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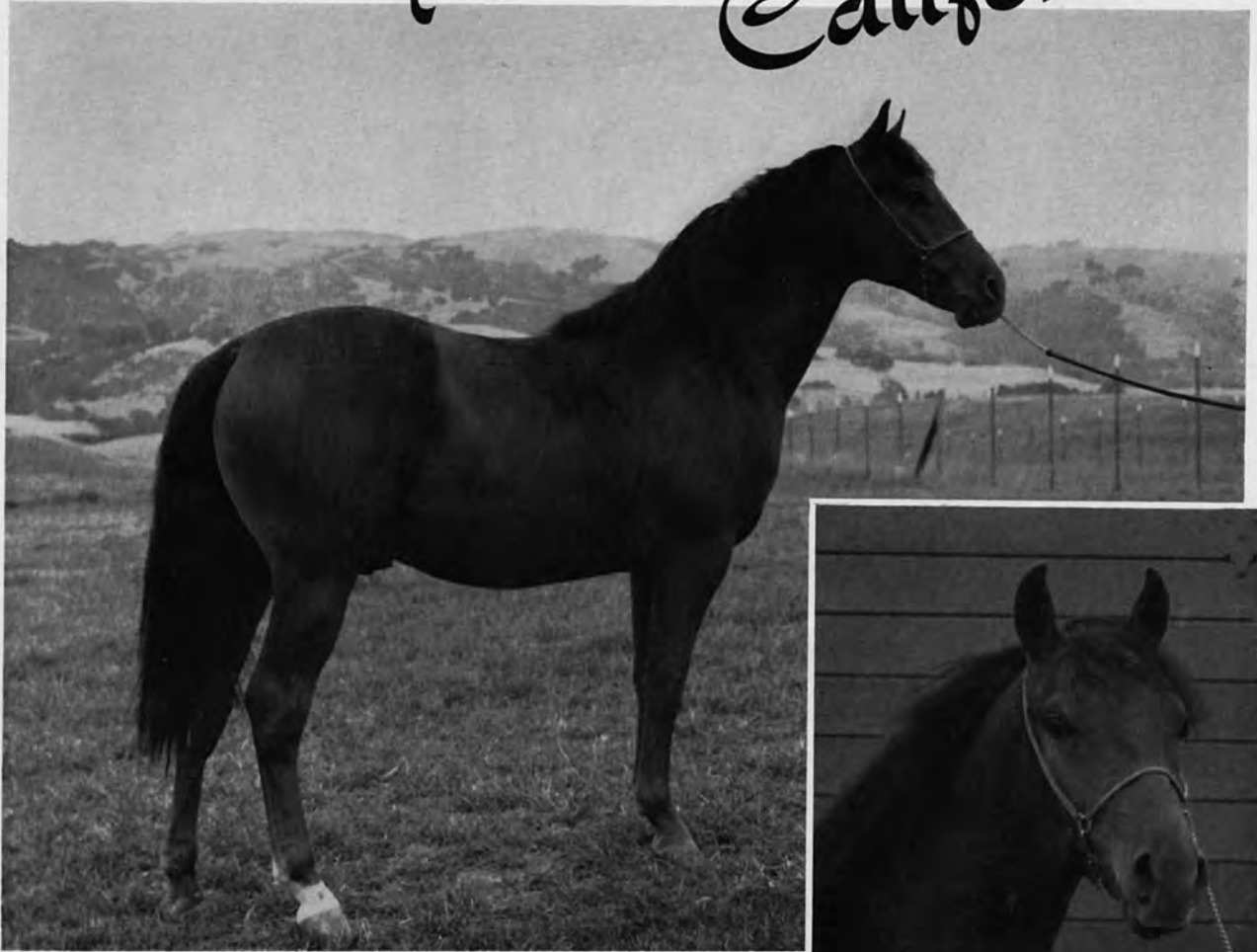

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The President's Corner

I have been swamped with letters complaining about the showing of Morgans with long feet, heavy shoes and straps to hold on the shoes. Articles are being written such as the one by Mrs. Pettinger, "Wither the Morgan Horse," in the Chronicle which shows what others are thinking about the horse we try to keep as the "Pride and Product of America."

I am pleased to say at the last directors meeting the rules as set up by the rules committee were accepted with a few minor changes. The new rules will be printed in pamphlet form and distributed to our members as soon as they are accepted by the American Horse Show Association. These new rules will limit the length of hoof from hair line to ground (shoes included) to 5" in performance classes with a maximum of 18 oz. and 4½" in pleasure classes with a maximum of 14 oz. shoes.

Lead under pad or the use of turnbuckles or bands of any kind is prohibited. Weanlings cannot be shod.

Western classes if shod cannot use pads and shoe cannot be over 14 oz.

This should put everyone on an equal footing and will certainly be more humane to the Morgan horse.

The co-operation and help of our directors is greatly appreciated and I feel we are now moving in the right direction.

Eastern States Horse Show

Waseeka's Nocturne And Gladgay's Pride Top Stake Horses

Morgans out-numbered all other breeds at New England's largest indoor show, the Eastern States Exposition. This year's horse show was the largest ever with over 500 entries. There were 58 entries in the Morgan in hand or breeding classes and well over 50 in the performance classes. There were more horses entered in all the Morgan classes than ever before. The management was very pleased at the major role this breed played.

The Performance classes averaged from 15 to 20 and all were top animals. The Morgan Harness class had 13 entries and the ring was jammed. The four driving pairs of Morgans made a great hit with the spectators. Congratulations are due to all the exhibitors for presenting their Morgans so well at this large show in West Springfield, Mass.

The Exposition this year was recognized the first time as an international fair and was attended by approximately 475,000 visitors from throughout the United States and Canada. Judging the Morgans were Richard E. Lavery, Jr., of Brecksville, Ohio and John M. Kays of Storrs, Conn.

This year it was Waseeka's Nocturne again. He won the Open Saddle Stake before a full house on Stake Night. This team of John Lydon and Nocturne is a sure winning combination.

