Reporter: 'I Was Not Harmed

BAGHDAD, IRAQ | American reporter Jill Carroll's three-month hostage ordeal ended Thursday when she was left on a Baghdad street in front of a Sunni political party office. She appeared composed and eager to talk about her 82 days held captive in a tiny room.

"It's important people know that I was not harmed," she said.

Carroll was dropped off at midday near an office of the Iraqi Islamic Party. She was then driven to party headquarters before being handed over to U.S. authorities.

The 28-year-old freelancer for The Christian Science Monitor said her kidnappers confined her to a small room with frosted windows but treated her well. Although her captors issued televised threats to kill Carroll if American forces did not release women prisoners, she said: "They never said they would hit me, never threatened me in any way."

The U.S. ambassador said there was no ransom paid by the American embassy, but his remarks left open the question of whether "arrangements" were made by others. (AP)

Steroids Inquiry **Criticized**

Former senator with ties to Red Sox to lead investigation

NEW YORK | Baseball began its investigation Thursday into alleged steroid use by Barry Bonds and others, and the head of the inquiry immediately came under attack because of his close ties to the sport.

In the wake of a searing book about Bonds, commissioner Bud Selig appointed former Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell currently a director of the Boston Red Sox - to lead the investigation. The probe initially will be limited to events since September 2002, when the sport banned performanceenhancing drugs, but Mitchell has the authority to expand it.

Selig said Mitchell's report will be made public but didn't set a timetable. By then, Bonds may well have passed Babe Ruth's home-run mark on the way toward Hank Aaron's all-time record.

Mitchell said he will not resign his position with the Red Sox. He also is chairman of The Walt Disney Co., the parent of ESPN, a national broadcast partner of baseball.

"I don't think there's any conflict," he said. "I'm going to be independent, have complete independent authority and will act." (AP)

Mass. Court Limits Gay Marriage

Ruling bans couples from states prohibiting unions from marrying

BOSTON | In a disappointment for the gay rights movement, the state's highest court ruled Thursday that same-sex couples from states where gay marriage is prohibited cannot tie the knot in Massachusetts.

Gov. Mitt Romney, a Republican who is considering a run for president in 2008, welcomed the decision, saying he did not want Massachusetts to become "the Las Vegas of same-sex marriage." The Supreme Judicial Court upheld a 1913 state law that forbids nonresidents to marry in Massachusetts if their marriage would not be recognized in their home state.

If the court had struck down the law, Massachusetts would have been thrown open to gay couples from across the country to get married. They could then have returned to their home states to fight for legal recognition for those marriages.

The ruling leaves in legal limbo an undetermined number of outof-state gay couples who got married in 2004 in Massachusetts

Army Bans Privately Bought Body Armor

WASHINGTON | Soldiers will no longer be allowed to wear body armor other than the protective gear issued by the military, Army officials said Thursday, the latest twist in a running battle over the equipment the Pentagon gives its troops in Iraq and Afghanistan.


Army officials told The Associated Press that the order was prompted by concerns that soldiers or their families were buying inadequate or untested commercial armor from private companies.

"We're very concerned that people are spending their hardearned money on something that doesn't provide the level of protection that the Army requires people to wear. So they're, frankly, wasting their money on substandard stuff," said Col. Thomas Spoehr, director of materiel for the Army.

Veterans groups and some lawmakers immediately denounced the decision.

"Outrageously we've seen that (soldiers) haven't been getting what they need in terms of equipment and body armor," said Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., who wrote legislation to have troops reimbursed for equipment purchases. LOLITA C. BALDOR (AP)

House Conservatives Blast Immigration Bill

Senate provision would give illegal immigrants chance at citizenship

WASHINGTON | A House conservative criticized President Bush, accused the Senate of fouling the air, said prisoners should pick America's crops instead of illegal farm workers and denounced the use of Mexican flags by protesters Thursday in a vehement attack on legislation to liberalize U.S. immigration laws.

"I say let the prisoners pick the fruits," said Rep. Dana Rohrabacher of California, one of more than a dozen Republicans who took turns condemning a Senate bill that offers an estimated 11 million illegal immigrants an opportunity for citizenship.

"Anybody that votes for an amnesty bill deserves to be branded with a scarlet letter A," said Rep. Steve King of Iowa, referring to a guest worker provision in the Senate measure.

Their news conference took place

across the Capitol from the Senate, where supporters and critics of the legislation seemed determined to heed admonitions

Ex-FBI Agent Indicted For Mob Hits

Inside man's tips led mafia boss to order slavings, police say

NEW YORK | A retired FBI agent was indicted on murder charges Thursday for allegedly taking bribes from a mobster to supply him with inside information that led to four underworld slavings in Brooklyn.

R. Lindley DeVecchio, 65, was arrested in a case of "confidential leaks, payoffs and death" dating back two decades, District Attorney Charles Hynes said.

DeVecchio pleaded not guilty and was released on \$1 million bail. He did not speak at his arraignment. One of the two alleged mob hitmen behind the slayings was jailed without bail. The other was in Florida, awaiting extradition.

Hynes said the charges stemmed from the unusually close relationship between DeVecchio - then head of the FBI's Colombo crime family squad — and Gregory Scarpa Sr.,

a government informant and Colombo captain nicknamed "The Grim Reaper."

The pair met each week during the 1980s and '90s and discussed a bloody civil war within the Colombo family. In exchange for bribes, DeVecchio "counseled Scarpa to protect himself by eliminating imminent threats," Hynes said.

In 1984, DeVecchio allegedly warned Scarpa that the girlfriend of a high-ranking Colombo figure was cooperating with federal authorities. As a result, authorities say, she was shot and killed in a Brooklyn social club — a pattern prosecutors said was repeated in three slayings of Scarpa rivals, the last one in 1992.

Scarpa gave DeVecchio weekly payments and also enhanced the agent's reputation within the FBI by helping him solve important cases, Hynes said.

DeVecchio surrendered Wednesday night at the Brooklyn district attorney's office. He had no comment as he entered.

DeVecchio retired in 1996. Scarpa died in prison in 1994. TOM HAYS (AP)

New Orleans Recovery Could Take 25 Years

Repairing city's levees to pre-storm levels will cost extra \$5.9 billion

WASHINGTON | A full recovery in New Orleans could take 25 years as homeowners, businesses and tourists are coaxed back to the city devastated by Hurricane Katrina, the Bush administration's Gulf Coast recovery coordinator said Thursday.

