PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Beginning from humble roots, the PSS has grown into a Society that every pharmacist can be proud of. The vision, determination, toil and sacrifices made by all our predecessors and pharmacists who have come forward to serve have brought PSS to where it is today.

An e-book "Celebrating 110 Years of Dedication to Healthcare" was published to capture our history and achievements as a reference for our future generations. Besides PSS's milestones, the book also contained exclusive interviews with past presidents of PSS. This e-book is available online and complimentary to all on the PSS website and we hope you take some time to read it.

The 25th Singapore Pharmacy Congress not only celebrated PSS's 110th anniversary, but also 25 years of bringing the Singapore Pharmacy Congress to our pharmacists. The committee painstakingly crafted a rich and comprehensive programme, revolved around the theme "Pioneering Care for Tomorrow". The programme reflected the changing needs of healthcare in Singapore and call for pharmacists to take the lead as we pioneer care and initiatives to look beyond our profession and design patient centric, quality, efficient and affordable care for residents in Singapore. The committee also planned a walk down the hall of fame –an exhibition of past winners of the Professor Lucy Wan Outstanding Pharmacist of the Year Award.

The inaugural Mrs Tan Shook Fong-PSS Innovation and Scientific Research Award was presented at the Congress. This award was made possible by the generosity of Mrs Tan Shook Fong to encourage innovation in pharmacy practice and pharmaceutical sciences.

The Congress culminated with a very successful Gala Dinner titled "Past and the Future". The dinner brought all together to celebrate PSS's 110th anniversary, and all had fun with the exciting programme and a pharmacist Talent time, showcasing the musical talents of pharmacists.

The Pharmacy Week 2015 committee continued its strong momentum and pioneered a deprescribing initiative, consisting of a position statement and a deprescribing kit for healthcare professionals. Known for their creativity, the committee designed comic posters to educate the public on various medication-related issues and common conditions.

The Community Chapter launched the first chapter of the PSS Self-care Guide. This included didactic lectures as well as online pre and post assessments. This guide will consist of 14 modules, to equip pharmacists with the latest evidence-based guidelines in their area of work and provide a standard for uniformity of care.

The Hospital Chapter organised a very successful workshop, with the invitation of other healthcare colleagues to enable pharmacists to have better knowledge of other profession and related knowledge that can enable pharmacists to provide more all-rounded care for patients. PSS's second Special Interest Group, the Infectious Disease SIG was also launched. Three online case studies were also published and made complimentary to all PSS members.

The Industry Chapter continued to reach out to this diverse sector of pharmacists and held career and networking sessions which were highly subscribed.

The Young Pharmacists Chapter also organized many activities, including the annual sports day which aimed to bring pharmacists out of the office for a day of fun and exercise. The Chapter also conceptualized a series of financial literacy talks for pharmacists, and especially for young pharmacists who are starting out in their life.

The year has also been very busy for the Professional Education Committee. The Committee has continued to bring carefully crafted, high quality monthly CPEs to our members.

The above are some of the highlights of the year but there are many more activities I am not able to detail here. Please do take time to read this annual report, so that you can learn more about our activities and hopefully be part of us in the coming years. Other chapters, committees and PSS representation on national committees has continued to work relentlessly to carry on the work so as to progress our profession to greater heights.

I would like to thank the PSS Fellows and Mentors for all the advice and contribution; the PSS Council for their camaraderie, the late night meetings and deliberation to reach the best decision for the Society; all our volunteers who have contributed their time and effort in bringing us new programmes as well as sustaining existing ones; PSS secretariat for the excellent support to the Council and our members; pharmacy managers and head of department for responding to our calls for volunteers as well as continuous support for our programmes; and last but not least our members who are the reason for our existence.

Missions:

- 1. To influence professional practice of community pharmacists*
- 2. To improve health outcomes for our patients by increasing access to preventive care by community pharmacists in the management of minor ailments, as well as chronic conditions*
- 3. To increase the awareness of the public, government-linked agencies and other stakeholders that community pharmacists are important members of the healthcare system*

1. Community Pharmacy Health Champion Programme (CPHCP)

The Community Pharmacy Health Champion Programme (CPHCP), formerly known as Pharmacist Health Ambassador Programme (PHAP), was initiated in October 2006.

The programme serves to reach out to the masses and functions as a platform for pharmacists to share their knowledge to empower general public to cope with chronic ailments and/or help them undergo healthy lifestyle modifications. Such ailments range from minor conditions such as allergic rhinitis and eczema to more serious chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, diabetes and high blood cholesterol. Assisting the community in smoking cessation was also a major goal for the pharmacists in this programme.

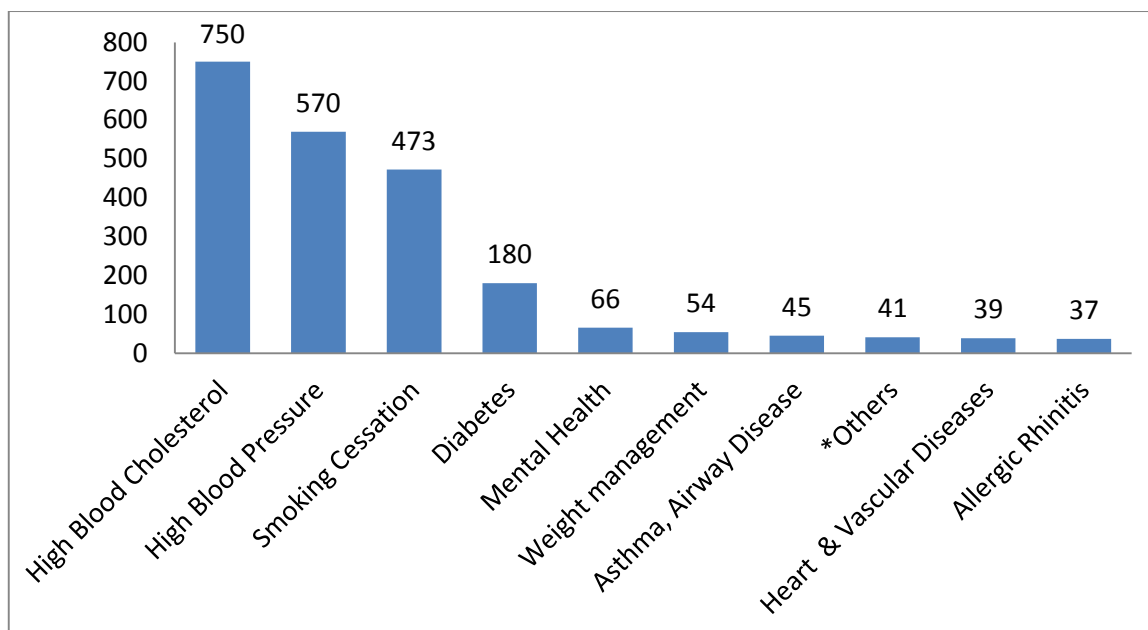


Figure 1. Incidence of patient follow-ups related to types of chronic diseases

*Others include GERD, gastric ulcers, eczema, stroke, epilepsy, weight management, osteoarthritis, osteoporosis, and migraine.

