Standing Rules

1. The District Steward, the Recording Steward and the Lay Leader of each charge are ex-officio members of the District Conference. Besides these, each charge is entitled to four delegates.
2. The Presiding Elders are a standing committee to nominate all the boards and regular standing committees at each session of the Conference.
3. The Presiding Elders are required by Conference resolution to send to the Secretary of the Conference, immediately after the meeting of their respective boards of District Stewards, a copy of the assessments made on each charge, and these assessments are to be recorded by the Secretary as the official assessment against the several charges of the Conference.
4. A Teller shall be elected quadrennially at the session following the General Conference, whose duty it shall be to receive all funds collected for the purpose known as Conference Collections which may be brought to the Annual Conference, and turn the same over to the several Annual Conference Boards as soon as practicable after the Conference meets. He shall be assisted by a representative of the Conference Boards.
5. The Treasurer of each of the Conference Boards shall forward in duplicate all receipts for moneys paid him by the pastor during the interim between the sessions of the Conference, and the Treasurer shall forward the receipts of the Secretary of the Auditing Committee, and the Auditor forward the duplicate receipts to the Pastors.
6. The Presiding Elder of each district shall appoint an editor of the statistical reports of his district, whose duty it shall be to collect all the statistical reports from the preachers in charge within the district and see that they are correctly made out. And when the District Editors shall have collected and edited these reports, they shall turn them over to the Statistical Secretary of the Conference, during the first day of the Conference session.
7. The Chairman of Committee on Admissions shall make written report to be filed with the Secretary of the Conference, concerning each one admitted into the Conference. This report shall embrace: full name; name of parents; date and place of birth, conversion and license to preach; date of marriage; name of wife, and such other facts of his life as may be deemed important.

CONFERENCE JOURNAL

OPENING DAY.

The Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, being one of the conferences into which the original Northwest Texas Conference was divided by the General Conference in May, 1910, convened in its first annual session—the forty-fifth session from the date of organization of the original Northwest Texas Conference—in the Methodist Church in Waxahachie, Texas, at nine o'clock a. m. Wednesday, the 16th day of November, 1910.

Bishop James Atkins called the Conference to order and conducted the opening worship as follows:

Hymn No. 560:

And are we yet alive
And see each others face.

Prayer, led by the Bishop.

Reading and exposition of a part of St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians.

Hymn: Come thou fount of every blessing.

The roll was called by Jno. M. Barcus, the Secretary of the last session of the old Northwest Texas Conference.

(For names of those who were present see Conference Roll).

The following lay alternates were seated in place of absent principals:

F. F. Downs, vice A. F. Bentley, from Georgetown District.

Jno. M. Barcus was elected Secretary and on his nomination Jno. R. Morris, S. J. Rucker, J. B. Berry, C. H. Buchanan and E. P. Williams were elected assistants. The last three were named as Statistical Secretaries.

Jerome Duncan, for the Presiding Elders, submitted a revised list of the Standing Rules of the original Northwest Texas Conference, which, with some minor amendments, were adopted by the Conference.

Tinkle, from Oklahoma Conference; J. O. Gore, from the New Mexico Conference; H. L. Gray, from the North Georgia Conference; W. F. Campbell, from Texas Conference; A. B. C. Debnam, from North Texas Conference.

Communications from the several connectional officers and Boards were referred without reading to appropriate Boards or Committees.

Bishop Atkins read a communication from Rev. G. S. Sexton concerning the proposed church in Washington, D. C., and made some remarks commendatory of the enterprise.

Prof. J. M. Alderdyce was introduced and extended to the Conference a cordial welcome in behalf of the citizens of Waxahachie, to which the Chair made a fitting response.

Dr. A. J. Lamar of the Publishing House and Dr. G. C. Rankin, editor of Texas Christian Advocate, addressed the Conference.

Jerome Duncan read resolutions signed by himself and others expressing sympathy with Hon. Jno. W. Robbins, whose wife, it was announced, had just died in the city of Austin. The resolutions were adopted and ordered sent to Mr. Robbins.

Dr. Early, representing the Superannuate Endowment Fund, addressed the Conference, and Ed. R. Wallace was elected to assist him during the Conference session.

Rev. A. E. Rector of the German Mission Conference addressed the Conference concerning our work among foreign immigrants at the port of Galveston.

W. E. Williams, Lay Leader of the Conference, made call for a meeting of the laymen to consider plans for another year.

Horace Bishop spoke concerning the Texas Historical Quarterly.

A number of recent transfers and visitors were introduced to the Conference.

On motion of James Campbell the hours for meeting and adjournment were fixed at 9 o'clock a. m. and 12 o'clock m.

On motion of A. D. Porter the bar of the Conference was fixed to include the main auditorium.

Committee on Public Worship announced preaching at 3 p. m. by Jno. A. Rice and the Sunday School anniversary at 7:30 p. m. to be addressed by Bishop Atkins and Dr. Bulla.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Conference sang a hymn and adjourned with the benediction by R. C. Armstrong.

Second Day

The Conference was called to order at 9 a. m. by E. F. Boone, who conducted the opening worship.

Bishop Atkins took the chair.

The minutes of the first day were read and approved.

The Secretary called the names of those who did not respond to first roll call and those present were noted.

On motion of Jno. M. Barcus the further calling of the roll was dispensed with.

PAPER "A".

Resolved, That we request the presiding elders of the several Annual Conferences of Texas, at the first meeting following the session of the General Conference, and at the same time the committees of examination are appointed, to designate instructors from those committees which are to be represented in the faculty of the Summer School of Theology, agreeable to the faculty of the Biblical Department of Southwestern University, and to serve for a term of four years.

The report of the Committee on Orphanage was read by T. E. Bowman and adopted.

Dr. Jno. H. McLean addressed the Conference in the interest of the Orphanage at Waco.

The hour for adjournment having arrived, the Doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Horace Bishop.

On motion of the Secretary the reading of the Journal of the morning session was deferred until the next session.

With the consent of the Conference Jerome Duncan moved a reconsideration of the action by which E. M. Wisdom was admitted on trial and the motion prevailed. On motion of Jerome Duncan, E. M. Wisdom was received as a traveling deacon from the M. E. Church and placed in the class of the third year.

S. R. Hay moved that the paper read by H. A. Boaz at the morning session be adopted.

In Memoriam

JAMES SANFORD TUNNELL.