Don Powell said that much of the city's rebirth will hinge on factors he said were "out of our control," including restoring housing, ensuring safety and encouraging robust investment by the private sector.

Powell said the Army Corps of Engineers now estimates it will cost an additional \$5.9 billion to repair levees enough to fully protect and insure nearly 1.1 million residents of the greater New Orleans area.

That is in addition to the \$3.5 billion the Bush administration has so far sought to bring the levees back to at least their pre-Katrina levels by June 1, the start of the 2006 hurricane season

Over the next 60 days the Corps will be strengthening levees and building storm-proof pumping stations and flood gates to close canals in the event of a major storm. LARA JAKES JORDAN (AP)

A huge blast incinerated a car at the entrance to the Jewish settlement of Kedoumim in the late evening hours on Thursday, sending plumes of flame and smoke into the air. Taylor's Trial May Be Moved

Ex-Liberian leader's war crimes tribunal could go to The Hague

FREETOWN. SIERRA LEONE | Trial in Africa is too risky for a man accused of fomenting bloodshed across West Africa, international prosecutors said Thursday in requesting that Charles Taylor's trial for crimes against humanity be moved to The Hague in the Netherlands.

The former Liberian president is set to become the first African head of state tried for war crimes before an international



court. He has been indicted on 11 counts for allegedly supporting a brutal rebel movement in Sierra Leone.

Peter Andersen, a spokesman for the U.N. tribunal, said court officials had requested the trial be moved. "But I wish to stress that it would be the Special Court of Sierra Leone sitting in The Hague," he said.

Liberian President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf also raised concerns about stability Thursday. saying in an address to her nation that The Hague would be a "more conducive environment" for Taylor's trial than so close to Liberia, where many still support him. (AP)

Iran Defiant on Latest Nuke Warning

BERLIN | A top Iranian envoy defiantly rejected a U.N. Security Council demand for a halt in uranium enrichment, saying Thursday that Tehran's activities are "not reversible," despite new calls to reconsider from the United States, its key European allies, Russia and China.

Ali Asghar Soltanieh, Tehran's chief representative to the International Atomic Energy

Agency, the U.N. nuclear watchdog, said "it is impossible to go back to suspension.

"This enrichment matter is not reversible," he said by phone.

Iran's defiance cast a pall on a meeting of top officials of the five permanent Security Council members plus Germany meant to demonstrate consensus on confronting Tehran over its nuclear program. After two hours of talks that were twice as long as planned, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said the six nations were "united."

But Russia and China suggested otherwise, expressing opposition to strong council action against Tehran after the meeting.

Russian Foreign Minister Sergev Lavrov specifically challenged U.S. assertions that Iran was trying to make nuclear arms, saying no proof existed of such claims. (AP)

Study: HIV Falling in India

Researchers find 35% drop in critical areas, credit education efforts

NEW DELHI | The number of HIV infections has fallen by more than a third among young people in southern India, the worst-hit region of the South Asian nation, according to a study published Thursday in a leading medical journal.

The 35 percent drop in HIV cases among people aged 15-24 was the result of better prevention and not due to deaths from AIDS, researchers from the University of Toronto said in a study published on

prevalence rate in the four southern states, which account for about 75 percent of India's HIV infections, fell from 1.7 percent in 2000, to 1.1 percent in 2004. (AP)

the Web site of the Lancet, a British medical journal.

The researchers singled out efforts by the Indian government, the World Bank and other non-

governmental groups to educate sex workers and the men who frequent them about the dangers of HIV, efforts that "appear to have contributed to a drastic decline" in new infections.

India has an estimated 5.13 million people with HIV, second only to South Africa, although the percentage of those with the AIDScausing virus is much lower than in many parts of Africa.

Still, there are fears that ignorance and the stigma attached to the disease could hamper prevention efforts and lead to an explosion in new infections across India. NIRMALA GEORGE (AP)

Dozens Die After Bahrain Ferry Sinks

MANAMA, BAHRAIN | A ferry carrying up to 150 people sank Thursday night in the Persian Gulf off the coast of Bahrain, and at least 44 bodies had been recovered, the country's interior minister said. American divers and a U.S. helicopter aided the rescue effort.

Interior Minister Sheik Rashid

bin Abdulla Al Khalifa said at least 52 people had been rescued.

The official Bahrain News Agency said the ferry was on an evening cruise that was to last several hours. It overturned less than a mile off the coast, it said.

There was no indication of what caused the ferry to sink in what appeared to be ideal weather conditions. The government dismissed terrorism as a cause, and the news agency quoted Interior Ministry spokesman Maj. Mohammed Ben Dayna as calling the sinking an accident.

The passengers were thought to be a mix of Bahrainis, nationals of other Gulf Arab nations and Westerners. (AP)

Moran Suggests Smithsonian Fee

Congressman thinks \$1 for museum entry is a reasonable idea

WASHINGTON | The Smithsonian Institution, which has not charged people to visit its museums for 160 years, should begin doing so to pay for critical repairs, according to a Northern Virginia congressman.

A member of the appropriations panel that approves Smithsonian funding, Rep. James Moran, made the suggestion during congressional hearings in which a Smithsonian official said the complex is crumbling because there is not enough


Washington Post Radio Goes Live

WASHINGTON | The Washington Post's new all-news radio station, WTWP, started broadcasting Thursday morning on 1500 AM and 107.7 FM, the long-time homes of all-news radio station WTOP.

Utah-based Bonneville International jointly owns and operates Washington Post Radio. Bonneville's WTOP can now be heard on 103.5 FM in Washington and 820 AM in Frederick, Md.

WTWP features local, national and global news, plus commentary and analysis from the Post.

Washington Nationals baseball games will also be broadcast on the new station. (EXPRESS)



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WASHINGTON | Three taxicab companies that provide transportation for the region's disabled transit riders say they're not getting paid on time and that could hurt the service.

Cabbies

They say the company that operates the MetroAccess service still owes them nearly \$500,000.

MV Transportation began providing the service in January for Metro.

MV uses its own fleet of vehicles as well as subcontractors and taxi companies to provide curb-to-curb service for about 16-thousand disabled people in the region.

A spokeswoman for MV says the payment delays have been caused by questionable or incomplete billing from the taxi companies.

