Background and Purpose/Rationale (Alignment to District Strategic Plan)

In partnership with family and community, the Consolidated School District of New Britain works to provide the best personalized and comprehensive whole-child education so our students will be prepared for, and positively contribute to, a profoundly different future. Our curriculum renewal timeline at the elementary school level turns to Mathematics for the 2021-2022 school year. The foundational resource we have been using for the past 11 years, Math Expressions was originally published in 2009 and has not been updated since 2013. To prepare to receive our renewed curriculum and to align our elementary mathematics to the middle school curriculum, we will be adopting a new resource, LearnZillion K-5 Illustrative Mathematics. Illustrative Mathematics is a mathematics curriculum that is highly usable, well-designed and supported. The instructional materials for LearnZillion Illustrative Mathematics meet the expectation for alignment to the CCSS and connect the Standards for Mathematical Content and the Standards for Mathematical Practice. Where in the past we have purchased static textbooks that we have utilized for 6 to 12 or more years, we are in a time in education in which textbooks themselves are virtual resources that can be updated and revised in real time. This cost expenditure should be equated to the cost of new textbooks, albeit online and digital, that will last multiple years.

Our District Strategic Plan demands that we prepare students to positively contribute to a profoundly different future and promote an engaging culture for learning for all staff and students. This future will require students to problem-solve, to devise clever, creative solutions to unique problems, to collaborate around these solutions and to reflect and improve their solutions with feedback. This curriculum includes all of these elements coupled with planned embedded professional development. In selecting a resource to support our renewed curriculum, we were mindful of several variables. As we have learned in recent months, our students and teachers have become more proficient in accessing digital materials through their Google Classrooms. It was essential that a replacement resource include a robust, easily navigable digital platform that communicates fluently with Google Classroom and Clever. In addition, ensuring that extensive supports and scaffolds were included for our English learners and our students who require special education services was non-negotiable. LearnZillion K-5 Illustrative Mathematics will be coming out of a Beta year in 2020-2021 and was designed as an extension 6-8 Illustrative Mathematics Curriculum which was given top ratings by edreports. It was piloted in many districts across the country including Norwalk, Bristol, and Los Angeles Unified School District in California.

LearnZillion K-5 Illustrative Mathematics is a comprehensive, flexible curriculum with easy-to-use lesson cards and built-in differentiation. Through inclusive instructional routines, students develop the skills to successfully learn math for life. The curriculum:

- *Was designed by noted mathematician and standards author, William McCallum
- *Contains embedded support for culturally responsive pedagogy
- *Includes digital interactives powered by Geogebra and Desmos
- *Builds confidence and growth mindset through productive struggle
- *Builds conceptual understanding, procedural fluency, and application
- *Is Classroom- and distance learning-ready, with comprehensive teaching support
- *Includes tools for active instruction, effective differentiation, and assessments that empower students
- *Includes instructional routines that promote collaborative discourse
- *Is a 2020 Tech & Learning Awards of Excellence winner

The attached quotes include a 6-year digital subscription to LearnZillion at \$771,167.50. Comparison quotes include a 3-year digital subscription for \$579,716.50 and 1-year digital subscription for \$422,628.50 These amounts reflect our year 1 cost for either 6 years, 3 years, or 1 year for: Digital Licenses for Teachers and Students, Student Print Consumables, Teacher Print, Manipulative Kits (plus shipping for kits only), and Professional Development. The quotes also show the yearly cost for student print consumables for years 2-6 which average \$122,725.00 which is about \$20,000 lower than our average yearly consumable cost of \$142,000 for Math Expressions. Additionally, our Math Expressions digital access expires this year. Last year we were provided with a renewal quote of \$338,952.60 for 1 year (or \$2,033,715.60 for 6 years).

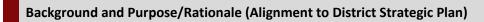

In partnership with family and community, the Consolidated School District of New Britain works to provide the best personalized and comprehensive whole-child education so our students will be prepared for, and positively contribute to, a profoundly different future.

In these uncertain times, we must be prepared to meet our students where they are. We must be equipped to provide our students and staff with varying approaches and platforms to receive and interact with content. Our teachers need options for providing synchronous and asynchronous virtual teaching both in the classroom and remotely. Edpuzzle provides teachers and students with a tool to collaborate virtually through Google Classrooms and in person classes.

Teachers have been using Edpuzzle as an educational tool since the fall of 2020. The free version limits each teacher to twenty video lessons, while the paid-for version allows for unlimited storage per teacher, allowing educators to create and share Edpuzzle lessons among all their classes or across content areas. The district currently has 349 teachers who have been active on Edpuzzle this year. Of those teachers, 62 are out of or almost out of storage space. Staff have created 5,267 assignments utilizing the Edpuzzle tools. Through a brief survey to teachers, just over 80% of the over 200 responders said they would take advantage of the expanded access to Edpuzzle provided through a district subscription.

