



Four Questions with Jason Goettler

SPOTLIGHT: LIMESTONE CITY TATTOO FESTIVAL by Erin Jones

The second annual Limestone City Tattoo and Arts Festival — coming to the Four Points by Sheraton on Sept. 16 and 17 -will feature two days of tattooing. with more than 40 artists from across North America. Along with custom artwork, it will also include vendors, entertainment and after-show parties for artists and patrons. We talked with Jason Goettler, co-owner of Inkwell — a tattoo shop at 272 Bagot St. — as well as one of the guest artists at the festival this year, about what to expect.

How would you describe your tattoo style?

It's a bold, graphic, comic-book illustrative style - but physically or proportionally accurate. It's not super cartoony where it's like giant heads or hands or something like that, but things that look a little bit more serious.

What draws you to the festival?

It's not so much about getting new clients or anything like that. I'm busy in Kingston before and after the festival. For me it's a cool opportunity to kind

of work on (a piece) that's super cool that I want to show off a little bit. It's a way to network and meet a bunch of new artists and kind of create those connections and open up the opportunity for guest spots. It's a cool opportunity to bring in new art, new artists, see different techniques, watch what other people are doing and get inspired.

You were also featured at the festival last year. How was the turnout?

The turnout was pretty crazy. On the Saturday we had, like, 2,000 people show up. I did actually meet a few people that came in to get some work done. This year it will be interesting to see what they do. It was the best experience I've ever had with a convention, ever. They really took care of the artists.

What do you think people look forward to about the festival?

A big thing is collectors looking forward to having access to a specific artist who otherwise would be on the other side of the country. Lots of prints, lots of different kinds of arts. People who are more seasoned in the convention circuit will do a bunch of little paintings and stuff and just do a ton of prints. It's a cool way to collect art.

GODFREY SCULPTURE PARK by Erin Jones

Looking for an inexpensive day trip idea? Godfrey Sculpture Park - 40 minutes west of the city, on Buck Bay Road — is open free to the public until Oct. 30, daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Pack a picnic and take a self-guided tour along the paths, trails, gardens and fields (a whole 60 acres of Canadian Shield). Established in 2016 by local artist Stefan Duerst, the park also features work by

other Kingstonians, including stone sculptor Chaka Chikodz, plus a "healing centre" that includes yoga workshops, healing therapy and acupuncture. "The combination of nature, art and healing art doesn't exist anywhere," Duerst says. "We are groundbreaking in the way we are bringing all these things together in one location."



HEAD PASTRY CHEF by Josephine Matyas

Baker Joy McBride has a long history working in restaurants, but it was a career that began humbly enough, baking desserts for friends. Joy was the person who always brought the cake to the party. As her reputation grew, so did her business: from parties to catering jobs, and eventually to her longtime position as head pastry chef at Pan Chancho.

What brought you to Kingston? I came here in 1985 to do a PhD at Queen's University in history.

What is your neighbourhood and what makes it special? I live in Portsmouth Village, close enough (to Lake Ontario) that we can walk along the water. We have the best neighbours in the world — there's a real sense of community.

Do you have a favourite spot to enjoy fall in the city?

I love being anywhere outside,

especially down by the water. My favourites are any of the hiking trails along the water, like Lemoine Point or CFB Kingston.

What's your favourite thing to bake in the fall using local ingredients?

Definitely baking with apples ... and fall is perfect apple time. I like to try different recipes and am always on the lookout for apple varieties. When we travel I call it orienteering for apples.

What is Kingston's best-kept secret?

All the little nooks and crannies you can wander through, like the cut-throughs behind Chez Piggy.

WOLFE ISLAND SPRING CRAFT BEER

Kingston's newest neighbour and the latest addition to the city's burgeoning craft beer scene, the Wolfe Island Spring Craft Brewery serves up tasty suds of all sorts to thirsty patrons around town. With a wide selection of lagers, ales and everything in between, the Wolfe Island Spring Craft Brewery boasts a robust lineup of full-bodied brews for every palate.

Try their signature brew Wolfenstein Cannonball Ale - a German Steinbier brewed with an authentic, 36lb solid iron cannonball, literally dredged from the bottom of Lake Ontario and likely leftover from one of many conflicts surrounding the Great Lakes during the War of 1812. The cannonball is heated significantly hotter than the German's brewers. This heat caramelizes sugars from the malt to help balance bitterness from the hops, and the residual iron the cannonball leaves in the beer gives it its crisp and refreshing finish.