Rev. James Sanford Tunnell was born April 12, 1855, near Tyler, Texas. He was called from labor to refreshment at 10:45 p. m., on the 9th day of March, 1910. His departure was unexpected and very sudden. The call came while at work on the parsonage yard at Ranger, Texas, his last pastoral charge. He never spoke or saw the light from that moment, but was ready. His house was in order, and preparation was not necessary for the journey. The purity of his life and purpose was never questioned, and was above reproach. He was studious, thoughtful, logical, and his sermons were models in construction, being more than the ordinary of his day. He studied his sermons, never coming before his congregation without thorough preparation. A large, neat and well kept journal shows every detail of his work: record of texts, time and place of delivery of sermons, number of sermons preached in each pastoral charge, number of baptisms, adult and infant members received, amount of money collected for missions and general collections, for pastor and presiding elder, and all with such care through thirty-two years that we see method and great pride in all his work. Total number of marriages, 129, with fees of \$466. Number of members received, 1323; number of sermons preached, 3599; amount on conference collections, \$5344; paid presiding elder, \$2565; preacher in charge, \$15,530. This is a fine showing for the hard circuits of his earlier ministry. He joined the Northwest Texas Conference at Belton, Texas, in November, 1878. He served, in order, 1879, Mountain Mission; 1880-81, Lampasas Circuit; 1882, Marlin Station; 1883, South Gabriel Circuit; 1884, Round Rock Circuit; 1885-86, Liberty Hill Circuit; 1887, Burnet Circuit; 1888-89, Corn Hill Circuit; 1890, Taylor Station; 1891, Mexia Station; 1892-93, Boonville Circuit; 1894, Whitt Circuit; 1895-98, Mineral Wells; 1899-1900, Moran and Albany; 1901-02, Gordon; 1903-06, Valley Mills and Clifton; 1907-08, Morgan and Walnut; 1909, Whitney Station; 1910, he served Ranger Circuit for three months, when he laid his armor down and went to his reward. But few men have made an unbroken record of so many years. He was married to Miss Nellie Mabry December 25, 1881, at Burnet, Texas. To this union God gave six children—three sons and three daughters. Gladys, Avis and Florry were his daughters, who were the pride of his happy home. His sons are Sanford, Buford and Olin, who are an honor to their parents, and promise much to the world. Brother Tunnell's devotion to his family was very marked, and the response was delightful, making a most happy family. May the God of this brave and strong man comfort and guide the grief-stricken companion and wife, and may the mantle of the father fall upon his children. May they be sons and daughters of the Lord Almighty. Peace be to his sleeping dust. We shall meet again.

MARION MILLS.

Marion Mills was born in Jefferson County, Fla., January 20, 1840; with his father moved to Mississippi in 1843 and to Erath County, Texas, in 1856, where he lived for one year. The family then moved to Henderson County,

where they lived until the Civil War. Brother Mills joined the Confederate Army in 1861 and served the entire four years as a brave and faithful soldier of his country. After the war he again settled in Erath County and lived in Hood County at the time of its organization. In 1867 he moved to McLennan County, where he was married in November, 1868, to Miss Sarah Ann Herring. He was converted under the ministry of Rev. W. T. Melugin on the second Sunday in July, 1871, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on the Monday following. He was licensed to exhort by the Quarterly Conference of the Bosqueville Circuit, Northwest Texas Conference, May 10, 1873, W. R. D. Stockton, presiding elder. Bro. Mills, feeling the great call to the ministry, was licensed to preach November 8, 1873, by the same Quarterly Conference and Presiding Elder who gave him license to exhort. He was admitted on trial into the Northwest Texas Conference at Corsicana in the fall of 1875. He was ordained deacon at Waco in 1877 by Bishop Wightman and received in full connection into the Annual Conference. In 1879 he was ordained elder by Bishop McTyeire at Fort Worth. Brother Mills served the following charges: Jonesboro Circuit, two years; Centerville Circuit, one year; Glenrose Circuit, one year; Paluxy Circuit, two years; Eastland Mission, three years; Palo Pinto Circuit, one year; Acton Circuit, two years; Oenaville Circuit, two years; Killeen Circuit, two years; Jonesboro Circuit, one year; Copperas Cove Circuit, one year; Lometa Circuit, two years; Mullin Circuit, one year; Ballinger Mission, two years; Morgan Mission, one year. These dates and places tell the story of twenty-four years of labor by one of the most faithful and devoted servants of God. Uncomplainingly he went at the command of the church he loved so well. No matter how hard the work was, he was never known to murmur about his lot. This list of appointments will show that he labored always on meager salaries. But his fervent love for the church, his Christ-like passion for the souls of men and his zeal for the Master buoyed him up under all difficulties. Brother Mills was an humble, timid man. I never remember hearing him speak on the Conference floor other than to make his report. He said: "I have never missed an Annual Conference, but two District Conferences and two Quarterly Conferences, and but very few appointments." Just before his death he manifested great interest in his home church. In 1899, at the Conference held at Cleburne he was granted the superannuate relation. He then moved with his family to Copperas Cove, where he lived till September 8, 1910, when God said: "It is enough," and took him to heaven. His faithful and devoted wife still lives there, but is in very feeble health. For her and the children we ask the prayers of the church. Brother Mills left eight children living, and three preceded him to the better world. The children were all with him when he died, except Mrs. E. P. Newsom, wife of Rev. E. P. Newsom, Chaplain in the U. S. Navy, at New York. Before he died Brother Mills told his pastor, Rev. J. W. Bowden, to tell the brethren at conference how it was with him at Jordan's brink. Having lived the allotted three-score-years-and-ten, he passed away in great peace, just as those of us who knew him expected that he would do. The God who had given him grace to endure the hardships of thirty-six years in the gospel ministry gave also his rod and his staff to comfort him as he passed through the valley of the shadow of death, and he was made to fear no evil. The funeral service was conducted by the writer, assisted by Rev. J. W. Bowden, his pastor; Rev. E. A. Evans, of Killeen Station; and Rev. S. P. Gilmour, of Copperas Cove Mission.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Your Board of Missions submit this, their forty-fifth report, as the old Northwest Texas Conference and their first as the Central Texas Conference.

We are glad to record another year of success and prosperity, notwithstanding the drouth which has afflicted all parts of the Conference and many portions very severely. One hundred and twenty-six Missionaries have operated in the territory comprising the two Conferences, eight of whom are Missionaries to the foreigners. In the midst of most trying conditions our Missionaries have remained faithfully at their post as real heroes of the Cross, and the courageous band of Missionaries to the Bohemians under the leadership of Rev. V. Cejnar and C. W. Macune and Maurini at Thurber, have rendered faithful and efficient service. There has been referred to your Board communications from the Secretaries of the General Board, and also from Dr. C. F. Reid, Secretary of the Laymen's Movement, also for the Missionary Training School at Nashville, reports of the General Board and from the Women's Societies.

We are pleased to note that the contributions for Foreign Missions was \$881,520. Of this amount \$181,078 was from Specials and other sources. The amount contributed the last year of this quadrennium exceeded the contributions of the corresponding year in the former quadrennium, \$257,765. While the General Board would not lessen nor discourage Specials, we are cautioned to so emphasize and increase the regular contributions as to maintain a safe conduct of the affairs of your Board and enable it to meet all its obligations. We are pleased to note the assessment of the Church has been increased from \$385,000 to \$500,000, and that also in July twelve new Missionaries were accepted, six of whom are married, making eighteen recruits to our forces in the field. Especially, are we made glad at the purpose to establish a Mission in Africa. The colored M. E. Church has pledged to co-operate in this and Prof. J. W. Gilbert, their most distinguished member, has offered for pioneer service in the Dark Continent. To our own Bishop Lambuth is committed this great work.

The Board is unable to provide for this Mission, and to send these reinforcements. The maintainance of enterprises and laborers already in the field more than consumes its resources. There is a pressing call for greater liberality, "bring all my tithes into my store-houses." Seventeen thousand, four hundred dollars are needed to send these recruits. The men and women in the field with appealing hands beg for reinforcements, then men and women at home are begging to be sent, and our Lord looks upon us. Shall we disappoint Him?

The every-member campaign has yielded excellent results, where it has been applied. It is certainly, the Christ ideal, "Every one members in particular." The organization of the Laymen and their declaration of purpose to co-operate with the pastor in executing this plan until every member shall contribute his part of time, money and prayers, is the desired goal.

