## 1. SUMMARY

As the period opened the Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area at Kimpo Peninsula, BS 876745. From 1 July through 12 July, the Battalion dispatched motor patrols twice daily. The mission of these patrols was to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's sector of responsibility.

On 7 July, the Battalion embarked on the USS LOGAN (APA 196). From 7 July through 10 July, the Battalion conducted amphibious exercises on the island of Tokchok To. For complete details, see Battalion Operation Order Number 18-52, Appendix IV.

On 13 July, the Battalion moved by truck and helicopter from its reserve area, BS 876745 to a new reserve area in the vicinity of CS 101973. The Battalion remained at this reserve area from 13 July through 25 July. As a unit of the Division reserve, the Battalion improved the reserve area and blocking positions on LINE KANSAS, conducted training and established interior guard and out-post security for the reserve area.

At 2000, 17 July the entire Battalion less the camp guard departed the reserve area to participate in a Regimental Drill in occupying blocking positions on LINE KANSAS. During this drill all enemy activity was simulated. The Battalion executed tactical troop movements to blocking positions. The drill secured at 1200, 18 July and the Battalion returned to its reserve area, CS 101973.

On 26 July the Battalion moved from its reserve area, CS 101973 to the Regimental reserve area in the vicinity of CT 046013. Company

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Baker was placed under the operational control of the Third Battalion, Seventh Marines, and occupied defensive positions on the MLR. Upon relief of the Third Battalion, Seventh Marines by the Third Battalion, First Marines, Company Baker was placed under the operational control of the Third Battalion, First Marines.

In accordance with Battalion Operation Plan Number 22-52, preparations were made to block and counterattack enemy penetrations in any portion of the Regimental sector of responsibility.

An extensive training schedule was established and carried out throughout the period. The following courses of instruction were emphasized: fire team and squad tactics; tank infantry tactics; platoon in the attack; manipulation, malfunctions and immediate action of T/O weapons; lashing and lowering of equipment; and embarkation and debarkation of helicopters.

Living conditions were made as comfortable as possible. Cots and mosquito netting were available for all personnel. Able and Baker rations were served three times daily. Movies were shown each evening.

During the period 1 July through 31 July the First Battalion, First Marines transferred eleven (11) officers and one hundred sixty-eight (168) enlisted personnel. The Battalion joined seven (7) officers and one hundred ninety-three (193) enlisted personnel. At the close of the period, personnel strength of the Battalion was thirty-eight (38) officers and one thousand sixteen (1,016) enlisted.

As the period closed the Battalion was continuing to occupy and improve its reserve area at CT 046013.

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## 2. CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE:

1 July- As the period opened the Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area, BS 876745 and carry out assigned missions. At 0800 a motor patrol consisting of four (4) men departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to the vicinity of BS 927-710 and BS 978662, Southwest to the vicinity of BS 959646 and BS 918-620, Northeast to the vicinity of BS 935635, Northwest to the vicinity of BS 908659 and Southwest to the vicinity of BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1550 with a negative report. At 2000 another motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to the vicinity of BS 925712 and Northwest to the vicinity of BS 915699. The patrol then returned to the vicinity of BS 925712. At this point the jeep broke down and the patrol was unable to complete its mission. The patrol returned to the reserve area at 1115, 2 July. A training schedule was established covering such subjects as debarkation, lashing and lowering of equipment, rifle platoon in the attack, helicopter embarkation and debarkation, stowage and ditching, amphibious lectures, tank infantry tactics, mines and booby traps.

2 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. The Battalion Commander, Operations Officer and Company Commanders made an aerial reconnaissance of Tokchok-To Island in anticipation of the Battalion conducting an amphibious exercise in that area. Atm 0800 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978668, Southwest to BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935-635, Northwest to BS 908659 and Southwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1610 with a negative report. At 2000 another motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Northeast to BS 924-712, South to BS 906695, West to BS 843689 and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 3 July with a negative report.

3 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0930 the Battalion Commander visited the USS LOGAN (APA 196). At 1100 a motor patrol departed the Battalion reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Northeast to the vicinity of BS 924712, South to the vicinity of BS 906695, West to the vicinity of BS 843689 and North to the vicinity of BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1545 with a negative report. At 2000 another motor patrol departed the

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reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Northeast to BS 924712, South to BS 906695 and West to BS 843689. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 4 July with a negative report.

4 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0900 a motor patrol departed the Battalion reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded West to BS 925-710, East to BS 876655, North to BS 905695, East to BS 835680 and North to BS 845715. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1600 with a negative report. At 1800 a second motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to BS 924712, South to BS 906695, West to BS 843-689 and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 5 July with a negative report.

5 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0800 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded West to BS 925710, East to BS 876655, North to BS 905695, East to BS 835680 and North to BS 845715. The patrol then returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1550 with a negative report. At 2000 another motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to BS 924712, South to BS 906695, West to BS 843689 and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 6 July with a negative report.

6 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0800 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to BS 924712, South to BS 906695, West to BS 843689 and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1605 with a negative report. At 2000 a second motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to BS 924712, South to BS 906695, West to BS 843689 and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 7 July with a negative report.

7 July- At 0615 the Battalion departed its reserve area, BS 876745 and proceeded to Inchon to conduct amphibious exercises. For further details see Operation Order Number 18-52. A minimum amount of person-

nel remained at the reserve area to provide camp security and motor patrols. At 0800 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to the vicinity of BS 927710, Southwest to the vicinity of BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to the vicinity of BS 935635, Northwest to the vicinity of BS 908695 and Southwest to the vicinity of BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1600 with a negative report. At 2000 a second motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded South to BS 906695, West to BS 843689, and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 8 July with a negative report.