Gladgay's Pride topped the Amateur Saddle Stake with a brilliant performance. This was a great win for Mark Hanna and his good stallion. The Harness class was won by Orcland Farms Donanna with Joyce Gad as whip. This mare made a very steady performance.

The Pleasure Class was topped by the Townshend Morgan-Holstein Farm's Townshend Melinda. This 4-year old mare, ridden by Nancy Ela, has a very easy way of going.

The Junior Saddle Class was won by

Gay Cavalier, owned by the Green Meads Farm, and was well ridden by Dr. Robert Orcutt. This young stallion sure has a lot of presence.

The Pair Class was won by Orcland Donanna and Bar-T Leading Man. This pair has Lyman Orcutt at whip and they really were right together and up in the riggen. Orcland Donanna is owned by Orcland Farms and Bar-T Leading Man is owned by Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Havey.

In the breeding classes, Reata's Adios

owned by Charles A. Cohen was Grand Champion and the reserve went to Broadwall Spangle, owned by Sally T. Hounslea. These were in the three years old and under classes.

In the New England Horsemen's Council Pleasure Horse Class three Morgans topped the class. This was also true of the Road Hack Class. These were large size classes with 24 entries in one and 26 in the other. The Morgans were sure standouts in both events. The N.E.H.C. Class was won by Orcland

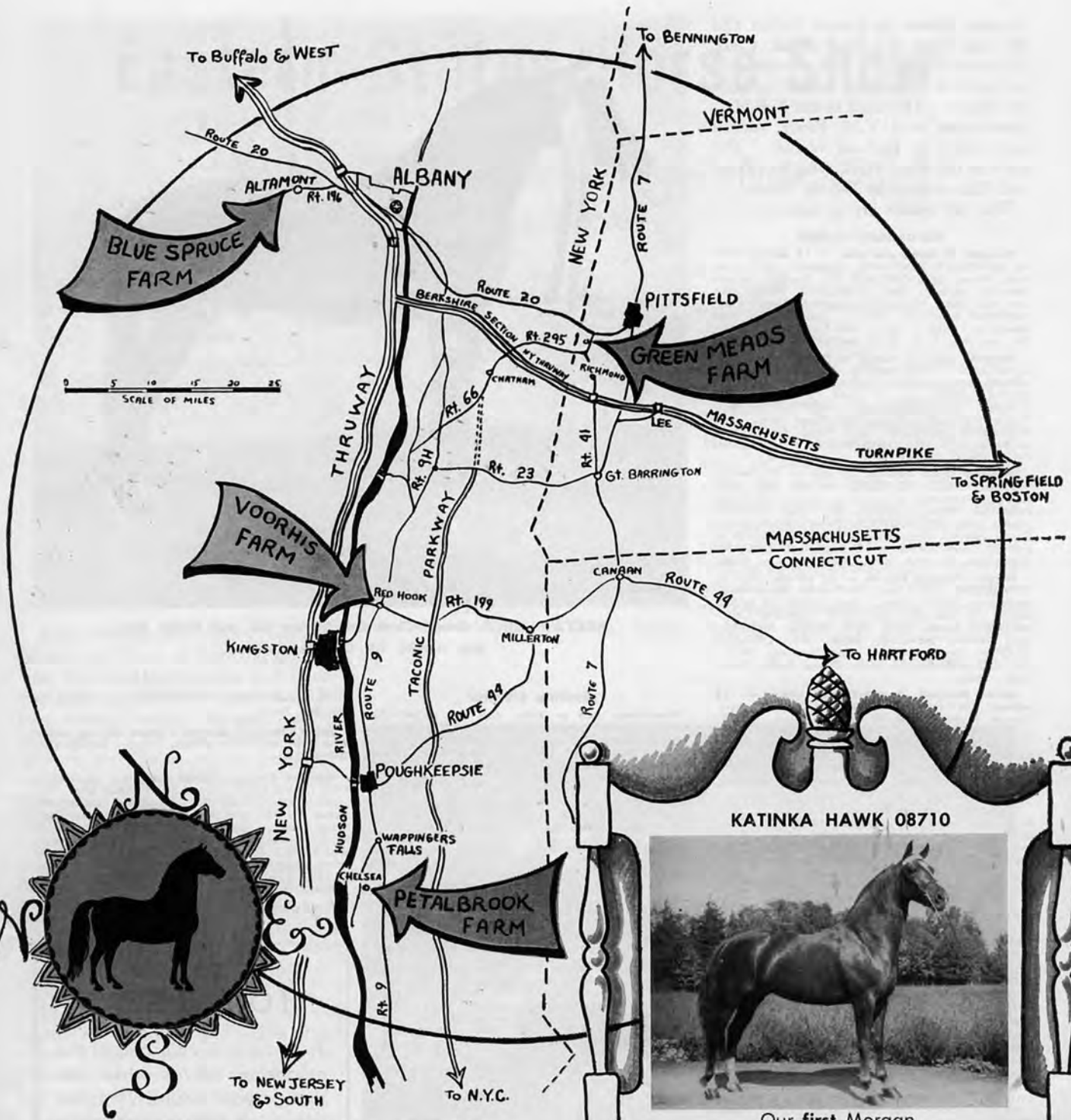

It's Weaning Season

Most foals are weaned at four to six months of age. Thus, foals born late this spring are ready for weaning now.

WEANING THE FOAL

Among good horsemen, weaning of the foal is more a matter of preparation than of absolute separation from the dam. And the simplicity with which it is accomplished depends very largely upon the thoroughness of the preparation.

Age of Weaning

When either the foal or the mare is not doing well, when the mare is used heavily, or when the dam was re-bred on the ninth day after foaling, it may be advisable to wean the foal comparatively early — say at two months of age. On the other hand, when both the mare and the foal seem to be doing well, when the mare is idle, when breeding has been delayed following foaling, or when it is desirable to develop the foal to the maximum, the weaning may very well be delayed until six months of age.

