AMENDMENTS TO NAVAL ACCOUNT REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS.

Attention is invited to the amendments to Naval Account Regulations and Instructions which appear in R.I. 10-11/37. The following instructions are issued for guidance in connection therewith:—

Articles 52 and 167. The requirement that a signature of claimant be obtained on claim forms is being dispensed with. Attention of Accountant Officers and Certifying Officers is drawn to the responsibility being imposed upon them under the amended regulations to obtain a signature of claimant if there is any doubt that the claimant is the person who rendered the service or supplied the goods to which the claim relates, or where it is necessary to obtain a signature for the purpose of comparison with any subsequent signature.

Action will be taken to omit the provision for signature of claimant on forms A.S. 22, A.S. 22A, N.A. 4 and N.A. 9, when these forms are being reprinted.

Article 208—Refund Account (N.A. 9). The existing certificate on the back of form N.A. 9 is to be replaced by the following, one of which should be completed:—

INSTRUCTIONS FOR DOCKING AND BERTHING H.M.A. SHIPS FOR REPAIRS AT COCKATOO ISLAND DOCKYARD.

1. When ships are being docked:-

The Commanding Officer is responsible that the vessel is trimmed as nearly as possible 2-ft. by the stern, and is upright to the satisfaction of the Dockyard Officers before entering the dock until the breast shores are set. All fittings outboard that would interfere with the safe working of docking operations are to be arranged so that there is no danger of any damage being done, e.g., davits to be triced up and turned in, accommodation ladders triced up, &c. Ships are not to enter the dock with collision mat chains rove. Crews of vessels are not required on the dock side when ships are going in or out of dock, and should not leave the ship until permission is given by the Dockyard

The Dockyard is responsible for the provision of suitable fenders to prevent ships being docked or undocked from touching the dock sides, entrances, or approach walls. Experience has shown that fenders are required at the Fitzroy Dock, not only on the approach wall, but also at either side of the entrance, as the propeller guards of small ships rise above the dock sides at certain stages of the tide.

2. The following arrangements will apply to Cruisers in commission and H.M.A.S. "Albatross":-

(a) A signal rating, equipped with hand flags, is to be sent to the dock in sufficient time to locate and attend on the Dockmaster before the arrival of the ship.

(b) The ship is to be brought to rest with the bows at the dock entrance, the ship being on the centre line of the dock, or, if there be a strong cross

wind, parallel to and slightly to windward of the centre line.

(c) On approaching the dock entrance and at a time convenient to her, the ship is to send (by boat, propelling gun or heaving line) two wires, one on either bow; the Dockyard will accept and secure them to bollards ashore on each side of the dock entrance. The ship will work these wires entirely, heaving in on the windward wire by her own capstan and working the other on bollards inboard as requisite to get the ship's stem in the correct position. Meanwhile the stern tugs under orders from the ship will continue to straighten up the stern as necessary.

(d) When the ship is nearly in line with the dock and her stem is at the entrance, the Dockyard will send its own Manila hawsers (6"). When these are secured inboard and the ship stopped, the Dockmaster will cast off the ship's wires and take charge as soon as the latter are inboard.

(e) When the Dockmaster has taken charge, the ship is to transmit without delay his orders to the stern tugs, and is to give no independent orders to them.

The main engines are not to be used after the Dockmaster has taken charge.

(f) The following signals shown from the roof of a small shed on the Southern side of Sutherland Dock entrance will be used for the purposes indicated hereunder:-

Red Light.—The burning of a red light during the ship's approach, will indicate that the Dockmaster is not ready to receive the ship. She should then keep an offing until an amber light is seen.

Amber Light .-

When docking.—The burning of an amber light will indicate that the Dockmaster is ready to receive the ship.

When undocking.—The burning of an amber light will indicate that the Dockmaster has given over charge to the ship.

Green Light.—The burning of a green light will indicate that the Dockmaster has taken over charge; and this signal should be acknowledged by the ship by voice or through the signalman attending on the Dockmaster.

- 3. For other Ships in Commission and Ships in Reserve docking in Sutherland and Fitzroy Docks:—
 - (a) The way of the ship should not be checked too early, so that the ship may be out of the influence of the tide when stopped with the bows at the dock entrance.
 - (b) When the ship is ready in position and as soon as it is possible she will throw heaving lines on to which the Dockyard will bend its own 6" Manila hawsers, weather side first.
 - (c) When the hawsers are secured inboard and the ship in position the Dockmaster will take charge, switching on the green light (at Sutherland Dock) to indicate this and the ship will then transmit the Dockmaster's orders to the tugs.
 - (d) The vessel passes from the control of the Dockyard again when the headlines are cast off at undocking. Assistance should be rendered to the Dockmaster in controlling the tugs.

4. Fitzroy Dock-Special instructions :-

- (a) Vessels proceeding to Fitzroy Dock should note that at or about high water the set of the tide is across the dock entrance, i.e., from S.W. to N.E., and ships should therefore make a large sweep in turning up for the entrance and should keep well to the south westward when approaching it.
 - (b) The port bow line should be laid out as early as possible.
- (c) A green light signal is not installed at Fitzroy Dock and the Dockmaster will indicate verbally when he wishes to take charge.

5. Regulations to be observed whilst in Dock :-

- (a) No weights are to be removed, added to, or shifted on board vessels whilst in dock, unless the written permission of the Dockyard has first been obtained. Prior to undocking, a written certificate is to be furnished by the Commanding Officer to the Dockyard Officers to comply with Article 719 of the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions.
- (b) The gangways or brows will be placed in position by the Dockyard, and the ship's officers are subsequently to be responsible that both ends of gangway or brows are efficiently protected by guard ropes to prevent accidents. Brows or gangways are not to be shifted by the ship's officers without the concurrence of the Dockyard officers.
- (c) The Dockyard will be responsible for providing and rigging adequate safety chains around the dock side. Ship's Officers will be responsible that these are not interfered with by ship's company without authority of the Dockyard.
- (d) The Dockyard will be responsible that the ship is efficiently protected by proper conductors from the danger of lightning.
- (e) Regulations regarding explosives, on docking, &c., are to be strictly observed. Application for authority to retain explosives on board whilst in dock should be addressed to the Captain Superindendent, Sydney.
- (f) The following procedure is to be followed for the disposal of ashes and other refuse:—
 - (i) Ships in commission (including "Penguin").—A Lighter provided by the Master Attendant Garden Island will be

- placed at the Dock head and *ships* are to place their refuse directly into the lighter. Lighter will be removed by the Master Attendant, Garden Island.
- (ii) Ships in Reserve.—Refuse is to be kept on board in bins provided for the purpose until the ship returns from Dock.
- (g) The Dockyard is to provide adequate and suitable water-closets for the use of officers and men whilst ships are in dock. These are to be handed over entirely, in clean condition.

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6. Undocking.

- (a) When it is intended to flood a dock for undocking or other purposes, the officer immediately responsible for and controlling the admission of the water to the dock will notify the fact in writing direct to the Commanding Officer and the Engineer Officer of the ship concerned, and the time when it is proposed to commence operations.
- (b) The Engineer Officer and the Shipwright Officer of the ship are responsible that a certificate, on a form to be supplied by the Dockyard, is furnished to the Dockyard before undocking, that all underwater valves are closed and the vessel is in all respects ready for undocking.
- (c) When a ship is undocked, the water-closets, sheds, telephone room, and washing ground are to be left in a clean and tidy condition.
- (d) The vessel passes from the control of the Dockyard when headlines are cast off at undocking.

7. Division of responsibility when being repaired alongside:

- (a) The Dockyard will provide suitable berthing and suitable bollards, &c., to which ship can make fast.
 - (b) The ship will provide wires and secure the ship.
- (c) Dockyard will be responsible for placing suitable brows in position and providing a suitable landing for shore ends thereof. The ship will secure the inboard ends.

8. General-

(a) The Dockyard will be responsible for supplying at ruling rates ample water, at suitable positions, and at all times, for magazine flooding when ships are in dry dock, fire-fighting, and domestic purposes. The Dockyard will be responsible for keeping water supply up to the hydrants on the dock side or wharf, for shipping an adequate number of hydrants prior to ship docking, and for maintaining valves on the hydrants in good condition, accessible, and fitted with means for opening and closing them.

The Dockyard will maintain an adequate supply of adapters for use with their hydrants or valves, and supply them in good order to ships on loan when demanded.

The ship will be responsible for connecting all hoses to hydrants, and for operating hydrant valves and all connections on the ship side thereof, and for returning adapters in good order before leaving the dockyard.

(b) The Dockyard will be responsible that all reasonable precautions are taken to prevent fire in the vicinity of H.M.A. Ships, and sabotage by Dockyard workmen.

- (c) The Dockyard will provide facilities for berthing of garbage lighters and for conveyance of garbage from ship to lighters.
- (d) Facilities for berthing ships' boats which are in use whilst ship is in dock will be provided by the Dockvard.
- 9. Services which Cockatoo Docks and Engineering Co. Pty. Ltd. are requested to provide as a convenience to ships when in dock:
 - (a) Electric light and power; ship to be supplied through a separate meter.
 - (b) Fresh water to be supplied through a meter.

Note.—Ship's and Dockvard officers to read meters conjointly before and after use.

- (d) Salt water for use in firemain and for refrigerating machinery.

NAVAL ARMAMENT STORE ACCOUNTS IN H.M.A. SHIPS.

In some instances Naval Armament Store Accounts forwarded into office for check in 1937 showed great neglect and lack of care on the part of Store Accounting Officers in keeping their Accounts.

