**Catalog Description:** Theoretical study of softball, baseball, football, and basketball fundamentals, positions, styles of offensive and defensive play, rules, signal methods, generalship and team play.

#### **Course Objectives**

Upon completion of this course:

- 1. Students will appreciate the history and develop a personal philosophy of coaching softball, baseball, football, and basketball that identifies goals and objectives to be achieved by both coach and players of football. (SHAPE 1.a, 1.f, CAEP 1.1, CRT 1.1)
- 2. The student will recognize all sports covered as team sports with individuals performing tasks to secure team goals and students. (SHAPE 1.b, CRT 14.0)
- 3. The student will gain an appreciation of the skill and finesse it takes to perform the fundamentals of throwing, catching and hitting, etc. of each sport. (SHAPE 1.b, 1.d, CFPO 3, CRT 8.0)
- 4. Students will implement successful coaching and teaching strategies and techniques of various sports observed. (SHAPE 2.a, 3.a, CFPO 3, INTASC 7)
- 5. Students will understand the importance of athletics as it pertains to their school and community. (SHAPE 1.f, CFPO 12, CRT 7.1, INTASC 10)
- 6. Students will develop, plan, and implement a practice schedule for an assigned sport. (SHAPE 3.b, 4.b, CRT 2.1, CFPO 10, INTASC 7)
- 7. Students will teach the fundamental skills of softball, baseball, football, and basketball. SHAPE 3.b, 4.b, CFPO 10, CRT 2.1, INTASC 7)

8. The student will gain an appreciation that athletics can play a significant role in the life of an individual and that there can be a significant carryover from athletics to life goals. (SHAPE 6. A, CFPO 12, CRT7.1, INTASC 9)

#### **Detailed Course Outline/Topics Covered in the Course**

- 1. Coaching philosophy, goals, team rules, time management techniques for practice and game organization (Time allotted: 15 hours)
- 2. Terminology of each observed sport
  - a. Offensive
  - b. Defensive
- 3. Fundamentals (Time allotted: 15 hours)
  - a. Conditioning drills
  - b. Agility drills
  - c. Receiving and kicking drills
  - d. Batting and hitting drills
  - e. Dribbling drills
- 4. Strategy (Time allotted: 10 hours)
  - a. Expressing yourself in an interview on basic offensive/defensive beliefs
  - b. Learning to control a game from sideline
  - c. Utilization of coaches in press box
- 5. Students will teach the fundamental skills of football. (Time allotted: 5 hours)

## **Text(s)/Course Materials**

Students are responsible for handout materials and articles issued in class and placed on Library reserve. There is no text required for this course.

#### **Description of Instruction**

Lecture. The methods of instructions for the course include class discussion, lecture, demonstrations/drills on the football field, active student participation, and drills/formations on practice field.

The students are not required to complete any tasks outside the classroom.

## **Evaluation of Student Progress**

### **Student Activities/Assessments/Percentage of Grade:**

- 1. Coaching Notebook (30%) Each student will prepare a coaching notebook that contains a personal coaching philosophy, teaching information, conditioning strategies, offensive/defensive team and individual drills, offensive/defensive strategies, team rules, and other information relevant to coaching a specific sport.
- 2. Practice Plan (20%) Each student will prepare a detailed practice plan intended to cover 12 two-hour practice sessions. The practice plan is intended to cover 12 practices preceding a team's first game. Each practice session should be detailed and conform to the format that will be presented in class. In addition, all drills and strategies utilized in the practice plan should be included in the coaching notebook.
- 3. *Drill Evaluations* (20%) Each student will be responsible for leading a portion of the class in drills intended to teach a specific skill/strategy. The student will be responsible for providing handouts to the class which provides information on the drill(s) being used to teach the skill. Each student will be evaluated by the class and instructor on the content/organization of the drill, teaching methodologies used, and feedback provided to drill participants.
- 4. Coaching Philosophy (10%) Each student will develop a written personal coaching philosophy that identifies the role of a coach, how he/she will deal with players, and main goals and objectives to be achieved. The student should view this philosophy as his/her creed of coaching and the document that defines the type of coach he/she wants to be.
- 5. Observations (10%) Each student will observe two practice sessions and provide written summary of what was viewed. The two observations must be of teams at different levels (i.e., high school and college). It is recommended the student obtain permission from the coaching staff prior to attending practice. The written report should detail how the practice was conducted, drills/teaching strategies used, interaction of coaching staff with players, and overall evaluation of the practice session. Each written summary should also contain the time and date of the observation, the name of the head coach and school/team, and where the observation took place.
- 6. Attendance (10%) Critical to the success of a student enrolled in this course is regular class attendance. Students are allowed to miss two class periods without loss of points. Each absence

beyond the allotted two will result in a loss of two percentage points from the student's attendance grade. Communication with the instructor regarding attendance in both appreciated and necessary.

### **Attendance Policy**

In accordance with university policy (AOP 12.09), students are expected to attend all classes. AOP 12.09 also defines what an excused absence is.

- 1. All students will be expected to receive assignments on the day they are administered and turn those assignments in on the scheduled due date.
- 2. Late assignments will not be accepted by an unexcused student. It is the responsibility of the student, not the instructor, to maintain a record of all missed work.
- 3. An athlete participating in a University athletic event must turn in those assignments prior to or on the day of the assignment due dates.
- 4. Students may not make up tests if a University Excuse does not apply to their absence.
- 5. A University-approved excuse includes proof of death/series illness in immediate family, proof of personal medical emergency, and proof of personal illness or to one dependent on you, religious holy day, required military duties, required participation in a university-wide event, and mandatory admission interviews from professional/graduate school that cannot be rescheduled.