If by means of the creep or a separate grain box, the foal has become accustomed to the consumption of considerable grain and hay (about $\frac{3}{4}$ pound of grain per each 100 pounds live weight daily,) weaning will result in very little disturbance or set-back. Likewise, if the ration of the dam has been decreased (lessened by one-half) a few days before the separation, usually her udder will dry up with no difficulty.

Separation of Mare and Foal

When these preliminary precautions and preparations for weaning have been made, the separation should be accomplished. This should be complete and final with no opportunity for the foal to see, hear, or smell its dam again. Otherwise, all which has been gained up to this time will be lost, and it will be necessary to begin all over again.

Perhaps the best arrangement is to shut the foal in the stall to which it has been accustomed and to move the mare away to new quarters, making certain that all obstructions have first been removed so there is no possibility of injury to the foal while it is fretting over the separation.

After the weanlings have remained in the stable for a day or two and have quieted down, they should be turned out on pasture. Where a group of weanlings is involved, undue running and possible injury hazard may be minimized in this transition by the following procedure: First turn two or three of the least desirable animals out and let them tire themselves out, and then turn the rest of weanlings out and they will do very little running.

With a great number of foals, it is advisable to separate the sexes, and even to place some of the more timid ones to themselves. In all cases, it is best not to run the foals with older mares.

Drying-Up the Mare

Some successful horsemen use the following procedure in drying-up mares:

1. Rub an oil preparation (such as camphorated oil or a mixture of lard and spirits of camphor) on the bag, and take the mare from the foal and place her on less lush pasture or grass hay.

2. Examine the udder and place oil on it at intervals, but do not milk it out for five to seven days. It will fill up and get tight, but do not milk it out. At the end of five to seven days, when the bag is soft and flabby, milk out what little secretion remains (perhaps not more than a half a cup.)

Mechanical power has been sort of a Doctor Jeckyl and Mr. Hyde to horses. It caused the decline of the draft horse, but the rise of the light horse. Sounds confusing, doesn't it?

MECHANICAL POWER

Back in 1910, U. S. Department of Agriculture's Yearbook of Agriculture reported as follows:

He, (the horse) has been assailed by the bicycle, the electric street and suburban car, and the automobile; but all combined have not prevented horses from increasing in numbers and in value. (And get this.) As a source of farm power and as a substitute for human labor in combination with machines, the horse's economic place on the farm is more strongly established than ever before.

Of course, subsequent events proved how clouded U. S. D. A.'s 1910 crystal ball was: Horse numbers increased up to 1915, at which time there were a record number of 21,431,000 head. From that date forward, the relentless wheels of progress steadily lifted from the horse his role in agriculture and commerce; automobile, truck, and tractor numbers increased, while horse and mule numbers declined.

Ironical as it may seem, mechanization is responsible for the rise of light horses. Here's how: In the middle ages, the rich man rode a horse and the poor man walked. When I was a boy, the rich man rode in a horseless carriage and the poor man had a horse. Today, the rich man has a horse and the poor man has a car.

More Mechanization and Automation

More mechanization and further declines in work horse numbers appear inevitable. But automation and mechanization are making for a happier position for the cow pony and for horses used in recreation and sport. Among such developments are the following:

1. Hauling range cattle and sheep instead of trailing, primarily because of saving in labor and time.
2. Pelleted rations, which permit easier storage and mechanical feeding.
3. Mechanical manure disposal and lagoons.
4. Automatic watering devices.
5. Bulk handling rather than bagging, concentrates.
6. Telephones in the barn.

Other labor-saving methods now commonplace on many light horse establishments include: The use of salt as a governor of feed, in self-feeding a band of mares or a group of young-

Have you enough Applications on hand? If not, write to The Morgan Horse Club, Inc. office for the number you need, you will receive them promptly. Remember, there is an additional fee if an Application for Registration is received *postmarked* after December 31st of the foaling year of the animal to be registered.

Eligibility

Only the progeny of a sire and dam both of which are already registered in the American Morgan Horse Register will be accepted for registration.

No horse shall be eligible to registration which has a walle (lack of pigmentation on the iris) or natural white markings above the knee or hock except on the face.

No animal shall be eligible for registration which has passed the 3rd December 31, subsequent to the actual foaling date. That is: all animals must be registered by postmark on or before December 31st of their two year old year. All birthdays are computed on a January 1st basis in accordance with American Horse Shows Association Rules.

Identification of your Morgan

Your Morgan foal is identified by color and by white markings below the knee or hock and on the face. The following are the common genetically accepted colors:

Chestnut—never has black mane, tail or legs.

Bay—always has black mane, black tail and black on the legs below the knee or hock although there can also be white leg markings below the knee or hock.

Brown—look for the distinguishing brown or mealy hairs on the muzzle and flanks.

The white face and leg markings are to be described both in writing and by carefully sketching them on the simple drawings on the Application form. Just take the form with you to the barn or pasture and study the markings on your foal. Look at him face on and outline the markings on the full face diagram on the Application. Look at the left side of his face and sketch on the left side face diagrams the markings as they appear, then look at the right side and sketch on the right side face diagram the markings as they appear. It is easy then, by following the explanation printed on the Application form, to describe the face markings in writing.

Following this same procedure sketch the leg markings on each leg diagram, pose the foal in a similar manner as the diagrams are drawn so you can sketch the inside markings on the off legs at the same time you sketch the outside markings on the near legs. Likewise, sketch the inside markings on the near legs at the same time you sketch the outside markings on the off legs. Then describe these markings in writing.

Stallion, Mare or Gelding

Use the complete word, Stallion, Mare or Gelding, there is plenty of room. Because of confusion, do not use the letter "M" — this can mean either mare or male; please use stallion or gelding — "male" can mean either. Confusion will result if the short-cuts are used.

A Name for Your Foal

Some of the rules to keep in mind when naming your foal are as follows:

1. Duplicate names are not permitted — this is why you are asked to list three choices, probably one of the three will be available and your Registration Certificate will not be delayed for the lack of an acceptable name for your foal.

