Dear Cousin:

Mr. Sigfus Olafson has graciously sent me your address and information which you had entered on a pedigree form. I was delighted to Learn that you are interested in exchanging information on your direct lines since I, too, wish to Learn as much as possible about them.

As you will notice from the Family Group Records which I have enclosed, there are several puzzles which we need to solve. One of the major ones involved the exact relationship of James P. White, husband of Mary (Robinetted), and Micajah Goodwin White, from I am descended.

As I mentioned to Mr. Olafson in a Letter sent today, one of my connespondents (whose information has proved reliable in every instance thus far) has informed me that she believes James P. White and Micajah Goodwin White were brothers. If this were actually the case, who then was their father? Was it Penry White as shown on Micajah's death record? Or was it Benjamin H. White? On were Penry and Benjamin one and the same person? Or was James P. White the uncle of Micajah Goodwin White as the information Mr. Olafson sent would seen to indicate?

I would appreciate your comments on the above questions as well as any connections on additions you might be able to make on the forms which I have enclosed. Do you happen to know the name of Perny White's wife?

You will notice that another basic question is posed by the information I have enclosed. Who was truly the father of the Elizabeth Buford [Burfford] who married Micajah Goodwin? All my evidence would indicate that it was Daniel rather than the Henry, Jr., you show. I have included herewith a copy of the will of Daniel Burford which would seem to verify that he is, indeed, the father of Elizabeth. You may keep the photocopy for your records if you wish.

According to Mr. Olafson, you are descended from Russell White. You will notice that my data concerning the names of his spouses is questionable. Also, I inferred from a death record that the Russell White who died 3 May 1882 was the Russell shown. Perhaps you could verify or refute this for me. I will be most interested in the information you have to offer and would, of course, be happy to check my files for anything you might wish to know.

I noticed that you had also determined that Ragland was in error in attributing the children he lists to Benjamin H. instead of to James P. White.

It would seem that we are also related through the Branch family. I have an extensive Branch library and would be pleased to forward and additional generation on two beyond that which (abell covers in Branch of Abingdon. According to Torrence's and (abell's William and Many Quarterly). The North (arolina Branches from whom I am descended were an off-shoot of the Virginia line; however, they do not offer definitive proof. I am, therefore, trying to document the parentage of John Branch, father of (olonel John Branch, who in turn was father of Governor John Branch, who also served as Secretary of the Navy. The first John mentioned was apparently born sometime around 1700.

I shall look forward to hearing from you and hope that our shared information will prove helpful to both of us.

Dear Mrs. Pearlman:

It is certain some nth degree cousinship exist between us. Family tradition was that Dr. Russell White, my great grandfather, and Micajah Goodwin White, from whom you are descended, were cousins. I don't remember hearing anyone say in just what degree, only they were our cousins. When someone would ask our set of Whites what relation they were to the other set of Whites, the answer was nearly always third or fourth cousins, which could mean fifth or sixth, or a way of saying "not too close." Both sets of Whites went to the same schools and it was generally accepted that they were cousins. The only other set of Whites were the children of Landon White, called "Groundhog" Landon. These Whites were not claimed as kin by either set of us, but I believe now they were but a little more distant.

Landon White had brothers named Dave, Lewis, and Simeon, and maybe some more that I didn't know. They were the sons of Floyd White, but not the Floyd White with wife named Rhoda, who came from Mercier County. I never heard where Landon got the nickname "Groundhog Landon", but he was called a lot of other names which he might have earned as a Revenue man during the Probation Era. I went to school with his sons Nev and Goodwin (called Gooden'). They lived on the mountain above Wharton, and up the hollow from the Frank Horne place. (Frank Horne married a granddaughter of Micajah Goodwin White)

My mother was Samantha White, born 1883, the daughter of Van and Manerva Webb White. She married John Elliott Turner, born 1875, the son of Marcellus A. and Julia Perdue Turner. My great grandfather was Dr. Russell White, the son of James and Mary Robinette White.

In 1951, Uncle Eruce White, (he was really my mothers uncle) and I, made some notes on the White family. Both of us listed everything we could remember about any member of the White family, He told me a good bit about his brother, Van White, who was my grandfather. As both my grandfathers died years before I was born, I was interested in anything I could learn about them. He listed for me all of brothers and sisters, as well as all of his father and mothers brothers and sisters. I remember asking him about the Micajah Goodwin Family and what kin they were to our set of Whites. He knew about all of Micajah's children and had talked to them about the family, but they couldn't determine what the relationship was, but knew they were cousins. (He wouldn't claim kin to "Groundhog Landon"). Bruce was the son of Dr. Russell White by his second wife, Mary "Polly" Webb, daughter of James R. and Sarah Gallimore Webb. (NOTE- My grandfather and my great grandfather, married sisters. Van White married his step mothers sister) After Russell White died Mary married William Bone.

What few records I have found would indicate that Benjamin Farrison White (Whom Ragland called "Chickasaw Ben"), was the father of James and Perry White, but I believe Ferry was known by another name. In all my searching on the White family, I have only found the name Perry White but twice. Cnce in the Death Records of Boone County at the Court House in Madison, which gives the parents of Micajah White, as Perry and Nancy White. The other time was in the Cleveland Library in a book called the Jelfe Family History, which said the family went early from Virginia to Kentucky and a granddaughter, Susan Lancaster, married Perry White. This Perry (I think) paid taxes in 1793, in Kentucky, so I ruled out this being our Perry.

The death record in Econe County (Old Book #1 - page 25) gives the following record:

Micajah White, age 74 years - 7 months. Cause of death Pneumonia. Farents Perry and Nancy White. Information furnished by Fannie. Her relationship is given as a daughter. (Frances was called Fannie) Date of death - December 4, 1883.

I think this is proof of the parents of Micajah G. White and it almost establishes the exact date of his birth. Which would be in May 1809. If this is true then the Nancy White, age 92, listed in the 1850 Census - Boone County, would not be the widow of Perry White for she would have been born 1758 which would make her 51 years old when Micajah Goodwin White was born. This Nancy could be Nancy Goodwin White, widow of Benjamin Harrison White, also known as "Chickasaw Ben" and the mother of Perry White.

In the 1830 Census - Grayson County, Virginia, is a Micajah White age 30 - 40. If he was near the age of 40, he would have been born 1790-1. Then he could be Micajah (Perry?) White. This could be a clue as to where to look for more information on Ferry White. Grayson County was the birthplace of some of my Webb and Dickens families. I plan to visit there sometime this summer.

I think you are right about the parents of Elizabeth Buford. You have in the will of Daniel Buford, proof that she was his daughter. As I told Mr. Olafson, I have very litte proof the White line past Penjamin H. White. I will change my records.

I am related to the Branch family through my grandmother, Julia Perdue Turner. Her father was Branch Perdue. His mother was the Branch. I have not worked yet on the Branch name, but hope to this summer if I get to the Virginia State Library. I am not sure yet of the connection, but as the name has been handed down to the present time, in every generation, I think when I find it out it will be Thomas Branch. My father had a brother Thomas Branch. I have a brother Thomas Branch Turner, and he named his son Thomas Branch Turner, he told me when he had a son it would be a Thomas Branch. I might need your help when I get into that name. I met a Dr. Thomas Branch Young in Welch, W. Va. last winter. He told me he was descended from Colonel Thomas Branch, a R/War soldier.

There are many Branch marriages in the Chesterfield County, Virginia, Marriage Records. I have the book compiled and published by Catherine L. Knorr. (1771-1815 Harriages) I will look look up any you would like to know.

I have the families of most of these. The ones I don't have are Lucy and Penina. Do you have anything about them? On your chart you show a Lewis White. The only Lewis that I have listed who would fit into this age group was the son of William and Elizabeth White. This Lewis White was born 1839 and married Viey (?) \_\_\_\_\_ Their children John L., born 1866; James M., born 1869; Amanda M., born1872; Allen, born 1876; Roxey, born 1879; and Phoebe, born 1879. My records show they were cousins through John White, the brother of Benjamin H. White, (also known as Chickasaw Een)

You have me wondering which of the children of Micajah G. White you are descended. (?). I have a good record of Elizabeth's children, also George's and James A. White's children. I would venture a guess that it was from one of the other children of the family. I have a Bible record of the children of James and Elizabeth Peters, also all of the brothers and sisters of James Peters (18 in all). I will be glad to send you any of it you are interested in. A good many of the descendants of Micajah G. White are here in Boone County, I see some of them nearly every day. I know about all of the grandchildren of George White.

Dear Cousin: [If all data bears out, that would be to the 4th degree!]

Thank you so much for your very prompt response to my recent letter. It is always so wonderful in genealogical research to correspond with a careful, thorough researcher—and you give every indication of being just that. I do appreciate your offer to check the (hesterfield (ounty marriages; however, that will not be necessary since I too have access to them.

You asked about my descent from Micajah Goodwin White. My great-grandmother was his daughter Clarinda "Rindy," who married Micajah Goodwin Mitchell. Like his father-in-law, M. G. Mitchell acquired his given names from a common ancestor: Micajah Goodwin. As you know, Micajah Goodwin's daughter Nancy, married Benjamin H. White. Another daughter, Spicey, married Archelaus Mitchell, M. G. Mitchell's grandfather. Not only do I have a double Goodwin line but a double Mitchell line as well since M. G. Mitchell's sister Isabel J. is also a great-grandmother. She married Paren Christian. My grandparents, Guma Mitchell and Albert Leander Christian, were first couning. All this is on my maternal side. My father was a Branch from North Carolina. I hope all this is not too confusing. If you are interested, I could send a pedigree chart which would clarify the relationships.

Regarding Penina White: It is my belief that this spelling by the census taker in 1850 was not correct and that this child is in fact Paulina. When Polina White, daughter of James and Many White, married (hapman Miller 15 December 1857, she was 21 years of age. This would indicate that she was born about 1836. I do not know how to account for the Paulina you show as having been born in 1827. What was your source for that date? Paulina—or Polina as it is spelled in many of the old records—was a very popular name in the White families. Paulina, the daughter of John and Susannah White, married Zacheus Boss 12 July 1854. A still earlier marriage was that of Paulina White to John Hinchman 5 September 1820. I do not know who her parents were but suspect they were Nancy Goodwin) and Benjamin H. White.

As for the Lucy White about whom you ask: I have never encountered that name in this immediate family (as daughter of Mary Robinette and James White) except on the 1850 census. If indeed the information given there is correct, she may have died a year or so later so that few Living relatives in this century would have remembered her. If I Learn anything about her, I will Let you know.

At present I am following several leads concerning the parentage of Micajah Goodwin White. More and more clues point to Nancy (Goodwin) and Benjamin Harrison White as his parents—making him the brother of Russell's father, Janes. In spite of her advanced age, Nancythad a daughter, Louisa (wife of Andrew Workman), with whom she was living in 1850. Louisa was born even later than Micajah Goodwin White. Although somewhat unusual, there is documentation of many women having children during the fifth decade of their lives. One such, as a matter of fact, was Micajah Goodwin White's mother-in-law. The only regative evidence I have that the parentage of Micajah Goodwin White was not as outlined above is the death necond, which seems to give "Perny" and Nancy White as the parents. Since I obtained my information from abstracts of these records and have never seen the original, I am beginning to wonder whether the abbreviation "Benj." for Benjamin has been mistakenly read as "Perny" these many years. For example, the following are copied directly from old records in which the name is known absolutely to be Benjamin:

In each of the above examples the ink had either faded on the scribe in his haste simply had not been careful to complete the "B" on to dot the "j". In one case the scribe had accidentally added an additional hump to the "n". On the last example the "B" was written as such, but the "e" covered the lower portion. As you will note, any of the above examples could be erroneously transcribed as "Perry" nather than as "Benj." which in fact they are. With the old-type pens and permanship, such variations would be even more pronounced than in my writing above. Since you and Mr. Olafson are right in Madison near the Court House, I would be very pleased to have your opinions after you check the original and give this matter careful study.

I am most interested in obtaining whatever material you might have about the White families—including names of their wives and husbands. Knowing how time-

consuming relaying such information can be, though, perhaps for the time being you could let me know the source of your data on Wesley White, whom you show as the father of Benjamin H. Do you have any additional data about these two men or the earlier generations? I am also most curious as to know you learned that this Benjamin is the one who was known as "(hickasaw."

Of course, if you have the time to prepare copies of your material on the later lines, I would love to have it. If it is easier to have photocopies made, I would certainly be glad to reimburse you for any expenses. Just let me know what you consider the best way to compare notes.

Dear Mrs. Pearlman:

It was good to hear from you again on the White line. I had rather suspected that you were descended from Clarinda White, but as I had nothing in my records about Frances or Louisa either, except the names of their husbands, I could not be certain.

I am inclined to agree with you that much evidence point to Benjamin H. White as the father of Micajah G. White, but one big fact remains, the Death Records give his parents as Perry and Nancy White. Several times, including today, I have examined the name Perry in the Record Book at the Court House. There is no doubt about it being meant for Perry. Today I even turned back to a family named Perry and checked the name against the other Perry. Both names are in the same handwriting and both are plainly Perry.

As to the birth date of 1827 for Paulina White, daughter of James and Mary White, my records show that I arrived at that date by subtracting 95 from 1922. In Uncle Bruce's notes he had Paulina White died in 1922 at the age of 95. While at the Court House today I searched for something which would indicate her age as I have never found her death recorded in the records. I found the Will of her husband, Champan H. Miller, which was probated 7 Oct 1896 (Will Book B). I found the record of Chapman's death which was Sept. 19, 1896.

Aunt Paulina Miller died when I was young (Nine or ten years old) and she was buried in what I always considered a unique cemetery. There were only four people buried there, Chapman, Paulina, and their two daughters. Sarah and Mary. It had a cover over it which always reminded me of a Merry-go-around, without the "go around". The floor was a concrete slab covering the entire sheltered area. Around the outer edge was a iron picket fence set into the concrete. There were metal vaults set into the concrete and these protruded above the floor about a foot. The vaults had lids which were fastened on with bolts. The place is located on West Fork of Pond Fork of Little Coal River. The cemetery has been neglected for a long time. The cover was torn down and removed several years ago. I stopped there today and copied the names from the markers. The date of Paulina's death was not given on the markers, but her birth date was. She was born March 29, 1836; Chapman H. Miller was born (According to the date of his death, which was given as Sept. 19, 1896, age 62 years 1 day) Sept. 18, 1834; Sarah Miller, their daughter, was born August 4, 1858, she died January 24, 1876; Mary Miller, their daughter, was born December 4, 1859, she died January 19, 1876. I believe these were their only children.

It looks as if the Census taker in Logan County in 1850, listed Penina, instead of Paulina. Also, Uncle Bruce was wrong as to the age of Aunt Paulina when she died. I think we can erase Penina from our records.

I always thought there was some connection between Paulina White and the William "Bill" Mooney family with whom she was staying when she died. Before her death she deeded all her property to the Mooney's. The Mooney's came to Pond Fork from Grayson County, Virginia. One of Paulina's brothers was named Grayson. I have wondered if he was named for a place they lived.

You ask how I learned our Benjamin White was the one known as "Chickasaw" Ben. I have never seen it mentioned anywhere except in Ragland's History of Logan County. Speaking of Benjamin White he says:

"Near the time the Perrys settled here, several other families from North Carolina made settlement on Buffalo and the waters of Spruce, among them were William Browning, William John, Tandy, and Merdith Burgess, and Ben White."....

"Ben White, who to distinguish him from Ben White, son of John, who has already been spoken of, was known as "Chickasaw" Ben. He settled on the farm now owned by Stephen Browning and was the father (Note; I think this should be grandfather) of a large family. His sons were Grayson, who married a daughter of James Christian; James Madison, who married a daughter of William Browning; Russell, who married a Miss Kuhn (This should be Julia Jarrell); Benjamin Wesley, who married a daughter of Tandy Burgess; and Andrew, who married a Ferrell. His daughters were Amanda, who married Oliver Browning; Elizabeth, who married Byron Christian; Nancy who married a Ferrell; and Paulina, who married Chapman Miller of Boone County."

This would lead me to believe some relationship existed between "Chickasaw" Ben White and these children. He was not their father for they were the children of James and Mary White. I believe Ragland placed Benjamin "Chickasaw" White in the right family but the wrong generation. I will admit this is not much proof, but as I say, I have even less on the earlier ones.

About 1905, Judge David E. Johnston published a book he called "A History of the Middle New River Valley". On page 80 he says:

"Before preceeding to relate the movements of the Military in the New River Valley, the names of some of the settlers who came into the Valley in 1780, will be mentioned. William Wilburn and David Hughes from North Carolina, and John and Benjamin White from Amherst County, Virginia."

This does not tell us that this was our Benjamin White, but to support it is the Marriage Record (Amherst County, Va. 1763-1852) which gives the marriage of Benjamin White to Nancey Goodwin, daughter of Micajah Goodwin (Underlined is Goodwing, Cager). On the top line of the page is the marriage of William Wilburn to Eda Guttery. This makes me wonder if William Wilburn stopped in Amherst County for a while and met met John and Ben White, and Eda. This could have given Ragland the impression that Ben White came from North Carolina with William Wilburn. The best I have been able to tell, William Wilburn stayed in Giles Crunty, but John and Benjamin White settled in Logan County about 1820, give or take a year or so. I think they were brothers.

The names Benjamin and Wesley are both common to the White family. It would suggest that the parents of our Benjamin H. White was either Benjamin White or Wesley White. I found the Will of William White (Book 3, p. 335) in Frederick County, Va. Probated May 7, 1766. He

mentions his wife Sarah, daughter Susannah, sons William, Wesley, and Benjamin. Benjamin White left a will in Frederick County, Va. in 1760 which was probated Sept. 3, 1860. (Will Book Two, p. 425) He mentions his wife Elizabeth, two younger brothers Joseph, and Wesley.

As this son Benjamin did not mention a son Benjamin, I am working on the assumption that Wesley was the father of our "Chickasaw" Ben. I would appreciate your comments, corrections or additions on these three Whites, William, Wesley, and our "Chickasaw" Ben.

