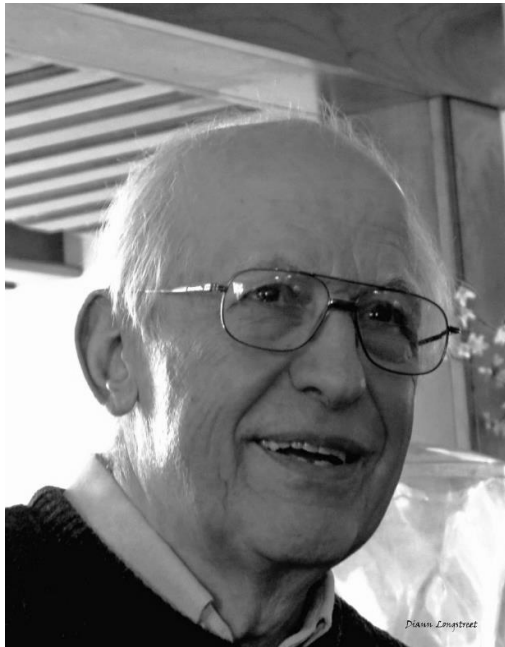

Dear Friends and Neighbors

The Town of Georgetown is celebrating its 300th Birthday this year. A Birthday Party was held at the Historical Society in June with cake and ice cream, speakers, games and exhibits. There is a big bash planned for July at the dock in Five Islands. We thank the Tricentennial Committee that put it all together.

Our committees have been busy this year. The Solid Waste Committee purchased a new container for the compactor and fenced in the bottle collection area. The Conservation Commission working with other communities (Arrowsic, Phippsburg and Westport Island) and with grant funding produced a "Stewardship Guide" for Georgetown, giving information on caring for our land and waters. The Shellfish Conservation Committee voted to extend the Heal Eddy closure and continue gathering scientific data on the seeding project in partnership with Manomet, a non-profit group of scientists focused on environmental impacts. They also purchased clams for seeding at their conservation events in the spring. The Town Owned Property Management board has started a renovation and reconfiguration project on the wharf in Five Islands. The Road Commissioner repaired and paved a portion of West Georgetown Road and has begun pre-paving work on the Jewett and Webber Roads for completion next year.

Our Harbormaster, George Dufour welcomed a new Deputy, Tom Bolster to train and will take over for him next year. The Harbor Committee and Harbor Master (s) worked with Robinhood Marina for a smooth transition when it was sold to Derecktor Maine, LLC.

We continue to review ordinances, as the laws coming down from Augusta continue to evolve.

The Selectmen, in conjunction with the Fire Department made sure their NIMS (National Incident Management System) certification remains up to date.

The Town has a new Animal Control Officer and a new Deputy Town Clerk / Tax Collector. We welcome Sarah Mancini and Amanda Campbell and thank Kate MacKay and Robin Doak for their past service in these capacities. Bill Plummer also decided not to seek re-election as a Select Board member and we thank him for his many years of service to the Town.

There were discussions that are on-going regarding a review of the Comprehensive Plan, last updated in 1993, as well as continued work on the Tricentennial Celebration this summer. An ad-hoc group was formed with Georgetown and Arrowsic residents to evaluate broadband internet and see if we can get any better service for the towns.

We had more land go into conservation, with the Lundstrom Preserve, now owned by KELT, being created. A local resident spearheaded the repairs and renovation of Perkin's Island Lighthouse in the Kennebec River. Work continues on First Church across from the school, again all volunteer.

There was also renewed interest in expanding aqua culture with the success of oyster farms in Robinhood Cove and there will be more to come on this venture in the future.

We were able to keep the mill rate the same and continue to build reserve for future use.

We are all lucky to live on this wonderful island which has a wonderful way of life, and the community that makes it all possible. We thank our staff and volunteers who make it all possible.

Dear Citizens of Georgetown:

Maine has a long tradition of civil participation in both state and local government, and I thank you for being informed and involved citizens.

My vision for Maine is prosperity, not poverty. For this reason, one of my top priorities continues to be the reduction and eventual elimination of the income tax. Raising the minimum wage is not the path out of poverty; I want Mainers to earn a career wage. Reducing the income tax is the biggest and most immediate pay raise for all hard-working Mainers.

Not only does an income tax cut put more money back in your pockets, but it will also attract businesses that can offer good-paying careers to keep our young people here. It shows the nation that we are serious about wanting people and businesses to come—and stay—in Maine.

Unfortunately, voters approved a referendum question to raise the income tax to 10.15% on successful Maine households and small businesses. Enacting the second highest income tax rate in the country shows the nation we are eager to punish people for being successful. It will drive them out of our state and make it even more difficult to attract much-needed doctors, dentists, scientists, engineers and other professionals to Maine. They can live in neighboring New Hampshire, which takes no income tax from their paychecks. Even worse, there is no guarantee the extra revenue from this tax will go to fund education, as proponents promised.

As successful people leave Maine, state and municipal government will lose the significant amount they pay in property, sales and incomes taxes. This will put even more upward pressure on local property taxes. Municipalities will have to get more creative to provide local services without increasing property taxes. Reforming the tree growth program, collecting property taxes on land in conservation or preservation programs, charging a payment in lieu of taxes on state land that is taken off the property tax rolls and having non-profit organizations pay a two-percent tax on their net revenues are all ways for municipalities to increase revenues.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments.

Growing our economy by encouraging job creation remains a top priority. The tax relief bill enacted during this last Congress contains provisions I authored to provide small businesses with the certainty that they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act includes a provision the Maine delegation worked together to champion requiring that military recruits be provided with athletic footwear made in America, as is required for other equipment and uniform items whenever possible. This is a great victory for our troops and for the 900 skilled workers at New Balance factories here in Maine.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and \$1 billion towards the construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen the Navy and our national security, and the additional destroyer will help meet the Navy's goal of a 355-ship fleet.

Maine's growing population of older individuals creates many challenges. That's why, as Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security.

The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. Last May, a call to the hotline helped lead to the arrest of a national crime ring targeting seniors, and in June I worked to secure the humanitarian release of a Maine senior who had been imprisoned in Spain after being victimized by an international drug smuggling scam.

The Aging Committee also released an extensive report detailing the findings of our bipartisan investigation into the abrupt and dramatic price increases for prescription drugs whose patents expired long ago.

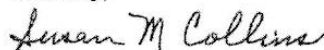
I advocated strongly for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. I also championed and authored portions of the 21st Century Cures Act that will further support biomedical innovation and make significant reforms to our mental health system.

The Senate also took steps in the past year to combat the nation's heroin and opioid epidemic by passing the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA), which I was proud to cosponsor. CARA is a monumental step forward in our effort to address the devastating addiction crisis affecting countless families and communities across the country and right here in Maine.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2016, I cast my 6,236th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Friends of Georgetown,

Since being sworn into the Senate in 2013, I have made it my mission to address at the federal level the most important issues facing our great state. Working closely with my colleagues in the Maine Congressional Delegation, we've been able to successfully secure a number of legislative victories that support our state's economy, our rich traditions, and the hardworking people I am proud to represent.

In an increasingly polarized Congress, my goal as an Independent is to put partisanship aside, build consensus and further common-sense solutions to address the needs of the American people. To this end, I have co-founded the Former Governors Caucus, a group of former state executives who are frustrated with legislative gridlock and eager to find bipartisan solutions. And as always, I aim to bridge the partisan divide by hosting barbeque dinners in Washington with colleagues ranging from Ted Cruz to Elizabeth Warren. If you know a person's children, then you see them as a mother or father and not a rival vote, and working to further personal dialogue and build relationships can lay the foundation for successful legislation.

One of the accomplishments of which I am most proud is the legislative victory that protects our college students and their families from an expensive hike in student loan interest rates. In 2013, as students faced a significant spike in interest rates that would have taken thousands of dollars out of their pockets, I brought together colleagues from across the political spectrum to broker compromise legislation called the Bipartisan Student Loan Certainty Act. Thanks to this bill, students will save \$50 billion over the next 10 years by lowering their interest rates, which means that a student in Maine will now save between \$3,000 and \$6,000 over the life of their loan.

Being an Independent in the Senate has allowed me to make calls and vote on policies that are best for Maine, but it has also made it possible to play key roles in finding simple solutions and legislative fixes that make good commonsense to both parties. Of course, much of what we do in the Senate doesn't happen on the Senate floor, or even in committee. Instead, it involves working across all levels of government to ensure the State of Maine receives attention and support from the federal government.