Since its launch, the programme continues to run successfully. From September 2014 to July 2015, a total of 36 community pharmacists participated in this programme. A total of 774 patients were counselled and 1381 follow-up reviews were rendered.

On top of that, 45.8% of all follow ups led to improved outcomes for patient while 32.9% of all patients followed up maintained good health. On a special note, out of all smoking cessation follow ups conducted, 87.5% resulted in positive outcomes (patient remain smoke free).

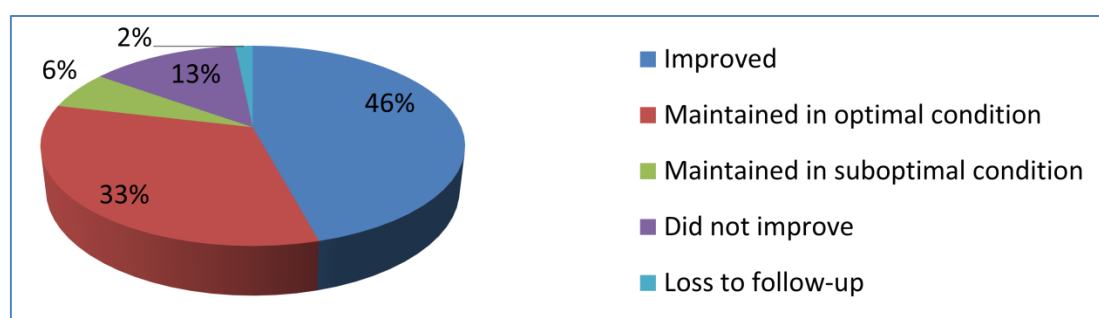


Figure 2. Patient-reported outcomes resulting from counselling by community pharmacists under CPHCP

Data collected demonstrated that the objectives of the programme were met. Firstly, community pharmacists proactively follow up patients' conditions and enhanced outreach efforts. More importantly, health counselling sessions conducted by community pharmacists resulted in patients achieving higher rates of healthy lifestyle adoption as well as improved patient outcomes.

To appreciate and encourage active participation of community pharmacists, the Top Ten Contributors for CPHCP were recognised during Gala Dinner, which was held on 12th Sep 2015 at Hotel Fort Canning, in conjunction with the 25th Singapore Pharmacy Congress.

Moving ahead, the community chapter will collaborate with NUS to gather feedback from community pharmacies on how to further improve this program. This project aims to revise the list of conditions – to focus on the most commonly seen conditions in the community setting, such as GERD, eczema and allergic rhinitis.

The documentation forms will also be enhanced to enable community pharmacists to clearly and efficiently record their findings. In the meantime, community pharmacists in Singapore will continue to provide this invaluable service to the public, enhancing the overall health of the residents of Singapore.

2. PSS Self Care Guide for Minor Ailments

Community pharmacists are the most accessible, well positioned and entrusted trained healthcare providers to the public. This important role requires pharmacists to be professionally competent and continuously updated.

In an effort to update pharmacists' knowledge and skills by providing a systematic, evidence-based and stepwise approach for managing minor ailments, the PSS Community Chapter spearheaded the development of guidelines on a series of topics. The topics will be bundled to form the **PSS Self Care Guide**.

The Community Chapter identified 14 topics to be covered in this first series. This project involves members from all community pharmacies – Guardian, Watson's, Unity, as well as

NHGP and Singhealth polyclinics. We hope this guide would serve as the foundation to further enhance clinical capability in community pharmacists.

The topics covered are:

- 1) Principles of Self Care
- 2) Weight Management
- 3) Understanding Allergic Rhinitis, Cough & Cold
- 4) GERD
- 5) Pain Management
- 6) Skin Conditions Part I (Eczema, Dandruff, Seborrheic Dermatitis)
- 7) Skin Conditions Part II (Fungal, Warts, Cold Sores, Acne)
- 8) Travel Medications (Malaria, Motion Sickness, Mountain Sickness)
- 9) Hair Loss
- 10) Smoking Cessation
- 11) Irritable Bowel Syndrome, Constipation, Diarrhea
- 12) Eye Care (Dry Eyes)
- 13) Wound Care
- 14) Vulvovaginal Candidiasis

It will be launched as a set of e-modules on PSS website and available to all members. Several topics will also be presented as PSS CPE talks. The first topic "Vulvovaginal Candidiasis (VVC)" was introduced on 19 Nov 2015 with a talk by Ms Helena Hor from Watson's and Dr Lim Kiat Wee from SGH. They shared about the facts, risks, symptoms and treatment of the condition, as well as case studies to aid greater understanding and application. About 80 pharmacists from various institutions attended the talk and the feedback was positive.

Other CPE talks on minor ailments covered by the guides will be held throughout 2016, with the full set of educational materials will be released after the Singapore Pharmacy Congress 2016.

3. New Members in PSS Community Chapter

From October 2015, the community chapter is honoured to welcome representatives from the National Healthcare Group Pharmacy (NHGP) and Singhealth Polyclinics (SHPC). We welcome Mr Anthony Yip Yew Fei (NHGP) and Ms Bandy Goh Qiu Ling (SHPC) as valued members of the PSS Community Chapter.