Von Pelot, a spokesman for Red Top Cab Company in Arlington told The Washington Post the cab companies can't continue to be part of the deal if they don't get paid promptly.

Naval Officer Accused In '96 Killing Convicted

ALEXANDRIA, VA. | A former naval intelligence officer accused in the 1996 disappearance of his ex-wife, was convicted Thursday of kidnapping resulting in death.

Prosecutors convinced the federal jury that Jay Lentz lured his ex-wife from her Arlington home to his home in Fort Washington, Md., under the pretext of seeing their daughter. Officials said the child was with relatives at the time.

Doris Lentz' body was never found, but her blood-soaked car later turned up in the District.

Lentz has been in jail since his arrest in April 2001. He was convicted on the same charge in 2003 and a jury also recommended he be sentenced to life in prison.

A week later, U.S. District Judge Gerald Bruce Lee set aside the verdict, saying the prosecution had not proved its case. He also accused a prosecutor of planting inadmissible evidence in the jury room – two diaries that belonged to Doris Lentz. Some jurors said the diaries helped push them toward a conviction.

An appeals court in 2004 overruled Lee and cleared Mellin of misconduct charges, but agreed to a new trial because jurors had seen the inadmissible evidence. (AP)

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

Workers' Web Use Curbed

Companies cracking down on use of tools like IM, outside e-mail

Companies are clamping down on employees' workplace use of the expanding range of free Internet services, such as instant messaging and video downloading, to protect themselves from viruses, communications traffic jams and regulatory missteps.

General Electric Co., for example, has barred outside instant-messaging and file-sharing programs. as well as access to personal online e-mail accounts like those offered by Yahoo Inc.

The corporate crackdown underscores an emerging challenge for the Web. As the spread of broadband technology makes it possible for millions of Americans to watch TV on the Web or make cheap phone calls, companies, government agencies and universities are concerned about the possible side effects — including the threat of a worm or other bit of malicious code sneaking into their systems.

Internet phone service Skype, which is owned by eBay, and other service providers say such concerns are overblown. They say their products are in many cases safer than e-mail attachments, a common source of viruses that are nonetheless seen as indispensable tools.

Telecom company Global Crossing started blocking its employees' access to personal email accounts on sites like Yahoo after a virus used them to slip in.

"I used to think nothing o checking my Yahoo mail several times a day," says Global Crossing Chief Marketing Officer Anthony Christie.

At Britain's Cambridge University, some colleges and departments ban Skype, fearing their data networks could become giant hubs for Skype transmissions from all over Europe.

Michael Jackson, Skype's vice president of operations, says that many technologies that are now crucial business tools were once greeted with suspicion. "Many organizations were initially scared of the Internet and e-mail," he said. "Now there's hardly a workplace on the planet that doesn't have an Internet connection." Regional MOP Joakim Noah (14.2 ppg) is getting all the press, but all five Gators starters average double figures. They play solid defense and shoot well from the perimeter. Sound familiar?


Around that time, the Nationals were coming to grips with the loss of reliever Luis Ayala to ligament-replacement surgery. The steady right-hander injured himself pitching

The Rivalry Begins

Nats, Orioles fight for fan allegiance in first games in the D.C. area

RIVALRY | OK, everybody off the fence. It's time to pick a side.

North or South. National League or American. Nationals or Orioles.

When the Washington and Baltimore baseball clubs get together this weekend, for the first time outside the Florida sunshine, a rivalry will be born. Sure, they are only exhibition games, but it's about to get real — real fast.

A year ago, Washington began its love affair with the Nationals as the team went about its inaugural season segregated from Peter Angelos' Orioles a short trip up the Baltimore-Washington Parkway. It's not the case this year. Major League Baseball has deemed the two franchises as interleague rivals, meaning they will play each other six times during the regular season, in addition to exhibition games tonight at RFK Stadium and Saturday at Camden Yards.

During Washington's threedecade absence from the big leagues, many area baseball fans looked north for their fix. These fans now must weigh their memories of Cal Ripken Jr. and Jim Palmer against their allegiance to the hometown team.

"I think that this is going to be

the year that the loyalties really start to shake out, whether you really are a Nats fan first or an Orioles fan first," said Colin Mills, president of the Nats Fan Club. "But whether you love the Orioles or you hate them,

I think that everybody appreciates that this isn't just another game."

In the first year of the fight for the baseball fans' affection, the Nationals averaged 33,651 fans per home game, good for 11th in baseball en route to an 82-82 finish. The Orioles drew 32,404, 14th best even as the team fell apart in the second half of the season.

The smart money says those numbers will go up when the two teams meet. And this weekend provides a perfect warm-up.

"Certainly I think Nationals fans are, in a way, out to prove themselves and this is the way to do it," said Ian Koski, editor and co-founder of the fan site NationalsPride.com. DEREK TURNER


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
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Nats Make Final Cuts of the Spring

Only 8 on this season's roster opened up last year in Washington

NATIONALS | Daryle Ward and Wiki Gonzalez claimed two of the Washington Nationals' final backup spots Thursday, when the team released outfielder Michael Tucker and made three other moves to get down to the 25-man active roster limit.

Washington also sent righthander Travis Hughes outright to Triple-A New Orleans, and reassigned catcher Alberto Castillo and right-hander Kevin Gryboski to minor league camp. Hughes cleared waivers and accepted his assignment to the minors.

The team's roster has 11 pitchers and 14 position players — and only eight of the 25 were with the Nationals on opening day in 2005.

Tucker, who hit .158 in spring training, was granted his unconditional release after losing out to Ward in competition for a reserve spot, while Castillo was beaten out by Gonzalez for the second-string catching job. Gonzalez's contract was purchased from New Orleans. "Daryle Ward had a good spring, hit the ball hard, consistently throughout," manager Frank Robinson said. "We just felt like for the best 25 players on this ballclub, for starting the season, we would be better off with Ward than with Tucker."

With Ward, fourth outfielder Marlon Byrd, Matthew LeCroy (1B-C), Marlon Anderson (INF-OF) and Damian Jackson (INF-OF), Robinson said he feels much better about his late-inning options than last season.

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

Former senate leader known for fair play is key man in drug probe

BASEBALL | In turning to former Senate leader George Mitchell to unravel its steroid scandal, Major League Baseball enlisted a global troubleshooter with an insider's knowledge of the game.

