

-January 1960-DICK JOHNSON TO EDIT NEW WEEKLY COIN PAPER

D. WAYNE JOHNSON, AN A.V.A. MEMBER FROM KANSAS CITY. HAS BEEN HIRED BY AN OHIO PUBLISHING FIRM TO START A NEW WEEKLY COIN NEWSPAPER. DICK IS ALSO A NEWLYWED. HE RECENTLY MARRIED Shirley Rausch, A TV and church editor on the Kansas City Kan-SAN. DICK WORKED ON THE SAME NEWSPAPER AS ADVERTISING MANAGER IN CHARGE OF ALL LOCAL RETAIL ADVERTISING. THE COUPLE HAS MOV-ED TO SIDNEY, OHIO, WHERE THEY ARE EMPLOYED BY THE SIDNEY PUB-LISHING CO. THIS FIRM PRINTS A WEEKLY NEWS PUBLICATION FOR STAMP COLLECTORS, "LINN'S WEEKLY STAMP NEWS." IN AN EXPANSION PROGRAM THE COMPANY CHOSE TO PUBLISH A WEEKLY COIN NEWSPAPER. THE PROPOSED PUBLICATION, CALLED "COIN WORLD," WILL BE ISSUED WEEKLY--APPEARING EVERY THURSDAY. IT WILL BE GRANTED 2ND CLASS MAILING PERMIT WHICH SPEEDS UP DELIVERY OF DAILY & WEEKLY PAP-ERS. A COIN PUBLICATION WHICH DICK BUT OUT IN COLLEGE LED THE MANAGEMENT OF THE SIDNEY FIRM TO INTERVIEW DICK TO HEAD UP THEIR NEW PUBLICATION. DICK PUT OUT THE NUMISMATIC DIRECTORY IN 1957 AS A CLASS PROJECT IN ADVERTISING AS WASHINGTON UNIV. IN ST. LOUIS. AFTER INTERVIEWING 6 CANDIDATES FOR THE POST. THE MANAGEMENT MET WITH DICK FOR A DISCUSSION OF WHAT COULD BE DONE IN A WEEKLY PAPER FOR COIN COLLECTORS. PUBLICATION OFFICE FOR THE COIN WORLD WILL BE THE SIDNEY DAILY NEWS BUILDING, 119 EAST COURT ST., SIDNEY, OHIO.

MCFARLAND CAB & BAGGAGE LINE OF WEST PLAINS, MO.

As the result of correspondence with parties in West Plains, the Editor has learned the story of the interesting firm which issued the newly discovered depoted token Mo 980 A.

The McFarland family, headed by the late J.H. McFarland, came to West Plains before the turn of the century, from Cuba, Mo., and entered into the plumbing business. Their establishment was located on the square on a site which is now a part of the Aid Hardware Co. Later the business was expanded, and in addition to plumbing they also had an undertaking establishment. The plumbing shop was located at the rear of the funeral parlor.

A HISTORY OF THE COMPANY IS TRULY A STUDY OF AMERICANA IN THE EARLY 1900'S FROM THE CARRIAGE DAYS THROUGH THE HORSELESS BUGGY TIMES TO THE ACCEPTANCE OF THE MOTOR CAR AS A MODE OF TRAVEL. IT REVEALS THE CHANGES THAT HAVE COME IN THE UNDER-TAKING BUSINESS FROM WHEN IT WAS COMBINED WITH ANOTHER ENTER-PRISE. BEFORE 1914 WHEN THE AID HARDWARE STORE BURNED, C.T. AID BOUGHT THE MCFARLAND BUILDING AND PUT IN A DIME STORE CON-NECTED TO THE AID STORE BY AN ARCADE. THE MCFARLAND CO., WHICH BY NOW INCLUDED THE LATE J.H. MCFARLAND'S SON AND HIS WIFE, RAY AND KITTY MCFARLAND, MOVED TO A LOCATION ON EAST MAIN STREET. NO LONGER DID THE COMPANY INCLUDE THE PLUMBING

BUSINESS, BUT INSTEAD ADDED A CAB COMPANY AND LIVERY BUSINESS IN ADDITION TO THE MORTUARY. MR. AND MRS. RAY MCFARLAND WERE THE PARENTS OF JACK MCFARLAND OF WEST PLAINS. MRS. KITTY MC-FARLAND BEGAN THE MANUFACTURE OF SHROUDS AND MRS. DOROTHY ROB-ERTSON WAS A TRAVELING SALESWOMAN FOR THE FIRM. SHORTLY BEFORE THAT MRS. ROBERTSON'S HUSBAND HAD BEGUN WORKING FOR THE MCFAR-LANDS, AFTER WORLD WAR I.

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The CAB COMPANY WAS ONE OF THE OLD "HOTEL TO DEPOT" LINES SO FAMILIAR IN THE MIDWEST PRIOR TO WORLD WAR I AND IMMEDIATE-LY FOLLOWING. IT MET THE TRAINS WITH HORSE-DRAWN BUSES AND CARRIED PASSENGERS FROM THE DEPOT TO THE HOTEL. MOST OF ITS CLIENTELE WERE TRAVELING SALESMEN ON EXPENSE ACCOUNTS WHO COULD AFFORD THE 25¢ ROUND TRIP FARE. A TOKEN WAS GIVEN THE PASSENGER FOR THE RETURN PART OF HIS TRIP. WHEN "GASOLINE BUG-GIES" BECAME PREVALENT, THE CAB COMPANY WAS MECHANIZED. THE ROBERTSONS WERE WORKING THERE THEN. THE FIRST HEARSE WAS A SPECIALLY BUILT BODY MOUNTED ON A MODEL-T TRUCK CHASSIS. THEN, IN 1922, THE MCFARLAND UNDERTAKING CO. BOUGHT ITS FIRST CUSTOM-MADE BUICK HEARSE FROM THE LOCAL BUICK AGENCY.

Meanwhile the need for a livery company had dwindled, and it was disposed of, together with the cab & baggage line. Other owners of the cab & baggage line were Amon Harlin, Joe Taylor, and John Gunn. In 1928, after the deaths of both Mr. & Mrs. Ray McFarland, the undertaking company was sold to a company formed by the man who operated the Buick Agency. It was moved to the location now occupied by the Robertson Funeral Home.

Those who remember the CAB & BAGGAGE LINE SAY THE TOKEN system was not used long, and no one could be found who has one of the brass, 23mm, scallopped edge, tokens. Thus, the Editor was not successful in obtaining the token for his collection...but I did get several nice photos of the old buses.

THE SIOUX CITY CABLE RAILWAY BY FOSTER M. PALMER

The Sioux City Cable Railway was built by William Phenix, an inventive Maine Yankee who had his own designs for a singletrack cable road. Phenix had built a similar road in Grand Rapids, Mich., before coming to Sioux City. Operations began on Jackson St. from 3rd to 29th in 1889. The power house and car barn was located on the south side of 29th St. at Jones. In 1890, the northerly part of the line, operated by a second endless cable, began running on Jackson St. from 29th St. to Central Park (now the Sioux City Country Club), where the cars turned around on a large loop. In the same year the trackage operated by the south cable was extended west on 3rd St. to Water. There were 6 turnouts on the single track line, entered

VIA 12 AUTOMATIC SWITCHES. CARS WERE RUN IN TRAINS, CONSISTING OF A SMALL GRIP CAR AND A TRAILER. FIVE OF THE LATTER WERE DOUBLE-DECKED. AT ITS PEAK, THE SIOUX CITY CABLE RAILWAY HAD 14 GRIP CARS AND 20 TRAILERS. THERE WERE SEPARATE OPEN TRAIL. ERS FOR SUMMER AND CLOSED CARS FOR WINTER. SEVEN TRAINS WARE COMMONLY ON THE STREET AT ONE TIME, ACCORDING TO A DESCRIPTION WHICH APPEARED IN THE STREET RAILWAY JOURNAL FOR MARCH, 1693. THE LONGER SOUTH CABLE, WHICH HAD TO HAUL TRAINS UP THE HEAVY GRADE NORTH OF 6TH ST., RAN AT A SPEED OF 8 MILES PER HOUR, WHILE THE CABLE ON THE SHORTER AND LESS SEVERELY HILLY CENTRAL PARK END RAN AT 11 MILES PER HOUR.

The large steam engines which drove the cables also ran a dynamo which furnished street lighting on Jackson St. and house current in the vicinity. This was one of the earliest electric plants in Sioux City. Exhaust steam from the engines was also used for heating houses in the neighborhood of the power house.

Even with these unusual sources of added revenue, the Sioux City Cable Railway was not a financial success. The basic difficulty was insufficient traffic to repay the heavy contruction costs. On October 9, 1895, the road was sold under foreclosure for only \$15,142 and became the Central Traction Company.

DIFFERENT SOURCES CONFLICT AS TO THE DATE WHEN CABLE TRAC-TION WAS GIVEN UP AND AT LEAST THE NORTHERN PORTION OF THE LINE ELECTRIFIED, BUT IT WAS NOT LATER THAN 1899, IN WHICH YEAR THE CENTRAL TRACTION CO. WAS MERGED WITH THE SIOUX CITY TRACTION COMPANY. THE PORTION NORTH OF 29TH ST. BECAME A PART OF THE PIERCE-JACKSON ELECTRIC LINE OF THE CONSOLIDATED SYSTEM, LONG THE MOST IMPORTANT ROUTE SERVING THE NORTH SIDE RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT, WHILE THE TRACKAGE BETWEEN 5TH AND 29TH STREETS ON JACKSON WAS SOON REMOVED.

[EDITOR'S NOTE: AS FAR AS IS KNOWN, THE SIOUX CITY CABLE RAILWAY ISSUED ONLY TWO TOKENS, IOWA 850 H AND I. THERE IS ONLY ONE KNOWN OF H, AND ONLY 2 KNOWN OF I. THE OLD SIOUX CITY TOKENS, 850 A THRU I, ARE AMONG THE RAREST TOKENS IN THE BOOK.]

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ELEVATOR TOKEN FINALLY REAPPEARS by kenneth smith

When I was working my way through the University back in MINNEAPOLIS ON THE STREETCARS, I HEARD ABOUT THE EXPOSITION ELEVATOR TOWER TOKEN OF 1886, BUT NEVER COULD FIND ONE THERE. IN NOVEMBER, 1959, I FINALLY FOUND ONE IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA. This exposition issued two metal tokens. The first one was as ADVERTISING PIECE, WM 30 Pc - MINNEAPOLIS INDUSTRIAL EXPOSI-TION (BUILDING) ON OBVERSE, AND MINNEAPOLIS INDUSTRIAL EXPOS-ITION SOUVENIR AUGUST 23 OCTOBER 2 1886 ON REVERSE. THESE WERE issued in a large quantity. The second token was B 23 Pc -MINNEAPOLIS IND. EXPOSITION (BUILDING) ON OBVERSE. AND GOOD FOR ONE TRIP ON PASSENGER ELEVATOR ON REVERSE. AS THIS WAS THE ONLY PASSENGER ELEVATOR IN THE TWIN CITIES AT THAT TIME, IT WAS NOT OPEN FREE TO THE PUBLIC. THEY CHARGED A FARE TO RIDE IT. The brass tokens were given to certain parties so they could RIDE FREE. THEY ONLY CHARGED FARE ON THE TRIP UP. THE DOWN-WARD TRIP WAS FREE.

NEW ISSUES SERVICE NEWS

The following tokens will reach you this month: Ohio 160 F; Mass 355 C; Mich 525 M; Minn 540 AH...Also Quebec 620 X to those on my Canadian list. Some of the Ohio tokens are a bit stained, but they will clean nicely in a vinegar solution. Let them set in vinegar for 5 minutes, then rub lightly with a soft eraser, rince with clear water, and you have a nice shiny clean token (but don't try this on steel or zinc or aluminum). Mass 355 C was first used Nov. 1, 1959. Minn 540 AH was just recently put into service. We wish to thank Quincy Laflin for getting them for us. Thanks to Mr. Cassidy for getting the Montreal tokens for us. There are several varieties of this token, but we can only get enough for <u>one</u> variety for half the members, so some will get it with dots, some without dots. We can't supply 620 W yet.

NOTES BY RALPH FREIBERG

I AM STARTING THE YEAR OFF BY BEING A LITTLE LATE, MADE A FEW WEEKEND TRIPS DOWN TO LOS ÅNGELES FOR BASKETBALL, AND RAN INTO SOME INFORMATION ON PARKING METER TOKENS. FIRST, WE HAVE A SCHOOL TOKEN WHICH IS MARKED "SPECIAL FARE" FOR JACKSON CITY LINES. IT IS POSSIBLE THAT IN THE FUTURE WE MAY HAVE OTH-ER TOKENS OF THIS NATURE MARKED SPECIAL FARE. THIS WAY, WITH ONE RATE OF FARE A TOKEN COULD BE USED AS AN ADULT FARE, THEN WITH A FARE RAISE IT COULD BE USED FOR SOMETHING ELSE. THIS WILL BEAR WATCHING IN THE FUTURE.

Next we come to a student token from Minneapolis. This is a combination token that can be used in either St. Paul or Minneapolis. The fare went to 25c for adults with tokens at

5 FOR \$1, AND SCHOOL RATES TO 2 FOR 25C, ON OCTOBER 12, 1959. However, as school tokens weren't ready on this date, témporary tickets were used till the tokens arrived, sometime in December.

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We have another school token from North Olmsted, Ohio. As the operator of the line does not cater to collectors, I do not know the reason that tokens now are made slightly larger than previously. Anyway, the latest order of tokens came 1mm larger than before. This is the one issue we don't know how to obtain for the New Issues Service (see article on page 94 of December Fare Box).

Next we come to a token similar to others of the 43rd St. Bridge. Mort Dawson had mentioned this previously, that he had a smaller one, and now with the Blacks coming up with one, we shall list it.

The Valley Mills token is probably another of the early depoted tokens. Mr. Coffee is trying to obtain some information on this line, and he is successful an article will appear in The Fare Box one of these days. As for the Unidentified, the JCE tokens have been showing up in various parts of the country. We don't know yet if they are transportations or not. The other one, #71, appears to be from Ohio. Perhaps someone will recognize it and explain the figure $7\frac{1}{8}$ on the token.

DURING THE PAST FEW MONTHS I'VE HAD CORRESPONDENCE WITH DUANE FEISEL REGARDING PARKING METER TOKENS. IT SEEMS LATELY THAT A LOT OF THESE HAVE BEEN SHOWING UP, ESPECIALLY AROUND THE PITTSBURGH AREA; MOST ARE 23MM, A FEW COLLECTORS HAVE MENT-IONED THAT THEY COLLECT THESE AS A SIDELINE, AND I'D LIKE THE OPINION OF MEMBERS AS TO WHAT THEY THINK OF THEM. WOULD THEY LIKE TO SEE A LIST OF THEM? IF YOU HAVE ANY TO REPORT, SEND A LISTING EITHER TO ME OR TO DUANE FEISEL. IF ENOUGH WOULD LIKE THEM LISTED, SEPARATELY OF COURSE FROM FARE TOKENS, WE COULD RUN SUCH A LIST IN THE FARE Box. I DON'T KNOW JUST HOW THESE TOKENS ARE USED IN PENNSYLVANIA, BUT AROUND LOS ANGELES THEY ARE USED IN CONNECTION WITH A KIND OF GATE. BY PUTTING A TOKEN IN A SPECIAL SLOT THE GATES RISE SO THAT AUTOS CAN ENTER OR LEAVE THE PARKING LOTS. ONE COMPANY THAT MAKES THESE GATES MIGHT USE A 23MM TOKEN, WHEREAS ANOTHER OUTFIT MAY USE A 25MM TOKEN. TOKENS ARE USED IN SOME INSTANCES WHERE IF YOU PURCHASE A CERTAIN AMOUNT IN A STORE, YOU GET A TOKEN. SO IN THIS CASE. THE TOKEN IS REALLY A CONTROL TO EXCLUDE NON-CUSTOMERS OF THE STORES. HOWEVER, PLACES WHERE A STRAIGHT 25C IS CHARGED, THERE IS NO NEED FOR TOKENS. THEY ARE INTERESTING IN THEMSELVES, SO IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO SEE A COMPLETE LISTING OF PARKING METER TOKENS, DROP ME A LINE AND LET ME KNOW. SO FAR WE KNOW OF ABOUT 70 VARIETIES OF THEM FROM ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTRY.