- 2. Check of these Accounts disclosed an abnormal number of deficiencies, which were due chiefly to the following causes:-
 - (1) Failure to take stock accurately at the beginning of the Account:
 - (2) Failure to keep an accurate account of stores expended;
 - (3) Loss of stores, such as web equipment and accourrements, arising from inefficient mustering after issues to landing parties, &c.
 - (4) Failure to detect and immediately report losses of valuable and important stores.
- 3. Storekeeping Officers are reminded that the allowances they receive for storekeeping are conditional upon these duties being correctly and properly performed and their accounts being satisfactorily rendered and duly passed, and that if these conditions are not fulfilled, they may be required to refund the allowance paid, and also be liable for charges against their pay for losses, &c., caused by neglect or carelessness, as provided by K.R. & A.I., Article 1581, and Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 8A.
- 4. Commanding Officers are to take the necessary steps to ensure that store accounts are kept with greater care in the future, that the stocktaking carried out on change of Accounting Officer is accurate and complete, and that losses of valuable and important stores are immediately reported in accordance with K.R. & A.I., Article 1130.

REPORTS OF MOVEMENTS OF H.M.A. (AND H.M.) SHIPS AND FLEET AUXILIARIES.

1. In peace-time, reports of movements on the Australia Station of H.M.A. (and H.M.) Ships and Fleet Auxiliaries are to be made as indicated below. The necessary reports to the Admiralty and to Authorities on other Stations will be made by Navy Office.

In time of war or strained relations, these instructions are to be taken as a general guide only, and the principles laid down in C.B. 3000 (31), Chapter VI., Part II., should be followed.

- 2. In the case of ships proceeding to sea for exercises for periods not exceeding 48 hours, and returning to the same port, movements signals are not required.
- 3. Reporting Authorities.—Movements reports are to be made by the Senior Officer of the ship/s arriving or leaving, except at Sydney and Westernport, where reports are to be made by the Captain Superintendent, Sydney, and the Captain Superintendent of Training, Flinders Naval Depot, respectively.
 - 4. Authorities to whom Movements Reports are to be sent.
 - (a) In all cases.
 - (i) Navy Office, Melbourne.
 - (ii) The Captain Superintendent, Sydney.
 - (iii) The Captain Superintendent of Training, Flinders Naval Depot.
 - (iv) The District Intelligence Officer of the Intelligence Area in which the movement takes place.*
 - (v) The Senior Naval Officer of the Squadron, Flotilla, or Establishment to which the ship belongs.

Note.—In regard to (iv) above, the limits of the various Australian Intelligence Areas are set out in A.C.B. 45, Section 1 (b).

- (b) Additional Authorities where applicable.
 - (i) The District Intelligence Officer of the Intelligence Area to which the ship is proceeding.*
 - (ii) The Senior Naval Officer Ashore at the port to which the ship is proceeding.
 - (iii) The District Intelligence Officer of the Intelligence Area/s
 through which a ship must pass to reach her immediate
 destination.*
- 5. Transmission of Movements Reports.—Reports to Shore Authorities (other than Naval Board or C.S.*) are to be routed either (a) via Garden Island W/T Station and thence by L/T (except in the case of the District Naval Officer, Victoria, as Navy Office W/T Station is automatically responsible for passing messages to this Authority) or (b) via Post Office L/T or Commercial Radio Stations.

- 6. Form of Report.—Reports should take the following form:—
 - (a) (In the case of a single ship.) "Arrived Gladstone. 1430/21."*
 - (b) (In the case of more than one ship.) "Canberra, wearing the flag of R.A.C.A.S., and Sydney left Brisbane for Hervev Bay, 1715/15."*

The names of all authorities to whom the report is sent are to be included in the address of the message.

- 8. When ships arrive or leave at short intervals the Senior Officer is to report the movements of all and is to inform other ships that he is doing so.

Instances have occurred where a number of items of Naval Stores has been lost at one time, or in the same set of circumstances, and, although the total value of the stores involved was considerable, no special report was forwarded to the Naval Board at the time, the Commanding Officer having been guided presumably by the fact that no individual item was of a rate book value of £5 or over. Thus the Naval Board were not aware of these heavy losses until some months later when Forms A.S. 1096 were received in office after the completion of the audit of the particular ship's Naval Store Accounts. The lapse of time made it difficult to obtain any further details required.

- 2. In future, in addition to the reports in accordance with K.R. and A.I., Article 1130 (B.R. 4, Article 72), a report in detail is to be rendered in the following cases of loss of Naval Stores by accident:—
 - (a) Binoculars, Telescopes and Watches.

COMMUNICATIONS BRANCH—ENTRY AND TRAINING OF JUNIOR RATINGS.

Ordinary Seamen C.B. (D.E.) are entered as such and, after passing New Entry Course (11 weeks), join the Signal School. In certain circumstances, Ordinary Seamen (D.E.) may be permitted to transfer to Ordinary Seamen C.B. during or on completion of their New Entry Course.

SIGNAL SCHOOL TRAINING.

2. Courses—

- (a) Preliminary Course of 12 Weeks.—On conclusion, Ordinary Seamen (C.B.) will be allocated to V/S or W/T and given the rating of Ordinary Seaman (V/S) or Ordinary Seaman (W/T) and will be required to wear the appropriate badge of their Branch.
- (b) Final Course of 32 Weeks.—During this course, Ordinary Seamen (W/T) will be instructed in Electricity and Magnetism on the Syllabus laid down in Signal Training Instructions and will be examined in these subjects on passing out of the Establishment. Failure to pass will not preclude a rating being advanced to Ordinary Telegraphist.

3. Examinations

On the results of the Final Examination at the S gnal School, time may be gained in accordance with the following scale:—

4. Failures-

Ratings who fail in the examinations at the conclusion of their final course will not be retained in the Communications Branch unless their failure is attributed to exceptional circumstances over which they have no control, e.g., prolonged sickness. In such cases, ratings may be given a further period of instruction and re-examined on conclusion, when similar opportunity arises for gaining time, counted from the date of re-examination.

TRAINING AT SEA.

5. On completion of Signal School Courses, ratings who qualify will be advanced to Ordinary Signalman or Ordinary Telegraphist and will be drafted to sea-going ships, as part complement, for a period of six months. During this period, they should be classed up under Petty Officer Instructors and receive instruction, as laid down in Signal Training Instruction, for Signal Boys and Boy Telegraphists (including W/T training classes for V/S ratings and V/S training classes for W/T ratings).

Ordinary Telegraphists who fail in Electricity and Magnetism at the Final Signal School Examination must qualify in these subjects before being eligible for advancement to Telegraphist.

6. Examinations—

On the termination of the six months' Training period at Sea, ratings are to be examined for Signalman and Telegraphist. On the results of these examinations, time may be gained in accordance with the following scale:—

Ratings who are re-examined and pass at the end of three months may gain time in accordance with the scale given in clause 6 above, such time to be applied from the date of the successful examination.

Subject to the proviso that advancement of an Ordinary Signalman or Ordinary Telegraphist to relative Able Seaman rating shall not be antedated to a date prior to attainment by the rating of the age of 181 years, Signalmen and Telegraphists, on being rated as such, may have their advancement antedated for purposes of seniority and pay in accordance with the time gained in both examinations from the date of passing their final qualifying examination.

CLASSES AND EXAMINATION FOR SEAMAN PETTY OFFICER AND LEADING SEAMAN.

(C.O.R. Article 170.)

The professional examination of Able Seamen for Leading Seaman and Leading Seamen for Petty Officer will be conducted by Boards of Officers. The examination is to be oral.

- 2. The Board of Examiners for both Petty Officer and Leading Seaman is to consist of:—
 - (a) a Commander as President,

(b) a Navigating Officer,

(c) two Lieutenant-Commanders or Lieutenants,

- (d) a Commissioned Boatswain or Boatswain, or if neither is available, a commissioned Gunner or Gunner or a Commissioned Gunner (T) or Gunner (T).
- Notes.—(i) In cases where it is not convenient for a Commander to be spared for this duty, a Lieutenant-Commander whose appointment is in Command, or as Executive Officer, may be appointed as President of a Board for Leading Seaman.

(ii) If insufficient Navigating Officers are available, a Lieutenant, carrying out the duties of Navigating Officer in a small ship, may be appointed to the Board.

(iii) Normally the President of the Board should not be required to examine candidates in a particular subject. He may, however, do so if he wishes, particularly when any doubt arises as to the suitability of a candidate.

- 3. The maximum number of candidates to be examined by one Board is to be limited to 12.
- 4. In normal circumstances, examinations should be held once every half-year, and as late as may be convenient in the half-year.
- 5. The Officer Commanding H.M.A. Squadron will make the necessary arrangements for the assembly of the half-yearly Squadron Board, and attendance of candidates.
- 6. Ratings in Shore Establishments are to be examined by Boards convened by the Captain Superintendent of Training and/or the Captain Superintendent, Sydney, unless an opportunity arises for them to be examined by a Squadron Board.
- · If a Navigating Officer is not available for these Boards, a Lieutenant-Commander without (N) qualification may be substituted.
- 7. Candidates in detached ships in Victorian waters should attend the Depot examination if convenient.
- 8. Men serving in detached ships, who have been unable to attend either the Squadron or Shore Establishment Boards during the half-year, are to be examined by a similar Board, but consisting of officers of their own ship.

Those serving in Exchange Cruisers, however, should be examined by the Boards of the Squadron in which they are serving.

- 9. When a rating applies to be examined, his Commanding Officer is to satisfy himself that the candidate possesses the necessary qualities which, with further experience, if necessary, will fit him to make an efficient Petty Officer or Leading Seaman, respectively. Provided that the man is otherwise qualified and that there is a reasonable prospect of his passing the examination, the Commanding Officer will forward his application for examination by the Squadron Board. Should, however, a candidate be considered unsuitable by his Commanding Officer, his application is to be considered null and void.
- 10. With a view to providing opportunities to men for preparing themselves for the higher rating, organized classes are to be arranged in ships and establishments for men who wish to pass for Leading Seaman and for Petty Officer. A definite syllabus of instruction in each case is to be drawn up. The special course of training should be of approximately two months' duration, and the instruction should be given mainly by officers.
- 11. Men must be prepared to work up in their own time, but organized instruction is to be given in working hours when feasible. Voluntary instruction in silent hours should be given for an aggregate of three hours a week, the times and periods comprising the voluntary instruction being arranged as convenient in each ship or establishment.
- 12. Commanding Officers are to use their discretion as to the inclusion in the classes during working hours of men who have previously undergone a course in the ship or establishment, or of men who absent themselves from voluntary instruction during non-working hours.