Representing two of the largest primary healthcare institutions in Singapore, their polyclinics are placed at the forefront of the community and the pharmacists share very similar responsibilities to community pharmacies. In addition to dispensing medications and providing advice on minor ailments, pharmacists also provide counselling and information to patients on drugs and other healthcare products in the pharmacy.

Hence, we are optimistic that this new support and the sharing of various ideas, knowledge and experiences, will further promote community pharmacists as an essential component of the healthcare system.

4. Reclassification of Medications

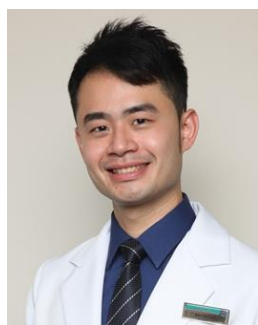
The chapter works closely with the Health Sciences Authority (HSA) in the reclassification of medicines. The main role of PSS is to produce patient information leaflets (PILs) for the reclassified medicines. These PILs are prepared by the Reclassification Education Support Subcommittee and are made available on the HSA website. Pharmacists are encouraged to provide these to the patients upon recommendation and dispensing of these P-only items.

Moving forward, PSS Community Chapter will continue to engage HSA to reclassify more prescription medicines which are appropriate for self-medication under the care and direction of the community pharmacists.

5. PSS “Shining Stars” – For Community Pharmacists

As part of our efforts to showcase our role models in community pharmacy, PSS has embarked on the “Shinning Stars” Project since 2013. This project aims to provide an up-close and personal interview with the pharmacists, giving us insights to what keeps their passion and desire to contribute to the community as a pharmacist. These role models serve to inspire the next generation of pharmacists and to recognize the good work they have done. With someone to look up to, community pharmacists will strive for excellence and scale greater heights as they seek to emulate these role models.

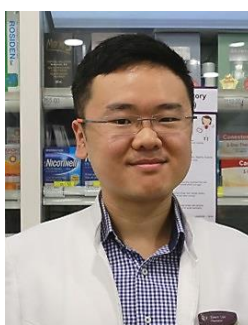

The community pharmacists have renewed their support for the national tobacco control programme (known as I Quit). The latest version of I Quit 28-Day Countdown programme was launched on the 30th May 2015 at West Coast Park, Jetty Lawn with a walkathon.

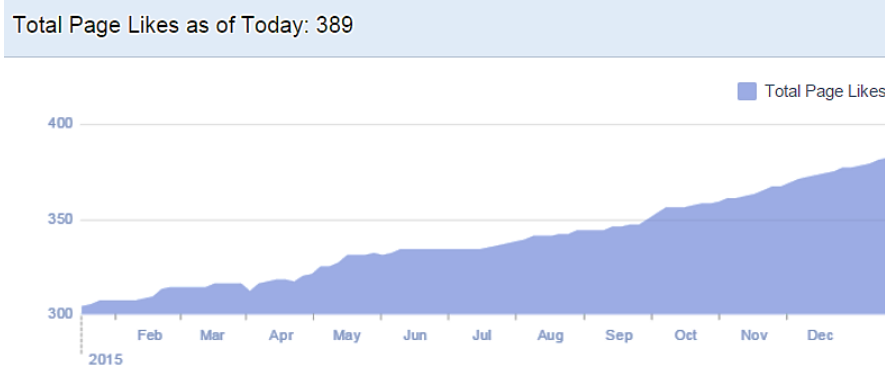
Community pharmacists from major retail chain pharmacies supported the event by providing smoking cessation counseling as well as signing up smokers to start their 28-day journey to become smoke free. In addition, the community pharmacists continue to provide an avenue for those on the countdown programme to track their progress via the smokerlyser tests and incentivize them based on the results input into the Heath Promotion Board system. Polyclinics also been contributed to the cause by providing smoking cessation services to the public.

7. PSS Community Chapter Facebook Page

The PSS Community Chapter Facebook Page was set up since 11 June 2013, with the aims to:

- Enhance communication with fellow community pharmacists
- Promote awareness of the value of community pharmacists

The year saw the hospital chapter continuing the efforts to support clinical education of hospital pharmacists and develop networks to link pharmacists from different institutions.

To enable pharmacists to keep up to date with changes in pharmacy practice, the hospital chapter preserved with their efforts to bring Pharmacist Letter (PL) updates to all members of PSS. To attract readers, we revamped the image of PL updates and started to feature both clinical articles related to hospital practice and also articles which are of interest to community pharmacists. Readership is on an increasing trend and we hope that more members will utilize this excellent resource to stay abreast with changes in the pharmacy landscape.



The hospital chapter also placed emphasis in developing good quality online case studies to help support continuous education of pharmacists. The chapter restructured the format of the case study and a total of three case studies were planned, in the area of pediatric asthma management, geriatric pharmacy and infectious disease. Two out of the three case studies are featured on the website, available at no charge for all PSS members. The final case study on infectious disease will be made available in the period of March-April 2016.

Inspiring future hospital pharmacists and showcasing mentors in the pharmacy profession is an ongoing activity of the hospital chapter. This year, a total of six pharmacists from the various hospitals around Singapore were nominated to be featured under “In the Spotlight”. The articles on the two outstanding pharmacists Dr. Jonathan Seah and Ms. Low Suat Fern have been published in our PSS website. Both interviews were well received by our members.



2015 also saw the launch of PSS Infectious Disease (ID) special interest group (SIG), with the sole aim to provide a means for quality educational programming, networking opportunities and opportunities for collaborative research. The very first ID SIG activity was a journal club held on the 22 September 2015 and a total of 57 participants from representing various institutions turned up for the event. We were



honoured to have 2 esteemed speakers who have a keen interest in infectious disease: Ms Lee Siok Ying from Khoo Teck Puat Hospital and Ms Sharmila Khumra from Austin Health Melbourne. The participants gave positive feedback about the event and the SIG plans to organize another Geriatric Workshop in 2016.

The annual PSS Pre-registration Pharmacists' Training Programme is a series of talks and discussions to equip pre-registration pharmacists with the necessary skills and knowledge to practice safely as pharmacists. The programme is organised by the PSS Pre-registration Pharmacist Training Subcommittee, a group of dedicated pre-registration training coordinators representing all certified training institutions in Singapore.