8 July- At 0800 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978662, Southwest to BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935635, Northwest to BS 908695 and Southwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1600 with a negative report. At 1135 Major General Selden, Commanding General, First Marine Division and Major General Kendal, United States Army visited the Battalion reserve area. At 2000 a second motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978662, Southwest to BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935635, Northwest to BS 908695 and Southwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 9 July with a negative report.

9 July- At 0800 a motor patrol departed the Battalion reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978662, Southwest to BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935635, Northwest to BS 908695 and Southwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1600 with a negative report. At 2000 a second motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978662, Southwest to BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935635, Northwest to BS 908695 and Southwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0400, 10 July with a negative report.

10 July- At 0800 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978662, Southwest to BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935635, Northwest to BS 908695 and Southwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over

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the same route arriving at 1600 with a negative report. At 1145 the Battalion returned to its reserve area after conducting an amphibious exercise. At 2000 a second motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to BS 924712, South to BS 906696, West to BS 843689 and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0355, 11 July with a negative report.

11 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0820 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978662, Southwest to BS 759646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935635 and Northwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1515 with a negative report. At 2000 a second motor patrol departed the reserve area with the same mission and proceeded Southeast to BS 924712, South to BS 906659, West to BS 843689 and North to BS 845729. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 0350, 12 July with a negative report.

12 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0805 a motor patrol departed the reserve area to prevent subversive activity within the Battalion's area of responsibility. It proceeded Southeast to BS 927710 and BS 978662, Southwest to BS 959646 and BS 918620, Northeast to BS 935635, Northwest to BS 908695 and Southwest to BS 876659. The patrol returned to the reserve area over the same route arriving at 1550 with a negative report. At 0845 an advance party departed the Battalion's reserve area, BS 876745 and proceeded to the vicinity of CS 101973. The mission of the party was to prepare that area prior to the movement of the remainder of the Battalion to that sector of the Division reserve.

13 July-At 0730 the Battalion commenced movement by helicopter and truck from its reserve area, BS 876745 to its new reserve area in the vicinity of CS 101973. At 1245 the Battalion closed its old Command Post at BS 876745 and opened its new Command Post at CS 101973. The last element of the Battalion arrived in the new reserve area at 1630.

14 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area, CS 101973 and carry out assigned missions. Interior guard and outpost security of the reserve area were established. At 1000 the Regimental Commander visited the Battalion reserve area. At 1530 Major General Selden, Commanding General, First Marine Division visited the Battalion reserve area.

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15 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0800 Major John K. Hegan relieved Major Leo V. Gross as Executive Officer of the Battalion. At 1500 the Regimental Commander visited the Battalion reserve area.

16 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0900 the Battalion Commander, Operations Officer and Company Commanders reconnoitered the blocking positions assigned to this Battalion on LINE KANSAS. At 0930 the Regimental Commander visited the Battalion reserve area. At 1300 the Battalion Commander made an aerial reconnaissance of LINE KANSAS and Blocking positions assigned to this Battalion. At 1500 the Regimental Commander and Colonel Smoak visited the Battalion reserve area. At 1730 the Battalion conducted a rehearsal of movement to and occupation of blocking positions.

17 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 1000 the Regimental Commander and Colonel Sayer visited the Battalion reserve area. At 1400 the Battalion Commander visited the 4.2" Mortar company of the First Marines. At 2000 the entire Battalion, less the camp guard, departed the reserve area to participate in a Regimental drill in occupying blocking positions on LINE KANSAS.

18 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 1200 the first elements returned to the reserve area after participating in a Regimental drill in occupying blocking positions on LINE KANSAS. The last elements of the Battalion arrived in the reserve area at 1420.

19 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 1430 the Battalion Commander visited the 4.2" Mortar company of the First Marines. Company Weapons conducted range and field firing. All T/O weapons were fired.

20 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. Holiday routine was observed. Protestant and Catholic divine services were conducted within the Battalion reserve area.

21 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. A training schedule was established covering the following subjects: range firing, gun drill, ambush and capture of enemy, demolitions and malfunctions and immediate action of all T/O weapons, field and night firing. Company Baker conducted range and field firing. All T/O weapons were fired.

22 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. Company Able conducted range and field firing. All T/O weapons were fired. The Battalion Commander inspected the entire Battalion reserve area. Particular attention was paid to living and working conditions and the extent of improvement accomplished by this Battalion since occupying this sector of the Division reserve.

23 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0900 the Battalion Commander, Executive Officer, Operations Officer, Intelligence Officer and Company Commanders attended a conference at Regimental Headquarters. Major General Selden, Commanding General, First Marine Division visited the Battalion reserve area.

24 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. Company Charlie conducted range and field firing of all T/O weapons. At 0900 the Battalion Commander inspected the living and working conditions of members of this Battalion. At 1800 the Battalion Commander visited the Regimental Command Post.

25 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0900 the Battalion Commander and the Battalion Operations Officer made an aerial reconnaissance of the blocking and counterattack positions this Battalion will occupy in the event of enemy penetration of the MLR.