Attention is directed to the fact of the merging of the three Missionary publications, "Go Forward," "Women's Foreign Missionary Advocate" and "Our Home." This gives us pleasure and we trust very soon at the nominal price of 50 cents it will find its way into every Methodist home.

The Home Department of the General Board so successfully planned and operated during the last quadrennium, by Rev. Jno. R. Nelson of this Con-

ference, has become an organic part of the church, and now under the leadership of Dr. Jno. M. Moore promises large results. No greater problem confronts the Church than saving America, the base of operations, the Home Land. America saved means the evangelization of the world in this generation. We pledge Dr. Moore our hearty co-operation in his stupendous task. May the great Head of the Church lead on to victory.

The Women's Societies under the new regime since the General Conference is working beautifully. While some were anxious and fearful they realize the divine hand more and more in the direction of these affairs. The Foreign department reports within the bounds of this Conference as follows: Adult Auxiliaries 70, members 1,970. Young Peoples' and Juvenile Societies 22, members 590; new Societies 7. Total membership 2,510. Scholarships supported 32, Bible Women 10, Missionaries supported in the Foreign field 7, monies raised \$9,091.84.

The Secretary of the Laymen's Movement, Dr. C. F. Reid, sends an encouraging note of victory. We are pleased also that Judge W. E. Williams has been re-elected Conference Lay Leader. The declaration of purpose from these consecrated laymen again fixes the amount of their pledge at \$10,000 for this year to be directed by the Home and General Boards.

This is apportioned to each district, according to resolution adopted by the Conference, on the scale adopted for the assessments.

Of this pledge of last year they have raised \$4,949.44. Of this amount \$2,191.35 was directed by the donors, leaving nearly \$3,000 to be applied to salaries of our Missionaries among the foreigners and the Port Work at Galveston.

Our expenditures for that work last year was \$6,000.

There is an urgent call for more laborers in this field. The last six years the tide of immigration has brought to America more than an average of a million immigrants a year. Last year more than 600,000 were lost to the church of Rome by immigration. Their membership in this country only increased a little more than 100,000. Five hundred thousand were lost and will drift into infidelity if Protestant Christianity does not give them the Gospel. There must be no retrograde movement.

The General Board has made an assessment of \$1,950 for the Home Department which we cheerfully accept. The assessment for Foreign Missions this year is \$14,200 and the assessment for Domestic Missions by this Board is \$16,000. If we add the assessment of the Home Department of \$1,950, the total assessment for Domestic Missions is \$17,950.

These assessments have been apportioned to the several districts according to scale adopted by the Conference.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Your Board of Education is impressed with the profound conviction that with the initial session of this Conference, we are confronted also with the responsibility of inaugurating in our educational work plans and policies which must keep pace with the progress indicated by the formation of the new Conference conditions.

That this crisis may be bravely met and successfully passed, it is incumbent upon us to take the broadest possible view of our situation and to project the wisest possible methods of adjustment. After an honorable career of more than half a century, a career marked by many privations and struggles for the advancement of Christian education under the guiding hand of Methodism, we have come to the parting of the ways. We must reconstruct our methods and broaden our plans or content ourselves to retire from the forefront of educational activity according to the demands of the marvellous generation in which we live. It is ours to look with the throbbing heart of hope upon fields already white unto an educational harvest which shall enrich beyond our most sanguine vision the equipment of the generations to follow us for meeting the tremendous possibilities of a Christian civilization. We therefore most heartily commend the action of the Conference in its practically unanimous vote for a Commission to co-operate with like commissions representing other Texas Conferences, looking to the correlation of all our educational interests in the State, and the wisest possible plans for a forward movement commensurate with the imperative demands of the hour.

Texas and the great Southwest is destined to be in the immediate future a storm center of educational activity. Large sums of money are being invested for the equipment and enlargement of the various enterprises which are seeking to mould the thought and give type to the character of Western youth. Our own great Church must know her day of opportunity. We therefore desire the Conference to adopt the following:

Resolved, That the Central Texas Conference wishes to go on record as favoring the plan now being prosecuted, through the appointment of a Commission, for the adjustment and enlargement of our educational operations, and pledges its loyal support to the findings of this Commission, and prays that Divine wisdom may be vouchsafed unto them in this the most important issue in Texas Methodism since the days of the sainted Dr. Mood.

Your Board rejoices in the note of victory which comes from over the Church regarding the progress of our educational work throughout her borders. The General Board reports that in several sections of our Methodism, endowment campaigns have been waged with great vigor and with great success. We have now nine colleges which report more than \$100,000 endowment; five which report more than \$200,000; two which report more than \$300,000, and Trinity College which reports more than \$500,000.

The Board has done its work during the past quadrennium under the general name of Educational Extension. During the past year, five schools owned by our colored brethren of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church were aided to the extent of \$14,587.80. Twelve of our own schools situated in pioneer and less favored communities were aided to the extent of \$9,700. There have been \$1,650 raised as a result of the Educational Extension movement started about a year ago.

The Board enters upon the work of the new quadrennium with enlarged resources and bright prospects. The last General Conference emphasized the increasing importance of our educational work by raising the annual assessment upon the Church for educational purposes from \$50,000 to \$95,000. Of this amount the General Conference provided that \$25,000 be used at the discretion of the Board of Education, and \$20,000 be applied to the Biblical Department of the Vanderbilt University; the rest to be used as heretofore. The Conference also directed the Board to divide the assessment among the

several annual Conferences on the basis fixed by the Board of Apportionment. The amount apportioned to our Conference is \$3,680.

In view of the issues raised concerning the ownership and control of our educational institutions, your Board created at the last session of the Northwest Texas Conference at Stamford, a committee whose duty it was made to secure an accurate statement of the financial status of all our schools within the bounds of the Conference. Because the information contained in their report as made to this body is to be of permanent value to the Church, we desire to present it herewith and ask that the editor of our Conference Journal incorporate it, without omissions, in the published Journal. The report reads as follows:

To the President and Members of the Central Texas Conference.

Dear Fathers and Brethren: We, your committee appointed at the last session of your Conference to examine into the Ownership, Control, and Financial Status of our institutions of learning, report as follows:

We first sought to get a legal opinion from first-class corporation lawyers on the question of ownership and control, but this plan we were unable to carry out. A series of questions bearing upon the points inquired of was then addressed to the President of each school, and upon their answers we base our report as follows:

POLYTECHNIC COLLEGE.

This is an incorporated institution with property deeded to the Polytechnic College of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for educational purposes. The deed does not contain the "Trust Clause." Control is vested in the Board of Trustees for the use and benefit of the Church. The original Trustees were constituted by the Northwest Texas Conference. Vacancies in the Board are filled on nomination and election of the Board itself subject to the confirmation of the patronizing Conference, according to the Board's own "By-Laws." But at a recent meeting of the Board, October 10, 1910, the following resolution was passed:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that Section 2, Article 4, of the By-laws be changed at the next annual meeting of the Board so as to read as follows:

"All vacancies in the Board of Trustees shall be filled by the patronizing Conference or Conferences on nomination of the Boards of Education of such Conferences."

Should this resolution be passed and become law, the method of election will then be the same as in the case of our central institution at Georgetown, the only difference being that the by-laws determine the method of election in the one case, charter requirements in the other.

