BJP plans massive awareness drive on farm laws

Party to hold 100 press conferences, 718 farmers' meetings in various parts of the country to explain 'correct' implications of new farm laws

PNS ■ NEW DELHI

With agitating farmers reluctant to accept Government's offer on farm laws and intensifying their stir, the BJP has sought to launch a strong counter-awareness campaign to mobilise support for the new agriculture marketing laws with the public and the farmers outside Punjab and Haryana.

The ruling party's vigorous outreach programme in "next few days" would involve 100 press conferences and 718 farmers meeting in as many districts to explain "correct" implications of the three farm laws to the farmers of the country, sources said.

The BJP leaders would organise "kisan sammelans" in rural "chaupals" to convince the farmers that the new farm laws would give them "unrestricted freedom" to sell and "increase" their income by way of contract farming, said sources in the party.

The new Central farm laws have allowed trade and contract in agricultural produce as also removed restrictions on hoarding by amending essential commodities Act. Farmers are demanding that the Government rollback these laws which they say would put farmers at the mercy of corporate traders and their profiteering business.

According to BJP leaders, their "awareness campaign" (on the farm laws) which got thwarted on account of coronavirus pandemic, would be expanded and also involve

farmers outside Punjab and Haryana, the States which, they claim, are "mainly feeding" the current stir on the outskirts of Delhi.

Union and State Cabinet Ministers will take part in the intense communication campaign with documents and "point-by-point" allay farmers' apprehensions on the laws as they would also list out Government's "readiness" to amend the sections which may help neutralising their fears on contract farming.

The farmers wing of the RSS — "Bharatiya Kisan Sangh" (BKS) — is too planning to organise a massive farmer outreach and around "Kisan Chaupals" in different parts of the country to showcase the benefits of the farm laws.

"The exercise has already begun in right earnest in rural areas," said one of the BKS leaders.

The BKS has asked all its units to "help farmers in procurement and payment" issues across the country.

The BKS while supporting demand for guaranteeing Minimum Support Price to the farmers has not joined the farmers agitation, citing "politicisation" of the protest.

The BJP is attempting to rope in farmers who are inclined to toe a middle-path in the ongoing protest and be satisfied with the amendments and guaranteeing the MSP and not be with the "extremists" wanting a complete annulment of the three farm laws, sources said.

Protesters to block Delhi-Jaipur highway today

On the 16th day of farmers' protest against the three recently introduced farm laws, farmers stayed put at borders across the national Capital. With farmers sitting at borders across the city, the alternative routes to neighboring Haryana and Uttar Pradesh continued to witness long traffic queues during office hours.

"On December 12, the farmers have decided to block the Delhi-Jaipur Highway and if still the law is not rolled back, the farmers on December 14, will stage sit-in protests in front of Deputy Commissioner's (DC) offices across the country and houses of BJP leaders. We will also block Reliance and Adani toll

plazas. There is no programme to stop trains.

Don't allow anti-social elements to hijack your stir: Tomar to farmers

Union Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar on Friday cautioned farmers agitating against the three farm laws not to fall prey to false propaganda and not allow anti-social elements to take advantage of their peaceful agitation.

He said some "anti-social elements" are conspiring to spoil the atmosphere of the peasants' movement under the

guise of farmers and appealed the protesters to be vigilant against their platform being misused.

Tagging a media report about posters coming up at farmers' Tikri Border protest site demanding release of some activists arrested under various charges, Tomar said, "Anti-social elements are conspiring to spoil the atmosphere of the peasant movement under the guise of farmers."

BKUB approaches SC to challenge Constitutional validity of 3 farm laws

At Delhi borders against the Centre's three new agri laws, farmers' body 'Bharatiya Kisan Union Bhanu' (BKUB) has moved the Supreme Court seeking to intervene as a party in a pending plea challenging the constitutional validity of the legislations.

A bench headed by Chief Justice Justice SA Bobde, on October 12, had issued a notice

to the Centre by agreeing to test the validity of the laws on the pleas filed by RJD lawmaker from Rajya Sabha, Manoj Jha and DMK Rajya Sabha MP from Tamil Nadu, Tiruchi Siva, and one by Rakesh Vaishnav of Chhattisgarh Kisan Congress.

BKUB, through its Mathura-based president Bhanu Pratap Singh, has sought implementation as a party in the lead petition filed by DMK lawmaker Tiruchi Siva.

Bengal Chief Secy, DGP defy MHA's summons

Top officials were called to report on law & order after attack on Nadda

The Union Home Ministry on Friday summoned West Bengal's Chief Secretary and DGP on December 14 for an explanation on the law and order situation in the State.

While the two officials refused to turn up saying the matter was being examined by the State Government, TMC launched scathing attack on the Centre for bypassing the State Government.

Chief Secretary Alapan Bandyopadhyay and Director General of Police Virendra were asked to present before the Union Home Secretary Ajay Kumar Bhalla to explain the law and order situation based on the report of Governor Jagdeep Dhankhar's

on the attack on BJP president JP Nadda's convoy.

In response to the Home Ministry's letter, Chief Secretary wrote back saying his and DGP's presence in Delhi was avoidable as the matter is "already being examined" by the State Government.

He also wrote, "While fur-

ther reports are being obtained and compiled, in the circumstances, I am directed to request you to kindly dispense with the presence of State officials in the meeting, considering the State Government is already addressing this issue with utmost seriousness."

Nod for SII vaccine's emergency use in India soon after UK's OK

Pune-based Serum Institute of India (SII) may get emergency use nod for Covishield in India as soon as the UK's drug regulator gives go ahead to the vaccine, which officials here expect to be before year end.

Union Health Minister Harsh Vardhan said at an event

that in the coming weeks vaccination process will kick-start in India as soon as it is approved by the regulatory agency concerned.

Sources said SII might take the lead in getting nod.

Dr Harsh Vardhan was speaking at the inter-ministerial meeting on vaccination of South Asia organised by the

World Bank through video conference.

The sources said the Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) is currently evaluating data, including which dosing regimen is best to use for the Covid vaccine developed by UK's Oxford and AstraZeneca. "The MHRA approval is

expected before Christmas and India may give a go-ahead soon after that," sources said.

"The regulatory approval in the UK is crucial to strengthen SII's application seeking emergency use authorisation in India because the proposal here refers to trials being conducted in the UK and Brazil. Moreover, the vaccine is yet to be approved in any country. It is a sensitive matter and only once we are sure of the safety, efficacy and immunogenicity of the vaccine, we can grant an approval," an official said.

The MHRAs evaluation of data is likely to bring more clarity on dosage of the vaccine — which has shown efficacy of 62 per cent when two full doses were given to trial participants, but 90 per cent for a smaller sub-group given a half dose and then a full dose.

Vardhan said, "Effective planning and strategic management has enabled India to keep its cases per million at 7,078 against the global average of 8,883. The fatality rate is 1.45%, well below the global average of 2.29%."

Protest against surgery by Ayurveda docs

It is an attempt to corrupt healthcare system, say IMA members, doctors

Thousands of doctors on Friday held nationwide strike under the banner of the Indian Medical Association (IMA) opposing the Centre's move to allow postgraduate practitioners of Ayurveda to be trained in performing surgical procedures.

The strike involved the withdrawal of non-Covid and non-essential activities from 6 am to 6 pm.

Last month, the Central Council of Indian Medicine — the regulatory body for the study and practice of Ayurveda



in India — amended the Indian Medicine Central Council (Post Graduate Ayurveda Education) Regulations, 2016, to include the regulation to permit postgraduate students of Ayurveda to receive training and practice of "shalakya" and

"shalakya". Shalaky refers to general surgery, shalaky is related to diseases of the ear, nose, throat, head, eye, and ophthalmology. The IMA condemned the move, terming the decision as a "deceptive camouflage of mixing the sys-

tems of medicine."

The Ayush Ministry then issued a statement clarifying that the amendment was specific to 58 surgical procedures only. However, the body of medical practitioners said: "It is nothing but a blatant attempt at mixopathy and khichdification of medical education and practice."

On Friday, doctors at the All India Institute of Medical Sciences and various other Government-run hospitals in Delhi and the municipality-run Hindu Rao Hospital performed duties while wearing black armbands and ribbons.

Dr R Sharma, national president of the association, said: "Modern medicine is controlled and research-oriented, we are proud of the heritage and richness of Ayurveda but the two shouldn't be mixed."

China's bid to change LAC cause of tension: MEA

Rebutting Chinese claim that India is responsible for tension at the Line of Actual Control (LAC), New Delhi on Friday hit back and said the situation worsened due to efforts by Beijing to "unilaterally change" the status of the LAC.

These strong comments by External Affairs Ministry Spokesperson Anurag Srivastava came at a media briefing. He was asked about the fresh comments by the Chinese foreign ministry blaming India again for the border situation in eastern Ladakh.

"Our position has been very clear and has been articulated several times in the past. The situation that we have seen since the last six months has been a result of the actions of the Chinese side which has sought to effect a



unilateral change in status along the LAC in eastern Ladakh," he said.

"These actions are in violation of the bilateral agreements and protocol on ensuring peace and tranquility along the LAC in the India-China border areas," Srivastava added.

A Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson on Thursday blamed India again for the

actions," Srivastava said.

Incidentally, the latest war of words between India and China broke out after External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said two days back that relations between the two countries are at worst stage in the last 30 to 40 years. He also said ties with China have "significantly damaged."

Striking a strident note in the backdrop of armies of both the countries locked in face-offs at the 1,700 km long LAC in Ladakh, Jaishankar said the ties were "very significantly damaged" because of Beijing's violation of agreements on maintaining peace and tranquility on the LAC.

He admitted the talks at various levels had so far failed to address the basic issue that "agreements are not being observed."

India's tough stand forced Trudeau to blunt his rhetoric

New Delhi: The Narendra Modi-led Government's tough stand against foreign interference in India's domestic affairs forced Canada Prime Minister Justin Trudeau to mellow his rhetoric and support to the ongoing farmers' agitation. Last week, Trudeau had extended his support to India's farm protests, claiming that the situation was "concerning" and Canadians were "all very worried about family and friends" in Punjab. Sources in Toronto told IANS that soon after the Modi

government summoned the Canadian High Commissioner in New Delhi over Trudeau's remarks and Minister of External Affairs S. Jaishankar announced that he will skip the Canada-led Ministerial Coordination Group on Covid-19 (MCGC), panic struck in the government circles in Canada. The Indian government had sent a clear message that such behaviour will affect the bilateral trade as it has already happened under the Trudeau government. The bilateral trade

between India and Canada declined by around \$1 billion from 2017-18 to 2018-19 after Trudeau's pro-Khalistani approach. Bilateral trade between India and Canada was worth \$7.23 billion in 2017-18. India's exports to Canada during this period were \$2.51 billion and imports from Canada were \$4.72 billion. In 2018-19, the trade was worth \$6.3 billion. Canadian investors view India as an attractive destination for investments, particularly in the post-coronavirus

period. More than 400 Canadian companies have presence in India, and more than 1,000 companies are actively pursuing business in the massive Indian market. Canada exports pulses, newsprint, wood pulp, asbestos, potash, iron scrap, copper, minerals and industrial chemicals and wants India to import more. The Canadian businesses would like their government to sign Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA) and Bilateral Investment Promotion

and Partnership Agreement (BIPPA) with India, sources said. After some deft diplomacy played by the Indian High Commission in Canada, sources said that Trudeau softened his stand when he was asked about the demarche issued by the Indian government. A humbled Trudeau in response said, "Canada will always stand up for the right of peaceful protest anywhere around the world and we're pleased to see moves toward de-escalation and dialogue."

Sources said Trudeau's earlier rhetoric against India on the farm protests was driven by his political compulsions -- he runs a minority government in his second term and continually needs to pander to his Khalistani vote bank. Six lakh Sikh immigrants in Canada constitute a significant vote bank, with everyone from Trudeau's Liberal Party to the opposition Conservative Party trying to woo them to their sides. Among the Sikhs in Canada, a substantial section is ideologically aligned with the

Khalistan movement -- a violent separatist Sikh militant movement in Punjab during the 1980s, sponsored by Pakistan. Thousands of innocent people in Punjab were killed by Khalistani militants before the Indian security agencies flushed them out completely. Though the militancy was wiped out, in the last five years, Pakistan's spy agency, the ISI, has been making efforts to revive the movement with the help of Khalistani diaspora in Canada, the UK and elsewhere.

In Canada, Khalistani politics continues to influence the Liberal Party and its foreign policy towards India. In the Trudeau government, Khalistani and Pakistani Canadians have assumed significant positions. While Canada's Defence Minister, Harjit Singh Sajjan, is a Khalistani sympathiser, the leader of the opposition New Democratic Party (NDP), Jagmeet Singh, too is a staunch supporter of Khalistanis. **IANS**

Over 20L UP farmers to get free vegetable seeds

PNS ■ LUCKNOW With the aim to promote horticulture, vegetable and fruit farming in the Purvanchal region as it is very effective in doubling the income of farmers of this region, the Yogi Adityanath government will be giving vegetable seeds free of cost to over 20 lakh farmers. Agriculture and Agriculture Education and Research Minister Surya Pratap Shahi said that horticulture had immense potential in Purvanchal. "In this region, while cereals are ready in six months, vegetables take 2-3 months to reap. Farmers should be made aware of such technology so that they can earn maximum income from horticulture," he said. Shahi, who was speaking in the technical session of the primary sector on the second day of the national webinar-cum-seminar on 'Sustainable Development: Issues, Strategies and Future Direction of Purvanchal' in Gorakhpur, said that the reason for the backwardness of the farmers was that they did not have

updated knowledge of technologies. "Diversification and multi-cropping are the demands of the agriculture sector and horticulture can play an important role in this," he said. The state government is continuously making efforts for the development of the agriculture sector. A centre of the International Rice Research Centre, Philippines, has been opened in Varanasi and efforts are also being made to open a centre of International Potato Research Centre. In the last three years, about Rs 300 crore has been given to Krishi Vigyan Kendra and other agricultural institutions, Shahi added. "Weather-based crop insurance for protection of crops is being provided at a mere 5 percent premium and mandi fee has been reduced from 2 percent to 1 percent. At least 50 percent grant is also being provided on construction of poly houses," he said. "In addition, 80 percent subsidy is being provided on agricultural equipment like sprinklers under the 'Per Drop More Crop' scheme. Such equipment saves water and also increases the production of

crops," Shahi said. Two mango packaging houses have been constructed in Amroha and Varanasi at a cost of Rs 9.90 crore each. During the coronavirus times, about 2,000 quintal mangoes have been exported from this region. "Dussehri mangoes have been the identity of UP and its quality can further be enhanced. By improving the quality of the 'Gaurji' mangoes of Gorakhpur and Basti, its exports can be increased and they can give a tough competition to Alphonso mangoes," he explained. Additional Chief Secretary (agriculture) Devesh Chaturvedi said that most of the lakhs of the migrants who returned during the coronavirus pandemic were from Purvanchal and a majority of them were given work in the agriculture sector. "New agricultural policies can be formalised by doing a SWAT analysis of the agriculture sector. Ample human resource is available in the sector in Purvanchal besides abundant water and improved road connectivity is our strength," he said.

Taiwanese firms keen to invest in K'taka, says Minister

ArrayBengaluru: Taiwanese companies expressed keenness to invest in Karnataka and strengthen economic and cultural relations between Taiwan and the southern state, said Karnataka Industries Minister Jagadish Shettar on Friday. "A Taiwanese delegation led by Taipei Economic and Cultural Centre (TECC) director-general Ben Wang met state Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa, and evinced interest to invest in diverse sectors in the state," said Shettar here. Noting that many Taiwanese firms were interested to know about the investment opportunities in the state, Shettar said the Chief Minister had assured them of providing all facilities and incentives to set up their India operations in services and manufacturing in Karnataka. "Industry secretary Gaurav Gupta made a presentation on the value proposition of the state, the favourable business environment and the conducive ecosystem for high-tech and innovation-driven manufacturing," added Shettar in a statement. The TECC delegation included its director Susan Cheng, deputy director Juliana Jin and representatives of Taiwanese firms Century Development Corporation, GW Instek, Delta Electronics Inc Aand Walsin Technology Corporation. **IANS**

UP farmers to 'produce' electricity

PNS ■ LUCKNOW Farmers will now 'produce' electricity along with crops using alternative or renewable sources of energy as they can set up solar power plants on barren or wastelands and sell the remaining electricity after their consumption to the Uttar Pradesh Power Corporation. UP's Energy Shrikant Sharma said this while chairing the fifth technical session of the manufacturing sector on the second day of the national webinar-cum-seminar on 'Sustainable Development: Issues, Strategies and Future Direction of Purvanchal' organised under the joint aegis of Planning department and Gorakhpur University on the Gorakhpur University campus on Friday. The energy minister said

that four of the sub-stations to be built to buy power generated by farmers under the PM Kusum Scheme in the field of renewable energy would be installed in Purvanchal. Apart from this, out of 8,000 solar irrigation pumps of the state, 2,882 have been given to Purvanchal, he added. "The rapid development of Purvanchal is important for the overall development of the state because without the development of Purvanchal, the development of Uttar Pradesh is incomplete," Sharma said. "There is a great need for uninterrupted power for sustainable development. In this context, the renewable energy sector currently contributes 6 percent to the energy sector, which the chief minister has targeted to increase to 20 percent by 2021," he said.