13. Care is to be taken that instruction and examination are not confine to the requirements for higher rating in the candidate's own ship.

14. The fact that a man has passed professionally for higher rating will not alone qualify him for advancement. Commanding Officers' recommendations are to be the most important factor in determining a man's suitability for higher rating.

Syllabuses.

15. The syllabuses are as follows:

(A) SYLLABUS FOR EXAMINATION OF LEADING SEAMEN FOR PETTY OFFICER.

SECTION I.—ABILITY TO TAKE CHARGE—ABILITY TO STEER A SHIP—BOAT WORK—PRACTICAL RIGGING.

Ability to take charge-

- (a) To take charge of a class in—
 - (i) Squad drill;

(ii) Physical and recreational training.

- (b) To tell off a party of men for work of the following nature and carry it out:—
 - (i) Getting out kedge anchors;
 - (ii) Working derricks;
 - (iii) Handling awnings.

Ability to steer a ship-

To be able to steer a ship.

To qualify in this subject a candidate is required to produce a certificate from the Captain of a sea-going ship that he has carried out the duties of helmsman satisfactorily in that ship. This certificate may be obtained at any time that a future candidate for examination for higher rating is serving in a sea-going ship.

Boat Work-

(a) Handling of boats under power, sails and oars.

(b) Ability to instruct a crew of inexperienced ratings under oars and sail.

(c) Hoisting, lowering and securing a seaboat.

- (d) Knowledge of boats' falls, fittings and gear, and duties of coxswain.
- (e) Practical knowledge of temporary repairs by boat's crew to boat's hull, mast and fittings.

Practical Rigging.—Ability to instruct in and demonstrate practically any of the following:—

- (a) All knots, splices, bends, hitches, and other practical rigging normally taught to Seamen, vide Chapter 3 of Seamanship Manual, Volume I.
- (b) Rigging sheers and derricks. To be done practically—with spars (small) in particular—
 - (i) Head lashing.

(ii) Passing strop.

(iii) Splay and heel tackles.
(iv) Lead of topping lift.

N.B.—Knowledge of holdfasts on shore not necessary.

(c) Repair of canvas gear and elementary sailmaking.

SECTION II.—TECHNICAL ABILITY.

Rigging.—Ability to instruct in any of the following:

· (a) (i) Types and uses of all hawsers.

- (ii) How to calculate working and breaking strains of hawsers.
- (iii) Different types of tackles, their uses, and how to fit them.(iv) Boats' falls and fittings, fitting and reeving, and securing.
- All fittings on davits.
 (v) Care and maintenance of all hawsers and blocks.
- (b) Target work. To be confined to a general knowledge of towing arrangements, and setting and furling sails.
- (c) Thorough knowledge of standing and running rigging, as generally fitted in H.M. Ships.

General Duties-

(a) To be able to instruct men in the duties of helmsman.

(c) Practical knowledge of methods of sounding and taking charge

Note.—A knowledge of the colours of Flags and Pendants is necessary.

(B) SYLLABUS FOR EXAMINATION OF ABLE SEAMEN FOR LEADING SEAMAN.

SECTION I.—ABILITY TO TAKE CHARGE—ABILITY TO STEER A SHIP— BOAT WORK-PRACTICAL RIGGING.

Ability to take charge-

(a) To take charge of a class in—

(i) Squad drill.

(ii) Physical and recreational training.

(b) To tell off a party of men for work of the following nature and carry it out :-

(i) Working small derricks.

(ii) Handling awnings.

Ability to steer a ship. To be able to steer a ship.

To qualify in this subject a candidate is required to produce a certificate from the Captain of a sea-going ship that he has carried out the duties of helmsman satisfactorily in that ship. This certificate may be obtained at any time that a future candidate for examination for higher rating is serving in a sea-going ship.

Boat Work.—General knowledge of—

(a) Handling of boats under power, sail, and oars. The examination under sail and oars to be carried out in a whaler.

(b) Hoisting, lowering, and securing a seaboat for sea. (c) Boats' falls, fittings and gear and duties of coxswain.

(d) Practical knowledge of temporary repairs to boats' hulls, mast, and fittings.

Practical Rigging.—Thorough knowledge and practical work in-

(a) Rigging, including splicing in hemp and wire, e.g.—

31-in. wire

(i) Thimble eve.

(ii) Hawser eve.

(iii) Strop a 10-in. block with a strand of 31-in. wire.

3½-in. (or larger) white hemp-

(i) Becket.

(ii) Long splice.

(iii) Cut splice.

(b) Rigging sheers and derricks (must be done practically with spars (small)). In particular—

> (i) Head lashing. (ii) Passing strop.

(iii) Splay and heel tackles.

(iv) Lead of topping lift.

N.B.—Knowledge of holdfasts on shore not necessary.

(c) Repair of canvas gear and elementary sail making.

SECTION II.

Rigging.—Thorough knowledge of-

(a) (i) Types and uses of all hawsers.

(ii) How to calculate working and breaking strains.

(iii) Different kinds of tackles, their uses and how to fit them. (iv) Boats' falls and fittings. Fitting, reeving, and securing all fittings on davits.

(v) Care and maintenance of all hawsers and blocks.

(b) Target work. To be confined to a general knowledge of towing arrangements and setting and furling sails.

(c) Standing and running rigging as generally fitted in H.M. Ships.

General Duties-

(a) Sufficient knowledge of compass, elementary chart reading, and uniform system of buoyage, to undertake quartermaster's duties and coxswain of a picket boat.

(b) Practical knowledge of methods of sounding and taking charge

of a sounding party.

(c) Writing up the log book. Reading a barometer.

(d) Elementary chart reading.

(e) To be able to use a Boatswain's call for calls in normal daily use.

Rule of the Road.—Practical knowledge of the regulations for preventing collisions at sea, required as coxswain of a boat. (Candidate should be assisted by illustrations and models.)

Anchor Work-

- (a) A practical knowledge of working anchors, cables, and capstans under all circumstances.
- (b) A practical knowledge of laying out anchors; weighing anchors from a boat.
- (c) All forms of forecastle work, including "bringing to" and tending
- (d) Duties when in charge of an anchor watch.

Organization-

- (a) Duties of leading hand of a mess.
- (b) Care and maintenance of decks and paintwork.

Signals—

(a) To be able to interpret any signal in the Boat's Signal Book with the aid of the book.

(b) Sufficient knowledge of semaphore and Morse lamp to make or read a message at a slow rate.

Note.—A knowledge of the colours of Flags and Pendants is necessary.

16. Candidates are to be examined in Section I. by the Officers of their own ships. No marks are to be awarded. Candidates are to be "Passed" or "Failed," the award being qualified, e.g., V.G., Good, &c., to indicate the standard reached by each man.

17. In Ability to Take Charge and Boat Work, candidates should be judged on their general bearing, the manner in which they set about the tests given to them and in which they give their orders and see them carried out. Technical knowledge is of secondary importance in these two parts of the examination. Attention is drawn to the fact that an Able Seaman passing for Leading Seaman must not be expected to show that

Notes.—(a) Questions relating to Rule of the Road are to be of a simple nature designed to ensure that the Candidate could be entrusted, as Coxswain, with the safe navigation of ship's boats and small craft such as drifters. A detailed knowledge of more abstruse matters is not required.

(b) The knowledge required of candidates in all subjects is primarily that which they can have reasonably acquired in the type of ship in which they are serving or, if serving ashore, in which they were last serving. It may be assumed that a man who shows that he is well up in subjects connected with the ship in which he is serving can and will become equally efficient when he is drafted to one of another type.

19. A rating who fails in not more than one subject in Section II. may be re-examined in this subject by his own ship's officers after not less than two months. If then successful his basic date of passing will be a date two months subsequent to that which would have been his basic date had he passed the Board examination.

There is no limit to the number of times a candidate for either Petty Officer or Leading Seaman may be re-examined.

20. The names of successful candidates are to be forwarded by the Senior Officer assembling the Examination Board, or by the Commanding Officer, as the case may be, to Flinders Naval Depot. All ratings who pass will be noted on the rosters as having passed on the last day of the half-year in which they were examined. Where it is not practicable for reasons outside his own control for a rating to take the examination in the half-year in which he applies to sit, his "date of passing" will be antedated to the last day of the half-year in which application was made, provided that he passes the examination at the first available opportunity.

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R.A.N. RELIEF FUND.

ORIGIN AND DEVELOPMENT.

