## DHEC says Lamar making 'really good progress' on water system

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At Lamar Town Council's Nov. 11 regular meeting, another update for the town's ongoing water and sewer issues produced more positive news.

Buck Graham with S.C. DHEC/Office of Rural Water spoke briefly on the matter, and noted that Lamar has made

steady progress toward repairing and reviving its water system.

"We've been working on the drinking water and wastewater projects over here, and I've got to be honest ... when we first started, I was very skeptical that we were going to make it," Graham said. "But through council's leadership, they've been making some really good

progress."

Graham observed that partnerships with Darlington County Water and Sewer Authority and engineering firm Davis & Brown have greatly aided the town's efforts.

Since DHEC put Lamar under a consent order in February 2016, the town has purchased its drinking water from DCWSA, but they are

working toward re-establishing the municipal water system by repairing water tanks, sinking a new well, replacing old water meters and rectifying long-standing problems with record-keeping.

Working with Davis & Brown, Lamar has used grant money from S.C. Department of Commerce and the Rural Infrastructure Authority to

replace key components of its wastewater processing system.

Greg McCutcheon with Davis & Brown and North American Construction added that a new wastewater chlorinator has been installed, and new aerators were in place and scheduled to go online later that week. Bids for a new effluent pump system are set to be opened on Nov. 21.

"We're progressing along. Things look well," said McCutcheon.

Graham advised city leaders to continue adjusting water/sewer rates as needed, assuring there are adequate funds to properly maintain the system as these new components age.

## New school gets familiar name: Cain Elementary

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The discussion took about a year. The decision took about a minute and a half.

With no debate, the Darlington County school board last week made it official: Darlington's new school, opening in fall 2020, will be called J.L. Cain Elementary School, and its mascot will be a tiger.

The Nov. 11 vote ended roughly a year-long, painstaking process of forming a committee, gathering suggested names for the new school, getting input from school district

employees, students and the public, and distributing ballots asking people to pick a favorite name.

Results were given to the board Oct. 14, and Cain was the overwhelming favorite.

Cain got 454 votes out of 958 valid ballots given to district officials. Location might have been a big factor in the public's vote: The new \$20 million school is being built next to the current Cain Elementary, named for black educator James Lawrence Cain.

Cain's current students will attend the new school, as will students at Brunson-Dargan Elementary. Brunson-Dargan was one of the options the public was given for the new school's name, but it only got 49 votes in the public balloting.

The new elementary schools being built in Hartsville and Lamar will follow a similar "pick the name" process, but school district spokeswoman Audrey Childers said it should go much faster with those schools now that the district has completed naming the Darlington school, which



served as a kind of trial run for the others.

A plaque at the current Cain Elementary School says

that the school was built in 1953 and was named for J.L. Cain (1870-1944), whom the plaque describes as a pioneer-

ing black educator and principal of Mayo School for 43 years.

The plaque says the school

was named after Cain "in recognition of his foresight, high idealism, unselfish devotion and leadership."



## City takes aim at more 'blighted' properties

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The city of Darlington has added approximately 40 properties to the city's list of vacant, "blighted/condemned" properties slated for demolition in fiscal 2019-20.

During a brief, half-hour City Council session Nov. 12, council approved the new list. The owners still can rescue their properties by bringing them up to city codes, officials said.

Out of 50 properties on the city's current demolition list, 33 have been razed; 12 were renovated by their owners and taken off the list.

In other business last week, council agreed to rezone - to "Basic Industrial" - 16.85 acres at Old Florence Highway, Avenue D and Friendship Street. The property, an empty field, was bought by Georgia-Pacific as part of the company's "Project Peach" development, which remains a mystery.

The land that council rezoned might be used for expanded parking or "potential future development." During last week's council meeting, a Darlington resident said he was worried that the rezoning could leave him with tractor-trailer trucks parked in front of his home. But Darlington city planner Lisa Chalian-Rock said Georgia-Pacific was willing to create a "buffer zone" to prevent that.

## Ex-Hartsville teacher called student 'ugly, fat, stupid,' state officials say

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A former music teacher at Washington Street Elementary School in Hartsville has been suspend-

ed from teaching for two years after a series of incidents, including one in which he allegedly called a student "ugly, fat and stupid."

Michael Eugene Berry, who worked for the

Darlington County School District from August 2017 through April 1, 2019, had his teaching certification suspended by the State Board of Education in an order dated Nov. 12. The state will not

allow Berry to teach again in S.C. public schools until November 2021, the order says.

Darlington's newest eatery - S.C. House of Wings - has made some big improvements since taking over the old Central Park location at 500 Pearl St. As part of their Incentive Improvement grant program, the Darlington Downtown Revitalization Association presented business owners Michael Scipio and Tony Marcus with a \$1,000 check to help defray the cost of new signage and building renovations.