I was never certain as to the parents of Louisa Workman, born 1815. Some say she was the daughter of Pyrhus McGinnis. There was some connection to the White family other than she married Matilda's brother, Andrew Workman. She was living in Raleigh County in 1880. The records there might shed some light on her. Other than she was a Midwife, and her husband was a minister I have very little about her, but would appreciate any info you can give me about her.

I will work up what I have about the Micajah Goodwin White family.

Thank you so much for checking the Boone (purty records for the death entry of Micajah G. White. Since I had never seen the original, it is helpful to have the results of your scrutiny. Since both you and Mr. Olafson agree that the father's name is written plainly as "Perry," I will simply assume such a person existed unless I find definitive documentary evidence to the contrary.

I appreciate your comments concerning Paulina (White) Miller and wish I could have seen the little cemetery before neglect caused its appearance to change. It is helpful, however, to have the exact dates which you copied and forwarded to me.

I had hoped before now to have the opportunity of studying the Giles County and Grayson (ourty records for White family entries, but it looks as if it will be autumn before my schedule will allow this. When I have done so, I will let you know the results. I should have mentioned Amherst and Louisa (ounties as well.

In going through some of my older notes, I just come across the following notation: The family Bible of Mary (Robinette) and James White is believed to be in the possession of the children and grandchildren of Andrew White who live in Lincoln (ounty. Since you are particularly interested and relatively near, you might be in a position to determine exactly who has this Bible and may be able to glean some additional information from its entries.

Although I do not know himselation to the other Whites in the area, there was apparently another Lewis White besides the one who married Vicy. A Lewis White and his wife Martha A. had a daughter Rebecca Jane May 1, 1860 on Pigeon in Logan (ounty. Another daughter Elizabeth had been born on Sandy River December 18, 1858. It is, of course, possible that there was only the one Lewis White who first married Martha A. and Later Vicy.

Incidentally, another correspondent has recently written me inquiring about another White line. She is interested in the parents of Woodford White, born about 1820 in Virginia. He married Ruth Ann Hicks about 1844, and he died near Pratt, Kanawha (ounty, West Virginia, ??date?? . Do you know anything about this Woodford White and whether on not he is related to our line? Any information you might have about him would, I know, be apprecited by Mrs. Voss—to whom I will send the information. She already has the 1850 census entries as well as the names of their children.

When I have searched through some of the other southwestern Virginia records, I will send you any pertinent findings. In the meantime, I will look forward to additional data on the later generations. By the way, I have placed a query in the Hillbilly for information concerning "(hickasaw" Ben White and his connections.

I have a few pieces of information about the Whites to pass on to you. One of the enclosed sheets is from Mrs. Black of Parkersburg. The other sheets were copied from records in the Virginia State Library by Dorsey White who lives in Richmond. Dorsey and my mother were first cousins. He sent the material to my Uncle Albert White who passed it on to me. I made the enclosed copies for you.

It is stated in Wayland's History of Shenandoah County, Va.

"In 1734 Benjamin Allen (a Quaker), Riley Moore and William White came from the Monocacy Valley of Maryland and took up land at or near Mt. Jackson, Va."

The Allen family appears often in the Quaker records and the White family were always attending their weddings, etc. The two families used the same names for several generations— that is Benjamin, Wesley, William. I believe they were related before they came there even though the Whites were Presbyterians.

A few miles below Harpers Ferry on the Potomatic River is a small place called Whites Ferry. It is on the Maryland side of the river. It has been my thought that the family from whom this place was named was of our Whites. There is a History of Montgomery County Maryland by Roger B. Farquhar, written about 1952. Was wondering if you had ever run across it. I have looked for a copy in several libraries but have never found it. It could shed some light on this town and the White family.

It is thought by both Mrs.Black and Dorsey White that the wife of Wesley White was a daughter of Burr Harrison. Hence, the family name of Harrison. Wesley and Mary White named a son Benjamin Harrison("Chickasaw Ben") White. This is the first time the name and Harrison was used by our White family as far as I know.

I received the family group sheets from you. Many thanks.

The genealogical section of the Los Angeles (ounty Library has the largest collection of family histories I have seen anywhere other than the Library of Congress, so it is possible they have the History of Montgomery County, Manyland, which you mention. I expect to be in Los Angeles one day next week and will certainly check it for any information it might have on Whites Ferry and/or the White family. I'll let you know the results.

You will probably wish to add the following data to your collection: From the Logan (ounty, West Vinginia, Marriage Register:

22 April 1873 John White, age 72, a widowy born Giles County, Va., the son of B. White and Anna Stewart married

Susan (Pace) Varney, age 42, a widow, born Patrick (o., the daughter of J. Pace and R. Boman (on Bowan)

6 February 1873 James N. White, age 24, born Logan County, Va., the son of J. M. and Sarsh White married

Many Altizer, age 22, born Montgomeny County, Va., the daughter of A. and S. Altizer

8 February 1874 Eli White, age 20, born Logan Coungy, Va., mannied Viola Ellis, age 22. [No parents given.]

19 February 1874 Lewis C. White, age 23, married Roxalena Elkins, age 17.

I was in Los Angeles today and had the opportunity of looking at Fanquhan's Historic Montgomeny County, Manyland. There was nothing which seemed to have a direct bearing on our specific WHITE family problems. In order that you could see for yourself, I made photocopies of the two most revealing pages. On one I made a note about the reference to White's Ford. It does not mention White's Ferry as far as I could tell.

While at the library I copied the White reference from Johnston's Middle New River Settlements. Although John and Benjamin were probably brothers, they could just as easily have been cousins or have had another relationship if one is to judge by this reference. The exact quaration follows from page 80:

Before proceeding to relate the movements of the military in the New River Valley, the names of some of the settlers who came into the valley in 1780 will be mentioned. William Wilburn and David Hughes from North Carolina, and John and Benjamin White from Amherst County, Virginia, settled on Sugar Run in 1780, and a little later, probably in the autumn of 1781, came William Tracy Sarver, James Rowe and others from North Carolina, who settled in Wolfe Creek valley.

Incidentally, the (ol. Victor White whom I mentioned to you while in West Virginia considered them brothers. He also believed that the Benjamin referred/was Benjamin H. White and that the John White is the one who married Nancy (opley. From what source did you consider them brothers? It will probably be late June before I can follow through on documentation of some of our speculations but will keep you informed of progress.

I believe Farquhar's Historic Montgomery County, Maryland, sheds some light on our WHITE family. Just how these families connect up will take a lot more research, but I believe they are of the same family.

The Stephen White's ancestors mentioned in the history came to Maryland in 1659. In my records I have the family listed as follows:

I have worked a little on the John and Isaac White, whom Mrs. Smith is interested in, hoping to connect them to our WHITE family but have never found a connection. What information I have will pass on to you.

Several White families came to America in 1724 with the Campbell families. Settling first in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, then moving a few years later to Orange County, Virginia. Orange County was later divided into several counties Augusta being one of them. Frederick was formed from Orange and Augusta. John White's name is on a list of persons who imported themselves, or were imported by others, The date they proved their importation in Orange County, Virginia, is shown. The date of John White's proven importation is shown as 28 Sept 1738. (O, Bk II, 391) This date entitled him to legal rights to hold title to land in the colony. I have not found where John White held land or when. Isaac White I have thought was a son of this John White.

The Beverly Manor Patent shows Isaac White obtained 150 acres of land in the large 118,491 acre tract. The Campbells also obtained land in this same tract

Isaac White married Jane Campbell, dau of James and Margaret Campbell. Their children were as follows:

I should not have turned from genealogy so abruptly in the paragraph above. I had intended to ask if you would like to receive abstracts of all the White marriages in Montgomery County if you do not already have them? Just let me know, and I will be pleased to send them. The marriage data abstracted above probably indicates a second marriage for the John White listed.

It takes its name from the old and well-known White family. L. C. White is postmaster, William Rollinson, ferryman, E. W. Mercer, merchant, and White & Wootton, grain dealer.

From the foregoing list of businessmen, it would appear that in 1882, White's Ferry was an official community.

As yet, I have found nothing further on our common ancestor, Benjamin Harrison White; but will keep you informed of progress.

1815 Tax List of following counties: Giles; Cabell; Tazewell

In the 1815 Giles County tax list is the following information concerning Benjamin H. White::

Entered March 4; Place, Big Spring; 2 while males over 16 yrs; no slaves; 5 horses; 9 cattle

The only other individual listed for Mar. 4 and the only other one on Big Spring was Robert Wilburn. Big Spring is located at the head of East River in what later bacame Mercer County.

As an adjunct to my Christian family research, I have been trying to unravel the Farley-Christian connections for which there is documented evidence, according to page 25 of Crozier's Vol. 3, Williamsburg Wills:

Simon Farley, Gent., Isle of Antigua, 13 June 1756; to wife; to son, Francis; daus. Elizabeth, Rebecca, Ann; son, John; lands in Virginia & North Carolina; uncles, Robert Christian & Mathew Christian; brother, Francis Farley. Wits.: John Halliday, Alex. Crawfoad, John D. Murphey. Proved before His Excellency, George Thomas, Esq., Captain General & Governor in Chief over His Majesty's Leeward Carribee Islands.

The source was given to me by another correspondent working on the Christians. A Francis Farley purchased some of the estate of Ellison Christian in 1795 in Greenbrier County, (West) Virginia. I am wondering if and how he might be related to the above Simon. I mention this Farley data to you since I believe you or your wife have Farley connections. Do you know anything of the Ellison Christian whose estate was inventoried in 1794?

If you have uncovered any further material on Benjamin Harrison White since you so graciously shared your notes with me, I would appreciate having it. I hope the above information may prove useful to you.

Thank you for the information about Benjamin Harrison White. I feel certain this is our Benjamin and supposedly the same one who came with John White to Sugar Run in the 1780's from Amherst county, Virginia. It was probably after his marriage to Nancy Goodwin.

The Robert Wilburn you found in the Tax List was a son of the William Wilburn who came to Sugar Run about the same time as John and Benjamin White. William Wilburn was married in Amherst county a month or so before Benjamin and Nancy.

I was in Amherst county last fall and searched the Deed Books, Marriage Records, and part of the Order Books, also the Will Books. Some of the Order Books are badly decayed and would come apart if the pages were separated. I did not find anything that would indicate Benjamin White ever having owned property there. There were many deeds to persons named White and I think I read them all. Apparently the first White to settle there was Conyers White of Albemarle county, and then Arthur White also of Albemarle County. I found the Will of Conyers White who mentions his wife, Rosemond; sons, Conyers, Jr., James, Joseph, Zachariah, Jonathan, Lewis, Isaac, He mentions one daughter, Frances Phillips.

In the Marriage Records I found Arthur White of Albemarle county to Sukey Magann, dated 16 Oct 1777; William Wilburn to Eda Guttrey, daughter of William Guttrey, dated 2 Apr 1787; Benjamin White to Nancey Goodwin, daughter of Micajah Goodwin (Cager Goodwing), dated 10 Jul 1787; Conyers White of Albemarle county to Frances Roberts, daughter of Henry Roberts, dated 1 Dec 1788; Cornelius White to Catherine Hall, daughter of Moses Hall, dated 2 Oct 1789; Joseph White of Orange county to Prisellah Dawson, daughter of John Dawson, dated 8 Jan 1793; Samuel White of Campbell county to Fanny Penn, daughter of Gabriel Penn, dated 6 Dec 1793.

I have several connections to the Farley family through marriage. One is that of Elizabeth Farley, born 18 Feb 1786, who married Lemuel Jarrell. Others are Esther Farley, born 2 April 1790, who married John Abbott (My wifes maiden name was Abbott); Matilda Farley, who married Merdith Burgess, born 1798.

Francis Farley, born 1703, in what is now Chesterfield county, Va. married Elizabeth Crostic(k) who was born in the lower part of North Carolina. Some of the other members of this family came to Chesterfield county from North Carolina and married into the Eaugh family. The one I suspect of being related to me was Amey Crostic(k) who married in Chesterfield county, 24 Nov 1798, William Eaugh.

We returned Friday from a second visit this autumn to Virginia. Your letter was among my mail which had accumulated. Thank you for the White information.

We visited several courthouses and gathered a good bit of information which was mostly on my Turner line. In Goochland county I searched the early Deed and Will books which indicate some of my early Turners there were Quakers.

In the Virginia Library at Richmond I searched the Amherst records but I could not connect our Benjamin H. White to any of the Whites there. It is my guess that he was there only to get married and stayed only a short time. What we need to know is where he came from when he came to Amherst county. Perhaps we should search the North Carolina records especially the counties near where the Chickasaw Indians lived. I believe he died here in what is now Boone county on upper Pond Fork. The Logan 1840 census show two persons in the household of Andrew Workman of approximately the age they would have been.

Last winter I put togather most of the notes of Uncle Bruce White and added them to what I have. I plan to work on it again this winter.

Enclosed are two more items which might be of interest to you.

You will notice that the handwritten note (from one of our common White cousins) indicates that Benjamin White was pensioned in 1832 and that he was of Virginia and West Virginia. I have written to determine source for the information since all communications I have had from the Mational Archives reveal that only military records are available for individuals with this name. If we can prove that the enclosed records are for one and the same individual (that is, "our" Benjamin White), then we might find other clues which would identify his parents.

Have you searched the records of Washington County, Virginia? If the Benjamin and John listed as Battle of Kings Mountain participants were indeed in that vicinity in 1780, we might find a missing link or two there. Of course, these two might have been the ones who subsequently settled in Giles County. Incidentally, there was an engagement against the Cherokees, and Ben could have acquired his nickname in an encounter against the Chicksaw branch of the tribe.

I will be most interested in obtaining the data you acquired from Uncle Bruce White when it is available.

By the way, did I mention that I had acquired the service records for Benjamin H. White for the war of 1812? No family data accompanied them, however.

Dear Cousin:

Although I have not yet had the opportunity of checking the Giles County Marriage Records for a possible John White marriage, I did not wish to wait any longer to write and thank you for the privilege of spending that most enjoyable and productive evening with you comparing genealogical notes. I also wanted to forward the material I have already gathered for you.

Most of the information is self-explanatory. John K. Hinchman and family were the only ones with that surname in the entire Cass County, Mickegan, 1850 Census. I added the entries for their next-door neighbors to aid you in reconstructing the marriages which can be deduced from the 1860 Census entries. My personal files show the birth of John K. Hinchman to have taken place near Wolf Creek 3 Sep. 1797 in that part of Greenbrier County which subsequently became Monroe County, West Virginia. Do you know whether or not he and Paulina returned to West Virginia? Before his death several years ago, Harry Wortman sent me much vital data on Mary Ann (Perry) and William Hinchman, Jr., and their children. It was apparently copied from a Bible record since it had the birth and death dates of infant children as well as those who grew to maturity. One of the puzzling dates was the death date given for John K. Hinchman: 13 Jan. 1844-- obviously incorrect. Someone may have erroneously interpreted faded ink. Did he die in 1866 or perhaps 1874 or 1877? Harry Wortman indicates that John K. Hinchman and family moved to Michigan but that he died and was buried in Logan County, West Virginia. I would appreciate anything you have on his or Paulina's death. Although the 1850 census taker spelled her name "Penina," the one in 1850 correctly lists it as "Paulina."

In addition to the census abstracts, photocopies from parts of two books are enclosed: Branch's THE BRANCH, HARRIS, JARVIS, AND CHINN BOOK as well as Burford's BURFORD GENEALOGY. I realize that the Purdue data in the Branch book is probably too late for your search, but it might furnish leads--particularly the reference on page 10. which seems to refer to earlier generations.

Is it possible that the Jonathan White who married Caty Meade in Wythe County, Virginia, 16 February 1809 was the son of Nancy (Goodwin) and Benjamin Harrison White? He would have been about the right age and with contacts in the right place.

For the White family, I have enclosed a revised projection of the family of Benjamin and Nancy. According to my census abstracts, the 15/20-year-old in the 1830 census was a female, probably a relative. The unidentified female would be a spinster about the same age as Elizabeth (whom you will notice I have given the benefit of the younger estimate). She and the other unmarried sister in 1830 had obviously subtracted a few years from their ages. If you recheck your abstracts, I believe you will find that one of the 10/15-year-olds in the 1820 household was a male and that with an 1810 birth date, Micajah Goodwin White's age could easily appear as shown. On the abstracts of the 1820 record, the enumerator had scratched out his ventry in the a/10 column. I would be interested in any of your comments.

Thank you for the material concerning the Branch and Burford families. I am now inclined to believe that my link to the Branch family was not through the Perdues but through either the Archer, Elam, or Mann family. I am going to work on this angle. I also want to thank you for the Cass county, Michigan, census records. This is the first time I have seen John and Paulina's family listed. I have never seen any evidence that they returned to West Virginia.

Regarding the Jonathan White of Wythe County who married Cathy Meade, daughter of Thomas. A correspondent working the Meade name wrote me that Jonathan was a son of the James White who lived in Wythe county but sold his land and moved to Knox County, Tenn. I will check further on this.

In looking over the 1843 Tax List of Logan County I find the name Benjamin H. White but his tithable is crossed through. Was this because of death or was he over the age to be taxed? I do not have the 1844 Tax list.

We are leaving this weekend for Virginia, I wanted to spend all of next week in the Virginia State Library working on the White family and perhaps stop at some of the southwest Virginia counties on the way home the week after next. I will let you know if anything turns up.

I have typed the "Descendants of Benjamin H. White" and have a proof copy back from the printers to index, etc. I plan to have only 100 copies printed. These to go mostly to libraries, and a few to persons who have helped me in the research. I have your name on the list. This publication will have over 1200 families now living in Boone county, who can claim kin to "Chickasaw Ben".

Anything new on the White's after you left here?



I had just finished abstracting the White marriages of Giles County, Virginia, when your letter arrived. As you will notice from the enclosed photocopy of my rough notes, there was no marriage of a John White to anyone named Susanna. Wherever extra information was given, I have entered it on my sheets.

After restudying my notes, I am inclined, like you, to believe that the John who left widow Susanna who married Thomas Taylor was indeed the eldest son of "our" Benjamin Harrison White. Perhaps the answer will be forthcoming in the land records of Logan County.