PRESUMABLY IT WOULD BE NECESSARY FOR A NEW MEMBER FIRST TO PAY HIS \$3 DUES AND \$1 FEE, IN ORDER TO GAIN MEMBERSHIP IN GOOD STANDING, BE+ FORE HE COULD SWITCH OVER TO LIFE MEMBERSHIP, FOR AN ADDITIONAL \$30.00. IN ADDITION TO THE OBVIOUS FINANCIAL ADVANTAGE OF NOT HAVING TO PAY ANY FURTHER DUES, THERE IS THIS TO THINK ABOUT: THAT BY BECOMING A LIFE MEMBER YOU ARE EXHIBITING A FAITH IN THE FUTURE OF OUR ASSOCIATION OVER THE YEARS TO COME. AS OF FEBRUARY 14, EIGHT MEMBERS HAD BECOME LIFE MEMBERS, IN ADDITION TO BILL BLACK, WHO HAS THE UNIQUE DISTINCTION OF HAVING HAD LIFE MEMBERSHIP VOTED HIM AT AN ANNUAL CONVENTION.

Because the life membership fee is not set in the Constitution, but is subject to the Executive Board, it may in the future be raised for future would-be life members. At present, representing the equivalent of only ten years' dues, it is quite a bargain.

RECENTLY I HAD A SOMEWHAT SIMILAR EXPERIENCE. My happiness was considerable when I saw that the token was NONE OTHER THAN NY 890 C. UNTIL NOW, THE ONLY KNOWN SPECIMEN OF THIS TOKEN WAS IN CECIL JEFFERSON'S COLLECTION, AS FAR AS I KNOW. SO DON'T HIDE YOUR LIGHT UNDER A BUSHEL! RARE TOKENS CAN TURN UP ANYWHERE. TELL ALL YOUR FRIENDS ABOUT YOUR HOBBY.

NOTES BY RALPH FREIBERG

This month we report some new issues which everyone on the New Issues Service will get. First, Los Angeles came out with a new token January 24. Fare was raised to 20¢ straight, and this new token is only a convenience token. The new token was struck to establish uniformity in the type of token used. Since the L.A. M.T.A. took over, they continued to use the 16mm tokens of Los Angeles Railway, Los Angeles Transit Lines, and Pacific Electric. No doubt all those tokens will be destroyed as they are taken in. They don't expect to use many tokens, so only had 100,000 of the new one struck, which is a very small order for a city like Los Angeles; their stock of the 3 older tokens must have run into the millions.

Next we have the Des Moines school token. Des Moines Transit took over transit operations in Des Moines on January 16, 1954, but continues to use the adult token issued by the -FEBRUARY 1960-

-PAGE 17-FORMER COMPANY. IN 1949 FARE IN DES MOINES WAS 10¢ OR 4/25, BUT WITH THEIR LAST FARE HIKE ON DECEMBER 16, 1959, FARE WENT TO 30¢ OR 4/\$1. AS FAR AS I KNOW THIS IS THE HIGHEST CITY RATE IN THE COUNTRY. SO HERE WE HAVE A SITUATION WHERE TOKENS SOLD AT 4/25 AND NOW SELL AT 4/\$1 --- AND THE SAME TOKEN THAT WAS ONCE WORTH 6 of FACE VALUE IS NOW WORTH 25¢ FACE VALUE!

IN ALMOST ALL CASES WHERE WE KNOW THERE HAS BEEN A FARE HIKE, THE NEW ISSUES SERVICE WRITES TO SEE IF THERE ARE NEW TO-KENS; SOMETIMES WE SEND 25¢ OR SO, OTHERWISE THE LETTER MIGHT GET THROWN INTO THE WASTE BASKET. OFTEN WE MERELY GET THE OLD COMMON TOKEN FOR 25¢ PLUS OUR POSTAGE, AND CAN'T FIND ANYONE WHO WANTS IT EVEN AT THE OLD 15¢ PRICE. SO DOES ANYONE NEED IA 300 I AT 15¢? THESE ARE GOOD FOR A 30¢ RIDE. ANYWAY, THE EARLY PART OF LAST YEAR WE WROTE AND LEARNED THAT THEY WERE US-ING SCHOOL TICKETS. BUT UPON OUR ROUTINE CHECK AT THE LAST FARE HIKE WE LEARNED THAT THEY HAD SWITCHED TO SCHOOL TOKENS IN September. So even our system is not fool-proof. A company MAY BE USING TICKETS, THEN 3 OR 4 MONTHS LATER CHANGE TO TO-KENS. THESE SCHOOL TOKENS SELL AT 5/85¢ WHICH IS A HIGH RATE FOR SCHOOL TOKENS. WACO, TEX., IS ANOTHER COMPANY THAT WENT TO A 20¢ RATE WITH TOKENS 2/35. THEY ALSO HAD CHANGED THEIR NAME SINCE TOKENS WERE FIRST USED. WHEN PURCHASED BY ANOTHER OUTFIT THEY USED THE TOKENS OF A DIFFERENT COMPANY, AND WHEN THE LATEST FARE RAISE WENT INTO EFFECT WE THOUGHT SURE THAT WE HAD A NEW TOKEN HERE, SO WE SENT 20¢, AND THEN RECEIVED TEX 950 C, which was out of circulation a while. So with our air-MAIL POSTAGE, THIS 950 C TOKEN COST US 20¢ PLUS 14¢ POSTAGE! So we've got another token we'll be lucky if someone needs at 15¢.

Next we noted a fare hike in Washington, Pa., so out went ANOTHER 20¢ PLUS OUR POSTAGE, BUT THIS TIME WE FIND THAT THEY DID PLATE THEIR TOKENS, AND WERE ABLE TO GET SOME FOR THE NEW Issues Service. Fare is now 17¢ at Washington.

Next a token from Roseburg, Ore. Bus service has folded UP HERE A COUPLE TIMES, BUT LAST MARCH, 1959, ANOTHER FIRM STARTED UP AND ISSUED TOKENS. I DON'T KNOW WHERE MR. GUERNSEY FOUND THE ONE HE REPORTED, BUT LETTERS TO THE COMPANY WENT UN-ANSWERED. HOWEVER, AS HAROLD FORD WAS GOING TO VISIT PEOPLE IN MEDFORD, WE PREVAILED ON HIM TO DRIVE 125 MILES OUT OF HIS WAY (TOTAL OF 250 MILES) TO SEE IF HE COULD GET THE TOKENS. ON GETTING TO ROSEBURG ON FEB. 2, HE LEARNED THE LINE HAD BEEN SOLD TO ANOTHER PARTY JUST THE DAY BEFORE. AS TOKENS WERE NOT BEING USED AT THAT MOMENT, BUT MIGHT BE LATER, THERE WAS A QUESTION IF THE FORMER OWNER WAS THE LEGAL, OWNER OF THE TOKENS, OR THE NEW OWNER WAS. SO THE ONLY WAY HAROLD COULD GET THE TOKENS WAS TO OFFER THE GOING RATE OF 25¢ EACH (\$25 FOR 100).

I HAVE SPENT A LITTLE EXTRA TIME IN MY NOTES TRYING TO SHOW HOW THE NEW ISSUES SERVICE WORKS, AND HOW A LOT OF SO-CALLED "PROFIT MONEY" IS SPENT. POSSIBLY FOR EVERY NEW TOKEN LOCATED, 25 OR SO LETTERS ARE SENT TO VARIOUS COMPANY --- SOME with just postage, some with cash enclosed. Sometimes we get A LOT OF OLDER TOKENS STILL IN USE; SOMETIMES OUR LETTERS ARE NOT ANSWERED AT ALL. SO WE STILL NEED A LOT OF COOPERATION

FROM ALL COLLECTORS. ALTHOUGH WE TRY TO RUN DOWN ALL LEADS, WE STILL MISS OUT ON SOME OF THEM.

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LAST YEAR, SHORTLY AFTER THE BRIDGE TOKEN WAS USED AT BREMERTON, WASH., WE WROTE THE TOLL BRIDGE AUTHORITY TO FIND OUT IF ANY BRIDGE TOKENS WERE IN USE ANYWHERE ELSE. WE WERE TOLD THAT IMMEDIATELY AFTER JANUARY 1, 1960, TOKENS WOULD BE USED ON THE VANCOUVER-PORTLAND BRIDGE. THESE TOKENS WENT INTO USE JAN. 10, AND ARE SOLD ONLY IN ROLLS OF 40 FOR \$6.00. THE FARE WITHOUT A TOKEN IS 20¢. ONE OF THESE DAYS I'LL HAVE TO GET UP AND SEE JUST HOW THESE TOKENS ARE USED ... THAT IS, WITH AN AUTOMATIC REGISTER, OR WHAT. VANCOUVER, WASH., IS IN THE SOUTHERN END OF WASHING TON STATE, WHEREAS VANCOUVER, B.C., IS ACROSS FROM THE NORTHERN END OF THE STATE. PREVIOUSLY I HAD MENTIONED THAT VANCOUVER, $B_{\bullet}C_{\bullet}$, expected to use tokens with THE INSTALLATION OF NEW GRANT MONEY METER FARE BOXES. TOKENS WENT INTO USE ON NEW YEAR'S DAY, 1960, AND ARE SOLD AT 4/25¢. A CHILD USES ONE TOKEN, AND AN ADULT HAS TO USE TWO OF THEM. APPARENTLY THE "A" ON THE TOKEN REFERS TO ITS BEING THE FIRST IN A POSSIBLE SERIES OF TOKENS TO BE ISSUED.

We also expect some tokens from Chambly Transportation Co. After this system installs Grant Money Meter fare boxes.

Now with regard to parking meter tokens, I find more and more collectors are interested in them. A couple months ago I had no idea how they were used. First we have the off-street parking lots which have meters. These meters have an extra slot for tokens. Usually they work this way: you go into a store and make a purchase and the merchant gives you a token which works in one of these meters. Most tokens of this type are23mm size, usually made by local stamping outfits.

Then we have another type of token, used in connection with a gate. There are many of these gates around the country. Some work with a quarter. But others work this way: you can drive in, but you need a token to get out. Most of these are used in connection with schools, hospitals, and banks. The idea of the token is to keep people out who have no business parking there. So when you do business you get a token from the person in charge. Some of these gates take 23mm tokens, others take 25mm tokens. Strange as it seems, these gates and lots have been right under our noses, and we didn't know about them. So whenever you pass an off-street parking lot, walk up to the meter or gate to see if there is a place to insert tokens.

Springfield, Ill., has raised fares to 25¢ cash and 5 tokens for \$1.10...Erie Coach Co. has raised fares from 23 to 25¢, tokens from 5/1.05 to 5/1.15...D.C. Transit of Wash. D.C., expects to have its last streetcar line converted to buses by Jan. 2, 1962...Pittsburgh Railways has upped fares from 25 to 27¢, tokens from 4/95 to 4/1.05.



SUPREME COURT BATTLE BEHIND THE SCHAPPI TOKEN BY HAROLD FORD, JR.

The Schappi Bus Line of Calumet City, Ill., was founded in 1920 and incorporated in 1924. This line operated in several cities in the area and in the late 1920's the city of Hammond, Ind., tried to evict the line from its streets. "We won out in all courts including the U.S. Supreme Court," the former owner Ernest Schappi states. "We made headlines then during these fights in the Hammond papers," he adds. He gave up the bus line (did not sell out, just quit) in July, 1951.

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NOTES BY RALPH FREIBERG

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We had suspected that the Chidester & Pickett token was from Camden, Ark., but had no definite proof. So John Coffee had an article printed in the newspaper there, which put him in touch with people who knew the full story. Pickett was in partnership with Chidester in the 1890's. One of these people also sent Coffee the new token (150 E), which is similar to "A" except that the letters aren't incuse, and "E" has "Drummers Check" on the reverse.

The first white metal tokens struck for Connecticut Co. HAD A COMMA AFTER "LINE," but when steel, brass, and bronze tokens came along, they didn't have the comma. Now it seems they ordered a new batch of white metal tokens, and they came without the comma. It may take a while to get these for New Issues Service, as they'll have to be picked out from the others.

The Meron, Ind., ferry token was found by Mr. Cline in Hutsonville. A man who was demolishing a house there found it in the wall. Merom is only a few miles south of Hutsonville, on the other side of the river. The Merom Ferry operated over a hundred years, always being run by the same family. Only a few months ago, the last survivor of the family dies, and the ferry stopped running. Business had fallen off due to the new bridge at Hutsonville, which got most of the traffic. The tokens were used about 1900, and only one old timer in Merom could remember them at all. It seems these tokens were given out free by McNutt to his customers to encourage them to cross the river and patronize his store.

Next we come to a token which was a surprise to me. Seems National City Lines probably took over in this city around 19-39 or thereabouts, and about 1944 or 1945 sold the line to the Intercity Coach Line. From my file of information I find that they had a 5¢ fare and a 6/25 school fare, similar to rates on other properties of theirs. However, as no token was ever reported from there, and I thought Lansing was pretty well covered, we had not paid much attention to looking for tokens from there for this line. Worst of it was that I even visited the present company some 7 years ago, and possibly might have been able to find one then. So for the present I am giving the token a tentative price of 50¢ but if no more than a dozen ever show up, it should be worth the top price of \$3,50. In other words, this was a sleeper. Now I'm wondering if by chance they might have used a nickel token, or one in the 21mm size.

Next we come to another one of those tokens from the Brooklyn Line. The Brooklyn Street Railway was incorporated in 1869. The company built and operated a single track horse car line from Spring Street in the village of Brooklyn, northerly along what was then Columbus Street, now Pearl Street, to

LORAIN STREET IN THE CITY OF CLEVELAND, A DISTANCE OF ABOUT 2 MILES. IN 1879 STEPS WERE TAKEN TO EXTEND THE ROAD FROM LOR-AIN STREET TO THE SUPERIOR VIADUCT AND THENCE TO PUBLIC SQUARE. So these tokens were used before 1900. There are four types of these tokens and what the numerals 1, 2, and 3, mean I do not know. Now it seems that there can be any variety of these cel-Luloid tokens in various colors which we haven't listed yrt.

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I HAD HELD UP THE LISTING FROM MONTREAL SO THAT I COULD LIST THE W TOKEN FIRST, AS IT HAS THE SAME OBVERSE AS V. How-EVER, A FTER EXAMINING A QUANTITY OF THE TOKENS USED ON THIS BRIDGE, IT APPEARS THAT THIS W TOKEN IS, FOR THE PRESENT, ONE OF THE SCARCEST OF THE BUNCH, BUT THEN AGAIN ONE OF THESE DAYS IN LOOKING THROUGH A BUNCH, A QUANTITY OF W MAY BE FOUND, SO FOR THE PRESENT THIS IS ONE THE NEW ISSUES SERVICE IS KIND OF HELD UP ON.

As for the Maverick, perhaps someone will recognize the name Neely's Taxi. If so, that could be the clue we are looking for.

Next month we hope to list another one of the General Services Administration tokens. We have one listed for Area 3, which is Washington, D.C. Shortly we'll list one from Denver, Region 8, as soon as--and if--Mr. Frisbee can negotiate a deal for some of them. The areas are as follows: Boston 1. New York 2. Washington 3. Atlanta 4. Chicago 5. Kansas City 6. Dallas 7. Denver 8. San Francisco 9. Seattle 10. There are no tokens used in Area 9, but collectors in other areas might ask or telephone the GSA in those cities and ask if any tokens are used anywhere in their areas.

THE CHIDESTER TOKENS OF CAMDEN, ARK. BY J.M. COFFEE

F.B. CHIDESTER OPERATED A STAGE COACH LINE FROM CAMDEN, Ark., to Dallas, Texas, in the 1870's. It was called the "Chidester Brothers U.S. Mail & Express Co." and F.B. was in partnership with his brothers J.T. and W.P. Mr. J.T. Chidester died in 1883. F.B. and W.P. continued in business. Camden was a major steamboat port for shipping cotton south, and a major center for buying mules. The Chidesters would buy carloads of mules from St. Louis and sell them to local farmers. Later W.P. Chidester was elected sheriff, and F.B. was sole operator of the business. In the 1890's he took a Mr. Hugh Pickett as partner, then a few years later bought Pickett out, and was, again, in business for himself. The transfer line was only one of his many business interests. F.B. Chidester died in 1953, at the age of 93, but this was long after he had divested himself of the transfer and livery business.



