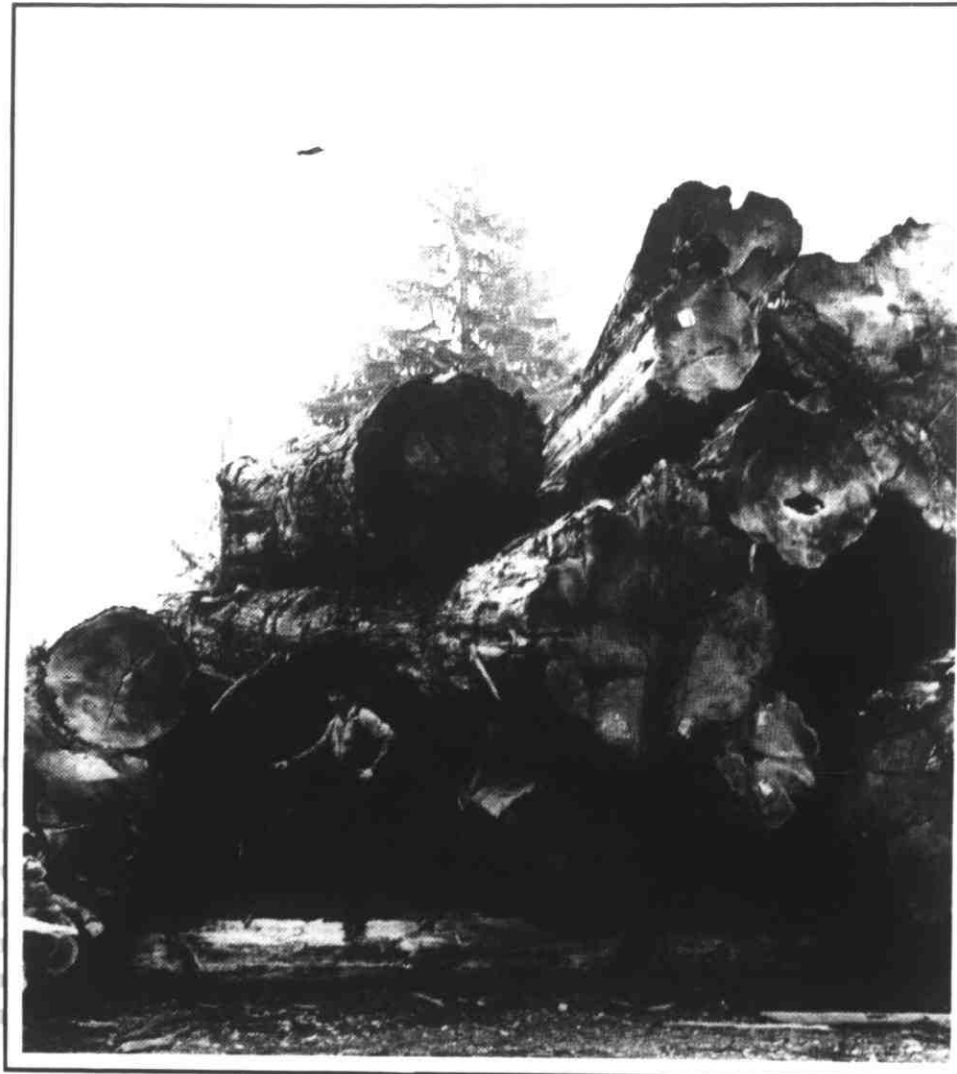

This will help pave the way for the removal of the word "male" in our current

bylaws and, membership willing, this will be the most democratic process for us to follow. Vice Presidents' Reports

1ST VICE PRESIDENT

DAVE BLASEN 53110

Since my last report, I have had the opportunity to visit two outstanding clubs—Cowichan Club #229 (Vancouver Island), directed by president Mike Hooper and Detroit Club #28, directed by president Nelson Cady. Although these two clubs are over 2,000 miles apart, both are faced with economic pressures of their own—timber issues in the Cowichan area and the plight of the auto industry in Detroit. In spite of these pressures, both clubs are doing well. They both have the necessary ingredients for success—a statement of purpose and a project. In most cases, clubs with these ingredients will effect a greater degree of member participation in working toward their goals.