You asked if I had anything which could be added to the Goodwin family chart which you sent. There is some additional miscellaneous data in the Goodwin Family Supplement to the William and Mary Quarterly. From your notes, however, I would judge that you have had access to that material. If not, let me know and I would be pleased to send it along. As for material not covered therein, I can add the following about Spicey Goodwin, born 1770-1775, died after 1840 phobably in Logan County, (West) Virginia, married 7 March 1791 Archelaus Mitchell, Ir., in Campbell County, Virginia, by Rev. William Dameron. Archelaus was also born 1770-1775 and died after 1840. Among their children were the following:

Samuel Mitchell, of whom I know nothing more other than the fact that he was involved in a suit as a party with the other three sons mentioned above.



In looking through your list of White marriages for Giles county, Virginia, the marriage of William White (son of John and Susannah (Marcum) White) to Editha White is of interest. Who were Editha White's parents? In notes given me by Uncle Bruce White he mentions "Aunt Editha". I knew she was not a sister to his mother or father and had assumed that she was a sister to his stepfather, William Bone. Could she have been a sister to his grandfather, James White (brother to Micajah, etc.)? The name Editha is common to the family of Russell White.

According to the Mercier 1850 Census, Editha White was born in 1796 and her husband, William White, in 1794. I feel certain that Editha White belongs to our White family, but I am not sure just where.

In regards to the parents of Simeon Jarrell who married Virginia White. My records show that he was a son of Elijah and Nancy A. (Dick) Jarrell. Elijah was a brother to my great-great grandfather John Jarrell.

The Cabell 1850 census show John and Nancy (White) Hannan with the following children in their household: Jesse W., age 36; Thomas V., age 33; John, age 26; Benjamin F., age 23; and Jenetta, age 20. I am sure there were other children in addition to these.

John Hannan was a son of the Revolutionary War soldier, Thomas Hannan who settled on the Greenbottom and according to tradition was the first settler in Cabell county. In 1810 Thomas Hannan conveys to John Hannan, 200 acres on Little Guyan.

Thank you for the Goodwin material also for the Giles county marriages.

Thank you so much for sending the Moore and Pine family data. The Alexander Pine, #909 1850 Cabell County, (West) Virginia, Census, age 52, was a younger brother of the Rebecca Pine who married Thomas Christian. This Alexander's wife was Julia A. Bailey. Although I am not certain, I believe that the Nancy Pine, #621 1850 Cabell County Census, was the widow of Squire Pine.

As for the Martin Moore family: I doubt that he was the father of Anne Moore. Since Anne was born in Monroe County, (West) Virginia in 1804, I believe that the George Moore living there during that period was probably her father. This George Moore's wife was Margaret Edmondson, and they were from Bath County, Virginia. Other circumstantial evidence points to these two as being her parents. They were subsequently located in Giles County. It appears that the Jane Moore who married John Workman and the Sarah Moore who married John Dingess were probably the sisters of the Anne Moore who married James Pine Christian. This would certainly explain the Dingess connection about which my mother used to talk while I was a child. Unfortunately, at that time I was not interested in genealogy, so did not ask about the precise relationship. The death record of Jane (Moore) Workman identifies her parents as Margaret and George Moore. It is likely, too, that the James Moore who married Nancy Shumate was a son of Margaret (Edmonson) and George Moore. James and his family lived in that portion of Fayette County which became Raleigh County. That is consistent with family tradition, which places Anne's Moore kin in Raleigh County. Two other possible daughters of Margaret and George might have been Susannah, who married Benjamin Read, and Hannah, who married Henry Jones. This leaves at least one son and one daughter unaccounted for.

I have enclosed some LeGrand family information which a fellow researcher made available to me because of our Norwood connections. Because of the Goochland, and Cumberland, County references and the fact that on page 6 alone I noticed two marriages of daughters to men named Turner, I thought you might be interested. Note that the brother of a female who married a Mr. Turner was named James Branch LeGrand. Of course, you might already have the data about these families; but I thought it still best to forward to you for whatever leads it might contain.

Even though I have been home for a considerable length of time, I still have not "caught up." I'm still hoping, though.

Dear Cousin:

Thank you so much for your letter of July 14, which crossed in the mail mine to you of July 16.

Although the enclosed analysis of the WORKMAN family was quite wordy in my communication to you, there were still many options that I did not discuss. The one you mention in your letter is an important one which I omitted due to the fact that I felt I was becoming too lengthy in the discussion. Yes, I am aware that Ragland Identified the grandfather of Dorcas (Workman) Barker as James and, like you, believe that is a distinct possibility. You must be aware, though, that Jasper (Dorcas' brother) Identified their grandfather as Joseph when he reported his father's death. Which of the two is an error, I do not know. Generally, I accept the official report until it is proved Incorrect since I know how confusing a narrative account can become. As you know, Ragland identifies the three who planted corn on the Island as James, Joseph, and Nimrod Workman, brothers. Dorcas may simply have said that her grandfather was the one who planted corn on the Island, and at that point Ragland in his notes may have had nothing more and simply assumed James. On the other hand. Dorcas could have been explicit (if indeed she talked to Ragland), and her grandfather may really have been James.

It is so easy to confuse the Joseph who married the Reed's and the Joseph who married Elizabeth (McNeely) Elkins. Whether both of these Joseph's had a father named Joseph or whether one was the son of James still remains to be ascertained. There were apparently only about ten years between their ages, the first born about 1780 and the latter in 1790.

One reason I had usually tied the John who married Jane Moore to the "Reed" Joseph as a brother is because the Reed and Moore families lived in the same Monroe County vicinity—if Jane Moore's parents are the ones I believe they are. Although I have not yet proven the relationship, I think that Jane Moore is the sister of "my" Anne Moore who married James Pine Christian and that another of their sisters, Sarah, married John Dingess. Sarah was the daughter of Margaret (Edmonson) and George Moore, of Bath Co., Va., then Greenbrier, then Monroe, then Giles Counties. By the way, do you have the information from a grave stone for John Workman, whom you say is buried on the Barker Farm? If so, I would appreciate receiving the data thereon.

Another few observations on the two Joseph Workman men. If the death record of the one who married the Reed women did not identify his mother as Hannah, I would have been inclined to think he was a son of the elder Joseph and Phoebe. Again, unless the death record (which was reported by "friend" James H. Workman) is found to be in error, one must work on the hypothesis that his mother was Hannah. Even our Joseph could have been a son of Joseph and Phoebe, but his death record identifies his mother as Nancy, not Pheby.

wife Margaret. He may well be the son of the James of the Kanawha County 1810 census, of whom I have not found later records. Interestingly, Joseph, Jr.'s 1830 household is one of the few that has another male in his age bracket and apparently two females too old to be his daughters. If James died shortly after 1810, then many of his children would have found homes in the families of relatives—most still being quite young. Thus, they would have been missed in the 1820 census as far as separate identities would have been concerned. Surprisemally, the household of Elizabeth (McNeely) and Joseph Workman was also missed in 1820. By 1830 Elizabeth and Joseph appear (with her eldest son of Elkins surname as well as their own children). James H. also missed in 1820.

If the John who married Jane moore were James' son, as commonly supposed, and if his father ried shortly after 1010, he could have lived in the same #pusebold as the McNeely-Joseph and thus developed closer ties than otherwise. Of course, this John could have been this Joseph's brother rather than one of the other Joseph's brother. As I said once before, there are simply too many with the same given names; and it's difficult to fully document precisely which was which. It would certainly be helpful if an ancient family Bible should appear.

By the way, after my recent comparison of the writing of Daniel and Nimrod, I do want to say that they both might have existed. The Isaac, born about 1780, has among his grandchildren one named Maniel and another named Nimrod. Was this Isaac's wife a Ferry?

refore closing, a word or two about the children of Moses, born 1700-1790, who was in Tazewell County, then Lawrence County, Kentucky, then Logan County, (West) Virginia. I helieve there are several errors in the listing of his children in Schreiner-Yantis book and on the L. D. S. records. According to another of ray correspondents descended from the Elizabeth who married Philip Heninger: Elizabeth was the daughter of Margaret (Elightmer) and Abraham Workman. The Moses who married Mary Flankenshin in 1845 was probably the son of Abraham or Thomas since the above Moses' son, Moses, was only about fourteen years of age in 1845 and was still single in 1850. The elder Moses apparently did marry twice as I intimated in my recent account.

In the first paragraph on this page, I stated rather categorically that James Workman of the Kanawha County 1810 census was missing from later listings. I am aware that there is a James in Kanawha 1820 and Logan 1830 who might be the same although the latter is younger than the former was supposed to be. I realize, too, that the enumerator can sometimes miss the proper column; so these might be one and the same man. I still have not found James H. in 1820 though.

Once more, I seem to have gone on and on; but it would be creat if the answer to the relationships could be found.

For Indeed we must be! I was delighted to receive your most recent letter and appreciated the time you took to clarify certain discrepancies. Your correspondence as well as some received from Mrs. William Hager has prompted me to review and reevaluate all my Workman family notes.

While the reevaluation has provided some answers, it has also raised new questions. Following are some observations.

Regarding the birthplace of the Abraham Workman, born 25 January 1761, who settled in Tazewell County, Virginia: Just as I accept his word for the date of his birth, I am inclined to accept the fact that he meent Washington Township when he said Township. There is such a township in York County, Pennsylvania. At the time of his birth York County extended into much of the western area (Allegheny formed in 1788 from Westmoreland and Washington; Washington in 1781 from Westmoreland; Westmoreland in 1773 from Bedford; Bedford in 1771 from Cumberland; and Cumberland in 1750 and York in 1749. both from Lancaster).

As for the parents of Abraham: When I last wrote, I should have had the "2" after the date of the marriage of Phoebe McMay/McMeagher/McRay on 4 August 1761, Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church, York, York County, Pennsylvania. The register from which I obtained this information was a transcription and translation--most of the original being in either Dutch or German. I do wish I could see the original to see if the date could have been 1751, a date which would allow a perfect set-up for the southwest Virginia Workman connections The confusion in the name also is due to the transcription. The entry appeared: MARRIAGES

Joseph Workman, son of Abraham,

with Phebe M'Ray day. of Hugh (Juh. Mecmeher

\*M'Meagher, sugg.

I believe the transcriber made the suggestion, "M'Meagher." it is not clear whether the line with the asterisk was in the original. I believe not since such a line does not appear with the other entries. Interestingly, there are no baptisms for any children, indicating attendance at another parish. I have not yet researched the other parish records for Pennsylvania. Although a Phoebe Workman lived in Brooke County, Virginia, In 1810, she was too young to have been the above.

In fact, all the evidence would indicate that Joseph and Phoebe came to southwest Virginia with their son Abraham and other children. This would have been the Joseph "of old age and infirmity" in 1805. He would have been the Joseph Workman, Sr., who signed the petition in 1798 to form taxewell from Wythe Co.; the second Joseph that year would have been his son (with wife Hancy); and the third Joseph on the petition would have been his nephex or grand-nephew (see different interpreta tions). Beginning in 1805 he was apparently exempt from taxes although he might

for some reason have been well enough to have been assessed in 1809 and 1814. In 1815 Pheby Workman was listed as a taxpayer in Tazewell County. Since as a rule single women could not be so designated, this was probably his widow, Phoebe, who had elabor died or remarried by 1816 or had become, like her husband before her, too "old and inform" to be assessed.

From the accumulated evidence, I consider Phoebe (McMay/McRay) and Joseph Workman the progenitors of our branches of the Workman family. I should make one or two comments about their reputed 1761 wedding date. It certainly could be correct since I'm sure then, as now, marriages sometimes took place after the birth of one or more children. Another possibility is that the marriage was performed by a traveling minister and not entered into the home church register until later, thus producing confusion in dates. Then, too, so often in the old script, an"0" can easily be mistaken for a "1" since the style of writing gave so much more emphasis to the down-stroke, often producing a faint or non-existent up-stroke. So much for speculation on this score, however. Please refer to attached page for likely children and grandchildren of Phoebe and Joseph. I list your Jemes and my Joseph among them fully aware that these two could have been sons of the elder Joseph by a prior marriage.

One of the major clues to the identity of the brothers and sisters is the sworn statement of Jacob Workman: In 1816, when there was a suit to determine title to certain lands on Big Sandy River, We made sworn statement regarding coming to Guyandotte River twenty-three years before with his brother. This would place him there about 1793, the very time when Joseph and James were certainly "planting corn" on the idiand of the Guyandotte. Here again is probably a case of erroneous interpretation of writing when Jacob's name became in later published accounts Nimrod. That the name should have been Jacob is amply demonstrated by voluminous documentation of his existence and presence while Nimrod remains a phantom. Admittedly, there could have been a Nimrod who died shortly after, but I believe not. Thomas also probably specific time with Jacob, James, and Joseph at the Island. Certainly there is a treation factoristics descendents that he and five other brothers moved into southern West Virginia about 1800.

Here I shall make a few corrections of separational resions to be derived from the dates given in Anderson's WORKMAN FAMILY HISTORY. Disregard completely the dates given on page 624 for Jacob and his siblings. There is absolutely no documentation that I have been able to find for such late dates; in fact, mask of themissis born ten to twenty years earlier. On page 606 shadedates are generally more accurate. Joseph #4777 on page 606, however, is the same Joseph as #5017 on page 624. On page 606 in the reference to James Hewett Workman'dipeath taking place about 1840 in Clay County, Ohio-erroneous on two points: He was still very much alive in the 1850 Boone County, Virginia, census; and there is no Clay County, Ohio. Although I have not followed through, I believe the 1840 date (repeated twice) probably refers to an earlier James (possibly the father of your Joseph). The only Clay Counties existing at that time were in Kentucky, Missouri, Indiana, and Illinois. All other Clay Counties in the U.S. were formed after 1854—Including the one in West Virginia.

The book on which I am working covers primarily the families of southern West Virginia and their connections with emphasis on those to whom I am related. Among the major surnames are CHRISTIAN, MITCHELL, WHITE, MOORE, WORKMAN, GORE, PINE, BRANCH, ROBERTSON, LEWIS, NORWOOD, YARBOROUGH, FULLER, THOMPSON, plus

many, many more. The ones mentioned are a few of my direct lines.

I forgot to mention that on page 611, the first three words should read MICAJAH GOODWIN WHITE, not JAMES GOODWIN WHITE.

If you have more detailed information on the family groups of Hannah (Reed) and Joseph Workman and Wattabeth (Réed) and Joseph Workman, I would appreciate receiving it. Your article does not have too many of the dates, etc. I would be pleased to send the same to you on Matilda (Workman) and Micajah Goodwin White and/or on Elizabeth (McNeely) (Elkins) and Joseph Workman If you are interested.

Of more immediate significance, however, would be corrections, additions, and questions concerning the attached pages, I have become very wordy.

Another P. S. I just finished typing the alternate lineages and wished to comment that the second allows one to accept the seemingly obvious writing that "your" Joseph's father, like "mise", was also named Joseph. The "Jos." on the death record does not have to be construed as "Jas." on either your Joseph's or on Beauth (in the second as "Jas." on either your Joseph's still possible!)

Joseph WORKMAN, son of Abraham, married 4 August 1761 Phoebe McMAY/McMEAGHER/McMAY. according to transcription of the marriage register of Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church, York County, Pennsylvania. Their likely children:

- Abraham, born 25 January 1761 in Washington Township, Pennsylvania, married In Montgomery County., Virginia, 13 September 1785 Margaret LIGHTNER. May be found in Tazewell County, Virginia, 1810 tax list and censuses of 1820, 1830, 1840, and 1850. At least seven, possibly ten, children. Names of children not yet fully determined, but Joseph, born about 1802, who married Margaret, could be a son.

- \*\*See more 25 James, born about 1762, married Hannah . Probably the James who likely was in Wythe County about 1797 signed a petition to form Tazewell and with \_\_\_. Probably the James who his brothers in 1794 had planted a crop on "the island" of Guyandotte River. Moved with his family and listed in 1810 on Kanawha County, Virginia, Census. Apparently had ten children, the eldest possibly James born 1779±; the next Joseph with wives Hannah and Elizabeth Reed; among others John, born 1799± who married Janes Moore. The Elizabeth who married George McNeely and the Hannah who married Daniel Jarrell could belong here or among children of James' brother Joseph.
  - 3. Joseph, born about 1763 in Pennsylvania, mained tentile her la zemes 1.00. y Volgicale, area, married Mancy ??Hewitt??. With brothers, planted crop on "the Island" of Guyandotte River about 1794. Pioneer settler of Brea which became Boone County, West Virginia. He and wife may have died about 1800 since they disappear from records. Their children were, according to tradition: Isaacy born about 1781, who married Susan and can be followed in census Giles 1810, Kanawha 1820, Logan 1830 5 40, and Boone 1850; Abraham, born about 1784, married 9 Nov. 1809 Mary "bolly" Ballard; Joseph, born between June and October 1790, married Elizabeth (?McNeely) (Elkins) 7 Nov. 1813; eriso likely are- Elizabeth who married George McNeely and the Hannah who married Daniel Jarrell, mentioned above as possibly James' children. The death record of Hannah (Workman) Jarrell shows her father as Jos. Workman, and the proximity of the McNeely's would seem to favor Elizabeth's inclusion In this group.
  - 4. Isaac, born about 1765, is apparently the only one of the brothers who moved to another part of Virginia. He is listed in the 1810 Loudoun County census. The isaac born about 1781 (shown above) might be the correct isaac for this spot, but the arrangement shown seems to me more likely.
  - 5. Ann, born about 1768, who married in Montgomery County, Virginia, 16 June 1788 Samuel Muncey. I have not yet traced records on her, but information on her death record, if available, might furnish significant clues about parentage.
  - 6. Thomas, born about 1772 in Pennsylvania, indicating that the family had not yet made the move to Virginia, married (Was this for the first time?) Sarah Dickerson/Deskins 24 October 1805. His family may be traced through census records from Tazewell 1810, 20, 30 to Boone in 1850. Still trying to separate identity of his children from those of Abraham.
  - 7. Jacob, born between 1770-1780, married Eleanor Jones. He made sworn statement In 1816 that he had accompanied brother to Guyandotte River twenty-three years before. He settled in that part of Cabell which became Wayne County, and his family can be followed there in censuses of 1810, 20, and 30. He had apparently died before 1850 when his widow, aged 74, was living with children.
  - 8. Moses, born 1780-1785, married 17 June 1801 Elizabeth Muncey. While in Tazewell County In 1810 and 1920, he was in Lawrence Co., Kentucky, by 1830. Dld he marry secondly Sarah Marrs?
  - 9. Phoebe, born ?about 1780-1785, married Isaac Roberts.