Property valuations are as follows: Buildings, \$155,000; grounds, \$125,000; apparatus, library, etc., \$33,000; productive endowment, \$73,000. Total school valuations, \$386,000. Income from endowment, \$6,500; estimated tuition from college and preparatory schools this year, \$12,000; from Conference collections, estimated, \$3,800. Total estimated income for current year not including school of fine arts, \$22,300. Indebtedness for improvements, \$50,000; indebtedness for running expenses, at present nothing; by next June it will be approximately, \$7,000. Practically all of the debt for improvements is covered by subscription notes; debt for running expenses is not provided for. There is a mortgage for \$35,000 on the property. They have \$50,132 in unpaid subscriptions, about \$40,000 of which they think is good.

SOUTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

This is an incorporated institution, with property deeded to the Trustees

of the Southwestern University in trust for the use of said University. The deeds contain the "Trust Clause." The control is vested in Trustees for the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The original Trustees were appointed by the patronizing Conferences, and vacancies are filled on nomination of the Boards of Education of the patronizing Conferences, and election by said Conferences, such method being determined by the charter itself.

By conservative estimate, its valuations are as follows: Buildings at Georgetown, \$290,000; grounds, more than 50 acres, \$25,000; apparatus, library, etc., \$95,000. The productive endowment, including funds already collected and invested, and interest-bearing notes for endowment, amount to \$145,051.26. This does not include the Biblical bonds that last year paid \$3,982.30. Value of other school property, including Medical Department at Dallas, valued at \$75,000, miscellaneous tracts of land, and the Allen bequest, amount to \$159,560. Total school valuations as given above, \$714,611.26.

Income from endowment will average 6 per cent, or \$8,703.07. Income from tuition and fees, 1909-10, \$44,148.30. Income from other sources, Conference collections and Biblical Bonds, not including collection for Summer School of Theology, \$17,014.34. Total income from all sources, as per above items, \$69,865.71. Total debt is \$96,993.87. The greater part of this is owed to other funds of the school itself, leaving only \$36,137.75 owed to outside parties; \$9,000 of this is on the Medical College. There is no debt for running expenses. The only encumbrance on the property itself is \$12,000 mechanic's lien on Mood Hall, and \$9,000 on the Annex. They have unpaid subscriptions for all purposes amounting to \$178,625.89, counting only those in notes, and not counting Biblical Bonds and other subscriptions in which the principal never falls due.

MERIDIAN TRAINING SCHOOL.

Is an incorporated institution, with property deed to its own Trustees, for school purposes. Deed contains the "Trust Clause." Control is vested in the Board of Trustees. Trustees are elected and confirmed by the District Conference on nomination of the Presiding Elder.

They have buildings to the value of \$50,000; grounds valued at \$5,000; apparatus, etc., to the value of \$2,000, making a total valuation of \$57,000. They have \$12,000 indebtedness on their building, secured by a lien on the building, and by personal real estate. Only \$300 debt for running expenses. They have \$7,000 of unpaid subscriptions, \$3,000 of which, possibly, is good.

GRANBURY COLLEGE.

Is incorporated, with property deeded to the Methodist Church of Granbury. The control is in the Board of Trustees, who are declared to be nominated by the preacher in charge and elected by the Quarterly Conference. Value of buildings is \$20,000; grounds, \$5,000; apparatus, etc., \$2,000. Total, \$27,000. Their only income is from tuition, amounting to \$5,000. They have no debt.

CENTRAL TEXAS JUNIOR COLLEGE

Is an incorporated institution, with property deeded to the Trustees for school purposes. The deed does not contain the "Trust Clause." Control is vested in the Board of Trustees. Original Trustees were constituted by the Corsicana District Conference. New Trustees are nominated and elected by the Board itself, subject to confirmation by the District Conference, the method of election being determined by the Board's own by-laws.

Their buildings and grounds are valued at \$30,000; apparatus, furniture,

etc., at \$3,750. Total, \$33,750. They receive a total income of \$9,000, \$5,000 of which is from tuition. Their debt amounts to \$11,000, to secure which they have bonded their property.

C. C. CODY.

Your Board is pleased to note in detail the institutions which have reported to us, and rejoice in the increasing prosperity of all these schools.

THE CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL.

The increasing value of this school to our young ministers is a source of peculiar gratification to your board, and to strengthen its work, which will require but a small outlay of money, will mean invaluable enlargement of the efficiency of that large element in our ministry which cannot otherwise meet the educational requirements of this generation. We suggest that our Presiding Elders take steps in all our districts looking to the payment of tuition fees for this purpose whenever necessary to secure this great benefit to our undergraduate pastors.

SOUTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

The condition of our central institution is highly gratifying. The high grade character of its work is of national and to some extent international fame. Her alumni are employed as teachers in many of the foremost institutions of the country and are winning renown in all lines of honorable endeavor. Her halls are literally crowded today, there being more than 700 students now in attendance, 416 of whom are of collegiate grade,—the largest number of collegiate students in any institution in our church. The increase this year over any preceding year is more than 30 per cent, greatly overtaxing the teaching force and buildings of the school. If the high grade character of its work is to be maintained, there must be enlargement of its facilities. The situation affords a rich opportunity to men of means.

While affording genuine education, the school also has a deeply religious atmosphere. A great revival was held during the past session and there has never before been such activity in religious work, Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., etc. The school is developing Christian character of a high type.

We learn with pleasure of the notable success of the Department of Education under Prof. C. A. Nichols; 105 students were enrolled in this branch the past year, and large usefulness to the church is promised by this work, if adequate support can be provided.

The Theological Department suffered a great loss by the elevation of Dr. E. D. Mouzon to the Episcopacy. But the school has been fortunate indeed in securing the services of Rev. H. L. Gray, who, with Rev. Frank Seay, is doing a fine work in the education of young preachers and others desiring Biblical instruction.

Much closer affiliation with the various secondary schools has been secured. These are to be recognized as Junior Colleges, and their work accepted without examination through the sophomore year, there being a uniform course of study well articulated with that of our central institution.

On the whole, the Church has reason for great gratification over the marvelous developments at Southwestern University, and over the bright outlook today. Surely the hour has come for magnificent achievements in the work of Christian education.

POLYTECHNIC COLLEGE.

The report of the Trustees of Polytechnic College shows a most healthful condition of this our Conference College. There has been an increase of 28 per cent over last year in the attendance of College students. The appropriation made by this Conference last year has enabled the College to place in satisfactory condition its work in the Department of Education. This department is fully recognized by the State Board of Education, which grants permanent Certificates to teachers who take this course in Polytechnic.

Ownership.—On account of the unrest in Methodist circles concerning the ownership and control of our educational institutions, we hereby declare that after a careful investigation of charter and titles, that the Polytechnic College is the property of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and under the control of the patronizing Conference or Conferences. In order to show the confidence of the Board of Trustees, in the church, at our last meeting we passed the following:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that Section 2, Article 4, of the By-laws be changed at the next annual meeting so as to read as follows:

"All vacancies in the Board of Trustees shall be filled by the patronizing Conference or Conferences on nomination of the Boards of Education of such Conferences."

