disclose your PHI for any purpose unless you have signed a form authorizing use or disclosure. You may take away this authorization at any time, in writing. We will then stop using your PHI for that purpose. But, if we have already used or shared your PHI based on your authorization, we cannot undo any actions we took before you told us to stop.

For Payment: We use and disclose PHI as necessary for payment purposes. For example, we may use your PHI to process a claim or may give information to a doctor's office to confirm your benefits.

For Health Care Operations: We use and disclose PHI for our health care operations such as customer service, premium rating, fraud and abuse prevention and detection, and other functions related to your health policy. For example, we may use PHI to review the quality of care and services you get. We may also use PHI to provide you with case management or care coordination services.

For Treatment Activities: We do not provide treatment. This is the role of a health care provider such as your doctor or a hospital. But, we may share PHI with your health care provider so that the provider may treat you.

To Others: You may authorize us in writing to give your PHI to someone else for any reason. Also, if you are present, and provide authorization, we may give your PHI to a family member, friend or other person. We would do this if it has to do with your current treatment or payment for your treatment. If you are unavailable, incapacitated, or facing an emergency medical situation, we may share limited PHI with a family member, friend or other person if sharing your PHI is in your best interest.

As Allowed or Required by Law: We may also use or disclose your PHI, as allowed by federal law, for many types of activities. PHI can be shared for health oversight activities. It can also be shared for judicial or administrative proceedings, with public health authorities, for law enforcement reasons, and to coroners, funeral directors or medical examiners (about decedents). PHI can also be shared for certain reasons with organ donation groups, for research, and to avoid a serious threat to health or safety. It can be shared for special government functions, for workers' compensation, to respond to requests from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and to alert proper authorities if we reasonably believe that you may be a victim of abuse, neglect, domestic violence or other crimes. PHI can also be shared for any purpose as required by law.

We may share PHI with the sponsor of the plan or use in the administration of the plan. Plan sponsors that receive PHI are required by law to have controls in place to keep it from being used for reasons that are not proper.

YOUR HIPAA PRIVACY RIGHTS

Access to Your PHI

You have the right to obtain a copy and inspect specific items of your PHI, such as your policy or claim information, for as long as we maintain it. We may deny your request to access certain PHI, as permitted or required by law. We may require your request for access in writing. Your request for access should contain as much detail as possible regarding the PHI you wish to review. We may charge a reasonable fee for access to your PHI.

Amendments to Your PHI

You have the right to request that the PHI we maintain about you be amended or corrected if you believe it is incorrect. We are not legally obligated to make all requested amendments but will give each request appropriate consideration. Requests for amendment must be in writing and must state the reasons for the amendment request.

Accounting for Disclosures of Your PHI

You have the right to request an accounting of certain disclosures made by us of your PHI. Examples of disclosures that we are required to account for include those to state insurance departments, pursuant to valid legal process, or for law enforcement purposes. Requests must be made in writing. We are not legally obligated to provide an accounting of every disclosure but will give each request appropriate consideration. The accounting will not include disclosures made prior to June 1, 2011.

Restrictions on Uses and Disclosures of Your PHI

You have the right to request restrictions on certain uses and disclosures of your PHI for treatment, payment, or health care operations by notifying us of your request for a restriction in writing. We are not legally required to agree to your restriction request but will give each request appropriate consideration.

Confidential Communication of PHI

You have the right to request to receive communications from us regarding your PHI by another method of contact or at an alternative address. We will accommodate reasonable requests, which must clearly state that disclosure of all or part of the information could endanger your health or safety.

Right to a Copy of the Notice – You have the right to a paper copy of this Notice upon request by contacting us at the telephone number or address below.

Potential Impact of Other Applicable Laws

HIPAA (the federal privacy law) generally does not preempt, or override other laws that give people greater privacy protections. As a result, if any state or federal privacy law requires us to provide you with more privacy protections, then we must also follow that law in addition to HIPAA.

Complaints

If you think we have not protected your privacy, you can file a complaint with us. You may also file a complaint with the Office for Civil Rights in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in Washington, D.C. We will not take action against you for filing a complaint.

It is subject to all of the provisions, limitations and exclusions of the Policy except as they are specifically modified by this Rider. See the *Policy Schedule of Benefits* for the applicability of this Rider with respect to each class of Insured Persons.

- I. The Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis Lifetime Maximum in the **POLICY SCHEDULE OF BENEFITS** section of the Policy is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

Lifetime Maximum Benefit	\$50,000
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The Lifetime Maximum Benefit does not apply to the Line of Duty Cancer Death Benefit.

- II. The following Definition is added to the **DEFINITIONS** section of the Policy:

Lifetime Maximum Benefit means the maximum dollar amount this Policy and any attached riders will pay in benefits to an Insured Person during his or her lifetime. The Lifetime Maximum Benefit does not apply to the Line of Duty Cancer Death Benefit.

- III. The following sentence, shown in the **Benefit Payment Conditions** sections of the **LINE OF DUTY CANCER INITIAL DIAGNOSIS BENEFIT**, in the BENEFITS section of the Policy, is deleted entirely:

19. Stomach cancer.
20. Testicular cancer.
21. Thyroid cancer.

Line of Duty Cancer also means a disease caused by an uncontrolled division of abnormal cells in a part of the body or a malignant growth or tumor resulting from the division of abnormal cells; and affecting the prostate or breast, lymphatic, hematological, digestive, urinary, neurological, or reproductive systems. Cancer also includes any other type of cancer with the exception of non-invasive skin cancer.



Diagnostic Requirements

The Company reserves the right to have any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis reviewed by a Physician of its choosing. In the event of any dispute or disagreement regarding the appropriateness or correctness of the Diagnosis, the Company shall have the right to request an examination of either the Insured Person or the evidence used in arriving at such Diagnosis by an independently acknowledged expert selected by the Company in the applicable field of medicine.

The Line of Duty Cancer must be positively Diagnosed by a Physician certified to practice pathological anatomy or osteopathic pathology, upon the basis of a microscopic examination of fixed tissues, or preparations from the hemic system. Such Diagnosis shall be based solely on the accepted criteria of malignancy after a study of the histocytologic architecture or pattern of the suspected tumor, tissue and/or specimen. Clinical Diagnosis alone does not meet this standard.

The opinion of such expert as to such Diagnosis shall be binding on both the Insured Person and the Company.

Benefit Payment Conditions

Payment of benefits is subject to:

1. the Diagnosis is made while the Insured Person's coverage is in force under the Policy;
2. the Insured Person has been employed as a Firefighter with the Employer for at least five (5) continuous years preceding Diagnosis;
3. The Insured Person has not been employed in any other position in the five (5) years preceding Diagnosis which is proven to create a higher risk for any cancer; and
4. The Line of Duty Cancer treatment is covered within the Employer-sponsored health plan or Employer-sponsored group health insurance trust fund.

No benefits will be payable for:

1. any disease, sickness or incapacity other than Line of Duty Cancer as defined; this is so even though such disease, sickness or incapacity may have been complicated, affected (directly or indirectly) or caused by Line of Duty Cancer;
2. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Policy Effective date;
3. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Insured Person's Coverage Effective Date;
4. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Policy terminates;
5. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Insured Person's coverage terminates.

Termination of Employment

If an Insured Person terminates employment with the Employer and a Line of Duty Cancer Initial Diagnosis Benefit is payable under this Policy, the Line of Duty Cancer Expense Reimbursement Benefit is payable upon Diagnosis of Line of Duty Cancer for 10 years following the date on which the Firefighter terminates his or her employment. The Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown in the Rider Schedule subject to the Diagnostic Requirements and Benefit Payment Conditions.

Benefit Payment Conditions

After termination of employment, payment of benefits is subject to:

1. the Diagnosis is made while the Insured Person's coverage is in force under the Policy;
2. after termination of employment, the Insured Person continued coverage in the Employer-sponsored health plan or Employer-sponsored group health insurance trust fund;

3. the Line of Duty Cancer treatment is covered within the Employer-sponsored health plan or Employer-sponsored group health insurance trust fund;
4. after termination of employment, the Insured Person was not subsequently employed as a Firefighter;
5. prior to termination of employment, the Insured Person was employed as a Firefighter with the Employer for at least five (5) continuous years;
6. the Insured Person has not been employed in any other position in the five (5) years preceding Diagnosis which is proven to create a higher risk for any cancer.

No benefits will be payable for:

1. any disease, sickness or incapacity other than Line of Duty Cancer as defined; this is so even though such disease, sickness or incapacity may have been complicated, affected (directly or indirectly) or caused by Line of Duty Cancer;
2. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Policy Effective date;
3. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis that occurs prior to the Insured Person's Coverage Effective Date;
4. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Policy terminates;
5. any Line of Duty Cancer Diagnosis occurring after the Insured Person's coverage terminates.

DEFINITIONS

Certain words used in this Rider have specific meanings. The words defined below and capitalized within the text of this Rider have the meanings set forth below. If a capitalized term is not set forth below, it may be defined in the Policy to which this Rider is attached. If a term contained in this Rider is defined in both the Policy and this Rider, the definition in this Rider shall govern.

Deductible means the amount the Insured Person must pay for covered health care services before his or her Employer-sponsored health plan or Employer-sponsored group health insurance trust fund will pay a claim.

Coinsurance means the percentage of costs of a covered health care service the Insured Person must pay (20%, for example) after he or she has paid the Deductible.

Copayment means the fixed amount (\$20, for example) that the Insured Person must pay for a covered health care service after he or she has paid the Deductible.

RIDER EXCLUSIONS

In addition to any exclusions, conditions or limitations provided under the Policy, no Benefits shall be payable for the following treatments or services, unless coverage is specifically provided:



Line of Duty Cancer Initial Diagnosis Benefit

If, while coverage under this Policy is in force, an Insured Person is Diagnosed with Line of Duty Cancer, by a Physician in the medical specialty appropriate for the type of cancer Diagnosed, the Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown in the Schedule of Benefits subject to the Lifetime Maximum Benefit, Diagnostic Requirements and Benefit Payment Conditions.

Once a Line of Duty Cancer has been so Diagnosed and an Initial Diagnosis Benefit has become payable to an Insured Person, no benefits are payable to that Insured Person with respect to a subsequently Diagnosed recurrence of the same Line of Duty Cancer or a subsequently Diagnosed separate Line of Duty Cancer.

If, while coverage under this Policy is in force, an Insured Person is Diagnosed with Line of Duty Cancer and a Line of Duty Cancer Initial Diagnosis Benefit is payable under this Policy, the Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown in the Rider Schedule subject to the Lifetime Maximum Benefit, Diagnostic Requirements and Benefit Payment Conditions. The Company will reimburse the following out-of-pocket expenses incurred by an Insured Person due to the treatment of Line of Duty Cancer: Deductible, Coinsurance, or Copayment. The Company shall not pay more than the Benefit Amount shown in the Rider Schedule for all out-of-pocket expenses resulting from the same Line of Duty Cancer.

If, while coverage under this Policy is in force, an Insured Person dies as a result of Line of Duty Cancer or from circumstances that arise out of the treatment of Line of Duty Cancer, the Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown in the Schedule of Benefits, subject to the Benefit Payment Conditions.

Payment of Line of Duty Cancer Death Benefit is subject to the following:

1. the death must occur while the Insured Person's coverage is in force under the Policy; and
2. acceptable proof must be provided to the Company, or its authorized claims payor, that such death was a result of Line of Duty Cancer or circumstances that arise out of the treatment of the Line of Duty Cancer.

Line of Duty Cancer Death Benefit - Classes 2 and 4 Only

If, an Insured Person is diagnosed with a Line of Duty Cancer for which a Line of Duty Cancer Initial Diagnosis Benefit is payable, and he or she subsequently dies as a result of the Line of Duty Cancer or from circumstances that arise out of the treatment of the Line of Duty Cancer, the Company will pay the Benefit Amount shown in the Schedule of Benefits, subject to the following Benefit Payment Conditions.

Payment of Line of Duty Cancer Death Benefit is subject to the following:

1. the death must occur while the Insured Person's coverage is in force under the Policy;
2. the death must occur within 10 years of diagnosis of Line of Duty Cancer; and
3. acceptable proof must be provided to the Company, or its authorized claims payor, that such death was a result of Line of Duty Cancer or circumstances that arise out of the treatment of the Line of Duty Cancer.

Subject: Request for Board Approval of Modification #1 to the FDEM Urban Search and Rescue Grant – Agreement Number T0275

Objective

Obtain Board Approval of Modification #1 FDEM Urban Search and Rescue Grant – Contract Number T0275 for Tactical Rescue Team (TRT) Number 646 extending one year.

Background Information

In December, 2022, the District was awarded \$12,000 by the State of Florida to help sustain the Statewide Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) capabilities to prepare for and respond to disasters throughout the State of Florida. The Board of Fire Commissioners approved and executed the agreement at the January 26, 2023 meeting. (See Attachment 1 for a copy of the original agreement). The eligible cost category of the award is “sustainment”. The subcategories available include personal protective equipment, equipment repair and maintenance, logistical support, cannie equipment, water rescue cache, tools and equipment, medical cache, and planning & technology. The original period of performance of the agreement is from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023.

Considerations

On July 10, 2023, the District received a proposed modification agreement from FDEM. The modification agreement (see Attachment 2) extends the US&R Grant one year and into the 23/24 fiscal year. Eligible expenses remain the same and no other parameters have been modified under the modification agreement (except for the time extension). Please note: The District has purchased the eligible items and will meet the terms of the agreement of the grant before the expiration of the newly extended period of performance.

Fiscal Impact

There are no fiscal impacts to executing the modification agreement (extending the period of performance one year).

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Board approve Modification #1 to the FDEM Urban Search and Rescue Grant – Contract Agreement Number T0275 totaling \$12,000 extending the period of performance through June 30, 2024.

**STATE-FUNDED GRANT AGREEMENT
URBAN SEARCH AND RESCUE GRANT**

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into by the State of Florida, Division of Emergency Management, with headquarters in Tallahassee, Florida (hereinafter referred to as the "Division"), and **North Collier Fire Control / Rescue District** (hereinafter referred to as the "Recipient") for Tactical Rescue Team **646**

THIS AGREEMENT IS ENTERED INTO BASED ON THE FOLLOWING REPRESENTATIONS:

- A. The Recipient represents that it is fully qualified and eligible to receive these grant funds to provide the services identified herein; and
- B. The Division has received these grant funds from the State of Florida, and has the authority to subgrant these funds to the Recipient upon the terms and conditions below; and
- C. The Division has statutory authority to disburse the funds under this Agreement.

THEREFORE, the Division and the Recipient agree to the following:

(1) LAWS, RULES, REGULATION, AND POLICIES

- a. As required by section 215.971(1), Florida Statutes, this Agreement includes:
 - i. A provision specifying a scope of work that clearly establishes the tasks that the Recipient is required to perform.
 - ii. A provision dividing the agreement into quantifiable units of deliverables that must be received and accepted in writing by the Division before payment. Each deliverable must be directly related to the scope of work and specify the required minimum level of service to be performed and the criteria for evaluating the successful completion of each deliverable.
 - iii. A provision specifying the financial consequences that apply if the Recipient fails to perform the minimum level of service required by the agreement.
 - iv. A provision specifying that the Recipient may expend funds only for allowable costs resulting from obligations incurred during the specified agreement period.
 - v. A provision specifying that any balance of unobligated funds which has been advanced or paid must be refunded to the Division.
 - vi. A provision specifying that any funds paid in excess of the amount to which the Recipient is entitled under the terms and conditions of the agreement must be refunded to the Division.

b. In addition to the foregoing, the Recipient and the Division shall be governed by all applicable State and Federal laws, rules and regulations, including those identified in Attachment B. Any express reference in this Agreement to a particular statute, rule, or regulation in no way implies that no other statute, rule, or regulation applies.

(2) CONTACT

a. In accordance with section 215.971(2), Florida Statutes, the Division's Grant Manager shall be responsible for enforcing performance of this Agreement's terms and conditions and shall serve as the Division's liaison with the Recipient. As part of his/her duties, the Grant Manager for the Division shall:

- i. Monitor and document Recipient performance; and,
- ii. Review and document all deliverables for which the Recipient requests

payment.

d. In the event that different representatives or addresses are designated by either party after execution of this Agreement, notice of the name, title and address of the new representative will be provided to the other party.

(3) TERMS AND CONDITIONS

This Agreement contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties.

(4) EXECUTION

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, any one of which may be taken as an original.

(5) MODIFICATION

Either party may request modification of the provisions of this Agreement. Changes which are agreed upon shall be valid only when in writing, signed by each of the parties, and attached to the original of this Agreement.

(6) SCOPE OF WORK

The Recipient shall perform the work in accordance with the Budget and Scope of Work, Attachment A of this Agreement.

(7) PERIOD OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement **shall begin July 1, 2022 and shall end on June 30, 2023**, unless terminated earlier in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph (16) TERMINATION. In accordance with section 215.971(1)(d), Florida Statutes, the Recipient may expend funds authorized by this Agreement “only for allowable costs resulting from obligations incurred during” the period of agreement.

(8) FUNDING

- a. This is a cost-reimbursement Agreement, subject to the availability of funds.
- b. The State of Florida's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature, and subject to any modification in accordance with either chapter 216, Florida Statutes, or the Florida Constitution.
- c. The Division will pay the Recipient only for the successful completion of each deliverable. The maximum payment amount for each deliverable is outlined the Budget and Scope of Work in Attachment A of this Agreement. The maximum payment amount for the entirety of this Agreement is **\$ 12,000.**
- d. The Division will review any request for payment by comparing the documentation provided by the Recipient against a performance measure, outlined in Attachment A, which clearly delineates:
 - i. The required minimum acceptable level of service to be performed; and,
 - ii. The criteria for evaluating the successful completion of each deliverable.
- e. The Division's Grant Manager, as required by section 215.971(2)(c), Florida Statutes, shall reconcile and verify all funds received against all funds expended during the period of agreement and produce a final reconciliation report. The final report must identify any funds paid in excess of the expenditures incurred by the Recipient.
- f. For the purposes of this Agreement, the term “improper payment” means or includes:
 - i. Any payment that should not have been made or that was made in an incorrect amount (including overpayments and underpayments) under statutory, contractual, administrative, or other legally applicable requirements; and,
 - ii. Any payment to an ineligible party, any payment for an ineligible good or service, any duplicate payment, any payment for a good or service not received (except for such payments where authorized by law), any payment that does not account for credit for applicable

discounts, and any payment where insufficient or lack of documentation prevents a reviewer from discerning whether a payment was proper.

g. As required by the Reference Guide for State Expenditures, reimbursement for travel must be in accordance with section 112.061, Florida Statutes, which includes submission of the claim on the approved state travel voucher.

