AUDITOR-GENERAL'S REPORT

FOR 1884-5.

I have the honor to transmit my report for the fiscal year 1884-5 on Appropriation and other accounts.

Statements similar to those which were inserted in the last report will be found in this, and the system of classifying and subdividing accounts has been extended to the following Services: Legislation Indemnity, Militia (Permanent and North-West Force), Post Office (Outside Service) and Public Works.

The expenditure due to suppressing the Rebellion is given in such great detail because everything connected with that trouble is looked upon with so much interest.

A statement is now preparing, on a similar basis, of the outlay since 1st July last, under the terms of the \$2,300,000 grant. This information will be laid before Parliament within the first fifteen days of the Session.

I am quite sensible of the advisability of keeping down the size of this report. To carry out this object, space has been economized by leaving as few blanks as possible, and by omitting details which seemed to be of minor interest.

Under this head I may refer to the remark made by the Deputy Minister of Finance in the preface to the Public Accounts, as to giving in this report the names of the recipients of public money. It has not appeared to me unimportant to give the names; but of less importance than to make the classification which is now furnished in part II. The first thing is: "How much did a particular sub-division of the Public Service cost?"

I propose, then, so that both objects may be attained, to retain part II as it now is (but with fewer names), and to make a subsidiary statement, showing the gross amount paid to each individual, unless the sums are small.

I would suggest that, as far as it may not interfere with some other object, the Public Accounts Committee should adopt the practice of going regularly through the report, instead of ordering information and vouchers connected with widely separated items at any time during the Session. If my suggestion were followed, I could be of more service by having the subject of the day's consideration refreshed by consultation with the examiners in this office, and by reading the vouchers ordered. The

Committee might, at the first meeting, order the vouchers for such items as require examination, up to a certain page in part II. At the second meeting the vouchers ordered at the first meeting would be considered, and the vouchers up to another page ordered.

I hope that I shall not be considered wanting in respect as a servant of Parliament in drawing attention to the impossibility of securing, at the limit of salary fixed by section 24 of the present Civil Service Act, the permanent services of such persons as are capable of properly examining the important accounts which are brought under review in this office.

There will be found at page 3 of part II several important Orders in Council which affect the economical administration of the Public Service, and which it will be convenient to have for future reference.

Communications from this office to the Treasury Board, with the action taken by the Board, will be found, as usual, in an appendix to the preface.

TREASURY DECISIONS—CORRESPONDENCE AND STATEMENTS.

AUDIT OFFICE, Nov. 5, 1885.

SIR,—I have the honor to inform you that the system now followed of paying the salaries of the Inside Civil Service for each month at the beginning of the month, appears to me to be illegal.

At the time payment is made not only is the service not performed, but there are manifestly three causes which may prevent its being done at all:—1st, death; 2nd, removal from office; 3rd, suspension.

To put back at once payment to the end of the month would be a source of inconvenience to many. I have therefore to suggest that the pay list for January next be authorized on the 2nd of that month, and that pay-lists of subsequent months be postponed two days per month, until the last of the month be reached.

The pay-lists and other authorities for the payments of extra clerks and other employees, who are now paid on the 1st of the month, should, I think, be treated as I propose that the pay-lists for permanent employees be dealt with.

I would further suggest that when the day for passing a pay-list under the proposed regulation is a Sunday or bank holiday, the pay-list be issued on the previous day.

Memorandum to Justice Dept. :—According to my interpretation of sec. 49 of the Civil Service Act of 1882, during the time of re-employment of a superannuated officer his superannuation allowance should be dropped. For this reason I thought it proper to withhold the payment of Mr. LeSueur's salary as Secretary of the Board of C. S. Examiners, which is about the same as his superannuation allowance, till I find out whether the Finance Dept. holds the same view of the matter as I do.

JUSTICE DEPT., November 7, 1885.

SIR,—With reference to your letter of the 23rd September last, enclosing one from the Auditor-General, in which he claims that Mr. P. LeSueur is not entitled to receive his superannuation allowance while drawing pay as a member of the Board of Civil Service Examiners, and as Secretary thereof, I have the honor to say that I do not think Mr. LeSueur's case comes within the provisions of the clause of the Superannuation Act, 1883, to which you direct my attention (46 Vic., cap. 8, sec. 11).

It appears that Mr. LeSueur was over 60 years when he retired from the Service, and the situation he is now filling is lower in emolument than that from which he retired.

Furthermore, I am of opinion that the forfeiture of the allowance prescribed by the section in question is a penalty for refusing to serve. I do not therefore see how it applies to the case under consideration.

There is a clause in the Act governing the superannuation of judges, which provides for the reduction of any salary to which the recipient of a pension may become entitled by the amount of such pension. I do not find any similar provision in the Civil Service Superannuation Act.

SIR,—I am in receipt of your communication of the 10th ultimo, which contains a letter from the Department of Justice on the superannuation allowance of Mr. LeSueur.

I draw from the 11th sec. of 43 Vic., cap. 8, that when a superannuated officer of any age returns to the service, his superannuation allowance is in abeyance during the time of the employment. The section does not apply directly to persons over sixty; but I think that it clearly does inferentially on the point involved in Mr. LeSueur's case.

The section was evidently intended to secure two things: (1) to the Government the power of calling upon any superannuated person to perform duties for which he might, in the opinion of the Government, be qualified; (2) to the superannuated officer the right to refuse, unless the emolument were up to a certain amount.

With reference to the second point, it surely cannot be intended to convey that the superannuated person may refuse, unless the emolument is the salary which he enjoyed while he was active and capable of general work, with his superannuation allowance added. Yet, if it is not understood that the superannuation allowance is to cease during the period of the renewed employment, this interpretation must be given to the second part of the clause. Therefore, so far as a person under sixty years of age is concerned, I take it that the superannuation allowance is not payable while active service is being performed.

Mr. LeSueur, being over sixty, cannot be compelled to come into the service. He may refuse any occupation at any rate of remuneration however great; but I draw from the second part of section 11 that if he undertakes to perform any duties his remuneration for the performance of the duties involves the stoppage of the superannuation allowance for the period of the service. It never could be intended that such a heterogeneous mode of account-keeping should be adopted as would be involved in making payment for service and for superannuation allowance concur while the person was over sixty, and the superannuation allowance stop while the person was under sixty.

The letter of the Department of Justice points out that the regulation with reference to judges who have been pensioned, and who are re-employed, runs with my view regarding superannuated officers.

So far as my recollection goes, all pensioned officers have been similarly treated when they have again entered the service. The cases of Messrs. Haviland, Trutch and O'Reilly occur to me. Pensions and superannuations should, in this respect, be treated uniformly.

SIR,—I forward herewith a copy of a circular issued by me last May, containing a form of declaration to be attached to accounts of cash outlay.

As the Treasury Board was not at that time holding meetings, I was unable to do more than suggest the form as desirable.

If the Board is not prepared at present to pass a minute reducing the allowance to the amount paid in other parts of the Dominion, I would suggest that evidence as to the actual cost of living be obtained throughout the Departments whose officers travel often through the North-West.

Order in Council of Nov. 14, 1885:—

“The attention of the Treasury Board was called by the Deputy Minister of Finance to the statement of the balances of the several Government accounts with the Bank of Montreal on the 31st October, 1885, by which it appeared that some of the Departments had issued pay cheques in advance of the due date.

The Board recommend that the attention of the several Departments be called to the irregularity of such action, and the Board are of opinion, and recommend that steps should be immediately taken, to stop the practice for the future.

AUDIT OFFICE, March 13, 1885.

SIR,—You are aware that the employes of the Department of Public Works, except those who are under the Civil Service Act, are paid from the appropriations for public buildings, harbors, or other works, and that neither is the whole salary of any one employe made a charge against one appropriation, nor does the portion of salary charged against any work indicate the length of time spent on the work.

The preparation of a statement of the salaries and travelling expenses of such employes therefore requires much labor in unearthing each month's salary from the whole expenditure for public buildings or harbors, as the case may be.

I would suggest that as it seems impracticable, even under the present system of appropriation, to show the exact cost of each building or harbor, a change be made, which will do away with the other difficulty—that of showing the amount paid to each person for overseeing construction. The voting of a sum under public buildings for the inside staff of architects, and another for that on the outside, and similarly two, under harbors, for engineers who are connected with the harbors and dredging expenditure, would, with a provision for the extra clerks at Ottawa, meet the requirements.