Background and Purpose/Rationale (Alignment to District Strategic Plan)

By providing special education teachers with planning opportunities as well as training and feedback in research/evidenced based methodologies, teacher practices will improve, which will result in student academic gains in literacy. The SPIRE reading program is a Tier II and Tier III reading intervention that is supported by the International Dyslexia Association. It requires a 6 hour training program in order to implement. We had 12 special education teachers trained at the beginning of the 20 -21 school year and purchased kits for each one of them. Implementation started by the end of September. We have now trained an additional 9 special education teachers who require the kits in order to implement the program. There will be a follow-up training in March for all the special education teachers that have been trained as a means to provide support in their first year of learning the program.

In partnership with family and community, the Consolidated School District of New Britain works to provide the best personalized and comprehensive whole-child education so our students will be prepared for, and positively contribute to, a profoundly different future. Our curriculum renewal timeline at the middle school level turns to English Language Arts for the 2021-2022 school year. Our foundational resource we have been using until this point, Pearson/Prentice Hall's Literature, was published in 2010 and does not include extensive digital support. To prepare for curriculum writing, we assembled a diverse team at the middle school level consisting of teachers, coaches, administrators, special educators and EL administrators and coaches. In examining options for resources, the team was mindful of several variables. As we have learned in recent months, our students and teachers at the middle school have become more proficient in accessing digital materials through their Google Classrooms. It was essential that a replacement resource include a robust, easily navigable digital platform that communicates fluently with Google Classroom and Clever. In addition, ensuring that extensive supports and scaffolds were included for our English learners and our students who require special education services was non-negotiable. StudySync not only offers support in Spanish, a dominant language among our students, but also includes auditory resources that are able to be read aloud at different speeds, in addition to comprehensive scaffolds built into every lesson. StudySync is being utilized with success in Meriden and Waterbury, Connecticut districts with similar demographics to New Britain. The diversity of authors and topics in reading full texts and excerpts was extensive and ranged from contemporary to classic. The attached quote includes a 6-year digital subscription to StudySync at \$237,407.50, an average of \$39,567.92/year). Comparison quotes included a 3-year digital subscription (\$181,332.50...an average of \$60,444.17/year), as well as 6-year quotes for unitized (\$399,935.28) and single-bind (\$376,992.10) consumables. The team felt strongly that the price difference for the consumables was not worthwhile when they would not be used in totality and when all resources therein is available and editable in digital format, although there are options to purchase single consumables at \$6/unit/student for a subset of our students who may need them.

In the effort to build library collections at all levels with an eye on diversity, equity and democracy we are purchasing an average of \$12,000 of print and non print (e-books) materials for each school. Smaller learning communities have access to their building's media center and Destiny collection or have access to a nearby building's collection. The focus of these orders is to build the collection with our diverse community in mind. This includes purchasing materials that reflect the cultures, abilities, gender identity, and languages that exist in our schools. Diversifying the collection has been a focus in the past, however the last few years have shown that we need to do a better job with providing our students with library materials that are current and timely and meet their needs and diverse backgrounds. Our collections are dated, the average publishing age of the district's library collections is 2001 (20 years old). A few schools have an average of 1997 (23 years old). This influx of new books will go a long way to help update the library collections and allow us to then renew and continue to build the collections from a more contemporary status.

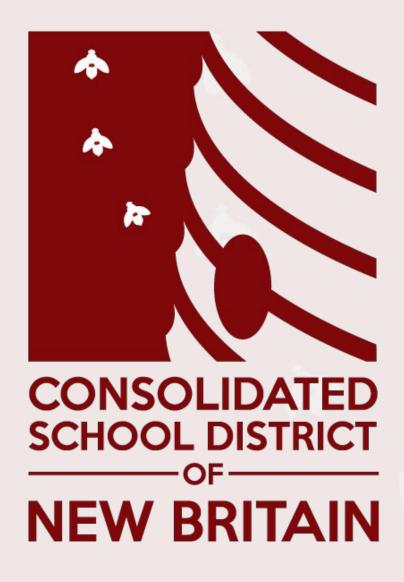

NEW BRITAIN HIGH SCHOOL ADA CODE COMPLIANCE - 2007

CONNECTICUT GENERAL STATUTES

Connecticut General Statutes Section 10-284(b) provides that: The Commissioner of Administrative Services may also disapprove a grant application if the town or regional school district has not begun construction, as defined in section 10-282, not later than 2 years after the effective date of the act of the General Assembly authorizing the Commissioner of Education or the Commissioner of Administrative Services to enter into grant commitments for a project as provided in sections 10-283 and 10-283a.

Section 10-282(9) defines the "Date of beginning of construction" to be the date on which the general construction contract or the first phase thereof, purchase agreement or leasing agreement is signed by the authorized agent of the town or regional school district.

Note: Pursuant to Section 10-282(9) of the Connecticut General Statutes, construction for Chamberlain Elementary School must begin on or before October 2, 2022.

PART I: APPLICATION OVERVIEW

Purpose:

The Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) supports Connecticut's low-performing K-12 public schools by providing grants-in-aid for alterations, repairs, improvements, technology, and equipment to address school site opportunities promoting learning, health, and safety for all children in high-quality facilities and 21st century educational environments.