(9) RECORDS

a. As a condition of receiving state financial assistance, and as required by sections 20.055(6)(c) and 215.97(5)(b), Florida Statutes, the Division, the Chief Inspector General of the State of Florida, the Florida Auditor General, or any of their authorized representatives, shall enjoy the right of access to any documents, financial statements, papers, or other records of the Recipient which are pertinent to this Agreement, in order to make audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcripts. The right of access also includes timely and reasonable access to the Recipient's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion related to such documents. For the purposes of this section, the term "Recipient" includes employees or agents, including all subcontractors or consultants to be paid from funds provided under this Agreement.

b. The Recipient shall maintain all records related to this Agreement for the period of time specified in the appropriate retention schedule published by the Florida Department of State. Information regarding retention schedules can be obtained at: <http://dos.myflorida.com/library-archives/records-management/general-records-schedules/>.

c. Florida's Government in the Sunshine Law (Section 286.011, Florida Statutes) provides the citizens of Florida with a right of access to governmental proceedings and mandates three (3) basic requirements: (1) all meetings of public boards or commissions must be open to the public; (2) reasonable notice of such meetings must be given; and, (3) minutes of the meetings must be taken and promptly recorded. The mere receipt of public funds by a private entity, standing alone, is insufficient to bring that entity within the ambit of the open government requirements. However, the Government in the Sunshine Law applies to private entities that provide services to governmental agencies and that act on behalf of those agencies in the agencies' performance of their public duties. If a public agency delegates the performance of its public purpose to a private entity, then, to the extent that private entity is performing that public purpose, the Government in the Sunshine Law applies. For example, if a volunteer fire department provides firefighting services to a governmental entity and uses facilities and equipment purchased with public funds, then the Government in the Sunshine Law applies to board of directors for that volunteer fire department. Thus, to the extent that the Government in the Sunshine Law applies to the Recipient based upon the funds provided under this Agreement, the meetings of the Recipient's governing board or the meetings of any subcommittee making recommendations to the governing board may be subject to open government requirements. These meetings shall be publicly noticed, open to the public, and the minutes of all the meetings shall be public records, available to the public in accordance with Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.

d. Florida's Public Records Law provides a right of access to the records of the state and local governments as well as to private entities acting on their behalf. Unless specifically exempted from disclosure by the Legislature, all materials made or received by a governmental agency (or a private entity acting on behalf of such an agency) in conjunction with official business which are used to perpetuate, communicate, or formalize knowledge qualify as public records subject to public inspection. The mere receipt of public funds by a private entity, standing alone, is insufficient to bring that entity within the ambit of the public record requirements. However, when a public entity delegates a public function to a private entity, the records generated by the private entity's performance of that duty become public records. Thus, the nature and scope of the services provided by a private entity determine whether that entity is acting on behalf of a public agency and is therefore subject to the requirements of Florida's Public Records Law.

e. The Recipient shall maintain all records for the Recipient and for all subcontractors or consultants to be paid from funds provided under this Agreement, including documentation of all program costs, in a form sufficient to determine compliance with the requirements and objectives of the Budget and Scope of Work in Attachment A and all other applicable laws and regulations.

(10) AUDITS

a. In accounting for the receipt and expenditure of funds under this Agreement, the Recipient shall follow Generally Accepted Accounting Principles ("GAAP"). As defined by 2 C.F.R. §200.49, GAAP "has the meaning specified in accounting standards issued by the Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB)."

b. When conducting an audit of the Recipient's performance under this Agreement, the Division shall use Generally Accepted Government Auditing Standards ("GAGAS"). As defined by 2 C.F.R. §200.50, GAGAS, "also known as the Yellow Book, means generally accepted government auditing standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, which are applicable to financial audits."

c. If an audit shows that all or any portion of the funds disbursed were not spent in accordance with the conditions of this Agreement, the Recipient shall be held liable for reimbursement to the Division of all funds not spent in accordance with these applicable regulations and Agreement provisions within thirty (30) days after the Division has notified the Recipient of such non-compliance.

d. The Recipient shall have all audits completed by an independent auditor, which is defined in section 215.97(2)(i), Florida Statutes, as “an independent certified public accountant licensed under chapter 473.” The independent auditor shall state that the audit complied with the applicable provisions noted above. The audits must be received by the Division no later than nine (9) months from the end of the Recipient’s fiscal year.

Tallahassee, Florida 32399-1450

(11) REPORTS

a. The Recipient shall provide the Division with quarterly reports and a close-out report. These reports shall include the current status and progress by the Recipient and all Sub-Recipients and subcontractors in completing the work described in the Budget and Scope of Work, in addition to any other information requested by the Division.

b. Quarterly reports are due to the Division no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter of the program year and shall be sent each quarter until submission of the close-out report. The ending dates for each quarter of the program year are September 30, December 31, March 31, and June 30.

c. The close-out report is due sixty (60) days after termination of this Agreement or sixty (60) days after completion of the activities contained in this Agreement, whichever occurs first.

d. If all required reports and copies are not sent to the Division or are not completed in a manner acceptable to the Division, the Division may withhold further payments until they are completed or may take other action as stated in Paragraph (15) REMEDIES. "Acceptable to the Division" means that the work product was completed in accordance with the Budget and Scope of Work.

e. The Recipient shall provide additional program updates or information that may be required by the Division.

f. The Recipient shall provide additional reports and information identified in Attachment G.

(12) MONITORING

a. The Recipient shall monitor its performance under this Agreement, as well as that of its subcontractors and/or consultants who are paid from funds provided under this Agreement, to ensure that time schedules are being met, the Budget and Scope of Work is being accomplished within the specified time periods, and other performance goals are being achieved. A review shall be done for each function or activity in the Budget and Scope of Work in Attachment A to this Agreement, and reported in the quarterly report.

b. In addition to reviews of audits conducted in accordance with Paragraph (10) AUDITS above, monitoring procedures may include, but not be limited to, on-site visits by Division staff, limited scope audits, or other procedures. The Recipient agrees to comply and cooperate with any monitoring procedures/processes deemed appropriate by the Division. In the event that the Division determines that a limited scope audit of the Recipient is appropriate, the Recipient agrees to comply with any additional instructions provided by the Division to the Recipient regarding such audit. The Recipient further agrees to comply and cooperate with any inspections, reviews, investigations, or audits deemed necessary by the Florida Chief Financial Officer or Auditor General. In addition, the Division will monitor the performance and financial management by the Recipient throughout the period of agreement to ensure timely completion of all tasks.

(13) LIABILITY

a. Unless Recipient is a state agency or subdivision, as defined in section 768.28, Florida Statutes, the Recipient is solely responsible to parties it deals with in carrying out the terms of this Agreement, and shall hold the Division harmless against all claims of whatever nature by third parties arising from the work performed under this Agreement. For purposes of this Agreement, Recipient agrees that it is not an employee or agent of the Division, but is an independent contractor.

b. Any Recipient which is a state agency or subdivision, as defined in section 768.28, Florida Statutes, agrees to be fully responsible for its negligent or tortious acts or omissions which result in claims or suits against the Division, and agrees to be liable for any damages proximately caused by the acts or omissions to the extent set forth in section 768.28, Florida Statutes. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any party to which sovereign immunity applies. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency or subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of this agreement.

(14) DEFAULT

If any of the following events occur ("Events of Default"), all obligations on the part of the Division to make further payment of funds shall, if the Division elects, terminate and the Division has the option to exercise any of its remedies set forth in Paragraph (15) REMEDIES. However, the Division may make payments or partial payments after any Events of Default without waiving the right to exercise such remedies, and without becoming liable to make any further payment:

a. If any warranty or representation made by the Recipient in this Agreement or any previous agreement with the Division is or becomes false or misleading in any respect, or if the Recipient fails to

keep or perform any of the obligations, terms or covenants in this Agreement or any previous agreement with the Division and has not cured them in timely fashion, or is unable or unwilling to meet its obligations under this Agreement.

b. If material adverse changes occur in the financial condition of the Recipient at any time during the period of agreement, and the Recipient fails to cure this adverse change within thirty (30) days from the date written notice is sent by the Division.

c. If any reports required by this Agreement have not been submitted to the Division or have been submitted with incorrect, incomplete, or insufficient information.

d. If the Recipient has failed to perform and complete on time any of its obligations under this Agreement.

(15) REMEDIES

If an Event of Default occurs, unless the event is covered by financial consequences listed in the Budget and Scope of Work, the Division shall provide the Recipient a thirty (30) day written notice within which the Recipient may cure the default. However, upon the Recipient's failure to cure the default within the thirty (30) day notice period, the Division shall exercise any one or more of the following remedies, either concurrently or consecutively:

a. Terminate this Agreement, provided that the Recipient is given at least thirty (30) days prior written notice of the termination. The notice shall be effective when placed in the United States, first class mail, postage prepaid, by registered or certified mail-return receipt requested, to the address in Paragraph (2) CONTACT herein;

b. Begin an appropriate legal or equitable action to enforce performance of this Agreement;

c. Withhold or suspend payment of all or any part of a request for payment;

d. Require that the Recipient refund to the Division any monies used for ineligible purposes under the laws, rules and regulations governing the use of these funds;

e. Exercise any corrective or remedial actions, to include but not be limited to:

i. request additional information from the Recipient to determine the reasons for or the extent of non-compliance or lack of performance,

ii. issue a written warning to advise that more serious measures may be taken if the situation is not corrected,

iii. advise the Recipient to suspend, discontinue or refrain from incurring costs for any activities in question or

iv. require the Recipient to reimburse the Division for the amount of costs incurred for any items determined to be ineligible;

f. Exercise any other rights or remedies which may be available under law;

Pursuing any of the above remedies will not stop the Division from pursuing any other remedies in this Agreement or provided at law or in equity. If the Division waives any right or remedy in this Agreement or fails to insist on strict performance by the Recipient, it will not affect, extend, or waive any

other right or remedy of the Division, or affect the later exercise of the same right or remedy by the Division for any other default by the Recipient.

(16) TERMINATION.

a. The Division may terminate this Agreement for cause after thirty (30) days written notice. Cause can include misuse of funds, fraud, lack of compliance with applicable rules, laws and regulations, failure to perform on time, and refusal by the Recipient to permit public access to any document, paper, letter, or other material subject to disclosure under chapter 119, Florida Statutes, as amended.

b. The Division may terminate this Agreement for convenience or when it determines, in its sole discretion, that continuing the Agreement would not produce beneficial results in line with the further expenditure of funds, by providing the Recipient with thirty (30) days prior written notice.

c. The parties may agree to terminate this Agreement for their mutual convenience through a written amendment of this Agreement. The amendment will state the effective date of the termination and the procedures for proper closeout of this Agreement.

d. In the event this Agreement is terminated, the Recipient will not incur new obligations for the terminated portion of this Agreement after the Recipient has received the notification of termination. The Recipient will cancel as many outstanding obligations as possible. Costs incurred after receipt of the termination notice will be disallowed. The Recipient shall not be relieved of liability to the Division because of any breach of this Agreement by the Recipient. The Division may, to the extent authorized by law, withhold payments to the Recipient for the purpose of set-off until the exact amount of damages due the Division from the Recipient is determined.

(17) SUBCONTRACTS

If the Recipient subcontracts any of the work required under this Agreement, a copy of the unsigned subcontract must be forwarded to the Division for review and approval before it is executed by the Recipient. The Recipient agrees to include in the subcontract that (i) the subcontractor is bound by the terms of this Agreement, (ii) the subcontractor is bound by all applicable state and federal laws and regulations, and (iii) the subcontractor shall hold the Division and Recipient harmless against all claims of whatever nature arising out of the subcontractor's performance of work under this Agreement, to the extent allowed and required by law. The Recipient shall document in the quarterly report the subcontractor's progress in performing its work under this Agreement.

For each subcontract, the Recipient shall provide a written statement to the Division as to whether that subcontractor is a minority business enterprise, as defined in section 288.703, Florida Statutes.

(18) ATTACHMENTS

a. All attachments to this Agreement are incorporated as if set out fully.

b. In the event of any inconsistencies or conflict between the language of this Agreement and the attachments, the language of the attachments shall control, but only to the extent of the conflict or inconsistency.

c. This Agreement has the following attachments:

(19) PAYMENTS

a. Any advance payment under this Agreement is subject to section 216.181(16), Florida Statutes. All advances are required to be held in an interest-bearing account. If an advance payment is requested, the budget data on which the request is based and a justification statement shall be included in this Agreement as Attachment D. Attachment D will specify the amount of advance payment needed and provide an explanation of the necessity for and proposed use of these funds. No advance shall be accepted for processing if a reimbursement has been paid prior to the submittal of a request for advanced payment. After the initial advance, if any, payment shall be made on a fixed-fee basis as needed.

b. Invoices shall be submitted in accordance with Attachment A and shall include the supporting documentation for the project or services. The final invoice shall be submitted within sixty (60) days after the expiration date of the agreement. An explanation of any circumstances prohibiting the submittal of quarterly invoices shall be submitted to the Division grant manager as part of the Recipient's quarterly reporting as referenced in Paragraph (11) REPORTS of this Agreement.

c. If the necessary funds are not available to fund this Agreement as a result of action by the United States Congress, the federal Office of Management and Budgeting, the State Chief Financial Officer or under Paragraph (8) of this Agreement, all obligations on the part of the Division to make any further payment of funds shall terminate, and the Recipient shall submit its closeout report within thirty (30) days of receiving notice from the Division.

(20) REPAYMENTS

All refunds or repayments due to the Division under this Agreement are to be made payable to the order of "Division of Emergency Management," and mailed directly to the following address:

In accordance with section 215.34(2), Florida Statutes if a check or other draft is returned to the Division for collection, Recipient shall pay the Division a service fee of \$15.00 or 5% of the face amount of the returned check or draft, whichever is greater.

(21) MANDATED CONDITIONS

a. The validity of this Agreement is subject to the truth and accuracy of all the information, representations, and materials submitted or provided by the Recipient in this Agreement, in any later submission or response to a Division request, or in any submission or response to fulfill the requirements of this Agreement. All said information, representations, and materials is incorporated by reference. The inaccuracy of the submissions or any material changes shall, at the option of the Division and with thirty (30) days written notice to the Recipient, cause the termination of this Agreement and the release of the Division from all its obligations to the Recipient.

b. This Agreement shall be construed under the laws of the State of Florida, and venue for any actions arising out of this Agreement shall be in the Circuit Court of Leon County. If any provision of this Agreement is in conflict with any applicable statute or rule, or is unenforceable, then the provision shall be null and void to the extent of the conflict, and shall be severable, but shall not invalidate any other provision of this Agreement.

c. Any power of approval or disapproval granted to the Division under the terms of this Agreement shall survive the term of this Agreement.

d. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, any one of which may be taken as an original.

e. The Recipient agrees to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (Public Law 101-336, 42 U.S.C. Section 12101 et seq.), which prohibits discrimination by public and private entities on the basis of disability in employment, public accommodations, transportation, State and local government services, and telecommunications.

f. Those who have been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime or on the discriminatory vendor list may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with a public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of \$25,000.00 for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list or on the discriminatory vendor list.

g. Any Recipient which is not a local government or state agency, and which receives funds under this Agreement from the state government, certifies, to the best of its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals:

i. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by a federal department or agency;

ii. Have not, within a five-year period preceding this Agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against it for fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state or local) transaction or contract under public transaction; violation of federal or state antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property;

iii. Are not presently indicted or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a governmental entity (federal, state, or local) with commission of any offenses enumerated in Paragraph (21)(g)(ii) of this certification; and

iv. Have not within a five (5) year period preceding this Agreement had one or more public transactions (federal, state, or local) terminated for cause or default.

If the Recipient is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, then the Recipient shall attach an explanation to this Agreement.

In addition, the Recipient shall send to the Division (by email or by facsimile transmission) the completed “Certification Regarding Debarment” (Attachment F) for each intended subcontractor that Recipient plans to fund under this Agreement. The form must be received by the Division before the Recipient enters into a contract with any subcontractor.

h. The State of Florida's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature, and subject to any modification in accordance with chapter 216, Florida Statutes, or the Florida Constitution.

i. All bills for fees or other compensation for services or expenses shall be submitted in detail sufficient for a proper pre-audit and post-audit thereof.

j. Any bills for travel expenses shall be submitted in accordance with section 112.061, Florida Statutes.

k. The Division reserves the right to unilaterally cancel this Agreement if the Recipient refuses to allow public access to all documents, papers, letters, or other material subject to the provisions of chapter 119, Florida Statutes, which the Recipient created or received under this Agreement.

l. If the Recipient is allowed to temporarily invest any advances of funds under this Agreement, any interest income shall either be returned to the Division or be applied against the Division's obligation to pay the contract amount.

m. The State of Florida will not intentionally award publicly funded contracts to any contractor who knowingly employs unauthorized alien workers, constituting a violation of the employment provisions contained in 8 U.S.C. Section 1324a(e) [Section 274A(e) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (“INA”)].