26 July- At 0630 Company Baker commenced movement from the reserve area, CS 101973 to relieve Company Able, First Battalion, Seventh Marines. Upon relief of Company Able, First Battalion, Seventh Marines, Company Baker occupied defensive positions on the MLR. Company Baker was placed under the operational control of the Third Battalion, Seventh Marines. At 0900 the remainder of the Battalion commenced movement from the reserve area, CS 101973 to a new reserve area in the vicinity of CT 046013. At 1300 the Battalion closed its old Command Post at CS 101973 and opened its new Command Post at CT 046013.

27 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0800 the Battalion Commander visited the Division Command Post. At 1300 the Battalion Commander,


the Battalion Operations Officer, the Company Commanders of Companies Able and Charlie and Lieutenant Colonel King reconnoitered the Battalion's blocking positions. (See Battalion Operation Plan Number 22-52 for details of blocking positions).

28 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 0830 Lieutenant Colonel King reconnoitered the defensive positions occupied by the Fifth Marines. Upon relief of the Third Battalion, Seventh Marines by the Third Battalion, First Marines, Company Baker was placed under the operational control of the Third Battalion, First Marines. At 1345 the Regimental Executive Officer visited the Battalion Command Post. A training schedule was established for Company Able. Emphasis was placed on the following subjects: fire team and squad tactics, close combat with live firing, tank infantry tactics, and platoon in the attack. Company Charlie was assigned as duty company for the remainder of the week.

29 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 1830 the Battalion Executive Officer visited Company Baker which at this time was under the operational control of the Third Battalion, First Marines.

30 July- The Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area and carry out assigned missions. At 1100 the FMF Pac Surgeon, the 1stMarDiv Surgeon, and the 3rdMarDiv Surgeon visited the Battalion Command Post.

31 July- As the period closed the Battalion continued to occupy and improve its reserve area at CT 046013. At 0810 a patrol consisting of a fire team, an interpreter and a radio operator departed from the Regimental reserve area and proceeded Northeast to CT 058025, North to CT 058049, Southeast to CT 064035 and Southwest to CT 059023. The patrol returned to the Regimental reserve area at 1200 with a negative report. The mission of the patrol was to apprehend unauthorized Korean nationals within the Battalion's sector of responsibility and to investigate any suspicious activity within the patrol area.

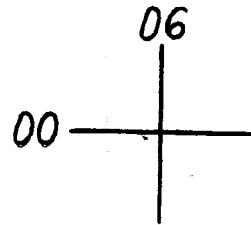
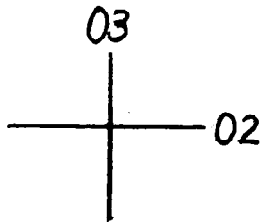






SITUATION OVERLAY 13 - 26 July 1952

(Reproduction of Annex Fox to Regimental Opn  
Plan 6-52)

1. GENERAL

a. It is vital that all elements of this command be fully cognizant of the security agreements pertaining to the conduct of the armistice negotiations. The agreements, neutral zones and restrictions listed herein supercede all others.

b. It has been mutually agreed by the United Nations and the Communists that no hostile acts by forces under their control will be made within the following areas:

(1) A circular area having a radius of three (3) miles centered on the traffic circle in Kaesong.

(2) A circular area surrounding the camp area of the UNC delegation having a radius of three (3) miles centered at CS 050930.

(3) A circular area surrounding the conference site area in PANMUNJOM having a radius of one thousand (1000) yards centered at BT 951033.

(4) The Kaesong-Panmunjom-Munsan-ni road and an area extending two hundred (200) meters on each side of that road.

c. Except for Military Police detachments of two (2) officers and fifteen (15) enlisted men from each side, no armed personnel of either side will be permitted in the conference site. The Military Police will be armed with small arms only (pistols, rifle, carbines). Both delegations and their parties shall have free access to and free movement within the conference site area.

d. Restrictions imposed on the operation of aircraft in this area are as follows:

(1) All air support missions flown anywhere on our present front must be under positive control, either by TACP, TAC, or MASR Team #1.

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(2) FIFTH AIR FORCE aircraft are restricted from flying over or attacking within area covered by a circle of six (6) miles radius with the center at the traffic circle in Kaesong, or over or attacking within the Panmunjom area limited by a circle with a radius of two (2) miles from BT 951033.

(3) All aircraft are restricted from flying over area covered by; (1) a circle of three (3) miles radius with the center at traffic circle in Kaesong; (2) the neutrality corridor from Kaesong to Panmunjom; (3) a circle of two (2) thousand yards radius with center at Panmunjom.

(4) The TAC, TACP, and MASR Team #1, when controlling missions, will exercise maximum care and discretion to insure that no attacks are vectored into the above areas. VMO-6 planes will not fly over the areas set forth in (3) above, nor over the neutral corridor between PANMUNJOM and the MLR.

## 2. Interpretation of Agreement

a. No member of the 1st Marine Division will enter nor fire into the Kaesong circular area (3 miles radius), the Panmunjom circular area (1000 yds radius), or into the restricted area long the Kaesong-Panmunjom road ( 200 meters each side of road).

b. No UNC attack will be launched from and no fire will be delivered against hostile forces from the Munsan-ni area or from the restricted area long the Panmunjom-Munsan-ni road.

c. High trajectory weapons may be fired across the corridor running west from our present front lines to Panmunjom circle but not into the corridor.

d. Military aircraft may fly over the Panmunjom-Munsan-ni corridor in rear of our MLR. Unarmed helicopters may use this corridor up to our OPLR or landing sites for administrative purposes, as in the case of medical evacuations.