The energy minister said that in the past when the transformer developed a snag in the village, the villagers had to make donations to get it fixed but today the dedicated team was activated as soon as it received the information. "On getting connections of more than 20 kilowatts, the executive engineers themselves arrive at the connection taker's place with a box of sweets. In this session, Uttar Pradesh Power Corporation Limited Chairman Arvind Kumar and Purvanchal Power Distribution Corporation Limited MD Saroj Kumar discussed the departmental plans and achievements. Environmentalist of West Chester Pennsylvania, senior advisor Dr Rajesh Singh, Climate Change Prof PK Ghosh were also present.

From Page 1 The number of farmers coming here is increasing day to day," said Balbir Singh Rajewal, Bharatiya Kisan Union, while addressing media on Friday. The Singhu, Tikri, Ghazipur, Auchandi, Safiabad, Piao Maniyari, and Saboli and Chilla border remained closed for traffic movement. "Jhatikara border is open only for two wheelers and pedestrian movement," Delhi Traffic Police (DTP) tweeted. Farmers from different States have been camping at Delhi's Singhu and Tikri are on border for the last 16 days while farmers on Ghazipur and Chilla (Delhi-Noida) border points are campaigning for the last 11 days to demand a repeal of the farm laws enacted in September. In a series of tweets, the Delhi Traffic Police said Tikri and Dhansa borders are closed for traffic movement, while Jhatikara border is open only for two-wheelers and pedestrians. Meanwhile, two senior Delhi Police officers heading security arrangements at Singhu have tested positive for Covid-19 and both the Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP) rank officials are in isolation. Those travelling to neighbouring Haryana can take routes via Jharoda (only single carriageway). Daurala, Kapashera, Badusarai, Rajokri NH 8, Bijwasan/Bajghera, Palam Vihar and Dundahera borders, the police said. "Singhu, Auchandi, Piao Maniyari & Mangesh pur borders are closed. NH 44 is closed. Please take alternate routes via Lampur, Safiabad, Saboli & Singhu school toll tax borders. Traffic has been diverted from Mukarba & GTK road. Pl avoid Outer Ring Rd, GTK road, NH 44," the DTP tweeted. However, due to protests at the Chilla border one carriageway of the Noida-Delhi Link Road has been closed, while the other side (Delhi to Noida) remains open for movement. Scores of protesters belonging to the Bharatiya Kisan Union (Bhanu) stayed put at the Chilla border, while those of BKU (Lok Shakti) continued to camp at the Dalit Prerna Sthal. "One carriageway of the Noida-Delhi Link Road is open. People can come from Delhi to Noida, but the traffic movement on the other side continues to remain closed due to the stir," a Noida Traffic Police official said. "Commuters travelling to and fro Delhi can use the alternative Kalindi Kunj and the DND routes to avoid inconvenience," he added. Meanwhile, at the Singhu and Tikri border, piles of garbage have been lying on there. The farmers are cleaning the area by themselves while waiting for the little help from the authorities in keeping the site clean.

From Page 1 He further said that allowing Ayurveda postgraduates to perform surgery is a "blatant attempt" to "corrupt" the healthcare system of the country. "It takes years and years to become a doctor. With mixopaths what are we heading for? It's a failure when nations compromise with health," said Dr Sharma. He stated that the IMA is not against "any sort of pathy", but the mixing up of disciplines. "We are not against any sort of pathy be it Ayurveda, Unani, Homeopathy. We are proud of our national heritage and richness but let it coexist with modern medicine. All we demand is not to mix the disciplines. It will also mean the end of pure Ayurveda," he added. The Resident Doctors' Association of AIIMS Delhi urged the Government to retract the notification of the move. "This step will not only encourage already rampant quackery, but also undermine the safety of public," it said in a statement. The IMA said the agitation is likely to intensify in the coming weeks if the Government doesn't take back the notification.

Don't allow... The Minister said the Centre hasn't yet received any reply from farmers' unions on the proposals to consider in place of their demand for a repeal of the three farm laws and that he got to know about their rejection of the suggestions through media. Tomar said that the Government has given consent to the demands of amendments that they (the farmers) are looking for. He also asked the farmers not to allow elements trying to take advantage of their agitation as he referred to reports showing farmers holding posters demanding the release of Delhi riots accused Umar Khalid, Sharjeel Imam, Khalid Saifi and others.

"These Acts are illegal and arbitrary, because, these Acts would pave way for cartelization and commercialization of the agriculture products and if allow to stand, we are going to completely ruin our country as the corporates can, with one stroke, export our agriculture products without any regulation, and may even result in

famines," the farmers' body said in its plea filed through lawyer A P Singh. The laws are "unconstitutional, anti-farmer" because, as per them, the farmers' position would become "vulnerable" before corporate giants and the greed of multinational companies, it said. "These laws would dismantle the Agriculture Produce Market Committee (APMC) system intended to insure fair prices for farm products," it said. These laws were passed "hastily without having an adequate discussion" and a bare reading of the provisions would indicate that their implementation in current form will be disastrous and pave the way for exploitation of farmers, it said. The Agricultural produce

market committee had been acting as a "protective shield around farmers" and due to the new laws, "the market would ultimately fall to the corporate greed of multinational companies," it said. The plea said that till date, farmer leaders and the nominees of the Central government have held talks six times but "no fruitful purpose" has been served till now, it said. Earlier, the top court had agreed to test the constitutional validity of these laws without acceding to the interim pleas of some of the petitioners that the operation of the statutes be stayed for the time being. RJD leader Jha, who filed the plea through lawyer Fauzia Shakil, had said the laws would expose marginal farmers to

the exploits of big corporates. Jha had said: "The impugned legislations corporatise agriculture and ushers in an unregulated and exploitative regime. A farmer would not have the knowledge to negotiate the best terms with a private company. DMK MP Siva also raised similar issues against the farm laws and said they "are prima facie unconstitutional, illegal and arbitrary". He contended that the Acts are anti-farmer, brought out during the COVID-19 pandemic to benefit few corporations who are close to the corridors of power. The plea of Congress Lok Sabha MP from Kerala, TN Prathapan has not been listed so far for the hearing in the court. **PTI**

From Page 1 The Chinese have given five "differing explanations" for violating the agreements by bringing tens of thousands of soldiers to the LAC in Ladakh sector, a development that has "profoundly disturbed" the relationship, he said in an online conversation with the Australian think tank Lowy Institute. The exchange of words

between the two countries came at a time when the armies of India and China are locked in a tense border standoff in eastern Ladakh since early May. Both sides have held multiple rounds of military and diplomatic talks. However, no breakthrough has been achieved yet. Srivastava said the two sides have continued to maintain communication through

diplomatic and military channels. "It is our expectation that the further discussions will help both sides to achieve an agreement on a mutually acceptable solution for ensuring complete disengagement in all friction points along the LAC in the Western sector and full restoration of peace and tranquility as early as possible," he said.

Bengal Chief Secy, DGP defy MHA's summons

From Page 1 The Chief Secretary further wrote, "We had indeed made elaborate arrangements for security coverage of the protesters... The West Bengal police had provided a bullet-proof car and a pilot to Nadda, which was in addition to the escort (vehicle by State, personnel by CRPF) and PSOs (Personal Security Officers) he is entitled to as a Z-category protectee. "Reminding how not only Nadda — who had traversed the entire route safely — was provided with a bullet proof vehicle and pilot cars but also the Government had deputed 4 ASPs, 8 DSPs 70 SIs and ASIs, 145 constables, 350 civic police volunteers and 40 RAF personnel" This was in addition to the security arrangements made by the Central Government. Chief Secretary's report to the Centre came in tandem with a scathing attack by Trinamool politicians on the Centre. Condemning the Home Ministry's "unconstitutional behaviour" senior Trinamool Congress functionaries, including Minister Subroto Mukherjee and MP Kalyan Banerjee, described the summons as "unprecedented in a federal form of Government" because "the Centre has no authority to call State officials like this bypassing the State Government," particularly because "law and order is purely a State subject."

Mukherjee went a step further and said, "Bengal and Mamata Banerjee will not be cowed down by such threats issued by the Centre... we in the Trinamool Congress have seen many such brow-beatings and threats earlier and are ready to face them." The Centre's summons to the officers came after Bengal Governor Jagdeep Dhankhar submitted an adverse report to Home Minister Amit Shah about the "deteriorating law and order" in the State. He wrote how "at 8.30 am I had had alerted the Chief Secretary... and he wrote me back" saying he was "alerted and had sensitized the DGP" about the matter." He later told the media how "the events that happened on December 11 were most unfortunate. They are a slur on our democratic fabric. As a Governor, it is my duty to uphold the Indian Constitution..." Referring to Mamata's statement passing the blame of the entire incident on the BJP leadership he said, "I take a very serious note of the statement that emanated from the Chief Minister. How can a responsible Chief Minister believing in rule of law, believing in Constitution, talked the way she did. I tweeted, I urge the CM, madam please reflect." Meanwhile, the State police had lodged three cases in the Thursday's incident. While a first FIR was filed against BJP

leader Rakesh Singh for instigating the crowd two other complaints were registered against "unknown people." The Governor's report following the violence in Diamond Harbour, the Lok Sabha constituency of Banerjee's nephew Abhishek, gives a detailed analysis of the law and order situation in West Bengal and the State Government's response to political violence and other crimes, the officials said. Cars of several party leaders, including that of BJP national general secretary Kailash Vijayvargiya and West Bengal BJP chief Dilip Ghosh were also damaged in the attack.

Probe ₹2,400 cr waiver by NMC, Jain asks Addl CS

Minister of Urban Development Satyendar Jain on Friday asked the Additional Chief Secretary (Urban Development) to investigate the matter of alleged "misappropriation" of funds by the North Corporation. The AAP on Thursday accused the North Corporation of waiving off ₹2,400 crore due to the South Delhi Municipal Corporation (SDMC).

Jain said that there is a misappropriation of more than ₹2,400 crore done by BJP led North Corporation. "The incapacity of North MCD to pay the salaries of the doctors and staff is quite transparent. Delhi Government pays off all the dues to MCD before time and their accusations towards us are baseless," he said.

On the ongoing farmer agitation, he said that the cen-

tral government should comply with the demands as they are the food soldiers of the nation. However, when asked about the lack of social distancing at the Singhu border, the minister retorted by saying that the media did not raise eyebrows when BJP supporters attacked deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia's residence without following social distancing.

"The Central Government should comply with its demands. The farmers are our food soldiers. They have travelled kilometres together, leaving their homes, so the central government should take immediate action," he added.

Responding to the queries surrounding this fund transfer, he said, "I became aware of this development through newspaper and media reports which stated that BJP run North MCD misappropriated an

amount more than ₹2400 crore from South Delhi MCD. I have given orders to investigate the matter."

"Delhi government has been instrumental in paying off whatever is due to MCD, before time. We are not supposed to pay them anything, instead, they are the ones who owe us thousands of crores" Jain said on the alleged claims made by MCD on Delhi Government.

When asked about the demand of ₹13,000 crores by Mayors, the Minister said "The Corporations should ask the Central Government. During the last elections, they were confident about getting funds from the Central Government. The amount that Delhi Government owes to the MCD as per the Finance Commission is duly paid off before time. We have rather loaned them money which is yet to be recovered" he added.

We will run offices from dharna site: Mayors

All three Mayors of Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP)-ruled corporations announced that they will run their offices from a dharna site outside the Chief Minister's residence from Monday. Mayors and leaders of the three municipal corporations has been sitting outside Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's residence for days, demanding to clear dues of ₹13,000 crore.

North Delhi Mayor Jai Prakash, Mayor of South Delhi Anamika Mithlesh and Mayor of East Delhi Nirmal Jain in a joint press conference informed about the move.

North Mayor Jai Prakash

said that the Delhi government wants to create a state of anarchy in Delhi by not giving the outstanding funds of the three corporations.

Prakash accused the government of playing party politics keeping in mind the

upcoming corporation elections. He said that due to non release of funds by Delhi government, all development works in Delhi have stopped and corporations are facing lot of problems even in timely release of salaries of their

employees.

SDMC Mayor Anamika said that they failed to meet Delhi Chief Minister on the fifth consecutive day. Mayor said that AAP leaders are not bothered about the ongoing fund crisis in MCDs resulting in delay of salary payment of employees. They are only showing their sympathy for farmers sitting at Delhi borders but no sympathy for councilors sitting outside his residence since the last five days," she said.

Anamika further said that employees of all three civic agencies will also join the protest if Delhi Government fails to meet our demand of immediate release of outstanding money.

"Salaries of frontline workers like healthcare staff, safai karmis, DBC workers, teachers, etc are pending since long. Delhi Government must show sympathy towards them and should release its dues," she said.



Air quality improves marginally

Air quality in Delhi improved marginally with overall AQI settled at 302 µgm-3 on the National Ambient Air Quality Index (NAAQI) on Friday.

According to System of Air Quality and Weather

Forecasting And Research (SAFAR), air quality improved to poor category from Very Poor.

"Surface-level winds are calm, but likely to pick up during the day. Under the influence of fresh Western Disturbance, isolated to scattered rainfall and better ventilation conditions are expected on Friday night and Saturday and Air Quality Index is likely to further improve on to the lower end of the Poor to Moderate category by December 12."

Forecasting from Very Poor as forecast,

Citing MeT factors, it further said that Surface-level winds are calm but will pick up during the day. Under the influence of fresh Western Disturbance, isolated to scattered rainfall and better ventilation conditions are expected on Friday night and Saturday and Air Quality Index is likely to further improve on to the lower end of the Poor to Moderate category by December 12."

"However, respite is not expected to last longer. As an aftermath of WD, high moisture availability with higher air holding capacity, dense fog formation is expected (mainly during early morning hours) which will lead to deterioration of AQI to Poor to lower end of the Very Poor category on December 13 and 14th," it said.

Meanwhile, values of Suspended Particulate Matters (SPMs), PM 10 and 2.5 were recorded 265 and 122 µgm-3.



City reports 2,385 new Covid cases

Delhi on Friday reported 2,385 new cases of Covid-19 taking the total number of people infected with coronavirus to 603535 while the death toll touched 9,934.

According to the health bulletin, which details information about the fresh cases registered in the last 24 hours, 71679 tests (31724 RT-PCR, CBNAAT and True NAAT tests figures; 39955- Rapid Antigen). The number of containment zones stood at 6501. The Covid-19 positivity rate

has also come down to 3.33 per cent.

Delhi health minister Satyendar Jain said that the third wave of covid in Delhi is on the wane and urged everyone to continue following the precautions to effectively combat the virus.

Deliberating on the status of health in the city, Jain said "November 7 was the peak of the third wave in Delhi. The positivity rate was 15.26 per cent on that day, which has been on the perpetual decline ever since. For the past 10 days, the positivity rate has been

below five per cent. I can say that the third wave is on the wane. More than 70,000 tests however are still being carried out."

"The situation is very much under control, but still, I will request you all to wear a mask, follow social distancing. Wearing a mask will help us in eradicating the virus from the city. I applaud the citizens for their continued support, as well as the healthcare workers who have been working tirelessly," he added.

Addressing the query surrounding the delay in reports of RT-PCR tests, he said "I agree that there has been a delay, but that is being looked into. We followed the Central Government's orders to double the testing, which led to the delay. But now, there is betterment in the turnaround time"

As per the bulletin, 314 beds in COVID care centres are occupied by persons under quarantine, including travellers who have returned by Vande Bharat Mission and bubble flights, it said.



Woman sustains severe burn injuries after setting self ablaze

A woman, in her late 30's, allegedly tried to end her life by setting herself ablaze using kerosene in Sagarpur area of southwest Delhi on Friday morning. Police said that she has sustained 90-95 per cent burn injuries and is currently unfit for statement.

According to Ingit Pratap Singh, the Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP), Southwest district, the incident took place in Buddha Jayanti Park and she was rushed to Deen Dayal

Upadhyay hospital by some of the morning walkers who found her engulfed in flames.

"They managed to douse the fire and informed the police. During enquiry, a witness told police that the woman was seen carrying kerosene can in her hands just before the incident.

"The kerosene can was also lying on the spot," said the DCP.

"It appears that the woman tried to commit suicide. However, further enquiry is underway to ascertain the reason for the incident," he said.

Security beefed up at key Gurugram roads, toll plazas

After protesting farmers decided to intensify their demonstration in support of their demands, Gurugram Police have already beefed up security at key city's road along with, toll plazas, Delhi-Haryana border and State highways in view of protesters' plan to block the Delhi-Jaipur Expressway on December 12.

More than 1,500 police personnel have been deployed at various points along National Highway 48 on December 12 to ensure law and order is maintained and there is no disruption

to traffic movement.

"As precautionary major around 68 magistrates have been appointed along with police officers to maintain law and order situations across the district. Nobody will be allowed to disrupt peace inside the district and if anyone found involved in disrupting or forcefully blocking the road a necessary action will be initiated against the offenders as per law," Khatri said.

Moreover, the Gurugram Police have deployed a number of police personnel at the sensitive locations throughout the city.