"To date, we've given out \$9,000 as part of our Incentive Improvement program," said DDRA executive director Lisa Chalian-Rock, who noted that each time a business upgrades its property, there is a positive cascade effect throughout the community. "The impact of that investment is over \$175,000 in improvements that have been done in relation to this (grant) program, and that's not even counting the number of improvements people have made because they saw that somebody else was cleaning up, so they wanted to paint their business, too. That's really what we want, for small businesses to take pride in their property." Scipio said that future plans for S.C. House of Wings include a major build-out and an outdoor dining area where guests can enjoy their food with (pending city approval) beer and wine. 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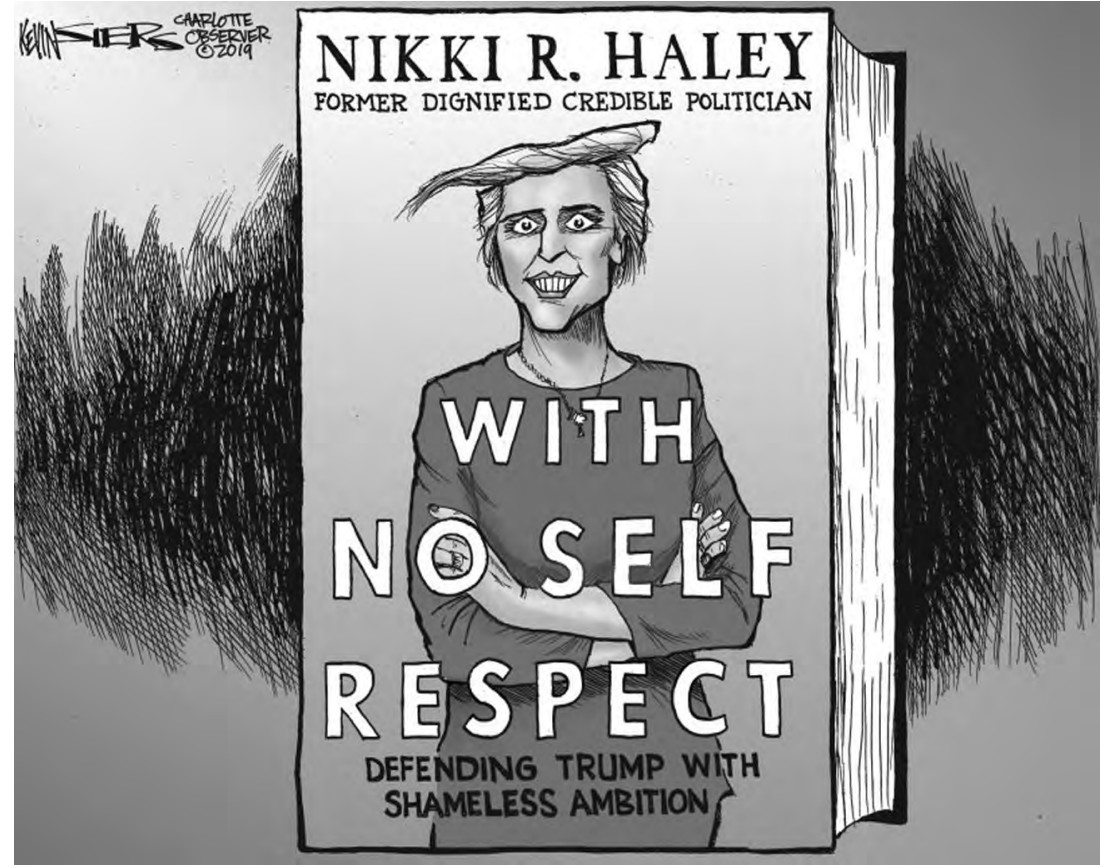
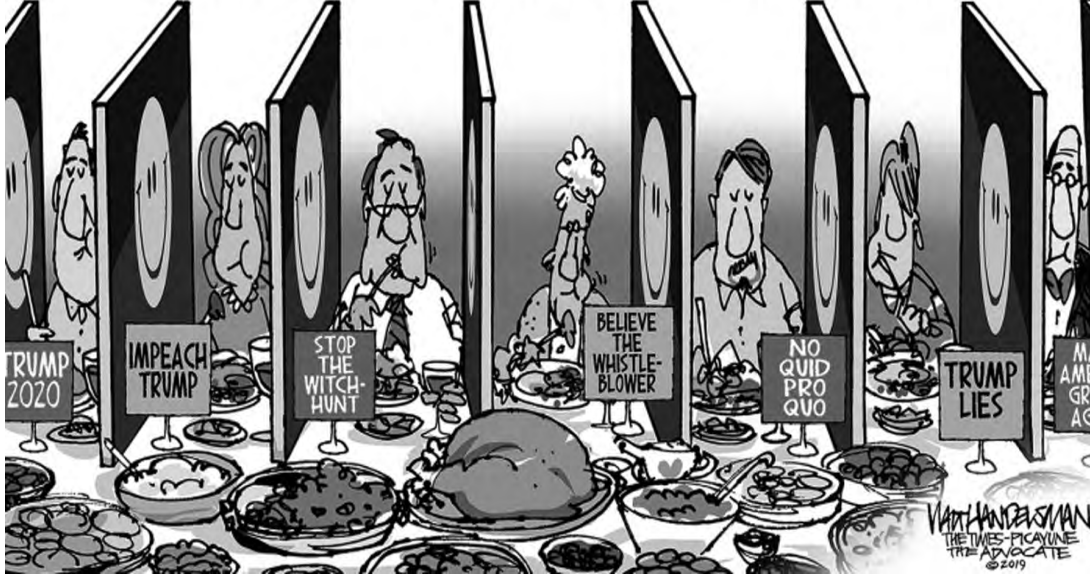