BUT THE NUMBER OF HOURS IN A DAY REMAINS THE SAME.

One of the biggest changes to come about since the inauguration of The Fare Box in 1947 has been the change in the values and availability of tokens. Before 1947, it was next to

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All that has changed since MR. Moore started The Fare Box. Common tokens have become available in tremendous quantity and variety, and today any collector can purchase up to 1,000 varieties if he has the cash. Ordinary tokens today are selling for less than 10¢ apiece. On the other hand, the rare tokens have sky-rocketed in value. If the 15¢ price in the Catalogue for common tokens is artificially high, the \$3.50 and \$5.00 price on rare tokens is now artificially low. Some collectors have paid \$25 to \$35 apiece for rare tokens, and they fight to get the chance to do so.

MANY HAVE DEPLORED THE RISE IN PRICES OF THE RARE TOKENS, AND WITH JUSTIFICATION. IN ONE SENSE, ALL WE ARE DOING IS MAX-ING IT MORE EXPENSIVE FOR OURSELVES TO COLLECT TOKENS. BUT, LIKE IT OR NOT, THE FACT IS THAT THERE ARE MORE COLLECTORS THAN RARE TOKENS, AND SOME PEOPLE ARE NOW WILLING TO GIVE UP OTHER THINGS IN ORDER TO OBTAIN A RARE TOKEN...THAT IS, THEY ARE WILLING TO SPEND THE MONEY.

This keen competition for the good tokens has led a few dealers, who advertise in coin journals, to believe that any obsolete token is valuable...witness the recent prices asked for the common Honolulu token of \$5 apiece!

The moral in all this is that tokens are worth different things to different people. An advanced collector who has over 100 census tokens (there are only 7 such collectors) may think a rare token he needs is worth a lot. A beginning collector would probably be foolish to try to meet the same prices, unless he is really going to collect in a big way. But the important thing is to know your tokens. The prices in our Catalogue are still a pretty good guide to the rarity of tokens. Before you lay out a lot of money for a token, be sure you know what you are about.

In the final analysis, the best way to build a collection, and the most enjoyable, is not to buy them. The best way is to dig them up at the source...to write letters and trace them down. Probably only one letter in 25 will pay off, but that one letter will more than make up for all the best. There is no thrill, in our hobby, like making a New Discovery of an old token. The adventure in this hobby, unlike stamps and coins, lies in the fact that we are still in the beginning stages of it...that hundreds of rarities are still waiting to be found. -APRIL 1960-

THE EUREKA SPRINGS STREETCAR SYSTEM

The Aluminum token listed from Eureka Springs, Ark., is unique---there is only one known to exist. Even the initials on the token stand for something which no one seems to have heard of. So recently I wrote an article for the newspaper down there, and it was published. I received many replies, but no tokens, and no one seems certain of what "E.L.S." stands for, although the concensus is for "Electric Light & Street" Ry. However, I did learn that the paper had earlier run an article about the streetcar system there, and I reproduce most of that interesting article here:

When health seekers began flocking to Eureka Springs in the 1880's, the tallyho was introduced to transport travelers from the stage depot and, later, the railway station, to the 53 hotels and boarding houses which then existed here. This vehicle carried 20 or 30 passengers and was drawn by 6 horses. But this system of transportation wasn't sufficient, so in 1891 a mule car line was started. A few years later the line was electrified and extended to nearly double its original length, with a branch line extending down the hill to the Missouri-Arkansas RR station. In 1912 the depot was changed to an easier grade. The total length of the system was 3[±]/₂ miles.

One of the most unusual features of the system was that the two terminals of the main line were only half a mile apart although the line was $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles in length. This was because one terminal was at the bottom of the hill and the other was at the top. The direct climb up the hill was so steep that most folks preferred to take the round-about route by trolley. The entire system was single-tracked with 3 passing switches. Track was placed near the curb at one side of the streets, because they were too narrow for center tracks.

The Citizens Electric Railway [probably the successor of the E.L.S. Ry.] which operated from 1904 to 1923, owned 12 cars 5 of which were 1-man closed; 6 were 2-man open; 1 was a work car which also was used as a party car. All but 2 of them were originally mule cars purchased second-hand from Houston, Texas. The electric motors put on them were also purchased second-hand from Detroit Street Railways. In 1904 two new summer cars were obtained from St. Louis Car Company. The color scheme was red with white numerals and trim.

IN 1923 THE CITIZENS ELECTRIC RAILWAY CEASED OPERATION. THE CARS WERE SOLD AND THE TRACKS TAKEN UP AND JUNKED. I UND-ERSTAND THAT MULES WERE USED TO ASSIST THE ELECTRIC CARS UP THE STEEPEST HILLS AT TIMES. THE CITIZENS LINE ALSO USED PAPER TICKETS, SELLING AT 6/25. THE ELS TOKENS MUST HAVE BEEN USED PRIOR TO 1904.

A LETTER FROM MR. ATKINS

DEAR FELLOW A.V.A. MEMBERS:

All too frequently of late, we see the announcement of the passing of another member, which makes one realize that a great many of us A.V.A. members are in the middle years or older. All of which is to say that, in the case of a great many of our wives, few have any idea of the value attached to our collections, and fewer still have any idea of how to dispose of a collection.

This, of course, does not include the many women members of our hobby, nor any of the well known husband-wife collecting , teams.

Speaking for myself, and I know many other collector friends feel the same way, I would like my collection, however broken up, auctioned, or otherwise disposed of, to stay in the A.V.A., or at least with other collectors. Since, as I've said before, so few wives know very much about their husbands' collections, I wonder if the following idea might be worth some discussion among members, and possibly at the next Convention.

NAMELY: THE FORMATION OF AN IMPARTIAL COMMITTEE OF OLDER, POSSIBLY CHARTER MEMBERS, WITH A CHAIRMAN, TO ACT <u>when Asked</u> BY A WIDOW OR OTHER NEXT OF KIN OF A DECEASED MEMBER, FOR AS-SISTANCE, TO ARRANGE THE DISPOSAL OF HIS COLLECTION IN WHATEVER WAY THEY THINK BEST--AUCTION BIDS, ETC., SO AS TO SEE THAT THE WIDOW WILL REALIZE THE FAIREST PRICE ON THE COLLECTION, ESPEC-IALLY ON ANY RARE ITEMS INCLUDED IN THE COLLECTION WHICH, WHEN THE VALUE IS NOT KNOWN, MIGHT OTHERWISE GO FOR A VERY SMALL SUM.

This is only a very rough idea of what I have had in mind, but I should be interested to hear what any other members think on the matter, and whether it might be an item to be included for discussion at the next A.V.A. Convention.

It was also my thought that if a committee was formed, that a small note might be left with the individual's collection or with his copy of the Catalogue, instructing that the chairman of this committee was to be contacted and how to do it, in the event the collection was to be disposed of.

The Lexington token was issued about March 1 of this year as the result of a fare increase to 20c cash or 2 tokens for 35c. Lexington Railway System was sold to Lexington Transit Corp. about November, 1956. The company had been on a fare of 15c straight for about five years, so with a new company and a new token rate, the finally changed to a new token, one of a different size for adults.

The new owners of the transit system in Washington, D.C., took over on August 15, 1956, but continued to use the same old tokens. However, after the fare increase of March 11, 1960, when the rate went to 25c or 5 for \$1, there weren't enough tokens on hand, so they had to order new ones. Naturally, the newly-ordered tokens were struck with the new name of the company. Since they look just like the older tokens I imagine that they are both now good for fare. Until now there wasn't enough difference between the cash rate and the token rate to get people to use tokens. But under the new rate, there is a big saving with tokens, so a lot more of them are being bought by the public.

NEW SUPERMARKET TAXI TOKENS

The Veteran's Cab Company of Quincy, Mass., has issued three varieties of large brass tokens which are given out by 3 local supermarkets to customers. The tokens are good for a ride on a Veterans Cab. Their use is similar to that of the Supreme Taxi tokens. However, because these new tokens do not say anything about transportation on them, (they are inscribed with the name of the market), some collectors may not be interested in them. In any case, they are very difficult to obtain at the moment. -April 1960-

ROSELINSKY MADE A MOTION THAT A LIST OF ALL MEMBERS OF THE LOCAL CLUB, TOGETHER WITH THEIR HOME ADDRESSES AND PHONE NUMBERS, BE FURNISHED ALL THE MEMBERS. MOTION WAS CARRIED AND MR. MILLER AGREED TO DRAW UP THE LIST. A SALE AND EXCHANGE OF TOKENS TOOK PLACE FOR THE BALANCE OF THE MEETING. WHICH ADJOURNED AT 3:30 P.M.

THE MORIAH PLANK ROAD

Two classic rarities are NY 595 A & B, the unique vulcanite tokens used on the Moriah, N.Y., plank road. A history of that area, published in 1931, informs us that this private road was mainly used to carry ore from a mine to the docks. It went over a steep hill, and the planks (4-inch hemlock, 8-10 feet in length, each) were constantly coming loose. The book goes on to say: "The road, for many years, went thru Moriah Corners, but nearly 70 years ago (i.e., about 1860) the dugway road was built from Mill Brook, as it was then called, to the lower toll gate. This eliminated the heavy grade on the road to "The Corners," so much larger loads were drawn. There were two toll gates on the road and the toll was paid with 'Moriah Plank Road Tokens' which were like an old-fashioned copper cent. A few of these are still in existence, and are much prized by collectors.

INASMUCH AS THE ONLY MORIAH TOKENS WE KNOW ABOUT ARE MADE OF VULCANITE, THE ABOVE REFERENCE TO TOKENS "LIKE AN OLD FASH-IONED COPPER CENT" SEEMS TO INDICATE THAT THERE WERE OTHER, OLDER, TOKENS ISSUED. I AM INVESTIGATING THIS POSSIBILITY. Some of the people whom I have contacted in Moriah seem to be-LIEVE THEY CAN LOCATE A TOKEN OR TWO.

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

GLENDALE: FIRST TYPE, PROBABLY A, INTRODUCED JAN. 12, 1941, WHEN GLENDALE CITY LINES TOOK OVER FROM PACIFIC ELECTRIC. Replaced tickets used by PE. Originally sold and honored by PE for joint fares. (Los Angeles tokens sold and honored by Glendale City Lines for joint fares with PE, Metropolitan Coach Lines, and L.A. Metropolitan Transit Authority, since Jan. 24, 1952, but Glendale tokens not good on these other Lines except that they were accepted as other foreign tokens when Glendale token rate is same as, or higher than, that in Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES. CALIF 450 C. INTRODUCED OCT. 21, 1928, with increase of fare from 5¢ to 7¢. First sold at 4/25. Withdrawn from use several times after introduction of 450 J, when supply of 450 J (and later 450 H) permitted.

CALIF 450 G: DATE OF INTRODUCTION UNKNOWN, BUT MAY HAVE BEEN DEC. 15, 1943. DISCONTINUED FEB. 1, 1948, WHEN FARE ZONES AND STRUCTURE WERE REVISED TO COINCIDE WITH THOSE OF LOS ANGELES TRANSIT LINES (EXCEPT ONLY LATL HAD TOKEN FARES).

CALIF 450 H: INTRODUCED JAN, 24, 1952.

CALIF 450 J: FIRST DELIVERY OF INITIAL ORDER (3,000,000 TOKENS) SEPT. 9, 1946. USE DISCONTINUED NOV. 21, 1948, BUT RESUMED JAN. 24, 1952, WHEN BASIC CASH FARE INCREASED FROM 10¢ TO 15¢.

Since Jan. 24, 1952, PE, L.A. Ry., and L.A. T.L. Tokens were all handled indiscriminately. Tokens since that date were used for joint intercompany fares, although this had not previously been the case.

THE NUMBERS ON THESE TO-KENS ARE PROBABLY FOR THE DIFFERENT GATES USED TO ENTER OR LEAVE THE ROAD, SO IT IS LIKELY MORE VARIETIES WILL TURN UP IN THE FUTURE. THESE TOKENS ARE THE OLDEST U.S. TRANSPORTATION TOKENS, HAVING BEEN USED IN THE 1790'S.

Next some Canadian tokens. More and more companies up there seem to be using tokens instead of tickets. At one time almost all Canadian companies seemed to be using tickets, but as they acquire new fare boxes that register tokens, they are putting tokens into use. The 16mm token is for adult fare, and the 22mm one is for student fare. Two listings of obverses are necessary because, although they look alike at a glance, the word PRES. Appears on the larger token but not on the small one. These tokens were first used April 6, 1960. I have the name C.E. Senecal from a transportation directory; without this I doubt if I could have made it out. Shawinigan Falls does not have a token rate, but had some made up for a convenience rate for institutions and firms who give transportation to employees while traveling for such firms.

I HAVE A COUPLE ISSUES WHICH HAVE BEEN PENDING FOR SEVER-AL WEEKS. THE COMPANIES IN QUESTION AT THIS TIME DO NOT WANT TO PART WITH 100 OR SO TOKENS FOR THE NEW ISSUES SERVICE. ONE FIRM WANTS TO SEE HOW MANY TOKENS ARE ACTUALLY NEEDED TO KEEP DRIVERS SUPPLIED, SO POSSIBLY WE'LL GET SOME EVEN IN ONE OF OUR MEMBERS HAS TO OBTAIN THEM A FEW AT A TIME. ANOTHER FIRM WANTS TO GO OFF TOKENS, AND IF THEY DO, THEN WE'LL BE ABLE TO GET THEM FROM THE COMPANY. STILL ANOTHER IS A GOVERNMENT TOKEN WHICH INVOLVES A LOT OF RED TAPE TO GET. WHEN WE LIST TOKENS Before we get a supply for the $N_{\bullet}I_{\bullet}S_{\bullet,\bullet}$ they get a flood of in-DIVIDUAL REQUESTS FROM COLLECTORS, AND THEN FLATLY REFUSE TO LET ANY OF US GET THEM. THIS HAPPENED BEFORE. SOMETIMES THE COMPANY ONLY ORDERS 1,000 TOKENS, AND TOO MANY REQUESTS MESS UP THE WORKS, SO WE THINK IT'S BETTER TO HOLD UP SOME LISTINGS TILL WE THINK WE'VE EXHAUSTED OUR ATTEMPTS AT GETTING THEM FOR ALL MEMBERS OF THE N.I.S.

LAST MONTH I FORGOT TO GIVE CREDIT TO JOHN NICOLOSI FOR REPORTING THE LEXINGTON TOKEN, AND TO JULIUS SHERR FOR THE NEW TOKEN FROM WASHINGTON, D.C.





THE STAR AND CRESCENT FERRY CO.

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While on a token hunt a few weeks ago I made a visit to THE STAR & CRESCENT FERRY COMPANY OFFICE. I WAS HOPING TO OB-TAIN A SPECIMEN OF THE OLD STAR & CRESCENT BOAT TOKENS (CALIF 745 C D E F) BUT HAD NO LUCK. I DID OBTAIN SOME INTERESTING INFORMATION ON CALIF 745 G AND Q. IN ABOUT APRIL, 1958, WHEN STAR & CRESCENT FERRY CO. RECEIVED APPROVAL FOR A FARE RAISE, PEOPLE BEGAN HOARDING THE OLD TOKENS TO SUCH A DEGREE THAT THE COMPANY BEGAN TO RUN SHORT OF THEM. THE COMPANY THEN ADVER-TISED THAT A CHANGE OF SIZE WOULD ACCOMPANY THE FARE HIKE, AND THAT THE OLD TOKENS WOULD BE REDEEMED AT THE OLD RATE. A LARGE PERCENTAGE OF THE TOKENS WERE THEN TURNED IN, AND THE COMPANY THEN PREPARED THEM BY REAMING ABOUT ONE-HALF OF A MILLIMETRE OFF OF THE DIAMETER, AND PLATING THEM WITH BRONZE. AFTER THE FARE RAISE THE OLD TOKENS COULD NOT BE USED IN THE MODIFIED TURNSTILES. IF THIS HAD NOT BEEN DONE THE COMPANY WOULD HAVE LOST A GOOD DEAL OF MONEY IN CONNECTION WITH THE FARE HIKE. A close examination of the 2 tokens, Calif 745 G and Q, will SHOW UP THE SLIGHT DIFFERENCE IN DIAMETERS. AFTER THE REAMING PROCESS EACH TOKEN HAD A SHARP EDGE ON IT. THIS WAS REMOVED BY TUMBLING HUNDREDS OF TOKENS TOGETHER FOR A PERIOD OF TIME. AF-TER THE PLATED TOKENS HAD BEEN USE FOR LESS THAN A YEAR, THEY WERE DISCONTINUED AND A STRAIGHT DIME FARE WAS INTRODUCED.