The funds outlined in this specific award will provide grants-in-aid to eligible schools and districts exclusively for the purchase of technology needed to ensure teachers and students have devices, and access to devices, to successfully enable remote learning, as needed, in response to COVID-19.

Grant Period:

Funding awarded through this grant application process must be expended by June 30, 2022.

Eligible Applicants:

Applications will be accepted from LEAs on behalf of their low-performing schools. For purposes of this program, a low-performing school is a designated Commissioner's Network, School Improvement Grant (SIG), Category 4 or 5 designated school (including Charter Schools) located in a state-designated Alliance District municipality. School category classifications will follow the assignments published in the 2018-19 CSDE School Classification report. LEAs must submit a separate application for each school they wish to have considered.

Funding and Uses of Funds:

Consideration for this competitive award will be evaluated in support of K-12 student learning-related outcomes related to technology for the purchase of student and instructional devices, as well as technology infrastructure improvement to facilitate the use of such devices to support remote learning. Uses of funds, specifically for Pre-K projects and other programs are ineligible for consideration under this grant application.

LEAs may submit an application(s) requesting up to \$200,000 per school.

Low-Performing Schools bond funding shall not supplant nor overlap with other technology-related grant funding sources, including but not limited to:

- CARES Act/ESSER grant allocations;
- Corona Virus Relief Funds (CRF);
- Partnership for Connecticut technology allocations (high schools only);
- district-funded planned purchases or replacements as part of normal operations;
- CSDE High Quality/Common Core Technology Grants;
- technology funding including that from Alliance District ECS Grants, Priority School District Grants, Commissioner's Network, and ESSA-SIG 1003(a), SIG 1003(g); and/or
- funds which support standard operating expenses or expendable supplies.

The awarding of funding is contingent upon an application's selection, the availability of funds, and approval by the CSDE and the State Bond Commission.



Additional Application Information:

A. Application Requirements: All applications must include the following components to be considered complete and eligible for further review and consideration: (a) a complete, signed and accurate application cover page; (b) a detailed bond funding proposal, including narrative and project/budget information in response to all application questions; and (c) a signed statement of assurances.

Applications that do not comply with these requirements may be considered non-responsive and excluded from review. Omission of any required document or form, failure to use required formats for response, or failure to respond to any of the requirements may lead to rejection of the proposal prior to any formal review.

- C. Submission Deadline: All applications must be submitted by e-mail to Mike Kent, at Michael.Kent@ct.gov, no later than 4:00 p.m. on December 1, 2020. No additions or changes to any application will be allowed after the application due date, unless such modification is specifically requested by the CSDE.
- **D. Submission Process:** This application request serves as the instrument through which grant proposals are solicited and evaluated.
- **E.** Amendment or Cancellation of the Application: The CSDE reserves the right to cancel, amend, modify, or otherwise change this request at any time if it deems it to be in the best interest of the state to do so. The CSDE, at its option, may seek applicant retraction and/or clarification of any discrepancy or contradiction found during its review of applications. The CSDE may decide, at any time, to start the application process again if in the best interests of the state.
- **F. Application Expenses:** Applicants are responsible for all costs and expenses incurred in the preparation of applications and for any subsequent work on the application that is required by CSDE.
- **G. Oral Agreement or Arrangements:** Any alleged oral agreements or arrangements made by applicants with any state agency or employee will be disregarded in any state application evaluation or associated grant award.

Disbursement of Funds: Once bond grants are approved, disbursement of funds will be subject to satisfaction of any identified contingencies, including the submission and subsequent approval of any outstanding final project audit reports for previously completed Low-Performing Schools bond award projects in any of the LEA's schools. If the school has any uncompleted Low-Performing Schools bond award projects from a prior approval, funding under this application may be held until such other



projects are completed, at CSDE's discretion. Note that grant end dates under this application will not be extended in this event.

- J. Monitoring: The state may conduct site visits to grantees and sub-grantees funded under this grant program to monitor a school and district's progress and compliance within the intent of the program. Within 60 days of project completion or at the end of the grant period, whichever is earlier, the grantee is required to submit a final project and audit report (template provided by CSDE) to confirm the manner in which funds were utilized. Any funds not expended, or not expended in accordance with the approved budget, must be returned to the state.
- K. Freedom of Information Act: All applications shall become the sole property of the state. All of the information contained in an application is subject to the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), Section 1-200 et seq. of the Connecticut General Statutes. FOIA declares that, except as provided by federal law or state statute, records maintained or kept on file by any public agency (as defined in statute) are public records and every person has a right to inspect such records and receive a copy of such records in accordance with the terms of FOIA.

Application Evaluation:

This is a competitive application and not all applications received will be funded. All applications deemed eligible will be evaluated in their entirety using the scoring rubric in Appendix A which includes consideration for Commissioner's Network and SIG-funded schools. Any funding ultimately awarded for specific project work in selected schools is subject to revision, reduction, or elimination on a project-by-project basis at the sole discretion of CSDE. Funding considerations include, but are not limited to priorities, cost estimation, conformance to capital appropriation guidelines, and available funding. A funding recommendation from selected applications will then be submitted to the State Bond Commission for final approval. No bond funding may be awarded without such approval.

