House panel passes bill adding oversight to state agencies

State government agencies could face greater scrutiny when proposing new regulations under a measure an Indiana House committee approved Tuesday.

House government reform committee members voted 7-4 to advance the proposal, which would add another layer of oversight to the policy-making process in Indiana.

State executive agencies are currently required to submit new policy proposals to the attorney general's office. If approved, they are then signed by Gov. Mike Pence. The bill would instead, require agencies to first submit proposals to an office within the Legislative Services Agency for review. The office would then alert the Attorney General's office if any suggested policy falls outside of an agency's legal limit.

"It gives us a red flag up front, as opposed to correcting things after the fact," said Rep. David Wolkins, R-Warsaw, who is sponsoring the bill.

The additional "thin layer of government" would keep agencies from imposing unnecessary and expensive regulations, he said.

Critics of the bill called it unnecessary, since Indiana law already has nine separate legal provisions that require regulators to develop responsible, science-based, statutorily-constrained, and cost-effective policies. The review office also has fairly minimal authority and won't prevent an agency's proposal from moving forward.

Jessie Kharbanda, from the Hoosier Environmental Council, said he's concerned that the oversight is just "a new layer of bureaucracy" and "government red tape" on the taxpayer's dime. According to the bill's fiscal note, the new review agency will cost about \$500,000 a year to operate.

The bill would also stop new policies from going beyond state and federal requirements, sparking criticism from environmentalists who said it would prevent regulators from tailoring federal laws to fit Indiana's circumstances.

Wolkins said the bill provides some flexibility for this. Agencies would still be able to go beyond federal law if the regulation specifically allows state discretion, but Kharbanda said the flexibility is more of a discrepancy and could be open to misinterpretation.

The bill now goes to the House for consideration.

Signups underway for expanded Healthy Indiana Plan

February 3, 2015

The conversion of tens of thousands of people to Indiana's expanded health care program for low-income residents has gone well during its first week, the top state official overseeing the program said Tuesday.

The Family and Social Service Administration has also started accepting new applications for the expanded Healthy Indiana Plan and is preparing an advertising campaign to encourage signups, agency Secretary John Wernert said.

Federal officials last week approved the state-run plan submitted in July from Republican Gov. Mike Pence dubbed HIP 2.0. It uses Medicaid funding to possibly extend coverage to an estimated 350,000 uninsured residents.

"The rollout has been very smooth, mainly because we've been up and ready for several months now," Wernert told the House Ways and Means Committee during an agency budget hearing.

Some 180,000 people who were already part of the previous HIP or Hoosier Healthwise programs have been converted to the new plan and applications are being processed from 6,000 people who were on the HIP waiting list, he said.

HIP 2.0 includes health savings accounts, which involves state contributions based on income levels, and will cover those with incomes below 138 percent of the federal poverty level, or the equivalent of a family of four that has an annual income of about \$33,000.

The basic level for those below 100 percent of the federal poverty level does not require payments from enrollees. But they are required to make co-pays for all services. A second tier of improved coverage is available if enrollees pay a monthly fee ranging from \$1 to \$25 into a health savings account.

Indiana House Minority Leader Scott Pelath, D-Michigan City, said he welcomed the expansion of health care coverage under the state program, but cautioned that not all would likely go perfectly with it.

"If there are problems, let's not use that as a cause to instantly condemn the entire system," Pelath said. "Let's try to fix it."

Wernert said an awareness campaign with television commercials was planned to start next month to encourage HIP 2.0 signups. The program is also being promoted through doctors and hospitals, which can have staff members help patients prepare applications.

"We're already getting lots of calls from providers who weren't participating in our Medicaid program who are now saying, 'Can I get in?'" Wernert said.

Religion-based hiring

The Indiana Senate could soon vote on a bill allowing religious institutions that receive state and local government contracts to make hiring decisions based upon religion.

Senators could vote as soon as Tuesday on whether to approve the proposal and advance it to the House for consideration.

Sen. Travis Holdman, R-Markle, said he sponsored the measure to restore the ability of Indiana Wesleyan University to receive state workforce training grants. The state attorney general's office determined last year that the university's religious lifestyle mandate violated state-contracting requirements against employment discrimination.

The Republican-dominated Senate voted 37-6 on Monday to defeat a proposed amendment from Sen. Tim Lanane, D-Anderson, that would have added sexual orientation to the state's anti-discrimination law.

Massage therapy regulation

A bill that would impose stricter regulations on massage therapists passed the House Public Health Committee on Monday.

House Bill 1360 would require professional massage therapists to be held to the same standards as other health care professionals, according to the bill's author, Rep. Sue Errington, D-Muncie.

"Professional massage therapists welcome more stringent regulation for their industry," Errington said in a written statement. "This legislation helps separate amateur therapists from those who are truly devoted to providing high-quality treatment to their patients."

The measure passed unanimously and moves to the full House for consideration. Audit frequency

The State Board of Accounts could soon receive greater authority to determine the frequency of audits it conducts if legislation passed by the Indiana Senate on Monday becomes law. Senate Bill 326, authored by Sens. Randy Head, R-Logansport, and Doug Eckerty, R-Yorktown, would provide the SBOA with an increased ability to undertake financial reviews of state and local government entities – determined by risk-based criteria established by the Audit and Financial Reporting subcommittee.

Head said the bill is an important step for the state's main accountability organization because the General Assembly has "cut their budget significantly," and it would allow the agency to "audit and receive the results faster to better address problem areas."

The proposed legislation would also allow an executive or fiscal officer of a government unit to establish a fraud hotline for the public to use to report suspected fraudulent activity of officers or employees of that unit. The identity of callers who use the hotline and any recorded audio from the conversation would be exempt from public disclosure.

The bill passed the Senate 43-1 and moves to the House for further consideration. School board felons

The House approved a bill that would remove school board members from their positions if they are convicted of a felony. House Bill 1335 passed unanimously and moves to the Senate for consideration.

The bill extends impeachment provisions that already exist for public officers of cities, counties, towns and townships.

Rep. Steve Stemler, D-Jeffersonville, authored the bill. He said that he was inspired to write the legislation after a Greater Clark Schools board member pleaded guilty to a felony charge of shoplifting and he realized that wouldn't automatically remove her from office.

"A correction needed to be made to include individuals if this situation would ever occur," Stemler said Monday.

Special death benefit

A bill that would provide a special death benefit to emergency medical technicians and paramedics passed the House 92-1 and moves to the full Senate for consideration.

Rep. Karlee Macer, D-Indianapolis, authored House Bill 1080, which would create a fund to pay \$150,000 to family members of an emergency medical services worker who is killed while carrying out work-related duties.

The bill gained abundant support in committee and had no opposition on the floor. Law enforcement officers and firefighters already receive death benefits. But, Macer said, the families of EMS workers do not receive special benefits when their lives are lost in the line of duty.

Ryan Ballard of the Wayne Township Fire Department testified last week before the House Veteran Affairs and Public Safety Committee. Ballard said paramedics and EMTs often work two or three jobs to be the bread winner for their families. That means upon death, their families could be left without help.

Divorce waiting periods

A state senator wants to try to preserve the institution of marriage by lengthening the time some couples must wait to get divorced.

Joseph Zakas, R-Granger, presented Senate Bill 564 to the Family and Children Committee on Thursday but asked the group to postpone a vote to allow more discussion.

The bill would extend the waiting period before a couple finalizes a divorce if children under age 17 are involved. The waiting period would also be extended if one spouse objects to the divorce. Cases involving domestic violence would be exempt from the changes.

Currently, state law imposes a 60-day waiting period for divorces to be finalized. The bill would extend that to 180 days for couples with minor children and 120 days when one spouse objects. Advocates of the bill say that the extended waiting period will help direct couples to resources that can preserve the marriage and spare children the challenges that are associated with a divorce.

Indiana House backs new rules after nursing home scandal

The Indiana House has adopted tighter rules on the conduct of lawmakers following an ethics investigation of a top Republican who fought privately to defeat legislation that would have hurt his family's business.

House members voted 97-0 on Tuesday to approve the revised ethics code.

Major changes in the code include instructions that House members should avoid the appearance of impropriety. It also directs House members to not carry out any public or private advocacy on issues in which they have a personal financial interest.

The tightening follows December's resignation of former House Speaker Pro Tem Eric Turner after The Associated Press reported he privately lobbied to kill a proposed ban on nursing home construction that could have cost his family's business millions of dollars.

New signups for Indiana health care program reach 100,000

Indiana's expanded health care program for low-income residents has enrolled more than 100,000 new people in the two months since it received federal approval.

Gov. Mike Pence said Wednesday that sign-ups for the new Healthy Indiana Plan are off to a good start.

Those new enrollees are in addition to some 180,000 people who were already part of the previous HIP or Hoosier Healthwise programs and were converted to the new plan. Officials estimate 350,000 Indiana residents might be eligible for the program.

The Indiana program uses Medicaid funding but federal officials in January waived some rules to allow Pence's proposal to require some payments from those receiving coverage.

Chief Justice to speak at equality day luncheon

Loretta Rush, chief justice of the Indiana Supreme Court, is the keynote speaker for this year's Women's Equality Day event, set for Aug. 26.

Jennifer Briggs, co-chair for the planning committee, said they wanted the speaker to be representative of strong female leaders in the community.

"This seemed like a natural fit," she said of Rush. "We looked at some national names but decided we wanted someone who our members could connect with, someone working and raising a family that is more like us, not on a national stage. We wanted someone that would really connect with our community."

Rush was appointed to the state Supreme Court by Gov. Mitch Daniels in 2012. She became the first female chief justice in 2014. Before her appointment to the state Supreme Court she was elected Tippecanoe Superior Court 3 judge and served for 14 years, according to Rush's biography on the Supreme Court's website.

Rush serves on the Commission on Improving the Status of Children in Indiana and the Indiana Conference for Legal Education Opportunity as well as liaison to the Division of Supreme Court Administration, the Division of State Court Administration, the Indiana Judicial Center and the Indiana Judges Association. She chairs the Judicial Nominating/Qualifications Commission as chief justice and has represented the state at the National Judicial Leadership Summit on the Protection of Children several times.

Briggs said Rush's commitment to women and children was also a factor in her selection. Rush played a vital role in creating Tippecanoe County's Court Appointed Special Advocate program. There she also implemented a certified juvenile drug treatment court and 24-hour assessment center for youth. Rush earned her undergraduate degree from Purdue University and graduated cum laude from the Indiana University Maurer School of Law in Bloomington.

She is married and has four children.

"It's an honor to have her as our speaker," Briggs said. "She is serving a key role in the state." Women's Equality Day commemorates the 1920 passage of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution that granted women the right to vote.

"Imagine a time when we couldn't vote," Briggs said. "We need to celebrate this because it wasn't that long ago that we couldn't. This celebration is a chance for us to come together and push for more women in leadership roles and a part of decision making."

Ritz told the Senate Appropriations Committee Thursday that nearly \$60 million in the proposed House budget could be diverted toward additional funding for local school districts.

Her proposals included eliminating \$40 million that's been proposed in additional grants for charter schools.

Ritz says she would also like to eliminate the IREAD test in 3rd grade and the 11th grade college and career readiness test. Her total testing plan could be delivered for about \$75 million over two years, which is almost half of what she originally estimated in December.

Legislators are currently considering a proposal that would replace the ISTEP with a national exam.

Indiana school district bans energy, supplement drinks

A school district in central Indiana is banning nutritional supplements and energy drinks from its campuses.

The Western Boone County Community School Corporation held separate meetings for parents and students on Wednesday to inform them of the new district wide policy.

School district officials tell WRTV-TV that they were becoming increasingly concerned about students' health. The athletic director at Western Boone Junior-Senior High School says many students who participate in weight training classes have been seen drinking supplement shakes and using energy boosters.

The district says the ban specifically targets products with creatine and nitric oxide, which can cause heart irregularities, problems with the central nervous system and even strokes. Students who bring any of the now-banned items will face suspension.

Ivy Tech trustees pass resolution in support of Downtown med school Megan Erbacher

In a resolution unanimously approved by Ivy Tech Community College Southwest Board of Trustees, the seven board members "fully" supported the proposed Downtown medical education center request for 223,000 gross square feet, designating 60,000 of it plus Simulation Center space to Ivy Tech.

At a Thursday afternoon meeting, Board Chair David Gunn presented information to other members about the resolution. Gunn said the 60,000 gross square feet would provide space for lvy Tech's Health Sciences and School of Nursing programs to grow. There are 1,000 students enrolled in programs that could benefit from the medical campus, including registered nurse, medical assistants, paramedics, surgical technologists and certified nursing assistants.

First-year Ivy Tech nursing student Nick Reed spoke to the board about his excitement over the opportunities the Downtown medical education center will provide.

"Having this multidisciplinary building in Downtown, the heart of Evansville ... the excitement to have all these disciples come together in one school — EMTs, doctors, CNAs, nurses — we get to come together and work together," Reed, 20, said.

In its resolution, Ivy Tech states the medical campus "will be an immediate boost to the economy as well as to the atmosphere in Downtown Evansville."

Hoosier Hot 50 Jobs projects that, by 2020, two of the top four jobs will be in health care fields, and both will require an associate degree, Gunn said. And the shortage of registered nurses and skilled health care workers has been a challenge statewide for many years, he said.

Ivy Tech officials estimate to see an increase of almost 1,600 students enrolled in programs through the new medical education center, as well as additional students for other institutions.

When the Downtown facility is finished, Ivy Tech plans to relocate all health-field programs to the medical education center.

The current 52,000 square feet of the main campus facility will then be used for other high-demand programs such as welding, automotive, technology and business. It will also allow Ivy Tech to expand community collaborations with WorkOne and high school Career and Technical Education programs.

Ivy Tech Southwest Chancellor Jonathan Weinzapfel gave an update to board members on funding for the project. Weinzapfel said the City Council unanimously committed a \$57 million bond. Gov. Mike Pence included \$19 million for the project in his budget, which the House increased to S37 million. And now the Senate will consider the biennial state budget. Weinzapfel said he expects the Senate version of the budget to be released the week of April 6.

"Then we'll know whether they are building upon the funding already provided by the House for this project. ... So roughly a \$50 million investment by the state to leverage a \$125 million investment overall. Seems to me that is a good deal. ... I'm optimistic that in the end it will be included in the budget," he said.

Weinzapfel noted consequences if the project is not fully funded. Those include less of an economic impact, less project student enrollment and not the same level of programming. Partners in the medical education center are Indiana University School of Medicine-Evansville, the University of Southern Indiana and the University of Evansville. Partner hospitals are Evansville's Deaconess and St. Mary's, Memorial of Jasper and Good Samaritan of Vincennes.

IND ANAPOLIS – Gov. Mike Pence signed a bill into law on Tuesday that gives civil immunity to volunteer healthcare providers.

The new law also provides immunity to licensed medical professionals who volunteer their services at no cost to taxpayers or patients. It applies to physician assistants, advanced nurses, podiatrists, and optometrists and allows them to provide basic treatments like physicals, routine services, and the treatment of minor cuts.

Pence said the new law will encourage doctors to volunteer and give back to the community in that way. "There is no greater importance than ensuring the health and safety of Hoosier families," Pence said.

"Hoosiers are known for their hospitality, and the medical health shield bill allows licensed medical professionals the necessary assurance to continue volunteering and serving in our communities." Rep. Dave Frizzell, R-Indianapolis, said the new law will help Hoosiers get care they need.

"Millions of people in the state are going to receive care they've never received before," Frizzell said.
"That's the important thing."

Pence signed the bill at Shepherd Community Center in Indianapolis where he met with doctors and community members.

"It will proceed simply out of the heart of people who believe that a part of the calling of their profession is to come alongside those most vulnerable and most in need," Pence said.

The law will take affect on July 1.

IND ANAPOLIS – Gov. Mike Pence signed a bill into law on Monday that is designed to lower infant mortality rates in the state.

The new law establishes the Safety Protecting Indiana's Newborns grant program and has been referred to throughout the session as Safety PIN.

The General Assembly allocated \$8 million for the first fiscal year of the program starting July 1 and \$5.5 million for the second. In the first year, \$2.5 million of the allocation will be to develop a web application that will be used as an outreach program for at-risk mothers.

Pence said in a statement that his administration is committed to lowering the infant mortality rate. "Currently, on average, seven Hoosier babies for every 1,000 births do not live to see their first birthday, and reducing this rate remains the top priority of the Indiana State Department of Health," Pence said. "But this is not just about the statistics—this is about reducing the heartbreak of infant mortality for Hoosier families."

Dr. Jerome Adams, commissioner of the health department said infant mortality has many causes, but there are ways to fight it.

"Local programs that help expectant mothers get prenatal care, understand the importance of safe sleep, encourage and make it easier for new moms to breastfeed, and help expectant mothers to get off drugs, alcohol and tobacco, are absolutely essential if we are going to save babies' lives," Adams said. House Speaker Brian Bosma, R-Indianapolis, said lawmakers were pleased to passed the Safety PIN legislation this session.

"The very creative means of leveraging those funds for the private sector and civic groups, health groups to make a difference without a government mandate (saying) that hears how you have to do it," Bosma said. "We're very hopeful for that one."

The program will be administered by the Indiana State Department of Health and will take effect on July 1.

The law takes effect immediately.

It comes after Pence declared an emergency and created a temporary needle exchange program in Scott County, where more than 140 people have been diagnosed with HIV. The cases are all tied to intravenous drug use.

"Since that time, our public health community has worked tirelessly to confront this outbreak," Pence sald in a statement. "Our administration worked with members of the Indiana General Assembly to construct a legal framework under which Scott County and other counties could respond to public health emergencies in the future, and I am pleased to sign SEA 461 into law today."

Originally, though, Pence said he opposed a statewide needle exchange program. The resulting compromise requires local governments to prove to the Indiana State Department of Health that a hepatitis C or HIV epidemic is occurring. Hepatitis C is also spread through shared needles and typically is an early indicator of a problem.

Last year, the House approved a bill to study needle exchange programs but it died in the Senate. This year, lawmakers said they acted to try to avoid the kinds of programs occurring in Scott County. "am grateful for the efforts of legislators in both political parties for moving this important public health measure forward in a timely way," Pence said. "This measure will save lives and give public health officials the broadest range of options to confront this and other public health emergencies in the future."

Firm can give hiring preferences to vets under bill Pence signed into law

IND ANAPOLIS – Gov. Mike Pence has signed a bill into law that lets companies give preference to veterans in hiring or promoting workers.

"Our Hoosier heroes deserve our utmost respect, and we owe them a debt of gratitude that can never be repaid," Pence said in a statement. "The legislation I sign today will ensure these courageous men and women have every opportunity for success in their chosen careers after putting their lives on the line for our freedom."

Senate Bill 298 passed the House and Senate unanimously.

The bill requires the Indiana Department of Veterans Affairs and the Indiana Department of Workforce Development to verify veterans preference programs.

The Governor also signed the following hills:

House Bill 1497, which boosts the requirements for the Jobs for Hoosiers program. The program requires individuals filing for unemployment to visit a WorkOne center within the first four weeks of receiving benefits and requires a person collecting unemployment to participate in reemployment.

House Bill 1104, which allows the State Board of Accounts to prioritize audits for local units of government the agency determines to be at the highest risk of loss due to fraud and noncompliance with state requirements.

State offers jobs help to HIP 2.0 members

IND ANAPOLIS — Members of state's health insurane plan for low-income Hoosiers will now have access to career development resources.

The Family and Social Services Administration announced the creation of the Gateway to Work program on Monday. Only Healthy Indiana Plan members will be eligible to join Gateway to Work, which is designed to help low income Hoosiers secure jobs.

Gateway to Work will help Hoosiers complete job applications, create resumes, and hone their interviewing skills. Some funds for the program will also go toward providing transportation to or clothes for job interviews.

"Gateway to Work and Healthy Indiana Plan are ideally matched because they give low-income Hoosiers a set of parallel tracks toward improving their health, their lives and the lives of their families," Gov. Mike Pence said in a statement.

FSSA Communications Director Jim Gavin said the program was submitted as part of the initial HIP 2.0 waiver last year. He said participation in Gateway to Work is not a requirement for HIP members.

"Making it mandatory would require approval from (Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services), and CMS has rejected similar proposals from other states," Gavin said.

Gavin said while only HIP members are eligible for Gateway to Work right now, it could be expanded in the future.

The state will provide \$650,000 for the program, Gavin said. That money — which covers half of the program's total cost — will come from eigarette tax revenues. Gavin said federal funds will cover the remaining 50 percent.

The FSSA said it's sending roughly 300,000 letters to HIP customers to inform them about Gateway to Work services.

Brainard wins in Carmel, Hogsett, Brewer win in Indianapolis

A five-term mayor of an affluent Indianapolis suburb known for its sustained building boom defeated a challenger in the Republican primary who said the city was spending too much and would eventually need to raise taxes.

Mayor Jim Brainard, who ran on a campaign that Carmel would continue to thrive if the city continued to invest in development, handily defeated City Council President Rick Sharp.

"We're going to move ahead and continue to build a city so it can compete with the best places anywhere in America so it's a great place to live, work raise a family and run a business," Brainard said Tuesday night by telephone. "We won by a good margin. That's an indication of trust. I want to make sure that we continue to fulfill that trust."

Sharp, a city councilman for 12 years, ran on a platform of fiscal restraint, saying he would cut spending and pay down debt. He warned voters that the future of the city 15 miles north of Indianapolis was in jeopardy because of overspending. Sharp said the problem was that everything looks fine in Carmel now.

"This is a beautiful community, wonderful amenities and the problem we were talking about coesn't really hit for 10 or 12 years. I guess we were not effective enough at communicating that message to voters that we need to make policy changes now to avoid the problem," he said.

There was no Democratic candidate running in the Carmel primary. Carmel was one of 115 Indiana cities holding mayoral primaries Tuesday.

In Indiana's biggest city of Indianapolis, former U.S. attorney Joe Hogsett easily defeated community activist Larry Vaughn in the Democratic primary, while restaurateur Chuck Brewer, an Iraq War veteran, defeated three challengers to win the Republican race. Hogsett and Brewer are seeking to succeed Greg Ballard, a Republican who decided against running for a third term.

Hogsett said crime will be one of the issues he will be focusing on for the fall campaign.

"There's been a crime epidemic that seems to have a gripped our city for the last two or three years," he said.

In South Bend, incumbent Mayor Pete Buttigleg beat Democratic primary challenger Henry Davis Jr., a Common Council member who had come under criticism for posting an explicit photo on Facebook last year and for pleading guilty to reckless driving after driving the wrong way on a highway. Buttigleg will tace small business owner Kelly Jones, who was unopposed in the Republican primary, in November. He won the general election four years ago with 74 percent of the vote. South Benc hasn't had a Republican mayor in more than 40 years.

Buttigleg called the primary win a strong vote of confidence, and said he won't take the general election for granted.

"We think we have a strong advantage going into November. But if you ever take an election for granted you deserve what you get," he said.

Fort Wayne Mayor Tom Henry defeated two challengers in the Democratic primary, receiving 76 percent of the vote, and in November will face City Councilman Mitch Harper, who defeated three other Republican challengers with 84 percent of the vote.

Focus now turns to mayoral campaign

Voters could be forgiven for barely noticing amid the sound and fury of bruising Democratic primary campaigns, but the two major party candidates for Evansville mayor were on Tuesday's ballot too. Running unopposed, Republican Mayor Lloyd Winnecke collected 1,723 votes. Democratic challenger Rep. Gail Riecken, also running without apposition, received 3,785 votes.

And therein lies perhaps the biggest threat to Winnecke's re-election: Even accounting for the fact that Democrats had more competitive and contentious primary elections than Republicans Tuesday, Evansville is a Democratic city. Winnecke is just the third Republican to lead it since H.O. "Hank" Roberts' defeat in 1955.

Aware that he won in 2011 with the aid of Democratic infighting, Winnecke knows what he's up against this time.

"I think in our first three-plus years in office we've proven that we represent the entire city," said Winnecke, who has courted traditionally Democratic constituencies since taking office in January 2012. "We've built really strong coalitions across party lines, across political demographics and I think as a result, you have a more engaged community."

That doesn't mean Riecken won't try to sharpen the differences between her and Winnecke. The veteran legislator has indicated, for one, that she will have something to say about the city's decision under Winnecke to Ican Earthcare Energy \$200,000 in federal funds to start a green energy facility in the former Whirlpool plant on U.5, 41. Those plans fell apart amid revelations about troubled financial histories of Earthcare and its executives, and now the company is struggling to pay back the loan.

Critics called it had judgment and sloppy vetting. Winnecke called it an aggressive pursuit of new employers that simply didn't pay off.

"We're disappointed that it didn't pan out. Not everything works the way you want," the 54-year-old mayor said.

Riecken likely begins by working to solidify her party's factions, which just finished battling in a handful of hotly contested primaries.

"The first thing I have to do after this election is bring this team together and talk to them about the office and the opportunity of working together — what we can do in terms of walking and mailing," the 69-year-old Riecken said. "But I do think after this fight in the primary is that they will pull back together. I wanted to stay away from a lot of the confrontational thoughts and actions that caused people to have real hard feelings. Hopefully they can look beyond that and recognize the importance of regaining this mayoral seat back."

For Riecken, the time also has come to hit the campaign trail full-time. Since declaring her candidacy in January, she's been able to do campaign work only after-hours and on weekends due to her work in the State Legislature.

Despite that, she said she is pleased with her campaign's fundraising effort for the first quarter of 2015. Riccken's campaign raised \$111,445 for the quarter. Riccken, who acknowledges Winnecke will outspend her, reported having \$85,572 in the bank on her last report. Winnecke reported having \$433,698 on hand.

Riecken said her fundraising will continue in earnest, and so will other campaign activities.

"(Monday), as an example, I was able to do call time and hit a neighborhood meeting that night," she said. "That's pretty much going to be the flavor from now on."

Riecken likely will get help from the Indiana Democratic Party, although decisions about what form that aid will take depend on political developments in other cities with competitive mayoral races.

John Zody, chairman of the state party, said financial and organizational support will be available to the candidate.

"We don't like to tell campaigns what they need. We like to help them where they believe they need help," Zody said. "Obviously, money's tight everywhere — but organizational support, we've already been involved with her campaign.

"We're going to try to help Gail however we can. That decision's already made. It's just a matter of what that is."

Riecken has criticized Winnecke's handling of city finances and promised a city government that is more "transparent." She has yet to release many specific policy positions, but said those will be forthcoming. "It's important for me to be able to talk to people and get their input on the ideas I have," Riecken said. "I have spent some time doing that over the last few months and we are in the process of forming those statements, and we will be pouring those out very soon. I don't think we can make light of this issue on spending and transparency. I think that's something people are very interested in. That's going to be an overriding theme, I believe."

While Democrats battled it out in the spring primaries, Winnecke's campaign quietly gathered nuts for the winter. The mayor's aides report fundraising has continued unabated since the pre-primary campaign finance report showed almost \$434,000 on hand.

Ensconced in the lobby of the former Old National Bank building at 420 S. Main St., the Winnecke campaign has three paid staffers and claims hundreds of volunteers. Winnecke has hired 27-year-old Matt Humm, who has worked in congressional campaigns, to manage his re-election effort. Humm managed 9th District U.S. Rep. Todd Young's successful 2014 re-election campaign, having served in other capacities for 2nd District U.S. Rep. Jackie Walorski and the Indiana Republican Party before that.

Winnecke has never lost an election. He has held office continuously since shortly after the 1999 city campaign, when he was selected in a Republican Party caucus to succeed then-newly elected Mayor Russ Boyd Jr. on the Vanderburgh County Council.

In 2002, in a County Council re-election campaign that attracted 12,125 voters, Winnecke defeated Democrat Chris Walsh by 61 percent to 39 percent. Winnecke had a GOP primary opponent in his 2006 council campaign but no Democratic opponent. He was unopposed again when he sought a County Commissioners seat in 2008.

Running for mayor in 2011, Winnecke first crushed little-known primary opponent Douglas DeGroot with 92 percent of the vote and then defeated Democrat Rick Davis with 54 percent. In that campaign, Winnecke was aided by Democratic infighting between supporters of the late Davis and other Democrats who resented Davis' challenges to some of the party's elected officials. Some of the latter group worked openly to help Winnecke defeat Davis in 2011, and Davis supporters accused party establishment figures of doing the same thing behind the scenes.

Most Indiana homes not tested for meth contamination.

Although Indiana has led the nation in meth busts for the past two years, the state's home inspectors don't routinely test for methamphetamine contamination, which can lead to a variety of health problems, according to a newspaper investigation.

With a dally average of more than four meth lab discoveries by law enforcement officials in Indiana, experts say thousands of homes across the state likely have been contaminated by residents making or using the drug, the Indianapolis Star (http://indy.st/1E5A_0I) reported. But many homeowners aren't aware of the risk and don't know meth can be detected through several hundred dollars' worth of testing. Although the state's real estate disclosure form asks sellers specifically about the meth contamination, the law doesn't require real estate agents to verify their answer through testing. It's not part of a standard pre-sale home inspection in Indiana or any other state.

An Indiana State Police public database identifying locations of meth lab seizures dating back to 2007 may be helpful to potential homebuyers, but homes and other sites that have been cleaned up to standards set by the state Department of Environmental Management are removed from the list.

Signs of meth contamination aren't always obvious, and the hazards associated with the drug can linger for months or longer, according to Nick Gromicko of the International Association of Certified Lome Inspectors. Gromicko said many inspectors offer such testing for an additional fee.

" It's a growing concern, and not just for prospective buyers," he said. "Not long ago we had an inspector in daho who was hospitalized" after being exposed to meth residue while going through a home. The presence of meth in a home can lead to severe skin irritation, nausea, diarrhea, body aches, couching and breathing issues, said First Sgt. Niki Crawford, commander of the Indiana State Police meth suppression section. Children, the elderly and people with existing health problems are most at risk. "Symptoms often mimic the flu," Crawford said, "but they will not go away."

The General Assembly allocated \$85 million for the program in the next two-year state budget, which Pence plans to sign into law on Thursday. That money will come from a state amnesty program that's authorized in the state budget.

But that's just one time funding. Pence said the tax amnesty will simply jumpstart the initiative and he didn't say where future funding might come from. But he said it was important to have the money to get the program launched.

Participating communities would also be required to use the money to leverage other public and private investments in areas that drive economic development.

"This legislation provides our communities with the necessary framework to continue fostering economic growth and development," said Sen. Ed Charbonneau, R-Valparaiso. "I look forward to seeing the positive impact these projects will have on Hoosiers."

In addition to House Bill 1403, Pence also signed a number of bills into law that were on his agenda.

- HB 1303 provides highly-skilled professionals a voluntary alternative to licensing, eliminates arbitrary
 barriers to employment, and reduces costs for consumers by giving them the information they need to
 make better choices about services they buy and people they hire.
- SB 441 simplifies the tax code to reduce the paperwork burden for Hoosiers and incentivize investment in Indiana.
- SB 412 requires electric utilities to file energy efficiency plans with the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission meant to ensure more affordable and reliable energy for Hoosiers.

Indiana Gov. Pence signs utility energy-efficiency bill

Indiana Gov. Mike Pence has signed a new law to reduce state oversight of the energy efficiency programs of major utilities.

Pence approved a measure Wednesday to allow major utility companies to develop their own efficiency programs and charge customers to implement them. The Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission will have final approval over the programs.

Supporters say companies should have the flexibility to choose their own programs, which help decrease electricity use and save ratepayers money.

But some experts say the bill is missing key elements for such programs to be effective and won't save consumers as much as supporters have advertised.

Environmentalists also argue that Indiana will have a harder time meeting federal requirements for reducing carbon dioxide emissions under the new law, which takes effect immediately.

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Most Indiana state parks raising entrance fees \$2 next week

User fees pay about 70 percent of state park operational costs, with the rest coming from Indiana's General Fund.

DNR Director Cameron Clark says visiting a state park or forest is still a great value for families.

A bill that would have allowed government agencies to charge private citizens for public research requests will not go into effect this year.

Senate Enrolled Act 369 was aimed at "increasing transparency," said Sen. Pete Miller, R-Avon, who authored the bill. It would have required local governments and school corporations to list financial information, including expenditures, expenses and balances, online.

But the bill would have allowed public agencies to charge for any research that would take longer than two hours to complete.

Gov. Mike Pence said that provision led him to the decision to veto the bill.

"I vetoed SEA 369 over fee for public record searches," Pence said in a tweet Friday evening. "The cost of public records should never be a barrier to the public's right to know."

SEA 369 would not have allowed agencies to charge the research fee if the information was distributed electronically.

Miller said he plans to re-introduce the "transparency" legislation next session but will likely leave out the public search fee.

"How you find the right balance is what we're after," Miller said. "Apparently \$20 is out of balance." Hoosier State Press Association Executive Director Steve Key said he worked with Miller and House Speaker Brian Bosma, R-Indianapolis, to create the research fee language. Like Miller, Key said he understands Pence's concerns about the fee but wasn't made aware of those concerns ahead of time. "The timing (of Pence's concerns) made it so that nobody could respond," Key said.

But Indiana University Journalism Professor Gerry Lanosga, who is also with the Indiana Coalition for Open Government, said he thinks the veto is "fantastic."

"It would have put up another barrier to citizen access to public records," Lanosga said.

Lanosga said while he "hopes" language including a public research fee would never reappear in the Indiana General Assembly, he's aware it will likely resurface.

"Issues like this do tend to get revived," Lanosga said.

Key said the bill passed the House three times and the Senate twice. He said he's not sure yet if Miller's bill next session will be more successful.

Pence passes law to address vacant housing

City officials in Indianapolis are applauding a vacant housing law signed by Indiana Gov. Mike Pence, despite the fact that it won't let municipalities hold banks responsible for upkeep on so-called "zombie homes."

The law changes a state tax-sale process pertaining to vacant homes that's so complicated that homes often stay empty for years, according to supporters of the law signed last week.

Indiana was among the states hardest hit by urban blight following the housing crisis seven years ago, The Indianapolis Star reported, citing national housing statistics. Indiana had 5,217 vacant homes at the end of January, according to housing data analyst RealtyTrac.

The new rules will allow code enforcement officials to declare properties vacant and speed up the selling process.

"Really, the bottom line is we have made a dramatic effort to allow the local government to be the catalyst to clean up neighborhoods," said state Sen. Jim Merritt, an Indianapolis Republican who sponsored the bill. "It makes it a quicker process and a cleaner process."

But the law has drawn criticism because it prevents municipalities from passing their own ordinances on vacant homes and protects banks holding liens on the homes from regulations requiring their maintenance.

Jeff Miller, a member of the City County Council of Marian County and Indianapolis, is expected to introduce an ordinance this month that would place the same level of accountability on a lender who issues a foreclosure notice on a vacant home as a homeowner. It would hold banks responsible for general upkeep such as cutting the grass and picking up garbage on the property.

Although the new state law will block the local effort, Miller hopes his proposal will send a message to legislators.

Indiana tourism slogan could be victim to fallout over law

An Indiana tourism slogar that was panned as too folksy when it was unveiled last year could be scrapped because of fallout over a religious objections law that critics say makes the phrase ring hollow.

A New York public relations firm is expected to look at the "Honest to Goodness Indiana" slogan as part of a \$2 million review of the impact of the law signed by Gov. Mike Pence in March. Many companies canceled travel to Indiana amid concerns that the law was anti-gay.

Tourism officials say they're still feeling the effects despite changes to the law's language designed to address the discrimination concerns.

Carrie Lambert, executive director of the Indiana Tourism Association, told the Indianapolis Business Journal that the association received 500 emails from people "expressing their disgust" over the law after its passage.

"We have a lot of meeting and tour planners telling us that now is just not the time to announce you're coming to Indiana. The bookings are drying up, and that could cause a big issue in three to five years," Lambert said.

Many say the reaction to the law makes it even harder to sell the "Honest to Goodness Indiana" slogan. Jo Wade, president of Visit Lafayette-West Lafayette, said at the time the hill was passed, "people didn't see that as honest or good."

"People want to grab anything they can to remember their anger toward our state, and Honest to Goodness could be a flare-up," Wade said.

Indiana Office of Tourism Development Executive Director Mark Newman said in a statement that the "Honest to Goodness" summer campaign began in April as scheduled.

But Lambert said there is a "sense of urgency" about the slogan and what direction Porter Novelli will take.

"We have a hurdle in front of us and we have to determine how to get over it," she said.

Not everyone would be happy to see the slogar go.

"The campaign did a great job of highlighting all the fun and entertaining things to do in this state," said. Tom Bannon, executive director of the Anderson/Madison County Visitors Bureau."

Todd Muffley, CEO of Carmel-based Fat Atom Marketing, said he worries that Porter Novelli could take the state in an equally damaging direction.

"If they paint Indiana as too liberal, it's not going to be seen as genuine," he said.

Tallian set to announce run for governor.

"At a time when the Hoosier state is falling further behind, Mike Pence and his allies are satisfied with engaging in destructive, divisive politics," Tallian said in a statement.

During her campaign, Tallian said she will run as a progressive voice for Hoosiers with an emphasis on women's pay and economic success for all Hoosiers.

Tallian was first appointed to the state Senate in 2005 after her predecessor stepped down to become a town clerk-treasurer. Since then, she's been re-elected to the Senate three times, and serves as the ranking Democration the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Former House Speaker John Gregg abnounced last month he would run in the gubernatorial race for the second time. Gregg first ran against current Gov. Mike Pence in 2012, when Pence narrowly defeated him.

Indiana Superintendent of Public Instruction Glenda Ritz said she is also considering a run for the state's highest office, but hasn't officially declared her candidacy.

House Minority Leader Scott Pelath, D-Michigan City, also said he has not ruled out the possibility of running for governor.

Pence has not yet said whether he will seek re-election in 2016.

Tallian will make her formal announcement outlining her agenda at 12:30 p.m. on Tuesday.

Different bird flu strain detected in Indiana backyard flock

Bird flu has been found in a backyard poultry flock in northeastern Indiana, and it's the first time the specific strain in question has been detected in the central U.S., animal health officials said Monday. The H5N8 virus found in Whitley County is different from the H5N2 virus that has led to the loss of more than 30 million chickens, turkeys and other birds since March in 13 states, including Minnesota and Wisconsin, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said.

Some birds in the Whitley County flock of 77 ducks, geese, chickens, turkeys and other species have died, the agency said. The remaining birds were removed, the indiana State Board of Animal Health said. The board said it was checking with nearby poultry owners to see if the disease has spread. The board said it is coordinating with the USDA, the Indiana State Poultry Association and the Indiana Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory in responding to the disease.

Indiana is a leading poultry-producing state, nationally ranked first in the production of ducks and fourth in turkeys.

The board encourages backyard poultry owners to watch for signs of bird flu and report illnesses and deaths to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Signs include sudden death, lack of energy or appetite, decreased and misshapen egg production; nasal discharge, coughing, sneezing and diarrhea. Bird flu doesn't affect the safety of eating eggs or poultry and poses little risk to humans. No human infections with the virus have been detected, the USDA said.

Bird flu can be carried by free-flying waterfowl such as ducks, geese and shorebirds. The occurrence in Whitley County west of Fort Wayne is the first time the H5N8 strain has been detected in the Mississippi flyway for migrating birds over the central U.S. The H5N8 strain previously had only been confirmed in the Pacific flyway after being detected in Oregon and Washington.

New HPAI outbreaks hit U.S. states as global poultry bans expand

lowa has reported new outbreaks of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) — and Nebraska became the 16th U.S. state to do so since December — even as the world continues to list more import bans of poultry and poultry products from U.S. states.

The lowa Dept. of Agriculture announced that <u>four more lowa farms</u> have tested positive for the H5N2 strain of bird flu, including for the first time a broiler farm raising 700 chickens for meat. The rest of the affected birds are egg-laying chickens and turkeys in the 15th overall case of an avian

influenza outbreak in Buena Vista County alone. Iowa currently has 49 confirmed cases of bird flu-

in 13 counties.

Meanwhile, USDA officials announced the first confirmed outbreak of avian influenza in Nebraska.

The commercial egg-laying farm in Dixon County has 1.7 million chickens, all of which may be

culled in order to prevent the spread of the H5N2 strain of HPAI. USDA added that nearly 33

million birds have been affected by the current outbreak since the first reports were confirmed in

Dec. 2014.

The recent news sparked an expanded ban from Hong Kong and one by Ecuador, specifically

covering poultry and poultry products from Nebraska and all U.S. states, respectively. Hong Kong

imports about 267,000 metric tons of chilled and frozen poultry meat and 530 million eggs from

U.S. sources each year. USDA officials estimate that Ecuador imported live poultry, poultry meat,

and poultry products including eggs and egg products from the United States worth about \$6

million in 2014.

USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) has also updated its list of poultry export

requirements from 14 foreign countries as reports of more confirmed infections are announced.

Exemption on equipment tax for small businesses about to take effect.

Small business owners in Indiana soon won't have to pay a tax on their equipment.

For those businesses, the Indiana General Assembly made permanent during this year's legislative session an exemption from the business personal property tax. The move comes a year after lawmakers approved giving counties the option to remove the tax for businesses acquiring less than \$20,000 in machinery or equipment in a given year.

Negotiations over the option to lower the business personal property tax became a large talking point for lawmakers in 2014. The exemption passed this year will cover approximately 150,000 business filers. State Sen. Brandt Dershman, who authored the legislation, said talk of eliminating the tax for small business owners got entangled in the larger debate over the lax during last year's General Assembly session.

"When they are first brought up, there is a concern about new ideas in general, and so it takes some time to socialize the issues and work through the potential concerns, and I think we did that," said Hershman, a Buck Creek Republican.

Several local government leaders, whose communities receive revenue from the tax, had decried attempts to reduce the tax without providing an option to replace the revenue. This year lawmakers, sought to soothe those concerns by allowing counties to adopt a \$50 fee for small business filers as a way to recoup some of the lost revenue.

Hershman said the exemption is aimed at helping small businesses that pay a small tax burden for their machinery and equipment, but face significant accounting fees to prepare their returns.

The change to exempt small businesses from the tax would result in about a \$7 million revenue loss to counties, according to an analysis by the nonpartisan Legislative Services Agency. The analysis completed last year found Vanderburgh County would lose an anticipated \$455,930; with Warrick County would lose \$8,080.

Matt Greller, executive director and CEO of the Indiana Association of Cities and Towns, said his group was pleased to see the replacement revenue option. He said the \$50 fee won't replace all lost revenue, but it will come close.

"It's still a tremendous reduction in what small business folks will have to pay and pay a CPA to prepare their return," Greller said.

The change for small business owners goes into effect for assessment dates after Dec. 31, 2015. New options also kick in this July for counties seeking to further reduce the tax for businesses. One option exempts new investment in a county, over time leading to a full phase-out of the tax as equipment is retired. The other option expands a tool already in use by local governments across the state that allows the tax to be abated for up to 20 years.

Initial work on RFRA Image repair to cost as much as \$750,000

The cost to repair Indiana's reputation following the fallout over the state's Religious Freedom Restoration Act is beginning to take shape.

The Indiana Economic Development Corp. finalized a contract that could reach \$750,000 with outside public relations firm, Porter Novelli, to develop a marketing campaign aimed at promoting the state's image. But a fuller picture of the cost will come this fall, when the IEDC and the firm are expected to settle on the launch and implementation of the campaign.

The contract states the IEDC and the Indiana Office of Tourism Development are working on a "reputation enhancement initiative" to strengthen the state's brand as a "welcoming place to live, visit and do business."

The state's economic development arm announced in April that it had retained Porter Novelli after controversy over the "religious freedom" law drew criticism nationwide over concerns the law could serve as a mechanism to discriminate against gays and lesbians. Criticism was so intense that Republican legislative leaders and Gov. Mike Pence quickly endorsed a clarification barring the law from being used as a defense to discriminate against any member of the public on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity.

The initial phase of the contract with Porter Novelli runs through the end of September. According to the contract, the firm will assess the state's reputation and create a campaign that's launch ready. Then, the IEDC and the firm will determine the funding required to implement the campaign.

The IEDC will pay for its work with the firm out of its promotional funds, according to agency spokeswoman Abby Gras. It's too early to know costs for Implementing the campaign because It's dependent on the initial phase of work, Gras said.

The contract does not make specific mention of the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, But an IEDC executive vice president told the Courier & Press in April that the "religious freedom" law played a part in the agency's decision to retain the public relations firm.

"The debate about RFRA has affected that," Chris Cotterill, an executive vice president at the IEDC, said in April.

"More people in Indiana are realizing that it makes sense to talk about the reputation of Indiana." Overall, the law sets a judicial standard a court can use to weigh religious objections. Supporters of the law say the standard adds protections for actions Hoosiers take based on sincerely held religious beliefs. But opponents feared that gay and lesbian Hoosiers could face discrimination on the basis of Indiana having such a law.

On May 2 a Courier & Press article said, "(Gov. Mike) Pence said the two-year state budget makes 'a historic investment in education in every form, at every level,' including ... charter schools and vouchers enabling economically poor children to attend private schools."

Show Indiana familles the data, please.

Where are the numbers? What are the five-year trends in low income student private school enrollment? What is the data showing trends in "economically poor children," who have enrolled and still attend the A-B and Four Star private and parochial schools?