The training curriculum is designed to complement each training institution's training programme, in order to ensure that every pre-registration pharmacist is adequately trained to meet the Singapore Pharmacy Council (SPC) Competency Standards and to aid in the preparation for the SPC competency examination.

The programme aims to:

- Facilitate the application of academic knowledge to real-life practice;
- Emphasise the importance of adhering to the rules, regulations and principles governing safe medicine use, and code of ethics of a pharmacist;
- Co-ordinate the contributions of all training institutions to ensure the delivery of a well-rounded and comprehensive training;
- Promote the development of professional relationships and networking within and between individual pre-registration pharmacists, pharmacists, and other healthcare professionals;
- Articulate the myriad possibilities within the pharmacy profession that pre-registration pharmacists can pursue in terms of career and professional development.

We have a total of 179 pre-registration pharmacists this year, including foreign graduates seeking a Pharmacy career in Singapore. Proof of completion of the PSS Pre-registration Pharmacist Training Programme is required by SPC as a registration requirement.

Key Activities/Information given in FY2015/2016

- The Training Programme will run from 27 June 2015 to 19 March 2016. Training sessions were conducted approximately every two weeks. Invited speakers and facilitators were mostly pharmacists practising in both patient-care and non-patient care sectors (e.g. regulatory, research and sales) of the profession. Other healthcare professionals (e.g. physicians) were invited for selected sessions to complement pharmacists' teaching and to introduce interdisciplinary collaboration in their respective fields of working together.

- The Pre-registration Training Opening Ceremony on 27 June 2015 was jointly organized by Singapore Pharmacy Council (SPC) and PSS.
 - A/Prof Christine Teng (Immediate Past President, PSS) opened the session by giving the new batch of pre-registration pharmacists a better understanding of the expectations of the training programme.
 - Ms Felicia Ling (Executive Secretary, SPC) went through an overview of the pre-registration training programme and Ms Goh Lay Hong (Co-chair, SPC Board of Examiners) briefed them on the SPC competency standards and examination.
 - Ms Goh Zhining (Chairperson, Pre-registration Pharmacists Training Committee) briefed them on the training programme and advised on the rules and regulations of the training sessions.
 - Mr Wu Tuck Seng (President, SPC) closed the session with an inspiring talk on the way ahead for their careers as pharmacists.

WSQ CERTIFIED PHARMACY TECHNICIAN COURSE

The Certified Pharmacy Technician Course (CPTC) introduced more than 20 years ago has been training and upgrading generations of Pharmacy Technicians to fill the evolving and increasingly sophisticated pharmacy services landscape. As the core roles of pharmacists in health system transform from the supply or product-centric to be more service and patient-centric, so must the roles of the pharmacy support system and infra-structure; particularly the roles of Pharmacy Technicians who form the critical component of the support system in the overall pharmacy service delivery and operations.

Since 2007, PSS has transitioned from the brick and mortar CPTC curriculum initiated by a few pioneering hospital pharmacists during the public hospital restructuring era, into the competency-based scheme compliant with the national standard prescribed under Workforce Skills Qualifications (WSQ). The 17th intake of CPTC was run fully under the WSQ framework, with Workforce Development Agency (WDA) funding.

In 2015, CPTC enrolled a total of 26 new candidates and the 26th and 27th intakes were rolled out. We now provide some highlights of the graduation event of these cohorts. There were totally 26 candidates in these cohorts and they all passed the full assessment required in order to graduate. On 10-Dec-2015, a graduation ceremony was held to celebrate their achievement and also to present the CPTC Certificates to the candidates. Many of the graduates turned up with their spouse, children, relatives or friends. There was such an atmosphere of joy, sense of achievement and reasons for celebration as they have each spent over 10 months of their evenings learning and upgrading their knowledge and skills. The celebratory occasion was further boosted with the presence of their managers, trainers and colleagues. The ceremony was graced by the PSS President – Ms Miko Thum.

Pharmacy Week 2015 committee's executive plan was to set up the path for a 3-year plan targeting inappropriate polypharmacy. It continued the main theme of "Just Ask" but added three subthemes: "Know Your Medicines, Own Your Health, Befriend Your Pharmacist" with the intent of using one for each of the subsequent years.

The committee worked on two main thrusts: a public outreach and a healthcare professional outreach in the pitch to educate all the possible contributors to polypharmacy. The committee was broken up into 4 main subcommittees:

- Inter-Professional Education
- Public Education
- Publicity & Communications and
- Sponsorship

Interprofessional Education

Polypharmacy is an increasingly prevalent issue as our population ages. We aimed to raise awareness of deprescribing as a means to combat polypharmacy among fellow healthcare professionals including pharmacists, doctors and nurses. Deprescribing is a systematic process of identifying and reducing doses of or discontinuing drugs where existing or potential harms outweigh existing or potential benefits.

The proton pump inhibitors were selected as the first drug class to be deprescribed based on the usage patterns which costs the healthcare system an estimated S\$19 million in 2014 and an estimated cost savings of S\$5 million if deprescribed.

A position statement on the role of deprescribing in polypharmacy in Singapore, endorsed by the Society of Geriatric Medicine, Singapore, the Singapore Nurses Association, and the Association of Diabetic Educators (Singapore) and a deprescribing educational kit inclusive of a slide set, a poster, and a pocket card was developed. The kits utilize a QR code technology for ease of search and download of the pocket card and the statement which are on the PSS website. Pharmacists and doctors (wherever possible) was identified at various institutions to serve as a change agent to promote deprescribing using the educational kit. For example, the National University Hospital organised a deprescribing forum for interested healthcare professionals.

Finally, a Deprescribing pre-congress workshop was held in conjunction with Singapore Pharmacy Congress 2015 which Professor Ian Scott and Dr. Doreen Tan facilitated. The 130-participant workshop included identified change agents – pharmacists, doctors and advanced practice nurses from all over Singapore. We were encouraged to find that the majority of the participant would implement deprescribing, and would recommend their colleagues to deprescribe at their areas of practice. The 2016 committee will follow up on the seeds which have been sowed.

Public Education & the Health and Medication Awareness Carnival (HMAC)

The second prong approach took the form of a health carnival targeting the lay public. We aimed to educate the public on their health and medications through interactive games, health talks and posters. Mr Lim Swee Say was our Guest of Honour at the event.