The Division shall consider the employment by any contractor of unauthorized aliens a violation of Section 274A(e) of the INA. Such violation by the Recipient of the employment provisions contained in Section 274A(e) of the INA shall be grounds for unilateral cancellation of this Agreement by the Division.

n. The Recipient is subject to Florida's Government in the Sunshine Law (Section 286.011, Florida Statutes) with respect to the meetings of the Recipient's governing board or the meetings of any subcommittee making recommendations to the governing board. All of these meetings shall be publicly noticed, open to the public, and the minutes of all the meetings shall be public records, available to the public in accordance with chapter 119, Florida Statutes.

o. All expenditures of state financial assistance shall be in compliance with the laws, rules, and regulations applicable to expenditures of State funds, including but not limited to, the Reference Guide for State Expenditures.

p. This Agreement may be charged only with allowable costs resulting from obligations incurred during the period of agreement.

q. Any balances of unobligated cash that have been advanced or paid that are not authorized to be retained for direct program costs in a subsequent period must be refunded to the State.

r. Section 287.05805, Florida Statutes, requires that any state funds provided for the purchase of or improvements to real property are contingent upon the contractor or political subdivision granting to the state a security interest in the property at least to the amount of state funds provided for at least five 5 years from the date of purchase or the completion of the improvements or as further required by law.

s. The Division may, at its option, terminate the Contract if the Contractor is found to have submitted a false certification as provided under section 287.135(5), Florida Statutes, or been placed on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan List or the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List, or been engaged in business operations in Cuba or Syria, or to have been placed on the Scrutinized Companies that Boycott Israel List or is engaged in a boycott of Israel.

(22) LOBBYING PROHIBITION

a. Section 216.347, Florida Statutes, prohibits "any disbursement of grants and aids appropriations pursuant to a contract or grant to any person or organization unless the terms of the grant or contract prohibit the expenditure of funds for the purpose of lobbying the Legislature, the judicial branch, or a state agency."

b. No funds or other resources received from the Division under this Agreement may be used directly or indirectly to influence legislation or any other official action by the Florida Legislature or any state agency.

(23) COPYRIGHT, PATENT AND TRADEMARK

EXCEPT AS PROVIDED BELOW, ANY AND ALL PATENT RIGHTS ACCRUING UNDER OR IN CONNECTION WITH THE PERFORMANCE OF THIS AGREEMENT ARE HEREBY RESERVED TO THE STATE OF FLORIDA. ANY AND ALL COPYRIGHTS ACCRUING UNDER OR IN CONNECTION

WITH THE PERFORMANCE OF THIS AGREEMENT ARE HEREBY TRANSFERRED BY THE RECIPIENT TO THE STATE OF FLORIDA.

a. If the Recipient has a pre-existing patent or copyright, the Recipient shall retain all rights and entitlements to that pre-existing patent or copyright unless this Agreement provides otherwise.

b. If any discovery or invention is developed in the course of or as a result of work or services performed under this Agreement, or in any way connected with it, the Recipient shall refer the discovery or invention to the Division for a determination whether the State of Florida will seek patent protection in its name. Any patent rights accruing under or in connection with the performance of this Agreement are reserved to the State of Florida. If any books, manuals, films, or other copyrightable material are produced, the Recipient shall notify the Division. Any copyrights accruing under or in connection with the performance under this Agreement are transferred by the Recipient to the State of Florida.

c. Within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement, the Recipient shall disclose all intellectual properties relating to the performance of this Agreement that he or she knows or should know could give rise to a patent or copyright. The Recipient shall retain all rights and entitlements to any pre-existing intellectual property that is disclosed. Failure to disclose will indicate that no such property exists. The Division shall then, under Paragraph (b), have the right to all patents and copyrights that accrue during performance of this Agreement.

d. If the Recipient qualifies as a state university under Florida law, then, pursuant to section 1004.23, Florida Statutes, any invention conceived exclusively by the employees of the Recipient shall become the sole property of the Recipient. In the case of joint inventions, that is inventions made jointly by one or more employees of both parties hereto, each party shall have an equal, undivided interest in and to such joint inventions. The Division shall retain a perpetual, irrevocable, fully-paid, nonexclusive license, for its use and the use of its contractors of any resulting patented, copyrighted or trademarked work products, developed solely by the Recipient, under this Agreement, for Florida government purposes.

(24) LEGAL AUTHORIZATION.

The Recipient certifies that it has the legal authority to receive the funds under this Agreement and that its governing body has authorized the execution and acceptance of this Agreement. The Recipient also certifies that the undersigned person has the authority to legally execute and bind Recipient to the terms of this Agreement.

(25) ASSURANCES.

The Recipient shall comply with any Statement of Assurances incorporated as Attachment C.

This is a reimbursement grant agreement to accomplish the scope identified in the laws, statutes, regulations, and this Agreement. It is not subject to adjustment due to the actual cost experience of the Recipient in the performance of the deliverables and requirements listed in the agreement. Prior to payment, tasks, deliverables, and reimbursement requests are subject to review and acceptance by Florida Division of Emergency Management.

Purpose

The intent of this Grant is to sustain the Statewide US&R capabilities to prepare for and respond to disasters throughout the State of Florida by providing funding in support of the eight (8) Florida Urban Search & Rescue and thirty-nine (39) Light Technical Rescue Teams. Funding for this purpose was appropriated by the Florida Legislature.

Scope

The Recipient will use the award amount to reimburse expenditures in one spending category: Sustainment. Sustainment consists of maintenance of specialized equipment, plus replacement and enhancement of equipment and personal protective items listed in Attachment J. Broadly, the qualifying sub-categories of Sustainment expenditures are listed below:

Sub-Category	Description
Personal Protective Equipment	Abrasion protection, uniforms, hydration packs, eye protection, foul weather gear, passport accountability, ID vests, chainsaw chaps.
Equipment Repair and Maintenance	Fluids, fuels, mechanical work for small engines, boat fuel and lubricants.
Logistical Support	Saw blades, batteries, MREs, water, and other perishable or disposables, warehouse fans, water rescue support equipment
Cannie Equipment	Kennels, transportation, and supplies.

Water Rescue Cache	Masks, suits, tools, PFDs, other water safety equipment, boat replacement, boat connectors, etc.
Tools and Equipment	Hand tools, straps, marking paint, other small tools, and individual equipment. Equipment necessary to support state communications.
Medical Cache	Patient care equipment, basic and advanced life support supplies.
Planning & Technology	Personnel and Asset inventory program, office supplies for mapping, printing, and accountability.

Requirements

It will be the responsibility of the Recipient to ensure expenditures are not duplicates of items purchased under surfside, cache rehab, DHS UASI Grant, or DHS SHSGP Grant funding. Any purchases which are duplicates cannot be submitted for reimbursement to the Division under this grant. If any purchases are reimbursed which are duplicates of items purchased under surfside, cache rehab, DHS UASI Grant, or DHS SHSGP Grant funding, the amount reimbursed must be returned to the Division. The Division will partner with the State Fire Marshall's Office as Subject Matter Experts to verify Deliverables to ensure duplicate purchases are not being submitted for reimbursement under this grant.

The Division will use Salesforce as its Grant's Management platform for this grant. All Deliverables, reports, and financial activities (reimbursement requests) must be submitted to Salesforce via the Division's established protocols. These protocols will be sent to the Recipient as a Salesforce External User Guide, and additional Salesforce training may be provided to the Recipient by the Division.

Thus, if a Recipient has paid for an item but delivery will not take place until after August 29, 2023, the Closeout Report will be due 60 days following the item delivery.

Quarterly Reports are the basis for a reimbursement claim under this grant agreement. Quarterly Reports must be submitted at least once quarterly based on the Deliverable Due-Date Schedule; however multiple

Quarterly Reports may be submitted per-quarter if the Recipient wishes to make additional requests for reimbursement. At a minimum, a Quarterly Report must contain a complete Attachment G - US&R Grant Report Cover Sheet. If the Recipient wishes to claim reimbursement for Sustainment expenses, the Recipient's Quarterly Report must also include:

1. A correctly filled-out Attachment H – Reimbursement Request Breakdown
2. Receipts of each Sustainment Item claimed with the Item # clearly written in the corner

The Quarterly Report may also include any other supporting documentation to help verify the veracity and appropriateness of a purchase. All supporting documentation must have the Item # written in the corner for tracking and verification purposes.

To correctly fill-out Attachment H, the Recipient must assign each purchase an Item #, starting at 1 and ascending (2, 3, 4, etc.). This is for tracking and verification purposes. This Item # will be unique for the purchase and must be written on the corner of the purchase receipt and included on Attachment I – Ownership Certification Form. Additionally, the Item # must be submitted in the corner of any supporting documentation for the purchase. After assigning an Item #, the Recipient will need to fill-out the relevant information for the Item #. Date(s) Item Received will be left blank until the Recipient takes possession of the Item #. Attachment H will be a living document that is continually added-to throughout the life cycle of the grant, updated any time there is a change or a reimbursement is added and submitted to the Division in Quarterly Reports.

Once the Recipient takes possession of the Item, the Recipient will need to submit their updated Attachment H in their next Quarterly Report, as well as Attachment I – Ownership Certification Form. This form certifies final ownership and possession of the Item. Every purchase submitted for reimbursement under this grant must have the Date(s) Item Received field filled out on Attachment H, and a complete Attachment I submitted.

Salesforce

Deliverables shall be submitted on the Division's Salesforce platform in the Deliverable object. The Recipient's Quarterly/Closeout Report shall be compiled by the Recipient into a single document wherever possible when submitting for deliverable approval. The deliverable shall include all required forms and supporting documents sufficient to verify the accuracy of deliverable completion.

Following review and approval of the deliverable by the Division's assigned Grant Manager, the Recipient shall submit a reimbursement request on the Division's Salesforce Platform on the Financial Activity object. In the Financial Activity, the Recipient shall attach their approved deliverable in the "Deliverable" field, and upload the full Quarterly Report deliverable submission.

Financial Consequences

Failure to successfully complete each of the required tasks, as demonstrated by the failure to satisfy the applicable deliverables, shall result in the following penalty:

- Reduction of the maximum payable amount based on the applicable percentage of each task not successfully completed.

Failure to submit deliverables by the due date may result in the following penalty:

- Reduction of the deliverable payment amount to the Recipient by 5% for each thirty (30) calendar day period in which the deliverable is not submitted.

If, because of circumstances beyond the Recipient's control, the Recipient is unable to successfully perform a task required by this Agreement, then the Recipient shall notify the Division in writing

immediately to request a due date extension. If the Division agrees that the inability to perform was directly due to circumstances beyond the control of the Recipient, then the Division will consider waiving the imposition of a financial consequence.

Subject: Amendment #2 to Amended Medical Clinic Services Contract Between North Collier Fire and AccessMD/Dr. Paul Hobaica

Objective

Obtain Board approval of Amendment #2 to the Amended Medical Clinic Services Contract (“contract”) between the District and AccessMD/Dr. Paul Hobaica.

Background Information

The contract between the District and AccessMD/Dr. Paul Hobaica allows for the annual adjustment of eligible patients to be serviced by the clinic. The District wishes to approve Amendment #2 to the contract to update the number of eligible patients for the 2023-2024 fiscal year.

Considerations

The District has not increased the per person fee for eligible patients since 2015. In light of recent inflationary trends, a per person fee increase to cover increased clinic costs for its services to our employees including lab work, x-rays, labor, etc. is realistic.

The District recommends amending the contract to acknowledge the following changes:

- 1) Per annum Compensation increase from \$265,080.00 to \$301,862.00 based upon:
 - a. The number of eligible employees increasing from 257 to 268.
 - b. The per eligible employee fee of \$940 increasing by 10% to \$1,034.
 - c. The number of eligible retirees decreases from 47 to 45. Eligible retirees include those that live in the area and are covered under the District’s health care plan.
 - d. The per eligible retiree fee of \$500 increasing by 10% to \$550.

Fiscal Impact

Increasing the total number of eligible patients and the per person fee by 10% results in an increase of \$36,782 for per annum compensation for fiscal year 2023-2024. This increase is budgeted for in the 2023-2024 budget.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Board approve Amendment #2 to the medical clinic services contract between the District and AccessMD/Dr. Paul Hobaica.

This SECOND AMENDMENT entered into and effective this 1ST day of October 2023 by and between Paul Hobaica, M.D., hereinafter referred to as “Dr. Hobaica,” AccessMD, P.L., hereinafter referred to as the “Medical Clinic”, and the North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District, hereinafter referred to as the “District”, and collectively referred to as the “Parties”.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the District, Dr. Hobaica, and the Medical Clinic entered into the North Collier Fire Control and Recue District Second Amended and Restated Medical Clinic Services Contract on October 1, 2021 (“Agreement”); and

WHEREAS, the Agreement provides a process to annually determine the number of Eligible Patients that should be included on the Eligible Patient List; and

WHEREAS, Paragraph D. of Section 6, Compensation, provides that the Eligible Patient List is used to calculate the proposed annual fee and that any proposed increase in Compensation must be approved by the District’s Board of Fire Commissioners and the subsequent execution of an amendment to this Contract; and

WHEREAS, Section 11 of the Agreement provides that it may only be amended by a writing duly executed by the Parties; and

WHEREAS, on November 17, 2022, the District determined that for Fiscal Year 2022-2023, there was an increase in the number of Eligible Patients; and Compensation was increased to \$265,080.00 per annum as executed in the First Amendment to North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District Second Amended and Restated Medical Clinic Services Contract; and

WHEREAS, for the Fiscal Year 2023-2024, the District has determined that the number of Eligible Patients that should be included on the Eligible Patient List has increased;

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to amend the Agreement to revise the Compensation owed to the Medical Clinic due to the increase in the number of Eligible Patients.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual terms and covenants and conditions contained herein, the Parties hereby mutually agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. Paragraph B. of Section 6, Compensation, is revised to read:

Section 6. COMPENSATION.

B. The District shall pay the Medical Clinic the sum of \$301,862.00, per annum ("Compensation"), which shall be paid in equal monthly installments of \$25,155.17 by the 15th of each month, as full compensation for providing the District with the services identified in Category A Services listed in Exhibit A to Eligible Patients. The District shall also pay the Medical Clinic for the Category C Services listed in Exhibit C ("Additional Services") within thirty (30) days of receiving an invoice from the Medical Clinic for such services.

2. The terms, covenants and conditions set forth in the Agreement that have not been specifically amended herein, will continue in existence, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed, and will remain binding upon the parties hereto.

207.1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to provide for internal controls for the management of North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District (“District”) deposits to prevent mishandling of funds and to safeguard against loss. Strong internal controls are also designed to protect employees from inappropriate charges of mishandling funds by defining responsibilities in the cash handling process.

207.2 GENERAL

The District’s deposits are held in qualified public depositories pursuant to Chapter 280, Fla. Stat. (Security for Public Deposits Act), as may be amended. Under the Act, all qualified public depositories are required to pledge eligible collateral having a market value equal to or greater than the average daily or monthly balance of all public deposits, multiplied by the depository’s collateral pledging level. The pledging level may range from 50% to 125% depending upon the depository’s financial condition and establishment period. All collateral must be deposited with an approved financial institution. Any losses to public depositors are covered by applicable deposit insurance, sale of securities pledged as collateral and, if necessary, assessments against other qualified public depositories of the same type as the depository in default.

207.3 QUALIFIED DEPOSITORY ACCOUNTS

Florida Statutes authorize the District to invest any surplus public funds into the following types of accounts:

- the Local Government Surplus Funds Trust Fund;
- any intergovernmental investment pool authorized pursuant to the Section 163.01, Fla. Stat. (Florida Interlocal Cooperation Act of 1969), as may be amended;
- Securities and Exchange Commission registered money market funds with the highest credit quality rating;
- from a nationally recognized rating agency;
- direct obligations of the United States Treasury;
- interest bearing time deposits or savings accounts in qualified public depositories as defined in Section 280.02, Fla. Stat., as may be amended; and/or
- other investments authorized by law or ordinance for a special district.

The District will file the Public Depositor Report to the State Treasurer’s Office no later than November 15th of each year as required by Chapter 280, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.

207.4 PETTY CASH

The District may establish one or more petty cash accounts for regular operations.

Regular operations include cash payments for goods and services related to District operation and maintenance which do not exceed the amount identified as the maximum amount per disbursement from Petty Cash pursuant to *District Policy 213-Purchasing*. Such goods and services include, but are not limited to, such items as station or equipment supplies, materials or costs for meetings and seminars conducted or sponsored by the District including refreshments and meals, and reimbursement of eligible prescription reimbursements. Each petty cash fund will be set at an amount no greater than \$1,500 annually unless authorized by the Board of Fire Commissioners.

The Petty Cash Custodian, as designated by the Chief Financial Officer, will be responsible for Petty Cash. Petty cash is to be maintained in a secure manner. Cashing of any checks is prohibited.

207.5 INVESTMENT MANAGER COMMUNICATIONS

Pursuant to Section 215.855, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, any written communication made by an investment manager in which such manager invests public funds on behalf of the District must include the following disclaimer in a conspicuous location if such communication discusses social, political, or ideological interests; subordinates the interests of the company's shareholders to the interest of another entity; or advocates for the interest of an entity other than the company's shareholders:

The views and opinions expressed in this communication are those of the sender and do not reflect the views and opinions of the people of the State of Florida.

Further pursuant to Section 215.855, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, the contract with an investment manager may be unilaterally terminated at the option of the District if the investment manager does not include the disclaimer required above. This applies to contracts between the District and an investment manager executed, amended or renewed on or after July 1, 2023.

As used in this section, the term "investment manager" means a private sector company that offers one or more investment products or services to the District and that has the discretionary investment authority for direct holdings.

207.6 INVESTMENT DECISIONS

Pursuant to Section 215.415, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, investment decisions of public funds must be based solely on pecuniary factors and may not subordinate the interests of the

people of the State of Florida to other objectives, including sacrificing investment return or undertaking additional risk to promote any nonpecuniary factor. The weight given to any pecuniary factor must appropriately reflect a prudent assessment of its impact n risk or returns.