Take, for example, the opioid and heroin epidemic devastating communities across our state. While Congress has passed legislative solutions aimed at expanding access to medical treatment, I've also pressed for other changes that can be accomplished more quickly and make a more immediate difference in Maine. For example, I successfully urged the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to increase the number of patients to whom a doctor can provide medication-assisted treatment, and in 2015 brought the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy to Brewer to meet directly with Mainers and hear their stories. I've also engaged law enforcement – including the Drug Enforcement Agency – to crack down on the production of opioids and work to limit their diversion. Together, Senator Collins and I helped pass the Northern Border Security Review Act to combat drug and human trafficking along our border with Canada.

While the opioid epidemic is certainly our biggest public health crisis, job loss in Maine is still our number one economic problem and that's why we need to focus on bringing good paying jobs back to Maine and protecting the ones we still have. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I teamed up with Senator Collins and Representative Poliquin to successfully secure a provision in the defense bill that can help domestic shoe manufacturers like New Balance. The three of us also worked together with the Department of Commerce to establish an Economic Development Assessment Team, known as an EDAT, to assist Maine's forest industry in the wake of several mill closures. We have an incredible spirit of innovation and ingenuity in Maine and I believe finding ways to invest in that spirit will reignite Maine's forest products sector and our economy. Part of our economic path forward must also include expanding access to high-speed broadband, which can help connect our businesses and communities to information and economic opportunities.

I hope this letter finds you well. It's a privilege to share an update on my work to represent you and your family in Washington and in Maine.

As always, the interests of my constituents are what guide my work. There are many things I could talk about in that regard. But I want to focus here on one issue of particular importance—economic development. Having good-paying jobs allows future generations to make this wonderful state their home. With that goal in mind, I'm working to address Maine's economic challenges and capitalize on its opportunities.

One such opportunity is agriculture, where Maine is bucking national trends. The average age of our farmers is actually going down while acreage in cultivation is going up. Consumer demand for local food is driving that growth. I've been successful in reforming federal policies to help farmers and processors meet that demand. My work will continue this year as Congress reauthorizes the Farm Bill.

These programs invest in worthy projects that are beyond the reach of private, municipal, or state resources. Aside from economic development, advocating for Maine veterans is one of my highest priorities. With Congress' current agenda, I'm also fighting to defend Medicare and Social Security, protect clean air and water, and ensure that our communities have the resources to address hunger, homelessness and lack of health care access.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

It is my honor to continue to serve the citizens of Georgetown as a Sagadahoc County Commissioner. As I begin my third term, I remain totally committed to insuring that the services provided by the County are delivered in the most cost effective and professional way possible.

As we move forward in an economic climate which for us is accentuated by the uncertainty of issues such as union contract negotiations and the funding of county jails, the Commissioners remain acutely aware of the impact the County tax assessment has on Sagadahoc municipalities. In FY 2016-17 the amount to be raised through taxes decreased by 0.14%, and we remain committed to minimizing increases as we enter into the FY 2017-18 budget process.

During 2016, the County's many activities and accomplishments included the following:

- **Administration** continued to oversee the self-funded health insurance program, which had a rate increase of only 3% for the first year (vs. an increase of 6.25% by our previous insurer),
- **Probate Court** was busy processing petitions for guardianship, conservatorship, change of name, adoption, and estates. They also processed passport applications and continued to back-scan records into an electronic database.
- **Deeds** continued its efforts to make all documents available for viewing at sagadahocdeedsme.com. They also stayed busy handling increased recordings due to the improved housing market.
- The **Emergency Management Agency** welcomed new Director Sarah Bennett, who continued to work on the planning and implementation of regional training; assist local EMA Directors and community officials to meet federal emergency preparedness requirements; and collaborate with area emergency responders and public health agencies.
- The **Communications Center** continued to make significant equipment upgrades. In addition, a joint Task Force was established with the County's Fire Chiefs to explore long term improvements to the E-911 system.
- The **District Attorney's Office** handled a high volume of court cases and added a part-time employee to assist with the implementation of a new court process.
- The **Sheriff's Office** saw a decrease of approximately 1.4% in the number of calls when compared with 2015, from 5,207 to 5,133. The **Transport Division** handled 904 transports last year and continued to monitor inmates on home release. The community public works program resulted in the performance of approximately 2,725 hours of labor in Sagadahoc County, saving over \$56,800 in labor costs. The **Civil Division** continues to serve orders and writs in a consistently professional manner.

The Sagadahoc County Emergency Management Agency (SCEMA) is responsible for policy development, planning, agency coordination, education and training surrounding the health and safety of those who live, work and play within the ten municipalities of Sagadahoc County. SCEMA is charged with creating the framework within which communities reduce vulnerability to hazards and cope with disasters. SCEMA protects communities by coordinating and integrating all activities necessary to build, sustain, and improve the capability to mitigate against, prepare for, respond to, and recover from natural disasters, acts of terrorism or other man-made disasters. Existing partnerships were enhanced and new partnerships with government, non-profit and industry were established over the course of 2016.

On September 1, 2016, SCEMA hired a Deputy Director, Sarah Bennett, who has officially stepped into the role of EMA Director, effective March 1, 2017. Mr. Eric Sawyer has resigned from his position with the County as of November 17, 2016.

SCEMA brought in close to \$66,000 in Federal Homeland Security Program Grant funds for fiscal year 2016. These funds translated into a number of projects across the County. Some of the projects included updates and improvements to unit identifiers for County Law and Fire primary frequencies, the purchase of a county incident support trailer and various supplies to support all municipalities, and animal emergency response shelter kits, just to name a few.

During the 2015 calendar year, SCEMA began working with our local partners, the Maine Emergency Management agency (MEMA) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to create our County Hazard Mitigation Plan. During 2016, the Plan has been fully developed and approved for final stage, the Adoption and Resolution Process, which will conclude the Hazard Mitigation Plan process in its entirety during the early portion of 2017. The Plan will be effective for the next 5 years.

In the later part of 2016, all ten municipalities worked in partnership to complete a Hurricane Storm Surge evacuation mapping project which was coordinated between SCEMA, MEMA and the Local EMA Directors. This project will allow for more precise targeting of evacuation zones based on individually identified directional landmarks (such as a streams, coastlines, train tracks, roads etc.) SCEMA intends to build upon the current CodeRED alert and warning notification system capabilities by geo-targeting these pre-identified evacuation zones. Once the project is complete, the maps will become available to the County and towns for use in evacuation planning, which is expected in 2017.

Working closely with the Sagadahoc County Board of Health, SCEMA staff partnered with County partners and stakeholders, neighboring jurisdictions and subject matter experts to target and address three areas of focus for 2016 and the coming year: 1.) Childhood lead based paint exposure/screening 2.) Obesity, and 3.) Mental health.

The Town Clerk called the meeting to order at 8:00 AM and read the greeting.

Art. 1. Andrew Roth-Wells was elected Moderator to preside at said meeting with 6 votes.

Art. 2. Catherine Collins was elected Town Clerk for a term ending at the closing of the Town books, June 30, 2017 with 371 votes. Kristen Coombs and Rick Plummer each received 1 vote.

Art. 3. Dolores Pinette was elected Selectman for a term ending at the 2019 Annual Town Meeting with 230 votes. Robin Moore received 162 votes and William Plummer 1 vote.

Art. 4. Mary McDonald was elected Treasurer for a term ending at the closing of the Town books, June 30, 2017 with 387 votes. Rick Plummer received 1 vote.

Art. 5. Catherine Collins was elected Tax Collector for a term ending at the closing of the Town books, June 30, 2017 with 372 votes. Kristen Coombs and Rick Plummer each received 1 vote.

Art. 6. Charles Collins was elected Road Commissioner for a term ending at the 2017 Annual Town Meeting with 352 votes. Dale Savoie received 6 votes.

Art. 7. Colleen Hudson was elected a member of the School Committee for a term ending at the 2019 Annual Town Meeting with 193 votes. Sarah Wilbur received 143 votes and William Plummer and Don Cowing each received 1 vote.

Art. 8. Andy King was elected a member of the Town-Owned Property Management Board for a term ending at the 2019 Annual Town Meeting with 27 votes. George Dufour and James Lang each received 2 votes. Andy Smith, Charles Collins, Mark Donovan, Barbara Hart, Angus Crosby, Harold White, William Plummer, Tom Watson, Andy Werwaiss, Elaine Varney, Rick Plummer, Rick Hasenfus, Susie Wren, Charles Mains, and Dolores Pinette each received 1 vote.

Art. 9. Evelyn Stevens was elected a Cemetery District Trustee for a term ending at the 2019 Annual Town Meeting with 342 votes. Tom Watson received 1 vote.