2. The total number of letters, spaces and punctuation marks must not exceed 20. An example is:

U P . D O W N F A R M ' S

3. Names misleading as to origin or relationship cannot be used. As an example, to use the name "Rob Morgan",

could readily mislead one to believe the animal was Bob Morgan 4549.

A Registered Prefix

If you decide on a Prefix to be used in naming your Morgans, you should contact The Morgan Horse Club, Inc.'s office to find out if the prefix is available. If you receive notification that it is available you may then reserve that prefix for your exclusive use in naming Morgans foaled your property. The fee to register a prefix is \$25. You cannot, however, register a prefix that someone else has used nor can you register a prefix that varies only slightly from an existing Registered Prefix. In the example used in the section "A Name for Your Foal," UP-DOWN is a Registered Prefix, should a request to register "Up 'n Down" be received, it would have to be denied. A listing of Registered Prefixes is published in The Morgan Horse Magazine (see April 1963 issue).

A Change of Name

It is desirable for a registered animal always to have the same name. The records maintained for the protection of your investment in a registered animal are not easily changed. To change the name of an animal with registered progeny requires that the record of each of the progeny also be changed. Two rules have been established on behalf of Morgan breeders, these are:

1. The name of a registered animal having the Registered Prefix of its breeder may not be changed.

2. The name of an animal already registered in the American Morgan Horse Register shall not be changed, except by action of the Board of Directors.

The registered name and number of all Morgans should be used in publicity and is required to be used for entry in American Horse Shows Association affiliated shows.

Signatures

The "Breeder" of an animal is the owner of the dam at the time of service.

Every Application for Registration must be executed with the personal signature of the owner of the dam at time of foaling, subsequent to which each and every transfer of ownership must be recorded with the Registrar of The Morgan Horse Club, Inc.

Now It's Done

Now that you have completed the Application for Registration for your foal, check it over carefully then send it with the correct fee (fee schedule is *(Continued on Page 66)*)

Three Morgans Participate in 17th Annual Vista Palomar Ride

As the cry of the trail boss is heard, 60 horsemen on the morning of June 21, 1963, put heels to their mounts and turned eastward where towers Palomar Mountain, home of the worlds mightiest telescope. Three registered Morgan horses were among the participating this year: Little Joe Morgan, an 8 year old gelding, owned and ridden by Frances Huling, who traveled from Sonoma, California some 600 miles north, and incidentally received the third place award in the Women's Division at the close of the ride; Gipsy Morgan, a 14 year old mare, owned by Wm. W. Matthews of Vista, and ridden by a local radiologist, Dr. John Miethke, who finished third in the Men's Division; and my mount, 18 year old Pretty Girl, owned by my dad, R. J. King of Vista, Calif. This is my first trail ride, although Pretty Girl who is 4 years my senior, has participated in several long distance trail rides. I have read articles in the Morgan Horse Magazine about owners exclaiming about the amazing condition of their Morgans at an advancing age, and this old girl is a fine example of Morgan longevity. I soon discovered that anywhere further back than several feet from the trail boss was an unpreferred position for Pretty Girl, as she could outwalk the best of them. All breeds were amply represented on this ride. Pretty Girl and I didn't win anything on this ride, except a lot of new-found friends, an exceptionally good time, and an experience I'll not soon forget. For those who are unacquainted with the annual Palomar Mountain Ride, a non-competitive ride, and the enjoyment of five days on horseback, I'd like to recite my experiences.

Our first day was spent riding from Vista through many hills and brush that was sometimes over our heads. There were many rocks and I was grateful that Pretty Girl was so sure-footed. We enjoyed many rest stops and the pop wagon was always amazingly there to serve a quick refreshment. I had been warned about drinking too much soda pop, so I waited until our night stop. When we got into camp, (a ranch located in Valley Center some 25 miles from Vista) our first concern was

for our horses, cooling them out, washing, cleaning, and brushing before their evening meal. For the riders, there was a reservoir by camp, and I thoroughly enjoyed my cooling swim in the water, getting rid of the trail dust (even if the reservoir did contain typical reservoir residue, fishes, etc.). Around 9:30 P.M. some retired, while the remainder attended a dance on the ranch. By 11:00 everyone had hit the sack, asleep or like myself, listening to the bull frogs noisy croak, accompanied by the symphony of the squeaking windmills.

We awoke to the wonderful smell of breakfast cooking. I might add that the food on this ride was the best I've ever eaten, and I told the cook so, too. The Palomar Riders have a wagon that accompanies the ride and the cooks and helpers really do a tremendous job. I found out that these terrific people have been donating their time for years for this purpose — to see that the riders are well fed, and such variety!

The second day our ascent was much in evidence. Instead of going up and around the hills we went directly over them, but it seemed much easier. As soon as we got off the hills, we traveled a flat for a few miles and then 8 miles straight up, called Niger Grade. We were very fortunate that the weather was fairly cool, as I don't believe some of the horses would have made it. I had been conditioning Pretty Girl for several weeks before the ride. Needless to say, I was grateful that I had both for myself and for Pretty Girl. We found ourselves three-fourths of the way up the mountain before lunch and traveled the rest of the way up to the State Park at Doane Valley by 4:30 p.m. This was our ultimate goal where we would camp until Monday morning. We found on top of the mountain ample tie-stalls for our horses. After dinner a huge fire in an open pit was prepared. Several hours later (11:00 p.m.) when the fire had burned down to dancing hot coals, three huge pans of beef were placed in the pit and covered with dirt to keep the warmth. Much singing around the fire accompanied this ceremony.

Sunday morning we awoke to a frosty wonderland. It was a chore to crawl from my warm sleeping bag to answer the nicker of my hungry companion. However, as the day unfolded, the sun came out and the warmth felt good. I took Pretty Girl for a short walk around the scenic State Park. Church services were held, for those who wished to attend. Around noon the camp was filled with many visitors who enjoyed the barbecue dinner along with the riders. In the evening, slides were shown of last year's Palomar Ride. A fine day of rest had been appreciated by both riders and horses.