"Concern police officers

including DCPs will be on patrol in their areas. We have issued an advisory to all officials concerned to take necessary precautionary measures in view of plans to block the expressway and toll plaza," KK Rao, commissioner of Gurugram police said.

Police officials have been asked to intensify patrolling in all sensitive locations, especially in border areas and Kherki Daula toll plaza so as to prevent any untoward incident.

Furthermore, the Delhi Police on Friday again tightened security at the Delhi-Gurugram border on the national highway. CISF per-

sonnel and Delhi police personnel were stationed at the border point and kept an eye on suspicious people surrounding the border areas. In view of the decision of various farmers associations to block the Delhi-Jaipur Expressway on December 12, the District Magistrate of Gurugram, Amit Khatri, has appointed 68 Duty Magistrates at multiple locations in the district on Friday.

These duty magistrates will be on duty along with the police officers throughout the day. Meanwhile, Anju Chaudhary, Chief Executive Officer of Gurugram Mahanagar City Bus Limited,



has been appointed as overall in-charge for the entire district in case of blocking the highway. Apart from this, Sub

Divisional Magistrate (SDM) Gurugram, Badshahpur, Pataudi and Sohna will be in charge in their respective areas.

Breast cancer in man successfully treated at hospital

A 62-year-old person from Delhi was diagnosed with high-grade (stage III) locally advanced 'Invasive Ductal Carcinoma' (IDC), a most common type of breast cancer in men, has been successfully treated at a city hospital.

After an excisional biopsy, a sample of tissue taken from the body in order to examine it more closely, Kumar was diagnosed with Invasive Ductal Carcinoma that started growing on the milk duct and has invaded the fatty tissues on the breast outside of the duct. He was successfully treated following a staged approach to allow the patient time to tolerate therapies, said Dr Chandragouda Dodagoudar, Director - Medical Oncology at Aakash Healthcare, Dwarka.

Interestingly, subsequent genetic testing showed he has no family history of cancer or hereditary breast and ovarian cancer (HBOC) syndrome, potential risk factors cited for male breast cancer, he said.

"This high-grade (which tend to grow and spread more quickly) cancer was challenging as the patient was obese and has long-standing diabetes, which made planning and executing chemotherapy difficult. So, we adopted a staged approach to allow the patient time to tolerate therapies. In the first stage, he underwent a surgery for removing the tumour followed by eight cycles of chemotherapy, spaced once in three weeks to allow recovery. This was followed by radiation therapy that reduces the risk of recurrence of cancer after the surgery," he added.

Dr Aashish Chaudhry, Managing Director of the hospital said "Male breast cancer is a rare disease. Most of the cases come to the fore at an advanced stage as men are not willing to accept that they can also get Breast Cancer. This case highlights how sound understanding of oncologists can help not only treat but cure advanced cancers. Men must be aware that breast cancer can happen to them even if they don't have a family history of cancer."

Breast Cancer in male is a rare disease and the ratio of male to female breast cancer diagnosis is 1:120.



India in no way responsible for climate change: Javadekar

 Asserting that climate change isn't an overnight phenomenon, Union Environment Minister Prakash Javadekar on Tuesday said India is in no way responsible for it still it is taking steps to cut down emissions as a responsible country. Javadekar was speaking on the eve of the fifth year of Paris Climate Agreement.
 "Climate change isn't an overnight phenomenon, it takes 100 years for a change and India is in no way responsible for this climate change. Historically, the USA has 25 per cent of all emissions, Europe has 22 per cent whereas China has 13 per cent and India, only 3 per cent. We are in no way responsible for this climate change," said the Minister.
 But as a responsible participant in world affairs, the country chose to take part in com-

bating climate change, he said.
 "Our emission intensity was to be reduced by 33-35 per cent as per the Paris Climate Agreement. We achieved 21 per cent of this and aim to achieve the remainder in 10 years," said Javadekar while addressing the media here. On December 12, Prime Minister Narendra Modi will address the global climate summit on its fifth anniversary, Javadekar said adding that India was one of the few countries, which have complied to the Paris Accord. "Our Nationally Determined Contribution will lead to less than 2 degree rise in temperature," he added.
 "According to the Climate Transparency Report 2020, India is the only Group of 20 country to meet its commitments," the minister claimed.
 "The recent report by the United Nations Environment Plan also says that India's emis-

sions grew 1.4 per cent in 2019, much lower than average of 3.3 per cent per annum over last decade." The Paris Agreement aims to hold the rise in average global temperatures to "well below" 2 degrees Celsius above preindustrial levels, and preferably 1.5C -- a threshold beyond which climate impacts are projected to sharply intensify.
 For the implementation of the targets under the Paris pact on climate crisis, the Environment Ministry, a few days ago, set up a high-level ministerial panel. The purpose of AIPA [Apex Committee for Implementation of Paris Agreement] is to generate a coordinated response on climate change matters that ensures India is on track towards meeting its obligations under the Paris pact including its Nationally Determined Contributions (NDC), a senior official said.

'A race is on to have strategic bases in IOR'

Says Chief of Defence Staff Bipin Rawat amid escalation of Chinese maritime presence in region

 As China is flexing its military muscle in the Indian Ocean Region (IOR), Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) General Bipin Rawat said on Friday a race is on among nations to have strategic bases in the region. Given the importance of the zone, more than 120 warships of extra-regional forces are now there to back various missions, he said.
 His observations came in the backdrop of India playing a crucial role in the field of maritime domain in the strategically important Indian Ocean region. Moreover, it has bolstered relations with all the littoral states located on the rim of the region.
 China started increasing its military prowess in the Indian Ocean region since 2008 by deploying its warships for anti-piracy missions in the Gulf of

Aden. As of now, there are three to four Chinese warships in the region.
 In this background, Rawat said here in an online conference there has been a "race for strategic places and bases" in the Indian Ocean Region which is only going to gain momentum in times to come.
 An increasing number of countries are focusing on the IOR considering its geo-strategic importance. "At present, there are over 120 warships of extra-regional forces deployed in the Indian Ocean region in support of various missions. Till now the region, by and large, remained peaceful," Rawat said at the Global Security Summit.
 The Indian Ocean, considered the backyard of the Indian Navy, is critical for India's strategic interests. China has been making concerted efforts to increase its presence

in the region.
 Referring to India's aspirations to become a major global power, he said the country will have to achieve it despite living in a "tough neighbourhood" and in an "increasingly contested" region.
 "We are witnessing a race for strategic places and bases in the Indian Ocean Region which is only going to gain momentum in times to come. Based on challenges we face as a rising regional power, we require structured long-term planning for capability building and capability development of our defence forces.
 "In our quest to build a stronger India, we need a peaceful and stable security environment. We need to maintain our strategic autonomy and cooperative relations underscored by strong regional linkages," he said.
 Referring to the evolving

geo-political scenario, the CDS said China's "economic and military rise coupled with competition increased its influence and attracted a great deal of interest.
 Rawat said the world appears to be on the brink of a new era as new centres of power and alliances based on geo-politics are emerging putting pressure on the Bretton Woods institutions.
 He said the Indo-Pacific region in general and the Indian Ocean region in particular will remain vital for transit and world trade. "Today, we are facing increasing security challenges, and to my mind, the best guarantor of peace and stability is to have dissuasive deterrence. For a nation like India, the security of land borders remained our primary concern," he said.
 "Therefore, there is a need to develop integrated structures

to ensure modernisation programmes to be undertaken by our armed forces based on careful assessment of the nature of threats and challenges," he added.
 He also said most of the countries in the Indian Ocean region are seeking to reap the economic dividends through improved connectivity and harnessing blue economy for which infrastructure is a prerequisite.
 Residents' powers and extra-regional power have shown a renewed interest in investing in infrastructure development in these countries to maintain and increase geopolitical influence, Rawat said.
 He said governance and security are under constant threat of being undermined by non-state actors and also naval competition among the states.

 In a move to prepare a profile data, the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs on Friday launched a programme for socio-economic profiling of beneficiaries of PM Street Vendors' Aatmanirbhar Nidhi (PM SVANidhi) scheme to extend benefits of other government plans to them.
 According to the ministry, a pilot programme will be run in Gaya, Indore, Kakching, Nizamabad, Rajkot, and Varanasi. The Quality Council of India (QCI) has been appointed as implementing partner for the programme. The programme was launched by Durga Shanker Mishra, Secretary of the ministry of housing and urban affairs on Friday.
 A complete profile of PM SVANidhi beneficiaries and their family members will be

prepared and based on the data, benefits of the various central schemes would be extended to them. In the first phase, 125 cities have been selected for the programme. The profile will identify potential eligibility of beneficiaries and their family members for select Central Government schemes and facilitate linkages.
 "Based on the profiled data, benefits of the various eligible central schemes would be extended to them for their holistic socio-economic upliftment," the ministry said.
 PM SVANidhi Scheme provides micro loans to street vendors, was launched in June 2020 with an objective to provide affordable working capital loan up to Rs 10,000 to Street Vendors for facilitating resumption of their livelihoods adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Desi mRNA vaccine candidate approved for human clinical trials



 The country's first indigenous mRNA vaccine candidate, developed by Gennova, Pune, has received approval from drug regulators to initiate Phase I/2 human clinical trials, the Department of Biotechnology said on Friday.
 The novel mRNA vaccine candidate, HGCO19, is supported with seed grant under the Ind-CEPI mission of the Department of Biotechnology.
 The mRNA vaccines do not use the conventional model to produce immune response. Instead, they carry the molecular instructions to make the protein in the body through a synthetic RNA of the virus.
 The host body uses this to produce the viral protein that is recognised, thereby, making the body mount an immune response against the disease.
 "Such vaccines are expected to be highly efficacious because



of their inherent capability of being translatable into the protein structure inside the cell cytoplasm.
 Additionally, mRNA vaccines are fully synthetic and do not require a host for growth, e.g., eggs or bacteria.
 "Therefore, they can be quickly manufactured in an inexpensive manner under cGMP conditions to ensure their "availability" and "accessibility" for mass vaccination on a sustainable basis," said a statement by the DBT.
 Gennova, in collaboration with HDT Biotech Corporation, Seattle, USA, has worked together to develop an mRNA vaccine candidate. HGCO19 has already demonstrated safety, immunogenicity, neutralization antibody activity in animals, said the statement.

SC refuses to hear plea seeking Lokpal monitored investigation into criminal-political nexus

New Delhi: The Supreme Court Friday refused to entertain a plea seeking a Lokpal-monitored investigation into the "criminal-political nexus" as flagged in the 1993 Vohra Committee report, saying the prayers "are all utopian".
 The top court said that petition must serve the purpose and it does not encourage petitions which are for publicity.
 A bench of Justices Sanjay Kishan Kaul, Dinesh Maheshwari and Hrishikesh Roy asked the petitioner advocate Ashwini Kumar Upadhyay to withdraw his plea and granted liberty to make a representation to law commission.
 At the outset, senior advocate Anupam Lal Das, appearing for Upadhyay, said that the petition relates to the issue of unholy nexus of criminal, politicians and bureaucrats.
 The bench said that over two decades have gone by since



the report was filed.
 Das replied that they have been taking baby steps and today, there is a Lokpal but it do not have the wherewithal and has no investigation wing.
 The bench said, "Look at your prayers. They are all Utopian. It is like a utopian situation. It's like I hope our country will be at the top in the world. You should write a book on it, don't file a petition on this".
 Justice Kaul said, "I don't encourage such petitions which are for publicity. The petition must serve the purpose".
 Das then told the top court that he will withdraw the petition but liberty may be granted to approach law commission.
 The bench allowed the petitioner to withdraw and granted the liberty to approach law commission.
 Upadhyay through his PIL has prayed for appropriate direction for Lokpal Monitored Investigation of the criminal political nexus, as referred by the Vohra Committee.
 Former Union Home Secretary N N Vohra headed the committee formed to study the problem of criminalisation of politics and the nexus between criminals, politicians and bureaucrats in India. The report was submitted in October 1993. **PTI**

Scientists develop inhalation delivery system for vaccines curing respiratory diseases

 In what could lead to new therapeutics for respiratory diseases like COVID-19, scientists have developed an inhalation delivery system for vaccines which generates potent immune responses in mice and non-human primates, without causing lung damage.
 The findings, published in the journal Med, suggests that a safe and effective lung delivery system could be developed for vaccines and therapeutics against pathogens such as the novel coronavirus.
 "This translational strategy potentially enables more effective delivery of therapeutics or vaccines while reducing the

The findings, published in the journal Med, suggests that a safe and effective lung delivery system could be developed for vaccines
 chance of toxic side effects," said study co-author Wadiah Arap from Rutgers Cancer Institute in the US.
 According to the researchers, this mode of vaccine delivery has many advantages over other routes, particularly for the development of vaccines against respiratory infections as the therapeutics arrive directly at the site of the infection.
 Inhalation-based vaccination is needle free and mini-

mally invasive, they said adding that it is especially attractive for administering multiple doses.
 The researchers said this method improves bioavailability and also reduces potential side effects by achieving a rapid onset of action.
 The scientists believe lung delivery could protect against airborne pathogens that cause diseases such as tuberculosis, influenza, Ebola, measles, and COVID-19. However, they said this approach has not been adopted widely, partly because the underlying physiological mechanisms remain largely unknown. They said answering this question is critical for designing a general lung delivery system for widespread use.

BMC to deploy 500 teams to administer Covid-19 vaccines in Maha Capital

Mumbai: At least 500 teams of five Trained personnel each will be deployed for administering the COVID-19 vaccine in the city, the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) said on Friday.
 The first to get inoculated will be health workers followed by frontline workers, people above the age of 50 and those suffering from co-morbidities, it said in a release.
 The announcement was made by additional municipal commissioner Suresh Kakani in the first meeting of the city task force for vaccine distribution at the BMC headquarters on Friday, the release said.
 The Maharashtra govern-

ment last month formed a task force to manage the distribution and administration of the COVID-19 vaccine in the state. A task force was also set up at the city level.
 The selected beneficiaries of the vaccine will receive a message on their registered mobile numbers, Kakani, who heads the task force, said.
 The process of setting up committees at the regional level to oversee vaccination will also be completed soon, he said.
 As of Thursday, the COVID-19 caseload in Mumbai stood at 2,88,689, which includes 10,948 deaths. **PTI**

India pledges \$2 billion to strengthen care for women, children, adolescents

New Delhi: India on Friday pledged a commitment of USD 2 billion at the World Health Organisation's 'Lives in the Balance' summit to provide essential services to women, newborns, young children and adolescents across the world.
 The summit organised by WHO's The Partnership for Maternal, Newborn & Child Health (PMNCH), a global alliance of more than 1,000 organisations, registered a total commitment of USD 20.6 billion from a group of high income, low- and middle-income countries and charitable foundations across the world.
 "USD 6.6 billion (32 per cent) of the total pledge is from money committed by low and middle-income countries themselves, including Afghanistan, India, Kenya, Liberia, and Nigeria. An additional USD 14 billion (68 per cent) is from official development assistance and grants given by Germany, Canada, Sweden, UK, USA and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation," the PMNCH said in a statement.
 India's commitment of USD 2 billion will be used to

strengthen all levels of care in response to the pandemic and to ensure essential public health functions during the year 20-21.
 "As important as this USD 20.6 billion is, it only will partially solve the problem of providing basic essential services for women, newborns, young children and adolescents," Rajesh Bhushan, Secretary, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare said.
 "Comprehensive efforts and collective advocacy are needed to ensure availability of substantially enhanced financial resources for this noble cause," he said.
 The recent WHO data from 105 countries shows that 90 per cent of countries have experienced disruptions to health services, with low- and middle-income countries reporting the greatest difficulties.
 According to early estimates of the indirect impact of COVID-19 on child and maternal mortality, more than 2 million additional deaths are estimated over 12 months (2020-2021) above the pre-pandemic level because of disruptions to essential health and nutrition services. **PTI**

 "Mahakavi Bharathiyar's definition of progress had a central role for women. One of the most


important visions was that of independent and empowered women," Modi said.

War veteran Col Prithipal Singh Gill turns 100

 The only officer to serve all the three Services on Friday celebrated his 100th birthday. Colonel Prithipal Singh Gill (retired) also fought in the India-Pakistan war as an Army officer.
 Gill is the only officer to have served in the Royal Air Force (RAF), Royal India Navy and then the Indian Army. He started his career in the pre-World War II era as a young pilot in the RAF. He saw action as a naval officer in world war two.
 Gill was born in 1920 in Patalia and studied at Government College, Lahore. He got married to Preminder Kaur in 1950. The couple

presently resides in Chandigarh with their children and grandchildren.
 Gill joined the RAF in 1942 without the consent of his family. He was commissioned as a Pilot Officer and stationed at Karachi flying Howard aircraft. Flying was then considered unsafe and his family did not want their son to live the life of a Pilot. This is when a British General, known to the Gill family, General Savoy, came to his help and was able to have Pilot Officer Singh transferred to the Navy.
 In the Navy, he served on a minesweeping ship and later on INS Teer which was a Navy escort ship for cargo ships during World War II. Gill was detailed to attend the Long



Gunners Staff Course at School of Artillery, Deolali, and he qualified as an Instructor in Gunnery. He then sought a

transfer to the Army, which was approved, and he was posted to "Gwalior Mountain Battery" equipped with 5.4 inch Howitzers.
 He later served with 34 Medium Regiment and later raised and commanded 71 Medium Regiment. During the 1965 Indo-Pak War when four guns of his regiment were cut off by enemy action, Gill personally led a successful mission to retrieve the four guns.
 On promotion to the rank of Colonel, Singh commanded an Assam Rifles Sector in Ukhrul, Manipur. He took premature retirement in 1970 and went to farming the family lands at his native village Pakhi in Faridkot District.