According to the www.Indiana.gov transcription of Gov. Pence's 2015 State-of-the-State, he said, "Today some 30,000 low- and middle-income kids are able to attend the school that works best for them because of our choice scholarship program." How many low income vis-à-vis middle income? Does data show the schools that "work best" for the low income students are Indiana-rated excellent schools? The problem for Indiana taxpayers is that this data does not exist.

From February 23-April 10, the Indiana Department of Education and Lexchanged emails about this exact chunk of data. I sought public-private-parochial-charter school data on A-F school grades along with each school's free-reduced lunch enrollment numbers. In April an IDOE technician told me I have to look up each nonpublic school one at a time on the IDOE's COMPASS system. This exposes a giant hole in statements about the success of Indiana's COMPASS system. This exposes a giant hole in statements about the success of Indiana's vouchers and SGO grants. Public school data is assembled in an easy to find and read spreadsheet.

Gov. Pence says the vouchers are helping poor children. We are told to feel all warm and fuzzy about this. We find fuzzy accounting and hide-and-seek data.

In the end, I looked up data for private and parochial schools in Posey, Gibson, Vanderburgh, Warrick and Marion counties. I could be wrong, but no one at the State House can provide me the information. My research shows

- 1. Charter, private and religious schools serving low income students have lower test scores, are not consistently A-B schools; they are not Four-Star schools.
- 2. Religious based, private, and charter schools outside of Indianapolis, generally do not have significant numbers of students on free and reduced lunch program. If they do, they are poorly rated, low scoring schools.
- 3. It is absolutely sickening that we are not providing taxpayers the data for charter, private and parochial schools to the same degree we demand of public schools, since all school types receive taxpayer money. Indiana Republicans are starting to see that our experiment in funding three school systems has no oversight. Although promised this funding would help the most in need, we cannot verify the help is

being delivered. If private, religious-based and charter schools are providing this data, then the state is doing a disservice by not compiling it.

Beginning this summer the governor and IDOE need to show taxpayers the data regarding how the needlest are helped by tax supported voucher and SGO grants. Also, how does this affect the 90 percent of students attending Indiana public schools?

IND ANAPOLIS – Gov. Mike Pence plans to announce that he'll run for reelection during the GOP's spring dinner next month.

Indiana Republican Party Chairman Jeff Cardwell revealed the news to supporters Monday in an email about the dinner on June 18.

Pence – once considered a possible presidential candidate – had said he'd announce his campaign plans after the legislative session, which ended last month. But it had become increasingly clear that Pence would not enter the crowded Republican presidential field and instead seek a second term as governor. "We are excited the governor will formally announce his plans to seek re-election during our annual Spring Dinner," Cardwell said, "and we look forward to hearing his ideas for the future of our great state." The cinner is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. at Primo Banquet Hall in Indianapolis. Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam is the keynote speaker.

The Indiana Constitution was amended in 1972 to allow governors to serve two consecutive terms in office.

Since then, every governor who has sought a second term has earned one, except Democrat Joe Kernan who had ascended to the position after former Gov. Frank O'Bannon died.

Former House Speaker John Gregg and state Sen. Karen Tallian have announced they'll seek the Democratic nomination for governor. State Superintendent Glenda Ritz has also said she's considering a run.

Textbook rental rates discussed for 2015-16; vote to approve in June

Textbook rental rates for next school year for students in grades K-8 in the Evansville Vanderburgh School Corp, could go down in cost compared to this year.

EVSC Chief Financial Officer Carl Underwood presented the proposed rates to school board members. Monday night. The school board will set textbook fees at its June 1 meeting.

The total proposed textbook rental cost for the 2015-16 school year for regular kindergarten is \$76, compared to this year's rate of \$84.20; first grade for next school year is proposed at \$101.55, a decrease of \$19.20 compared to this year; second grade will also see a decrease of \$19.20 with a proposed rate of \$95.80; third grade is proposed at \$107.35, compared to this year's rate of \$139; fourth grade is expected to be \$89.60 compared to \$124.40; and fifth grade was presented at \$95.60, compared to this year's rate of \$131.10.

Middle and high school book rental rates vary because of the different classes offered at each individual school and/or grade level.

Sixth grade rates can range next year from \$136.99 to \$143.99, a savings range of \$70.21 to \$90.41; seventh grade rental rates are proposed between \$104.83 to \$116.19, a savings range of \$70.17 to \$90.41. And if approved, eighth grade class materials will cost between \$108.68 to \$119.55, a savings

range of \$72.27 to \$92.45. These costs depend on the curriculum used at the school and the classes each student takes.

Grades 6-12 rental fees include netbook/laptop costs as we'll as accidental damage and extended warranty insurance. For students in grades 6-8, total cost is proposed at \$75, compared to last year's \$100. And students in grades 9-12 have the same proposed rate as this year at \$37.50 per semester, or \$75 per year.

No textbooks are used at New Tech Institute, so students there will use full laptops with special software and offerings. The laptop rental rate, which also includes extended warranty and accidental damage insurance, is proposed at the same cost as this year at \$90.50 per semester or \$181 per year. There are several reasons for the cost reductions for next school year, EVSC Chief Communications Officer Marsha Jackson said. Those include teachers in kindergarten through fifth grade changing instruction so the reading workbook is no longer necessary; third-through fifth-graders won't need a health book because that information is incorporated into the Indiana Science Initiative materials; students in grades 6-8 will see a cost reduction for their social studies book from 25 percent to 15 percent because of its age; and netbook costs for middle school students will drop because the EVSC "secured better financing," Jackson said.

Free workbooks for reading, language, English honors and science are given to students in grades 6-8.

In other action at Monday night's meeting:

The K-12 class fees were approved for 2015-16. In elementary and middle school; K-5 art is \$3 per semester; 6-8 general music is \$3 per semester; vocal music \$10 per year; practical arts and lab classes are \$5 a semester; art is \$3 a semester; and advanced art is \$10 for the year. Instrumental music for grade 5-8, without instrument rental, is \$10 for the year. With the instrument rental, it is \$40 per year. High school class fees for math, English, social studies and other classes, with a resource calculated in the book rental rate, is a maximum of \$3 per semester. Classes such as science, art, technology, business and others with a lab component are \$10 maximum for the semester. Instrumental music, vocal music and other high school classes without an instructional resource rental calculated in the book rate is a maximum of \$10 per semester. Instrument rental is \$30 a year. High school principals determine fees based on guidelines.

The 2015 West Terrace School roof replacement project contract was awarded to Midwest Roofing Sheet. Metal for the lowest base bid amount of \$493,000.

Bids for staples, dairy, bakery and paper/plastic products for the 2015-16 school year also were approved by board members.

Farm Boy Food Service and Troyer Foods were awarded the contract for food, staples and supplies. A combined bid of \$2,921,628 was approved for Farm Boy and Troyer Foods, with Farm Boy receiving \$2,277,023.10 and Troyer Foods getting the remaining \$644,504.90.

Prairie Farms received next year's dairy contract for an estimated \$947,564.75.

A & D Distributors received the bakery contract for \$109,530.

Next school year's paper and plastic products contract was awarded to CRS-One Source for \$240,727.75.

New summer camp teaches kids technology Kaitlin Lange Students will have the opportunity to play Minecraft Mania and learn about 3D printing during Evansville Vanderburgh School Corporations' new summer camps as well as many other high-tech activities. EVSC's Summer Creativity Camps give students entering third through sixth grade the chance to take different weeklong technology classes. Classes include sessions on photography, computer coding, digital storytelling and stop motion animation.

Sponsored by parent-teacher associations, the sessions are offered at Highland Elementary School from June 15-19 and Scott Elementary School from June 22-26. Camp participants are not required to be students at either school.

Jerrad Gleim — an EVSC innovation, curriculum, technology specialist — came up with the idea because he couldn't think of any other technology camps in the area. He has a second-grader who he said often asks him questions about technology.

"The purpose of the Summer Creative Camp is to give kids an outlet to get an exposure to some of the creative tools there are out there," Gleim said. "Once they learn some of this stuff and have gotten deep into it, they'll be able to bring it into the classroom during the school year."

DeLyn Beard, an eLearning Coach at Central district, will be teaching Minecraft Mania. In her class, students can collaborate to create new worlds and also explore already created, historically based worlds on the Minecraft video game. She also plans to incorporate leadership skills and writing.

"Every child I know has an account," Beard said. "I have it on my phone because of my best friend's son. I'm with him a lot, so he uses my phone. I've learned a lot from him, and he is 9."

Beard didn't come up with the idea for the class herself. Minecraft is known for its educational value, and there is even a version specifically for school use — MinecraftEdu — that teachers can purchase.

" think kids like it because they get to explore and create," Beard said, "Sometimes those pieces tend to get pushed aside in our classrooms because we are worried about the next test."

Brian Bobbitt, a Cedar Hall Community School engineering teacher, will be teaching the Engineering and Invention Workshop, focused on 3D Printing. During the session, students will design things using Google SketchUp and print them on a 3D printer.

Bobbitt used grants from the Public Education Fund of Evansville to purchase the printer for his Project Lead the Way class this January.

"t's not as hard as it sounds," he said. "The biggest thing is the kids get excited about it, and when they get excited about stuff, the sky is the limit."

Bobbitt said the printers are great for problem solving. When his students printed something that didn't work, they would go back and redesign it.

Vic Chamness, director of Science, Health, PE and Digital Resources, said the summer camps will help students learn how to take advantage of all the technology available to them.

"We live in a digital world. Students are digital natives. They've grown up with it," he said. "What is impactful is when you can actually use that technology to help you with your learning."

EVSC is invested in technology, even outside of the camps, Chamness said. The district gives every student from fifth to 12th grade a tablet to use, and has hired employees to specifically focus on using technology in the classroom.

If the camp offerings are successful, officials here plan to expand it to other schools or to a higher level. Currently Gleim said there are about 50 students signed up at Scott Elementary School and 27 at Highland Elementary School. Registration ends June 1.

Donnelly's military mental health legislation moves forward

WASHINGTON – U.S. Sen. Joe Donnelly's proposal to provide more mental health options for active military servicemen is on its way to the full Senate.

The Service Member and Veteran Mental Health Care Package — also referred to as "Care Package" — is a component of the National Defense Authorization Act for the 2016 fiscal year.

The proposal is meant to help improve mental outcomes for service members by:

- Strengthening Department of Defense mental health services.
- Enhancing the ability for active military members to receive quality mental health care from community providers.
- Calling on the Department of Defense to train physician assistants to help meet the growing demand for mental health services

The bill in its current form provides these services to active military – but not veterans. However, Donnelly said he's confident that language will be added later.

Donnelly said the provision would allow private providers to take part in an online registry that would make it easier for active duty military and veterans to find care.

"I would encourage any of our private providers to begin working together immediately with the Military Family Research Institute and other organizations where they can learn more each and every day and start to talk about themselves as being veterans friendly," Donnelly said.

The legislation comes a year after Donnelly backed a law that requires a lactive, reserve, and Guard service members to undergo person-to-person mental health assessments. President Barack Obama signed that provision into law in December 2014.

Donnelly's newest proposal passed the Senate Armed Services Committee and will be included in the 2016 defense bill. It now heads to the Senate.

New ed board will get new executive director

IND ANAPOLIS – A newly appointed State Board of Education will get to choose its own executive director.

Robert Guffin, the man currently in the position, announced Wednesday that he will retire at the end of May after roughly a year in the position.

That change comes as the board undergoes changes to its makeup. Under a bill Gov. Mike Pence signed into law this month, two of the group's 11 members will now be appointed by legislative leaders while eight will be appointed by the governor.

Pence used to have 10 appointments. The state superintendent also serves on the board.

The law means some changes in the board's makeup are almost a certainty – and the new group will have a major decision immediately.

The role of executive director has become a somewhat controversial one since Pence was elected. The Department of Education has traditionally staffed the education board. But after voters gave that office to Democrat Glenda Ritz, the governor created a new agency to serve the board. He later eliminated that agency but lawmakers gave the board wide latitude to set up its own staff.

During Guffin's tenure, the board has created a new A-F school grading system, partnered with Indianapolis Public Schools on the development of Innovation network schools, and developed a new process for partnering with local school districts in the turnaround of chronically failing schools. He's a former classroom teacher and principal.

"It has been an honor working to improve the lives of Hoosier students and preparing the next generation of education leaders during my career in our schools and as executive director of the State Board of Education," Guffin said in a statement. "I am looking forward to beginning the next chapter of my life and enjoying time with my children and grandchildren."

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Swarens: Mike Pence says he needed to listen more about RFRA

Gov. Mike Pence ticked off the accomplishments. Rising student achievement. Falling unemployment. A new, balanced budget, which includes in dollar terms the largest single increase in school funding in the state's history. A small but groundbreaking investment in preschool. A responsible, innovative expansion of Medicaid.

"There are a lot of really encouraging things happening around Indiana," the governor said during a meeting with the Indy Star's publisher and a group of editors in his Statehouse office on Wednesday.

And — let's be fair here — encouraging things *are* happening in our state.

But also, let's not be naive.

It's clear that the challenges facing Indiana — from bolstering incomes to training workers, from rebuilding communities to improving Hoosiers' health — remain

daunting.

It's also clear, three weeks removed from a brutal legislative session, that the conversations lingering in Indianapolis and beyond aren't about Team Pence's accomplishments. The talk rather is still about the destructive, unnecessary passage of the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, and Pence's failure to prevent the damage.

I asked Pence about the lessons he learned from the RFRA debacle. "I certainly learned — again — that I'm not perfect," he said. "If I have a regret, I regret that we didn't spend more time listening before the bill got to my desk. My ambition is to be a better listener."

He also emphasized, as he did at the height of the RFRA inferno, that in his mind the law was not about discrimination. "I support religious freedom. I also oppose discrimination. I was raised to do unto others, what you would have them do unto you. Those are core principles for me," he said. "If I had thought it was about discrimination, I would have vetoed the bill. I meant that to my bone marrow."

Yet, Pence acknowledged that he made a mistake by signing the bill in private, with a group of hand-picked, hard-line religious conservatives standing behind him. That staging sent an exclusionary message to the state and to the world, and it stoked flames of outrage that quickly burned out of control.

Two days after he signed RFRA, Pence admitted that clarifying legislation was necessary. Five days after that, state lawmakers passed the "fix," and the governor soon signed it.

With the fix in place, the initial firestorm began to die. But there was a promise made during the height of the crisis that could still burn the governor, and the state, if he lets it.

The RFRA clarification was introduced during an extraordinary Statehouse news conference called by key legislative, business, academic and community leaders. In addition to revising the new law, those leaders promised to push in the next year for the addition of sexual orientation and gender identity to the state's civil rights law.

The governor, however, has been largely noncommittal about that idea.

So on Wednesday, I pressed him for his position on an expansion of the civil rights law. He repeatedly dodged direct answers to my questions on the issue — to the point that it felt like an episode of "Dancing with the Stars."

He did promise to listen as he travels the state, and to keep an open mind, but questioned whether the issue is a high priority for most Hoosiers.

Bottom line: Pence is still far from a yes on whether he's willing to embrace statewide civil rights protections for LGBT Hoosiers. But he didn't say no.

As Pence's bid for re-election unfolds in 2016 — "My intention is to get another five years out of this gig" — his mishandling of RFRA provides Democrats with their best opportunity in 12 years to win back the governor's office and even raises the potential for a challenge in the Republican primary.

During the campaign, the governor will want to talk about his record on jobs, education and other core issues, and he'll be able to point to significant accomplishments in several key areas.

But, as a leader who acknowledges he needs to become a better listener, Pence runs a high risk if he's seen as intransigent on expanding civil rights. Many voters may stop listening to him.

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The request comes after a study of the state's workload standard, which is designed to set limits on the number of cases a family case manager can oversee. In November, the state agency revealed it was failing to meet the workload standard in most of the state, including Vanderburgh County and commissioned the \$561,000 study by Deloitte Consulting.

"Our family case managers in Indiana have an incredibly difficult job. We want to make sure that we are not only meeting our statutory obligations in terms of the standards that have been set, but we simply want to do right by our kids," Pence said.

DCS determines whether a region is complying with the law using a monthly average of cases handled by family case managers. Under the law, family case managers in a given region should not average more than 12 new cases or 17 ongoing cases. The law enacted in 2007 follows a national standard.

Senate Democratic Leader Tim Lanane, who pressed state leaders to hire additional family case managers, said a top priority of his caucus will be ensuring the funding is added to the state budget.

"Essentially as I understand it, the department study confirms those standards are valid, that we do need additional caseworkers and staff to come into compliance, and the plan now is to get that funding to make sure that happens," Lanane said.

Senate President Pro Tem David Long, a Fort Wayne Republican, said he supported the governor's request.

"There is no more important investment we can make than the safety of our children and the health of Hoosier families," Long said in a statement. "This is a critical issue that Republicans in the Statehouse have aggressively addressed over the past 10 years and we will continue to do so both now and in the future."

Lawmakers are currently in the process of writing a new, two-year budget for the state during this year's legislative session that ends in April.

Pence: \$7.5M needed to hire more DCS workers

The governor will be requesting an additional \$7.5 million from the legislature to hire 117 more employees for the Indiana Department of Child Services, according to a news release.

The request comes at the heels of DCS officials receiving the results of a workload study conducted by Deloitte Consulting. The study was commissioned, after DCS Chief of Staff Doris Tolliver told the State Budget Committee in November that only <u>one of DCS' regions</u> — the agency's central office — was in compliance with mandated caseload standards. State law requires DCS family case managers to average no more than 12 initial assessments or 17 ongoing cases per worker per region.

During her presentation, Tolliver said the agency would need 77 more employees to meet that requirement. But DCS officials didn't ask for more funding at that time. Instead, Tolliver said the agency planned to "promote quality leadership" and conduct a field workload study to determine whether the 12/17 standard was still appropriate.

The agency's decision to pay more than \$500,000 for the study, in lieu of immediately requesting more funding, drew criticism from state officials and advocates who expressed concern for the safety of children.

"Commissioning a study, as the department stated they intend to do, is not enough," Sen. Tim Lanane, D-Anderson, wrote in a letter to Pence. "Our state's most vulnerable deserve a guarantee that we are doing everything in our power to protect them."

Deloitte Consulting's report, which was completed earlier this month, included 10 recommendations for DCS, including additional staff, enhanced staff training, expanded use of data, a staff recruitment and retention plan, and techniques to close cases more quickly, according to the news release.

"Our FCMs are on the front lines and in the trenches each day helping the thousands of children and families that come to us in crisis," DCS Director Mary Beth Bonaventura said in the release. "It is my responsibility to make sure they have the resources they need to protect Hoosier children from abuse and neglect. The recommendations from this report validate some steps we have initiated to address this issue, as well as system enhancements to better protect Hoosier children from abuse and neglect."

Chief Justice to speak at equality day luncheon

Loretta Rush, chief justice of the Indiana Supreme Court, is the keynote speaker for this year's Women's Equality Day event, set for Aug. 26.

Jennifer Briggs, co-chair for the planning committee, said they wanted the speaker to be representative of strong female leaders in the community.

"This seemed like a natural fit," she said of Rush. "We looked at some national names but decided we wanted someone who our members could connect with, someone working and raising a family that is more like us, not on a national stage. We wanted someone that would really connect with our community."

Rush was appointed to the state Supreme Court by Gov. Mitch Daniels in 2012. She became the first female chief justice in 2014. Before her appointment to the state Supreme Court she was elected Tippecanoe Superior Court 3 judge and served for 14 years, according to Rush's biography on the Supreme Court's website.

Rush serves on the Commission on Improving the Status of Children in Indiana and the Indiana Conference for Legal Education Opportunity as well as liaison to the Division of Supreme Court Administration, the Division of State Court Administration, the Indiana Judicial Center and the Indiana Judges Association. She chairs the Judicial Nominating/Qualifications Commission as chief justice and has represented the state at the National Judicial Leadership Summit on the Protection of Children several times.

Briggs said Rush's commitment to women and children was also a factor in her selection. Rush played a vital role in creating Tippecanoe County's Court Appointed Special Advocate program. There she also implemented a certified juvenile drug treatment court and 24-hour assessment center for youth. Rush earned her undergraduate degree from Purdue University and graduated cum laude from the Indiana University Maurer School of Law in Bloomington.

She is married and has four children.

"It's an honor to have her as our speaker," Briggs said. "She is serving a key role in the state." Women's Equality Day commemorates the 1920 passage of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution that granted women the right to vote.

"Imagine a time when we couldn't vote," Briggs said. "We need to celebrate this because it wasn't that long ago that we couldn't. This celebration is a chance for us to come together and push for more women in leadership roles and a part of decision making."

State superintendent requests shift in House budget funds

Ritz told the Senate Appropriations Committee Thursday that nearly \$60 million in the proposed House budget could be diverted toward additional funding for local school districts.

Her proposals included eliminating \$40 million that's been proposed in additional grants for charter schools.

Ritz says she would also like to eliminate the IREAD test in 3rd grade and the 11th grade college and career readiness test. Her total testing plan could be delivered for about \$75 million over two years, which is almost half of what she originally estimated in December.

Legislators are currently considering a proposal that would replace the ISTEP with a national exam.

Indiana school district bans energy, supplement drinks

A school district in central Indiana is banning nutritional supplements and energy drinks from its campuses.

The Western Boone County Community School Corporation held separate meetings for parents and students on Wednesday to inform them of the new district wide policy.

School district officials tell WRTV-TV that they were becoming increasingly concerned about students' health. The athletic director at Western Boone Junior-Senior High School says many students who participate in weight training classes have been seen drinking supplement shakes and using energy boosters.

The district says the ban specifically targets products with creatine and nitric oxide, which can cause heart irregularities, problems with the central nervous system and even strokes. Students who bring any of the now-banned items will face suspension.

Ivy Tech trustees pass resolution in support of Downtown med school Megan Erhacher

In a resolution unanimously approved by Ivy Tech Community College Southwest Board of Trustees, the seven board members "fully" supported the proposed Downtown medical education center request for 223,000 gross square feet, designating 60,000 of it plus Simulation Center space to Ivy Tech.

At a Thursday afternoon meeting, Board Chair David Gunn presented information to other members about the resolution. Gunn said the 60,000 gross square feet would provide space for Ivy Tech's Health Sciences and School of Nursing programs to grow. There are 1,000 students enrolled in programs that could benefit from the medical campus, including registered nurse, medical assistants, paramedics, surgical technologists and certified nursing assistants.

First-year Ivy Tech nursing student Nick Reed spoke to the hoard about his excitement over the opportunities the Downtown medical education center will provide.

"Having this multidisciplinary building in Downtown, the heart of Evansville ... the excitement to have all these disciples come together in one school — EMTs, doctors, CNAs, nurses — we get to come together and work together," Reed, 20, said.

In its resolution, Ivy Tech states the medical campus "will be an immediate boost to the economy as well as to the atmosphere in Downtown Evansyille."

Hoosier Hot 50 Jobs projects that, by 2020, two of the top four jobs will be in health care fields, and both will require an associate degree, Gunn said. And the shortage of registered nurses and skilled health care workers has been a challenge statewide for many years, he said.

lvy Tech officials estimate to see an increase of almost 1,600 students enrolled in programs through the new medical education center, as well as additional students for other institutions.

When the Downtown facility is finished, Ivy Tech plans to relocate all health-field programs to the medical education center.

The current 52,000 square feet of the main campus facility will then be used for other high-demand programs such as welding, automotive, technology and business. It will also allow Ivy Tech to expand community collaborations with WorkOne and high school Career and Technical Education programs.

Ivy Tech Southwest Chancellor Jonathan Weinzapfel gave an update to board members on funding for the project. Weinzapfel said the City Council unanimously committed a \$57 million bond. Gov. Mike Pence included \$19 million for the project in his budget, which the House increased to \$37 million. And now the Senate will consider the biennial state budget. Weinzapfel said he expects the Senate version of the budget to be released the week of April 6.

"Then we'll know whether they are building upon the funding already provided by the House for this project. ... So roughly a \$50 million investment by the state to leverage a \$125 million investment overall. Seems to me that is a good deal. ... I'm optimistic that in the end it will be included in the budget," he said.

Weinzapfel noted consequences if the project is not fully funded. Those include less of an economic impact, less project student enrollment and not the same level of programming.

Partners in the medical education center are Indiana University School of Medicine-Evansville, the University of Southern Indiana and the University of Evansville. Partner hospitals are Evansville's Deaconess and St. Mary's, Memorial of Jasper and Good Samaritan of Vincennes.

IND:ANAPOLIS – State lawmakers will not conduct a public study of gay rights issues in Indiana in advance of the 2016 legislative session.

Legislative leaders on Thursday approved 40 topics for work by summer study committees, but adding sexual orientation to the state's civil rights law was not one.

Senate President Pro Tem David Long, R-Fort Wayne, said that doesn't mean the issue won't be discussed; it just won't be in a public committee. Instead, the debate will "go on quietly through the summer," he said.

The leaders' decision not to move forward with a public gay rights debate comes roughly two months after a battle over the state's Religious Freedom Restoration Act prompted outrage from across the country.

Critics said the law would allow businesses to discriminate against gay customers and lawmakers scrambled to try to fix it. At the time, House and Senate leaders said they would start a conversation about banning discrimination based on sexual orientation.

Democrats said that should occur in a study committee this summer. But on Thursday, the Legislative Council – a group of leaders from the House and Senate – decided not to formalize the discussion. That frustrated Democratic leaders.

"This isn't about politics, this is about what we are going to do public policy wise to show that Indiana is a truly welcoming state," said Senate Minority Leader Tim Lanane, D-Anderson. "Waiting another year is out of the question."

Critics of the RFRA law say that the state's reputation will not fully recover until there are statewide civil rights protections for gays.

Cov. Mike Pence, a Republican, has said putting gay rights into state law is not part of his agenda and he defended the controversial state law as a protection of Hoosiers' rights to exercise their religious beliefs. Still, Lanane said he has a positive outlook for the future of gay rights in Indiana. "No matter how hard they try to obstruct it, our governor and his allies in the legislature cannot hold back progress any longer," he said.

"We know what everyday Hoosiers know, that there's no place for discrimination in the Hoosier state," Lanane said. "We'll continue to fight to make that a reality."

IND ANAPOLIS – Indiana legislators will spend part of the summer studying how to restore the public's trust in the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, an agency that's charged with mismanagement and overcharging customers.

It's one of 40 topics study committees will consider in advance of the 2016 legislative session. Changes to the state's smoking ban, a new testing program for students, and measures to address so-called "food deserts" will also be considered.

"Each year during the legislative session, a number of issues arise that require further in-depth study and discussion before potentially being addressed with legislation," Senate President Pro Tem. David Long said in a statement Thursday, "interim study committees provide a valuable forum for these discussions to take place so that legislators can take more informed action in the next legislative session."

The Legislative Council – a group of eight leaders from the House and Senate – approved the study committee topics.

The Bureau of Motor Vehicles is among the most controversial of the issues. In a 40-page report released this month, the auditing group BKD listed eight key areas in which the BMV administration has been lacking. Most of the issues focused on ineffective or outdated technology used to manage BMV information.

In addition, 3 MV officials have acknowledged over charging fees to thousands of Hoosiers. Rep. Dan Forestal, D-Indianapolis, said the study committee will give the public a chance to explain how those overcharges have affected them.

" am glad that our leaders understand that we need to play an active role in formulating the types of reforms that can help restore the public's trust," he said.

The Interim Committee on Roads and Transportation with studying three issues, he said:

- Ensuring the BMV is implementing the reforms contained in the BKD report.
- Creating a regular system of auditing done by an outside firm.
- Simplifying the BMV fee system.

Meanwhile, the Interim Committee on Public Policy will be focusing on whether to expand the state's smoking ban, which currently exempts bars, casinos and private clubs.

The committee will also consider the subject of e-cigarettes, how they affect smokers' health and whether they should be included as part of the smoking ban.

"The topic was assigned for them to make their case, which they did unsuccessfully during the session," said House Speaker Brian Bosma about the tobacco companies.

Carlier in the session, Indiana Attorney General Greg Zoeller wrote a letter to e-cigarette marketing and advertising company Altria Group Inc. emphasizing his concern that e-cigarettes are following in the footsteps of traditional cigarettes. He said nearly 2 million middle and high school students had tried the product, which has raised concerns among some lawmakers.

The Interim Committee on Education will be focusing on school testing, and in particular, whether the ISTEP program should be replaced with a new standardized exam.

The discussion comes as the state is implementing new curriculum standards and revamping the current ISTEP test. The committee will weigh the options of revising or creating a whole new test for the state. In addition, the Interim Committee on Agricultural and Natural Resources will be talking about the local farm and food product economy – and how to prevent food deserts.

"A food desert is a part of any community where people don't have easy access to such things as fresh fruit, produce and meats, fish and poultry," said Rep. Justin Moed, D-Indianapolis, in a statement Thursday.

And he said that affects Hoosiers' health. "Indiana ranks 8th in the nation in levels of obesity among its population," he said.

The study committee will provide an opportunity to take positive steps for providing nutrition in urban communities, he said.

The Interim Committee on Corrections and Criminal Code has several key issues.

Lawmakers will look at the struggle offenders face when they are released from prison and the hardship they experience when searching for a job. The committee will study the possibility of establishing a program to encourage employers to hire them. They will also discuss retrieving DNA samples from anyone arrested for a felony.

The Committee on Government will study body camera videos on police officers and whether the resulting video should be subject to public records requests.

IND ANAPOLIS – Two Republican powerbrokers are ignoring their Mitch Daniels-era political connections to one Senate candidate and instead urging Rep. Todd Young to run for the open seat.

Al Hubbard and Jim Kittle Jr. – both former chairs of the Indiana Republican Party – signed a Joint letter that Young's congressional campaign sent to supporters on Sunday afternoon.

They urged other Republicans "to exercise patience in making a decision" regarding support for two other candidates in the race – former GOP chairman Eric Holcomb and U.S. Rep. Marlin Stutzman, R-3rd District. Their move to publicly support Young could be a grim sign for Holcomb, who has never held elected office and served most of his career as a political operative. Holcomb ran Daniels' second campaign for governor and then served as a top advisor in the governor's office.

Holcomb was expected to tap into the Daniels network for much of his financial and political support. But Hubbard, a former George W. Bush economic adviser and long-time Daniels friend, and Kittle, who served as the former governor's finance chairman, said they think Young is a better choice.

In the email blast – paid for by the Friends of Todd Young committee – Hubbard and Kittle say Young "would be the best candidate because he's never shied away from making tough choices during his time in office."

"Put simply: We believe Todd Young is a proven conservative leader and would be the strongest candidate and office holder Republicans could field in 2016," the pair wrote.

But Holcomb's campaign spokesman said that while "others engage in lengthy contemplation about whether to wage a campaign, Eric's list of supporters grows every day."

"Asking people to 'exercise patience' is another way of acknowledging that Eric has been racking up endorsements and support in every corner of the state," spokesman Pete Seat said Sunday. "His broad statewide support is also reflected in his fundraising, which has been steady and ongoing." he candidates are vying to replace retiring U.S. Sen. Dan Coats, also a Republican.

Hubbard and Kittle said in their letter that they have "high regard" for Holcomb and Stutzman.

"It's clear Republican primary voters will have a quality field from which to choose in next year's election," they wrote. "However, one potential candidate clearly stands out: Congressman Todd Young."

Young is expected to announce whether he'll run this summer. His campaign spokesman, Trevor Foughty, said Sunday that the "congressman is narrowing in on a decision."

"As we go through this process," he said, "the growing support for a potential Senate campaign – from grassroots volunteers to party stalwarts like Jim Kittle and Al Hubbard – makes it clear that we would have a lot of momentum on our side if he opts to run."

If Young ran and nabbed the nomination, he could face Democrat Baron Hill, whom he ousted from the state's 9th congressional district seat. Hill announced earlier this month that he would seek the Democratic nomination in the race.

Coats announced in March that he would not seek another term in the Senate.

Just a few days later, Holcomb – who had been working as Coats' state director – announced he would seek the GOP nomination. Holcomb's announcement was packed with former Daniels' staffers and supporters.

In what was left of the first quarter fundraising period, which ended March 31, Holcomb received \$125,000 in contributions for the race.

Stutzman formalized his candidacy earlier this month and has not yet had to report any fundraising for the Senate race. But he reported nearly \$424,000 in cash in his congressional campaign committee as of March 31. That included about \$123,000 in contributions during the first quarter of the year.

Young had \$1.1 million in his campaign report as of March 31, including \$410,000 he raised during the first quarter of the year.

State schools chief Ritz to make campaign announcement

Indiana SuperIntendent of Public Instruction Glenda Ritz, who has said she's considering a run for governor, is expected to make a campaign announcement this week.

Ritz's compaign Facehook page posted a series of messages Sunday saying she would make a "special campaign announcement" Thursday at Ben Davis High School in Indianapolis. The posts didn't give any further details. Announcements also were planned for Terre Haute and Evansville later Thursday and in Fort Wayne, South Bend and Hammond on Friday, according to the page.

Ritz, a Democrat, couldn't immediately be reached for comment Sunday.

A former school librarian, Ritz defeated former Superintendent Tony Bennett's re-election bid in 2012 using a powerful grass-roots campaign. She said earlier this year she was considering running for governor after months of battles with a State Board of Education appointed by Gov. Mike Pence — a Republican who's expected to announce he's running for re-election later this month — and after attempts by the Republican-dominated General Assembly to divert power from the Department of Education to the education board.

Ritz would join a Democratic field that already includes former Indiana House Speaker and 2012 nominee. John Gregg and state Sen. Karen Tallian of Portage.

Current Indiana House Leader Scott Pelath, D-Michigan City, said last week that he would not seek the party's nomination for governor.

Pence captured only 49 percent of the vote in 2012 in defeating Gregg, who received 46 percent of the vote. Many observers regard Pence as vulnerable over his handling of a religious freedom law this spring that critics viewed as discriminatory against gays. Members of the business community were vocal in their opposition to the measure.

Ritz's position as superintendent also is up for election in 2016. But the Democratic nominee is chosen at a summer convention, so Ritz could still seek re-election to that office if she loses in the May gubernatorial primary.

Good luck with state school board changes

Gov. Mike Pence made new appointments to the often-stormy Indiana State Board of Education on Wednesday, saying that it marks "a fresh start" for the panel.

Our response is, good luck.

As of Thursday, a spokesman for state Superintendent of Public Instruction Glenda Ritz had declined to comment. Of course, it was disagreements between Ritz, Pence, and other members of the board that created much of the turmoil in the first place.

What happened on Wednesday is that Pence reappointed five state board members, while another five members were appointed, two by legislative leaders.

From Evansville's standpoint, Pence reappointed B.J. Watts, an Evansville schoolteacher, and a good choice to remain on the board.

Another good choice — really, an excellent choice — for a new board member was former Evansville Vanderburgh School Corp. Superintendent Vincent Bertram, who left his post here in 2011. Bertram stepped down as superintendent to become president and chief executive officer of Project Lead the Way in Indianapolis. The organization concentrates on developing curriculum in science, technology, engineering and math.

Bertram had quite an impact on public school education in Evansville. Recall that he created the strategic plan, which included new schools and improving existing schools, establishing preschools, developing an emphasis on technology, and a variety of programs, including early college.

So yes, we believe that Bertram has something to offer the State Board of Education. The question is whether the new board will be able to move beyond the fighting.

At one point, Republicans attempted to take Democrat Ritz's chairwoman post on the board away from her. The post was provided for the superintendent by state law, but the turmoil was such that Republicans attempted to change the law. However, late in the legislative session, lawmakers agreed to allow her to remain as the board chair until her current term expires next year. Of course, it has been rumored that Ritz might challenge Pence and others for governor next year.

The new law created a new vice chairman position, giving that person joint responsibility with Ritz for the board's agenda. It is a decision that could fire up the board again in short order, if Ritz and the new vice chairman don't see eye to eye.

However, the intent of the legislature's work in reconstituting the board is to bring a measure of peace to board. Let's hope it happens, but if it doesn't then legislators should take a serious look at making the superintendent an appointee of the governor.

The new board is to meet on Wednesday at Purdue, and as we said above, good luck.

Gov. Mike Pence wants more money for charters, vouchers

Gov. Mike Pence today unveiled a two-year state budget plan that calls for \$200 million more in standard K-12 funding, including significantly more money for charter schools and public vouchers for students to attend private schools.

The proposal, submitted today to the State Budget Committee, would provide a 2 percent increase in K-12 funding for the 2015-2016 school year and 1 percent more the following year.

The governor calls for charter schools to receive an additional \$1,500 per pupil on top of the tuition support they already receive from the state. That would account for \$41 million of the \$200 million increase over two years.

Charter schools receive state per-pupil funding but do not receive local property tax dollars that traditional public school districts receive for transportation and building costs.

Pence also wants the cap on vouchers, now set at \$4,800 per student in grades 1-8, to be eliminated. The move could increase the percentage of private school tuition the state would cover at some schools. The cost would be about \$4 million a year.

The governor's proposal will serve as a starting point as state legislators began to negotiate and craft the state budget over the next several months in a legislative session set to end April 29. Star reporter Stephanie Wang contributed to this report.

Pence unveils 2-year state budget

INDIANAPOLIS - Gov. Mike Pence unveiled a proposed two-year state budget Thursday that would

modestly increase education funding, maintain state reserves and fund a number of new initiatives. Chris Atkins, head of the Indiana Office of Management and Budget, said the focus of the budget is education and expanding educational opportunities for Hoosiers.

The average increase in the budget is 1.34 percent each year. Reserves would drop to about \$1.9 billion a year -- slightly lower than the current level.

About \$200 million in new dollars would go to K-12 tuition support during the two years -- though \$41 million would directly benefit only charter schools by adding \$1,500 to the per pupil grant for charters. Atkins said charter funding is lower than per pupil funding for traditional public schools largely because they can't levy property taxes. He hopes increasing the base amount will attract high-quality charter operators.

The budget also increases Department of Correction operational spending by \$43 million and includes \$51 million to build new prison units. And it sets aside \$300 million in additional highway funding money during the two-year period.

Another key new program is the Regional Cities initiative, which would be a partnership with local communities to improve the quality of life in regional cities and attract top-tier talent.

The state would contribute about \$42 million a year, and local units would also contribute local dollars for special projects.

Pence's budget includes \$19.2 million for med school

INDIANAPOLIS — The medical school campus planned for Downtown Evansville cleared a hurdle Thursday when Gov. Mike Pence included funding for the project in the budget proposal he sent to state lawmakers. But the level of funding proposed by Pence — \$19.2 million — is just more than a third of what project partners have requested from the state to build the campus.

Pence's budget fully funds the Indiana University School of Medicine portion of the project, but doesn't include the combined \$30.2 million in funding sought by the University of Southern Indiana and Ivy Tech Community College to locate programs at the campus.

That means if the General Assembly maintains Pence's funding level, the building likely would be smaller in size. The timeline for construction could also move back due to the governor's proposal to fund the project with cash provided during the fiscal year beginning in July 2016.

Debate on the project is just beginning this legislative session, and state lawmakers could opt to put funding for Ivy Tech and USI in the budget.

Mayor Lloyd Winnecke called the proposal a "great starting point." Winnecke attended the State Budget Committee meeting Thursday at the Indiana Statehouse, where Pence's proposal was unveiled.

Winnecke said his administration will work with Ivy Tech and USI in the next three months to help them make their case to the General Assembly to be included in the project. IU, which plans to locate its Evansville medical school at the site, is the "cornerstone" for the project, Winnecke said

"This is the project that has to be funded first, so it makes sense the governor has identified this as the place to start the budget discussions," Winnecke said.

State Auditor Suzanne Crouch, who was a state lawmaker when initial planning dollars were approved for the project, said the legislative process to write the new state budget is a marathon and not a sprint.

"It is a great, great day," said Crouch, who served House District 78 before moving to the executive branch. "The governor recognizes this as a priority for the state of Indiana and has singled it out as a priority that is not only important to the health care for our region, but also for economic development and for job creation."

Pence's administration tried to prioritize funding for capital projects as "best we could," said Chris Atkins, director of the state's Office of Management & Budget.

"We feel like this starts the conversation about the medical school, and I also believe the IU component was the original request for the project funding itself, and we look forward to conversations about the other pieces going forward," Atkins said.

IU officials said Thursday that it's premature in the legislative process to talk about the ultimate size, design and timeline of the project.

"It remains IU's intent to plan for the creation of a comprehensive, multi-institutional health education center in Downtown Evansville. We also remain committed to supporting our institutional partners in their pursuit of the necessary funding from the General Assembly for their portions of the project," IU spokesman Mark Land said in a statement.

The almost \$50 million requested of the state is higher than the original approximation of \$35 million for the medical school, which will be located within the boundaries of Locust, Cherry, Southeast Fourth and Southeast Sixth streets.

The funding request grew from preliminary estimates when Ivy Tech and USI desired more space in the complex. USI plans to offer occupational therapy and health informatics programs, while Ivy Tech will conduct courses in health sciences and nursing. University of Evansville plans to offer classes in physical therapy and its physicians' assistant program.

Pence's proposal now goes to the House Ways & Means Committee — the first vetting ground for the budget in the General Assembly.

Pence proposal for new Indiana budget boosts school funding, including charters, vouchers

INDIANAPOLIS — Republican Gov. Mike Pence has proposed 2 percent and 1 percent increases in Indiana school funding over the next two years, with the money expected to help cover additional spending for private school vouchers and charter schools.

The governor's proposal for spending about \$31 billion over two years is being presented Thursday to the State Budget Committee.

State management and budget director Chris Atkins says the spending plan would leave the state with a reserve of nearly \$2 billion without any proposed tax changes.

The plan would give \$1,500 more per student for charter schools at an estimated cost of \$41 million. It also removes the school voucher program's limit on per-student funding. That's estimated to cost \$4 million yearly.

The Legislature has until late April to approve the budget.

Pence's budget asks for more funding to public and charter schools

<u>Governor Mike Pence</u> revealed his recommended budget for fiscal years 2016 and 2017 Thursday, with <u>education priorities</u> demanding most of the funds.

But, Statehouse Democrats say the governor's budget proposal doesn't tell a true story when it comes to increasing education funding.

Pence wants to increase <u>K-12 funding</u> by two percent in 2016 and one percent in 2017, which adds up to a \$200 million increase over the two years. Pence's plan would fund <u>charter schools</u> more than in the past, allocating an additional \$1,500 per pupil for students in charter schools. Right now, each Indiana district receives a minimum of \$4,280 per pupil, regardless of school type.

"In the category of funding, the first priority of this budget will be expanding opportunities for our youth in Indiana, from pre-k education to higher education," Pence said Tuesday.

Chris Atkins, Office of Management and Budget director, says the \$41 million specifically set aside for charter schools would reduce inequity between funding of charters and traditional public schools.

"We're concerned that some higher quality charter operators are not willing to look at locating here or investing here because of our charter financing system," Atkins says.

But, Austin Democratic Representative Terry Goodin says a \$200 million increase doesn't tell the whole story when it's split between traditional public schools, charters and private schools.

"People are confused at home," Goodin says. "As I speak to constituents, they say, 'Hey, they gave you 200 million more dollars in education.' Well okay, yeah but here's where this money went. So that money's not coming back to communities like it should."

Atkins says Pence's goal is increasing overall education funding and points out that the governor's proposed budget is only the first step in a nearly four month budget writing process.

Another part of Pence's proposal involves the state's <u>new pre-k pilot program</u>, On My Way Pre-K. Pence suggests funding the program at the same rate – \$10 million each year – *pereyear* through the two-year budget cycle. This is a change from the language of <u>the law</u>, which only sets out requirements for the current fiscal year. By suggesting the state allocate funds to the program for more than one year, Pence is setting the stage to expand the program, something participants have expressed they want.

The governor's budget also includes increased funding for teacher performance grants, as well as addressing financial needs for <u>career and technical education</u> and <u>adult high schools</u>.

\$31B Pence budget proposes 3% increase for schools over two years

Governor Pence is proposing a \$31 billion budget for the next two years, including a 3% increase in school funding.

Pence's budget spends about a third of expected new state revenue -- it increases state spending overall by 1.3%. Schools would receive an extra \$200 million, with about a fifth of that increase going to charter schools. Office of Management and Budget director Chris Atkins says the fact most charters lack the authority to levy property taxes has created a funding gap.

The budget includes \$90 million on top of the basic school formula for initiatives from vocational education to the state's new preschool pilot program, though it doesn't expand that program as some advocates have urged. Atkins says the administration will await the results of the pilot first.

The vocational education funding includes incentive funds linked to schools' performance. Atkins says he anticipates the legislature will make performance funding part of the basic school funding formula as well, and says the administration will support those efforts.

The budget increases a teacher merit-pay fund, and includes four-million dollars for a Pence proposal to offer incentive bonuses to teachers who go to struggling schools.

The proposal sets aside \$300 million for highway construction, on top of \$400 million from the current budget. Another \$51 million would go to build more cells at the Miami and Wabash Valley prisons.