In my last report, I wrote about our membership goals: Retention (retain 90% of membership), Reinstatement (reinstate 60% of those lost last year), and Recruitment (bring in a 20% increase in members over last year). At the annual board meeting in Leura, the Supreme Nine were given the responsibility of assisting clubs in their jurisdictions in meeting these goals. To do this, each S-9 was provided written guidelines for distribution to the person in each club who is responsible for membership. Recognizing the great diversity in clubs, these guidelines were written as a tool (not as a set of instructions) to help meet membership goals. Some suggestions may fit your club; some may not. If you have not yet received a copy of these guidelines, contact your S-9 or the Gurdon office.

Beginning January, we will be running articles in Random Lengths Locator. The first article, "What is Hoo Hoo?", provides information about our organization and a form that can be sent to the Gurdon office to obtain more information. Gurdon will provide the names of responding individuals to the appropriate club for contact.

At this time, it is too early to report the results of our current membership drive; a complete report will be available in the May issue. Remember, in order for this membership campaign to be successful, all members—from the newly initiated to the Rameses—must participate. No one person can succeed by his efforts alone. Let's make this a year of growth for Hoo-Hoo International!

HOO-HOO INTERNATIONAL ANTI-TRUST POLICY

The following anti-trust policy as adopted and practiced by Hoo-Hoo International is printed here for the purpose of public information.

"Neither Hoo-Hoo International nor any of its jurisdictions, officers, directors, or members will participate in, meet for the purpose of, or even authorize any discussions, agreements, comparisons or other conduct which could be construed as or give rise to an inference of contracting, conspiracy, combination, tying, unfair competition, monopolization, pricing or any other activity which could lead to an inference of restriction of competition, price fixing, markups, discrimination, market allocation, or any other conducts prescribed by the Sherman Antitrust Act, the Clayton Act or any other state or federal law relating to competition.

"The purpose of our fraternity is to provide a vehicle for social gatherings, comradery, and most importantly, the promotion and enhancement of the forest products industry, both in this country and throughout the world. This policy has been carried on since the inception of this fraternity and is implemented through each member and jurisdiction's participation in community affairs, education, and generally in the promotion of forest products."

To reinforce this comparison of membership past and current, Joyce Taylor, editor of the Log & Tally, asked me for some comparative photos of Atlanta in 1920 and 1991, and as I looked at these photos I realized that I was looking at a city with a 2000 percent increase in population and a Hoo-Hoo club that had shrunk 50 percent. Why???

In 1920, there were few social clubs in the city, and Hoo-Hoo was one of the "only games in town", whereas, in 1991, we, as a club, compete with a staggering number of

alternative sources of entertainment and diversions - big league sports, night life, home entertainment and a host of little league activities.

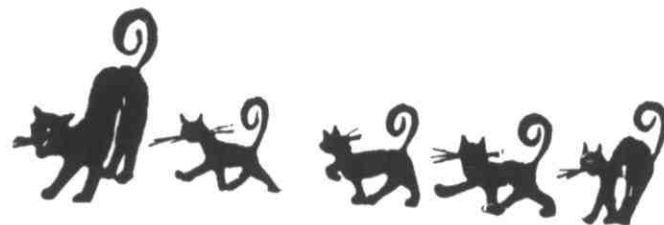

Proposed Bylaw Changes, Seconds and Opposition

ARTICLE IV (as it currently reads) ANNUAL CONVENTIONS

The annual convention of the Order shall be held on Hoo-Hoo day, September 9th, or the nearest available day to September 9th of each year. The first session shall convene the ninth minute after nine A.M. of that day or such subsequent date as may be designated by the International Board of Directors. The place shall be selected by the Board of Directors.

The annual convention shall be composed of delegates from each Jurisdiction at the rate of one delegate for each fifty members or fraction thereof, in good standing in each Jurisdiction. Each Jurisdiction shall be entitled to as many votes at the annual convention as it is to delegates. The delegates present from each Jurisdiction shall be entitled to the number of votes to which their Jurisdiction is entitled. The number of votes cast by any Jurisdiction shall be determined by the Secretary/Treasurer's Report as of August 31, of the calendar year.

Organized clubs in each Jurisdiction shall be entitled to choose one delegate for each fifty members, or fraction thereof, in good standing in the International Order. Each fifty members, or fraction thereof, not affiliated with any club in each Jurisdiction shall be represented by a delegate selected by the Member of the Supreme Nine in that Jurisdiction.