West Godavari bears brunt of mystery illness

JP Colony in Andhra Pradesh's West Godavari district headquarters Eluru bore the brunt of the mysterious illness which shook the State, leaving the colony's residents in a scared state.

As many as 40 people in this working class neighbourhood collapsed due to the mysterious illness. In all, nearly 600 people suffered sudden convulsions from Saturday to Thursday morning, the majority of whom were treated at the government district hospital in Eluru and some at the government hospital in Vijayawada.

"There is a water tank in our colony. Water is supplied from it. The water comes here from Pampula Cheruvu and that gets supplied. We are wondering if that was the reason we

aced this problem," Manikyam, 40, a resident of the colony, told IANS. He complained that the municipal water used to look green in colour until four days ago but after this illness now it looks okay.

"I told my family members to boil the water, maybe that saved us, nobody in our family was struck by the illness, including children," he said.

Manikyam believes that it was water which caused this illness. He cited the cases of a few neighbours who just collapsed.

Sattibabu, 45, Manikyam's neighbour, said leaders and officials should come to check the quality of the water in canals and pipelines at regular intervals but it is never done.

"Will anybody do these things when a person like me asks? This problem has occurred because of municipal water," he complained.

Sattibabu questioned the wisdom of attending to a problem after allowing it to crop up. "They should be saved before falling sick. Just imagine

how people are living amid the coronavirus. Even during coronavirus no leader came and spoke to us or asked us whether we had food," said Sattibabu.

Meanwhile, Suribabu, 40, who along with two other family members fell sick, said that he too collapsed.

"I just collapsed, what can I say why I fell down. On Saturday, I collapsed at the government hospital, my family members admitted me in the government hospital," said Suribabu. Suribabu said he suffered epileptic fits and didn't know what happened to him when the illness struck while visiting his daughters who had fallen prey to the same disease. Suribabu was not alone, two daughters, Lakshmi Pravalika (15) and Deepika (17), were also affected by the illness.

However, he expressed satisfaction at the treatment and medicines offered to them by the Government. He said blood samples and also the samples of what they had cooked at home were taken for tests.

According to Manikyam, JP Colony is a working class neighbourhood where people eke out a living as masons, jute mill workers, auto-rickshaw drivers and by doing other small jobs.

However, all of them are now afraid. "I don't know what will happen to me when I go back home after talking to you," he said. Because of the nature of the illness, Manikyam said they always have someone watching their children.

He said they are now even scared to step out for work. He said 40 people getting hit by the disease in a neighbourhood of about 300 houses is a big number to worry about.

Satyanandam, 45, another resident from the same colony, complained that a medical camp was held for only one day, which was not there on Wednesday as well as Thursday.

Indo-Bangla train services to start in N Bengal after 55 yrs

Kolkata: After a 55-year gap the people of North Bengal will be able to take a train to Bangladesh, thanks to the decision taken by the two countries to reopen the Indo-Bangla rail route from December 17, Northeast Frontier Railway sources said adding initially a goods train will run between the two countries.

The railway route will connect Haldibari in Coochbehar district to Chilhati in Bangladesh. The route was closed in 1965 when Bangladesh was a part of Pakistan.

NF Railway CPRO Subhanan Chanda said that "Prime Minister Narendra Modi and his Bangladeshi counterpart Sheikh Hasina will inaugurate Haldibari-Chilhati rail route on December 17. The distance between Haldibari railway station is 4.5 kilometres away from the international border Chilhati in Bangladesh is 7.5 kilometres away from the spot making the total distance between the two stations to 12 km, sources said.

Reports were confirmed by top officials of Katihar Division in North Bihar under which the Coochbehar-Jalpaiguri section falls. After the passenger trains start running the distance between Kolkata and northern Bangladesh would be reduced to a 7-hour journey sources said. Currently trains between India Bangladesh run between Sealdah and Bangladesh via the Gede route of Nadia district in South Bengal.

Jeans, T-shirts, slippers are now taboo for Maha Govt employees

Uddhav Thackeray dispensation unveils new dress code for its employees, officers, contractual staff

Taking serious note of its "casual dress sense" of its employees, officers and also those on its contract, the Maharashtra Government has come out with a dress code for them — under which it has banned its staffers from wearing jeans, T-shirts and slippers.

Holding that dresses worn by some employees as "indecent", "unkempt" and "unclean", that they have an adverse impact on the work atmosphere in offices and that they also "sully" the image of its image in the minds of people, the Uddhav Thackeray dispensation restrained its staffers from wearing jeans, T-shirts and casual slippers at its offices.

Prefacing the decision to introduce a new dress code for its staffer and contractual employees, Principal Secretary (General Administration Department) Shrikant Deshpande stated in a circular: "It has been observed that several employees and contractual staff wear "indecent", "unkempt" and "unclean" dress that have an adverse impact on the work atmosphere in offices and that they also sully the image of the government's image in the minds of the people".

AMONG OTHER THINGS, THE MAHARASHTRA GOVERNMENT STATES THAT WOMEN EMPLOYEES CAN WEAR SAREES, SALWARS/CHUDIDARS KURTAS, TROUSER PANTS AND SHIRTS ALONGWITH DUPATTAS IF NECESSARY. THE MALE EMPLOYEES CAN WEAR SHIRTS AND 'PANTS OR TROUSER PANTS'

Among other things, the Maharashtra Government states that women employees can wear sarees, salwars/chudidars kurtas, trouser pants and shirts along with dupattas if necessary. The male employees can wear shirts and "pants or trouser pants" and "Clothes with deep colours and strange embroidery patterns or pictures should not be worn. Besides, employees and staff should not wear jeans and t-shirts in offices," the circular stated.

In another diktat, the state government circular said that women employees should wear chappals, sandals or shoes while men should wear shoes or sandals.

In a welcome move aimed at encouraging use of hand-

spun cloth, the Maharashtra government stated that all employees must wear khadi clothes at least on Fridays.

Maharashtra is not the first state to have come out with a dress code for its government employees. Last year, the Bihar government had come out with a similar dress code for its employees. More than two years ago, the Rajasthan government had banned its employees from wearing jeans and T-shirts.

On its part, the Tamil Nadu government asked its employees to avoid casual attire and instead wear clothes that reflect Indian and Tamil culture. Among other things, the Tamil Nadu government mandated the women employees to wear sari/salwar kameez/churidar with dupatta while they were on duty and to shirts with formal pants/veshti (dhoti) or any other Indian traditional dress.

In August 2017, the Himachal Pradesh Government came out with a similar order prescribing a dress code for all its employees at work.

The Karnataka Government, which was among the first few states that introduced a dress code for its employees, had in 2013 barred its female employees from wearing skirts, T-shirts and pants while at work and asked its male employees not to wear T-shirts at work.

Cops act on 'love jihad' complaint, stop wedding of Muslim couple

Police in neighbouring Kushinagar stopped a wedding function and took the couple to the police station for interrogation after a complaint that it was an interfaith marriage involving a minor girl.

The man and the woman turned out to be both Muslims and adults. The man told a newspaper later that he was thrashed with a leather belt at the station, an allegation denied by the police.

Kushinagar Superintendent of Police Vinod Kumar Singh said someone from Gurnia village had informed them on Tuesday that

a couple was getting "quietly" married there, and suspected it to be a case of "love jihad".

The term is used by right-wing activists to refer to marriages allegedly performed for the sake of religious conversion. A police team reached the spot and found a 'maulvi' and the couple there and brought them to police station for interrogation, the SP said.

He said police later established that both were adults and belonged to the same faith. The two eloped 13 days ago from Azamgarh and the woman's family had lodged a missing person's report at the police station, he said.

Maha deaths reach 48,000 as 87 more die

4,268 test +ve, total infections mount to 18,72,440; total deaths climb to 48,059

The Covid-19 deaths in Maharashtra breached a grim milestone of 48000 on Friday, as 87 more people died of Coronavirus, while 4268 people tested positive for the pandemic in various parts of the State.

With 87 new deaths, the Covid-19 toll in Maharashtra went up from 47,972 to 48,059. Similarly, with 4268 fresh infec-

tions, the total infected cases jumped from 18,68,172 to 18,72,440.

As 2774 patients were discharged from the hospitals across the state after full recovery, the total number of people discharged from the hospitals since the second week of March this year rose to 17,49,973. The recovery rate in the state dropped marginally from 93.52 per cent to 93.46 per cent. Of the 87 deaths reported,

Mumbai accounted for a maximum of 13 deaths, 12 each in Pune and Nagpur, 6 in Solapur, 5 each in Nashik and Bhandara, 4 in Buldhana, 3 each in Thane, Sangli, Akola, Yavatmal and Wardha, 2 each in Ahmednagar, Satara, Shindhadurg, Osmanabad and Beed and one death each in Palghar, Dhule, Kolhapur, Aurangabad and Nanded.

With 13 fresh deaths, the Covid-19 toll in Mumbai climbed from 10,942 to 10,955, while the infected cases rose by 654 to trigger a jump in the infections from 288,696 to 289,350. Meanwhile, the health authorities pegged the "active cases" total cases in the state at 73,315. The fatality rate in the state stood at 2.57 per cent. Pune district, which continued to be the worst-affected city-district in Maharashtra, saw the total number of cases

increase from 3,60,921 while the total number of deaths in Pune increased to 7608.

Thane district remained in the third spot — after Pune and Mumbai — after the total number of infections rose to 2,46,720, while the total deaths climbed to 5380. Of the 1,15,70,137 samples sent to laboratories, 18,72,440 have tested positive (16.18 per cent) for COVID-19 until Friday.

5th phase of panch bypolls in J&K records 59.90% turnout

J&K Election Commissioner JKK Sharma informed on Friday that 59.90 per cent and 52.43 per cent voter turnout was recorded in the fifth phase of panch and sarpanch bypolls, respectively, which were held on Thursday.

While giving out the details, the SEC informed that bypolls for the vacant panch seats were held in 229 constituencies in the fifth phase. Out of a total 42,504 electors (including 22,140 males and 20,364 females), 25,460 voted in the fifth phase.

Sharma said that the Jammu division recorded 77.52 per cent turnout while the Kashmir division recorded 58.35 per cent turnout in fifth phase of panch bypolls.

Similarly, 52.43 per cent voting was registered in the sarpanch constituencies in the fifth phase in 125 constituencies.

Out of 88,078 electors (including 45,766 males and 42,312 females), 46,179 voted to choose their representatives, the SEC said.

He further said that 75.84 per cent polling was registered in Jammu division while 42.85 per cent polling was recorded in Kashmir division.

Bodies of woman, 3 kids found hanging from a tree in Bhiwandi jungle

Head of families tries to commit suicide, after learning about death of members

In a shocking development, the decomposed bodies of a woman and her three children were found hanging from a tree in the jungles of Pachapur in Bhiwandi taluka of Thane district.

After learning about the death of his wife and three children, the head of the family one Sripat Bachchu Bangri tried to commit suicide by consuming poison. Bangri is undergoing treatment at the state-run Indira Gandhi hospital, where his condition is described as "critical".

The Bhiwandi police said on Friday that the incident came to light on Thursday. The brother of Sripat Bangri who had gone to the jungle to fetch firewood saw the four bodies hanging from a tree. He alerted the police.

"After receiving the information, we recovered the decomposed bodies from the

tree. We established their identities based on the clothes worn by them. After we established the identities of the four bodies, we informed Sripat Bangri about it. We have sent them for post-mortem," a senior police officer said. Meanwhile, a forensic team from Bhiwandi visited the spot where the four bodies were recovered and did a panchnama of the spot.

Police identified the four bodies as that of Ranjana Bangri (30), her daughters Darshana (12), Rohini (6) and son Rohit (9).

According to the police, the four members of Bangri family had been reported missing for seven weeks. Sripat Bangri had lodged a complaint with the Bhiwandi police on October 21 about their disappearance.

Bhiwandi police are investigating to find out if it was a suicide or a murder.

This is the second incident of a similar kind that has taken place in Thane district. Last month, the bodies of three persons were found hanging from a tree near Khardi village in the neighbouring Sahapur taluka.

43 new corona cases in district, 31 recovered

Aligarh: In the district, 43 new corona cases have been discovered with 31 recovered and sent back home from Covid-19 hospital. 43 people found corona infected in JN Medical College, Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyay Hospital, private lab and antigen test.

The health department is worried about the sudden rise in corona cases. District Magistrate Chandra Bhusan Singh told that infected are being admitted in Covid-19 hospitals. Family members and contact persons will be tested soon. Currently, 259 active cases in the district made a total of 10,857 total cases with 10598 recovered.

Even after the directives of the administration, Corona infected patients are putting in isolation into the city, not only that the data of these patients are not being recorded, even the administrative officer is completely unaware about this.

Spiritual politics: DMK presses panic button

Though the DMK leadership had said on December 3 that it would wait for more details about the spiritual politics to be launched in Tamil Nadu by Rajinikanth, in its first official reaction on Friday, the Dravidian major could not hide its disapproval of the new entity to be launched by the actor.

"It is not correct to bring spiritual politics to Tamil Nadu," said Kanimozhi MP, the step sister of party president M K Stalin while addressing public meetings in Tamil Nadu. She said this was an attempt to

divide the State and its people based in caste, creed and religion. But the DMK leader did not elaborate how Rajinikanth would divide the population in the State and which are the communities to be benefitted by the new political party.

Addressing party cadre across the south western districts of the State as part of her election campaign for the 2021 assembly election, Kanimozhi said that Rajinikanth's political party would impact the prospects of the AIADMK while the DMK and allies would not be impacted at all. But reports from Anna

Arivalayam, the DMK head quarters in Chennai, say that Stalin and other leaders have pressed the panic button following the announcement by Rajinikanth last Thursday. "Hectic parleys are on between the DMK and the Dr Ramadoss led PMK to rope in the Vanniyar caste votes," said sources in the DMK. The sudden agitation unleashed by the PMK last week demanding 20 per cent reservation for the Vanniyar community in government service and educational institutions is being seen as the prelude to the PMK's move to align with the DMK.

"The PMK is known for its game of flying trapeze and political acrobatics. The party has always jumped from one alliance to another in successive elections and is famous for its consistently inconsistent stances. What I understand is that the DMK leadership may even part with the post of deputy chief minister to the Vanniyar community as part of the deal," said Kolahala Srenivasan, author and political commentator.

Vanathi Srinivasan, BJP leader, said the DMK may have to pay high price for its anti-Hindutva stance and appeasement of minorities. "Let them appease the minorities and we do

not have any issues. But they should not insult and humiliate the Hindus to keep the minorities in good humour," said Srinivasan.

S Gurumurthy, editor, Tughlaq, said that the coming weeks would see tempers rising in the State as the DMK is upset over the announcement made by Rajinikanth. "History proves that the DMK and the Congress were the losers when the AIADMK was formed by MGR in 1972. We will see the same phenomenon now as the Tamils are waiting for a change from the worn out and rusted Dravidian politics," said Gurumurthy.

Mission Bengal

The pre-poll discourse in the State is rarely ideological but about intimidatory heft. Both the TMC and BJP can't ignore it



The BJP's desperation to succeed in Mission Bengal by toppling its arch-enemy and Trinamool Congress (TMC) chief Mamata Banerjee and the latter's spirited fight to hold on to her turf, if only to challenge the BJP's formulaic invasion of Opposition-ruled States, will inevitably spill over into clashes and violence. The latest flashpoint was around an attack on the convoy of party president JP Nadda, with the BJP blaming TMC cadres and the latter claiming it was staged to implicate them. In the process, both camps are caught in issuing threats and counter-threats that in no way tests the capability of each in ensuring good governance or the promised land. While the BJP's hunger to chase its electoral goal and the concomitant rhetoric and war cry are understandable, does it have to plummet to the depths of threatening counter-violence? Or is it a ruse to build a case for total breakdown of law and order and ensure a high-security election for the Assembly, which would be, by implication, one conducted under Central scrutiny? That's what is apparent with Bengal Governor Jagdeep Dhankar sending a report to the Centre, saying the security arrangement was inadequate for Nadda's convoy and asking Mamata to watch out as the State was not her fiefdom. That's what State BJP chief Dilip Ghosh recklessly seemed to suggest a few days ago with his crass remark that those opposing a fair verdict or intimidating voters would find themselves either with broken bones or at the crematorium. As for the TMC, it has been hardened by the politics of violence and agitations. Coercion, violence or booth management, which the Left parties in Bengal had perfected into what is called "scientific rigging", became part of a machinery that no party in Bengal has been immune to but that in no way could effect a tidal change. One must remember that Mamata uprooted the Left giants operating within that hostile system. She stood up to them but having arrived, built her political stock on her personal charisma, cause-based activism and grassroots connect. The BJP itself, while promising change, has been charged with getting men from Bihar and Jharkhand into Bengal for "electoral management."