Remarks on Civil Government Contingencies.

a. The services of this office for the year in question have not required the expenditure of the whole amount granted by Parliament. Beyond this general statement the account does not appear to me to call for special explanation.—*MELGUND, Lt.-Col., Gov. Genl.'s Secy.*

b. Explanations of the causes of difference between grant and expenditure, called for by the circular of the 19th November, 1885, from this office, have not been given by this Department.—*J. L. McDOUGALL, A. G.*

c. For the past few years the amount \$3,500 voted for this service has been found inadequate to meet the requirements. I have asked, therefore, for \$5,000 under this head in the estimates for the year ending June 30, 1887.—*Geo. W. BURBIDGE, D. M. J.*

d. The under-expenditure of \$157.23 in the Penitentiary Branch of this Department is in consequence of a large reduction under the head of Telegrams.—*Geo. W. BURBIDGE, D. M. J.*

e. It has been found that the vote for contingencies was too small, and should be increased as a consequence of the growth of the Department of Militia. With the strictest economy it has been found impossible to keep within the estimate, which has been exceeded by \$2,507.—*C. EUG. PANET.*

f. Every economy has been practised commensurate with the efficiency of the office and its branches. The working of the Canada Temperance Act, the services of extra clerks and messengers necessitated by the absence on leave of several of the permanent employees during the troubles in the North-West, the protracted Session of Parliament, and the large number of returns called for by Parliament, and the increase generally of the business of the Department, will account to a very large extent for the increase in the expenditure, which could not have been foreseen. I have to add that the increased cost of telegraphing over that for the preceding year was caused by the absolute demand of the use of the wires in the interests of the Public Service.—*G. POWELL.*

g. The over-expenditure of \$2,391.35, was caused by the fact that the practice of charging the accounts for telegraphing to Dominion Lands Income, was discontinued at your request, and those accounts were charged to Civil Government Contingencies, although no provision had been made for that purpose in the Estimate for 1884-85. The explanation of the under-expenditure of \$4,430.82 in the Departmental Printing is that when the amount required for that service was estimated, certain printing in connection with survey work and outside service was included, which was properly a charge against Dominion Lands, and was paid for out of that fund. In addition to that, it was thought that the cost of printing in connection with the Forestry Commission amounting to about \$500, would have to be made in the year 1884-85; but payment of that amount was not found to be necessary or indeed possible, until the close of that fiscal year.—*JOHN R. HALL, Secretary.*

h. With respect to the items "subscriptions to newspapers," "telegraphing," "travelling expenses," "engraving and lithographing," and "stationery office," nothing can be said except that they were under-estimated; under items "extra clerks" and "extra messenger" the over-expenditure of \$1,018.50 was due to the fact that two extra clerks who were not estimated for, because it was anticipated that they would pass their examination and be placed on the strength of the Department, failed to do so (one altogether, the other passed in January, 1885, and was put on the pay list on 16th March last) and to the unforeseen employment as extra clerks of Mr. Hunton and the Rev. Mr. Scott. The over-expenditure under item "Queen's Printer," is solely due to the increasing business of the Department of Indian Affairs having necessitated an outlay for printing and binding which was not anticipated. The returns to Parliament last year were very voluminous and caused an expenditure of \$216.33 which was not estimated for.—*L. VANKOUGHNET.*

i. The work of the office increased during the year faster than was anticipated and I was therefore obliged to ask for an additional extra clerk. The amount paid

to Mr. J. W. Reid, the person engaged, accounts for the excess of the expenditure over the grant.—J. L. McDUGALL, A.G.

j. In consequence of the conversion of the 5 per cent. loan, and the placing of the 4 per cent. loan on the market, and the Minister of Finance having been in England, a large amount of expenditure for cables and telegrams became necessary, and that, with a larger amount of printing and stationery than was estimated being procured, explains the difference between the grant and the expenditure.—J. M. COURTNEY, D.M.F.

k. The vote for \$8,000 was asked for in order that a sufficient sum should be available to cover possible expenditure under this head, but as the details vary from year to year, it is impossible in advance to estimate exactly what the necessary outlay would be, and the estimate must, in all cases, be an approximate one. You will observe that for Queen's Printer the sum expended is much smaller than in many previous years, and the saving under this item was due to the fact that expensive records had not been replaced during the year. I might add, in further general explanation, that the utmost care has been taken to keep all expenditure by this Department within the narrowest limits consistent with the proper working of its various branches.—W. G. PARMELEE.

l. Expenditure less than anticipated.—O. DIONNE.

m. The amount of over-expenditure, viz., \$1,551.26, is principally caused by an increase in the item, "Queen's Printer," which the Postmaster-General was unable to control.—WM. WHITE.

n. The increase of \$4,236.12 arose, as in former years, from the very large extent of business in the Patent Office, this extent of business, at the same time, on the other hand, implying very large revenue from fees. The items in which the increases have occurred are extra clerks, the expenditure for such service last year being \$6,006.46, against \$3,600 the previous year, making an increase of \$2,406.46; the item of the Queen's Printer's charges is \$1,120.02 more than the previous year; special charges of \$524 for reporting a Patent case, and \$125 for a type-writer. These items, without going into further details, as nearly as possible account for the increase of expenditure over the grant.—J. LOWE.

o. The sum of \$2,444.57 in excess of vote can be explained in the following manner:—\$3,000 of the original vote was transferred to the Fisheries Department, which, however, did not make any marked difference in some of the principal items, for instance:—

While the Queen's Printer's item was increased from \$1,234 to \$2,571.96 owing to the list of shipping being charged against this vote instead of the amount specially voted for the same, which, added to the balance of Fisheries Department, will more than meet the over-expenditure.—F. GOURDEAU.

Explanations given to Auditor-General by Department of Agriculture:—
 a. The vote under this head, as stated in your account, was \$25,675, the items comprising it being specific; and as respects these there has been no over-expenditure. On the contrary, there is an unexpended balance of \$1,499.58, as follows:—Halifax, \$50 unexpended, owing to the death of the late Agent; North-West Territories, \$1,400, not expended; and \$49.58 not expended for the Interpreter at Winnipeg, owing to his retirement after 11 months' service \$4,977.38, classed by you as being over-expended on the vote referred to, was expenditure for the payment of temporary employees at the several stations, not estimated in this vote for the reason that their services were held by the Minister to be temporary, and therefore, by his direction, classed as belonging to general expenditure, and this service was estimated under the head of "Immigration Expenses." b This arose from a re-arrangement of the staff and extra services required by the High Commissioner. c. The account you have furnished makes the expenditure on this head \$3,189.46 more than estimated, while the actual expenditure under the classification on which the vote was taken shows an amount of \$140 63 less than the estimate, arising from the expenditure of only part of the estimate for Germany and Scandinavia. The difference between your statement and that of the Department arises from the fact that you have classed payments for services of temporary Agents with the salaries of the regular Agents, for which the vote was taken. Such temporary services were held to form a part of the estimate under the head of "Immigration Expenses." d. Your account, showing \$154.97 less than estimated, indicates the nearness to accuracy of this estimate. e. Your account shows an expenditure of \$10,265.18 more than estimated under this head. The actual expenditure of the Department was simply for expenses of 5 regular Agents, at an aggregate of \$4 a day for each, and this amount has not been exceeded. The numerous and diverse items placed in your accounts under this head, which go to make up the difference more than estimated, as stated by you, were estimated by the Minister under the head of "Immigration Expenses." f. This arose from the fact of the volume of immigration being less than anticipated, and being therefore accompanied by diminished expenditure. The items of over-expenditure under the preceding heads of your account were, with the single exception of salaries in the London office as above explained, estimated by the Minister of Agriculture under this head as properly belonging to it; and certainly there can be no question as to the absolute propriety of such items of expenditure under such classification.—JOHN LOWE, Secretary.

Explanations given to Auditor-General by Department of Agriculture:—*a.* The following items were not foreseen: \$4,600 for a steamer for the Inspection Service, in view of the possible advent of cholera; \$208 for engineer; \$175 for cook and contingencies, and \$140 for extra steamboat service. *b.* The amount estimated for contingencies was not used. *c.* Caused by boat service for the special inspection of vessels, under a proclamation for preventive measures against cholera. *d.* Caused by a payment of arrears for fuel, the indebtedness for which was incurred before the fiscal year in question. *e.* The post of Steward was filled for only part of the year. *f.* The Chaplain's salary for June of the previous year. *g.* Under the grouping you have made for "Public Health," including "Cattle Quarantine," your classification is so different from that of the Department that an explanation of the differences could only be made by placing the entries as they are in the books of the Department. It will, therefore, probably meet the object of your letter to explain the difference between the whole expenditure and vote, or \$8,233.23, which arose under these sub-heads: *h.* At Point Levis the expenditure for the Cattle Quarantine was \$2,960 more than the estimate, owing to the number of animals arriving for quarantine being much larger than anticipated. No estimate was taken for the expenses of the Montreal Cattle Quarantine, which were exceptional this year, amounting to \$2,906.71. There were expenses at Emerson Cattle Quarantine, for repairs of buildings, fences, and expenses of maintenance not estimated or foreseen, amounting to \$6,806.92. I think it is better to call attention to one item in your statement, \$4,900, grouped under the head of "J. A. Couture, outlay for labor, feed and travelling expenses," and to say that no expenditure is incurred for "feed" either at Levis or any other Cattle Quarantine, the Minister having made a regulation to the effect that the cost of all feed should be paid by the owners of cattle. Such items of feed as may appear in the accounts will be found to be rather more than covered by the refunds.

CUSTOMS DEPT., OTTAWA, February 17, 1886.