The names of the authorized delegates shall be reported to the International Secretary/Treasurer by the member of the Supreme Nine for each Jurisdiction at least ten (10) days before the Annual Convention.

No quorum shall be necessary at any regularly called meeting of the members; and at any such meeting those present may transact any business properly before any said meeting, or may adjourn said meeting until a later date.

PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGE (submitted by Fred Scheffler)

"The date August 31" change to July 31 to make Article IV as printed to Section 1, Article IV. Section 2 All voting procedures for officers and directors shall follow Section 1 of Article IV.

ARTICLE IV ANNUAL CONVENTIONS

Section 1. The annual convention of the Order shall be held on Hoo-Hoo day, September 9th, or the nearest available day to September 9th of each year. The first session shall convene the ninth minute after nine A.M. of that day or such subsequent date as may be designated by the International Board of Directors. The place shall be selected by the Board of Directors.

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The names of the authorized delegates shall be reported to the International Secretary/Treasurer by the member of the Supreme Nine for each Jurisdiction at least ten (10) days before the Annual Convention.

No quorum shall be necessary at any regularly called meeting of the members; and at any such meeting those present may transact any business properly before any said meeting, or may adjourn said meeting until a later date.

Section 2. All voting procedures for Officers and Directors shall follow Section 1 of Article IV.

ARTICLE XIV (as it currently reads) FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the order shall terminate on the 31st of August in each year.

PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGE (submitted by Fred Scheffler)

To change the date to "31st of July in each year".

ARTICLE XIV FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the order shall terminate on the 31st of July in each year.

ARTICLE XVIII (as it currently reads) AMENDMENTS

"These Bylaws may be amended at any annual convention of the order by a three-fourths vote of the delegates at the convention, provided such proposed amendments have been submitted to the membership for their study and perusal at least 60 days prior to the opening date of the annual convention."

PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGE (submitted by Fred Scheffler)

"These Bylaws may be amended at any annual convention of the order by a three-fourths vote of total votes returned to Hoo-Hoo International by members in good standing. Each member, "(1) one member (1) one vote", will receive a ballot by way of direction by the Board of Directors, provided such proposed amendments have been submitted to the membership for their study and perusal at least 60 days prior to the opening date of the annual convention."

SECONDS TO THE PROPOSED CHANGES

In line with the vagueness of the voting procedures as written in Article IV, we cannot take away from the annual convention the right to vote for the officers and directors of Hoo-Hoo International which would enhance the officers running for a position to campaign at the Hoo-Hoo International Convention. I second the proposed bylaw change made by Fred Scheffler.

OPPOSITION TO THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE BYLAWS CHANGING ARTICLE XVIII

Dear Members:

I am unalterably opposed to changing this Article in this manner, as its expense to HHI would be tremendous, and we cannot afford such a luxury.

It would cost in excess of \$1.00 per member for those members in Jurisdiction IV who return their ballot. The cost for the rest of the membership would be 28 cents for each returned ballot. It would also be an additional expense of \$266.00 for the printing and insertion of the ballot in the *Log & Tally* and \$260.00 for a business reply permit and accounting fee.

1060 members x \$1.00 =	\$1060.00
5003 members x \$.28 =	\$1400.84
Print & Insert	= \$ 266.00
Permit & Fee	= \$ 260.00
TOTAL	= \$2986.84

These figures are calculated on the basis that all members would return their ballot. Naturally, this will not happen. The proponents of this Amendment have not considered all of the costs involved. They indicated that probably a very small percentage would return the ballots. If this is the case, then there is no purpose to the Amendment at all. If the other people are not interested enough to return the ballot then there is no purpose to send them a ballot to return. Furthermore, there is no method proposed to verify that the ballot returned is actually from a paid member. I believe that if this type of voting procedure is desirable, it should certainly be thought out in more depth and come up with some solutions to the obvious problems it will present if approved.

A Tradition Since 1875



The Arlington Hotel, today, dominates the intersection of bustling Central Avenue and scenic East Mountain Drive. Visitors lounging on its spacious veranda have a lovely view of the stately facades of the historic Bath Houses along Bath House Row.

The era of luxurious hotels in Hot Springs began in the early 1870's.