FOR THE PRESENT, THEY DON'T WANT TO GIVE UP ANY OF THE FRONTENAC TOKENS, BUT IF TOKENS ARE DISCONTINUED THEN POSSIBLY WE CAN GET ENOUGH FOR THE NEW ISSUES Service. Also, if this token rate is still kept, maybe more TOKENS CAN BE OBTAINED ALSO, IF THEY HAVE TO RE-ORDER. FOR THE PRESENT, THE ONLY TOKEN WE CAN GET FOR THE N.I.S. IS THE ALUM-INUM ONE. THE WORST PART OF IT IS THAT HAROLD FORD AND I WERE IN KANSAS CITY LAST DECEMBER, AND WOULD HAVE MADE A SPECIAL TRIP TO PITTSBURG HAD WE KNOWN ABOUT THE TOKENS. BEING OF ODD SIZES, NONE OF THEM CAME THROUGH OTHER FARE BOXES, SO WE HAD NO WAY OF KNOWING ABOUT THEM.

Next we have another token used by Antietam Transit of HAGERSTOWN. IN MAY, 1958, WHEN WE LISTED THEIR OTHER TOKEN, WE WERE TOLD THAT TICKETS WERE BEING USED FOR SCHOOL FARES. So when they changed to tokens again for school fares recently WE DIDN'T KNOW THAT IT 'MEANT TOKENS. HOWEVER, EMZY THOMPSON ON A VISIT THERE NOTED THE NEW TOKEN AND OBTAINED A SUPPLY FOR THE N.I.S. (SEE NOTES ON THIS COMPANY PAGE 40 MAY 1958 F.B.)

ST. LEONARD, P.Q., IS NOT TOO FAR FROM MONTREAL. ENRG. IS AN ABBREVIATION FOR "ENREGISTRER," FRENCH FOR "COMPANY. THIS COMPANY HAD WHITE METAL TOKENS MADE; WHEN THE SUPPLY RAN LOW THEY ORDERED MORE, THIS TIME IN BRASS WHICH IS CHEAPER THAN WHITE METAL. BRASS TOKENS ARE IN GENERAL USE AND WE GOT SOME FOR THE N. I.S., BUT THE OWNER AT PRESENT TIME WON'T PART WITH ANY OF THE WHITE METAL TOKENS FOR US. HOWEVER, IF THE OPPORTUNITY SHOULD ARISE THAT THE OWNER WILL PART WITH THEM, MR. CASSIDY WILL OBTAIN THEM FOR THE N.I.S. MR. CASSIDY ALSO SAYS THE TORONTO SUBWAY IS BACK ON TOKENS AT A CONVENIENCE RATE TORONTO FIRST USED THE ALUM. TOKENS MARCH 30, 1954; LATER RED-ENAMELED THEM FOR A FARE HIKE; THEN CLEANED OFF THE ENAMEL, OR ISSUED NEW PLAIN ONES; NOW THEY'RE BACK TO THE ENAMELED ONES AGAIN. MR. CASSIDY ALSO SAYS THAT ON SOME OF THE GREENFIELD PARK TOKENS THEY SPELLED THE NAME "CHAMELY" (E INSTEAD OF B). THE ERROR OCCURS ON BOTH SIDES ON SOME; ON 1 SIDE ONLY ON SOME.



A LETTER FROM MR. SCHWARTZ

Dear Fellow A.V.A. Members:

In the April 1960 issue of The Fare Box there was published a letter from our fellow member, Richard K. Atkins, in which he directed our thoughts to the ultimate disposition of our respective collections in the event of our passing. There is no question in my mind that this is a problem that we are each faced with and that it should be solved by each of us during his or her life. I feel, however, that the solution proposed by Mr. Atkins is not the proper one under the circumstances.

It goes without saying that each of us should make proper testamentary disposition of his estate by making a Will, because in this way, your estate will go in the manner directed by you, rather than as set forth in the laws of your state if you die intestate. In making such a Will, you designate as executor that person or persons in whom you have confidence that they will carry out your wishes. You do not ask the A.V.A. to appoint a committee to carry out your Will.

Similarly, you should leave a letter of instruction to your widow or children that they should ask the help of a collector or collectors in who you have confidence and not that of a committee designated by someone else.

In our contacts with other collectors through the course of years we have each made up our minds as to who may be worthy of confidence and who has sufficient experience to be of help under the circumstances. It is such a person or persons that we should suggest in this letter of instructions rather than those who may by happenstance be designated as a committee for such purpose, because in such designation, you individually have had no choice.

In all sincerity, I saw to you that I have made a Will and that I have left such a letter of instructions which is kept in the same place as my Will. Should my feelings about the people I have named in the letter of instructions change, it is a simple matter for me to rewrite this letter of instructions without in any way changing the terms of my Will.

It has always been my prime objective to have the A.V.A. perform functions for our mutual benefit. This particular point under discussion, however, is not a joint effort for the benefit of all concerned, but for the private benefit of each of us and I therefore feel that the designee should not be named by the A.V.A.

NOTES BY RALPH FREIBERG

This month we have a longer list than usual. Some of the Manufacturer's Samples and Patterns are being listed after discussing them with other collectors.

Mort Dawson acquired information on Unidentified #41 and 71 which indicated they were from Kentucky. At the same time, Mr. Pollack re-ported a token from the same area. Rather than list tokens as being from definite cities immediately, I always try to obtain corroborative information first. One reason for this was the rush listing of Md 60 Just prior to the 1958 Catalogue, this token was reported to me, 0. and I immediately listed it under Baltimore on the assumption that it must have been issued by the same company that issued Md 60 N. However, it now appears that this token is not from Baltimore at all, and I should have listed it as a Maverick until more information was at hand. It may be some time before we learn its real origin. Consequently, hereafter unless we know for sure the origin of a token, we shall hold up the listing till more information is available. We did this with the Cold Spring, Ky., token, and the information we now have was well worth waiting for. Mr. Coffee wrote the Postmaster there and learned that the company was operated by a Mr. Paul Schwerling, between 1929 and 1935. It ran from the southernmost part of Cold Spring to the end of the Fort Thomas streetcar line. Round trip tokens sold at 15%. In 1935 the company sold out to the Cincinnati, Newport & Covington Transportation Co.

As for the Ludlow token, fares were adopted by the Ludlow Council on February 6, 1937. City fares in Ludlow were 5¢, but a token or 8¢ cash was to be collected from Bromley or Covington passengers when they left the bus in Cincinnati. So this token was used in 1937.

The Dayton, Ky., token was listed under Mavericks, as it didn't make sense to list it from Dayton, O. Since then we found out that there is a Dayton in Kentucky, and the 7½ fare between Dayton, Ky., and Cincinnati, O., makes sense. We still don't know what N.K.T. stands for, bus guess it would be Northern Kentucky Transit.

The Green Line, or Cincinnati, Newport & Covington, took over these bus lines in the late 1930's. Besides the 3 companies and cities mentioned above, now served by Green Line, the company in Fort Thomas, Ky., was taken over by them in 1939. Dixie Traction of Erlanger was also a part of the Green Line...so now all these lines are a part of the C.N. & C.

Mr. and Mrs. Black tried to obtain some of these old tokens, but were unable to do so. However they did find the new 23mm token used -July 1960by the Green Line with the new name of the company on it. This token is used as a school fare. Perhaps later they may come up with a new 16mm token, with the new name on it, so anyone picking up tokens for the Green Line should watch out for it.

The Waterbury, Conn., token was reported a couple of months ago by Mr. Schwartz. However, up to the present time the company is very uncooperative in selling us tokens. Mr. Dawson has gone over several times buying a few tokens at a time (they won't sell them in quantity). At the rate we are going it might be a year before we're able to get enough for the New Issues Service. However, Mr. Nicolosi will try to get enough of them for the N.I.S.

The GSA token from Denver is another one that we've been unable to do anything with. It is used in a motor pool in a kind of taxi service from the Federal Center to downtown Denver. It took us a little while to break the red tape when we listed the GSA token from Washington, D.C. So possibly we may also be able to do the same with this Denver token, eventually. Mr. Frisbee will try to get us a supply for the N.I.S.

Emzy Thompson had reported the Jacksonville token some time ago, and claims it was used in 1947 or thereabouts for fare from Jacksonville to Camp Blanding. Supposedly the plain one was used one way, and the gun-metal plated one for the return trip.

In June, 1959, I noted a raise in fares for Davenport, Ia., and figured that they might have a new token. However, when I sent to them, they sent me a token from Moline, Ill., for my 20¢. Maybe I was just too soon, because sometime later they got their own tokens for Davenport (both companies under the same ownership). In obtaining a supply of the new token for the N.I.S., Mr. Nicolosi learned that they first sold at 6/\$1 but since have gone up to 6/\$1.05. A coin dealer has been advertising these tokens, and Mr. Mazeau mentioned this to Mr. Nicolosi. Since then a couple other collectors have noted this dealer's ad and mentioned it to us.

On June 4, 1960, the company in Wichita, Kans., was taken over by some of the people who operate the M.K. & O. Transit of Tulsa. A friend of Mr. Schwartz notified him of a new token being used. In sending to the company for these tokens, Mr. Nicolosi also learned that they had a new student token. Tokens of Wichita Transportation, the former company, should all be obsolete. However, this company also operates in Lawrence and so some of the 16mm tokens, Kans 970 D E F--which have been used also in Lawrence--may still be in use there. The M K & O, after starting operations in Tulsa, have never had a token rate there to my knowledge. But they may get one.

On page 50 of the June, 1959, Fare Box we had an article about the Wood County Bridge, and in reporting this new discovery from Wisconsin Rapids, Mr. DiMichael mentions that there may well also be tokens in 3¢ and 5¢ denominations waiting to be found.

The tokens we have listed as Patterns do not carry any price. In nearly all cases, there never were enough of any pattern token to rate a regular listing, and as they were never sold (used as fare) there is no price on them. However, in the next edition of the Catalogue there will be prices listed for Zone Checks. These can be obtained sometimes, by paying another fare and claiming the zone check was lost. So these zone checks will probably be priced at the zone fare if it is known.

Recently I paid a visit to the Seattle Club. The City of Seattle will have an International Exposition in 1962, and the Seattle boys are hoping to have the 1962 Convention of the A.V.A. held in Seattle. There will be a Monorail system operating in Seattle by then, from -July 1960downtown out to the Exposition Grounds, about one mile. At present it is expected that it will be similar to the one in Disneyland. It would be very appropriate if they would issue a special Monorail token, but we'll have to wait and see about that.

While in Seattle I went on a few side trips. One was over to Bremerton to see the bridge the last token was used on. However, since the token was issued it is now also being used on the Manette Bridge in Bremerton, at the same toll rate. Interestingly enough, the picture on this token is not of the bridge it is used on, but it is a picture of the Tacoma Narrows Bridge (which doesn't use tokens).

If I can get the time off, I plan to take a three or four week vacation trip, including the Austin Convention. Since I won't be back before August 15, the next Fare Box will be a little late, probably mailed out from Boston after John Coffee gets back there. I do not know how many of you plan to attend the Austin Convention, but if any quick answers are required, just write me in care of Eroy Kimmons at Austin. Incidentally, I haven't heard of any group that will bid for the 1961 Convention. So if you'd like to have it for your city, be sure to write in. Seattle wants it for 1962, but 1961 is open.

The other token Mr. Guernsey reported is a bronze 30mm token, pierced. It says Mt. Hood Skyway with a picture of a car or bus being hauled up on a cable. However, one side of it says "Lucky Coin" so it may be merely an advertising piece or souvenir of the first run on February 3, 1951. Perhaps someone can fill us in on more details.



THE FRASER TUNNEL TOKEN OF COLORADO

One of our most active members in the old days was Edgar Levy, of Colorado Springs, Colo. Ed sold out his collection several years ago in the most talked-about token auction ever held. It's always a pleasure to hear from him, and recently he wrote your Editor, and among other things asked me to pass on to our readers the following information about that intriguing and very rare token, Colo 380 A.

The token was used on an auto bus in the summer, and a horse-drawn sled in the winter...from November 1924 to March 1927. It ran from Fraser to the West Portal of the tunnel, a distance of 5¹/₂ miles. About 12 to 18 passengers were carried each trip. The owner adds: "Our sled had a huge stove inside to keep us warm, as we had to travel often in 40 to 50 below Zero weather. After a heavy snow we had 4 horses, otherwise 2, and we always got there although sometimes late when we had unusually bad weather. We made 3 round trips daily in order to meet each change of shift." -August 1960-

Meeting at the Stephen F. Austin Hotel at Austin, Texas, the meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m., August 6, 1960. In the absence of regular officers, Mr. Eroy L. Kimmons presided, assisted by R.K. Frisbee. Edward M. Cutler was appointed to act as Convention Secretary. There was a moment of silent prayer for our departed members. The greeting speech to members was made by Mr. Bertram of Austin.

Members present were: Freiberg, Nicolosi, Barnett, Frisbee, Cutler, Clymer, Irwin, Mullin, Bertram, Kimmons, and Crockett.

Minutes of the 1959 Convention were approved as printed in The Fare Box. Ralph Freiberg and J.C. Clymer were appointed to ASSIST MR. BERTRAM IN COUNTING THE BALLOTS. A MEMO FROM KEN-NETH SMITH PERTAINING TO ADVICE AND DISPOSAL OF A COLLECTION OF ANY DECEASED MEMBER WAS APPROVED BY MEMBERS AT THE CONVENTION provided that it also be approved by A.C.T.T.C. members, GREE-TINGS TO THE CONVENTION WERE READ FROM PRESIDENT EISENBERG, Vice-President Atwood, Bob Butler of the Minneapolis Club, And OTHER MEMBERS. THERE WAS QUITE A BIT OF DISCUSSION ON ARTICLES HELD BY THE CURATOR. IT WAS MOVED AND SECONDED THAT THE PRESS IDENT OF THE A. V.A. SHOULD BE GIVEN AN INVENTORY LIST OF ALL ARTICLES HELD BY THE CURATOR OR OTHER PROPERTY OF A.V.A. No -ION CARRIED. THE TREASURER'S REPORT WAS READ BY MR. FRISEEE. THE ANNUAL REPORT ON THE FARE BOX BY MR. COFFEE, THE EDITOR, COVERING FINANCIAL STATEMENT WAS AUDITED BY THE AUDITING COM-MITTEE AND APPROVED. (AUDITING COMMITTEE: IRWIN & BARNETT) A LENGTHY REPORT BY MR. COFFEE ON THE SALE OF CATALOGUES WAS APPROVED AS READ, AND AS AMENDED BY THE TREASURER.

MR. COFFEE ALSO SUGGESTED THAT CONSIDERATION BE GIVEN TO THE POSSIBILITY OF IMPROVING THE APPEARANCE OF THE OFFICIAL A.V.A. SEAL, BY REPLACING THE LETTERS "AVA" IN THE CENTER WITH A PICTURE OF A HORSECAR, BECAUSE MANY PEOPLE CONFUSE "AVA" IN OUR SEAL WITH "AA" WHICH ARE THE INITIALS OF ALCOHOLICS ANONY-MOUS. AFTER MUCH DISCUSSION IT WAS MOVED AND SECONDED THAT THE INSIGNIA DESIGN BE CHANGED. THERE WERE SUGGESTIONS THAT SINCE THE MASTHEAD OF THE FARE BOX ALREADY HAS A PICTURE OF A HORSE CAR THAT PERHAPS A STREETCAR & BUS WOULD BE MORE APPROPRIATE. THE EDITOR IS TO CONTACT VARIOUS PEOPLE AND PLACES AND REPORT TO THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Meeting recessed at 11:30 A.M. for Lunch. Meeting resumed at 12:15 p.m.