Following the counting of the ballots and the announcing of the results, the Meeting was recessed until 9:00 AM on Saturday, June 18th.

Art. 10. The Town voted to adopt the following: (A) in regard to collection of taxes: Taxes shall become due and payable sixty days from the date printed on the bill, and interest at the rate of seven percent per annum will be charged on all accounts not paid by the due date; and (B) in regard to abatement of taxes: Interest at the rate of three percent per annum will be applied to all accounts from the date the taxes were paid until the overpayment is repaid.

Art. 11. The Town voted to authorize the Treasurer, with the consent of the Board of Selectmen, to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town, such loan or loans to be paid during the municipal year out of money raised by taxes during that municipal year.

Art. 12. The Town voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quitclaim deeds on the same.

Art. 13. The Town voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of Town owned personal property with a value of \$2000 or less under such terms and conditions as they deem advisable.

Art. 14. The Town voted to authorize the Board of the Selectmen to accept and expend such additional funds as various Town bodies may receive from government or private grants or similar block-funding gifts and donations, provided that funding does not trigger the expenditure of additional local funds not previously appropriated by the voters.

Art. 15. The Town voted to authorize the municipal Treasurer, upon direction from the Board of Selectmen, to waive the foreclosure of a Tax Lien Mortgage by recording a Waiver of Foreclosure in the Registry of Deeds in which the Tax Lien Certificate is recorded, prior to the right of redemption expiring, pursuant to 36 MRSA § 944.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Commission had a busy and productive year in 2015-2016, meeting our mission to care for and maintain Georgetown's open spaces and to provide leadership in the development, use, conservation, and restoration of the town's natural resources. During this year, the Conservation Commission engaged the community in programs that raised awareness of environmental issues in Georgetown and collaborated with Conservation Commissions in four nearby towns, to write and publish a stewardship guide for our coastal communities.

Among 2015-2016 activities, the Georgetown Conservation Commission:

- Hosted, with the Georgetown Historical Society, an island-wide discussion of the findings and recommendations in the Conservation Commission's 2015 publication, [Climate Change Adaptation Report: Georgetown, Maine](#). A community group has been meeting monthly since then to continue to study and take action on the issues of climate change on our island.
- Coordinated Georgetown's annual participation in *International Coastal Cleanup* weekend in September to keep Georgetown's beaches, marshes, and shorelines free of debris.
- Hosted the fifth annual Harvest Potluck supper of locally grown, caught, shot, or foraged food, to focus on the value of eating locally for island sustainability.
- Continued to engage the Georgetown community in a multi-year project monitoring water quality in the waters around Georgetown, with support from the Kennebec Estuary Land Trust.
- Continued to work with teachers and school children at the Georgetown Central School to monitor tree growth and natural ecological processes in permanent forest plots in the town forest behind the school, and to learn about our island's relationship with the surrounding waters.
- Sponsored a well-attended community workshop on ticks and tick-borne diseases.
- Continued to monitor and maintain town-owned conservation lands: the Ipcar Natural Preserve in Five Islands, and the Round the Cove Walking Trail in Georgetown Center. Replaced a trail bridge in Round the Cove.
- Updated the Conservation Commission map and guide to Georgetown's most popular walking and hiking trails on conservation lands.
- Continued the Georgetown Turtle Project. Students and community members worked together on a project about turtles and their tendency to cross our roads to lay eggs in the spring. The Commission posted "Caution – Turtle Crossing" signs made by Georgetown's children along island roads.
- Sponsored a two-semester capstone research project by students at the University of New Hampshire to evaluate storm resilience and emergency preparedness in Georgetown.
- In partnership with the nearby towns of Arrowsic, Phippsburg, and Westport Island and the Kennebec Estuary Land Trust, wrote and published stewardship guides for our coastal communities. Georgetown: Caring for Our Land and Waters was mailed to every Georgetown resident in June, 2016.
- Maintained a Conservation Commission website: www.gtownconservation.com

Voters at the June 18, 2016 Town Meeting approved a Town Budget totaling \$4,842,614 for the fiscal year, an increase of \$509,748 or 11.8% from the previous year. The Municipal Budget showed an increase of \$344,529 or 28.9% to \$1,537,841. The majority of that is for a new pumper/tanker for the Fire Department, which we will take from the reserve and a loan. The school budget was up 8.1%.

The total amount needed to be raised by property taxes increased by \$94,838 or 2.7%.

The FAC appreciates the efforts of all the town committees, in providing the information needed to compile the total budget.

HARBOR COMMITTEE

Again there were no significant problems or emergency issues during the 2015-16 fiscal year that fell under the Harbor Committee charter.

Total expenditures for the fiscal year were \$11,635 versus a town approved budget of \$13,075. This included a transfer of \$3,000 to the Harbor Committee Reserve Fund which is designated for harbor emergencies and to purchase a town owned boat for use by the harbormaster. Harbormaster expenses related to the town tricentennial did not affect the Harbor Committee budget since they were paid by the separate tricentennial fund. The budget for 2016-17 will remain the same at \$13,075

Collection of mooring permit fees totaled \$17,002 versus a budget estimate of \$12,784. The increase resulted from the reapplication by Derecktor/Robinhood Marina for their moorings following the purchase of the marina. Mooring permits are not directly transferable and must go through a fee based reapplication.

An assistant harbormaster position was created and filled in anticipation of the possible retirement of the harbor master in 2017. Training for the assistant will be funded without a budget increase.

A "NO WAKE" sign was installed in the narrows of the Little Sheepscot. Also, two new green marker buoys were purchase to mark two hazardous rocks in the lower section of Robinhood Cove. They were also registered with the Coast Guard.

The committee decided to stop sending out personalized courtesy mooring permit fee reminders to mooring owners. It was concluded that the expense and work burden are not justifiable relative to the low cost of the individual fees. Instead the committee voted to send generic e-mail reminders to mooring owners who supply their e-mail addresses.

It remains the objective of the Harbor Committee to promote continued safe use of both commercial and pleasure craft in the waters of Georgetown.

PLANNING BOARD

The planning board issued 28 permits either for new or improved principle structures, new or improved accessory structures, new or replaced piers or other activities requiring a permit during the fiscal year. Ten of the permits were for new principle structures, 16 for improved principle structures and two piers. This compares with 19 permits issued in the preceding fiscal year.

The Planning Board prepared a revision to the Shoreland Zoning ordinance for consideration at the annual Town Meeting. The changes consisted of mandates provided by the State of Maine. These changes were accepted by the town.

In celebration of the town's 300th birthday, the GTKYNP was held at the Robinhood Free Meetinghouse and was one of the first events at this historic venue under the new ownership of Georgetown residents Carlos and Ali Barrionuevo. The 2016 Outstanding Citizen award was presented to former Robinhood Marina owner, historian, and community advocate, Andy Vavolotis.

Holiday in the Harbor:

As we launch into the holiday season we present the "Lighting of the Christmas Tree" in December. SHELLFISH COMMITTEE

The committee has continued to be proactive in many conservation efforts regarding shellfish harvesting and research to increase the harvestable areas in town. Grant monies were used this year to purchase baby seed clams, and protective nets which were planted in Sagadahoc Bay. Seed clams were also removed from a portion of Robinhood Cove and relocated to Sagadahoc Bay so worm harvesters wouldn't destroy them while harvesting. This was our spring conservation effort. Naturally occurring baby clams are not as plentiful as they once were. The lack of seed clams may be due to a current increase of green crabs or other causes.

The Department of Marine Resources (DMR) will continue to monitor the shoreline through sanitary surveys. The committee appreciates the work of Kennebec Estuary Land Trust (KELT) through their educational programs and media resources educating people how important is it for residents with shoreline property to maintain their septic systems. Maintaining your shoreline septic system helps keep our flats open and our resource healthy. We encourage all residents to inspect and maintain their systems.

We are currently looking for new members who would be interested in this local industry and our conservation efforts. If you might be interested please contact a committee member, a Selectman or join us at our next monthly meeting.

SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

Operations at the Transfer Station are running smoothly. Jim Coombs, Jim Brown and several part time attendants keep the Transfer Station (TS) in good working order.

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection took place in Bath and Brunswick, with Georgetowners taking in items such as oil based paints, chemicals, insecticides and several other hazardous substances that will now not go into landfills. Thanks to all who participated in those events. The Universal Waste shed is usually full, which means electronics are also being kept out of landfills.

For the calendar year 2015-2016 the town had 308.85 tons of Municipal Solid Waste, 231.29 tons in the Bulky Waste, we recycled 61 tons of metals, 122 tons of plastics and glass, and 70 tons of electronics.