## McLeod doctors: 'If you vape, stop now'

As of Oct. 15, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has confirmed 33 deaths among 1,479 lung injuries. The cases span every state but Alaska and the District of Columbia, with numerous cases reported in South Carolina and North Carolina. Almost 80 percent of the cases of injury have occurred in patients under 35.  
What is causing this outbreak of injuries?  
For years now, e-cigarettes have been viewed as a safer alternative to smoking, and many of our patients are asking: Should I go back to smoking cigarettes?  
Here what we know so far, and what we advise.  
The latest figures tell us that vaping products that contain THC – the active ingredi-

ent from marijuana – particularly those obtained off the street, have played a major role in this outbreak. As such, we advise that vaping products with THC should be stopped.  
The FDA began regulating e-cigarettes in 2016 including the marketing of products to help people quit smoking. Since 2018 all e-cigarettes are labeled with the important warning that these products all contain nicotine – the same addictive chemical in tobacco.  
Most people would be surprised to know that the manufacturers often set the "dose" of nicotine in vaping products to levels that get hooked faster, sooner. For now, that just isn't enough data to support the claim that these vaping products are safe for long-term use.  
We know vaping can be an important off-ramp for tobacco smokers. We encourage adult vapers to speak with their physicians and to look for ways to wean off vaping. It is

common sense that the lungs are just too delicate and fragile to tolerate the repeated contact with the chemicals in e-cigarettes, when while the plume of vape looks so innocent.  
For our youth and young adults, we have crystal-clear advice: If you haven't vaped yet, don't, and if you do vape, stop now!  
For youth, vaping is the on-ramp to a lifetime of nicotine and smoking. One in three teens that vape will begin smoking cigarettes six months in.  
As we write this, almost 40 percent of high school seniors reported vaping in the preceding 12 months. Even more stunning than that, so have 20 percent of 8th-graders.  
Youth shouldn't have to tolerate this assault on their health. We know that they can't afford it, and our communities can't either. We all know what will come next for this generation of new smokers.

We don't yet have all the answers, but as physicians of the community, and for our community, we are taking a stand, now.  
We are going to look hard for the answers. We are going to work hard to effectively treat the smoking-related illnesses of our current patients. We are going to double-down on our efforts to inform our patients, friends and neighbors – and to prevent new health problems in our youth.

## The magic light bulb

All the kids got a stick so the gum fairy had a sense of fair play and lots of Juicy Fruit chewing gum fell from a hole in the bead board ceiling where that light hung. The sticks would sometimes hit the bulb, and bounce into our waiting hands.  
To this day I see the bright yellow, silver foil sticks tumbling in eastern Georgia light. Brenda remembers quarters falling from the light as well, though it might have been nickels. Money was scarce.  
I never knew who climbed into that attic, but I'll put my money on Uncle Carroll. He was lithe and small and could have easily slipped into the attic.  
The magic phrase we uttered was Uncle Carroll's cue to act. As for a supply of gum, that was no problem.  
Granddad Walker's country store with its penny candies and chewing gum was 20 yards away across the sandy front yard.  
Here's another story about a magical light bulb. Mom said that the first electric light came into the area caused quite a stir. Rural electrification was arriving and a neighbor had that miraculous, magical first light bulb.  
Folks would come from all over and sit and

stare at it so long they got pink eye. I can see that happening.  
The jump from kerosene lamp to light bulb was akin to the jump from horse to Model T.  
I'd have stared too. So would've you.  
Yes, there was a time when light bulbs seemed magical, but we're so spoiled and jaded today nothing thrills

us.  
Alexa answers our questions and turns lights on and off. Nothing seems magical, not even shiny new iPads and flatscreens, but I smile when I think of Uncle Carroll in that attic dropping coins and gum to my cousins and me. Having a bit of magic in our life? It made for a lifelong memory.

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# S.C. lawmakers paying for trips to Egypt, other countries with campaign funds

As many as 17 S.C. lawmakers traveled to Egypt last month, most of whom paid their way with campaign funds, State Ethics Commission records show.

Two legislators who used campaign money for the trip — Reps. Todd Rutherford, D-Richland, and John King, D-York — also tapped their campaign accounts for costs related to trips to Greece and Peru, respectively, according to their latest expense statements.

State ethics law bans elected officials from using campaign money for personal expenses. But the longstanding law has a huge loophole: It allows officials to use campaign funds for costs related to their “office,” not just their campaigns. And the law doesn’t define what constitutes office-related expenses.

In the 170-member General Assembly, the House and Senate Ethics committees, which are supposed to police lawmakers’ ethical conduct, have broadly interpreted the law over the years, which has allowed members to spend campaign money on overseas trips — so long as it served a general official purpose as recognized by the committees.

“I’ve always objected to the use of campaign money for any purpose except campaigns,” said longtime state government watchdog John Crangle, who made an unsuccessful bid last year for a state House seat, when contacted by The Nerve. “The idea that you could use campaign money for office-related expenses is something I thought opened the door to a lot of mischief.”

Crangle, the government relations director of the South Carolina Progressive Network, described the legislative trip to Egypt as a “vacation — that’s all it is.”

Three lawmakers who paid for Egypt trip expenses with campaign funds, according to Ethics Commission records — Rutherford, King and Rep. Heather Crawford, R-Horry — sit on the House Ethics Committee.

None returned phone messages from The Nerve seeking comment.