The Arlington Hotel opened on April 15, 1875; it was the largest hotel in the state and the plushiest in town. The handsome wooden structure was three stories high with 120 guest rooms. Gas lights illuminated the spacious rooms and there was a grand court between the structure's two wings. Colonial porches ran the full length of the building to Hot Springs Mountain.

To maintain the Arlington's reputation as a first class hotel and to keep up with competition, the original Arlington was razed. A new 300-room luxurious structure of "Spanish Renaissance or Moorish" design replaced the first Arlington and opened to the public in March, 1893. In Charles Cutter's Guide Book of 1892, he refers to the second Arlington to be "the most elegant and complete hotel in America". The exterior of the second Arlington remained the same although, internally, there were several remodeling periods before the hotel was destroyed by fire on April 5, 1923.

It was on Wednesday, December 31, 1924, that the present Arlington celebrated its opening with a gala New Year's Eve Dinner Dance - exactly 14 months after breaking ground on October 25, 1923.

The three guest elevators have been in operation since 1969, replacing the original hand-operated elevators installed in 1924. Around the hall from the main elevator is the original Bath House elevator - lined with bevelled glass and shining brass - still manually operated today.

The colorful history of the three Arlington Hotels does not lie in their physical beauty and uniqueness alone. Always the center of activities in Hot Springs, the Arlington has hosted hundreds of grand balls and social events since 1875. Dignitaries, politicians, actors, gangsters, and prominent citizens alike have flowed through her doors, bathed in her Bath House, danced to her music and enjoyed the splendor and charm of her stately air.

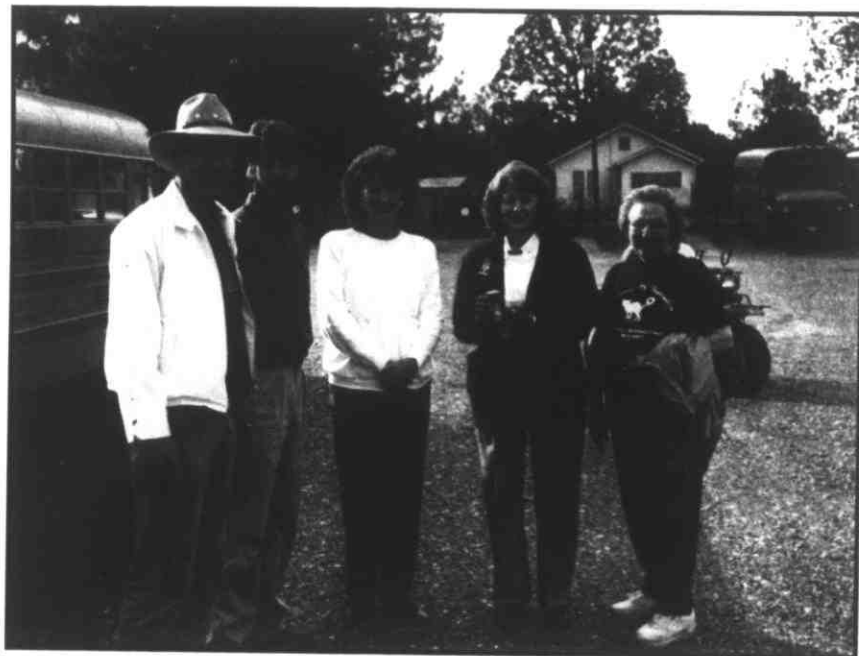

KEN HALLGREN CLUB #139 OF NORTHERN ILLINOIS

The Ken Hallgren of Northern Illinois Hoo-Hoo Club #139 held its first winter educational session in Elgin, October 29. President Tony Vecchiolla called the dinner meeting together to provide members information about changes in the structural panel industry.

Tom Kositzky, representative of the American Plywood Association, informed the group of over 30 people about the new grading and identification marks now being used in the industry. Kositzky also gave the attendees some good tips to pass along to their builders about the proper application of plywood panels.

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Club News

The guests learned that when installing plywood panels on roofing jobs or as floor underlayment, builders should follow two important steps. First, when placing panels on the roof structure, they should leave 1/8" spacings between panels. The space allows for expansion when the wood reaches equilibrium and helps to prevent buckling. Second, when laying floors, builders should nail the underlayment onto the sub-floor, not hammer the nails into the joints. By using this technique, if the building moves, it will prevent the nails from loosening and popping up.