Because of the contracts we have in place, we save approximately \$120 per ton of material recycled. In 2015, our best year ever, we diverted 240 tons of material from the landfill, saving the town \$28,800 in the process. Please keep recycling your plastics, newspapers, cardboard, mixed paper, bottles, cans, electronics, and scrap metals.

A reminder, when residents get another vehicle remember to ask for a TS sticker when you register the vehicle.

The Committee thanks all the volunteers who help keep the mall organized, looking neat and tidy - this can be a daunting job at times.

Anytime you are unsure if an item can be left at the Transfer Station, please ask the attendants for guidance as to what can be accepted and where the item should be put. Remember - reuse, reduce & recycle helps save the land, air, water, and tax dollars.

TOWN OWNED PROPERTY MANAGEMENT BOARD

Maintenance

Routine maintenance at the Town Wharf during this period included replacing and reinforcing the header for the ramp to the recreational floats, replacing cleats on the floats and re-building the stairs to the second floor of the Love Nest. As a follow up to the preventive maintenance inspection performed by Pine Tree Engineering earlier in the spring, Andy King dove to inspect the underwater pilings, and Kennebec Marine was hired to secure brackets and replace two pilings according to the diagram and priorities established in the engineering report.

The board continued to contract with Jorgensen Landscaping for mowing services at the wharf, Todd's Landing and Richards Library. In addition, we initiated a multi-year program to remove invasive Black Cherry, Rosa Floribunda and Bittersweet on the bank and around the dumpster area at the wharf. Consistent with Shoreland Zoning requirements under a permit from the Town Planning Board, the area will be line cut as part of the regular mowing for at least a year with the goal of planting lower-growing non-invasive native species such as Juniper, Bayberry and Viburnum when the undesirable plants have died back. Continued line cutting will be required, and possibly some hand pulling of bittersweet, for several seasons.

Event Permits

In discharging our responsibility under paragraph B section 3 of the TOPMB ordinance, "to issue permits for public and private functions and other organized activities" on the properties under our jurisdiction, the board rejected a request to hold a wedding reception at the wharf, authorized a graduation ceremony on the shore for Rising Cub Scouts from the Georgetown Central School, and met with the Tricentennial Committee and the Recreation Committee to review their plans for public safety, parking, crowd control, and maintaining patron's access to the wharf tenants' business, as well as public access to the commercial and recreational floats, during the 300th Celebration and the Blessing of the Fleet. Due to the proliferation of special events and the crowded conditions that often prevail at the wharf, the board reminds individuals, Town committees, and community organizations, to file a written request outlining their plans at least 60 days prior to any proposed activity.

Ordinance Changes

Several changes to the TOPMB Ordinance were approved by the Town Meeting in June. These included raising commercial user fee from \$200 to \$250 and commercial skiff tie-up fees from \$100 to \$125. The annual due date for commercial fees was moved from January 1 to September 1 to correspond better with the fishermen's traditional cash flow. To encourage and reward prompt payment, the former \$20 late fee was replaced with a cumulative series of fines beginning with \$100 on October 1 and imposing an additional \$50 each month the fee remains unpaid.

Wharf and Float Modifications

For several months the board considered various modifications to improve efficiency and safety on the wharf while providing for the maximum number of skiffs at the commercial and recreational floats. In March, we applied to the Town Planning Board for a permit to add a fourth recreational float, move the location of the commercial ramp, and re-configure the commercial floats to provide a better landing for the ramp, more protected tie-ups and easier processing of the lobster being sold to the wholesaler at the wharf. We then discovered that because the wharf existed long before the Natural Resources Protection Act was passed, it had never been permitted in any form by either the Maine DEP or the Corps of Army Engineers. We were, therefore, required to submit a full-fledged NRPA permit to both the DEP and the Corps with scale plans, site drawings, and documentation of the present location of the wharf and the buildings as well as property lines on the tax map. We secured the necessary permits in May, but were not able to begin construction immediately since all treated lumber had to be cured for several weeks. Kennebec Marine has been hired to complete the project in the fall.

As a result of this effort, the wharf itself is now officially documented in DEP permit # L-20355-4P-B-N and in Army Corps permit NAE-2016-00854. Future modifications and improvements will require only amendments to the existing permits and the Town's rights to rebuild the wharf are now protected, should it ever be destroyed or severely damaged in a storm. The board wishes to thank Jason Lang for connecting us to the appropriate Departments, Mary McDonald for assistance with paperwork, mailings, and research into Town records, David Tudor for pro-bono help in drafting the application and generating the supporting drawings and documents, as well as David Cherry of the Maine DEP and LeAnn Neal of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for their generous help in understanding the requirements and for facilitating approval of our application in the shortest possible time.

Between September 9, 2015 and June 30, 2016 there were 13 loose dog calls, 1 dog biting a human, 7 stray cats picked up, 2 animal cruelty complaints, 2 abandoned cats, and 5 shelter trips. I continued working with a feral cat colony manager by taking approximately 2 litters of kittens to the shelter. I also supported Bob Arledge and Nananda Col, 2 private citizens, who have trapped approximately 47 feral cats and paid to have them spayed or neutered.

CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER

Construction in Georgetown was brisk at times this year and slowed to a trickle at other times. There were thirty permits issued by the Planning Board, nineteen of the permits were in the shore land zone. There were twenty six CEO building permits; seventeen of the permits were issued in the shore land zone. There were also thirteen septic permits and seventeen plumbing permits as well as four flood plain permits.

If you are considering doing any construction, it is strongly recommended that you call the CEO to find out what, if any, permits are required and to review setback requirements. This is especially true if you are considering building or cutting trees in the shore land zone, or doing shoreline stabilization as State rules and regulations can change at any time during the year. The CEO is available to review preliminary plans and/or conduct site visits to assist you during project development.

The CEO can be reached at 207-522-3225, feel free to call anytime week day or week end. Messages can be left on my phone anytime. Call backs will be made usually within twenty four hours, except for emergencies which will be answered as soon as possible.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR

The Georgetown Emergency Management Agency has had a quiet yet busy year. The "quiet" relates to the fact that while Georgetown had several storms, none became emergencies. However, had there been any, we were ready! The "busy" refers to the fact that we have been busy: attending meetings, taking on-line and in-class courses, and going to the Annual Preparedness Conference. Basically, we have been engaged in "preparing" wherever and whenever necessary. Our emergency management team includes: the selectmen, the fire & ambulance chief, harbor master and assistant, road commissioner, school principal and custodian, Marine Patrol Office, Sagadahoc Sheriff, Maine Game Warden, Reid State Park Director, Animal Control Officer, and the Georgetown Fire Department. We established this team in 2012 and agreed to meet as necessary. Our communication protocol is to contact team members, as needed, when an emergency occurs. The Georgetown Emergency Management Advisory Committee consists of: Jerome D. Gamache, EM Director; Karin Gamache, Assistant, Justin Lodolce, Fire & Ambulance Chief; Ronald Hayward, Robert & Sharon Trabona, Ralph Wilkinson, David Knauber, all Georgetown Fire Department Members.

Contingency plans for the primary shelter is the Community Center, with the School and the Historical Society, as secondary shelters, if needed. In addition to the cots stored at the Community Center, this year we added more cots and blankets, just in case.

Before the major storms, Jerry contacts many of these leaders to make sure we are ready. For example, for the Community Center, he always contacts Bill Plummer, who assures us they are ready. We, in Georgetown, are lucky to have such a dedicated and cooperative community. That's not the case in many other small communities.

For preparedness activities, we attended the bi-monthly Sagadahoc County Directors Meetings with Eric Sawyer, the County Director. Plus we have taken several Emergency Management Preparedness on-line courses this year, with Jerry also taking a two-day Public Information Officer Course, as well. Additionally, in April we participated in the Annual Maine Partners in Emergency Preparedness Two-Day Conference in Augusta.

In April, 2016, we had the annual review of Georgetown's Emergency Operations Plan with our advisory committee. Two annexes were added, and some revisions were made. It has now been submitted to the Selectmen for review and acceptance. The EOP can be seen on the Town website. We will continue this form of training, participation, and planning so that Georgetown will be prepared in case of an emergency.

HARBORMASTER

I recommend that float and ramp owners mark each with his/her name and contact telephone number in order that we can notify you in the event of a breakaway. On the same subject if you have a float which has fallen into disrepair, please dispose of the float/ramp properly.

My thanks go out to Deputy Harbormaster Tom Bolster for his initiative and hard work.

I look forward to another safe, pleasurable and profitable 2017 boating season. My thanks go out to all of our fishermen and boaters for their cooperation.