SIR,—Referring to the statement of expenditure of this Department, for salaries and contingencies for the year 1884-85, and the amounts shown to have either been spent in excess of or less than the estimate, I beg to state that the excess of \$314.44 in the Province of Ontario has arisen in consequence of the necessity for the payment of board allowance and travelling expenses to the officer detailed as Acting Collector at Fort Erie and Sarnia, and because of short estimate to meet contingent expenses at Port Arthur. There were several unforeseen changes in this Province during the year, but the consequent increased or lessened expenditure leaves a total varying but little from the sum voted.

The short expenditure of \$1,738.13 in the Province of Manitoba is explained by the fact that the anticipated contingencies have been curtailed by the sum of \$1,000, while the items of salaries and daily wages, for which an approximate amount was asked, have been so adjusted as to avoid the expenditure of some \$800, which appeared necessary when the estimate was prepared.

The saving of \$6,677.67 in the North-West Territories has arisen through the reduction of the percentage payable to officers of the Mounted Police on collections made by them, though it is partly attributable to the fact that a certain portion of the percentage actually earned by such officers during the year had not been paid before the 30th June last.

The other cases in which the grant has either been exceeded or not wholly used show so small a margin of difference that they afford valuable testimony as to the care which has been exercised in preparing the estimates, and in auditing the various items of expenditure which have been placed before this Department for approval during the fiscal year in question.

AUDITOR GENERAL'S REPORT-1884-5.

PART II.

DETAILS OF EXPENDITURE.

EXECUTIVE REGULATIONS.

I have thought it advisable to collect for reference several Orders in Council relating to economy in public expenditure, which are frequently quoted in the following pages.

Powers of Attorney.

Rules prescribed by the Treasury Board, under sanction of the Governor General in Council, in reference to the mode of Acquittal of Warrants for the payment of money by the Government of Canada.

1. No officer in the Civil Service shall, under any circumstances, be permitted to act as attorney for the receipt of public moneys.

2. No power of attorney will be recognized, received or acted upon by the Receiver-General which is not printed, and of the form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver-General, under which only payment can be made, and such power will operate as to any sum of money due only by the Government at the date of the power of attorney.

3. No powers of attorney will be received by the Government for the payments of moneys on warrants which partake of the character of an assignment of the moneys to another party or purport to be irrevocable or are in "any respects qualified."

4. General powers of attorney, authorizing the receipt of money due, or which may become due after its date, by which any chartered bank or agent of a chartered bank, or any private individual, is constituted the attorney, will be received and acted upon if printed, and of the special form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver-General; and in the event of the power being to the agent of a chartered bank, the bank must declare itself, by a proper instrument in writing, responsible for the acts of such agent, in respect to the receipts of moneys thereunder.

It is, however, optional with the party executing any power of attorney to a bank or agent of a bank or any private individual, prior to the execution, to erase the words "or may hereafter become due."

5. All powers of attorney must be signed in the presence of a witness.

6. In case of the death of the person in whose behalf payment is claimed, the probate of will or other proof that the applicant is entitled to receive the money, must be furnished on application for such payments.

Blank forms of powers of attorney may be obtained from the office of the Receiver-General and at all the branches of the Bank of Montreal.

Mr. Mackenzie, on the subject of Departmental advertising, proposing a scheme for adoption as absolutely necessary to prevent the recurrence of abuses which seem inseparable from isolated action, and an inefficient audit by those Departmental officers who may not have the means of ascertaining facts necessary to an accurate correction of advertising accounts.

Mr. Mackenzie states that if this scheme is adopted, he recommends that the Secretary of State shall at once communicate with each Department information of the mode of proceeding for the future.

The Committee advise that the scheme and recommendation submitted be adopted.

Memorandum referred to above.—With a view to similarity of action by the various Departments in respect of orders and accounts for advertising, it is recommended that all such orders as are issued at the Seat of Government be given through the Queen's Printer, and that the Queen's Printer certify to the accounts before payment.

The copy to be sent to the Queen's Printer, accompanied by Ministerial directions, naming the papers in which the advertisement is to be published, specifying whether in the daily or weekly issue, and the number of insertions in each paper respectively.

On receipt of these instructions the Queen's Printer to procure the printing by the contractors of a sufficient number of copies to enable him to furnish duplicates to the papers indicated. These to be forwarded by him to the publishers, accompanied by an intimation of the number of lines to which the advertisement is to be limited, himself establishing the space on a proper estimate of the solid matter of the notice, with a moderate allowance for purposes of display; and accompanied also by an instruction to the publishers to render the accounts to him, with a copy of the order attached, and with marked copies of the papers in which advertisements are printed.

The Queen's Printer to ascertain the established tariffs for advertising of the several papers on the list; and on receipt of the accounts, certify to the same in accordance with these rates, and to transmit the accounts for payment to the Departments from which the orders issued, having first satisfied himself that publication has been had as directed.

Accounts for advertising required by the outside services to be also rendered with the orders, and marked copies of the publications, to the Queen's Printer, and the advertisements to be by him measured, certified to, and transmitted for payment in accordance with the rules which obtain for advertisements issued at the Seat of Government.

The Queen's Printer to keep with each paper, accounts of the advertisements directed to be published in it, under the different Departmental headings, so as at all times to show the state of each account.

Printing, not under Contract.

Order in Council, November 2, 1884.—The Board had under consideration a letter from the Auditor-General referring to the discussion in the Public Accounts Committee respecting public printing done otherwise than by the contractors, and requesting a ruling from the Treasury Board thereon.

The Board, on careful consideration of the subject, recommend to Council that whenever printing is done by others than the contractors, the rates to be charged should be the current rates for work of the same magnitude at the place where the printing is performed.

Stationery Office.

Order in Council, November 17, 1877.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration the items in the Public Accounts under the head of Departmental Contingencies, from which it appears that considerable sums are disbursed by the several Departments for books, maps and stationery, outside of the Stationery Branch. They are of opinion that those articles could be purchased more cheaply through the Stationery Branch than by the system now pursued. They therefore recommend that hereafter those articles be purchased through the Government Stationery Office, by requisition from the Minister or Deputy Minister of each Department, and that the Stationery Office be directed to procure the articles when not kept in stock.

Order in Council, October 8, 1880.—On a memorandum dated October 2, 1880, from the Secretary of State, stating that it has been represented to him that the practice occasionally prevails in the Departments of ordering or purchasing stationery otherwise than through the Stationery Office—the accounts for which (accompanied

by the orders for the same) are thereafter presented to the Clerk of the Stationery Office for payment.

That, as it is impossible that the prices of the articles thus ordered can be properly checked, and as the practice appears to him (the Minister) to be otherwise objectionable, he recommends that it be discontinued, and that it be the duty henceforth of the Clerk in charge of the Stationery Office to refuse to pay any accounts for articles which have not been ordered through him. Order in Council, July 24, 1882.—The Board had under consideration a letter from the Auditor-General in connection with the purchase of stationery, &c., at Victoria, B.C., for the use of officers of the Dominion Government in that Province.

The Board recommend that the Order in Council of November 17, 1877, be amended, and that power be given to officers in British Columbia to purchase stationery at Victoria, and to officers in other Provinces, excepting Ontario and Quebec, to purchase mucilage and ink, viz.: at St. John, Halifax, Charlottetown and Winnipeg.

Advertising in Pamphlets.

Order in Council, April 16, 1880.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration the subject of advertising in pamphlets, and the question of the subscription by Departments to books, and they recommend:—

(1.) That no advertisements be authorized in connection with the publication of any pamphlet or book whatever, save only that, where any Department of the Government causes to be published a pamphlet or book, the Head of such Department may cause to be inserted therein such advertisements connected with his own Department as he thinks expedient in the public service.

(2.) That as regards subscriptions to books, no Department be allowed to subscribe for or purchase any book whatever unless such book be deemed by the Head of the Department one which will be useful for reference in the administration of the Department, and that not more than four copies shall be taken in any such case.

The Committee further recommend that the foregoing Minute be published in the *Canada Gazette* for the information of the public. Certified. J. O. COTÉ, *C.P.C.*

Order in Council, November 1, 1881.—Ordered that the Immigration Branch of the Dept. of Agriculture be excepted from the provisions of O.C., April 16, 1880, relative to the purchase of pamphlets, books, or other publications, and that the same rule of exception be applied to advertisements. Legal Services.

Order in Council, April 12, 1879.—On a report dated April 2, 1879, from the Hon. Minister of Justice, stating that it has been represented by the Auditor-General that it would facilitate the business of his office were an Order in Council passed making it necessary that the accounts rendered by any legal agent employed professionally by any of the Departments of the Government should be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment.

That at present the practice of the Departments appears to be to submit such accounts to the Department of Justice before paying the same, but no formal Order in Council exists on the subject.

That an Order in Council does exist providing that all accounts for printing and advertising are to be certified by the Queen's Printer before payment.

That he, the Minister, thinks that it would be proper that a formal Order should be passed with respect to legal agents. He recommends, therefore, that it be ordered that the accounts rendered by legal gentlemen employed professionally by any of the Departments of the Government be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment, and that a copy of the Order be transmitted to each of the Departments of the Government.