The budget calls for \$56 million dollars for next year's bicentennial celebration. Most of that would go for a new State Archives building, and a new Bicentennial Inn at Potato Creek State Park near South Bend, the first new state park inn in nearly 80 years. The administration anticipates paying for those two projects by leasing or selling excess capacity in state-owned cell-phone towers.

The state would finish the two years with a projected \$2 billion surplus, about 13% of spending. Atkins says it wouldn't trigger the state's automatic tax rebate, because the state's tuition reserve account isn't included in surplus calculations for rebate purposes.

The House Ways and Means Committee will open formal budget hearings on Monday.

INDIANAPOLIS - Gov. Mike Pence is requesting a budget that will grow state government spending 1.34% over the next two years. The details were outlined by Director of the Office of Management and Budget Chris Atkins before the State Budget Committee Thursday morning. As the governor promised in early December, his budget prizes a balance with a surplus and a variety of education initiatives.

"The first priority of the governor is to pass an honestly balanced budget," Atkins told the bicameral committee. He added the governor's outlays have a structural surplus, which keeps spending under the rate of inflation (roughly 2%). Such "a healthy cushion" is worthwhile, Atkins remarked, as proven during the last biennium budget when spending cuts were not needed after a shortfall in predicted

revenues. Volatile revenue growth characterized the state's last two years.

The governor also calls for maintaining the state's approximately \$2 billion in reserves above the targeted goal of 12.5% of total annual spending. Atkins told the committee this surplus would only fund state government for some 50 days but believed it adequate protection. Senate Appropriations Chairman and State Budget Committee Chairman Luke Kenley mentioned that reserves can be exhausted quickly and Indiana's reserves were crucial to protecting K-12 and higher education funding during the last recession.

Overall, Republican fiscal leaders were generally pleased with proposed budget. "It's a night and day comparison where they were a couple years ago. And they should be better," Kenley remarked of the governor's budget presentation. "I feel real good going to work on this. I don't feel uncomfortable at all. I think we can get there by the end of April. I got so snakebit when the budget fell apart six or eight years ago that even though those revenue forecasts that they have, which are, I think 2.4% and 3.2% over the next two years, I'm not even sure I feel comfortable with those. I tend to favor the Pence approach that we're actually going to appropriate less than that coming out of the front door. I'm just not sure the revenues are going to be there or not."

"I think this is a prudent, honest responsible step forward," said House Ways & Means Chairman Tim Brown.

"This is the beginning of a three and half month process," Kenley wanted to emphasize. "The governor's folks have indicated they are perfectly engaged in that [discussion]."

Education Spending

K-12 tuition support will increase \$201 million over the next two years, \$134 million (2%) for FY 2016 and \$67 million (1%) for FY 2017, if the governor gets his way. Not all of this funding is directed toward traditional public schools, however. Both the state's burgeoning charter school and voucher programs are included. As the governor outlined in early December, he is calling to eliminate the \$4,800 scholarship voucher cap for grades 1-8 along with a tax credit increase for scholarship granting organizations.

Democrats believe the fiscal impact of yet more voucher expansion is being underestimated. "There's a lot of fuzzy math going on here," Sen. Karen Tallian, D-Ogden Dunes, said to Atkins during the hearing. Tallian contended the growing voucher program was going to take an ever-greater share of overall education funding in the next two years and that it was getting an additional cut of the new \$200 million general increase proposed Thursday. Removing the cap on vouchers, she worried, would only accelerate this problem. "There is nothing in these numbers to show there is any end in sight to this," Tallian said. "How is \$200 million added to the pot, barely keeping up with inflation, going to cover this?"

"There ought not to be a limit on quality schools and educational opportunities," Atkins responded.

Democrats in both chambers are pushing to separate charter and voucher school funding from the general K-12 tuition support appropriation. Republicans argue that would needlessly silo off what are really education dollars following pupils wherever they might be studying.

Democrats were not alone in having concern over whether the \$201 million K-12 request was sufficient. On this point Sen. Kenley remarked, "I'm a little nervous that the money isn't going to stretch as far as we need for it to stretch, particularly in respect to the public school formula. If you take those other amounts off the top [appropriations for charters and vouchers] of the formula then that squeezes the formula down that I'm not sure if we're doing a good enough job or not." ??Chairman Brown seemed less concerned. "We set a level of spending and then try to decide how to divide it out and that's the way to budget," the Crawfordsville Republican said. "If you go backwards, your unending obligation becomes unfunded." Brown noted that Pence's budget gives education higher than inflation increases in its first year.

?Another element likely to be divisive is a call to grant charter schools an additional \$1,500 per pupil. Since charters do not have the same operational funding per pupil as public schools, this will help correct the imbalance Republicans argue. Moreover, the governor's proposed Freedom to Teach initiative will be granted \$2 million per year and fall under the direction of the State Board of Education, not the Department of Education. Atkins said the goal of this program was to provide "a shot in the arm" to traditional public schools. Ten million dollars are earmarked for supporting turnaround initiatives for failing public school districts.

For teachers, the budget proposal includes a 10% increase in the Teacher Performance Grants program, which would then total \$63 million over the next two years. Teachers' pension obligations will reportedly be fully funded by a \$64 million infusion. ??Whereas both Superintendent of Public Instruction Glenda Ritz and Democratic lawmakers have been advocating an elimination of the so-called "textbook tax," the governor's budget does not include any appropriation for directly alleviating textbook costs. "We did not increase funds for textbook reimbursement in this budget," said Atkins told reporters. However, he added increased funding to schools would empower them to provide textbook assistance if they so desired. Sen. Kenley noted the state already provides roughly \$39 million in textbook assistance. "I assume there'll be discussion," he said. "But, I don't sense any urgency in moving forward on that point."??

Higher Education

For higher education the governor is requesting a 1% increase over the next two years for state universities' operating and line item funds. This exceeds \$40 million over the biennium. The top capital projects for every state university are allocated cash funding as well. For example, there is \$19 million to fund the construction of the IU Medical School branch in Evansville. Over the next two years student scholarship funding will increase almost \$39.7 million. Regarding a program that has repeatedly not met demand and exhausted its funding, Pence is calling for an additional \$500,000 for the National Guard Scholarship fund.

The governor also wants to tweak the Career and Technical Education funding formula to be encourage better performance and will increase funding for facilities by \$20 million per year through the Indiana Works Council. There is also \$14 million more for adult high school programs.

Transportation

There is increased funding for road construction but not road maintenance. Gov. Pence is calling for additional \$300 million for the Major Moves 2020 fund over the next two years. This comes on the heels of the Governor requesting the fulfillment of a conditional \$200 million appropriation from the same fund for this current fiscal year. The plan is to add additional lanes to I-65 and I-69 in several locations across the state. "I would like to applaud you on the \$300 million for transportation," Rep.

Sheila Klinker said during the hearing. "It's well needed."

?"We still have a lot of potholes out there," Chairman Brown said of road maintenance. "The need is so, so great we would never fund it. We just have to find out how much of a priority it is and how much we can fund." Brown said interest off the Next Generation Trust Fund would provide a one-time infusion of \$120 million over the next two years to be dedicated toward road maintenance. The Department of Transportation has told lawmakers an additional \$60 million each year will be needed to simply maintain the state's current behind schedule maintenance status for roads and bridges. ??As for other investment priorities, the Gov. Pence is requesting \$84 million for the Regional Cities Initiative. The Indiana Association of Cities and Towns has said this urban renewal program is their top priority for this budgetary session. The Indiana Economic Development Corporation believes the program will need hundreds of millions of dollars by the end of the decade to effective statewide.

Agencies and The Bicentennial

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Other projects that raised eyebrows throughout the room were appropriation requests for the state's bicentennial celebrations for 2016. These totaled almost \$60 million but included items that will probably need to be completed anyway, such as \$25 million for a new State Archives location. "I may not be as excited about the bicentennial as you are," Kenley quipped about the total amount. "The governor is spending money here like it's the last year we're going to be a state," Goodin followed.

Pence budget keeps state spending on tight leash

INDIANAPOLIS | Gov. Mike Pence delivered state lawmakers a thrifty two-year budget proposal Thursday that limits annual spending increases -- including on education -- to 2 percent or less, and cuts agencies and programs to pay for new construction and bicentennial events.

Overall, the Republican proposed spending \$31.1 billion between July 1 and June 30, 2017. That's about \$781 million more than the current two-year budget approved in 2013.

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Specifically, he wants \$200 million over the next two years added to the school funding formula that supports public schools, charter schools and private school vouchers, though \$41 million of that would be paid off the top directly to charter schools.

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"The governor had an opportunity to signal his support for working families. He could have proposed ending textbook fees or boosted funding for public schools significantly," Tallian said. "Instead, he's choosing to hold public schools hostage by redirecting tax dollars supporting public schools to private schools."

As previously announced, Pence's budget continues funding at current levels Camp Summit, the LaPorte County paramilitary-style youth offender rehabilitation center the Department of Correction proposed closing last year.

The Northwest Indiana Regional Development Authority was not included in the governor's budget, though Atkins said the RDA's request to continue its \$10 million in annual state support may ultimately be funded by Pence's proposed \$42 million a year Regional Cities Initiative.

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"The governor's approach to spending – using the state's new revenue to pay for cash projects – is akin to a family buying a new house and car but having nothing left to pay the bills and buy gas," Tallian said. "Bond rates are at an all-time low. If we want to build, we can do it in the traditional way."

While pleased with the budget overall, state Sen. Luke Kenley, R-Noblesville, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, was skeptical of Pence's desire to spend \$56.1 million constructing a new

state archives building, a Bicentennial Inn at Potato Creek State Park and for 2016 state bicentennial events, including a torch relay (\$1.6 million) and Statehouse plaza (\$2 million).

Under Pence's budget proposal, Indiana would spend \$648.5 million less than it takes in over the next two years and maintain a budget reserve of approximately \$2 billion.

State Rep. Tim Brown, R-Crawfordsville, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, declared the governor's plan "prudent, honest and responsible," and said it provides a good start for the budget legislation, House Bill 1001.

Brown's committee is set to review the needs of each state agency over the next six weeks and will write a budget for the full House to consider in late February. That measure then will be modified by Kenley's committee en route to a Senate vote.

Ultimately, a House-Senate conference committee will decide the state's final spending plan in late April, subject to approval by both chambers.

Indiana lawmakers seem cautiously optimistic about Governor **Mike Pence's** budget which increases school funding while maintaining a nearly \$2 billion surplus, but still leaves some areas up for discussion.

The Governor's budget includes nearly \$200 million in new money for schools, gives charter schools an additional \$1500 in per pupil funding and increases the amount available for school vouchers.

It also provides \$20 million in more funds for career and technical education while providing \$20 million more for pilot pre-K.

The state surplus is maintained to the tune of about \$2 billion, while the budget, the Pence administration says, meets or increases its obligations in areas of health, domestic violence and pursuing economic development. It also includes \$50 million towards marking the state's 200th anniversary in 2016. Those funds would come from the one-time sale/lease of some of the state's cell phone towers. Pence says the budget also continues to pay down state debt and allows for it to pay for new capital projects with cash.

Despite that, lawmakers say they have concerns about increasing funding for some charter schools without the necessary accountability measures. And the budget does not include new funding for local community corrections which will be needed due to changes in the criminal code.

The Governor's Office say it plans to work out those issues with lawmakers over the next three and a half months.

Gov. Mike Pence wants more money for charters, vouchers

Gov. Mike Pence today unveiled a two-year state budget plan that calls for \$200 million more in standard K-12 funding, including significantly more money for charter schools and public vouchers for students to attend private schools.

The proposal, submitted today to the State Budget Committee, would provide a 2 percent increase in K-12 funding for the 2015-2016 school year and 1 percent more the following year.

The governor calls for charter schools to receive an additional \$1,500 per pupil on top of the tuition support they already receive from the state. That would account for \$41 million of the \$200 million increase over two years.

Charter schools receive state per-pupil funding but do not receive local property tax dollars that traditional public school districts receive for transportation and building costs.

Pence also wants the cap on vouchers, now set at \$4,800 per student in grades 1-8, to be eliminated. The move could increase the percentage of private school tuition the state would cover at some schools. The cost would be about \$4 million a year.

The governor's proposal will serve as a starting point as state legislators began to negotiate and craft the state budget over the next several months in a legislative session set to end April 29.

Pence unveils 2-year state budget

INDIANAPOLIS - Gov. Mike Pence unveiled a proposed two-year state budget Thursday that would modestly increase education funding, maintain state reserves and fund a number of new initiatives.

Chris Atkins, head of the Indiana Office of Management and Budget, said the focus of the budget is education and expanding educational opportunities for Hoosiers.

The average increase in the budget is 1.34 percent each year. Reserves would drop to about \$1.9 billion a year -- slightly lower than the current level.

About \$200 million in new dollars would go to K-12 tuition support during the two years -- though \$41 million would directly benefit only charter schools by adding \$1,500 to the per pupil grant for charters.

Atkins said charter funding is lower than per pupil funding for traditional public schools largely because they can't levy property taxes. He hopes increasing the base amount will attract high-quality charter operators.

The budget also increases Department of Correction operational spending by \$43 million and includes \$51 million to build new prison units. And it sets aside \$300 million in additional highway funding money during the two-year period.

Another key new program is the Regional Cities initiative, which would be a partnership with local communities to improve the quality of life in regional cities and attract top-tier talent.

The state would contribute about \$42 million a year, and local units would also contribute local dollars for special projects.

Pence's budget includes \$19.2 million for med school

INDIANAPOLIS — The medical school campus planned for Downtown Evansville cleared a hurdle Thursday when Gov. Mike Pence included funding for the project in the budget proposal he sent to state lawmakers. But the level of funding proposed by Pence — \$19.2 million — is just more than a third of what project partners have requested from the state to build the campus.

Pence's budget fully funds the Indiana University School of Medicine portion of the project, but doesn't include the combined \$30.2 million in funding sought by the University of Southern Indiana and Ivy Tech Community College to locate programs at the campus.

That means if the General Assembly maintains Pence's funding level, the building likely would be smaller in size. The timeline for construction could also move back due to the governor's proposal to fund the project with cash provided during the fiscal year beginning in July 2016.

Debate on the project is just beginning this legislative session, and state lawmakers could opt to put funding for Ivy Tech and USI in the budget.

Mayor Lloyd Winnecke called the proposal a "great starting point." Winnecke attended the State Budget Committee meeting Thursday at the Indiana Statehouse, where Pence's proposal was unveiled.

Winnecke said his administration will work with Ivy Tech and USI in the next three months to help them make their case to the General Assembly to be included in the project. IU, which plans to locate its Evansville medical school at the site, is the "cornerstone" for the project, Winnecke said

"This is the project that has to be funded first, so it makes sense the governor has identified this as the place to start the budget discussions," Winnecke said.

State Auditor Suzanne Crouch, who was a state lawmaker when initial planning dollars were approved for the project, said the legislative process to write the new state budget is a marathon and not a sprint.

"It is a great, great day," said Crouch, who served House District 78 before moving to the executive branch. "The governor recognizes this as a priority for the state of Indiana and has singled it out as a priority that is not only important to the health care for our region, but also for economic development and for job creation."

Pence's administration tried to prioritize funding for capital projects as "best we could," said Chris Atkins, director of the state's Office of Management & Budget.

"We feel like this starts the conversation about the medical school, and I also believe the IU component was the original request for the project funding itself, and we look forward to conversations about the other pieces going forward," Atkins said.

IU officials said Thursday that it's premature in the legislative process to talk about the ultimate size, design and timeline of the project.

"It remains IU's intent to plan for the creation of a comprehensive, multi-institutional health education center in Downtown Evansville. We also remain committed to supporting our institutional partners in their pursuit of the necessary funding from the General Assembly for their portions of the project," IU spokesman Mark Land said in a statement.

The almost \$50 million requested of the state is higher than the original approximation of \$35 million for the medical school, which will be located within the boundaries of Locust, Cherry, Southeast Fourth and Southeast Sixth streets.

The funding request grew from preliminary estimates when Ivy Tech and USI desired more space in the complex. USI plans to offer occupational therapy and health informatics programs, while Ivy Tech will conduct courses in health sciences and nursing. University of Evansville plans to offer classes in physical therapy and its physicians' assistant program.

Pence's proposal now goes to the House Ways & Means Committee — the first vetting ground for the budget in the General Assembly.

Pence proposal for new Indiana budget boosts school funding, including charters, vouchers

INDIANAPOLIS — Republican Gov. Mike Pence has proposed 2 percent and 1 percent increases in Indiana school funding over the next two years, with the money expected to help cover additional spending for private school vouchers and charter schools.

The governor's proposal for spending about \$31 billion over two years is being presented Thursday to the State Budget Committee.

State management and budget director Chris Atkins says the spending plan would leave the state with a reserve of nearly \$2 billion without any proposed tax changes.

The plan would give \$1,500 more per student for charter schools at an estimated cost of \$41 million. It also removes the school voucher program's limit on per-student funding. That's estimated to cost \$4 million yearly.

The Legislature has until late April to approve the budget.

Pence's budget asks for more funding to public and charter schools

Governor Mike Pence revealed his recommended budget for fiscal years 2016 and 2017 Thursday, with education priorities demanding most of the funds.

But, Statehouse Democrats say the governor's budget proposal doesn't tell a true story when it comes to increasing education funding.

Pence wants to increase K-12 funding by two percent in 2016 and one percent in 2017, which adds up to a \$200 million increase over the two years. Pence's plan would fund charter schools more than in the past, allocating an additional \$1,500 per pupil for students in charter schools. Right now, each Indiana district receives a minimum of \$4,280 per pupil, regardless of school type.

"In the category of funding, the first priority of this budget will be expanding opportunities for our youth in Indiana, from pre-k education to higher education," Pence said Tuesday.

Chris Atkins, Office of Management and Budget director, says the \$41 million specifically set aside for charter schools would reduce inequity between funding of charters and traditional public schools.

"We're concerned that some higher quality charter operators are not willing to look at locating here or investing here because of our charter financing system," Atkins says.

But, Austin Democratic Representative Terry Goodin says a \$200 million increase doesn't tell the whole story when it's split between traditional public schools, charters and private schools.

"People are confused at home," Goodin says. "As I speak to constituents, they say, 'Hey, they gave you 200 million more dollars in education.' Well okay, yeah but here's where this money went. So that money's not coming back to communities like it should."

Atkins says Pence's goal is increasing overall education funding and points out that the governor's proposed budget is only the first step in a nearly four month budget writing process.

Another part of Pence's proposal involves the state's new pre-k pilot program, On My Way Pre-K. Pence suggests funding the program at the same rate – \$10 million each year – per year through the two-year budget cycle. This is a change from the language of the law, which only sets out requirements for the current fiscal year. By suggesting the state allocate funds to the program for more than one year, Pence is setting the stage to expand the program, something participants have expressed they want.

The governor's budget also includes increased funding for teacher performance grants, as well as addressing financial needs for career and technical education and adult high schools.

\$31B Pence budget proposes 3% increase for schools over two years

Governor Pence is proposing a \$31 billion budget for the next two years, including a 3% increase in school funding.

Pence's budget spends about a third of expected new state revenue -- it increases state spending overall by 1.3%. Schools would receive an extra \$200 million, with about a fifth of that increase going to charter schools. Office of Management and Budget director Chris Atkins says the fact most charters lack the authority to levy property taxes has created a funding gap.

The budget includes \$90 million on top of the basic school formula for initiatives from vocational education to the state's new preschool pilot program, though it doesn't expand that program as some advocates have urged. Atkins says the administration will await the results of the pilot first.

The vocational education funding includes incentive funds linked to schools' performance. Atkins says he anticipates the legislature will make performance funding part of the basic school funding formula as well, and says the administration will support those efforts.

The budget increases a teacher merit-pay fund, and includes four-million dollars for a Pence proposal to offer incentive bonuses to teachers who go to struggling schools.

The proposal sets aside \$300 million for highway construction, on top of \$400 million from the current budget. Another \$51 million would go to build more cells at the Miami and Wabash Valley prisons.

The budget calls for \$56 million dollars for next year's bicentennial celebration. Most of that would go for a new State Archives building, and a new Bicentennial Inn at Potato Creek State Park near South Bend, the first new state park inn in nearly 80 years. The administration anticipates paying for those two projects by leasing or selling excess capacity in state-owned cell-phone towers.

The state would finish the two years with a projected \$2 billion surplus, about 13% of spending. Atkins says it wouldn't trigger the state's automatic tax rebate, because the state's tuition reserve account isn't included in surplus calculations for rebate purposes.

The House Ways and Means Committee will open formal budget hearings on Monday.

INDIANAPOLIS - Gov. Mike Pence is requesting a budget that will grow state government spending 1.34% over the next two years. The details were outlined by Director of the Office of Management and Budget Chris Atkins before the State Budget Committee Thursday morning. As the governor promised in early December, his budget prizes a balance with a surplus and a variety of education initiatives.

"The first priority of the governor is to pass an honestly balanced budget," Atkins told the bicameral committee. He added the governor's outlays have a structural surplus, which keeps spending under the rate of inflation (roughly 2%). Such "a healthy cushion" is worthwhile, Atkins remarked, as proven during the last biennium budget when spending cuts were not needed after a shortfall in predicted revenues. Volatile revenue growth characterized the state's last two years.

The governor also calls for maintaining the state's approximately \$2 billion in reserves above the targeted goal of 12.5% of total annual spending. Atkins told the committee this surplus would only fund state government for some 50 days but believed it adequate protection. Senate Appropriations Chairman and State Budget Committee Chairman Luke Kenley mentioned that reserves can be exhausted quickly and Indiana's reserves were crucial to protecting K-12 and higher education funding during the last recession.

Overall, Republican fiscal leaders were generally pleased with proposed budget. "It's a night

and day comparison where they were a couple years ago. And they should be better," Kenley remarked of the governor's budget presentation. "I feel real good going to work on this. I don't feel uncomfortable at all. I think we can get there by the end of April. I got so snakebit when the budget fell apart six or eight years ago that even though those revenue forecasts that they have, which are, I think 2.4% and 3.2% over the next two years, I'm not even sure I feel comfortable with those. I tend to favor the Pence approach that we're actually going to appropriate less than that coming out of the front door. I'm just not sure the revenues are going to be there or not."

"I think this is a prudent, honest responsible step forward," said House Ways & Means Chairman Tim Brown.

"This is the beginning of a three and half month process," Kenley wanted to emphasize. "The governor's folks have indicated they are perfectly engaged in that [discussion]."

Education Spending

K-12 tuition support will increase \$201 million over the next two years, \$134 million (2%) for FY 2016 and \$67 million (1%) for FY 2017, if the governor gets his way. Not all of this funding is directed toward traditional public schools, however. Both the state's burgeoning charter school and voucher programs are included. As the governor outlined in early December, he is calling to eliminate the \$4,800 scholarship voucher cap for grades 1-8 along with a tax credit increase for scholarship granting organizations.

Democrats believe the fiscal impact of yet more voucher expansion is being underestimated. "There's a lot of fuzzy math going on here," Sen. Karen Tallian, D-Ogden Dunes, said to Atkins during the hearing. Tallian contended the growing voucher program was going to take an evergreater share of overall education funding in the next two years and that it was getting an additional cut of the new \$200 million general increase proposed Thursday. Removing the cap on vouchers, she worried, would only accelerate this problem. "There is nothing in these numbers to show there is any end in sight to this," Tallian said. "How is \$200 million added to the pot, barely keeping up with inflation, going to cover this?"

"There ought not to be a limit on quality schools and educational opportunities," Atkins responded.

Democrats in both chambers are pushing to separate charter and voucher school funding from the general K-12 tuition support appropriation. Republicans argue that would needlessly silo off

what are really education dollars following pupils wherever they might be studying.

Democrats were not alone in having concern over whether the \$201 million K-12 request was sufficient. On this point Sen. Kenley remarked, "I'm a little nervous that the money isn't going to stretch as far as we need for it to stretch, particularly in respect to the public school formula. If you take those other amounts off the top [appropriations for charters and vouchers] of the formula then that squeezes the formula down that I'm not sure if we're doing a good enough job or not." ??Chairman Brown seemed less concerned. "We set a level of spending and then try to decide how to divide it out and that's the way to budget," the Crawfordsville Republican said. "If you go backwards, your unending obligation becomes unfunded." Brown noted that Pence's budget gives education higher than inflation increases in its first year.

?Another element likely to be divisive is a call to grant charter schools an additional \$1,500 per pupil. Since charters do not have the same operational funding per pupil as public schools, this will help correct the imbalance Republicans argue. Moreover, the governor's proposed Freedom to Teach initiative will be granted \$2 million per year and fall under the direction of the State Board of Education, not the Department of Education. Atkins said the goal of this program was to provide "a shot in the arm" to traditional public schools. Ten million dollars are earmarked for supporting turnaround initiatives for failing public school districts.

For teachers, the budget proposal includes a 10% increase in the Teacher Performance Grants program, which would then total \$63 million over the next two years. Teachers' pension obligations will reportedly be fully funded by a \$64 million infusion. ??Whereas both Superintendent of Public Instruction Glenda Ritz and Democratic lawmakers have been advocating an elimination of the so-called "textbook tax," the governor's budget does not include any appropriation for directly alleviating textbook costs. "We did not increase funds for textbook reimbursement in this budget," said Atkins told reporters. However, he added increased funding to schools would empower them to provide textbook assistance if they so desired. Sen. Kenley noted the state already provides roughly \$39 million in textbook assistance. "I assume there'll be discussion," he said. "But, I don't sense any urgency in moving forward on that point."??

Higher Education

For higher education the governor is requesting a 1% increase over the next two years for state universities' operating and line item funds. This exceeds \$40 million over the biennium. The top capital projects for every state university are allocated cash funding as well. For example, there is \$19 million to fund the construction of the IU Medical School branch in Evansville. Over the next two years student scholarship funding will increase almost \$39.7 million. Regarding a

program that has repeatedly not met demand and exhausted its funding, Pence is calling for an additional \$500,000 for the National Guard Scholarship fund.

The governor also wants to tweak the Career and Technical Education funding formula to be encourage better performance and will increase funding for facilities by \$20 million per year through the Indiana Works Council. There is also \$14 million more for adult high school programs.

Bosma said there are "still some discussions to take place," and that he needs to meet with Long again before the language of the bill is finalized.

Tuesday, state Democrats called for a total repeal of RFRA, an action Bosma said is not likely. "I think repeal is a mistake," Bosma said. "It infers that there's something wrong with the RFRA law, and I don't think there is."

Bosma also said he thinks the language in the new bill will appease businesses that have threatened to take their work out of the state because of the law.

Despite objections from Democrats, Bosma said he's confident the Republican Party will stand behind the new legislation.

"My goal here was to make sure the House Republican caucus was very closely united, and we are," Bosma said.

Thank you, Arthur, thank you for that very kind introduction. And thank you for the hospitality of the American Enterprise Institute. I am genuinely grateful to you and the AEI family, not just for your hospitality today, but for really keeping the twin lights of freedom and enterprise burning brightly in a city that too often seems committed to extinguishing those lights in our nation. AEI's mission, as I see it, is about keeping the hope of opportunity of a better life and a more vibrant society alive and well in this country — and promoting empirically grounded fresh ideas to make that possible. So it's an honor for me to be with you today, and please join me again in thanking the American Enterprise Institute and Arthur Brooks for his great leadership.

Like many other admirers of yours and of your work here at AEI, Arthur, I have been influenced by your writings and your sense of the term "earned success." I come from a state that works. It's a state where people value hard work. And so I see the principle of earned success lived out every day across the 92 counties of Indiana.

As I travel across my home state, I see it in the school teacher who helps at-risk kids after school to help them graduate and go to college; I see it in the entrepreneurial business owner who started a business in their living room and now employs 50 people; or the police officer who takes pride in keeping the peace on our streets each and every day. I see it in cities large and small all across the state of Indiana that principle that you've articulated so well, that people are happier and more motivated when they build something of their own. When they take greater ownership in their lives and they earn the success,

whatever level of success that is. And that principle is much of what brings me here today.

What I'm here to talk about today is related to that point, and it concerns the future of health care in America. And particularly how Indiana has been leading the way for the kind of reform that I would submit respects the dignity of every person regardless of their income and honors the aspiration of every person for a better life. I agree with the thinking of those here at American Enterprise Institute who have made the case that reform-minded conservatives need to ensure that the safety net is well-designed and strong to provide a firm basis for those starting out on life's ladder. I cite none other than President Ronald Reagan, who would say in New York City in 1979 these words. President Reagan said, "We have long since committed ourselves as a people to help those among us who cannot take care of themselves." But he added, "The federal government has proven to be the costliest and most inefficient provider of such help we could possibly have." I would submit once again Reagan was right.

The truth is the safety net doesn't need to be expanded, as some in this town argue incessantly, and it doesn't need to be abolished, as some also argue. It needs to be reformed. It needs to be made better, and I believe that can best happen in the laboratories of innovation and democracy at the state level. If you think of what President Reagan said so many years ago, that we have long-since committed ourselves to help people who can't help themselves, but that the federal government itself was the least suitable to do that.

I come before you today to really say that when it comes to the issue of health care, I believe that people in my party need to be "solutions conservatives," offering real alternatives to the big government answers of the liberal establishment that are grounded in respect for the aspiration of every person to earn their own way, to succeed, to

achieve self-sufficiency, and to do that in the best way possible with the kind of innovation that can happen all across the country on a state-by-state level.

Now I say all of this recognizing that this is the very antithesis of the approach embodied in the Affordable Care Act. Ordering every American to buy health insurance whether they want it or need it or not is not the answer to expanding access to affordable health care in America.

I've said it before and I'll say it again -- Obamacare must be repealed. And Obamacare must be replaced with market-based reforms and, as I'll elaborate more today, with a flexible Medicaid block program that allows the states to create innovative solutions at the point of the need. I have and will continue to advocate for a Congress and a President that have the political will to repeal Obamacare so we can do even more to improve health access and outcomes. Some of you who have known me for a while in this town know I was a pretty vocal opponent of Obamacare when I was in the Congress. I said then that this law will not stand, and I believe that more today than ever before.

Even though Obamacare's architects and boosters are breathing a little easier it seems these days, the program is still terribly flawed and should be repealed. It's bad for families. It's bad for business. And it's bad for America. And despite the great progress we have been making in our economy in the state of Indiana, there's not a day that goes by that I don't travel across the Hoosier state and hear people tell me that the implementation of the Affordable Care Act has a dampening effect hanging over Indiana's economy and our nation's economy. It's truly stifling growth in America.

Early in our administration against that backdrop, I made it clear that Indiana would not establish a state-based exchange, and I stand by that

decision.

Everyone knows the fiscal position of these exchanges is untenable even if they won't admit it. And come November, when the rates rise again, I predict you'll see another big drop in public support.

It was a government takeover of health care and the overly-regulated, top-down, command-and-control structure of the law will never allow the exchanges to operate freely as they should. And as a result, access will stay the same or get worse as costs go up.

I always thought that was the fundamental flaw of the argument on the other side. Most people back home I talked to when I was serving in the Congress would say they were most concerned about the cost of health insurance. But the focus in the Congress wasn't on lowering the cost of health insurance, it was about growing the size of government. And that's how the Affordable Care Act came to be.

So Obamacare needs to be repealed for all these reasons and, I would submit to you, for one more, because it's pushing a massive, flawed Medicaid program on the states.

I believe a plan for state-based Medicaid reform is not only entirely consistent with the repeal of Obamacare, but I believe it helps make the case for why repeal is needed.

Republicans in Congress have long argued for reforming Medicaid into a block grant so the states have the flexibility to design better programs. I can't think of a budget I voted for during my years in Congress that didn't include block granting Medicaid back to the states. And I submit to you today that in the debate over health care reform, states need to lead the way – like Indiana is doing.

Last week I announced that the State of Indiana will seek to do just that, to seek flexibility from the federal government to close the

coverage gap by expanding our own homegrown health care solution known as the Healthy Indiana Plan.

Honestly, I have been talking about using the Healthy Indiana Plan as the basis for expansion of health care coverage in Indiana since even before I took office in January of 2013. Today I am pleased to have the opportunity to share with each one of you the details of our Administration's proposed waiver to expand the Healthy Indiana Plan and offer consumer-driven, private market-based health care coverage to low-income Hoosiers.

First, a little bit of background:

Today in Indiana we have some 350,000 low-income, working Hoosiers – those below 100 percent of the federal poverty level. For a family of four, that's about \$24,000 a year. These are Hoosiers who lack access to the kind of quality health insurance that many of their better-off neighbors enjoy. Experts rightly call this the "coverage gap." Many Hoosiers up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level, which is about \$33,000 a year in income for a family of four, also cannot access affordable coverage and live with uncertainty in their families as well. Last week when we made our announcement, I had the opportunity to introduce the people of our state to a number of Hoosiers who fall into this coverage gap. Working men and women, who are out rolling up their sleeves oftentimes in the most difficult circumstances, but courageously moving forward in providing for their families.

People like Becky Kinkead and Beth Murphy, proud Hoosiers all, who find themselves essentially caught in that gap where their income simply doesn't give them the ability to purchase health insurance for themselves or for their families.

Some of our neighbors across the Midwest have chosen to address the coverage gap by expanding traditional Medicaid. I respect the decisions that others have made, but I'm here to talk about Indiana's decision. From the beginning of my tenure as Governor, we have been saying no to Obamacare in Indiana. We declined a state based exchange, and I have made it clear from the outset that we will not expand traditional Medicaid on my watch.

Medicaid is not only broke, it's broken. Medicaid is not a program we need to expand. Medicaid is a program we need to reform. It was nobly created some 50 years ago to help the poor and those with disabilities access quality health care. Truth be told, Medicaid has morphed into a bureaucratic and fiscal monstrosity that does less to help low-income people than its advocates claim.

And Obamacare advocates continue to promote Medicaid expansion despite the overwhelming evidence that the program doesn't work as it is supposed to. As a highly anticipated study in Oregon showed just last year, Medicaid actually increased emergency room use by enrollees and produced health outcomes that were no better than being uninsured. Other studies have also shown that health outcomes are no better, and sometimes even worse, for people covered by Medicaid compared to those with no coverage at all.

Last year's Oregon study should have sent shockwaves through the ranks of public health policy experts and advocates across the country. For some reason it didn't do that. It should have caused people to pause and ask themselves how expanding a program that doesn't improve health outcomes was the right approach for America, or how it's just and fair and right to do that.

If you care about low-income Americans, why in the world would you want to expand a program that provides such inadequate coverage?

The only thing Medicaid does well is make it onto the GAO's list of high-risk federal programs every year. We all know doctors who see Medicaid-eligible individuals for free rather than dealing with Medicaid. The program is bureaucratic, difficult, prone to fraud, and complicit in the growing disconnect between coverage and access in health care.

Let me say again, Obamacare needs to be repealed for many reasons, including that it's pushing a massive, flawed Medicaid program onto the states.

Medicaid expansion proponents are satisfied with covering a vulnerable population with a program that is so deeply flawed. But I'm not.

Fortunately, Hoosiers have found a better way.

In Indiana, we have learned that the way to change Medicaid is to base the program on what we know improves health and lowers costs, namely consumer-driven health care using health savings accounts.

Let me brag on the Hoosier State for just a second. We think Indiana is actually the birthplace of health savings accounts. Some of you in the policy community here in our nation's capitol remember the name J. Patrick Rooney. He was an insurance executive and a visionary. In addition to his idea he called medical savings accounts, which he, perhaps more than any other American, popularized on Capitol Hill and was able to achieve being added into the tax code as a pilot program, he also personally financed the first privately funded educational choice program in the United States of America. J. Patrick Rooney was my friend and a visionary Hoosier, and we miss him.

Beginning with his vision in the early 1990's, Indiana became a centerpiece for the discussion about consumer-driven health care. Today, Indiana has more public employees – 96 percent in our state government – enrolled in HSA plans, more than any other state, and

our private marketplace has a higher percentage of people enrolled in consumer-driven plans compared to many other states. So the Healthy Indiana Plan, built as it is on health savings accounts and on consumer-driven health care, makes most sense being launched and piloted and expanded in the state where consumer-driven health care, in many respects, was born.

Six years ago against that backdrop and progress, Indiana became the very first state to successfully create a consumer-driven health plan to expand quality health insurance coverage to the population covered in Medicaid. It was created on a pilot basis and we called it, as I mentioned, the Healthy Indiana Plan. It provides health savings accounts today to some 40,000 Hoosiers and empowers them to take ownership of their health decisions. And it works.

The Healthy Indiana Plan integrated the principles of consumer behavior within Medicaid, encouraging enrollees to take charge of their health care and empowering them to act as consumers in the health care market. Here are some of the facts.

The Healthy Indiana Plan has lowered inappropriate emergency room use by 7 percent compared to traditional Medicaid during the course of the program. Sixty percent of HIP enrollees, and that's our acronym you'll get used to, use preventive care, which is similar to the rates we see in the general commercial marketplace. HIP enrollees choose generic drugs at a much higher rate than people covered by other private insurance plans. In fact, when you think in a broad sense, consumer-driven health plans have been shown to decrease health care spending by 25 percent across the country, and those public employees that I mentioned in the state of Indiana – who have a 96 percent enrollment rate in health savings plans – save about \$23 million a year for taxpayers in Indiana thanks to the adoption of consumer-driven

plans. We are also beginning to see this downward trend in health care costs within the Healthy Indiana Plan.

HIP enrollees also have a proven track record of managing their own health care decisions. Ninety-three percent of HIP enrollees make contributions to their savings accounts on time, and a third of them say they regularly ask their health care providers about the cost of services. Ninety-eight percent say they would enroll in HIP again if they were given the choice. In a word, Indiana has proven in the last six years that consumer-driven health care works. And it works for those who are starting out on the first rung on the ladder of the American Dream.

Because of this success, last week my administration announced plans to submit a waiver to the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services to replace traditional Medicaid in Indiana for all able-bodied adults with an expanded version of the Healthy Indiana Plan. This will go for those up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level. We actually call it HIP 2.0—my kids liked that.

HIP 2.0 would offer three basic options. First, there would be a premium assistance plan that helps low-income working Hoosiers access employer coverage, and second, we have two HSA-like plans with varying degrees of coverage. It's essentially a three-legged stool for health care in Indiana.

We call it HIP Link, HIP Plus and HIP Basic. Each of these would allow people to utilize private insurance options and consumer behavior to increase access to quality health care and to manage costs and health outcomes in the long run.

Our proposed HIP 2.0 would offer HIP Link, which is a premium assistance program, and it is the first of its kind in the United States of America. This is a first in the nation. Those who qualify for HIP Link

would receive a defined-contribution from the state into what we call their POWER account that they can use for premiums, co-payments or deductibles.

Secondly, is the first of the two health savings account-like programs. HIP Plus is available to all qualified HIP members who make their POWER account contributions, which range from \$3-\$25 a month, based on income. The HIP Plus plan offers enhanced coverage including vision and dental services for adults and a comprehensive prescription drug program. It also covers maternity services with no cost sharing during the duration of the pregnancy.

Lastly is HIP Basic. It is something of a default plan. It is exclusively for Hoosiers that fall below 100 percent of the federal poverty level who fail to make their required contributions to their health savings account. Members of this plan must make co-pays. They will receive fewer benefits until they can begin to contribute to their health savings accounts and move back into the HIP Plus program.

Again, in summary the premium assistance program helps people who are employed but cannot afford their employer's health plan or do not have access to a plan. The enhanced health savings account plan, HIP Plus, provides incentives to save and use preventive care and offers a more generous set of benefits. The second, HIP Basic, serves as a default for those under 100 percent of poverty who fail to make their payments under HIP Plus. It contains incentives for them to re-enter the HIP Plus program. Both plans penalize inappropriate emergency room use and encourage preventive care instead.

Now contributions are required for all HIP members who choose one of the HSA plans. Those above 100 percent of FPL risk losing their coverage entirely if they do not make contributions, and those below 100 percent FPL, should they stop making contributions, as I said, must make co-pays and receive fewer benefits until they begin to make contributions again. The contribution amounts are reasonable and fair by income level and are designed to be that way. As we have seen in our pilot program, let me say this emphatically, low-income working Hoosiers in our state take pride in managing their accounts and make contributions to their HSA consistently. And we are proud of that fact.

The plan also includes what we call a Gateway to Work referral program that will connect those who qualify for HIP coverage with job training and job search programs offered by the State of Indiana so they can move up and out of the program.

HIP 2.0 is not intended to be an entitlement. It is a safety net program that aligns incentives with aspirations. The plan also includes high copays for inappropriate emergency room usage to encourage enrollees to use primary care rather than emergency room care to manage non-emergent health care needs, and I am very pleased to say that HIP 2.0 will be fully funded at no additional cost to Hoosier taxpayers.

HIP 2.0 will be funded through a combination of federal funds and an agreement with Indiana's hospitals, who have partnered with us to improve access to health care coverage within the state of Indiana. This means, if approved by the federal government, our waiver will allow us to expand health care coverage to hundreds of thousands of Hoosiers with no new state spending and no tax increases required.

Now if I haven't thoroughly confused you, or if I have, you can go to our website and read all about HIP 2.0 to your heart's content. Visit HIP.in.gov to learn more about this program.

You know I think HIP 2.0 maintains the emphasis on the principles that animate my political career, and I think are at the very heart of the people of our state and the people of this country. They put the

emphasis on personal responsibility and they also represent continuing efforts in Indiana to find innovative, fiscally responsible ways to get people the care they need. Reforming traditional Medicaid through this kind of market-based, consumer-driven approach is essential to creating better health outcomes for the people of our state and curbing the dramatic growth in Medicaid spending.

I truly believe that once Obamacare is repealed, the consumer-driven plan that we're proposing in the Healthy Indiana Plan will serve as a model for what block-granted Medicaid programs could be in states across the country.

With this I will close and be pleased to take some questions

I believe there are only two futures for health care in America today. There is government-driven health care or consumer-driven health care. Years ago, when the Healthy Indiana Plan was first adopted, Indiana chose the better portion by embracing consumer-driven health care, giving eligible Hoosiers the power to make their own health care decisions. And now we are seeking permission from the federal government in a form of a waiver to build on that choice by expanding the Healthy Indiana Plan for even more working Hoosiers.

HIP 2.0 takes consumer-driven Medicaid reform to the next level by replacing traditional Medicaid in Indiana for all non-disabled adults and offering instead a health care culture that is built on healthy, cost-conscious decision making.

Again let me say, HIP 2.0 is not intended to be a long-term entitlement program. Our hope is that people will not be on it very long at all, but will transition into the private insurance marketplace. Taking greater ownership of their own health care will lay a foundation for good health and prosperity for their families as they move up and out of the program and are able to obtain insurance in the marketplace. HIP 2.0 is

a safety net that aligns incentives with earned success; hope and opportunity.

The truth is the soft paternalism of the modern welfare state has failed to honor the dignity of the working poor in many ways, by failing to give them the benefit of the doubt and by failing to believe in them. In Indiana, we believe in our people, regardless of their income, regardless of where they find themselves on the path to success, and HIP 2.0 is really designed and built with that faith and confidence in the people of Indiana and their ability to take hold of their futures if given the opportunity to prosper.

Now lastly let me close, here at this policy group surrounded by so many think tank leaders. Let me ground this a little bit more in the world in which I work every day. Now I think as we talk about policies and coverage and health care reform, the debates that take place on cable television on the airwaves across the country, we must never forget that we are talking about real people, working people who deserve a better way. HIP 2.0, in our proposal to reform traditional Medicaid in Indiana, is about reaching out to people that are working hard to build a better future, but who simply don't have the ability or the means in the health insurance economy that we have today to be able to provide coverage for themselves or for their family. These are real Hoosiers, and I've talked to many of them across our state since I began serving as Governor and one of them, I'll close with, was named Diana.

I met Diana at a visit to Community Hospital East in Indianapolis, just a few weeks back. She was in with a heart condition, but she said it was okay if I came in her room anyway. She was self-conscious about how she looked and I tried to set her at ease, I told her, "You look great." I sat down next to her bed, took her hand and she told me her story. Diana had lost her job and shortly thereafter she started having chest

pain and, even though she knew she could go to the emergency room and get treatment, she waited.

Sitting up in her bed, she said, "The doctors told me I put off coming in a little too long, but I didn't want to come in because I was embarrassed because I didn't have insurance."

Now thank God she is okay, and I prayed for her more than once since that day at her bedside, and she remains in our prayers.

But she touched my heart. I mean here is a hard-working woman who just wanted to find a way to pay her own way and not rely on the free access of a public hospital.

You know I think Diana is like a lot of working Hoosiers, people who don't want a hand out, but want a hand up.

In Indiana, we have long-cherished the principle that we must "love our neighbor as we love ourselves," that we must not "walk by on the opposite side of the road" when someone is hurting and in need.

I think it is what makes Indiana special.

And let me just say that's what HIP 2.0 is really all about—respecting the dignity of every Hoosier, including our working poor, to find a way to cover themselves and their families, respecting their ability to make their own health care choices and empowering them to lead healthier and better lives.

I think the Healthy Indiana Plan is a better way—a better way to better health, to better coverage, to a better health care system, and to a better future for the working people in the state of Indiana and beyond. I hope that our success with this program will help other states, as well, and serve as yet another reason why we should start over on health care reform in America. Why we should repeal Obamacare and replace

it with a plan that includes consumer-driven health care for low-income Americans that empowers them and their families to meet their needs and make their own way.