## POSSIBLE WORKMAN FAMILY LINEAGE: ALTERNATE TWO

The preceding page does not take into account the presence in 1776 of an adult James Workman, "said to be the first white man to build a cabin within the Gilmer County area." It is, of course, possible that as a young man of fourteen a James born about 1762 might have built the cabin. Much more likely, however, is that the preceding family group be changed, eliminating James in the group. The elder James (with a much earlier birth date and an even larger family) would be perhaps a younger brother of the Joseph who married Phoebe. Another of their brothers would have been Daniel/Nimrod--names which can be easily misread (Nimrod for Daniel or vice versa) if the initial "D" and other letters are quickly written in the old style. Note samples below:

If the family groups (or most parts thereof) following prove to be correct, several otherwise difficult-to-explain traditions and facts are quite reasonable. The seemingly conflicting accounts of precisely who went to the Island then fall into perspective. Depending on who told the story in later years and decending on which of the two generations represented there quite early was mentioned in the account, the impression left was different: It would have been "my grandfather and brothers came to the Island," "my brother and I were on the Guyandotte," etc. By careful study of the census records and tax lists, one can clearly determine when and which ones actually moved to (West)

## Children of Phoebe & Joseph Workman would then be:

1. Abraham, born 25 January 1761, etc.

- 2. Joseph, horn about 1763, with wife Nancy, etc.
- 3. Isaac, Forn about 1765, etc.
- 4. Ann, born about 1768, etc.
- 5. Thomas, born about 1772, etc.
- 6. Jacob, horn about 1770-1780, etc.
- 7. Moses, born 1700-1785, etc.
- 8. Phoebe, born perhaps 1780-1785, etc.

Children of Ganiel/Nimrod might then be: Known to have been in Rockbridge/Greenbrier/ 1. Joseph, born ante 1760 with wife Hannah, whose son Joseph married Reed's

- 2. Samuel, who married Martha Rhea in Rockbridge in 1785
- 3. John, who already had wife Sina in Rockbridge in 1797

4. Benjamin in Rockbridge in 1793

## Children of James were possibly:

- 1. James, born 1770-1780
- 2. Joseph, born ca. 1780 (If #1 in Daniel/himrod family non-existent)
- 3. Male born 1784-1794
- 4. Female born 1784-1794 - Sur Femble barni 1706-1800
- 6. John Coorn ca. 1799, married Jane Moore
- 7. Male, born 1800-1810
- 8. Male, born 1800-1810 9. Female, born 1800-1810

The above lists are probably not complete. I would also like to make another comment concerning the elder James. He and his family are in Kanawha County in 1810, and I have not picked them up later. Is it possible that they went to that area subsequently covered by Clay County, West Virginia, or to one of the Ohio countles? Most of the children uttributed to Joseph and Phoebe above can be followed easily in their migratory pattern.

I would be most interested in any suggestions, comments, or corrections and additions to the above which might also prove or disprove any or all the speculation.

Although I have not heard from you since sending my recent letters, I am enclosing another "Possible Workman Family Lineage" which is a third alternate to the previous two. Several major changes have been made, and I believe this is probably more nearly correct than the previous two.

Due to a reevaluation of the records, it would appear that the Joseph who married Elizabeth McNeely) Elkins was the son of James and Nancy Workman. In Looking over my notes, I found that I had been using the W.P.A. abstracts for Joseph's death record, which showed his father as Joseph. The actual death record has the given name abbreviated Jas. which could be interpreted as Jos. Mrs. Hager, however, believes that the writing in the register is quite distinct and that the name is James. James would be consistent with what Dorcas (Workman) Barker apparently told Ragland in giving the name of her grandfather. Also, in speaking with Mrs. Thelma Anderson, who wrote WORKMAN FAMILY HISTORY, I learned that there may be some mixing of generations on page 606. In any event, in the new "Line-up" you will notice that Hannah who married Daniel Jarrell appears as a sister of the above-mentioned Joseph. Do you have any corrections or additions?

As promised when back East in the spring, I have finally been able to follow through on the census records for Paulina (White) Hinchman. If you recall, although I sent the 1850 and 1860 abstracts, I could not do the same for 1870 since the film was illegible. Today I saw new film of Silver Creek Township of Cass County, Michigan, and it was quite clear. Apparently John K. Hinchman had died since Paulina Hinchman, aged 67, was head of household #92 with only her son, John W., living with her. Household #93 was for George Collingwood, aged 27, born in England, his wife Cynthia (apparently Cynthia Hinchman), aged 27, born in Virginia, George S. Collingwood aged 5, and Thomas Avrell, aged 17. Augusta Hinchman, aged 20, was living in #94 with Emily and Thomas Easton. The only other Hinchman was William, aged 14, living with William and Sarah Bilderback; he probably the son of Clement, whom I believe had died before 1860.

I would be most interested in anything you have on which to comment about the Workman study.

By the way, Mrs. Hager mentioned that you are a Gatliff descendant? If so, that makes us doubly cousins since I am descended from Mary (Gatliff) and KRMXMXMXXXXXXX James Alexander Pine. On my spring trip, I spent some time in Kentucky where Mary's brother moved and found some significant material. Let me know if you are interested.

III; Leander Workman, son of David Pierce Workman, married a sister of my maternal grandmother; Daniel Jarrell and my great grandmother, Julia Jarrell were first cousins. (Daniel who married Hannah Workman).

If I interpret the Boone County Death Register correctly Hannah Workman was a daughter of Jas. Workman, and Joseph Workman was the son of Jos. and Nancy Workman. I am enclosing a copy of several entries which include both Hannah and Joseph. In case you do not have it. I thought perhaps with several listings you can better interpret the clerks intention.

I am still collecting White's but it looks as the I lost a few in the family of John and Nancy Hannan. One of my cousins always tells me when one of the White's die "You can take one off your list".

Thank you for the information concerning the Jordan Peters family. Some of it I did not have.

I received the letter from Mr. Chester A. Peters last week and answered it a few days ago. I sent him a photocopy of the information that I copied several years ago from an old Bible, printed in German, that had belonged to Elijah Stanley Dickens, born 28 Nov 1871, who married Martha Peters, born 8 Nov 1872. She was a daughter of James, son of Jordan Peters. Since the Bible contained the names and birth dates of both James and Jordan's children, I had assumed that it had been handed down from one of them.


My family lived neighbors to Elijah and Martha Dickens for many years and knew about the German Bible in their possession. They said that Martha's grandfather could speak and read German.

Elijah Stanley Dickens was one of my early school teachers. Martha, his wife, was also a school teacher but that was before my time. Eefore they came to Boone county they were teaching in Raleigh when they say the Mormans gained control of the Raleigh county schools and would not give them a school because of their religion. Mr. Dickens was a Methodist minister and taught Bible in the school. He was one of the best men that I ever knew.

The 1860 census of Boone county was taken by Andrew J. Barrett (his daughter-in-law is still living), who in most instances, shows both the <u>County</u> and State of birth of most of the persons. The birth place of James Peters is shown as Floyd county, Virginia. Since James was born before Floyd county was formed, I presume he meant that part of Franklin county that became Floyd in 1831.

The 1820 census of Franklin county shows Jordan Peters as the head of a household. Your date of 1817 for his marriage would fit in. The 1810 census for Franklin shows only three persons named Peters as heads of households. I think one of these was Jordan's father. The Peters listed are Michael, Sr., Michael, Jr., and Zachariah. Since Jordan named a son Zachariah. Could this be his father?

As you probably noted, there were several inconsistencies between your records and his; namely, the birth date for wife of Jordan N. Peters--5 Dec. 1799 or 12 May 1799 (obviously ascase of transposition of numbers used for month and day rather than the preferred letter abbreviations). Also, the years of birth for Elizabeth (1840 or 1843), Sarah (1841 or 1842), Joseph W. (1843 or 1844), and Moses 1845 or 1846).

Knowing that you are always interested in adding information to your census annotations, you might wish to know that in the 1860 census, #298, family of Preston Perry: the son Napolean French Perry married 1) Ida Gore and 2) Causby Morgan.

You and Janet Hager have done an excellent job on the 1880 census records. I added some to the Logan County copy. Although I was delayed in sending it back to her, she should have received it by now.

I finally finished several of the indexes on which I had been working. Flyer is enclosed for your information.


Your indexes proved very helpful while I was working the Cook, Stewart, Clay, and Allied families. I wish someone would put one togather for the other census years.

Dear Cousin David:

Thank you so much for your detailed response to the questions I had posed in my letter to Mr. Olafson. I had planned to write to you the same day with still other questions but had postponed doing so in order to further check my notes on the White family.

Would you consider appearing as coauthor of the White family article which will appear in Volume II of KITH AND KIN OF BOONE COUNTY? I believe that would certainly be the best way to give you credit. Without the results of your research, my information would be far more limited than it is. After a few more exchanges of data (most of which will be questions by me and answers by you, I would guess), I could then send a rough draft to you for your comments and revisions. Then I could prepare the final copy for publication. By working together, I believe we would be able to eliminate many of the discrepancies which creep in when working alone. Please let me know what you think of this approach.

Incidentally, I would have telephoned you to discuss some of the possibilities with you; however, the operator said she did not have a listing for you. Needless to say, the genealogical details can best be handled by letters. I am most anxious to have the account as complete and perfect as possible. By complete, I do not mean to include the Logan County lines although I do wish to clarify several relationships for those families. If it would help for you to photocopy anymore of your records to save time, just let me know the cost; and I will reimburse you.

William Everett Peters, born 22 November 1860, and wife Mary Kinder had at least the following six children: Terry or Carrie (a male), born August 1884 Allie M. born March or November 1887 Dora, born 10 May or June 1890 William S., born 19 April 1895 Annie L., born June 1897 Seth R., born May 1900

When I have the chance to get the data on Sanford, I will send it to you.

- Now for a few questions -- or a lot of questions, depending on the viewpoint! 1. Do you have the maiden name of Laura Blanch , wife of Garfield White who was born 21 October 1880 and died 1 April 1940? Did they have children or grandchildren?
- 2. Do you have the maiden name of Nora L. , wife of Burton White who was born 13 May 1883 and died 25 November 1951? Do they have descendants?
- 3. Who was the wife of Elsworth White, born July 1891? Did they have a family?
- 4. Did Hershey White, born May 1897 marry; and if so, who was she and did they have descendants?
- 5. Edwin White, born 24 February 1877, and America Price had at least two children. One was Seigel, born February 1900. Do you know anything of the other?
  - As you will note, all the above are children of George Doliver and Emily (Sutphin) White. Until I began preparing the manuscript for KITH AND KIN OF BOONE COUNTY, I had not realized that my records on the descendants of these two were so sketchy. Anything you have will be of interest.
- 6. What do you have on Andrew W. White, born about 1847, son of Benjamin Wesley and Sarah G (Jarrell) White. Who were the parents of his wife Nancy? Did they have more than the three children: Melvin, born about 1874 Rush, born about 1875 Louden or Landeng born about 1879?
- 7. Have you anything on Cornelius White, born about 1842, son of Benjamin Wesley and Sarah G. (Jarrell) White?
- 8. Did Andrew and Emily (Ferrell) White have more than the five children born to them prior to 1900? I have hames and dates if you are interested.
- 9. Did Leander "Lee" White, born 8 February 1846, son of Dr. Russell and Julia (Jarrell) White, have a family? I have nothing on him other than that he married Mary E. Mullins, daughter of Hiram and Jane (Riggans) Mullins.
- 10. By the way, was Dr. Russell White a medical doctor? Most of the census records list him as a farmer.
- 11. When you sent me the vital data on the family of Asa White, you said that you also have records on his grandchildren; that is, the family groups of his children. Could you send those to me? As I said, I would be pleased to pay for costs of making photocopies.

- 12. This question involves discrepancies in my records. Ragland identifies the father of the John who married Susannah Elkins as the son of Jack White. This is the Susannah who later married Thomas Taylor, according to my notes. I believe at one time you and I speculated that this John White who married Susannah Elkins might have been the son of Benjamin Harrison White rather than of Jack. Which do you believe to be the correct parentage? Have you found any documentation to substantiate one or the other? I would be most interested in your comments.
- 13. John and Susannah (Elkins) White had a son named John, born about 1830, who married Mary . Who was she and what happened to them? I realize that you may have no more on them than I have.
- 14. One last question for today: Can you identify the parents of Leota born about 1875, who was married about 1892 to Wilson White, son of James Anderson and Paulina A. (Workman) White?

Although I referred to #14 as being the last question, I do want to make a few comments which might raise others. Most of the following is in regard to the Logan County White groups.

In your 1880 Logan County Census annotations, you show the parents of Rheuben White, # Ha 219/239 as William and Elizabeth White. Shouldn't the parents be shown as <u>John</u> and Elizabeth?

Also in the 1880 annotations: The John White, # Ha240/261, probably was the son of Maston and Susannah (Sansom) White, not William and Elizabeth (Sansom) White. I have not found a record of a William who married Elizabeth Sansom. Was there such a marriage?

Speaking about Maston White reminds me of several discrepancies I have noted. Did he marry twice? Once to SusannaAdAnna" Sansom and later to Susan Neese? There is documentation identifying the mother of his younger children as Susan Neese. Some of the earlier birth records identify the mother as Anna. Or could there perhaps have been a third wife named Anna between Susan Sansom and Susan Neese? If indeed there was a Sansom and a Neese marriage, do you know in which year his first wife died and when he remarried?

This is probably enough for one day. I shall look forward to hearing from you.

On the parental home farm in Boone County, W. Va. Hurse m. white was born 31 may 1837, a son of George D., and Emily (Sutphen) white, the former of whom died 26 January 1921, at the age of seventy four years, and the latter of whom passed away on the 19th of april of the preceding year. Edwin, first barn of the children, is deceased; Garfield was the next in order of Birth; minnie is the wife of W. F. Horn; Burton, Elbert and B. Harrison still reside in Boone county; Elsworth is principal of the high school at moderon, this county; Delie is the wife of wirk stewart; and Hursis m, of this review, rounds out the family circle. George W. white was long numbered among the supstantial exponents of farm industry in Boone County, was a Republican in politics, and as a young man he represented west Virginia as a loyal soldier of the Union in the Civil war, he having been a member of Company B. Seventh west Virginia Cavalry, and having received his honorable discharge at Charleston, this state, shortly after the surrender of General Robert E. REE.

The public schools of his native county were the medium through which Hursie in white acquired his early Education, and thereafter he took three Courses in the Concord normal school at athens, this state. He made a record of nine terms of Effective service as teacher in the schools of Boone County, and he was in the pedagogic aanho at

Tebruary 28, 1918, at charleston, he enlisted for service in the United States army, and he was assigned to Battery B. Thirty-eighth artillery. He received training at Fortress monroe and camp Stewart, both in Virginia, and was stationed at Fort Hamilton. My. When the armistic brought the war to a close. He received his honable discharge Accember 13, 1918, and thereafter resumed his service as teacher in the schools of his native County. In 1926 he was elected to his present office, that of clerk of the Circuit Court for Boone County, and in this position he is giving a characteristically loyal and efficient administration.

The white retains the paternal faith and is a stalwart in the local ranks of the Republican party. His name is still enrulled on the roster of Eligible young backdars in Boone County.

I have no dates on them, and my records for death date of B. Harrison White are conflicting: 4 August 1955 or 4 January 1955.

2. My records on the family of Elbert and Ora (Jarrell) White are equally limited. I show their children as:

Wilhelma (Should this be Wilhelmina?)

Naturally, I would appreciate whatever additional material you have on them. When I originally gathered data on these families, I had not intended to extend my records beyond approximately 1880 to 1900. This accounts for many of the gaps in the later generations.

- 3. When you sent the information on the families of Asa White's children, you sent nothing for Murphy and Goldie (Jarrell) White. Did they have children and grandchildren?
- 4. Did Murphy's twin brother Byrd marry and have children?
- 5. Is Sutphin generally spelled in this fashion or as Sutphen? I notice that you used the latter spelling for Abner Sutphen, husband of Sarah White. My records previously had contained the "i" rather than the "e."
- 6. I plan to visit the National Archives Record Center tomorrow and will check for additional children of Lee and Mary E. (Mullins) White.

- 7. I have conflicting birth dates for Nora Lee (Jarrell) White, wife of Burton White. In your letter you gave 28 October 1884. My notes have 28 October 1888. How can we verify the correct one?
- 8. In the list of children for Garfield White, I had another child names Lola. Was there such a person or was Lola perhaps a nickname for Llewellyn?
- 9. Also in the family of Garfield White, could you verify the sex of several children. Was Lennie male or female? Still living? What about Dovie who married Lace Griffith?
- 10. In giving the parentage of the Bessie White who married Elsworth White, you listed Landon and Dora (Canterbury) White.

Who were this Landon's parents?

Was this the same Landon who had wife Victory R. (\_\_\_\_) in 1900 in Boone County? Landon and Victory R. showed their children as follows:

Lewis F., born Sep. 1884 Orpha L., born July 1885 James M., born Oct. 1887 Bessie M., born June 1897 Doran L., born Feb. 1899

If this is not the same Landon White, to whom does the second one belong? I should have mentioned that Landon and Victory were in Crook District.

11. You may wish to add the following dates to your records of the children of Andrew and Emily (Ferrell) White:

Brady, born February 1896

In addition to the children you show, there was Weltmer or Wettmer, born May 1900, the same month his mother died. I did not have Mary, born 8 March 1890, and wonder if she died before 1900 or was missed by the census enumerator or was living with other relatives at that time.