Gratuities.

Order in Council, Feb. 1, 1868.—As frequent instances occur of the death of officers in the service of the Government, leaving their families in circumstances of great and immediate want, and destitute of means to defray the expenses of illness and funeral, the Committee respectfully advise that in all cases of the decease of an officer of the Government on the permanent list a gratuity equal to his salary be paid to his widow or orphan children, or to such members of his family or household as Your Excellency may approve, for two months from the day of his decease.

Salaries.

Order in Council, Feb. 9, 1875.—On a memorandum dated Feb. 9, 1875, from the Hon. the Minister of Finance, reporting that there appears to be a want of uniformity in the manner of paying the salaries of deceased officers—that in some cases the salary is paid to the day of death, and in others the salary of the month in which the officer died is paid. He therefore recommends that for the future the whole month's salary be paid in all cases. The Committee submit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval. Certified. W. A. Order in Council, July 29, 1871.—On a report, dated July 29, 1871, from the Minister of Finance, stating that considerable inconvenience having arisen from Orders in Council making promotions and other changes in the Civil Service, and granting superannuation allowances, not naming the time from which they shall count, and it being desirable that, excepting for special reasons, such changes shall always count from the first day of some month, and recommending that it be established as a general rule that unless some other date is specially named in the Order in Council, all such changes shall be held to count from the first day of the month next succeeding the date of the said Order. The Committee submit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval. Approved.

Order in Council, May 23, 1882.—On the recommendation of the Minister of Finance, the Committee advise that payment of salaries to members of the Civil Service be made on and from the 1st of June, 1882, and thereafter continuously on the 1st day of every succeeding month. JOHN J. MCGEE, C.P.C.

Order in Council, Nov. 24, 1883.—The Treasury Board submit for the favorable consideration of Council that in cases of promotion the promotion shall be to the next immediate class above the one in which the officer is who is to be advanced. JOHN J. MCGEE, C.P.C.

Superannuation.

Order in Council, Jan. 7, 1884.—The Board had under consideration the fact that several recommendations to place temporary officers on the permanent list have been referred to them for report.

The Board, in compliance with the law, have recommended favorably on the cases submitted to them, but at the same time the Board have to direct the notice of Council to the fact that placing these officers on the permanent list has the effect of bringing them under the operation of the Superannuation Act, and that hitherto no provision has been made for payment of abatements on the pay of these officers while temporarily employed, although their temporary service counts on retirement.

The Board now recommend to Council that from and after the 1st inst. it shall be optional with temporary officers, on receiving permanent appointments, to place themselves, as far as regards their temporary services, under the operations of the Superannuation Act; but that in the cases where officers desire to avail themselves of this privilege, the Board are of opinion that abatements should be paid on their past temporary salaries since the Superannuation Act came into force, when the officers have served for so long back; otherwise, from the commencement of their temporary services.

The Board further recommend that, as the immediate payment of abatements on past salaries would, in many cases, involve considerable hardship, a period of six months be allowed for paying the same, the deduction to be made in six equal parts, to be taken from each monthly pay for the first six months of the permanent appointments.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge your letter of the 7th, asking whether, under any circumstances, superannuation once established by Council may be re-opened—always presuming that no clerical error has been made.

The Superannuation Act provides that under the circumstances mentioned therein the Governor in Council may grant to a person who has served in an established capacity in the Civil Service a superannuation allowance, and that the Order in Council made in the case shall be laid before Parliament. If the grant was made by Letters Patent, the latter could not be cancelled by authority of an Order in Council, except they had been issued in the name of the wrong party, or contained a clerical error or misnomer, or wrong description of a material fact. (*See 38 Vic., cap. 13*). As the grant in the case of a member of the Civil Service is made by an Order in Council, I am of opinion that in practice it would be well to adhere to the same rule and not to cancel or amend the Order in Council, except in cases mentioned in the Act referred to (*38 Vic., cap. 13*). Special Qualifications.

TREASURY BOARD, OTTAWA, Nov. 13, 1883.

SIR,—I have been directed by the Hon. the Treasury Board to call your attention to the 5th sub-section of section 7 of 46 Victoria, chap. 7 (C. S. Act), wherein it is stated that "In the case of attorneys, barristers, engineers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with on a report from the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the Department, that it is not necessary;" and in connection therewith I have to call your attention to the *Hansard* of last Session, page 1035, when in reply to an observation from Mr. Ross, of Middlesex, Sir Hector Langevin stated that these gentlemen are employed in the Service in the practice of their professions, and therefore an examination would not be required, as they had already passed technical examinations before their admission into the ranks of their professions.

I have now to ask whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a Department where their professional attainments are not required, as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act would allow of the examination being waived. SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 13th instant, in which you call attention to sub-section 5 of section 7 of 46 Vic-

toria, chapter 7, wherein it is stated that, "In the case of attorneys, barristers, engineers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with, on a report from the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the Department, that it is not necessary."

An opinion is requested as to whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a Department where their professional attainments are not required, as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act will allow of the examination being dispensed with.

I am of opinion that the spirit of the Act does not allow of the examination being dispensed with in the case mentioned, but that the examination can be dispensed with only in cases where the duties to be performed by the officer seeking promotion are those connected with his profession as an attorney, barrister, engineer, architect, actuary or land surveyor.

Travelling Expenses.

Order in Council, Sept. 8, 1871.—The Committee of Council have had under consideration an extract from the minutes of a meeting of the Treasury Board held Sept. 7, recommending that the following rules be adopted for the payment of removal allowances to Government employees, and they respectfully advise that the recommendations therein submitted be approved and adopted:—

"*Removal Allowances.*—No removal allowance can be granted except on report of the Treasury Board. No removal allowance is to be granted if the salary is increased, except in special cases, and on a report of the Head of the Department. A removal allowance is not to exceed the actual cost on account rendered."

Order in Council, Nov. 29, 1882.—Ordered, that the Order in Council of May 6, 1876, governing travelling expenses, be modified, and that from July 1, 1882, with the exception of the Major General commanding the militia, and the judges who are otherwise provided for, there be paid to all officers travelling on public service in the Dominion, except in those parts hereafter specified, over and above the actual moving expenses, an uniform rate of \$3.50 per diem—the days of leaving and arriving to be counted as full days—and that for those officers who may be called upon to travel in British Columbia, Manitoba, the North-West Territories or out of Canada, the rate be \$5 per diem.

I regret that having to go through a great accumulation of work, I have been unable until

now to reply. The account in question was adjusted in London this summer, during the time the Finance Minister (Sir Leonard Tilley) was there. It was represented by the bank that it was an understanding that the interest should be computed in the way in which it was settled, and the Minister decided that the bank was entitled to consideration. Before, however, a settlement was made, I had an interview with the bank officials, the result being that the Board of the bank agreed to allow a sum of \$4,866.67 as a deduction. SIR,—I beg to call your attention to the following remarks in connection with the expenditure on account of the Kingston Penitentiary for the last six months of the fiscal year ended June 30 1885.

Vouchers 251, 304, 310, cover purchases of books for the Library to the amount of \$82.12. These should be procured through the Government Stationery Office.

Vouchers 244 and 245 cover payments to Jas. Weir and Chas. McNeill of \$100 and \$50 respectively for injuries received in October, 1883. I would ask how the amount of compensation granted was arrived at, and also why settlement of these claims has been so long deferred.

Robt. Priestly, a keeper in the Penitentiary, has received during the course of the year, the amount of \$245.97 for milk supplied. This is in contravention of 46 Vic. cap. 37, sec. 29, which provides that no officer or servant of a penitentiary shall be concerned either directly or indirectly in supplying any goods or provisions, under penalty of forfeiting the sum of \$500.

DEPT. OF JUSTICE, Sept. 7, 1885.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 21st inst, calling my attention to your remarks on the several matters hereinafter referred to, and asking for explanations thereof.

1st. The books for the Library at Kingston, the payment for which is evidenced by vouchers 261, 304 and 310, were bought in the usual way, and as they have been bought, so he assures me, all the time the Inspector has been in office, and before that, I do not agree with you that they should be bought through the Stationery Office, as, in my opinion, the Order in Council, on which you evidently base that view, does not apply to the case.

2nd. The amounts of \$100 and \$50 paid to James Weir and Charles McNeill respectively, were on the recommendation of the Minister of Justice authorized by the Governor in Council to be paid to them in acknowledgement of the courage they displayed, and in compensation of injuries received by them, in preventing an escape, which four desperate convicts attempted in October, 1883. I will be glad if you will point out the authority under which you ask the Minister of Justice, to explain why the settlement of these accounts was so long delayed. However, I enclose you the papers in this matter, which will, I trust, give you all the information which you desire. Please return the papers when you are done with them.