Monday proved to be the scenic highlight of the trip, however, the hardest day for myself and Pretty Girl. We traveled 35 miles down the mountain on the Mission Trail, which is steep and rocky. Again I was grateful for my sure-footed mount. We arrived in camp near Pala about 5:00 p.m., and after caring for our horses, eating a hearty dinner of chicken, we gathered to have Kangaroo Court. This was a lot of fun.

Upon arising the following morning, the last day of our ride, I discovered my sleeping bag surrounded by poison oak, which I had neglected to notice in my blurry-eyed weariness of the preceding evening. At this writing, I am still itching and nursing this unexpected "award" from the ride.

The horses seemed to sense this was the last day of the ride and needed no urging from their riders. We rode into the club-house grounds in Vista early in the afternoon. The riders and horses quickly headed home, for a quick clean-up and back to the clubhouse to attend the annual awards banquet that night. Another outstanding meal was served, followed by presentation of performance awards. Many humorous awards for incidents that occurred on the ride were sprinkled among the presentations. It was evident by the glistening, smiling faces of the group, it had been a most enjoyable five day ride. The high spot of the evening was a standing ovation for 81 year old Bertha "Ma" Brown, when presented the award for the oldest participating rider (her 14th ride to the mountain).

Pretty Girl lost some weight on her 100 mile trek but took me up and back in good shape. I will always be grateful to her for such a rewarding experience.

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Ask The Doctor

Note: Dr. Cleveland operates the radium hut at Buffalo Raceway for treatment of lameness in horses.

Question—I understand that there is a doctor in New York State who uses radium in the treatment of lame horses. If you know who this is, could you ask him the following questions:

Question 1: Is radium dangerous either to the horse the operator or the owner?

Answer: There is no danger to the horse or operator when radium is used cautiously with the proper safeguards by trained persons. A horse can tolerate about 3000 roentgens (measure of radiation) and the operator can take 100 milliroentgens a week. The operator's dose is monitored by a badge-like apparatus which he wears, so that he knows when he reaches his limit. The application of radium to the horse is timed. There is no danger whatever to the owner.

Question 2—How is the radium applied?

Answer—Radium is applied in two ways. Normally six cylindrical rods containing the radium are slipped into pockets in a special boot made to fit the horse's leg. They are removed by the operator at the proper time. Radium may also be applied in the form of radon gas, which is captured in gold seeds. These seeds are then surgically implanted in the area to be treated. The seeds need not be timed since their effective period is limited.

Question 3—Does it burn the hide or hair, does it leave scars, or is it painful in any way?

Answer—Radium does not burn the hide or hair unless there is an overdose. It leaves no scars, and it is painless.

Question 4—Is it effective on bony growths, like splints or spavins?

Answer—Radium works to kill inflammatory action, to reverse inflammation. In case of a bone bruise, for instance, the splint will not appear for about 12

Brachears, who took top honors and later was named Champion Weanling. In second place it was J. Roy Brunk's petite filly, Dannete, with third to another dainty little one, Emerald's Lady Elite, entry of Emerald Acres Morgan Farm, and fourth to Hillview Susanne for Mr and Mrs. Warren Holmbraker.

After the weanling stallions were judged it was Senator Barr, who received the blue and later reserve champion weanling title for Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Greenwalt. Morgan Horse Versatility Show Draws Entries from Seven States

If there is a more versatile Morgan than Manito, he'll have a tough time convincing the crowd that attended the fourth Morgan Versatility Horse Show in Philadelphia.

The 14 year old chestnut stallion won three classes and placed in five others to amass the high point total in this equine event against a field of entries from seven states.

The Morgan Versatility Show is a unique event, specially designed to show the range of things that Morgans can do. Founded and managed by Miss Ethel Gardner the show offers a card of 13 events from which the entries may select as many as ten in which to compete. In each class entered, each horse receives a numerical point score or rating of its performance of the job at hand whether it wins a ribbon or not.

The selections were well-handled by Judge Al Brouillet of Athol, Mass. These scores are totalled to determine standings in the show's championship.

Manito opened the show with a first placing in the stock horse class. Immediately after that he was back under different tack to place second in English Pleasure. That was followed by another second place performance in the trail class.

After a short breather during the fine harness class which he did not enter, Manito was on the track with his rider in stable colors for the running race in which he placed fifth.

His next appearance gave him sixth place in stallions in hand. Passing up the saddle performance event, he was the winner when they called the results of the western pleasure class.

Having pretty well proved his ability under both English and western tack, he next showed the crowd what he could do in harness, placing fifth in the trotting race and winding up his placings with a blue ribbon in pleasure driving.

Shown in most of his classes by Ann Hopkins for her father William R. Hopkins of Green Village, N. J., Manito gained a second leg on the President's Championship Challenge Trophy which he also won in 1961.

Reserve Champion of the show was Richard Nelson's U. S. Panetz. His

score card for the day included first place in English Pleasure and in Work Harness; second in trotting race, pleasure driving, and walking race; and fourth place in running race and stallions in hand.

Seven ribbons also went to Orland Linda, owned by Mrs. Sandra Wooding of Jobstown, N. J. In gaining third place in final standings she accumulated second in stock horse; third in trail and western pleasure; fourth in mares in hand and walking race; fifth in English pleasure; and sixth in saddle performance.

Fourth in the championship went to Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Rodee's Don Quixote Pepper. He won the trail class; second in fine harness, geldings in hand, and western pleasure; and fifth in walking race.

With a total of eight ribbons to his credit, The Third Man was next on the list. Owned by Roger Etherington he was unplaced only once as he won the walking race and geldings in hand; third in running race; fourth in English pleasure, western pleasure and harness race; fifth in trail and jumping.

U. C. Hermes placed seventh for Dr. Eugene M. Holden of Amherst, Mass. Winner of the trotting race, he was also third in jumping and work harness; fourth in pleasure driving; fifth in stallions in hand; and sixth in western pleasure.

The other blue ribbons went to entries who chose to compete in a limited number of classes.

Kane's Spring Delight was undefeated in three trips to the ring. Owned by Camelot Farm of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., she won fine harness, saddle performance and mares in hand.