B. Overall Project Narrative and Rationale: Describe how the proposal supports specific school-wide needs and goals to improve student remote learning opportunities. Provide a brief recap of how an additional funding award will complement technology devices already received by the school in response to Covid-19 plans (include all sources). Explain how the proposed project(s) will integrate with the formal School Improvement Plan goals and/or Network School Plan (if applicable).

The overarching goal is to build teacher capacity to integrate technology in their instruction. Principals completed the Substitution, Augmentation, Modification, and Redefinition (SAMR)Model to access technology integration. According to June survey results, 82% of teachers were in the enhancement (1 and 2) category of integrating technology into instruction and 18% of teachers were in the transformation (3 and 4) category of integrating technology into instruction.

Due to the pandemic and virtual learning, teaching requires enhanced technology. In response to COVID, students have received brand new Chromebooks while teachers were left with outdated and much slower devices. This has become challenging for teachers as they try to embrace a variety of platforms which require a much higher processing speed, to meet the needs of all learners while providing efficient and engaging lessons. Our current devices cannot handle the complexity of the software that we need to run without having programs crash or not open at all. This causes the need to troubleshoot during live meets which, in turn, results in a loss of student engagement and instructional time. We also cannot run the number of programs that we need to, simultaneously, or at the speed that they require to function properly. Student learning would be enhanced if teacher technology was powerful enough to handle the requirements of our new style of teaching.

With all students currently remote, they are not able to share their work in real time. This impacts academic discourse. Students ability to engage in lessons as well as share their responses with teachers and peers for the purposes of feedback is compromised. Not being able to interact with each other or get immediate feedback results in a lack of engagement. We have noticed that chronic absenteeism has increased because students are not logging in to their google meetings.



Currently, teachers are teaching both in school and remote learners at the same time. This makes it very difficult for students to hear each other during lessons and google meets due to feedback, echoing, and limits to microphone and speaker quality. Students are not able to have true student to student discourse as teachers are having to echo responses and comments of in classroom students which is a major loss of instructional time. In addition, teachers are very limited in their movement around the classroom while teaching due to their proximity from the current microphone/speakers.

C. Instructional Technology: Indicate the requested portion of the grant that will support instructional needs and how this funding will be used. This could include teacher devices and laptops, instructional capture, display and transmission, and storage devices, as examples.

Teacher Laptops: To support the delivery of the platforms necessary in our current teaching environment, teachers need updated technology. Larger screens would assist in being able to clearly see all students and their work. A faster and larger processor would handle the complexity of the software that we need to run, how many programs we can operate simultaneously as well as how fast those programs will work.

Drawing Pads: To increase student engagement and participation in lessons, the drawing pads would provide the opportunity for students to show their work in real time, interact with the lesson by sharing responses and collaborate with peers. The pads would also provide teachers the opportunity to utilize ongoing formative assessments during lessons.

Chargers: Many chargers have been broken or misplaced. We need to have extras on hand so that students can maintain a constant charge to their Chromebooks and minimize loss of instructional time when their device shuts down.

Headphones: For students at home and in the classroom, focus and instructional time would increase with the use of headphones with microphones as they would minimize the noise and distractions students are subject to in their current learning environments.

ASUS Google Hangouts Meet Speakermics: This device will allow teachers and in school students to communicate better with remote learners without the disruptions of feedback from multiple microphones being on at once. It will also allow teachers to be able to move around the classroom and access whiteboards, visual aids, etc and still be heard clearly by students who are remote.

Laptop Cases: Teachers need to safely transport their devices as they move back and forth from remote to in building teaching.

Wireless Mice: Many of the platforms we use are difficult to manipulate using a touchpad and using a mouse would make them quicker and more efficient.

Adapters/Splitters/HDMI cables: Teachers need to be able to connect their whiteboard and an additional monitor to the laptop to be able to have multiple screens running at once and projected to students in the



classroom.

We are currently in a brand new building with the most up to date fiber, cable/wiring, hotspots, bandwith and wifi network equipment. We are currently operating in a 1:1 environment. We have been assured by our technology department head that our infrastructure can fully handle the demands of updated technology with no additional resources.

The grant funds will support our ability to ensure that all students can be engaged in lessons daily and interacting with teachers in real time. The pads will increase our ability to give immediate feedback to students which will aid in their learning and minimize the loss of instructional time. The speakers will increase student discourse and collaboration. Finally, laptops will support teacher ability to keep up with technology demands reducing the need to troubleshoot and wait for buffering thereby maximizing instructional time and student engagement.

The major cost for this project is in the purchase of property to increase student engagement

APPENDIX A: APPLICATION EVALUATION RUBRIC

Applicants will be evaluated based on clear, complete, and specific responses to the application narrative, questions, descriptions and budget. The application is scored holistically, even if comprised of separate projects. Incorporation of projects not aligned to need and strategic intent may impact overall scoring. Each section is rated using the following key:

4 points – Excellent: Specific and comprehensive. Complete, detailed and clearly articulated information regarding criteria. Well-conceived and developed.

3 points – Good: Clearly written with most important and relevant details or requested information provided. Very few questions are not fully explained. A few minor inconsistencies or errors may exist.