- 12. Did Andrew and Sheilda/Shrilda/Surilda Doss have any children? Do you know the correct given name for this second wife?
- 13. Speaking of Andrew White: Have you information on the spouses of Andrew W. and Sarah Alice (Canterbury) White's children? I have the names of only seven of the twelve children they had before 1900 but nothing further about them other than birth dates. I have them as follows:

- 15. Here's a case of trying to properly identify one or more by the name of Albert White. In 1900 Boone County census there is an Albert White, born April 1861 with wife Missouri E. (\_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_), born May 1866. They had had nine children eight of whom were still living and for whom I have names and dates if you want them. Was this the same Albert as the one listed in 1880 in Logan County, West Virginia, with wife Martha? Your annotations identify this Albert as the son of Darby K. and Margaret (McNeely) White. Isn't it more likely that this was Albert, the son of Mastin and Susan (Neese) White, born 24 April 1854? I realize, however, that Darby Kelly White did have a son Albert also, born about 1856. My notes show this Darby Kelly White's wife as Mary Thompson. Was he previously married to Margaret McNeely or are we dealing with more than one Darby Kelly White?
- 16. In the 1880 Boone County, West Virginia, Census, Peytona District #48/45 was the family of James P. White. His death record identifies his parents as Elijah and Mahala White. Was Mahala's maiden name White or was it Lilly? According to the computer index file of the L. D. S. Church, James P. White married Polina White 4 August 1863 in Mercer County, West Virginia. Do you know who Polina's parents were? My notes show their children as follows:

Does the Henry, born October 1871, who married Ella \_\_\_\_\_\_ belong here?

- 18. Can you identify the parents of Carrie Alice Coon, born December 1881, who married James Noah White, son of Lemuel J. and Martha (Jarrell) White?
- 19. What do you know of the Simeon White, born April 1876, who married Izpah about 1895 and who lived in Crook District of Boone County about 1895?
- 20. I have raised so many points that I hesitate to mention several White family questions which do not directly concern our present project. However, since they involve discrepancies, I will mention them. In the 1850 Logan County, (West) Virginia, census, it is my belief that Family #110 is that of the Nancy White who first married John Chambers. Several years ago you had identified Family #536 as the Nancy who first married a Chambers. If you have revised your records and agree with my evaluation, who, then, was the husband of the Nancy White who is head of household #536? Could it have been Robert? Partial abstracts are enclosed for quick comparison of ages, etc.
- 21. Finally, do you know the maiden name of the Celia who married James White (although in 1850 this James White was referred to as John, Jr.)? Or did the widow of John, Jr., marry James? For a long time I have been curious about this seeming discrepancy and have not been able to find the answer.

I have some Logan County relatives who might be able to fill in the gaps on this Browning family now that I have the names of two of the children.

Mentioning the Browning family reminds me of Lewis Craig White, born 8 November 1850, the son of James Madison and Sarah E. (Browning) White, married 19 February 1874 Roxalena "Roxy" Elkins, born about 1857 the daughter of Uriah and (\_\_\_\_) Elkins. I have only two children for them and no data beyond approximate birth dates:

Their father was apparently living alone in 1900. Do you have more on them?

Do you know whether the Lewis White born about 1836 with three different wives and sets of children is one and the same person? He seems to me to be the son of John and E. ( ) White.

I realize that this is another of those families which does not concern our Boone County account, but I am curious about your evaluation. I might mention that in 1900 there is only one Lewis White in this approximate age bracket, and he is with wife Vicy.

In referring to the parentage of Benjamin Harrison "Chickasaw Ben" White, how definite do you think we can be in identifying them as Wesley and Mary (Harrison) White? Although we know that Wesley and Mary did have a son Benjamin, what do you consider the convincing piece of evidence that "our" Benjamin is "their" Benjamin?

Do you believe that Wesley and Mary were closely related to the William White, born 4 April 1748, married 11 February 1773 Mary Harrison, died 17 July 1836? This William was an Episcopal minister and bishop and the son of Col. Thomas White. This William died in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

By the way, do you have anything on the death of Wesley and Mary (Harrison) White? That's about all for today.

- 10. In giving the parentage of Bessie White who married Elsworth White, I relied too much on memory. She is the daughter of Leander (Landon) and Victoria (Green) White. This Landon was sometimes referred to as "Bald Eagle" Landon. The other was called (but not to his face) "Ground hog" Landon.
- 11. Thank you for the data on the Andrew and Emily White family.
- 12. I don't think Andrew White had any children by his marriage to Shrilda.

Andrew White, Jr. and S. J. Doss were married in Boone county 11 Oct 1901. Her age is shown as 17. His age is 37.

Uncle Bruce White used the name Shrilda in his papers.

Thank you for the new information you found for Uncle Lee White. Also for the Milton Browning info.

All that I can add to the Lewis Craig White family is Roxalina's birth date which was 12 Mar 1856. She is shown as the d/o Uriah W. and Mary Ann Elkins.

As to the Lewis White, born ca 1836, and shown with three different wives. I think he is one and the same person. My records show he married (1) Martha \_\_\_\_\_\_. m.(2) Jane M., d/o Barnabus and Eliz. Curry. m.(3) Vicy, dau. of Daniel and Margaret (Taylor) McCoy. (Vicy, m. (1) in Nov 1874, Anderson, s/o Levi and Francis Shepard Stone).

All the evidence that I have seen so far as to the parentage of Benjamin H. "Chickasaw Ben" White has been very slim. I think the most convincing, at least to me, is the repetition of family names, and the application of these names to certain families that were living in an area where there could have been family connections.

Also by the process of elimination we have narrowed down the margin for error until there are only a few families left to place him in. I think we should tentatively list Wesley and Mary White as the parents of our "Chickasaw Ben". What do you think?

You ask if I had anything on the death of Wesley and Mary (Harrison) White. Mrs. Black of Parkersburg wrote me that she found them in many records in Washington county, Va. on up through 1783 at which time they disappeared.

Could the Col. Thomas White you found have been a brother of Wesley's father, William? I think we should keep an open mind on this.

I believe this covers about everything today.

There was one correction in the article that I thought we should make. On page 14 the last two lines of the first paragraph about Dr. Russell White, I ask Sig to have it read "the young doctor settled with his as yet small family at the mouth of Whites Branch on the 4,000 acre tract of land conveyed to him by his father-in-law, John Jarrell, Sr. I am enclosing a copy of the deed for your records.

Russell did make a survey of 54 acres of land on a ridge near the head of Browns Branch 5 Feb 1848 but I don't think anyone ever lived on this land.

I have a bit of other information about W.E. Mutters that I found in the Circuit Court Records Of Boone County. In 1892 there is an entry which states that <u>W.E. Hamilton</u> alias W.E. Mutters was charged with a felony in the April term of Court. Witness against him were M. G. Mitchell and G. W. Jarrell. I did not dig any further into this matter. Sometimes it is better to let certain things remain hidden.

In the 1890 birth records for Boone county there is an entry for Howard Mutters, born 3 June 1890, parents are listed as W.?. and Josephine. Could this have been a son of Bill and Frances (Josephine?) Mutters? Frances was a daughter of Micajah G. White.

Mrs. Hager told me they were trying to get the next issue of Kith and Kin out in time for the next meeting.

Just this week I heard from a Gore family correspondent who is a descendant of Robert and Thomsie (Jarrell) Gore. According to a Mormon Library record submitted by Mrs. Erma Jarrell Worthen of Kearns, Utah, Daniel's wife is listed as Mary Garland. (I believe you identified her as Mary Terry.) His birth is given as 1749 in Madison County, Virginia, and his death as 1804 in Monroe County. Her birth is listed as 1751 in Madison County, Virginia. Their children were listed as follows:

It is possible that the wife of Daniel Jarrell was Mary Garland instead of the Mary Terry which I show. I had noticed that Erma Jarrell Worthen listed Mary Garland as Daniel's wife. In her publication she also lists Nancy Haney as the wife of John Jarrell (my ancestor). There was a John Jarrett who married a Nancy Haney, but John Jarrell married Nancy Brown. I wonder if she didn't confuse Daniel Jarrell with his brother Solomon.

I have been working on the theory that Solomon Jarrell married Mary Garland and had children:

Garland S(olomon?) Jarrell who married Juliet, daughter of George Pearis. Simeon Jarrell who married Elizabeth Miller and named a son Garland (the strong man who died in the Mexican War).

Tomsie Jarrell who married Robert Gore. William Jarrell who married Mildred Ballard, daughter of Elijah and Millie.

The last three of the above list did not sign the deed for Daniel's land when it was purchased by Willis Ballard after Daniel's death. Garland S. Jarrell was living in the same general area as the others but apparently was not a son of Daniel and Mary.

Erma Worthen used the name Gibson Garland Jarrell. I wonder if she didn't confuse the two Garland's. A descendant of "Big" Gib Jarrell who is working the Meredith and Emily Jarrell Wells family line visited Erma's family after Erma's death. He told me that he went through Erma's notes but could not establish Mary Garland as Daniel's wife.

I have Solomon Jarrell's pension record and several other mention of him, but cannot put his family togather. Can you help me with this?

I am enclosing some Gore data given to me by Mr. Aubrey Smith before his death a few years ago. Hoping it will be of some use to you.

Daar Mr. Turner;

It was a pleasure speaking to you yesterday, and you the Kith and Kin, Volume III, erase a myriad of questions in My quest to find the parents of Cornelius White, my great-great-great grandfather.

A short resume of my lineage is enclosed; if it is of any help on the "White" disk side, good; if not just throw away.

After reading through the White family section, there are a few w questions that arise in my mind and hope you have the time and can answer them for me. The questions follow:

I. Where did you find the proof that John "Jack" Whate was the father of William White (he married Edutha White)?

My White family search has not been going on as long as yours, but, what I have done XMXXXXXXX indicated to me that Benjamin H. White could be the father of William White. (I will discuss this in a more detailed manner later in this letter)

II. Where did you find proof that Susannah Marcum's father was John Marcum? When John and Susannah were married Major Marcum was surety on the marriage bond; Of course this does not mean that major Marcum was the father, but normally the father, brother or close fixiend signed the bond—correct or not? In that period of time 1790 — 1800 in Montgomery County, there were three John Whites\* that were married.

John White

Surety & Father(Thomas Copley)

John White Susannah Marcum md: 10 May 1796 Surety: Major Marcum

In David E. Johnston's book, he states "Benjamin White and John White came from Amherst in 1780 and settled on Sugar Run." Montgomery Co. then Giles now. In Montgomery County Entry Book C 1787-1794, page 119, dated 1 Nov 1788 reads, I quote: "John White, assignee of William Preston, assignee of Charly Davis, by virtue of a land office treasury warrant N14070 and dated 31 Aug 1772 enters 50 acres of land on waters of Little Sugar run, the waters of Walker Croek Lying between a plantation which this White owns and the house in he lives to begin at the head of a spring and running toward Thomas Hammons line for quantity." Montgomery County Brief of Deeds Book 1 1776-1797 "John H. White to Joseph Cloyd 45 acres on Little Sugar Run for L20." Dated 16 oct 1793

From these documents, I have deduced (maybe right, maybe wrong) that John H. White and Benjamin were brothers or very close relatives; must have been close to come the distance from Amherst and settle in the same area—Sugar Run & Little Sugar Run (a branch of Sugar Run).

Enough of the John's. Back to William White. There was another William White in KXXKK Giles County. William White, I'M sure was the Son of John H. White, that married Lavinia Munsey 28 Jan 1820. I can follow him in the Giles County Personal Property Tax List up to 1834, then he disappears from Giles; not in 1840 Giles or Marcer County Census; probably moved on like so many of those families.

On page 128, Vol II, your book, The "other" Progenitor

Ref: OI. William White, born about 1798--- William White was born (if the 1850 Mercer Census taker was correct) in 1794; and did marry Edutha White on 2 Dec 1816 (Marriage Bond date, not necessarily date of marriage). They had four sons:

Andrew, b. 1818; Floyd, b. 1820; Benjamin, b. 1823; William H., b.1854.

Andrew md: (1) Mary Wiley, d. of James and Ann Wiley; 24 May 1845 in Mercer Co. (2) Elizabeth E. Foley, d. of James and Judy Foley; 1856, at this time he was 37 yrs 1 mo and 11 days old.

Floyd, bd: Rhoda Duncan, d. of Rev. Landon Duncan who married them on 2 Jan 1843. You have listed the other wives.

Benjamin md: Elizabeth E. Pearis, d. of George (1847) (I don't have exact date) Benjamin was Sheriff of Mercer county in 1866 thru 1870. I quote from a document in my possession: "Sheriff Benjamin White, a man of great native ability and powerful physique, who when aroused was bold to the point of utter fearlessness, secured a court order and removed the records by wagon from Concord to Princeton." Another: "Mr. White's 'strong and boisterous speech and serious charges so alarmed two members of the Board thay they gathered their hats and fled from the meeting place." I have his picture.

William H., md: Margaret F. Shannon in 1854 in Mercer Co. Full name was William Harrison White.

In 1860 William's land ownings were valued at \$27.000; personal property at \$1,000.

William's Will dated 7 Sept 1863, Proven in Mercer Court 18 Oct 1866. I quote a portion: "I will to my fee sons, Andrew, Floyd, Benjamin and William H. White, my flattop land equally, provided if there is any cost, each man pay his part."

Still on page 128, Vol II.

OII. Thomas White, born about 1800.——I have documents that state Thomas was born 1803, died 14 Oct 1883, buried in White Cemetary In Elgood, W.Va. (about six-seven miles east of Princeton.)
He married (1) Polly Jamison Bailey, d. of RMK Reuben Bailey and Sarah E. Ferguson. Reuben was son of Richard Bailey, Sr. who was son of Jamms Bailey. (James died 1763, Chesterfield County Va.) Sarah E. was daughter of Samuel Ferguson, Sr. and Mary Jamison, Sam and Mary moved from Giles to Cabell in 1803/4, he died 12 Feb 1825 in Cabell co., now Wayne. Sarah died 21 Sept 1829, same place. Icon three Somuel Require family brile to northern Inland to 1997.

Thomas' first wife died 37 Jah 1899 in Boone County, She must have divorced Thomas because he remarried to Rebecca Blankenship; she died 3 Jan 1899 and is buried with Thomas in the White Cemetary. (I have not taken the time to find out any details on this situation)

Let me digress to Benjamin Harrison White. How did you determine that Benjamin H. White and Nancy are the same people that married in Amherst in 1785. I understand that Benjamin came from Amherst, but the certainness that they are the same is what I'm asking.

(I'm probably too meticulous(Netti Schreiner-Yantis says I am) but unless I have proof by interview of descendents or documents I keep on searching for that positive proof.) When we talked on the phone I stated I could follow Ben H. through 1850 in Logan County Personal Property Tax Lists; I stated wrong-I can follow him through 1848, then no more mention of Benjamin H. in Logan Tax Krab.

Another reason why I think Benjamin H. and John H. are brothers is that John H. White died between 19 May 1847 and 28 June 1847. I have copy of his will, dated 18 May 1848 and admitted to record on 28 June 1847. As far as I can determine he and hancy had 10 sons and 5 daugneers. If Denjamin died between 1848 and

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To you, who had had so many years searching the White Family, my deductions may sound very unsound, however please bear with me in my train of thought. (The train may be off the track)

Because of William & Edetha naming one of their sons Benjamin and not any were named John; Benj. W. White naming a son Cornelius; and a son named Andrew (like Williams son) Cornelius naming a son John Wesley, like Benj. Wesley; Cornelius naming a Son Overton; and Overton H. naming a son Albert like Cornelius' son, William naming a daughter Louisa, his son Andrew naming a son Nathaniel Harrison, --- Well enough of that. Document where he is appointed sheriff of Mercer 1849-50.

Document where he is Justice of Peace, Mercer, for period1855 to 128 1864.

Record of Fidicuaries Book 1, appointing John S. Carr, Ficicuary of Estate Oct 1874. Year of his death. I have not been able to get to Mercer County to check all the White Cemetaries, and come spring I will go there and check them all. I am in correspondence with a lady in Princeton that descends through Thomas White, Reuben White, Mary Eliz., d. of Reuben, who married a Pennington, and finally married David White, now living in Princeton.

Well, Mr. Tirner, please for ive all my typos, (this is a new electric and doesn't write good englishk). Should you know anyone that knows anything about Cornelius, please steer them my way.

Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of January 13th concerning the White family. I am in total agreement with you that we are of the same branch of the family, and, like you, have not found positive proof of the connection between Benjamin H. and Cornelius White.

First I would like to point out that Mrs. Agnes B. Pearlman deserves most of the credit for the article which appeared in Volume II, Kith and Kin of Boone County, West Virginia. We worked independently and togather over a period of several years gathering the basic data. When the Boone County Genealogical Society, of which we are both members, ask her to do an article on the White family of this area for their publication, she ask me to co-author it with her which I was more than willing to do.

An analysis of the 1810 census enumeration for Giles County tend to indicate that Benjamin H. White at that time had four sons still living at home at that time. There were also five daughters. The sons were, according to what few records we have plus family traditions, John, James, Benjamin W., and Micajah Goodwin White. It is possible that they had other children not staying at home.

Had William, Cornelius, Thomas and Overton been sons of Benj. H. and Nancy (Goodwin) White, my thoughts are that they should have been enumerated with his family since all of them were sixteen years of age or younger.

Your question about Benjamin H. White who married in Amherst County, Virginia, 10 July 1787 Nancy Goodwin, daughter of Micajah and Elizabeth (Burford) Goodwin, being the same persons of that name who came to this area. The best answer that I have to that question was given to me by Mrs. Donald F. Black, another White researcher of our branch of the family. Her husband was a Circuit Judge and she was a lawyer for some time. I don't know their present address as she didn't answer my last letters. What she said when I ask her the same question was "Who but a daughter of Micajah Goodwin would hang a name like Micajah Goodwin White on a son." Of course there is other evidence.

Micajah Goodwin White was living in close proximity to Andrew Workman when the 1850 Boone census was taken. In Andrew and

Louisa (White) Workman's household was Nancy White, age 92 which perhaps should be 82 since in the 1840 census she is in the 70 to 80 bracket. We know that Louisa Workman was a daughter of Benjamin White by the Workman Family History by Thelma Anderson, page 610, which shows that Andrew Workman married Benjamin's daughter. Some of the research on this book was done about 1925 in the vicinity where Andrew Workman and Micajah G. White lived and at that time several of Micajah's children were still living and supposedly furnished the data.