- 1. The R.A.N. Relief Fund arose from very small beginnings. In April, 1913, Captain Constantine H. Hughes Onslow, R.N., and Commander William Burrows, R.A.N., gave into the care of the Chaplain of Williamstown Depot the sums of £5 5s. and £5 respectively, to be distributed by the Chaplain among any of the families of R.A.N. ratings he might find in need of financial help. In August of the same year Captain Hughes Onslow gave an additional £10, and Commander Burrows another £5. This small fund was known as the "Emergency Distress Fund."
- 2. In 1915 it was felt that the "Emergency Distress Fund" ought to enlarge its scope, if possible, in order to cope with the increasing number of cases of distress, which were the immediate outcome of the war. It was decided to initiate a fund, to be called the "R.A.N. Families' First Relief Fund." This was done, and an appeal for help was sent out to the various R.A.N. Ships and Depots. Commodore A. G. Gordon-Smith, R.N., kindly consented to act as the first Honorary Treasurer. As a result of the appeal, £135 0s. 9d. was collected, the greatest part of which—£102 0s. 9d.—was given by the R.A.N. Reserve.
- 3. In the balance-sheet issued at the beginning of 1916 the Honorary Treasurer appealed to the R.A.N. for more generous assistance, and the fact that an appeal was made became known outside the Service. As a result, £447 12s. 4d. was obtained. Of this amount the V.R.C. gave £25; the Victorian Football League, £150; the Victorian League Umpires' Association, £20; the Royal Society of St. George, Penang, £33 16s. 4d.; and of the balance, £218 16s., a large sum again came from the R.A.N. Reserve and their friends.
- 4. June 12th, 1916, marks a distinct growth in the R.A.N. Relief Fund. On that date a letter was written to Rear-Admiral Sir William Creswell by the Secretary of the Victorian Football League saying that the Committee were anxious "to make some special effort to augment one of the excellent funds it is understood you have for the benefit of the men of the Australian Navy," and asking that someone might be appointed to meet and confer with the Football Committee. As a result of a Conference between the Committee and the Naval Representative detailed for this purpose, it was decided to help the "R.A.N. Families' First Relief Fund." Other Melbourne societies—notably the Melbourne Branch of the Navy League—then became interested in Naval Relief, and it was ultimately decided that all the societies should co-operate in one general appeal to the public for this purpose, with the result that £18,112 5s. 10d. was collected on "Sailors' Day," 23rd March, 1917. This amount was distributed as follows:—

5. With this great help from the "Sailors' Day" appeal, it was felt that the Fund could widen its scope of relief, and therefore, in 1917, the name was changed from the "R.A.N. Families' First Relief Fund" to that of the "R.A.N. Relief Fund," and it was also decided to include officers as well as ratings as being eligible for financial assistance.

6. In 1918 New South Wales likewise decided to help the families of Naval men who had fallen on evil days as a result of the war. Various patriotic societies in that State, guided and enthused by the Sydney Branch of the Navy League, held "Our Jacks' Day" on 1st November, 1918, and collected the magnificent sum of £163,262 6s. 8d. This was distributed in much the same way as the money collected in Victoria, viz.:—

20 per cent. R.A.N. Relief Fund,

10 per cent. R.N. Mine Sweepers (Dependants),

10 per cent. Naval Prisoners of War Fund,

30 per cent. R.N. Relief Funds,

30 per cent. Mercantile Marine Relief Funds.

- 7. Of this 20 per cent. allocated to the R.A.N., it was felt by the Committee of "Our Jacks' Day" Fund that "as many large subscriptions had been handed in on the understanding that one of the cardinal features of the Jacks' Day Appeal was that those who had been engaged in the war, or their families, should be cared for and liberally treated by those administering the Fund," it would not be right to place the whole of the 20 per cent. to the credit of the ordinary account of the R.A.N. Relief Fund. After consultation between the Executive Committee of the "Jack's Day" Fund and a representative from the Trustees of the R.A.N. Relief Fund, it was decided that £15,000 should be placed to the credit of the R.A.N. Relief Fund towards its usual and ordinary purposes of Naval relief, and that the balance of the 20 per cent.—£17,652—should be administered and distributed from Sydney by the "Navy League R.A.N. Claims Committee" for the benefit of those whose death or disability was the immediate outcome of the war.
- 8. The Relief Fund was further augmented in 1919 by £522 14s. 9d., forwarded by the Honorary Secretary "Our Sailors' Day Fund," Northern Tasmanian Branch of the Navy League, Launceston.
- 9. The foregoing statement does not include all contributions which were given during the war period towards the relief of Naval distress. These contributions include:—

and many others, large and small, which have helped to place the R.A.N. Relief Fund in its present satisfactory financial position.

10. On 6th May, 1922, the R.A.N. Relief Fund was constituted a proper and legal Trust Fund, and its object, according to the terms of the Trust

Deed, was stated to be:-

"For rendering pecuniary assistance to Officers and/or men serving in the Royal Australian Navy, together with their dependants, also retired Officers and/or men, together with their dependants, and/or dependants of deceased Officers and men, in such manner as the Trustees shall in their absolute discretion deem advisable, and such assistance may consist of gifts or loans to such Officers and/or men, together with their dependants, in in such manner and under such conditions as the Trustees shall think proper."

ADMINISTRATION.

11. Acting under the powers conferred by the Trust Deed as above, the Trustees have decided that the benefits of the Trust shall be limited to—

(a) Officers and men serving in the R.A.N., together with their dependants.

(b) The dependants of deceased Officers and men who have served within the R.A.N.

(c) Officers and men who have served in the R.A.N., together with their dependants—

Provided that, save in the case of exceptional circumstances of distress, the dependants of deceased Officers or men, and ex-Officers and men and their dependants will not be regarded as eligible for assistance from the Fund for more than five years after the date of death or discharge from the Service of Officers or men respectively concerned.

12. The Trustees have further decided that as a general rule assistance given from the Fund shall be limited to the amount derived per annum from interest on invested capital.

13. The administration of the Fund, under the authority of the Trustees, is vested in two Committees, one operating in Sydney and the other in Melbourne. The Committees comprise respectively the Captain-Superintendent and the Chaplain of the Penguin, and the Captain-Superintendent of Training and the Chaplain of Flinders Naval Depot, the Chaplain in each case acting as Honorary Treasurer. Applications for relief should be addressed to the Chaplain of the Penguin, or of Flinders Naval Depot, according to the location of the person or persons in need of assistance; in the case of ratings serving in sea-going ships, the request for assistance should be made to the Ship's Chaplain, if borne, either direct or through the Divisional Officer.

14. Balance-sheets showing the financial position of the Fund, and the amounts disbursed as relief, are issued half-yearly. The details of ordinary cases are, however, regarded as strictly confidential, and the names of persons assisted are not promulgated in the balance-sheets.

15. Navy Order 127 of 1932 is hereby cancelled.

FINAL MEDICAL EXAMINATION AND ENGAGEMENT OF RECRUITS AND RE-ENTRANTS.

The following changes in procedure in connexion with the entry of recruits and re-entry of ex-members of the Sea-going Forces are to be brought into force.

2. All District Naval Medical officers will in future be regarded as Final Examining Medical Officers.

As District Naval Medical Officers in the States of Queensland, South Australia, Western Australia, and Tasmania will now be so regarded, recruits passed by them as physically fit will not be re-examined at Sydney or Melbourne as heretofore.

Form A.R. 6 is to be used in all such cases in place of Form A.R. 5.

3. In the case of provisional medical examinations conducted in the country districts of each State, instructions are to be given for Form A.R. 5 to be returned by the private practitioner who examines the recruit to the D.N.O. of the particular State in which the examination has taken place. The decision as to whether the candidate is fit for final medical examination or not is to be made as follows:—

By D.N.M.O., who will also conduct the final medical examination.

Victoria

Final Examining Medical Officer.

New South Wales

A Medical Officer of Penguin.

In Victoria and New South Wales the final medical examination will be conducted as heretofore.

- 4. In cases, however, where it is more convenient to carry out the final medical examination in a capital city other than that of the State in which the recruit resides, the D.N.O. is to instruct the recruit that he will be required to proceed to the former city for final medical examination. In such instances all necessary entry forms, &c., including Form A.R. 5, are to be transferred to the D.N.O. concerned and the date of the medical examination is to be communicated to the recruit by the D.N.O. of the State in which the recruit will be examined.
- 5. Upon completion of the necessary recruiting forms and the passing of the final medical examination, each D.N.O. (except D.N.O., N.S.W.) is to take action to effect the engagement of the recruit or the re-engagement of the ex-rating concerned, and arrange his discharge as necessary.
- 6. If, on joining a Ship or Depot, a newly entered member is found to be suffering from a defect considered likely to render him permanently unfit for service, he is to be brought forward for Medical Survey on Form A.M. 252z.
 - 7. The above procedure is to be brought into force on 1st May, 1938.
- 8. The consequent amendments to Recruiting Instructions will be issued in " R.I." Series at an early date.

AUSTRALIAN MERCHANT NAVY DEFENCE COURSES.

It has been decided to institute Merchant Navy Defence Courses on the lines of A.F.O. 1971/37, at suitable commercial ports in Australia.

2. The Naval Board desire that knowledge of the institution and scope of the defence courses should be disseminated as widely as possible among officers of the Australian Merchant Navy, and look to Officers of the Royal Australian Navy to assist to the best of their ability in the achievement of this object. The following description of the courses is promulgated in order that Officers of the Royal Australian Navy may be able to furnish information on the subject to Australian Merchant Navy Officers.

3. The aim of Merchant Navy Defence Courses is to inform the Merchant Navy of the measures that will be taken by the Royal Australian Navy in conjunction with the Royal Navy, for the protection of Seaborne trade in war and to make known to masters and officers of Merchant Ships the part that they must play if the maximum possible degree of safety to their ship is to be ensured.

4. The instruction given falls under two main headings:-

- (i) The general organization of trade protection, including the organization of convoys and the way in which Merchant Ships should act, whether in convoy or sailing independently, so as to secure the maximum immunity from attack.
- (ii) The steps needed to ensure that a Merchant Ship which has been equipped for self defence shall develop the maximum fighting efficiency when attacked.

5. Defence courses are open to all Masters and Navigating Officers of British Nationality. Instruction on convoy may also be attended by Chief Engineers. Courses will be open to unemployed Officers as well as those serving in ships.

6. Defence Courses will be held at the Royal Australian Naval Reserve Depots at Sydney, Port Melbourne, and Fremantle. The Instructional Staff will be provided from the R.A.N.R. Staffs of the Depots.

How the Courses are Organized.

7. A complete Defence Course comprises six three-hour sessions. The sessions will be held from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. on the following days:—

Sydney Mondays.

Melbourne .. Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Fremantle .. Wednesdays.

- A. General Principles of Trade Protection.
- B. Convoy—Instruction on convoy work in general and on handling ships in convoy.

- 9. It is not necessary for the course to be taken continuously. Sessions can be taken separately at any time convenient to the Officer and in any order, except that Session "A" must be taken first. An Officer need not do the whole course at one port, but can take any session at any port convenient to him.