3rd. Mr. Warden Lavell's letter, which I enclose, will give you an explanation respecting the purchase of milk for Kingston Penitentiary, from Guard Robert Priestly. You will see that although the law has been the same during the whole time, it has been the practice since 1872 to make these purchases from Priestly, who has, during that time, been an officer of the Penitentiary. You will also observe that you and I, and our predecessors in office, and the several accountants, who have from time to time been charged with the examinations thereof, have been certifying and passing these accounts. That however is no reason why the law should not be followed, and I am much obliged for having my attention called to the matter.

SIR,—In reply to your letter of the 7th inst, in answer to mine of the 21st ult., I would suggest that to remove the doubt with reference to your first point, a recommendation be made by your Department for an Order in Council on the subject.

2nd. My reason for wishing to know the cause of delay in pressing these demands, is, that almost invariably where an account against the Government is old, it is because there is something weak in the claim. I do not know of any written authority for my asking the question; you must, however, be aware that there are many enquiries which the duty of one in my position obliges him to make, and which are nowhere expressly authorized.

3rd. With reference to your third point, there is no necessity for further remark, as the violation of the law has ended.

SIR.—I observe by your accounts of expenditure for Indemnity to Members of the House of Commons, that in calculating the deductions from Mr. P. M. Guay for non-attendance before he was a member, the sitting days are alone counted. It seems to me that all the days, and not only the sitting days, should, for that part of the time, have been counted in making the deduction.

I also observe that Mr. Guillet, who was unseated during the Session and re-elected before the end of it, is treated as if he were two members, and is paid two Sessional allowances—the deduction from the first allowance being for the number of sitting days after he was unseated, and that from the second allowance being for the number of sitting days from the beginning of the Session before he was re-elected. I cannot see the reason for the two Sessional allowances, and the ground of objection in Mr. Guay's case holds, it appears to me, in this case.

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 7th inst. with regard to the payment of indemnity to Mr. Guay, who was a member for part only of the Session. As you observe, payment was made to him of the Sessional allowance, less the days on which the House sat before he was a member, while you think that all the days, sitting and non-sitting, for that part of the time, should have been counted and deducted.

Opinions have been received on this point from several legal gentlemen with very varying results—the highest, however, being that a member for part only of a Session should receive the indemnity, less the deduction of the sitting days only. Mr. Guillet, who as you observe was unseated during the Session and re-elected before the end of it, is treated as if he were two distinct members. This is a point I have never heard called in question, any more than if at the second election another person had been elected. The amount of indemnity expended would be the same in either case.

DEAR SIR,—I send you herewith a copy of a letter from myself to the Accountant of the House of Commons, and his reply. Please refer to "Ra" in the Report of the Commissioners who revised the Statutes, and from section 6 onwards, particularly to section 30. Mr. Burbidge will send you a copy of the Report to-day.

Mr. Hartney, you will observe, says that it was never questioned but that a man in Mr. Guillet's position should be considered under the Indemnity Act as two members. He says that no more indemnity is expended than if he had been defeated at the election which took place during the Session of Parliament. Quite true: but he receives more than the men who did not lose a day—he getting \$1,900, while the member who never lost a day is paid but \$1,500.

The whole difficulty arises from the two modes of paying—or rather from the two elements, the Sessional allowance and the *per diem* deduction, entering into the calculation. If members were paid in proportion to the time given by each, the making-up of the amount to be paid to each would be simple. It is enacted that a Session of thirty days entitles each member who has been in attendance all the time to the Sessional allowance, and that a longer Session entitles every member who has been in attendance at least thirty days to a Sessional allowance less a certain *per diem* deduction for non-attendance (much higher pay than the *per diem* allowance.) The latter part is a natural consequence of the former, but I cannot see why the person who had an incapacity to act for part of the time should be entitled to more remuneration than those who could and did serve during the whole period.

Please give your opinion on the point, and on the question of sitting and non-sitting days affecting both Mr. Guay and Mr. Guillet.

DEAR SIR,—I am preparing for my report a statement of the amounts for indemnity and mileage drawn by the members of Parliament, and find that your indemnity was calculated on the basis of your being entitled to two Sessional indemnities, one for the period before you were unseated and the other for that after you were re-elected, subject, in the former case, to the usual *per diem* deduction for sitting days after you were unseated, and in the latter to the deduction for similar days before the re-election.

I have endeavored to obtain an opinion from Mr. C. Robinson, who advises me on legal points, as to the construction which was put on the Indemnity Act in your case, that construction having appeared to me unreasonable. Mr. Robinson has been

too busy to take up the matter, and will be unable to answer me before the 10th, and in the meantime the accounts must be sent to the printers.

If a refund were now made by you, the accounts would appear as if the money had never been paid to you. I send a statement showing the refund (\$591.20) which should be made, if any is to be made.

I am extremely anxious not to have anything in my report which would look like a reflection upon the conduct of a member of Parliament. I had at one time the honor of being a member.

DEAR SIR,—I duly received your favor advising me you had taken exception to the Speaker's ruling in regard to the Sessional Indemnity paid me as first and second members for West Northumberland in the 5th Parliament,—as Member elected in 1882 and Member elected in 1885.

As a layman I am not supposed to be competent to decide when "doctors disagree." The Speaker is by profession a lawyer and I am aware he carefully looked up the law before deciding the case. Also since receiving your letter I have consulted Mr. Hector Cameron, Q.C., and he has given me his opinion which confirms the Speaker's view of the law. I am aware that the same view is held by Mr. Murray Dodd, Q.C., Mr. Wood, of Brockville, and other members learned in the law, but whose names I have not yet obtained their permission to use. Certainly when I was re-elected and the return made I found myself in the position of a new member precisely. I had again to sign the roll of membership of the House and I had again to take the oath of office. I was also regarded as a stranger to the House and had to be introduced before taking my seat. The Accountant also informed me I was entitled to draw mileage and that a new account would be opened with me. I then drew the mileage and found a new account had been opened. I was also informed that if the Session did not last thirty days after the day on which I took my seat as second member, I would be paid ten dollars per diem for the days it continued thereafter as the law provides, and that eight dollars per diem would be deducted from my Indemnity as first member for every sitting day of the Session after I was unseated, the rule established by the law on which the indemnity of members is paid. It does seem, moreover, clear to me that I was *in the eye of the law* dead as the representative of West Northumberland, as soon as the report of the Supreme Court unseating me was read by the Speaker to the House. The writ was issued for the election of a member to represent the riding. I was elected instead of my opponent, Mr. Kerr, and it seems to me I was before the law precisely in the same position he would have occupied had he been elected. Surely my election had no retroactive effect. There is no provision in the law for the case of a re-elected member, as such, and I must, it appears to me, be regarded as a new member, the second member in this Parliament for my riding. Would it not appear clearer to you I was such, legally, in case the Session had lapsed before my election?

I have to thank you for the courteous tone of your letter. To it I cannot at present give a more definite reply than the above. I am consulting further about it.

P. S.—Another thought occurs to me. Suppose for the sake of argument I sold and assigned my indemnity immediately after being unseated, subject to the deductions in the clause you refer to: could the assignee's claim, under it, be invalidated by my afterwards becoming a candidate and being elected and again seated. I may say further I expect to have a written opinion from Mr. Cameron in a day or two when I will forward to you a copy.—G. G.

MY DEAR SIR,—I have read the Auditor General's letter of the 3rd instant, as to your right to a payment of your full indemnity as a member, for each period of the Session during which you sat, before and after you were unseated and re-elected, (subject to the usual deduction), and I have also considered the Statute providing for the indemnity of members.

I think that you come directly within the terms of the clause providing for "a person, who for any cause is a member of the House for a part only of the Session," and that when you ceased to be a member, on being unseated, your right to the full indemnity for the Session, subject to the deduction for non-attendance, and also subject to the deduction for each day of the Session after you ceased to be a member, became complete, and that such right cannot be divested by the fact of your subsequent re-election and again becoming a member during the same Session.

There is no express provision in the Act, for a person who is a member of the House for two parts of the Session, and who in the interval, is not a member at all; and, in the absence of any such provision, I think you are entitled to the full indemnity, as so stated, for the period before you were unseated, and that you are equally entitled to the full indemnity for the period after you were re-elected and again became a member, subject to the deduction for each day of the Session before you were re-elected. In fact, under the Statute, I think you are, to all intents and purposes, to be treated as if you were two members, and in the eye of the law of Parliament, I think you were in fact two members and required to be re-sworn and re-introduced.

The revenue suffers no loss by this construction of the law, as any other person re-elected would, undoubtedly, have been entitled to the full indemnity for the second part of the Session, and it ought not to obtain the benefit to your loss from the fact of your being re-elected.

Opinion of Christopher Robinson, Q.C.—I have considered the questions submitted to me with regard to the remuneration of members.

The exact facts of each case are not fully stated, but both claimants were members during part only of the Session, and come therefore under the 31 Vic., c. 3, sec. 5, as amended by 36 Vic., c. 31, sec. 13, now consolidated in c. 10 of the draft of the new Consolidated Statutes of the Dominion.

Mr. Guay, as I understand, was elected during the Session, and sat for the remainder of it, a period exceeding thirty days. The question is whether the deduction from his Sessional allowance should be for all the days of the Session, before he became a member, or only for those on which the House sat.