The committee in a 2017 written opinion said House members could participate in an “educational tour” that year in Israel using campaign funds, noting, “Since the Member is participating in this educational tour for legislative and economic development purposes in order to carry out the duties of the office he or she holds as a House member, the Committee finds that this would be a permissible use of the Member’s campaign funds.”

The Nerve in 2014 reported about a Holy Land trip taken that year by 11 House members and a senator. The Nerve’s latest review of State Ethics Commission records found that Egypt trip expenses paid this year with campaign funds totaled at least \$65,951 for 11 House members and two senators.

Two other lawmakers who traveled to Egypt — Sen. Margie Matthews, D-Colleton, and Rep. Seth Rose, D-Richland — told The Nerve they used personal funds to cover their expenses.

Reps. David Weeks, D-Sumter, and Adam Morgan, R-Greenville, also went on the trip, according to a fellow traveler and lawmakers’ social media accounts — though, as with Matthews and Rose, their campaign reports showed no trip expenses covered with campaign funds.

Weeks, the House Ethics Committee vice chairman, did not return a phone message seeking comment.

Other lawmakers who reported using campaign funds for Egypt trip expenses included: Reps. Alan Clemmons, R-Horry; Neal Collins, R-Pickens; Mike Forrester, R-Spartanburg; Laurie Funderburk, D-Kershaw; Rick Martin, R-Newberry; Brandon Newton, R-Lancaster; Russell Ott, D-Calhoun; and Chris Wooten, R-Lexington; and Sens. Gerald Malloy, D-Darlington; and Kent Williams, D-Marion, Ethics Commission records show.

Total individual campaign-fund amounts spent by the 13 lawmakers who specified Egypt

trip expenses ranged from \$3,600 to \$7,982, typically paid in June and July, according to records.

Contacted by The Nerve, Newton described Clemmons as the trip’s leader, noting the House Rules Committee chairman approached him earlier this year during the legislative session and told him he was “working on a delegation trip to Egypt” and asked if “I would be interested.”

“Of course, I was interested in the trip,” Newton said.

The December 2014 Holy Land trip also was led by Clemmons, as The Nerve reported then. Clemmons did not return a phone message seeking comment.

Besides \$5,300 in campaign funds paid to the “SC Mideast Delegation” and another collective \$85.76 that went to the “Embassy of Egypt,” Clemmons paid a total of \$12,771 in campaign funds to Delta Air from June 11 to Sept. 12 for unspecified “travel,” Ethics Commission records show.

Eleven other lawmakers also listed the “SC Mideast Delegation” as the vendor for the Egypt trip, according to records. Newton said he was told to mail his trip check to an address associated with that name, adding, “I’m sure (Clemmons) played a part in it since he was the leader.”

In other overseas legislative trips, Rutherford, the House minority leader, paid \$5,840 in campaign funds on Sept. 30 to American Express for a “Greece Legislative trip,” according to his latest quarterly campaign report with the State Ethics Commission. King’s latest campaign report shows he paid \$1,676 in campaign funds on Sept. 3 to Delta Airlines for a ticket for the “South Carolina Delegation Trip to Peru.”

No other details about those trips were listed in their Ethics Commission filings.

Besides lawmakers, Hugh Weathers, who heads the state Department of Agriculture, went on the Egypt trip from Oct. 7-13, meeting with the Egyptian president on Oct. 9 and also with the country’s agriculture minister and head of

Parliament, department spokeswoman Eva Moore said in an email to The Nerve.

The per-person cost of the trip was \$3,600, which covered “hotels, group meals, and travel within Egypt,” and Weathers’ flight cost was \$761 from England, where he was attending at the time a separate trade mission paid for by the British Embassy, Moore said.

Weathers’ wife accompanied him to Egypt, she said, noting the department would reimburse Weathers for his share of the trip costs.

Asked which lawmakers were with Weathers on the Egypt trip, Moore referred The Nerve to Clemmons, adding that “SCDA didn’t organize the trip.”

On their campaign expenditure statements, lawmakers gave various descriptions of the Egypt trip, including “Political, economic, cultural trip to Egypt,” “Economic development/trade mission,” “Trade Mission Trip,” and “Egypt Economic Development Trip.”

In an Oct. 2 column in The Newberry Observer, Rep. Martin said he would have the “honor of joining a delegation of South Carolina lawmakers” on the Egypt trip from Oct. 5-13, adding, “This trip will be a culture and commerce exchange, where we hope to bring Egyptian companies and manufacturers to South Carolina.”

Martin did not return a written message from The Nerve seeking comment.

Newton said his main purpose in traveling to Egypt was to meet with Egyptian president Abdel Fattah al-Sisi and other government and university officials to “talk about how we can build partnerships, both economically and academically.”

He said he spent most of his time in Cairo, the country’s capital, with a day trip to the Mediterranean port city of Alexandria where he and other lawmakers toured a soybean facility. He added the group had a “day to ourselves,” adding lawmakers “had to pay for it ourselves if we went anywhere.”

Newton confirmed he and other lawmakers visited Egypt’s

pyramids, noting it was “part of the tour of the government.”

As for increasing South Carolina soybean exports to Egypt, Newton said he knows “a lot of soybean farmers who sell to companies that in turn sell to Egypt,” though he couldn’t specifically identify any soybean farmers in his district involved in that trade.

South Carolina ranked 25th in the nation in 2018 in soybean production, while Egypt was fourth behind China, Mexico and the Netherlands in the value of U.S. whole soybean exports, according to the American Soybean Association.

