He outlined the beginnings of trihal and clan law, tracing laws on down through Roman law and the Napoleonic Code, and by English law as modified by the Magna Carta, the American constitution and the American bill of

All through history, said Judge McDonald, the rights of citizens have been expanded under English and American law. He explained the difference between laws of nations operating under Roman law and the Napoleonic Code and laws of nations basing individual and property rights on English law.

Judge McDonald likened the system of laws to a river system like the Mississippi, with tributaries flowing in all the way from 3. the source. The ancient Jutes, Saxons and Angles and the Normans as well as Romans contributed to the English law; Greeks and Egyptians, Jews and other people modified and altered Roman law, Judge McDonald

Romans brought order out of chaos with their legal system, and Napoleon, through his codifying and modifying of Roman law for use throughout Spanish and French areas, did great good, the Lansing judge said.

# That year 15 town officers Mail Regulations

Postmaster Leslie B. Palmer of Mason has called to the attention regulations being issued effective December 1 which provide important changes and simplifications in the use of the mails.

The Postoffice department has issued a new postal manual which contains these changes in simple form. The new manual will bring together in less than 300 pages public-interest postal ment of \$38 to the treasurer, that person in turn paying the note through 4,000 pages of dense print. Postmaster Palmer explained.

"The new publication is remarkable for its simplicity," Palmer said. "Not only is it printed in easy-to-understand English, but it contains simple black and white illustrations on how to prepare material for mailing. The print is easy to understand, and is arranged in logical sections under bold-face headings. "Not only are the regulations issued in new simplified form, but the rules themselves have been changed. A great deal of

The new booklet is so simple that if the shipping clerk, for example, in a small business is ill or absent, other employees can get a ready understanding of the postal rules from the publication Palmer said.

The booklet is also an invaluable guide for the average householder. It shows, for example how to package fragile materials for mailing; how to attach firstclass letters to packages; how stamps of unwanted denominalions that are unused may be exchanged for others of different values if desired. It also tells about many other matters of special interest to all mail users, he added.

Mail users who have inquiries about any special points in connection with the new publication may direct them to the Mason Postoffice, It should be emphasized, Postmaster Palmer said, that the booklet represents the "final word" on all postal rules.

#### **Reduce Ballot Size**

In the November 2 election more than 2,100,000 Michigan people cast their ballots. Out of that vast throng only 5,824 votes were cast for candidates of the Prohibition party. Socialist Labor candidates garnered a total of 1,126, less than one-quarter a vote per precinct throughout the state. Socialist Workers candidates drew only 902 votes.

There is no excuse for permitting minor parties to clutter up the ballot the way they now do. Giving them their present places on the ballot doubles the cost of paper used in providing paper ballots and adds to the confusion on the faces of voting machines. Tallying the few votes cast for minor party candidates slows up the counting and the canvassing and adds to the cost of elections.

Prohibitionists have a principle at stake and in this county attract enough votes to be a minor factor, at least. Yet better counting the pounds or the their votes would count for much more if they were cast for forkfuls. candidates of one of the major parties, say for the lesser evil between two candidates. But there is no excuse for continuing to set aside columns for such parties as Socialist Labor and Socialist Workers. Michigan could cut the size of its ballots in half by establishing some realistic qualification goals for minor parties. Present laws invite fringe groups to hold telephone booth conventions and put up nuisance candidates.

With the results of the November election fresh in their minds, legislators should take action to reduce the size of the ballots by eliminating the nuisance of parties so minor that they are practically non-existent.

### Culling Doesn't Mean Killing All

Conservation department propaganda likens Michigan's any-deer law to a farmer culling his flock.

No greater fallacy could be imagined.

A farmer doesn't cull his poultry flock by killing every hen, pullet, rooster and chick he can reach with a club. He culls out the non-producing hens, the unpromising pullets and roosters. He keeps the rest.

Under Michigan's any-deer law every buck, doe and fawn which can be found is slaughtered.

This unwise policy of the state conservation department has made deer in many good hunting areas almost an infrequent sight. It has decimated Michigan's deer herds. It has made it virtually impossible for tourists to catch a glimpse of deer in summer months.

Conservation ought to mean more than butchering every deer that moves on December 1.

### **Democrats Riding Crest Now**

Governor Williams and the Democratic party in Michigan are certainly justified in their current jubilation over election returns. Official state figures are now complete and show Governor G.

Mennen-Williams won over Donald S. Leonard by 250,908 votes. Reviewing the record, however, perhaps Williams should be a little apprehensive about this vote. Only once in the past 25 years has a Michigan governor been elected by a plurality of more than 250,000 votes. That was in 1946 when Republican Kim Sigler defeated the popular former Governor Murray Van Wagoner by 359, 338 votes. Previous to that election, the last time a governor received such a vote was in 1928 when Fred Green won over William Comstock by 556,633 votes. And witness what happened to

Sigler. Two years later he was defeated by 163,854 votes. Riding the crest of popularity this year is no positive assurance of a politician's status 2 years hence. Public popularity is too illusive and fickle. This is borne out, too, in the results on other state officials.