As used in this section, the term “pecuniary factor” means a factor that the Board of Fire Commissioners (“Board”), or in the delegation to the Fire Chief by the Board, the Fire Chief prudently determines is expected to have a material effect on the risk or returns of an investment based on appropriate investment horizons consistent with applicable investment objectives and funding policy. The term does not include the consideration of the furtherance of any social, political or ideological interest.

212.1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to establish a process for fair, equitable, and open procurements; to ensure the North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District (“District”) receives high-quality, economical goods and services in a timely manner; and to ensure public confidence in the District’s procurement process.

212.2 DELEGATION OF PROCUREMENT RESPONSIBILITIES

The District’s procurement responsibilities are to be directed by the Fire Chief or authorized designee with the assistance of the Chief Financial Officer or authorized designee. The Chief Financial Officer will be responsible for maintaining complete files for the purchase of goods and services. The Board of Fire Commissioners (“Board”), the Fire Chief, or the Chief Financial Officer may authorize the purchase of goods or services, issue competitive solicitations, and execute contracts, dictated by the dollar amount of the purchase and in accordance with this Policy.

Before entering into any agreement, contract, or arrangement that obligates the District to pay for goods or services or otherwise perform in some manner, proper procedures must be followed in accordance with this Policy. Unless authorized by the Board, the Fire Chief, or the Chief Financial Officer, no person may make purchases or enter into any contract involving the expenditure of District funds.

The Fire Chief or authorized designee will be responsible for examining goods or services received by the District, and the Chief Financial Officer will be responsible for approving such goods or services for payment under the terms of an executed contract.

212.3 DEFINITIONS

For purposes of this Policy, except as in Sections 212.16 (Emergency Purchases) and 212.17 (Sole Source Purchases) herein, the following terms have the following meanings:

“Competitive solicitation” means the process of requesting and receiving sealed bids, proposals, or replies submitted by responsible vendors or firms in accordance with the terms of a competitive process, regardless of the method of procurement, and includes procurements through ITB, ITN, RFI, RFP and RFQ.

“Invitation to Bid” or “ITB” means a written or electronically posted solicitation for competitive sealed bids for the purchase of goods or services when the District is capable of specifically defining the scope of work for which services are required or when the District can define the actual goods required.

“Invitation to Negotiate” or “ITN” means a written or electronically posted solicitation for competitive sealed replies to select one or more vendors with whom to commence negotiations for the procurement of goods or services.

“Request for Information” or “RFI” means a written or electronically posted request made to vendors for information concerning goods or services. Responses to an RFI is not an offer and may not be accepted by the District in the form of a binding contract.

“Request for Proposal” or “RFP” means a written or electronically posted solicitation for competitive sealed proposals for goods or services. An RFP is used when it is not practicable for the District to specifically define the scope of work for which the goods or services is required, and when the District is requesting that a responsible vendor propose goods or services to meet the specifications of the solicitation document. Evaluation of a proposal or response is based on prior established criteria which involves more than price. The RFP will provide evaluation criteria and state the relative importance of price and applicable evaluation criteria.

“Request for Quote” or “RFQ” means an oral or written informal request for written pricing or services information from a vendor for goods or services.

“Responsive bid” or “responsive proposal” or “responsive reply” means a bid, proposal, or reply submitted by a responsible vendor that conforms in all material aspects to the solicitation.

“Responsible bidder” or “responsible vendor” means a bidder or vendor that has submitted a bid, proposal, or reply that conforms in all material aspects to the solicitation.

“Substitution” means shipment of an item that materially conforms to the specifications but is technically different from the solicitation.

212.4 PURCHASING CATEGORIES

For purchases other than those outlined in Sections 212.16 (Emergency Purchases) and 212.17 (Sole Source Purchases) or otherwise excepted in this policy, the following Purchasing Categories are established for purchases of goods and services. The Board may adjust the amounts of the Purchasing Categories from time to time, based upon the rate of change of a nationally recognized price index.

Purchasing Category	Purchase Dollar Amount
Category 1	\$0.01 - \$10,000
Category 2	\$10,000.01 - \$100,000
Category 3	\$100,000.01 and above, not including vehicles and marine vessels
Category 4	\$100,000.01 and above for vehicles and marine vessels

Minimum procurement process requirements are applicable for each Purchasing Category and are specified below. The Fire Chief or authorized designee will have discretion to determine whether procurement of a good or service requires a more comprehensive process as described in a higher category.

Except for emergency purchase made as provided in Section 212.16 (Emergency Purchases) herein, Board approval is required prior to the procurement of goods and services in Purchasing Category 3.

For purchases more than \$100,000.00, regardless of the Purchasing Category, or if budgeted or non-budgeted, the Fire Chief will approve and/or acknowledge via a designated process established by the Chief Financial Officer.

212.5 PROCESS FOR CATEGORY 1 PURCHASES

For purchases of goods and services in Purchasing Category 1, the District will obtain at least one (1) quote or relevant pricing information pursuant to an RFQ. RFQs may be issued and quotes may be obtained by any District employee but must be forwarded with the requisite purchase order to the Chief Financial Officer for review, approval, and processing. Approval by the Chief Financial Officer is required prior to the procurement and purchase of goods and services for Category 1 purchases.

Petty cash purchases (the purchase of materials, goods, or supplies by a District employee) that must be reimbursed by the District are limited to \$200 as per *District Policy 213-Purchasing* and are exempt from this Policy.

212.6 PROCESS FOR CATEGORY 2 PURCHASES

For purchases of goods and services in Purchasing Category 2, the District will obtain at least three (3) quotes or relevant pricing information pursuant to an RFQ. Each quote should detail the quantity and description of the goods or services to be purchased. The Chief Financial Officer will then review the quotes and obtain any necessary employee input relating to which vendor has submitted the best, responsive, and responsible quote meeting the specifications of the RFQ. Quotes for Category 2 purchases must have the name and signature of the individual

person providing the quote or must reference the website where quote was obtained.

212.7 PROCESS FOR CATEGORY 3 PURCHASES

For purchases of goods and services in Purchasing Category 3, the minimum procurement process is through an ITB, ITN, RFI, or RFP (“competitive solicitation”).

1) Legal Advertisements

Unless otherwise required by law or when emergency purchases are being made in accordance with Section 212.16 (Emergency Purchases), the District will publicly advertise the competitive solicitation no less than twenty-eight (28) days prior to the bid/proposal opening for ITBs and RFIs, no less than twenty-eight (28) days prior to the bid/proposal opening for RFPs or ITNs. The public advertisement will appear in a newspaper of general circulation, on the District’s website, and will be posted at the District’s Headquarters. The advertisement will include a description of the goods, services and/or qualifications sought and the time and date for submittal of bids/proposals. The public notice will also contain a reference to the protest provisions set forth in Section 212.13 (Protests). The District may also transmit the competitive solicitation to vendors it believes may be interested in responding.

If the Fire Chief, with concurrence of the Board at its next regularly scheduled meeting, determines that unusual circumstances exist such that delaying the competitive solicitation to provide an opportunity for newspaper advertising would be detrimental to the District’s interests, the Fire Chief will post the competitive solicitation on the District’s website and at the District’s Headquarters, including with particularity the conditions and circumstances requiring a waiver of the advertising requirement.

Advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation is not required for the reissuance of a competitive solicitation, provided that (1) the District advertised the original competitive solicitation in a newspaper of general circulation; and (2) the District mails notice of the reissuance of the competitive solicitation to all vendors that were mailed notice of the original solicitation, and to all vendors that responded to the competitive solicitation, excluding those vendors that responded with an indication of no interest in responding.

2) Conditions to be included in the Competitive Solicitation

All competitive solicitations must contain the criteria to be used in determining the acceptability and evaluation of the bids/proposals. Bids/proposals will be prepared with the appropriate terms and conditions and detailed specifications, including

items to be bid, units, and total (or estimated) quantity desired; instructions for bidding/responding; delivery information; and any special requirements for bidding/responding. Assigned dates and times for pre-bid/proposal meetings, if any, and for the public bid/proposal opening will also be included. If a mandatory pre-bid/proposal conference is to be conducted, an employee from the bidder's firm will be in attendance or its bid/proposal will be rejected. Bids/proposals will be publicly opened at the time designated in the competitive solicitation; however, the District may alter these dates, at its sole discretion, via the issuance of a modification to the competitive solicitation. The timing of release of sealed bids/proposals will be in accordance with applicable public records laws.

A bid/proposal must be submitted in accordance with the District's competitive solicitation requirements, and on the District's forms, signed by a legal officer of the company, and provide all requested information; otherwise, the bid/proposal is subject to rejection. Failure to properly execute the official signature page of the bid/proposal may result in automatic disqualification. Bidders are solely responsible for the costs associated with the submittal of their bids.

The entire bid/proposal, including a cover letter, all instructions and addenda, if any, and the actual bid/proposal form must be submitted intact in a sealed envelope, marked on the outside "sealed" and the competitive solicitation number and title. Failure to read or comply with the general information and specifications contained in the competitive solicitation will in no way relieve the vendor from its liabilities arising in the competitive solicitation.

3) Questions

Any questions to a competitive solicitation must be provided in writing in accordance with the competitive solicitation requirements. All written questions will be answered with responses posted on the District's website. Any District response that requires a modification to the competitive solicitation will be in the form of an addendum and posted on the District's website. All addenda issued will be deemed part of the competitive solicitation.

4) Modification of Bids/Proposals

A bidder may not modify its bid/proposal after it is submitted, except pursuant to an official negotiation as part of an ITN. The District, at its sole discretion, may correct mistakes in arithmetic or may waive minor irregularities in an otherwise responsive bid/proposal.

5) Withdrawal of Bids/Proposals

Requests for withdrawals of bids/proposals will be granted if received by the District, in writing, at any time before opening of the bids/proposals.

6) Right to Reject Bids/Proposals

The District reserves the right to reject any or all bids/proposals or to cancel negotiations. This statement will be included in every public notice and competitive solicitation.

7) Opening of Bids/Proposals

Bid/proposal opening will be public at the date and time and at the place specified in the competitive solicitation and as advertised in a newspaper of general circulation at least seven (7) days prior to the meeting. The opening will be conducted in accordance with the competitive solicitation. At a minimum, bids/proposals will be opened by a District employee and witnessed by at least one other District employee. Bid/proposal tabulation/scoring sheets will be completed simultaneously with the public opening of bids/proposals, whenever appropriate. Upon completion of tabulation/scoring, copies of tabulation/scoring sheets will be made available for inspection or copying by any interested party. The District employee must include his/her name and signature on his/her bid/proposal scoring sheet. The District employees that open the bid must include their names and signatures on the bid tabulation sheet.

212.7A PROCESS FOR CATEGORY 4 PURCHASES

For purchases of vehicles and marine vessels in Purchasing Category 4, the District will obtain at least three (3) quotes or relevant pricing information pursuant to an RFQ. Each quote should provide a detailed description of the vehicle or marine vessel to be purchased. The Chief Financial Officer and Assistant Chief of Essential Services will then review the quotes and obtain any necessary employee input relating to which vendor has submitted the best, responsive, and responsible quote meeting the specifications of the RFQ. Quotes for Category 4 purchases must have the name and signature of the individual person providing the quote or must reference the website where quote was obtained. The purchase recommendation will be provided to and approved by the Board of Fire Commissioners at a publicly held meeting.

212.8 CONTRACTS FOR AUDITING SERVICES

Auditing contracts will be awarded pursuant to the terms and conditions of the *District Policy 210-Auditor Selection*.

212.9 CONTRACTS FOR INSURANCE SERVICES

The District will obtain quotes or competitive bids on all insurance coverage held by the District every three (3) years, or at the direction of the Board. In determining which purchasing procedures apply, the thresholds established for purchasing categories 1, 2, and 3 in Section 212.4 (Purchasing Categories). herein will be used based upon the annual estimated cost for each type of coverage.

212.10 CONTRACTS FOR PUBLIC CONSTRUCTION WORKS

The District will follow the requirements in Section 255.20, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, from time to time, to competitively award to an appropriately licensed contractor each project to construct or improve a building, structure, or other public construction works that is estimated to cost more than \$300,000. For electrical work, the District will competitively award to an appropriately licensed contractor each project that is estimated to cost more than \$75,000. For purposes of this section, “competitively award” means to award contracts based on the submission of sealed bids, proposals submitted in response to a RFP, proposals submitted in response to a RFQ, or proposals submitted in response to an ITN.

This Section expressly allows contracts for construction management services, design/build contracts, continuation contracts based on unit prices, and any other contract arrangement with a licensed contractor. For purposes of this Section, cost includes the cost of all labor, except inmate labor, and the cost of equipment and materials to be used in the construction of the project.

The provisions of this Section do not apply to the following circumstances:

- 1) If the project is undertaken to replace, reconstruct, or repair an existing public building, structure, or other public construction works damaged or destroyed by a sudden unexpected turn of events such as an act of God, riot, fire, flood, accident, or other urgent circumstances, and such damage or destruction creates (a) an imminent danger to the public health or safety; (b) other loss to public or private property which requires emergency government action; or (c) an interruption of an essential governmental service.
- 2) If, after notice by publication in accordance with this Policy, the District does not receive any bids or proposals.
- 3) If the project is undertaken as repair or maintenance of an existing public facility. For the purposes of this paragraph, the term “repair” means a corrective action to restore an existing public facility to a safe and functional condition and the term “maintenance” means a preventive or corrective action to maintain an existing public facility in an operational state or to preserve the facility from failure or decline. Repair or maintenance include activities that are necessarily incidental to repairing or maintaining the facility. Repair or maintenance does not include the construction of any new building, structure, or other public construction works or any substantial addition,

extension, or upgrade to an existing public facility. Such additions, extensions, or upgrades will be considered substantial if the estimated cost of the additions, extensions, or upgrades included as part of the repair or maintenance project exceeds the threshold amount of more than \$300,000, or for electrical work, the project is estimated to cost more than \$75,000 and exceeds 20 percent of the estimated total cost of the repair or maintenance project using generally accepted cost-accounting principles that fully account for all costs associated with performing and completing the work, including employee compensation and benefits, equipment cost and maintenance, insurance costs, and materials. An addition, extension, or upgrade will not be considered substantial if it is undertaken pursuant to the conditions specified in subparagraph 1 of this Section. Repair and maintenance projects and any related additions, extensions, or upgrades may not be divided into multiple projects for the purpose of evading these requirements.

- 4) If the funding source of the project will be diminished or lost because the time required to competitively award the project after the funds become available exceeds the time within which the funding source must be spent.
- 5) If the District competitively awarded a project to a private sector contractor and the contractor abandoned the project before completion or the District terminated the contract.

If the project is to be awarded based on price, the contract must be awarded to the lowest qualified and responsive bidder in accordance with this Policy and applicable contract documents. The District may reserve the right to reject all bids and to rebid the project or elect not to proceed with the project. This Section is not intended to restrict the rights of the District to reject the low bid of a nonqualified or non-responsive bidder and to award the contract to any other qualified and responsive bidder

If the project uses an RFP or RFQ, it must be publicly advertised, and the contract must be awarded in accordance with this Policy. If the project is subject to competitive negotiations, the contract must be awarded in accordance with Section 287.055, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.

A construction project provided for in this Section may not be divided into more than one project for the purpose of evading the process outlined in this Section. This Section does not preempt the requirements of any small-business or disadvantaged-business enterprise program or any local-preference resolution, once the District performs a disparity study that finds that there is disparity between the utilization and availability of minority- and women-owned businesses or small businesses.

Any contractor may be considered ineligible to bid by the governmental entity if the contractor has been found guilty by a court of any violation of federal labor or employment tax laws

regarding subjects such as safety, tax withholding, workers' compensation, reemployment assistance or unemployment tax, social security and Medicare tax, wage or hour, or prevailing rate laws within the past five (5) years.

The threshold amount of \$300,000 for construction or \$75,000 for electrical work must be adjusted by the percentage change in the Engineering News-Record's Building Cost Index from January 1, 2009, to January 1 of the year in which the project is scheduled to begin.

The District must specify in the contract for public buildings and other structures that lumber, timber, and other forest products produced and manufactured in this state must be used, if wood is a component of the public work, and if such products are available and their price, fitness, and quality are equal. This does not apply (1) to plywood specified for monolithic concrete forms; (2) if the structural or service requirements for timber for a particular job cannot be supplied by native species; or (3) if the construction is financed in whole or in part from federal funds with the requirement that there be no restrictions as to species or place of manufacture.

212.11 CONTRACTS FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

The District will follow the procedural requirements in Section 287.055, Fla. Stat., Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act ("CCNA"), as may be amended, to competitively select firms to provide professional architectural, engineering, landscape architectural, or registered surveying and mapping services.

1) Public Announcement, Competitive Selection, and Negotiation

- a) **Service or Study Solicitation.** The District will publicly announce all requirements for professional architectural, engineering, landscape architectural, or surveying and mapping services ("professional services") and to negotiate such contracts on the basis of demonstrated competence and qualifications at fair and reasonable prices. Such service or study solicitations will be publicly announced on each occasion when professional services must be purchased for a project the basic construction cost of which is estimated by the District to exceed the threshold amount of \$325,000, or for a planning or study activity when the fee for professional services exceeds the threshold amount of \$35,000, except in cases of valid public emergencies certified by the Board. In the procurement of professional services, persons interested in providing such services may be required to submit a statement of qualifications, a proposal, or other such information consistent with Section 287.055, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.
- b) **Scope of Project Requirements.** Written project requirements will be developed and made available to interested parties. The scope of project

requirements will indicate the nature and scope of the professional services needed, including but not limited to, the following:

- i. the location and general purpose of the service or study;
 - ii. the objectives of the study or service;
 - iii. the estimated period of time needed for the service or study;
 - iv. the estimated cost of the project;
 - v. whether the proposed study or service would duplicate any prior or existing study or service;
 - vi. a list of current contracts or prior services or studies that are related to the proposed study or service; and
 - vii. criteria upon which project statements of qualifications, proposals, or other such required submittals will be evaluated, including submittal rules and formats (e.g., page limitations, font sizes, electronic or paper copies, etc.).
- c) Public Announcement. The public announcement for professional services will be in a uniform and consistent manner through means intended to reach a wide audience of vendors potentially qualified to conduct such services. In order to accomplish this requirement, the District will make the public announcement for professional services by publication in a newspaper of general circulation and an electronic posting on the District's website. The public announcement will be accompanied by an invitation for firms to submit an indication of interest in performing the professional services; how they may obtain the scope of project requirements and other selected project information; and the period of time within which such indications of interest will be accepted, which period will be not less than twenty-eight (28) calendar days from the date of the public announcement.
- d) Review of Public Announcement and Project Requirements. The public announcement and scope of project requirements will be approved by the Fire Chief or his or her authorized designee prior to public distribution of these items.
- e) Re-Solicitation. If the District receives indications of interest from less than three (3) vendors, it may resolicit indications of interest from all

firms previously solicited and from such additional firms as it may deem advisable. Thereafter, the District may proceed to consider those vendors responding to the solicitation or re-solicitation.