Plainspoken, even bland, with skills honed in courtrooms, boardrooms, in Washington and on the international stage, Mitchell brings a rare range of experience and a reputation for something at risk in baseball — fair play.

the former U.S. attorney a spot on the Supreme Court. His stewardship of the Northern Ireland peace talks made him a celebrity on another continent. He was the architect of a Middle East peace plan that won

Baseball's investigation will test those sterling credentials.

The 72-year-old Mitchell is part of the baseball establishment - a director with the Boston Red Sox who has dreamed of becoming commissioner. Already there are questions from critics who say the league needs to clean house, not redecorate.

"Of course he has some ties to baseball, but we know what they are. Everybody will be watching to make sure he plays things absolutely straight," former commissioner Fay Vincent said. (AP)

Conte: Book 'Full of Outright Lies'

DOPING | BALCO founder Victor Conte insisted Thursday that he never gave performance enhancing drugs to Barry Bonds and that a new book that makes those claims is "full of outright lies."

Conte spoke to The Associated Press outside his San Mateo home hours after his release from prison, where he spent four months after pleading guilty to orchestrating an illegal steroids distribution scheme that allegedly involved many highprofile athletes, including Bonds.



Asked whether he gave Bonds steroids, Conte said: "No, I did not."

"Game of Shadows," by two San Francisco Chronicle reporters, chronicles the founding of the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative and details alleged extensive steroid use by Bonds and other baseball stars. Baseball Commissioner Bud Selig announced Thursday that former Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell will lead an investigation into the claims. (AP)

He has famous bloodlines, worldwide experiences and a unique combination of talent and charisma — all of which has helped transform the 6-foot-11 sophomore forward from part-time player to full-fledged star at Florida.

Noah has been the catalyst for the team's run to the Final Four, where the Gators will play George Mason on Saturday night.

He is one assist shy of leading Florida in every major category during the NCAA tournament. He has 69 points, 40 rebounds, 19 blocked shots, 14 assists and six steals in four games.

Maybe more importantly, he brings an unparalleled level of enthusiasm to every game, every possession.

He screams after blocks, pounds his chest after dunks and challenges teammates to match his passion and effervescence.

"He is seizing every moment that he has on the court," point guard Taurean Green said. "He has been stepping up big for us. He's an emotional player. When he gets all hyped up, we just feed off of that and it gets us going." MARK LONG (AP)

Final Four teams try to steal the spotlight from George Mason


FINAL FOUR | Florida, LSU and UCLA each have one seemingly impossible task this weekend — trying to steal some attention from the darlings of the Final Four.

"In the NCAA tournament, there are two things people love to see a Cinderella story and a team that is so powerful and explosive they look invincible," Florida coach Billy Donovan said Wednesday during a conference call with the other Final Four coaches.

George Mason (27-7) fits Donovan's first description perfectly.

3's Company For Terrapins

Maryland joins UNC, Duke in ACC-heavy Final Four in Boston

TERPS WOMEN | It's going to be an Atlantic Coast Conference party in Boston this weekend.

With the second-seed Maryland Terrapins joining top seeds North Carolina and Duke in the Final Four, the path to the national championship will look very familiar to coach Brenda Frese's squad. The pairings represent the first time in NCAA history that one conference placed three schools in the Final Four.

No. 1 Louisiana State is the only outsider in the bunch.

The Terrapins have reason to be optimistic. They've beaten both North Carolina, their opponent Sunday, and Duke this season. On the other hand, they've also lost to both of them. They know it will take

peak performance to win it all.

As has been the case all season, Langhorne's play will be critical in the Final Four. She scored 25 points in February when the Terrapins (32-4) handed the Tar Heels (33-1) their only loss this season. However, she was held to 12 points when Maryland fell to North Carolina in the ACC tournament final.


The Tar Heels did a particularly good job defending her, limiting the center to just one shot in the second half. Meanwhile, All-American guard Ivory Latta and forward Erlana Larkins scored 26 points each in North Carolina's 91-80 victory.

"We're learning more about [the Terps] and how to play them," North Carolina coach Sylvia Hatchell said after that game.

Hatchell's assessment will be put to the test this weekend. So too will



CAROLINA ON THEIR MIND: Maryland, the only team to beat UNC this season, will face the Tar Heels for a spot in Tuesday's final.




rounded by No. 1s, they'll have the chance to prove the selection committee wrong once and for all.

Madness Comes to Mason

Patriots deal with the media crush resulting from Final Four run

MASON HOOPS | For Gabe Norwood, the strangest part of George Mason's Final Four run has been the rumors.

"People on our floor are saying Sean Connery is going to play [coach Jim Larranaga in the movie about Mason]," the 6 foot 5 sophomore said after practice Tuesday.

Movie? At this point, it wouldn't be surprising.

The cameras turned out en masse Tuesday afternoon for another glimpse into the Patriots' improbable run. Larranaga —who had an audience of two reporters the day before Mason (27-7) left to play Michigan State two weeks ago — met a semicircle of scribes packed six deep in anticipation of his team's national semifinal matchup with Florida.

Larranaga has been the star of the Patriots' odyssey. His stories circulated through the Patriot Center again on Tuesday. Only this time, it was the players telling them.

"We released butterflies my sophomore year outside the Patriot Center," senior Lamar Butler said. "We actually had a ceremony. We were laughing and he was trying to

get us to be serious. I just couldn't be serious releasing a butterfly. We actually waved goodbye to the butterflies as they flew off."

> And the message that day? "I can't remember."

Well, the week has been a blur. Larranaga said he'd had just eight hours of sleep in the two days since beating Connecticut.

Forward Will Thomas hasn't gotten much rest either, thanks to some of his fellow students. "People keep pulling the fire alarms where we live," said the forward, who resides with his sophomore teammates. "There was one Sunday night, and when the firemen left, 10 minutes later they pulled it again."

Apparently the Mason kids haven't mastered couch burning yet. But they sure are excited about one of the most unlikely Final Four berths in NCAA history.

"A lot of people have come up to me and congratulated me on everything we've done and saying how we've brought George Mason alive now," Folarin Campbell said. "This campus, people said it was dead. Now, a lot of people are just walking around happy." ERIC BRANDNER

Boeheim: Add More Teams to The Big Dance

COLLEGE HOOPS | Jim Boeheim wants more schools playing in the NCAA tournament, and his coaching colleagues appear to agree.