A letter from Mrs. Minnie Horne who lived in Florida and who was a granddaughter of Micajah White, states that her father and Dr. Russell White were first cousins. Other correspondence substantiate this.

One of my grandfather's brothers, Uncle Bruce White, who was a grandson of James White (brother of Micajah G. White), and I worked togather nearly thirty years ago on the White family genealogy. He was also a big help in establishing the early generations. Most of Uncle Bruce's work was based on tradition.

All traditions are originally based on fact and it is natural for blood relations to retain a reasonably accurate recollection of those in their family whose personal history is of material importance to them. These recollections being passed down to the future generations may in time become somewhat distorted as to details, but an element of truth remains.

You mentioned the repetition of names which are common to our branch of the large White, of which I am also proud to be part of, I think this is one of the best means of establishing relationship whenever documentation has remained unavailable or ambiguous. This is the only way that I have found to connect the William White (who married Editha) to the Benjamin H. White branch- she was probably one of the unidentified daughters. The same holds true for the Overton White family- Matilda was perhaps one of the unidentified daughters also. Have you found anything that would prove otherwise?

I have not collected (or accumulated) a great deal of paper on the White family, as I have access to most of the county records which have been microfilmed and placed in the West Virginia Deptartment of Archives and History in Charleston - thirty-seven miles from Madison. They have also all the West Virginia census enumerations and the soundex films, most of the county histories that have been published and a large selection of family geneal-

Thank you for the information, I want to study it for a while and then will probably have some additional comments.

Dear Mr. Davis:

This is the first opportunity I have had to write since returning home from my Easter vacation. I will try to cover a few of the points you raised in your letter to David Turner.

Regarding identity of Benjamin Harrison White: Because of "known" family relationships still recognized by an elderly cousin, there is little doubt in my mind that the Benjamin Harrison White of logan County, West Virginia, is the one who married Nancy Goodwin in Amherst County, Virginia. Nancy's sister, Spicey Goodwin, married Archelaus Mitchell in Campbell County, Virginia. The sisters were daughters of Micajah and Elizabeth (Burford) Goodwin. The sisters and their spouses and families both settled ultimately on upper Buffalo Creek in what became logan County, West Virginia. I am descended from both sisters through their grandchildren, second cousins who married each other and knew themselves to be cousins: Micajah Goodwin Mitchell (son of Jordan D. and Isabel J. (Gore) Mitchell) who married White White (daughter of Micajah Goodwin and Matilda (Workman) White). The Giles County, Virginia, deeds mention Benjamin H. and Nancy White, husband and wife. Although her maiden surname is not given in the deeds, I have not found any evidence that they were other than the couple married in Amherst County. Furthermore, Benjamin White was specifically listed as a bachelor on the marriage bond, so we know that he did not have any previous marriages.

I belive the answer to many of the unsolved riddles nests with learning the identity of the Benjamin White of Wythe County, Virginia. Have you eliminated him as a candidate for father of "your" Cornelius White? Was your ancestor the one who married Polly Garrason 25 Hay 1816 in Giles County, Virginia? It is likely that this Benjamin was closely related to Benjamin Harrison White (cousin, nephew, or uncle?); if so, it would not be unusual for the same family given names to be carried on in descendants of both men. At least one child of Benjamin Harrison White married in Wythe County, possibly becoming acquainted with his future wife while visiting his White cousins there. I doubt that Cornelius was a son of Benjamin Harrison White since there were not enough males in his age group in 1810. Or did Cornelius have an earlier marriage?

You might be interested in the later whereabouts of the William White who married Lavinia Hunsey 18 January 1820 in Giles County, Virginia. Their son, Lewis Jackson White married Heriba Elswick 5 August 1844 in Kanawha County, (West) Virginia. I have not followed later migrations and received this information from a descendant. How did you determine that this William was the son of John Hunter and Nancy (Copley) White?

Naming John and Susannah (Marcum) White as parents of the William White who married Editha White came as a result of the information in Ragland's History of Logan County, but I have found no documentation which would prove such a relationship. Indeed, if he were born about 1794 rather than 1798 as previously speculated, he would have been born before the marriage of John and Susannah.

I was pleased to have the information you had obtained regarding the sons of Milliam and Editha (White) White. I had never searched the Mercer County, West Virginia, record books for White family data so had not seen his will. You identify the daughter who married Levi Hearin/Hearn as Arony White; I had thought her name was Anny White. There was apparently one other daughter born about 1825—besides those listed in the 1850 census record.

If we were able to find with whom the children of Overton and Matilda (White/Hite) were living in 1860, it might tell us something about their relatives. My data on surname of Matilda is contradictory—some listing White, other showing Hite. Are their deaths listed in the Cabell County, West Virginia, Death Register?

I suppose you are aware that a Cornelius White married Catherine Hall, daughter of Moses Hall 2 November 1789 in Amherst County, Virginia. Whether he is related to your Cornelius, I cannot say. It is certainly possible, however. I have abstracted all White marriages in Amherst, Giles, Tazewell, Kanawha, Wythe, Montgomery, Boone, Cabell, plus numerous miscellaneous records of southern West Virginia and Couthwestern Virginia. I should have said, all pre-1850 marriages and later for Boone County.

Your comments on my observations would be most welcome. As mentioned previously, I would also appreciate your listing of the children of John Hunter and Nancy (Cobley/Copley) White.

Do let me know if there is anything you would like to have me cheek in my files for you.

The copy of your letter to Mr. Charley Davis was received today. I do have a few comments to make concerning the Cornelius White who married Polly Garrison 25 May 1816 in Giles County, Virginia.

As you know, the Giles 1810 census show four families named White - James, John, John H., and Benjamin H.

- (a) James White Apparently none of his children married between 1810 and 1820. This rules him out as being the father of Cornelius who married in 1816.
- (b). John White Had only one son that married between 1810 and 1820.

  This would be the William who married Editha (If Ragland is correct) in 1816.
- (c) John H. White- Also had only one son who married (disappears from household) between the above mentioned census years. This would be the William who married Lavinia Munsey 28 January 1820 in Giles County.
- (d) Benjamin H. White There are two males who appear in his household in the 1810 census who don't appear in the household in 1820. One of these apparently is James P. White, my ancestor, and the other is either Cornelius, or the John who married Susannah Elkins. If the marriage of John and Susannah Elkins took place after the census enumerations of 1820, who is the male in Benjamin H. White's household who disappears in 1820. Cornelius??

It is possible that the John White who married Susannah Elkins was a son of John Hunter White and not Benjamin H. as we show in <u>Kith and Kin</u> of Boone County, West Virginia.

I, too, have been very busy during the past winter. Have finished the Floyd Cook Family Genealogy for my daughter and son-in-law. I am back again on the White Family.

After receiving your letter of April 21, I once again reviewed my White family notes and can make a few comments and corrections:

First, we were in error in attributing the marriage of John White to Susannah Elkins as "about 1824." They were, in fact, married before 1820 if one may judge by the 1820 cansus. They are apparently the couple living in Giles County, Virginia, without any children that year. All the other John Whites in Giles and Cabell Counties are accounted for in our article.

Secondly, since we never proved that the above John White was a son of Benjamin H. and Nancy (Goodwin) White, it is possible that he belonged to someone else. In such a case, it is possible that Connelious White was the son of Benjamin H. White. As you observed in your letter, there were two males in the 1810 household of Benjamin H. White who do not appear in his household of 1820. One, of course, is your ancestor, James P. White; and we had speculated that the other was the John White who married Susannah Elkins. I wonder if the court minutes of Giles or Cabell County would shed some light on this subject.

Thirdly, as I mentioned previously, I believe a better determination of the various relationships would be possible if the Wythe County, Virginia, records were studied. I expect to be in Salt Lake City early next month and will see what I can find.

Further, if John H. White had only one son who left his household between 1810 and 1820 and it is known that this would be the William who married Lavinia Munsey, then neither John above nor Cornelious would have been his son. All this, of course, assumes that all unmarried children were in the household at the taking of the census.

If, in our renewed white family research, we make significant new discoveries, perhaps we should consider a sequel to our first article in KITH AND KIN OF BOONE COUNTY.

Concerning the White family of Wythe County which you mentioned in your last letter. Several years ago I spent a couple of days in Wythe County doing research on my Robinette family, also exploring the possibility that my James P. White was the son of the Benjamin White who was living in Wythe County when the 1810 and the 1820 census were taken. I searched most of the records in the courthouse, but failed to find anything that would tie them togather.

Names common to my James P. White's family such as Benjamin H., Benjamin Wesley, Goodwin, Editha, Polina, Louisa, Nancy, etc. did not appear in the Wythe County line of Whites.

The Benjamin White's household shown in the Wythe 1810 and 1820 census show that no males disappear from his household during that period. Three females shown in the 1810 census do not appear in his household in 1820.

Mr. Charley Davis mentioned in a letter the distance that James P. White would have had to travel to court Mary Robinette if he had been a son of Benjamin H. White. The distance would have been far greater had he have been a son of the Benjamin White who was living in Wythe County.

Concerning a sequel to our article in Kith and Kin. I think it is a splendid idea.

I have been very busy during the past few weeks with family genealogy, especially the White and Robinette families. Also have been typing the Boone 1900 Census.

I was just ready to respond to your letter of April 25 regarding the Christian Colliery Company when your letter of May 7 with additional notes about the White family arrived.

At the present time, I cannot shed any light on whether the Christian family had any direct connection to the Christian Colliery Company. Certainly, nothing in my research so far would indicate that anyone closely connected to my direct line was engaged in mining. In fact, about the twin of the century the family sold their property to others who later converted use of the land to mining.

Could you let me know where Mahan is situated? I have searched for it on all maps, both new and old—in my possession and cannot locate it. Once I know where it is, I could let you know what I have about Christian groups in that vicinity. My records do not extend later than about 1900, however, except for the descendants of James P. and Anne (Moore) Christian. They were the progenitors of most of the Logan County, West Virginia, Christians.

For my current evaluation of our White connections, please refer to the enclosed communication in response to Charley L. Pavis' recent letter.

Thank you so much for the mine scrip--the first for our family coin collection! Be assured I will let you know if I discover anything about the Christian connection to it.

Thank you for the copy of your letter to Charley Davis. I thought your response to the problems he had posed in his letter of April 25 were well answered.

In regard to the town of Mahan: It is located on Paint Creek of Fayette County- near the Fayette and Kanawha County line. The Christian Colliery Company mines (there were several of them) were opened up in the early 1900s. My father came from Chesterfield County, Virginia about 1902 to build the houses at Burnwell, a few miles below Mahan. He could have built the Mahan houses also.

The Christian Colliery Co. was perhaps formed by a Frank Christian of Lynchburg, Virginia.

I am still working on the Boone 1900 census, and of course the White family I never stop on it.

Dear Charley:

Thank you for your letter and the information which you enclosed concerning our White family. Sometimes I think it will be impossible to straighten out all the Benjamin's, John's, William's, etc.

Concerning Ragland's quote about Ben White: Ragland done very little record searching on the families which he wrote about. He relied instead on what people told him. His information in many instances does not check with what the records show. However, he did record a lot of information about the people of Logan County that would have otherwise been lost. In Ben White's case, Mrs. Black of Parkersburg, wrote me in one of her many letters, that Ragland got his information about the White family from her uncle, Carlos Van Buren White, who run a store and kept a post office on Buffalo Greek. He was also sort of the family historian and a good friend of Ragland. She thought perhaps that her uncle had confused the date and place where the Whites came from, with the date and place the Brownings (her mother's people) came from. I have presumed that she got her information from her father, Judge Bland of Logan, who was well acquainted with Ragland.

As to the Pensioners in Logan County in 1830 —— Not all Revolutionary War soldiers were eligible for pensions. Some of them didn't even apply for one and some who did were turned down because they owned too much property. Especially if they had several acres of good land and owned several horses, cattle, sheep, etc. I don't say this was the case with Benjamin H. White, but it could have been.

Have you examined the Auditors Books of Virginia? Volume XVIII, should show if Benjamin H. White received Bounty Land for services in the Revolution and in some cases gives a little more information. I will check it the next time I am in Richmond.

I will continue looking for the answers.

Thank you for the additional information regarding Mahan and the Christian Colliery Company mines.

If, indeed, the owner was a Frank Christian of Lynchburg, Virginia, he may have been

the following individual or one closely related to him:

Judge Frank Patterson Christian, born 18 November 1856 in Lynchburg, Virginia, son of Edward Dunscombe and Cornelia (Burton) Christian; died 6 June 1933. He married in 1890 Mary Lucretia Dearing, born 27 August 1863, died 13 February 1947, the daughter of James Clark and Roxanna (Burchett) Dearing.

Frank Patterson and Mary Lucretia (Dearing) Christian had the following children: James Dearing Christian, born 16 February 1891, died 26 September 1933;

married 1917 Josephine Percy Handy or Wandy.
Frank Patterson Christian, Ir., born 24 February 1896, died 2 January
1944; married 1926 Mary Burnley Wilson. This may have
been the Frank Christian who opened the mines.

Charles Lynch Christian, born 21 November 1893, died after 1964; married 28 September 1918 . (I seem not to have copied name of his wife.)

Cornelia Dunscombe Christian married Claiborne W. Gooch, Ir. No further information.


Harrison Christian, born 24 September 1900, died 16 January 1954. No further information.

Of course, there may have been other men named Frank Christian in Lynchburg; but I have no easily available record of them if there were.

Although the Lynchburg Christians may have been distantly related to the more familiar West Virginia Christian groups, there is as yet no documentation as to the exact tie. As I mentioned previously, I have very little post-1900 information on these other lines. I do recall seeing a biographical sketch about Judge Christian in one of the turn-of-century publications. He and his family were quite prominent in Lynchburg political and social circles. I will certainly keep you informed about any discoveries I might make regarding the Christian Colliery Company.

Copies of your recent letters to David Turner have arrived, and I believe that I am in a position to clarify several questions, especially regarding the Hitchells.

The marriage of Spicey Goodwin 7 March 1791 was to Archelaus Mitchell. Although I do not have copy of the Winister's Return, I do have photocopy of the original concent form and bond. It is my belief that Archelaus' name was probably abbreviated on the Winister's Return and that "Arch!" was incorrectly transcribed as "Arthur." There is absolutely no doubt that his name was Archelaus. On the bond, it is spelled out in full in the signature and abbreviated trice in the body of the bond: on the concent form signed by Micafah Goodwin, his name is spelled out in full. The concent form and the bond are both dated 3 Harch 1791. Of interest is the fact that a Benjamin white was one of the witnesses to the concent form.

The Thomas Mitchell who married Eady Trent 2 January 1792 was a brother of the Archelaus Mitchell who married Spicey Goodwin. In fact, there was a double wedding 2 January 1792 when their sister, Patsy Mitchell, married Eady's brother, John B. Trent. These marriages took place in Amherst County, Virginia. I have ample documentation that Archelaus Mitchell, Sr., had the following children:

Archelaus Mitchell, Jr., martied Spicey Goodein per above; he born 1770-1775.

John Hitchell, born before 1775; no further information.

Patsy Mitchell, born after 1772, married John B. Trent per above. Thomas Mitchell, born after 1774, married Easy Trent per above.

Rowling Hitchell, born 1776-1784, married 30 September 1805 in Amherst County, Virginia, Nancy White, daughter of Arthur. They were in Bote-ourt County. Virginia in 1820.

Stella Mitchell, born 1782-1785, married William Jones 20 January 1802 in Amherst County, Virginia.

At his death before 12 September 1799 when inventory of estate was taken, Archelaus Hitchell, Sr., left widow named Hannah. I believe she was probably mother of his children but have no proof. I have pages of deeds, estate papers, guardianship papers, concent forms, etc. which prove that his family consisted of at least the children shown above.

Although Archelaus Nitchell does not seem to be a common name, I must say that there were. I believe, as many Archelaus Mitchells as there were Benjamin Whites. Often the name was incorrectly transcribed as Archebald or. as above. Arthur.

I do not yet have definitive proof but believe that the Archelaus Mitchell who married Milley Burk/Burkes 19 November 1784 was the same one who married Patsey Terry 26 December 1795 in Louisa County, Virginia. There was an Archelaus Mitchell who served as a sergeant in the Revolutionary War, a carpenter and house joiner by trade and in his pension papers refers to "second wife." This was in 1820 when he was 67 years of age and living in Amherst County, Virginia.

There was also the Archelaus Mitchell, born 1770-1780, who married Naomi Hill 12 July 1809 in Franklin County, Virginia, and who moved about 1828 to Weakley Comunty, Tennessee. He was the son of the Thomas MHN Mitchell whose estate was settled in Montgomery County, Virginia, in 1820.

I have records of numerous other men named Archelaus Mitchell living at the same time as the above. Because of documents in my possession, I know those mentioned herein to have been different individuals.

In regard to your "reaching" on the Amherst County, Virginia, White connections: it seems to me that the men you show as possible parents of Benjamin H. and John White were more likely their contemporaries than their parents. I believe that the Arthur White was probably the one who was "of Albemarle County, Virginia" 16 October 1777 when he married Suckey Magann, probably daughter of Joseph Magann. The Cornelius White is probably the one who married Catherine Hall 2 November 1789. The Benjamin White in all probability could even be Benjamin H. White who had not yet sold all his interests in Amherst County, Virginia. I know that in the case of Archelaus and Spicey (Goodwin) Mitchell, they moved from Amherst County, Virginia, to Montgomery County, Virginia, also to Rockbridge County, Virginia, then back to Amherst County, Virginia, and finally back to that portion of the state which became West Virginia—all this before they finally settled in Logan County, (West) Virginia. Certainly we know that Benjamin went back to Amherst County, Virginia, to marry.

This brings up one possibility to which we have not given sufficient attention. It is quite likely that it was an earlier generation of brothers John and Benjamin who originally went to Sugar Run. In such a case, John H. and Benjamin H. White could be sons of either the elder John or Benjamin. Just "reaching."

A correction to your page 2 of letter to David Turner: The John White whom we attributed to Benjamin H. White would not have been the one you identify as "1." The John White who married Susannah Elkins was already dead before 1850 and could not have been listed in a census that year. Furthermore, the John shown with wife Elizabeth in Logan County's 1850 census was the son of Benjamin and Anna (Stuart) White as proven by his subsequent marriage 22 April 1873 to Susan Pace, widow of Alexander Varney, wherein his parents are named.