## 3. Responsibility of Unit Commanders

a. Commanding officers of all units in this command will insure that the following measures are complied with:

(1) All personnel of this command are fully aware of the neutral zones, restrictions on the commission of hostile acts and all other restrictions set forth in this Annex.

(2) Special care will be observed at all times in firing artillery, small arms and other high trajectory weapons to insure that no rounds land in the neutral zones, including the Corps Commanders NO Fire Line. See Appendix 1.

(3) The commanding officer of the battalion whose sector includes the high ground East of and dominating Panmunjom (left MLR battalion), will insure that each individual of his unit has been fully instructed on neutrality restrictions and warned not to fire except in case of attack by the enemy.

(a) Firing Lanes for this covering force will be so set to insure against any violations by fire of the conference area as set forth in 1. b (3) above (1000 yds radius from BT 951033).

(b) In the event of any enemy attack by maneuver on this covering force position, personnel may fire, but then only within the limitations imposed in 2. a above. An enemy attack may be interpreted to include an attack by fire but this interpretation will be made at Division level except in case of extreme emergency or communication failure at which time the interpretation will be made at the highest level of command available. Such attack by fire must reach serious proportions before fire will be returned and then only within limitations of 2. a above.

(c) All incidents pertaining to these troops will be reported to this Headquarters (S-3) immediately utilizing the most expeditious means.

(d) The commanding officer of the battalion in whose sector Panmunjom falls will maintain a record of all incidents and hostile acts (to include apprehension of enemy agents and suspicious persons) that occur in the vicinity of the UNC Base Camp, the conference site of Panmunjom, Kaesong area or areas adjacent to the Kaesong-Panmunjom-Munsan-ni road. Submit verbal reports immediately, to be followed by written reports of any such incidents, to reach this Headquarters (S-3) within 24 hours. These reports are to be specific as to the incidents, including date, time, places, persons involved and witnesses. Upon relief, the record will be passed to relieving unit.

(e) Every effort will be made to apprehend all infiltrators into any of the restricted areas.

(r) Psychological warfare measures will be limited as indicated on Appendix 1.

### MEDICAL SUMMARY

During the period 1 July 1952 through 31 July 1952 the following disease preventive measures were taken throughout the Battalion area: DDT was sprayed twice weekly, messhalls and galleys were issued Aersol Bombs for spraying twice daily, Warforin poison was used to rid the area of rodents, Chloroquine tablets were passed out weekly to prevent Malaria, and mosquito netting was inspected and found in good condition. All tents and clothing were impregnated by dipping in DDT.

Showers were available to all personnel from 1000 to 2000 daily. All clothing issued at the shower points had been previously impregnated with DDT.

The heads and urinals were inspected daily by the Medical Officer. Lime was placed in the areas where urinals were located. The heads were burned out twice weekly and the trash pits were burned out daily.

Mess gear, stoves and other messing facilities were inspected daily by the Medical Officer. Cooking utensils and stoves were cleaned after each meal. Soapy and clean boiling water were used to clean mess gear. The roads and area adjacent to the mess halls were sanded to control the flow of dust.

Periodic inspections of Company areas were made by the Medical Officer. Weekly foot inspections were conducted by the Company Corpsermen. Even though the findings of these inspections proved that the feet of the members of this Battalion were in good condition, foot powder and fungicidal ointment were issued as precautionary measures.


Replacement personnel were instructed in field sanitation, personal hygiene and the application of first aid.

During the amphibious training this Battalion established a Battalion Aid Station and a Forward Aid Station. Eighty (80) simulated casualties were treated and evacuated, twenty (20) of which were evacuated by helicopter.

Personnel requiring dental treatment were sent to the Regimental Dental Dispensary.

During the period forty-six (46) personnel were evacuated due to contracting various diseases. Twelve (12) patients were treated for venereal disease, two (2) of which were evacuated.

During the period covered by this report, the physical condition of the Battalion as a whole was excellent.

 A F I reports indicate several possible mortar positions, and a number of bunkers and prepared fighting positions on the high ground overlooking all probable landing beaches.
- c. This enemy is capable and is believed to be willing to put up a very determined defense.

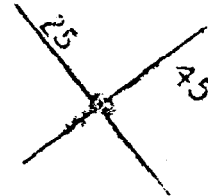
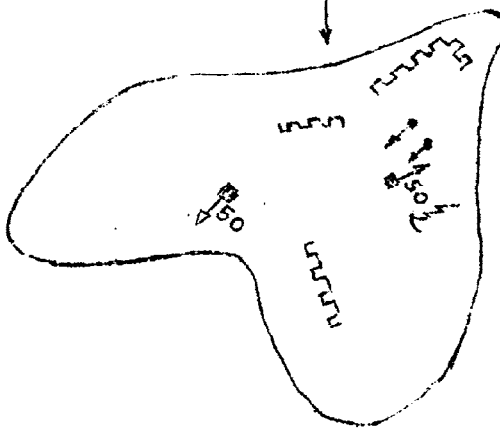

1. GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

The island of Tokchok To is located approximately thirty two (32) miles SW of INCHON, Korea. Long. 126° 07'E and Lat. 37° 15'N and is the largest of the several islands in the TOKCHOK group. The island is approximately 5 miles long and 3 miles wide at its widest point. Estimated population is 4,000 mixed Japanese and Korean. Principal industry is of agrarian nature with all tillable land being under cultivation.