Contacted by The Nerve, Rep. Ott, a cotton and corn farmer, said there could be “some agricultural commodities that are produced in South Carolina that ultimately make it to Egypt.” But he added, “You just don’t really ever know,” explaining that South Carolina soybeans that are sold typically are combined with soybeans produced elsewhere before being shipped overseas.

Still, Ott said there is a “possibility” that more soybeans and other agricultural products could be shipped out of the Charleston port, potentially making South Carolina “more competitive than our neighbors on the Gulf Coast.”

“At the end of the day, any time we can create more markets for our agricultural commodities, that benefits our farmers, and it’s going to benefit all our farmers,” he said.

In justifying his trip to Egypt, Ott said he comes from a “very rural district, and I represent a lot of farmers.”

“The bottom line is, it absolutely was in relation to my office,” he said. “There’s no reason I would have been over there if it were not for me being a member of the House of Representatives.”

“It’s just like any other business, where the ones that remain successful pass it along and fund what they need to do their projects with,” said Graham.

Mayor Darnell Byrd McPherson notified all present that the City of Darlington would no longer be able to handle building inspections for Lamar since Darlington’s Building and Codes director Alex Gainey recently took on additional duties as the city’s stormwater director.

McPherson said she has asked Darlington County administrator Charles Stewart if the county could carry out inspections for Lamar as they do for Society Hill. McPherson gave council members a schedule of inspection fees used by the county and suggested they study the information and be

prepared to vote at the next Town Council meeting on how to proceed.

Also at this meeting, council unanimously passed a measure approving Mayor Pro Tem Lang Howell as the second signatory (along with Mayor McPherson) on all of the town’s bank accounts.

Berry resigned from his job with the school district effective April 1 of this year, said school district spokeswoman Audrey Childers. As of last week, Berry’s official profile remained on Washington Street Elementary’s website archives. It says:

“Born and raised” in Darlington, Mike Berry is a product of Darlington County schools. Graduating from St. John’s High School in 1978, he attended Emmanuel College and Berry College, receiving a bachelor’s degree in 1982.

“Having played coronet and trumpet since 6th grade at St. John’s Elementary, Mike was a member of the S.C. Philharmonic Orchestra from 1987 to 1999 as well as an active freelance musician in the Palmetto State. He has also performed with orchestras in Chattanooga, Savannah and

Florence. Hobbies include photography, chess, golf, cycling and travel.”

The state board’s suspension order, posted on the agency’s website, breaks down the incidents involving Berry like this:

— On May 8, 2018, the state board issued a public reprimand on Berry’s teaching certificate for hitting a student’s desk and using profanity in his classroom. Childers said this punishment “dealt with conduct that allegedly took place in another school district.” Berry later told officials he didn’t lose his temper; he only wanted to get the students’ attention.

— In December 2018, the state board’s order says, Berry got an “internal reprimand” for his “improper handling” of two separate student disciplinary issues. These incidents apparently took place at the Hartsville school.

— In January 2019, the order says, Berry was reported for “insulting a student by call-

ing the student ugly, fat and stupid.” The State Board of Education’s order says Berry apologized to the student he insulted. This incident, the state board’s order indicates, happened in Hartsville.

At one meeting with school district officials — and it’s not clear when the meeting took place or which incident was being discussed — Berry “continued to express frustration with school staff he believed were coddling students,” the order says. “Mr. Berry also noted that

although he was reported to police several times in the past, criminal charges were never brought against him. He expressed his belief that others were taking the incident too seriously and believed no harm had been done.”

The board’s order gives no details about when or where Berry was “reported to police,” or what he was reported for.

Berry was allowed to resign from the Darlington County School District rather than be fired, the order says.

# RUSH Program at Florence-Darlington Technical College empowers students

The RUSH (Removing Underserved Student Hurdles) Program at Florence-Darlington Technical College (FDTC) helps its students succeed by tackling hurdles encountered inside as well as outside of the classroom.

The RUSH Program assists its students on their educational journey through free tutorial services, academic advisement, career counseling, job shadowing, a book/laptop loan program, workshops and much more.

It serves first-time freshmen enrolled in STEM and healthcare programs. An extension of the program, RUSH CTE, serves career and technical students and welcomes walk-ins for tutoring services.

When a student approaches the RUSH staff, he or she becomes a member of the family.

The staff tutors the students on classwork and helps them prepare for a life beyond college. RUSH regularly hosts workshops that help students create resumes, cover letters and learn how to dress and participate in a job interview.

"A lot of our students, especially on the CTE side, are not your traditional English and math students," said Ashley Prosser, RUSH CTE counselor. "That's typically not what their main need is. They're looking for how to market themselves in order to get a job. For our Welding students specifically, we came up with a career readiness series, and the first one was 'Resume and Cover Letter.' That was immediately relevant to them and to those fields."

The RUSH staff also helps its students tackle issues outside of the classroom that may be affecting their ability to concentrate on coursework. They help the student develop good practices that will help them not only be employable but stay employed. Students learn about time management and even have the opportunity to attend credit score seminars through the RUSH Program.

"Our students go through so much," said, RUSH Program Coordinator Andre Boyd. "We try to teach them how to respond to life. We teach them that you have to face it, but you don't have to accept life the way that it is. I think that all of us find ourselves in a place where we have a mindset of scarcity, because we have few limited resources, and we don't always think the way we should."