HMAC rode on the Bedok Community Center monthly big walk crowd. PSS & the CC jointly publicized to the neighbouring Eastern estates. HMAC boasts of a great family day complete with learning and medication review and reconciliation (Med R&R). For the patients who turned up without medications, we furnished them with medication reconciliation vouchers that could be used at the neighbouring community partners Guardian®, Watson® and Unity®. The carnival consisted of interactive games designed by National University of Singapore Pharmaceutical Society (NUSPS) students, based on our theme and the poster topics. These games served to teach the participants through fun, they also offer opportunities for our students to hone their communication skills with the lay public.

There were two health talks centering around the concept of polypharmacy, eating healthily and use of vitamins and supplements conducted in English, Mandarin and Malay. A lively Q&A hosted by our very own emcee of the day, and attractive prizes including supplements, skin care products, and home monitoring devices like glucometer ensured an enthusiastic crowd which strove hard to answer the questions correctly. Judging from the response and the type of questions the public asked, it is evident that they have brought home valuable knowledge on owning their health and knowing their medicine.

Straddled among the six poster standees, we planted opportunistic counsellor pharmacists. They talked through topics such as appropriate use of gastric protectants, the anatomy of medication labels and packaging including how to determine the dose, frequency, drug name and expiry date of the medications, essential knowledge to maintain their medicine list true to the theme of “owning their health, and knowing their medicine”. The event saw a total of over 100 volunteers comprising pharmacists, pre-registration pharmacists, pharmacy and polytechnic students.

The dedication, cooperation and collaboration with the equally driven Bedok CC team were the ingredients that made HMAc an absolute success. The first HMAc was truly amazing and will be a stepping-stone to better future “HMAc”s.



Pharmacy Week 2015: Publicity Sub-committee Report

The publicity sub-committee refreshed the 2012 logo with a new look. Appended with the tag lines: “Just Ask - Own Your Health, Know Your Medicines, Befriend your pharmacist”, we ensure that the brand can be continued and perpetuated.

The very first Singapore Pharmacy Week 2015 Facebook page was created and garnered to total of 466 likes by the end of HMAc. All collaterals, infographics and posters were posted on Facebook phasally leading up towards Pharmacy Week. Whenever the user clicks on the post, it will link to the “Justask” page (www.pss.org.sg/justask) where all the files were hosted. The infographic flyer which we created boasts of cutesy caricatures bearing the six messages to our public. Though the initial conception of design and choice of messages to use was subjected to countless bouncing back and forth from council to the main committee, the end product was beautiful. This flyer now graces the banner of the PW.15 facebook page and made it around facebook with numerous “like”s.

“Justask” page had a total of 294 views with an average of 1 minute on page. We have yet to complete realize the power of social media branding and we believe that more can be done to promote the page. It is best to consult a Social Media Marketing expert to set publicity strategy early, allocate budget for boosting and promoting posts to targeted audience and to explore other social media platforms like Instagram or Tumblr. The current PSS website should be configured to the more mobile-reader friendly one. We propose the formation of an Editorial Sub Committee to write-up topics that are educational and appealing to the public.

The other collaterals which with the Publicity Sub-committee supported include the designs of the all HMAc banners, flyers, vouchers, pocket cards, T-shirt and presentation slides. We served as the point of contact with PSS and supported the Inter-professional Education sub-committee by uploading all de-prescribing materials to website. The subcommittee was the conduit for feedback and review by the various Corporate Communications of all the hospitals.

One learning point which could be improved upon includes strengthening of the media language and a focal point for the media to “take”.

In 2015, the Young Pharmacists Chapter (YPC) has decided to focus on the areas of social networking, skills development and outreach. These were decided with the hope of creating opportunities for the young pharmacists to not only grow in their career but also pick up some important life skills.

As part of the chapter's aim, YPC has embarked on several projects. Under the umbrella of social networking, there were the Taiwan-Singapore Exchange Program, Annual Sports Day, Asian Young Pharmacist Group (AYPG) Leadership Forum 2015 and the upcoming Annual Appreciation dinner. In terms of skills development, we are planning for the inaugural financial literacy workshop tailored for our young pharmacists. They visited the Taipei Veterans General Hospital and were given the option to visit either an independent pharmacy or a chain pharmacy in Taiwan. Breaking from the norm of a chain pharmacy in Singapore, YPC opted for the independent pharmacy. Through this pilot project, there were sharing of practices and ideas by pharmacists from both countries. YPC hopes that with this will help our pharmacists to broaden their network and adapt bright ideas shared and experiences into practices in Singapore.

Extending the social networking aspect within Singapore, the YPC has once again organised its annual Sports Day in August. This year there were four participating teams from Watsons, Guardian, the PSS Council and YPC. Each team fought out under the hot sun at National University of Singapore (NUS) sports field for the Captain Ball championship. The council put up a good fight against the young to secure the top position. The second and third positions were Watsons and Guardian respectively. The top three teams walked away with bags filled with prizes and vouchers. To spice up the event, there were drinks and fruits provided to quench the thirst of everyone. This collaboration effort will offer both chapters an opportunity to mingle, reach out and thank all the pharmacists who have contributed to the pharmaceutical society in one way or another. Breaking away from the tradition of having it in December, it was being held on 22nd January 2016, to kick off the new year.

In the area of skills development, the YPC has decided to focus on financial literacy specially catered to young pharmacists. Pharmaceutical Society of Singapore (PSS) successfully organised its annual congress, 25th Singapore Pharmacy Congress on 12th -13th September 2015 at Grand Copthorne Waterfront Hotel. Year 2015 was a momentous year as it marked the 110th founding anniversary for PSS and Department of Pharmacy, National University of Singapore. Henceforth, both organisations collaborated to organise the congress to commemorate this important milestone. The collaboration also aimed to rekindle and foster stronger ties between the academics and practitioners so as to achieve greater success in pushing the frontiers of pharmacy practice and pharmaceutical services further.



The theme of the congress was “Pioneering Care for Tomorrow”. It was chosen to demonstrate the commitment of the practitioners and scientists in bringing the best and latest evidence-based care to the patients in the not so distant future. Associate Professor Benjamin Ong, Director of Medical Services (DMS) was our Guest-of-Honour and in his speech, he advised us that effective care delivery will require a team-based approach. To enable teamwork, coupled with innovation, will require shifts in the roles of pharmacists in order for the profession to proactively contribute to improve care and to meet patients’ needs.