Each political party has institutionalised muscle power and mischief-making recruits have been changing camps according to the trade winds. Crossovers in Bengal politics are rarely ideological but solely about intimidatory heft. Sadly, that has set the terms of the discourse instead of issues, becoming an obnoxious scare tactic for every voter, decided or undecided, that they should weigh in with the strongest side. Little wonder then that the BJP has allowed rabble-rousing ways of its State leaders to negate Mamata's stature, considering she still has an emotional hold on the people. This is why BJP is having to work the ground despite a favourable tide in the Lok Sabha polls. And by claiming victimhood in a "reign of terror" early on in the campaign, it is justifying the need for violence as defence as part of its propaganda. For its house is not quite in order. That's why Home Minister Amit Shah has made Bengal his focus. He has to take care of internal dissension between the original BJP cadres and TMC rebel imports over the quantum of importance that each should get. While the original party workers are gung-ho about a Centrist push to the campaign, the turncoats are wary of Bengal's anti-Right ethos and are not being able to commit to the party's hegemonic planks. The BJP is pitching its campaign on the TMC's "politicisation of institutions", particularly the police, but that is yet to cut ice given the record of its own autocratic methods in States it already governs. Its minority appeasement plank against Mamata or her COVID management have been blunted by the Bengal leader's new-found maturity in matters religious, her smooth conduct of the Durga puja and arresting the pandemic spiral better than the projected scenarios. Besides, after years of nurturing and solidifying its vote base in North Bengal, and investing its lot with the Gorkhaland movement, the BJP's key man and Gorkha Janukti Morcha (GJM) leader Bimal Gurung jumped ship and declared support to Mamata. With such hurdles cropping up just six months before the elections, Shah, therefore, has come down to mathematical certainty like working on consolidating the tribal and Dalit vote in the State. And he is chipping away the Trinamool's strengths, like weaning away Suvendu Adhikari and other disgruntled leaders who are not happy with Mamata's blind reliance on her nephew Abhishek Banerjee and election strategy advisor Prashant Kishor. Shah had poached Mukul Roy, closest to Mamata at one time, to get a sense of her winning strategy. Now he has Adhikari, a popular grassroots leader, an organiser and mobiliser for issues like Nandigram. Both are not exactly clean, with ED cases against them, but the BJP is willing to manipulate their weakness to its own strength. The party is desperate about Bengal for more than one reason. First, it sees it as a liberal and intellectual outpost that has been its ideological polarity, and having made inroads in the last Lok Sabha election, it now wants the glory of a conquest. Second, along with Odisha, Bengal has been a vanguard of the East that has held out against its juggernaut. Third, the BJP wants to prove that poll arithmetic can override cultural opposition to it. Of course, Mamata is used to taking several punches and emerging stronger in the end. And instead of getting increasingly caught up in a reactive game with the BJP, she is now focussing on her "doorstep" appeal, launching new and highlighting existing welfarist schemes. In fact, only she can break the vicious cycle of violence, drive home the message of development and hold the BJP to account on its real specific plans for "poriborton." As for the BJP, it needs an equally charismatic face. Will cricket icon Sourav Ganguly agree to be Shah's man for the job?

Year of the pandemic

2020 is that in more ways than one, it appears, as dictionaries unanimously vote for word of the year



While there might be some lingering doubts about Time magazine's selection of US President-elect Joseph R Biden and his Vice-President Kamala Harris as "Persons of the Year," we, along with many others, feel that the "people of the year" are the frontline medical workers risking their lives for the sake of others. But there is little doubt about the "word of the year," which both Dictionary.Com and Merriam-Webster have awarded to the "pandemic." And that is appropriate because how many people used or knew of that term unless they were Hollywood screen writers until the Coronavirus upended everyone's lives in 2020? Even as the news of advancement in the trial of vaccines brings some cheer across the world, we are still far away from vanquishing the virus that has permanently changed the lives of us all. And there is no guarantee that "vaccination" will be the word of the year in 2021. We are still a long way from having a significant number of people being vaccinated against the virus for it to be effective among a large population and the world has learnt a lesson about the need for hygiene in all our lives. But how else will 2020 be remembered decades from today? Will we talk about this being the year where "social distancing" became the norm and online education really took off? Or will we remember 2020 as the year that several social constructs broke down once and for all and set the ball rolling on the path to revolution across many nations? Will 2020 be the year where we reset everything altogether, everything becomes "Before Pandemic" (BP) and "After Pandemic" (AP)? We will have to wait and watch but make no mistake, 2020 will be the most memorable year of our lives even if it was a year in which we all did almost nothing. Of course, it allowed us buffer time to re-orient ourselves, evolve and survive in new contexts and circumstances. Maybe 2021 will offer us some hope and we can break out of the thesaurus and learn some new words for hope and expectations. It can't be this bad again next year? Or can it?

Combat climate change

The long haul ahead to bridging the emissions gap doesn't present a rosy picture but there are encouraging signs, too

Every year, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) releases an *Emissions Gap Report* showing the difference between estimated current greenhouse gas emission levels and the target prescribed by the Paris Agreement on Climate Change signed on December 12, 2015. The latter calls for holding the increase in global average temperature in this century to well below 2 degrees Celsius above the pre-industrial-revolution level, and for trying to limit it to 1.5 degree Celsius above it.

Each report not only dwells on the gap but provides a comprehensive account of the situation and developments on the environment front during the year, what needs to be done to combat climate change, and the prospects ahead for the world. The current report, 11th in the series titled *Emissions Gap Report 2020*, released on December 9, 2020, presents, like its predecessors, an alarming picture. It says that the year 2020 is likely to be the warmest on record, with wildfires, droughts, storms and glacier-melting intensifying.

If one were to identify its most terrifying prognosis, it would be that the world is hurtling towards a temperature increase of over 3 degrees Celsius by the end of this century. And this would be despite a predicted fall of 7 per cent in carbon dioxide emissions as a result of the economic slowdown caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. The decline, however, would translate to only 0.01 degree reduction in global warming by 2050, because the emissions would rise again — and become even higher — as economies bounce back.

What all this means begins to become clear on recalling that according to the *Special Report on Global Warming of 1.5°C* (The Special Report), released by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) on October 7, 2018, the adverse effects of climate change would not be reduced even if the increase is limited to 1.5 degree Celsius. Sea levels will continue to rise beyond 2100, threatening coastal ecosystems and infrastructure. Flooding, drought and extreme weather events will wreak havoc around the world. Many species will continue to be driven towards extinction and marine ecosystems could face "irreversible loss." What is particularly alarming, this level, according to the report, is likely to be reached sometime between 2030



and 2052. Fourteen per cent of the world's population would be exposed to severe heat waves at least once in five years at the 1.5 degree Celsius warming level. The percentage would rise to 37 if the level rises to 2 degrees Celsius. Christopher Flavelle's report, titled *Climate Change Threatens the World's Food Supply, United Nations Warns*, in the *New York Times* of August 8, 2019, quotes Edouard Davin, a researcher at ETH Zurich and an author of the report, as saying by email, "Above 2 degrees of global warming, there could be an increase of 100 million or more of the population at risk of hunger," and adding, "We need to act quickly." A three-degree Celsius increase in temperature, according to a report by Louise Boyle, datelined December 9, 2020, in the *Independent* of the UK, would cause mass extinctions and leave "swaths of planet uninhabitable." It cites the non-profit organisation, Climate Central, as saying that 275 million people would be at risk in areas flooded by sea-level rise.

It is a grim scenario on almost every front. A 65-page "Summary for Policymakers" of another IPCC special report of 2019 stated that a food crisis loomed large, especially in tropical and sub-tropical regions, if carbon dioxide emissions continued unchecked. It added that besides significantly reducing crop yields, rising temperatures may also bring down the nutritional value of crops. Floods, droughts, storms and other forms of extreme weather conditions threatened to disrupt and, over time, reduce the world's food supply.

According to Stephen Leahy's report, "World food crisis looms if carbon emissions go unchecked, UN says" in the

National Geographic of August 8, 2019, already, more than 10 per cent of the world's population remained undernourished. It quoted Cynthia Rozenzweig, Coordinating Lead Author of the IPCC's *Special Report on Climate Change and Land*, and a climatologist at the NASA Goddard Institute for Space Studies, as saying that extreme weather events had already increased in size and intensity, and are playing a role in food price spikes.

It cited the examples of extensive spring floods in the US Midwest in 2019 leading to very late planting of corn and soy crops, reducing their potential yields. It also mentioned drought playing havoc with rice crops in Thailand and Indonesia and sugarcane and oilseeds produces in India in 2019 when record-breaking heat waves in Europe were feared to be causing a 13 per cent decline in French wine production. Apart from under-nourishment and hunger, food short-

ages could lead to an increase in cross-border migration, which is having an unfortunate impact on politics in North America and Europe.

The question arises: What are the chances of averting the dismal future that seems to face the world? There are some glimmers of hope. The *Emissions Gap Report 2020* says that the predicted emission rates could be reduced by around 25 per cent if Governments commit to a path of "green recovery" from the pandemic's disaster. This would give the world a fighting chance to keep global warming down to 2 degrees Celsius by the end of this century. Treading this path would require the provision or direct support to zero-emissions technologies and infrastructure, reducing fossil fuel subsidies, promoting measures like afforestation and avoiding deforestation. Trees are most important as they reduce the presence of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere by absorbing it.

Agricultural practices and global food supply systems account for one-third of the global carbon emissions. It is, therefore, important to orient them towards reducing carbon emissions. For example, steps like the draining of wetlands to make room for cultivation — as has happened in Indonesia and Malaysia to create palm oil plantations — should be avoided as that would release into the air the huge amounts of carbon dioxide gas trapped in these water bodies. Further, the *Special Report on Climate Change and Land* calls for institutional changes like providing farmers with better access to credit in developing countries and giving them stronger property rights. It further advocated utilisation of the skills and knowledge of indigenous and local peo-

ple to devise agricultural practices aimed at promoting biodiversity conservation and combating desertification and land degradation.

Along with agriculture, the *Emissions Gap Report 2020* emphasises the need for shipping and aviation industries, which account for five per cent of global emissions, to combine energy efficiency with a rapid transition away from fossil fuels.

Around two-thirds of global emissions being linked to private households, changes in consumption and behaviour patterns are required. Cycling, car-sharing, and more energy-efficient housing needs to be promoted. Travel by rail rather than air is recommended for short journeys. The wealthy, particularly, need to make significant changes in their lifestyles as the richest 1 per cent of the world's population accounts for more than twice the combined share of the poorest 50 per cent. There is a special need to avoid food loss and wastage.

There are some encouraging signs. While President Donald Trump of the US walked out of the Paris Agreement and derided the idea of climate change, President-elect Joe Biden has not only decided to rejoin but has set a target for net-zero emissions no later than 2050. According to the *Emissions Gap Report 2020*, some 126 countries, covering 51 per cent of global greenhouse gas emissions, have so far, adopted, announced or are considering, a net zero pledge by 2050.

Nevertheless, optimism needs to be kept on a tight leash. Between promise and performance, and resolve and result, falls more than a shadow. In this case, the shadow will darken the future of the entire world.

Sir — Generic medicines are considered an economical substitute for branded drugs. But I was shocked to notice heavy trade margins in generic medicines at the wholesale market in Delhi's Bhagirath Palace.

A box of 20 strips of 10 tablets each of Vogliboz-0.3, marketed by Knoll Healthcare Pvt Ltd, with the Maximum Retail Price (MRP) of ₹100 each (box MRP ₹2,000), was available with the distributor at ₹300. It means a whopping 567 per cent profit for the retailer.

The National Pharmaceutical Pricing Authority (NPPA) should immediately direct generic drug marketers to reduce the printed MRP to not above the net total trade margins of 20-25 per cent. The high trade margins create room for bribery since governments are the biggest purchasers of generic medicines for their hospitals and dispensaries.

New Parliament building: What's the need?

The "ground-breaking ceremony" for an imposing new Parliament building seemed incongruous when the country is going through an unprecedented difficult patch mainly due to the COVID-19 pandemic and economic downturn. The occasion was cheerless in the face of farmers intensifying their agitation for repealing the new farm laws.

The *Dhoomi puja* with chants from Hindu scriptures seemed a display of the predominance of one religion. The multi-faith prayer that followed was consolatory and there was no reading from the Constitution. President Ram Nath Kovind was conspicuous by his absence which was perhaps just what the Prime Minister needed to enjoy the limelight. The Central Vista Project (CVP), sprawling along the heart of the city and costing a few thousands of crores, validates the proposition that politics is too often concerned only with the personal vanities of politicians.

There is no justification for giving precedence to a sprawl of structures to house Parliament rather than providing housing for all the homeless, especially when the 93-year-old existing structure has not yet outlived its usefulness. A city where the destitute sleep on pavements can-



not boast of a four-storey triangular-shaped building — however much its grandeur — in good conscience. The "Temple of democracy" should sit easy with the reality of life for most citizens.

What the Supreme Court's red light to any construction or demolition and felling of trees in the demarcated plot of land will translate into is far from clear. Cutting down trees for erecting a plethora of concrete structures does not advance the causes of conservation or curbing pollution.

Reap the gains of a downtrend

Investors who want to build a good portfolio over the long term, should use opportunities like the present one, to invest in the financial markets

The Coronavirus pandemic has stalled international trade and created heightened volatility in the financial markets. It has impacted many businesses and the finances of individuals. People are revisiting their financial plans in order to sustain their savings for as long as possible. Those who have been playing the financial markets for long, know that such downturns are a great opportunity to rebalance their investment portfolios. Many research houses have come up with data points on how the recovery of the markets has been, post a catastrophic event that has sent the markets into a tailspin. In most of the cases it has been found that after a downward trend, the markets get back to their original level within two years. Hence, investors who are not looking to time the market and want to build a good portfolio over the long term, should use opportunities like the present one, to invest in the financial markets and reap benefits.

Many investment firms have gone the extra mile to support their stakeholders during these uncertain times. Webinars were conducted on financial health that focussed on effective fiscal management during the lockdown and the turbulent phase that the economy is going through. These firms facilitated a goal-based approach, risk profile analysis and rebalancing of strategies which helped the millennials with their future investment plans by tailoring them to their specific requirements.

A plunge in March, followed by a gradual recovery, has created a volatile situation in the financial markets that has lured many people to dabble in the stock market. At the same time, many existing investors who barely traded, have now started doing so. Retail participation saw a record high, while many inactive clients re-entered the market and there was a sharp rise in the number of new clients in the industry. Despite volatility, many investors were able to generate good returns with the help of financial advisors who adopted various strategies, the most popular being buying at the dip and multi-asset class investing. Buying at the dip is a market timing strategy and more often than not, investors do not get the timing right. The potential problem with this approach is that you may end up catching a falling knife. Investors should choose companies that fundamentally have good businesses and sufficient cash flows to withstand a potential downturn. It is beneficial to create a well-diversified portfolio by investing in multiple asset classes that give a balanced risk exposure over various macroeconomic conditions.

For investors focussed on companies with sustainable competitive advantages and long-term secular trends, it's important to prioritise a far-horizon investment outlook over knee-jerk modifications. While investors who focus on short-term stock market momentum may have rebalanced portfolios during the period, staying the course can potentially be beneficial. Sticking to a long-term investing strategy can serve as a guiding principle through swings on a monthly or quarterly basis. Research companies guide investors with rebalancing techniques as they tend to improve risk-adjusted returns over time, as long as it doesn't generate excessive tax and transaction costs by reducing portfolio sensitivity to the timing of volatile markets. It also gels with the markets' natural tendency to revert to the mean. Many a time, people do not understand and focus on rebalancing, however, this is one of the most important steps to get a consistent return. Rebalancing the portfolio normalises it for one's age, revised objectives, current market conditions and so on. For instance, if one has invested ₹1 crore with 70 per cent in equity and 30 per cent in debt and after a sudden fall in the market, the portfolio composition changes to 60 per cent equity and 40 per cent debt, it is the right time to shift some amount from debt to equity, which will bring the portfolio composition back to 70:30. This way, one will always benefit from any market condition and the portfolio, too, will be aligned with long-term objectives.

Investors have been encouraged by improvements in manufacturing and metals, better-than-expected second-quarter earnings, hopes of a potential vaccine and extremely low interest rates. Mostly, investors seem to be looking past the pandemic to the recovery expected in 2021. Due to the expectations of an additional US Government stimulus, the ongoing global recovery and an expected rebound in cyclical sectors, the world is likely to see a V-shaped economic rebound. If the RBI continues the low interest rate regime for the next one year or so, the yields on Fixed Deposits and other fixed income instruments are going to be very low. Plus, if we include the impact of income tax the returns from these instruments are not going to beat inflation and one is going to get a negative real rate of return. All these put together, provide a great opportunity for investors to participate in the markets and build a portfolio with a long-term objective.

As the overall structure of the market remains positive, participation by retail investors will increase consistently. With economic activity recovering fast, more upgrades in earnings cannot be ruled out. Strong global markets in the future can keep the liquidity abundant in the system, thus providing support to the overall market.