- f) Modifications Prohibited. After the publicized submission time and date, indications of interest will not be modified or allowed to be modified in any manner. Notwithstanding, a firm that has submitted an indication of interest by responding to a solicitation may withdraw its indication of interest if a re-solicitation occurs in accordance with paragraph (e) above.
- g) Exemptions. This section will not apply to a professional service contract for a project whose basic construction cost is estimated by the agency to be \$325,000 or less, or for a planning or study activity when the fee for professional services is \$35,000 or less or in cases of valid public emergency certified by the Fire Chief. This section will not apply to any requirement for professional services if a continuing contract to provide such services is in effect, a determination is made to utilize the continuing contract to obtain such services, and such professional services are below the statutory thresholds for a continuing contract.
- h) Consultant Selection. For each solicitation in which a public announcement is made, the Fire Chief or authorized designee will appoint a Professional Services Evaluation Committee (“PSEC”) to review and evaluate submittals and make recommendations on the selection of professional services. The PSEC will include no less than three (3) and no more than five (5) voting members. Non-voting advisory staff may be appointed to assist the PSEC by the Fire Chief as needed. PSEC voting members will generally consist of District employees, but may include others when deemed appropriate by the Fire Chief. The PSEC will be appointed prior to the public announcement being made.
- i) Evaluation. Following a determination by the Chief Financial Officer, or his or her authorized designee, that the written submittals of qualifications, proposals, performance data, and other information complies with the requirements of the public announcement, including being timely and properly received, the submittals will be evaluated by the PSEC. The Chief Financial Officer, or his or her authorized designee, will assimilate submittal materials and disseminate to the PSEC members. A minimum of one (1) PSEC meeting will be held to review and rank submittals. All PSEC meetings will be conducted in accordance with Chapter 286.011, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, the Florida Sunshine Law, as may be amended. PSEC voting members will refrain from any

selection-related discussions with other committee members outside of a PSEC meeting.

The PSEC will determine qualifications, interest, and availability by reviewing all written responses properly and timely received that express an interest in performing the professional services. The PSEC determinations will be based upon the following considerations:

- i. competence, including technical education and training or project personnel;
- ii. experience in the kind of project to be undertaken;
- iii. projected workload and availability of adequate personnel, equipment, and facilities;
- iv. the extent of repeat business of the vendor;
- v. past record of professional accomplishments;
- vi. office location proximity to the District's geographical boundaries;
- vii. past record of performance on District projects; and
- viii. other applicable project specific factors determined by the District prior to the issuance of the public announcement.

Based on application of evaluation criteria to the written submittals, the PSEC will prepare a ranked short-list of at least three (3) firms determined to be most qualified to conduct the services requested. At the discretion of the PSEC, all firms on the ranked short-list may be interviewed, and re-ranked based on results of the interviews.

The final ranked short-list will be submitted to the Fire Chief for consideration, and upon approval, contract negotiation will be initiated or in the alternative, the Fire Chief is authorized to present the ranked short-list to the Board for consideration and approval for contract negotiations.

- j) Contract Negotiations. Upon approval of the ranked short-list by either the Fire Chief or the Board, contract negotiations with the highest ranked firm on the short-list will begin. Negotiations will be conducted by the

Fire Chief or his or her authorized designee(s), hereinafter referred to as “District negotiators.”

- i. If the District is unable to negotiate a satisfactory contract with the firm considered to be the most qualified at a price the District determines to be fair, competitive, and reasonable, negotiations with that firm must be formally terminated. The District will then undertake negotiations with the second most qualified firm. Failing accord with the second most qualified firm, the District must terminate negotiations. The agency will then undertake negotiations with the third most qualified firm. If the District is unable to negotiate a satisfactory contract with any of the selected firms, the District will select additional firms in the order of their competence and qualification and continue negotiations in accordance with this Policy until an agreement is reached.
 - ii. The negotiated contract, including scope of project and fees, will be submitted to the Chief Financial Officer for administrative approval by the Fire Chief and preparation of recommendation to the Board. Nothing in this section will prohibit the Board from rejecting the negotiated contract and directing District staff to resolicit the services.
- k) Truth-in-Negotiation Certificate. For all lump sum or cost-plus-fixed-fee professional service contracts, the District will require the firm receiving the award to execute a truth-in-negotiation certificate that meets the requirements of Section 287.055(5), Fla. Stat., as may be amended.
- l) Prohibition Against Contingent Fees. Each contract entered into by the District for professional services will contain a prohibition against contingent fees that meets the requirements of Section 287.055(6), Fla. Stat., as may be amended.
- m) Continuing Contracts. Nothing in this section will be construed to either prohibit continuing contracts for professional services between a firm and the District or waive the applicability of Section 287.055, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.

212.12 DESIGN-BUILD CONTRACTS

Design-Build contracts may be awarded in accordance with the provisions of this subsection.

- 1) Definitions. For purposes of this subsection:

- a) A “design-build firm” means a partnership, corporation, or other legal entity which:
 - i. Is certified under Section 489.119, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, to engage in contracting through a certified or registered general contractor or a certified or registered building contractor as the qualifying agent; and
 - ii. Is certified under Section 471.023, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, to practice or offer to practice engineering; certified under Section 481.219, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, to practice or offer to practice architecture; or certified under Section 481.319, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, to practice or offer to practice landscape architecture.
 - b) A “design-build contract” means a single contract with a Design-Build Firm for the design and construction of a public construction project.
 - c) A “design criteria package” means a concise, performance-oriented drawings or specifications for the public construction project. The purpose of the design criteria package is to furnish sufficient information so as to permit design-build firms to prepare a bid or a response to the District’s competitive solicitation, or to permit the District to enter into a negotiated design-build contract. The design criteria package will specify such performance-based criteria for the public construction project including, but not limited to, the legal description of the site, survey information concerning the site, interior space requirements, material quality standards, schematic layouts and conceptual design criteria of the project, cost or budget estimates, design and construction schedules, site development requirements, provisions for utilities, stormwater retention and disposal, and parking requirements, as may be applicable to the project.
 - d) A “design criteria professional” means a firm who holds a current Certificate of Registration under Chapter 481, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, to practice architecture or landscape architecture or a firm who holds a current certificate as a registered engineer under Chapter 471, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, to practice engineering and who is employed by or under contract to the Authority for the providing of professional architect services, landscape architect services, or engineering services in connection with the preparation of the design criteria package.
- 2) The Design Criteria Package will be prepared and sealed by a design criteria professional employed by or retained by the District in accordance with this Policy. A design criteria professional who has been selected to prepare a design criteria package will not be

eligible to render services under a design-build contract executed pursuant to the design criteria package prepared by the design criteria professional.

- 3) Procedures for the award of design-build contracts. Procedures for the award of design-build contracts will include, at a minimum, the following:
 - a) Preparation of a design criteria package for the design and construction of the public construction project;
 - b) Qualification and selection of no fewer than three (3) design-build firms as the most qualified, based on the qualifications, availability and past work of the firm, including partners or members thereof;
 - c) Criteria, procedures, and standards for the evaluation of design-build contract proposals or bids, based on price, technical and design aspects of the public construction project, weighted for the project;
 - d) Solicitation of competitive proposals, pursuant to a design criteria package, from those qualified design-build firms and the evaluation of the responses or bids submitted by those firms, based upon the evaluation criteria and procedures established prior to the solicitation of competitive proposals;
 - e) Consultation with an employed or retained design criteria professional concerning: 1) evaluation of the responses or bids submitted by the design-build firms; 2) supervision or approval by the District of the detailed working drawings of the project, and; 3) evaluation of the compliance of project construction with the design criteria package provided by the design criteria professional; and
 - f) In the case of public emergencies declared by the Board, any or all of the foregoing procedures may be waived, and negotiations are authorized with the best qualified design-build firm available at the time.

- 4) The Chief Financial Officer may develop additional procedures consistent with this Policy as may be necessary to implement the provisions of this subsection.

212.13 PROTESTS

This procedure applies to resolution of all protests arising from the competitive solicitation process. Notice of all District decisions concerning a competitive solicitation or award, will be electronically posted on the District's website. By submitting a bid/proposal, all bidders or offerors agree to the process set forth in this Policy.

- 1) Notice of Protest/Formal Written Protest
Any person adversely affected by a competitive solicitation will file a notice of protest, in writing, seventy-two (72) hours prior to the date and time on which bids/proposals are to be received and will file a formal written protest within ten (10) days after filing the notice of protest.

Any person adversely affected by the District's decision concerning a competitive solicitation or award, or any person adversely affected by the District's decision to reject all bids/proposals, will file a formal written protest within seventy-two (72) hours after the District's electronic posting of the notice of decision on its website.

No time will be added to the above time limits for mail service.

2) Contents of Formal Written Protest

The formal written protest will be printed or typewritten, and will contain:

- a) The name and address of the person or firm filing the protest and an explanation of how they are adversely affected;
- b) A statement of how and when the competitive solicitation, or notice of District decision or intended decision was received;
- c) A statement of all disputed issues of material fact, and if there are none, a statement so indicating;
- d) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, as well as the rules or statutes which entitle the protestor to relief;
- e) A demand for relief; and
- f) Any other information material to the protest.

3) Filing

All notice of protests and formal written protests will be filed with the District Clerk Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, during normal business hours. Filings may be submitted via hand delivery, U.S. Mail, or other delivery/courier service. Filings will not be accepted via email. A notice of protest or formal written protest is not timely filed unless received by the District within the prescribed time limit. Failure to file a notice of protest, if required, or a formal written protest within the time prescribed in this Policy will constitute a waiver of all claims.

4) Stay of Procurement

Upon receipt of a formal written protest that has been timely filed, the bid solicitation or contract award process will be stayed until the subject of the

protest is resolved by final action by the Board, unless the Fire Chief, with the concurrence of the Board, sets forth in writing particular facts and circumstances which require the continuation of the contract solicitation process through award without delay in order to avoid an immediate and serious threat or loss to the public health, safety, property, or welfare. Notice that a contract solicitation has been stayed will be given by either electronic mail or U.S. mail to all bidders.

5) Resolution of Formal Written Protest

The Fire Chief, or authorized designee, will consider and investigate all written protests in a timely manner. The District will provide an opportunity for the protestor to meet with the Fire Chief, or his or her authorized designee, to resolve the protest by mutual agreement within seven (7) days, excluding Saturday, Sunday, and holidays, of receipt of a formal written protest. The District may grant extensions of time to conduct this meeting for good cause shown.

If the subject of a protest is not resolved pursuant to this meeting, the Fire Chief will certify in writing that there was no resolution. The Fire Chief will make a recommendation to the Board, and the Board will then make a final decision to either uphold the recommendation, reject the recommendation and send it back for further action, reject all proposals, or do something other than what the Fire Chief has recommended.

212.14 SUBSTITUTION OF GOODS

Substitution of goods requires the approval of the Chief Financial Officer, or his or her authorized designee, prior to shipment. Any products delivered that do not meet specifications, or substitute products that are shipped without prior approval, will be returned to the vendor at the vendor's expense. When a shipment or product is returned, the vendor must make immediate replacement with acceptable merchandise or the District may seek all available remedies for default.

212.15 CONTRACT RENEWALS/CONTINUING CONTRACTS

If the District contemplates a renewal of a contract, the competitive solicitation will so state and will provide sufficient information, including the contract period(s) of renewal, to enable each vendor to submit an offer on the contract, including renewal(s). In such case, the contract award will be based on an evaluation of the bid/proposal for the entire contract period, including renewal(s). Contracts for goods may be renewed for an additional term not to exceed the original contract period unless the original contract period is twenty-four (24) months or less, in which case the contract may be renewed for up to three (3) one-year periods. Renewal of the contract will be by mutual agreement in writing and will be subject to the same terms

and conditions set forth in the initial contract. If the goods are purchased as a result of a competitive solicitation, the cost of any contemplated renewals will be included in the competitive solicitation. Renewals will be contingent upon the contractor's satisfactory performance, at the District's sole discretion.

The District will provide for legal counsel to review and approve the form of all contracts prior to their execution when appropriate, as determined by the Fire Chief or authorized designee.

212.16 EMERGENCY PURCHASES

The Board recognizes that circumstances may arise which make it impossible to obtain Board approval prior to making a purchase of goods or services. Emergency purchases are the expeditious purchase of goods or services to eliminate or reduce an imminent or existing threat to the public health, safety, or welfare of persons or property within the District and may be made without taking competitive bids. If possible, emergency purchases will be made with such competition as is practicable under the circumstances, at the discretion of the Fire Chief and will be made at the best possible price. Public construction works do not qualify for this provision and must be procured pursuant to Section 255.20, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, and Section 212.10 (Contracts for Public Construction Works) of this Policy.

In the event that a state of emergency is declared for Collier County by the United States President, the Florida Governor, the Collier County Board of County Commissioners, or the Board, the Fire Chief has the authority to approve without prior Board approval, the purchase of necessary goods or services due to the emergency declaration. The Fire Chief must approve the purchase prior to disbursement of funds.

For all purchases made within this section, the Chief Financial Officer will provide the Board with a summary of emergency purchases including the conditions and circumstances requiring a purchase under this Section at the next Board of Fire Commissioners meeting, and will include complete details surrounding the event(s) which created the emergency. The emergency purchase summary will be included in the consent agenda to be retroactively approved and ratified by the Board.

This provision in no way grants the Fire Chief authority to solely and alone sign District checks as provided for in *District Policy 2.08 Check-ACH-EFT Authorization*.

212.17 SOLE SOURCE PURCHASES

"Sole source" means a purchase that occurs when research has determined that there is only one potential vendor for a good or service. A purchase may be made, or a contract may be awarded without competition when the Fire Chief determines, in writing, after conducting a good faith review of available sources, that there is only one available source for the required supply, service, or construction item. However, if the good or service is available from a sole

source and total cost is in excess of the threshold for Purchasing Category 2, the purchase may be excepted from competitive solicitation by the Board, in writing, upon the filing of a certification by the Fire Chief stating the conditions and circumstances requiring the purchase. This certification will set forth the purpose and need, and why the commodity is the only one that will produce the required results. The Chief Financial Officer will ensure that negotiations are conducted, as appropriate, as to price, delivery, and terms. A record of sole source procurements will be maintained as a public record and will list each vendor's name, the amount and type of each contract, a listing of the item(s) procured under each contract, and the number of each purchase order. Due to the uniqueness of real property, contracts for the acquisition of leasehold interests in real property will generally be considered as a sole source procurement and awarded in accordance with this provision. The Chief Financial Officer may recommend, and the Board may direct, the award of contracts in accordance with other provisions of this Policy or other procedures designed to promote competition and otherwise fulfill the intent of this Policy under appropriate circumstances. Notwithstanding, nothing in this Policy will supersede Sections 212.16 (Emergency Purchases) and 212.17 (Sole Source Purchases).

212.18 PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

Except as provided in Section 212.17 (Sole Source Purchases), because differences in price may only be a minor concern compared to qualitative considerations, professional services are exempt from competitive solicitation requirements by the Board, unless the Board determines that such services should be competitively awarded. Such services include:

- 1) appraisal services;
- 2) auditing and accounting services;
- 3) consultants (planning, management, technologic, or scientific);
- 4) financial services (bond counsel, rating and underwriting, financial advising, actuarial, and investment services);
- 5) legal and legislative services (attorneys and legal professionals); and
- 6) medical services (medicine, psychiatry, dental, hospital, and other health professionals).

212.19 DEFAULT-REPROCUREMENT

In the event that a vendor fails to perform pursuant to contract terms and is found to be in default, the District may reprocure the goods or services. Reprocurement may be accomplished by first attempting to contract with the second lowest responsible

bidder/respondent. If the District fails to contract with the second lowest responsible bidder/respondent, it may attempt to contract with the next lowest responsible bidder/respondent sequentially until a vendor is found that is willing to perform at acceptable pricing under the competitive solicitation requirements. The District may also elect to reinstate the competitive solicitation process, as may be in its best interest as determined by the Fire Chief, or his or her authorized designee. The foregoing Section does not limit, waive, or exclude in any way the District's remedies against a defaulting vendor at law or in equity.

212.20 TERMINATION OF CONTRACT AND RESCISSION OF AWARD

Termination of any contract or rescission of any award must be made by the Board; and in all cases where the Board takes action, the Board will consider the Fire Chief's recommendation prior to termination or rescission, in consultation with the District's legal counsel.

212.21 EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

The District, in accordance with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252), as may be amended, and the Regulations of The Department of Commerce (15 CFR, Part 8), as may be amended, issued pursuant to such act, hereby notifies all vendors that it will affirmatively ensure that in any contract entered into pursuant to a competitive solicitation, minority business enterprises will be afforded full opportunity to submit proposals in response to this RFP and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in consideration for an award.