Students these days have a lot on their minds and have to deal with scenarios that are happening in their lives outside of the classroom, such as finding transporta-

tion to the college or solidifying a warm meal in-between class. Add those stresses to testing anxiety, and a full day at the college can be very overwhelming.

The RUSH staff tackles those issues by helping the students relax and mentally overcome the challenges in their lives.

"A lot of our students come in, and sometimes they're just stressed out," said Shelanda Deas, RUSH counselor. "We want them to relax and learn about different techniques that can help them in the long run."

A unique way students can relax is through virtual reality (VR) therapy. Today's young generation grew up on technology, playing video games and learning how to use mobile apps. Students can now be digitally immersed in a VR world, which helps them escape reality for a few moments. The VR applications can also be fun and educational.

"On the VR subject, that is particularly amazing because most students aren't exposed to it in their everyday lives, so they're super excited about it," said Mariah Spigner, RUSH ELA Coach. "We have the opportunity now that even when they're not necessarily playing with an educational app as such, we can still educate them on this is how VR works, and this is why it works. Even the fun is educational."

While RUSH offers an array of services to its students, the program does concentrate on STEM learning. Earlier this year, students placed machine learning and artificial intelligent bots on a Raspberry Pi, which is essentially a credit-card-sized computer that can plug into a monitor or TV. Students connected a camera to the Raspberry Pi and taught it to identify various details and objects in the room.

"With just connecting a camera, we could teach the computer to identify a phone, the color of the wall and anything else in the room," Boyd said. "It has the sophistication to program and teach itself. The students started exploring how the camera can detect emotions of a person, whether they are frustrated as opposed to being perplexed or frightened."

The Raspberry Pi project not only allowed the students to work with cutting-edge technology on an advanced level, but the actual language that communicated between the devices was actually written in the classroom. Students literally learned how to write code to solve an assignment.

"The students built it," said Boyd about the coding used in the classroom. "The students designed it and made it up. They didn't buy it, and they didn't download it."

The RUSH program prepares its students for the real world through the transferable skills developed in the classroom.

Students within the program are empowered and learn that the more knowledge they can obtain, the more marketable they will be upon graduation.

# Francis Marion University trustees extend Carter's contract

Fred Carter has served as Francis Marion University's president, and been the face of the growing university, for 20 years.

The FMU Board of Trustees is making sure he'll be around for a few more.

At last Thursday's regularly scheduled meeting, trustees voted unanimously to extend Carter's contract through the 2025-26 academic year.

They also named him FMU's first president emeritus, an honor that takes effect immediately.

Robert Lee, chair of FMU's Board of Trustees, said the extension and its logical follow up means "Fred Carter is staying here."

"This is where he belongs," said Lee. "The impact he's had on this place is really beyond words. He's just transformed it. We want him to stay here, he wants to stay here and it will be

a boon to FMU for him to be around for a long, long time to come. We're all just delighted this is happening."

Speaking of the president emeritus honor, Lee said, "That's something we wanted to do, an honor that speaks the deep respect the trustees, and indeed, the entire FMU community, has for Dr. Carter. What he's done for this university is just incredible."

Carter, who is both the longest-serving college president at FMU and in South Carolina, said the board's action was humbling.

"This is a magnanimous gesture on the part of chairman Lee and the board," said Carter. "(Mrs. Carter) Folly and I are deeply appreciative."

Carter's contract was extended three years. That will take him through the 2025-26 academic year. At that point, he'll have the option of returning to

the faculty and resuming his academic work.

Carter, who served on the faculty at the University of Central Florida and Western Kentucky, and chaired the Department of Political Science at the College of Charleston, is the author of five books on political science and government.

Carter's undergraduate degree is from the University of Central Florida. His graduate degrees (MPA and Ph.D.) are from the University of South Carolina.

He was an infantry officer in the Marines and later, the Marine Corps Reserve, retiring with the rank of colonel. He previously worked as a public administrator, served on the staff of two governors, and was director of the South Carolina Budget and Control Board.

Carter became FMU's fourth president in 1999.

# Men's health symposium to be held in Darlington

Darlington County First Steps and Macedonia Life Skills Center will host a free Men's Health Symposium to address health disparities in men of color and encourage men to prioritize their health Nov. 23 from 10 a.m.-noon.

According to the Department of Health and Environmental Control's South Carolina Central Registry (SCCR), the five leading causes of cancer deaths in African-American men were cancers of the lung, prostate, colorectum, pancreas and stomach between 2012-16.

SCCR also reported lung cancer was the leading cause of cancer death in African-American men, causing 51 percent more deaths than the sec-

ond leading cause of cancer death, prostate cancer.

Studies have shown social factors such as poverty, access to health care, lack of health insurance, doctor distrust, behavioral factors, psychological stress and genetic/biological factors contribute to health disparities. The symposium is intended to leave attendees with knowledge of available and local resources and an action plan to take charge of their health.

"If we don't educate ourselves, we lose. The more information people receive the more people benefit," said T.C. Sawyer, Board Chairman of Genesis Health Care Inc.

The Men's Health Symposium will be held at

Macedonia Life Skills Center in Darlington on 115 Exchange St. A panel discussion will be facilitated by Tre Gammage of Gammage Enterprise.