Checks and balances needed

There is a requirement to have a re-look into the provisions of the Uttar Pradesh Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Ordinance

The Governor of Uttar Pradesh (UP) recently promulgated an Ordinance called the Uttar Pradesh Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Ordinance, 2020. It has been promulgated to provide for prohibition of unlawful conversions from one religion to another by misrepresentation, force, undue influence, coercion, allurement, by any fraudulent means or by marriage. The emphasis in the Ordinance is on the prohibition of "unlawful conversion." A conversion is considered unlawful if it is due to allurement, coercion and so on and also by marriage. An "unlawful conversion" is defined as one that is not in accordance with the law of the land.

According to the new law, a wo/man intending to convert to another religion needs to inform the District Magistrate or Additional District Magistrate at least 60 days in advance and give a declaration that the decision is free from any pressure or allurement and is being done by one's free choice. Yet, another declaration needs to be submitted within 60 days once the conversion takes place. Only then will the person be able to attain a confirmation certificate that the conversion is lawful. The District Magistrate's Office has to exhibit a copy of the declarations on the notice board of the office till the date of confirmation of conversion.

However, the UP Ordinance is silent with regard to the nature of the law governing conversions. It does not provide any explanation and contemplates that whoever is involved in the said unlawful conversion shall be punished with an imprisonment of not less than one year, which may extend to five years. The accused person is also liable to pay a fine. Though the punishment is one year to five years, the Ordinance makes the offence cognisable and non-bailable and triable by the court of sessions.

Generally, in criminal cases the burden of proof lies with the prosecution but the Ordinance imposes this burden upon the person who allegedly caused the conversion. And wherever the conversion has been facilitated by any other person, the burden of proof is on them too. It also contemplates that any marriage, which was entered into for the sole purpose of unlawful conversion by a man of one religion with a woman of another religion or vice-versa, either by converting himself/herself before or after marriage or by converting the wo/man before or after marriage, shall be declared void by the family court.

In case, the couple is in an area where the family court is not established, the civil court having jurisdiction in the area can try the case and declare the marriage null and void. There need not be any independent adjudication with regard to a declaration of any marriage as void as per any other law. However, the fact remains that unless a nexus is established between a marriage and unlawful conversion, Section six of the Ordinance, which contemplates marriage to be declared as void by the courts, is not applicable.

The meaning of conversion by marriage is also not explained in the Ordinance and it contemplates conversion by marriage per-se unlawful. Generally two persons belonging to different faiths can get married under the provisions of Special Marriage Act. However, in some cases unless there is a conversion and both, the bride and the bridegroom belong to the same faith, the marriage would not be performed. Conversion would be a prerequi-

site in such cases. It cannot be said that it is a conversion by marriage. The Ordinance also contemplates that once the person who intends to change his/her religion has made the declaration before the District Magistrate, an inquiry would be conducted by the police with regard to "such an intention of a person to convert." The report of the police would be a major factor in deciding whether a person can change their religion or not. It would also be instrumental in concluding whether the conversion is illegal and thus, void.

The Ordinance also contemplates a post-conversion procedure. It states that a converted individual shall send a declaration to the District Magistrate and appear for 21 days thereafter before him/her till the objections, if any, received are decided by the District Magistrate. It also contemplates that if the procedure is not followed the conversion becomes illegal and void.

Though the Ordinance protects people from getting converted due to allurement, coercion and so on, there is a scope for abusing the provisions by relying upon the police enquiry report. The Ordinance is silent with regard to the action of the District Magistrate vis-a-vis the police enquiry report. There is a requirement to have a re-look into the provisions of the Ordinance for the purpose of incorporating necessary checks and balances instead of placing more reliance upon a police enquiry report.

However, the UP Government's anti-conversion move is not unique. In the past too, several States in the country have passed what are referred to as Freedom of Religion Acts or "anti-conversion laws". These are mostly State-level laws that are aimed to regulate involuntary religious conversions. Odisha was the first State to pass such a law in 1967

and the most recent legislation was passed in Jharkhand and Uttarakhand in 2017. Chhattisgarh, Gujarat and Himachal Pradesh passed their "Freedom of Religion Act" in 2000, 2003 and 2006 respectively. Taking a cue from the others, Rajasthan too passed a similar Bill in 2006. Arunachal Pradesh had already enacted one in 1979 and in 2002 Tamil Nadu passed the Tamil Nadu Prohibition of Forceful Conversion Act. The Supreme Court in the Reverend. Stainislaus Vs. State of Madhya Pradesh case upheld the provisions of the Madhya Pradesh and Orissa Act. Significantly, Madhya Pradesh enacted the Madhya Pradesh Dharma Swatantraya Adhinayam Act way back in 1968 and Odisha enacted the Orissa Freedom of Religion Act in 1967.

The provisions of both the Acts relating to prohibition of forcible conversion and punishment were challenged before the respective High Courts and were carried to the Apex Court. The Supreme Court had held that the freedom of religion enshrined in Article 25 of the Constitution is not guaranteed in respect of one religion only but covers all religions alike and it can be properly enjoyed by a person if s/he exercises her/his right in a manner commensurate with freedom of persons following other religions. It was further held that freedom for one is freedom for the other, in equal measure, and there can therefore be no such thing as a fundamental right to convert any person to one's own religion. The Apex Court upheld the provisions which prohibit forcible conversion in the background of maintenance of "public order." The Supreme Court also held that if an attempt is made to raise communal passions, e.g. on the ground that someone has been "forcibly" converted to another religion, it would

in all probability, give rise to apprehension of breach of public order, affecting the community at large. However, the present Ordinance incorporates a new concept of conversion by marriage. It presumes that every religious conversion is illegal unless the procedure that has been laid down is followed. The term "love jihad" has not been referred to in the Ordinance and its perusal shows that the same is applicable to all religions. The word "allurement" has been defined widely, which may ultimately be a playing field for the police during its enquiry.

Article 25 of the Constitution of India contemplates that all people are equally entitled to freedom of conscience, the right freely to profess, practice and propagate religion. It means that the Constitution guarantees the right to practice, propagate a religion and in the process a person may impress upon the other to get converted or herself/himself change their religion.

The Ordinance comes into play when such a conversion occurs due to the factors like allurement, coercion and so on. It is inoperative while exercising freedom of conscience. The question is whether the police are equipped sufficiently to conduct an enquiry into these aspects or not, so as to come to a conclusion that the choice of conversion has been made freely without any other factors. There would be a possibility of abuse of processes and filing of criminal cases against those persons who propagate their faith, on the ground that they have instigated the thought of conversion in a person. However, a mere thought of conversion to another religion cannot be made an offence unless it manifests into action.

The return of strongmen in politics

Like the authoritarians of the Cold War, the current leaders are thought to provide assertive leadership that is protecting their nations from malevolent forces

man, which they never had," he chuckled. "But why would they want one when democratically-elected men and women in your country have done rather well compared to all the strongmen that have ruled Pakistan?" I asked.

He replied by saying that India's new middle-classes feel that their country's political system is corrupt and weak and unable to defend its Hindu majority from brazen attacks from Pakistan. This left me scratching my head: "But India's economy has been outperforming that of Pakistan's for years now, and India has a much better image abroad," I smiled. "No, boss," he replied, "what is the use of a good economy or image if they can't stop attacks on our pride and people." He almost sounded melancholic.

Three years later, India elected the unabashed nationalist, Narendra Modi as its Prime Minister. India's own "strongman." The term "strongmen" (in politics) is rooted in the largely mythical exploits of ancient monarchs who "ruled like benevolent kings but with an iron fist." It's

an expression of a political masculinity driven by fearlessness, fairness, ambition and mental and physical strength. However, the more immediate roots of the term lie in the ways certain authoritarian rulers and dictators came to power and conducted matters of the State and Government during the Cold War (1945-1990).

In a March 11, 2019 essay in *Foreign Policy*, the American political scientist Erica Frantz writes that the size of autocratic regimes peaked in the 1970s, when 75 per cent of the governments in the world were authoritarian. They were said to be ruled by "strongmen." The term had a negative connotation when used by political scientists, but it was actually celebrated by those for whom it was being used. Some of these "strongmen" were romanticised through State propaganda as men who were boldly protecting their societies from malevolent forces that were out to usurp a country's resources, progress, pride and existence.

After the collapse of the Cold War in 1990, it was widely believed

that in the defeat and absence of the Soviet Union and because of the triumph of capitalism, a liberal democracy would rapidly proliferate in former dictatorships. The era of "strongmen" was understood to be over. Nevertheless, after 1990, the term "strongmen" did recede, and many countries adopted democracy, in one form or the other. But the term returned with a bang after 2010, mainly on the wings of two democracies gradually sliding into autocracies.

Russia was a "hybrid democracy" and like most post-Cold War hybrid regimes, never fully developed into the kind of liberal democracy that most analysts believed it would eventually evolve into. More striking was the case of Turkey which, after decades of military interventions, did manage to make a successful transition with the 2003 election of Recep Erdogan as the Prime Minister and the rapid erosion of the political influence of Turkey's military. However, Russia's Vladimir Putin and Turkey's Erdogan soon discovered that an authoritarian set-up can last longer

behind a facade of liberal democracy, compared to the bygone nature of dictatorship, which was openly antagonistic towards democracy. Their "success" in this respect did not go unnoticed. After 2014, a wave began to sweep across various regions in which democratically-elected men started to use similar tactics, putting themselves at the centre of an authoritarian set-up but giving it a veneer of democracy. They all became the new "strongmen."

More alarmingly, this not only happened in hybrid set-ups in former dictatorships (such as Pakistan, for example) but also in developed democracies in various European countries and in India and the US.

According to a detailed study on the "new strongmen" published in the journal, *Political Research Exchange*, the current breed of "strongmen" share similar characteristics with the authoritarians of the Cold War. The only difference is, unlike their Cold War contemporaries, the new ones come to power through a democratic process. But they mould, turn and twist demo-

cratic institutions and tools to formulate an autocratic set-up.

The study defines the personalities of authoritarians as dark traits which include, "narcissism (grandiosity, ego-reinforcement behaviour, tendency to seek attention and admiration), subclinical psychopathy (lack of remorse, insensitivity, impulsivity) and Machiavellianism (tendency to use manipulation and strategic behaviours)." They embody a push for a centralisation of executive power, hierarchical governance, muscular treatment of opponents and the media, and the promotion of nationalism. The study further states that the electoral attraction for the new authoritarians is because of disillusionment with established democratic models. However, a May 10, 2018 report by the *International Association for Political Science Studies* (IAPSS) posits that "a combination of uncertainty with the false perception of an escalating threat has led to an increase in calls for strong leaders." It adds that societies are now more vulnerable and under the influence of authoritarians that

provide simple answers — often fallacies — to the complex issues of today's world. The report argues that, psychologically, new autocratic regimes use old authoritarian tactics of inducing anxiety in the polity about fears that may be exaggerated, or non-existent. For example, returning to my conversation with the Indian journalist in London, the Modi regime's "manly" anti-Pakistan bent and actions against ideas such as "love jihad" may be a carry-over from a decades-old Hindu middle-class anxiety. According to the German historian Markus Daechsel, in the early 20th century, there was a feeling among Hindu nationalists that the Hindus lacked militant virtues. Daechsel writes that it was widely believed by the Hindu middle-classes that "Muslims had a higher birth rate than Hindus because of their unrestrained sexuality."

Is it possible then that those middle-class Indians who were looking for a "strongman" had also this embedded in their psyches? Perhaps.

Hundreds of GOP members sign onto Texas-led election lawsuit

Houston: The Texas lawsuit asking the US Supreme Court to invalidate President-elect Joe Biden's victory has quickly become a conservative litmus test, as 106 members of Congress and multiple state attorneys general signed onto the case even as some have predicted it will fail.



The last-gasp bid to subvert the results of the Nov 3 election is demonstrating President Donald Trump's enduring political power even as his term is set to end. And even though most of the signatories are far-right conservatives who come from deep red districts, the filing meant that roughly one-quarter of the US House believes the Supreme Court should set aside election results.

Seventeen Republican attorneys general are backing the unprecedented case that Trump is calling "the big one" despite the fact that the president and his allies have lost dozens of times in courts across

the country and have no evidence of widespread fraud. And in a filing Thursday, the Congressional Republicans claimed "unconstitutional irregularities" have "cast doubt" on the 2020 outcome and "the integrity of the American system of elections."

To be clear, there has been no evidence of widespread fraud and Trump has been seeking to subvert the will of the voters. Election law experts

Michigan, Georgia, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin repeats false, disproven, and unsubstantiated accusations about the voting in four states that went for Trump's Democratic challenger.

The case demands that the high court invalidate the states' 62 total Electoral College votes. That's an unprecedented remedy in American history: setting aside the votes of tens of millions of people, under the baseless claim the Republican incumbent lost a chance at a second term due to widespread fraud.

Two days after Paxton sued, 17 states filed a motion supporting the lawsuit, and on Thursday six of those states asked to join the case themselves. Trump has acted to join the case, tweeting Thursday that "the Supreme Court has a chance to save our Country from the greatest Election abuse in the history of the United States."

Hours later, Trump held a meeting at the White House, scheduled before the suit was filed, with a dozen Republican attorneys general, including Paxton and several others who are backing the effort.

Still, some of the top state Republican prosecutors urging the Supreme Court to hear the case have acknowledged that the effort is a long shot and are seeking to distance themselves from Trump's baseless allegations of fraud.

North Dakota's Wayne Stenehjem, among the 17 attorneys general supporting the case, said North Dakota is not alleging voter fraud in the four states at issue.

"We're careful on that," said Stenehjem, who noted that his office has received thousands of calls and emails from constituents asking the state to support the suit. "But it's worth it for the Supreme Court to weigh in and settle it once and for all," he said. AP

Obama reunion? Biden fills Cabinet with former White House leaders

Washington: President-elect Joe Biden is getting the old gang back together.

Increasingly deep into the process of selecting Cabinet members and other senior staff, the incoming Biden administration has a distinctly Obama feel.

There's Denis McDonough, former President Barack Obama's chief of staff who Biden announced on Thursday would be nominated as the secretary of veterans affairs.

Susan Rice, Obama's former national security adviser, was named the director of Biden's White House Domestic Policy Council.

That's on top of Biden already tapping Obama's agriculture secretary, Tom Vilsack, to head the department once

again, former Secretary of State John Kerry to serve as special envoy on climate and Kerry's Obama-era deputy Antony Blinken to lead the State Department.

Jeff Zients, who did stints as acting Office of Management and Budget director and a top economic adviser in the Obama White House, will return as Biden's coronavirus response coordinator.

With the exception of President Donald Trump, a political outsider when he was elected in 2016, recent new presidents have relied heavily on pools of talent that had cut their teeth in their parties' previous administrations to fill out their own government.

But Biden, who is assuming the presidency in the midst of

the worst public health crisis in a century and a flagging economy, is putting a greater premium on past experience and, as a result, has gone frequently back to the Obama well as he fills out his government.

"Many of the folks who are returning are returning because they believe in public service and know that after four turbulent and destructive years and a brutal pandemic, this is a particularly important time to serve," said David Axelrod, who served as a senior adviser to Obama.

"Their experience is valuable. Their values and outlooks are consonant with (Biden's). The challenge is to look forward and not back and innovate beyond what's simply been broken." AP

US carries out rare execution during presidential transition

Terre Haute (US): The Trump administration Thursday carried out its ninth federal execution of the year in what has been a first series of executions during a presidential lame-duck period in 130 years, putting to death a Texas street-gang member in the slayings of a religious couple from Iowa more than two decades ago.



Four more federal executions, including one Friday, are planned in the weeks before President-elect Joe Biden's inauguration.

One was carried out in late November.

The case of Brandon Bernard, who received a lethal injection of phenobarbital at a US prison in Terre Haute, Indiana, was a rare execution of a person who was in his teens when his crime was committed.

Several high-profile figures, including reality TV star Kim Kardashian West, had appealed to President Donald Trump to commute Bernard's sentence to life in prison.

With witnesses looking on from behind a glass barrier separating them from a pale-green death chamber, the 40-year-old

Hong Kong media tycoon Jimmy Lai charged under national security law

Hong Kong: Hong Kong pro-democracy activist and media tycoon Jimmy Lai has been charged under the city's national security law, amid a widening crackdown on dissent, according to local media reports.

Lai, who founded the Apple Daily tabloid, was charged on suspicion of colluding with foreign forces and endangering national security, local broadcaster TVB reported Friday.

He is the most high-profile person to be charged under the law since it was implemented in June.

Police said in a statement that they arrested a 73-year-old



man under the national security law, but did not name him.

Lai was arrested under the national security law in August.

He and two executives of Next Digital, the company that operates the Apple Daily newspaper, were later charged for fraud over accusations that they violated lease terms on office space the company. He was denied bail earlier this month. AP

UN backs Afghan peace talks in resolution, Russia votes no

United Nations: The UN General Assembly approved a resolution over Russian objections Thursday commending progress in peace talks between the Afghan government and the Taliban while urging stepped-up efforts to tackle terrorist attacks by the Taliban, al-Qaida, the Islamic State extremist group and their affiliates.