Thank you, Dr. Anne Gilbert of IU Health, for that kind introduction. I am grateful to the staff and professionals here at IU Methodist Hospital for your hospitality and for the extraordinary work you do in these hallways every day. To our honored guests, health care professionals, and my fellow Hoosiers—thank you for coming today.

I have long believed that a society may be judged not only by how it deals with its most vulnerable, but also by how it comes alongside those often forgotten working people who are striving every day for a better life.

It is really my concern for those Hoosiers that brings us together here today.

I am here to talk not so much about the future of health care for our uninsured in Indiana, but about a better way to a better future for working Hoosiers and working families.

The facts are clear. Today we have 350,000 low-income, working Hoosiers—those below 100 percent of the federal poverty level or a family of four making about \$24,000 a year or less—who lack access to the kind of quality health insurance that their better-off neighbors enjoy. Experts rightly call this the "coverage gap."

Many Hoosiers up to 138 percent of poverty, or \$33,000 for a family of four, also cannot access affordable coverage and live in uncertainty.

These Hoosiers include people like:

- Beckie Kinkead, Greenwood, an Ivy Tech student studying health sciences. She has attempted to obtain coverage via the federal health exchange but has not been successful. WorkOne is helping her pay for her education. She is a widow with a pension, which disqualifies her for some programs. She would like to be able to afford more access to primary and preventive health coverage.
- Suzanne Kyle, Carmel, who recently went back to school to earn her Masters in Business Administration, but has still found it difficult to find a job matching her degree and skills. She is currently without health coverage or unemployment benefits. In the past she has had coverage through her employers, including consumer-driven health products.
- Mark Gibson, Greenwood, is a current Healthy Indiana Plan (HIP) member and has been on the program for three to four years. He has had two recent heart surgeries covered by HIP and says he is "lucky" to have access to the program. He is a self-employed contractor who couldn't afford insurance otherwise.
- Beth Murphy, Indianapolis, is unable to participate in the current Healthy Indiana Plan because of her income, but she is a likely candidate for coverage under the proposed HIP 2.0. She works part time in the home health care industry, but this employment is based on need. She has had health insurance in the past but is unable to obtain a policy through her current job.

With these Hoosiers and thousands of others like them in mind, today I am pleased to announce that the State of Indiana will seek flexibility from the federal government to close the coverage gap by expanding our own homegrown health care solution: the Healthy Indiana Plan.

I have been talking about using the Healthy Indiana Plan as the basis of an expansion of health care coverage in Indiana since before I even took office in January of last year. Today, I am pleased to share with you the details of my Administration's proposed waiver to expand the Healthy Indiana Plan to offer consumer-driven, private market-based health care coverage to low-income Hoosiers.

We will submit our waiver to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services at the end of June, following two required comment periods. We'll be sharing details about how to comment, and I encourage everyone to look the plan over and offer us your thoughts.

Now, some of our neighbors and neighboring states have chosen to address the issue of the coverage gap by expanding traditional Medicaid. But from the beginning of my tenure as Governor, we have been saying "no" to the Affordable Care Act in Indiana. We refused to set up a state-based exchange, and we have made it clear that we will not expand traditional Medicaid.

Medicaid is not a program we need to expand. It is a program we need to change. Nobly created 50 years ago to help the poor and those with disabilities access quality health care, Medicaid has morphed into a bureaucratic and fiscal monstrosity that does less to help low-income people than its advocates claim.

As a highly anticipated study in Oregon showed last year, Medicaid increased emergency room use and produced health outcomes that were no better than being uninsured. Other studies have also shown that health outcomes are no better, and sometimes worse, for people covered by Medicaid compared to those with no coverage at all.

Fortunately, Hoosiers have found a better way.

In Indiana, we have learned that the way to change Medicaid is to base the program on what we know improves health and lowers costs, namely consumer-driven health care.

Six years ago Indiana was the first state to successfully create a consumer-driven health plan to expand quality health insurance coverage to this population on a pilot basis. The Healthy Indiana Plan, or HIP, provides health savings accounts to nearly 40,000 people in Indiana and empowers them to take ownership of their health decisions.

The Healthy Indiana Plan integrated the principles of consumer behavior with Medicaid, encouraging enrollees to take charge of their health care and empowering them to act as consumers in the health care market. And here in 'the state that works'...it works!

HIP has lowered inappropriate emergency room use by 7 percent compared to traditional Medicaid, and 60 percent of HIP enrollees use preventive care, which is similar to the rates we see in the general commercial marketplace. HIP enrollees choose generic drugs at a much higher rate than people covered by other private insurance plans. Consumer-driven health plans have been shown to decrease health care spending by 25 percent, and Indiana's public employees have saved Hoosier taxpayers \$23 million annually thanks to the adoption of consumer-driven plans. We are beginning to see this downward trend in health care costs with HIP as well.

HIP enrollees also have a proven track record of managing their own health care decisions. Ninety-three percent of HIP enrollees make contributions to their savings accounts on time, and a third of them say they regularly ask their health care providers about the cost of services.

Ninety-eight percent say they would enroll in HIP again if they were given the choice.

Because of this success, my Administration has submitted a waiver to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to replace traditional Medicaid in Indiana for all non-disabled adults ages 19-64 with an expanded version of the Healthy Indiana Plan for those up to 138 percent of the federal poverty level, which for an individual is roughly \$16,000 a year in income and for a family of four is about \$33,000.

HIP 2.0 would offer three options: a premium assistance plan that helps low-income working Hoosiers access employer coverage and two HSA plans with varying degrees of coverage.

Our plan's three-legged stool—HIP Link, HIP Plus and HIP Basic—would utilize private insurance options and consumer behavior to increase access to quality health care and to manage costs and health outcomes in the long run.

Our proposed HIP 2.0 would offer HIP Link, which is a premium assistance program for people who have access to insurance through their employers, but who may not be able to afford it. This is a first in the nation. Those who qualify for HIP Link would receive a defined-contribution from the State into their POWER account that they can use for premiums, co-payments or deductibles.

HIP Plus is available to all qualified HIP members. It requires POWER account contributions, which range from \$3-\$25 a month, based on income. The HIP Plus plan offers enhanced coverage including vision and dental services for adults and a comprehensive prescription drug program. It also covers maternity services with no cost sharing for the duration of the pregnancy.

HIP Basic is a default plan for Hoosiers below 100 percent of the federal poverty level who fail to make their required POWER account contributions. Members of this plan must make co-pays and will receive fewer benefits until they begin to contribute to their accounts again.

Again, the premium assistance program helps people who are employed but cannot afford their employer's health plan or do not have access to a plan. They, too, could receive an HSA to use for premiums, co-payments or deductibles, or they could elect to have HIP pay a portion of the premium under their employer plan. Those who choose the premium assistance option would be responsible for making monthly HSA contributions on a sliding income scale.

Contributions also are required for all HIP members who choose one of the HSA plans. Those above 100 percent of federal poverty level risk losing their coverage if they do not make contributions, and those below 100 percent of federal poverty level, should they stop making contributions, must make co-pays and receive fewer benefits until they begin to contribute to their accounts again. The contribution amounts are reasonable and fair by income level. As we have seen in our pilot program, low-income residents of our state take pride in managing their accounts and make contributions consistently.

The enhanced HSA plan, HIP Plus, provides incentives to save and use preventive care, and it offers a more generous set of benefits. The second HSA plan, HIP Basic, serves as a default for those under 100 percent of poverty who fail to make their payments under HIP Plus. It contains incentives for them to re-enter the Plus program. Both plans penalize inappropriate emergency room use and encourage preventive care instead.

Nearly 35 years ago, Ronald Reagan said, "We have long since committed ourselves, as a people, to help those among us who cannot take care of themselves. But the federal government has proven to be the costliest and most inefficient provider of such help we could possibly have."

150 years ago, the Confederate Constitution used Mike Pence's view of religious freedom to justify slavery

April 9, 2015 will be the 150th anniversary of Robert E. Lee's surrender at Appomattox Courthouse to Ulysses S. Grant, marking not only the end of the Civil War, but also the end of slavery. When Jim DeMint last year stated that faith did more to end slavery than the federal government, his viewpoint was obviously "mostly false" and a whitewashing of history. As I stated in my *Roonoke Times* article after DeMint's comments, the Confederate Constitution and other Southern documents from this era utilized Cod and religion to justify slavery, not end the practice. The House Judiclary Committee inItlally voted 5-5, which would have kept the bill from passing. Because the vote tied, the bill did not fail, but instead did not pass, meaning that other committee members could be allowed to vote.

The committee chairman, Rep. Greg Steuerwald, R-Avon, allowed Reps. Casey Cox, R-Fort Wayne, and Jud McMillin, R-Brookville, to vote after missing the discussion. They both voted yes.

Democrats objected to the chair's decision and said that the debate was crucial and members who missed it should not be given a vote.

But Steuerwald said he has always let committee members who missed parts of the meeting to come back in and vote.

"This committee has always a lowed people to come in and vote," Steuerwald said. "I've been consistent over the years allowing people to vote. I don't think anybody can say I've not done that."

Senate Joint Resolution 9 would prohibit state budget appropriations from exceeding state revenues.

However, the restriction could be lifted with a two-thirds vote of the House and Senate.

Pence made the amendment a part of his legislative agenca, although Indiana lawmakers have generally passed balanced budgets, except during economic downturns or when trying to cut taxes to reduce a big state surplus.

The amendment has already passed the Senate.

Steuerwald said both McMillan and Cox were confused about what time the meeting was supposed to start. The committee typically takes place later in the morning.

If approved by the General Assembly this year, the balanced budget legislation would need to be approved by the legislature again in either 2017 or 2018 before it could go on the ballot for ratification. After the additional votes, the bill passed the committee 7-5.

Senate Bill 412, authored by Sen. Jim Merritt, R-Indianapolis, is meant to replace the Energizing Indiana program, which the General Assembly canceled last year over the objections of environmental groups. Energizing Indiana imposed a fee on the electric bills of all Hoosier households and businesses to pay for conservation efforts that included weatherization and other programs. Critics – including Merritt – said the program had become too expensive to administer.

The new proposal gives companies the authority to create and submit at least one energy efficiency plan to the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission every three years. The bill also allows for large energy customers to opt out of the energy efficiency plan.

Merritt said changes passed by the House give the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission "more teeth" in the process by allowing them to determine whether a plan is reasonable. Previously, the bill had the commission assess if the proposed plan stacked up against the utility's consumption in the previous year and could be continued for following years.

Sen. Jean Breaux, D-Indianapolis, said the bill still was a move in the wrong direction. Breaux said that eliminating statewide goals and allowing large customers to opt out is a step back from the previous Energizing Indiana program.

The Senate passed the bill 38-10 and it now moves to Gov. Mike Pence, who is expected to sign it into law.

IND ANAPOLIS – The Senate passed a bill on Tuesday that places new security requirements on e-liquid producers and bans retailers from selling them to minors.

House Bill 1432, authored by Rep. Kevin Mahan, R-Hartford City, defines e-liquid as a substance that is vaporized and inhaled by vapor pens.

The bill would require manufacturers to get a permit from the Indiana Alcohol and Tobacco Commission before bottling or selling the liquid. The fee for applying for a permit would be \$1,000, which would be good for five years until the manufacturer would need to pay a \$500 renewal fee.

HB 1432 also requires manufactures to use specified safety equipment and use such as childproof caps and extra security where the e-liquid is manufactured so that no one can get into.

Sen. Carlin Yoder, R-Middlebury, said the bill is fair and balanced and brings security and legitimacy into the e-liquid field.

But Sen. Vaneta Becker, R-Evansville, spoke out against the bill saying that e-liquid manufacturers in Evansville have concerns. Becker said the people are worried the bill is a way for big companies to eliminate the competition because the requirements and permits cost a significant amount of money, something the smaller businesses may not have.

Becker also said that she contacted the ATC and said officials there do not yet know how they will enforce the law if it is passed.

However, Yoder said that he is confident the licensing fees that the bill requires will be sufficient for the commission to find a way and that he is confident in their ability to enforce the law.

The Senate passed the bill 33-15 and now moves back to the House where legislators will consider the changes in the bill.

Effort to repeal old I-69 route law moves to full Senate for consideration

An effort to remove a nearly decade-old state law that bars the Interstate 69 extension from entering a suburban Indianapolis township is now headed to the full Senate for consideration.

A Senate committee passed the proposal, 5-3, on Tuesday amid Perry Township business owners and school officials sharing concerns about the road following Indiana 37 north into Indianapolis.

The proposal doesn't make a recommendation on the route for the sixth and final section of the project that will take I-69 from Martinsville north to Indianapolis. But it does seek to remove a restriction placed into state law in 2006 that prohibits the road from entering Perry Township, which is just north of Johnson County.

Proponents say all routes should have an even playing field as state and federal highway officials determine the location for the sixth section.

Opponents say business decisions were made based off the law — facilitated by a group of state lawmakers whose districts cover portions of Perry Township and Marion County — and that the law needs to be honored.

State Sen. Carlin Yoder, who chairs the Senate Homeland Security and Transportation Committee, said the proposal was difficult for him to consider, arguing the General Assembly shouldn't have placed the restriction into law in the first place. Yoder, a Middlebury Republican, and the bill's author, state Rep. John Price, pointed to a section of the Indiana Constitution that bars the General Assembly from passing local or special laws regarding the location of highways.

"Because we did horrible policy in 2006, we are left to deal with it," Yoder said.

Representatives of Hoosier Voices for I-69 and the Southwest Indiana Chamber said removing the restriction allows for the consideration of all potential routes.

"Every route should be studied and considered solely on their environmental and economic merits," said Justin Groenert, director of government relations and public policy for the Southwest Indiana Chamber. Yet, state Sen. Patricia Miller, who advocated for the restriction in 2006, said people have made business decisions based on the law.

"We didn't do this because people just didn't want it. We did it because we had substantial evidence of the negative impact on our schools and public safety in Perry Township," said Miller, an Indianapolis Republican.

The bill passed the House earlier in the session, and now moves to the Senate floor.

Price, a Greenwood Republican, said the General Assembly needs to adhere to the state Constitution.

"How can we make a promise or commitment as a Legislature or (as) the governor for a decade down the road? I don't think we can do that," Price said. "I think that's bad policy."

The Indiana Department of Transportation is analyzing comments and suggestions provided by the public earlier this year, with plans to have public meetings again in May, said Will Wingfield, a spokesman for the department.

The state has not identified a cost estimate for funding for the sixth section. The fourth section, which extends the road from Crane to Bloomington, is expected to be completely open to traffic by the end of this year.

The fifth section, which is being paid through a public-private partnership, is set to open by the end of 2016.

Syringe Exchange: Indicators of Need & Success

March 2015

The recent outbreak of HIV in southern Indiana among injection drug users brings attention to the lack of a strong public health system in these communities.

Syringe exchange programs (SEPs) are part of a comprehensive public health response to HIV and Hepatitis C.¹ Key indicators of need for SEPs include reported Hepatitis C, and injection drug use. CDC indicates that between 50-90% of people with HCV are coinfected with HIV.

Hepatitis C & Heroin Use: Surrogate Indicators

Hepatitis C virus (HCV) has increased in Indiana since 2011. There have been 15,709 reported cases of acute and chronic HCV from 2011-2013.² Urban and rural communities are affected. Communities with state prisons may have additional public health system needs due to the number of HCV cases among prison populations.

Heroin: From 2001-2011 there was a significant increase in reported heroin use among Hoosiers (most recent trend data available). Of those admitted for substance abuse treatment, 9% reported heroin as their primary drug in 2011. This is significantly higher than in 2007 (2.9%).³

Youth: In 2011, 2.9% of Indiana youth (9-12th grades) reported using heroin at least once.⁴ Nationally, there is evidence of an increase of HCV among young, heroin-injecting drug users who first used oral prescription opioid drugs.⁵



Public Health System: Necessary for SEP Success

Preventive health services such as HIV screening, HIV treatment and substance abuse treatment are critical components to SEPs. System investment is necessary. Prior to the outbreak, southern Indiana counties had limited access to HIV testing, HIV treatment and affordable substance abuse treatment (see inset). The closest infectious disease treatment clinic is in Louisville, KY.

HIV Testing, Case Management and Treatment Resources in Region



Acute and Chronic Hepatitis C in Indiana Counties 2011-2013

An analysis of publicly available reported cases of acute and chronic HCV by county for 2011, 2012 and 2013 suggests the following: (see attached table)

- Both rural and urban communities are affected by HCV. Those in **quartile 4** merit attention to their public health systems to assure early HCV and HIV screening; and linkage to HIV, HCV and substance abuse treatment.
- Counties with state prisons that report HCV cases likely have unique public health system needs to assure coordinated services.
- Rates of HCV (cases per 100,000 population) indicate more about the impact of HCV in communities than case counts do, and they allow comparison between and among communities.
- Scott County, the center of the current HIV outbreak, ranks among the top 3 counties for rates of acute and chronic hepatitis C.
- Wayne, Fayette and Henry counties, also in quartile 4, experienced a rapid increase of acute HCV among young injection drug users in early in 2011.6

Methodology

The state of Indiana publishes combined reported cases for acute and chronic HCV by year for each county. While HCV case rates are usually calculated for acute HCV, both types are associated with HIV. Thus, rates for the combined acute and chronic reported cases were calculated per 100,000 population to allow for county comparison.

Recommendations

- Separate analyses of county level reported acute and chronic Hepatitis C is recommended to allow comparison with the nationally published acute HCV annual rates.
- Identification of current HCV screening and reporting systems will be necessary to understand public health system capacity and preparedness.

Governor:

Nationally, we are seeing the return of migratory birds. These birds are infecting domestic poultry farms in 18 states (Indiana is **not yet** one of them) with Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI). We are monitoring this situation very closely. The LG's staff is also very engaged for the agriculture implications.

- Dr. Bret Marsh, (head of the Board of Animal Health) is outstanding and is really leaning into this effort, participating in national calls and forums should Indiana be faced with the situation. David Kane is working closely with him.
- Ted McKinney and his team are doing aggressive outreach to the poultry association and farmers in our state to keep them informed.
- My purpose in writing you is to alert you that in Wisconsin they have activated the National Guard because resources nationwide are in very short supply to help with de-populating poultry farms with infected flocks. I've notified the National Guard of this and planning is underway should there be a need.
- Governors in Minnesota and Wisconsin have declared a state of emergency to deal with the situation. (In MN 3.4 million bird infections and WI has 1.6 million)
- Iowa has not declared such an emergency but has a huge effort underway with depopulating poultry farms (9.9 million birds). To illustrate the significance of this outbreak, Iowa produces 20% of all eggs consumed in the US.
- Several of our state agencies are doing planning in the event Indiana is confronted with this problem.
- No incidences of human infection in the US have yet been found but CDC is monitoring it closely and developing a human vaccine for this strain of the virus. There is no known *animal* vaccine for this virus strain.
- Indiana's BOAH has statutory authority to indemnify producers for their losses, but the USDA is currently covering all indemnity costs.
- At next Wednesday's meeting of the Counter Terrorism Security Council meeting, there will be a briefing given about this matter.

Will keep you informed of any developments in Indiana.

Union workers fill Statehouse lawn to protest proposed common construction repeal.

IND:ANAPOLIS – More than a thousand Hoosier workers and contractors showed up to the Statehouse lawn on Monday waving signs urging lawmakers to not to repeal the state's common construction wage law.

House Bill 1019 would eliminate a system that lets local boards set wages for contractors who work on projects worth more than \$350,000. Opponents of the system say that leads to higher wages—often union wages—on projects, which costs taxpayers more money.

Supporters of the common construction wage say it ensures quality workers and helps Indiana families earn higher paychecks

"I'm here for my family and I want to make sure I can take care of them from now and into the future," Dane Yagelski, a Union Local 81 laborer said. "The training that these people get to get the jobs that they have, you can't put a price tag on that."

Yagelski was among the workers who crowded around to the south steps of the Statehouse, where inside, lawmakers have been debating the legislation since January.

They chanted and cheered as union and political leaders chastised Republicans for pushing legislation they say will hurt workers.

Later, Sen. Brandt Hershman, R-Buck Creek, a sponsor of the legislation, said he hasn't seen evidence in other states that suggest repealing the wage would lower the quality of work. He said his caucus plans to present an amendment that will address training programs for workers.

"We think that creates a level playing field to ensure that workers remain trained on the latest techniques on building construction," Sen. Brandt Hershman, R-Buck Creek, said.

HB 1019 was on the calendar for the Senate session on Monday, but Senate President Pro Tempore, David Long, R-Fort Wayne, said possible changes to the bill are still under discussion. The Senate will consider amendments on Tuesday.

Indiana Senate still combing through common wage repeal; vote coming Wednesday

The Indiana Senate on Tuesday is set to consider changes to a controversial proposal to repeal an 80-year-old state law that serves as a way to set wages for public construction projects.

Debate on a proposed repeal of the common construction wage comes as the General Assembly faces a critical deadline this week for bills to pass out of their second chamber. That means by Wednesday, House bills must pass the Senate, and Senate bills must pass the House to either go to Gov. Mike Pence for consideration or advance to a conference committee, where lawmakers decide a bill's final language. Senate President Pro Tem David Long said on Monday that Republicans were still wading through amendments for the common construction wage repeal.

"We're talking it through right now," said Long, a Fort Wayne Republican, "so there's just more work to be done on it."

Thousands of contractors and union members stood on the lawn of the Indiana Statehouse on Monday to protest the proposed repeal of the common construction wage. The push for the repeal comes three years after Indiana became a right-to-work state, which made it illegal for a union to charge nonmembers dues and fees associated with the cost of representation.

Supporters of the repeal argue that allowing the free market to dictate wages for public projects would offer protection to taxpayers in the state. But opponents say doing away with the ability of a local board to set wages for projects would work to lower wages and detract young people from entering trades. Participants of the Indiana Building Contractors Alliance's rally held signs and cheered as speakers, which included contractors from across the state, decried the proposed repeal. The rally brought Evansville residents to the Statehouse, including Dixie Springer, a representative of Laborers' International Union Local 561.

"What we are wanting them to do is not mess with the common wage," Springer said. "The thing is, when they reduce the common wage, we will get contractors from all over the country coming here." Springer noted the children attending the rally, describing them as the "coming generation." "They will be working for minimum wage if this doesn't get turned around," Springer said. Under the law, a local board meets to determine a baseline wage for public construction projects involving local and state dollars. Membership on the board includes local residents, a representative of the AFL-CIO and the Associated Builders and Contractors.

As the rally got underway, Pence took to his campaign Twitter account to say he was leading the fight to repeal the common construction wage. The Republican governor argued that "common construction wages drive up costs for Indiana taxpayers," turning the system "into a tax dollar sinkhole." The bill also sets a number of requirements on contractors, including barring them from paying employees in cash on public works projects.

Senators could consider a number of potential amendments to the legislation on Tuesday. One proposed amendment requires that the state study the effects of repealing the wage. Another would send the proposed repeal of the wage to a study committee, effectively pushing any talks of a repeal back. The Senate is expected vote on the Issue on Wednesday.

The Senate also will take up amendments Tuesday to the state's proposed \$31 billion budget that will cover state spending for the next two years.

While the Senate moved action on the common construction wage and the budget to Tuesday, the chamber on Monday passed a bill to remove a almost decade-old state law that bars an Interstate 69 section from entering a suburban Indianapolis township. Lifting the Perry Township restriction — providing the ability for the road to follow Indiana 37 into Indianapolis — passed the chamber, 31-19, and now goes to Pence's desk.

State Sen. Vaneta Becker, an Evansville Republican, asked her colleagues to pass the bill, saying she believed the Perry Township restriction that went into law in 2006 likely went against the state's Constitution.

"This bill doesn't say 'go that route," Becker said. "It allows the (Indiana Department of Transportation) to do their job and to explore all options."

Now, the Indiana Economic Development Corp. has retained an outside public relations agency, Porter Novelli, to help bolster the Hoosier State's image.

The timing is no coincidence, says Chris Cotterill, an executive vice president at the IEDC. Cotterill said Monday's announcement signifies that the Hoosier State will take its branding campaign "to the next level." He acknowledged that RFRA played a part in this decision.

"The debate about RFRA has affected that," he said.

"More people in Indiana are realizing that it makes sense to talk about the reputation of Indiana."

State officials had talked for a while of doing more widespread branding for Indiana, Cotterill said, and the recent RFRA debate made it clear that such a campaign is needed.

"The more recent events have put a nice solid period at the end of that sentence," Cotterill said.

The IEDC and the Indiana Office of Tourism Development will collaborate as the lead state agencies in the effort.

It's too early to say what the campaign will look like or exactly how much it will cost, Cotterill said. Campaign costs will come out of the IEDC's budget.

"t's our intention to give a full reporting of that once we have our hands around the full scope of it." Phil Mowrey, creative director at Evansville ad agency Daniel Burton Dean, said he'd been waiting to see who was hired to help the state recover from RFRA fallout.

"ndiana's current problem was such a shock to the national audience, and it may have reinforced some deeply held, nearly forgotten beliefs about the antique naiveté of the Midwest. Certainly, Indiana's RFRA debacle will be less a part of the news cycle in weeks, but the lasting effects to commerce will take years to truly forget," Mowrey wrote in an emailed response to the Courier & Press. Indiana's legislators signed a clarification to RFRA on April 2, adding language that says the law can't be

used as a mechanism to refuse services to any member of the public. That clarification helped defuse things, said Greg Wathen, the president and chief executive officer at the

Economic Development Coalition of Southwest Indiana.

Even so, Wathen said, the RFRA debate might make it harder to recruit out-of-state workers or

"We may never know the full extent of the damage," Wathen said.

But now that Indiana has captured national attention, Wathen said, the state could use this to its advantage.

"it's a chance to help redefine us, or more clearly define us," said Wathen, who worked in crisis public relations earlier in his career. "Things work out in mysterious ways."

Not everyone reacted positively to Monday's news.

Senate Democratic Leader Tim Lanane, D-Anderson, released a statement following the IEDC's announcement. Republicans have defeated a proposal in the Indiana House to delay when Democratic state schools. Superintendent Glenda Ritz could be replaced as leader of the state Board of Education.

House members voted 57-36 Monday to reject a Democratic amendment that would push back any change in the board leadership until after Ritz's current elected term ends in early 2017.

Republicans have pushed to allow the 10 board members appointed by Republican Gov. Mike Pence elect their own chairman, ending a decades-old law that made the state superintendent the board's leader. Supporters of the change say it's needed to address dysfunction between Ritz and other board members. House Republicans on Monday also voted down a Democratic proposal for statewide election of Board of Education members.

IND ANAPOLIS – Republicans won another battle against unions Thursday, passing a bill they say will save taxpayers money on public projects.

Gov. Mike Pence is expected to sign House Bill 1019 into law quickly, which will eliminate an 80-year-old system that lets local governments and schools set wage floors for projects that often favored union companies.

"Here we go again," said Rep. Greg Porter, D-Indianapolis, "We're talking about getting rid of something that's been fruitful for all of us in this great state...! Just wonder why we're doing this."

But Republicans say the answer is easy: It will mean cheaper projects.

"This is a common sense change" that helps taxpayers, said Rep. Martin Carbaugh, R-Fort Wayne. "It's their money, not ours."

The House voted 54-40 to accept changes made by the Senate and send the bill to the governor's office. Under current law, local governments and schools convene a five-member board to set minimum wages for projects. The board has representation from both union and non-union contractors and the wage floor is often – but not always – set at union scales.

The bill eliminates that system and instead sets some minimum state standards for contractors that include provisions for training, citizenship verification of workers, and a ban on cash payments to workers. The bill also requires companies to prequalify to bid on public projects.

Supporters say the bill should open projects to more competition from union and non-union companies and could reduce the cost of those projects by as much as 20 percent. But critics say it won't save taxpayers' money and will reduce wages at a time when Indiana's per capita income is already trailing the rest of the nation.

The bill's author, Rep. Jerry Torr, R-Carmel, said both those critiques can't be correct. He said if the bill won't save money, then workers won't be making less.

"It doesn't make any sense," Torr said. "It defies logic."

Torr acknowledged the bill has some problems with the language about the training programs and said they will be fixed in another bill, probably the budget. That prompted Democrats to call for Republicans to postpone Thursday's vote and send the bill to a conference committee to amend the language now. Or even better, said Rep. Christina Hale, D-Indianapolis, send the issue to a summer study committee and address it next year.

"Where's the fire?" she asked. "Why do we need to push this legislation now?"

But Rep. Todd Huston, R-Fishers, said there's no reason to wait.

"This is a very, very simple important bill," Huston said. "This prioritizes our commitment to taxpayers." Pence has already announced that he'll sign the common construction bill when it gets to his desk.

The House approved the bill 85-0 on Thursday.

The bill by Rep. Karlee Macer, D-Indianapolis, establishes the Public Safety Officer Special Death Benefit Fund. It will pay \$150,000 to the beneficiaries of EMS employees who lose their lives on the Job.

"Current state laws are unclear as to whether or not EMS providers are eligible for the death benefit like police and firefighters," Macer said in a statement about the bill. "This legislation gives EMS workers some peace of mind knowing, that if the unthinkable were to happen, their families and children won't be left behind by the state."

EMS providers are seven times more likely to be killed in the line of duty than other public safety officers, Macer said. Violent acts and automobile accidents largely contribute to this number.

Under House Bill 1080, the employers of EMS providers would have to pay \$100 annually per employee to ensure qualification for the death benefit. Payment for the coverage would then be deposited into the Public Safety Officer Special Death Benefit Fund.

HB 1145 requires the Indiana Professional Licensing Agency to create a health care volunteer registry where volunteer providers will be listed and may be approved for a location where they can be immune from liability for up to two years.

Under the bill volunteers must provide certain records and results on patients, and patients must sign a document that signifies they are aware the provider has civil immunity.

House Bill 1432 bans the sale of e-liquids to minors and requires manufacturers to get a permit from the Indiana Alcohol and Tobacco Commission before bottling or selling. Businesses would pay \$1,000 for the permit, which would be good for five years. Renewals would cost \$500.

The legislation also requires manufactures to use specified safety equipment and childproof caps and provide extra security where the e-liquid is manufactured.

Sen. Carlin Yoder, R. Middlebury, and Rep. Kevin Mahan, R. Hartford City, spent months working with elliquid manufacturers on the bill. Yoder said last week that the final language is fair and balanced and brings security and legitimacy into the e-liquid field.

But some manufactures and retailers have said the regulations are too onerous and will drive some momand-pop shops out of business.

The House passed the bill 73-14 on Thursday after the Senate approved it 33-15 the previous week. Pence can sign the bill into law, veto it or let it become law without his signature.

INDIANAPOLIS Gov. Mike Pence has signed a bill that's meant to help save drug users who've overdosed on heroin or other narcotic.

Senate Bill 406 allows individuals to obtain and administer an overdose antidote known as Nalaxone or Narcanto have on hand in case a friend or family member overdoses.

Previously, the law only allowed health professional, police and emergency workers to administer the drug. "With the rise of heroin addiction across our state, this important legislation will make available overdose intervention treatments and will save lives in Indiana." Pence said in a statement.

"Families, friends and loved ones struggling with the scourge of obioid addiction will now have access to life-saving medications that work immediately when administered and will help prevent the heartbreaking loss of life we hear about too often in the case of drug overdoses," he said.

The antidote comes in a filled syringe that doesn't have a needle and can be shot up a user's nose after an overdose.

Rep. Dan Forrestal, an Indianapolis firefighter who has seen the antidote used by first responders, has called it "nothing short of a miracle."

The drug has no known effects on someone who has not used heroin.

"The signing of this bill will save Hoosier lives," said Dr. Jerome Adams, commissioner of the Indiana State Department of Health. "Many overdoses happen in the presence of others and readily available haloxone is a proven method for bystanders and loved ones provide rescue assistance."

Data suggests that individuals whose lives are spaced by overdose intervention drugs are more likely to seek treatment for their addiction, the governor's office said.

Indiana Legislature nearing deadline with unsettled issues

State Sen. Luke Ken ey, the chamber's lead budget writer, said he thought the money was important in making sure the state doesn't lose its "good, strong and aggressive" image of being the right place to be.

"We thought that money would be helpful in making sure we address that issue," said Kenley, a Noblesville Republican, as he unveiled the Senate's budget plan.

While the price tag for mencing the state's reputation following passage of the law is mounting, the political fallout is still a relative unknown for members of the Indiana General Assembly. However, a new poll released last week by Howey Politics Indiana begins to outline the impact for Gov. Mike Pence.

The poll by Howey Politics Indiana found 46 percent of respondents disapprove of the job Pence is doing as governor. The poll surveyed 607 registered voters in Indiana last week, following lawmakers clarifying that the law couldn't be used to discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity.

Comparatively, a poll released in the fall had Pence at a 62 percent approval rating. But the long-term impact of the law may be too early to gauge, and could ride on lawmakers considering statewide protections for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender Hoosiers during the next General Assembly session.

House Speaker Brian Bosma, an Indianapolis Republican, said he hasn't assessed the political fallout, saying his focus remains on the remaining days of the legislative session.

"We are also quite a ways away from any election in the near future," Bosma said. "So the next crisis will occur. The next solution will be presented."

IND ANAPOLIS – A key Republican senator says she's open to needle exchange legislation but needs the go-ahead from her GOP caucus to sign on.

Public Health Chairman Pat Miller, R-Indianapolis, said after two hours of sometimes-emotional testimony on the proposal that she wants to add a sunset to the bill, meaning that lawmakers would have to reapprove the legislation in 2017 to keep the programs in place.

But Miller – who previously opposed needle exchange programs – said the state is facing an emergency in Scott County, where roughly 130 intravenous drug users have been diagnosed with HIV. She said something needs to be done now.

"ndiana is in a terrible position. I'm heart sick about the disease and the epidemic we have in Scott County," Miller said. "I'm just sorry we have that here in Indiana. But we need to address it." On Monday, Gov. Mike Pence extended a public health emergency for Scott County for an additional 30 days. That move allows the state to continue operating a temporary needle exchange program in the county, something the Indiana State Department of Health has said is otherwise illegal.

But Dr. Shane Avery, a physician in Scottsburg, near the epicenter of the HIV outbreak, told lawmakers Monday that a temporary program isn't enough. He said a short-term program encourages drug users to hoard clean needles rather than exchange them while a longer-term program could build trust that leads addicts to be safer.

"This HIV epidemic is not something that will go away in a few months," he said. "It's here to stay." Avery called on the state to do more to extend health, testing and needle exchange services beyond Scott County, saying there's plenty of evidence that infected residents have left the area to use drugs in other counties or had sex with people traveling through the region.

"If Gov. Pence and the Indiana General Assembly fail to act, then God have mercy on us," Avery said.

Pence has opposed an ongoing needle exchange and has said he's only approved the targeted, temporary program to address an emergency. Avery said local health officials are grateful for the help they've received but desperate for more.

"t is the governor's refusal to address this situation that will result in Indiana's most historic failure in public health," he said.

Miller said the proposed legislation is important because Pence can only act every 30 days to extend several programs, including the current needle exchange. But she said the legislative needle proposal — crafted by Rep. Ed Clere, R-New Albany — needs work. She wants to change the way counties qualify to participate and let medical providers weigh in on the process.

Miller said she also has to consult the other GOP members of the Senate. Republican senators can't sign on to a legislative compromise without permission from their caucus.

"We have not had one word in my caucus yet about needle exchange," Miller said.

On Monday, at least two members of that caucus — Sens. Erin Houchin, R-Salem, and Liz Brown, R-Fort Wayne — expressed concerns about the needle exchange provision.

Houchin said she's worried the legislature is "putting the cart before the horse" by creating a needle exchange program without the drug treatment services necessary to help addicts get clean. And Brown said she's concerned that a needle program might increase drug use.

But Brenda Patterson of Indianapolis said that when her daughter was battling a heroin addiction, she decided to let her have the clean needles she'd purchased for her diabetic son.

After her daughter's multiple failed rehab attempts, Patterson said it was more important that she prevent her daughter, who was also suffering from cystic fibrosis, from contracting an illness from a dirty needle.

"'m still not past worrying about what people think of me with a daughter who has heroin and a mother who would provide the needle," Patterson acknowledged, "What I do know is this; Giving her clean needles didn't stop or not stop her from using heroin at all. Without a needle, she used dirty needles," Patterson said her daughter is now four years sober – but it's not because she took away her needles. She urged the committee to pass a needle exchange program to help people like her daughter be safer until they can get treatment and get off drugs.

Plans for deadly Spencer County intersection to be unveiled

Indiana Department of Transportation officials plan to unveil their recommendations on how to improve a deadly Spencer County intersection during a meeting at Heritage Hills High School on April 30. The intersection of U.S. 231 and Indiana 62 has been the site of four fatal wrecks since 2011, when U.S. 231 was widened to four lanes. Local officials have expressed concerns about the intersection since shortly after the four-lane improvements were made. The intersection is west of Dale. Improvements were made to the intersection in 2012 to try to make the area safer, according to Will Wingfield, an INDOT spokesman.

Transportation officials had a meeting at Heritage Hills in January after 60-year Susan D. Grundhoefer, a former Heritage Hills Middle School principal, died in a crash at the intersection. Shortly after that crash, members of Grundhoefer's family contacted INDOT and urged them to take another look at improving the intersection.

During that January meeting, Grundhoefer's son, Seth Grundhoefer, said it is still difficult for motorists going east and west there to see at the intersection, despite the 2012 improvements. The highway going west from the intersection in question is actually Indiana 61 hecause Indiana 62 follows the same route as U.S. 231 for a short time starting at that Junction.

Currently, east and westbound traffic at that intersection have stop signs, while U.S. 231 traffic does not stop. There are rumble strips and oversized stop signs at the intersection for approaching Indiana 62 traffic.

Wingfield declined to disclose what transportation officials have recommended for the intersection. Testimony from the January meeting, as well as public comment taken by INDOT online, was taken into consideration, he said.

the meeting is scheduled to start at 6 p.m., and will take place in the high school's auditorium. INDOT officials will be available for questioning after the plans are unveiled, according to the department news release.

IND ANAPOLIS – At the Indiana Statehouse there are bills to give property tax breaks and hunting permits to veterans.

There's legislation to pay for specialized treatment for soldiers who come home suffering from post traumatic stress.

And there are proposals to help the children of disabled veterans go to college.

"All of them are important," said Jim Bauerle, a volunteer lobbyist for the Military Veterans Coalition of Indiana.

In all, there were some four dozen bills related to veterans introduced during the 2015 session of the Indiana General Assembly. Today, with just more than a week left until lawmakers go home for the year, there are just a handful still alive.

The disparity has created a clash between veteran advocates and key legislators – with veterans going on the offense to try to get their priority bills passed.

TOO MANY BILLS

Rep. Randy Frye, R-Greensburg, said legislators are doing the best they can to help veterans, but said they need to decide which pieces of legislation are most important, especially if the bills have a fiscal impact. It's a message he's shared before. Frye said he met with veterans' organizations throughout the summer and urged them to pair some bills together and be detailed about what they wanted to accomplish. " suggested they concentrate on four or five" bills, Frye said. "They filed 48."

A veteran fights to get therapy for fellow Hoosiers.

That's important, Frye said, because every year, more than 1,000 bills are filed and the majority are killed during the legislative process. Frye said it is difficult to consider and pass so many bills from one special interest group.

"I don't think there's anyway we can hear 48 bills for one organization. That's just not realistic," Frye said.
"There are just too many bills."

He also said that many of the veteran-specific bills were killed due to their fiscal impact.

"Sometimes there simply just isn't enough money to go around for everything that folks want," Frye said. But Jason Emery, an Iraq veteran, said lawmakers should focus on the individuals who need help, not the money.

"How do you put a price on leaving a man behind in battle or leaving a man behind back here. It's the same thing," Emery said. "When they put money into it that just really hurts us."

Veterans' advocates have said lawmakers have forgotten or con't care about veterans, but Frye said legislators want to do everything they can for them.

"All of us, every legislator that I know, wants to do everything humanly possible to help our veterans, to recognize their service to our country, and to reward that," Frye said. "But we do have constraints and those constraints include funding."

WORKING THE SYSTEM

While the Statehouse hallways are filled with highly paid, highly experienced lobbyists, the men and women who advocate for former soldiers tend to be volunteers – veterans who learn the legislative and political system as they struggle through it.

Consider a Ways and Means Committee meeting in which those volunteers were trying to convince skeptical lawmakers to spend money on a controversial therapy for veterans with PTSD.

They wanted lawmakers to amend funding for hyperbaric oxygen therapy into a bill, sponsored by Rep. David Frizzell, R-Indianapolis, that dealt with a spinal cord and brain injury fund unrelated to veterans. At issue was how much the hyperbaric therapy would cost – and how much it would take from the \$4 million in the bill.

Bauerle went to the podium and begin presenting his prepared remarks. After listening for a few minutes, Ways & Means Chairman Tim Brown interrupted.

"Can you bring it around to the fiscal impact of this bill please," Brown said.

"Yes sir," Bauerle replied. He then shuffled through his notes and explained that as veterans, not lobbyists, they needed the legislators help to amend the bill to provide veterans with programs that will help them.

He explained that the Department of Veterans Affairs was not helping with the problem and that the federal government would likely reimburse the state for the funds because of the state's standing. Bauerle proposed some suggestions for a pilot program. After several minutes, he finally got around to the fiscal impact.

"It would prove once and for all that veterans can be helped in our state," Bauerle said. "That would be the fiscal impact and the reason why we bring this to this assembled body."

Brown tried again: "How much do you think the fiscal impact would be?" he asked.

"Sir, the cost of currently using Medicare rates in Indiana. I've checked with three hospitals in Indiana," Bauerle responsed.

"'m not asking about Medicare rates," Brown said. "How much do you think the fiscal will be?"

"The fiscal impact for a trial that we're asking for would be 52 million."

So, Brown said, that's all the money the bill would be available under the bill.

"'m very sympathetic and obviously, Mr. Chairman, we welcome, once we get this started, we would welcome veterans to come," Frizzell said. "Now, their part of it, yes it would wipe out the fund unless we add more money through appropriation."

Brown turned back to Bauerle. "Is there no medical based research that shows this is effective long term?" Brown asked. Bauerle began to talk, but was cut off by Brown who asked his question again. The disagreements continued until Brown said, "Also, didn't you come to my office and state this was an issue you weren't going to bring forward this year because the Indiana State Department of Health was not going to support it?"

"That is a true statement and afterwards I recanted that request," Bauerle said.

Brown then thanked Bauerle and the discussion was done. So was the proposed amendment.

WHAT'S WORKED

What the volunteer lobbyists lack in experience, they try to make up for in organization and energy. Leaders of the veterans groups say they've been working together with a unified volce to try to convince lawmakers to do more than just what they call "whoop-de-do" legislation, which includes things that veterans say are common sense, such as veteran employment preference and National Guard financial aid.

But leaders say while those issues are important, there are other bills that really matter and can change lives.

The Military Veteran Coalition of Indiana is a group that meets to discuss strategies on how to deal with situations at the legislative level and promote veteran issues.

At a meeting in March, the coalition discussed how veterans have become a group that lawmakers like to be seen with, but don't actually want to support.

Ron Martin, who advocates at the Statehouse for the coalition alongside Bauerle, said veterans are sick of just being in pictures.

Politicians "stand along the highway to wave the flags, but that's all," Martin said.

HIGH PRIORITY BILLS KILLED

The veterans proposed a bill earlier in the session dealing with a Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy pilot program. House Bill 1615 would have allowed the veterans' recovery program and fund to provide treatment to veterans with PTSD and other severe brain injuries.

Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy would be one of the treatments used. HBOT has not been FDA approved for treating brain injuries and is therefore not covered by a soldier's federal health plan.

However, many veterans who have been through the program say it has changed their lives.

Emery, a Greenfield resident, was wounded during his time serving in Iraq. Upon returning home, he developed PTSD, which he said he didn't realize was a problem initially and led to changes in his behavior. He then learned the Rocky Mountain Hyperbaric Association for Brain Injuries in Colorado had a program that allows veterans to come to their facilities and houses and feeds them during the time of their treatment. Nothing like that is available in Indiana.

"It should not have to be that hard for any family to get the treatment they need for these soldiers. They're our first line of defense and we're not taking care of them," said his mother, Brenda Berry. Julie Stapleton is the medical director for the Rocky Mountain Hyperbaric Association for Brain Injuries and she believes the treatment is better than taking pills alone.

"'ve seen a lot of treatments come and go and I think overall this is the one treatment that I've seen that actually is therapeutic. It actually treats the symptoms. Medications manage the symptoms, they do not cure," Stapleton said in a video posted on the association's website.

The association's president, Eddie Gomez, said in the video, that the therapy should be accompanied by other treatments as well.

"Hyperbaric oxygen therapy is definitely a treatment you want to do with other therapies. It's not the endall. The psychological counseling definitely has to be in there," Gamez said.

Emery wants veterans in Indiana to receive similar treatment — without making the trip to Colorado. That's why he testified in favor of HB 1615 earlier. But the bill never made it out of committee and the later attempt to amend similar language into another bill failed too.