Panelists will be cancer survivors and representatives from Man2Man Fatherhood Initiative, Genesis Health Care and other community leaders. Light refreshments will be available.

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## Lamar crushes Ware Shoals in second round of 1A playoffs

It was a night of domination for the Lamar Silver Foxes this past Friday at home against the Ware Shoals Fighting Hornets.

After receiving a bye in the opening week, Lamar showed no signs of rust, crushing the Fighting Hornets 64-0, advancing the Silver Foxes to the third round of the 1A playoffs.

"We knew the opponent they are; we knew if we came out and played as well as we can play we would take care of business," Lamar head coach Chad Wilkes said. "You know I am really proud of that; I feel like we are actually building something. We are playing better every week, practicing better every week, which is where it starts. I feel good right now;

we are in a good position for this time of year, but it is going to get tougher for sure."

It was a complete mismatch from beginning to end. Lamar scored 24 points in the first quarter, 24 points in the second quarter, 8 in the third quarter and 8 in the fourth quarter. But it was not just the offense that dominated.

The defense was just as good and it may have been even better than the 64-point offensive output. While the shutout was impressive enough, even more impressive was the fact that the Silver Foxes never gave up a first down.

"The thing for me about this in this game is we started playing all of our backups in the second half so we are talking about freshmen who just came

up off of 'B' team who came in there and still didn't allow a first down so that bodes well for the future," Wilkes said.

Even when the starters went out and the reserves came in after halftime, the defense's intensity never let up.

"We knew our starters should perform that well, but for our backups and our young guys, our ninth graders, to come in and keep that level and keep getting turnovers and making plays, that's awesome, that's exciting for me," Wilkes said. "We were having a great time out there."

The game got out of hand so quickly that the referees instituted a running clock in the second quarter while also cutting the halftime, third and fourth quarters to just 10 minutes each from the normal 15

for halftime and 12 for each quarter.

After forcing Ware Shoals to a quick three and out to start the game, Lamar needed only three plays for quarterback Cam Galloway to rush in from 15 yards out. From there it was like clockwork for the Silver Foxes offense.

On the next offensive possession, Jiaquell James scored on a five-yard touchdown run, his first of two touchdowns in the game, to put the Silver Foxes up 16-0.

Ronnie Abson wrapped up the scoring in the first quarter with a two-yard touchdown run of his own to increase Lamar's lead to 24-0.

With the outcome of the game already obvious by the end of the first quarter, Lamar's offense kept the pedal to the

floor, scoring three more touchdowns, a 15-yard run, an 8-yard run and a 16-yard run to put the Silver Foxes up 48-0 by the end of the second quarter.

The second half did not have the point totals that the first half had, but it was not due to Lamar not being dominant.

The Silver Foxes were just as dominant in the second half as the first half and when looking at what they were playing with, it might even be more impressive.

Basically using an entire second string defense and offense, not to mention having a running clock and shortened quarters, Lamar's defense was still as stifling, keeping the Fighting Hornets' offense bottled up just as good as the first string did in the first half.

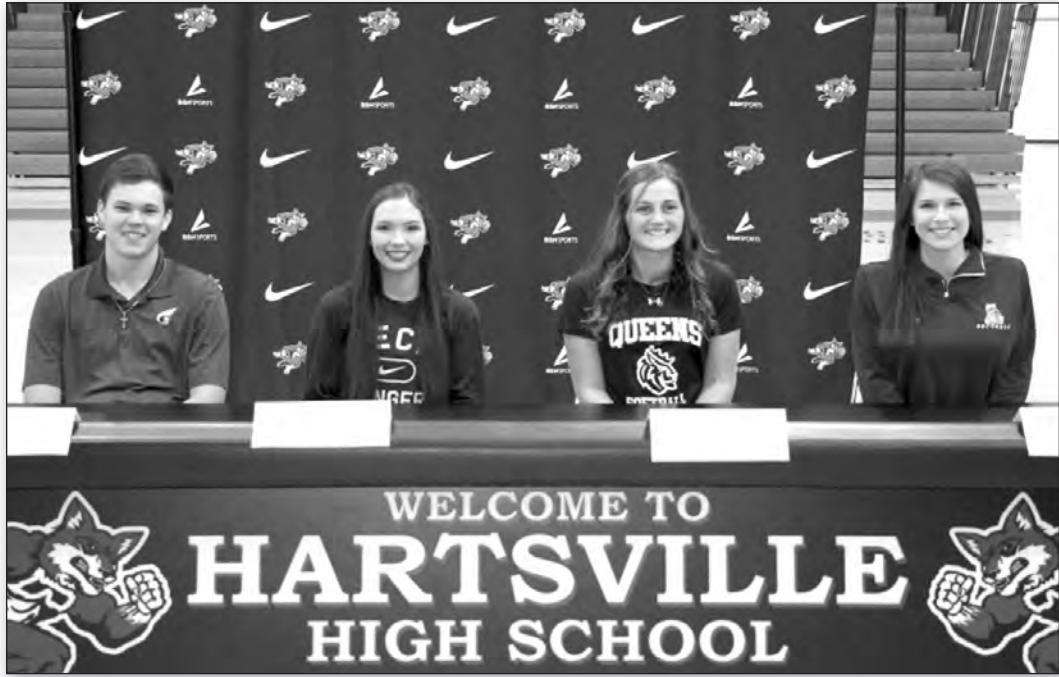
Lamar's Derrick Higgins

The STEAM bus, along with a GSSM instructor, will be traveling to elementary schools in the Hartsville and Darlington area during their pilot year.