212.22 PUBLIC ENTITY CRIMES

Pursuant to Sections 287.133(2)(a) and (3)(a), Fla. Stat., as may be amended, a person or an affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of public building or public work, may not submit bids, proposals, or replies on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, for category two for a period of thirty-six (36) months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendors list.

212.23 DISCRIMINATORY VENDOR LIST

Pursuant to Section 287.134(2)(a) and (3)(a), Fla. Stat., as may be amended, an entity or affiliate who has been placed on the discriminatory vendor list may not submit a bid, proposal, or reply on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid,

proposal, or reply on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids, proposals, or replies on leases or real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity.

212.24 SCRUTINIZED COMPANIES

Pursuant to Section 287.135, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, a company that, at the time of bidding or submitting a proposal for a new contract or renewal of an existing contract, is on the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in Sudan List or the Scrutinized Companies with Activities in the Iran Petroleum Energy Sector List, created pursuant to Section 215.473, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, or has been engaged in business operations in Cuba or Syria, will be ineligible for, and may not bid on, submit a proposal for, or enter into or renew a contract with an agency or local governmental entity for goods or services of \$1 million or more. A vendor may not submit a proposal if it is on the aforementioned lists. By submitting a proposal, a vendor certifies that it is not on the aforementioned lists. Any contract awarded pursuant to a competitive solicitation may be cancelled by the District if a vendor is placed on any of the aforementioned lists.

212.25 CONTRACTOR QUALIFICATIONS

In order to be eligible to submit a bid/proposal for construction, renovation, repairs, modifications, demolition, or other work on a District project, a vendor under the jurisdiction of Chapters 399, 455, 489, or 633, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, must provide to the District evidence of the following qualifications:

- 1) Current state contractor's license certification or registration, as required by law; and
- 2) Current corporate registration, if the vendor is a domestic (Florida) corporation, or authority to transact business in the state of Florida if the potential bidder is a foreign (non-Florida) corporation, as required by law.

212.26 RESPONSIBLE VENDOR DETERMINATION

Respondent is hereby notified that Section 287.05701, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, requires that the District not request documentation of or consider a vendor's social, political, or ideological interests when determining if the vendor is a responsible vendor.

212.27 PUBLIC RECORDS

Sealed bids/proposals are not subject to the public records provisions of Section 119.07(1), Fla.

Stat., as may be amended, until such time as the District provides a notice of a decision or intended decision or within ten (10) days after the bid or proposal opening, whichever is earlier. The 10-day period does not include the date of the notice or opening. When the invitation to bid requires the bid or proposal to be placed in two separately sealed envelopes to be submitted simultaneously and not opened on the same date, the 10-day period begins the day after opening of the second envelope.

Once opened, all bids/proposals will become the property of the District and, at the sole discretion of the District, may not be returned to vendor. Any information, reports, or other materials given to, prepared, or submitted in response to a competitive solicitation will be subject to the provisions of the Public Records Act, Chapter 119, Fla. Stat., as may be amended. Any vendor claiming that its bid/proposal contains information that is exempt from Chapter 119, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, must clearly segregate and mark that specific information and provide the specific statutory citation for such exemption. Section 119.071(1)(b), Fla. Stat., as may be amended, exempts sealed bids/proposals from inspection, examination, and duplication until such time as the District issues a notice of intended decision pursuant to Section 120.57(3)(a), Fla. Stat., as may be amended, or within thirty (30) days after the bid/proposal opening, whichever comes first. This exemption is not waived by the public opening of the bids/proposals.

All vendors will be subject to the public records requirements of Chapter 119, Fla. Stat., as may be amended. The District has the right to request and obtain any and all documents pertaining to the purchase of goods and services. The District will require language to be included in all contracts for the purchase of goods and services that the vendor acknowledges and agrees to its responsibilities under Chapter 119, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.

212.278 COMPLIANCE WITH PROCUREMENT POLICY

By providing any goods or services to the District, a vendor agrees to comply with the provisions of this Policy. Failure of a vendor/contractor to comply with the terms of this Policy may be deemed as a default or breach of contract and provide cause for termination of the contract.

212.289 PARTICIPATION IN E-VERIFY SYSTEM


By providing any goods or services to the District, a vendor agrees to comply with Section 448.095, Fla. Stat., as may be amended. In accordance, beginning January 1, 2021, every public employer, contractor, and subcontractor will register with and use the E-Verify System to verify the work authorization status of all newly hired employees. Any arrangement or contract awarded for goods or services will be terminated by the District if the District has a good faith belief that a vendor thereof has knowingly violated this requirement.

301.1 PURPOSE

301.2 APPLICATION

This policy applies to all terms and conditions of employment, including, but not limited to: recruiting, hiring, placement, promotion, termination, layoff, recall, transfer, leaves of absence, compensation and training.

301.3 ANTI-HARASSMENT, DISCRIMINATION AND RETAILIAITON

The District expressly prohibits any form of employee harassment or discrimination based on any protected class. The District will not allow any form of retaliation against individuals who raise issues of equal employment opportunity.

301.4 COMPLAINTS


Harassment, discrimination and retaliation are unacceptable in any setting and should be reported right away to the Human Resources department - in person, via telephone or email.

302.1 PURPOSE

North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District (“District”) is committed to the fair and equal employment of individuals with disabilities under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the Americans with Disabilities Amendments Act (ADAAA). The ADA and ADAAA are federal laws that require employers to not discriminate against applicants and employees with disabilities and, when needed, to provide reasonable accommodations to applicants and employees who are qualified for a job, with or without reasonable accommodations, so that they may perform the essential job duties of the position.

302.2 DEFINITIONS

Disability: A physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities of the individual, a record of such an impairment, or being regarded as having such an impairment.

Major life activities: Term includes caring for oneself, performing manual tasks, seeing, hearing, eating, sleeping, walking, standing, lifting, bending, speaking, breathing, learning, reading, concentrating, thinking, communicating and working.

Major bodily functions: Term includes physical or mental impairment such as any physiological disorder or condition, cosmetic disfigurement or anatomical loss affecting one or more body systems, such as neurological, musculoskeletal, special sense organs, respiratory (including speech organs), cardiovascular, reproductive, digestive, genitourinary, immune, circulatory, hemic, lymphatic, skin and endocrine. Also covered are any mental or psychological disorders, such as intellectual disability, organic brain syndrome, emotional or mental illness and specific learning disabilities.

Substantially limiting: In accordance with the ADAAA final regulations, the determination of whether an impairment substantially limits a major life activity requires an individualized assessment, and an impairment that is episodic or in remission may also meet the definition of disability if it would substantially limit a major life activity when active. Some examples of these types of impairments may include epilepsy, hypertension, asthma, diabetes, major depressive disorder, bipolar disorder and schizophrenia. An impairment, such as cancer that is in remission but that may possibly return in a substantially limiting form, is also considered a disability under the final ADAAA regulations.

Direct threat: A significant risk to the health, safety or well-being of individuals with disabilities or others when this risk cannot be eliminated by reasonable accommodation.

Qualified individual: An individual who, with or without reasonable accommodation, can perform the essential functions of the employment position that such individual holds or desires.

Reasonable accommodation: Includes any changes to the work environment and may include making existing facilities readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, job restructuring, part-time or modified work schedules, telecommuting, reassignment to a vacant position, acquisition or modification of equipment or devices, appropriate adjustment or modifications of examinations, training materials or policies, the provision of qualified readers or interpreters, and other similar accommodations for individuals with disabilities.

Undue hardship: An action requiring significant difficulty or expense by the District. In determining whether an accommodation would impose an undue hardship on a covered entity, factors to be considered include:

- The nature and cost of the accommodation.
- The overall financial resources of the facility or facilities involved in the provision of the reasonable accommodation, the number of persons employed at such facility, the effect on expenses and resources, or the impact of such accommodation on the operation of the facility.
- The overall financial resources of the District; the size, number, type and location of facilities.
- The type of operations of the District, including the composition, structure and functions of the workforce; administrative or fiscal relationship of the particular facility involved in making the accommodation to the District.

Essential functions of the job: Term refers to those job activities that are determined by the District to be essential or core to performing the job; these functions cannot be modified. The examples provided in the above terms are not meant to be all-inclusive and should not be construed as such. They are not the only conditions that are considered to be disabilities, impairments or reasonable accommodations covered by the ADA/ADAAA policy.

Upon revisions to the ADA or ADAAA, the above definitions shall be automatically revised to incorporate such revision.

302.3 ACCOMMODATION FOR EMPLOYEES

The District will reasonably accommodate an employee with a disability so that the employee can perform the essential functions of a job unless doing so causes a direct threat to the

employee or others in the workplace and the threat cannot be eliminated by reasonable accommodation or if the accommodation creates an undue hardship to the District.

An employee with a disability may request an accommodation from the Human Resources department and should specify what accommodation is needed to perform the job and submit supporting documentation explaining the basis for the requested accommodation, to the extent permitted and in accordance with applicable law.

The District will review and analyze requests, including engaging in an interactive process with the employee or applicant, to identify if such an accommodation can be made, or if any other possible accommodations are appropriate.

If requested, the employee is responsible for providing medical documentation regarding the disability and possible accommodations. All information obtained concerning the medical condition or history of an applicant or employee will be treated as confidential information, maintained in separate medical files, and disclosed only as permitted by law.

The District will review and analyze requests, including engaging in an interactive process with the applicant, to identify if such an accommodation can be made, or if any other possible accommodations are appropriate.

All employees are required to comply with the District's safety standards. Employees who pose a direct threat to the health or safety of themselves or other individuals in the workplace will be placed on leave until an organizational decision has been made in regard to the employee's immediate employment situation.

302.4 ACCOMMODATION FOR APPLICANTS

When an applicant with a disability requests accommodation and can be reasonably accommodated without creating an undue hardship or causing a direct threat to workplace safety, the applicant will be given the same consideration for employment as any other applicant.

If requested, the applicant is responsible for providing medical documentation regarding the disability and possible accommodations. All information obtained concerning the medical condition or history of an applicant or employee will be treated as confidential information, maintained in separate medical files, and disclosed only as permitted by law.

The District will review and analyze requests, including engaging in an interactive process with the applicant, to identify if such an accommodation can be made, or if any other possible accommodations are appropriate.

An applicant who poses a direct threat to the health, safety and well-being of the applicant or others in the workplace when the threat cannot be eliminated by reasonable accommodation will not be hired.

302.5 ANTI-HARASSMENT, DISCRIMINATION & RETALIATION

It is the policy of the District to prohibit harassment and discrimination based on disability or because an employee has requested a reasonable accommodation. The District prohibits retaliation against employees for exercising their rights under the ADA, the ADAAA or other applicable civil rights laws.

303.1 PURPOSE

It is the policy of the North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District (the “District”) to encourage military veterans and other eligible persons that are eligible for veterans’ preference, in accordance with Sections 295.07, 295.08 and 295.09, Fla. Stat., and Chapter 55A-7, Florida Administrative Code, as many be amended, to seek employment opportunities with the District. This policy is designed to meet the District’s legal obligations in hiring preference and recruitment goals as required by Florida statute.

The District recognizes that Veterans Hiring Preferences laws are enacted to prevent veterans from being penalized in their civilian careers for their time in military service, to recognize the economic loss suffered by citizens who have served their country in uniform, to restore veterans to a favorable competitive position for public employment, and to acknowledge the larger obligation owed to disabled veterans.

The District is committed to successfully recruiting talented and skilled military veterans into the workforce and to increase awareness among veterans and other eligible persons of the employment opportunities available within the District.

408.1 STATEMENT

The North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District ("District") is committed to maintaining a drug and alcohol-free workplace in order to ensure a safe, healthy, secure, and productive work environment. It is imperative that the District take every step possible to ensure all employees and the public that it provides a drug and alcohol-free workplace. This Policy is designed to be a fair, even-handed tool towards accomplishing that objective. The District must take reasonable precautions to ensure that its employees are not under the influence of drugs or alcohol while performing their duties.

The effects of employee drug and alcohol abuse in an organization can increase absenteeism, tardiness, accidents, health care costs, and workers' compensation rates while also lowering productivity. In addition, these problems demoralize and jeopardize the safety of other employees and the public. This Policy attempts to deter drug and alcohol abuse through education, testing, required rehabilitation for abusers, and, if necessary, disciplinary action, for those employees who wish to continue working for the District.

Management will not tolerate violations of this Policy. Violators of this Policy will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including discharge from employment, as well as penalties under federal and state law if applicable. This Policy implements and is consistent with Sections 440.101 and 440.102, Fla. Stat, as may be amended.

408.2 POLICY

The purpose of this Policy is to:

- Provide notice of the District's alcohol and drug free workplace policy;
- Establish a Drug-Free Workplace Program for purposes of Sections 440.101 and 440.102, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, including but not limited to the types of drug testing, drugs to be tested, drug testing procedures, laboratory standards, and reporting of results;
- Provide for disciplinary action for a violation of the Policy;
- Provide an Employee Assistance Program;
- Ensure confidentiality regarding documents produced through the drug testing program; and
- Establish special provisions applicable to employees who hold commercial driver's licenses.

408.3 SCOPE

This Policy applies to all District employees and job applicants. Nothing in this Policy shall be construed to eliminate or diminish any rights provided to the District or a bargaining unit employee applicable by the collective bargaining process and the resulting collective bargaining agreements thereof. The bargaining unit employee also has the right to challenge the results of any drug or alcohol tests and any discipline imposed due to the provisions of this drug testing policy in the same manner that any other employer action can be grieved under the terms of an applicable collective bargaining agreement.

408.4 POLICY ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

The District shall give all employees and job applicants a copy of this Policy. (*Attachment A: Acknowledgement of Receipt and Understanding Form*). The District shall also include a notice of drug testing on vacancy announcements. Notice of this Policy shall also be posted in appropriate and conspicuous locations on the District's premises, and copies of this Policy are available for inspection by District employees or job applicants during regular business hours at the District's Administration Headquarters [1885 Veterans Park Drive, Naples, FL 34109].

408.5 AUTHORITY

This Policy is enacted pursuant to Sections 440.101 and 440.102, Fla. Stat.; Chapter 59A- 24, Florida Administrative Code; 41 U.S.C. Section 81; 41 U.S.C. Section 702; FDA Schedules 1- IV; and 21 U.S.C.A. Section 802, as may be amended.

408.6 DEFINITIONS

The following terms are as defined in Section 440.102(1), Fla. Stat, as may be amended, and have the following meanings for purposes of this Policy:

- A. "Applicant" or "job applicant" means a person who has applied for a special risk or mandatory testing position.
- B. "Chain of custody" is the methodology of tracking specified materials or substances for the purpose of maintaining control and accountability from initial collection to final disposition for all such materials or substances and providing for accountability at each stage in handling, testing, and storing specimens and reporting test results.
- C. "Confirmation test," "confirmed test," or "confirmed drug test" mean a second analytical procedure used to identify the presence of a specific drug or metabolite in a specimen, which test must be different in scientific principle from that of the initial test procedure and must be capable of providing requisite specificity, sensitivity, and quantitative accuracy.
- D. "Controlled substance" is defined in Title 41 U.S.C.A. Section 702, Drug-Free Workplace Requirements for Federal grant recipients, as those drugs listed in FDA Schedules I-IV, 21 U.S.C.A. Section 812, as may be amended, or any other substance defined as a

- "controlled substance" by federal, state, or local authorities.
- E. "*District*" means the North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District.
 - F. "*Drug*" means alcohol, including a distilled spirit, wine, a malt beverage, or an intoxicating liquor; an amphetamine; a cannabinoid; cocaine; phencyclidine; a hallucinogen; methaqualone; an opiate; a barbiturate; a benzodiazepine; a synthetic narcotic; a designer drug; or a metabolite of any of the substances listed in this paragraph.
 - G. "*Drug rehabilitation program*" means a service provider as defined in Section 397.311, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, which provides confidential, timely, and expert identification, assessment, and resolution of employee drug abuse.
 - H. "*Drug test*" or "*test*" mean any chemical, biological, or physical instrumental analysis administered by a laboratory certified by the United States Department of Health and Human Services or licensed by the Agency for Health Care Administration, for the purpose of determining the presence or absence of a drug or its metabolites.
 - I. "*Employee*" means any person who works for salary, wages, or other remuneration for the District.
 - J. "*Employee Assistance Program*" or "*EAP*" mean an established program capable of providing expert assessment of employee personal concerns; confidential and timely identification services with regard to employee drug abuse; referrals of employees for appropriate diagnosis, treatment, and assistance; and follow-up services for employees who participate in the program or require monitoring after returning to work. If, in addition to the above activities, an Employee Assistance Program provides diagnostic and treatment services, these services shall in all cases be provided by service providers as that term is defined in Section 397.311, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.
 - K. "*Employer*" means a person or entity that employs a person and that is covered by the Workers' Compensation Law. The District is an employer.
 - L. "*Follow-up drug testing*" means drug testing that is required by the District if an employee, in the course of employment, enters an EAP for drug-related problems or a drug rehabilitation program, as a follow-up to such program, unless the employee voluntarily entered the program. In cases where the employee voluntarily entered the program, the District has the option not to require follow-up testing. If follow-up testing is required, it must be conducted at least once per year for a two-year period following completion of the program. Advance notice of a follow-up drug testing date must not be given to the employee to be tested.
 - M. "*Initial drug test*" means a sensitive, rapid, and reliable procedure to identify negative and presumptive positive specimens, using an immunoassay procedure or equivalent, or a more accurate scientifically accepted method approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration or the Agency for Health Care Administration as such more accurate technology becomes available in a cost-effective form.
 - N. "*Mandatory testing position*" means a job assignment that requires the employee to carry a firearm, work closely with an employee who carries a firearm, perform life-threatening procedures, work with heavy or dangerous machinery, work as a safety inspector, work with children, work with detainees in the correctional system, work with confidential information or documents pertaining to criminal investigations, work with controlled substances, or a job assignment that requires an employee security

background check, pursuant to Section 110.1127, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, or a job assignment in which a momentary lapse in attention could result in injury or death to another person.