Her stable mate, Eve of Edhobe, won the running race and also took second in jumping, third in trotting race and mares in hand.

Ann Hopkins' April Surprise was the jumping winner and Hillcrest Acres Farm's Ran-Bunctious topped the field of stallions in hand.

Excellent facilities at the new Liberty Bell Trotting Track were the setting for

Miraculous is the word for the accomplishment of the Committee of British Columbia's first All-Morgan Horse Show (believed to be the first all-Morgan Show in Canada), headed by President Gerald Fahrni, his wife Helen, and Al Church, Secretary of the organization, ably assisted by Thelma Dudley, Show Secretary and a host of others.

The show was held at the Fahrni's Skyfield Farm, Abbotsford, B. C., on August 25th and proved to be a huge success as well as a delightful weekend for everyone. Because approximately half of the Morgans entered were from this section of the country, this reporter was asked by the B. C. Morgan Club to report the show and to express the Club's deep appreciation to everyone who participated and for all the wonderful help in making this a successful affair and one which will be long remembered.

Although the Morgan is not as well known in the B. C. area as other breeds, it is felt that this show with its fine publicity has been a definite step forward in promotion of the breed. The beautiful outdoor ring at Skyline Farm was completely surrounded with people lined several deep, all intent upon discovering the Morgan horse. Seventy-one Morgans were entered almost equally divided between Canada and

the United States. All these horses were stabled (mostly in box stalls) at Skyfield Farm and within a stone's throw of the excellent large outdoor ring.

From Canada, the Mills family traveled the farthest, coming from Calgary, approximately 650 miles; from the United States, the Charles Akes family set the record coming over 400 miles from Milton Freewater, Oregon.

The show was held on Sunday, but horses and owners started arriving early in the week and quite a few stayed for a Monday trail ride. A special dinner was held in Abbotsford, Saturday evening and an early breakfast preceded the show on Sunday.

It was very gratifying to see so many youngsters riding their own horses and the opening of the afternoon performance was impressive; Carlee McLean and Linda Dudley riding a matched pair of mares in English tack, preceded Merilee Fahrni driving Lady Margaret with the Lord Mayor of Morganville as passenger. They circled the ring and the Lord Mayor then read a proclamation opening the show.

After the dinner Saturday evening most exhibitors took time off from vacuuming, brushing, cleaning tack and all other last minute chores to join in the bonfire fun at the Farm. Mr. Fred Usher from Victoria, who did a very

fine job of announcing on Sunday, contributed his musical talents and with his guitar and large repertoire of every conceivable kind of song that did much toward inspiring even those who could not sing.

Dr. Elmer Searls, Extension Department of Washington State University, Puyallup, Washington, judged the show. When his duties as judge were over, Dr. Searls put on a Justin Morgan exhibition with his fine stallion Dyerberry Robin. This was something entirely new to most of the spectators and proved to be one of the highlights of the day - especially when the stone boat and occupants were dumped in the sawdust!

To encourage the breeding and showing of Morgans in Canada three special awards were given to Canadian horses. High standing mare in hand went to Ranchita Queen owned by the Gerald Fahrni family; award for the high standing stallion in hand was won by Mill's Pride owned by Mr. A. J. Mills; and Oradust, owned by the Gordon Dudleys, North Vancouver, was named high point Canadian Performance horse of the show.

Another successful New Mexico State Fair is the big news from the Land of Enchantment this month! Although entries in the Morgan Division were lighter than those of 1962, we had a good show. In the Performance classes he neglected to require the English Pleasure class to extend the trot, however, when reminded, our Pleasure Driving was worked in accordance with AHSA.

Two "old timers", the stallion Rex Linsley (age 11) and the mare Jubilee's Pastime (age 10) from the Byers' Windmere Farm took the top stallion and mare honors again this year, repeating their wins of 1962. Reed's mighty Gallant King repeated his wins of 1962 also, by again taking the blues in both Pleasure Driving and Roadster.

A newcomer to this area looked very sharp in the ring — he is the 3 year old chestnut gelding Longview Saber, purchased by Mrs. John Rawlings recently from Blue Spruce Farm. The Rawlings have just moved to New Mexico (and are our newest members) and also own the 6 year old pleasure mare, Green Meads Ladyfair (Ben Davis x Cover Girl). 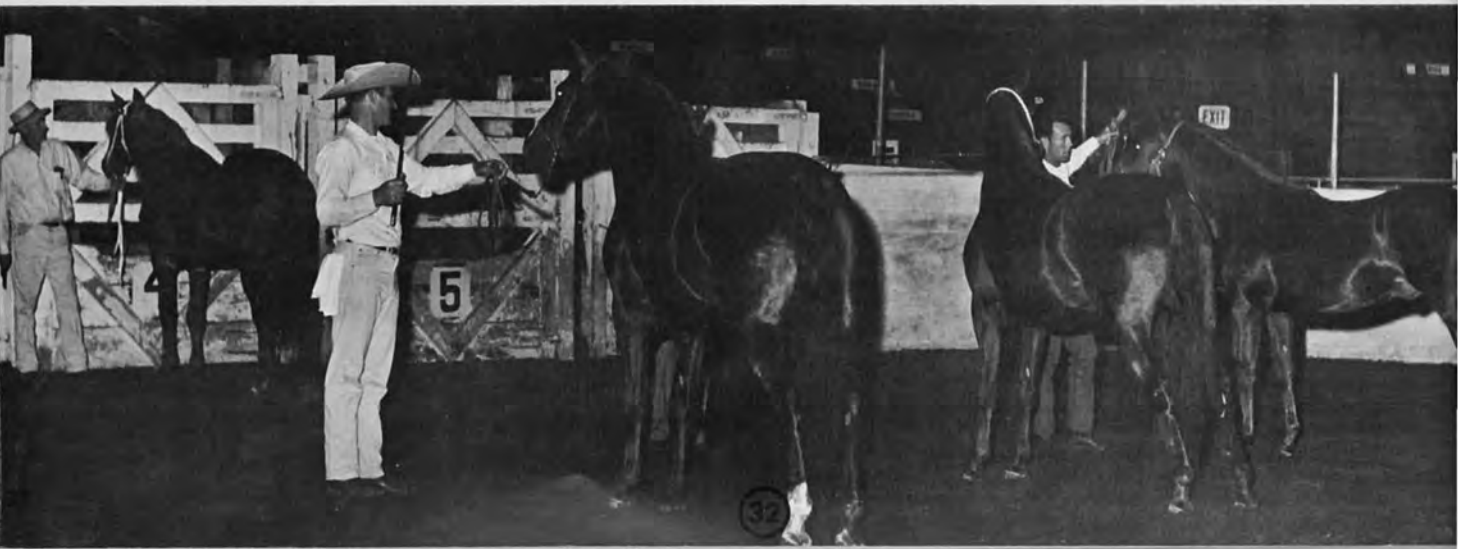