The Election Committee reported the results of the palloring for A.V.A. officers, as follows: (142 votes cast). For President: <u>F. GORDON SMITH 85</u>; <u>WILLIAM E. EISENBERG 57</u>. Atwood and Frisbee each received 131 votes; DiMichael and Miller each received 132 votes. 10 ballots voted only for President. Rasults certified by Freiberg, Clymer, and Bertram (chairman), So F. Gordon Smith is the new President of the A.V.A., and MR. Eisenberg replaces Mr. Kimmons on the Executive Board as the Immediate Past President.

CONVENTION BE HELD AT MINNEAPOLIS, MINN., THE FIRST WEEKEND IN AUGUST. THE CONVENTION ADJOURNED AT 1:00 P.M.

"You were right in presuming the W.L. Gage hack line was 50 or 60 years old if not older. 'Dad' Gage no relation of mine started with cabs entrance on each side capacity about 4 driver up high in front. Then he bought hacks with rear entrance seats on each side 5 passengers to side, glassed in windows raise & lower according to weather. Had two of this kind one for traveling men, and one for town trade. Then he bought an auto buss on the principal of horse drawn busses, only very high. Driver up-set it and Gage got rid of it and went back to the 2-horse-drawn cab. One time there were 12 passenger trains in and out of Logan, Ohio. Now there are none. I drove hack for Dad Gage after school was out in summer until fall 1909-1910. Enclosed one of his tokens. I don't think you will be able to get many of them."

FROM ANOTHER PARTY IN LOGAN I LEARNED THAT THE FARE WAS 15¢ one way or 25¢ round trip, each piece of baggage 15¢ extra. The hacks were very similar to old stage coaches.

I had little luck in finding the 25¢ tokens, but did get a few of the 12k¢ one. The 25¢ tokens are very rare and it is doubtful if any more of these will ever show up. With only one of the aluminum, and two of the brass 25¢ tokens known, these must be classed among the rarest of transportation tokens.

The first ferry ever to operate in St. Francisville was in 1804. IT WAS ABOUT A HALF MILE UPSTREAM FROM THE PRESENT FERRY THE GILLISPIE FERRY STARTED IN THE 1870'S. AROUND 1914 SITE. GILLISPIE BOUGHT THE OLD FERRY AND DID AWAY WITH IT IN ORDER TO THROW ALL THE BUSINESS TO THE ONE FERRY, OPERATED BY HIM. The FIRST TOKENS TO BE USED WERE STRUCK ABOUT 1905. THE 25¢ TOKENS WERE GIVEN OUT BY THE ELEVATOR TO FARMERS ACROSS THE RIVER AT HARVEST TIME, AS A CREDIT SO THEY COULD BRING THEIR GRAIN AC-ROSS. THE FERRY NEVER ISSUED THE 25¢ TOKENS--IT ACCEPTED THEM FROM THE FARMERS FOR A ROUND TRIP, AND THEN THE ELEVATOR WOULD REDEEM THEM FROM THE FERRY. THE 12 ot tokens were put out by MR. GILLISPIE TO MAKE CHANGE. THE ROUND TRIP WAS 25¢, AND IF ANYONE WASN'T RETURNING THE SAME DAY, OR WAS RETURNING AT ANO-THER FERRY, THEN HE WOULD BE GIVEN ONE OF THE 12 d TOKENS.

I was very anxious to try to find out if there ever was an aluminum $12\frac{1}{2}$ token used. From the best information I could gather, there was not. The first token to be used was the 25¢ aluminum. This token was unsatisfactory with the men at the ferry because it was hard to handle, and too many were lost. It was only used a short time, and then the brass ones were made. The aluminum tokens were then all destroyed. From what I could gather, the $12\frac{1}{2}$ tokens were made at the same time the brass 25¢ ones were put into use. There haven't been any to-kens used since around 1920.

COLORADO RAILROAD PASS SELLS FOR \$102 AT AUCTION

At a coin collectors' auction this summer, one of the rare Otto Mears railroad passes in silver was up for sale (see page 30 of Atwood's Catalogue). Several Seattle collectors put in bids of \$100, but the pass was knocked down to an unknown buyer for \$102.00. The dealer who executed the bid stated afterward that this buyer had been prepared to pay \$300 if necessary. These passes are in a special category, of course, and such a high price should in no way be considered as indicative of the values of regular transportation tokens. However, even fome celluloids have been going for \$25 to \$30 each of late.

NOTES BY RALPH FREIBERG

We are late this month because we attended the Austin Convention. Traveled by auto with John Nicolosi and covered 5,400 miles. As far as finding any tokens it was a waste of time, but we enjoyed meeting those collectors who attended the convention, and saw a lot of the State of Texas, which covers a huge area. Next year we hope to attend the one in Minneapolis, and in 1962 in Seattle. So perhaps at one of these two I can meet other collectors whom I still haven't got to know.

For this month's listings we have another of the Housatonic RR tokens from Connecticut. As this is the 4th one of these that have turned up, we believe there might be at least 8 others from the other sections. We know there were at least 12 sections.

Next a token from Lincoln, Nebr. This one makes my face red because I visited there last December and rode on buses of Lincoln City Lines, and even asked about tokens, but no one mentioned anything about a different line using tokens. I even went through what foreign tokens the Lincoln City Lines had on hand and didn't note any of the GTL ones. As the city fare on Lincoln City Lines is 15¢ and the fare on General Transit is 25¢, I figure the latter must be a suburban line. We have the tokens for New Issues Service, but still no information on just where the token is used. It was first used September 19, 1958, at 5/\$1 but since then has gone up to 4/\$1.

Next two depotel tokens from Ohio. Elsewhere in this issue Mr. Coffee has an article about the Logan one. Harold Ford picked up two of the Manchester ones, which are die varieties, but one of them is in poor condition. One is square; the other May have been square cut down to octagon shape, or may have been octagonal in the first place. We hope someday to pick up another of the latter so that we can be more certain about it. The token was used from about 1892 to 1910. E.F.W. Erderink operated the line which ran from Manchester across the Ohio River via a ferry to the C. & O. Ry. depot in South Manchester, Ky. It was a 2-horse-drawn bus and today neither the ferry nor the depot exists. These tokens have the manufacturer's name on them but it is very hard to make out so rather than try we just listed it as "manufacturer's name."

Next a new one from Hazleton by Carbon County Motor Transit Co. This was one of the 4 companies who took over parts of the runs of the former Hazleton Auto Bus Co. This token was first used Nov. 19, 1959, at 2/25. We have run into difficulty in getting them for the N.I.S. A check sent them by Mr. Nicolosi has been neither cashed nor returned. If and when they send the tokens, they will be distributed as usual by N.I.S.

MR. COFFEE LEARNED ABOUT THE NEW TACOMA SCHOOL TOKEN FROM GEORGE GOULD AT A MEETING OF THE SEATTLE TRANSPORTATION TOKEN CLUB. AFTER SEVERAL VISITS TO THE BUS COMPANY AND THE SCHOOL BOARD IN TACOMA, MR. COFFEE OBTAINED 100 OF THEM FOR THE N.I.S. AND REPORTED THE TOKEN TO US. THIS NEW TOKEN GOES INTO USE ON

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September 7, 1960, to replace paper tickets formerly used. The "School District #10" includes all of Tacoma. The tokens are the property of the School Board, and are given out free to school children who live over 2 miles from their school $(1\frac{1}{2})$ miles in the case of grade school). They are good for a $12\frac{1}{2}$ school fare, and the Tacoma Transit Co. turns them in to the school board, which reimburses the Transit Company $12\frac{1}{2}$ each. In order to use them, the kids have to show an identification card. There were 75,000 struck. This may be the first of a new trend, so possibly in the future other tokens of this nature will appear.

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See an article elsewhere in this issue about the Marshfield, Wisc., depotel token.

Speaking of depotels: A lot of these are turning up now, but never in large quantities. They continue to be very rare. The tokens were usually used by traveling salesmen ("drummers") and very few of the ordinary citizens of the town ever saw the tokens or used them. So often asking questions around town doesn't do any good. The tokens were used on the hack that carried the drummers from the depot to the hotel, which was usually five or six blocks away. The tokens were often used as inducements to the drummers so they would stay at hotels, and were given free transportation from hotels to depots, or viceversa. Usually the vehicle was horse-drawn. Nearly every depotel token dates from before World War I. So size up a town and see how far the depot was from the hotel, and then start asking questions.

THE MARSHFIELD DEPOTEL TOKEN

MORT DAWSON DISCOVERED THIS TOKEN, AND WAS VERY FORTUNATE IN UNCOVERING A FEW OF THEM. USUALLY, WHEN A COLLECTOR DIGS UP A DEPOTEL TOKEN HE GETS ONLY ONE, AND THAT'S THE END OF IT. BUT MORT SAYS HE HAS 5 DUPLICATES AND WOULD BE HAPPY TO SWAP THEM FOR RARE TOKENS HE NEEDS. IF INTERESTED, WRITE HIM AND LET HIM KNOW WHAT YOU HAVE TO OFFER.

The tokens themselves were used, first, on a horse-drawn hack, and later on a gasoline bus. They were used between 1900 and 1918, when the company ceased operations. The fare was 25¢ round trip from the depot to the hotel, with a token being given the passenger for the return trip back to the depot. Only 500 tokens were struck altogether.



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TRANSPOR TATION TOKENS OF BRITISH COLUMBIA BY LARRY GINGRAS

The transportation tokens of British Columbia have long been a favorite study of mine, and the tracking down of the story behind them has provided me with many pleasant hours. Although I'm sure that the tokens which have been attributed to this province were listed in good faith, I have found evidence during my research that would appear to cast some doubt as to whether or not some of these items have been placed in their proper category.

FIRST OF ALL THERE IS THE RECENTLY-LISTED UNION JACK MOT-ORS TOKEN. IT IS TRUE THAT THIS FIRM DID EXIST IN VANCOUVER. BUT THEY WERE A FLY-BY-NIGHT OUTFIT, CONTINUALLY MOVING FROM ONE OFFICE LOCATION TO ANOTHER DURING THE FEW MONTHS THEY WERE IN BUSINESS DURING 1917. I HAVE BEFORE ME "THE OBJECTS FOR WHICH THIS COMPANY HAS BEEN INCORPORATED," AND WHILE YOU MIGHT INTERPRET ONE PARAGRAPH AS MEANING THAT THEY INTENDED TO, OR HAD AUTHORITY TO, TRANSPORT FREIGHT AND PASSENGERS, THEY STATE QUITE DEFINITELY THAT THEIR OBJECTS WERE TO BUY AND SELL MOTOR VEHICLES, ACCESSORIES, BILLS OF EXCHANCE, PROMISSORY NOTES, ETC. THIS COULD VERY WELL MEAN THAT THEY WERE IN THE NEW OR used car business. One gentleman I interviewed during my re-SEARCH HAD OFFICE SPACE AT 330 SEYMOUR STREET AT THE SAME TIME THAT UNION JACK MOTORS DID, AND HE ASSURED ME THAT THEY WERE NOT TRANSPORTING PASSENGERS OR GOODS. THE TOKEN IS BLANK ON THE REVERSE AND MAKES NO REFERENCE TO A FARE. THERE IS ABSOL-UTELY NO EVIDENCE OR INDICATION THAT THIS TOKEN WAS EVER USED OR INTENDED TO BE USED AS A FARE. THE GENERAL FEELING IS THAT IT WAS NOTHING MORE THAN AN ADVERTISING PIECE.

ANOTHER QUESTIONABLE ATTRIBUTION IS THAT OF THE NEL-TAXI TOKEN WHICH FOR SOME YEARS NOW HAS BEEN CONSIDERED AS A NELSON TOKEN. THE ONLY SPECIMEN OF THIS TOKEN TO COME TO OUR ATTEN-TION IS SAID TO HAVE BEEN IN THE COLLECTION OF THE LATE MR. Cooper of Chicago. From a survey of the gentlemen responsible FOR THE LISTING OF THE CANADIAN SERIES, IT IS QUITE EVIDENT THAT IT WAS ON MR. COOPER'S CLAIM ONLY THAT THIS TOKEN WAS AT-TRIBUTED TO NELSON. LET US EXAMINE THE OPPOSITE SIDE OF THE Ledger. Consider the phone numbers "1074 nite 216" which Ap-PEAR ON THE TOKEN. I HAVE ON FILE A LETTER FROM MR. V.C. OWEN, District Commercial and Traffic Manager for the British Colum-BIA TELEPHONE COMPANY IN NELSON. MR. OWEN HAS THIS TO SAY: "PLEASE BE ADVISED WE SHOW NO RECORD OF A WORKING SERVICE FOR THE NEL-TAXI GOING BACK AS FAR AS 1939." TELEPHONE COMPANY RE-CORDS SHOW THAT THE NUMBER 1074 WAS NOT ISSUED IN NELSON UNTIL SOME TIME LATER, AND THEN TO A PARTY LINE WHICH DOES NOT SEEM FEASIBLE FOR A TAXI. ATTEMPTS TO ASSOCIATE THE SUBSCRIBERS ON THE PARTY LINE TO A TAXI BUSINESS HAVE ALSO FAILED. YOU WILL ALSO NOTICE THAT THE WORD "NIGHT" IS SHORTENED TO "NITE," WHICH IS A MORE COMMON PRACTISE IN THE UNITED STATES THAN IN

-September 1960--PAGE 80-CANADA. THE FACT THAT THIS TOKEN IS MADE OF BRASS WOULD INDI-CATE THAT IT WAS AN EARLIER ISSUE. SINCE THE POPULATION OF Nelson is rather small, possibly we should look to a much lar-GER CITY where the number 1074 might have been in use at a TIME when brass was a more common metal for the manufacturing OF TOKENS.

During my visit to Nelson, I have had the opportunity of examining various records without finding a Nel-Taxi. I have also talked to many old timers in the transportation business, as well as others who take great pride in their knowledge of the city's history. All were quite certain that such a firm was never in business in Nelson. A search of the telephone company records for Vancouver, Victoria, New Westminster, Spow kane, and Seattle, has also failed to shed any light on the matter.

Please bear in mind that I do not wish to go on record, at this time, as suggesting that this token should definitely not be attributed to Nelson, in spite of this evidence and the fact that leading authorities seem to concur. Further research is needed.

Possibly this token should be attributed to your city, What do you know about this token or Nel-Taxi? Why did Me, Cooper believe this to be a Nelson issue? The writer would appreciate hearing from anyone with information regarding this case. However unimportant the information may seem, it will be more than welcome for it is only by placing together these bits and pieces that we shall be able to form a true picture,

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At the recent A.N.A. convention in Boston, Mr. Schwartz Learned of the existence of a new commemorative token from Philadelphia, similar to the three earlier such tokens, Pa 750 AA, AB, and AC. One such token changed hands at the convention for \$5.00, and I believe both Mac and I regretted that we had not been able to purchase it, even at that figure. Knowing how difficult it had been to obtain the earlier commemorative tokens, I was not hopeful, but I nevertheless wrote the Philadelphia Transportation Co., offering and trying to purchase one of them for my collection. I received in reply a flat turn down. They refused to part with the few remaining tokens for any price.

This past week, however, I had opportunity to travel to Philadelphia, and while there rode out to the company office. After a very long conference with the gentleman who had turned down my written request, I had better success. He informed me that the company had had 500 of the tokens struck--he showed me the bill for striking them (it cost PTC \$350)--and that of these, about 440 had been given out to prominent officials and reporters on the occasion of a special advance showing of the New subway cars. The PTC had invited these dignitaries for a first Ride on the new cars, to be followed by a luncheon. Each person present was given one of these tokens. The tokens were good for a ride anywhere on the system, and still are, although it is needless to say that none were used for that purpose.