2 points – Satisfactory: General, but insufficient detail. Adequate information regarding criteria, but several areas are not sufficiently explained and/or questions remain. Several inconsistencies, weaknesses and/or errors.

1 point – Fair: Unclear and non-specific. Criteria appear to be minimally met, but limited information is provided about approach and strategies. Lacks focus, detail, and/or coherence. May contain multiple errors.

O points – Poor: Does not meet or address the criteria. Fails to provide information, provides inaccurate information, or provides information that requires substantial clarification as to how criteria are met.

PART I: APPLICATION OVERVIEW

Purpose:

The Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) supports Connecticut's low-performing K-12 public schools by providing grants-in-aid for alterations, repairs, improvements, technology, and equipment to address school site opportunities promoting learning, health, and safety for all children in high-quality facilities and 21st century educational environments.

The funds outlined in this specific award will provide grants-in-aid to eligible schools and districts exclusively for the purchase of technology needed to ensure teachers and students have devices, and access to devices, to successfully enable remote learning, as needed, in response to COVID-19.

Grant Period:

Funding awarded through this grant application process must be expended by June 30, 2022.

Eligible Applicants:

Applications will be accepted from LEAs on behalf of their low-performing schools. For purposes of this program, a low-performing school is a designated Commissioner's Network, School Improvement Grant (SIG), Category 4 or 5 designated school (including Charter Schools) located in a state-designated Alliance District municipality. School category classifications will follow the assignments published in the 2018-19 CSDE School Classification report. LEAs must submit a separate application for each school they wish to have considered.

Funding and Uses of Funds:

Consideration for this competitive award will be evaluated in support of K-12 student learning-related outcomes related to technology for the purchase of student and instructional devices, as well as technology infrastructure improvement to facilitate the use of such devices to support remote learning. Uses of funds, specifically for Pre-K projects and other programs are ineligible for consideration under this grant application.

LEAs may submit an application(s) requesting up to \$200,000 per school.

Low-Performing Schools bond funding shall not supplant nor overlap with other technology-related grant funding sources, including but not limited to:

- CARES Act/ESSER grant allocations;
- Corona Virus Relief Funds (CRF);
- Partnership for Connecticut technology allocations (high schools only);
- district-funded planned purchases or replacements as part of normal operations;
- CSDE High Quality/Common Core Technology Grants;
- technology funding including that from Alliance District ECS Grants, Priority School District Grants, Commissioner's Network, and ESSA-SIG 1003(a), SIG 1003(g); and/or
- funds which support standard operating expenses or expendable supplies.

The awarding of funding is contingent upon an application's selection, the availability of funds, and approval by the CSDE and the State Bond Commission.

Monitoring: The state may conduct site visits to grantees and sub-grantees funded under this grant program to monitor a school and district's progress and compliance within the intent of the program. Within 60 days of project completion or at the end of the grant period, whichever is earlier, the grantee is required to submit a final project and audit report (template provided by CSDE) to confirm the manner in which funds were utilized. Any funds not expended, or not expended in accordance with the approved budget, must be returned to the state.

Any funding ultimately awarded for specific project work in selected schools is subject to revision, reduction, or elimination on a project-by-project basis at the sole discretion of CSDE. The overarching goal is to build teacher capacity to integrate technology in their instruction. Principals completed the Substitution, Augmentation, Modification, and Redefinition (SAMR)Model to assess technology integration. According to June survey results,

• 79% of teachers were in the enhancement (1 and 2) category of integrating technology into instruction and 21% of teachers were in the transformation (3 and 4) category of integrating technology into instruction

Due to the pandemic and virtual learning, teaching requires enhanced technology. Our data indicates that teachers need enhancement technology devices to build their capacity.

Our district wide response to COVID was to ensure that all students received brand new chromebooks for equity of access. Teachers, on the other hand, did not receive new devices, Teachers were left with outdated and much slower devices. This has become challenging for teachers as they try to navigate a variety of platforms which require a much higher processing speed, to meet the needs of all learners. Our current devices can not handle complexity of the software required to run without being kicked out of the meet, programs crashing or not being able to open at all. We also cannot run the number of programs that we need to, simultaneously, or at the speed that they require to function properly. Student learning would be enhanced if teacher technology was powerful enough to handle the requirements of our new style of teaching. Currently, teachers are teaching both in school and remote learners at the same time. This makes it very difficult for students to hear each other during lessons and google meets due to feedback, echoing, and limits of microphone and speaker quality. Students are not able to have true student to student discourse as teachers are having to echo responses and comments of in classroom students which is a major loss of instructional time. In addition, teachers are very limited in their movement around the classroom while teaching due to their proximity from the current microphone/speakers they are forced to be stationary at their desk or small area in front of the class.

The technology enhancements below will enable teachers to be portable in their classrooms.

Teacher laptops: 15 inch screen to be able to clearly see students and their work; core i7 processor to be able to handle the complexity of the software that we need to run, how many programs we can run simultaneously as well as how fast those programs will run; 12-16G of RAM to assist with speed; touch screen capability that many of our current platforms require

Laptop Cases: Teachers need to safely transport their devices as they move back and forth from remote to in building teaching.