Upon the whole, I think the latter is the correct view.

The general purpose of the Act seems to be to allow \$1,000 for each Session of over 30 days, less \$8 per day for non-attendance, when the member could have attended, and is not excused—this deduction, therefore, being for neglect only. It is true, sec. 26 (of the Consolidated Act) directs a deduction "for each day of such Session before he was elected," but reading all the clauses together, this, I think, may fairly mean each day on which, if a member, he could have attended or which, under the exceptions in sec. 26, would have been allowed to him; in other words, his incapacity to attend, by reason of not being a member, is equivalent to such neglect as in the case of members would have incurred forfeiture.

He is to forfeit all which if a member, he could have forfeited, but no deduction is to be made by reason of non-membership which could not have been made if he were a member.

Mr. Guillet was unseated and re-elected during the Session, and having sat, as I assume, 30 days on each occasion, both before and after his re-election, he claims a double allowance for the Session.

At first I thought this could not be permitted and would be unfair, but upon consideration, I have come to a different conclusion. Each election, must, I think, be considered, as separate. Having served 30 days when unseated, he became entitled to the \$1,000, subject to the necessity of waiting till the end of the Session to ascertain the proper deduction from it. On coming in again under a different writ, this right, I think, was not changed; but on serving 30 days, he became entitled to another allowance, subject to a deduction calculated with reference to his second election. If by reason of that election he can claim \$1,000, as I think he can, it must be subject to the deduction for each day of the Session before he was so elected; and calculated in this way, taking 90 days as an average Session, and assuming that he had sat the first and last 30 days, his remuneration would not differ very materially from that of a member who had sat during the whole Session under the same election, though he could have served less time for it. The exact case is not provided for, and I do not well see how on the principle of one allowance only the Statute, as it is worded, could be applied.

DEAR SIR,—I beg to call your attention to some items of expenditure for House of Commons Contingencies in 1884–85:—

Publishing Debates.—I notice a cheque for \$6,027.09 in favor of Maclean, Roger & Co., in full of account for printing the *Hansard* of 1884. Please let me have details of the whole account. In paying round sums for the present Session before the completion of the work, a progress estimate, with specimens, should form part of the voucher rendered to this office.

Time of Payment.—I hope you will see your way clear to making monthly payments by cheque for all services except indemnity, and for the exact amounts earned. Please refer to my correspondence on this subject with Hon. Mr. Blanchet, printed with the Appropriation Accounts for 1881–82 (page 136).

Translation.—Since 1st July, 1884, Mr. T. G. Coursolles, the chief French translator, has been paid \$1,205 for translating the Consolidated Statutes, and \$57.50 for translation for the Post Office Department. In the same period several persons not on the permanent staff have received pay for translating such work as the Militia, Mounted Police and Indian Affairs reports. In general, no officer should take so much extra work that he is unable to perform his regular duties. But granting that the Consolidators needed Mr. Coursolles, either his regular salary should be withheld, or the payments to outsiders charged against him. The Dominion should not be asked to make three payments for two services.

Two fortnightly receipts of Mr. J. Benson Williams, an extra Sessional Clerk, are dated from Quebec. An explanation should be attached to the voucher.

2. The disposition of Mr. Brewer's cash is accounted for daily, and the result handed to me in a written statement, signed by himself and another official, who assists him in checking over the day's proceedings. This result I verify by my own books. In fact, the Indemnity Account is audited daily.

DEAR SIR,—Your system of daily audit of the cash advances for indemnity is very satisfactory and complete, as a matter of Departmental regulation. The Audit Act, however, requires an examination of all accounts by this office, as an indepen-

dent check, the Departments being responsible for correctness in the first instance. A second independent examiner cannot accept a mere certificate from the first examiner. If he does his pretended check is worse than useless, from promising a security which does not exist.

The statement I would like is a list of names, dates and amounts. The receipts will not be necessary in the meantime, if they are in daily use in your office.

With reference to progress estimates from the printers, I gather from your explanation that the contractors get 80 per cent. of their claim before their accounts are audited. Please let me know why the usual practice of Departmental audit before payment is not followed in this instance.

The contractors for railways and public works are paid upon submission of progress estimates. Such estimates are probably much more voluminous than the Printing Accounts, and there should not be much difficulty in furnishing the latter.

DEAR SIR,—In answer to yours of the 29th ult., I beg to say I am very pleased to hear that you consider our system of the daily audit of the cash advances for indemnity "as very satisfactory and complete as a matter of Departmental regulation." You further state that the Audit Act, however, requires an examination of all accounts by your office. It appears to me you have had such examination ever since you have had the auditing of the Parliamentary expenditure, when the declaration of each M. P., with his receipt in full for indemnity and travelling expenses, was sent to you for that purpose, and which you certified to as correct in the annual statement. I have not heard of anything which would tend to destroy your confidence in the value of those declarations for the purpose of audit, that you should wish another system now to be inaugurated. You state what you would now like would be "a list of the names of the M. P's., the dates when they draw any money, and the amount each one draws." I presume you require this periodically as each \$2,000 is expended, as in your letter of the 27th ult. This information, being a detail of the monetary transactions of this office with the members of the House, which are confidential, I cannot furnish without an Order of the House, or of the Honorable the Board of Commissioners of Internal Economy. I have ever refused it. Did I even furnish it to you, it would be valueless, for it would be but my unsupported statement, till you received the declarations after the Session, as you now do.

You quite mistake the purport of my letter of the 27th ult., if you gather from my explanation in it that the Parliamentary Printing Contractors get 80 per cent. of their claim before their accounts are audited. They do nothing of the kind. You refer to the contractors for railways and public works as being paid on progress estimates, but we have no progress estimates, we only pay for work actually performed and delivered, which consists of the Blue Books, Votes, Minutes, Returns, Bills, &c., each one of which constitutes a finished work and voucher in itself, and charged as such. After audit in this office 20 per cent. is retained till the whole of the work pertaining to the Session is finished, thus ensuring its speedy completion, the balance of 80 per cent. is drawn by the contractors in such sums and at such periods as they may require it. Semi-annually, an account containing all these items of work performed is furnished me, with the cost and charges of each, in detail, on which a final settlement is made. This system has been in use ever since 1859, the year in which the Joint Committee on Printing was inaugurated. The Journals of both Houses have often testified as to the satisfaction it has given. Since you have had the auditing of the Printing Accounts, you have annually certified as to their correctness. The Joint Committee has them re-audited by a Sub Committee of their own appointing, who also certify the same thing, and it does seem uncalled for that a system which has given such universal satisfaction should now require further checks and guarantees, without any reason being assigned therefor.

Circular to Returning Officers.

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA,

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DEAR SIR,—I beg leave to make the following suggestions, tending to a speedy settlement of your account, for holding the coming election in .

1. The charges for mileage should be supported by a detailed statement of actual travel, giving dates, names of persons travelling, places passed through and distances

from place to place. To assist me in checking the statement with the map, please mark on the enclosed tracing of your county the route followed when posting Proclamations, and the place of each poll. No account will be accepted which cannot be compared fully with a map.

The practice is to make payment for posting notices and giving boxes in one trip. If, from unusual and special circumstances, the Returning Officer is unable to have everything ready to send out at one time, full proof of the fact should accompany the charges for mileage.

2. Please see that a specimen of each form printed is sent with the printer's account. I am only able to order payment when satisfied that work has been done equal to the amount of the claim. Enclosed is a list of the sums which will be allowed to the printer for necessary forms.

3. I shall need the account of the custodian against you for voters' lists, and the name of the office by virtue of which he is custodian. If you had any sub-division of lists to make, let me know your reasons for sub-dividing.

4. With this I send blank accounts for the deputies. Claims for rent and constables will be paid only when made in writing by the person to whom the money is due. You should certify that each item charged is correct, and that the rent paid for the polling booth is a reasonable amount for the house used. Please notice that \$4.00 for rent is a limit, and not a fee. Polls can generally be rented for less than \$4.00.

5. I send you, by mail, a specimen screen, which has already been used with satisfaction. It is a piece of heavy grey cotton, 6 feet square, hemmed along the top, with a ring on each end of the hem—the whole to be hung across the corner of the room. Screens of this kind could be made under your own directions at a cost of less than 75 cents each, and sent to the deputies (where needed) inside of the ballot boxes. After the polling day they could be returned to you in the same manner. Your voucher should be based on the quantity of material used for the number made.

If, however, an election has lately been held in your county, the screens are already provided. In that case you will find screens and ballot boxes in the possession of _____, postmaster at _____. These will be given to you on payment of a delivery fee of \$2.00 a year, counting from the time the postmaster got them.

6. Any new ballot boxes obtained by you, together with the screens, should be securely packed up and left with a postmaster near the place of declaration. A storage allowance of \$2.00 a year will be made to him, payable when he gives them up. You will please take his receipt, and forward it to this office, specifying the number of screens and boxes.