The vote in the 193-member world body was 130 in favour, Russia against, and China, Pakistan and Belarus abstaining.

Fifty-nine countries did not vote.

The 15-page resolution titled "The Situation in Afghanistan" covers a wide range of issues including peace

and reconciliation, democracy, the rule of law, good governance, human rights, counter-narcotics, social and economic development and regional cooperation.

While welcoming progress in the intra-Afghan talks, including the December 2 agreement on rules of procedure for negotiations, the resolution "condemns the high rate of continued violence."

It says this "is contributing to an unacceptable number of casualties" and calls for an immediate cessation of violence and strongly encourages the Afghan government and the Taliban "to pursue confidence-building measures and to reduce violence."

The resolution reiterates the General Assembly's "serious concern" about the security situation in Afghanistan and stresses the need to continue to address the threat to the country's stability from violence committed by the Taliban, including the Haqqani Network, as well as al-Qaida, Islamic State, their affiliates "and other terrorist and criminal groups."

Afghanistan's UN ambassador, Adela Raz, expressed regret that despite her government's strong support for the resolution it wasn't adopted by consensus, saying the measure reflects "developments that are taking place on the ground and particularly the progress in the peace process." AP

Around the Globe

Juba (South Sudan): One county in South Sudan is likely in famine and tens of thousands of people in five other counties are on the brink of starvation, according to a new report by international food security experts. Nowhere in the world has been in famine since one was declared nearly four years ago in South Sudan's Unity state as civil war raged. Now western Pibor county is feared to have reached that crisis level, the result of massive flooding and deadly violence that has prevented access to aid.

Kabul: Optimism among Afghans regarding the country's peace process has decreased significantly in the past few months amid a spike in violence, according to a survey released Friday. The Institute of War and Peace Studies found optimism had dropped to 57 per cent when the survey was conducted from September 29 to October 18. That's down from 86 per cent of those surveyed according to the previous assessment conducted over the summer and released in August.

Buffalo: Convicted former movie producer Harvey Weinstein is expected to appear briefly via video from a New York prison Friday as part of legal efforts to send him to California to face sexual assault charges. Authorities say the extradition proceeding, originally scheduled for August, likely will be postponed again, this time until April 9.

Leidschendam (Netherlands): A UN-backed tribunal sentenced a member of the Hezbollah militant group to life imprisonment Friday for his involvement in the 2005 assassination of former Lebanese Prime Minister Rafik Hariri. The defendant, Salim Ayyash, has never been arrested and was not in court at the Special Tribunal for Lebanon for Friday's sentencing hearing.

Taipei: A leading pro-China cable news channel prepared to halt its broadcast operations at midnight Friday after Taiwan's government refused to renew its license, citing accuracy issues. The National Communications Commission cited repeated violations of rules on accurate reporting in rejecting CTTV's license renewal.

World: An iceberg larger than Rhode Island that broke off an Antarctic ice shelf in 2017 is closing in on South Georgia Island, a British territory in the South Atlantic Ocean. The iceberg, designated A68a by the National Ice Center, is being steered by ocean currents to a position closer to the island, which is home to large colonies of penguins, seals and other unique wildlife. PTI

Turkey rejects EU decision to widen sanctions

Ankara: Turkey on Friday called on the European Union to act as an "honest mediator" in its dispute with EU members Greece and Cyprus over the exploration of gas reserves in the Mediterranean, after European leaders approved expanding sanctions against Ankara.

The leaders said early Friday that Turkey — which is a candidate to join although its membership talks are blocked — has "engaged in unilateral actions and provocations and escalated its rhetoric against the EU." This was despite the fact that they had offered trade and other incentives to Turkey to

halt its activities during their last summit in October, they said.

The leaders tasked EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell with drawing up a report on the state of EU-Turkey political, economic and trade relations and to suggest how to proceed, including on widening sanctions. Borrell was asked to submit the report to the leaders by the time they hold a summit in March.

Turkey's Foreign Ministry slammed the EU decision, saying Ankara rejects the 27-member group's "biased and unlawful attitude." A ministry statement said the decision to

expand sanctions against Turkey was approved out of solidarity with Greece and Cyprus. The two countries' alleged misuse of the solidarity and veto rights had thrust EU-Turkey ties into a "vicious circle," it said.

"The situation is harming the joint interests of Turkey and the EU as well as our region's peace, security and stability," the ministry said. "The EU should take up the role of an honest mediator, it must act in a principled, strategic and sensible manner." Tensions between NATO allies Turkey and Greece escalated over the summer with a military build-up after Turkey sent its seismic survey vessel Oruc Reis, escorted by navy frigates, into disputed waters. AP

US panel recommend Pfizer vaccine's emergency use

Washington: A special US government advisory panel has recommended emergency use authorisation for Pfizer's coronavirus vaccine, in a major step towards its widespread use in the country, worst-hit by the pandemic.

After an eight-hour public hearing on Thursday, the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee (VRBPAC) voted 17 to 4 with 1 abstention to recommend the vaccine developed by American pharmaceutical giant Pfizer and its German partner BioNTech to combat the disease that has killed over 292,000 people in the US.

An emergency use authorisation (EUA) is short of a full

approval. Pfizer would have to file a separate application for full FDA approval for its vaccine. Thursday's vote does not mean the vaccine will be authorised immediately, US media reported.

"There is a clear benefit, and all we have on the other side is theoretical risks," said committee member Paul Offit, a vaccine expert with the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. The vaccine's potential benefits outweigh its risks, he said. PTI

Aus ends Covid vaccine trials due to HIV antibody +ves

Melbourne: Australia on Friday stopped the further development of a Covid-19 vaccine candidate as several participants in the early-stage trials generated antibodies for HIV after receiving the potential therapeutic.

There were no serious adverse events or safety concerns reported in the 216 participants of the phase 1 trial of the v451 COVID-19 vaccine candidate being developed by the University of Queensland (UQ) in collaboration with biotech company CSL, according to a statement.

However, data showed that some patients developed antibodies towards fragments of a HIV protein (gp41), which was used to stabilise the vaccine, it said. PTI

India's Oct industrial production grows by 3.5%

India's industrial activity accelerated in October with a rise of over 3.5 per cent in factory output on a year-on-year basis, official data showed on Thursday.

As per the Quick Estimates of Index of Industrial Production (IIP), the factory output grew by 3.6 per cent in October 2020 from 0.49 per cent in September and (-) 6.6 per cent during the corresponding month of the previous year.

"For the month of October 2020, the Quick Estimates of Index of Industrial Production (IIP) with base 2011-12 stands at 128.5," the Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation said.

"The Indices of Industrial Production for the Mining, Manufacturing and Electricity sectors for the month of October 2020 stand at 98, 130.7 and 162.2 respectively."

The IIP had been in the negative territory from April to August FY21 due to the Covid-19 pandemic and the subsequent lockdown to curb its spread. Among major segments, manufacturing production grew by 3.5 per cent from (-) 5.7 per cent reported for the corresponding month of

Govt cautiously optimistic on economy; will continue to take steps to push growth: DEA Secy

The Government is cautiously optimistic on the economic front and will continue to take measures to push growth, Economic Affairs Secretary Tarun Bajaj said on Friday.

Addressing Ficci's Annual Convention, he said the second quarter GDP number was much better than market expectations and it will further improve in the second half of the current fiscal.

The economy contracted by 7.5 per cent in the second quarter, as against 23.9 per cent degrowth in the first quarter of this fiscal on account of the COVID-19 pandemic. "So we are positive. We are cautiously optimistic on the economic front. And we are hoping that our third and fourth quarter will be far better than the second quarter."

Furthermore, the data on a YoY basis showed that manufacturing of primary goods de-grew by (-) 3.3 per cent, whereas capital goods production rose by 3.3 per cent, and intermediate goods inched higher by 0.8 per cent.

On the other hand, the production of infrastructure or construction goods grew by 7.8 per cent and consumer durables by 17.6 per cent.

The sub-segment of consumer non-durables showed a growth of 7.5 per cent.

Markets perch near all-time highs; bank, FMCG stocks shine

Equity indices resumed their climb on Friday after a day's pause as bank, energy and FMCG stocks saw robust buying amid persistent foreign fund inflows. Subdued global markets and a flat rupee capped the gains, analysts said.

After touching its all-time intra-day high of 46,309.63, the 30-share BSE Sensex dipped into the negative zone in late-afternoon trade. However, it staged a comeback to end 139.13 points or 0.30% higher at 46,099.01, just shy of its closing record. On similar lines, the broader NSE Nifty rose 35.55 points or 0.26% to 13,513.85. It hit a lifetime high of 13,579.35

during the session. ONGC topped the Sensex gainers' chart, rallying 5.68%, followed by NTPC, Tata Steel, ITC, ICICI Bank, Titan, Bajaj Auto and SBI. On the other hand, Axis Bank, M&M, Tech Mahindra, HCL Tech, Bajaj Finserv and Infosys were among the laggards, skidding up to 2.19%. During the week, the Sensex vaulted 1,019.46 points or 2.26%, while the Nifty surged 255.30 points or 1.92%. World stocks wobbled as prospects of a no-deal Brexit and uncertainty over US stimulus talks sapped risk appetite. "Market opened well, but in

between it lost all the gains and turned negative, fortunately in the last trading minutes, it made a good attempt to bounce back and closed marginally above. Gains made in sectors like energy, FMCG and metals were countered by selling in Pharma and IT stocks. "This muted momentum was due to a weak global trend. Despite European Central Bank announcing an increase in the stimulus package, European markets fell as it was weighed by increasing chance of a no-deal Brexit, rising virus cases and moderate usages of the announced stimulus plan."

Forex reserves surge by USD 4.525 bn to record USD 579.346 bn

The country's foreign exchange reserves surged by USD 4.525 billion to touch a record high of USD 579.346 billion in the week ended December 4, the RBI data showed.

In the previous week ended November 27, the reserves had declined by USD 469 million to USD 574.821 billion.

In the reporting week, the increase in reserves was on account of a rise in foreign currency assets (FCA), a major component of the overall reserves.

FCA rose by USD 3.932 billion to USD 537.386 billion, the Reserve Bank of India's

(RBI) weekly data showed. Expressed in dollar terms, the foreign currency assets include the effect of appreciation or depreciation of non-US units like the euro, pound and yen held in the foreign exchange reserves.

The gold reserves increased by USD 535 million in the reporting week to USD 35.728 billion in the week ended December 4, the data showed.

The special drawing rights (SDRs) with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) rose by USD 12 million to USD 1.506 billion. The country's reserve position with the IMF increased by USD 46 million to USD 4.725 billion.

Amazon now biggest corporate buyer of renewable energy: Bezos

Amazon founder and CEO Jeff Bezos has said that his company has become the largest-ever corporate purchaser of renewable energy after it added 26 new wind and solar energy projects totaling 3.4 gigawatts (GW) of electricity production capacity.

The addition of 26 new wind and solar projects in Australia, France, Germany, Italy, South Africa, Sweden, the UK, and the US brings Amazon's total number of renewable energy projects to 127, the company said on Thursday.

The company's total renewable energy investments to date will supply 6.5 GW of electricity production capacity



-- enough to power 1.7 million US homes for one year.

That surpasses 5.5 GW of renewable energy projects under contract that Google claimed to have till last year.

"With a total of 127 solar and wind projects, Amazon is now the biggest corporate buyer of renewable energy ever," Bezos said in a statement.

₹ ends nearly flat at 73.64 against \$

The Indian rupee ended almost flat at 73.64, up 2 paise, against the American currency on Friday as dollar buying by banks weighed on the domestic currency.

At the interbank forex market, the domestic unit opened at 73.65 against the US dollar and witnessed an intraday high of 73.56 and a low of 73.71.

The local unit finally closed at 73.64 against the American currency, registering a rise of 2 paise over its previous close. On a weekly basis, the rupee has gained 16 paise.

"The Indian rupee ended flat this Friday as persistent dollar purchases from RBI offset gains from foreign equity inflows into the domestic markets," said Sriram Iyer, Senior Research Analyst at Reliance Securities.

Gold declines ₹102; silver marginally lower

Gold prices declined ₹102 to ₹48,594 per 10 grams in the national capital on Friday, according to HDFC Securities.

The precious metal had closed at ₹48,696 per 10 grams in the previous trade.

Silver dipped marginally by ₹16 to ₹62,734 per kg, from ₹62,750 per kg in the previous trade. In the international market, both gold and silver were trading flat at USD 1,836 per ounce and USD 23.92 per ounce.

"Gold prices witnessed range-bound trading on mixed global cues as investors are awaiting the US stimulus," HDFC Securities Senior Analyst (Commodities) Tapan Patel said.

Paddy procurement in the ongoing kharif marketing season at MSP has so far increased by 22.5 per cent to 368.7 lakh tonnes, valued at Rs 69,612 crore.

In the ongoing kharif marketing season (KMS) 2020-21, the government continues to procure kharif 2020-21 crops at its MSP (minimum support price) from farmers, an official statement said on Friday. The marketing season starts from October.

Paddy procurement for kharif 2020-21 is continuing smoothly in Punjab, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Telangana, Uttarakhand, Tamil Nadu, Chandigarh, Jammu & Kashmir, Kerala, Gujarat,

Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra and Bihar.

The Food Corporation of India and state agencies have purchased 368.7 lakh tonnes of paddy up to December 10 as against purchase of 300.97 lakh tonnes in the corresponding period last year. "About 39.92 lakh farmers have already been benefited from the ongoing KMS procurement operations with MSP value of Rs 69,611.81 crore," the statement said.

Out of the total purchase of 368.70 lakh tonnes, Punjab alone has contributed 202.77 lakh tonnes, which is 54.99 per cent of total procurement.

Procurement operations of seed cotton (Kapas) under MSP is going on smoothly across various states.

Working with Pixar is a dream come true. I've been a massive fan of their films since the very beginning. My team could barely contain their excitement when they told me that Pixar had a pitch for me.

ENCOUNTER 45 MINUTES

Narrator **CHRIS PACKMAN** says that the series, *Primates*, revolving around the species, captures the intimate moments of animal life, which are otherwise inaccessible to common people.

By **TEAM VIVA**

Primates are social animals. They can be fearsome but they can be equally emotional, thoughtful and caring. Focussing on this group of animals, which fascinates and captivates us more than any other — Gavin Boyland's *Primates* is his next step in natural history storytelling. Narrator Chris Packman shares his anecdotes and tales between the species. Excerpts:

What made you say yes to the series?

I've known Gavin Boyland, the series producer, for some time. He has made some really intelligent, imaginative series and pushing the boat out to make them as creative as possible. He made a previous series about big cats and I stayed in touch with him whilst he was doing that. I loved the series so when he told me he was doing *Primates*, I was interested.

Primates, I feel, is beautifully shot. Often, when we're watching blue-chip TV, we use our technology to follow those intimate moments of animal life, which otherwise would be inaccessible but we're driven principally by our interest in the behaviour, the ecology, the physiology. But here, they've found a collection of camera people who have shot it so that we can immerse ourselves in the animals' environment with beautiful photography as well as learning all those new and exciting aspects of their ecology and so forth.

The second reason was that I like to learn new things. If I'm watching a TV pro-



gramme and I find myself already knowing 50-60 per cent of it, it's boring. I don't want to just see new things, I want to learn new things, and I've learned a lot watching this programme because the science is up-to-date, and that's hard work getting up-to-date science.

Lastly, if you ask people about primates, they'll talk about apes and monkeys. They'll talk particularly about gorillas, chimpanzees, orangutans and so on — the big flashy 't-shirt' animals as I call them — are things that people easily engage with. I like the way the series covers the whole breadth of the primate family. They've got everything including the lemurs, the slow loris, the bush babies, spider monkeys and the gibbons to mention a few. There's a great breadth there that I think will open people's eyes to this real-

ly important group of animals which are, as programme three tells us, critically endangered in many cases.

What are the most surprising stories in the series?

There are a number of surprising stories and the first one pops up in our first programme. I think we've all grown up with the idea that male silverback gorillas are all about being big and immensely strong and it's that that would give them their fitness in their social groups. But what we've learnt through new observations and science is that male gorillas' fitness, in terms of how often they can reproduce successfully, has nothing to do directly with their size but with how they respond to the need of their youth, effectively how cuddly they are. It's fantastic!



I love it when we turn stories on their head and we completely transpose what we think about something into something new. And we can do it with authority because the science says it's true and is therefore trustworthy.

The other things I've enjoyed are the intimacies and the subtle bits of animal behaviour. The tool use is always interesting. I suppose we empathise with the cognitive abilities of these animals. A lot of the time when we're watching them, we realise through their actions that they are really really smart.

The last story that I really liked was the one of the orangutans up the trees where they were learning to climb, and the cars were learning to climb because here you have got two species learning at the same time. The humans have learned that their

previous practices weren't massively efficient and now the primates are learning through their changes. This sort of cooperation is fantastic.

Why do you think a series like *Primates* is important?

I think that we can use animals we engage with instantaneously and easily as a medium to getting people to engage with things which they don't perhaps necessarily have the ability for.