Relation to the Two Conferences.—The recent division of the Northwest Texas Conference makes this College the property of the two Conferences, and in order to adjust its control, at our last meeting the following resolutions were read and adopted:

Whereas, The Polytechnic College was established by the Northwest Texas Conference; and

Whereas, The Northwest Texas Conference has been divided into the Central Texas and Northwest Texas Conferences; and

Whereas, The Polytechnic College has fallen into the bounds of the Central Texas Conference; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Polytechnic College do hereby declare that the Northwest Texas Conference has already equal ownership in the Polytechnic College with the Central Texas Conference, and that we hereby ask the Northwest Texas Conference to claim and accept formally such ownership and equal control with the Central Texas Conference.

The entire faculty of the three schools consists of thirty-three professors, teachers and instructors. The Church is to be congratulated upon the strong faculty, the splendid equipment, the large student body and the excellent work being done at this most prosperous institution. The Lord has most graciously blessed the efforts put forth until now you have one of the best equipped and most popular colleges in the entire Southwest. It is filled to overflowing with happy, hard-working, earnest, loyal and enthusiastic students.

A Distinctively Christian School.—The entire institution is distinctively Christian. The faculty is composed of well-equipped and thoroughly qualified Christian men and women. The atmosphere is not only intellectual, but spiritual. A large majority of the students are active Christians. Forty young preachers are in regular attendance. The citizens of the community are now completing a beautiful church edifice with a seating capacity of more than twelve hundred. The local membership now numbers more than nine hundred. All departments of the church work are in active operation. Such influences are very wholesome for your sons and daughters while they are away from home seeking an education.

CENTRAL TEXAS COLLEGE.

The buildings and equipments have been greatly improved. The installation of waterworks and electric lights, equipment of all recitation rooms with new apparatus and seats, the erection of a new front and an addition to the main building, the equipment of a Science Laboratory, the purchase of twenty acres of land, the issuance of \$20,000 in bonds are improvements already accomplished during the present administration.

At its last session the Corsicana District placed upon the district an educational assessment of \$1,600 annually, the same to be used to pay the interest and retire the principal of bonds amounting to \$20,000.

We have an excellent faculty of nine teachers. The work of the school was never better organized than at present. The school emphasizes the work of primary, grammar school and high school grades, also doing the work of the Freshman class in the University. The attendance for the past year was 121.

The religious training of young people is also a feature of importance. Our young people are instructed in the Bible, many of them also take active work in religious services. We have three young preachers in attendance this year.

Plans are in progress for the installation of a Department of Manual Training, which they hope to have in operation by another year. We heartily commend this excellent Training School.

WEATHERFORD COLLEGE TRAINING SCHOOL.

This institution is now under the efficient presidency of Rev. H. A. Boaz, D. D., with Prof. E. H. Lang, principal. Excellent work is being done and the school is enjoying renewed prosperity.

MERIDIAN TRAINING SCHOOL.

We have a good report from this school concerning its statistics and property values. The school is doing excellent work under the presidency of Prof. Bloodworth.

We recommend the following assessments for the ensuing year:

The amount apportioned to our Conference by the General Board of Education is \$3,680.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

We note with great pleasure the growing interest in Church Extension within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference. Despite the almost unprecedented drouth in some sections of our territory a number of church enterprises have been projected the past year and other similar enterprises have been brought to a satisfactory completion.

The Board desires to call attention to the change of sentiment with reference to the use of Church Extension funds, in our Conference, and throughout the connection.

There is a growing disposition to cease indiscriminate giving of money and the making of loans instead. This will enable the Board to create a loan fund of its own, which in a few years will be sufficient to meet the demands in our own territory for Church Extension money.

We would discourage the requests for a gift, except in the most peculiar and necessitous cases, let the requests be rather for loans.

We are glad to report to you that while two years ago we had not a dollar of a loan fund, now we have approximately \$4,000 belonging to this Conference, and which is called the "Central Texas Conference Loan Fund." Applications for loans may be made any time during the year through the

President or Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee will pass upon the application, but the loan will be administered through the General Office at Louisville as the Discipline directs.

Applications for loans or donations from the General Board should be made as heretofore, through the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Church Extension.

The attention of the Conference is called to the fact that the new law places the work of aiding parsonages in the hands of the Board of Church Extension, and in the assessment made at this time there is included an assessment for parsonages. These funds will not be available until the fall of 1911.

Again the Board would call attention to the provision in the Discipline for the organization of City Boards of Church Extension, where there are as many as three or more pastoral charges. In this connection we would commend most heartily the organization in the city of Waco of a Board of Church Extension and City Missions."

The assessment for 1910-11 is \$12,000.

In compliance with the request of the Texas Tract Society that one member of the Board of Church Extension be elected to membership in the Board of Managers of that Society, the Board elected W. B. Andrews.

JOINT BOARD OF FINANCE.

During the year, by reason of the division of the Conference, certain funds were held by our Treasurer in common for the two Conferences, which funds have been pro rated and paid into the treasury of the two Conferences in proportion to the list of claimants in each Conference. The list of claimants in the Northwest Texas Conference is composed of twenty-nine names, and that of the Central Texas Conference is composed of sixty-seven names.

We have collected for Bishops' Fund during the year \$228.75, and have received from the Conference Teller \$1,720.47, making a total sum of \$1,949.22. Our assessment for this fund the coming year is \$3,286.

We have collected for Conference claimants during the year \$1,092.50, and

have received from the Conference Teller \$7,991.14, making a total of \$9,083.64. We add to this total sum the following amounts received by us, viz.: From Brother L. Blaylock, publisher of our Texas Christian Advocate, \$194.60; our pro rata of the reserve fund left over from last year, \$249.57; our pro rata of the Trapp Fund, \$147.47; our pro rata of the Marquis Fund, \$178.67, and our pro rata of the Superannuate Endowment Fund, \$184.25, making a grand total of \$10,038.20 for distribution among our claimants.

We again wish to thank Brother Blaylock for his kind and most generous donation to our superannuates of the aforesaid sum.

We estimate the amount necessary for Conference claimants the coming year at \$12,500.

At the beginning of another quadrennium we again recommend that a reserve fund be left with our Treasurer of not less than five per cent of the total sum for distribution, to be known as a "Reserve Fund," for the relief of those who may become claimants during the year, and who are not otherwise provided for, to be paid on the order of the presiding elder within whose bounds such claimant may reside, and not over fifty dollars to any one claimant during the year.

Some of our claimants, being sufficiently supplied with the necessities of life, most generously ask no appropriation from us, but yield their claims to those in need, and to all of these brethren and sisters we extend our thanks, and pray that God may continue to bless them.

We have received \$14 from the "Calvin Bequest," and which we have apportioned to the widows and orphans of our deceased traveling preachers.

All assessments coming before us, we have pro rated to the several Presiding Elders' Districts of the Conference as per the scale furnished us by the presiding elders.

We recommend that the Board of Missions be assessed \$185; Board of Church Extension, \$80; Board of Education, \$85; Sunday School Board, \$30, and Board of American Bible Society, \$20, for the purpose of paying for printing the Conference Journal.

After prayerful and mature deliberation and a most painstaking investigation into the facts of each and every case, we have disbursed the superannuate collections to claimants as follows:

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

We note with pleasure the continued prosperity of our publishing interests, and especially the fact that now our branch house at Dallas is comfortably housed in its own elegant building.