2. METEOROLOGICAL DATA

(a) See Appendix (3)

3. TOPOGRAPHY

(a) The principal terrain features are a series of prominent ridges with small valleys sloping to the South and the Southwest. The crest lines are of uniform height averaging 700 ft. elevation. Mt. PIJO BONG, 954 ft. dominates the South end of the island. Several small fresh water springs are located on the island.

(b) Vegetation consists of patches of thickly wooded areas located 300 to 500 yds inland from all beaches. The wooded areas decrease in density up the slopes and thin to a covering of scrub pine averaging 2 to 4 ft. in height on the top of the ridges.

(c) The entire central area of this island is covered by an impenetrable Mangrove swamp which is covered by 8 to 15 feet of water at high tides. The floor of the swamp consists of scattered outcroppings of volcanic rock and coral heads surrounded by almost bottomless quicksand. Foot or vehicular traffic is impossible between the North and South ends of the island. (For South boundary of swamp area, see ADMINISTRATIVE LINE, Operation Overlay).

(d) With the exception of foot trails, small villages and cultivated areas, there are no man made changes in the topography. There are no roads, bridges, or rail lines in the South coastal areas of Tokchok To.

4. RED BEACH

(a) The 975 yd. expanse of beach located in a protected cove at the south western part of the island is known as Sop'o-ri beach and will be designated as RED BEACH for this operation.

(b) Location

(1) The center of the beach is located 37 13'N 126 07'E.

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## (c) Length

(1) There is approximately 700 yds of useable beach. The flank has a small man made rock jetty 100 ft long, with a 12 ft. base and approximately 4 ft. wide at the top. Both beach flanks are bounded by steep headlands covered with small trees.

## (d) Width

(1) Average width at high tide is 60 yds.

## (e) COMPOSITION AND TRAFFICABILITY

(1) The beach is mostly composed of fine sand. Trafficability of the beach is good on all tides. The beach has a large berm scarp for a depth of 60 ft. with a gradient of 1:1. Movement inland is by the berm scarp and a sand dune of approximately 275 yds. The sand dune area in the hinterland will provide good cover and concealment due to heavy growth. Matting will be required for vehicles in the backshore and hinterland area.

## (f) HYDROGRAPHY

(1) Underwater gradient - Offshore 1:100, Foreshore 1:25.

(2) Hazards to navigation - the beach is rocky on both flanks. Shoals exist offshore to the approach. Kamjungtan rock lies 2300 yds. offshore on the right flank line of approach.

(3) Currents - Tidal up to 3 1/2 knots.

(4) Tides - range 16 to 24 ft.

(5) Bottom - Fine sand and a combination of rock and sand.

(6) Surf - Moderate to none.

## (g) EXITS

(1) Exits from the beach are limited to foot trails leading to the villages and are not considered suitable for vehicular traffic.

## 5. BLUE BEACH

(1) This beach is located on the southwestern side of the island near the village of OE JUUM. Overall length of the beach is 820 yds. in width. Steep finger ridges extending to the sea flank the beach at either end. Back beach area varies from moderate sand dunes on the eastern end to a gentle slope leading inland in the center, and steep slopes on the western end of the beach.

(2) Exits from the beach are limited to foot trails leading inland from the eastern end of the beach.

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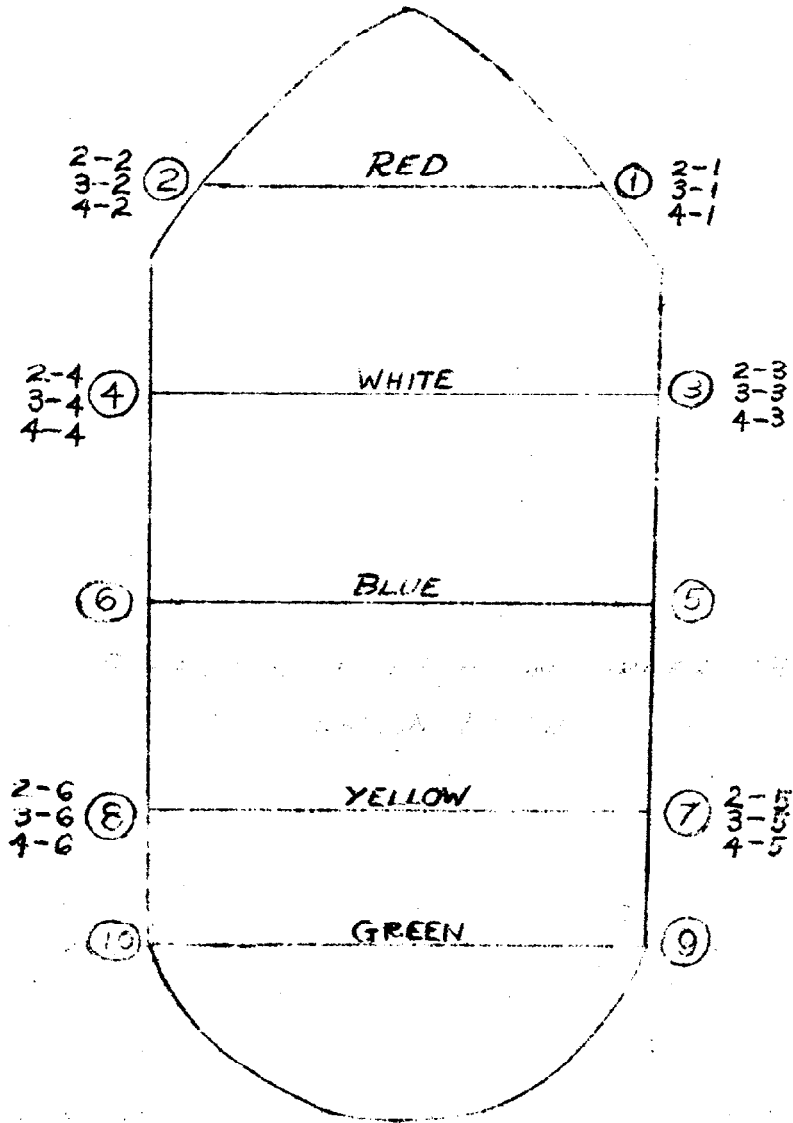