METHOD OF ARRANGING ATTENDANCE AT COURSES.

10. The Naval Board will issue programmes showing the arrangements of Sessions at each of the instructional centres covering periods of approximately six months.

These programmes will be issued to the Shipping Companies for distribution to their ships and to the District Naval Officers. New South Wales, Victoria, and Western Australia.

- 11. An officer of the Merchant Navy wishing to attend any of the sessions included in the programme, and able to obtain leave to do so, should attend at the place of instruction at the time for starting the Session.
- 12. Officers may attend either in uniform or plain clothes, but if attending in plain clothes, they must produce some evidence of their identity.
- 13. An officer on first attending a Defence Course will be given a Certificate of Attendance. In order to allow time for the issue of the Certificate of Attendance, an officer joining the course for the first time should attend a quarter of an hour before the Session starts.

14. At subsequent Sessions, whether taken at the same port or elsewhere, the Certificate of Attendance must be produced for the appropriate entries to be made by the Instructional Officer. The Certificate of Attendance will be sufficient evidence of identity for Officers attending in plain clothes.

NAVAL ARMAMENT AND TORPEDO STORE ACCOUNTS—COMMON ERRORS MET WITH IN CHECKING OF AT NAVY OFFICE.

The attention of all officers concerned is drawn to the undermentioned errors commonly met with during the checking of Naval Armament and Torpedo Store Accounts at Navy Office:—

- 1. Failure to account for full quantity of arisings from expenditure of stores, i.e., fired cases, fired primers, fired tubes, empty cylinders, grummets projectile, igniter covers, tinned plate hoxes for tubes and igniters torpedo, &c. The full quantity applicable to stores expended should be brought on Voluntary Charge and those not actually recovered accounted for in Expense Book and written off charge.
- 2. Discrepancies between expenditure as shown in ledgers and quantities recorded in Expense Book.
- Discrepancies between expenditure of Small Arm Ammunition as shown on Forms A.S.301 and the quantities recorded in Expense Book.
- 4. Failure to record expenditure of stores other than (S) items in Expense Book.
- 5. Failure to give explanations of deficiencies in stores other than (S) items in respect of spare parts chests returned to Depot.
- 6. Expenditure of stores taken from spare parts boxes has in some instances been noted in the Expense Book from the receipted copy of the Requisition for Survey after the return of chests to Torpedo Depot. Expenditure should be recorded as it occurs. If stores are not demanded in replacement, those taken from the chest should be brought on Voluntary Charge to balance the quantities written off charge.
- 7. In some accounts rendered on obsolescent reprints of Form S.1423(f) certain descriptions of stores which are actually (S) items do not appear as such, and expenditure of these stores has thus been unnecessarily recorded in Expense Book.

V/S 1 AND W/T 1—GRANTING OF ACTING NON-SUBSTANTIVE RATES.

In view of the increase in requirements of the Communications Branch it appears unlikely that it will be possible, in the near future, to spare any V/S or W/T ratings to undergo courses for V/S 1 and W/T 1 in the United Kingdom.

2. In consequence, the scheme for granting the Acting rates, outlined in Navy Order 179 of 1937, now requires revision. Paragraphs 4 to 9 inclusive of Navy Order 179 of 1937 are therefore to be cancelled and the following substituted:—

"4. The senior V/S and W/T ratings in each of the abovenamed ships and *Penguin* are, subject to recommendation as to suitability by the Commanding Officer, to be granted the acting non-substantive rate of V/S 1 and W/T 1, respectively.

5. Acting V/S 1 and W/T 1 rates may be granted to Instructors at the Signal School, amongst whom is included the regulating Chief Yeoman, who is in general charge of instruction, up to $\frac{2}{3}$ rds of the numbers borne. The ratings to be paid will be selected by the Captain Superintendent of Training and will not necessarily be the senior ratings. Selection will be dependent on the duties being carried out.

6. The senior W/T ratings of the Transmitting Station crew and Receiving Station crew of Navy Office W/T Station are each, subject to recommendation, to be granted the acting rate of W/T 1.

7. Advancements are to be made by the Commanding Officer concerned.

8. The basic date for the granting of the acting non-substantive rating and pay under the revised conditions is to be 1st April, 1938.

9. The names of ratings recommended for V/S 1 and W/T 1 are to be included in the quarterly returns of Form 1303A. A notation is to be made in the Remarks Column of this Form indicating to which of the following categories they belong:—

Category I.—Ratings recommended, eligible regarding Service, i.e., having more than 5 years to serve of first 22 years, and volunteers for course and training in U.K.

Category II.—All other ratings recommended, i.e., those ineligible regarding Service and those eligible but not volunteers for course.

Note.—Re-engagement over 22 years cannot be counted in selecting ratings for Category I.

10. Ratings who eventually qualify will, on their return to Australia, supplant ratings paid by "Seniority Method."

DENTAL HISTORY SHEETS.

It has come to notice that a considerable number of irregularities are occurring in regard to the transmission of dental history sheets and the recording thereon of treatment given.

2. When medical history documents are being prepared for transmission to another Ship or Depot, the Dental Officer, if one is borne in the Ship, otherwise the Medical Officer, is to take steps to ensure that, in all cases, the Dental History Sheet of the member is with other medical documents,

3. In the event of the Dental History Sheet not being available immediate action is to be taken to trace its whereabouts and include it in the cover for Medical History Documents. Temporary Dental History Sheets are not to be created until all possible steps have been taken, without result, to trace the original. Where a Dental History Sheet is missing, such fact is to be intimated to the Ship or Depot to which the member is appointed or drafted, action being taken at the same time to proceed with the search therefor.

4. To ensure proper care of Dental History Sheets, the Dental Officer of Ships and Establishments, or, in the event of no Dental Officer being borne, the Medical Officer, is to hold a quarterly muster of Dental History Sheets. A notation to the effect that these sheets have been mustered is to be included in the general remarks of the Medical Journal signed by the Officer who has carried out the muster and, if any are missing, a list of such is to be included in the Journal.

5. Regarding the record of treatment, and particularly as regards supply of dentures, clear and definite details thereof are to be inserted on the Dental History Sheet.

6. In the event of details as to supply of dentures being lacking or indefinite, application is to be made for the required information to the Director of Naval Medical Services who has complete records of all dentures supplied to members.



STATE TAXATION OF SALARIES AND WAGES OF COMMONWEALTH OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES.

Sub-sections (1), (2) and (3) of Section 19 of the Financial Emergency Acts 1931-1936, and the regulations thereunder prescribed the maximum rates of taxation to which the remuneration of any Commonwealth officer or employee could be subject under the laws of any State.

The definition of "Commonwealth officer and employee" covers all members of the Permanent Naval Forces as well as all persons employed in a civilian capacity.

2. The abovementioned Section has been repealed from 1st July, 1938, and the relative regulations cease to have effect on and from that date. From 1st July, 1938, therefore, Commonwealth officers and employees, so far as State taxation in any State is concerned, are on the same basis as State employees and other citizens.

OFFICERS PROCEEDING ON FOREIGN SERVICE LEAVE— TRANSPORT OF HEAVY BAGGAGE.

Cases have come under notice where Officers, on their return to Australia from service overseas, have incurred avoidable expense in regard to the transport of their baggage by unnecessarily taking the whole of such baggage with them when proceeding to their homes on foreign service leave.

2. In the case of Officers who disembark at Fremantle, Adelaide, or Melbourne, and are required to proceed on expiration of leave to Melbourne or Sydney to take up duty, the District Naval Officers in the respective States can make arrangements for storage, and/or any necessary transport by the Departmental cartage contractors.

3. Arrangements may also be made with the shipping company for heavy baggage to be carried on to Melbourne or Sydney in the original ship. Customs clearance in such case can be made at the port of disembarkation, permitting delivery as requisite, or the baggage placed in the bond store pending clearance on the arrival of the officer.

4. Detailed instructions cannot be laid down to cover all the various cases arising. It is recognized that, as the safe custody of baggage and arrangements for customs clearance are the responsibility of the officer, the arrangements made must be left to the officer's choice, according to circumstances. It is expected, however, that officers will make the most economical arrangements possible by taking every advantage of the facilities afforded by the shipping companies, transport authorities and from Service sources, and claims for refund of expenses incurred will not be accepted otherwise.

5. District Naval Officers are advised in regard to officers' next appointments and any arrangements made for onward sea passage, &c., and should be consulted in this matter at the first port of call and/or port of disembarkation.

PILLION PASSENGERS ON MOTOR CYCLES.

The practice of carrying pillion passengers on motor cycles is considered to involve abnormal risk of injury and to conduce to accident to a greater extent than a motor cycle without such a passenger.

- 2. Naval personnel are hereby expressly forbidden to carry a pillion passenger while driving a motor cycle on a duty journey, or to proceed on duty journeys as pillion passengers on motor cycles, and the Naval Board will accept no responsibility for injury or death of a driver or a pillion passenger sustained while riding a motor cycle in either of these circumstances.
- 3. It has been ascertained that, generally, insurance companies are not normally prepared to issue a motor cycle policy to cover claims for medical expenses arising from injury to the rider of a motor cycle or to a pillion passenger. Owners of motor cycles are, therefore, warned against the practice of carrying pillion passengers, in view of the risk of incurring heavy financial liabilities in the event of injury to the passenger in an accident for which no other person can be held responsible.

ROYAL AUSTRALIAN NAVAL SHORE WIRELESS SERVICE— INTRODUCTION OF.

The Naval Board have had under consideration the question of the manning of the new Naval Wireless Stations at Canberra and Darwin and the D/F Stations at Canberra, Darwin, and Fremantle, and it has been decided to introduce a Royal Australian Naval Shore Wireless Service (as a branch of the Naval Auxiliary Services of the Permanent Naval Forces) for this purpose, under the following conditions of service:—

1. Recruitment of Personnel.

The personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be recruited:—

- (a) in the case of Officers—
 from the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing);
- (b) in the case of Petty Officers and Men from members or ex-members of such Forces.