Senator Ferguson who won the election 6 years ago (in a Democratic presidential election year) by 44,827 votes, was defeated this year by 39,130 votes.

Pat Cleary who won his last election by 133,975 votes was defeated this year by 55,232. John Martin won in 1952 by 169,320 votes and lost this year by 41,707. Hale Brake's plurality in 1952 was 146,582 and he was beaten by 77,824 votes this year. Frank Millard at the top of the list 2 years ago, winning by 169,944 votes dropped to the bottom this year when Thomas Kavanagh of Carson City beat him by 94,405 votes.

While the 1954 results were decisive there is no reason that they should prove disastrous to the state Republican party. Both parties have taken worse defeats in the past.

On the other hand there is no reason to believe that Republicans can regain control of the executive branch of state government by simply waiting for some turn of events to drop it into their laps. It will take new party leadership, new blood in the ranks and unity. - Gratiot County Herald.



### Warfarin Diets Will Clean Out Hordes of Rats

He emphasized that rats can be costly nuisances around the farm -eating up large quantities of grains and undermining build-

Zoologist Don Hayne of Michgan State college gives this prescription for good rat poison

Freshly ground cornmeal, 65%; olled or ground oats, 20%; powdered sugar, 5%; vegetable or nineral oil, 5%; and the knockout blow, 5% of warfarin.

Hayne says it's cheaper to mix our own rat balt-and you get etter results because the bait is isn't the only anti-coagulant sold, leath by internal hemorrhage. Mixed bait containing warfarin is available at elevators.

Hayne says you can make bait stations by just leaning a wide board against the wall with a dish of bait behind it. An inverted box with a hole for the rats to go into also works. The latter will keep out other animals, too.





### Farmers Advised To Provide Cow With Rest Period

Put off breeding dairy cattle

That's advice from M. H. Avery, cattle soon after calving. They freshen during the 1955 base months-and passing up sound herd management.

George Parsons, Michigan State college extension dairyman, says that a cow bred back so soon will have a short lactation and won't produce as much milk. Her rest period, too, may be short for preparing for the next lactation.

### Too Much Gleaning Gets Sows Too Fat

Bred sows can do a good job of cleaning up that cornfield aften the picker—but they shouldn't follow the picker so long they get too fat, advised M. H. Avery, county agricultural agent.

Avery pointed out that many farmers in Ingham county have just finished their corn and will soon be turning in their sows to do the gleaning after the picker: Harry F. Moxley, Michigan State college hog specialist, gives hese directions to swine feeders for estimating the amount of corn

in the field: Count the number of kernels in 40-inch square. Every 20 kernels means you've lost a bushel of corn to the acre. If you have a lot of corn that's fallen down, the ears will make the loss heavier, but the amount will vary from field to field.

Only when the corn loss is heavy will you have to worry bout the hogs getting too fat. Moxley notes that sows gleaning fields may need some supple-

nentary feeding. He suggests when 10 bushels of corn are left on the acre, a self-fed supplement made up of 300 lb of oats, 300 lb of alfalfameal, 100 lb of soybean meal, 50 lb of meat scraps and 25 lb of complete mineral mix will take care of about 3 sows an acre for

Moxley says a hand-fed dry lot supplement of 11/4 lb per head daily, in addition to the corn the sows pick up, will also do the

### Losses in Cattle Shipped from West

Use management common sense when you put those feeders in the feedlot this fall-and cut down on your losses from ship-

This advice comes from Dr. Glen Reed, extension veterinarian at Michigan State college. He says feeder cattle that come to Michigan from western ranges are subject to the discomforts of travel just like humans.

Crowded conditions, irregular feeding and watering, changeable weather and little rest all add up to this combination: fatigue and low resistance to shipping fever

Reed emphasizes that feeder cattle are often put with diseased cattle in contaminated stockyards. For this reason they should be isolated from the rest of the cattle on the farm for at least 30

Give the new arrivals plenty of water, but limited amounts of good hay, Don't feed grain until a few days later then start slow





### Benson Is Coming | Wiring Systems Require Checking

It is estimated that at least 90% of the farms that have been wired 10 years or more have inadequate or poor wiring. The lines are frequently overloaded and are fire hazard to the farm, accordng to a Prairie Farmer survey.

There are some danger signs hat mean that your wiring is nadequate. If lights dim when he refrigerator, pump, furnace, nearing units or motors turn or, or the radio volume goes down vhen other appliances are switched on, your circuits may be overloaded.

If motors in the barn operate poorly when the electric stove or other large household electric equipment is on, or electric motors stall easily or get hot fast, griculture, will be the headline lit's past time to check. It's time to do something.