If we keep on working on these families, I am sure we will find more answers.

P. S. In passing, you might be interested in the fact that another of the witnesses to Micajah Goodwin's concent for his daughter Spicey to marry Archelaus Mitchell was one Jeremiah Taylor. This was the husband of Ann Mitchell, sister of Archelaus Mitchell, Sr. If you recall, Susannah (Elkins) White married a Thomas Taylor after John White's death. I wonder if there was a connection!

About the time your letter of May 25 came, so did my grandchildren and with a two-year-old and a ne-year-old in the house, there is not much correspondence going on. Anyway, we are always glad to see them.

Today the copy of Mrs. Pearlman's letter to you came and since she has done extensive research on the Mitchell family, I am glad that she answered the questions which you had posed to me. I couldn't have answered them anyway and would have passed them on to her.

In regard to the father of our Benjamin H. White: I, too, occasionally do some "reaching" when there seems to be no other way to find a lost person. However, Wesley White is the best possibility that I have found to be the father of Benjamin H. White.

To "reach" a little: It is my belief that Benjamin H. White spent some time in East Tennessee between 1783 and 1787. If he was a son of wesley white it would be only natural for him to go with his parents to a new home. Apparently, wesley did move to East Tennessee about 1783 and was among the first settlers of what later became Jefferson County. As you perhaps know, wesley disappears from the Southwest Virginia records in 1782.

I am enclosing some of my notes on the White family which were taken from Worth Ray's <u>Tennessee Cousins</u>, a history that I have found to be very reliable. Many of the families mentioned in these notes were togather in Rockingham, Frederick, Augusta, and Shenandoah Counties. Later moved to Southwest Virginia; and end up in East Tennessee.

I will continue to White hunt.

That same year he moved with his family to what is now Knox County and settled on the North side of the French Broad, near the present Riverdale, the same place that Alexander Campbell who established Campbell's Station, had lived in 1790. The next year Capt. White and some of the others settled on White's Creek. -----



About the Whites who served in World War I - The monument on the Court House lawn lists the names of all the service men from Boone County who served in World War I. I am enclosing a list of the ones with the surname WHITE.

As to World War II - The best record that I have found for that war is the one compiled by the local V.F.W. Post. (I am also enclosing a photocopy showing the ones named WHITE (also the ones named WORKMAN for your records).

I have never seen a list for the Spanish-American War, but I am sure there is one. Perhaps in the Archives in Charleston. I will check the next time I am in there.

Contrary to the belief of some local historians, the family of Russell White was a Union family and very strongly opposed to slavery. Tradition is that after Russell and Julia married, John Jarrell, Julia's father, offered to give them a slave as he had his other children, Russell refused and John gave him 4,000 acres of land instead.

Anything that I can do to help with the article, just let me know.

You could be right about the James White who signed the Marriage bond for William and Editha, but I am more inclinded to believe that it was Editha's brother, James White, who was born in the early 1790s and who would have been of age.

Mr. Hermon White, It., Star Route 2, Bor 1520, Madison, West Virginia 25130, informed me of the death dates of two sons of Micafah Goodwin and Hatitda (Borhwan) White:

Benjamin H. White, born about 1835 died June 11, 1882, in the General

Hospital of Charleston, Deat Virginia, of typhold fever.

Joseph N. White, born about 1838, died June 12, 1868, in Petersburgh,

Virginia, in the General Hospital of the same disease. He is descended from Andrew W. White, born 9 February 1853, and has additional information about some of their children beyond what was printed in our original article.

Congratulations on your fine research work in Gitze Countai Being able to place so many additional Unites in appropriate family groups is a valuable step toward the ultimate goal of doing that for all the early Whites in southern West Virginia and southwestern Virginia.

As you may kepy noticed, the Sally White who warried William Cooper 6 Newamber 1818 one Eisted through whitele as one of those who winte have been a daughter of Benjamin H. and Nancy (Novimin) White. Now, with the consent form (which I had not seen), she can delinitely be so lientified. I'm actinhted you lound the form.

Fou ask about a John White with mile Elizabeth who might have been parents of the Elizabeth [White] Williams who died 95 Vecember 1880 at 70 years of acc-1 would owess from the context of your letter in Giles County, Virginia.

1) A nather fan-fetched vossibility would be the one kamen as Old Juch while, who had a wise called Bidge. Bidde, like bette, is a nickname for Elizabeth; however, I have not to lind a record which would give Bidde's formal given ware. Since we also do not have record for a birth date for Bidde, we can only guess whether she was still journe enough to have a child about 1810. Bidde's squarest son was born about 1790.

2) Another possibility could be John white, son of Senjacin and Anna (Stewart) white. We was married at least three times. My records show only an initial "E." for name of his first wife. This could, of course, be for "Elizabeth"; and they could have been the parents of Elizabeth Williams—this if John were born five to ten years before the estimated 1800 birth date which I show. His second wife was named Elizabeth, but he married her too late—about 1849-50.

3) There was an impleeper in Charleston, Kanawha County, West) Virginia, in 1859 named John D. White with wife Elizabeth. I have no idea about their ages except that she had a child that year. This may be the same John D. White, aged 25 in 1850 listed as a S. B. Captain, who had 25-year-old wife Elizabeth. They obviously would not be the parents of Elizabeth Williams.

Do you think the James white, born in England, could have been the one who married 8 September 1800 Mary Campbell, daughter of Alexander Campbell of Augusta County, Virginia?

As I reviewed once more the notes and correspondence you have sent, I must say that the weight of circumstantial evidence would point toward your ancestor Cornelius as being a son of Benjamin H. and Mancy (Goodwin) White. David Turner and I perhaps should have

accepted Ragland's placement of the John who married Susannah Elkins in the household of John and Susannah (Marcum) White. If we could locate some of their descendants, perhaps the parentage could be clarified. If the John, husband of Susannah Elkins should be definitely removed from the family of Benjamin H. and Nancy (Goodwin) White, I hope that substantiation can be found before an article appears in the next issue of KITH AND KIN OF BOONE COUNTY. WEST VIRGINIA.

Certainly the same can be wished for documentation which would establish the parentage of your ancestor. Cornelius. Have you been able to determine how Cornelius white acquired his 120 acres of land on East River? If there is no record of purchase, then it is likely that it passed direct to him without benefit of recording from his father. A deed from one of Cornelius' descendants (possibly with a different surname) years later might describe how and when the land came into the family. I would be interested in whether or not you have explored this avenue—admittedly rather difficult if the transfer out of the family has a different surname as grantor.

In comparing the Personal Property Tax Lists of Montgomery County, Virginia, and Giles County, Virginia, with the available census records, it becomes apparent that they lived in close proximity in Giles County--Benjamin H. and Connelius White, that is. Benjamin H. was Living on the Big Spring of East River at the same time that Connelius was living on East River. I doubt that Benjamin ever lived on the properties which he sold in 1219 since he purchased them only about two years before (those on Christian's Fork of Brush Creek). It is possible that Connelius remained on the East River land of his father, or at least retained possession of some of it. I have yet to find a deed wherein Banjamin H. and Maney White sold their East River land. Mave you seen such a document?

Interestingly, the land and census records don't seem to have anything on John and Biddy White. I wonder if he ever actually urrived in logan County with his "family of grown men and one daughter" as Ragland bays. I suppose he could be the same John who married Elizabeth Davenport, but I have absolutely nothing to so identify him. If Elizabeth Davenport's husband, John White, did not die until 1834, he should appear on a census someplace. I wonder if they were indeed John and Biddy and if they moved to Ohio with their daughter and son in-law: Robert and Nancy (White) Whitt.

I'm beginning to get too far afield with speculation so will close for the present. Do continue to keep me informed of progress. I'm hoping in September to have some hours to devote to research, and I'll let you know what I find.

I was in Charleston yesterday and stopped in at the Archives to check on the Whites in the Spanish-American War. I didn't find any from Boone County, but did find two from Dingess, Logan County. The Adjutant General's Report for the period shows Honan and Leonard B. White both enlisted 24 Jun 1898 and served until 10 Apr 1899. They were in Company K, Second Inf.

Andrew Beckett and Mary (Elkins) White had a son named Leonard B. White. I don't know who the Honan White was.

There isn't any record that I can find that shows the parents of the men who served in the military during World Wars - 1 and II. However, I have added the parents to the World War 1 list, but as to the World War 11 men and women, it will take a long time to make up that list.

I might add to the Spanish-American War soldiers two Workmans and a Mitchell from Boone County, they were Frederick and Wilburn W. Workman from Comfort, Boone County, 8th and 6th July 1898 and served until 10 Apr 1899. The Mitchell was Marion. C. from Danville who enlisted 23 Jun 1898 and served until 10 Apr 1899. The Workmans were in Company K, Second Inf., and the Mitchell was in Company M, Second Infantry.

First of all, "Thank you" for sending the copy of your Giles County 1806 Tax Lists. I am sure they will prove to be very helpful. I congratulate you on doing such a fine job on it.

About the two Susannah Marcums -- It certainly would appear that one of them was a daughter of Major Marcum. I, too, think it would be very unlikely for there to have been two in one family. As a passing thought, could there have been two John Marcums with daughters named Susannah? I hardly think that was the case.

Charley, I think there is as much evidence that Cornelius White was a son of Benjamin H. White, as there is for some of the other children whom we have attributed to him. Have you explored the possibility that his full name might have been John Cornelius White?

In some of the Maryland records there is a marriage of a John Cornelius to Sarah White, widow of Stephen. This White family used many of the names that are common to our set of Whites. Stephen and Sarah had a son William who came from the Monocacy Valley of Maryland in 1734 and settled in the Harrisonburg, Virginia area near Smith Creek. He died before 7 May 1766 (date his will was proven) and his will mentions sons, William and Wesley. There was another son named Benjamin who died before his father, William White, he left a will in which he leaves his clothes to his younger brothers, William and Wesley. Or perhaps it was Joseph and Wesley (I will have to hunt up the will).

I don't have proof that these were our Whites, neither have I been able to eliminate them.

The deed from John Hector and his wife to the Whites and others is interesting. I had thought that this land was perhaps part of the Robert Morris survey and they were getting good title to what they already had???

Thank you for the order for my 1860 CENSUS: ANNOTATED - LOGAN COUNTY, W.VA. I hope it will be helpful to you. Your copy was mailed November 12.

About the articles for KITH AND KIN - I think you have done a wonderful job with them. It seems to me that what you have put togather should clear up any corrections that needs to be made in the article that appeared in Volume Two of Kith and Kin.

On the third page of THOSE PUZZLING WHITE CONNECTIONS you mention that Benjamin White, who married Ann Stuart, had eight children. I have only seven listed for him. They are the ones mentioned by Ragland, namely: John, Arter, Ben, William, James, Nancy and Margaret. However, in another place in his history he does mention that William Sansom (son of John) married a daughter of Ben White.

The marriage records of Lawrence County, Kentucky shows that a William Sansom and Polly White were married in that county 7 February 1824. Apparently it is the same couple who made their home in Logan County and had children named James, Gordon, Wesley, Floyd, Overton, Andrew, Melvin and Parthena. These names are common to the "Chickasaw" Ben White family. They are not common to the John White set of Whites.

I don't know which Ben White that Ragland meant, but I have a feeling that Polly belonged to our set of Whites. Furthermore, several White and Sansom researchers have tentatively listed Chickasaw Ben White as the father of Polly and want my opinion. Can you shed any light on Ben?

Thank you for your prompt response to my letter of November 10. I am looking forward to receiving copy of the 1860 Logan County Census.

As for the family of Benjamin and Anna (Stewart) White: It is my belief that they did have eight children rather than just the seven mentioned by Ragland. This is based primarily on reading of the census records from 1820 through 1850. I believe further that the daughter he left out was Mary "Polly" White who married William Sansom. That their marriage took place on the Kentucky side of the river simply adds another bit of circumstantial evidence because we know that at least two of Benjamin and Anna White's children married in Pike County, Kentucky. Now you have found the marriage of Mary in Lawrence County, Kentucky.

Although I realize that a reading of the early census records is by no means conclusive, it is apparent that there were three young girls in the family of Ben and Anna in 1820. One of them (I think, Mary) was no longer in the household in 1830. This would correspond to her having married in 1824 and left home by then. Although I do not know the precise order of children, here is household as I have reconstructed it based on 1820 census of Cabell County:

Do you happen to know names of wives of William, James, and Benjamin?

Enclosed are corrected sheets Nos. 5 and 6 for manuscript I recently sent. They contain additional data about the children of Cornelius White primarily. Please note that William and Cerling were definitely sons whereas the Benjamin I had listed was actually a son of William and Editha (White) White. Charley Davis sent the revised data.

While discussing the identity of Mary (White) Sansom above, I forgot to comment on the similarity of given names to our White family. I am more than ever convinced

that our line of Whites and the "other" Whites were very closely related in the next earlier generations and that it would therefore not be unusual for children of both lines to carry similar names. If, as our new article speculates, the John who married Susannah Elkins was of the "other" line, such would be the case.

Also, I cannot find a place for Mary (White) Sansom in the family of Benjamin H. and Nancy (Goodwin) White. Of course, I realize that she could perhaps fit there in place of Editha; but I do think that Editha belongs where we have tentatively placed her. I believe the evidence shows that Editha who married William White was herself a White. If certain family data which Charley Davis mentions can be accepted as a lead, descendants confused her maiden name with her mother's maiden name. Following

is the comment from Charley:

Comment: I have been corresponding with a Jewell White, a Henrietta White, and a Billy Gore, each of them find ladies, in Princeton, W. Va. A lot of the data from them has been handed down by cousins, uncles, etc., and a lot of places in the material states that William White married a "Goodwin girl". I have asked them to try and find where this idea comes or came from but they can't tell me except that a niece sent it to them and the niece is dead. Until they or I can prove Editha was a "Goodwin girl" I will go with what you and Dave day in Kith and Kin; although she has not been definitely placed in Benjamin & Nancy's family.

Wouldn't you say that with the tendency of descendants to skip generations (particularly easy if husband and wife in one generation carried the same surname) that it is even more likely than we originally thought that Editha was indeed a daughter of

Benjamin and Nancy (Goodwin) White?

I will be quite interested in any new information you and your other correspondents discover.

Your 1860 Census arrived, and I am looking forward to having the opportunity to make use of it.

Just this past week I have received two letters on the White family. One was from a three-time descendant of the Logan County progenitor, John White. He was especially interested in our original placement of the John White who married Suzannah Elkins. I told him that we were now inclined to accept Ragland's placement of this John as a son of John and Suzannah (Marcum) White and that if Benjamin Harrison White did indeed have a son named John who left widow and children, then his records have been lost to us. Have we identified all Whites in the Logan County 1850 census now? I am enclosing the family group record sent by Vern O. Whitman, the descendant of John and Susannah (Elkins) White.

Also enclosed is some material received from Norma Evans. She has copied the data from the microfilmed copy of Aubrey Smith's collection. Interestingly, he gives maiden name of the Wife of William White as Workman. That now makes her a White girl, a Goodwin girl, or a Workman girl. I will stick with White until I find out how Mr. Smith came to his conclusion—or until new evidence is uncovered.

Naturally, I would be interested in your comments on any of the enclosed.

It certainly does appear that the Polly White who married William Sansom was a daughter of Benjamin and Anna (Stewart) White, instead of Benjamin and Nancy (Goodwin) White. This would make Benjamin and Anna having eight children instead of seven as Ragland stated.

About the names of the wives of William, James, and Benjamin White - sons of Benjamin and Anna (Stewart) White -

William White, born? Could he have been the William White, born 1817, died May 1850 of consumption in Logan County? His widow married about 1855 Nathan L. Cottriel of Kanawha County. They moved to Calhoun County, (W) Va. before 1860. The 1860 Calhoun Census shows that she was born in Logan Co.

James White, born ca 1805/1820 - I believe him to be the James White with wife Celia, and who later married Harriet Farley.

Benjamin White 1805/1820 - Perhaps the one who married Mary Lacky. This Benjamin White's will dated 18 June 1889.

I need to do a lot more research on all of the John "Jack" White family. I did find recently another daughter for John and Susan White -- The Wayne County Death Register shows that Juliantes Sansom, widow of Abel, was a daughter of John and Susan White. Julia died 6 January 1897 in Wayne County.

White I am enclosing what recent/information that Janet Hager and I have added to the 1880 Logan County book.

- William White, born about 1794 (per census); son of John "Jack" and Susannah (Marcum) White (per Ragland); married 2 December 1816 in Giles County, Virginia, to Editha White (per marriage register), probably the daughter of Benjamin Harrison and Nancy (Goodwin) White (per circumstantial evidence); died between 7 September 1863 and 18 October 1866 in Mercer County, West Virginia (per dates of will and probate). Widow Editha survived him and was living in 1870 with son Andrew. William and Editha White listed in 1850 Mercer County, Virginia, Census #343/343.
- William White, born about 1790 (per census); son of John and ?Biddy (\_\_\_\_)
  White (father per Ragland, mother per tradition); married
  ante 1822 Polly Sansom (implied from children's birth dates),
  daughter of John Sansom (per Ragland). This couple could have
  had more than the four children of whom we have record.
- William White, born about 1805 (per census); son of Benjamin and Anna (Stuart) White (per David Turner); married Jane (per 1850 Raleigh County, (West) Virginia, census). Two young boys, Lewis and John A. White, living in their 1850 household. Could this have been the William White who married a Miss Workman, as reported by Audrey Smith?
- William White, born about 1817, son of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_\_, died May 1850 of consumption (census and mortality schedule); married Nancy \_\_\_\_\_, who later married Nathan L. Cotteril about 1855 and moved to Calhoun County, West Virginia, (there in 1860) from Logan County, (West) Virginia, where the widow was located with children in household #536. Could this be a previously unidentified son of James and Lucretia "Lucy" (Elkins) White?
- William White, born 1794-1800, son of John Hunter and Nancy (Copley) White (per census and Charley Davis); married Lavinia Munsey 28 January 1820 in Giles County, Virginia, from whence he moved between 1834 and 1840--probably to Kanawha County, West Virginia (per Weldon L. White).
- William White, born about 1780 in Omagh, County Tyrone, North Ireland; married Rebecca Orr in 1807; moved to Greenbrier County, (West) Virginia, in 1817 (per Gail White).
- William White, born in Omagh, County Tyrone, Ireland; moved to Greenbrier County, (West) Virginia, about 1790's, married Catherine Hoke in 1801 (per Gail White).