2. Period of Service.

Appointment to or engagement in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be:—

(a) in the case of Officers—

for service until attainment of the age of retirement prescribed for rank in the Auxiliary Services.

(b) in the case of Petty Officers and Men-

for such periods not less than 6 years, as may be determined by the Naval Board, subject to a maximum age for service of 50 years.

3. Ranks or Titles and Equivalent Ranks and Ratings.

The ranks or titles of personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service and their equivalent Seagoing ranks or ratings will be as follows:—

4. Inaugural Personnel of R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service.

The inaugural personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service and approximate dates of appointment will be as set out in Appendix "A" to this Order.

Transfer to or entry in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be effected in accordance with the following conditions:—

(a) Officers.

The Officers of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be selected from volunteers from the list of Seagoing Officers of the ranks of Telegraphist Lieutenant, Commissioned Telegraphist, and Warrant Telegraphist. Officers desirous of being considered for transfer are to submit an application through their Commanding Officer to reach the Secretary, Naval Board, not later than 15th November, 1938.

Officers selected will continue to serve in the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) until required for transfer.

(b) Petty Officers and Men.

(i) Members of the Seagoing Forces.

Members of the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) who desire to be considered for entry in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service are to submit an application through their Commanding

Officer to reach the Secretary, Naval Board, not later than 15th November, 1938. Applications are to be accompanied by a copy of the member's Certificate of Service and Conduct Sheet.

Ratings selected for transfer, whose names will be promulgated as early as practicable, will continue to serve in the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) under their existing conditions until required for transfer, and will be eligible for advancement therein up to the date of transfer to the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service.

Only Telegraphist ratings who are fully qualified for Leading rating or above will be eligible for service in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service, but ratings may be accepted subject to such qualification before transfer. They will be entered in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service in the rating of Shore Wireless Operator, Grade 3.

Leading Telegraphists and Petty Officer Telegraphists selected for service in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be entered as Shore Wireless Operator, Grade 2 and Grade 1, respectively.

Particulars regarding advancement subsequent to entry are contained in Appendix "B" to this Order.

(ii) Ex-members of the Seagoing Forces.

A certain number of vacancies in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be available for ex-members of the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing). Such men who desire to be considered for entry should forward an application to reach the Secretary, Naval Board, not later than 15th November, 1938.

Applications, which are to be accompanied by Certificate of Service, should state whether married or single. This information is required solely for administrative purposes and will have no influence in connexion with selection for entry. Selected candidates will be required to re-enter the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) under the existing regulations on the understanding that, subject to their conduct and ability being satisfactory, they will be transferred to the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service on completion of a revision course at Flinders Naval Depot, and a period of training afloat.

Only Telegraphist ratings fully qualified for Leading rating or above will be eligible for service in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service, but ratings may be accepted subject to such qualification before transfer. They will be entered in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service in the rating of Shore Wireless Operator, Grade 3.

Particulars regarding subsequent advancement are contained in Appendix "B" to this Order.

5. Future Vacancies.

Vacancies arising in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service subsequent to the inauguration of the Service will be promulgated in Navy Orders from time to time.

6. Advancement in Rank or Rating.

Advancement in rank or rating in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be:—

(a) in the case of Officers—

subject to conditions similar to those prescribed for advancement of an Officer of the R.A.N. Auxiliary Services of equivalent rank; (b) in the case of Telegraphist ratings—
subject to qualification for the higher rating (see Appendix
"B") or, in the case of advancement to Chief Shore
Wireless Operator, to selection in vacancy;

(c) in the case of Artificer ratings by roster in vacancy.

7. Active Pay and Allowances.—Rates of.

The rates of Active Pay and allowances of personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be as follows:—

- (a) Active Pay.—At annual rates in accordance with the appropriate scale appearing in Appendices C and D. Such rates will be subject to cost of living variations in the manner prescribed for personnel of the R.A.N. Auxiliary Services.
- (b) Child Endowment.—At the rate of £13 per annum in respect of each fully dependant child under the age of 14 years, subject to maximum total emoluments, including the endowment, not exceeding £500 per annum. Payable under the conditions applicable to other personnel of the R.A.N. Auxiliary Services.
- (c) District Allowance.—Payable only to members serving at Darwin Stations. Married members—£100 per annum; single members, £80 per annum.
- (d) Kit Upkeep Allowance.—At the rate of £9 2s. 6d. per annum.

8. Active Pay-Increments of.

Increments of Active Pay within the scale appropriate to rank or rating will be annual, subject to the approval of the Naval Board.

9. Deferred Pay.

Personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be credited with Deferred Pay at the rates and under the conditions prescribed for equivalent personnel of the permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) and payment of Deferred Pay will be subject to conditions similar to those prescribed for personnel of the R.A.N. Auxiliary Services.

10. Rates of Pay on Entry.

The rates of pay of personnel on entry in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be determined in accordance with the following provisions:—

- (a) Officer Personnel.—Each completed year served on full pay in the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) in the rank to which appointed to be allowed to count as if served in the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service.
- (b) Petty Officers and Men-
 - (i) Initial Staff of Shore Wireless Service.

To receive the lowest rate within the scale appropriate to their Shore Wireless rating which will ensure that they receive cash emoluments not less than the cash emoluments

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(as under) for which they were eligible in the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) immediately prior to entry in the Shore Wireless Service:—

Active Pay, Non-Substantive Allowance, Kit Upkeep Allowance, Badge Pay, and Provision Allowance. (ii) Staff Appointed to Fill Subsequent Vacancies.

To receive the minimum scale rate of pay appropriate to their Shore Wireless rating, provided that a rating who, immediately prior to entry in the Shore Wireless Service, held the rating of Petty Officer Telegraphist, shall receive the scale rate of pay applicable to the rating of Shore Wireless Operator, Grade 3 (£220 per annum), but shall retain the rating of Petty Officer. On completion of one year's service such rating shall be advanced to Shore Wireless Operator, Grade 1, and be paid the minimum scale rate for such rating (£256 per annum).

11. Location of Shore Wireless Stations.

The sites of the stations are in the vicinity of Darwin, Canberra, and Fremantle.

The question of transport facilities (where not already available) for shopping and recreational purposes for personnel stationed at remote localities is receiving consideration.

12. Housing and Furniture.

Service housing accommodation will be available to members at the various stations. Houses will be of at least three bedroom standard, with internal sanitation. Essential furniture will be provided in residences of personnel who are subject to periodical transfer between stations. The questions of house rental and charges in respect of furniture provided is receiving consideration.

13. Reversion to Seagoing Service.

Petty Officers and Men of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service may, at the discretion of the Naval Board, be reverted to the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) for the balance of the period of their engagement in the Shore Wireless Service:—

- (a) If no longer required in the Shore Wireless Service;
- (b) If for any reason found unsuitable for service in the Shore Wireless Service;
- (c) In the event of national emergency; under the conditions laid down in Article 433, King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions.

14. Uniform.

Personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will continue to wear the uniform appropriate to their rank or rating in the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) with, in the case of Petty Officers and Men, the addition of the letters S.W.S. below the badge on the right sleeve.

15. Uniform Gratuities.

Personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be granted uniform gratuities on promotion or necessary change of uniform at the rates and under the conditions prescribed for equivalent personnel of the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing).

16. Recreation Leave.

Personnel of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service will be granted recreation leave under the conditions prescribed for personnel of the R.A.N. Auxiliary Services, except that in the case of personnel stationed at Darwin, leave will be permitted to accumulate in respect of a period of not more than three years' service.

17. Discharge by Purchase.

The conditions relating to discharge by purchase, prescribed for personnel of the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing), will be applicable to Petty Officers and Men of the R.A.N. Shore Wireless Service.

18. Physical Standard.

Candidates should conform generally to the standard for the Auxiliary Services, and consideration will be given to the entry of ratings previously invalided from the Seagoing Service. Detailed instructions to Medical Officers are being issued separately.

19. Other Conditions of Service.

DRESS TO BE WORN BY OFFICERS ATTENDING OFFICIAL BALLS, ETC.

His Excellency the Governor-General has approved of the following in regard to the occasions on which certain Dresses are to be worn by officers of the Royal Australian Navy:—

- (a) At all State balls and evening official functions and dinners given by the Governor-General or State Governor, or the Officer administering the Government of the Commonwealth or the State.

- (d) At all functions attended by the Governor-General or State Governor, or the Officer administering the Government of the Commonwealth or the State, in evening dress with decorations.

Dress to be as indicated by His Excellency concerned.

Dress to be appropriate uniform or civilian evening dress with decorations at the discretion of the Senior Naval Officer.

LEAVE TRAVELLING CONCESSIONS.

The following consolidation of instructions regarding the issue of free travelling warrants to members of the Permanent Naval Forces (Seagoing) proceeding on leave is issued for general information and guidance:—

- (1.) Subject to the conditions and limitations prescribed hereunder, members of the Permanent Naval Forces (Sea-going) may be granted the concession of transport at Commonwealth expense for a return journey to their homes within the Commonwealth during periods of home service leave or foreign service leave as prescribed in Consolidated Orders and Regulations.
- (2.) A member shall not be entitled to the concession until the expiration of a period of three months from the date of his entry into the Service (or re-entry where a break in service has occurred), or in respect of leave granted to him immediately prior to his discharge from the Service. The provisions of Article 166 of Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions will apply to travelling while on leave prior to final discharge.

(3.) The purpose of the concession is to assist members to visit their homes after extended absence, and is not intended to be regarded, apart from domestic considerations, as a holiday leave pass.

In no circumstances will payment be made in lieu of the concession.