The congress was a resounding success with about 800 participants, from both local and regional areas such as Hong Kong, Indonesia attended the congress. Apart from the 2 days main congress, there was also high turnout in our pre-congress workshops (4 off site and 2 on site), which spanned across 10th – 11th September despite clashing with the polling day.

During the opening ceremony, three awards were presented. The LF Asia-PSS Community Pharmacist of the Year Award was presented to Ms Chung Wing Lam and the PSS Student Overseas Enrichment Award was presented to Mr Soon Yu Ming. Through the generous support of Ms Tan Shook Fong, former Chief Pharmacist and Fellow of PSS, we also presented the inaugural Mrs Tan Shook Fong-PSS Innovation and Scientific Research Award at this congress, to the HSA Pharmacogenetics Team.



We were honoured to have 2 keynote speakers and many interesting plenary speakers for this year congress. Dr Helen J Taylor delivered a lecture on “Pioneering Integrated Care – Bridging the Gaps in Patient Care” which provides insights on how pharmacy profession could venture to integrate care for better patient care. Professor Ka-Kit Hui on other hand delivered a fresh perspective lecture on “The Important Role of Integrative Medicine in the Global Arena – an internist and Clinical Pharmacologist’s Perspective”. He talked about the potential of medical advances when combining Traditional Chinese Medicine and Modern Western Medicine.



At the congress we put up 2 types of exhibitions, firstly a collation of innovative projects submitted by various pharmacies with intention to spread the good work done by various pharmacies. The second one was a showcase of Past year winners of the Prof Lucy Wan Outstanding Pharmacists of the Year award with their inspiring advices, with intention to motivate the young ones as well as to re-affirm their outstanding achievement.

PSS 110TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

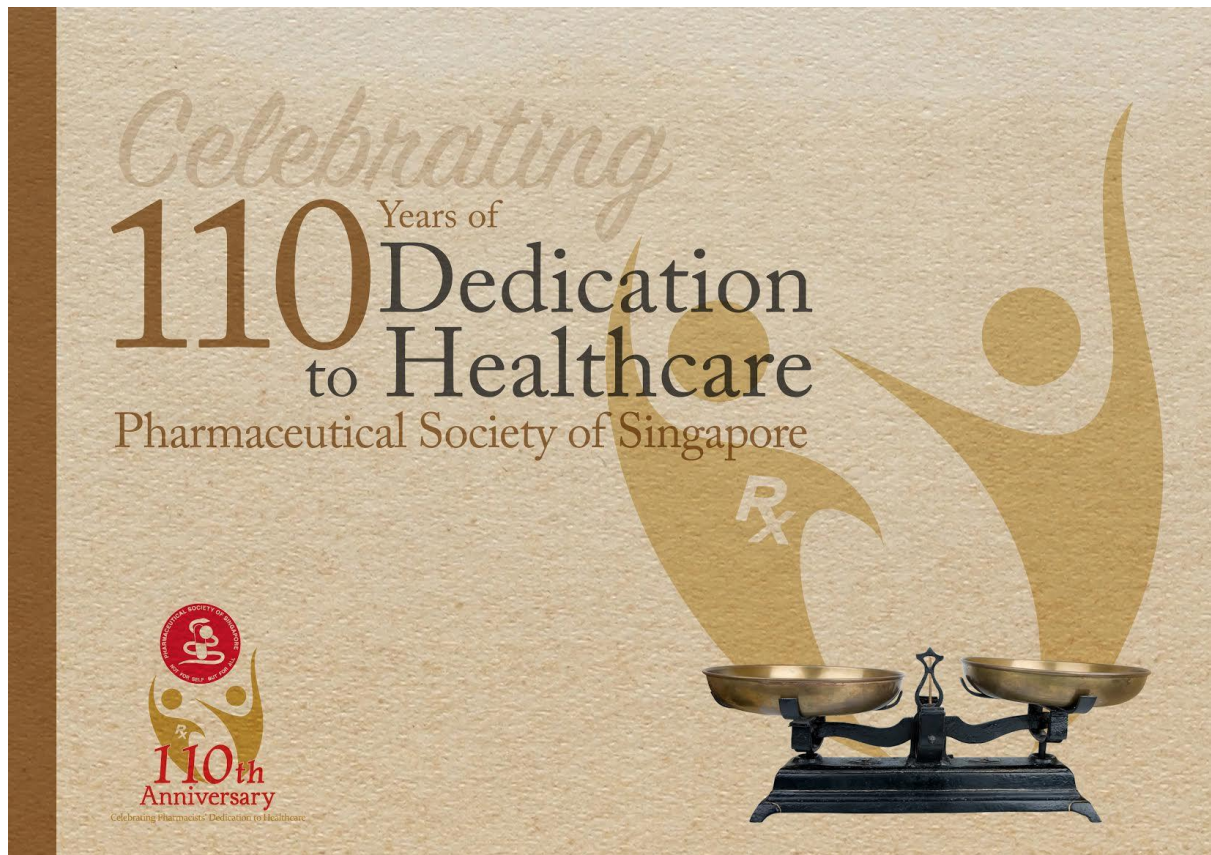

PSS PHARMACIST VOLUNTEER SERVICE FOR DOVER PARK HOSPICE (DPH) AND HOSPICE CARE ASSOCIATION (HCA)

Briefly, the PSS pharmacist volunteer service for DPH started in 1998 with the aim of helping to ensure safe medication use through proper storage and handling of medicines. In 2000, the service was extended to HCA. Volunteers review donated medicines and see if they can recycle them safely to reduce cost. They pre-pack medicines for inpatient use at DPH and pack ready to use packs of medicines for home visits by the HCA doctors and nurses. The volunteers take turns to provide this service every Saturday for about 2 – 3 hours each time.

For 2015, the PSS pharmacist volunteers continued with the recycling of medicines work. They conducted a total of 52 medication recycling and repackaging sessions at DPH and HCA in 2015.