Some questions regarding your 1880 Logan County, West Virginia, Census Annotations:

- #Lo-91--Exactly which John and Elizabeth (White) White were Eli's parents? The couple I have would have been too young to have been Eli's parents. Eli's wife is shown as Viola Ellis, daughter of James and Nancy (Davis) Ellis. My records show that Viola's mother may have been a Browning. Do you know which is correct? I just noticed that Eli M. White, son of John and Elizabeth White, was son of the John born about 1800. How did you determine that this John's second wife was Elizabeth White? Did the divorce papers of 1869 give her maiden name? If so, who were Elizabeth's parents?
- #Lo-109-One of the dates given after Celia's name (wife of Hickman White) seems to be an error since you show her born 1868 and married in 1865. What are correct dates?
- #Tr-45--James Maidson White married 1) Sally Risse and 2) Sarah E. Browning; thus, his marriage to Ibby Hinchman must have been a third marriage. Was Ibby a widow?
- #Ha-161/182--Dontt you think that if Anna Stewart were born in Kentucky that at least one of her other children would have so indicated--and that she would have had such a birthplace listed in one of her census listings? Was this James definitely the son of Benjamin and Anna (Stewart) White? How did you learn that Celia's maiden name was Varney?

Same household: I had Comfort White listed as a female, yet the names you have listed for Comfort's spouses are also females. What is the answer?

- #Lo-89--Could you clarify discrepancy between your records and mine on the first of Lewis White? My notes show her to have been Vicy McCoy, daughter of Daniel and Margaret (Taylor) McCoy although I don't know where I obtained such information. You show Vicy as daughter of Daniel and P. Taylor, who first married Anderson Stone.
- #Lo-207-Could this Lewis W. White be the son of James and Celia (Varney) White?
  This is the only other Lewis of the right age if the Lewis White (Lo-198)
  who married Elizabeth Hager were indeed the son of Mastin and Susan
  (Neese) White.
- #Lo-37--Where did you find that Charles White's widow Mary had the maiden name of White? This, of course, was Charles second wife. According to my notes, his first wife was Rachel Jeffreys.
- #Lo-26--I believe that this Thomas L. White was the one called Thomas E. White, born about 1855, of the 1860 Logan County census and that he would have been the son of Charles White by the second marriage since Charles and Mary were supposed to have been married about 1853--or did Rachel die later than 1851?

Dear Cousin Agnes:

Thank you for your letter of December 23rd. I appreciate your letters and information very much.

The William White, born ca 1805, living in Raleigh County in 1850, was born in Pennsylvania, which, I think, would eliminate him from our set of Whites. He was married in Fayette County 7 October 1846 to Jane, daughter of Peter and Ellen Bragg. Jane died 9 December 1857 in Raleigh County and the record shows that she was born in Monroe County. The information was furnished by William White, her husband. This shows that William was still living in 1857. but he does not appear in the 1860 census for Raleigh County.

It is possible that William White was married before he married Jane Bragg, then too, he might have married again after her death and moved away—perhaps married a Workman girl as Aubrey Smith shows in his papers which were donated to the archives by his widow after his death.

I knew Aubrey Smith well and often exchanged bits of information with him when he was here in Madison. He was in charge of the Draft Boards in several southern West Virginia counties and he would often look up information for me in various other counties when he visited the Draft Boards there. In the evenings when he was here in Madison he liked to drop by and talk genealogy and compare notes with me. He was a valued friend.

About the William White, born 24 August 1798; died 14 July 1850; who came from Cambell County, Virginia. I think Charley Davis is right about this one.

And to the William White, born about 1817, and died May 1850 as shown by the mortality schedule for Logan County. This one could be a son of James and Lucretia (Elkins) White, although I don't rule out Benjamin and Anna (Stewart) White.

Mrs. Janet Hager called this morning and said that she had taken careof the questions that you had asked about the White families in our 1880 census annotations. If you find anything else that you think could be wrong, do let us know. We want them as near right as we can get them.

I am enclosing a copy of some of my White Notes that I can't remember sending to you. You may already have them. I will send copies to Vern Whitman and Jack Dickinson.


Dear Cousin David:

I was delighted to receive the White Notes, which enabled me to add considerable data to some of my family group records. I am sure Vern Whitman will appreciate receiving the copy you sent since he did not have exact marriage date for William Holly Whitman to Mary Jane White, as well as other miscellaneous data.

The references to the parents of William H. Whitman were of interest to me. My notes had shown that James Whitman married Mary Ann Hale whereas Virgil Lewis's article named James' wife as Mary Richards. I have asked Vern Whitman about this discrepancy since these are his ancestors. I have never engaged in primary research on the Whitman line. All my records about them are from a close girlhood friend, a relative of Vern.

By the way, where did you find that William White, born about 1805, living in Raleigh County, West Virginia, in 1850, was born in Pennsylvania? My notes (I believe, however, originally from you) list his place of birth as Virginia.

You mentioned a Jack Dickinson in your letter. Is this a new-found white cousin? Again, best wishes for this new year.

Dear Vern:

My information on the John White, Jr., and wife Celia (Logan County, Virginia, 1850 household #533) is quite limited; but I will comment on what I have.

First, I believe that the census enumeration of 1850 is in error regarding his given name since in all subsequent census records this man is called James White. Some researchers have indicated that this James White's parents might be Benjamin and Anna (Stuart) White, it seems more likely to me that they were his grandparents. If the eldest son of Benjamin and Anna (Stuart) White.

My records show-without documentation-that James White married 1) Celia Varney and 2) Harriet Farley. Why James was called John, Jr., in the 1850 census is only open to speculation. There is the possibility that the enumerator started to list him as a Jr., son of John. Or his name might even have been John James White-although John and E. [ ] White did have another son named John. Or, as sometimes happened, the enumerator simply made a mistake, entering the word John for James. The 1880 census shows that James White's father was born in Virginia and that his mother was born in Kentucky. This might be the key clue worth pursuing. I have not had the time to do

It is my opinion that these individuals are not the ones who figure in the family of John and Susannah (Elkins) White. Their son, John, had a wife named Mary and could still be the man known to the family as Kelly, who also had a wife named Mary.

I notice that you sent a copy of your letter to Jack Dickerson. I do not have his address so cannot forward copy of this letter to him; however, I am sending a copy to David A. Turner.

I hope the above answers some of your immediate questions.


Quite coincidentally, a day or so after sending my letter to you I was searching through my correspondence with Mr. Sigfus Olafson on an unrelated subject and ran across the following in his August 27, 1974, letter to me:

I have not yet typed the list of Boone County marriages that I got in Richmond; I did not quite finish by the time I had to leave, and the 1860-61 part is not copied. . . .

I ran into one odd thing in these records. In Boone County Drury Elkins, age 18, son of Daniel and Elizabeth Elkins married Elizabeth Elkins, age 33, daughter of Elijah and Martha Elkins, May 7, 1857. Drawry Elkins, age 27, and his wife Elizabeth, age 45 are Family No. 279 in the Logan 1850 census, also in the Logan 1860 census, No. 290, ages 37 and 50. Drewry and Elizabeth Elkins, ages 22 and 36 are also in the Boone 1860 census.

Esn't it amazing that two men named Drury/Drewry Elkins should both have had wives much older, both of whom were named Elizabeth? No wonder we have so much difficulty keeping everything straight!



Dear Charley:

As usual, you keep coming up with such interesting documents and data.

In order to see if any conclusions can be drawn from the various White signatures on the documents which you have sent, I am now going to trace the signature, abstract the identifying data from the document including date, and make a few comments if deemed necessary. -- See the enclosed sheet!

It seems clear in examining the signatures of Benjamin White, all of which seem quite distinct, that we may need to re-evaluate some of our preconceived notions. I had always assumed that the Jane White who married Jeremiah Stone 8 May 1815 in Wythe County, Virginia, was the daughter of Benjamin and Martha (Jobe) White; however, unless the two Benjamin Whites had identical signatures, it seems apparent that Jane was the daughter of the Benjamin H. White who witnessed the consent in Giles County 23 April 1807 that was signed for their son Samuel Mills by John and Franky White. The signature is also the same as that signed by Benjamin and Nancy for their daughter Sally to marry William Cooper 5 November 1818. I seem at the moment unable to find the Amherst County, Virginia, documents for the marriage of Benjamin H. White and Nancy Goodwin, which might shed further light on the subject. I believe a reexamination of all the Wythe County, Virginia, White marriage bonds and consent forms might be in order. Do you have the others in your possession? With the exception of the 1824 consent form signed by Emly Millard, the Benjamin White who married Anna Stewart invariably signed by mark. This is the case on a number of deeds, too.

There are many questions posed by the signatures of John White although a few conclusions can be made. The John White who married Susannah Marcum, like his brother Benjamin, also signed by mark. The signature of the John White who married Francis Mills seems somewhat different on the various documents he purportedly signed; however, it is my opinion that the John White who signed the 1826 request for license for marriage of James White to marry Mickey McKinney is the same as the one who married Francis Mills. Or is it possible that the John who had signed by mark at his own marriage should have later learned to write his name in the same manner as his father? I'm keeping an open mind on these John White signatures. I suppose that the James White who married Mickey McKinney could have been a son of John and Frankey ( ) (Mills) White. What do you think?

Thank you for the copy of your letter to Charley Davis about his recent find. He does come up with some interesting discoveries. Your letter to him seem to express my thoughts on the matter better than I can—you have a way with putting words together. Charley called me when he got your letter. We both agree with your evaluation.

I have not made many finds in the last year or so, but did purchase three of James Robinett's books on the Robinett family. He seems to think that Mary(Robinett) White was a daughter of Michael Robinett and not Daniel as we have listed in our records. I will enclose a copy of his placements. However, I think he is wrong about the children and grandchildren of James and Mary (Robinett) White. Apparently he has them mixed up with another James and Mary White.

Another find that I made recently was Narcissus White, daughter of Benjamin W. and Marsilla Burgess White, married Andrew Higginbothan. They had at least two children - E. F. Higginbothan, born 1870 in Kanawha County (they probably moved there in late 1870), died 2 June 1876 in Boone County; and Press Higginbothan, born Jan 1880.

I haven't found much, but wanted to send it along for whatever it might add to your knowledge of the family.

In 1842, among other descendants of Samuel Robinett, 1351, and Thomas Dunn, second husband of Mary, widow of Samuel, Michael Robinett and wife Rhoda signed a land Deed from Thomas Dunn to Henry Grayson, Wythe County, VA, dated 28th of September 1842. This deed lists most of the children of his two brothers, Daniel and James, both of whom had died by this time.

Michael died prior to 1850 when his widow is shown on the census report for that year with their son Henry in Scott county. In 1860, she is with her son Randolph in Wise County, VA, aged 71.

There is no known factual list of the children of Michael Robinett. The following list has been compiled from census reports, court records, and some family knowledge.

Introductory Comments: Most of the data in my Burford file is from secondary and tertiary sources; notably, abstracts of Amherst County, Virginia, deeds and wills and marriages and information in W. B. Burford's BURFORD GENEALOGY, published in 1914. Since much of the material in his book was compiled 200 years after the fact, there is considerable margin for error. Nonetheless, I had used the book as an "outline" for relationships until documented data confirming or refuting the conclusions came to light. The time has come for a reevaluation.

<u>Paniel Burford</u>: Even casual study shows that there were at least four and possibly five men named Daniel Burford who were living in the area later encompassed by Amherst County, Virginia, during the mid-eighteenth century. I will list six below but believe in reality we are dealing with no more than five:

Paniel Burford, probably born before 1694, whose wife Sarah gave birth to a son Daniel 20 May 1714 in Abingdon Parish, Gloucester County, Virginia. He was, I believe, married to a first wife at this time and was the

same as the man next listed.

Daniel Burford, born 21 April 1684 in Burford, Oxfordshire, England, who 5 March 1729 married Martha Jane Morley/Mosley--probably as his second wife. In his book Burford mentions only their first-born, and it is not unusual for an author to omit previous marriages. Burford identifies

this Daniel as Daniel James Burford.

Daniel Burford, born 20 May 1714 in Abingdon Parish, Gloucester County, Virginia, to Daniel and Sarah Burford, according to DAR reference to parish register. He is probably the Daniel who married before 1743 (possibly about 1734) a woman named Mary . Was it he or his father who died "old and infirm" in 1787? I think it was he.

Daniel Burford, born about 1734-7 in King William or Middlesex County, Virginia.

He is believed to have had a wife Sarah also and is thought to have been the one who died about 1811 in Amherst County, Virginia.

Daniel Burford, born 1 May 1731, who married 12 February 1757 Nancy Jane Brown. He is identified by Burford as the first son of Daniel and Martha Jane (Morley) Burford and is called Daniel Elijah Burford in the book.

Paniel Burford, born 4 May 1729, died 6 June 1800 in Amherst County, Virginia. He married Mary Ann "Polly" Jones and is identified by Burford as the son of Elijah Hastings and Mary Jane (Hastings) Burford. This Daniel

was also called Daniel James Burford in the book.

I will not list those born after 1740 although, as you can guess, there were several. If, as I speculated, Daniel Burford the Elder was married twice, it would appear that he also had a son named Daniel by each wife. It was quite common for this to occur, particularly if the first son were already grown or deceased. In this case he would have been grown. Before moving on, I must say that 73 years of age seems younger all the time--in fact, much too young to be "old and infirm." I know, though, that infirmities, even at that age, can cause a person to be called "Old" so have concluded that the Daniel born in 1714 was the one who died in 1787. That would mean that Daniel Burford the Elder was the one who died in 1756, but sons sometimes die before the fathers. If such occurred, then the old man would have been 103 years of age-fhot too likely. Also, Daniel with wife Mary was still living in 1757 per deed. Thus, I think the Elder died in 1756 at age 72.

One of the most difficult problems is determining exactly which and how many children were born to each marriage. For this letter, I will restrict myself to the family of our ancestor, Daniel Burford, who wrote his will 1 May 1787 in Amherst County, Virginia.

Revolutionary War Services:

Even in restricting oneself to this Daniel Burford, who died in Amherst County in 1787, it is virtually impossible from the available records to be sure exactly which services he performed during the Revolutionary War. Some attributed to him by descendants may actually have been performed by one of his contemporaries. Does anyone have proof of which he performed and whether or not he was the sheriff?

The Family Group:
My reconstruction, like most of the others, is based on Daniel Burford's will—Will Book 3, page 48, Amherst County, Virginia. In addition, the Guardian Bonds for Reuben and Edmind Taylor also shed light on marriage and children of daughter Virginia—Will Book 3, page 395. The other source used were various abstracts from the Deed Books as contained in Bailey Fulton Davis's ABSTRACTS OF DEED BOOKS OF AMHERST COUNTY, VIRGINIA, published in 1963.

Daniel Burford, probably the one born 20 May 1714 Abingdon Parish, Gloucester County, Virginia, died between 1 May 1787 (will date) and 2 July 1787 (will probate) "aged and infirm" in Parish of Lexington, Amherst County, Virginia. Probable mother of children was wife Mary, whom he married about 1733 and who apparently died about 1757-1759. Children were at least the following:

Daniel Burford, born about 1734-37, possibly the one who died about 1811 and married Sarah sometime in the 1750's.

John Burford, born about 1735, who reputedly married Sarah Thacker. Could another John have been the one with this wife?

Elizabeth Burford, probably born about 1741, married before 1767 Micajah Goodwin of Amherst County, Virginia. Proven daughter.

Burford, a daughter who married John Stewart and had daughter Mourning before father wrote will. Inferred from mention of a grand-daughter Mourning Stewart in will. Mourning could have been married daughter of a son. Any ideas?

Milley/Molley Burford, whose given name is not certain, married James Crews. No further information.

Frances Burford, probably born in mid-1740's, married Joseph Goodwin, born about 1744, sometime before 1773 when his wife Frances was first mentioned in deeds.

Virginia Burford, who had a son, John Floyd Burford (aka John Burford Floyd),
before her marriage to Mr. Taylor between 3 February 1776
and 5 August 1776. She died before September 1796. Somewhere in my notes I have Taylor's given name.

Miscellaneous Comments:

If the Elder Daniel Burford had the two marriages, then the 19-year-old William Burford taken 13 July 1756 would have been a child of the second marriage (thus a half-brother to the above Daniel).

There were as many John Burfords and Philip Burfords, etc. as there were Daniel Burfords. I am still trying to place each one in the proper family group but will not have time for another few weeks to transfer my data to computer. I will then send each of you copies of the abstracts and complete documents I have copied. Sorry that they cannot be included today!

About the Goodwins:

I will also send copies of my Goodwin records. In the meantime, you may wish to add to your notes from the following:

Family of Micajah and Elizabeth (Burford) Goodwin:

Cornelius Goodwin, who married Hannah Paxton, according to THE GOODWIN FAMILY IN AMERICA, published 1897.

An unidentified daughter, about whom nothing more is known, from the same source.

\*Nancy Goodwin, born about 1768, died after 1850; married Benjamin Harrison White 10 July 1787 in Amherst County, Virginia.

Virginia Goodwin, died unmarried; no further information.

\*Spicey Goodwin, born 1770-1780, died after 1840 apparently in Logan County, (West) Virginia; married Archelaus Mitchell 7 March 1791 in Campbell County, Virginia.

James Goodwin, possibly died unmarried; had a bounty claim near Little Rock. Arkansas.

Thomas Goodwin, born 1775, died about 1830; married Martha Reed in 1803; lived in Botetourt and Tazewell Counties, Virginia.

Goodwin, a son whose name is not currently known, but believed to have been the one who married before 1796 Sally Trent, daughter of Henry Trent.

John Lipscomb Lynch Goodwin, born 1793, died 5 January 1857 in Amherst County; married 1) Mary E. Goodwin and 2) Martha Crews

\*I am descended from both Nancy and Spicey, as some of you may already know.