That wasn't the only high-priority veterans' bill that died this year.

SB 424 would make the state women's veteran coordinator a permanent position that must be filled. The law currently makes the position optional.

Lisa Wilken, who volunteers as an advocate for female veterans, said lawmakers don't understand that the position is needed by women veterans who want someone to fight for their gender-specific issues.

"Unfortunately the losers in this situation could be the women veterans in the state of Indiana," Wilken said.

This year, Frye, who chairs the committee decided not to hear the bill after hearing and supporting it last year.

"The reason that we're not hearing the bill is because I don't think it's necessary," Frye said.

Frye said lawmakers have cealt with the issue and the position is filled, so there is no need to hear it again, but Wilken said it the issue is about whether or not the position is permanent.

"If you support the legislation and you support the position always being there, then why not go ahead and complete the legislation and make this a truly permanent position here in Indiana," Wilken said. She said veterans do not want special treatment, they just want the opportunity to have their bills heard and to be voted on based on their merit.

THE BOTTOM LINE

Throughout the process, the majority of veterans bills have been killed, especially those that had money attached to them.

Senate Appropriations Chairman Luke Kenley, R-Noblesville, killed several of them in his committee early in the session. And so when he was pushed later about including the provisions in the state budget, he pointed back to those bills. "I think that shows my intention and their persistence."

Veteran advocates said that the lawmakers have forgotten about veterans and don't care about their issues. Lawmakers said they care about veterans, but sometimes they simply ask for too much and that there is not enough money to go around.

At the end of the day, both groups continue to disagree about how high on the priority list veterans issues should be

"We want our list to be shorter," Martin said. "You gotta pass a few bills and it will be shorter."

Lawmaker renews efforts to require schools to teach cursive.

A longtime supporter of requiring Indiana schools to teach cursive writing is making her fifth attempt to restore the skill to Indiana's curriculum.

Sen. Jean Leising, R-Oldenburg, acided the measure to an education bill moving through the General Assembly last week after a cursive writing bill she sponsored earlier in the session failed.

Leising said she expects the bill, which also would replace the ISTEP- exam, to go to a conference committee. The Indianapolis Star reported. Tory Flynn, a spokeswoman for House Republicans, said no decision had been made on a conference committee.

The Indiana State Board of Education voted in 2011 to eliminate cursive as a requirement for student instruction and told school districts that it expected students to become proficient in keyboard use. Many districts nationally did the same when they adopted the national Common Core educational standards, which omitted penmanship classes for a variety of reasons, including increasing use of keyboarding and evidence that even most adults use some hybrid of classic cursive and print.

Leising has been trying to reinstate the requirement and sponsored cursive writing bills in 2012, 2013 and 2014 that failed.

The state Senate approved a cursive measure in 2012, but it didn't advance in the House.

Adding the measure to the House bill was a last-minute effort to get it passed this year, said Leising, who worries that younger generations won't be able to write cursive or read documents like the original version of the U.S. Constitution if the requirement isn't restored.

"I still have a pad of yellow Sticky Notes, and if I write out something neatly in cursive, I expect an internative Senate to be able to read that," she said.

IND ANAPOLIS – Possible presidential contender Carly Fiorina wouldn't say Monday how she thinks the GOP should choose which candidates will get to participate in the party's 2016 presidential debates.

Fiorina – in Indianapolis to speak at a GOP women's event – sidestepped the question, even though the debates could be her best shot at getting the attention she'd need to stand out among a growing Republican field.

"I am reasonably confident that if I decide to jump in the race that I will be on that debate stage," Fiorina said. "I wouldn't do this if I didn't think I would have a lot of encouragement and I wouldn't do it if I wasn't prepared."

the former CEO of Hewlett Packard is one of more than a dozen Republicans who are running or considering a bid for the party's nomination in 2016.

But Fiorina trails some those other candidates significantly. National polls show her support among GOP primary voters is less than 1 percent. That's important because those polls could determine who gets into debates that are controlled in part by the Republican National Committee.

Fiorina said after her speech to 900 people at the 25th Anniversary Lugar Series Annual Event that her business experience makes her "uniquely qualified" for the position.

" think what people are looking for is both authentic, empathetic, and will solve problems with the good of everyone in mind," she said.

But it's her ability to criticize presumptive Democratic nominee Hillary Clinton without concern about gender that could make her especially valuable within the party.

Fiorina said during an event last week that "there are a whole set of things" that Clinton won't be able to talk about if she's facing a female opponent. CNN.com reported that Florina said that Clinton would instead be forced to talk about "her track record, her accomplishments, her candor and trustworthiness and her policies."

"And I think that's what elections should be run on — not identity politics, not what you look like, but who you are, and what you believe, and what you've done, and what you will do," the CNN story quoted her saying.

Fiorina focused Monday in Indianapolis on foreign policy issues and her experience as a business leader, explaining how that translates to government.

"You have customers who really are very important. You have investors who are very important. You have communities who are very important. And you have employees," she said. "So in truth, a successful business leader is balancing constituencies all the time."

Fiorina said she expects to make a decision and formal announcement about running for office in the coming weeks.

The Indiana First Lady's Charitable Foundation chose Feeding Indiana's Hungry, which locally helps to support Tri-State Food Bank in Evansville, as the major grant recipient for this year's luncheon.

Pence, who led the creation of the non-profit in 2013, announced in November the selection of Feeding Indiana's Hungry. The grant amount for Feeding Indiana's Hungry will be unveiled Thursday.

This year the foundation is focusing on agriculture in Indiana with the theme of "Hoosier Home Grown," so Pence said Feeding Indiana's Hungry was a natural choice.

IND ANAPOLIS – Indiana's unemployment rate dropped by 0.1 percent cown to 5.8 percent in March. The national average still remains lower than Indiana at 5.5 percent.

Over the past two years, the unemployment rate in the state has gone down by 2.4 percentage points. Meanwhile, the labor force has grown by about 72,000 people over that two-year period.

Steven Braun, the commissioner of the Indiana Department of Workforce Development, said Indiana's economic indicators are still positive.

"Continued claims for unemployment insurance remain at their lowest levels in 15 years, which is also an encouraging trend as we enter the spring and summer months," Braun said.

Lawmaker seeks to drop drug testing for welfare recipients

IND ANAPOLIS — The lawmaker behind a proposal to drug test certain welfare recipients backed away from the idea Tuesday, instead calling for further study on the issue.

Democratic Rep. Terry Goodin, of Crothersville, proposed the testing requirement in a last-minute amendment on the House floor last week, claiming it would help fight a recent HIV outbreak in Southern Indiana. He asked conference committee members Tuesday to remove the provision and require a study into Indiana's drug abuse problems this summer.

Goodin said he began to reconsider the idea after learning last week that its impact on drug use could be minimal, but said he still felt the proposal spurred serious conversations about the issue, which has been considered several times in recent years.

"Mission accomplished. We declare victory," he said. "We're going to get these folks who need the help, the help they need."

Indiana's proposal would apply only to those who receive cash benefits through the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Program, specifically people who have been identified as high risk for drug abuse or have been charged with a drug-related crime. If recipients fail a drug test, they would have an opportunity to receive counseling, but several failed tests after counseling would make them ineligible for welfare benefits for at least three months.

More than a dozen other states, including Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi, have either passed or are considering similar legislation, according to the National Conference of State Legislatures.

Indiana Family and Social Services Administration officials report that only about 3,800 adults receive TANF payments. In Scott County, where the HIV outbreak is centered, only nine adults receive TANF payments. Another 60 more receive benefits on behalf of 93 children.

Senate health committee chairwoman Patricia Miller, R-Indianapolis, said she will discuss the issue with Republican caucus members before making a decision, but said she had serious concerns about its cost: about \$1.8 million to implement testing.

House Health Committee Chairman Ed Clere, R-New Albany, said he supports further study, especially if the measure could be seen as discriminatory or punitive against a certain group. He also expressed concerns about "potential unintended consequences" that could negatively impact children receiving benefits through an adult.

"We all want accountability from people who are receiving benefits but I'm not sure this is the right approach," he said. "In fact I'm pretty sure it's not the right approach."

Committee members face an April 29 deadline to reach an agreement.

Legislature looks to overhaul school intervention rules; mulls EVSC-style Transformation Zones. Chelsea Schneider

The bill moves up the timeline (or Indiana State Board of Education Intervention in a school from six to four years of consecutive "F" accountability grades. The proposal also implements the Transformation Zone — a model for improving a school's achievement that gained statewide recognition after use by the Evansville Vanderburgh School Corp. — as an official strategy schools can use.

Some public education groups told a panel of state legislators on Tuesday that they oppose moving up the timeline for state intervention over concerns about the current metrics used to determine school A-F accountability grades. But state Sen. Earline Rogers, a Gary Democrat, said she supported the change. Earlier interventions, Rogers said, means earlier prospects for students to begin to achieve.

" do think four years is a long time for a student to be in a failing school," Rogers said.

The shortened timeline would affect schools receiving an initial "F" letter grade after June 30, 2016. Schools currently ranked as "F" would continue with the original six-year timeline, according to the bill. Intervention options range from following the Department of Education's recommendations to closing a school.

The bill also allows school districts with a school rated "D" or "F" to immediately ask the State Board of Education for authority to turn into a Transformation Zone.

State Rep. Bob Behning, who leads education issues for the House, said the bill ultimately aims for less state intervention.

"We're giving schools the ability to turn themselves around, and Evansville was a good example where they had schools scheduled to be taken over but because they had the whole community come together, they went ahead and were able to turn around," Behning said.

In 2012, EVSC decided to contract on its own accord with a nationally recognized non-profit in school turnaround — Mass Insight Education — to build the Transformation Zone as some schools in the district came closer to a potential state takeover.

When Glenwood Leadership Academy received its sixth consecutive "F," the school became the first in the zone to trigger talks of state oversight. Lincoln School hit the same trigger in 2014. But the State Board of Education agreed to let Glenwood and Lincoln stay under EVSC control.

A few years earlier, those schools faced a greater likelihood of being assigned to an outside operator — a more drastic turnaround effort that's been marred with problems in the five schools in Gary and Indianapolis taken over under the administration of former Indiana schools chief Tony Bennett.

Some state board members regard the Transformation Zone as the answer to state oversight. Gov. Mike Pence even mentioned EVSC's efforts in rolling out his education priorities for the 2015 legislative session.

A representative of the Indiana State Teachers Association said at the legislative hearing Tuesday that she hoped lawmakers would see the union as a partner in changes they are considering for schools. "I'm standing here asking you to give one of these or all of these school governance changes the chance to include the local association in a true partnership," said Gail Zeheralis, with the teachers union. Lawmakers are working to finalize language for the proposal before the General Assembly adjourns by April 29.

These license branches will process only new, amended or replacement ID cards, and renewed, amended or replacement driver's licenses and learner permits.

Indiana law requires residents to show either a driver's license or a state-issued identification card at polling places before they can vote.

Lawmakers still looking for deal on gambling bill

IND:ANAPOLIS — An always-evolving gambling bill at the Indiana Statehouse could undergo more changes after a conference committee met Wednesday and then recessed to come up with a deal behind closed doors.

Lawmakers are still trying to decide whether to authorize live dealers at the state's two horse track casinos – and if they do, how to mitigate the impact on other gambling operations. It's a sticky question because Gov. Mike Pence has said he opposes a gambling expansion and key lawmakers say his definition includes live dealers.

Rep. Tom Dermody, R-LaPorte, said lawmakers have been trying since the summer to find language that will benefit all of Indiana's casinos.

"Hopefully we can bring something that will help the industry compete with the surrounding states," Dermody said.

Rep. Terri Austin, D-Anderson, and Sen. Tim Lanane, D-Anderson, said they favored the language in the original House version of the bill that allowed racinos to have live dealers at 24 table games immediately—and let them petition for more after five years.

The Senate version of the bill bans live dealers for five more years to give other gambling operations the opportunity to adjust to the future change. But then the number of games wouldn't be capped.

The live dealers provision in the bill is among the most controversial issues left for lawmakers to settle. Casino industry officials disagree about the impact, saying it would benefit some operations while taking advantages away from others.

"The House sent a very strong message when we sent this bill out 76-22, that we want to address the industry as a whole," Austin said. "We do not want to pick winners and losers."

Austin said lawmakers want to put the casinos in the "best competitive situation" in the future. The bill is meant to help the gambling industry deal with growing competition in Ohio and Illinois, as well as a possible Native American casino in northern Indiana.

But other casino operators say that adding live dealers at the race track casinos will keep Central Indiana customers from driving to their operations in more distant places.

The House and Senate versions of the bill both allow riverboat casinos to rebuild on land. However, lawmakers are still discussing whether to provide a tax credit for casino investments and extend a marketing tax break.

"There's still some tweaks that need to be done," Austin said.

Lawmakers try to finalize gambling overhauls as session nears end

Lawmakers are working to finalize a plan aimed at boosting the competitiveness of the state's gambling industry with a week remaining in this year's Indiana General Assembly session.

A panel of lawmakers heard again from the operators of the state's casinos Wednesday. The proposal would allow Tropicana Evansville and the state's other riverboats to move to land-based facilities. Negotiations on the bill appear centered on another of its features — allowing the state's two race track casinos, in Anderson and Shelbyville, to have live dealers. The House plan provided for live dealers at the racinos, but the Senate plan pushed them back to 2021.

Tropicana Evansville General Manager Jason Gregorec attended Wednesday's legislative hearing and expressed his support for the bill. Gregorec said allowing the casino to build on land would help it compete with Harras Metropolis in Illinois, which recently moved to land. He noted Tropicana has made improvements in Atlantic City and at sites in Mississippi, where the company brought the operations of two riverboats onto land.

"The company is in the position to make significant improvements at our facilities," Gregorec said. Gregorec said he hopes lawmakers add a tax credit for capital investments back into the bill. The credit would aid in Tropicana building its land-based casino, he said. The credit was in the House version but later removed in the Senate.

A key lawmaker on the hill, state Rep. Tom Dermody, said the credit came out of the House version to help casinos "improve their property and make it more of a destination point."

"This is a bill that's been worked on since this past summer," said Dermody, a LaPorte Republican. "I've appreciated all the effort and hopefully we can bring something that will help the industry compete with surrounding states."

State Sen. Luke Kenley, a Noblesville Republican, stressed to lawmakers that the state's casino industry is fluid, especially given talks of a potential casino by the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Native Americans in South Bend.

Kenley said he understood the bill that cleared the Senate didn't answer all the desires and demands of the industry.

But he sald, "Are we really able to do that with uncertainty that's ahead of us?"

The bill allows for casinos to move onto land within their existing footprint. For Tropicana to move onto land, the company plans to relocate a building that currently houses a temporary flood wall. The city also plans to vacate South Third Avenue, between Riverside and Northwest First Street in the area of the

proposed casino site, to make way for development. The bill allows Tropicana to build on that portion of the road.

Under the Senate version, discussion about proposed gambling taxing changes is sent to a study committee. Before passing the bill to the Senate, the House had stripped out major taxing changes, which could have cost the city of Evansville and other local governments, and the House chose not to end the \$3 admissions tax casinos pay every time a patron steps onto their facilities.

the bill in its current form does exempt the French Lick casino from the admissions tax, and also allows casinos to offer complimentary beverages outside of the gaming floor.

Lawmakers face a tight deadline on deciding a final gambling proposal to forward to Gov. Mike Pence. The General Assembly set to adjourn by April 29.

INDOT commissioner resigns without explanation

Karl Browning resigned his post Wednesday as commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation through an e-mail to the governor.

Gev. Mike Pence immediately named Brandye Hendrickson—who previously led the agency in an interimrole—to succeed him.

The governor's office would not say whether Browning's departure had been anticipated or whether he'd been ask to leave.

"We don't discuss personnel matters," press secretary Kara Brooks said.

And Browning's resignation email offered no clues.

"While I am proud for the accomplishments I've been able to achieve in state government and am sincerely grateful to you for the opportunity to serve your administration, it is time for me to move on," the e-mail said. "Effectively immediately I resign my appointment as Commissioner of the Department of Transportation. Highest regards, Karl B. Browning."

Pence appointed Browning to serve as commissioner in 2013—the second time he held the position. He also headed up INDOT from 2006 to 2009. In 2011, then-Gov. Mitch Daniels appointed Browning to be executive director of the Hoosier Lottery.

Hendrickson has served as the deputy commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation since 2007, overseeing the agency's Greenfield District Operations. In 2013, Pence named Hendrickson interim commissioner at INDOT, a role she held for seven weeks.

" appreciate the apportunity to continue my service to Hoosiers as head of the Indiana Department of Transportation," she said in a statement, "Hook forward to contributing further to the accomplishments of the Pence administration."

Hendrickson also served as deputy commissioner for human resources within INDOT and was the human resources director for the Indiana Department of Environmental Management for more than six years. "With more than a decade of executive experience in state government, Brandye Hendrickson has demonstrated a commitment to public service and a nearly unmatched depth of understanding of the Indiana Department of Transportation," Pence said in a written statement. "I am confident that she will upholo the agency's mission and serve Hoosiers well as commissioner."

Lawmakers negotiating changes to State Board of Education

Republican legislative leaders said Thursday they were still working out a final plan for changes to the Indiana State Board of Education.

But the proposal could do more than effectively remove state Democratic schools chief, Glenda Ritz, from head of the state board — or change the size of the board and its appointment process. Lawmakers are discussing adding a requirement into state law that the Ritz-controlled Indiana Department of Education shares data with the state board.

Senate President Pro Tem David Long said lawmakers need to take a holistic approach in fixing the state board's tension. Long, a Fort Wayne Republican, said he's fielded concerns that even if the chairperson changes, the board will continue to experience dysfunction if there's not a free flow of information between the Department of Education and the state board.

"I would say that there's great frustration on the board right now. A lot of it comes from the fact there's a lot of data they're not being provided that historically the board has been provided, and they are very frustrated about it," I ong said.

Earlier proposals to require the Department of Education to provide data to the state board died earlier in the legislative session. One bill authored by a Republican lawmaker stated, "The department shall provide any data to the state board that the state board determines is necessary to perform the state board's duties under law."

The bill also required any data sharing to be done in compliance with a federal law that governs student information.

Ritz spokesman Daniel Altman on Thursday refuted claims the Department of Education hadn't provided information. Altman said his understanding was the department has "always provided data that (the state board) asked for," subject to any prohibition.

Yet, House Speaker Brian Bosma echoed Long's comments during a media briefing, saying access to datalism is an issue (awmakers are currently working on.

"We want to be sure, when the General Assembly leaves town next Wednesday evening, there are statutes in place to see to it that the board functions," Bosma said.

The reintroduction of the data requirement comes in the final days of the General Assembly, where lawmakers have yet to come to a consensus on the makeup of the state board.

The bill calls for the state board to elect its own chair. Right now, the state superintendent of public instruction automatically fills that role. Even with the changes, Ritz would still remain a member of the state board through her elected office.

The Senate's original plan reduced the size of the board from 11 to nine members and also changed who makes appointments to the board. The governor currently makes all appointments, with the exception of the state superintendent of public instruction. The version that passed the House increased the board to 13 members, and while most appointments would remain with the governor, legislative leaders would make two appointments.

Changes to the state hoard are one of several issues lawmakers are working to finalize before the General Assembly adjourns April 29. Lawmakers also are hammering out a new, two-year state budget and potential changes to the state's gambling industry, including approval of land-based casinos.

IND ANAPOLIS – Key lawmakers said Thursday they plan to move forward with a new STEP test – at least for the next two years – and then study whether an off-the-shelf exam could be used in the future to save money.

Sen. Luke Kenley, R-Noblesville, said he would back off his proposal to require the use of an already standardized test instead of ISTEP to measure student comprehension of the state's new curriculum standards.

Earlier this session, the Senate approved Senate Bill 566 – authored by Kenley and Sen. Ryan Mishler, R-Bremen – to explore the new avenue for school testing, rather than the ISTEP.

House Republican leaders had opposed the plan and stripped it out of SB 566. On Thursday, the two sides met to try to find a compromise on the legislation.

The debate stems from Increasing costs to administer various statewide student tests – a price tag that is expected to rise further as the state develops a new test to match its new standards.

Originally, the state was set to use the controversial Common Core standards – which have been adopted by dozens of states – which would have made an off-the-shelf test much more likely.

But the General Assembly ordered the State Board of Education to come up with standards written just for Indiana. That also means a customized test, state Superintendent Glenda Ritz has argued.

The Democrat asked lawmakers in December for more than \$65 million to implement new tests, although she has since cut that number almost in half. Kenley had hoped to go even cheaper.

But now the issue will be sent to a legislative study committee for more review.

Schools delay testing, seek online waivers after glitches

School districts across Indiana are delaying the second round of ISTEP+ testing or asking the Department of Education for permission to administer the exam with paper and pencil after experiencing continuing problems with an online server.

Districts in Franklin, Kokomo and Columbus are among those that have received waivers from the online testing requirement. Fort Wayne Community Schools and the Bartholomew Consolidated School Corp. have delayed the start of testing after experiencing problems during online practice sessions.

The issues are fueling already heightened concerns over how students will perform on the high-stakes exam, which is used to evaluate schools and teachers. Outrage over changes to the exam that more than doubled its length, to about 12 hours, forced Gov. Mike Pence and lawmakers to find ways to shorten the test earlier this year.

Warrick County Superintendent 3rac Schneider said practice testing in his district was an "absolute disaster" and said it's not acceptable to be experiencing problems as testing begins.

"Someone needs to answer for this simply because this is a high-stakes test. ... And if we can't provide a testing platform in which students are not disrupted ... what kind of impact will it have?" Schneider said. The problems include students not being able to log onto the system, frames freezing, calculators and other functions not working and students only being allowed to click one answer on multiple choice questions when they are prompted to select more, the Evansville Courier & Press reported. Lissa Stranahan, director of exceptional learners and testing at Western Schools in Russiaville, called the

testing issues a "debacle" in an email to House Speaker Brian Bosma.

"It is an embarrassment to the entire state. This assessment will not reflect the true abilities of students, teachers and schools," she wrote.

Department of Education spokesman Daniel Altman told The Associated Press on Thursday that the first day of testing was "going smoothly" and that the rate of interruptions was low.

He said the department was reaching out to schools that had reported disruptions to resolve the issues. Educators say they're frustrated by continuing problems with the online test and vendor CTB/McGraw Hill. In the past three years, schools have had repeated problems ranging from screens freezing to seeing blank screens instead of questions. In 2013, schools statewide had multiple problems and an estimated 70,000 students experienced disruptions that included screens freezing and being kicked out of the test. "The state should have their act together by now," Principal Mark Heiden of Creekside Elementary in Franklin told the Daily Journal. "At what point is someone going to get this under control?"

Charter school funding still a question as Legislature wraps up

As lawmakers wrap up work on the state's new budget, one issue still up in the air is whether charter schools receive funding to help with facility costs.

The funding would make a big difference, said Jean Hitchcock, executive director of Signature School. The Evansville charter school currently must raise about \$250,000 in donations annually to bridge a funding shortfall.

The school relies on donations for computers, and furniture is hand-downs from the University of Southern Indiana and other sources.

But what weighs on Hitchcock the most is the list of students waiting to get into Signature School, known nationally for its high achievement.

"I hate having kids on a waitlist and turning them away, but we simply don't have the space," Hitchcock said. "My hope is they will examine it this session and will be able to find some dollars for charter schools. It's very difficult for us to operate at a deficit."

But whether those dollars end up in the final budget lawmakers forward to Gov. Mike Pence by Wednesday is still a matter of negotiations. Supporters of offering additional funding for the schools say it's needed, because unlike traditional public schools, charter schools can't collect property taxes to help pay for capital expenses. Yet, opponents say any extra funding for those schools will drain money from traditional public schools where the vast majority of Hoosier children attend.

Budget proposals released by Pence and the House and Senate all take different routes on charter school funding.

- Pence offered the most funding a \$1,500 per student grant for charter schools. The grants are expected to cost \$41 million in 2016 and \$45 million in 2017.
- The House plan offers \$20 million per year in grants to charter schools for capital projects.
- The Senate plan pushes back any proposed changes by sending them to a summer study committee. Senate President Pro Tem David Long said on Thursday lawmakers are working to find a "sweet spot" on charter school funding. A 2013 report by the National Conference of State Legislatures found 10 states and the District of Columbia provide direct funding to charter schools to cover facility costs.

"They are in a deficit and usually incurring pretty significant debt to be able to construct their facilities," said Long, a Fort Wayne Republican, "so do we help them find a way to improve that situation. That's the discussion right now, and I think it's a fair one."

The funding likely will be one of the last issues resolved as lawmakers make final revisions to the next state budget, said Betsy Wiley, president and CEO of Institute for Quality Education. The school choice organization continues to be hopeful, Wiley said, that per-student funding toward capital expenses is made available to all charter schools.

"I think it's a big fight ahead of us," Wiley said, "but I think it's an important one. I think it's phenomenal we are having the conversation and getting the attention we have. There are nearly 27,000 students in charter schools and they deserve to have their education funded equitably. I'm optimistic we will all work together and figure out how to get that done here before the end of session."

Wiley expects the new forecast of state revenues released this month, which showed the state had about \$213 million less in spending power than anticipated for the next budget, to cause lawmakers and the Senate's lead budget architect, state Sen. Luke Kenley, concern.

"The Senate likes to be deliberative, and I don't think Sen. Kenley in particular has had the time to fully learn what our current situation is when it comes to charter school facility funcing," Wiley said. Regardless of facility money, Signature School and the area's other charter school, Joshua Academy, see different outcomes in House and Senate plans for funding K-12 schools. Joshua Academy makes slight gains in funding in both the House and Senate plans. But Signature School would lose about \$162,000 in state funding over the next two years in the Senate plan, while the school would see a slighter decrease in the House plan.

State Sen. Vaneta Becker, an Evansville Republican, said she supports sending charter school funding to a study committee. Becker said she was concerned of recent A-F school accountability grades where about 45 percent of the state's 73 charter accredited schools earned either a "D" or an "F."

" just think we have a lot of traditional public schools that are struggling as well," Becker said on school finances. "So I think the study committee would be the best option at this point."

State Sen. Mark Stoops, a Bloomington Democrat and member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, said Pence's proposal goes against the original concept that charter schools would be more efficient to run than traditional public schools. Stoops said community-based, not-for-profit charter schools need to be separated out from those run by for-profit operators.

"Where is that money going to go? Is it going to go straight to the bottom line of these for-profit charter operators," Stoops questioned.

Deliberations on charter school funding come as lawmakers are working to settle a new, two-year budget for the state, which will cover spending from July through June 2017.

INDIANAPOLIS – Gov. Mike Pence is packing his bags in anticipation of a trip to China, which will focus on creating economic opportunities and partnerships between the country and our state.

Pence will leave on May 9 for a weeklong trip and will visit Beijing, Shanghai and Hangzhou, the capital city of Zhejiang Province, Indiana's Chinese sister state.

While away, Pence will meet with Chinese government leaders, top executives from numerous Chinese companies and potential investors. The governor will also stop at Indiana companies with operations in China, including Eli Lilly and Cummins, as well as China-based Haier Group, which is planning to locate its North American Tech Center in Evansville.

China is the state's fifth largest export partner, with exports totaling \$1.4 billion in 2014.

"Inciana plays a critical role in the global economy, with thousands of Hoosiers across our state going to work daily at international companies," Pence said in a statement. "China represents the largest economy in the world. Today we see immense potential for the creation of more jobs for Hoosiers through the strengthening of ties with our Chinese partners."

The trip is Pence's sixth international trade mission since taking office. His first was in 2013 when he traveled to Japan. He has also gone on trade missions to Germany, the United Kingdom, Canada and Israel.

"The reach of Indiana's economy extends far beyond our borders," Pence said. "Hoosiers can create everything from cars to medicines that are used around the world. And with Indiana's strengths in life sciences, advanced manufacturing and aerospace, we aim to make sure Chinese business leaders know that Indiana is the ideal place to grow their companies and create great Hoosier jobs."

Private donations from the Indiana Economic Development Foundation are paying for Pence's trip. First Lady Karen Pence and Secretary of Commerce Victor Smith will also travel with the governor.

"Our universities and our communities already boast a thriving friendship with China," Pence said, "and we're looking forward to strengthening this relationship on our jobs mission next month."

Ethics bill that requires more financial disclosure from law makers heads to Pence for approval

IND ANAPOLIS – An othics bill that would require lawmakers to be more transparent with their business dealings and stop them from using state resources for political gain is now headed to the governor for approval.

House Bill 1002, which was authored and sponsored by the four leaders of the House and Senate, received final approval by the House on Monday. The bill is a response to ethical issues surrounding former Rep. Eric Turner and former state Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Bennett. House Speaker Brian Bosma, R-Indianapolis, said the bill gives Hoosiers the chance to see the business interests of lawmakers, while also forcing those lawmakers to be transparent.

"The goal was always to have unprecedented transparency and disclosure, and I'm very confident that 1002 accomplishes just that," Bosma said.

House Minority Leader Scott Pelath, D-Michigan City, said the bill was a bipartisan effort and all of the state legislative leaders contributed to the bill.

"We have plenty of things around here on which we find ground to disagree, but this is one we're all intogether," Pelath said.

New language added to the bill closes a loophole that state employees have used in the past to get around a one year cooling off period. Current law allows a former employee to become a consultant and then contract with the company he or she would otherwise have been banned from working with. The new language would ban that activity as well.

The legislation also requires lawmakers to take an ethics training course and creates an ethics office within the nonpartisan Legislative Services Agency. Bosma said new ethics office would feature the same LSA employees legislators go to for ethical advice now.

The bill would require lawmakers to disclose active business investments of at least \$5,000. Current law doesn't require a disclosure until the investment reaches \$10,000.

The bill passed the House unanimously.

Ritz would keep chair for now, board gets some ISTEP authority under proposed compromise

IND ANAPOLIS – State Superintendent Glenda Ritz would keep her position as chair of the State Board of Education through the end of her current term under a new proposal lawmakers are considering with just days left in their legislative session.

The plan would still give the state board the authority to elect its own leader – but not until Jan. 1, 2017, just after the next election of the superintendent of public instruction.

Stripping Ritz, a Democrat, of her power at the state board has been a hot-button issue throughout the session with majority Republicans pushing to let the board pick its own chair as soon as this summer. They've argued that the current setup, which has Ritz chair a board of members all appointed by a GOP governor, has led to dysfunction that is unacceptable.

But Sen. Travis Holdman, R-Markle – who is chairing the joint House-Senate conference committee looking for an agreement on competing versions of Senate Bill 1 – said the decision to keep Ritz in her position as chair for now is a compromise that is less about political pressure and more about other aspects of the legislation that should strengthen the board's hand.

Among those provisions are some that would give the state board more control over the ISTEP exam and make the board a state educational authority, as well as the DOE, which gives both agencies standing with the federal government. The proposal also revamps the board's makeup and dictates a number of board operating procedures, including how many members must be present to act and when agendas must be prepared.

John Barnes, the director of legislative affairs at the Indiana Department of Education, said the agency is happy that Ritz will not be removed as chairman. But he said he still thinks the argument is politically driven.

Democrats and advocates for Ritz have long argued that removing her as the board chair now would disenfranchise voters.

"So from that standpoint, certainly that's better," Barnes said. "We feel like its ridiculous from the beginning to manufacture this kind of dysfunction that everybody wants to call it when in fact it all seems to be purely politics and it just doesn't make a whole lot of sense."

Since Ritz was elected more than two years ago – defeating Republican Tony Bennett – she and board members have bickered about not just significant policies involving testing and school accountability but also small, administrative issues including who gets to put items on the board agenda and when a policy is eligible for a vote. At one point, Ritz sued the board for taking action behind her back and, at another point, she walked out of a meeting.

Holdman chose not to hear public testimony on the proposal Monday, despite proposing language that had not passed the House or Senate earlier in the session. He said because of the time crunch, he only wanted lawmakers weighing in.

SB 1, in its current form, would give more power to the State Board of Education to not only set education policy in the state, but also to be more a part of the implementation of those policies, something the DOE has historically done.

Barnes said that is a dangerous idea because there are times when a quick decision must be made and the schools don't have time to wait for the DCE to consult with the board.

"We just think its always confusing if you try to put two different entities in control," Barnes said. "There isn't time for two different entities to consult about what's going on so we feel like that's a big mistake. You don't want to put a volunteer board in charge of ISTEP when it takes experts and people who are experts in student assessment."

The new proposal would also shrink the board from 11 members to 9. The governor would appoint six members to the board, with only four coming from his political party. The speaker of the House and president pro tem of the Senate would each get one appointee.

Holdman said shrinking the board would allow members to work more efficiently and work better together as a team.

"Most Hoosiers acknowledge that the current discord and dysfunction on the State Board of Education is not in the best interest of Hoosier students," Holdman said in a statement after the meeting. "As state lawmakers charged with setting state education policy, we have a responsibility to do something about it. I believe this legislation is a solid move in the right direction that will benefit our kids in the classroom." Democrats said they were upset that the board would be stacked for the majority 6-3 and create a completely partisan system.

Senate Minority Leader Tim Lanane, D-Anderson, said he thinks the elected superintendent needs to have more power and is upset that language was taken out that required majority legislative leaders to at least consult with the minority leaders before selecting their appointees.

"This is going to be a completely partisan type of a board," Lanane said. "There's a good reason that the elected superintendent of public instruction serves as the chair. All those other appointments on that board are not elected, and underneath this scenario, they could have minimal qualifications.

"think it would be an excellent time to restore the power, to affirm the power of the elected superintendent of public instruction as the chair of this board," he said. "We'll put that out there. We'll see if they accept that or not."

The bill underwent minor changes that gave the preference to more veterans including former members of the Indiana National Guard and Air National Guard.

"Our hardworking Hoosier veterans often find difficulty when returning home to their families," Rep. Karlee Macer, D-Indianapolis, said. "This bill makes it easier for these veterans to obtain employment while giving employers peace of mind knowing that their workforce is comprised of our nation's heroes." The bill would also protect employers from lawsuits if they give preference to veterans.

Both chambers passed the bill and it is now awaiting the governor's signature.

Proposed changes to State Board of Education pushes back election of chair to 2017, gives state. Chelsea Schmeider

A final deal is in the works to modify the Indiana State Board of Education that delays any changes to the board chair until after the 2016 election, but would still give the board new powers over ISTEP. The proposed plan unveiled Monday reduces the State Board of Education to nine members from the current 11-member board. However, Democratic state schools chief Glenda Ritz would remain head of the state board through her current term in office — a shift from earlier proposals that would have allowed the board to remove Ritz as chair this year.

The proposal before lawmakers also would statutorily require the Department of Education to share data with the state board in a lireasonable time frame. It also gives the state board oversight over the content and format of the ISTEP.

Republican lawmakers involved in finalizing the changes to the state board called the deal a fair compromise on Monday. But Democrats criticized the decision not to allow public testimony at a Monday legislative hearing because some aspects of the proposal are either new concepts or ones that stalled in the legislative process earlier in the General Assembly session.

State Rep. Wendy McNamara, a Mount Vernon Republican who is serving as an advisor on the final deal, said the proposal balances concerns brought forward about the state board changes.

"I firmly believe when we really want to say what we mean, and it means we are going to take care of kids in Indiana; it's our ultimate responsibility to make sure that the highest level of education, the place that's given the governance for education, functions appropriately and functions in the best interest of our kids," McNamara said. "After months and months of discussion and compromise, this is the best thing for us."

John Barnes, director of legislative affairs for the Department of Education, took issue with the state board gaining new control over standardized tests for Hoosier students, saying putting two different groups in control of ISTEP would cause confusion.

"We feel like that's a big mistake. You don't want to put a volunteer board in charge of ISTEP when it takes experts and people who are experts in student assessment," Barnes said.

Delaying changes in the selection of the board chair until after the 2016 election eliminates the argument that the proposal would disenfranchise Indiana voters, who elected Ritz on the presumption she would serve as head of the Department of Education as well as the state board, Barnes said.

"But again, we feel like it's ridiculous from the beginning to manufacture this kind of dysfunction that everybody wants to call it when in fact it all seems to be purely politics," Barnes said.

One of the proposal's lead authors, state Sen. Travis Holdman, said lawmakers were under a "time crunch," so public testimony wasn't taken at the Monday hearing.

Holdman, a Mark'e Republican, said the proposed changes aim to open communication lines between Ritz's department and board members, so the date of when the board first elects its chair became "somewhat moot."

Under the plan, membership on the board would reduce to nine members this June. The governor would appoint six members. The House speaker and Senate president pro tem would hold one appointment each, and the state schools chief would still serve as an automatic member.

Then at the board's first meeting in January 2017, the board would elect its own chairperson. Of the governor's six appointments, four must have professional education experience and four can come from the same political party.

The proposal also speaks of board operating procedures, including requiring a chairperson — in the event it's not the state schools chief — to add items to the board's meeting agenda at the superintendent's request.

Most charter schools would get additional money, teachers would get a \$100 tax credit and the governor's regional cities initiative would be funded under a budget compromise the indiana House and Senate reached Tuesday.

The \$31.3 billion, two-year plan—which should be approved and sent to Gov. Mike Pence on Wednesday, the last day of the 2015 General Assembly – would mean a 2.3-percent increase in K-12 school funding in 2015 and again in 2017.

The school money will be divided among districts in a way that closes the gap between the urban districts with the state's highest per student funcing and those in suburban areas with lower per student funding. But House Speaker Brian Bosma, R-Indianapolis, said the proposal also provides "a softer landing to some of the urban schools that thought they were suffering too much of a loss" under the original budget passed by the House.

Charter schools that have an A, B or Cirating would get a \$500 per student funding boost under the plan. Under current law, they don't share in the property tax revenue that traditional public schools receive for buildings, transportation and other costs.

Charters that have a D or F grade could obtain the additional money if they perform at or above the level of the traditional schools in their area. Charters – which are public schools generally operated outside traditional districts and with fewer rules – would also be eligible for loans from the state's common school fund to help pay for construction and other costs.

Extra funding for charter schools had been a priority for Pence, although lawmaker had been far more skeptical.

"We're in a sweet spot where everyone can live with it," said Senate President Pro Tem David Long, R-Fort Wayne.

The budget plan creates an amnesty program that lets tax scofflaws pay up and avoid prosecution. That's expected to bring in more than \$100 million that will be used in part to pay for Gov. Mike Pence's regional cities initiative, which calls on metro areas to develop and implement strategic plans for development.

Pence wanted \$84 million for the plan but the Senate originally slashed the funding. Bosma said Tuesday that Pence will be happy with the compromise.

The Republican majorities in the House and Senate had originally hoped to have the final budget planfinished and posted publicly Tuesday afternoon. But Long said the usual last-minute negotiations overseveral issues pushed it back. The plan was expected to go online late Tuesday evening.

Meanwhile, legislative leaders spelled out some of the plan's details.

The budget will include a \$100 tax credit for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies. House Republicans had originally sought a credit twice that size but Senate Republicans opposed the program. Still, the compromise will cost the state \$10 million.

"Sometimes a half a loaf is better than none," Bosma said. "We are getting a tax credit for every teacher, which was our goal."

The budget will also include increased performance awards for teachers.

But to afford the additional money for schools and teachers, lawmakers are pulling back on money for

roads. Both the House and Senate had put \$200 million into the budget each year for special highway projects. That would be on top of the ongoing revenue stream for roads.

The compromise plan cuts that amount in half but lets the State Budget Committee authorize more later if the money is available.

"t is reduced," Bosma said, "but it's still high."

The budget plan boosts funding for higher education by about \$45 million – the same amount proposed by the House but less than pushed by the Senate.

"We felt we were going to have to back up a little bit," said Senate Appropriations Chairman Luke Kenley, R-Noblesville.

The cuts from the original budget proposals became necessary after lawmakers learned earlier this month that they'll likely have fewer tax dollars to spend in 2016 and 2017 than they thought when they started working on the spending plan.

Long said lawmakers wanted to keep enough reserves in the bank to ensure the state maintained its AAA bond rating, which makes borrowing cheaper, while still boosting funding overall for a few priorities. "We're spending a lot of money on education, which we're happy about," Long said. But the reduced revenue forecast "caused some whittling here and there."

The budget provides \$80 million for local community corrections programs, which are expected to see significant increases in enrollment under sentencing changes the General Assembly made last year. But a separate bill puts considerable "checks and balances" on the way the money is obtained and spent, Kenley said.

There's no money in the budget to expand two prisons, something Pence had requested.

Lawmakers reconsidering search fee for public records

A fee for public records requests that take longer than two hours to fulfill is back on the table this session, Indiana lawmakers said Tuesday.

House members have approved a proposal that would allow government agencies to charge a searching fee for record requests that take over two hours. After that time, they could charge up to \$20 an hour. Lawmakers considered the fee and other public record changes earlier this session but voted to remove the language in from another bill in March.

State law currently prohibits public agencies from charging a fee to search for, examine, or review a record to determine whether or not it can be disclosed. Those requesting the documents can only be charged for the actual cost of copying a record, which is a minimum of \$0.10 per page or \$0.25 for color. Supporters of the proposal argue that compensation for search times would help alleviate the burden that large requests place on government resources. But critics say the measure could discourage in-depth records requests and give officials another tool to fight transparency.

Bill sponsor Republican Rep. Dennis Zent of Angola said local governments often receive complicated requests for documents from certain individuals.

"I don't think that's a wise use of taxpayer money if that's just one individual repeatedly doing it," Zent said.

Supporters also applaud a provision that would allow a requester to receive records electronically. The search fee would apply, but the requester would not have to pay a copying cost.

Currently, an agency can refuse to provide electronic copies, forcing a requester to pick up records in person and pay a copying fee.

Hoosier State Press Association Executive Director Steve Key said the benefit of getting records in an easy format outweighs the potential negatives of a search fee.

Key said it would also save time and resources for both government agencies and records requesters.

"This is going to probably force people to be a little bit more selective when they make records requests," he said. "It will be much more of a rifle approach as opposed to a shot gun or casting a fishing net." Democratic Rep. Matt Pierce of Bloomington criticized the measure.

"The records are created with our tax dollars; the employees and the buildings are paid for with our tax dollars. If they've got to suffer through a few people who make outrageous requests, that's kind of the price of democracy," he said.

Lanane said Gov. Mike Pence's staff indicated the Republican would veto any measure that permitted the live dealers – which would take the place of electronic table games – anytime sooner.

"it's unfortunate for the gaming industry," Lanane sald. "This is our opportunity to do a comprehensive improvement of our industry to ward off the competition of other states."

Lanane said the delay will kill potential jobs in Shelbyville and Anderson, and eliminates a competitive advantage for the state.

As passed by the House, the bill would have authorized the land-based casinos and the live dealers immediately. It also provided tax breaks to help the casinos beat back competition from Ohio and Illinois. But the Senate pushed back the live dealers for five years.

Senate President Pro Tem David Long, R-Fort Wayne, said the gambling compromise won't likely be finalized until Wednesday, the last day for legislation to pass the General Assembly.

That's when lawmakers also expect to vote on Senate Bill 1, a controversial bill that would give the State Board of Education the authority to elect its own chair. Originally, the House and Senate voted to put that provision in place this summer, which would likely sweep state Superintendent Glenda Ritz, a Democrat, out of her role as chair.

But a new provision would let Ritz, who was elected in 2012, keep the spot until the end of her four-year term.

IND ANAPOLIS — The Pence administration would be banned from constructing a new, \$25 million state archives building along the Central Canal in downtown Indianapolis under the budget bill lawmakers plan to approve Wednesday.

"That's green space and it's not a big enough space," said Senate Appropriations Chairman Luke Kenley, R-Noblesville, who put the language into the bill. "If you build that building there now, in 20 years it's too small."

However, the budget includes \$25 million to fund the building.

The proposed site – which state officials said earlier month is their preference for the project – is located across the canal from the Indiana History Center near a state parking garage.

That's also across Ohio Street from the state office building complex that includes the Statehouse. Kenley said the Department of Administration showed him six parcels of land the state owned that could serve as locations for a new archives building. "I think others are better," he said.

Currently, many of the state's historical documents are housed in a warehouse that does not have the climate control needed to properly preserve them.

The Indianapolis Business Journal reported that the proposed site for the archives has been somewhat controversial. "We need to continually add more vibrancy to the canal with increased foot traffic," Sherry Seiwert, CEO of Downtown Indy, told the IBJ.

The budget plan also includes \$2 million to renovate part of Robert Orr Plaza at the state office complex into a bicentennial plaza as well as \$2.5 million for an education center that would be part of a bicentennial legacy project.

Funding in place for USI, IU portions of medical school; Ivy Tech out

Lawmakers neared a budget deal on Tuesday, as they came to compromises on funding for the regional medical school campus in Downtown Evansville and funding for charter schools, while preserving overall funding increases for K-12 education.

The budget proposal offers \$25.2 million in state funding to construct the Indiana University and University of Southern Indiana portions of the medical school project. The IU portion is cash funded at \$19.2 million, and the USI portion at \$6 million. University of Evansville will fund its own portion of the project, so construction funding could reach closer to \$31.2 million among the universities, organizers say.