The Syracuse coach believes the tournament field should expand from its current 65 teams and hopes to start lobbying for an increase Friday during a meeting with the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

"I have a number in mind, I think it should probably be about four to six, somewhere in there," Boeheim said. "The problem really is that it shouldn't come down to logistics."

Boeheim believes the rapid increase in Division I schools, to more than 300, and increased parity, as demonstrated by George Mason reaching the Final Four, indicates its time to include more teams. (AP)


A Welcome Slug

The slimy antics of 'Slither' herald a director to watch

FILM | In a world of brain-dead horror remakes, writer-director James Gunn didn't just set out to redo any old fright flick. In the body-snatchers-from-space tale "Slither," he aimed to remake them all – and more.

With the gore-minded glee of a fan attuned to every cinematic scare tactic, Gunn also knows how silly they are, infusing "Slither" with a wicked sense of parody while still crafting a clever, maniacally paced twist on B-movie slimefests.

Gunn establishes the story in a quick opening segment as a meteor hurtles toward Earth. Cut to the Southern burgh of Wheelsy, where bored police chief Bill Pardy (Nathan Fillion of the cult TV series "Firefly" and its big-screen spinoff"Serenity") and a deputy fritter away time in a patrol car by checking the speed of a

whippoor will with their radar gun. They're so benumbed by the snail's pace of their town that they never notice the fiery flash behind them as the meteor crashes in the woods.

Things quickly speed up, though, as lunk-headed businessman Grant Grant (Michael Rooker) stumbles on the meteorite and the giant, oozy slug that crawls out of it. Grant becomes host for a parasite that turns him into a freakish, tentacled predator whose activities unleash hordes of slimy worms that turn the townsfolk into meat-hungry zombies.

Pardy and Grant's wife, Starla (Elizabeth Banks) race through a rip-roaring night of the living dead as they try to put down Grant and his zombie army.

The grisly creature effects and themes of parasitic possession pay respect to "The Thing," "Invasion of the Body Snatchers," the "Alien" franchise, the George Romero zombie flicks and countless other creature features.

Hollywood has hit on a dependable little gold mine churning out shoddy horror remakes. Here's hoping Gunn, who has a truly creative vision for the genre, can find the same commercial success. DAVID GERMAIN (AP)


Talk Among the Animals

The chatty beasts of 'Ice Age 2' embark on another antic quest

FILM | He's the centerpiece of the movie's poster. He's the creature the kids are all waiting to see. And he steals the show with every fleeting moment he's on screen.

Once again, Scrat, the little part-squirrel, part-rodent thing upstages the top-billed talent with his manic antics to secure his precious acorn.

The movie is right on par with the 2002 original: brisk, pleasant and loaded with slapstick that should keep young children giggling, though repetitive enough that parents at times may feel they're sitting through the first "Ice Age" all

over again.

The vocal trio of the original two-thirds droll and dour with Ray Romano and Denis Leary, onethird babbling whirlwind with John Leguizamo - is smartly enlivened through the saucy addition of Queen Latifah as a spunky female mammoth

But it's those moments with Scrat – whose bleats, grunts, howls and yelps are voiced with inarticulate glee by "Ice Age" director Chris Wedge – that are the most memorable.

As the title suggests, endless winter is coming to a close for the prehistoric posse of talking animals. Best pals Manny the mammoth (Romano), Diego the sabertoothed tiger (Leary) and Sid the sloth (Leguizamo) discover a giant ice dam holding back the sea is melting and about to break in a deluge that will flood their valley. So the gang starts a long migration to safety at the other end of the valley.

Even more so than the first movie, the sequel comes off as a series of comic episodes strung together along a loose central story.

In fits and starts, though, the fanged little goof asserts himself as the heart and soul of the "Ice Age" tales, adding warmth and loony pathos to what otherwise would be only a sturdy but temperate franchise. DAVID GERMAIN (AP)

AQUAMARINE (PG, 109 minutes) This mild-mannered comedy tells the story of 13-year-old best friends Claire (Emma Roberts) and Hailey (Joanna "JoJo" Levesque), who discover a mermaid named Aquamarine (Sara Paxton), who has come ashore to find love. She immediately sets her baby blues on a lifeguard named Raymond (Jake McDorman), whom Claire and Hailey have been crushing on all summer. The direction isn't particularly distinguished, but this movie is better than nothing for its woefully underserved tween audience. (AH)

BIG MOMMA'S HOUSE 2 (PG-13,99 minutes) Martin Lawrence is FBI agent Malcolm Turner, who slaps on the big lady equipment (again) so he can pose undercover as a nanny to uncover the nefarious doings of the big daddy of the household. To add subplot injury to main-plot insult, Malcolm has to keep his mission secret from the FBI and his pregnant wife (Nia Long). Please tell me you've heard enough. (DT)

THE BOYS OF BARAKA (Unrated, 84 minutes) This rich, satisfying documentary follows four inner-city boys who discover their potential at a boarding school in Kenya. We meet them as they wend their way through tortured schools and troubled families. Each has demonstrated potential, though, and they are recruited to attend the Baraka School, founded in 1996 by a Baltimore-based foundation. "Baraka" is a soaring, complex testament to survival, character and hope. (AH)

CRASH (R, 100 minutes) The aftermath of Rodney King and 9/11 seems to sear the nostrils of every Los Angeleno in Paul Haggis' Oscar-winning white-knuckle hatefest among characters of almost every ideological, cultural or religious stripe. Asians, Latinos, whites, blacks, rich and poor, Muslim and Christian all clash in this multi-character story. If "Crash" only showed the dark side of humanity, it would barely be worth the viewing. But the movie is also about the best in people. (DT)

DAVE CHAPPELLE'S BLOCK PARTY (R, 103 minutes) This film was shot in September 2004, when Dave Chappelle had just signed a \$50 million deal for his comedy series. There's an innocent joy and a genial detachment, as if he's playing host to his own celebrity. But there's something deeper at work. Even with his

cutting racial satire, he seems uniquely positioned to appeal to white and black Americans. (DT)

EIGHT BELOW (PG, 120 minutes) Eight canines pull their weight literally and figuratively in this lively adventure. The movie, based on true events, starts out with a gripping setup, in which National Science Foundation guide Jerry Shepard (Paul Walker) takes an arrogant scientist on an expedition. When a storm forces the humans to evacuate, Jerry is told he can't go back for the dogs. The movie is an often agonizing depiction of how these animals save themselves, and the sequences of them trying to survive are magnificent and deeply moving (AH)