7. The accounts of your creditors should be forwarded in original, without alteration, except your deductions and certificate in the margin. Please support the whole account with a solemn declaration under 37 Vic., cap. 27, that you have made a reasonable examination of the claims, and are to the same extent satisfied of their correctness: that you do not know of any item for which the Government is asked to pay more than others would under circumstances of similar urgency. As the Dominion officer having most knowledge of the locality, we rely upon you for protection against overcharge.

8. Let me call your attention to the Dominion Election Act, sec. 126, sub-sec. 30, instructing returning officers to report through the Secretary of State the distribution made of money paid to them for election expenses. Since many of your claims on the Government are not completely established without receipts from your creditors, and you cannot be expected to advance the money, a subsequent verification is the only one possible. Your services will not be completed until the account is closed, and a part of your fee will therefore be withheld until this is done.

SIR,—Let me call your attention to a discussion in the House of Commons (April 7th) concerning the travelling expenses of the Minister of Customs.

The debate supports me strongly in the position I have always taken, that items usually charged against Civil Government Contingencies should never be paid from outside votes.

Unless our practice is consistent, the public will find difficulty in understanding the accounts.

I notice payments in January, March and April, to the Secretary of your Department, for travelling expenses, charged to the vote for Immigration; also in April, travelling expenses of Mrs. A. F. Lyster, charged to Health Statistics. These amounts should be transferred to Civil Government Contingencies.

In January last a payment was made to Holland Bros. of \$127.50, for a typewriter, and charged to Mortuary Statistics. This should have been procured through the Government Stationery Office.

SIR,—I have to acknowledge your letter of the 6th instant, calling attention to a discussion in the House of Commons of April 7th, relating to the votes to which travelling expenses should be charged.

The point, as I understand it, to which you desire to have attention directed, is that travelling expenses charged in the particular accounts pertaining to the service for which the expenditure was incurred, could not so readily be seen as when charged to the account of Civil Government Contingencies.

I am to inform you, that after a careful consideration, nothing is found in this reference to alter the decision which was arrived at by the Minister of Agriculture, with respect to the entry of items in the accounts to which the charges, from the nature of the service, actually belong.

Travelling expenses which relate simply to the Department generally are always charged to Contingencies; but there are certain other charges for travelling which are placed to the account of special votes for the reason that they belong to, and that their object is, to give effect to such votes.

So far as relates to the point that these items are not so plainly seen, I have to remark, with respect to the Immigration vote, for instance, that there is probably no part of the public accounts which seems to attract more attention.

All items for travelling expenses, moreover, which have been authorized in this Department, are always clearly shown separately, in connection with the name of the officer or other person authorized to incur them, without being grouped under any general heading.

AGRICULTURE DEPT., September 3, 1885.

SIR,—In looking over the details of expenditure in your appropriation account under the head of Immigration, which you were so good as to communicate to the Department, I find that in five items there should be a little change of form to make the account accord with our vote, as specified in the Estimates, and as explained in previous years.

A. Gaunt, a Messenger of the Toronto Agency, is paid a salary of \$1 per day (\$365), but you have entered \$515. The \$150 is not salary, but payment for special extra services authorized by the Minister, and therefore should be entered as such under the general expenditure of this vote. Mr. Gaunt is only a temporary employé, and does not come within any of the definitions of the Civil Service Act.

H. B. Clay, in the Halifax Agency, is entered at \$349 50 as salary, but he being only a temporary assistant employed during the winter time, no special vote was taken for salary, the payment being made from the general vote, under which head it should be entered in the appropriation account.

At the Winnipeg Agency, J. M. Trimble, Caretaker, is entered in your account at \$730 for salary, and Mr. E. Ohlen, interpreter, is also entered in the same account for \$499.75 for salary. These employés being temporary, no special vote for salary was taken for them, they being paid from the general expenditure, under which head the entries should be made.

At the Port Arthur Agency, O. Mellbye is entered in your account for salary as Messenger at \$360.50. This employé also is purely temporary and no vote was taken for him; the payment made to him being from the general expenditure, under which head this item should be charged.

SIR,—I have to request that you will send me a copy of each contract for materials supplied to the Government for the current fiscal year; also, for work now being carried on under the authority of your Department, so that I may be able to check the prices paid with those contained in the contract.

When work is undertaken or materials are furnished without a contract, I shall be glad to have any correspondence between your Department and the person or persons entering into the agreement, which would show the character and cost of the building to be completed, or the rates of remuneration for the different kinds of materials supplied and work performed.

Requisitions are often made by your Department for payments on account of materials delivered on the site of any public work or building. In every case the bill accompanying the said requisition should bear, in addition to the signature of the proper officer of your Department, the certificate of the person authorized to receive the material on behalf of the Government: 1st, That the amount of material stated in the bill is delivered; 2nd, That the rates charged are reasonable and just. (Sec. 33, Audit Act.)

AUDIT OFFICE, Oct. 28, 1885.

SIR,—I have examined the statements and vouchers for the expenditure under letter of credit in the Bank of Montreal for the first six months of the fiscal year ended June 30, 1885.

I observe that a number of the extra clerks of your Department are paid every six or eight days, and their pay is distributed over a number of sub-votes, without any apparent system.

When this practice is followed it is very difficult to calculate the total amount received by each clerk during the year, and it is evident that each account does not show the amount of work done by the extra clerks on the corresponding work. In order to facilitate account-keeping, and to clearly exhibit the expenditure, I would suggest: 1st, That the extra clerks should be paid only once a month; 2nd, That a separate vote should be taken, against which to charge the pay of all the said clerks. The same remarks, except as to the number of times a month in which they are paid, apply to the permanent architects and engineers of the Department who are stationed at Ottawa, and I would suggest that a separate vote for each of these classes be also obtained.

I observe that the sum of \$535 is paid for charwomen and charged to repairs to Ottawa buildings. This is irregular, as the charwomen should be paid by the Accountant of Contingencies. (See 31 Vic., cap. 35, sec. 11; also O. C. of Oct. 31, 1881.)

I take the same objection to the method of making payments, amounting to \$515.84, to messengers, and charging the same to sundry sub-votes of the outside service of your Department, as these also should be paid through the Accountant of Contingencies.

In several instances stationery, which should have been purchased through the Stationery Office, was purchased direct by your Department. Five thousand special envelopes, for enclosing plans, and costing \$275, is one example.

All the above charges are contained in the construction and repairs of Dominion Public Buildings.

(1.) When a payment is made on account, a progress estimate should be given by the printer, showing the work done up to that time, and the value of it—making a sum in excess of the payment asked. This should be certified by an officer of your Department acquainted with the work. (2.) The voucher for the final payment should contain full details of the calculations fixing the whole amount. Specimens of the work should be attached. I cannot pass any payments until I am satisfied that the work charged for was done. (3.) Please obtain in each case from the Department of Justice a statement that the work is not one to which the printing contractor is entitled.

The Public Works Department has the duty of buying all furniture to be used at Ottawa. There is a special vote for furniture for Public Buildings. The expenditure is made by the Public Works Department, on the staff of which are persons having the technical knowledge necessary for a certificate of value. Please ask that Department to examine the furniture bought by you, and to certify the accounts. The items should be transferred to the special vote.

I beg to acknowledge receipt of appropriation accounts and vouchers for your expenditure to December 31, 1884, and hope to find time to examine them soon. In the meantime, I notice that Messrs. Bailey, Chalmers and Weston are the only surveyors who have given accounts of their expenses for the season of 1884. The other surveyors who have returned should close their accounts at once. Please see that this is done in time to send me their vouchers with the January appropriation accounts at latest.

I would like to have statements for each month, before the end of the following month, instead of quarterly, as at present.

AUDIT OFFICE, April 24, 1885.

SIR,—I have completed my examination of your vouchers for the half year ended Dec. 31, 1884, and beg to call your attention to some changes which are desirable, in the interests of uniformity.

The petty cash system now worked in connection with Civil Government Contingencies is based on the necessity of frequent account. An advance, equal to the average monthly expenditure, is made in July, and retained to the end of the fiscal year. Accounts are presented every month and paid in full. The June account is set against the original advance, and the difference paid by cheque or refund before a new account is opened for the next year. Petty cash is advanced only to one person in each Department.

I notice that you keep open accounts for expenses with both Messrs. Marshall and O'Farrell, and pay, in some cases, \$200 in one cheque. Mr. O'Farrell's whole expenditure for 1883-84 was less than \$700. Following the usual system, a July cheque would be issued for about \$60, in place of \$200. Please ask both gentlemen to close their accounts at once, and open a new account with one of them on the system now followed in all the other Departments.

There is no reason why Mr. Desbarats should make drafts on you. He should ask for cheques, and send progress estimates in support of his demands. The estimates should form part of the vouchers sent to this office.

An account of Mr. Burland, for \$1,377 for printing 3,100 copies of a Geological Map of Canada, is not certified by any one. Experienced lithographers, to whom I have submitted the account and specimen, state that the rates charged are unreasonably high. Under 41 Vic., cap. 7, sec. 33, it is my duty to see that every account for technical work is examined and certified by some officer who, from his position, would naturally be acquainted with the work for which payment is asked.