On the November agenda, the Northern Illinois Hoo-Hoo Club hosted another educational seminar in Elgin, November 21. Sponsored by the Illinois Lumber & Material Dealers Association and the Western Wood Products Association, the seminar offered information on new

dimension lumber design values. It addressed all aspects of how the recent changes affect the way structural softwood lumber is used in design and construction.

The program offered two free sessions to attendees of all levels in the building industry: a non-technical session for retailers, wholesalers, and builders and a technical session for architects, engineers, building officials and truss fabricators.

President Vecchiolla was quite pleased with the turnout of both conferences. "Providing continuing education programs to help lumber and building industry people is an achievable goal," he said, "and well worth the efforts of the Northern Illinois Hoo-Hoo Club's commitment to promote these programs."

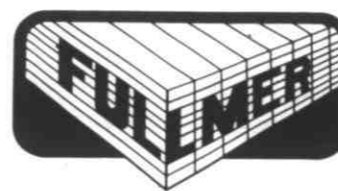

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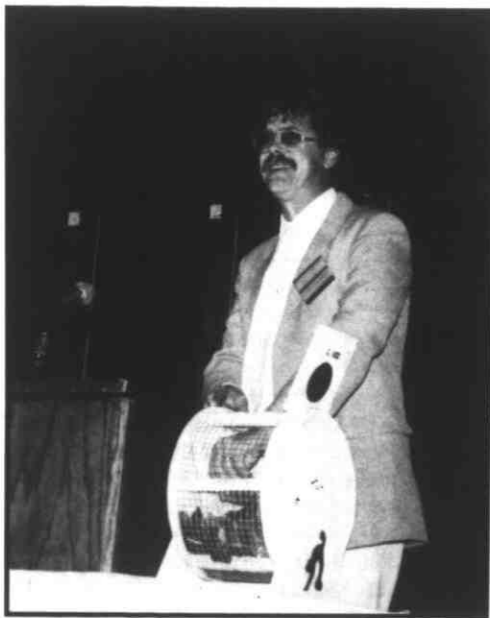

The club's Industry Night is planned for January 22, 1992, in Ukiah, CA.

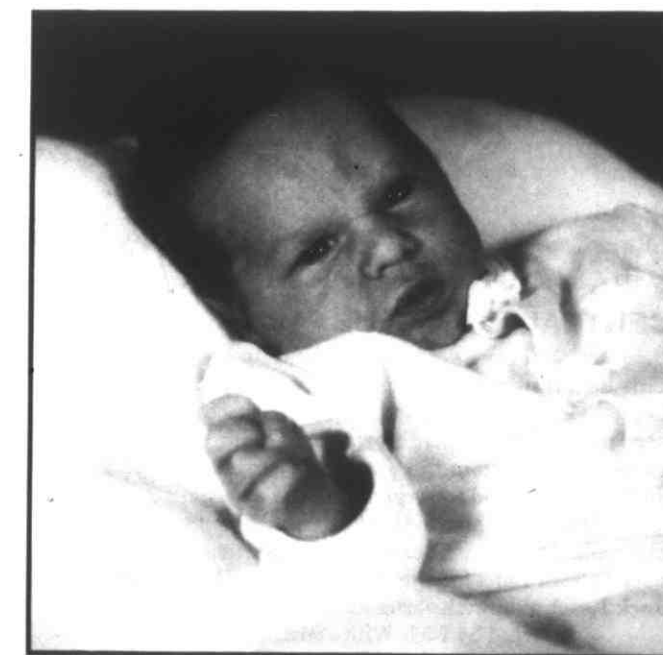

Wood Promotion Award Calls Attention to "Grass Roots" Approach to Wood Promotion



The Hoo-Hoo International Wood Promotion trophy is awarded each year to the club which is judged as having best promoted the use of wood, whether locally, nationally or internationally. It is a coveted award that has recently enjoyed a resurgence of interest among Hoo-Hoo clubs who compete for the award at each annual international convention. Perhaps your club could be the next winner of the Wood Promotion Award.