FAILURE TO LAUNCH (PG-13,97 minutes) This movie is one of the best American films in months and the best comedy since I don't know when. Matthew McConaughey plays a 35-year-old boy-man who still lives with his parents. They hire Sarah Jessica Parker, a specialist in emptying nests, to get him to fall in love with her and move out. On this simple, sturdy frame, the writers work all kinds of comic riffs. The movie is so swift and sure, you can say: It achieves liftoff. (SH)

FIND ME GUILTY (R, 125 minutes) As cinematic distractions go, this one's right up there: the spectacle of Vin Diesel playing a real-life Italian American mobster. With hair. And a gut. Talk about suspension of disbelief. Once I got over that, I found myself charmed by Diesel. Playing the morally compro-

FOR "AWESOME: I... SHOT THAT!," the Beastie Boys handed out video cameras to 50 fans and told them to go wild gathering footage of their October 2004 Madison Square Garden show. But because these are fans behind the cameras, the video is usually headacheinducing in its jerkiness. And the strobe effects and frantic edits certainly don't help, the cuts coming as quickly as DJ Mixmaster Mike works the turntables. The Beastie Boys don't need all this visual trickery and embellishment. As the trio works their way through hits including "So What'cha Want," "Brass Monkey," "Sure Shot" and "Sabotage," they reveal once again that they're a complete blast to watch. CHRISTY LEMIRE (AP) mised Giacomo "Jackie Dee" DiNorscio, Diesel infuses the Lucchese family made man with a convincing cocktail of sweetness and rage. But I was less enamored with the film's scraggly script. This is a courtroom drama without much drama going on. (TERESA WILTZ)

FIREWALL (PG-13, 120 minutes) Harrison Ford plays Jack Stanfield, a security systems designer who is held at gunpoint, along with his family, by a criminal mastermind who knows Jack designed the security for a global bank. Jack must save his family and outwit the bad guys. Unfortunately, Ford's brand of actionhero has become obsolete — at least for him. Although the actor looks great for 63, the job calls for vigor and virility. (DT)

GAME 6 (R,86 minutes) This movie actually springs from the head of a novelist, the postmodernist legend Don DeLillo. It's about a playwright named Nicky Rogan (Michael Keaton) who's on the verge of a nervous breakdown. But the movie's about as serious as the drunk writer's tale. If Rogan's not drinking, he's riding in taxis and making pointless chitchat with the drivers. It never gets either funny or interesting. (SH)

THE HILLS HAVE EYES (R, 105 minutes) This remake of the alleged 1977 Wes Craven classic is by French director Alexandre Aja ("High Tension"), who is a great reworker. The basics are: A disputatious, dysfunctional clan is headed to California. You can tell they're doomed to slaughter, in all sorts of ways: burning at the stake, pickax in the head, etc. Aja was clearly working on a big budget for his first American film and was told he could do anything he could think of. Visually, the movie is wildly alive, full of sure touches. (SH)

INSIDE MAN (R, 129 minutes) A deft, tense, pure thriller, this movie has great star turns and is brilliantly directed by Spike Lee. One morning, a Wall Street bank is taken over by heavily armed robbers. Cops quickly gather, headed by Detective Keith Frazier (Denzel Washington). But just when you think the movie's going to settle down to "Dog Day Afternoon II," it mutates weirdly (the first of several times) with the arrival of Jodie Foster, whose job is to make certain no one discovers what's in a certain safe deposit box. The movie is full of attractive people, smart dialogue, surprises and final satisfaction. (SH)

JOYEUX NOEL (PG-13, 116 minutes) This film tells the true story of a spontaneous truce during the first winter of World War I, when German, French and Scottish troops laid down their arms and spent Christmas singing carols, exchanging tobacco and whiskey and otherwise *Continued on page 26*

The first two-thirds of the movie are strangely inert, as the characters and historical context are established, but it ends with a moving and sophisticated meditation on the definition of moral duty. (AH) LARRY THE CABLE GUY: HEALTH **INSPECTOR** (PG-13, 89 minutes) This film features but one joke and it's only funny the first time, although they tell it 88 more times. Larry, who is to blue-collar as John Wayne is to westerns, appears in some tony setting where his low-rent, get-rdone crudity and his amply displayed gluteus maximus groove shocks a batch of swanky, indignant twerps, until his natural cunning and goodness bites them on the, er, assumption. Larry (Dan Whitney, by birth) has had a great ride as a standup comedian on cable and albums, but as an actor he's still trying to master the "don't bump into the furniture" skill of screen performance (SH)

MADEA'S FAMILY REUNION (PG-13, 107 minutes) This Tyler Perry movie is a cultural phenomenon, and understanding that is key to understanding the world of Madea (Perry in a dress, wig and bigbreasted fat suit), a tenderhearted black woman who talks straight as she tries to guide lost and broken souls. Some can point to other films of higher artistic quality that deal with resurrecting broken and battered souls of African Americans. Yet Perry has figured out how to deliver his message in a way that has mass appeal. (MARCIA DAVIS)

MATCH POINT (R, 124 minutes) In Woody Allen's new film, Jonathan Rhys-Meyers plays Chris Wilton, a retired tennis player who has given up the pro circuit to teach the rich and untalented. He starts dating a student's sister (Emily Mortenson), when he meets the sultry Nola (Scarlett Johansson). This film is elegant, uncompromising and oh-so nasty. (рт)

MUNICH (R, 140 minutes) Steven Spielberg's film focuses on a small Israeli killing team tasked with hunting and destroying the Palestinian Black September planners of the Munich Oympics massacre of 1972 across Europe and the Middle East. Give the movie credit for its rigor in facing the depressing problem of vengeance. But the film uses memories of the Munich Olympics massacre. was the little Sellers moments that made even the weakest "Pink Panther" a cinematic untouchable. In this version, most of the humor derives from Martin's silly French accent. (AH)

THE SHAGGY DOG (PG, 99 minutes) This movie is a pointless remake of the 1959 Disney classic. Tim Allen plays Dave Douglas, a Type-A careerist and doghater who, through a series of mishaps too ridiculous and tiresome to describe. is injected with the blood of a 300-yearold dog and turns into the pooch of the title. He discovers that he may not be a bad dog but that he has been a terrible husband and father. The movie