- O. *"Medical Review Officer" or "MRO"* mean a licensed physician, employed with, or contracted with the District, who has knowledge of substance abuse disorders, laboratory testing procedures, and chain of custody collection procedures; who verifies positive, confirmed test results; and who has the necessary medical training to interpret and evaluate an employee's or applicant's positive test result in relation to the employee's medical history or any other relevant biomedical information.
- P. *"Prescription or nonprescription medication"* means a drug or medication obtained pursuant to a prescription as that term is defined in Section 893.02, Fla. Stat., as may be amended, or a medication that is authorized pursuant to federal or state law for general distribution and use without a prescription in the treatment of human diseases, ailments, or injuries.
- Q. *"Reasonable suspicion drug testing"* means drug testing based on a belief that an employee is using or has used drugs in violation of the Policy drawn from specific objective and articulable facts and reasonable inferences drawn from those facts in light of experience. Among other things, such facts and inferences may be based upon:
 - 1. Observable phenomena while at work, such as direct observation of drug use or of the physical symptoms or manifestations of being under the influence of a drug.
 - 2. Abnormal conduct or erratic behavior while at work or a significant deterioration in work performance.
 - 3. A report of drug use provided by a reliable and credible source.
 - 4. Evidence that an individual has tampered with a drug test during his or her employment with the District.
 - 5. Information that an employee has caused, contributed to, or been involved in an accident while at work.
 - 6. Evidence that an employee has used, possessed, sold, solicited, or transferred drugs while working or while on the District's property or while operating a District vehicle, machinery, or equipment.
- R. *"Special risk position"* means a position that is required to be filled by a person who is certified under Chapter 633 or Chapter 943, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.
- S. *"Specimen" or "sample"* mean tissue, hair, or a product of the human body capable of revealing the presence of drugs or their metabolites, as approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration or the Agency for Health Care Administration.

408.7 PROHIBITIONS

It is a condition of District employment for an employee to refrain from consuming, manufacturing, distributing, dispensing, processing, or otherwise possessing or being under the influence of a drug while conducting District business. This includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. Reporting to work or working with the presence of unlawful drugs in an

- employee's body;
2. The use of alcohol while on duty, while on District property, or while operating District vehicles or equipment or being transported in District vehicles;
 3. The use of alcohol within four (4) hours of reporting to work for duty; or having an alcohol concentration of .04 or greater before, during, or immediately after having performed employment duties for the District;
 4. Unlawfully possessing, manufacturing, distributing, dispensing, selling, or using drugs or a controlled substance on District property, while in or operating a District vehicle or equipment, or while otherwise conducting District business;
 5. Misuse or illegal use of prescription or nonprescription medication(s) that can or does impair an employee to the point that he/she is unable to perform his/her assigned job duties; and/or
 6. Use of legally prescribed or over the counter medication(s) where such use impairs the ability of the employee to safely and properly perform work or operate equipment, machinery, or vehicles.

408.8 VIOLATIONS

Any violation of this Policy is a serious matter. Any employee who violates this Policy will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge from employment. Any job applicant who violates this Policy will not be considered for employment.

408.9 INSPECTIONS OF PROPERTY

The District reserves the right to inspect all parts and aspects of its property for illegal drugs, alcohol, or other contraband. All employees and visitors may be asked to cooperate in inspections on District property, including work areas and public property (such as personnel lockers, desks, bedrooms, District-issued gear, equipment, and other areas not considered personal or private) that might conceal illegal drugs, alcohol, or other contraband.

408.10 LEGAL USE OF MEDICATIONS: MEDICAL MARIJUANA PROHIBITED

Nothing in this Policy precludes the appropriate use of legally prescribed medications in accordance with the instructions of a health care provider, or over the counter medications, where such use does not impair the ability of the employee to safely and properly perform work or operate equipment, machinery, or vehicles. However, Section 440.102, Fla. Stat, as may be amended, prohibits the use of cannabinoids (marijuana), including medical marijuana. Additionally, marijuana is listed as a federally prohibited Class I substance pursuant to the Controlled Substance Act, found in Title 21 of the United States Code, as may be amended. Therefore, marijuana use, medical or otherwise, is prohibited under this Policy.

408.11 DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE PROGRAM LIAISON

The ~~Fire Chief shall designate in writing an employee to serve as Human Resource Deputy Director is~~ the District's liaison for the purpose of overseeing the drug testing program ("Drug-Free Workplace Program Liaison"). The Drug-Free Workplace Program Liaison shall be charged with implementing the drug testing program as well as compiling and storing all relevant documentation. The Drug-Free Workplace Program Liaison, or his or her designee, shall also serve as an information source to all employees and job applicants with questions about the program. Employees and job applicants have the right to be fully informed of all aspects of the program including, but not limited to, the testing procedure and scientific process involved, the drugs specifically tested for, the effect of nonprescription and prescription medication on the test, and the avenues of contesting a test result. The Drug-Free Workplace Program Liaison shall be a source for such information.

408.12 CONVICTION OF CRIMES INVOLVING DRUGS

Employees who are convicted of, plead guilty to (including a plea of nolo contendere or no contest), or are sentenced for a crime involving illegal drugs must report the conviction, plea, or sentence to the District within five (5) business days. If an employee who is convicted of, pleads guilty to (including a plea of nolo contendere or no contest), or is sentenced for a crime involving illegal drugs performs work directly relating to the District's contracts or grants with a state or federal government, the District will report such conviction, plea, or sentence to the appropriate agency within ten (10) business days after it receives notice.

408.13 DRUG-FREE AWARENESS PROGRAM

The District will maintain an ongoing Drug-Free Awareness Program, informing employees of the dangers of alcohol and drug abuse in the workplace; reminding employees of the District's Drug-Free Workplace Program; providing information to employees about the District's Employee Assistance Program and other sources of drug counseling and rehabilitation available to employees; and notifying employees of the penalties for drug violations occurring in the workplace. See, **Attachment E, Employee Assistance Programs and Local Drug/Alcohol Rehabilitation Programs.**

408.14 TYPES OF TESTING

The District shall conduct the following types of drug testing:

408.14.1 ~~Special Risk and Mandatory Testing-Pre-Employment Testing~~

A job applicant ~~selected for a special risk or mandatory testing position~~ is subject to drug testing in accordance with this Policy.

408.14.2 Reasonable Suspicion Testing

- A. An employee may be subject to reasonable suspicion drug testing based on a belief

that the employee is using or has used drugs in violation of the Policy. This belief must be drawn from specific objective and articulable facts and reasonable inferences drawn from those facts in light of experience. Among other things, such facts and inferences may be based upon:

- i. Observable phenomena while at work, such as direct observation of drug use or the physical symptoms or manifestations of being under the influence of a drug.
- ii. Abnormal conduct or erratic behavior while at work or a significant deterioration in behavior or work performance.
- iii. A report of drug use provided by a reliable and credible source.
- iv. Evidence that an individual has tampered with a drug test during his employment with the District.
- v. Information that an employee has caused, contributed to, or been involved in an accident while at work.
- vi. Evidence that an employee has used, possessed, sold, solicited, or transferred drugs while working or while on District property or while operating a District vehicle, machinery, or equipment.

B. The District will initiate reasonable suspicion drug testing upon the recommendation of a supervisor, in consultation with the Drug-Free Workplace Program Liaison, Human Resources, and ~~and/or the~~ Fire Chief, as necessary. Anyone who suspects that an employee is under the influence of alcohol or drugs should contact the employee's immediate supervisor or the suspected employee's immediate supervisor, and simultaneously contact the Drug- Free Workplace Program Liaison and Human Resources. An observer may be requested to complete Section A of **Attachment F, Reasonable Suspicion Confidential Observation Form**, or may alternatively use Section A of Attachment F to provide the initial report to the supervisor, the Drug- Free Workplace Program Liaison, and Human Resources.

C. The recommending supervisor shall (i.e. no more than thirty (30) minutes unless there are documented extraordinary circumstances that prevent compliance with this provision) promptly detail in writing the circumstance(s) that formed the basis for the reasonable suspicion, using **Attachment F, Reasonable Suspicion Confidential Observation Form**. To accomplish this requirement, the recommending supervisor may either request that the observer complete Section A of Attachment F, or may complete it him/herself. In any event, the recommending supervisor must check the appropriate box as to whether reasonable suspicion has or has not been established, and must sign in the designated location in Section A of Attachment F. The documentation must then be provided by the supervisor to the Drug- Free Workplace Program Liaison and Human Resources no less than thirty (30) minutes of signing Section A of Attachment F. A copy of this documentation shall be given to the employee upon request and the original documentation shall be kept in a confidential file maintained by the Drug-Free Workplace Program Liaison for at least

one (1) year. Such documentation is exempt from the provisions of Section 119.07(1), Fla. Stat., as may be amended.

- D. Employees required to be tested shall not be allowed to drive themselves to the testing site or home. The employee must be accompanied by the applicable battalion chief, applicable deputy director, or if neither is available, a chief position that is above the applicable deputy director or battalion chief to the testing site and stops on the drive to the testing site are not authorized. Supervisors will arrange testing and transportation for the employee to the testing site for testing as soon as possible and testing shall occur within 2 hours. If the test is not done within 2 hours, the supervisor must document why the test was not done. If the test is not done within 2 hours, the supervisor shall cease attempts to test and document again why testing was not done. The employee will be tested for both drugs and alcohol. After the testing is completed, the employee shall be transported to his or her place of residence. Supervisors may arrange for a mobile testing facility to perform testing as soon as possible and testing shall occur within 2 hours.
- E. To ensure the safety of the employee and the public, an employee who is requested to submit to a reasonable suspicion drug test and who submits to the drug test must immediately stop the performance of his or her job functions and may, at the sole discretion of the Fire Chief, be placed on administrative leave with pay pending receipt of the initial confirmed test results. Additional administrative leave with pay is at the sole discretion of the Fire Chief.
- F. An employee who leaves District property without justifiable explanation prior to submission to drug and alcohol testing will be considered to have refused the test.
- F.G. Supervisors will be trained on the identification of circumstances and indicators that may create reasonable suspicion that an employee is using or under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

408.14.3 Post-Accident Testing

A post-accident drug and alcohol test shall be performed if the accident occurs and the accident meets at least one of the following criteria:

- The accident involved a human fatality.
- The accident involved a bodily injured with immediate medical treatment away from the scene and the employee received a citation under state or local law for a moving traffic violation arising from the accident.
- The accident involved disabling damage to any motor vehicle requiring tow away and the employee received a citation under state or local law for a moving traffic violation arising from the accident.

Notwithstanding the above criteria, an employee involved in an accident that is not required to be tested under this paragraph may still be subject to reasonable suspicion drug testing.

~~An employee may be subject to post-accident testing following a personal injury event resulting in a worker's compensation report of injury. Post-accident testing may also be conducted based on information that an employee has caused or contributed to an accident or injury while at work.~~ Employees subject to drug testing as a result of an accident or injury who wish to challenge the results of any drug test may do so in accordance with this Policy as well as Chapter 440, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.

If testing is required, supervisors will arrange testing and transportation for the employee to the testing site for testing as soon as possible and testing shall occur within 2 hours. If the test is not done within 2 hours, the supervisor must document why the test was not done. If the test is not done within 2 hours, the supervisor shall cease attempts to test and document again why testing was not done. The employee will be tested for both drugs and alcohol. After the testing is completed, the employee shall be transported to his or her place of residence. Supervisors may arrange for a mobile testing facility to perform testing as soon as possible and testing shall occur within 2 hours. The employee must be accompanied by the applicable battalion chief, applicable deputy director, or if neither is available, a chief position that is above the applicable deputy director or battalion chief to the testing site and stops on the drive to the testing site are not authorized. An employee who leaves the scene of an accident without justifiable explanation prior to submission to drug and alcohol testing will be considered to have refused the test.

To ensure the safety of the employee and the public, an employee who is required to submit to drug testing and who submits to the drug test must immediately stop the performance of his or her job functions and may, at the sole discretion of the Fire Chief, be placed on administrative leave with pay pending receipt of the initial confirmed test results. Additional administrative leave with pay is at the sole discretion of the Fire Chief.

408.14.4 Routine Fitness-for-Duty Testing

The District will require an employee to submit to a drug test if the test is conducted as part of a routinely scheduled employee fitness-for-duty medical examination, or that is scheduled routinely for all employees within an employment classification or group.

408.14.5 Missing Controlled Substances

The District has a policy related to security mechanisms for controlled substances, which implements certain procedures to ensure the avoidance of the loss, theft, or misappropriation of District controlled substances.

- A. If there are missing controlled substances following an inventory of the District's

controlled substances at the beginning of a shift, the following employees shall be drug tested:

- Those employees that are on-duty that are assigned to the apparatus with the missing controlled substances; and
- Those employees that were assigned to the apparatus with the missing controlled substances who just completed their shift.

B. If there are missing controlled substances following an inventory of the District's controlled substances during a shift, the following employees shall be drug tested:

- Those employees that are on-duty that are assigned to the apparatus with the missing controlled substances.

If testing is required, supervisors will arrange testing and transportation for the employees to the testing site for testing as soon as possible and testing shall occur within two (2) hours. If a test is not done within two (2) hours, the supervisor must document why the test was not done. If a test is not done within 2 hours, the supervisor shall cease attempts to test and document again why testing was not done. The employees will be tested for drugs. After the testing is completed, each employee shall be transported to his or her place of residence. Supervisors may arrange for a mobile testing facility to perform testing as soon as possible and testing shall occur within 2 hours. The employees must be accompanied by the applicable battalion chief, applicable deputy director, or if neither is available, a chief position that is above the applicable deputy director or battalion chief to the testing site and stops on the drive to the testing site are not authorized. An employee who leaves District property without justifiable explanation prior to submission to drug testing will be considered to have refused the test. To ensure the safety of the employees and the public, an employee who is required to submit to drug testing and who submits to the drug test must immediately stop the performance of his or her job functions and may, at the sole discretion of the Fire Chief, be placed on administrative leave with pay pending receipt of the initial confirmed test results. Additional administrative leave with pay is at the sole discretion of the Fire Chief.

408.15 DRUG TESTING PROCEDURES

408.15.1 Substances that will be Tested

The District's drug testing program detects the presence of the following drugs: alcohol (including distilled spirits, wine, malt beverages, and intoxicating liquors); amphetamines; cannabinoids; cocaine; hallucinogens; phencyclidine ("PCP"); methaqualone; opiates; barbiturates; benzodiazepines; synthetic narcotics (methadone and propoxyphene); designer drugs; or a metabolite of any of the substances listed herein. See *Attachment B: Drug*

Classifications for Which Testing Will Occur.

Both before and after a drug test, an employee or job applicant shall have an opportunity to report the use of prescription or non-prescription drugs they have taken. Additionally, employees and job applicants have the right to consult with the Medical Review Officer for technical information and assistance regarding prescription and nonprescription medications.

See *Attachment C, Common Medications Which May Alter or Affect Drug Testing and Medical Review Officer Notification*, for a listing of over-the-counter and prescription drugs which could alter or affect a test result. Attachment C is not intended to be an all-inclusive listing due to the large number of obscure brand names and constant marketing of new products.

Reporting of prescription and non-prescription drugs may also be reported on Attachment C.

408.15.2 Specimen Collection

The District expects the laboratory to adhere to the following procedures, as provided in Section 440.102(5), Fla. Stat., as may be amended:

- A. Specimens for testing will only be taken or collected by the following persons: a physician; a physician's assistant; a registered professional nurse; a licensed practical nurse; a nurse practitioner or a certified paramedic who is present at the scene of an accident for the purpose of rendering emergency medical services or treatment; or a qualified person employed by a licensed laboratory.
- B. A specimen shall be collected with due regard to the privacy of the employee or job applicant providing the sample and, in a manner, reasonably calculated to prevent substitution or contamination of the specimen.
- C. Specimen collection shall be documented and the documentation procedures shall include:
 1. Labeling the specimen containers so as to reasonably preclude erroneous identification of test results. Providing a form (Attachment C) for the employee or job applicant being tested to document any information he/she considers relevant to the test, including identification of currently or recently used prescription or nonprescription medication or other relevant medical information. Any information provided shall be considered in interpreting any positive confirmed results. Any information provided shall be confidential.
- D. The individual collecting the specimen for testing and the laboratory conducting the test(s) shall use appropriate chain-of-custody procedures to ensure proper record keeping, handling, labeling, and identification of all specimens to be tested.

- E. For current employees, any drug test conducted or requested by the District may occur before, during, or immediately after the regular work period of the employee but shall be deemed to be performed during work time for the purpose of determining compensation and benefits for the employee.
- F. If an initial drug test is negative, the District may, in its sole discretion, seek a confirmation test. Such testing is authorized to be conducted only once and must be requested no more than seven (7) working days from the time the original negative test result was reported to the District by the Medical Review Officer.
- G. The District pays the costs of:
 - 1. Initial and confirmation drug tests required of employees and job applicants; and
 - 2. Follow up testing as may be required.
- H. An employee or job applicant shall pay the costs of any additional drug tests not required by the District.

408.15.3 Drug Testing Standards for Laboratories

The District shall not use a laboratory to analyze initial or confirmation drug specimens unless:

- A. The laboratory is appropriately designated by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services or the Agency for Health Care Administration;
- B. The laboratory has a written procedure to ensure chain of custody;
- C. The laboratory follows proper quality control procedures and complies with Section 440.102(9), Fla. Stat., as may be amended, which includes but is not limited to:
 - 1. The use of internal quality controls including use of samples of known concentrations that are used to check the performance and calibration of testing equipment and periodic use of blind samples for overall accuracy;
 - 2. An internal review and certification process for drug test results conducted by a person qualified to perform that function in the testing laboratory;
 - 3. The implementation of security measures by the testing laboratory to preclude contamination or adulteration of specimens and drug test results; and
 - 4. Submitting a monthly report to the Agency for Health Care Administration with statistical information regarding the testing of employees and job applicants selected for employment.