The volunteer pharmacists had one meeting with DPH management on 07/2/15 at the DPH Council room and updated the staff and volunteers contact information , reviewed the DPH drug list (slow moving drugs were deleted and new required drugs added) as well as par levels. It was agreed that DPH will only receive donated drugs from DPH patients and any medications DPH cannot use will be donated out to HCA for their use and distribution to other institutions that have use for them. Dr Wu Huei Yaw, Medical Director of DPH enquired if generic fentanyl patches were as good as the branded ones. The volunteers replied in the affirmative. The generic version is also very much cheaper. There were no new updates on controlled drugs or new guidelines on medication handling from the HSA. Drug updates from HSA has been made available to DPH doctors and nurses for 2015, information being circulated by Mr Wu to DPH and HCA medical directors respectively via email.

Tokens of appreciation were given by Dr Wu Huei Yaw, Medical Director of DPH to all the volunteers.

We value all the work done by the volunteers and their unstinting spirit of giving of their time and knowledge to help with medication management at DPH and HCA. The PSS volunteer pharmacists continue to work with enthusiasm and commitment earning praises from DPH and HCA doctors and nurses.

Medication Safety in Nursing Homes

We are now in the 2nd year of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed between AIC and PSS in June 2014. The MOU, through a Pharmaceutical Care Program, aims to enhance the capability of nursing homes (NH) in managing their residents' medication needs and medication management processes.

In Jan 2014, the Enhanced Nursing Home Standards (ENHS) was implemented to allow time for NHs to get up to the requirement by April 2016 which is the enforcement deadline. PSS Nursing Home Pharmacists Workgroup was engaged by the NHs or AIC to assist them in preparation for the Ministry of Health licensing audits on the medication management module.

There are currently 70 nursing homes in Singapore. As of 31st Dec 2015, 60 homes have pharmacist coverage, up from 45 in 2014.

The Pharmacists involved in providing medication management service to the NHs assisted the nursing homes in various components:

- 1) Setting up Standard Operating Procedures (SOP)
- 2) Medication Audit
- 3) Medication Review
- 4) Training of nursing and healthcare staff
- 5) Provision of Drug Information services

The workgroup has written up 17 SOPs which used a standardised template to roll out consistent processes and practices to all NHs that they cover.

The medication audit form was improved in September 2014 and has been used since then by the workgroup. Ms Joyce Tan presented this to nursing home representatives in Dec 2014. The form has also been uploaded to the AIC Learning Management System (LMS) to spread this toolkit to the NHs.

This year, PSS NH Pharmacists Workgroup has conducted 3 runs of medication management training as well as revised the curriculum to include more topics. 2 runs out of 3 runs were on the new curriculum which comprises of 24 topics, up from 10 topics in the 1st run. Please see Table 1 on the new revised curriculum. The curriculum aims to improve the drug knowledge aside from training the nurses on safe medication practices.

Each run of the new revised curriculum was over 12 half day sessions, compared to the older version which comprised of 5 half day sessions. Each session was limited to 25 nurses per session. We have received good feedback for all sessions, average score of 83.8% as rated by the participants. As the response was overwhelming, this will continue into year 2016 with more runs to come.

A second workshop on the design of resident medication records (RMR) and reporting medication errors was also conducted for 20 senior staff nurses and directors of nursing in Jan 2015 after good feedback received from the 1st round in November 2014.

In addition, the NH Pharmacists Workgroup also ensure representation in various critical workgroups. Ms Reshma Lhode represented us in National Medication Reconciliation Guideline Workgroup which was formed in Sep 2014. The National Medication Reconciliation Workgroup aims to establish a guideline for HCPs to understand and perform medication reconciliation and to create PML at appropriate points of the care continuum. This will help ensure patient safety throughout the care continuum and to support patient care integration.

Another workgroup, Nursing Home Enablement Program (NHELP) – Medication management Workgroup are represented by Ms Reshma Lhode, as well as Mr Chong Jiun Yih and Ms Joyce Tan who are representing their institutions but are members of PSS NH Pharmacists Workgroup too. The NHELP – Medication Management Workgroup was formed in March 2015 to define the processes and to gather the functional requirement of the NHELP system. NHELP is an IT program developed to improve Nursing Homes' operational efficiency and facilitate care integration across the various healthcare systems; with sufficient numbers to support policy directions and care coordination.

Singapore Pharmacy Congress took place in September 2015. The Workgroup would like to thank AIC which kindly sponsored 2 tables for the workgroup at the 110th anniversary Gala Dinner post congress. It was a good networking to know all the AIC and PSS colleagues.

Last but not least, this year our workgroup also permeated into center based sector. On 2 Nov 2015 at a networking session organised by AIC in Furama Waterfront Hotel, Ms Grace Kng and Ms Reshma Lhode gave a talk to 50 center based providers (administrators and staff) to share with them on how community pharmacists can help the center based service providers. They described the community pharmacists' role and their value proposition.

The workgroup is also in the midst of collaborating with AIC in a pilot project on Falls Risk Management in a Senior Care Centre. The roles of the pharmacists include:

- Medication Review
- Measuring the client's fall risk using an algorithm
- Performing medication reconciliation and derive a patient medication list (PML)
- Patient education (including assessment of knowledge before and after the education session)

The PSS NH Pharmacists Workgroup has continued to conduct quarterly meetings and sharing sessions as a platform for pharmacists involved in providing medication management services to nursing homes to share their experiences and gain knowledge from each other.

Advertising Standards and Authority of Singapore (ASAS) is the entity in our local jurisdiction that handles feedbacks and complaints from the consumers and industries to ensure advertising claims as truthful and ethical. Members can visit ASAS at <https://asas.org.sg> for further information.

ASAS seeks to address misleading claims (non-factual and unsubstantiated) advertised in the media targeted at the public in Singapore. The guidelines as based on Singapore Code of Advertising Practice (SCAP) and in the context of protecting the local public.

The ASAS Committee is headed by a Chairman, currently Dr Tan Tze Wee. The following representatives from the following entities form this committee:

- a. Consumer Association of Singapore (CASE)
- b. Singapore Press Holdings and Mediacorp
- c. Telco - Starhub, M1 and Singtel
- d. Regulatory bodies include Monetary Authority of Singapore (MAS), Health Science Authority (HSA), Agri-Food and Veterinary Authority of Singapore (AVA), Health Promotion Board (HPB), etc.
- e. A member from Pharmaceutical Society of Singapore (PSS), Singapore Association of Pharmaceutical Industries (SAPI), Singapore Advertising Association (SAA) and related societies and associations.