The total sales now amount to \$658,000 and increasing annually at the rate of \$35,000. The profits amount to \$80,000 per year and the total assets reaches well over one million dollars. Not only are we making money by our publishing interest, we are also doing a great work in placing wholesome literature before our people.

All of our periodicals seem to be in good condition. The Methodist Review is a publication of which our people are justly proud, and stands equal to that of any church paper anywhere. To its conduct the editor has brought tireless industry and scholarly ability. It has more than paid the cost of publication, but is worthy of a much larger circulation amongst our preachers and people.

The Christian Advocate, under the new editorship, is meeting every demand, and rings out clear in the doctrines and polity of our church, and defends her rights in every instance.

We heartily commend the management and editorial work of our own Texas Christian Advocate and rejoice at the re-election of Dr. G. C. Rankin as editor. He is making it felt as no other paper in the state is felt.

We heartily commend the management of the Texas Tract Society, and believe it has in it possibilities of the greatest importance to our church. We urge our pastors to secure its publications and freely distribute them among our people and the public generally.

By a unanimous vote the Committee recommends that the Texas Advocate gather and tabulate all the statistics of the Texas Conferences and publish them in the Advocate. Also that the Texas Tract Society publish the same in tract form with such annotations and additional information as will show in concise statement what Methodism is doing in Texas.

We call special attention to the work of the Texas Methodist Historical Association. The work of each man connected with it is wholly gratuitous, but of the greatest interest to our people. They publish a Quarterly at one dollar a year that is well worth two dollars in its size and mechanical make-up, and no reading could be more interesting to lovers of our Methodism than it. It also gathers and preserves literature and historical facts that could not otherwise be preserved, and which will make possible a great history some day to be written for our people. We urge a more liberal patronage of this periodical.

We have had before us the request of the Texas Tract Society for an appropriation of \$340 from the Boards of Church Extension, Sunday Schools, Education and Missions, the same to be used to pay a small deficit in expenses for the year and to pay the salary of a man to give his whole time to the management of the work of the Society for the coming year. The Society also requests the appointment of Rev. S. W. Turner as Editor-Secretary of the Society. Believing this to be vital to the interests of the Society, we, your Committee, recommend compliance with the request.

TEMPERANCE.

It is gratifying to note the progress that has been made in the year 1910. The liquor forces have been steadily growing weaker. Some of the facts that we have been able to gather show that more than forty-one million people in the United States live in dry territory. In the United States alone saloons have been closed at the rate of more than forty (40) per day for the past two years.

In Texas seven-eighths of the area is now dry and three-fourths of the population live in dry territory. Out of 245 counties in the State, 21 are wet, 59 are partly dry and 165 are totally dry. Five counties have gone "dry" this year; also a few precincts.

The Pros are rallying to the cause in every part of the state and every indication is that the people of Texas will have a chance to vote for State-wide Prohibition.

We endorse and commend the Anti-Saloon League and commend Rev. J. D. Odom for his faithful and efficient service the past year and recommend that Bishop Atkins appoint him to same work.

We commend Dr. Rankin for his wise and fearless stand on the question of Temperance, both in the press and on the platform.

We commend the "Home and State" as a reliable Temperance organ.

We call upon our people everywhere to rally to this great cause and especially call upon the members of the Central Texas Conference to urge our people to pay their poll taxes for the coming year.

ORPHANAGE.

After a careful investigation of the status and the needs of our Orphanage, your committee would call attention to some very important facts connected with it, and offer some resolutions which we hope will lead to a larger and better equipped home for the dependent children who look to us for support.

The first important fact to which we would call your attention is that the providence of God is more and more manifested in the preservation of the lives of the children. None have died during the year, notwithstanding the serious illness of more than fifty. We ought to express our gratitude to God for this great blessing.

Second. We find that there are at present 140 children in the Home to be trained and educated for life's great work; we find also that we lack the equipment necessary for the proper training in some lines of useful employment. We need workshops for the boys, and a well regulated industrial feature for the girls. We are gratified with the educational facilities which are offered under present conditions, but we believe a new and separate school building is one of the imperative needs of the Home. We are also convinced that we need a nursery for the smaller children.

We heartily commend the administration of the Manager, Dr. J. H. McLean, and his faithful corps of helpers in this delicate and important work, and we pledge them our loyal support.

We recommend first that our pastors endeavor to find some person or persons of means who might be induced to contribute largely for the erection of such buildings as are needed, and that they put the Manager in communication with all such persons.

Second, that we accept the assessment of \$3,000 upon our Conference as apportioned to us by our Board of Directors.

Third, that we urge our pastors to take the collections early in the year, before the Christmas holidays are over if possible, or at least by the first of March; and that we as leaders take up the important matter of laying this work upon the hearts of the children of the Sunday Schools. No more important work is being done than that which we are doing for the orphan children of the State.

Fourth, that we encourage our Home Mission Societies and Epworth Leagues to co-operate with the plans suggested by the Manager.

Fifth, that we elect Rev. E. Hightower to fill the place on our Orphanage Board made vacant by the transfer of Dr. B. R. Bolton from our Conference.

And, lastly, that we so talk up our work that the public will be interested not only in the Orphanage work generally, but in our own work in particular.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The reports of our preachers show a great advance in Sunday School work in our Conference. At once we are improving as we are enlarging, therefore while the growth is rapid, it is normal and permanent.

Our Literature.

Our Sunday School literature is in favor with our people and we rejoice that the day has come when we can get the best in the world from our own department. The total circulation of our Sunday School periodicals is 1,679,300, being an increase of about 50,000 copies in the past year.

We recommend the new graded lessons for our beginners—Primary and Junior classes. They are specially adapted to our children of these grades and superior to the uniform International Lessons.

Department of Teacher-Training.

At the date of the Editor's report to the General Conference of 1910, which is the latest general summary of the Department of Teacher-Training, Dr. Hamill had enrolled 1,200 Study Circles and nearly 20,000 students. The adoption of two training courses in place of one, as heretofore—viz., the "First Standard Course" and the "Advanced Course"—has fitted the work more closely to the needs of the many young people who are willing to take the easier elementary training as contained in the "Legion of Honor" Course. In consequence the larger number of classes now being organized are of young people meeting at the Sunday School hour, under an appointed teacher, as a regular class in the school, with the Legion of Honor lessons as their texts instead of the Uniform International Lesson. Many pastors and superintendents, seeing the practicability of such a picked class of young Christians during the hour of the regular session, are forming such classes and are making favorable reports of them to Dr. Hamill. Such a class is within the duty and power of every pastor to maintain, and it offers the surest and quickest method of recruiting trained teachers.

Wesley Adult Bible Classes.

We have been greatly profited by the visit and service of Dr. Chas. D. Bulla, Superintendent of our Wesley Adult Bible Class Department.

Looking to the federation of all adult classes in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, the General Conference, in May, provided for the Wesley Adult Bible Class Department. The General Sunday School Board has formulated a Constitution for Wesley Classes, organized for the training of Christian character for Christian service, in the extension of Christ's kingdom, by means of Bible study, mutual helpfulness, and social fellowship.

We earnestly recommend that all classes enroll in the Department, that there may be unity of policy and action in this movement, that seeks to gather men and women together in Bible study and send them out in helpful service.

For information concerning the Department and the work of organized classes address Rev. Charles D. Bulla, 810 Broadway, Nashville, Tennessee.

Children's Day.