The proposal does not offer state funding for the Ivy Tech Community College portion. The school initially requested \$22.9 million

" said early on it was a high priority," Bosma said of the medical school. "I was down there (in Evansville) last Wednesday night and said it remained a high priority for me personally and for our team, and the Senate concurred it was an important regional program."

State Rep. Holli Sullivan, an Evansville Republican, said the funding is an "absolute win" for the city. " am ecstatic that we've now got to the end of session and we have a med school coming to Southwest Indiana," Sullivan said.

Sullivan said she couldn't speak to the exact reason why Ivy Tech was left out of state funding, but she noted the strong community advocacy for the project.

" feel the project itself will grow on its own two feet, and I can see by Tech joining in a different phase at a different time," Sullivan said.

On education funding, Bosma confirmed the budget deal includes a 2.3 percent increase for K-12 schools each year over the next two years, which totals about \$464 million in new funding for schools.

Under the plan, Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corp. would see a \$6.8 million increase over the next two years. Warrick County School Corp. would see a \$2.2 million increase, while Metropolitan School Districts of Mount Vernon and North Posey would see slight decreases.

Details of the budget come as lawmakers race to get work done before Wednesday's deadline for the General Assembly to adjourn this year's legislative session. The approximately \$31 billion budget proposal lawmakers will forward to Gov. Mike Pence will cover state spending from July through June 2017. The spending proposal also maintains an almost \$1.8 billion cash surplus for the state in each year covered under the budget.

The proposal also includes a \$500 per student grant in additional funding for high-performing charter schools. The grant amount is lower than what Pence had hoped for, which was a \$1,500 per student grant

expected to cost \$86 million over the next two years. The grant amount contained in the final proposal is expected to cost about \$10 million per year, Bosma said.

Charter schools rated "A," "B," or "C" would receive the full grant amount. Charter schools with "D" or "E" grades would receive a lower level of funding if they can prove they perform equal to or better than nearby schools. The proposal also allows charter schools to get loans from the common school fund for facilities.

A key state budget writer, state Sen. Luke Kenley, said lawmakers advised Pence that they were concerned about the debt some charter schools were carrying. Kenley, a Noblesville Republican, said the governor had become a champion for extra charter school funding.

"That's where really challenged the governor," Kenley said, explaining that the issue of charter schools with high ratings and financial woes needs resolved.

Lawmakers also embraced the Senate plan to divvy out dollars to schools for at-risk students. The plan bases those dollars on students qualifying for food stamps, welfare or foster care. The spending plan also would count full-time kindergarten students as a full student for funding purposes.

On the medical school, the funding amount contained in the spending plan released Tuesday comes at the end of a long road local lawmakers and city leaders followed this session to secure construction dollars.

The Senate dealt the project a setback by lowering funding for the school after the House boosted funding from Pence's proposal. The project was envisioned as a partnership among IU School of Medicine, USI, Ivy Tech and University of Evansville. Full funding for the school was estimated at almost \$50 million, but throughout the budgetary process, lawmakers endorsed a plan with less square footage. Among other budget items, the plan includes about \$100 per year in income tax credit to help educators who use personal money to purchase classroom supplies. Lawmakers also are approving a tax amnesty program to fund Pence's regional cities initiative, where communities can apply for funding for community projects. That funding is expected to reach close to \$84 million.

Budget, education board decisions set for session's last day

Indiana lawmakers are facing final decisions on several contentious issues heading into the last day of this year's General Assembly session.

The biggest matter on Wednesday's agenda is approval of a new two-year state budget. Other topics expected to come up for votes include a Republican-backed proposal that would shift some authority away from Democratic state schools Superintendent Glenda Ritz and a bill to legalize needle-exchange programs in reaction to a southern Indiana HIV outbreak blamed on intravenous drug use.

A budget deal announced Tuesday night by legislative leaders slows down proposed funding cuts to some shrinking school districts while providing a portion of the additional money that Republican Gov. Mike Pence sought for charter schools.

Republican House Speaker Brian Bosma said the agreement reached with the Senate would keep overall school funding increases of 2.3 percent, or about \$460 million, over the next two years. It would also phase in over three years a shift of money from many shrinking urban and rural school districts to those in growing suburban communities. A previous plan called for immediate cuts to more than a third of Indiana's nearly 300 school districts in order to even out the spending, a move Democrats called devastating.

"We make significant progress on the gap between the highest and lowest spending schools, but we give a softer landing to some of the urban schools that felt that they were suffering too much of a loss," Bosma said.

Lawmakers are to vote on approving the budget plan Wednesday, which is the Republican-dominated General Assembly's adjournment deadline.

The budget plan would spend about \$31 billion over the next two years, leaving state reserves of nearly \$1.9 billion, or 12 percent.

Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Luke Kenley, R-Noblesville, said he discussed the reserves level with Pence on Tuesday.

"I was concerned about making sure we maintained our triple-A bond rating and he and his advisers called New York, the Standard and Poor's people, to see if they approved of that approach to our balance sheet," Kenley said. "Apparently they do."

The budget deal also gives about \$10 million a year in additional charter school grants of about \$500 a student, Bosma said. That's about a quarter of the \$40 million a year that Pence had requested. Pence's spokeswoman didn't immediately comment on the budget talks.

Meanwhile, an agreement had yet to be reached Tuesday night over a bill that would affect what control the Ritz-led Department of Education or the state Board of Education would have over state school policy. All members of the board besides Ritz are appointed by the governor.

Since the session's January start, Pence and GOP leaders have pushed for allowing the board to select any of its members as chairman, a move that likely would oust Ritz as the leader and end a decades-old law that makes the elected state superintendent the board's leader.

A Senate proposal released Monday would push back the change until 2017, which is after Ritz's current term ends. But it also would give the board additional authority over the ISTEP standardized test and school data.

Pence and other Republicans have said the chairmanship change is needed to address ongoing disputes between Ritz and the other board members, but Democrats and Ritz supporters have argued the move would undermine the will of voters, who elected her in 2012.

Bosma said delaying the chairmanship change wasn't his first choice, but he signaled that House Republicans might go along with it.

"It may be a shock to people, but we actually listen when people say things, when constituents express opinions, when teachers express opinions," Bosma said. " ... It was never anyone's intent here to do a, quote, 'power grab' or to strip somehody of authority. It was always about making the board functional."

Lawmakers considering language to emphasize confidentiality of audit process

Last year, an Evansville city councilwoman made headlines when she recorded and released an audio recording of a private meeting concerning the city's financial audit.

State lawmakers are now considering a proposal that makes clear, in state law, that a person attending a meeting where audit details are discussed, called an exit conference, can't electronically record.

State Rep. Gail Riecken said she introduced language concerning exit conferences to the bill, which is now in final negotiations at the General Assembly. Riecken, an Evansville Democrat, said the language was needed following the incident involving Councilwoman Stephanie Brinkerhoff-Riley, D-3rd Ward.

The proposal also would emphasize in state law that information discussed and materials presented at an exit conference are confidential and can't be discussed publicly until the information is released. It also would allow all members of the Evansville City Council, or any other legislative body, to attend the exit conference, while keeping the meeting and its findings closed to the public.

Riecken said state law needed to be clear that the meetings are confidential and no participant can record. But she said it was also important for all council members to have the ability to attend to hear first-hand the concerns or comments surrounding an audit.

" think It's important that we expand the opportunity for legislative bodies to be accountable," Riecken said. "They should all be there."

Currently, state auditors have the meeting with the government's fiscal officer, executive and president of the legislative body. State Examiner Paul Joyce said other members can attend, but only to the point

where a quorum is not met. Joyce said the proposal allows the meeting to remain private while allowing all members of the legislative body to attend.

"think it is a positive change and will allow all of the legislative body to participate if they want to," Joyce said in an email to the Courier & Press. "We have had issues in the past where some members wanted to participate but couldn't because of the quorum issue. This will take care of that. It is always good to hear it straight from the source rather than second hand."

Last year, a prosecutor found that Brinkerhoff-Riley's release of the audio recording did not violate the law.

Following the Evansville incident, Joyce had placed limits on attendance at exit conferences to only city clerks and clerk-treasurers. He's since reopened attendance to other designated public officials, but attendees must first agree to sign a confidentiality agreement to participate.

State education board changes expected Wednesday

House Speaker Brian Bosma said Tuesday that pushing the ability for the Indiana State Board of Education to elect its own chair back to 2017 wouldn't be his first choice.

A plan unveiled Monday billed as a compromise by Republicans would effectively keep Democratic state schools chief Glenda Ritz in the role of board chair through her current term in office. Earlier proposals had allowed the board to elect its own chair this year.

" think we are having discussions, honest policy discussions, about what will make the board the most functional, and that's what we are all focused on." said Bosma, an Indianapolis Republican.

Bosma said lawmakers are still looking at options as they consider changes to the state board.

The proposal lowers the board's membership to nine members by June, and then allows the board to choose its own chair in January 2017. The state board also would gain new oversight powers over the ISTEP test.

Aircraft bill headed to Pence

An effort to name an official state aircraft with Evansville ties is now on its way to Gov. Mike Pence's desk. The proposal, which cleared the House and Senate on final votes this week, gives the designation to the P-47 Thunderbolt. More than 6,000 of the planes were manufactured in Evansville during World War II. The bill also specifies that the Thunderbolt is commonly known as the "Indiana Warbird."

School of Medicine funding is vital for SW Indiana

3:01 AM, Apr 28, 2015 opinion | editorials | facing our future The Indiana Legislature is taking steps this week to finalize the next biennial budget, and people in this corner of the state should be concerned — and perhaps even be prepared to be angry. We are standing on the precipice of taking a major step in Southwestern indiana, with a key component being the proposed Downtown campus for the Indiana University School of Medicine. It has been a remarkable process to build a facility that no one can argue is not needed, both for this region and the state. There has been unparalleled, complete cooperation shown by IU, the University of Southern Indiana, Ivy Tech Community College Southwest and the University of Evansville. Visionary leaders at those schools saw the good in a combined effort to bring a full-service medical campus to Southwestern Indiana. There is no doubt that the plan of having a variety of disciplines operating in proximity — young men and women learning to be doctors, dentists, nurses and technicians would help with teaching and training. With two first-class medical facilities in Evansville, along with smaller regional hospitals, there is no arguing the ability to train these professionals. But some members of our Legislature, particularly in the Senate, don't appear to recognize that value. The Indiana House of Representatives, in its budget plan, provided \$36 million to get the project well underway. But the Senate, in a process led by Noblesville Republican and finance chairman Luke Kenley, pulled the number back to \$19 million — basically representing the share for IU. Nothing for USI's portion of the project. And nothing for Ivy Tech, which represents the fastest growing and most-affordable segment of higher education — but is landlocked at its North First Avenue building. Kenley hasn't helped his standing by saying, basically, that the Evansville facility would be too nice or too big in relation to other regional medical school campuses — a statement that he made without noting that none of the other facilities are designed to include so many schools and so many students. It's such a lack of vision that will keep indiana behind the times in not just education, but in medical care — and precisely the lack of vision that was shown when Kenley — and most Republicans in the House and Senate — voted for a hastily-modified Religious Freedom Restoration Act that placed a scar on our state's reputation (and caused additional costs to be added to the budget for damage control). At this point, that's how this session's legislators will be remembered — as architects of a hateful piece of

they can mitigate that legacy.

Another piece of the budget pie could help fund projects such as the School of Medicine. If the Legislature approves land-based casinos, and Pence signs the bill, the gaming groups believe that competitive advantage will raise revenues — and the public's shares in taxes. In Evansville, if the School of Medicine progresses, that would anchor two ends of Downtown — the school to the south and east, and a land-based casino to the north and west. That, in turn, creates space for the LST 325 to dock on the bend where the casino boat now sits, and adds another reason for folks to visit the riverfront. It's definitely a key moment for Evansville, with answers just around the corner.

"indiana should be the worst place in the nation to commit a crime," said Pence, "and the best place to get a second chance once you've done your time."

Pence signed three bills focused on law enforcement and public safety.

Senate Bill 6 outlaws the possession, purchase, sale, offer to sell, or use of powdered or crystalline alcohol. Doing so is now a Class B infraction. Specific groups, including the State Department of Health, are exempt from the law if using the substance for research. The law went into effect immediately. Senate Bill 94 lengthens the statute of limitations for rape. SB 94 makes it possible to prosecute someone otherwise protected by the statute of limitations in certain circumstances. Charges could be brought against a suspect within five years of the state obtaining DNA evidence linking the offender, the state becomes aware of the existence of a recording that provide sufficient evidence to charge the offender or a person confesses to the offense. This law goes into effect July 1, 2015.

Pence also signed Senate Bill 193. The legislation designates the Northwest Indiana Law Enforcement Academy as a criminal justice agency and specifies that it is a board-certified training center. This law also goes into effect July 1 of this year.

IND ANAPOLIS – Republican lawmakers pulled back slightly Wednesday from a last minute effort to shift more authority away from state Superintendent Glenda Ritz even as they let her remain the chair of the State Board of Education through the end of her current term.

With the support of Gov. Mike Pence, fiscal leaders put language in the state budget late Tuesday that would have shifted oversight of Indiana's private school voucher program to the State Board of Education.

The governor – emerging from a meeting Wednesday in House Speaker Brian Bosma's office – said he supported the move. But a few hours later, Senate President Pro Tem David Long, R-Fort Wayne, said that language had been stripped from the bill.

"The Senate didn't know it was there," Long told reporters.

Daniel Altman, a spokesman for Ritz, said Pence "got caught with his hand in the cookie jar."

The revised budget – which lawmakers planned to approve by a midnight deadline – still gives the State Board of Education more authority to oversee Indiana's ISTEP testing program and lets the board control a new grant program that gives more money to charter schools, which are public schools freed from traditional rules and districts.

It also boosts funding for the education board.

" think that the goal here is that we would bring about a range of reforms in the State Board of Education that would make it more possible for those various initiatives to operate with more efficiency and more effectiveness for our kids," Pence said.

Legislators also approved Senate Bill 1, which will allow Ritz to keep her position as chair of the state board until December 31, 2016. After that, the board would elect it's own chair. The bill passed the House 60-38 and the Senate 31-17.

Earlier this session, the House and Senate had passed bills to remove her from the job immediately. The new provision won't take effect until after the next election.

State Rep. Vernon Smith, D-Gary, said Ritz deserves to keep her spot as chain of the board because she represents the will of the people.

" get so many emails, so many text messages, so many calls indicating they are supporting her even though they are of the Republican persuasion," Smith said. "They claim themselves to be Republican but still they are supporting what she is about."

But the bill's sponsor, Rep. Jud McMillin, R-Brookville, said the legislation is a compromise.

"We create a mechanism that requires more cooperation" between the state board and superintendent, he said. "We make sure our children are best served."

Under SB 1, the superintendent will remain in charge of the Department of Education, which implements policies approved by the board.

Still, Altman said the legislation is "still taking away the voice of the voters."

"When some votes for governor, they do it for a variety of reasons," he said. "When someone votes for superintendent, they're voting on education issues. This takes away their voice on the State Board of Education."

Since Ritz was elected more than two years ago – defeating Republican Tony Bennett – she and board members have bickered about not just significant policies involving testing and school accountability but also small, administrative issues including who gets to put items on the board agenda and when a policy is eligible for a vote. At one point, Ritz sued the board for taking action behind her back and, at another point, she walked out of a meeting.

" realize the shock of Superintendent Ritz's election was hard to take," said Minority Leader Scott Pelath, D-Michigan City. "But this bill does not have to be. It doesn't have to be because it still suffers the taint that has existed through the legislative session. It is an effort to reverse the will of the people." And Rep. Sue Errington, D-Muncie, said the civisions between the superintendent and the board represent deep philosophical differences that should be debated.

But Rep. Tony Cook, R-Cicero, said dysfunction does exist – and he blamed both sides.

"The actions I've witnessed don't demonstrate how adults should work together," said Cook, a former school superintendent.

He called the bill "an excellent attempt" to deal with the needs of the state's education leadership structure.

SB 1 shakes up the board membership, although not as significantly as previous versions. The board would retain 11 members – with the superintendent serving as one.

Eight members would be appointed by the governor -as opposed to 10 now -and six of those must have professional experience in education. The governor could appoint no more than five from any one political party.

The leaders of the House and Senate would each get one appointment to the board.

the changes in the board composition would begin June 1.

"'m just grateful that we are rolling our sleeves up," Pence said. "We're finding some ways to improve the functioning, provide the resources necessary for the state board of education to provide that role of oversight of education policy in the state of Indiana that it's designed to do."

IND ANAPOLIS — Legislation aimed at reducing the abuse of prescription drugs and herein in Indiana has been re-introduced in Congress.

Sen. Joe Donelly, D-Indiana, said he is resurrecting the Heroin and Prescription Opioid Abuse Prevention, Education and Enforcement Act because abuse of opioids and heroin continues to rise nationwide. "Sadly, prescription drug abuse is a serious problem, not just in Indiana, but around the country," Donnelly said.

The legislation, which Donnelly said is a bipartisan effort that is also sponsored by Sen. Kelly Ayotte, R-New Hampshire, has five parts.

First, it would create the Pain Management Best Practices Interagency Task Force, which would look at best practices for pain medication prescriptions and management. Donnelly said there is a "clear correlation" between prescription drug abuse and eventual heroin use.

Second, the bill would create the Harold Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program, which would give grants to support other prescription drug monitoring programs.

"If we can do a better job in prescription monitoring programs, I think that can help right at the root cause," Donnelly said.

Donnelly said 80 percent of heroin users admit to abusing prescription drugs earlier in their lives. Donnelly's bill would also reauthorize the Byrne Justice Assistance, which would give grants to support local law enforcement in their efforts to combat the drug problem.

"Opioid addiction is difficult to treat," Donnelly said. "It's critical to support the efforts to prevent it." The bill would also start a national awareness campaign to shed light on prescription drug abuse throughout the country.

New to the legislation this year is a provision that would allow first responders to administer the drug Nalaxone to patients who have overdosed on heroin.

Donnelly said according to the World Health Organization, 20,000 heroin-related deaths could be prevented each year if the use of Nalaxone were legalized nationwide.

"We're trying to prevent them from dying there on the spot," Donnelly said.

Republican Gov. Mike Pence signed a similar bill into Indiana law earlier this month. Senate Bill 406 allows individuals to administer either Nalaxone or Narcan, another anti-overdose drug, if a family member or friend overdoses.

Previous indiana law only allowed health professionals, law enforcement officers or emergency workers to administer the drugs.

"With the rise of heroin addiction across our state, this important legislation will make available overdose intervention treatments and will save lives in Indiana," Pence said in a statement.

The issue of overdoses caused by intravenous drug use has been in the forefront of legislators' minds in Indiana after an HIV outbreak in Scott County in March caused Pence to declare a state of emergency. Donnelly said just last week, 142 residents of Austin, Indiana, a town in Scott County, were diagnosed with HIV. The town has a total population of 4,200. This surge in diagnosed cases has been liked to the sharing of infected needles among Opana users.

Donnelly said the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention "have been able to trace family members swapping needles at the same time and taking these drugs."

In an effort to combat the HIV crisis in Scott County, Pence authorized a temporary needle exchange problem. The program allows "high risk" counties that have a high rate of Hepatitis C to send clean needles to its residents.

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Pence said he is opposed to creating a statewide exchange once the temporary program expires.

" do no enter into this lightly," Pence said when he signed the temporary exchange into law. "I do not support needle exchange as anti-drug policy, but this is a public health emergency."

But Donnelly said he would support a needle exchange program in the state.

" am hopeful the governor will consider extending that temporary cycle for at least another 30 days," Donnelly said.

While Donnelly said the cost of his bill has not been added up yet, he said the cost of HIV treatment is worth creating preventative legislation.

Donnelly said HIV and Hepatitis C patients have to pay \$500 thousand in medical bills. In Scott County alone, Donnelly said It will cost nearly \$71 million to treat all the patients of the outbreak.

Donnelly said he and Ayotte are "going to do everything possible" to see their bill passed during this Congressional session.

"This isn't an Indiana problem only, this isn't just a rural problem, this can happen anywhere." Donnelly said. "I don't know a senator who wouldn't want to try to make sure this gets cone."

Banks is still on active duty until Tuesday. He does not know when he will return to the Senate, but he said he is excited for the 2016 legislative session and getting back involved.

Indy Eleven stadium bill dies as session nears close

April 29, 2015

A bill that would have funneled state money into a new or substantially renovated soccer stadium for the lindy Eleven has died in the legislative session's final hours.

"We needed to get to something clear, and we kind of ran out of time," the bill's author, Rep. Todd Huston, R-Fishers, told IBJ Wednesday afternoon. "Better not to do it than to put together a bad bill." Huston said legislators could take up the issue again in the coming years.

A version of the bill that passed the Indiana Senate earlier this month called for up to \$20 million in state money to help expand and renovate Michael Carroll Track and Soccer Stadium at IUPUI, where the Indy Eleven play their matches.

That was scaled back from an earlier version, <u>passed by the Indiana House</u>, that would have helped fund a new \$82 million arena in an undetermined Indianapolis location.

The team and its lobbyists had been busy trying to shape the legislation into allowing a new stadium on the site of the existing one—a project that also would require city support.

Referee Report: Professor Richard J Coble

I am pleased to be able to act as a referee for Professor Coble in relation to the position of Associate Dean at the University of Hawaii.

I am Chief Research Scientist with the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation, Australia's national science organisation of some 7,000 staff. I currently occupy the role of Deputy Chief of the Division of Building, Construction and Engineering, with 270 staff located at laboratories in Melbourne and Sydney. The Division's annual research budget is over A\$30 million per year. From April 2001 I will join the Board of the International Council for Research & Innovation in Building and Construction (CIB). My comments on Professor Coble will be primarily in relation to research, publication, communication of knowledge and science and industry networks – areas where I am in best position to make international comparisons.

I have known Professor Coble for 7 years. On an overseas visit in 1994 I travelled to the University of Florida specifically to meet Professor Coble because of his reputation in construction innovation (at that time he was leader of a CIB International Commission on Construction Futures). The meeting proved fruitful and led to subsequent collaborative research with Professor Coble and his team at U of Florida.

Because of Professor Coble's innovative research on hand held personal digital assistants in the early 1990s (forerunners to today's Palm Pilots) we were able to develop processes for reengineering the flow of information through the construction process that for the first time closed the digital divide between construction site (Professor Coble's domain of expertise) and the design office (where CSIRO had broadband communications applications operating). Our systems were trialled at Lend Lease in Sydney in 1995 and form the basis of their revolutionary Project Web system. This is but one area where he has been world leading. Other examples you will find in his work on construction safety and health. His Centre at the University of Florida and his continuing leadership of the CIB Working Commission in this area places him in an enviable position as a key focus for researchers globally. I hope to attract Professor Coble to Australia's new Co-operative Research Centre for Construction Innovation for brief periods to provide research leadership in this area.

Over the past 7 years I have had 4 separate visits to work with Professor Coble at U of Florida (University of Hawaii would be much more convenient!) and I know that he is a magnet for other researchers of international calibre – a major asset to any research institution. I have also met many of his graduate students who are also of high calibre. He assembles good people around him as a result of his enthusiasm and his intellect.

Professor Coble has been invited on fully funded visits to Australia and I have toured with him on joint workshops where I have been impressed with his ability to communicate and his ability to network.

On the former, you will have already discovered that his presentations are lively as well as well-grounded academically/scientifically. This traverses all levels – from one to one, small groups, students, senior government and industry leaders, academic peers etc.

In regard to the latter, Professor Coble's networks – both academic and industry – are extensive. This is a highly valuable commodity in 2001. One example. His links to Salford and their world-leading Construct IT is providing a gateway for Distance learning projects for Construction in the USA. Construct IT is linked to our CRC in Australia. Networks! As a senior industry/science manager at CSIRO I know all too well how rare the mix of research and commercial skills are.

I could go on, but his CV record speaks for itself. On a personal level, I now count Professor Coble as one of my friends as well as scientific colleagues. Clearly he adds a significant human dimension to the places and people which come into contact with him.

I believe Professor Coble would make a most valuable contribution to your Faculty.

I have completed my review of Dr. Richard Coble's vitae and supporting materials submitted for consideration for tenure and for promotion in the School of Building Construction. As you requested, I offer my comments for the two personnel actions independent of each other. However, as it relates to both issues, I have evaluated Dr. Coble's materials as if he were a faculty member in my department.

First, the issue of tenure. The faculty of the Construction Management Department at Cal Poly has established criteria for tenure based on five elements: academic preparation, professional experience, teaching, professional development, and service (to the Department, College, University, and Profession). Using these criteria to evaluate Dr. Coble, I offer the following:

a. Academic Preparation

The Construction Management Department recognizes the Master's degree in construction or a construction related field as the minimum level of academic preparation for tenure. Dr. Coble has an earned doctorate in architecture and a master's degree in building construction. In the area of academic preparation he would be considered to be eminently qualified for tenure at Cal Poly.

b. Professional Experience

The Construction Management Department requires a minimum of five years of construction experience at the managerial level for tenure, with more years required for higher academic ranks. A review of Dr. Coble's professional qualifications reveal over 20 years of project and corporate level management experience. In the area of professional preparation he would be considered to be a highly experienced individual.

Teaching

The Construction Management Department requires that individual faculty members maintain above average teaching evaluations and are encouraged to take individual action towards continued improvement. This is relatively vague and is dealt with long before it becomes an issue that would make or break a tenure action. From evidence provided by Dr. Coble, it is apparent from his teaching evaluations that his students consider him to be an average to above-average instructor. While not exceptional in this area, scores in this area might be improved with some mentoring from faculty members with higher evaluation scores. Still, while Dr. Coble's scores fall around the School mean, they still would have to be considered high and would qualify him for tenure.

As an aside, in-service workshops on teaching techniques, course organization, etc. offered by BCN faculty with more experience in these areas might serve to raise the mean score across the School.

d. Professional Development

Within the Construction Management Department, tenure-track (as well as tenured) faculty are expected to maintain currency in their area of professional expertise. This can be accomplished by research, publication, attending seminars and workshops, and most importantly, professional practice in the industry. Dr. Coble's vitae notes achievements in several of these area. His (principal) participation in an ongoing construction firm, his research activities, his numerous publications all indicate an individual committed to learning more about his profession. I consider this to be one of his strongest attributes and would eminently qualify him for tenure at Cal Poly.

Service (to the Department, College, University, and Profession)

The faculty of the Construction Management Department expects its members to be good citizens by participating in committee activities at the Department, College, and University level. Similarly, service to the construction industry is recognized as making a valuable contribution. Dr. Coble shows evidence of his participation in several areas, most conspicuously in the areas of graduate student advising/committee work, student club advising, and industry service. Once again, these activities would be viewed very positively in any tenure action within the Construction Management Department at Cal Poly.

With respect to Dr. Coble's request for consideration for tenure, I find that his qualifications meet or exceed those that would be expected of a tenured faculty member in the Construction Management Department at Cal Poly.

The next issue to address is Dr. Coble's request to be considered for promotion to the rank of Professor. Using the criteria for promotion within the Construction Management Department, I will offer my comments on preparation in the area of profession experience, professional development, leadership, and service.

a. Professional Experience

One element of consideration for promotion within the Construction Management Department is the number of years of professional experience (at a managerial level) the candidate has achieved. The criteria for consideration for the rank of Professor is 12 years. Dr. Coble's vitae notes over 25 years of professional experience at a managerial level.

Professional Development

The Departmental criteria identify a requirement to enhance academic and professional preparation by additional education, research, or development related to improving teaching qualifications and performance. Dr. Coble has provided significant evidence of his active participation in the area of research and publication. Additionally, he has maintained his participation in the industry through his activities with his construction firm and through his consulting. While collegial mentoring in the area of teaching performance would be recommended, it would not be a precondition to awarding Dr. Coble promotion to the rank of Professor at Cal Poly.

Leadership

The faculty of the Construction Management Department uses this criteria to evaluate a person's role in curriculum discussions, student advising, and interdepartmental committee activities. Dr. Coble's role as an academic advisor to several of the BCN student clubs would be typical of the activities that would be favorably viewed. Of more significance would be his role as advisor or committee member to graduate students. His

vitae includes many citations of his word in this area. Once again, more than enough for consideration for promotion to the rank of Professor.

Service (to the Department, College, University, and Profession)

Here, the faculty of the Construction Management Department considers the candidate's record of service to the Department, the College, the University and the Profession. Does the candidate take an active role in collegial governance through committee participation (committee leadership is always a plus)? Does the candidate participate in industry short courses, workshops, etc.? Questions such as these, which are not readily quantifiable, are all part of the deliberations when considering a candidate's application for promotion. Dr. Coble's activities in this area, while somewhat light in the college and university forums, are extremely strong in the area of industry service. This alone would be more than sufficient to approve his application to the rank of Professor.

You have probably noted that the area of teaching is not an area that is considered during promotion deliberations. The rationale behind that decision is that teaching performance is an on-going consideration for all academic ranks and that Assistant Professors should be just as good (or at least working on being) as Professors. Cal Poly faculty typically carry significant teaching loads, so much so that it often precludes the opportunity to pursue research interests. Because of this, teaching is something that is viewed as our primary mission. Teaching well counts for a lot.

In conclusion, based on my evaluation of Dr. Richard Coble's materials submitted for consideration for tenure, as well as his application for consideration for promotion to the rank of Professor, I find that Dr. Coble meets or exceeds the criteria for granting tenure in the Construction Management Department at Cal Poly. Additionally, I find that his qualifications meet or exceed those expected for promotion to the rank of Professor.

I am pleased to recommend Dr. Richard Coble for tenure and promotion to Full Professor in the M. E. Rinker Sr. School of Building Construction, College of Architecture. Dr. Coble is strong in teaching, research and service as they relate to tenured promotion to Full Professor at the University of Flouda.

Dr. Cohle has received several awards relating to his teaching performance. I specifically notice the commitment to training students and the quality of students from Building Construction that Dr. Coble has brought to the GeoPlan Center. We have worked jointly applying Geographic Information Systems and Mobile Computing to construction magnitude of safety problems, with the results being very gratifying.

In service, Dr. Coble is intensely involved in leadership positions in both local and international professional organizations. I have experienced the results of his relationship in that, almost every month some visitor from around the world stops by to see some of the work we are doing related to mobile computing.

My most direct experience in working with Dr. Coble is in the area of research. For the past decade I have been developing software to take computer mapping and data collection directly to the field. My original focus was primarily related to geographic information systems and collection of field data for cities, but because of Dr. Cobles research my focus has broadened.

Dr. Coble immediately saw the value of my work and related same to the construction industry. In the construction field he has worked closely with me and many of our joint graduate students to develop hand held computers and related for construction management and safety coordination software. Dr. Coble and I have also developed relationships with other institutions and now have two graduate students in Australia. We have also been working closely in fostering a relationship between the University of Florida and the leading research, manufacturing and construction consortiums in Australia. The Australian government has provided funding for us to visit Australia to finalize our proposal for further development of our research, which is targeted for manufacture as a valuable tool for the construction industry.

He has developed an icon based construction management software system called "IDIOMS". This system is basic to the construction application of the hand held computing device, that I have been involved with the last ten years. It is my belief Dr. Cobles concept of using icon based report generation is both invaluable and unique to computer application. Currently, the research we are involved with is such that it will allow an industry that is virtually void to automation for field operations to be fully automated and integrated with their management.

For the last four years our research has been at a stage of development that there has been significant concern by the University of Florida Intellectual property office that we not prematurely disseminate our intellectual property. At this time, the University of Florida. has hired a patent attorney and filed a preliminary patent application on the results of our research. Since the patents are now pending this research will be able to be discriminated to the research community.



His communication skills were put to the test for fifteen presentations, which were in all cases of a very high quality. We collaborated well and were well received by our colleagues, peers and the potential users of our products.

Dear Dr. Goble,

I want to thank you and the Center for Construction Safety and Loss Control for assembling such a worthwhile conference in October. I came away encouraged about the research in safety that is being conducted around the world. I was pleased with the volume of presenters and attendees that had a feel for the "real" world. Many of the presenters and members of your School of Building Construction, especially, had developed material that I feel can be very useful in today's construction environment. More importantly, everyone associated with the University of Florida were extremely attentive to people like myself and made me feel very welcome. I constantly look for people and organizations who have the ability contribute to the cause of safety. I really felt that the Rinker School of Building Construction had a vision for safety issues in construction.

Many organizations have good foundations of knowledge in matters of safety but lack the ability to convey the information to those who need it most. Your conference demonstrated to all of us in attendance advanced means and methods of graphic communication in the classroom with the multimedia presentations. Our collective ability to rely on the standard overhead projected as the tool of choice in presentation of information is rapidly coming to an end. The multimedia demonstrations by your students and Jon Antevy showed us how the art of graphic communication in the classroom has progressed from the overhead projector.

As a result of seeing Jon Antevy at work in his presentation at the conference, I have sought to establish a working relationship with him to further develop the tools and formats for providing meaningful safety education for the field worker in the classroom setting. I believe that Jon has the talent to use technology that exists today for that purpose as well as the talent to lead the way in the development of systems of reaching large quantities of workers across the nation.

Our organization is dedicated to doing research and development in the field of safety information transfer. My ultimate vision for Jon is for him to conduct significant research in that area and to do so in a way that will allow him to ultimately complete a doctorate program with the Rinker School of Building Construction should be choose to do so. I believe that his work and research for SafetyCorp will have an immediate impact on industry's ability to reach the field worker with training.

Our organization doesn't stop at simply making the workplace safer. We settle for nothing less than making the worker more productive at the same time as they are becoming safer. Our programs are designed to have safety pay it's way in productivity. Employers across the nation are more likely to implement dynamic safety programs if we can demonstrate that they "pay" for themselves in production.

We are very interested in developing conveyances of training material to reach the masses of literate field workers across the nation with whom we will never to able to have direct classroom contact. One of the first teaching mechanisms we are developing at SafetyCorp is a system of providing Continuing Education courses designed for the field worker. Conveyances of safety training are currently very inadequate to reach the volume of literate construction workers that desperately need training. We are using industry specific magazines to act as a conveyance of training courses. The magazine will have training articles with a post-reading test component attached. The test component will be returned to SafetyCorp by the worker for computer grading and documentation of training. Those who pass the test will be issued Continuing Education Credit for their effort and their employer will be provided the decumentation of successful completion of the training that will assist them in meeting the requirements of OSHA.

i am seeking to collaborate with universities in this project for the purpose of conducting relevant research using the database of workers that will be established with this Continuing Education format. The SafetyCorp system is one of the few, if not the only, system that establishes a direct connection with the worker for feedback. This direct connection with the field worker via the post reading test, will allow follow up research on many issues relative to safety. The insight of university "educators" in the establishment of this research format with field workers will be important.

Why conduct research about the field worker? At SafetyCorp, we believe that constant research into the "thinking patterns" of the field worker is necessary to develop effective training. Typically, research regarding the field worker is directed toward accident analysis. This body of research is helpful to identify

areas needing immediate attention for training but falls short in determining the thought processes that allow accidents to occur.

Most of all, I would like you to know that your conference was successful in "communicating" with industry about the subject of safety. I hope that future conferences will use this communication mechanism to establish working relationships between industry and academia. I used the conference to establish a working relationship with Jon Antevy. I believe such conferences can be used for establishing partnerships for the purpose of conducting industry relevant research. Many university research projects would benefit greatly from the input of industry. Industry, likewise, would benefit greatly from the ability of the university to conduct research. Partnerships with industry are certainly not unheard of; they are just underutilized. I would like to participate with you in the development of future conferences to bring a larger component of industry to the forum.

Indiana State University will not find a more forward-thinking, energetic or inspiring individual to serve as the Chair of the new Built Environment Department, than Dr. Richard Coble. As each of you know, I have worked closely with Dr. Coble over the past six (6) years, in numerous capacities, and firmly believe that he is one of the finest individuals to be considered for both of these promotion opportunities.

Providing his own support and without pay, he has gone to Manchuria to teach at the University level during summer months with a Christian organization that could not have otherwise been allowed into the country. He spends a considerable amount of his time counseling students, far in excess of the required office hours. He serves on numerous graduate committees, acting as both the toughest constructive critic of the student's work product, and the consummate encourager to the student that is ready to throw in the towel and give up.

Dr. Coble is known as a professor who cares, whether it is in spending additional time to review something as simple as a homework assignment, or as difficult as advising a student on a career job decision. In closing, I again recommend Dr. Richard J. Coble for approval for both Tenure and Full Professor at the finest University and School in the country. He will make those of us in the industry proud to continue our support of the M. E. Rinker, Sr. School of Building Construction.

Due to my involvement with the Gainesville Fire Department as Chief of the volunteer division, I had the opportunity to work very closely with Dr. Coble in his safety class. Almost two years later, our company has grown to 18 employees with three offices, one of which was just built in Gainesville. I travel county 20 days a month, meeting the top construction company CEOs around the country. Dr. Coble has provided the conduit for me to continue coming back to the college. where I talk about my experiences and provide Insight to the graduating sentors.


Arnold's ability ranges much further than simply doing the work, he has a good positive attitude and is a good negotiation, which is no doubt what these jobs needed.







Judge orders joint venture behind convention center project to pay \$6.3M

he newest addition of the Orange County Convention Center has been open for six years, but the aftermath of its haphazard construction lives on in federal court.

A U.S. Bankruptcy Court judge in Tampa recently issued a \$6.3 million judgment - and a stinging rebuke - against the building's general contractor, Hunt/Clark/Construct Two. Interest, attorneys' fees and other costs, which have not yet been decided by the court, will likely add several million dollars to the judgment.

In a 163-page order in a case that has dragged on since 2003, Judge Michael Williamson said the joint venture hired by Orange County to oversee the center's construction was responsible for "an inefficient mess" and "an uncoordinated nightmare" that was completed "in the most unproductive way possible."

"Somehow, in what appears to this court to be a state of chaos, a convention center was built," Williamson wrote.

The company was a joint venture of Hunt Construction Group and The Clark Construction Group - both national companies - and Construct Two Construction Managers of Orlando. Hunt and Clark are among the largest construction companies in the country, and Hunt is now managing construction of Orlando's Amway Center basketball arena.

Williamson found that the partnership suffered from "distrust and finger-pointing" that led to widespread management failures on the \$748 million convention-center expansion.

Attorneys for Hunt/Clark/Construct Two did not return calls seeking comment.

The million-square-foot convention-center addition was green-lighted by Orange County in 1998, in hopes of capitalizing on a then-booming convention market. To get the building up quickly, construction began before final blueprints were complete, according to subcontractors who worked on it.

"They wanted to get it built quickly so it would start making money. The job wasn't ready to be built, and they knew it," said Richard Coble, a construction consultant hired by Electric Machinery Enterprises Inc., the company that won the judgment against Hunt/Clark/Construct Two.

Because the plans were incomplete, numerous changes were needed. And the contractor failed to keep a schedule that would allow work to progress in a logical manner, the judge found. For instance, he said, drywall was installed before there was a roof on the building - and had to be replaced after it was damaged by rain.

The project schedule maintained by the company was a bogus one used for "public relations purposes" to show Orange County everything was OK on the job, Williamson wrote.

Costs skyrocketed because of constant revisions to the plans and the lack of a coordinated schedule, but the project was kept within its budget because many subcontractors were never paid for the extra work they had to perform. EME also sued Orange County, but the county settled for \$820,000 in 2004

The project stayed within budget, but subcontractors claimed that was simply because they weren't paid what they were

"The job was terribly mismanaged by H/C/C," said Chris McRae, whose Tallahassee law firm represented EME. "All the trade contractors like EME were left holding the bag."

In fact, EME - like other smaller companies that worked on the project - was driven our of business. At least five companies in addition to EME filed suit over the project, but only one is still pending: Patterson Mechanical, a Winter Garden company has sued Harper Mechanical, the company that hired it to install air-conditioning ducts.


Peggy Patterson blames the convention center project for killing her once-thriving business.

"I lost everything. I have no home, no business, no employees," said Patterson, who now lives with her mother. "And it's because of that building."

Orange County workers armed with cans of disinfectant pulled reams of documents out of several large trash bins at the convention center Thursday under orders from a federal judge.

The judge wants to determine whether the county has tried to destroy records that would prove it stiffed one of the companies that helped build the new wing of the center.

Electric Machinery Enterprises, which installed miles of wiring and thousands of electrical fixtures in the center, has sued Orange County and its general contractor for \$11 million in unpaid fees. In court papers filed this week, the subcontractor claims that companies that built the center may be owed as much as \$50 million.

The messy legal battle casts a shadow over the largest public construction project in Central Florida history, a job that county officials have repeatedly said was finished in September, "on time and on budget."

A 26 page complaint filed Sunday said the county and its general contractor, Hunt/Clark/Construct II, met that goal "on the backs" of their trade contractors by simply not paying the companies for all their work.

"That's their opinion, and it will be resolved in court," convention center Director Tom Ackert said.

The expansion project added a separate 3 million-square-foot building to the convention center at a cost of \$748 million, giving Orange the second largest facility in the nation. But according to court papers and interviews with

ntractors, the project was marked from its inception by poor planning, inept scheduling and slipshod management.

Lawyers for Electric Machinery Enterprises told the court that it bid on the convention center job based on what turned out to be incomplete construction blueprints. Throughout the building process, the blueprints were changed repeatedly, forcing work to be delayed or re-done and expenses to skyrocket.

Schedule changed

Just as troubling, contractors said, was the lack of a dependable construction schedule. The schedule is vital for any large project to proceed in a logical order, it ensures, for instance, that drywall isn't installed before there is a roof on the building.

The constant changes to the blueprints and timetable made work more costly for some contractors, EME initially thought they could do the job in 311,000 man hours; the company said it eventually took 720,000.

Representatives from EME and Hunt/Clark/Construct II would not comment Thursday. But in court papers, EME said it has been negotiating with the general contractor for months to be paid \$11 million owed for extra work. the company hired a construction expert to review project records, hoping to bolster its financial claim

The consultant, former University of Florida professor Richard Coble, requested dozens of documents from Orange County under Florida's public records law. County officials supplied some of

the records, but not all of them. In nid-December, county officials and Hunt/Clark/Construct II began shutting down the project's construction offices in a cluster of trailers behind the convention center. They also began throwing stacks of files into the trash.

Coble poked through some of the discarded records and found information EME executives think helps prove they are owed money. The debris - daily construction reports, meeting transcripts, phone logs and even a computer - included some record Coble requested from the county but was not given, according to court affidavits. He even found one of his own public records requests in the trash, torn into tiny pieces, the affidavit read.

"We don't destroy public records, and anybody who works for the county who does will face the appropriate disciplinary action," he said.

Still, EME executives, who have filed for bankruptcy protection, asked U.S. Bankruptcy Court Judge Michael G. Williamson to force the county to stop destroying any records related to the project.

In a hearing Monday in Tampa, Williamson ordered the county and its general contractor to retrieve paperwork from the large trash bins where they had been thrown, clean them up and catalog them.

"Hopefully, they have a lot of Lysol," assistant County Attorney Joe Passiatore said.

Other complaints

EME is apparently the first company to file a claim for unpaid debts against the county and Hunt/Clark/Construct II. But it's complaints are not unique; several

other subcontractors said they are facing financial ruin because they haven't been paid.

Ivan Moreno, co-owner of the Edgewood company that installed most of the drywall in the new wing of the convention center, said his company is owed about \$1.5 million. The unpaid debt means he hasn't had the cash flow to bid on some new jobs. His bonding company will no longer insure his work.

"We are in a desperate situation right now," San Moreno, of Exterior Walls Inc.

Peggy Patterson, who said her Winter Garden heating and air-conditioning firm is owed \$515,000, is in similar straits.

"It's killing me," she said. "I'm hurting bad."

Patterson has appealed directly to county commissioners, but the county maintains that it has no responsibility to subcontractors such as Patterson, EME, and Exterior Walls. The county's only contract is with Hunt/Clark/Construct II, which in turn hired the trade contractors who did the work. The arrangement, county officials hope, shields taxpayers from legal claims.

EME's lawyers think the county is liable because county officials OK'd changes that drove up the cost.


"Why Orange County is a party to this kind of deceptive practice is not clear to me," Coble wrote in a September letter to the county.

New Martin Marietta Production Facilities Near Ocala Being Built By Tyco Constructors, Inc.

One of the most exciting growth companies in West Orange is Tyco Constructors, Inc., 1430 E. Highway 50 in Winter Garden. Incorporated in February of 1975, Tyco completed its first major project, a 12,000 square foot office building for Wingard Land Company, just 90 days later, in May of 1975.

In the years since then, Tyco has done many millions of dollars worth of construction work throughout Central Florida. Locally, it has built the whole of West Orange branch of Maguire Road, the Golden Corral Restaurant and the Fairway Market shopping center.

In 1979, Tyco was designated one of the outstanding small businesses in the Southeast by the U.S. Small Business Administration in

Earlier this year, in a move which positions Tyco Constructors to tackle the largest projects now being planned for Central Florida. Tyco will soon be acquired by Racon, based out of South-

field, Michigan, a company headed by R.J. (Bob) Spiegel. Spiegel has more than thirty years of construction experience; and Racon is one of the top 400 construction firms in the U.S. Its acquisition of Tyco Constructors will enable Racon to participate in the building surge that is expected to take place in Central Florida in the years ahead.