- a. CL 155 will effect assignments shown in Appendices 1 and 2 of this Annex, and will further provide call fire support for Co. "C", First Battalion, First Marines.

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ANNEX JIG TO OPERATION ORDER NUMBER 18-52 (Cont'd)

b. DD 802 will effect assignment shown in Appendices 1 and 2 of this Annex, and will provide call fire support for Co. "B", First Battalion, First Marines. As a secondary mission DD 802 will provide screening protect for LSM (R) during pre H-Hour bombardment.

c. LSM (R) will effect assignments shown in Appendices 1 and 2 of this Annex, and will further provide call fire support for Co. "A", First Battalion, First Marines.

- x. (1) Priority of fires initially: to destruction of priority A, B and C targets in that order. After H-Pour, priority to call fires and targets of opportunity. Targets are classified as follows:
- A - Installations which threaten ships, aircraft and UDT operations.
  - B - Installations which threaten assault forces, ship-to-shore movement and landing.
  - C - Installations which threaten or oppose Landing Force Operations after landing.
  - D - Installations which should not be fired on prior to D-Day.
  - E - Targets which will not be destroyed except by order of the Commanding Officer, First Battalion, First Marines; either because of possible future use by friendly forces or for humanitarian reasons.
- (2) Assignment and relief of fire support ships will be made by Commander Attack Force (Task Group 77.1) and will be effected at 0400I each day. Emergency relief may be requested at any time.
- (3) On D-Day, scheduled fires will be lifted or repeated as directed by Commander Attack Force. If scheduled fires are repeated the rate of fire will be one-half (1/2) that shown in the schedule for the period indicated.
- (4) Harassing, interdiction and illuminating fires will be requested by Battalion NGLO, except in an emergency. Plans for night fires will be submitted to NGLO prior to 1600I.
- (5) High performance (VOF) air spot will be available. Organic ship spot should be used where available and practicable.
- (6) VT fuses will not be fired over friendly troops without specific clearance by the Unit Commander concerned.
- (7) Smoke projectiles (white phosphorus) should not be used to screen troop movements except in emergency and only with the clearance of the Unit Commander concerned.
- (8) Shore fire control parties will operate in accordance with LPM-21 and with instructions contained in this Operation Order.

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ANNEX JIG TO OPERATION ORDER NUMBER 18-52 (Cont'd)  
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- (9) The NGLO will coordinate the employment of Naval Gunfire support with air and artillery through the Battalion SAC. Employment of plans William, Victor or Negat during air strikes will be at the direction of the SAC Officer.
- (10) 5" rockets will not be fired over the heads of friendly troops, nor within 1,000 yards of friendly front lines. Caution will be exercised to insure that star shell trajectories do not terminate within friendly positions.
- (11) Targets of opportunity must be identified as hostile before being taken under fire. This is particularly true on D-Day when communications with assault units and patrols may be poor. Ships will not fire direct fire on targets of opportunity without clearance from the Commanding Officer, First Battalion, or Battalion NGLO.
- (12) Reports required:
- (a) From Battalion Naval Gunfire Spotter:
- 1) Friendly front lines hourly and whenever changes occur; to NGLO and supporting ship.
  - 2) Destruction and Intelligence reports daily, once before 1200I and once before 1600I: to NGLO.
  - 3) Ammunition expenditure report at 1600I: to NGLO
  - 4) Night fires request at 1600I to NGLO.
- (b) From ships:
- 1) Ammunition status at 0800I and 1600I and whenever supply approaches 20% of bombardment allowance: to NGLO.
  - 2) Intelligence gained from ship's observation or from ship's air spot, as soon as possible: to NGLO.

#### 4. AMMUNITION.

a. Ships of Attack Force will be loaded with full magazine capacity when reporting on station at H-18 hours. No replenishment of fire support ships is anticipated. However, should the need arise it will be done at the direction of CTG 77.1. Fire Support Ships will not leave fire support area for replenishment without the clearance of the Commanding Officer, First Battalion, First Marines.

b. Fire Support Ships will reserve 10% of 6" ammunition magazine capacity and 20% of 5" ammunition magazine capacity for ship's defense. LSM (R) 4 will reserve 10% of 5" rockets for night emergency call fire.

a. Communications in accordance with 1st MarDiv SOI-5, Current Signal SOP, ACP 125, JANAP 164 and Annex Dog to Administrative Order 1-52.