IN ANY CASE, THE GENTLEMAN AT THE PTC HAD ABOUT 60 OF THE TOKENS LEFT. AS A RESULT OF OUR CONVERSATION, DURING WHICH I STRESSED THE HISTORICAL, EDUCATIONAL, AND PATRIOTIC ADVANTAGES OF OUR HOBBY, HE FINALLY SAID HE WOULD BE WILLING TO SELL THE REMAINING TOKENS TO COLLECTORS FOR \$1.00 APIECE PLUS POSTAGE, WHICH BARELY COVERS THE COST OF PRODUCING THEM. ON BEHALF OF MY FELLOW COLLECTORS, I THANKED HIM PROFUSELY, AND DEPARTED FULL OF THE SELF-SATISFACTION OF A JOB WELL DONE. IN ADDITION TO THE HOST, HIS WIFE AND HIS NEPHEW (PAT CAIN) THE FOLLOWING MEMBERS AND VISITORS WERE PRESENT: CORINNE & BILL BLACK. BILL CARR, HIS WIFE & DAUGHTER, THE WRITER & HIS WIFE, DUANE FEISEL, JOHN MACKIE, AND VISITOR DON TANNER. THE MEETING, ALTHOUGH A BIT UNDER IN ATTENDANCE, WAS VERY SUCCESSFUL AND ALSO A BIT UN-USUAL. This month we are listing some nice tokens and my wantlist is getting longer faster than it is getting shorter. First we have a token mentioned in the report of the Seattle Club in the August Fare Box, page 70. Then one from Itasca, Ill., which is a place I know very little about. There was a note about it on page 77 of the October 1955 Fare Box mentioning that Medinah was only a couple miles from Itasca, and that Medinah was only so-named since 1920.

AND ANOTHER ONE FROM LOUISVILLE. ALTHOUGH MR. THOMPSON IS NO LONGER AN A.V.A. MEMBER HE SOMETIMES REPORTS NEW TOKENS TO US. THIS IS ANOTHER OF THOSE COMPANIES WHICH AREN'T MUCH INTERESTED IN COOPERATING WITH COLLECTORS. I BELIEVE THIS TO-

KEN IS USED BY SUBURBAN BUS LINE, A SUBURBAN OUTFIT RUNNING FROM LOUISVILLE TO CORAL RIDGE AND FAIRDALE, KY. THE ONLY THING I CAN FIGURE IS THAT IT IS A 20¢ FARE, BUT AS FOR THE TOKEN RATE USED IN THESE PLACES, I DON'T KNOW, WE'VE BEEN TRY-ING TO GET INFORMATION ON IT FOR OVER 4 MONTHS. FOR ALL I KNOW, IT SHOULD BE LISTED FROM ONE OF THE OTHER TOWNS RATHER THAN LOUISVILLE. BUT PERHAPS AFTER THIS LISTING, SOMEONE CAN HELP OUT AND GET THE INFORMATION FOR US, AND PERHAPS EVEN SOME OF THE TOKENS FOR THE NEW ISSUES SERVICE. I BELIEVE IT IS STILL IN USE.

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There is an article elsewhere in this issue by Mr. Coffee about the new souvenir token from Philadelphia.

Some collectors keep varieties and others don't. The company at Washington, Pa., seems to change their tokens with every fare hike. Note Wash 950 J-- that is, Pa 950 J from Washington. When fares went to 4/55 they ordered new tokens, which had no diamonds on the reverse. When the fare went to 4/60, they plated their tokens (950 K). Now they have another fare hike as of September 4, 1960, and took their tokens and cleaned the plating off of them. However, as they needed more tokens, they put in a re-order, and the new batch has diamonds on the reverse. So this is one time we can say the no-diamond token was first used in September, 1956, and the diamond token was used first in September, 1960. Those that want the token with diamonds should notify John Nicolosi, as the new variety will not be sent you unless you say you want it.

Next another of the Cloudy's Ferry mavericks. It seems that these tokens were only good until a certain date (see Unidentified #67). So possibly there might be other varieties with other dates on them. However, the main problem is to find out where Cloudy's Ferry operated. So even if you have noncollecting friends, ask them if they ever heard of this outfit, which operated some 45 years ago.

Next another maverick, reported by a non-member who had purchased one of Atwood's Catalogues and said he couldn't find this token listed. Of course, it wasn't listed because we did not know about it...all of which is another good reason why we should get our catalogue into the hands of coin collectors, as they may be able to report unlisted tokens to us. This token appears to be a depotel.

MR. FEISEL REPORTED AN INTERESTING PARKING TOKEN FROM NEW CASTLE, PA. FIRST, THE MERCHANTS OF THAT TOWN HAVE SMALL ALUM-INUM TOKENS WHICH ARE GIVEN OUT WITH PURCHASES. WHEN YOU HAVE ACCUMULATED 5 OF THEM, YOU CAN EXCHANGE THOSE 5 FOR A PARKING TOKEN. HOWEVER, IF YOU WANT TO RIDE THE BUS HOME YOU CAN USE THIS TOKEN AS 5¢ TOWARD PAYMENT OF BUS FARE. HOWEVER, AS I BELIEVE THE FARE IN NEW CASTLE IS 20¢, IT WOULD THEREFORE TAKE 4 OF THESE TO PAY YOUR FARE, OR A TOKEN AND 15¢. THOSE WHO COLLECT PARKING TOKENS COULD CALL IT EITHER WAY. -September 1960-

Another interesting item is an operators receipt used by Pittsburgh Railways---a 32mm brass token used as a receipt for tokens and cash received. Possibly the number of the operator was stamped on these tokens, and when they turned their money and cash back in, they would get this token back. Although not truly a transportation token, this item is worth mentioning. Duane Feisel has picked up a couple of these and asked me to mention it.


ON MY OWN TRIP RECENTLY, WE FIRST WENT TO EL PASO, WHERE THEY'RE STILL USING 320 B AT 2/15, WHICH I BELIEVE IS LOWEST TOKEN RATE IN THE U.S. NEXT TO DEL RIO. INQUIRING ABOUT 265 A. THIS WAS USED FIRST ABOUT 1952 OR 53 WHEN SERVICE BEGAN FROM Del Rio to Laughlin Air Force Base; the bus line is now discon-TINUED, REPLACED BY A MILITARY BUS. NEXT TO BROWNSVILLE, WHERE BOTH COMPANIES ARE NOW ON A DIME FARE, OFF TOKENS OVER 2 YEARS. Next to Victoria where tokens and the bus have been obsolete FOR TWO YEARS. AT CORPUS CHRISTIE, 220 A IS STILL USED AT 7/\$1 RATE WHICH HAS BEEN IN EFFECT OVER A YEAR. THEN TO GALVESTON WHERE FARE WENT TO 20¢ OR 5/80 TWO MONTHS AGO. 360 G STILL USED, BUT H DISCONTINUED TWO YEARS AGO, ALTHOUGH THEY HAD TOK-ENS MADE WITH THE NEW NAME ON THEM FOR ADULT AND 2 FARES, THEY STILL USED 360 C AS STUDENT FARES TILL TWO YEARS BACK. THEN OVER TO PORT ARTHUR; THEY'RE OFF TOKENS, BUT AFTER I GOT HOME I LEARNED THAT THEY WENT TO 20¢ OR 2/35 BUT ARE USING TOKENS OF PADUCAH, KY. THIS FIRM IS ONE OF A GROUP THAT USES PADUCAH TOKENS WHENEVER THEY NEED TOKENS. SO FAR I KNOW THAT THESE PADUCAH TOKENS HAVE BEEN USED AT: PADUCAH, JOPLIN, TEXARKANA, AND PORT ARTHUR. FOR STUDENTS THEY HAVE A PUNCH CARD. THEN AT VERNON I LEARNED THERE IS NO BUS SERVICE AT ALL NOW. Thence TO BEAUMONT WHERE THEY ARE STILL USING 65 I AT 20¢ or 4/75. This is the only token used. At Baytown there is no more bus SERVICE. AT HOUSTON TOKENS SELL 4/85, BUT YALE STREET TRANSP. Co. HAS BEEN DISCONTINUED. AT LOCKHART WE LEARNED THAT THE OLD TOKEN WAS ACTUALLY USED ON A MULE CAR LINE IN THE EARLY 1880'S TO EARLY 1890'S. AT WACO FARE IS 20¢ OR 2/35 (950 C). AT AUS-TIN THE COMPANY IS ON STRAIGHT 15¢ FARE (NO TOKENS). FORT Worth is still on tokens, but asking for a hike. At Dallas TOKENS HAVE BEEN 4/85 SINCE DEC. 59 BUT THEY'RE ASKING FOR MORE. THEY STILL DON'T HAVE NEW TOKENS WITH THE NAME DALLAS TRANSIT Co. on them--- they're using the old Railway tokens. At Wichita FALLS IT'S 20¢, NO TOKENS. AT AMARILLO IT'S 20¢ OR 3/50, AND SCHOOL TOKENS 10¢ OR 3/25. I COVERED QUITE A FEW CITIES AND TOWNS, AND DIDN'T FIND ANY NEW TOKENS. BUT AT LEAST I PICKED UP A LOT OF INFORMATION ... AND FROM THE ABOVE YOU WILL SEE THAT MANY OF THE TOKENS WE HAVE MARKED OBSOLETE IN THE CATALOGUE ARE NOW IN USE, WHILE OTHERS ARE NOW OBSOLETE WHICH ARE LISTED AS CURRENT.

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THE STREETCAR ERA IN AUSTIN, TEXAS by ralph freiberg

THE FIRST MULE-DRAWN STREETCARS HERE WERE OPERATED BY THE AUSTIN CITY RAILROAD ON JANUARY 15, 1875. FARE WAS 5¢, NITH TOKENS SELLING AT 10 FOR 45¢, BUT WE CAN'T BE CERTAIN IF TOKENS WERE USED FROM THE FIRST DAY. IN ANY CASE, THESE ARE THE TOK-ENS LISTED AS TEXAS 50 A. TOKENS WERE USED WITH SUCH FREQUEN-CY THAT EVERY STORE IN TOWN ACCEPTED THEM AS CASH FOR PURCHASES.

ON FEBRUARY 26, 1891, AUSTIN RAPID TRANSIT RAILWAY CO. PUT ITS ELECTRIC CARS IN OPERATION, IN COMPETITION WITH THE MULE CARS OF AUSTIN CITY R.R. A FEW MONTHS LATER BOTH COMPANIES MERGED, AND THE LAST MULE CAR RAN ON OCTOBER 25, 1891. ON APRIL 7, 1900, THE DAM BROKE AND RUINED THE POWERHOUSE WHICH SUPPLIED POWER FOR THE STREETCARS. AS THE CARS WERE UNABLE TO RUN, THE MULE CARS WERE RETURNED TO SERVICE FOR ABOUT 9 MONTHS.

AUSTIN RAPID TRANSIT CO., DURING MOST OF ITS OPERATION FROM 1892 TO 1902, RAN AT A LOSS, AND A NEW COMPANY, AUSTIN ELECTRIC RAILWAY CO., WAS CHARTERED MAY 29, 1902. THE PROPER-TY OF THIS FIRM WAS, IN TURN, PURCHASED BY AUSTIN STREET RAIL-WAY, WHICH WAS CHARTERED JANUARY 3, 1911.

FROM JANUARY 15, 1875, TO JUNE 1, 1920, THE ADULT FARE WAS 5¢, BUT DURING THAT TIME THE ONLY COMPANY TO USE TOKENS WAS THE AUSTIN CITY R.R. BUT ON JUNE 1, 1920, THE ADULT FARE WENT TO 7¢ CASH OR 4 TOKENS FOR 25¢, with children's fare 3¢. It is NOT KNOWN IF 50 B OR 50 C was the first token used by AUSTIN Street Railway Co. ON JULY 5, 1929, fares went to 10¢ with tokens 7½¢ and half fare tokens at 25 for \$1. ON October 12, 1939, tokens were reduced to 6¢, which fare was still in effect on VJ day.

ON FEBRUARY 7, 1940, THERE WAS A CELEBRATION MARKING THE LAST DAY OF STREETCARS. BUSES TOOK OVER. SHORTLY THEREAFTER THE NAME OF THE COMPANY BECAME THE AUSTIN TRANSIT COMPANY. SO TOKENS 50 A B C D ARE STREETCAR TOKENS, AND TOKENS 50 E TO L ARE BUS TOKENS. IN 1955 THE COMPANY WAS SOLD AND THE NEW NAME WAS AUSTIN TRANSIT CORPORATION. FARE AT PRESENT IS 15¢ WITH NO TOKENS; IF THE FARE GOES UP, IT'S HARD TO TELL IF THEY WILL HAUL OUT THE OLD TOKENS OR ISSUE NEW ONES.

BEECH GROVE TRACTION CORP. (INDIANA 90 A B C) OPERATED FROM 1911 TO 1937, A 6-MILE LINE FROM INDIANAPOLIS TO BEECH GROVE. ITS FARE WAS 10¢ THROUGHOUT ITS HISTORY. Each month we try to list tokens which the New Issues Ser-vice is sending out, but it's hard to have The Fare Box and the -NEW ISSUES ARRIVE SIMULTANEOUSLY. SO WHEN YOU GET TOKENS FROM THE N.I.S. WAIT A FEW DAYS FOR THE REPORT IN THE FARE BOX WHEN YOU WILL ALSO RECEIVE THE NUMBERS ASSIGNED TO THEM.

-OCTOBER 1960-

Very little is known about the Kansas depotel, except that It is one of the most interesting tokens to be discovered in some time. Mr. Coffee wrote an article, which was printed on the front page of the newspaper in Oswego, but nobody in town seems to know anything about the token or the company that issued it. Two specimens are known to exist.

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THE HENDERSON, XY., CELLULOID WAS USED ON A HORSECAR LINE. ON PAGE 58 OF THE FARE BOX THERE IS A NOTE WHICH MENTIONED THAT THERE ARE ONLY 27 VARIETIES OF TOKENS LISTED WHICH HAVE HORSE CARS ON THEM. HOWEVER, MANY OTHERS WERE USED ON HORSECAR LINES BECAUSE MOST TOKENS ISSUED PRIOR TO 1900 WOULD HAVE BEEN USED on such lines. The Henderson Street Railway Co. was chartered FEBRUARY 13, 1886, AND BEGAN OPERATIONS OCTOBER 7, 1887. IT WAS REORGANIZED IN 1894 AS THE HENDERSON ELECTRIC STREET RAIL-WAY CO. HORSES WERE USED TILL 1896. SO OUR TOKEN WAS ISSUED SOME TIME BETWEEN 1887 AND 1894, AND OBVIOUSLY WAS USED ON THE HORSECARS. THIS IS THE ONLY SPECIMEN KNOWN. MR. COFFEE HAS SOUGHT OTHERS THROUGH NEWSPAPER ARTICLES, BUT SO FAR HAS HAD NO SUCCESS. LATER ON, THERE WAS A HENDERSON TRACTION CO. CHART-ERED APRIL 13, 1907, AS SUCCESSOR TO HENDERSON CITY RAILWAY CO. HENDERSON TRACTION CEASED OPERATIONS JULY 17, 1925. WE HAVE TOKENS LISTED FOR HENDERSON TRACTION--ONE LISTED AS COPPER AND ONE AS BRONZE. THE COPPER TOKENS I BELIEVE WERE FIRST USED SOMEWHERE ARGUND 1916 TO 1920. THEN, I BELIEVE, TE COPPER PROVED TOO SOFT AND BRONZE WAS USED ON THE RE-ORDERS STARTING AROUND 1921. So, FROM THIS, YOU CAN ALMOST DATE CERTAIN OF THE TOKENS IN OUR CATALOGUE, SUCH AS THOSE FROM SEATTLE, SAGINAW, KANSAS CITY, AND ST. LOUIS, IN ST. LOUIS THE 1919 TOKENS ARE COPPER AND THE 1920 ARE BRONZE. So I'M ALMOST INCLINED TO DOUBT ANY COPPER TOKEN AFTER 1921, EXCEPT IN A FEW RARE CASES WHERE THE TOKENS WERE STRUCK BY A SMALL CONCERN [SUCH AS OUR BRATTLEBORO SPECIAL TOKENS].

Next, a token being sent out by the New Issues Service. On the start of the new school term, September 6, 1960, Duluth issued a school token. Fare is 15¢ straight for school fares, but I imagine they are limiting it to those who purchase tokens at the proper place, instead of using a cash fare.