Wireless Mice: Many of the platforms we use are difficult to manipulate using a touchpad and using a mouse would make them quicker and more efficient.

Adapters/Splitters/HDMI cables: Teachers need to be able to connect their whiteboard and an additional monitor to the laptop to be able to have multiple screens running at once and projected to students in the classroom.

ASUS Google Hangouts Meet Speakermics: Will allow teachers and in school students to communicate better with remote learners without the disruptions of feedback from multiple microphones being on at once. It will also allow teachers to be able to move around the classroom and access whiteboards, visual aids, etc and still be heard clearly by students who are remote.

Chargers: Many chargers have been broken or misplaced. We need to have extras on hand so that students can maintain a constant charge to their Chromebooks and minimize loss of instructional time when their device shuts down.

Headphones: For students at home and in the classroom, focus and instructional time would increase with the use of headphones with microphones as they would minimize the noise and distractions students are subject to in their current learning environments.

Drawing Pad: For students at school who have difficulty using the keyboard for note taking. The wireless drawing pads will support students with note taking in real time by providing them a familiar tactile sensation to ease their transition into digital learning.

2 points – Satisfactory: General, but insufficient detail. Adequate information regarding criteria, but several areas are not sufficiently explained and/or questions remain. Several inconsistencies, weaknesses and/or errors.

1 point – Fair: Unclear and non-specific. Criteria appear to be minimally met, but limited information is provided about approach and strategies. Lacks focus, detail, and/or coherence. May contain multiple errors.

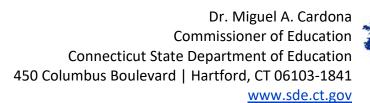

PART I: APPLICATION OVERVIEW

Purpose:

The Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) supports Connecticut's low-performing K-12 public schools by providing grants-in-aid for alterations, repairs, improvements, technology, and equipment to address school site opportunities promoting learning, health, and safety for all children in high-quality facilities and 21st century educational environments.

The funds outlined in this specific award will provide grants-in-aid to eligible schools and districts exclusively for the purchase of technology needed to ensure teachers and students have devices, and access to devices, to successfully enable remote learning, as needed, in response to COVID-19.

Grant Period:

Funding awarded through this grant application process must be expended by June 30, 2022.

Eligible Applicants:

Applications will be accepted from LEAs on behalf of their low-performing schools. For purposes of this program, a low-performing school is a designated Commissioner's Network, School Improvement Grant (SIG), Category 4 or 5 designated school (including Charter Schools) located in a state-designated Alliance District municipality. School category classifications will follow the assignments published in the 2018-19 CSDE School Classification report. LEAs must submit a separate application for each school they wish to have considered.

Funding and Uses of Funds:

Consideration for this competitive award will be evaluated in support of K-12 student learning-related outcomes related to technology for the purchase of student and instructional devices, as well as technology infrastructure improvement to facilitate the use of such devices to support remote learning. Uses of funds, specifically for Pre-K projects and other programs are ineligible for consideration under this grant application.

LEAs may submit an application(s) requesting up to \$200,000 per school.

Low-Performing Schools bond funding shall not supplant nor overlap with other technology-related grant funding sources, including but not limited to:

- CARES Act/ESSER grant allocations;
- Corona Virus Relief Funds (CRF);
- Partnership for Connecticut technology allocations (high schools only);
- district-funded planned purchases or replacements as part of normal operations;
- CSDE High Quality/Common Core Technology Grants;
- technology funding including that from Alliance District ECS Grants, Priority School District Grants, Commissioner's Network, and ESSA-SIG 1003(a), SIG 1003(g); and/or
- funds which support standard operating expenses or expendable supplies.

The awarding of funding is contingent upon an application's selection, the availability of funds, and approval by the CSDE and the State Bond Commission.



Additional Application Information:

- **A. Application Requirements:** All applications must include the following components to be considered complete and eligible for further review and consideration: (a) a complete, signed and accurate application cover page; (b) a detailed bond funding proposal, including narrative and project/budget information in response to all application questions; and (c) a signed statement of assurances.
 - Applications that do not comply with these requirements may be considered non-responsive and excluded from review. Omission of any required document or form, failure to use required formats for response, or failure to respond to any of the requirements may lead to rejection of the proposal prior to any formal review.

- **D. Submission Process:** This application request serves as the instrument through which grant proposals are solicited and evaluated.
- **E.** Amendment or Cancellation of the Application: The CSDE reserves the right to cancel, amend, modify, or otherwise change this request at any time if it deems it to be in the best interest of the state to do so. The CSDE, at its option, may seek applicant retraction and/or clarification of any discrepancy or contradiction found during its review of applications. The CSDE may decide, at any time, to start the application process again if in the best interests of the state.

If the school has any uncompleted Low-Performing Schools bond award projects from a prior approval, funding under this application may be held until such other projects are completed, at CSDE's discretion. Note that grant end dates under this application will not be extended in this event.