The third Sunday in May of each year is Children's Day. It should be the high day of the year in all our churches. It should be made a congregational as well as a Sunday School service. This year our collections on this day aggregate nearly two thousand dollars, being several hundred dollars in excess of last year.

State Sunday School Conference.

Under the management of our Board of Directors of our Methodist State Sunday School Conference, we held our annual meeting at San Antonio, Texas, in April of this year. The attendance and program were splendid. We are already arranging for our next meeting in Dallas, Texas, in April, 1911, and trust our people will attend and profit by these great spiritual meetings.

A Week at Epworth.

Your Board appreciates the courtesy of the management of Epworth-by-the-Sea, who have invited us to have a Sunday School encampment at Epworth to last one week. This encampment is to be in the month of August of each year. Sunday School experts will conduct an Institute and School of Methods for one week. This will likely be preceded by the regular Epworth League program of one week.

We note with pleasure the campaign of great magnitude outlined by the Sunday School workers of all denominations and embraced in the Texas Sunday School Association, of which our beloved brother, Rev. J. T. McClure, of Dallas, is Central Chairman.

The plan is to have a systematic campaign to have every home in Texas visited on February 22nd, to be followed by a universal Rally Day, on Sunday, February 26, when it is hoped to have one million people present in the Sunday Schools on said day.

In order that we may reap our share of the harvest from such a campaign we urge all pastors, superintendents and workers to this united effort, with the hope that the Sunday School may be able to reach the masses for a systematic Bible study, and winning them for our Christ and the training of them for His service.

Your Board has, by unanimous action, appointed Bro. B. L. Nance to be Field Missionary for another year, and commends him to the favorable consideration of presiding elders and pastors.

Your Board recommends the appointment of Rev. A. D. Porter as a member of the Board of Directors of the Methodist State Sunday School Conference.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We, your Committee on Sabbath Observance, having duly considered the subject and giving attention to a paper submitted to us by the Sunday League of America, beg to make the following report:

Never perhaps in the history of our civilization has our Christian Sabbath been so seriously threatened as at the present time. This is emphatically a commercial age, and in the onward rush to secure wealth the Sabbath has been converted into a day of speculation on the part of many. From the beginning of this commonwealth the Sabbath has been regarded as an institution of God, and has been set apart for rest and worship. Our mothers and fathers were strict in observing and protecting its sanctity. It has had the protection of the legislative and judicial departments of our government, so that its sanctity has been preserved in the past; but we have noted that for some years past innovation following innovation has been made upon the sanctity of this day. It is endangered not only by commercial greed, but by the love and practice of pleasure also. More and more this day is being used for traveling, working, buying, selling, for sport and for play.

We have been passing resolutions in our Conferences from time to time which seem soon to be forgotten. The time has come for definite action in some tangible way.

We beg to quote approvingly the action of our late General Conference as expressed in the following language:

"We appreciate and commend the faithful effort of the Sunday League of America, to secure in sentiment, in law and in customs, the proper observance of this day throughout our great nation. We render our endorsement of the League, and commend its purposes, plans and representatives to the cordial co-operation of all our people. We note the proposition to erect an administration building in the city of Fort Worth, Texas, partly in the memory of the lamented Bishop Duncan's service in behalf of the Sabbath, and request that our church raise the sum of \$5,000 for the same, and we respectfully ask all our pastors and people to give it such support as their liberal consideration may suggest."

In compliance with the request presented to you, through your committee, by the representative of the National Board of Directors, we recommend: That \$400.00 be apportioned by the Joint Board of Finance to the districts of this Conference, as per scale adopted, to be raised in the congregation. We also recommend that the second Sunday in January, 1911, shall be fixed as Sunday League Day, and request every pastor to preach on the importance of this movement, and at the close of such sermon take a collection to carry out the purpose herein contemplated, and promptly send the amount raised to the Sunday League of America, Fort Worth, Texas.

We are in hearty sympathy with the efforts of Revs. Ed Thompson and R. C. Armstrong, to secure such legislation as shall eliminate Sunday excursions, base ball games, theatrical performances, picture shows, racing of all kinds, hunting, fishing and the opening of the gates of fairs.

We recommend the election of W. B. Andrews, H. D. Knickerbocker, W. E. Williams and J. M. Robertson, who shall constitute a Sabbath Committee, to render such service as they may be able in securing the legislation outlined above.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. R. C. Armstrong as Assistant Secretary of the Sunday League of America.

Therefore, we recommend that the pastors not only look after the collections ordered for the Society, but also promote the circulation of the Society's publications among our people as far as practicable. These are furnished at actual cost and even as gifts where the people are not able to purchase. Your Board will work in harmony with Rev. R. C. George, the Superintendent of this field, who is located at Dallas, in promoting the interest of the Society in every way possible. We rejoice to note that the conditions of the Russell Sage donation of \$500,-

000 have been met, which gives the Society an endowment from this source of one million dollars.

Our Treasurer has received from the Treasurer of the old Board \$135; from the teller of this Conference, \$1,177.84; total, \$1,312.84, less \$20 appropriated for printing minutes, leaving a net total of \$1,292.84 to be forwarded to the American Bible Society.

We recommend that an assessment of \$1,650 be made on the Conference for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES FOR SUPERANNUATE HOMES.

We, your Board of Trustees for Superannuate Homes of the Central Texas Annual Conference, herewith, submit our report.

We have secured two homes during the year, one built on a lot 75 by 150 feet, located on Rosen Heights, Fort Worth, the lot being donated by Bro. C. C. Hayden of Grandview, which is worth \$750. The house has five rooms with galleries finished throughout and furnished with water connection. A small barn has been built and the place well fenced, all of which is valued at \$1,750. We owe about three hundred dollars on same. Bro. W. J. Lemons was moved into this home.

The other home is located at Ranger, where our honored Bro. Tunnell died. After his death the presiding elder, Bro. Little, being on the ground, found that the people were anxious that Sister Tunnell and family should remain with them and she desiring the same, Bro. Little called our agent, Bro. Brown, to his assistance and they appointed committees and started the work of securing a home. This committee has secured a home near the church, a house with six or seven rooms on a good lot, for the sum of \$900. This committee raised nearly all of the first payment, which was \$300, and they have a good subscription of \$300 more, leaving still, \$300 unprovided for. Sister Tunnell and her four children will move into the home this week, and we know that no one who knew that worthy and faithful preacher, Bro. J. S. Tunnell and his noble wife, but will rejoice to know that she and his children are given a comfortable home by the Church, which he served so well.

One hundred and fifty dollars has been spent on repairs of the Haynie Home at Georgetown, occupied by Sister Morgan and family.

Thus, you see, that we have some little prosperity in this work. Our affairs are run on an economical basis, as our agent has had only a meagre salary, and that, being made by himself in evangelistic work, never using any part of "special gifts" or money raised by pastors, so, we urge our brethren to co-operate with him in this work. Brother Brown with his singer, Bro. Fisher, will enter at once into the field as helpers of pastors in meeting work. Now, we insist that our brethren confer with them if they want faithful Gospel work by preacher and singer.

We ask the Bishop to appoint Rev. Chas. E. Brown as our agent, thus making him the joint agent of the Central and Northwest Texas Conferences.