Next the Chester, PA., Token. The South Penna. Bus Co. was on strike and it was not settled, so they sold out to the Philadelphia Suburban Transportation Co. (which company is listed under Upper Darby). This happened about the First of July, so the PST started to run buses in Chester and called the operation the Red Arrow Lines, and came out with a new token. The company is using the same rates that South Penna. Bus Co. had in November, 1959: 23¢ or 2 tokens for 45¢. So mark 190 A and B as obsolete, because the company is defunct.

Every now and then so meone will question if a token is listed from the correct city. I've received such a question

About MD 560, A--why was it listed from Hagerstown. Up to now IT WAS LISTED IN HAGERSTOWN BECAUSE THE MAIN OFFICE OF THE COM-PANY WAS IN THAT CITY, AND WHEN THE TOKENS SHOWED UP IT WAS ASSUMED THEY WERE USED IN HAGERSTOWN. HOW, HOWEVER, INFORM-ATION COMES TO US THAT THIS TOKEN WAS USED IN OTHER CITIES, SUCH AS CHAMBERSBURG, PA., PRIOR TO WHEN 175 A & B WERE ISSUED. MD 560 A. MAY ALSO HAVE BEEN USED IN FREDERICK, MD. BUT RATHER THAN JUST SWITCH THE LISTING, WE'LL ADD A NOTE UNDER THIS LIS-TING SAYING THAT THE HEAD OFFICE WAS IN HAGERSTOWN, BUT THAT THE JOKEN WAS USED IN CHAMBERSBURG AND FREDERICK.

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THERE IS ALSO THE POSSIBILITY THAT OTHER TOKENS ARE NOT LISTED CORRECTLY, BUT SO FAR NOTHING DEFINITE HAS COME UP TO PROVE US WRONG. FOR MYSELF, I'D LIKE TO HAVE MORE DEFINITE PROOF THAT ILL 150 B IS REALLY FROM CHICAGO. I CAN FIND NO TRACE OF SUCH A LINE THERE IN ANY HISTORY. THE TOKEN MAY BE FROM MADISON, INDIANA. THEN, AGAIN, MD 60 0 MAY NOT BE FROM BALTIMORE AT ALL, BUT PERHAPS FROM SOME PLACE LIKE PEORIA, ILL. SO ALSO NJ 730 A AND B. I'VE NEVER HAD ANY PROOF THAT THESE ARE FROM NEW JERSEY, AND THEY MAY WELL HAVE BEEN USED SOMEWHERE IN THE MIDWEST AROUND OMAHA, OR PERHAPS EVEN WYOMING AS THEY HAVE THE SHAMROCK SIMILAR TO TOKENS FROM WYOMING AND COLORADO. So if anyone ever notes any listing about which he has some LEGITIMATE DOUBTS, BE SURE TO LET US KNOW.

THE FINAL TOKEN WE HAVE LISTED IS THE NEW BRIDGE TOKEN USED ON A BRIDGE ACROSS THE ST. LAWRENCE RIVER BETWEEN CORN-WALL, ONTARIO, AND MASSENA, WEW YORK. IT IS A BEAUTIFUL TO-KEN, WELL-STRUCK AND HEAVY. THE TOKENS COST 35¢ APIECE AND, ALTHOUGH LISTED UNDER CANADA, THEY COULD ALSO BE CONSIDERED TO BE UNITED STATES TOKENS, BECAUSE THE BRIDGE CONNECTS BOTH + + + 45° * COUNTRIES. -----****

MOORE ON THE MASTHEAD OF EARLY ISSUES OF THE FARE BOX. Ιr IS AN ATTRACTIVE SEAL, AND WHEN PRESENT STOCK RUNS OUT, IT WILL BE PRINTED ON MASTHEADS OF THE FARE BOX, THE A.V.A. STATIONERY, AND MEMBERSHIP CARDS.



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THE TRANSFER LINES OF FULTON, MO. by harold ford, jr.

The story of the Fulton tokens began in Europe in the summer of 1959. The token listed as Mo 350 B was found in an antique shop in Copenhagen, Denmark. I returned to the United States in the late fall of 1959 and spent about a month visiting the family home near Kansas City. While in the Mid-west I spent some time in Fulton, a small farming community of about 10,000 located in central Missouri, checking out the history behind my "European find" and the possibility of additional specimens. I visited the families of both Tucker and Jameson, and received a write-up on the front page of the local newspaper, with a picture of myself discussing tokens with one of the Tuckers. My search did not turn up any additional specimens of the brass token, but did pay off in two additional varieties, an aluminum token that was used by the Jameson line which preceeded the Tucker line, and a later issue by the Tucker outfit.

I LEARNED THAT THE LATE J. ROY TUCKER BOUGHT THE TRANSFER LINE FROM THE LATE JOHN JAMESON IN EITHER 1906 OR 1907. THE LINE OPERATED BOTH PASSENGER AND FREIGHT WAGONS FROM THE RAIL-ROAD DEPOT TO THE LOCAL HOTELS AND BUSINESS PLACES. J. ROY TUCKER RAN THE LINE UNTIL ABOUT 1942 AND HIS SON CONTINUED OP-ERATIONS FOR ANOTHER FOUR YEARS, ALTHOUGH THE PASSENGER PART OF THE SERVICE WAS DISCONTINUED ABOUT 1920.

TUCKER DESCRIBED THE WAGONS USED FOR PASSENGERS AS BUSSES DRAWN BY 2 HORSES WITH SEATS ON EACH SIDE SO THAT OCCUPANTS ON OPPOSITE SIDES FACED. EACH OTHER. THE BUSSES COULD TRANSPORT ABOUT 10 PERSONS AT A TIME, WITH THEIR BAGGAGE IN A RACK ON THE ROOF. PASSENGER SERVICE WAS FROM THE DEPOT TO THE OLD FUL-TON HOTEL AT 6TH & COURT STS., OR TO THE PALACE HOTEL, 5TH & MARKET STS. THE TOKEN WAS ISSUED AS THE RETURN PORTION OF THE FARE. MISSOURI SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF STUDENTS ALSO WERE TRANS-PORTED TO AND FROM TRAINS DURING THEIR ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES.

JAMESON STARTED THE TRANSFER BUSINESS IN FULTON IN THE EARLY 1890'S; AN EXACT DATE COULD NOT BE ESTABLISHED. THERE-FORE THE TOKEN WE ARE LISTING AS 350 A WAS USED AROUND THE TURN OF THE CENTURY. 350 B; THE TOKEN FOUND IN DENMARK, WAS USED ABOUT 1906-1909, AND 350 C WAS USED AROUND 1917, AS I AM TOLD IT WAS USED NEARLY 10 YEARS AFTER THE BRASS TOKEN.

I HAVE HAD SEVERAL ADDITIONAL ARTICLES AND ONE AD IN THE Fulton newspaper since last December with no additional results to show. Therefore the town would seem to be dry of additional specimens.

LAST MONTH I MADE A TRIP TO A COIN CONVENTION DOWN IN SAN DIEGO, PROBABLY JUST FOR A GOOD EXCUSE TO SEE EXACTLY HOW CER-TAIN TOKENS WERE USED IN SAN DIEGO. PART OF MY HOBBY IS ALSO TO RIDE FERRIES OR VEHICLES THAT HAVE USED TOKENS. I WENT TO LOOK AT THE STAR & CRESCENT FERRY AND ALSO TO RIDE ONE OF THEM. AT THE PRESENT TIME THEY ARE ON A STRAIGHT DIME FARE. HOWEVER, ONE OF THE MAIN REASONS FOR USING TOKENS WHEN THEY DID USE THEM, AND NOT TICKETS, IS THAT TURNSTILES ARE USED. AND THESE TURNSTILES BROUGHT TO MY MIND A WHOLE PHASE OF TOKEN-COLLEC-TING. JUST HOW MANY TOKENS DO WE HAVE THAT WERE MADE FOR USE IN TURNSTILES?

ONE OF THE LARGEST USERS OF TURNSTILES IS THE NEW YORK SUBWAY. WHEN THEY HAD A NICKEL FARE, AND LATER A DIME FARE, Tokens were not needed, But when they went to $15 \not e$, A token WAS NEEDED BECAUSE NEARLY ALL TURNSTILES WORK WITH ONLY ONE COIN. THIS MAY NOT BE TRUE IN THE NEAR FUTURE BECAUSE A NEW TURNSTILE IS BEING DEVISED FOR MULTIPLE COINS ... SO CONCEIVABLY TOKENS WOULD THEN NOT BE NEEDED BY THE NEW YORK SUBWAY EXCEPT AS REDUCED RATE TOKENS. I BELIEVE THAT NEARLY EVERY SUBWAY USES TURNSTILES. THEY HAVE THEM IN BOSTON, PHILADELPHIA, CHICAGO, AND THE H & M IN NEW YORK. I'VE NEVER BEEN ON THE TORONTO SUBWAY SO DON'T KNOW ABOUT THAT ONE. IT IS POSSIBLE THAT MOST FERRY BOATS HAVE ALSO USED TURNSTILES. WE HAVE OTHER TURNSTILES FOR WALKING ACROSS BRIDGES. IF THE TOLL IS A PENNY OR A NICKEL, NO TOKEN IS NEEDED. BUT IF THEY HAVE A 7¢ OR 8¢ TOLL, THEN A TOKEN WOULD BE NEEDED. A COUPLE OF NEW JERSEY FERRIES, WITH FARES OF 7¢ OR 8¢, DID USE TOKENS (NJ 30 A AND 220 A).

We have had transfer turnstiles, which operated on a token given in exchange for a transfer. Many of the Brooklyn, N.Y., streetcars and buses had turnstiles on the cars, so either a nickel or a token given in exchange for a transfer, or in exchange for a school ticket, was necessary. As far as I know the only tokens we have that mention turnstile are Pa 480 A B and NY 628 A B, but up to now I still have no idea where the turnstiles on the NY 628 tokens were located. Then we do have NY 631 G and H for the Perey Turnstile, but I have no idea why these tokens are listed. There's another one of them, with a different plating, but I am not going to list it until I know what the turnstile was used for.

THEN WE HAVE SOME FERRY TOKENS WHICH ARE NOTED AS "HUB TOKENS" BECAUSE OF THE RAISED COLLAR ON THEM, THESE WERE USED IN TURNSTILES. THERE ARE NONE OF THESE HUB TOKENS PRESENTLY IN USE, SO I CANNOT MAKE ANY TRIPS TO OBSERVE THEIR USE AT FIRST HAND. IT MAY BE POSSIBLE ONE OF THESE DAYS TO MAKE A -November 1960-LIST OF TOKENS USED IN VARIOUS TURNSTILES, SO IF ANYONE FEELS LIKE WRITING AND LET ME KNOW SOME TOKENS THAT I HAVE NOT MEN-TIONED WHICH WERE MAINLY FOR TURNSTILES, PLEASE DO SO, AND WE CAN COMPILE SUCH A LIST.

The idea of mentioning turnstiles came to me after seeing THE ONE USED IN SAN DIEGO, AND THEN COMING UPON AN ARTICLE IN THE MAGAZINE BUS TRANSPORTATION, OCTOBER 1943, PAGE 39. SO IF ANYONE KNOWS OF A LIBRARY THAT HAS THIS MAGAZINE, HE CAN CHECK ON IT. WITHOUT HAVING READ THIS ARTICLE, I DOUBT IF MORE THAN ONE OR TWO COLLECTORS REALIZED THE NATURE OF THE USE OF THE PICATINNY ARSENAL TOKENS OF DOVER, N.J. BEING ZINC TOKENS. THE ONLY CLUE WAS THAT THEY MUST HAVE BEEN USED DURING THE WAR. Well, IT seems that when these war workers came off the SHIFT --- AND THERE WERE A GOOD MANY OF THEM EMPLOYED THERE ---THERE WOULD BE A MAD RUSH FOR THE BUSES. AS THERE WERE 3 DIFF-ERENT FARES (ZONE 1 20C, ZONE 2 30C, ZONE 3 35C) WORKERS WENT TO 3 DIFFERENT AREAS TO BOARD THE BUSES. TO GET INTO THESE AREAS THEY WOULD PASS THROUGH GATES OR TURNSTILES AND USE THESE TOKENS. SINCE THE FARE WAS PAID AT THE TURNSTILE, THERE WAS THEN, OF COURSE, NO NEED OF PAYING FARE WHEN ENTERING THE BUS, WITHIN EACH FARE AREA, THERE MIGHT BE BUSES GOING TO SEV-ERAL DESTINATIONS, BUT ALL IN THE SAME FARE ZONE. THE ZONE 3. or 35c zone, might have gone as far as New York City. LEAST, IN 1943, 35° WOULD CARRY YOU A GOOD DEAL FARTHER THAN IT DOES NOW.

TRANSIT IN AUBURN, N.Y.

When the 1958 Catalogue was issued we did not know what the abbreviations on NY 35 A and B stood for. I have run accross the following in the meantime: On April 15, 1871, two companies were chartered: East Genesee & Seward Avenue Ry, Co., and the Auburn & Owasco Lake Ry. Co. Both companies had the same president, but on October 1, 1886, they became consolidated and were then known as Auburn City Ry. Co. So the tokens of East Genesee & Seward Avenue Railway were probably used between 1871 and 1886. Why some of these early companies used both brown and black tokens is something I do not know,

Streetcar service in Auburn was ended April 15, 1930. Cuyuga Omnibus Co. operated from about 1927 to 1950. Auburn Bus Co. had its first token listed by us in the February 1950 Fare Box, and this company operated until July, 1954, when there was an argument with the drivers, who refused to work until they were paid. At the present time, I doubt if there is either bus service or tokens in Auburn, N.Y.

NOTES BY RALPH FREIBERG

This month we have a few more taxi tokens for the Supreme Markets in the Boston area. The store in Roslindale is using the letter R. When Mr. Smith learned that the 115 V and X were in use, he asked the Supreme Markets for 100 of each for collectors. They said they would make up an extra batch for us. However, what they made up came through entirely different from the originals. The Roslindale token they made up for us turned out to be octagonal, instead of round, thus giving us a new variety but leaving us still not having enough of the round "R" token for collectors. Then the South Boston token they supplied us was octagonal like the original 115 X, but it had much larger letters--letters entirely different, thus -November 1960-GIVING US TWO IMPORTANT DIE VARIETIES OF 115 X. THE NEW Issues Service will be sending out the 115 W and the large Letter variety of 115 X. It will not be able to handle the 115 V or the small letter variety of 115 X. However, Mr. F. Gordon Smith has a few extras of these and collectors desiring them may contact him directly. Incidentally, the tokens made up specially for us collectors were made in sufficient quantity so that some of them are actually being used by the Markets. Elsewhere in this issue, if there is space, Mr. Smith is running an article about the Supreme tokens.

THE ALUMINUM KITIMAT TICKET OF THE CANADIAN NATIONAL

ON JULY 8, 1955, CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS OFFICIALLY OPENED THE BRANCH LINE JOINING ITS MAIN LINE AT TERRACE, B.C., with Kitimat, B.C., where the Aluminum Company of Canada had opened a large aluminum plant. To commemorate the official opening, the CNR, with the cooperation of others, had aluminum return tickets made, coach fare, good from Terrace to Kitimat. These tickets were presented or given to those attending the opening to enable them to ride the first train on the official opening of the New Line, The ticket is the standard form of railway ticket, described as follows:

There seems to be some confusion about how to measure the size of octagonal tokens. The correct way is to measure the distance between two opposite flat sides. These should be the sides to the left and right, respectively, of the matter inscribed on the token. This is also the way to measure hexagonal and square tokens--the distance between opposite flat sides.



I wrote these notes sometime ago and my intention was to include not only tokens (Cuba 400 A B C) but also medals, for Havana's railroads have been remembered in quite a few of the latter. I am very glad to send this article thus to The Fare Box for the enjoyment of fellow collectors; and though I realize that medals are, after all, a bit out of place here, I can not resist the temptation to mention just one of them--and my favorite one: a medal struck by the City of Havana in 1898 to recall its blockade by the United States Navy. There is, besides the picture of many warships, the Mobro Castle, and stately figures, a little train somewhere in the background of it all. I like to think that maybe the artist, Sr. Antonio Jimenez, just put it there for no other reason except that Havana was not really Havana without its "small train around the bay."