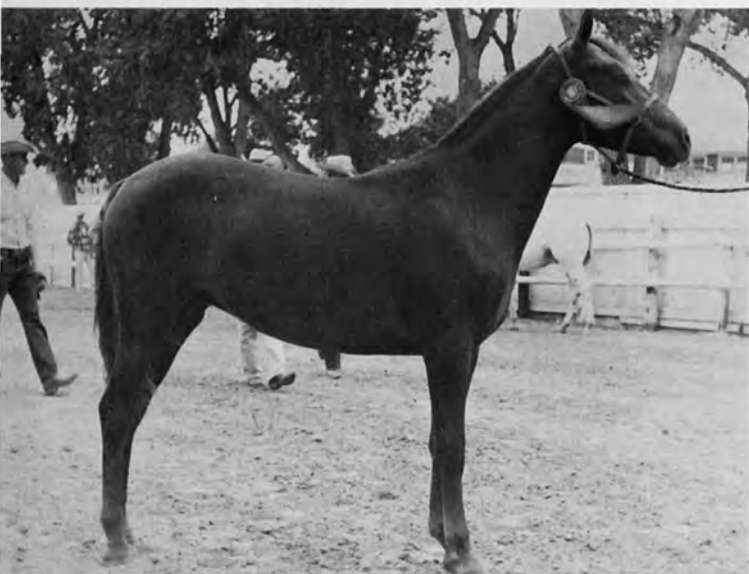

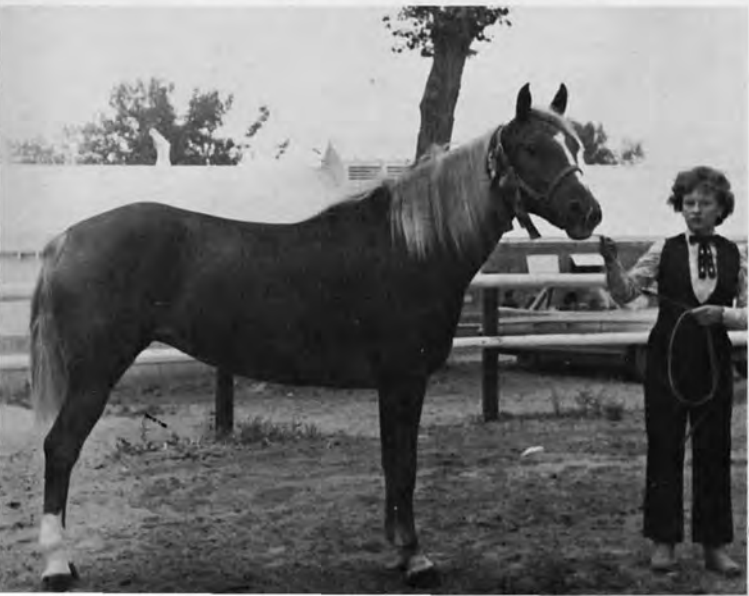

Morgans in Arizona

Well! We have started our Fall season off with a bang!

Our first meeting was on September 8th and was held at Jack Connolly's ranch out on the desert near Scottsdale. Jack who has a very fine training stable spent the entire morning with us and some of our horses going through a step-by-step rehearsal of the classes we'd entered in the Yavapai County Fair. The Curtis', the Hallways, Betty Gleason and her son, Jim all brought horses and the rest of us became rail-birds to watch and listen. Jack really worked the riders and handlers and if we didn't learn a good deal more than we'd known before, it isn't his fault. It was one of the best Clinic training sessions we'd ever had and the results showed the very next week-end at the Prescott show. Following all the work in the blazing hot sun we had our business meeting in the shady barn where we introduced our newest member family. Hugh and Pat Larmon drove all the way down from Prescott in the early morning hours to join our Association and to meet the members and member horses. The Larmons have just moved to Arizona from Florida and declare themselves delighted to find this such avid Morgan country. We, for our part, are more than just delighted to have Hugh and Pat with us — they are young, enthusiastic, and knowledgeable and plan to have their own Morgan very soon now.

The results of the Morgan classes at the Yavapai County Fair will follow at the end of this article but first we want to tell you all that the Morgans (16 of them!) just plain stole the show! Ours was the first Pleasure Driving class in the history of the fair and it just brought the audience to its feet. I'll bet that I'm not the only person here that lost their voice completely from cheering. The applause and the cheers followed the circling carts and horses around and around the arena during the entire class. And this was our first driving class at a show too! Sue Halliwell and Jane Curtis were the two women drivers and it's no exaggeration to say that they looked as completely relaxed and enjoying themselves as if

they were out in a park somewhere just driving for the sheer fun of it. The two men, Al Halliwell and Bud Templin looked smart and more than competent. The Morgans? Bob and Gert Bruns' Moro Hills Medallion, driven by Mr. Templin, had that "watch me" air every moment he was out there. Jane Curtis' Don-O-Don never for a moment looked as though driving was a comparatively new experience for him, he went faultless every step of the way. Sue Halliwell's Moonbird loves her work and shows it — she's a bright, sleek, happy Morgan when she's pulling Sue around the arena. Al Halliwell's coming 3 year old Apache is destined for the Roadster Class — she sure can show a lot of speed and Al is working very hard with her. Another highspot of the show was the Parade of Champions. Our Morgans were the last group to be called into the arena and of all the breeds, they were the only ones who entered at an animated trot and who came up to receive their ribbons as though the horses themselves knew they were receiving awards for being pretty special individuals. All through the show the ring announcer was enormously kind to us and mentioned the Morgans time and time again, calling the audience's attention to the Morgan beauty, manners, and amazing versatility.