This season started with the shimming of many of the paved town roads. Building up the gravel edges protects the edges of the road pavement from breaking and adds life to the road. The Webber and Jewett roads both had all culverts replaced prior to future paving.

West Georgetown Road was paved to the Marrtown intersection and the large culvert at the Trafton Marsh was reinforced with rip-rap and each end extended to provide shoulders.

SHELLFISH WARDEN

The value of the soft-shell clam industry has increased over the past five years by about forty percent. This in turn brings enforcement to new and unexpected levels where your wardens are out and about on sporadic twenty four seven patrols. We all carry and use cell phones and night vision which have proven to be a great tool with rescues and enforcement in the marine environment.

Over the past several years the Maine Shellfish Advisory Council and various business ventures have been busy working on aquaculture programs. This is the way of the future. Our neighboring town of Wiscasset operates an upweller which is a wonderful example of how we can grow seed or baby clams to a size where they are then seeded into the clam flats where they may grow to maturity. Another effort is where crushed clam shells are spread on the flats in order to reduce acidification in the flats which then allow baby clam shells to remain healthy and grow to maturity. And most recently the Heal Eddy Restoration effort funded by Manomet Center for Conservation Sciences, which is a commercial-scale project to restore clam flats to ecological and economic productivity. This effort has become a great educational tool for surrounding town's shellfish committees and many local school children use it as an extended classroom.

The European green crab is threatening Maine's coastal fisheries and ecosystems. Decreases in clam populations and degradation of coastal habitats have been observed up and down the coast. As a result, your shellfish committee and the Kennebec Estuary Land Trust (KELT) along with interested parties throughout the areas are working on projects that allow us to better understand the green crab life cycle. The crabs are known to eat all sizes of soft-shell clams, and have an adverse effect on eelgrass beds by eating eelgrass shoots and burrowing into the banks of intertidal marshes, where they destroy the marsh grasses. The past winters have been mild by most standards. It will take a significant research effort to show us where Georgetown ranks with the green crab population on our flats. In this country at the present time there is very little economic value to the green crab once harvested. Some possibilities for commercial use around the world are creating aquaculture feed, lobster bait, pet food supplements, and fertilizer. Crab meat for human consumption, in an overseas market may be a possibility in the near future

Prior to harvesting any shellfish in Georgetown you must first obtain a shellfish license from the Town office. At that time, ask the clerk if there are any conservation closures in effect and ask to look at all the latest applicable Administrative Letters, which should be found on the bulletin board outside the office door in the hallway. You may also want to pick up a Recreational Shellfish Information sheet from the clerk or go to the Town web site for a copy. For the most up to date status of any flat, visit Maine DMR and go to Shellfish Sanitation and there you will find a wealth of information for the most up to date status of the flats. This way you can be absolutely sure that the flats you plan to dig on are open. If you need assistance with this procedure please call Jon Hentz at 371-2732 for guidance through the site.

If the Town office is closed and you need an immediate shellfish license, please call the Sagadahoc Bay Campground at 371-2014 where you will find Patricia and Eric Kosalka ready to sell you a 7 Day Recreational Shellfish License at just about any time during daylight or early evening hours.

Prior to digging in the future, contact your Town Office at 371-2820 or me for the openings and closings which can change without warning. Be especially cautious in the spring when we can expect heavy rains which may close all our flats. Another springtime problem we routinely face is Red Tide. This will usually affect Blue Mussels, Carnivorous Snails and European Oysters, and can last all summer. The warden makes every effort to post closure signs at major points of access to some of the flats. These locations are the first telephone pole on the Birch Island Road, Julia Kahr's telephone pole by the tennis court on Kennebec Point, the signpost at the southern end of Molly Point, the sign post at the end of the pavement on the Sagadahoc Bay Road, Todd's Landing on Robinhood Cove between the two bridges, Bean's launch ramp at the end of the Indian Point South Bay Road, the Indian Point commercial clambers' access to the Bay by Connie Donovan's, the Indian Point access to Little River on the Ocean Loop Road, and the gate house at Reid State Park. However, never trust the absence of a sign. They can be; and in many cases are vandalized or damaged. The only postings you can completely trust are the ones located in the Town Office or the DMR website.

Please remember that if you use someone else's property to get to the clam-flats, you must first obtain permission from the owner or designated responsible person.

Finally, the Red Tide Hotline number is 1-800-232-4733. If you have a problem understanding this recording, please look at a chart or map to find the points of reference being spelled out. If you are still in doubt, please call me at home so I can provide assistance.

In August we had our first annual "set for success" event designed to help all students start the school year on the same playing field. Backpacks and school supplies were handed out to every Georgetown student.

There were many enrichment activities that our students participated in over the course of the year. In the fall, we offered a green house club, hiking club and archery. The sixth grade students built a boat under the supervision of Bob Trabona. Grades 3-6 continued their involvement with the Heal Eddy clam farm project. Students collected data on growth rates and conducted green crab studies. We began a new tradition of having cookouts on Fridays with the principal cooking and serving lunch.

As part of the tricentennial celebration in Georgetown our first grade teacher, Beth Saufler, wrote and directed a play depicting the history of Georgetown. Students and volunteers did many hours of research at the historical society to prepare for the writing of the play.

We began a new tradition on the last Wednesday of the month of having a monthly community meeting with the entire school. Our goal is to build a safe and positive school community. The fourth and fifth grade students went to Growstown School and spent the day as students did in the early nineteen hundreds.

GIEF (Georgetown Island Education Foundation) awarded several grants to teachers and students over the course of the year. The following students received grants: Padraig Keith Hardy, Elias Goodrich, Freyja Rogenes, Yasmeen Douar, Brett Lindsay, and Ava MacMahan. Adults receiving grants were Beth Saufler, Marcie Look, and Brett Miller who provided a Saturday photography and painting experience for Georgetown students. We also received funding for our "set for success" program and our greenhouse winterization project.

Annual Report, 2015-2016

The Department's leadership changed, as Larry Mann stepped down and Justin Lodolce assumed the duties of Fire Chief. Extensive maintenance took place during the year, including the replacement and insulation of the Center Station Roof and modifications made to the Trafton Meadow pumphouse and Charles' Pond dry hydrant. A long-term vehicle replacement plan was developed to ensure a steady succession of ISO-approved apparatus. Jerome Gamache, John Labrecque and Bob Trabona were appointed as Deputy Chiefs. The Department mourned the passing in 2016 of long-time Chief Reed Fulton, which occasioned the first placement of black bunting over the Center Station vehicle bay doors.

Members responded to 42 fire calls and 79 ambulance calls. Training hours for calendar year 2016 totaled 1,053, a 30% increase over calendar 2015, due to four members attending basic interior firefighting classes.

Independent Auditors' Report

**To the Selectboard

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Georgetown, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We did not audit the financial statements of the Georgetown School Department's general fund, fiduciary fund (agency fund - student activity accounts) and other governmental funds (special revenue funds), which represent 34%, 22%, and 7%, respectively, of the assets, fund balances/net position, and revenues of the Town of Georgetown, Maine. Those statements were audited by other auditors whose report has been furnished to us, and in our opinion, insofar as it relates to the amounts included for the general fund and other governmental funds, is based solely on the report of the other auditors. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, based on our audit and the report of other auditors, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Georgetown, Maine, as of June 30, 2016, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis, budgetary comparison information, the Schedule of the Town's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability, the Schedule of Town Contributions, and the Notes to the Schedules, as noted in the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Georgetown, Maine's basic financial statements. The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America by us and other auditors. In our opinion, based on our audit, the procedures described above, and the report of the other auditors, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

As management of the Town of Georgetown, Maine, we offer readers of the Town's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016. The Town's financial performance is discussed and analyzed within the context of the accompanying financial statements and disclosures following this section.

Financial Highlights

The Town's assets exceed liabilities by \$4,781,195 as of June 30, 2016, compared to \$4,835,192 as of June 30, 2015.

The Town's governmental funds General Fund Balance on a budgetary basis was \$784,152 as of June 30, 2016, compared to \$793,730 as of June 30, 2015.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the Town's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements include three components: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and (3) notes to the financial statements. The Town also includes in this report supplemental information to the basic financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements include a Statement of Net Position and a Statement of Activities. These statements provide information about the activities of the Town as a whole and present both a long-term and short-term view of the Town's finances. Financial reporting at this level is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies.

The Statement of Net Position includes all assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in the Town's net position is one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Evaluation of the overall economic health requires other non-financial factors, such as changes in the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's roads, as well as many others.