Voucher 266 covers a payment of \$55 to Matthew Esdale, your salaried carpenter, for making and finding material for two drawing tables. It would be well to have a statement from Mr. Esdale that the work was done outside of his office hours.

I forward a letter received from Mr. Wallace Broad, complaining about an item of \$205.71 charged against him in last report. He thinks the Department is in his debt about \$70. Please let me know if his explanation is correct.

I should like to have your accounts rendered monthly. I have nothing later than December.

INDIAN AFFAIRS, OTTAWA, June 20, 1885.

SIR,—With reference to your letter of the 18th instant, referring to my application for payment to Baker & Co. of \$31,510.24 on account of this Department, and informing me that the grant to Indians for the N. W. T. is already overdrawn, and that in the absence of authority from Parliament you are unable to certify that any more expenditure may be made; I beg to state that when application was made to Council on the 22nd of January last, for a Governor General's warrant to carry us over the fiscal year, the Superintendent General stated in his report that the amount that would apparently be required would be \$372,682.83, but that the Department would endeavor to make \$250,000 answer.

You will thus observe that this expenditure was not altogether unexpected by the Government, and in view of the impossibility of knowing when the Supplementary Estimates will pass the House, and as those already prepared for 1884-85 have been printed, and it will therefore be necessary to make up a Supplementary Estimate for the amount required, which will not probably be taken into consideration until the very latest date that Parliament sits, and in view of the great inconvenience to which parties will be put by delay in the payment of their accounts, I should be glad if you could see your way to certify the requisitions sent to you for payment, on the understanding that the Department will protect you in doing so by having a sufficient amount placed in a supplementary estimate to be submitted to the House, or in such other way as may suggest itself to you.

SIR,—Let me call your attention to a discussion in the House of Commons (April 7) concerning the travelling expenses of the Minister of Customs. The debate supports me strongly in the position I have always taken—that items usually charged against Civil Government Contingencies should never be paid from outside votes. Unless our practice is consistent, the public will find difficulty in understanding the accounts.

I notice payments to yourself in July, 1884, and February, 1885, of \$382.85, for travelling expenses. Please apply for a transfer of the amount from "Mounted Police" to Civil Government Contingencies.

If the vote for contingencies of your Department for 1884-85 is not large enough to include the Mounted Police branch, it would be well to get a special vote this Session to cover all the Mounted Police expenditure properly belonging to Civil Government.

SIR,—I beg to call your attention to the following remarks in connection with the expenditure during the months of April, May and June last, on account of Militia on active service.

Cheque No. 690, April.—This is an advance of \$250 to Dr. Douglass, of the ambulance service. Of this amount \$120 has been refunded, leaving \$130 for the expenditure, of which no details have been given. A reference is made to cheque No. 1088, June. The only details there given, however, are for a further payment of \$41.05 for travelling expenses.

Cheque No. 711, April.—An advance of \$2,000 to Capt. J. Wright, supply officer with the 65th Battalion. In the expenditure under this advance the following items appear, for which I ask an explanation :—

Rideout House, Rat Portage, to 27 suppers for troops.....	\$20 00
Extras.....	18 00
Total.....	\$38 00

In no other case has more than 50c. been paid for meals, while everything of the nature of extras should be paid by the officers themselves, and not be charged against the Government. The same cheque also covers a payment of \$25.50 for a rifle and ammunition purchased at Calgary. I would ask for whom, and by what authority, this purchase was made. I would also like an explanation of the payment of \$770 in bonuses of \$10 each to teamsters returning to Calgary.

Cheque No. 721, April.—Vouchers are required for the expenditure of \$76.45 out of the advance of \$100 to Major Guy for travelling expenses.

Cheque No. 750, April.—J. A. McCann has been paid at the rate of \$2 a day from the 12th of March, about two weeks before the actual outbreak. The first two weeks of his service cannot be properly charged against the vote for Militia on active service.

Cheque No. 752, April.—An advance of \$400 to Capt. Heigham, supply officer with the Cavalry School Corps. In the payments under this advance the item of \$10.50 for dinners supplied by the Rideout House, Rat Portage, appears to have been charged twice, especially as there are 72 dinners in all charged at Rat Portage, as compared with 50 at other points.

Expenditure by Paymaster Major Guy.—Lt. Col. D. A. Macdonald has received, in addition to his pay of rank for 60 days, at \$4.87 per day, a hotel allowance at \$3.50 per day for the same period, as well as an allowance of \$1 per day, as in paragraph 983, R.P.O., 1883, and field allowance for 61 days, at \$1 per day. In no case should these two last allowances be paid during the same period as that for which the hotel allowance is drawn. In the present case, as Col. Macdonald is a member of the Civil Service, all payments made to him outside of his salary are in contravention of the Civil Service Act.

Dr. E. Benson drew pay from 13th May to 29th May at the rate of \$5.65 per day. The other surgeons were paid at the rate of \$4.65 a day, being \$3.65 pay and an allowance of \$1 per day.

With regard to the transport service, all vouchers for teaming should be accompanied by a way-bill, showing the exact amount of the goods or stores delivered to the teamsters, and also the receipt of the officer to whom they were delivered. In none of the vouchers examined so far has the service been thus certified, and I would ask that if any such way-bills were used I may be furnished with them without delay.

A refund of \$1,000 has been made on account of horses sold by auction. I would ask that in this, and in all cases of refunds of sales, a statement be furnished me of the goods sold and the services received, as no information is to be derived from the mere statement of the bulk proceeds of the sales.

SIR,—I beg to call your attention to the following remarks on the expenditure under advances to the Hudson Bay Co. on account of militia on active service as per statements 1-5 inclusive.

1st. The correction of \$20 in voucher 543, Fort Qu'Appelle supplies, statement 6, should not have been made, for although the amount has been entered as \$62.45, still in the addition it has been taken as \$42.65, the correct amount. In the same statement, \$147.05 (see list) should be transferred from payments to supplies.

With these changes, in addition to those made by the company itself, and allowing a commission of 5 per cent. on the corrected amount of payments, the first five statements would be as follows:—

It is unnecessary to remind you that in all such cases a certificate by a disinterested party as to the performance of the service is indispensable.

As to the payment being made through the contingent account, it was the most convenient manner of doing it until the passing of the Estimates, when it was intended to transfer the whole amount to salaries account.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter No. 2372.

When you state that up to the time of the giving of the ruling of the Department of Justice it was held that the differential salary was payable under circumstances similar to those which are connected with this case, you refer, I presume, to the opinion held in your Department.

I beg to call your attention to what, as it appears to me, would have been the more correct course to have followed, *viz.*, to have withheld the differential salary until after its authorization by Parliament. I must also remark that no appropriation should be used as a means of paying sums not properly chargeable to it, even where it is expected to subsequently obtain an appropriation to which the same may be charged.

Class I includes \$16,560.63 under the head of accident insurance, being the excess of indemnities for injuries paid to employes over the assessments for that purpose accrued up to 30 June last. It is claimed by the employes, I understand, that a former manager had promised that the railway would make annual grants to the fund. I would therefore recommend that the fund be placed on a proper basis, either by an annual grant by the railway, or by fixing such an increase in the assessments as will make the fund self-sustaining.

In former reports I have deemed it proper to call attention to the very large increase in the number and amount of the unsettled balances in the railway books. During the past five fiscal years they stood as follows on the 30th June of each year :—

I have already shown that the last total includes various balances, amounting to \$103,853.51, in which no changes whatever took place during the past year. Many of the debts, it is well-known, will never be collected. I would therefore respectfully recommend that steps be taken to authorize a revision of the balance sheet, with the view of writing off all bad debts, and establishing as stringent measures as possible to ensure for the future the most prompt settlement of all running accounts that may be authorized.

II.—WINDSOR BRANCH.

SIR,—I beg to acknowledge receipt yesterday of your accounts of Dominion Lands Expenditure for July, 1884.

I notice that payments made to other persons at the request of surveyors, and charged to the surveyors' accounts, are now supported by two receipts—one from the surveyor himself and one from the person who gets the money. Example enclosed, No. 21, Capital Account. The first receipt, not representing a real transaction, is of no use. The surveyor does not get the money, and is not bound by his receipt. The law on the subject is very clear. A power of attorney should be given on the printed form ordered in 1870, a copy of which I sent you Feb. 20, 1884. This original power of attorney should form part of the voucher for this office.

Voucher 21 (income) shows a payment to the *Montreal Shareholder* of \$100, for advertising land registrations in 25,000 of "Ho for Canada." This is contrary to an Order in Council of April 16, 1880: "No advertisements shall be authorized in connection with the publication of any pamphlet or book whatever, save only that where any Department causes a pamphlet to be published, the head of such Department may cause to be inserted therein such advertisement connected with his own Department as he thinks expedient in the public service." I would like to have some explanation from you before asking the Treasury Board whether the item shall remain in the Appropriation Account.

I return, as samples, two vouchers for the extra work of extra clerks, in which the time of each clerk is certified by the other. It is plain that the only certificate of any value would be one made by the officer in charge of the work.