408.15.4 Recording of Positive Results

The District expects its testing laboratory to submit a written report to the District identifying all positive confirmed samples by specimen number within seven (7) days after receipt of the specimen. With regard to each such sample, the report will contain, at a minimum, the following information:

- A. The name and address of the laboratory that performed the test;
- B. The specimen number of the person providing the specimen;
- C. The result of the test;
- D. A list of the drugs for which the analysis was conducted;
- E. The types of tests conducted on the specimen along with the minimum cutoff levels of each test; and
- F. Whether any medication identified as being taken by the employee or job applicant could have caused a positive test result.

409.15.5 Medical Review Officer

An employee or job applicant may contact the Medical Review Officer at the drug testing laboratory to ask questions regarding technical information and assistance regarding prescription and nonprescription medications, and interpretation of drug test results. The Medical Review Officer will be listed on the chain of custody form.

409.16 RESULTS

409.16.1 Negative Test Results

If an initial drug test is negative, the District may, in its sole discretion, conduct confirmation drug tests.

409.16.2 Positive Test Results

Positive test results shall be handled in accordance with Section 440.102(5), Fla. Stat., as may be amended. With respect to a positive drug test, the following shall apply:

- A. If an initial test is deemed positive, then a portion of the same specimen shall automatically be subjected to a confirmation test. A positive result on an initial test shall not be reported by the Medical Review Officer to the District unless followed by a positive test result on a confirmation test.
- B. The District will not discharge, discipline, or request or require rehabilitation of an employee or refuse to hire a job applicant on the basis of a positive test result that has not been verified by a confirmation test by the same laboratory and by the Medical Review Officer.
- C. Within five (5) business days after the District receives notice of a positive confirmed test result from the Medical Review Officer, the District will inform the employee or job applicant in writing of such positive test results, the consequences of such results, and the options available to the individual who tested positive. The District will provide to individuals tested, upon request, a copy of the test results.
- D. Within five (5) business days after receiving notice of a positive confirmed test result from the District, the employee or job applicant may submit

information in writing to the District explaining or contesting the test results and why the test results do not constitute a violation of this Policy or should not result in a decision not to hire.

- E. If the employee's or job applicant's explanation of a positive test result is unsatisfactory to the District, a written explanation as to why the explanation is unsatisfactory, along with the positive results, shall be provided to that individual by the District. All such documentation shall be kept confidential and shall be retained by the District for at least one (1) year.
- F. Every specimen that produces a positive, confirmed test result shall be preserved by the licensed or certified laboratory that conducted the confirmation test for a period of at least two hundred ten (210) days after the result of the test was mailed or otherwise delivered to the Medical Review Officer. However, if an employee or job applicant undertakes a legal challenge to the test result, the employee or job applicant shall notify the laboratory and the sample shall be retained by the laboratory until the case or administrative appeal is settled.
- G. If an employee or job applicant has tested positive, such individual shall have one hundred eighty (180) days to have a portion of the specimen retested at the employee's or job applicant's expense, at another laboratory appropriately designated by the Department of Health or the Agency for Health Care Administration chosen by the employee or job applicant. This second laboratory must test at equal or greater sensitivity for the drug as the first laboratory and test in accordance with the criteria prescribed in Section 440.102, Fla. Stat., as may be amended. Employees and job applicants may receive information on available laboratories from the Drug-Free Workplace Program Liaison. The first laboratory that performed the test for the employer is responsible for the transfer of the portion of the specimen to be retested, and for the integrity of the chain of custody during such transfer.
- H. If an employee initiates procedures for having a portion of a positive specimen retested, that employee shall not be subjected to the consequences of a positive test until such time as positive test results are returned from the retest. However, the employee may still be placed on leave pursuant to the Disciplinary Measures provided below.
- I. If an initial drug test of an employee or job applicant is confirmed as positive, the Medical Review Officer shall provide technical assistance to the District and to the employee or job applicant for the purpose of interpreting the test result to determine whether the result could have been caused by prescription or nonprescription medication taken by the employee or job applicant.
- J. If a job applicant produces a positive confirmed drug test result, the District shall not be required to hold the position vacant while the job applicant pursues administrative action.
- K. An employee or job applicant whose drug test result is confirmed as positive shall not, by virtue of the result alone, be deemed to have a "handicap" or "disability" as defined under federal, state, or local handicap and disability discrimination

laws.

- L. If a retest produces a negative result, the Fire Chief will determine what action, if any, will be taken by the District.

409.17 DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

409.17.1 General

Employees who test positive for drugs or alcohol will not be allowed to perform job functions until testing negative within thirty (30) days of the first positive result.

Employees who test positive for drugs and/or alcohol or who otherwise violate this Policy will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action, up to and including termination from employment, based upon this Policy and other applicable District policies. Depending on circumstances, an employee's return to work, reinstatement, and/or continued employment may be conditioned on the employee's successful participation in and/or completion of any and all evaluations, counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation programs, passing of return-to-duty and follow-up testing, or other appropriate conditions as determined by the District.

409.17.2 Voluntary Treatment

The District shall not discharge, discipline, or discriminate against an employee solely upon the employee voluntarily seeking treatment for any drug-related problems if the employee has not previously tested positive for drug use or has entered an EAP for drug-related problems or has entered an alcohol or drug rehabilitation program. Participation in a drug/alcohol rehabilitation program does not insulate an employee from the imposition of discipline for violations of this Policy or other District policies.

409.17.3 Prior Medical History

The District shall not discharge, discipline, or discriminate against an employee or refuse to hire a job applicant on the basis of any prior medical history revealed to the District pursuant to this Policy.

409.17.4 Refusal to Participate in Drug Testing

The District may take the following action based on a refusal to take a drug test:

- A. A current employee will be discharged from employment.
- B. An injured employee who refuses to participate in a drug and/or alcohol test will be discharged from employment and forfeits eligibility for medical and indemnity benefits provided by the state workers' compensation statute.
- C. The District may refuse to hire a job applicant based on his or her refusal to take a drug test.

409.17.5 First Confirmed Positive Results

Except as provided in Paragraphs F and G, below, the District will not discharge or discipline an employee on the sole basis of the employee's first positive confirmed drug test when the District has first given the employee an opportunity to participate in, at the employee's own expense or pursuant to coverage under a health insurance plan, an Employee Assistance Program or an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program, unless:

- A. The employee has either refused to participate in the Employee Assistance Program within thirty (30) calendar days of the first positive confirmed drug test, or has failed to successfully complete such program, as evidenced by withdrawal from the program before its completion or a report from the program indicating unsatisfactory compliance, or by a positive test results on a confirmation test after completion of the program; or
- B. The employee has failed or refused to sign a written consent form (**Attachment D, Written Consent to Provide Information on Status of Assistance and/or Rehabilitation Program**) allowing the District to obtain information regarding the progress and successful completion of an employee assistance program or an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program; or
- C. The employee has caused or contributed to an injury or illness while at work to himself/herself or another person, or has caused damage to a District vehicle, property, or equipment.

Participation in a drug/alcohol rehabilitation program does not insulate an employee from the imposition of discipline for violations of this Policy or other District policies.

407.17.6 Second Positive Test Results

Any employee who, for a second time, tests positive for a substance listed in this Policy shall be subject to disciplinary action up to and including discharge from employment. The Fire Chief may also require the employee to successfully complete an EAP or drug/alcohol rehabilitation program or impose any other appropriate condition(s), in his/her discretion.

407.17.7 Additional Grounds for Discipline or Discharge

The District has the flexibility to consider all aspects of employment before making any employment decision, based upon circumstances, evidence, previous practices, workplace safety, and an employee's employment record. Depending upon circumstances, an employee's return to work, reinstatement, and/or continued employment may be conditioned upon the employee's successful participation in and/or completion of any and all evaluations, counseling, treatments, and rehabilitation programs, passing of return-to-duty and follow-up alcohol and drug tests, or other appropriate conditions as determined by the District. The District may discipline or discharge an employee on another basis when the discipline or discharge is based upon a concurrent factor other than the employee's positive drug test. In addition, when drugs or alcohol are found in an injured employee's system at a level prohibited by state statutes and rules, the employee forfeits eligibility for medical and indemnity benefits that are usually available through the state worker's compensation system

to care for injured workers. Finally, the District reserves the right to take disciplinary actions against any employee for drug and/or alcohol offenses that negatively affect the District's reputation or operational effectiveness.

407.17.8 Reassignment of Employees in Special Risk or Mandatory Testing Positions

If an employee in a special risk or mandatory testing position, as defined herein and by Section 440.102, Fla. Stat, as may be amended, enters an EAP or drug rehabilitation program, the District will reassign the employee to a non-safety-sensitive position, or if another appropriate position is unavailable, will place the employee on leave status while the employee is participating in the program. The employee is required to use his or her available leave balances, in accordance with District Policy or Contractual Agreements, prior to placement on leave without pay. Participation in a drug/alcohol rehabilitation treatment program does not insulate an employee from the imposition of discipline for violations of this Policy or other District policies.

407.17.9 Successful Completion of Program

Upon successful completion of an EAP or an alcohol or drug rehabilitation program, the employee shall be reinstated to the same or equivalent position.

407.18 EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Part of the District's employee benefit package includes an Employee Assistance Program (EAP). The service provided by the EAP is a comprehensive program that helps employees resolve personal problems, such as drug and alcohol abuse, ~~that~~which may adversely affect their work performance, conduct, health, and well-being. EAP addresses problems in the quickest, least restrictive, and most convenient manner while protecting client confidentiality. To obtain additional information about the District's EAP or to gain access to the services provided by the EAP, employees should be referred to the Human Resource Department. Employees may contact the Human Resource Manager for more information on the District EAP or they may also contact the EAP provider directly. See, **Attachment E, Employee Assistance Programs and Local Drug/Alcohol Rehabilitation Programs.**

- A. If an employee is unable to participate in outpatient rehabilitation, the employee may be placed on leave status while participating in an EAP or an alcohol or drug rehabilitation program. The employee is required to use his or her available leave balances, in accordance with District Policy or Contractual Agreements, prior to placement on leave without pay. Prior to the employee being placed on leave without pay, the employee is required to use any accrued paid leave.
- B. Prior to the employee's successful completion of the EAP, the District may reassign the employee to another position.
- C. Upon successful completion of the EAP or rehabilitation program, an employee shall be reinstated to the same or equivalent position. Successful completion of an EAP shall be determined by the standards dictated by the program itself.

- D. An employee required to enter an EAP or rehabilitation program who refuses to participate in the program or who does not successfully complete the program may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge from employment, at the Fire Chief's discretion.
- E. An employee required to enter an EAP or rehabilitation program is required to complete the **Written Consent to Provide Information form, Attachment D**. This form allows the District to obtain information regarding progress towards successful completion of the program.
- F. The District ~~must~~ requires any employee who tested positive and **entered into an EAP or rehabilitation program completed rehabilitation** to participate in follow-up testing for a period of two (2) years following completion of the program.

407.19 CONFIDENTIALITY

- A. Except as otherwise provided by law, all information, interviews, reports, statements, memoranda, and drug test results, written or otherwise, received or produced through this drug testing program are confidential and exempt from Florida's public information laws (Section 119.07(1), Fla. Stat., as may be amended, and Section 24(a), Article I of the State Constitution, as may be amended, and may not be used or received into evidence, obtained in discovery, or disclosed in any public or private proceedings except as permitted by Section 440.102, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.
- B. Information may be released by way of written consent signed voluntarily by the individual tested, according to the criteria contained in Section 440.102(8)(b), Fla. Stat, or wheresuch release is compelled by an administrative law judge, a court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to an appeal taken under this Policy, or where deemed appropriate by a professional or occupational licensing board in a related disciplinary proceeding.
- C. Nothing in this Policy shall prohibit the District, an agent of the District, or a laboratory conducting a drug test from having access to employee drug test information or using such information when consulting with legal counsel in connection with actions brought under orrelated to this section or when the information is relevant to its defense in a civil or administrative matter.

407.20 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- A. No physician-patient relationship is created between an employee or job applicant and the District or any person performing or evaluating a drug test, solely by the establishment, implementation, or administration of a drug testing program.
- B. Nothing in this Policy shall be construed to prevent an employer from establishing reasonable work rules related to employee possession, use, sale, or solicitation of drugs, including convictions for drug-related offenses, and taking action based upon a violation of any of those rules.
- C. This Policy does not act retroactively, and does not abrogate the right of the District

under state law to conduct drug tests or implement employee drug testing programs.

- D. If an employee or job applicant refuses to submit to a drug test, the District is not barred from discharging or disciplining the employee or refusing to hire the job applicant.
- E. This Policy shall not prohibit the District from conducting medical screening or other tests required, permitted, or not disallowed by any statute, rule, or regulation for the purpose of monitoring exposure of employees to toxic or other unhealthy substances in the workplace or in the performance of job responsibilities. Such screening or testing is limited to the specific substances expressly identified in the applicable statute, rule, or regulation, unless prior written consent of the employee is obtained for other tests. Such screening or testing need not be in compliance with the rules adopted by the Agency for Health Care Administration under Chapter 440, Fla. Stat., as may be amended.
- F. No cause of action shall arise in favor of any person based upon the failure of an employer to establish a program or policy for drug testing.

ATTACHMENT B
DRUG CLASSIFICATIONS FOR WHICH TESTING WILL OCCUR

Initial Test: The District shall use the following cutoff levels when first screening specimens to determine whether they are positive or negative for these drugs or metabolites. Levels on initially screened urine specimens that are equal to or exceed the following cutoff levels shall be reported as positive and submitted for confirmation testing:

Amphetamines	1,000 ng/mL
Cannabinoids	50 ng/mL
Cocaine	300 ng/mL
Phencyclidine	25 ng/mL
Methaqualone	300 ng/mL
Opiates	2,000 ng/mL
Barbiturates	300 ng/mL
Benzodiazepines	300 ng/mL
Methadone	300 ng/mL
Propoxyphene	300 ng/mL

Alcohol testing shall be by urine sample and the initially screened specimen shall be considered (presumptively) positive and submitted for confirmation testing if the level is equal to or exceeds .04 g/dL. An equivalent or more accurate method may be selected by the District.

Levels on confirmation testing for blood specimens that are equal to or exceed the following shall be reported as positive. This confirmation testing shall be considered as meeting standards under gas chromatography if the following blood levels are exceeded:

ATTACHMENT C
COMMON MEDICATIONS WHICH MAY ALTER OR AFFECT DRUG TESTING

These over the counter and prescription drugs could alter or affect drug testing results. Due to the large number of obscure brand names and constant marketing of new products, this list, as follows, is not intended to be all inclusive. It will remain the employee's or job applicant's responsibility to be aware of the potential impact on drug testing that any medication that he/she may be taking may have on drug testing results. Below medications are listed by brand name or common/generic name with the type of drug for which they may alter test results.

Alcohol	All liquid medications containing ethyl alcohol (ethanol). Please read the label for alcohol content. For example, Vick's NyQuil is 25% (50 proof) ethyl alcohol, Comtrex is 20% (40 proof); Contact Severe Cold Formula Night Strength is 25% (50 proof) and Listerine is 26.9% (54 proof).
Amphetamines	Obetrol, Biphedamine, Desoxyn, Dexedrine, Didrex, Ionamine, Fastin.
Cannabinoids	Marinol (Dronabinol, THC).
Cocaine	Cocaine HCl topical solution (Roxanne).
Phencyclidine	Not legal by prescription.
Methaqualone	Not legal by prescription.
Opiates	Paregoric, Parepectolin, Donnagel PG, Morphine, Tylenol with Codeine, Empirin with Codeine, APAP with Codeine, Aspirin with Codeine, Robitussin AC, Guiatuss AC, Novahistine DH, Novahistine Expectorant, Dilaudid (Hydromorphone), M-S Contrin and Roxanol (morphine sulfate), Percodan, Vicodin, Tussi-Organidin, etc.

POLICY	409 Smoke, Vape & Tobacco Free Workplace

409.1 POLICY

North Collier Fire Control and Rescue District (“District”) is a smoke-free and vape-free workplace in accordance with Part II, Chapter 386, Fla. Stat., the Florida Clean Indoor Air Act, as may be amended, and a tobacco-free workplace.

All District property is designated as smoke, vape and tobacco free areas. A person may not smoke, vape or use tobacco or other prohibited products on District property or in employee owned or leased vehicles on District property.

409.2 DEFINITIONS

“Prohibited products” include but are not limited to:

- cigarettes;
- cigars;
- snuff;
- pipe tobacco;
- chewing tobacco;
- smoked and smoke-less tobacco;
- tobacco pouches;
- other smokable products;
- personal vaporizers or any device intended to simulate smoking; and/or
- electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS) or electronic smoking devices such as e-cigarettes, e-pipes, e-hookahs and e-cigars.

“Smoke” and “Smoking” mean inhaling, exhaling, burning, carrying, or possessing any lighted tobacco product, including cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco, and any other lighted tobacco product.

“Vape” and “Vaping” means to inhale or exhale vapor produced by a vapor-generating electronic device or to possess a vapor-generating electronic device while that device is actively employing an electronic, a chemical, or a mechanical means designed to produce vapor or aerosol from a nicotine product or any other substance. The term does not include the mere possession of a vapor-generating electronic device.

“District property” means all facilities, grounds, entryways to buildings and parking lots owned, leased, operated or used by the District and all District-owned or leased vehicles.

409.3 SCOPE

This policy applies to the following individuals at all times while on District property:

- employees;
- employees’ family members; and
- visitors of any kind including but not limited to vendors, contractors or consultants.

409.4 EXCEPTION

Any product that has been approved by the FDA for tobacco cessation or other medical purposes is excluded.

409.5 RESPONSIBILITIES

It is the responsibility of each employee to ensure compliance with this policy. It is the responsibility of each supervisor to ensure that no person under his or her supervision smokes, vapes, or uses any prohibited products on District property.