Gorillas, chimps and orangutans are easy-ins. Everyone loves them and knows that they are endangered and threatened. We all know that they are intelligent and humans share a lot of genes with them and a lot of similarities in terms of our species. Once you get people watching them, we can take them somewhere new and that's what we do with the series. It's not just about those big 't-shirt' animals but it's about the entire breadth of the primate group, including some small species, that people may not have even heard of. And yet we can show people how important, smart and fascinating they are.

What do you think will be viewers' takeaways from the series?

A deepened affection for this group of animals, which is easy to love. I think people need to see that they are valuable not just because they are interesting but also because they play important roles in the ecosystem that we're highly dependent upon. It is a pretty forthright plea for people to assist the conservation of these animals. Without that, we'll lose a lot of them very quickly. And when we start losing species in masses, we're making ourselves vulnerable.

We are still part of the ecosystem on planet Earth and if it collapses due to inappropriate human actions, unfortunately, we will collapse too. It is in our best interest to do that. I'm really hoping that people will love primates even more and contribute in some way to wildlife conservation.

A last thought on primates in the wild and their future...

I'd say they are a remarkable group of animals. I'm still learning more things each day. They are a very beautiful species, which is so similar to us and hence, makes it easier to engage with them.

But the big trouble from their point of view is down to us. I think this is a series which has to leave us with one or two questions about ourselves. We are a primate and a part of this group of species. The way we behave at this point in time will determine all of our collective future.

A timeless rhythm

On the 12th anniversary of *Rab Ne Bana Di Jodi*, music composers **SALIM-SULAIMAN** recall what went into the making of its album



Actors Shah Rukh Khan and Anushka Sharma starrer *Rab Ne Bana Di Jodi*, directed by Aditya Chopra, was a blockbuster. The film celebrated the individuality of a man and a woman, hailing from different circumstances, who end up falling in love with each other after their sudden arranged marriage.

It had a music album, composed by composers Salim and Sulaiman Merchant. On the 12th anniversary of the film, the duo

reveals how SRK made the songs timeless and how the *mukhda* of a song was actually an Aditya's tune.

On the creative vision for the song, Sulaiman says, "The film was well written, conceived with exact places and spots for songs and the brief was very simple. Raj and Suri (both played by SRK) were to have their own distinct identities through music. Suri being the traditional husband and Raj, the urban hero. The music had to be simple

melodies that even the most basic person would be able to sing and get the feeling of comfort and love when you hear them."

Salim adds, "Composing music for the film was a huge opportunity. We had worked with Adi as a producer on *Chak De India* and *Aaja Nachley* but working with him as a director was special. We wanted this album to be most memorable for us and the audience but more importantly, I wanted the music to work for the film."

Speaking about the USP of the music album, Salim says, "Even though the songs were made for different situations in the story, they had a common thread. They belonged to the same world and were very reflective of the characters. The importance of the Golden Temple in the story and the song added quality."

Sulaiman adds, "I think the simplicity of the songs with traditional melodies and production of music to have cutting edge, yet familiar sound, was the USP."

A lesser known fact is that the *mukhda* of the song *Haule Haule Ho Jayega Pyaar* was apparently Aditya's tune. Sulaiman reveals, "The song's lyrics actually came from the scene that Adi had written and it ended with the dialogue *Taani partner, haule haule ho jayega pyaar*. Adi kept humming a kind of rough tune to these lyrics and it sounded good, even in its rough basic form. So we decided to develop it further with Jaideep (Sahni). We decided to keep the melody as simple as possible."

Shah Rukh is considered the king of romance and Salim says the superstar's lip-synching to the songs made them even more special. "SRK brings joy to every song. *RNB* was special because all the songs are chartbusters and SRK is a big reason for that. He truly celebrates every song on screen and makes them timeless," he adds.

PAGES OF RESONANCE

The English translation of *Akkitham: A Pictorial Autobiography*, based on Jnanpith award-winning poet and philosopher ACHUTHAN NAMBOOTHIRI, by BHASKARAMENON KRISHNAKUMAR, retells his poems and sheds light on his life with a remarkable sensitivity, says UMA NAIR

Mahakavi Akkitham Achuthan Namboothiri, Jnanpith Award-winning poet and philosopher from Kerala is the subject of the hard cover book — *Akkitham: A Pictorial Autobiography* by Akkitham. The book has been culled and created entirely from the author's writings, interviews and private conversations and is a wellspring of wit, words and worth. The text has been constructed and translated into English by Bhaskaramenon Krishnakumar, alias Atmaraman, who has been associated with poet Akkitham Namboothiri for over four decades.

Well, to sit and savour the book's verbal and visual islands of thought, poetry and prose is akin to a few hours of reverie through some rivetting pages of resonance.

From scribbling on temple walls to becoming the Nation's poet

To unravel the power of a passionate poet's palette is no easy task but the translated tomb of poet Namboothiri's life is a journey that threads the tendrils of tide and time. One recalls artist Akkitham Narayanan (Paris dweller), stating that his elder brother Namboothiri started dabbling in poetry very early in life by scribbling on temple walls. He studied Sanskrit, music and astrology in school and never finished college but became the founding father of modernist poetry in Malayalam in Kerala. Namboothiri has nearly four dozen works to his credit. Among them are anthologies of poems, stories, dramas, and essays and this book delves into his life with zest and reverence.

The narrative in this book flows like the river Pamba. It tells the vers-



es and small stories with a remarkable sensitivity. The English translation shows how his poems are a spatial, immersive experience, in which we glimpse waves of permanence and impermanence. His awards — the Jnanpith (2019), Kendra Sahitya Akademi (1973), Vayalar (1972), Ezhuthachan (2016) and Kerala Sahitya Akademi (1972) — are a legion of the power and strength of the vernacular. They touch the tip of the iceberg of his intellectual integrity. In the many stories, we sense the examples of subjugation and release, of celebration and solitude, the fabric of fear and freedom — that can skim the depths of a visual narrative, at once stretching it sideways and pulling it together into a vortex of coherent emotions distilled in the essence of minimalist moods. His number of awards tell us about his love for literature and the lexicon of language.

Drawings by son Vasudevan
In an entwined history of penmanship of verse and verve, it is

Namboothiri's son and former professor Vasudevan Akkitham who creates the illustrations for the book as pen and ink vignettes. Vasudevan creates idyllic landscapes of the backwaters of Kerala with canoes and coconut palms as well as lush portraits of his father and the feminine pillars in his family. If an old lamp is a whisper of ritual and the relic of the past, it is the stealth of combining lithe strokes of hatching, stippling and languorous lines of depth that make a winsome coupling. He strengthens and corrects some of the finer lines with brusquer penwork so as to recreate the Mallapuram magic while giving hints of a subtle state of being one with nature like his esteemed father. Vasudevan says he kept his reflections simple and realistic, nostalgic in tone as he created compositions and narratives that had lucid expressionistic forms.

Expressive & emotive
Akkitham's life story is also the story of the Namboothiri renaissance, at which he was a major play-

er. Writers, social activists and politicians abound in this book. While Akkitham wanted the feudal social order to go, he was also disenchanted with communism and his youthful dalliance came to an end. The book narrates the deep philosophical objections and the intensely personal reasons of his disenchantment.

One of Akkitham's deeply philosophical poems has been illustrated by Narayanan. Several translations of Akkitham's Malayalam poems have been included—in part or full. One recalls the famed lines of one of his poems — *Ninne Konnavar Konnu Poove! Thannude Thanne Mokshathe* (Those who killed you, flower! Killed their own salvation) — as a shining example.

For Namboothiri, even the most abstract happenings retained expressive, emotive content. For him, nature embodied an active and deeply unfinished expression. And in the paradoxes of life's enigmas, he wove peace and calm and fine-tuned his poetic cadences into the circle of life through the silent slivers of notations that sprang from the penumbra of spiritual and cosmic realms.

"A poet of rare integrity, a creator of many works, all considered as classics, Akkitham's poetry reflects unfathomable compassion, imprints of Indian philosophical and moral values. They are a bridge between traditionality and modernity, delves deep into human emotions in a fast changing social space," read a statement by the Jnanpith jury board last year.

For all those who love poetry and the art of the written word, this book must find a place on your shelf, for art is long and life is short.

Advani, to name a few. Tell us about the uncertain times and how you kept your eyes on the prize.

My period of struggle was not easy at all. There was recession going on at that time, the film business was not very prolific, people were making fewer films. Therefore, opportunities for actors were far less than what it is today. We didn't have these web and OTT platforms. Hence, good opportunities were hard to come by. For three to four years, I was just groping in the dark, attempting various avenues, trying to get a break, trying to get a foot in the door, doing the rounds of various offices with my portfolio looking for work and not knowing whether it will ever happen at all. It was

very farfetched for someone in my position to think that I'd get a premier opportunity as a performer to act as a lead in Hindi films. It was a million to one shot but I took it. With the love, blessings, sacrifices and support of my amazing parents, I mustered up the fortitude to keep going. I was hungry and sometimes foolish but also very persistent. I was 21 when I started trying and at 24 it happened for me in spectacular fashion. Those tales are memoir-worthy for sure. I almost debuted in a side role in *Patiala House*. I did some small budget films that Anurag (Kashyap) was directly/indirectly affiliated with. Anurag Sir and Nikhil Sir are probably as astounded as I am about how things started and how they are going.

Looking back, did you ever think you will achieve this level of success in a decade?

Not at all. Right from the very Friday of my debut, the kind of things that have happened to me, the beats of my career, it is all beyond my wildest imagination. I could not even dream of the things

that have happened to me, with me and around me. I can't claim to have had the vision to dream up something like this. *Maine socha tha ki kuch na kuch ho jayega, lekin aisa hoga, yeh kabhi nahi socha tha.* They say you should dare to dream big but I couldn't have dreamt this big myself. So, if I stop to think and take stock of how things have transpired and where am I today, it feels absolutely unreal to me.

Are you someone who thinks too much about your legacy? If so, what do you want Ranveer's legacy to be in the history of Indian cinema?

Yes, every day I am working towards leaving behind a legacy, a filmography that I can be proud of. I want to make a significant contribution to the arts and inspire other artists, the way my senior artists have inspired me. We all wish to be remembered in history. I want to be remembered as a thorough entertainer, a versatile actor, someone whose body of work constitutes some of the best cinema of our country. These are tall ambitions but I am putting in work every single day to hopefully have a fulfilling run at the films and make my country proud in my field. If I distill my ambitions further, I would say that I just want to entertain people, that's all. I would like to alleviate the agony of existence by offering people some cathartic relief. My calling is to be an entertainer and I believe that god is guiding me as I fulfill my destiny and answer my calling.

Bumrah puts India ahead after batting collapse

Jasprit hits maiden FC fifty as India's bowling was in a fine form on day 1 of D/N warm-up game against Australia A but the same can't be said about their batting

Pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah headlined the opening day's play with a maiden first-class fifty and a couple of wickets in an impressive all-round effort to put India in the driver's seat against Australia A in the pink ball warm-up game on Friday.

With his unbeaten 55 off 57 balls, Bumrah was the top-scorer for the visitors, who folded for a disappointing 194 in 48.3 overs at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

The Indians, however, came back strongly with the ball to bundle out Australia for 108 at stumps as 20 wickets fell on a curtailed day on which almost an hour was lost due to heavy rain.

India's four-pronged pace attack did well to intimidate Australian youngsters with short-pitched stuff as Mohammed Shami and Navdeep Saini got three wickets apiece.

On a day when the recognised batsmen struggled to put runs on the board, Bumrah, who came into the game with a Test batting average of 2.9, produced a stellar performance with the willow, smashing the ball six times to the fence and twice over it.

The 27-year-old, known for his wily bowling, reached his half-century in style, hooking a bouncer by all-rounder Will Sutherland for a huge six over the deep square-leg fence.

Bumrah and fellow pacer Mohammed Siraj stitched a valuable 71-run partnership for the 10th wicket before the Indian innings ended with a semblance of respectability.

Pleasantly surprised with his batting heroics, Bumrah's teammates got up, clapped and gave him a guard of honour when he walked back into the dressing room.

Earlier, after skipper Ajinkya Rahane opted to bat, Prithvi Shaw (40) and Shubman Gill (43) — both 21-year-old batsmen with bright futures — showed enough

Green substituted after nasty blow on head

Australia Test hopeful all-rounder Cameron Green suffered a concussion while bowling after a rasping straight drive from Jasprit Bumrah struck him on the head during the warm-up game against India on Friday.

Bowling his second spell of the day, the 21-year-old was unable to react in time when Bumrah's full blooded drive slipped through his palms and struck on the right side of the head.

The all-rounder immediately went down and non-striker Mohammed Siraj rushed to check on him.

After being examined for a couple of minutes by the medical team, the all-rounder was back on his feet as he walked off the field for further assessment. Batsman Patrick Rowe was named his concussion substitute.

"Cameron sustained a mild concussion while bowling for Australia A. This is Cameron's first

Vihari were also dismissed early. But the most distraught will be the duo of Shaw and Gill, both getting out after promising so much with their dazzling strokes and positive approach.

The Australians bowled out India for a low score but they wouldn't be too happy with the way their batting panned out during the day's play.

Jack Wildermuth went for a cut against Bumrah but ended up getting an outside before Navdeep Saini (3/19) sent back Will Sutherland, Alex Carey and Mitchel Swepson, coming in as second change.

Green is primed for a Test debut after scoring an unbeaten 125 for Australia A in their first practice match, which ended in a draw on Tuesday.

In the second game he returned with figures of 1/20 in the 6.1 overs, taking the crucial wicket of Shubman Gill.

Rohit clears fitness test

NEW DELHI: Senior India batsman Rohit Sharma on Friday cleared an eagerly-watched fitness test at the National Cricket Academy in Bengaluru and will leave for Australia on December 14, three days before the start of the marquee Test series against the world's number one team.

Rohit had sustained a hamstring injury during the IPL, which led to him missing the white-ball leg of the ongoing tour. He is also out of reckoning for the first two Tests but can now be there for the last two games. "Rohit has cleared the fitness Test and will soon be flying out to Australia," a senior BCCI official told PTI.

DE KOCK TO LEAD SA AGAINST SRI LANKA

JOHANNESBURG: Wicketkeeper-batsman Quinton de Kock was named South African Test team captain for the upcoming two-match series against Sri Lanka. The 16-member squad includes rookie opener Sarel Erwee, wicketkeeper Kyle Verreynne and medium-pacer Glenton Stuurman, the trio receiving their maiden call-ups. Eight months after South Africa's director of cricket, Graeme Smith had ruled him out, limited over skipper De Kock was handed the reins of the Test squad for the 2020-21 season on a temporary basis with a permanent captain to be announced in the coming months.

NICHOLLS 117 STEADIES NZ ON DAY 1

WELLINGTON: New Zealand's Henry Nicholls rode his luck to post a crucial century as the hosts, weakened by the loss of Kane Williamson, survived a shaky start to reach 294/6 on day one of the second Test against the West Indies on Friday. 29-year-old Nicholls survived multiple dropped catches at Basin Reserve as he snapped a 21-month string of low scores with his sixth Test century. At stumps, he was 117 not out with Kyle Jamieson on one. From being on the ropes at 78/3, Nicholls said Kiwis now considered 400 would be "a good result".

CLARKE BACKS CUMMINS TO SUCCEED PAINE

SYDNEY: Former Aussie skipper Michael Clarke is hopeful of pace spearhead Pat Cummins succeeding Tim Paine as the country's Test leader when the veteran's reign comes to an end. With the 36-year-old Paine reaching the fag end of his career, a fresh captaincy discussion has started. While there have been calls to reinstate Steve Smith as skipper, Clarke believes Cummins, who was recently appointed the sole vice-captain after previously sharing the role with Travis Head, should be handed the top job when it is time. "Patty's ready for it. I love that they've given him the full-time vice-captaincy," Clarke told AAP. "Hopefully he gets an opportunity along the way to captain in certain games, whether it be Australia A or whether it be a tour game, whatever it is, which I'm sure he will," he added.

SOCIEDAD SQUEEZE THROUGH EUROPA K/O

NAPLES: Real Sociedad snatched qualification for the last 32 of the Europa League in the final seconds on Thursday after William Jose's late leveller in a 1-1 draw at Napoli and AZ Alkmaar's shock 2-1 defeat at Rijeka allowed the Spanish side to progress. Young Boys, Molde, Wolfsberg and Maccabi Tel-Aviv rounded off the group stage by making Monday's draw in Nyon, where they join the 18 already-qualified teams and will be met by eight drop-outs from the Champions League. Napoli finish top of the group on 11 points, two ahead of Sociedad in second who end the group stage a further point ahead of Alkmaar.

BORN TO BE A MUSICIAN

NILADRI CHAKRAVARTY might sing for his supper, but he is pretty good at it



I've been surrounded with music all my life," says Niladri Chakravarty, frontman of the Delhi-based band 'The Limited Experience' and adds that he has actually been listening to music since the time he was in his mother's womb. But even after he came into this world, he credits his family for ensuring that music ran in his blood as he was introduced to a vast array from traditional Rabindra Sangeet to funk.

"My list of musical influences is very large. I've heard music from the 1930s right up to today's music from a multitude of genres all of which have inspired me and developed my ear," Chakravarty says.