The Statement of Activities reports the current year change in net position. This statement includes all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities are divided into the following types of activities:

- Governmental activities - Most of the Town's basic services are reported here, including general government administration, public works, public safety, health and human services, sanitation, education, and cemeteries. Property taxes, excise taxes, fees, interest income and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.

Currently, the Town does not have any business-type activities.

Fund Financial Statements

For governmental activities, these statements focus on how services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements also report the Town's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the Town's most significant funds. The remaining statements provide financial information about activities for which the Town acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of those outside of the government.

Financial Analysis of the Town as a Whole - Government-wide Financial Statements

The Statement of Activities is showing that revenues are up slightly, mostly from increased excise tax. Property taxes remained fairly flat with the same mil rate for the second year in a row. The Town's auto excise tax has been slowly rising and State revenues continue to decline. Road expenses are up due to paving projects and educational expenses are up as well.

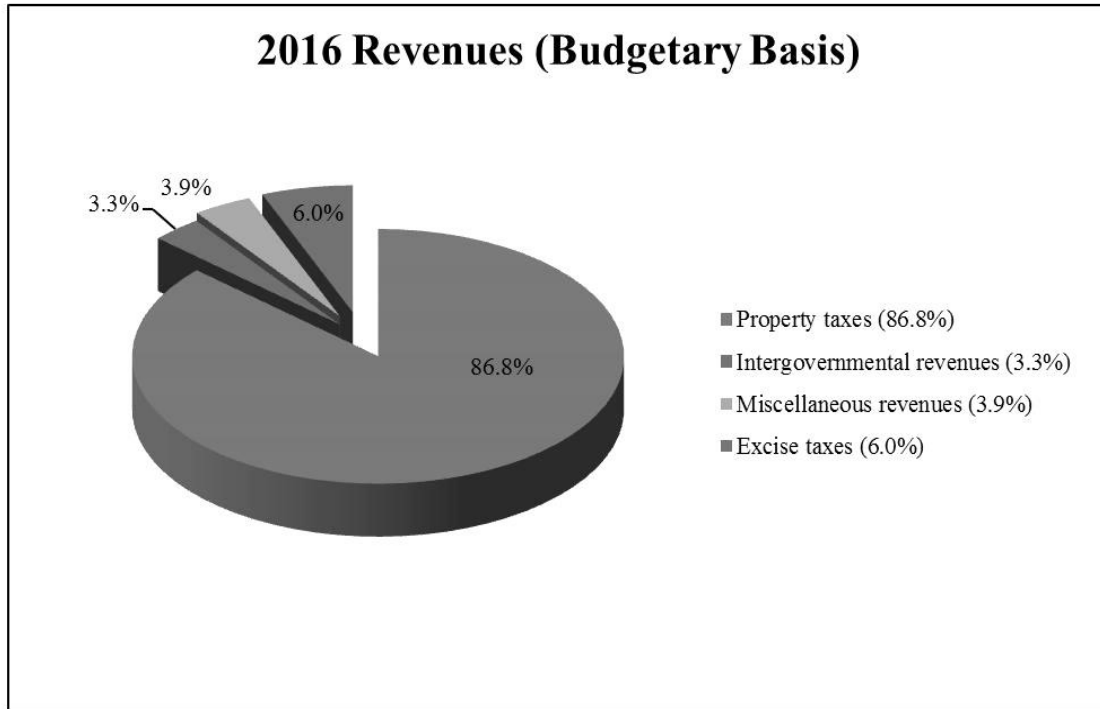
Financial Analysis of the Town's Funds - Fund Financial Statements

Our analysis of the Town's major funds begins with the fund financial statements on page 6 and provides detailed information about the most significant funds-not the Town as a whole. Some funds are required to be established by State law. However, the Town establishes many other funds to help it control and manage money for particular purposes or to show that it is meeting legal responsibilities for using certain taxes, grants, and other money. The Town reports governmental funds.

- Governmental funds - Most of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. We describe the relationship, or differences, between governmental activities, reported in the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities, and governmental funds in reconciliations on pages 7 and 9 of the financial statements.

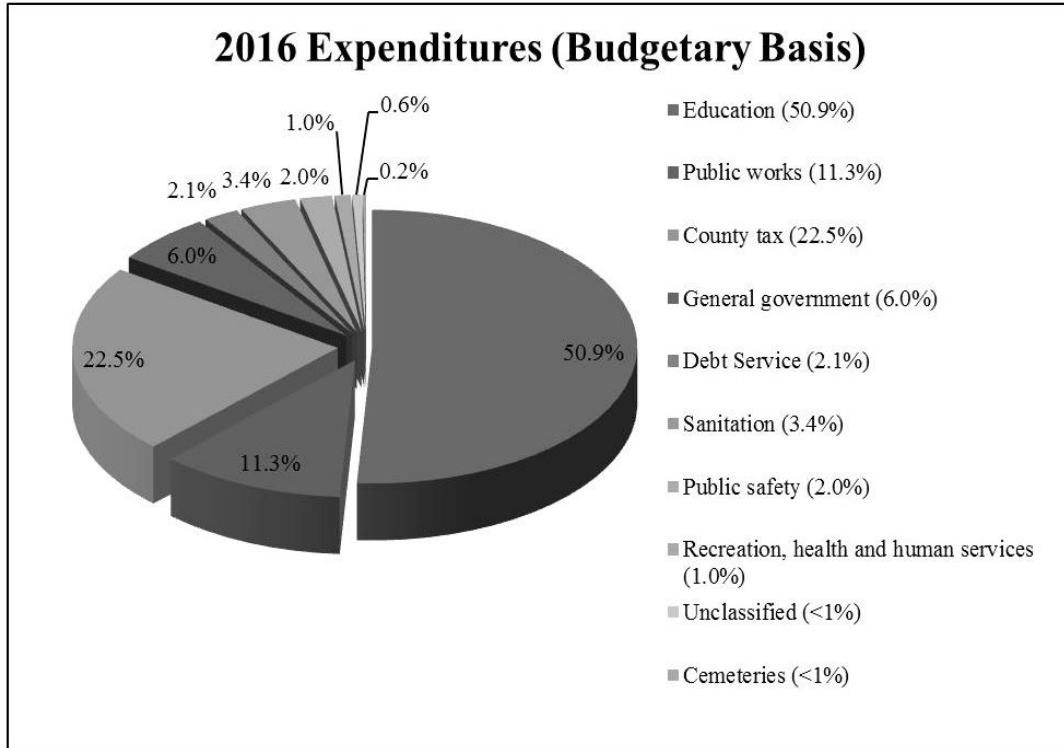
In an effort to reduce borrowing and eliminate peaks in the mill rate, the Town continues to build reserve funds (assigned fund balances within the general fund) annually to reduce the need for major fund outlays as equipment and infrastructure assets need replacement. All expenditures incurred in the reserve funds are noted in the Report of the Selectmen. A listing of all reserve accounts can be found at Note L to the financial statements.

Current year revenues in the general fund on a budgetary basis were made up of the following:



The pie chart shows, as expected, that property taxes are the primary source of revenue for the Town, accounting for 86.8% of all funding. This is followed by excise taxes which has slowly but steadily risen, although not enough to make a true impact. All auto excise tax generated is used on the roads for maintenance and repair or paving. State revenue remained flat and is not expected to change and the burden will remain on property taxes to maintain the Town's budgets.

Current year expenditures in the general fund on a budgetary basis were made up of the following:



As shown and explained yearly, the school and county tax make up over 70% of the budgeted expenses, followed by roads, including snow plowing.

GENERAL FUND BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

A budget to actual comparison is reported on page 10.

All spending came in under budget with the exception of the roads budget which was slightly over between lines. The Town continued to put money away in reserves for future expenditures (\$74,000 in the current year) and continue to maintain current services while trying to keep costs down.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At the end of June 30, 2016, the Town had approximately \$5.7 million invested in capital assets. (See table below)

Assets included here are the School, Transfer Station, Fire Department (Town owned Equipment only), new infrastructure, and the Five Islands Wharf. These items were placed on the books at historical costs (as best could be determined) and are/will be depreciated over their estimated useful lives. A breakdown of all assets listed above is available at the Town Office.

The Town adopted a policy of capturing any capital expenditure in excess of \$10,000. Several items under that amount were capitalized in conjunction with others items (i.e. all costs associated with the “new” transfer station were reviewed regardless of their amount to get a true total cost of the project). These items will be looked at yearly and added to the Capital Asset Schedule as appropriate. Total additions to capital assets of the year ended June 30, 2016 was \$13,078 and there were not any retirements of fixed assets.