- (4.) The grant of the concession shall normally be limited to two occasions in each leave year. Where, however, as a result of the deferment from one year to another under the provisions of C.O.R., Article 248, of a period of home service leave, a member proceeds on leave on three occasions in any leave year, he may be granted the concession on each such occasion, provided he did not have the opportunity of travelling to his home on more than one occasion during the preceding leave year.
- (5.) As a general rule, grant of the concession shall be confined to leave taken during one of the regular leave periods (as prescribed in C.O.R., Article 247) and upon the return of the member from service abroad.

The concession may, however, be granted to a member in respect of home service leave taken immediately prior to his proceeding on service abroad or being transferred to the Auxiliary Services, provided the leave due to the member is not less than ten days and an interval of not less than three months has elapsed since completion of the member's previous period of leave. Where these requirements are not met but special circumstances exist, the case may be submitted for consideration by the Naval Board.

A member who, in special circumstances urgently requiring his presence at home (e.g., in case of death or serious illness in his family), is granted leave outside one of the regular leave periods, should be issued with a chargeable warrant and full particulars of the circumstances submitted to the Naval Board for consideration regarding the grant of the concession.

- (6.) Except as provided in paragraph (22.) of these instructions, the concession shall apply to transport by rail where such is available.
- (7.) The concession shall not apply to journeys within the suburban area of a capital city, and shall be restricted to cases where the cost of a return journey to the member's home exceeds, in the case of an officer, 7s. 6d. (based on 1st class fare), and in the case of a petty officer or man, 5s. (based on 2nd class fare).
- (8.) The cost of sleeping berths shall form part of the concession only in respect of journeys on the trans-Australian railway, provided that an officer travelling between Melbourne and Sydney in charge of a party of men proceeding to or returning from leave may, where such facility is available on the train, be provided with a sleeping berth at Departmental expense.
- (9.) Except in the case of officers in charge of parties of men proceeding to and returning from leave, and ratings forming the picket accompanying such parties, the concession shall not include charges for booking of seats.
- (10.) For the purposes of these instructions a member's home shall be—
 - (a) in the case of a married officer or man—
 the usual place of residence in Australia of his wife and
 family; and

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(b) in the case of an unmarried officer or man-

the usual place of residence in Australia of his parent (or parents), or of his guardian as defined in paragraph (17.) of these instructions.

- (11.) The concession is applicable to journeys to and from "home" as defined in paragraph (10.) of these instructions, and to no other place. It shall not apply, in any circumstances, to journeys to or from a place where the member's parent (or parents), guardian, or wife may be resident temporarily.
- (12.) Leave concession warrants are not to be issued where residence of a permanent character by the member's family or guardian has not been established for a period of at least three months prior to commencement of the member's leave.

Cases in which change of permanent domicile within the period of three months referred to in this paragraph is due to reasons of health or to other special circumstances may be submitted for consideration by the Naval Board.

- (13.) An unmarried member whose parents are living apart shall be entitled to the concession to visit the home of one of the parents only. The member shall elect which parent he desires to visit. Warrants to visit the home of the other parent are not to be issued without the approval of the Naval Board.
- (14.) A member who is a widower, is legally separated from or deserted by his wife, or is divorced, may be granted the concession to visit the home of his child (if any) provided he has an allotment in force payable either directly to or on behalf of the child and that he is the sole support of the child. Warrants shall not be issued to the home of such member's parents unless it is also the bona fide home of the child and the foregoing conditions are fulfilled.
- (15.) In cases where divorce proceedings have been instituted, a member shall not be entitled to a concession warrant to visit his parents until the decree nisi shall have been made absolute.
- (16.) A widower without children may be granted a concession warrant to visit the home of his parents.
- (17.) The term "guardian" shall for the purpose of these instructions mean a relative or other person who has taken a parental interest in the member's upbringing and general welfare or, where the parents of a member have died since his entry into the Service, a near relative residing at the member's home town.
- (18.) The grant of the concession for the purpose of visiting the home of a guardian shall be limited to unmarried personnel who have not attained the age of 23 years.
- (19.) Action towards determining the eligibility of a member for the grant of the concession to visit the home of a guardian shall be initiated by the Captain Superintendent of Training on the entry of the member. In the case of a member who becomes an orphan subsequent to entry into the Service, similar action should be taken by the Commanding Officer of the ship or establishment in which the member is serving.

The full circumstances of each case in which application is made for the concession to visit the home of a guardian are to be submitted for consideration by the Naval Board, and a copy of the decision given is, in the case of a rating, to be attached to his Certificate of Service.

(20.) Warrants for leave concession rail journeys should be in the special form adopted for the purpose, and should show clearly the relationship existing between the member and the person or persons visited.

Where the special concession railway warrant form is not available, or in the case of leave concession steamer passages (for which a special form of warrant has not been adopted), the ordinary duty warrant should be utilized and should be clearly marked across the face "Travelling Concession".

(21.) Warrants for the journeys to and from the member's home should be issued at the same time.

Advantage should be taken, whenever possible, of railway excursion and concession fares, and warrants for "return" tickets issued where a saving would thereby result.

- (22.) Members proceeding to Hobart from Sydney on leave should normally travel by direct steamer route. In cases where it is not practicable for approximately the full period of leave to be taken in Tasmania, using direct sea route only, rail warrants may be issued via Bass Strait for either the forward or the return journey (but not both).
- (23.) Wherever practicable, members are to be sent on leave from the port nearest to their homes, e.g., those whose homes are in Sydney are not to be sent on leave from ship in Melbourne.
- (24.) Concession warrants are not to be issued in any case where a doubt exists as to the eligibility of the applicant under the approved conditions. Where, in such cases, the member so desires, a chargeable warrant may be issued and the matter referred for decision by the Naval Board.
- (25.) It shall be the responsibility of each member to obtain the necessary leave concession warrants to which he is entitled, prior to departure from his ship or establishment when proceeding on leave.

In the event of the loss of a concession warrant (or railway ticket) application should be made to the Commanding Officer of the ship or establishment in which the member is serving (if the loss occurs prior to commencement of the journey) or to the nearest District Naval Officer, for the issue of a chargeable warrant. In such cases, application for re-credit of the charge, accompanied by a full statement of the case, should be submitted for the consideration of the Naval Board.

Refund of cost of fares paid by a member in consequence of loss of a concession warrant will be considered only in very exceptional cases, in which definite proof of travel by train is furnished and it is clearly established that it was not possible for the member to have obtained a chargeable warrant for the journey.

"The officer who signs a (travelling) warrant will be responsible that the person to whom the warrant is issued is . . . entitled to the

ENROLMENT OF OFFICERS AND MEN ON COMMONWEALTH AND STATE ELECTORAL ROLLS.

With reference to Navy Order 37 of 1936, the following information furnished by the Chief Electoral Officer for the Commonwealth and the Chief Electoral Officer for Victoria, respectively, in regard to Postal Voting is promulgated for the guidance of officers and men concerned:—

Commonwealth Elections and Referendums-

Any elector qualified to vote by post may, at any time after the issue of the writ and before polling day, make application, on the prescribed form, to any Divisional Returning Officer in the Commonwealth who, if the application is in order, will issue the requisite Postal Vote Certificate and Postal Ballot-paper to the applicant elector forthwith (or if the application is received prior to nomination day, immediately after the close of nominations). After the elector has completed the Postal Vote Certificate and marked his Ballot-paper in the presence of an authorized witness, the Certificate and Ballot-paper may be posted to any Divisional Returning Officer or Assistant Returning Officer in the Commonwealth or delivered to the Presiding Officer at any polling booth in the Commonwealth on polling day, and so long as the documents are in the hands of one of those officers by 8 p.m. on the day of polling the vote is accepted for inclusion in the scrutiny.

It will thus be seen that Naval Personnel should not experience any difficulty in recording their votes at Commonwealth Elections or Referendums irrespective of where the vessel happens to be, provided such vessel is in Australian waters and between nomination day and polling day visits a port at which a Divisional Returning Officer is located.

Victorian Elections and Polls-

Applications for Postal Vote Certificates and Postal Ballot-papers must be witnessed by a Justice of the Peace residing in Victoria. These Certificates and Ballot-papers may not be issued until a writ, legally determining that an election or poll shall take place, has been issued. They cannot be issued by Returning Officers to applicants until one month prior to polling day.

If, therefore, any of H.M.A. Ships leave the State more than one month before polling day and will not return to Victorian waters before that day, officers and men serving therein who are eligible to vote are exempt from voting as the present law does not provide for Postal Voting from without the boundaries of the State of Victoria.

ANTI-SUBMARINE BRANCH OF NAVAL RESERVES.

The Naval Board have had under consideration the question of forming an Anti-Submarine Branch of the Australian Naval Reserve Forces, and it has been decided to introduce this service under the following conditions:—

1. Recruitment of Personnel.—The A/S. Branch of the Australian Naval Reserves will be manned:—

(a) in the case of Officers—
from the Royal Australian Naval Volunteer Reserve;
and

(b) in the case of Petty Officers and Men from specially selected ratings of the Royal Australian Naval Reserve who are willing to serve in this Branch for a minimum period of 5 years.

Officers will be selected from-

(i) applicants serving in the Royal Australian Naval Reserve and Royal Australian Naval Volunteer Reserve, who will retain their present rank and seniority; and

(ii) civilians who have had Yachting or other Sea experience, who will be given commissions in the Royal Australian

Naval Volunteer Reserve.

Note :-

- (1) Applicants for appointment under Sub-clause (ii) above will be given such rank as may be deemed appropriate in accordance with the existing procedure for granting ranks in the Royal Australian Naval Volunteer Reserve. Such Officers will be on probation for a period of twelve months.
- (2) R.A.N.R. Officers selected for A/S. Branch will be transferred to the R.A.N.V.R.
- 2. Two non-substantive rates will be established, namely:—

(a) Submarine Detector (S.D.).

(b) Higher Submarine Detector (H.S.D.).

Qualified ratings will wear the distinguishing badges of the Active Service Submarine Detector personnel.