  - (3) Support Carrier Aircraft will be on station over the objective area from H-Hour minus thirty minutes until Battalion landing team objective secured.
2. General mission of Air Organization furnishing local Air Support to the Amphibious Force are:
  - a. Air Defense.
  - b. Close Air Support for Battalion Landing Team.
  - c. Tactical air observation for Naval Gunfire, assistance to Tactical Air Control Party when required, and general reconnaissance for BLT Commander.
  - d. Helicopters: See HMR-161 Operation Order 4-52.
3. Support Carrier Aircraft.
  - (1) D-Day:
    - (a) Air defense: 24 VMF with 4 VMF on station at all times. Each aircraft will be loaded with full load of 20MM. These aircraft will be used for air defense only and under no circumstances will they be relieved for close air support. Each aircraft will remain on station for two hours with relief effected on station.
    - (b) Air support: 24 VMA with 6 VMA on station at all times; aircraft will be loaded with 1-1000 lb. bomb with a VT fuse, 4-5 second delay tail fuse; 1-navalm; 12-250 lb. G.P. bomb; and full load of 20MM. Each aircraft will remain on station for two hours with relief effected on station. All missions will be under positive control of Tactical Air Control Party.
  - (2) Air support, Dog Day plus one:
    - (a) Dog Day air support plan to remain in effect until Battalion objective secured or until secured by Battalion Landing Team Commander.

1. a. Approximately three hundred (300) Red troops occupy defensive positions on the island of TOKCHOK TO as shown in Annex Baker to Operation Order 18-52. Primary artillery targets will be on trench and bunker works on Hill 313 and Hill 297. Proper harassing fire may be directed against road junctions at BS 464237 and BS 445225. The enemy has two (2) known mortar positions shown in intelligence reports, but no known artillery emplacements.

b. Friendly troops, comprising one (1) reinforced Battalion will land and assault toward objectives as shown in Appendices to Annex Charlie of Operation Order 18-52.

- (1) Naval Gunfire will provide pre-landing preparation fires and destruction.
- (2) Supporting Air elements will provide pre-landing neutralization fires and close support subsequent to the assault.

2. One (1) 105mm howitzer battery from the Third Battalion, Eleventh Marines will be in support of the Battalion Landing Team and will land on call from the Battalion Commander.

3. a. George Battery will provide the support set forth in this order.

- (1) The Battery will be prepared to operate a battery fire chart and deliver such fires as are demanded of it in coordination with Naval Gunfire and Supporting Air.
- (2) Priority of fires will go to support the advance in Co. "B" zone. Co. "A" and Co. "C" will be given support on call.
- (3) The Battery will provide an artillery forward observer team with each of the assaulting companies and an artillery liaison officer to accompany and advise the Battalion Commander.
- (4) The Battery position ashore will be selected to provide the greatest zone of fire with regard both to the artillery mission and the tactical situation.

4. a. Each man will carry a 2/3 ration and two (2) full canteens of water. Medical Aid Stations will be located according to the Administrative Order to Operation Order 18-52.

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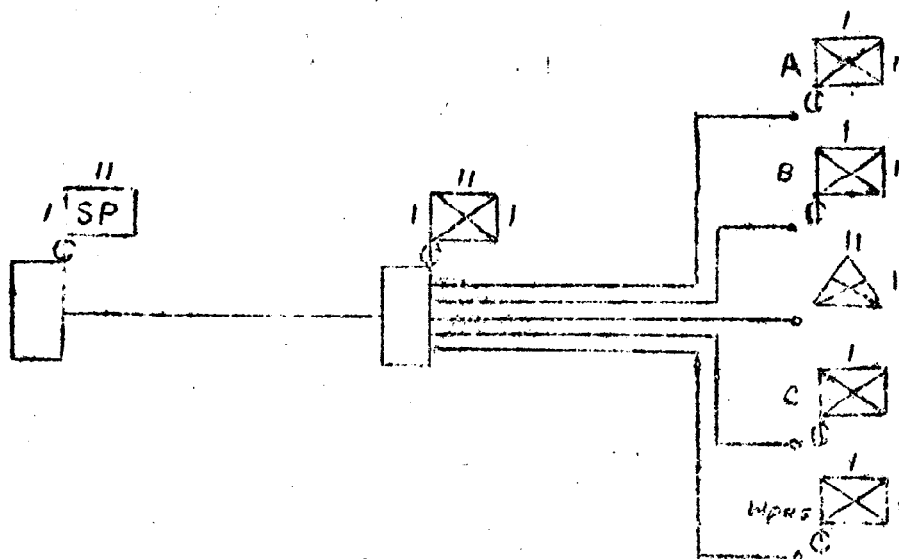