Other individuals forming the committee includes a representative from direct marketing industry; Media & Communications and Legal experts from tertiary institutions or any other discipline as relevant.

ASAS Secretariat comprising of 3 staff working with Dr Tan. The office of the secretariat is located at CASE and the staff disseminates the feedback or complaints for advertisements of products and services from different industries to ASAS committee for evaluation and comments. We can expect an average of 2 to 3 emails per week for our response within 2 – 3 days' deadline. A monthly meeting is held at CASE office and the minutes disseminated are password protected to ensure confidentiality.

As PSS representative, I am in the Health & Wellness sub-committee and we are given mainly the advertisements related to health products and services.

Over the last 2 years, ASAS collaborated with HPB & MOH and came up with the Advertising guidelines for food products targeted at children. The committee followed up with a training workshop to facilitate some positive engagement with the food industry.

Recently, in December 2015, a draft copy of the “digital & social media advertising guidelines” was made available for public consultation through ASAS website apart from local media notification.

COMMITTEE TO REVIEW CURRENT LIST OF DISEASES/CONDITIONS PROHIBITED FROM HEALTH PRODUCTS ADVERTISEMENTS

I had represented PSS in the “Committee to Review Current List of Diseases/Conditions Prohibited from Health Products Advertisements” formed in February 2015.

The Committee comprises representatives from various specialities such as medicine, traditional Chinese medicine practice, ayurvedic, pharmacy, academic, food and nutrition and legal representative. The Committee aims to put in place a consistent policy / criteria in the selection of the diseases / conditions, so as to ensure that the prohibition list meets the objectives of advertisement control and remains relevant and robust.

The committee has completed the review and report with finalised recommendations has been drafted.

NUSPS is the student body representing the pharmacy undergraduates in NUS while North West CDC is one of the 5 CDCs in Singapore, tasked to promote community bonding and social cohesion in the North West district of Singapore. Launch in 2 July 2011, the “Know Your Medicines. Get It Right! @ North West” program aims to harness the energy of NUS Pharmacy undergraduates and expertise of registered pharmacists in making a positive contribution to the community. In this program, NUSPS, PSS and North West CDC partner with voluntary welfare organisations, neighbourhood links, senior activity centres and North West Grassroots Organisations to conduct medication review, disease awareness outreach and talks to guide elderly patients on the safe and proper use of medications.

Other than helping the elderly to maximize the therapeutic effects of their medication with medication safety in mind, this program also strives to reach out to the community to educate the public about the role of pharmacists as the trustworthy medication experts and caring partners in managing their health. At the same time, this event fosters closer relations between pharmacy undergraduates and pharmacists from PSS. Students can benefit from the sharing of experience and knowledge by the pharmacists. Last but not least, it allows students to apply their drug knowledge and practise their patient counselling and communication skills, under the guidance of pharmacists.

In the past year, “Know Your Medicines, Get It Right! @ North West” was held twice on 8 Mar 2015 (at Saujana Road) and 30th August 2015 (at Yishun St 22). Since its inception in June 2011, 12 such community outreach events were held to date at different areas under the North West district such as Chong Pang, Clementi, Bukit Panjang, Marsiling and Nee Soon and have benefited more than 1200 senior residents.

This year we also analysed available data collected from the 10 outreach events from 2011 to 2014 and presented a poster at the 25th Singapore Pharmacy Congress. In summary, we found that at least 1 in 4 senior residents in the community had at least one drug related problem. Drug use without indications and adherence issue seems to be the major drug related problems identified. As such, patient education is important and necessary to bridge any gap in the patient’s knowledge between medication and its usage. Of note, our data also showed that the residents were highly satisfied with the pharmacist’s advice received at the event.

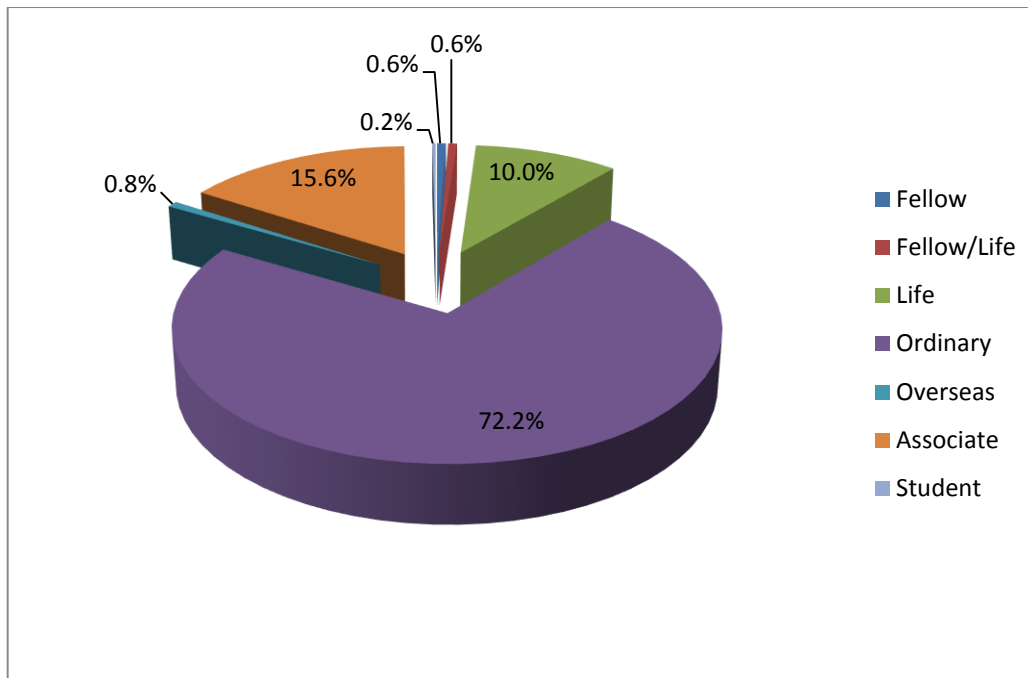