- J. Monitoring: The state may conduct site visits to grantees and sub-grantees funded under this grant program to monitor a school and district's progress and compliance within the intent of the program. Within 60 days of project completion or at the end of the grant period, whichever is earlier, the grantee is required to submit a final project and audit report (template provided by CSDE) to confirm the manner in which funds were utilized. Any funds not expended, or not expended in accordance with the approved budget, must be returned to the state.
- K. Freedom of Information Act: All applications shall become the sole property of the state. All of the information contained in an application is subject to the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), Section 1-200 et seq. of the Connecticut General Statutes. Application Evaluation:

This is a competitive application and not all applications received will be funded. All applications deemed eligible will be evaluated in their entirety using the scoring rubric in Appendix A which includes consideration for Commissioner's Network and SIG-funded schools. Any funding ultimately awarded for specific project work in selected schools is subject to revision, reduction, or elimination on a project-by-project basis at the sole discretion of CSDE. Funding considerations include, but are not limited to priorities, cost estimation, conformance to capital appropriation guidelines, and available funding. A funding recommendation from selected applications will then be submitted to the State Bond Commission for final approval. No bond funding may be awarded without such approval.

The district administered the Substitution, Augmentation, Modification, and Redefinition (SAMR)Model survey to assess technology integration. 97% of Chamberlain teachers were in the enhancement (1 and 2) category of integrating technology into instruction and 3% of teachers were in the transformation (3 and 4) category of integrating technology into instruction. The data indicates the need to build teacher capacity to integrate technology into their instruction. A critical component of this is ensuring that all staff have equal access to technology devices.

Due to the pandemic and virtual learning, teaching requires enhanced technology. The Consolidated School District of New Britain's response to COVID was to ensure that all students receive a brand new chromebook for equity of access and opportunity. Teachers, on the other hand, did not receive new devices. Teachers were distributed outdated and much slower devices. This has become challenging for teachers as they try to embrace a variety of platforms which require a much higher processing speed, to meet the needs of all learners. Our current devices can not handle complexity of the software that we need to run without being kicked out of the meet, programs crashing or not being able to open at all. We also cannot run the number of programs that we need to, simultaneously, or at the speed that they require to function properly. Student learning would be enhanced if teacher technology was powerful enough to handle the requirements of our new style of teaching. Currently, teachers are teaching both in school and remote learners at the same time. This makes it very difficult for students to hear each other during lessons and google meets due to feedback, echoing, and limits to microphone and speaker quality. Students are not able to have true student to student discourse as teachers are having to echo responses and comments of in classroom students which is a major loss of instructional time. In addition, teachers are very limited in their movement around the classroom while teaching due to their proximity from the current microphone/speakers.

C. Instructional Technology: Indicate the requested portion of the grant that will support instructional needs

Technology enhancements:

Teacher laptops: 15 inch screen to be able to clearly see students and their work; core i7 processor to be able to handle the complexity of the software that we need to run, how many programs we can run simultaneously as well as how fast those programs will run; 12-16G of RAM to assist with speed; touch screen capability that many of our current platforms require

Chargers: Many chargers have been broken or misplaced. We need to have extras on hand so that students can maintain a constant charge to their Chromebooks and minimize loss of instructional time when their device shuts down

Laptop Cases: Teachers need to safely transport their devices as they move back and forth from remote to in building teaching.

Wireless Mice: Many of the platforms we use are difficult to manipulate using a touchpad and using a mouse would make them quicker and more efficient.

Adapters/Splitters/HDMI cables: Teachers need to be able to connect their whiteboard and an additional monitor to the laptop to be able to have multiple screens running at once and projected to students in the classroom.

ASUS Google Hangouts Meet Speakermics: Will allow teachers and in school students to communicate better with remote learners without the disruptions of feedback from multiple microphones being on at once. It will also allow teachers to be able to move around the classroom and access whiteboards, visual aids, etc and still be heard clearly by students who are remote..

Headphones: For students at home and in the classroom, focus and instructional time would increase with the use of headphones with microphones as they would minimize the noise and distractions students are subject to in their current learning environments.

We are currently in an older building with some up to date hotspots, bandwidth and wifi network equipment. We have been assured by our technology department head that our technology infrastructure can fully meet the demands that this updated technology would require with no additional resources.

All technology will be ordered upon approval of the funding and will be in operation by February 2021. All will be scanned into Chamberlain inventory. 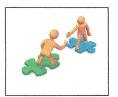

Background and Purpose/Rationale (Alignment to District Strategic Plan)

Cultural Responsiveness has become a primary focus for Slade Middle School in increasing the student engagement. We have initiated Cultural Responsiveness into the development of our curriculum as a preliminary task to become a student centered environment that focuses on the needs of all students. Chronic student absence has created many barriers to our students accessing their education. Our intent in being student centered is to focus on student engagement that provides a well-rounded, whole child education. Student centered instruction will decrease student chronic absenteeism by providing education in talent,

academics, culture and climate and operations. Teachers need access to tools that promote the delivery of student centered instruction. Engaging instruction is predicated upon quality teacher, student and platform mobility and interaction. At this time our teachers do not have the tools that promote this engagement. The current teacher technology devices, 5-7 year old used student Chromebooks do not support the platforms required to deliver timely, quality engagement. Provision of updated technology tools for staff promotes the alignment of our School Theory of Action: Curriculum: If the staff and faculty of Slade Middle School follow a comprehensive, standards based curriculum with a foundation in literacy and numeracy that meets the needs of a diverse student population, then student performance will improve.