WIRE CIRCUIT DIAGRAM



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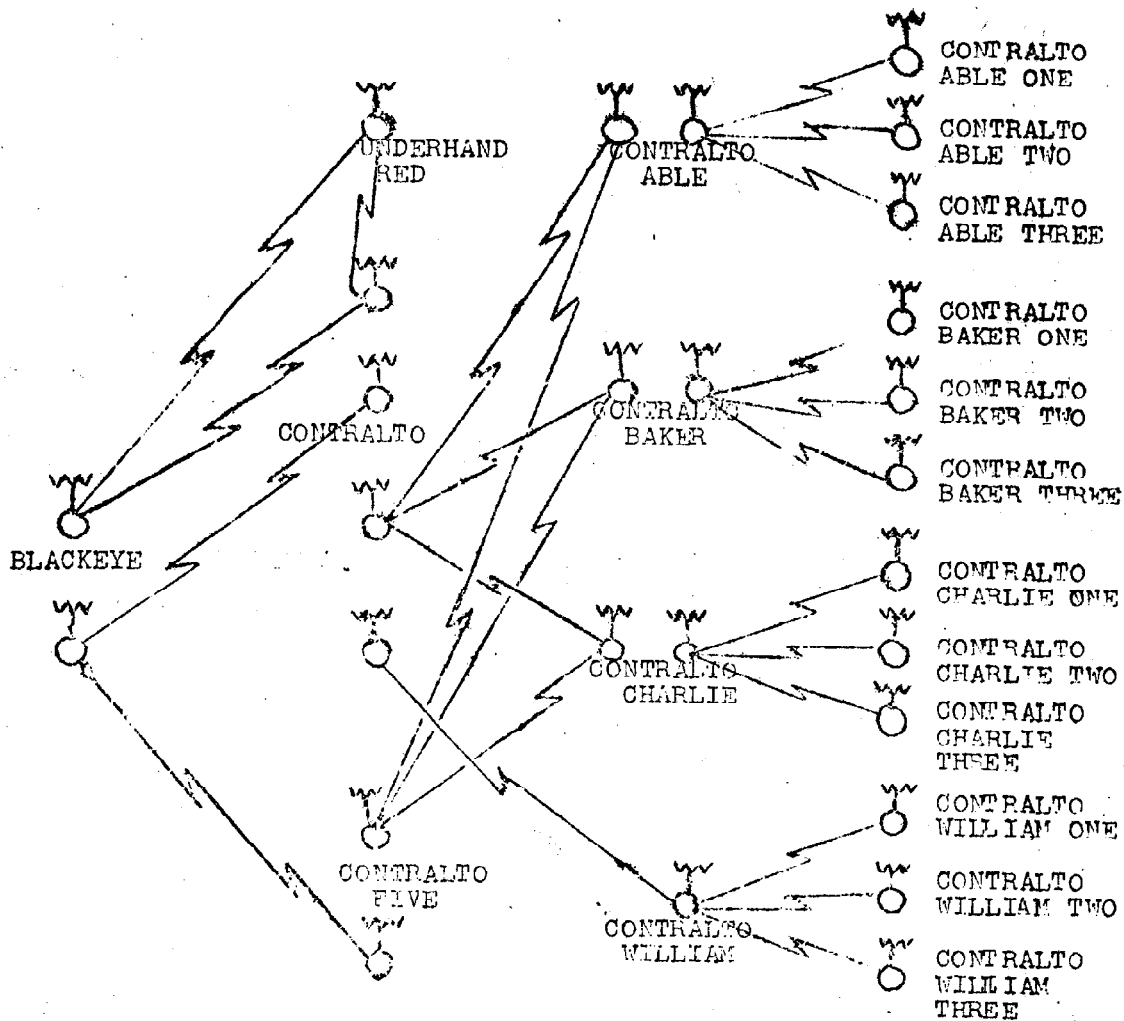

ANNEX BAKER TO ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 1-52

MEDICAL

1. TASK ORGANIZATION.

- a. Bn Med Section divided into 2 forward aid stations, supported by additional units:
- (1) Shore party with medical officer and corpsmen to act as collecting and clearing station.
  - (2) Four LCVF designated with Mike flags serve as hospital boats. LCVF's in later waves to be designated as hospital boats as required.
  - (3) One LST and 1 APA with medical officer and staff to handle both major and minor casualties.
  - (4) Medical officer and staff aboard carrier to handle casualties incurred in helicopter lift.

2. MISSION OF MEDICAL UNITS.

- a. Care and evacuation of casualties and the maintenance of sanitation.

3. SANITATION.

- a. Individual company corpsmen responsible for company sanitation until objective secured.
- b. No food or water will be consumed except that supplied by normal supply channels.

4. EVACUATION.

- a. Casualties incurred enroute to the beach will remain in assault craft and be returned to hospital ships.
- b. Casualties incurred during landing and assault will be taken directly to collecting and clearing station by companies following treatment by company corpsmen.
- (1) No facilities ashore for treatment of major casualties.
  - (2) No transportation available ashore.

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- g. Evacuation vessels shown in paragraph 1 above.
- d. Subsequent to paragraph 4b above patients will be evacuated under control of evacuation control officer.
- e. Casualties other than ambulatory will be transported by litter from forward points to Bn Aid Station and subsequently to Shore Party control points.
- f. Evacuation control officers will receive casualties from Shore Party for transportation to hospital ships. Returning trips will bring necessary supplies from ship.
- g. Company corpsmen will familiarize themselves with location of forward aid stations and shore party and direct patient evacuation by shortest route.
- h. Prisoner and civilian casualties will be evacuated as set forth for friendly casualties.
- i. Casualties incurred in helicopter lift to be evacuated by helicopter to carrier.
- j. Helicopters available for emergency evacuation on order of evacuation control officer.

## 5. HOSPITALIZATION.

- a. Hospital ships listed in paragraph 1a (3) above, available throughout operation.
- b. Prisoners and civilians hospitalized as above.

## 6. MEDICAL SUPPLY.

- a. Initial supplies ( splints, litters, blankets, dressings, plasma, albumen, and narcotics) will be carried ashore by company corpsmen.
- b. Splints, litters and blankets will be exchanged at each point in the evacuation chain.
- c. Resupply will be the evacuation chain in reverse, originating with the hospital ship.
- d. Emergency resupply available by helicopter if necessary.
- e. Captured medical supplies to be used as indicated.

## 7. MEDICAL ADMINISTRATION.

- a. Medical officer will be located with forward aid stations, shore party, and with each hospital ship.
- b. ANNEX Nan to Opn O 18-52.
- c. Evacuation reports to be filed by shore party.