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

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






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Off the Beaten Path

THREE NEIGHBOURHOODS TO EXPLORE

by Erin Jones



Kingston has some truly unique neighbourhoods, full of rich history, thriving culture, and incredible architecture. Here are three 'hoods worth checking out.

Portsmouth THE ONE TO WATCH: Portsmouth Village is known for its rich, storied history and loved for its stretches of public waterfront. Not far from the downtown core, the neighbourhood is defined by Johnson Street to the north, Portsmouth Avenue to the west and Lake Ontario to the south. It's home to Queen's north campus, Richardson Stadium, St. Lawrence College and Lake Ontario Park. One of Kingston's biggest tourist attractions, Kingston Penitentiary's prison tours, is located in Portsmouth Village. The 178-year-old former prison complex is in the process of being redeveloped to include public access to the entire waterfront, and more open space using heritage buildings for mixed commercial and residential use. Also in redevelopment is the Portsmouth Olympic Harbour building, which will be torn down and replaced with a community hub and highrise buildings up to 25 storeys tall. With a fusion of old and new, Portsmouth is sure to be the neighbourhood to watch in Kingston.

Skeleton Park THE ONE TO INSPIRE:

Arguably the most hip part of Kingston, Skeleton Park is named after McBurney Park, a former public burial site in the 1800s. Just a few blocks from downtown, it's burrowed at the end of Clergy Street and bordered by Alma and Ordnance streets. Rumoured to be haunted, the eclectic surrounding neighourhood is teeming with artists of all kinds. It's also home to one of Kingston's largest and longest-running summer festivals, The Skeleton Park Arts Festival. which has featured big names like The Trews and Sarah Harmer. You don't want to miss the annual Skeleton Park Halloween Parade - a New Orleans-style "second line" parade around the park. The area is so hip, Kingston's own The Tragically Hip even have a song named after the park.

Svdenham Ward THE ONE TO TOUR:

Downtown's Sydenham Ward is very close to Oueen's campus, and with over 500 properties built in the 19th century, it's designated a Heritage Conservation District. I would say my shorts and my saddle on my bike. That's probably what makes me the most comfortable when I'm doing


long rides. Bontrager shorts and then my saddle is made by Specialized.


What are some of your favourite places to bike in Kingston?

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

and his family lived in the late 1840s, or witness the majesty of the original pumps that provided running water to Kingston as early as 1850 at the Pump House Steam Museum.

If you're in the downtown area, be

sure to visit local favourites like Martello Alley and Studio 22. Venture toward Queen's University and stop by the Agnes Etherington Art Centre or Union Gallery, and don't forget to head near the water where Modern Fuel Artist-Run Centre is located inside the Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning.

Hockey lover? Kingston is home to the original Hockey Hall of Fame. The hall covers intriguing artifacts, achievements by Kingston players and the oldest hockey jersey from Queen's University. The whole family will appreciate learning about one of Canada's most beloved sports.




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




Valuable Venues

ART A city as culturally diverse as Kingston offers no shortage of art galleries and hands-on cultural experiences. Take a walk down Princess Street and you'll see the dedicated work of artists and artisans at places like Martello Alley (203 B Wellington St.), The Kingston Collective (303 Bagot St. #14) and Studio 22 (320 King St. E., across from Springer Market Square). Slightly farther from the downtown area, on the Queen's University campus, are the Agnes Etherington Art Centre (36 University Ave.) — offering free tours yearround — and The Union Gallery (inside Stauffer Library). The Modern Fuel Artist-Run Centre, inside the Tett Centre for Creativity and Learning (Morton Way), is just a short walk west on King Street by the waterfront, where both spaces offer a number of workshops, discussions and fun activities for every age.

MUSIC Kingston's music scene thrives every season of the year. Venues like the Rogers K-Rock Centre (1 The Tragically Hip Way) and the Isabel Bader Centre for the Performing Arts (390 King St. W.) offer unique live experiences for music lovers. Looking to enjoy a show in a smaller setting? Musiikki Café (73 Brock St.) is the place to be on Tuesdays for open mic nights. Other establishments like The Common Market (136 Ontario St.) and Sir John's Public House (343 King St. E.) host some of the city's other major open mic nights, guaranteeing a good time for those brave enough to take the stage and for those waiting to hear something new.

Nestled in the downtown core is The Screening Room (120 Princess St.), a favourite place for many to watch new releases, indie favourites and more. The theatre itself is known for hosting several movie events throughout the year, showcasing old classics and other films that are hard to find. This is a place you won't want to overlook: it has a good taste for the old while keeping the appeal of lesser-known movies fresh for its audiences.

What's Kingston's best-kept secret?