Learning Context: If the staff and faculty of Slade Middle School provide strategies to create a caring, safe and engaging learning environments, then student performance will improve.

Instructional Practices: If the staff and faculty of Slade Middle School provide research based instructional practices that engage all students with content at their instructional level and is aligned with their interests, backgrounds and possible futures, then student performance will improve. Assessment: If the staff and faculty of Slade Middle School provide an assessment structure that links the three levels of the system with a systematic, team-based data application process and research based assessment tools, then student performance will improve.

Upon discovery by PowerSchool of a breach, PowerSchool shall conduct an investigation and reasonably restore the integrity of its data systems and, without unreasonable delay, but not later than thirty (30) days after discovery of the breach, shall provide the Licensee with a detailed notice of the breach, including but not limited to:
 - 7.2.1. the date and time of the breach;
 - 7.2.2. name(s) of the student(s) whose student data was released, disclosed or acquired;

- 7.2.3. nature and extent of the breach; and
- 7.2.4 measures taken to ensure that such a breach does not occur in the future.
- 7.3. PowerSchool agrees to cooperate with the Licensee with respect to investigation of the breach and to reimburse the Licensee for costs associated with responding to the breach, including but not limited to the costs relating to notifications as required by Public Act 16-189.
- 7.4. Dust Collection Systems at New Britain High School, Pulaski Middle School, and Slade Middle School are vital for maintaining safety in the Tech Ed rooms at each school. SL Cooke has quoted all equipment and installation in their proposal to meet all national fire protection codes and school safety code requirements. The Tech Ed rooms provide a safe educational environment that mirrors real-world industry settings so that students can develop the skills required to pursue successful careers in various trades. Students work hands-on with high-tech machinery that meets current manufacturing industry standards and was installed last summer as part of the District's investment and commitment to growing manufacturing and technology education. Re: Five Year History of Grant Awards

Attached as pages 2 and 3 is the grant award for the current year and the four prior years. Also shown is the grant life for each grant. The majority of grants usually commence as of July 1st, but there are a few exceptions. Grant applications submittal dates do vary and many of our grants are submitted after July 1st when the State opens the portal for submission.

Recently the District received notification that it has been awarded \$22,902,450 for the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds II (ESSER II) which is not included in the attachments. The District is planning for expenditures commencing as of July 1, 2021. These funds have to be fully expended by September 20, 2023. The grant application is not open as of yet for submittal. The purpose for these funds are:

- Academic Supports, Learning Loss, Learning Acceleration and Recovery
- Family and Community Connections
- School Safety and Social-emotional well-being of the "Whole Student" and of our School Staff
- Remote Learning, staff Development, and the Digital Divide Additional other uses of these funds can be for:
 - Addressing learning loss among students
 - School facility repairs and improvements to reduce risk of virus transmission and exposure to environmental health hazards

Re: Discussion on Future Years School Construction Projects

In January 2019 the Board submitted three School Construction Projects to the City of New Britain for consideration. After these were submitted to the City a CIP Template was sent by the City for Mr. Moore to complete.

The projects that were submitted were as follows:

- Chamberlain Expansion & Renovation Project
- Slade Roofing Project
- Pulaski Roofing Project

BTW the City Charter requires that capital projects must be submitted annually by January 15th. In December 2020 the City forwarded over a Capital Improvement Template to our new Director of Facilities to complete. I do not recall this template ever being sent by the City unless it was sent directly to Mr. Moore. Mr. Dion did forward this to me and I informed him it cannot be submitted to the City without Board of Education approval of new projects.

In looking at our future needs there should be consideration to eventually forward on these three school construction projects that were discussed two years prior:

- Roosevelt Roof Project Fiscal Year 2022-23 (est. \$3 million)
- Holmes Expansion & Renovation Project Fiscal Year 2023-24 (est. \$50 million)
- Jefferson Expansion & Renovation Project Fiscal Year 2025-26 (est. \$58 million)

In addition, there should be consideration in contracting with outside professionals to assist the Board of Education in undergoing a comprehensive facility master plan of our schools.

Re: Discussion on Excess Cost Grant and Potential ECS Holdback for the

Current Fiscal Year

Due to the closing of schools last March, costs for outplaced special education students may have been less than what was projected in the State's calculation for the special education excess cost grant. Discussions took place with the State and school districts that they would fund excess cost grant as if schools were fully in session for the 2019-2020 school year. It was also discussed in that the excess cost grant was higher than it should have been for 2019-2020 that there may be a holdback in ECS funding to the municipalities due to the overpayment for the 2019-2020 in excess cost grant.

We will not know if there is a holdback until May. If the City does not receive its full funding, I am recommending that the excess cost that flows to Education budget for 2020-2021 be reduced by the holdback in order to make the City whole.