Long-Term Debt

In 2012, the Town borrowed \$50,000 from the First N.A. Bank for a new school boiler. The Town made principal payments of \$9,519 against this note in the current year.

In 2013, the Town borrowed \$477,000 from Bath Savings Institution for the purpose of funding road projects. The Town made principal payments of \$74,299 against this note in the current year.

The total balance outstanding on Town debt at year end was \$8,181.

The Town paid off its final road paving loan this year for the project which began in 2008-09 and will have the boiler paid off next year. The Town will be in the market for a loan for a new pumper-tanker for the fire station in the near future.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

The annual budget assures the efficient, effective and economic use of Town resources. Through the budget process, the citizenry, at Town Meeting, sets the direction of the Town, allocating its resources and establishing its priorities.

Our committees work to keep budgets low while looking out for maintenance and asset replacement needs. The Selectboard works to keep the needs of the Town met while keeping the taxes as low as possible and maintaining the services our citizens expect.

This could not be done without the volunteers and committee/board members that do all the hard work, most for little or no pay.

State government continues to shift the burden on to the local tax payers in the way of reduced educational, roads and revenue sharing disbursements as well as mandates requiring employee time and resources.

This leaves the Towns, like Georgetown, struggling to determine how best to utilize our limited resources. We are always looking for new ideas for cost cutting, efficiencies in delivery of services and ways to stretch the Town's dollars.

CONTACTING THE TOWN'S FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

This financial report is designed to provide our citizens, taxpayers, customers, and creditors with a general overview of the Town's finances and to show the Town's accountability for the money it receives. Notes to Financial Statements

Note A - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Georgetown, Maine (the "Town") was incorporated under the laws of the State of Maine and operates under a Selectboard form of government. The accounting policies of the Town conform to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is responsible for establishing GAAP for state and local governments through its pronouncements (Statements and Interpretations). The more significant accounting policies established in GAAP and used by the Town are discussed below.

Principles Determining Scope of Reporting Entity

The basic financial statements include the accounts of all Town operations. The criteria for including organizations as component units within the Town's reporting entity, as set forth in GAAP include whether:

- the organization is legally separate (can sue and be sued in their own name)
- the Town holds the corporate powers of the organization
- the Town appoints a voting majority of the organization's board
- the Town is able to impose its will on the organization
- the organization has the potential to impose a financial benefit/burden on the Town
- there is fiscal dependency by the organization on the Town

Based on the aforementioned criteria, the Town of Georgetown has no component units.

Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements

The statement of net position and statement of activities report information about the reporting government as a whole. They include all funds of the reporting entity. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for services for support. Currently the Town has no business-type activities.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. The Town does not allocate indirect expenses to functions in the statement of activities. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the Government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements of the reporting entity are organized into funds, each of which are considered to be separate accounting entities. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts, which constitute its assets, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures.

Governmental Activities

Governmental funds are identified as either general, special revenue, capital projects, or permanent funds based upon the following guidelines.

The *General Fund* is the operating fund of the Town and is always classified as a major fund. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific sources (other than major capital projects or expendable trusts) that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.

Permanent Funds are used to account for resources legally held in trust. All resources of the fund, including any earnings on invested resources, may be used to support the organization as stipulated by the specific trust instrument.

Fiduciary Funds (not included in Government-wide statements)

The Town's fiduciary funds are presented in the fiduciary fund statements by type. Since by definition these assets are being held for the benefit of a third party and cannot be used to address activities or obligations of the Town, these funds are not incorporated into the Government-wide statements.

Agency funds are used to account for assets held by the Town as an agent for individuals, private organizations, and/or other government units.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting is related to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Basis of Accounting - Continued

Accrual

Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements and the fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Modified Accrual

Governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e., both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt is recognized when due.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Town considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Inventories

Inventories consist of the School Lunch Program and are recorded at cost on a first-in, first-out basis. Inventories of supplies are considered to be expenditures at the time of purchase.

Capital Assets

In the government-wide financial statements, capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$10,000 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. In accordance with provisions of GASBS No. 34, the Town has elected not to report infrastructure assets retrospectively. Infrastructure assets (primarily roads) will be reported on a prospective basis only. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives are as follows: land improvements, 10 years; buildings and improvements, 20 to 40 years; infrastructure, 40 to 50 years; equipment, 5 to 15 years; and assets included with the Five Islands Wharf, 5 to 20 years.

In the fund financial statements, fixed assets used in governmental fund operations are accounted for as capital outlay expenditures of the governmental fund upon acquisition. Fixed assets are not capitalized and related depreciation is not reported in the fund financial statements.

Long-Term Obligations

In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities statement of net position. Bond premiums are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the straight-line method. Bond issuance costs are recognized as an expense in the period incurred.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

Deferred Inflow of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position and the governmental funds balance sheet will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflow of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an expense or expenditure until that time. The Georgetown School Department has one item that meets this criterion, deferred pensions, which is reported in the statement of financial position.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position and the governmental funds balance sheet will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resource, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The Town has one type of item, unavailable revenue, which results from property taxes, which arises under the modified accrual basis of accounting that qualifies for reporting in this category and is reported in the governmental funds balance sheet. The Georgetown School Department also has one type of item, deferred pensions, which is reported in the statement of financial position.

Pensions

In government-wide financial statements, retirement plans (pensions) are required to be recognized and disclosed using the accrual basis of accounting (see Note I and the required supplementary information beginning on page 39), regardless of the amount recognized as pension expenditures on the governmental fund statements, which use the modified accrual basis of accounting.

Pensions - Continued

In general, the Georgetown School Department recognizes a net pension liability, which represents the School Department's proportionate share of the excess of the total pension liability over the fiduciary net position of the pension reflected in the actuarial report provided by the Maine Public Employees Retirement System (MainePERS). The net pension liability is measured as of the School Department's prior fiscal year-end. Changes in the net pension liability are recorded, in the period incurred, as pension expense or as deferred inflows of resources or deferred outflows of resources depending on the nature of the change. The changes in net pension liability that are recorded as deferred inflows of resources or deferred outflows of resources (that arise from changes in actuarial assumptions or other inputs and differences between expected or actual experience) are amortized over the weighted average remaining service life of all participants in the respective pension plan and are recorded as a component of pension expense beginning with the period in which they are incurred.

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Teachers Pension Plan (TPP) and additions to/deductions from the TPP's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by the TPP. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Projected earnings on pension investments are recognized as a component of pension expense. Differences between projected and actual investment earnings are reported as deferred inflows of resources or deferred outflows of resources and amortized as a component of pension expense on a closed basis over a five-year period beginning with the period in which the difference occurred. Each subsequent year will incorporate an additional closed basis five-year period of recognition.

Interfund Activity

Interfund activity is reported as either loans, reimbursements, or transfers. Loans are reported as interfund loan receivables and payables as appropriate and are subject to elimination upon consolidation in the government-wide presentation. Reimbursements are when one fund incurs a cost, charges the appropriate benefiting fund and reduces its related costs as a reimbursement. Since not all funds maintain a separate cash account, cash is pooled in the General Fund cash account and activity for individual funds are recorded through the General Fund and each respective individual fund through the recognition of a "due to/due from" as appropriate. The due to/from other funds balances are subject to elimination upon consolidation in the government-wide presentation. All interfund transactions are treated as transfers. Transfers between governmental or proprietary funds are netted as part of the reconciliation to the government-wide financial statements.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Budget

The Town of Georgetown's policy is to adopt an annual budget for operations. The budget is presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting, which is consistent with generally accepted accounting principles with modifications as described in Note M. The following procedures are followed in establishing budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- Early in the second half of the last fiscal year the Town prepared a budget for this fiscal year beginning July 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
- A vote of the inhabitants of the Town of Georgetown was then taken for the purpose of adopting the proposed budget after public notice of the vote was given.
- The budget was adopted subsequent to passage by the inhabitants of the Town.

Revenue Recognition - Property Taxes

The Town's property tax for the current year was levied October 23, 2015, on the assessed value listed as of April 1, 2015, for all real property located in the Town. Taxes were due December 22, 2015. Interest on unpaid taxes commenced on December 23, 2015, at 7% per annum.

Property tax revenues are recognized when they become available. Available includes those property tax receivables expected to be collected within sixty days after year end. The remaining receivables have been recorded as deferred revenues.

The Town is permitted by the laws of the State of Maine to levy taxes up to 105% of its net budgeted expenditures for the related fiscal period. The amount raised in excess of 100% is referred to as overlay, and amounted to \$63,829 for the year ended June 30, 2016.