The purpose of a local Hoo-Hoo wood promotion project is to provide a local "grass roots" approach to wood promotion. The local program should supplement and tie in with the wood promotion activities of regional and national programs, because person-to-person contact and personal influence is a more effective method of selling our side of the wood resource story. Wood promotion projects should be designed to get the broadest local exposure possible to the greatest number of people and should be dramatic enough to have lasting value. Every person in a Hoo-Hoo club's center of influence (city, county and state) should be aware of the role the forest products industry plays in forest maintenance, use, and renewal.

SELECTION OF A WOOD PROMOTION COMMITTEE

The club president is responsible for wood promotion. He should appoint a wood promotion committee with a fireball type, self-motivated chairman to handle the wood promotion project. The club president or another club officer appointed by the president should maintain close contact with the wood promotion committee to be certain they are getting the job done. Committee members with sales experience, merchandising expertise, and public relations experience are the best types of members for the wood committee since a successful wood promotion project is actually a gigantic sales, merchandising, and public relations effort.

SPEAKERS, BUREAU OF WOOD PROMOTION

Every Hoo-Hoo club should, on a continuing basis, have knowledgeable lumbermen available for speaking engagements, on wood promotion. Excellent programs on wood promotion are available from the various lumber associations like the American Plywood Association, Southern Forest Products Association, WWPA, California Redwood Association, etc., and from most lumber manufacturers like Georgia Pacific, Weyerhaeuser, etc. These organizations are most happy to supply local lumbermen with these programs for local use. The local chamber of commerce is a good place to advertise your wood promotion program, as they usually offer a speakers bureau brochure to their members and are most happy to have "Wood Promotion" included.

An active committee can initiate wood promotion programs for social and business groups like Rotary, Kiwanis, Optimist, Lions, Cosmopolitan Clubs, etc. These wood promotion programs are very popular with these groups.

Public and private schools are quite receptive to wood promotion programs. The students are eager to hear our story, and who could select a better audience to hear this important message than school children.

LOCAL EXPOSURE

Local public television is a natural for a local wood promotion program. Thirty minute program time for a "Forestry" presentation on public television can be purchased at extremely reasonable rates. Imagine the exposure available through the TV media. Proper publicity of your TV wood promotion through free ads can insure a good viewing audience when your show is broadcast.

Radio, newspapers, and magazines are also good vehicles for wood promotion activities, and Home Shows and Trade Shows have in the past proven to be quite effective.

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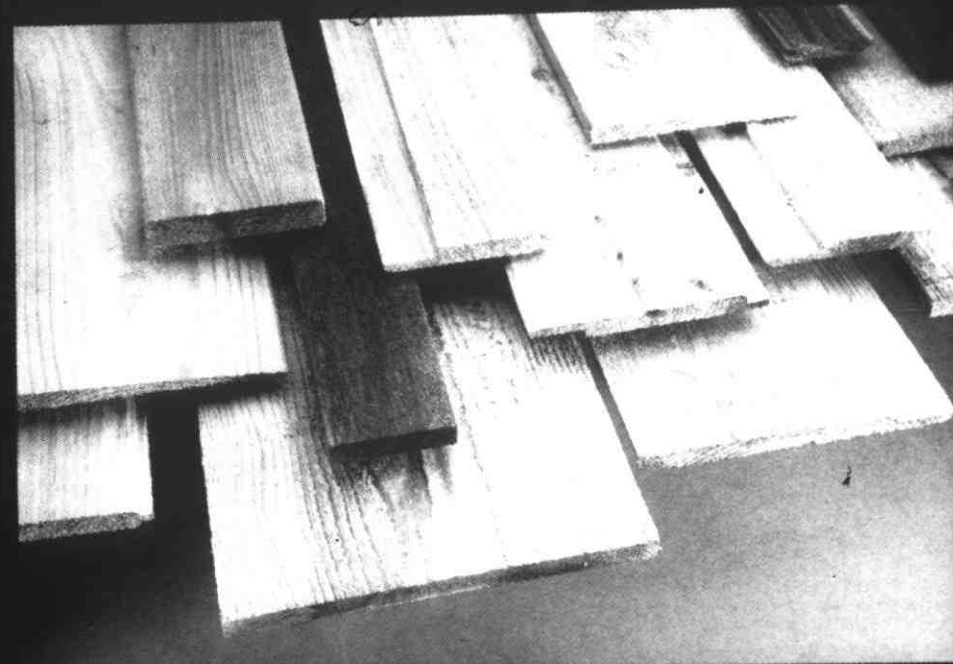
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