- 3. For the present, all A/S. personnel will be drawn from New South Wales and will be borne on the books of the Sydney Port Division.
- 4. Courses and Drills.—The following periods for qualifying and requalifying Courses and for Drills shall be obligatory for Officers, Petty Officers and Men of the A/S. Branch:—
 - (a) Officers-

(i) On appointment, a qualifying Course of 26 days.

Officers who find it impracticable to carry out this Course in one continuous period may take the course in more than one continuous period.

(ii) Annually—28 days' Drill divided into 12 whole days

and 48 night-drills.

The duration of a whole-day drill shall be not less than 6 hours and a night-drill not less than 2 hours, to be arranged so that not more than one whole-day drill per month, and one night-drill per week, takes place. Note.—Whole-day drills may be divided into half-day drills each of not less than 3 hours duration.

- (b) Ratings-Qualifying and Requalifying Courses-
 - (i) On Enlistment, a qualifying Course for S.D. of 19 days.
 - (ii) after two years' service as S.D., a qualifying Course for H.S.D. of 26 days for all ratings taking this Course.
 - (iii) S.D.'s requalifying Course of 13 days after 4 years as S.D.
 - (iv) H.S.D.'s requalifying Course of 21 days after 4 years as H.S.D.

Ratings who find it in practicable to carry out these Courses in one continuous period may take the Courses in more than one continuous period.

(v) Annually—28 days' Drill divided into 12 whole-days

and 48 night-drills.

The duration of a whole-day drill shall be not less than 6 hours and a night-drill not less than 2 hours, to be arranged so that not more than one whole-day drill per month, and one night-drill per week, takes place.

Note.—Whole-day drills may be divided into half-day drills each of not less than 3 hours duration.

5. Voluntary Continuous Training.—In addition to the obligatory qualifying Course and Annual Drills, Officers will be encouraged to undertake Voluntary Continuous Training up to a maximum of 13 days annually.

6. Pay-

(a) Officers will receive pay at Seagoing (on promotion) rates whilst undergoing Courses and for Drills, and also during Voluntary Continuous Training.

> In addition, a Specialist Allowance of 2s. 6d. per day will be paid, up to the total number of days, for Courses and Drills undertaken, including Voluntary Continuous

Training, after qualifying.

- (b) Ratings will receive pay at rates prescribed for the Royal Australian Naval Reserve whilst undergoing Courses and for Drills. In addition, a Specialist Allowance of £2 per annum for S.D. rates and £4 per annum for H.S.D. rates will be paid subject to qualifying or requalifying.
- 7. Amendments to the Regulations for both the R.A.N.R. and R.A.N.V.R. are in course of preparation, and the Regulations and Instructions embodying this Order will be issued at an early date.

GUNS AND GUNMOUNTINGS—REPORTS OF RECEIPTS AND ISSUES.

 - (iii) Date of receipt or issue;
 - (iv) Mode of transport.

CEREMONIAL AND ORCHESTRAL (STRING) BAND INSTRUMENTS SUPPLIED FROM DEPARTMENTAL FUNDS.

- 1. Supply of Instruments.—The Naval Board will, from time to time, decide what Ships and Establishments are to be supplied with ceremonial and/or orchestral (string) band instruments. The supply of such instruments will be arranged by the Director of Victualling, Navy Office, either from Royal Edward Yard or from the United Kingdom direct, in the event of a ship being in the United Kingdom.
- 2. Ceremonial Bands.—(a) Ceremonial bands are at present allowed in H.M.A. Ships Australia, Canberra, Cerberus, Sydney, Hobart, Perth, and in the Naval Reserve Districts of Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria (Port Melbourne and Williamstown), South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania.
- (b) Music for ceremonial bands to the value of the limit which is communicated by the Naval Board from time to time will be allowed to each of H.M.A. Ships concerned, if required.
- (c) When replacements of ceremonial band instruments are necessary, demands are to be forwarded to the Victualling Store Officer, Sydney, for necessary action.

CEREMONIAL AND ORCHESTRAL (STRING) BAND INSTRUMENTS-continued.

(d) Accessories and music for ceremonial band instruments and repairs to ceremonial instruments are also to be requisitioned from the Victualling

Store Officer, full details being shown on the requisitions.

(e) Where special circumstances might warrant local arrangements for the repair of instruments, i.e., to avoid payment of interstate freight charges on the return of instruments to Sydney, or in some other special circumstances, the matter is to be referred to the Director of Victualling, Navy Office, for instructions before taking any other action.

3. Orchestral (String) Bands.—(a) The conditions under which orchestral (string) bands are allowed to H.M.A. Ships or Establishments are laid down

in Naval Financial Regulations and Instructions, Article 209.

(b) Repairs to, and overhaul of, orchestral instruments are not to be effected at Departmental expense. The necessary arrangements are to be made direct by the Ship or Establishment concerned. When orchestral instruments are returned to the Victualling Yard on paying off, any necessary repairs will be arranged by the Yard and the cost of such repairs recovered from the Ship concerned.

(c) To assist the Officers who maintain orchestral bands in H.M.A. Ships, grants-in-aid towards meeting all expenses of maintaining the band are made by the Naval Board. Such grants may be utilized towards the payment of the percentage charge payable, vide Naval Financial Regulations

and Instructions. Article 209.

4. Transfer of Instruments.—Band instruments, ceremonial and/or orchestral, supplied to any of H.M.A. Ships or Establishments are not to be transferred to any other Ships or Establishments, except to Royal Edward Yard, without prior Naval Board approval.

5. Registration of Instruments.—(a) Each instrument and case will in future be given a special Departmental Registered Number which is to be engraved or printed on the instrument or case concerned. These numbers

are to be referred to, always, in any relative correspondence.

(b) The Victualling Store Officer, Royal Edward Yard, is to give each article its Departmental Registration Number and to maintain a complete record of the life history of each article, including, inter-alia, source of supply, original cost, subsequent cost of repairs, its location from time to time and final disposition.

(c) Where an instrument or case is at present on issue or when instruments are received direct by a Ship or Establishment from the United Kingdom, the Victualling Store Officer is to communicate the relative Departmental Registration Number to the Ship or Establishment concerned, which is then to arrange for such number to be placed on the article.

(d) Care is to be exercised that instruments are not damaged in any

way in the process of numbering.

- 6. Care and Maintenance of Instruments.—The instructions laid down in King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, Article 775, regarding the care and maintenance of band instruments are to apply generally in H.M.A. Ships and Establishments in respect of all instruments supplied by the Department.
- 7. Store for Instruments.—A suitable locked store is, where possible, to be provided for the accommodation of band equipment.

CEREMONIAL AND ORCHESTRAL (STRING) BAND INSTRUMENTS—continued.

- 8. Survey of Instruments before Return.—Before instruments are returned to Royal Edward Yard, on paying off, they are to be surveyed by a Bandmaster of another ship, if available, in conjunction with the Bandmaster concerned. A Report of Survey is to be prepared setting out clearly the condition of each instrument. Both Bandmasters are to sign this Report, which is then to be attached to the return notes to be forwarded to the Victualling Yard, a copy of such Report being retained by the Bandmaster concerned.
- 9. Losses of and Damoge to Instruments.—(a) The value of all instruments lost, except where the Commanding Officer is satisfied, on investigation, that the loss is due to causes beyond the control of the man, will be charged against the pay of the person concerned.
- (b) Similarly, the cost of repairs due to neglect will be charged against the pay of the person concerned.
- (c) All cases of loss of, or damage to, instruments from whatever cause arising, together with particulars of costs recovered, are to be reported to the Director of Victualling, Navy Office. A copy of the report is to be sent at the same time to the Victualling Store Officer, Royal Edward Yard, for record purposes.
- (d) All charges against individuals are to be based on the value and the life of the instruments concerned, the scale laid down for the Royal Marine Bands being utilized for the purpose. Copies of the scale referred to are available at Royal Edward Yard, Sydney.
- 10. Method of Accounting.—Band instruments and accessories and band music supplied to H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments, including Naval Reserve Districts, are to be treated as victualling stores, and, in the case of H.M.A. Ships and Naval Establishments, are to be taken on charge in the Implement Account (Form A.S. 83, Part III.). MESS GEAR-AMENDED SCALES AND SYSTEM OF SUPPLY.

It is notified, for general information, that the amended scales and system of supply of Mess Gear, referred to in Admiralty Fleet Order 2750/1937, as amended by Admiralty Fleet Order 358/1938, are to apply in all Sea-going Ships of the R.A.N. as from 1st January, 1939. 4. The introduction of new and improved pattern articles will be deferred until it is known to what extent they are required as a result of demands furnished to the Victualling Store Officer, Sydney.

5. A revised scale of Replacement Allowances applicable to Ships on the amended scales of Mess Gear will be promulgated at an early date.

- 2. This form will provide the Accountant Officer with a ready means, in conjunction with Form A.S.72x, of verifying all quantities shown in Form A.S.72z.
- 3. The following instructions are promulgated for guidance in the use of this form:—
 - (a) After all necessary issues for the day have been made, Form A.S.113 is to be completed, in duplicate, by the Victualling Staff, showing the quantities of all fresh and dry provisions issued to the General Mess Galley.
 - (b) The signatures of the Supply Officer, or Senior Supply Rating in charge of Victualling and the Senior Cook Rating in charge of the General Mess Galley, are to be inserted on this form as an indication of correct issue and acknowledgment of receipt of the stores shown thereon.
 - (c) The original copy of this form is to be retained in the Victualling Office and the duplicate given to the responsible Cook Rating receiving the stores.
 - (d) The daily completed forms are to be retained for the information of the Accountant Officer and are not to be destroyed until the passing certificate of the Provision Account for the period concerned has been received.
 - (e) On supersession of the Senior Cook Rating in charge of the General Mess Galley, all forms A.S.113 in his possession are to be given to the Accountant Officer of the Ship or Establishment for retention.
- 4. The existing Form A.S.113 "Statement of General Mess Expenditure" has been re-numbered A.S.113z.