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is a nasty, unappealing Allen vehicle, whose comedy chiefly derives from stupid stunts. (AH)


SHE'S THE MAN (PG-13, 105 minutes) In this teen-oriented tribute to Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," Amanda Bynes plays Viola, a soccer jock who disguises herself as her twin brother to join his school team. Bynes's rubbery expressions are occasionally funny, but there's no way people couldn't see through her disguise. For the teens this is aimed for, this won't matter. But once again, Hollywood makes the mistaken assumption that cribbing Shakespearean plots and dumping the poetry will somehow download the Bard's brilliance. (nt)

What neither realize is that the guy Eddie is about to blow the whistle on is a cop, and if he's indicted, that cop will rat out an elite group of detectives. So the cops improvise a series of assassination attempts along what is basically the Chinese New Year parade route to wipe out Eddie and, if necessary, Jack. This feeble thriller is full of nonsense and implausibilities. (SH)

SOPHIE SCHOLL: THE FINAL DAYS (Unrated, 117 minutes) This movie tells the true story of Scholl and her brother, who secretly printed and distributed fliers denouncing Hitler, the injustice of the state and the penchant for atrocity. The story has been told, but Marc Rothemund's riveting, near-documentary is based on a document that became available only after the fall of the Berlin Wall: the actual transcript of Sophie's interrogation by a secret-police functionary named Robert Mohr. (SH)

SOMETHING NEW (PG-13, 100 minutes) Kenya McQueen (Sanaa Lathan) is an African-American woman who goes on a blind date with a white man (Simon Baker). But her girlfriends and family make it clear they're not thrilled about this union, and the closer they get to one another, the more race matters. The fun—and the seriousness — of the movie is in watching a beautiful woman challenge an equal opponent. (DT)

THE SYRIAN BRIDE (Unrated, 98 minutes) Mona (Clara Khoury), a Druze living in the Golan Heights, wants to marry Tallel (Derar Sliman), who lives in Syria. But Syria will allow Mona to enter only if she settles permanently. She makes the painful choice to leave her family forev-

er, but her plans are derailed by bureaucrats on both sides. The movie seems to line up every cultural, sexual and religious fender-bender it can for maximum conflict, but the device is used to reveal touching human complexity. (DT)

SYRIANA (R, 126 minutes) George Clooney plays CIA operative Bob Barnes, an avuncular career agent who used to know where all the bodies were buried — mainly because he did most of the digging. This is a premium-octane thriller about a society that has become insidiously dependent on oil. (DT)

THANK YOU FOR SMOKING (R, 92 min-

utes) As a lobbyist for the tobacco industry, Nick Naylor (Aaron Eckhart) realizes that disingenuousness is a moral survival strategy: Don't think of cigarettes as a health hazard, Nick says, consider them a symbol of America's right to choose. Watching Nick get away with murder is the fun of this adaptation of Christopher Buckley's 1994 novel. But as a satire on Tobacco Inc.'s ability to market carbon monoxide as the elixir of life, this movie should be packing more nicotine. (DT) **THE THREE BURIALS OF MELQUIADES ESTRADA** (R, 97 minutes) Rancher Pete Perkins (Tommy Lee Jones), needs a

ULTRAVIOLET (90 minutes, PG-13) An ultra-stupid fusion of sci-fi cliche, cyberspace stylings and wretched kung fu antics, starring Milla Jovovich's muscle-y stomach—the only fascinating thing in this movie. She plays a "hemophage," a genetically engineered superhuman who, having tasted the pleasures of Godhood, does not want to give them up. 



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

Concern grows in Pr. George's over crime at apartment complexes

Sakinah Thompson moved into Southview Apartments after college, drawn to the Washington area by its abundance of young black professionals and diverse social life. At \$600 a month, her one-bedroom apartment was a bargain in a region with skyrocketing rents.

She had lived in the Prince George's County complex two years when, on a spring night in 2003, a man in a ski mask hid in her bathroom, a hammer tucked in his belt. Minutes after she arrived home, he raped her.

After learning of the attack, Southview manager Odell Moon visited Thompson in her apartment. She remembers asking him if he was going to post notices to warn other residents. Moon said it was the first time he was aware of a sexual assault there.

Then he asked if she'd like to move to another apartment on the property. "Are you kidding me?" she recalled telling him. She moved out of Southview the next week.

A year later, after five more women reported being attacked, Thompson learned she was hardly the first victim at the sprawling complex near the District border. Dozens of other sex offenses had been reported previously to Prince George's police. In the past decade, there have been 63 reported incidents, ranging from assaults to fondling and attempted sex crimes. The victims were as young as 8 and as old as 73.

Southview managers like Moon say they were not aware of most sex offenses, and for years posted no warnings about the assaults. The managers sent out general safety

cautions and supplemented a team of resident "courtesy officers" by hiring off-duty county police. But the off-duty officers were absent many days.

Infuriated by what she learned, Thompson sued Southern Management, the property's owner, contending that it had a responsibility to provide more protection. The complex, spread over 60 acres with 1,406 apartments, has no security cameras or alarm systems.

"Sexual assaults or not, we never heard anything about any crimes," Thompson said in a recent interview. The Washington Post generally does not name victims of sex assaults without their permission and is not using Thompson's entire name at her request.

Six other tenants who were sexually assaulted at Southview have filed similar lawsuits in the past five years. The company has settled four of the suits and the others are pending.

The lawsuits underscore the pervasive problem of crime in the county around garden apartments, which former Prince George's executive and Maryland Gov. Parris N. Glendening once called "breeding grounds for trouble."

Unlike some of the other complexes that have been cited as crime magnets, Southview is neither rundown nor graffiti-sprayed. Crime in the immediate area is common, but not the worst in the county.

While tenants such as Thompson blame their landlords, Southern Management blames the county for assigning inadequate police resources to the area. Ron Frank, Southern Management's president,

said his company could not pay offduty officers for 24-hour patrols and still keep rents affordable. "It's not my responsibility" to do the job of the police, Frank said. And police officials say they can't be expected to be a constant presence in every apartment building.

"We've committed a tremendous amount of investigative hours there," said Lt. Col. Vincent C. Gay, chief of the county police Investigative Services Bureau. "Every incident reported there was thoroughly investigated."



Where Was the Review?