IT would be most unfair not to say that I deliberately took most of the facts for these notes from an article which a very fine gentleman and friend, Dr., Julio Morales Coello, wrote quite a while back for our Yacht Club magazine.

And lastly, before beginning our narrative, if it is permissible in this kind of work, I would like to dedicate these notes to my American friend and fellow collector, Mr. Jack F. Burns of Pittsburgh, Pa., because of his enthusiasm and interest in Cuban numismatics.

BACK IN THE OLD DAYS, IN 1837 TO BE EXACT, THE FIRST STEAMBOAT COMPANY WAS FORMED TO CONNECT HAVANA WITH THE SMALL TOWNSHIP OF REGLA ON THE EASTERN SIDE OF THE HARBOR. IT WAS NAMED THE EMPRESA DE VAPORES A REGLA, AND LATER KNOWN BY HEARLY EVERYONE AS LA VIEJA EMPRESA (THE OLD ENTERPRISE), TO DISTIN-GUISH IT FROM ITS SUCCESSOR WHICH STARTED OUT IN 1842, BUT SHORTLY AFTERWARDS MERGED WITH THE FIRST ONE. FROM REGLA, ONE COULD EITHER TAKE A COACH OR, LATER, A HORSE-DRAWN TRAMWAY KNOWN AS THE FIGUERAS TO NEARBY GUANABACOA, A DISTANCE OF ABOUT 10 KILOMETERS. ON THAT VERY SAME YEAR DON EDUARDO FESSER FOUN-DED A RAILROAD TO GUANABACOA AND HENCE TO THE CITY OF MATANZAS OVER 100 KILOMETERS A WAY, WHICH IT EVENTUALLY REACHED IN 1858. This was the second oldest railroad in Cuba, for the first one WAS STARTED ALL OF 3 YEARS EARLIER, IN 1834, BY THE COUNT OF VILLANUEVA AND STRETCHED FROM HAVANA TO BEJUCAL, A STAGGERING RUN OF 25 KILOMETERS.

The following year, Senor Fesser, in partnership with the Banco del Comercio, founded a new company, the Compania del Ferrocarril de Bahia y Almacenes de Regla Ltda. (The Bay Railroad Company and Regla Warehouses, Ltd.) This new company started business with 3 sturdy wooden-hulled ferries with side

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PADDLES AND ROUNDED PROWS; AND THOUGH SMALL IN SIZE, NEVERTHE-LESS THEY "HAVE LARGE ENOUGH HOUSING SPACE FOR THEIR ENGINES AND OTHER MACHINERY, AS WELL AS AMPLE SPACE FOR VEHICLES AND ACCOMMODATIONS FOR THE SENORES PASSENGERS." FURTHERMORE, THEY WERE REGALLY NAMED THE MARIA CRISTINA, MARIA ISABEL, AND AL-PHONSO XII, which much later, with the advent of the Republic, were dutifully rechristened the AMERICA, INVENCIBLE, and VIC-TORIA, NO LESS IMPOSING AND MORE IN THE SPIRIT OF THE TIMES, FOR THE SPANISH ROYAL HOUSE HAD PASSED INTO OBLIVION IN CUBA'S DESTINY.

The tokens of Havana, Cuba 480 A and B, portray on their reverse one of these little ships and the date underneath, 1881, bears witness to their neat construction and seaworthiness, for during all these years they patiently plowed back and forth between their berths at Luz (Havana), Fesser, Regla and Casa Blanca. Years later the company reinforced the fleet with 3 more sister ships: the HABANERO, FESSER, and CASABLANCA. A contemporary notice (1834) painstakingly itemizes the fares:

"EACH WHITE PERSON 1 REAL. CHILDREN 5-8 YEARS & REAL. EACH COLORED PERSON & REAL. SAME BUT CARRYING BAGGAGE 1 REAL. SADDLED HORSE 1 REAL. UNSADDLED HORSE & REAL. OXEN OR COW 1 REAL. ANY SMALLER 4-LEGGED ANIMAL & REAL. 1-HORSE CARRIAGE & DRIVER 2 REALS. SAME BUT 2-HORSED 3 REALS. SAME BUT 3-HORSED 4 REALS. LARGER 4-WHEELED CARRIAGE WITH DRIVER & HORSE(S) 5 REALS." (FIGURE 1 REAL EQUAL TO A DIME)

And so on, taking into account all styles of wheeled vehicles and innumerable combinations of drivers, wheels, burdens, and animals. Moreover it strictly called attention that service started promptly at 4:30 a.m. and just as promptly ended at 9:30 p.m. Later, because a larger public attended the theatres of Payret, Albizu and Tacon, service was stretched until 11 p.m. and the last ferry came to be known as the "Theatre Special."

Much later, about 1905, two bigger and better ferries were added: the MANUEL UNDERDAWN and the GUANABACOA, both built by English shipwrights; the former at Dundee and the latter at Faversham, near London, by James Pollock & Sons, Ltd., both were of a type known as the Pennsylvania, with propellers in each prow, iron-hulled, 140 feet in length, 55 in beam with a displacement of 9 feet.

About 1933 they were finally retired. Roads encircling the harbor as well as motor launches slowly choked them out of all profit. As a last resort the company purchased and operated fast motor launches, but they were unable to survive for long. Some enterprising showman purchased the MANUEL UNDERDAWN and converted it into a floating nightclub, quaintly named the NEPTUNO, but the venture failed and so it passed away. The proud GUANABACOA had a more practical if less romantic end.

RAZED DOWN TO HER BARE HULL, SHE WAS TURNED INTO A LOADING SCOW FOR TRAMP STEAMERS, AND MOST LIKELY IS STILL AT HER TRADE UN LESS CAST OFF IN SOME FORGOTTEN BACKWASH. WHATEVER THEIR END, ON THE OBVERSE OF CUBA 480 C THEY ARE PRESERVED FOREVER FOR THOSE WHO COLLECT THESE SMALL HUMBLE PIECES.

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BACK NOW TO RAILROADS. DON EDUARDO FESSER HAD A HANDSOME STATION BUILT AT REGLA, WHICH FITTINGLY WAS NAMED AFTER HIM; AND EVEN IF IT TOOK HIM 13 YEARS TO REACH MATANZAS, HIS BRANCH LINE TO GUANABACCA DID RUN EARLY AND ON SCHEDULE. IF TODAY COLLECTORS REGARD HIS ENGINES (PICTURED ON CUBA 480 A.B) AS MERE TOYS, NEVERTHELESS IN THEIR HEYDAY THE IMPRESSION WAS DIF-FERENT; SO MUCH SO THAT SOME OF THE NARROWER STREETS OF OLD GU-ANABACOA WERE QUITE UNABLE TO COPE WITH THEM. ALL OF WHICH GAVE RISE TO A MOST BRILLIANT FEAT IN TRAINMANSHIP, THE KIND THAT IS EVER ENDEARING TO RAILROAD ENTHUSIASTS. THERE WAS A SPUR BY THE OLD HOSPITAL A SHORT DISTANCE FROM WHERE THE RIGHT-OF-WAY ENTERED A NARROW STREET. AS THE INCOMING TRAIN APPROA-CHED IT ON THE DOWNGRADE, THE ENGINE WAS UNCOUPLED FROM THE FOREMOST CAR. IN THOSE RUSHING SECONDS THE ENGINE WOULD SWERVE INTO THE SPUR WHILE WITH SPLIT-SECOND TIMING PRECISION THE SWITCH WAS THROWN BACK ENABLING THE CARS TO CONTINUE ON THE MAIN LINE. NOT TO BE OUTDONE BY THE SWITCHMEN, THE BRAKEMAN JUST AS NEATLY BROUGHT THE HEADLESS TRAIN TO A DEAD STOP, SOME DISTANCE AHEAD, AT THE EXACT PLACE WHERE THE STATION PLATFORM WAS LOCATED, AT THE CORNER OF ANIMAS & VERSALLES STREETS.

In 1889 the company had finally wound its track around the kidney-shaped harbor to connect with Havana at Cienaga. Ten years later, in 1899, at the end of the War of Independence, the company split and was reformed as the "United Railways and R_{EGLA} Warehouses Ltd." And after further modifications it is known today as the "Ferrocarriles Occidentales de Cuba, S.A." (Western Railways of Cuba, Inc.)

Nowadays launches are still connecting Havana to Regla; and from there the electrically-powered "Ferrocarril de Hershey" runs to Matanzas over much the same route. The terminus at Regla--and the freight yard--retains the name of Fesser, but the line to Guanabacoa vanished and in its place there are buses which likewise have replaced the small train round the bay.

PARKING TOKENS BY DUANE H. FEISEL

One of the newer fields attracting the attention of many avid vecturists is the collecting of tokens which are used to pay fees for parking. These tokens may be used in parking meters, in parking gates, or may be given to an attendant. Parking tokens have been in use for about ten years, and many new tokens appear on the scene regularly. The tokens may be used by municipalities, by private parking companies, by hospitals, by banks, and by industrial concerns.

EFFORTS ARE UNDERWAY TO COMPILE A LISTING OF PARKING TOK-ENS AS A GUIDE TO COLLECTORS. AT THE PRESENT TIME AN EXTENSIVE SURVEY IS BEING MADE TO LOCATE USERS OF PARKING TOKENS, AND IT IS CONTEMPLATED THAT THE CATALOG COMPILATION WILL BE AVAILABLE IN THE SPRING OF 1961. To date there are recorded 109 differ-ENT PARKING TOKENS. THESE ARE FROM 19 STATES, FROM 2 FOREIGN COUNTRIES, FROM MANUFACTURERS, AND FROM UNIDENTIFIED SOURCES. THE LARGEST NUMBER, 38, ARE FROM PENNSYLVANIA, WHILE CALIFORNIA WITH 16, IS NEXT IN LINE.

The compilation of the parking tokens is being done in a form equivalent to that used in Atwood's Catalogue. One distinctive difference, however, is that the city numeral code will be in the 3000 series. Thus, Pittsburgh, given as Pa 765 in the transportation token listing, will be coded as Pa 3765 in the Parking Token Catalog. It is felt that this difference will eliminate confusion between coded listings of the two types of tokens.

ONE MIGHT ASK HOW PARKING TOKENS ARE RELATED TO TRANSPORT-ATION TOKENS. APART FROM THE CONSIDERATION THAT AUTOMOBILES ARE A MEANS OF TRANSPORTATION, THERE ARE OTHER TIES BETWEEN THE TWO TOKEN FIELDS. A TOKEN FROM ST. LOUIS, MO 910 P, IS ALSO A PARKING TOKEN, AND WILL BE CODED AS MO 3910 A. ANOTHER TOKEN RECENTLY ISSUED IN NEW CASTLE, PA., IS INTENDED PRIMARILY FOR USE IN PARKING METERS, BUT THE TOKENS, GIVEN FREE TO CUSTOMERS UPON PURCHASE OF A CERTAIN AMOUNT, MAY ALSO BE USED IN PAYMENT OF BUS FARE.

ALTHOUGH THE NUMBER OF KNOWN TOKENS IS INCREASING STEADILY AT A QUITE RAPID RATE, IT IS FELT THAT MANY OTHER TOKENS ARE NOW BEING USED OR HAVE BEEN USED FOR PARKING PURPOSES WHICH ARE NOT KNOWN TO COLLECTORS OF THESE TOKENS. PERHAPS YOUR OWN AREA HAS A PARKING TOKEN.

The unidentified tokens are being listed here in the hope that someone will be able to shed some light on their origin. The usual symbols and manner of coding used in Atwood's Catalogue are applied in describing these tokens. See next page,

THE KICKAPOO TRANSIT COMPANY

There are only 3 known specimens of the little aluminum token issued by this company (and one of these is damaged). The Kickapoo Transit Company has rather a unique history of its own. The whole drama of streetcar development in Springfield, No., is very complicated; there were dozens of different companies, and I suspect that more tokens will be discovered from there issued by various of the old companies. The "Springfield Electric Street Railway" which issued the unique Mo 860 A was not an electric line at all, but a horsecar line with hopes of becoming electrified---hopes that never materialized.

ON JUNE 16, 1890, THE NEWLY-ORGANIZED METROPOLITAN ELEC-TRIC RAILWAY ACQUIRED RIGHTS TO ALL STREET RAILWAY BUSINESS IN Springfield <u>except</u> for a small line operating from the Public Square out to the Poor Farm located in "Kickapoo Prairie." This little Kickapoo Transit Co. was the sole competition to the big Metropolitan for over a decade. Kickapoo Transit Used two mule cars from its beginning in 1890 until 1903, when ele ectricity was substituted. The fare was 5¢, and the firm made little revenue. However, the conductor made extra money by running errands for people who lived along the line.

Although the promoters of the little Kickapoo Transit Co. piously asserted, in applying for a franchise, that they were only interested in providing streetcar service to the Poor Farm, their real reason was real estate speculation. They purchased 40 acres from the Poor Farm, plotted it into lots, and offered it for sale an "an area connected with the center of Springfield by streetcar service." The little line was eought out in 1905 by Springfield Traction Co., and thus ended a fase cinating chapter in Springfield's traction history.

This month we have two new issues to report. There is an article elsewhere about the Andover, N.H., token. The new school token from Manitowoc was placed in use February 3, 1960. It seems a lady from Manitowoc, a Mrs. Watson, placed an ad in some numismatic paper advertising tokens for sale. Mr. Cutler answered the ad and discovered it was something we had not listed. Since then others have probably written to this same person and obtained the token, and others have reported it to me and also to John Nicolosi. However, Mr. Nicolosi was able to get a supply of them for the New Issues Service and will send them out shortly after Christmas.

MR. ATWOOD HAS COME UP WITH A VERY NICE OLD ONE. I FIG-URE THAT THIS TOKEN WAS PROBABLY USED ABOUT 1890 ON A HORSE CAR LINE.

I have no idea when or how the Poltrok Bus token from Freeland, Pa., was used. Since we have no information, we are tentatively listing it at 50¢, but if only a few more turn up, it will be put in the \$3.50 class.

IN THE OCTOBER ISSUE WE REPORTED A TOKEN FOR THE CORNWALL

BRIDGE, IT WAS LISTED AT 35¢. HOWEVER, IT SHOULD CARRY A PRICE OF 50¢. THE TOLL ON THIS BRIDGE IS \$1.00 AND TOKENS WERE FIRST PLACED ON SALE JUNE 28, 1960. AS SILVER DOLLARS ARE NOT TOO COMMON, THEY HAVE A COLLECTION DEVICE IN WHICH YOU PLACE EITHER TWO 50¢ PIECES OR TWO TOKENS. IF YOU PRESENT A DOLLAR BILL YOU WILL BE GIVEN TWO 50¢ PIECES TO DEPOSIT. TOKENS ARE SOLD ONLY IN ROLLS OF TWENTY FOR \$7.00, AND THE BRIDGE ATTENT DANT IS NOT SUPPOSED TO HAVE ANY ODD TOKENS IN HIS POSSESSIOJ. SO THE TOKEN IS GOOD FOR HALF OF A FARE, AND TWO ARE NECHES ANT TO PAY THE TOLL. THOSE WHO DO NOT COLLECT GANADIAN TOKENS SHOULD STILL SAVE THIS ONE, BECAUSE IT COULD ALSO BE CONSIDERS A U.S. TOKEN FROM MASSENA. N.Y.

THE ANDOVER, N.H., TOKEN BY J.M. COFFEE

The New England Regional Committee is the high school youth organization for New England of the Unitarian Church, The national organization is called "Liberal Religious Youth," hence the initials "LRY" on the token, Each year they hold a conference in December for 150 to 200 high school Kids, And the ones from Boston charter a bus or two to provide training portation to the conference and to return. Those taking with chartered bus pay the round trip fare in advance, and are simple given a ticket for the trip back.

This year I suggested that they use a token instead of a ticket, and they liked the idea. Hence the new issue reported from Andover, N.H. The round trip fare is \$5.50, so the token will actually be worth \$2.75 face value. However, as it is a one-shot deal, after the trip is over, it loses its face value. So we've listed it at 50¢. Members of the New Issues Service will receive the token, as I secured 100 of them for MR. Nicolosi. A total of 250 were coined. The token will be used on December 30, 1960. That is the date the return trip on the chartered bus will be made.