The listing of the show results will give a name new to almost all of us. I beseech you all to remember the name and watch for it in the near future. Poco Ace of Spades. A magnificent animal with a story so fantastic it'll make you gasp, as it did us. Poco Ace of Spades, owned by Al Bells of Bradbury, Calif. and trained by Don McDaniels of La Puente, California, beautifully ridden by Mrs. McDaniels, is a seven year old coal-black stallion who was green-broke at the age of two and then turned out on the enormous ranges of Nevada to run with the mares as a breeding stallion. Less than 60 days ago — showtime, he was brought into the ranch and turned over to Don McDaniels for training. On September 14th, at the Prescott Show, he had been under saddle daily for 41 days and

was being ridden in English Pleasure classes, both Morgan and Open. Very typy, animated but with no nerves showing, proud of himself and alert to all the other horses and people and new surroundings and without a fidget or tremble in his whole make-up. Mr. Bells and the McDaniels considered this Prescott show as a try-out for Poco Ace of Spades and surely now they will continue the stallion's training and show him extensively. Incidentally, the "Poco" refers to the Spanish word meaning "little" and not in any way to another breed of famous "Poco" names.

I am raving a mite too much about our Morgans and this Prescott showing. I remember that 10 months ago the Morgan Horse Assn. of Arizona entered its very first competitive show here at our Arizona State Fair. I also remember that we had no pleasure driving class or equipment or drivers, or horses ready for driving. Three months ago we still had no pleasure driving class. That we had a Pleasure Driving class in the arena last weekend is due to a large extent to the spark-plugging and just plain hard work of the Halliwells of the Desert Morgan Ranch. The rest of us certainly caught fire in a big hurry and there's just no telling now how far we can go here in Arizona with our driving Morgans. There appears to be no limit. The public reaction was impressive to say the very least.

Mark Krumwiede spent the week-end just plain living at the show arena, taking photographs and because I've seen a little of Mark's work I am sure that you will find a series of pictures of the Arizona Morgans in a very soon-to-come issue of the Morgan Horse Magazine.

Our current big effort now is to get ready for our State Fair here in Phoenix in November. We're hoping our New Mexico friends will join us again, and we do hope some of the fine California and Colorado Morgans will come over too. How about you mid-westerners? You'd be warmly welcomed.

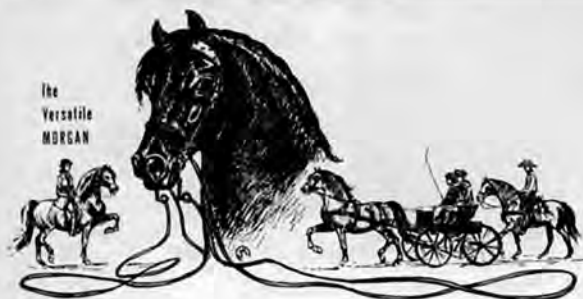

days. Radium applied early will prevent this formation. It is effective in the treatment of splints; it will help spavins, but sometimes will not cure, partly because the early stages of injury to the hock are often not recognized.

Radium is never used for muscle soreness.

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The animal should, however, be rested for some time after the lameness has disappeared.

Question 6—Is radium treatment expensive?

Answer—That depends. The cost of the complete series seldom runs over \$100.

GENERAL QUESTIONS

Question—What makes a pregnant mare act like a stallion? My mare has been bloodtested and found to be in foal, yet acts in all departments like a male animal.

Answer: This is probably hormone unbalance. In such a case the blood test for pregnancy is not reliable. She may, however, be in foal. She definitely does need help from your veterinarian.

Question: Is it possible for a mare with heaves to be bred and carry a foal successfully?

Answer—Yes. Do, however, use a suitable feed formula.

sters; slotted floors to alleviate bedding; lagoons for manure disposal; and the use of large hay racks to lessen frequency of hauling.

But this is not all. Some ingenious horsemen are now using closed circuit TV's, with a camera in the maternity stall. They sit at home and enjoy their favorite TV program, interrupted periodically as they switch to Channel X. Next they'll teach the mare to send out distress calls like, "Wilbur, my midwife, come help me."

COMMON STABLE VICES

As the name indicates, stable vices are those which are observed in confinement. Many of them originate with incompetent handling and lack of exercise; but once acquired they are difficult to cope with or to correct. The common ones are:

1. Bolting—Eating too fast; usually rectified by placing some baseball sized stones in the feed box.

2. Cribber—Biting or setting the teeth against the manger (or other object) and sucking in air; remedied by buckling a strap around the neck and compressing the larynx with discomfort.

3. Halter pulling—Pulling on the halter when tied.

4. Kicking — Striking with the hind feet without provocation.

5. Tail rubbing — Rubbing the tail against the side of the stall or other objects; rectified by installing a tail board.

6. Weaving — Rhythmical swaying back and forth while standing in the stall.

7. Other vices—Balking, rearing, shying, striking with the front feet, running away, and objection to harnessing, saddling and grooming.

FUNQUEST FARMS: If you would like to know the weight of a horse, and do not have access to scales, you can, by simple measurements and arithmetic estimate the weight to within an average accuracy of about three per cent of the actual weight. The procedure is as follows:

1. Measure the heart girth: in inches
2. Measure the sloping length of the body from the round of the buttocks to the point of the shoulder: in inches.
3. Multiply the heart girth by itself and this product by the sloping length of the body.
4. Divide the last obtained product by 300 and add 50 pounds.

Example:

Heart girth: 70 inches

Sloping length of body: 63 inches