Tyco's largest current project is a \$2.2 million, 52,000 square foot expansion of Martin Marietta's plant in Silver Springs Shores, just south of Ocala. Part of the new Martin space is to be used for laser guided weapons production and part for offices. A second floor of the new building will house administrative personnel and a


CONTRACTORS COURT IT SOLUTIONS

With the plethora of cutting edge technologies available today, ultimately it's the tools that are practical and money saving that find the widest acceptance and success. With that in mind the technique of using 4D CAD, or creating both a 3D model and a schedule from the same project database is finding new fans in the legal arena.

"It can do an awful lot to help keep contractors out of the courthouse," says Bud Griffis, professor of construction management at Polytechnic University, Brooklyn. He and Rick Coble, professor of construction management at the University of Florida, Gainesville, presented the technology at the New York office of Holland & Knight LLP Jan 26.

Coble and Griffis presented two case-study animations at the meeting of nearly 20 construction lawyers. A schedule tied to a developing CAD model was used to explain how an entire structure or component was or will be built.

Coble's project consisted of a conflict caused by the end of an excessively long girder protruding through a space where a glass curtain wall was to be installed, along with schedule changes needed to accommodate reworking the girder. Griffis demon-



strated two scenarios for building a 20-story dormitory at the Polytechnic campus. "These aren't cartoon," says Griffis. "These are engineering drawings, and the model comes right from the drawings."

Advocates of 4D CAD such as Coble and Griffis also promote other technology including a digital camera to avoid litigation. "The technologies are basic to address problem situations if you get in early," says Coble. He suggests that attorneys embrace the technology and counsel their construction clients on how to use it. For example, contractors should have their foreman shoot the same location at the end of every day. "If you do have a dispute developing, taking the pictures every day puts everyone on notice that you, at least, are going to be prepared."

For using CAD, digital photography and other technologies, Griffis warns contractors to wait designers to take the lead. "Most of the architects in New York are still using butcher paper and crayons," says Griffis.

SOFTWARE MODEL BUILDERS ADD AN EXTRA DIMENSION TO 3D CAD

LIKE THE GROWTH OF DESIGN-BUILD, researchers on the cutting edge of construction management have for the past few years been evolving a "digital design-build" technique called 4D CAD. Loosely defined, 4D involves creating a three-dimensional, computer-aided design of a project, then joining the digital model pieces with the fourth dimension of time, as on a schedule.

Nearly 50 construction management researchers from around the world met Feb. 22 in Orlando, Fla., and Feb. 24 in Gainesville, Fla., to move it to the next level. The technique may seem like an owner's dream: bringing designers, contractors and subcontractors together from the beginning of a project. But the approach also has its detractors.

LEARNING NEW METHODS. Nearly all attendees agreed that a major stumbling block to 4D CAD's success is the initial resistance to using 3D CAD. "3D is one of the greatest tools for design review," says Bud Griffis, director of the Construction Management and Technology Center at Polytechnic University, Brooklyn, N.Y. But you've got to get the site people to use the model."

Others echoed the sentiment. "Forcing foremen to equate three-dimensional drawings with time is something that should be the goal of every construction manager," says

Rick Coble, director of the Construction Safety and Loss Control Center at the University of Florida, Gainesville. "Even without the use of 4D CAD."

Getting general contractors to act as intermediaries can help the technique gain acceptance. "General contractors become the integrative agent," says Sarah Slaughter, assistant professor of project management at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge. "That participation lowers the uncertainty and the perception of risk."

Response was mixed on whether the design industry's still-common practice of billing hours, versus charging lump-sum fees for work, are also a hurdle to 4D CAD's adoption.

"The trend is to get less and less design from the [engineers]," says David Riley, assistant professor of construction management at the University of Washington, Seattle. He cites as an example a case in which a designer crunched for time might use a single drawn line to represent five pipes.

Instead, Riley and others pointed to a promising solution of agreeing up front that engineers and architects create a rough 3D project design, followed by tech-savvy subcontractors filling in the mechanical, electrical and plumbing details. "All too often we begrudgingly include the special-

ists in the design phase," adds William O'Brien, an assistant professor of construction management at UF-Gainesville.

They say both 3D and 4D techniques work better because, ultimately, it is subcontractors that create the project's building components. But doing this among multiple projects is a "constant headache" adds O'Brien. He says subs need a multiproject version of 4D, or what he calls "5D" CAD.

Workers' comp fraud said to cost \$1 billion

Fraud places financial burden on companies that follow the rules

The state is losing more that \$1 billion in annual revenue as a result of workers' compensation insurance fraud, according to a new study published by a University of Florida professor.

Richard Coble, a licensed contractor and associate professor of building construction, said a growing number of companies underreport their payroll to reduce "workers' comp" premium payments, and others fraudulently claim exempt status - and many companies,

primarily involved in the construction industry, don't even buy workers' comp insurance in violation of state law.

"The average worker is the big loser here," Coble said. "If companies are cheating by not paying for insurance, and a worker gets hurt, he often has to sue the company just to get

compensated. But most of them don't even go that far."

Coble started to research workers' compensation issues in 1994. The study has taken several years to compile, and Coble recruited numerous sources of information for help, including municipal building departments around the state, colleagues at UF and the Florida Roofing, Sheet Metal and Air Conditioning Contractors Association.

Workers' comp insurance premiums are calculated as a percentage of workers' wages. Rates are established by the state and vary for different workers, such as carpenters, steel workers and plumbers.

Consequently, a general contractor's workers' comp premium is based on the makeup and size of its work force, as well as the "claim experience" of the contractor, or the amount of claims it has filed.

By surveying building departments in all 67 of Florida's counties, Coble collected information on the value of construction projects and permits issued in 1997. Coble also used 1997 data from the U.S. Census Bureau, which studies overall construction volume every five years.

The National Council on Compensation Insurers reported that Florida collected about \$912.2 million in workers' comp insurance premiums in 1997. But Noble's study says the state should have earned between another \$1.2 billion and \$2.7 billion in premiums, based on the volume of construction performed in the state that year.

Coble is using \$1.3 billion as a conservative estimate of the state's shortfall, since he didn't receive a 100 percent response rate on his surveys to municipal building departments for construction information. But Coble said he tallied sufficient data from the major metropolitan areas and some who have seen his study are backing up his findings.

"I was very impressed with the work he did," said Elsie Allen, business representative for Carpenter's Union Local 75 in Gainesville. "This is a major problem, probably the most significant problem we have in this industry."

"The companies committing fraud are using that to keep extra money in their pockets, and then they're able to underbid the legitimate companies for contracts."

Enforcement against workers' comp fraud has been difficult at times for state labor investigators, who lack the resources to effectively police the thousands of construction companies that exist in the state. Part of the problem lies with an exemption rule for independent contractors, who often act as one-person operations and are not required to purchase workers' comp insurance.

In many cases, Coble said, while companies fraudulently register with the state as independent contractors, when in fact they employ a number of workers and are required to have workers' comp insurance. As a result, insurance rates have gone up, he said, and placed a burden on legitimate companies who pay their claims.

Sen. Rod Smith, D-Alachua, read Coble's report and said although he wasn't convinced the numbers "were absolutely correct," the findings should raise some questions during the Legislature's next session.

"Florida's worker's comp rates are low, among the top five in the country, and I don't think it's driving any business away," Smith said.

"I'm not saying I would adopt these findings, but they ought to spur some interest on the issue," he said.

Coble said he has sent copies of the study to the state Bureau of Compliance in the Division of Workers' Compensation Oversight Board. He hopes state officials will consider establishing a better system of tracking workers and independent contractors in order to determine eligibility for exemption from workers' comp insurance.

UF professors, Chinese bond amid NATO bombs

Driving to Red Bridge market, watching the bridge below him fill with angry Chinese student protesters, UF professor Rick Coble thought about the Chinese people he knew.

And about how, after three trips to Beijing, one bomb was threatening to destroy all he had worked for.

Coble, with Jim Terhune, associate dean of the College of Journalism and Communications, and UF staff member Mike Sorgius, was in China earlier this month to build relationships.

But they were there, on separate chips, just when the United States had become a hated nation.

There was no way of knowing that on the night of May 7, NATO would bomb the Chinese Embassy in Belgrade, killing three Chinese journalists.

The next morning, Coble watched more than 300 Chinese students from Tsinghua University burn an American flag from the Sheraton Hotel across from the U.S. Embassy in Beijing.

But strangely, amid the chaos of the students' hurling eggs and rocks, Coble still felt secure in China.

Earlier that day, the Chinese government appeared on television to denounce the bombing. But Coble noticed something that served as a comfort. The Chinese were protesting a country not the people of America.

That was something Terhune also picked up on.

"It's the politics. Its not the common people of the United States. 'Common people.' That was the term they used," he said.

While Terhune and Sorgius were asked not to return to Beijing after the bombing, they entertained thoughts similar to Coble's.

"We left at 7 AM Sunday for Xi'an (China)," said Terhune, who was not

travelling with Sorgius. "We know about it before we got on the plane. We were advised that there were protests there."

His group heard 10,000 to 20,000 protesters had gathered in the city southwest of Beijing. The government reported more than 100,000.

> Terhune spoke in an English class where the American instructor spent 15 minutes apologizing for the bombing.

"He had been alerted that in his class, some people might give him a hard time. But all of our personal contacts were positive," said Turhune. "Every class I was in, they

asked to take pictures with us. That hardly sounds like a hostile group to me."

For Terhune, who has visited China every other year since 1990, one bomb could not destroy so many relationships. He spoke to students just hours before the bombing.


"I started speaking at 6:30 and got out of there at 9:30," said Terhune Terhune. "They followed me all away to the gate. They asked all sorts of questions."

Because of his bonds, he was not scared for his safety.

"You study the looks you get," Terhune said. "You can interpret what you see. You can imagine people staring at you and thinking evil things. But it's all supposition."

According to the Tsinghua News Weekly, 1,000 students demonstrated on the Beijing campus soon after the bombing. Coble was staying at the Friendship Hotel across town, and admittedly tense

experience.

"It was basically in their hands. If the group would have come in, there was nothing I could do. I was helpless," said Coble. "One student asked me, 'Did vou have anything to do with the bombing?' I said, 'No.' He said, 'Neither did I."

To Coble, that was a sign of friendship.

> He will return to China in August and again in December returning the same time every year for the next five

> During that time, Coble further the new Center for Safety Construction Health at Tsinghua, a sister program of UF's Center for Construction Safety and Loss Control that is run by Coble.

The center will be the crux on ongoing fight for the protection of China's 35 million construction workers.

Coble also is bringing five Chinese students the US this fall in a move he hopes will provide them with positive experiences to take back to their homeland.

"I want to work with the students who want to rebuild China. Anything less would be compromising my relationship with China. It expects nothing less of me," he said.



Construction experts speculate on future of high-rises

In the aftermath of the attacks on New York City's Word Trade Center, construction experts, property managers and developers are wondering whether skyscrapers will remain desirable symbols of US skylines.

"There's a big psychological factor," said Henry Petroski, a professor at Duke University's Pratt School of Engineering who specializes in construction failure. "The reason people wanted space in the skyscrapers is for prestige. Those things are going to be not so valuable anymore if employees don't want to work in skyscrapers or clients don't want to do business there."

In downtown Miami - well-known for its striking high-rises and imaginative bay front architecture - the planned 70-story Four Seasons Hotel & Tower. hailing itself as "the tallest residential building south of New York City," is already advertising its shops, condominiums and hotel rooms. The complex is scheduled to go up on Brickell Ave between 14th Lane and 14th Terrace and be finished in winter 2002.

The city's tallest building now is the First Union Financial Center, 200 S. Biscayne Blvd., at 55 stories. A nearby building at 100 S. Biscayne Blvd and others on Brickell were evacuated last week after bomb threats.

In fact, a spell of fraudulent, copy cat threats in the days following the New York and Washington, DC, attacks forced workers in tall buildings across Miami to interrupt their workdays and climb down dozens of "Those things are going to be not so valuable anymore if employees don't want to work in skyscrapers'

flights of stairs in order to exit without elevators.

Still, said Gloria Hernandez, secretary of Miami-Dade's Building Owners and Managers Association, the practicality of vertical buildings in urban areas may outweigh concerns about unlikely future terrorist attacks.

"I think because of the density in most major cities in the country, you have no choice but to build vertical structures. There's not a lot of land in big cities to build four- or fivestory buildings."

"You have to build up," said Ms. Hernandez, property manager of 1221 Brickell Ave, home of Telefonica. "Perhaps we wont be building large, structures like the World Trade Center. But we'll keep building high rises to fill demand."

"For predictable events - natural disasters such as hurricanes, lightning storms and earthquakes - tall buildings may be sturdier than structures closer to the ground," said Richard Coble, and associate professor at the University of Florida's Rinker School of Building Construction who specializes in construction safety.

"When you have a hurricane, vertical shelter is what they find is the best protection," Dr. Coble said. "The middle part of it is designed for heavy wind loads. Your house isn't

designed for those loads. Houses get destroyed. But even in the eye of the storm, there's no building reported as going down that was Americanengineered. People should be wanting more of those buildings, not less."

"When you start putting 12,000 gallons of fuel in a building," Dr. Coble said, referring to the contents of the jets that hit the World Trade Center, "you can't design it to withstand that kind of heat. You could put 10 feet of concrete around it, but it's not practical."

Practicality, said Jose Mitrani, a professor in Florida International University's construction management program, is a key to determining whether theories of engineering skyscrapers will change.

"If we can put people on the moon, we can build buildings that can withstand these types of things," Mr. Mitrani said. "But how expensive? And where do you stop? Can a building withstand the detonation of a small nuclear device? Where do you draw the line?"

Bill Ross, president of Estoril Inc., the company that owns and is developing Brickell's 36 story Espirito Santo Plaza, said "a big building - no matter whether it is tall or sprawling - is still a big building, making it unsafe in some way."


"Think of the average tenant in a large building. If you need 50,000 or 100,000 square feet, there is no way to do it in a small building. What difference does it make if it's horizontal or vertical? I somebody thinks you're a target, it really makes no difference if it's big or small, public or private."

Many Subcontractors claim they were not paid for any extra work they did on the convention center's addition.

Judge orders joint venture behind convention center project to pay \$6.3M

he newest addition of the Orange County Convention Center has been open for six years, but the aftermath of its haphazard construction lives on in federal court.

A U.S. Bankruptcy Court judge in Tampa recently issued a \$6.3 million judgment - and a stinging rebuke - against the building's general contractor, Hunt/Clark/Construct Two. Interest, attorneys' fees and other costs, which have not yet been decided by the court, will likely add several million dollars to the judgment.

In a 163-page order in a case that has dragged on since 2003, Judge Michael Williamson said the joint venture hired by Orange County to oversee the center's construction was responsible for "an inefficient mess" and "an uncoordinated nightmare" that was completed "in the most unproductive way possible."

"Somehow, in what appears to this court to be a state of chaos, a convention center was built," Williamson wrote.

The company was a joint venture of Hunt Construction Group and The Clark Construction Group - both national companies - and Construct Two Construction Managers of Orlando. Hunt and Clark are among the largest construction companies in the country, and Hunt is now managing construction of Orlando's Amway Center basketball arena.

Williamson found that the partnership suffered from "distrust and finger-pointing" that led to widespread management failures on the \$748 million convention-center expansion.

Attorneys for Hunt/Clark/Construct Two did not return calls seeking comment.

The million-square-foot convention-center addition was green-lighted by Orange County in 1998, in hopes of capitalizing on a then-booming convention market. To get the building up quickly, construction began before final blueprints were complete, according to subcontractors who worked on it.

"They wanted to get it built quickly so it would start making money. The job wasn't ready to be built, and they knew it," said Richard Coble, a construction consultant hired by Electric Machinery Enterprises Inc., the company that won the judgment against Hunt/Clark/Construct Two.

Because the plans were incomplete, numerous changes were needed. And the contractor failed to keep a schedule that would allow work to progress in a logical manner, the judge found. For instance, he said, drywall was installed before there was a roof on the building - and had to be replaced after it was damaged by rain.

The project schedule maintained by the company was a bogus one used for "public relations purposes" to show Orange County everything was OK on the job, Williamson wrote.

Costs skyrocketed because of constant revisions to the plans and the lack of a coordinated schedule, but the project was kept within its budget because many subcontractors were never paid for the extra work they had to perform. EME also sued Orange County, but the county settled for \$820,000 in 2004

The project stayed within budget, but subcontractors claimed that was simply because they weren't paid what they were

"The job was terribly mismanaged by H/C/C," said Chris McRae, whose Tallahassee law firm represented EME. "All the trade contractors like EME were left holding the bag."

In fact, EME - like other smaller companies that worked on the project - was driven our of business. At least five companies in addition to EME filed suit over the project, but only one is still pending: Patterson Mechanical, a Winter Garden company has sued Harper Mechanical, the company that hired it to install air-conditioning ducts.

Peggy Patterson blames the convention center project for killing her once-thriving business.

"I lost everything. I have no home, no business, no employees," said Patterson, who now lives with her mother. "And it's because of that building."

I know you are very busy, but yesterday I walked around Austin's "north side" knocking on peoples doors asking them if they could see something changed in the community what would they liked to see changed and like I thought many said they would like to see the drug problem go down. The next question I asked was how could the drug problem go down? If you had a wish list on what you could get accomplished if your voice was heard what would you fight for? The responses were much help and some even surprised me.

The children said they do not know anything besides drugs. Its what the kids do for fun because there isn't anything going on around here. They see their friends going, using, and selling and they want to make a quick buck or feel how their friends feel. Many children said they would love to see more after school programs. Many said they do not get a meal besides school everyday. They also talked about how they love sports, but there is no way to play on the school team. Jim:

I write to thank Governor Pence, you and everyone on the Governor's team for your efforts in working to protect Hoosiers' rights to freely exercise their religious beliefs without government interference. I really enjoyed hearing the Governor speak at this year's prayer breakfast and know his motives are pure and his heart is in the right place. I was particularly struck to hear him say the most comforting words he hears are when people tell him they are praying for him. Please know I am praying for Governor Pence and his family. The attacks on him and the State of Indiana are some of the most unfair I've ever seen. I am also praying for you and the Governor's others closest advisors as well as members of the General Assembly.

I know the Governor has many interests to balance in light of the firestorm that has erupted. I am concerned, however, that recent statements about clarifying the RFRA may actually lead to a result that turns the law on its head and codifies the State's purported ability to compel Christians to participate in weddings that we believe blaspheme one of the most sacred religious ceremonies and relationships established by the God we worship. (Genesis 2:24). Whatever clarifications are made, I hope they do not result in laws being established that give individuals or the State a legal basis to sue or otherwise punish persons (including business owners) for refusing to actively participate in a wedding ceremony that violates the core of their deeply held religious convictions. There has been a lot of talk about Indiana and the RFRA making discrimination lawful. Christian Perspective: This woman chose to not serve a gay couple out of her religious conviction to live by the rules of God. Now she is either forced to go against her religious beliefs and pay a fine/serve gay couples in the future, or lose her business and home and be shunned by those who advocate the LGBT lifestyle. Sadly, this is what our country is coming to: you increasingly can't live by your religious beliefs in our country any more. Respect one person's right, but not right of another. This about respecting the rights of one individual but not another. I believe in God and I believe that he loves all his children and created us all in his image. Christian Perspective: We'll see what happens if it goes to the Supreme Court. In my opinion, I don't think it should be about giving respect to any one religion. It should be about allowing, in rare cases, an individual to live according to their beliefs and convictions while respecting the beliefs and convictions of another. That's my opinion. Robert, I never suggested that LGBT are Godless or faithless. Yes, the Christian God does love everyone. But he also has rules, sins etc. that he requires his followers to follow. I can't speak to other religions. But Robert I agree with you... Christians aren't asking everyone's to agree with the bible. The LGBT community isn't asking everyone to agree with their lifestyle choices either. Yet are essentially saying that Christians can no longer uphold scripture of the bible. They can no longer uphold their their beliefs. Americans should no longer have that primary right. You are essentially advocating the banning of the Christian religion from society altogether, but just incrementally. Not to mention other religions. Let's call this what it is, or is becoming. This is about removing religion, and Christianity in this case currently, from our country completely

LGTB Perspective: You consider this an affront to the established christian religion in this country---I see it as simply keeping religion in check. Your beliefs and freedom of religion has limits Jeff. In the eyes of a court, the difference is between religion of belief and religion of action. To quote Thomas Jefferson, "the legislative powers of the government reach actions only, and not opinions. People need to understand that they cannot indulge their self interests (even when it concerns their faith) to the point that society's common good is compromised. In other words...the courts have said and will decree again and again that essentially you and I can have our beliefs and that no law should ever restrict our beliefs. But law of the land will time and again restrict and control ACTIONS. The founding fathers don't care if you worship the spaghetti monster just as long as you don't break laws like steeling pasta, defacing public property with tomato sauce OR discriminate against people by refusing to sell meatballs to people who resemble Bill Murray. Get it? I am saying that lady needs to get over herself and make cupcakes for Adam and Steve...she runs a Business and part of that responsibility is serving the entire public---she can't pick and choose just because of her interpretations of the bible.

Christian Perspective: You can refuse to sell me meatballs because I have big feet, or because I'm being obnoxious. There is no law that prevents that. I'm saying that she doesn't have to accept Adam and Steve, or sell those cupcakes. Adam and Steve need to get over it and patronise a different bakery. In fact there are 100 bakeries that would be happy to serve them. There are alternatives for Adam and Steve. She can pick and choose based on the first amendment and she should be able to practice her deeply held convictions according to Bill Clinton. Gregg, if someone calls me to do an illustration for a magazine for which goes against my personal beliefs, you are saying I can't say no? I am forced to provide my service and do the assignment? I will respectfully disagree with you and say no. You can take away my job, my house, boycott me, humiliate and destroy me as a person in the court of public opinion (actions based on your beliefs) but I won't do the assignment. That should be my right, in my opinion.

LGTB Perspective: But, isn't that where the issue is? In Indiana, and only Indiana, the LGBT community is not a protected class. Having big feet, being obnoxious, is quite different from what is being talked about. People use religion to create second class citizens all the time. There were plenty of deli counters who would refuse to serve black people, or bakeries who wouldn't make cakes for interracial couples.

I just kind of hoped we were past all that. We are back to square one here: using religion to put self interests ahead of the interests of the common good.

Christian Perspective: You are looking at this in completely the wrong way. To deny someone a first amendment right in order to provide another person a different right is not for the common good. Is there a way for both sides to be able to express their right? Is there a way to tolerate the free expression of the deeply held views of both sides? I think there is a creative solution here.

LGTB Perspective: Laws govern actions, not beliefs. No one is being "forced" here. You can dig in your heels on this, but I'm done explaining.

Christian Perspective: This isn't discrimination, because the woman sold flowers to that gay man before. It's only when he wanted to use the flowers to celebrate gay marriage, which is pretty clear in the bible (one man, one woman). You want to force her to go against her deeply held convictions. Let's turn the tables now. Jessup wants Chalonte to print 1 million t shirts. No problem, right? but Jessup wants the t shirts to say "white power, long live the KKK." With your logic, Chalonte needs to get over herself and print those t shirts. Bart wants to buy 1,000 flowers from Gregg, Jeff and Robert's flower shop. Bart tells him he is going to use them for an event that celebrates the death penalty, or abortion, or every time a gay man or a liberal dies. You need to provide that service Gregg, Jeff and Robert, so get over yourself. So this isn't only about discriminating against another person for being who they are. This is about refusing to promote an idea that goes against your fundamental beliefs. I have no problem protecting everyone above from being forced to go against their beliefs. If the laws are currently this way, then they need to be changed. That's for the greater good.

LGTB Perspective: Try being treated as a second class citizen for awhile, you would have a different stance. SUMMARY:

The proposed amendments in this bill would add sexual orientation and gender identity to the list of protected characteristics under the Indiana Civil Rights law for purposes of housing, employment and public accommodations.

The bill defines sexual orientation and gender identity, making clear that gender identity may be shown by medical history or treatment, consistent and uniform expression, or other evidence that the gender identity is a part of the individual's core identity and not asserted for any improper purpose.

The bill also clarifies that where sex may be lawfully taken into account under the civil rights law, those distinctions must be made in accordance with an individual's gender identity. This ensures that transgender people are not subject to discrimination.

Indiana law already exempts religious organizations and religious schools entirely from the definition of employer for purposes of the civil rights law, and this bill will not change that exemption.

Finally, the bill states that the Indiana Religious Freedom Restoration Act cannot be used as a defense in any claim under the Indiana Civil Rights Act, or local or other state law prohibiting discrimination.

Article 9, Chapter 1 is hereby amended as follows (amendments in red underline):

IC 22-9-1-2

Public policy; construction of chapter

- Sec. 2. (a) It is the public policy of the state to provide all of its citizens equal opportunity for education, employment, access to public conveniences and accommodations, and acquisition through purchase or rental of real property, including but not limited to housing, and to eliminate segregation or separation based solely on race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, national origin or ancestry, since such segregation is an impediment to equal opportunity. Equal education and employment opportunities and equal access to and use of public accommodations and equal opportunity for acquisition of real property are hereby declared to be civil rights.
- (b) The practice of denying these rights to properly qualified persons by reason of the race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, national origin, or ancestry of such person is contrary to the principles of freedom and equality of opportunity and is a burden to the objectives of the public policy of this state and shall be considered as discriminatory practices. The promotion of equal opportunity without regard to race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, national origin, or ancestry through reasonable methods is the purpose of this chapter.
- (c) It is also the public policy of this state to protect employers, labor organizations, employment agencies, property owners, real estate brokers, builders, and lending institutions from unfounded charges of discrimination.
- (d) It is hereby declared to be contrary to the public policy of the state and an unlawful practice for any person, for profit, to induce or attempt to induce any person to sell or rent any dwelling by representations regarding the entry or prospective entry into the neighborhood of a person or persons of a particular race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, national origin, or ancestry.
- (e) The general assembly recognizes that on February 16, 1972, there are institutions of learning in Indiana presently and traditionally following the practice of limiting admission of students to males or to females. It is further recognized that it would be unreasonable to impose upon these institutions the expense

of remodeling facilities to accommodate students of both sexes, and that educational facilities of similar quality and type are available in coeducational institutions for those students desiring such facilities. It is further recognized that this chapter is susceptible of interpretation to prevent these institutions from continuing their traditional policies, a result not intended by the general assembly. Therefore, the amendment effected by Acts 1972, P.L.176, is desirable to permit the continuation of the policies described.

(f) This chapter shall be construed broadly to effectuate its purpose.

IC 22-9-1-3 Definitions

Sec. 3. As used in this chapter:

- (a) "Person" means one (1) or more individuals, partnerships, associations, organizations, limited liability companies, corporations, labor organizations, cooperatives, legal representatives, trustees in bankruptcy, receivers, and other organized groups of persons.
 - (b) "Commission" means the civil rights commission created under section 4 of this chapter.
 - (c) "Director" means the director of the civil rights commission.
 - (d) "Deputy director" means the deputy director of the civil rights commission.
- (e) "Commission attorney" means the deputy attorney general, such assistants of the attorney general as may be assigned to the commission, or such other attorney as may be engaged by the commission.
 - (f) "Consent agreement" means a formal agreement entered into in lieu of adjudication.
 (g) "Gender identity" means gender-related identity, appearance, expression, or behavior, whether or not such gender-related identity, appearance, expression, or behavior is different from that traditionally associated with the person's assigned sex at birth. Gender identity can be shown by providing evidence, including, but not limited to: (1) medical history, care, or treatment of the gender identity; (2) consistent and uniform assertion of the gender identity; or (3) other evidence that the gender identity is a sincerely held part of the person's core identity and is not asserted for an improper purpose.
 - (h) "Sexual orientation" means actual or perceived homosexuality, heterosexuality, or bisexuality.
- (g) (i) "Affirmative action" means those acts that the commission determines necessary to assure compliance with the Indiana civil rights law.
- (h) (j) "Employer" means the state or any political or civil subdivision thereof and any person employing six (6) or more persons within the state, except that the term "employer" does not include: (1) any nonprofit corporation or association organized exclusively for fraternal or religious purposes; (2) any school, educational, or charitable religious institution owned or conducted by or affiliated with a church or religious institution; or (3) any exclusively social club, corporation, or association that is not organized for profit.
- $\frac{\text{(i)}}{\text{(k)}}$ "Employee" means any person employed by another for wages or salary. However, the term does not include any individual employed: (1) by the individual's parents, spouse, or child; or (2) in the domestic service of any person.
- (j) (l) "Labor organization" means any organization that exists for the purpose in whole or in part of collective bargaining or of dealing with employers concerning grievances, terms, or conditions of employment or for other mutual aid or protection in relation to employment.
- (k) (m) "Employment agency" means any person undertaking with or without compensation to procure, recruit, refer, or place employees.
 - (1) (n) "Discriminatory practice" means:
 - (1) the exclusion of a person from equal opportunities because of race, religion, color, sex, <u>sexual orientation</u>, <u>gender identity</u>, <u>disability</u>, national origin, or ancestry;
 - (2) a system that excludes persons from equal opportunities because of race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, national origin, or ancestry;
 - (3) the promotion of racial segregation or separation in any manner, including but not limited to the inducing of or the attempting to induce for profit any person to sell or rent any dwelling by representations regarding the entry or prospective entry in the neighborhood of a

person or persons of a particular race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, national origin, or ancestry; or

- (4) a violation of IC 22-9-5 that occurs after July 25, 1992, and is committed by a covered entity (as defined in IC 22-9-5-4). Every discriminatory practice relating to the acquisition or sale of real estate, education, public accommodations, employment, or the extending of credit (as defined in IC 24-4.5-1-301.5) shall be considered unlawful unless it is specifically exempted by this chapter.
- (m) (o) "Public accommodation" means any establishment that caters or offers its services or facilities or goods to the general public.
 - (n) (p) "Complainant" means:
 - (1) any individual charging on the individual's own behalf to have been personally aggrieved by a discriminatory practice; or
 - (2) the director or deputy director of the commission charging that a discriminatory practice was committed against a person other than himself or a class of people, in order to vindicate the public policy of the state (as defined in section 2 of this chapter).

 (o) (q) "Complaint" means any written grievance that is:
 - (1) sufficiently complete and filed by a complainant with the commission; or
 - (2) filed by a complainant as a civil action in the circuit or superior court having jurisdiction in the county in which the alleged discriminatory practice occurred. The original of any complaint filed under subdivision (1) shall be signed and verified by the complainant. (p) (r) "Sufficiently complete" refers to a complaint that includes:
 - (1) the full name and address of the complainant;
 - (2) the name and address of the respondent against whom the complaint is made;
 - (3) the alleged discriminatory practice and a statement of particulars thereof;
 - (4) the date or dates and places of the alleged discriminatory practice and if the alleged discriminatory practice is of a continuing nature the dates between which continuing acts of discrimination are alleged to have occurred; and
 - (5) a statement as to any other action, civil or criminal, instituted in any other form based upon the same grievance alleged in the complaint, together with a statement as to the status or disposition of the other action. No complaint shall be valid unless filed within one hundred eighty (180) days from the date of the occurrence of the alleged discriminatory practice.
- (q) (s) "Sex" as it applies to segregation or separation in this chapter applies to all types of employment, education, public accommodations, and housing. However:
 - (1) it shall not be a discriminatory practice to maintain separate restrooms;
 - (2) it shall not be an unlawful employment practice for an employer to hire and employ employees, for an employment agency to classify or refer for employment any individual, for a labor organization to classify its membership or to classify or refer for employment any individual, or for an employer, labor organization, or joint labor management committee controlling apprenticeship or other training or retraining programs to admit or employ any other individual in any program on the basis of sex in those certain instances where sex is a bona fide occupational qualification reasonably necessary to the normal operation of that particular business or enterprise;
 - (3) it shall not be a discriminatory practice for a private or religious educational institution to continue to maintain and enforce a policy of admitting students of one (1) sex only; and
 - (4) for purposes of this chapter, where distinctions based on sex are authorized, such distinctions must be applied consistent with an individual's gender identity.
- (r) (t) "Disabled" or "disability" means the physical or mental condition of a person that constitutes a substantial disability. In reference to employment, under this chapter, "disabled or disability" also means the physical or mental condition of a person that constitutes a substantial disability unrelated to the person's ability to engage in a particular occupation.

IC 22-9-1-4

Civil rights commission; creation

- Sec. 4. (a) There is hereby created a civil rights commission composed of seven (7) members, not more than four (4) of whom shall be members of the same political party, to be appointed by the governor. In making such appointments, the governor shall take into consideration all interests in the community including but not limited to the interests of minority groups, employers, labor, and the public.
 - (b) Except as provided in IC 4-21.5-2, IC 4-21.5 applies to the commission.
- (c) Successors to all members of the commission shall be appointed for terms of four (4) years, excepting when appointed to fill a vacancy, in which case such appointment shall be for the unexpired term.
- (d) Members of the commission may be removed by the governor for cause but for no other reason.
- (e) The members of the commission shall be paid per diem and travel expenses and other necessary and reasonable expenses for attendance at meetings and hearings of the commission.

IC 22-9-1-5

Civil rights commission; appointment of members; meetings

Sec. 5. The members of the Commission shall be appointed within thirty (30) days after the effective date of IC 1971 22-9-1 and the first meeting thereof shall be called by the member first appointed within sixty (60) days after the effective date of IC 1971, 22-9-1.

At its first meeting and at each annual meeting held thereafter, the Commission shall organize by the election of a chairman and vice chairman from its membership, each of whom, except those first elected, shall serve for a term of one (1) year and until his successor is elected.

The Commission shall hold one (1) regular meeting each month, and such called meetings as its chairman may deem to be necessary. The April meeting shall be the annual meeting.

IC 22-9-1-6

Civil rights commission; powers and duties

- Sec. 6. (a) The commission shall establish and maintain a permanent office in the city of Indianapolis.
- (b) The commission may appoint such attorneys and other employees and agents as it considers necessary, fix their compensation within the limitation provided by law, and prescribe their duties. All these employees, with the exception of the executive director and attorneys, shall be appointed by the commission from eligible lists to be promulgated by the department of personnel as the result of a competitive examination held under IC 4-15-2 and rules of the department and on the basis of training, practical experience, education, and character. However, special consideration and due weight shall be given to the practical experience and training that a person may have for the particular position involved regardless of his academic training. Promotions, suspensions, and removal of persons appointed from such lists shall be in accordance with IC 4-15-2. The reasonable and necessary traveling expenses of each employee of the commission while actually engaged in the performance of duties in behalf of the commission shall be paid in accordance with the state travel policies and procedures established by the Indiana department of administration and approved by the budget agency.
- (c) Except as it concerns judicial review, the commission may adopt rules under IC 4-22-2 to implement this chapter.
- (d) The commission shall formulate policies to effectuate the purposes of this chapter and make recommendations to agencies and officers of the state or local subdivisions thereof to effectuate such policies. The several departments, commissions, divisions, authorities, boards, bureaus, agencies, and

officers of the state or any political subdivision or agency thereof shall furnish the commission, upon its request, all records, papers, and information in their possession relating to any matter before the commission.

- (e) The commission shall receive and investigate complaints alleging discriminatory practices. The commission shall not hold hearings in the absence of a complaint. All investigations of complaints shall be conducted by staff members of the civil rights commission or their agents.
- (f) The commission may create such advisory agencies and conciliation councils, local or statewide, as will aid in effectuating the purposes of this chapter. The commission may itself, or it may empower these agencies and councils to:
 - (1) study the problems of discrimination in the areas covered by section 2 of this chapter when based on race, religion, color, sex, <u>sexual orientation</u>, <u>gender identity</u>, handicap, national origin, or ancestry; and
 - (2) foster through community effort, or otherwise, good will among the groups and elements of the population of the state. These agencies and councils may make recommendation to the commission for the development of policies and procedures in general. Advisory agencies and conciliation councils created by the commission shall be composed of representative citizens serving without pay, but with reimbursement for reasonable and necessary actual expenses.
- (g) The commission may issue such publications and such results of investigations and research as in its judgment will tend to promote good will and minimize or eliminate discrimination because of race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, handicap, national origin, or ancestry.
- (h) The commission shall prevent any person from discharging, expelling, or otherwise discriminating against any other person because he filed a complaint, testified in any hearing before this commission, or in any way assisted the commission in any matter under its investigation.
- (i) The commission may hold hearings, subpoena witnesses, compel their attendance, administer oaths, take the testimony of any person under oath, and require the production for examination of any books and papers relating to any matter under investigation or in question before the commission. The commission may make rules as to the issuance of subpoenas by individual commissioners. Contumacy or refusal to obey a subpoena issued under this section shall constitute a contempt. All hearings shall be held within Indiana at a location determined by the commission. A citation of contempt may be issued upon application by the commission to the circuit or superior court in the county in which the hearing is held or in which the witness resides or transacts business.
- (j) The commission may appoint administrative law judges other than commissioners, when an appointment is deemed necessary by a majority of the commission. The administrative law judges shall be members in good standing before the bar of Indiana and shall be appointed by the chairman of the commission. An administrative law judge appointed under this subsection shall have the same powers and duties as a commissioner sitting as an administrative law judge. However, the administrative law judge may not issue subpoenas.
- (k) The commission shall state its findings of fact after a hearing and, if the commission finds a person has engaged in an unlawful discriminatory practice, shall cause to be served on this person an order requiring the person to cease and desist from the unlawful discriminatory practice and requiring the person to take further affirmative action as will effectuate the purposes of this chapter, including but not limited to the power:
 - (A) to restore complainant's losses incurred as a result of discriminatory treatment, as the commission may deem necessary to assure justice; however, this specific provision when applied to orders pertaining to employment shall include only wages, salary, or commissions;
 - (B) to require the posting of notice setting forth the public policy of Indiana concerning civil rights and respondent's compliance with the policy in places of public accommodations;
 - (C) to require proof of compliance to be filed by respondent at periodic intervals; and
 - (D) to require a person who has been found to be in violation of this chapter and who is licensed by a state agency authorized to grant a license to show cause to the licensing agency why his license should not be revoked or suspended.
- (1) Judicial review of a cease and desist order or other affirmative action as referred to in this chapter may be obtained under IC 22-9-8. If no proceeding to obtain judicial review is instituted within thirty (30) days from receipt of notice by a person that an order has been made by the commission, the commission, if it determines that the person upon whom the cease and desist order has been served is not complying or is making no effort to comply, may obtain a decree of a court for the enforcement of the order

in circuit or superior court upon showing that the person is subject to the commission's jurisdiction and resides or transacts business within the county in which the petition for enforcement is brought.

- (m) If, upon all the evidence, the commission shall find that a person has not engaged in any unlawful practice or violation of this chapter, the commission shall state its findings of facts and shall issue and cause to be served on the complainant an order dismissing the complaint as to the person.
- (n) The commission may furnish technical assistance requested by persons subject to this chapter to further compliance with this chapter or with an order issued thereunder.
- (o) The commission shall promote the creation of local civil rights agencies to cooperate with individuals, neighborhood associations, and state, local, and other agencies, both public and private, including agencies of the federal government and of other states.
- (p) The commission may reduce the terms of conciliation agreed to by the parties to writing (to be called a consent agreement) that the parties and a majority of the commissioners shall sign. When signed, the consent agreement shall have the same effect as a cease and desist order issued under subsection (k). If the commission determines that a party to the consent agreement is not complying with it, the commission may obtain enforcement of the consent agreement in a circuit or superior court upon showing that the party is not complying with the consent agreement and the party is subject to the commission's jurisdiction and resides or transacts business within the county in which the petition for enforcement is brought.
- (q) In lieu of investigating a complaint and holding a hearing under this section, the commission may issue an order based on findings and determinations by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development or the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission concerning a complaint that has been filed with one (1) of these federal agencies and with the commission. The commission shall adopt by rule standards under which the commission may issue such an order.
- (r) Upon notice that a complaint is the subject of an action in a federal court, the commission shall immediately cease investigation of the complaint and may not conduct hearings or issue findings of fact or orders concerning that complaint.

IC 22-9-1-7 Educational programs

Sec. 7. In order to eliminate prejudice among the various racial, religious, and ethnic groups in this state and to further goodwill among such groups, the commission, in cooperation with the state department of education and the universities and colleges of the state, and such other universities and colleges as are willing to cooperate, is directed to prepare a comprehensive educational program, designed to emphasize the origin of prejudice against such minority groups, its harmful effects, its incompatibility with American principles of equality and fair play, and violation of the brotherhood of man.

IC 22-9-1-8 Civil rights commission; director

Sec. 8. The governor shall select and appoint a director who shall be secretary of the commission and chief administrative officer for the commission. The director shall devote his entire time and effort to the administration of the provisions of this chapter and shall not engage in or have any interest in any business or activity which may create a conflict of interest. The salary of the director shall be fixed by the governor with the approval of the budget agency.

Public contractors; public utility franchises

Sec. 10. Every contract to which the state or any of its political or civil subdivisions is a party, including franchises granted to public utilities, shall contain a provision requiring the contractor and his subcontractors not to discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment to be employed in the performance of such contract, with respect to his hire, tenure, terms, conditions or privileges of employment or any matter directly or indirectly related to employment, because of his race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, national origin, or ancestry. Breach of this covenant may be regarded as a material breach of the contract.

Investigation of complaints; recommendations to legislature

Sec. 11. In addition to its power to investigate the discriminatory practices referred to in this chapter, the commission may receive written complaints of violation of this chapter or other discriminatory practices based upon race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, national origin, or ancestry and to investigate such complaints as it deems meritorious, or to conduct such investigation in the absence of complaints whenever it deems it in the public interest. It may transmit to the general assembly its recommendations for legislation designed to aid in the removing of such discrimination.

IC 22-9-1-12.1

"State agency" defined; local government; ordinances; exclusive jurisdiction; transfer of complaints; appeals

- Sec. 12.1. (a) As used in this section, the term "state agency" means:
- (1) every office, officer, board, commission, department, division, bureau, committee, fund, agency; and
 - (2) without limitation by reason of any enumeration in this section:
 - (A) every other instrumentality of the state, every hospital, every penal institution, and every other institutional enterprise and activity of the state, wherever located;
 - (B) the state educational institutions; and
 - (C) the judicial department of the state. "State agency" does not mean counties, county offices of family and children, cities, towns, townships, school corporations (as defined in IC 20-18-2-16), or other municipal corporations, political subdivisions, or units of local government.
- (b) Any city, town, or county is hereby authorized to adopt an ordinance or ordinances, which may include establishment or designation of an appropriate local commission, office, or agency to effectuate within its territorial jurisdiction the public policy of the state as declared in section 2 of this chapter without conflict with any of the provisions of this chapter. Any city or town may adopt such an ordinance or ordinances jointly with any other city or town located in the same county or jointly with that county. A city

ordinance that establishes a local commission may provide that the members of the commission are to be appointed solely by the city executive or solely by the city legislative body or may provide for a combination of appointments by the city executive and the city legislative body. The board of commissioners of each county is also authorized to adopt ordinances in accordance with this section. An agency established or designated under this section has no jurisdiction over the state or any of its agencies.

- (c) An ordinance adopted under this section may grant to the local agency the power to:
 - (1) investigate, conciliate, and hear complaints;
- (2) subpoena and compel the attendance of witnesses or production of pertinent documents and records;
 - (3) administer oaths;
 - (4) examine witnesses;
 - (5) appoint hearing examiners or panels;
 - (6) make findings and recommendations;
 - (7) issue cease and desist orders or orders requiring remedial action;
- (8) order payment of actual damages, except that damages to be paid as a result of discriminatory practices relating to employment shall be limited to lost wages, salaries, commissions, or fringe benefits;
 - (9) institute actions for appropriate legal or equitable relief in a circuit or superior court;
 - (10) employ an executive director and other staff personnel;
 - (11) adopt rules and regulations;
- (12) initiate complaints, except that no person who initiates a complaint may participate as a member of the agency in the hearing or disposition of the complaint; and
- (13) conduct programs and activities to carry out the public policy of the state, as provided in section 2 of this chapter, within the territorial boundaries of a local agency.
- (d) Any person who files a complaint with any local agency may not also file a complaint with the civil rights commission concerning any of the matters alleged in such complaint, and any person who files a complaint with the civil rights commission may not also file a complaint with any local agency concerning any of the matters alleged in such complaint. Any complaint filed with the commission may be transferred by the commission to any local agency having jurisdiction. The local agency shall proceed to act on the complaint as if it had been originally filed with the local agency may be transferred by the local agency to the commission. Any complaint filed with a local agency may be transferred by the local agency to the commission if the commission has jurisdiction. The commission shall proceed to act on the complaint as if it had been originally filed with the commission as of the date that the complaint was filed with the local agency. Nothing in this subsection shall affect such person's right to pursue any and all other rights and remedies available in any other state or federal forum.
- (e) A decision of the local agency may be appealed under the terms of IC 4-21.5 the same as if it was a decision of a state agency.