Through their visit, elementary students will be able to explore and participate in hands-on activities related to science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics, upholding the learning of the state's science standards.

Students will have the



opportunity to partake in a variety of projects related to things such as engineering, chemistry, and electronics.

"It is an honor and privilege to be able to have the opportunity to bring standards-based, hands-on educational field trips to elementary students across the state at their schools through the GSSM STEAM bus. We are thrilled to be able to allow these students access and exposure to the exciting world of STEAM! The STEAM bus is not only aimed towards edu-

cating the younger generations, but it also aids teachers and schools across South Carolina to meet their curricular needs with support, content, and enthusiasm," said Gary Gabel, GSSM Director of Elementary Programs.

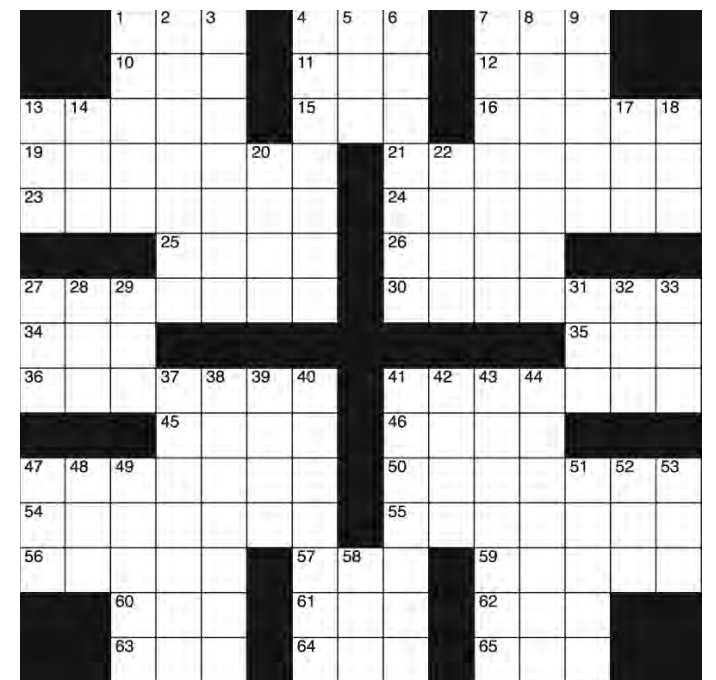

# Darlington Civil Air Patrol cadet honored

The Billy Mitchell Award, which marks the completion of Phase II of the Civil Air Patrol's four-phase cadet program, was recently presented to Cadet 2nd Lt. Trae Ann Proell of Darlington, the Cadet Commander of the Florence Composite Squadron, which meets at the Florence Airport.

The "Father of the Independent Air Force," Mitchell led an aerial bombing demonstration resulting in the sinking of the surplus German battleship Ostfriesland in 1921.

The Navy had said such a feat would be impossible, and the Army remained skeptical toward airpower. Mitchell continued his all-out public campaign for airpower, even facing court-martial for his persistence. He knew that in the new "aeronautical era," military airpower, operating independently of ground and sea forces, needed to be the first line of defense.

Not until World War II did the full U.S. military establish-

ment realize how right he was. After the Allied victory, and by a special act of Congress, Mitchell was posthumously awarded a gold medal. With Gen. Mitchell as their role model, cadet officers know that speaking truth to power is a moral duty.

The Mitchell Award marks completion of Phase II of the CAP Cadet Program, recognizing sustained excellence in all four areas of cadet life: leadership, aerospace, fitness and character. Further, Mitchell cadets must have passed comprehensive examinations on leadership and aerospace topics and have completed a week-long encampment immersing them in a challenging Core Values and STEM environment.

Mitchell cadets who enlist in the Air Force enter the service at the advanced grade of E-3, Airman First Class. Once a cadet earns the Mitchell Award, he or she becomes a cadet officer, is promoted to the grade of cadet second lieu-

tenant, and is challenged to lead and serve junior-ranking cadets, while continuing to develop into a "dynamic American and aerospace leader."

Proell has been a member of the Civil Air Patrol for three years, she has attended two Wing Encampments and served on the Logistics team at this past summer's encampment.

She has attended Non-Commissioned Officer Academy, Region Cadet Leadership School and MAR-Warrior Challenge.

She is a sophomore in high school, where she is a member of the National Honor Society and the Darlington High School girls' golf team. She is also active in her church, Cornerstone Baptist Church, where she is a youth leader in the children's department and has participated in two mission trips.

- 2 tsp butter melted
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup all purpose flour
- 3/4 cup pecans in pieces

**Instructions**

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- Grease a medium sized baking or casserole dish.
- In a large bowl, mix the grated sweet potatoes with the sugar, melted butter, eggs, milk, vanilla extract, and spices.
- Pour all of the above into a

greased baking dish.

Bake for 30 minutes. Remove from the oven, add the pecan topping, and continue to bake for an additional 30 minutes.

Serve warm.

**To make the pecan topping**

In a small bowl, mix together the flour, brown sugar, melted butter, and the pecan pieces.

Place the pecan topping on the sweet potato pudding after it has baked for 30 minutes.