Tax liens are placed on real property within twelve months following the tax commitment date if taxes are delinquent. The Town has the authority to foreclose on property eighteen months after the filing of the lien if tax liens and associated costs remain unpaid.

Government-wide Fund Net Position

Government-wide net position is divided into three components:

Net investment in capital assets - consist of the historical cost of capital assets less accumulated depreciation and less any debt that remains outstanding that was used to finance those assets.

Government-wide Fund Net Position - Continued

Restricted net position - consist of net asset position that is restricted by the Town's creditors (for example, through debt covenants), by the state enabling legislation (through restrictions on shared revenues), by grantors (both federal and state), and by other contributors.

Unrestricted - All other net asset positions are reported in this category.

Governmental Fund Balances

In the governmental fund financial statements, fund balances are classified as follows:

Nonspendable – resources which cannot be spent because they are either a) not in spendable form or; b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted – resources with constraints placed on use of resources are either a) externally imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Committed – resources which are subject to limitations the government imposes upon itself at its highest level of decision making, and that remain binding unless removed in the same manner.

Assigned – resources neither restricted or committed for which a government has a stated intended use as established by Town Selectboard or a body or official to which the Town Selectboard has delegated authority to assign amounts for specific purposes.

Unassigned – resources which cannot be properly classified in one of the other four categories. The General Fund should be the only fund that reports a positive unassigned fund balance amount.

Use of Restricted Resources

The Town has no formal fund balance policy. For purposes of fund balance classification, expenditures are to be spent from restricted fund balance first, followed in order by committed fund balance, assigned fund balance and lastly unassigned fund balance.

New Accounting Pronouncement

During the year ended June 30, 2016, the Town implemented Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement (GASBS) No. 73 *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That Are Not within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68*. Balances were not restated as a result of this Statement.

Note B - Cash

The Town conducts all its banking transactions with its depository banks.

Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits

At June 30, 2016, the carrying amount of the Town's deposits was \$1,795,031, and the bank balance was \$1,786,177. The difference between these balances relates to deposits in transit, outstanding checks and cash on hand at year-end.

Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits - Continued

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Town's deposits may not be returned to it. The Town does not have a deposit policy on custodial credit risk. At June 30, 2016, \$521,810 of the Town's bank balance of \$1,786,177 was exposed to credit risk as follows:

Certificates of deposits totaling \$916,285 are included in cash in the accompanying financial statements. The certificates bear interest at varying rates and have maturities ranging between nine months and one year, with penalties for early withdrawal. General Information about the Pension Plan

Plan Description

The MainePERS State Employee and Teacher Plan (the Plan) is a multiple-employer cost sharing plan with a special funding situation. As of June 30, 2015 there were 231 employers, including the State of Maine, participating in the plan. The State of Maine is also a non-employer contributing entity in that the State pays the initial unfunded actuarial liability on behalf of teachers, while school districts contribute the normal cost, calculated actuarially, for their teacher members.

Pension Benefits

Benefit terms are established in Maine statute. The System's retirement programs provide defined retirement benefits based on members' average final compensation and service credit earned as of retirement. Vesting (i.e., eligibility for benefits upon reaching qualification) occurs upon the earning of five years of service credit (effective October 1, 1999, the prior ten year requirement was reduced by legislative action to five years for State employees and teachers). In some cases, vesting occurs on the earning of one year of service credit immediately preceding retirement at or after normal retirement age.

Normal retirement age for State employees and teachers is age 60, 62 or 65. The normal retirement age is determined by whether a member had met certain creditable service requirements on specific dates, as established by statute. The monthly benefit of members who retire before normal retirement age by virtue of having at least 25 years of service credit is reduced by a statutorily prescribed factor for each year of age that a member is below her/his normal retirement age at retirement. The System also provides disability and death benefits which are established by statute for State employee and teacher members and by contract with other participating employers under applicable statutory provisions.

Upon termination of membership, members' accumulated employee contributions are refundable with interest, credited in accordance with statute. Withdrawal of accumulated contributions results in forfeiture of all benefits and membership rights. The annual rate of interest credited to members' accounts is set by the System's Board of Trustees and is currently 5.0%.

Member and Employer Contributions

Retirement benefits are funded by contributions from members and employers and by earnings on investments. Disability and death benefits are funded by employer normal cost contributions and by investment earnings. Member and employer contribution rates are each a percentage of applicable member compensation. Member contribution rates are defined by law or Board rule and depend on the terms of the plan under which a member is covered. Employer contribution rates are determined through actuarial valuations.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflows of Resources and Deferred Inflows of Resources Related to Pensions

The net pension liability, deferred inflows of resources and deferred outflows of resources related to pensions were measured at June 30, 2015, the latest measurement date available, and the total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. These amounts are reported on the Georgetown School Department's (Department) financial statements as of June 30, 2016. The Department's deferred outflows of resources related to pensions balance, as of the measurement date, was increased by contributions to pensions made in the current fiscal year. These amounts were adjusted accordingly as reductions to expenses in the Statement of Activities.

At June 30, 2015, the Department reported a liability for its proportionate share of the net pension liability that reflected reduction for State pension support provided to the Department. The amount recognized by the Department as its proportionate share of the net pension liability, the related State support, and the total portion of the net pension liability that was associated with the Department were as follows:

The Department's proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the Department's long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating school districts and the State, actuarially determined. At June 30, 2015, the District's proportion was 0.001387% which was an increase of 0.000031% from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2014.

Actuarial Methods and Assumptions

The collective total pension liability for the Plans was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2015 and 2014, using the following methods and assumptions applied to all periods included in the measurement:

Actuarial Cost Method

The Entry Age Normal actuarial funding method is used to determine costs. Under this funding method, the total employer contribution rate consists of two elements: the normal cost rate and the unfunded actuarial liability (UAL) rate.

The individual entry age normal method is used to determine liabilities. Under the individual entry age normal method, a normal cost rate is calculated for each employee. This rate is determined by taking the value, as of age at entry into the plan, of the member's projected future benefits, and dividing it by the value, also as of the member's entry age, of his or her expected future salary. The normal cost for each employee is the product of his or her pay and his or her normal cost rate. The normal cost for the group is the sum of the normal costs for all members.

Experience gains and losses, i.e., decreases or increases in liabilities and/or in assets when actual experience differs from the actuarial assumptions, affect the unfunded actuarial accrued liability.

Asset Valuation Method

The actuarial valuation employs a technique for determining the actuarial value of assets which dampens the swing in the market value. The specific technique adopted in this valuation recognizes in a given year one-third of the investment return that is different from the actuarial assumption for investment return.

Amortization

The net pension liability of the Plan is amortized on a level percentage of payroll over the amortization period then in effect under statutory and constitutional requirements. All other gains, losses, and changes are amortized over ten year periods beginning on the dates as of which they occur.

Significant actuarial assumptions employed by the actuary for funding purposes as of June 30, 2015 and June 30, 2014 are as follows:

Investment Rate of Return - 7.125% per annum for the years ended June 30, 2015 and June 30, 2014, compounded annually.

Salary Increases, Merit and Inflation - State employees, 3.50% to 10.50% per year; Teachers, 3.50% to 13.50% per year.

Mortality Rates - For active State employee members and non-disabled retirees of the State employee plan, participating local districts, legislative and judicial plans, the RP2000 Tables projected forward to 2015 using Scale AA are used; for active members and non-disabled retirees of the teachers' plan, the ages are set back two years; for all recipients of disability benefits, the Revenue Ruling 96-7 Disabled Mortality Table for Males and Females is used.

Cost of Living Benefit Increases - 2.55% per annum for the years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan assets was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major class of assets. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in the pension plan's target asset allocation as June 30, 2015 are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate

The discount rate used by the Plan to measure the collective total pension liability was 7.125% for 2015 and 2014. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that plan member contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that employer and non-employer entity contributions will be made at contractually required rates, actuarially determined. Based on these assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments to current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Note J - Risk Management

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets, errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the Town either carries commercial insurance, or is effectively self-insured. Currently, the Town carries commercial insurance for any risks of loss to which it may be exposed.

Based on the coverage provided by commercial insurance purchased, the Town is not aware of any material actual or potential claim liabilities, which should be recorded at June 30, 2016.

Note K - Commitment with Related Party

The Town has entered into contracts with the road commissioner for winter road snow plowing and sanding for the year ending June 30, 2017 and 2018. The annual cost of the contracts for the years ending June 30, 2017 and 2018 is approximately \$203,000 and \$211,000, respectively. For the year ended June 30, 2016, the road commissioner was paid approximately \$213,000 for road related services.