We offer the following for your adoption:

Whereas, The Northwest Texas Conference five years ago began the work of securing homes for the Conference claimants of the Northwest Texas Conference; and,

Whereas, The recent session of the General Conference divided the Northwest Texas Conference into the Central and Northwest Texas Conferences; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we continue this work of securing homes for the Conference claimants of Central Texas Conference under the constitution enacted five

years ago, and request the Presiding Elders to name a board of trustees, who shall be the legal successors of the original board.

EDUCATIONAL COMMISSION.

Whereas, The development of the State of Texas and the progress of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the educational sentiment in Texas are such that the demands for education cannot be met by existing institutions with their present facilities, and inasmuch as the enlargement of our plans is imperative, rendering a readjustment of our educational policies desirable; and,

Whereas, The City of Dallas has submitted for the consideration of the several Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the State of Texas a proposition offering land and money for the establishing of a University in Dallas to be owned and controlled by the several Annual Conferences participating in its establishment; and,

Whereas, The proposition is of such far-reaching importance as to demand the most careful and painstaking consideration; and,

Whereas, We believe that the present demand and the future growth of the Methodism of Texas and the Southwest will justify the establishment of a complete University by the Methodists of this region; therefore, be it resolved:

1. That this Conference ask the Presiding Bishop and the Presiding Elders to nominate for election by this Conference two laymen and two preachers, who in conjunction with similar commissioners from such other Annual Conferences as may see fit to co-operate in the movement, shall duly consider

this question and take such action as they may deem wise.

2. That this Commission when so elected shall at the call of the Bishops in charge of the Texas Conferences meet and organize, and shall have full power to consider and determine the question of the establishment of a University as above described, and to proceed to establish the same as soon as they deem wise.

3. This Commission shall have power to consider and determine the location of said University, to accept or reject the proposition submitted by the City of Dallas or such as may be submitted by any other city of Texas.

4. That if this Commission shall find that the establishment of such a new institution is impracticable it is empowered and directed to take such steps for the enlargement of some existing institution or institutions as will meet the pressing and growing demands of our times.

5. The Commission shall have power to determine the relation of existing institutions to the proposed University, and the establishment of other institutions of learning and their relation to the same; provided, its action shall be in harmony with the provisions of the General Board of Education of our Church touching the classification of schools.

In any event the Commission shall have power to determine the relation of existing institutions and such as shall hereafter be established to each other in our educational system.

6. This Commission shall exist for four years, and all vacancies occurring during the interim of the Conference sessions shall be filled by the Board of Education of the Annual Conference, by which the member was elected. Said newly-elected member shall hold office until the session of the Annual Conference, at which time the vacancy shall be filled by the process prescribed for its creation.

7. This Commission is hereby empowered to act as a board of trust of the proposed University in harmony with the laws of the Church and the State of Texas, until the participating Annual Conferences shall make provision for a Board of Trustees to further carry out their will.

8. This Commission is hereby instructed to use every care that all property hereafter deeded to our Church for school purposes within the State of Texas shall be so deeded, and the institution or institutions established thereon so chartered, that no contention can arise against the ownership and control of the same by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as represented by the participating Annual Conferences.

RESOLUTIONS BY R. A. JOHN AND OTHERS CONCERNING
REMOVAL OF SOUTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY.

Adopted by Board of Trustees at their annual meeting in June, 1910.

Whereas, It is important today to Southern Methodism, as well as to the general interest of religion and education in Texas, that the institution of learning established by the Southern Methodist Church at Georgetown, Texas, in 1873, be endowed for the purpose of cheapening higher education and by its other advantages secure general confidence and patronage; and,

Whereas, The compact entered into by the five several Conferences of the Southern Methodist Church in the year 1869, that culminated in the establishment of the Southwestern University at Georgetown, Texas, which was finally merged in a charter locating and establishing the University at that place, is a compact that should not be breached by the contracting parties, unless grave or extraordinary reasons justify the same; and,

Whereas, Antedating its location and anterior to the securing of its charter, the citizens of Georgetown, Texas, proposed that if the five Conferences of the Southern Methodist Church should permanently locate its central educational institution for the purposes of higher education, at Georgetown, Williamson County, Texas, that they would give large sums of money, lands, sites, and other properties; and,

Whereas, The proposition so made at that time by the citizens of Georgetown was accepted upon the condition and in consideration of the promise on the part of said Annual Conferences to so permanently locate said institution of learning at Georgetown, in Williamson County, Texas, and pledged their continuing support thereto, without regard to personal or local preferences, that said contract is a valid, binding and subsisting obligation, as vital and as effective today as it was upon the day upon which it was entered into; and,

Whereas, Continuing since the date of acceptance of said donations by the citizens of Georgetown, upon the faith of its permanent location at this place, the citizens of Georgetown have, from time to time, contributed additional sums, amounting approximately to the sum of one hundred thousand dollars; and,

Whereas, Methodist families, including widows with their children, have, upon the hypothesis that the University should and would be perpetually located and maintained at this place, moved into Georgetown, and have purchased homes in which to live and educate their children, and a removal of said University at this time will inevitably destroy the values of said homes and precipitate an enormous shrinkage of property values in this town, and for that reason indirectly inflict an injury and damage upon those who have acted upon the faith of those promises so made as aforesaid; and,

Whereas, the Southwestern University from an humble beginning, has grown and progressed at the sites so chosen by our fathers, until it has become one of the largest and most famous institutions in the Southwest, demonstrating the wisdom of its original establishment, and such splendid growth being in the nature of a prophecy of a greater growth in the future, and also suggesting that its removal to any other place would be at best an experiment and may cause its collapse and destruction; and,

Whereas, This promising future of the University is seriously jeopardized, if not destroyed, unless it can have the continued and united support of the Methodist Conferences which created it, as well as the continued and united loyalty, fidelity and affection of its alumni and former students that have been educated at its present location, which united support of both Conferences and alumni can be better conserved at its present location than if removed to any other place; and,

Whereas, The agitation of the question, at this or any future time, of the removal of Southwestern University, or any part of the same, from its present

location at Georgetown, brings confusion into the council of the Church, arrests the generosity of prospective donors, and discourages and disorganizes every promising plan of progress, and will continue as long as said agitation lasts, injuring not only the University itself, but the cause of education in the Methodist Church of this State; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of the Southwestern University, in regular meeting assembled:

1. That the Southwestern University has been and should perpetually continue to be located at Georgetown, Williamson County, Texas:

2. That, while appreciating the local pride that prompts the great city of Dallas in desiring to secure the same, and the implied compliment to the institution that her offer signifies, it is the sense of said Board of Trustees that all propositions looking to the removal of said University from Georgetown, Texas, are by said Board respectfully declined.

3. That it is the deliberate judgment of said Board of Trustees that the contract permanently locating said University at Georgetown, Texas, made by the Annual Conferences patronizing the same, is a valid, subsisting and binding contract that cannot and should not be breached either in law or in morals.

4. That all the officers of said University, the President, the Faculty, and the agents thereof, are hereby instructed to hereafter discountenance and discourage the agitation of the removal of said University from Georgetown, Williamson County, Texas, except in those particulars and for those purposes contemplated in the original charter thereof.

5. That these resolutions be spread upon the Minutes of the Board of Trustees of Southwestern University, and that the Secretary be instructed to forward a copy of the same to each of the Annual Conferences of the Southern Methodist Church in Texas, in time to be presented to same at the ensuing meetings thereof.