Employment of persons with physical disability; discrimination; promotion or transfer; physical accommodations

- Sec. 13. (a) The prohibition against discrimination in employment because of disability does not apply to failure of an employer to employ or to retain as an employee any person who because of a disability is physically or otherwise unable to efficiently and safely perform, at the standards set by the employer, the duties required in that job.
- (b) After a person with a disability is employed, the employer shall not be required under this chapter to promote or transfer such person with a disability to another job or occupation, unless, prior to such transfer, such person with a disability by training or experience is qualified for such job or occupation. (c) This section shall not be construed to require any employer to modify any physical accommodations or administrative procedures to accommodate a person with a disability.

Election of civil action

However, both the respondent and the complainant must agree in writing to have the claims decided in a court of law. The agreement must be on a form provided by the commission.
- (b) The election may not be made if the commission has begun a hearing on the record under this chapter with regard to a finding of probable cause.

From the Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine comes a study that gives excellent direction to employers (and insurers) regarding the management of low back problems (LBP). The authors analyzed databases belonging to a large, self-insured company over the course of nine years to evaluate the direct and indirect costs of LBP for the company's employees (EEs). In so doing, they discovered that chiropractic care cost significantly less than physical therapy, complex medical management, information/advice (which included lab testing and imaging), and multiple-provider care.

2013 Early predictors of lumbar spine surgery after occupational back injury: results from a prospective study of workers in Washington State. Spine(Phila Pa 1976). 2013 May 15;38(11):953-64. Keeney BJ, Fulton-Kehoe D, Turner JA, Wickizer TM, Chan KC, Franklin GM.

This important study was conducted by a collaboration of prestigious institutions, including Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth College, University of Washington School of Public Health, University of Washington School of Medicine, Ohio State University College of Public Health and the Washington State Dept. of Labor and Industries. In total, 42.7 percent of workers who initially visited a surgeon underwent surgery, in contrast to only 1.5 percent of those who first consulted a chiropractor. These results further documents chiropractic care as a first option for back pain relief and surgical avoidance.

2013 Outcomes of osteopathic manual treatment for chronic low back pain according to baseline pain severity: Results from the OSTEOPATHIC Trial. Manual Therapy, 06/14/2013 Clinical Article; Licciardone JC et al.

This study was carried out by the osteopathic profession and was designed to evaluate the response of patients with chronic low back pain to spinal manual (manipulative) treatment (OMT). Substantial pain reduction in patients with chronic LBP of high severity was associated with clinically important improvement in back-specific functioning, by treating with spinal manipulation. It was determined that spinal manipulation therapy may be an attractive option in such patients before proceeding to more invasive and costly treatments.

2013 Non-drug Treatment for Chronic Tension Headache in Teens; American Academy of Pain Management (AAPM) 24th Annual Clinical Meeting. Abstract #25.

Presented September 27, 2013; P Przekop, DO, PhD, Betty Ford Center, Rancho Mirage, and Loma Linda University School of Medicine, Loma Linda,
California.

Chronic tension-type headache (CTTH), which may affect up to 20% of teens, can be successfully treated without pharmacologic agents, a new study shows. The American Academy of Pain Management determined that the improvement was much more dramatic in the group that underwent manipulation as compared to the group that underwent pharmacologic intervention.

2013 Adding chiropractic manipulative therapy to standard medical care for patients with acute low back pain: results of a pragmatic randomized comparative effectiveness study. Goertz CM, et al; Spine 2013 Apr 15;38(8):627-34

In a study printed in journal Spine, 2013, standard medical care was combined with chiropractic manipulative therapy and was found to have a significant advantage for decreasing pain and improving physical functioning when compared with only standard care, for men and women between 18 and 35 years of age with acute LBP.

2012 Early Predictors of Lumbar Spine Surgery after Occupational Back Injury: Results from a Prospective Study of Workers in Washington State. Keeney BJ, Fulton-Kehoe D, Turner JA, Wickizer TM, Chan KC, Franklin GM. Spine, 2012.

In a 2012 study to identify early predictors of lumbar spine surgery after occupational back injury, reduced odds of surgery were observed for those under age 35, women, Hispanics and those whose first provider was a Doctor of Chiropractic. 42.7 percent of patients who first saw a surgeon had surgery, in contrast to only 1.5 percent of those who first saw a Doctor of Chiropractic, a result not due to any difference in severity of cases seen by DCs and surgeons. The researchers found spinal manipulation therapy provided by DCs more effective than medication in both the short and long term

2012 University of Pittsburgh Mandates Conservative Care

University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC). http://www.upmchealthplan.com/pdf/PandP/MP.059.pdf

On January 1, 2012, the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC) mandated chiropractic care as a first-line conservative treatment for a 3-month period, prior to any advanced imaging and/or surgical consultation, for non-specific spine pain.

2012 Predictors of Improvement in Patients With Acute and Chronic Low Back Pain Undergoing Chiropractic Treatment; Journal of Manipulative and Physiological Therapeutics, Volume 35, Issue 7, p 525-533, Sept 2012; CK Peterson, DC, MMedEd, J Bolton, PhD, MAEdB. K Humphreys, DC, PhD.

In a 2012 study published in the Journal of Manipulative Therapeutics, patients with chronic and acute pain reported that they were "much better" or "better" on the Patient Global Impression of Change scale at 1 week after the first chiropractic visit, and were 4 to 5 times more likely to be improved at both 1 and 3 months compared with patients who were not improved at 1 week. Patients with acute pain reported more severe pain and disability initially but recovered faster. Patients with chronic and acute back pain both reported good outcomes, and most patients with radiculopathy also improved.

2012 Spinal Manipulation Epidemiology: Systematic Review of Cost Effectiveness – Studies; Electromyogr Kinesiol. 2012 (Oct); 22 (5): 655–662; Michaleff ZA, Lin CW, Maher CG, van Tulder MW. The George Institute for Global Health, The University of Sydney, Sydney, NSW, Australia.

The University of Sydney, Australia, conducted a study in 2012 to investigate the cost-effectiveness of spinal Manipulative therapy (SMT) compared to other treatment options for people with spinal pain of any duration. Their determinations were that SMT was found to be a cost-effective treatment to manage neck and back pain when used alone or in combination with other techniques compared to General Practitioner (GP) care, exercise and physiotherapy.

2012 Value of Chiropractic Services at an On-site Health Center; J Occupational and Environmental Med 2012 (Aug);54 (8):917–921; Curt A. Krause, DC; Lisa Kaspin, PhD; Kathleen M. Gorman, MPH; Ross M. Miller, MD, MPH

A 2012 study, undertaken by the Cerner Healthe Clinic, Kansas City, MO; Cerner LifeSciences Consulting, Beverly Hills, CA; and Cerner Employer Services, Cerner Corporation, Beverly Hills, CA, published in the Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine, studied on-site chiropractic care, versus off-site physical therapy, and concluded that chiropractic services offered at on-site health centers may promote lower utilization of certain health care services, while improving musculoskeletal function. Additionally, patients who receive chiropractic treatment often have a more conservative, less invasive treatment profile which can significantly reduce the overall cost of treatment.

2012 Spinal Manipulation, Medication, or Home Exercise With Advice for Acute and Subacute Neck Pain. Annals of Internal Medicine, 2012. Bronfort G, Evans R, Anderson A, et.al.

A 2012 study published in the Annals of Internal Medicine concluded that patients with acute and sub-acute neck pain found spinal manipulation therapy provided by doctors of chiropractic more effective than medication in both the short and long term.

2012 The Association of Complementary and Alternative Medicine Use and Health Care Expenditures for Back and Neck Problems, Medical Care, 2012; Martin IM, Gerkovich M, Goertz C, et. al.

In 2012, an article published in Medical Care showed that costs are less for patients with neck pain and back pain who see a Doctor of Chiropractic, based on a risk-adjusted analysis of a large nationally representative dataset.

2011 A Hospital-Based Standardized Spine Care Pathway: Report of a Multidisciplinary, Evidence-Based Process; J Manipulative Physiol Ther 2011 (Feb); 34 (2): 98–106In 2011,

A health care facility (Jordan Hospital) reported on the implementation of a multidimensional spine care pathway, utilizing a multidisciplinary, evidence-based, standardized process, to improve clinical outcomes, and to reduce the costs associated with treatment and diagnostic testing. The conclusion was that "interprofessional collaboration between doctors of chiropractic, physical therapists, and medical doctors within teams improved spine care; that promotion of care coordination reduced unnecessary testing and procedures; and the standardization of LBP management reduced practice variations and significantly reduced the costs of care.

2011 Cost-effectiveness of Guideline-endorsed Treatments for Low Back Pain: A Systematic Review; Eur Spine J. 2011 (Jan 13) [Epub ahead of print]

This 2011 systematic review of the cost-effectiveness of treatments endorsed in the APS-ACP guidelines found that spinal manipulation was cost-effective for sub-acute and chronic low back pain, as were other methods usually within the chiropractor's scope of practice (interdisciplinary rehabilitation, exercise, and acupuncture)

2011 Health Maintenance Care in Work-Related Low Back Pain and its association with Disability Recurrence; Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine 2011 (Apr); 53 (4):396–404; http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pubmed/21407100

This study found that a patient was twice as likely to end up disabled if the patient received care from a Physical Therapist, rather than from a Doctor of Chiropractic, and that patients were 60% more likely to be disabled if they choose an MD to manage their care, rather than a Doctor of Chiropractic

2011 Health Maintenance Care in Work-Related Low Back Pain and Its Association With Disability Recurrence; Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine 2011 (Apr); 53 (4):396–404; Willetts J, Wasiak R.; From the Center for Disability Research at the Liberty Mutual Research Institute for Safety (Dr Cifuentes and Ms Willetts) and University of Massachusetts Lowell (Dr Cifuentes), Hopkinton, Mass; and Center for Health Economics & Science Policy at United BioSource Corporation, London, United Kingdom (Dr Wasiak).

This study is unique in that it was conducted by the Center for Disability Research at the Liberty Mutual Research Institute for Safety and the University of Massachusetts Lowell, Hopkinton, Mass; and the Center for Health Economics & Science Policy at United BioSource Corporation, London, United Kingdom. The authors concluded: Statistically, a patient is twice as likely to end up disabled if the patient received care from a Physical Therapists (PT), rather than from a chiropractor. The patient was also 60% more likely to be disabled if the patient chose a Physician (MD) to manage their care, rather than a chiropractor.

A 2010 study at the University of British Columbia found that guidelines-based care which included spinal manipulation provided by a DC was significantly more effective than "usual care" provided by medical physicians for patients with lower back pain of less than 16 weeks duration.

Dear Dr. Wernert:

Thank you for meeting with the Indiana State Chiropractic Association. Congratulations on your success in obtaining the HIP 2.0 expansion waiver from CMS to provide health care insurance to more Hoosiers.

We appreciated the opportunity to provide you information regarding the exclusion of chiropractic spinal manipulation from HIP Basic and Hip Plus. The ISCA believes the chiropractic profession has been clearly discriminated against through the exclusion of its mainstay treatment, spinal manipulation. This action will result in significant cost increases to the State through cost-shifting from the most cost-effective and cost-efficient healthcare for spine-related injuries to far more costly traditional medical care. Since we know that up to 40% of Hoosiers on Medicaid seek care for spine pain, this is an especially important oversight. Also, exclusion of the full chiropractic benefit is contrary to both the spirit and intent of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act's Section 2706, which explicitly prohibits discrimination against duly-licensed health providers.

In view of the scientific evidence supporting the cost-effectiveness, cost-efficiency and superior outcomes of spinal manipulative therapy over both that of traditional medical care and physical therapy, the ISCA is understandably disappointed to learn that the HIP 2.0 expansion waiver will continue to exclude chiropractic spinal manipulation. We have attached a summary of the latest studies that demonstrate the money saved, the positive outcomes, and the consumer satisfaction when the chiropractic spinal manipulation is included in the healthcare benefit.

Additionally, HIP 2.0, as it stands, presents confusion to both doctors of chiropractic and their patients regarding the number of different chiropractic benefits outlined in the various HIP plans. The ISCA requests that the State rectify this problem by adding spinal manipulation/adjustments to the HIP Basic and HIP Plus plans just as it is in HIP State Plan and HIP State Plan Plus. Thank you for your consideration and we look forward to hearing from you.

VA is very committed to working with State Approving Agencies, Non-Governmental Organizations, Intergovernmental Affairs partners, Veterans Service Organizations, and other stakeholders to inform them of the requirements.



States Status of Compliance

On October 29, 2014, VA sent a letter to Governors and requested definitive information on the states' ability to meet the requirements of Section 702 of the Public Law. *VA requested a response by November 28, 2014*

- No state has indicated that they do not intend to comply.
- 2 States (TX and GA) are confirmed compliant.
- VA has provided Technical Assistance to 30 states (AK, AR, AZ, CA, CO, DC, KS, KY, MD, ME, MI, MN, MO, MS, ND, NE, NJ, NV, NM, OK, PA, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WI, WV, WY)
- 14 of the Tech Assists VA determined, if adopted, would bring the state into compliance (AZ, MN, MS, ND, NE, NJ, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WV, WY)
- 17 states have introduced the bill or amendment to the state legislature (AK, AZ, KS, MD, ND, NE, NJ, OH, PA, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WI, WV, WY)



General Overview of Section 702

- Requires VA disapprove programs of education if while living in the state
 of the institution, a covered individual is charged tuition and fees in
 excess of the rate for resident students.
- Covered individuals
 - Receiving Montgomery and Post-9/11 GI Bill educational assistance; and
 - Enrolls within 3 years of discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Anyone using transferred entitlement within 3 years of the transferor's discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Surviving Spouses or Children under the Fry Scholarship who enroll within 3 years of an active duty Servicemember's death in the line of duty after serving 90 days or more; or
 - Individuals who remain continuously enrolled after initially meeting the requirements and are using CH 30 or 33.



Methodology to Comply

State Level

Change in State Legislation, regulation, or policy

Example: Texas Education Code Section 54.241(k)

- (k) A person is entitled to pay tuition and fees at an institution of higher education at the rates provided for Texas residents without regard to the length of time the person has resided in this state if the person files with the institution at which the person intends to register a letter of intent to establish residence in this state and resides in this state while enrolled in the institution and the person:
- (1) is eligible for benefits under the federal Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2008 (38 U.S.C. Section 3301 et seq.) or any other federal law authorizing educational benefits for veterans

Methodology to Comply

- Below State Level
 - Board of Regent, University/College System
 - Institution of Higher Learning (IHL)
 - Policy Amendment

Example: Georgia policy and procedural manual changes at the University System of Georgia and the Technical College System of Georgia (see excerpt on next slide)

Note: VA cannot compel a school to charge covered individuals the in-State rates; however, VA will disapprove the impacted programs if a school charges tuition and fees in excess of the rate for resident students.



Georgia's Compliance through Policy Change

GA Board Policy:

Per subsequent VA guidance, and to ensure all "covered individuals" are clearly defined, the Procedures Manual further clarifies Board Policy 7.3.4.1 (above). Specifically, the Procedures Manual reads:

"Section 702 of the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014 requires institutions to provide in-state tuition to "covered individuals" in order for that institution to maintain eligibility to participate in either the Post-9/11 GI Bill and the Montgomery GI Bill – Active Duty programs. Institutions shall, in order to comply with this law, offer military waivers to spouses and dependent children as defined in Military waiver #3 in Board Policy 7.3.4.1. Additionally, for the purposes of this specific policy provision, "spouses and dependent children" shall be defined also to include those "covered individuals" outlined as eligible for in-state tuition under the provisions of Section 702 of the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014. Covered individuals include those using transferred benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs GI Bill programs within three years of the transferor's discharge from a period of active duty service of 90 days or more."

Note: As stated in the Policy Manual, this policy remains in effect as long as continuous enrollment is maintained by the "covered" individual.



Common Pitfalls to Avoid when drafting legislation, rules, and/or policies

- You can always be more liberal than what the statute requires.
- Exercise caution:
 - If using the terms "Veteran" or "Armed Forces."
 "Veteran" for the purposes of title 38, United States Code, must include veterans who performed certain full-time service in, or were called up from, the reserve components or the National Guard, and veterans of the commissioned corps of the Public Health Service (PHS) or National
 - When limiting applicability based on the character of discharge (e.g., honorable discharge)
 - When using terms such as "spouse," "child," "dependent"

Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

 Remember to account for individuals "continuously enrolled" beyond 3 years of discharge (so long as they are still using CH 30 or 33)

VA is very committed to working with State Approving Agencies, Non-Governmental Organizations, Intergovernmental Affairs partners, Veterans Service Organizations, and other stakeholders to inform them of the requirements.



States Status of Compliance

On October 29, 2014, VA sent a letter to Governors and requested definitive information on the states' ability to meet the requirements of Section 702 of the Public Law. *VA requested a response by November 28, 2014*

- 31 States and the District of Columbia have formally replied to date and indicated an intent to comply by July 1, 2015 (AL, AK, AZ, AR, DC, DE, HI, IA, ID, IL, KY, MA, MN, MS, MT, NC, ND, NE, NH, NV, NY, OH, OK, OR, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WI, WV) *Updated status needed
- 14 States and 5 Territories have contacted VA (either asking questions or requesting more time), but have not issued a formal response to all 3 questions in the letter (AS, CA, CO, CT, FL, GU, IN, KS, LA, ME, MP, NJ, NM, PA, PR, RI, VI, VT, WY) *Imperative that states listed in this category contact VA
- 3 States (MD, MI, and MO) responded stating that the decision and changes will be made below the state level
- 2 States (TX and GA) are confirmed compliant.



States Status of Compliance

- VA has provided Technical Assistance to <u>24</u> states (AK, AR, AZ, CA, CO, DC, KS, KY, ME, MN, MS, ND, NE, NJ, NV, NM, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WV, WY)
- ▶ <u>14</u> of the Tech Assists VA determined, if adopted, would bring the state into compliance (AK, AZ, KY, MS, NE, ND, NJ, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WV)
- ▶ 10 states have introduced the bill or amendment to the state legislature
 (AZ, ND, NE, NJ, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WV)
- VA has provided Technical Assistance to <u>3</u> States planning to comply below state level (MD, MI, and MO)





General Overview of Section 702

- Requires VA disapprove programs of education if while living in the state
 of the institution, a covered individual is charged tuition and fees in
 excess of the rate for resident students.
- Covered individuals
 - Receiving Montgomery and Post-9/11 GI Bill educational assistance; and
 - Enrolls within 3 years of discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Anyone using transferred entitlement within 3 years of the transferor's discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Surviving Spouses or Children under the Fry Scholarship who enroll within 3 years of an active duty Servicemember's death in the line of duty after serving 90 days or more; or
 - Individuals who remain continuously enrolled after initially meeting the requirements and are using CH 30 or 33.



Methodology to Comply

State Level

Change in State Legislation, regulation, or policy

Example: Texas Education Code Section 54.241(k)

- (k) A person is entitled to pay tuition and fees at an institution of higher education at the rates provided for Texas residents without regard to the length of time the person has resided in this state if the person files with the institution at which the person intends to register a letter of intent to establish residence in this state and resides in this state while enrolled in the institution and the person:
- (1) is eligible for benefits under the federal Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2008 (38 U.S.C. Section 3301 et seq.) or any other federal law authorizing educational benefits for veterans

Methodology to Comply

- Below State Level
 - Board of Regent, University/College System
 - Institution of Higher Learning (IHL)
 - Policy Amendment

Example: Georgia policy and procedural manual changes at the University System of Georgia and the Technical College System of Georgia (see excerpt on next slide)

Note: VA cannot compel a school to charge covered individuals the in-State rates; however, VA will disapprove the impacted programs if a school charges tuition and fees in excess of the rate for resident students.



Georgia's Compliance through Policy Change

GA Board Policy:

Per subsequent VA guidance, and to ensure all "covered individuals" are clearly defined, the Procedures Manual further clarifies Board Policy 7.3.4.1 (above). Specifically, the Procedures Manual reads:

"Section 702 of the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014 requires institutions to provide in-state tuition to "covered individuals" in order for that institution to maintain eligibility to participate in either the Post-9/11 GI Bill and the Montgomery GI Bill – Active Duty programs. Institutions shall, in order to comply with this law, offer military waivers to spouses and dependent children as defined in Military waiver #3 in Board Policy 7.3.4.1. Additionally, for the purposes of this specific policy provision, "spouses and dependent children" shall be defined also to include those "covered individuals" outlined as eligible for in-state tuition under the provisions of Section 702 of the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014. Covered individuals include those using transferred benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs GI Bill programs within three years of the transferor's discharge from a period of active duty service of 90 days or more."

Note: As stated in the Policy Manual, this policy remains in effect as long as continuous enrollment is maintained by the "covered" individual.



Common Pitfalls to Avoid when drafting legislation, rules, and/or policies

- You can always be more liberal than what the statute requires.
- Exercise caution:
 - If using the terms "Veteran" or "Armed Forces."
 "Veteran" for the purposes of title 38, United States Code, must include veterans who performed certain full-time service in, or were called up from, the reserve components or the National Guard, and veterans of the
 - commissioned corps of the Public Health Service (PHS) or National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).
 - When limiting applicability based on the character of discharge (e.g., honorable discharge)
 - When using terms such as "spouse," "child," "dependent"
- Remember to account for individuals "continuously enrolled" beyond 3 years of discharge (so long as they are still using CH 30 or 33)

VA is very committed to working with State Approving Agencies, Non-Governmental Organizations, Intergovernmental Affairs partners, Veterans Service Organizations, and other stakeholders to inform them of the requirements.



States Status of Compliance

On October 29, 2014, VA sent a letter to Governors and requested definitive information on the states' ability to meet the requirements of Section 702 of the Public Law. *VA requested a response by November 28, 2014*

- 31 States and the District of Columbia have formally replied to date and indicated an intent to comply by July 1, 2015 (AL, AK, AZ, AR, DC, DE, HI, IA, ID, IL, KY, MA, MN, MS, MT, NC, ND, NE, NH, NV, NY, OH, OK, OR, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WI, WV) *Updated status needed
- 14 States and 5 Territories have contacted VA (either asking questions or requesting more time), but have not issued a formal response to all 3 questions in the letter (AS, CA, CO, CT, FL, GU, IN, KS, LA, ME, MP, NJ, NM, PA, PR, RI, VI, VT, WY) *Imperative that states listed in this category contact VA
- 3 States (MD, MI, and MO) responded stating that the decision and changes will be made below the state level
- 2 States (TX and GA) are confirmed compliant.



States Status of Compliance

- VA has provided Technical Assistance to <u>24</u> states (AK, AR, AZ, CA, CO, DC, KS, KY, ME, MN, MS, ND, NE, NJ, NV, NM, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WV, WY)
- ▶ <u>14</u> of the Tech Assists VA determined, if adopted, would bring the state into compliance (AK, AZ, KY, MS, NE, ND, NJ, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WV)
- ▶ 10 states have introduced the bill or amendment to the state legislature
 (AZ, ND, NE, NJ, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WV)
- VA has provided Technical Assistance to <u>3</u> States planning to comply below state level (MD, MI, and MO)





General Overview of Section 702

- Requires VA disapprove programs of education if while living in the state
 of the institution, a covered individual is charged tuition and fees in
 excess of the rate for resident students.
- Covered individuals
 - Receiving Montgomery and Post-9/11 GI Bill educational assistance; and
 - Enrolls within 3 years of discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Anyone using transferred entitlement within 3 years of the transferor's discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Surviving Spouses or Children under the Fry Scholarship who enroll within 3 years of an active duty Servicemember's death in the line of duty after serving 90 days or more; or
 - Individuals who remain continuously enrolled after initially meeting the requirements and are using CH 30 or 33.



Methodology to Comply

State Level

Change in State Legislation, regulation, or policy

Example: Texas Education Code Section 54.241(k)

- (k) A person is entitled to pay tuition and fees at an institution of higher education at the rates provided for Texas residents without regard to the length of time the person has resided in this state if the person files with the institution at which the person intends to register a letter of intent to establish residence in this state and resides in this state while enrolled in the institution and the person:
- (1) is eligible for benefits under the federal Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2008 (38 U.S.C. Section 3301 et seq.) or any other federal law authorizing educational benefits for veterans

Methodology to Comply

- Below State Level
 - Board of Regent, University/College System
 - Institution of Higher Learning (IHL)
 - Policy Amendment

Example: Georgia policy and procedural manual changes at the University System of Georgia and the Technical College System of Georgia (see excerpt on next slide)

Note: VA cannot compel a school to charge covered individuals the in-State rates; however, VA will disapprove the impacted programs if a school charges tuition and fees in excess of the rate for resident students.



Georgia's Compliance through Policy Change

GA Board Policy:

Per subsequent VA guidance, and to ensure all "covered individuals" are clearly defined, the Procedures Manual further clarifies Board Policy 7.3.4.1 (above). Specifically, the Procedures Manual reads:

"Section 702 of the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014 requires institutions to provide in-state tuition to "covered individuals" in order for that institution to maintain eligibility to participate in either the Post-9/11 GI Bill and the Montgomery GI Bill – Active Duty programs. Institutions shall, in order to comply with this law, offer military waivers to spouses and dependent children as defined in Military waiver #3 in Board Policy 7.3.4.1. Additionally, for the purposes of this specific policy provision, "spouses and dependent children" shall be defined also to include those "covered individuals" outlined as eligible for in-state tuition under the provisions of Section 702 of the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014. Covered individuals include those using transferred benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs GI Bill programs within three years of the transferor's discharge from a period of active duty service of 90 days or more."

Note: As stated in the Policy Manual, this policy remains in effect as long as continuous enrollment is maintained by the "covered" individual.



Common Pitfalls to Avoid when drafting legislation, rules, and/or policies

- You can always be more liberal than what the statute requires.
- Exercise caution:
 - If using the terms "Veteran" or "Armed Forces."
 "Veteran" for the purposes of title 38, United States Code, must include veterans who performed certain full-time service in, or were called up from, the reserve components or the National Guard, and veterans of the
 - commissioned corps of the Public Health Service (PHS) or National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).
 - When limiting applicability based on the character of discharge (e.g., honorable discharge)
 - When using terms such as "spouse," "child," "dependent"
- Remember to account for individuals "continuously enrolled" beyond 3 years of discharge (so long as they are still using CH 30 or 33)

IC 20-32-5-4

Duties of board, state superintendent, and department

Sec. 4. (a) The state board shall:

(1) authorize the development and implementation of the ISTEP program;

and

(2) determine the date on which the statewide testing is administered in each school corporation

The following statute only seems to state that Supt. Ritz must develop a schedule. It does not say that the BOE has to accept the schedule she develops.

IC 20-32-5-15

Testing schedule

Sec. 15. (a) The state superintendent shall develop an ISTEP program testing schedule in which:

- (1) each student in grades 3, 6, 8, and 10 must be tested; and
- (2) each student in grade 10 or grade 11 must take a graduation examination.
- (b) The state board shall adopt rules to establish when a student is considered to be in grade 10 for purposes of initially taking the graduation examination.

As added by P.L.1-2005, SEC.16. Amended by P.L.229-2011, SEC.191.

I could not find any rules in 511 IAC that would prohibit this. Of course, the board could just deauthorize implementation for a year under that same statute, but that might be a little drastic. I'm not an attorney, so I can't speak with authority on this, but it does seem pretty well laid out in everyday language to a layman like myself.

Just a couple quick suggestions from a concerned father.

General Overview of Section 702

- Requires VA disapprove programs of education if while living in the state of the institution, a covered individual is charged tuition and fees in excess of the rate for resident students.
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 and
 - Enrolls within 3 years of discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
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 - Surviving Spouses or Children under the Fry Scholarship who enroll within 3 years of an active duty Servicemember's death in the line of duty after serving 90 days or more; or
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 - Board of Regent, University/College System
 - Policy Amendment
 - Institution of Higher Learning (IHL)
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Note: VA cannot compel a school to charge covered individuals the in-State rates; however, VA will disapprove the impacted programs if a school charges tuition and fees in excess of the rate for resident students.

PL 113-146 - Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014

On October 29, 2014, VA sent a letter to Governors and requested definitive information on the states' ability to meet the requirements of Section 702 of the Public Law. *VA requested a response by November 28, 2014*

- 2 Territories have not responded or contacted VA. (GU, VI)
- 34 States have indicated an intent to comply by July 1, 2015.
 (AL, AK, AZ, AR, CO, DE, DC, GA, HI, ID, IA, KY, MD, MA, MN, MS, MT, NV, NH, NJ, NY, NC, ND, OH, OK, OR, SC, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WV, WI)
- 14 States have contacted VA (either asking questions or requesting more time), but haven't issued a formal response to all 3 questions in the letter.
 (CA, CT, FL, IL, IN, KS, LA, ME, NM, PA, PR, RI, VT, WY)
- 3 States (MI, MO, NE) responded stating decision decided below the state level.
- 1 State reported compliant with section 702 and was confirmed by Education Service and OGC (TX).

VA is very committed to working with State Approving Agencies, Non-Governmental Organizations, Intergovernmental Affairs partners, Veterans Service Organizations, and other stakeholders to inform them of the requirements.



General Overview of Section 702

- Requires VA disapprove programs of education if while living in the state of the institution, a covered individual is charged tuition and fees in excess of the rate for resident students.
- Covered individuals
 - Receiving Montgomery and Post-9/11 GI Bill educational assistance; and
 - Enrolls within 3 years of discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Anyone using transferred entitlement within 3 years of the transferor's discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Surviving Spouses or Children under the Fry Scholarship who enroll within 3 years of an active duty Servicemember's death in the line of duty after serving 90 days or more; or
 - Individuals who remain continuously enrolled after initially meeting the requirements and are using Ch 30 or 33.
- VA cannot compel a school to charge covered individuals the in-State rates.
- VA will disapprove the impacted programs if school does not charge in-State rates.



Common Pitfalls to Avoid when drafting legislation, rules, and/or policies

- You can always be more liberal than what the statute requires.
- Exercise caution:
 - If using the terms "Veteran" or "Armed Forces." "Veteran" for the purposes of title 38, United States Code, must include veterans who performed certain full-time service in, or were called up from, the reserve components or the National Guard, and veterans of the commissioned corps of the Public Health Service (PHS) or National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).
 - When limiting applicability based on the character of discharge (e.g., honorable discharge)
 - When using terms such as "spouse," "child," "dependent"
- Remember to account for individuals "continuously enrolled" beyond 3
 years of discharge (so long as they are still using Ch 30 or 33



Texas Statute that is Compliant with Section 702 of the Choice Act

- (k) A person is entitled to pay tuition and fees at an institution of higher education at the rates provided for Texas residents without regard to the length of time the person has resided in this state if the person files with the institution at which the person intends to register a letter of intent to establish residence in this state and resides in this state while enrolled in the institution and the person:
 - (1) is eligible for benefits under the federal Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2008 (38 U.S.C. Section 3301 et seq.) or any other federal law authorizing educational benefits for veterans

For over 38 years I have prayed almost daily....and at every mass asking God to help me understand asking the question why ...what do you want me to do nowthus I set out to try and help ordinary people without seeking money.....thus my career as a citizen lobbyist...... I am also shamefully a Divorced Catholic who first learned from my next door neighbor on my birthday (Dec 26Th, 1976) that my wife was leaving at the insistence of Father who strongly felt a woman's place was in the home versus working ...versus helping to financially support our marriage (she was an excellent pediatrics nurse and wife) I Have been plagued by a thousand and one questions why she left she left very early the next day with her father never explaining why to me personallywhile she had problems in her ability to open up and communicate her feelings their was never even a hint even days before her parents visit that she was thinking about divorce....to say I was blown away would be an extremely huge understatement....three years later she abandoned her faith, turned her back on the annulment process and remarried in a civil ceremony.......a step I could never consider

as the vows I took were not just to her but to God.....while I applied for an annulment it failed as I too could not explain why and it seem unbelievable a parent could have such influence....... I could never turn my back on our faith thus I have lived as a single man despite the loneliness that created for the past 38 years........ during that time I have listen to the problems, excuses couples use to get a divorce and sadly the devastating effect on their children...... when ever and where ever I could I would try and help defuse such emotions......few folks have this experience......nor would they want it.

Why did I seek you out as the **primary sponsor** because I am led to believe your faith is very strong and you care

Despite the lateness of this request, I am sure a vehicle bill could be obtained and many would join as cosponsors in both the House and Senate and across the isles....as a very respected Catholic leader the feeling is you would be an excellent captainfeelings shared by Charlie Hiltunen and your own colleagues. I need such help to successfully steer this through......despite my failing health I will help you in any way you need as this will be my final swain song....it is an issue very. very close to my heart.....I will not fail God on this no matter what challenges lie before me....the next time I stand before those pearly gates I hope I can say I finished my job.I hope you understand and will give it your all....not for me, but for our common faith and our allegiance to Christ.

I know without any doubt that such a law must be kept as simple and as short as possible yet inspiring as it must become by itself a sales tool that young couples first entering marriage would not have any reservation on signing italso I have taken into consideration the experiences of 38 years and have carefully listen to every suggestion to help create the best possible bill.

This agreement does not address or alter the property rights already defined by the courts nor does it prevent a couple from securing a divorce rather it creates a cooling off period coupled with crisis counseling to address the causes of a an individual desire to seek a divorce.

It is acknowledged that emotional and physical challenges often tears at the very core of any lifetime commitment. The parties understand that no marriage is the embodiment of perfection; rather it is journey fraught with seemingly insurmountable challenges that requires love, patience, and most of all forgiveness as our imperfections as human's beings test the very core of that commitment to each other.

This prenuptial agreement does not prevent us from getting a divorce if one or both feels it is necessary rather it simply requires a cooling off period and counseling prior to any divorce proceedings.

We further understand: that we may be faced with problems that may seem impossible to resolve therefore we agree that we will seek counseling before our marriage to better prepare ourselves for marriage and during the course of our marriage as a part of our lifetime commitment to each other

An example of help that we are willing to accept before, during and following a decision by either party to seek a divorce includes but is not limited to the following.

- 1....A doctor or a psychologist if we feel we are faced with insurmountable medical, mental or emotional problems such as being childless, a terminal illness, the loss of a loved one.
- 2....A marriage counselor, priest, pastor, lay worker skilled in those areas that we are finding difficult to resolve on our own.
- 3....A professional skilled in the art of communications to teach us how to Communicate and resolve differences. The use of the "Prep" educational and counseling services/material developed in conjunction with the University of Denver is a highly recommended and successful counseling support system.

We understand and agree....... that marriage is a continuing series of challenges that may require the aid, counsel, advice, and understanding of a third party as listed above to resolve those hurdles we find difficult to resolve on our own. In a continuing effort to honor our lifetime commitment to each other, we agree to such pre-marriage counseling that our church feels best prepares us for the journey ahead. The costs of such services may be waived based upon our income, however we agree if such costs are reasonable and we are able to pay such costs then we agree that we will work out a payment

plan. If we are unable to cover such costs that we will agree to humbly accept help from our church or our community to offset such costs.

We further agree and under stand: If the basis of the party seeking a divorce is based upon physical abuse of an adult or a child then the following shall apply:

Abuse of an adult: The abused party shall be free to immediately seek a restraining from the courts who shall order the couples to take anger management counseling and/or the "PREP" educational counseling.

Abuse of an Child: When the basis of the decision by either party to seek A divorce is founded upon allegations of child abuse then their exists the obligation of the party seeking a divorce to immediately notify the division of child services within the State Department of Family and Social Services who shall Immediately launch an investigation into such allegations and report their findings within 30 days to the appropriate court. The party seeking a divorce shall immediately request a temporary restraining order from the courts who shall be guided by the information from child services.

The courts shall order intensive counseling and is free to take any other action it deems appropriate to protect the interests of the child from such proven abuse.

We further agree: following a ninety day cooling that we will attend as a couple crises counseling to identify those issues which created this impasse and will try to resolve these issues as well as answer the question "Did these issues exist prior to our marriage rendering our ability to make a lifetime commitment invalid "

<u>Note well:</u> this is a work in progress and needs to be polished to become a legally binding agreement acceptable to all Christian faiths in all 50 states. Your thoughts and revisions are encouraged.............. This effort to create an appropriate prenuptial law will be submitted to all fifty states as the disintegration of the family caused by divorce has a huge impact on many generations of children and society economically.

On October 29, 2014, VA sent a letter to Governors and requested definitive information on the states' ability to meet the requirements of Section 702 of the Public Law. *VA requested a response by November 28, 2014*

- 3 States have not responded or contacted VA. (GU, SC, VI)
- 32 States have indicated an intent to comply by July 1, 2015.
 (AL, AK, AZ, AR, DE, DC, GA, HI, ID, IA, KY, MD, MA, MN, MS, MT, NV, NH, NJ, NY, NC, ND, OH, OK, OR, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WV, WI)
- 15 States have contacted VA (either asking questions or requesting more time), but haven't issued a formal response to all 3 questions in the letter.
 (CA, CO, CT, FL, IL, IN, KS, LA, ME, NM, PA, PR, RI, VT, WY)

TA1

- 3 States (MI, MO, NE) responded stating decision decided below the state level.
- 1 State reported compliant with section 702 and was confirmed by Education Service and OGC (TX).

VA is very committed to working with State Approving Agencies, Non-Governmental Organizations, Intergovernmental Affairs partners, Veterans Service Organizations, and other stakeholders to inform them of the requirements.



General Overview of Section 702

- Requires VA disapprove programs of education if while living in the state of the institution, a covered individual is charged tuition and fees in excess of the rate for resident students.
- Covered individuals
 - Receiving Montgomery and Post-9/11 GI Bill educational assistance; and
 - Enrolls within 3 years of discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Anyone using transferred entitlement within 3 years of the transferor's discharge after serving 90 days or more on active duty; or
 - Surviving Spouses or Children under the Fry Scholarship who enroll within 3 years of an active duty Servicemember's death in the line of duty after serving 90 days or more; or
 - Individuals who remain continuously enrolled after initially meeting the requirements and are using Ch 30 or 33.
- VA cannot compel a school to charge covered individuals the in-State rates.
- VA will disapprove the impacted programs if school does not charge in-State rates.



Common Pitfalls to Avoid when drafting legislation, rules, and/or policies

- You can always be more liberal than what the statute requires.
- Exercise caution:
 - If using the terms "Veteran" or "Armed Forces." "Veteran" for the purposes of title 38, United States Code, must include veterans who performed certain full-time service in, or were called up from, the reserve components or the National Guard, and veterans of the commissioned corps of the Public Health Service (PHS) or National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).
 - When limiting applicability based on the character of discharge (e.g., honorable discharge)
 - When using terms such as "spouse," "child," "dependent"
- Remember to account for individuals "continuously enrolled" beyond 3
 years of discharge (so long as they are still using Ch 30 or 33



Texas Statute that is Compliant with Section 702 of the Choice Act

- (k) A person is entitled to pay tuition and fees at an institution of higher education at the rates provided for Texas residents without regard to the length of time the person has resided in this state if the person files with the institution at which the person intends to register a letter of intent to establish residence in this state and resides in this state while enrolled in the institution and the person:
 - (1) is eligible for benefits under the federal Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2008 (38 U.S.C. Section 3301 et seq.) or any other federal law authorizing educational benefits for veterans



Exchanges who wish to engage the uninsured will need to appeal to these motivations – connecting insurance to the achievement of these goals.

Focus on Millennials

A deeper look at the uninsured Millennials reveals


that only 19% claim they don't need insurance. Instead, cost and job status are top reasons for their lack of insurance. Millennials in jobs where coverage is no offered are 132% more likely to be uninsured. But like the larger uninsured population, their health isn't a top priority. Instead, they're driven by their quest for peace of mind, self-preservation, and enjoyment of life.

2015 Intenders

Though most outreach efforts are focused on the uninsured, 70% of those evaluating their options on the open exchange are already insured. They are more likely to be driven by a sense of accomplishment, pride and self-image than their uninsured counterparts.

The general composition and motivations differ from their 2014 predecessors. This year, intenders are 41% more likely to be a Millennial, 17% more likely to be male and 31% more likely to be employed full-time. In 2014, intenders were driven by a sense of community and security/well-being. This year's intenders are more likely to be driven by more personal motivations such as personal happiness, sense of self and success.

Who Are the Uninsured?




The uninsured run the gamut, but skew to lower incomes, younger populations, and lower-skilled labor.

Few people feel "invincible." Many simply can't afford insurance.

Don't overlook the self-employed population. While it may be small, these workers are much more likely to be uninsured and lack workplace benefits of subsidized insurance.

Almost half of the uninsured have health benefits available through their employer. Some cite missing open enrollment or recent start dates as reasons for being uninsured, but cost is still a factor for many.

Value Drivers

Uninsured consumers are more likely to value success and less likely to value security, but individual values provide the greatest clues to connect with them.

The uninsured are 33% less likely to value health, so it is important to frame insurance in the light of things they do value.

Compared to those with health insurance, the uninsured are more likely to value peace of mind, self-fulfillment, and self-image.


Peace of mind may be a key marketing messaging around health exchanges, since financial and health security is not a highlyindexing value segment.

Self-fulfillment is another message to explore. While the uninsured are pursuing life interests that don't come complete with health insurance, they can still be covered.

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
VALUES SEGMENTS

AT PARITY WITH INSURED POP



The uninsured skew toward minorities



The uninsured are more likely to be minorities, particularly black and Hispanic. There are differences between the minority uninsured and the rest of the uninsured population.

Assimilation: The uninsured are more likely to live in less-assimilated households, speaking languages other than English (though often in addition to English).

Age: On average, 46% of the uninsured population are under 35. But 65% of Hispanic uninsured and 57% of black uninsured are under 35.


Income: Uninsured Hispanics have higher income than the rest of the uninsured (14% over \$100k), while the black uninsured population has lower income (66% under \$50k).

Employment: Uninsured Hispanics are also more likely to be employed full-time than the rest of the uninsured population.



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Uninsured Insured

Money and opportunity are big drivers in the differences between insured and uninsured Millennials.

25% of uninsured 18-34 year olds have a household income less than \$25k.

These uninsured Millennials are 135% more likely to be employed in Construction/Labor and 26% more likely to be in Retail. These two industries make up 19% of the employed uninsured.

37% of the employed uninsured state that their employer does not offer health insurance. Those whose employers do not offer insurance are 132% more likely to be uninsured.

The uninsured are also 1.7 times more likely to be unemployed.

Value Drivers

There are three key differences in values that drive the uninsured versus the insured Millennials.

Uninsured Millennials are more likely to value peace of mind, self-preservation, and enjoyment of life.


The first two motivations (peace of mind and self-preservation) suggest uncertainty introduced by their financial situation and lack of security.

Health exchanges offer services that compliment the motivations of this group, but there are two main challenges. First, they need to help Millennials understand that they can afford insurance. And second, exchanges need to convince this group it's worth the time commitment to learn about their options.

Health Psychographics

Uninsured Millennials report a 12% lower incidence of having a chronic condition. But judging from their less proactive behavior, it's possible they just haven't been diagnosed yet.

Nonetheless, half of the uninsured report having a chronic condition.


Only 19% of the uninsured get routine medical care, compared to 42% of the insured.

The uninsured are also less compliant when taking medication. Only one in four report taking medication as directed for as long as directed, and they are 21% more likely to stop a medication due to cost.

Their health behaviors are possibly in conflict with their personal motivations, providing an opportunity for health exchanges to assist with resolution


18-34: UNINSURED vs INSURED



Insurance Intentions




REASONS FOR BEING UNINSURED UNINSURED: 18-34 vs 35+

Although Millennials are more likely than A35+ to say that they just don't need insurance, over 80% still cite another reason.

Over 40% of Millennials say that they can't afford insurance, while 10% say that they don't know how to get it.

Employment difficulties shows itself in reasons for not being insured, with 14% citing being "between plans (e.g. lost a job or got a new one)" as a reason.

Millennials actually show a bias for buying on the exchanges, but also show a higher unawareness. Certain populations need to be educated versus persuaded.



Though the uninsured are more likely to intend enrollment on the exchanges, they are not the only ones interested.


Success in enrollment depends on identifying all intenders, not just uninsured.





Differences between insured and uninsured intenders


Insured intenders tend to have higher incomes, but are more likely to have chronic conditions; they may be deal-shopping. Uninsured intenders are more likely to be lower income and have sub-optimal employment conditions for obtaining insurance.







MULTI-TASKING WHILE CONSUMING TV








Differences between 2014 and 2015 intenders






INCOME ENROLLED vs ADULT ONLINE POP





Difference between 2014 cycle intenders and enrollees

Compared to people who intended to buy, those who actually enrolled are more likely to value personal relationships and a sense of belonging, as well as the freedom to pursue their own interests, and less likely to value their health. The enrollee population was more likely to be older, lower income, and without employment than overall intenders.



Driving from intention to enrollment: What factors predicted enrollment in the 2014 cycle?

Employment is a driver of enrollment, and particularly **self-employment**, where employer-provided insurance isn't available.

The availability of **employer-provided insurance is a deterrent to enrollment**. It's often a more convenient and cost-effective solution.

Education is also a driver. Though higher incomes are often associated with increased education, income is negatively associated with enrollment.

Being chronically ill is also associated with enrollment, as uninsured or underinsured patients look to build in a safety net.