Zachary Schrag opens the doors on Metro history

IT'S EASY TO DWELL on the broken escalators and ugly orange seats, but to George Mason University history professor Zachary Schrag, D.C.'s subway system is a wonder to behold. In "The Great Society Subway: A History of the Washington Metro," he maps the development of the system from a twinkle in the eye of city planning wonks to today's 100-mile, multitentacled reality. Express' Vicky Hallett saw how he fared with these questions.

How did you become so interested in the Metro?

I was born in New York in 1970 and there was a subway stop on every corner. We moved to D.C. in 1977 when there was just this little stub of a Metro. I thought this was a joke. But in 1984, it finally got out to where I was living, Friendship Heights, and then the city was mine. This is an experience most American kids don't get until they're 16 and can drive. I got it two years early because of the Metro.

What surprised you the most about Metro's history?

That the Metro was affected so much by national politics. When I started this, there was no hint that I would have to go to four presidential libraries. But very early on, there were two key reports. A 1959 report said to build highways everywhere. A 1962 report said build rail everywhere. These were just three years apart and done by many of the same people. What had changed in that time? The election of JFK.

What would have happened if **JFK** hadn't been elected?

We might well have had a small subway line and a lot more highways. If you want to know what that would have looked like, go to Atlanta. If you can afford to drive in Atlanta, you drive. The people who take transit aren't there by choice, and they're disproportionately poor.

Contrary to the myth, you say Georgetown was never going to get a Metro stop.

Georgetown didn't want the Metro,

but it didn't matter one way or the other. I talked to the three men who designed the Metro and they all told the same story. The system was for commuters and Georgetown was not a high priority, and it would have had to have been built very far underground. If Georgetown had begged for one, though, they might have gotten it. A lot of people in Washington believe that everything is done to benefit rich white

people at the expense of poor black people. That's only true part of the time, not all of the time.

What about the Green Line taking until 1991 to open?

What interests me is that it exists at all. That it was slowed down so much was because of the activism of the neighborhoods. [Metro planners] studied whether to put the stop on Howard's campus, but the priority of the community was to rebuild the commercial strip on U Street after the riots.

Do you have a favorite Metro stop?

It may well be Dupont Circle because it's a side platform station with a mezzanine on both ends and a grand escalator. That probably gives it an edge over Judiciary Square.

What's the future of Metro?

The proposed Dulles extension is exciting. It will make Tysons pedestrian-friendly, and for Loudon, it will determine whether growth becomes classic American sprawl or turns into something more planned. Airport access is an added bonus.

What's it like for you to walk into a Metro station?

I still feel like I'm entering the future. The lighting effects of when a train is coming and that shadow appears across the vault, and when the doors open and light spills out — it's a moment of intense drama.



that U.S. house sizes keep getting bigger, it often seems like condos — affordable D.C. ones, at least — are getting smaller. So how do you furnish a pint-sized pad without making it look like an overstuffed dorm room or a crammed storage unit? "It's really about simplifying, using furniture that has more than one purpose," says Grace Bonney, a.k.a. Design Sponge, who dishes on decor trends in her popular blog (design sponge.blogspot.com). Multi-use pieces range from beds with drawers in their bases to foldout tables that attach to the wall like retro Murphy beds.

Brooklyn-based Bonney, who just moved from a 450-square-foot apartment into an 850-square-foot railroad flat, also recommends painting walls in warm neutral colors to make rooms look bigger, hanging pendant lamps from the ceiling to free up valuable floor real estate and seeking smaller-sized furniture (Pottery Barn and IKEA both produce many apartment-scale merch).

But sometimes, using an oversized, "statement" piece (a towering Victorian secretary, an oversized abstract painting) can add visual spice. "When everything in your apartment is small, you really don't have a focal point," says Kim Hessler, a D.C. interior designer and owner of Logan Circle's Dragonfly Design Decor. "Using something large — like a Chinese apothecary cabinet with lots of drawers — looks interesting. And a large piece can hold a lot of things, like towels or a computer, that you don't want lying around." Here are some products both great and small that'll make a tiny space chic. "When you move lights to the ceiling, it makes a big difference in your space," says design blogger Grace Bonney. 



With a little give and take, couples thrive in teeny apartments

For couples who share tiny spaces, every moment presents an opportunity to snuggle up with the one you love. When you live in an apartment the size of a dorm room, everything — making dinner, doing dishes, folding laundry, paying bills — takes on a certain intimacy, whether you want it to or not.


The "tour" of Jennifer and Jeremy Haile's apartment lasts only as long as it takes a visitor to glance from left to right about 45 degrees. For the past four years, since returning from a Peace Corps stint overseas, the couple has called a 416-square-foot Georgetown studio home.

Their bed – which is also


one of their two couches — is a futon, hard up against the front door. Books, papers, vitamins and foodstuffs share shelf space in one corner. The computer doubles as an entertainment center; they watch DVDs on it and store all of their music on its hard drive. Their refrigerator and stove look like full-size versions that have been shrunk to about 65 percent by some sort of kitchen-appliance copying machine.

Wait: It gets better. Jeremy Haile is currently a first-year law student at George Washington University and does most of his studying at home. And because first-year law students study more or less around the clock, peace and quiet are more valuable to him right now than anything.

During exams, he says, "I was pulling close to 20-hour days. But *Continued on page E13*

Jen has the patience of Job. She would use headphones [to watch TV or listen to music]; she prepared all of my meals, and I'd go in my little corner and study. And somehow it worked."

The Hailes are no strangers to domestic deprivation. As Peace Corps volunteers, they lived in what they refer to as a "Sovietstyle" apartment in Armenia, where it was so cold that any water left in the bathtub would freeze over. "To go into the kitchen, you had to dress like you were going outside," Jennifer says.

For two years they slept in a twin bed, with only a small kerosene heater — and each other — to warm them. "Now, when we go to a hotel and there's a king-size bed, we sleep together at the very edge of it," she says. "We don't really know how to sleep apart."

Living in comically cramped quarters may be easier when you're madly in love with your roommate, the Hailes say, but that doesn't necessarily make it easy. Every move they make reflects a negotiation of sorts. "Jeremy was losing his eyesight during his first semester," says Jennifer, an events coordinator for National Public Radio. "He thought he was going to have to get glasses. The doctor told him: 'You have to stop reading in such small amounts of light.' What was happening was that I would go to bed at 10:30 or so, and he would turn on this tiny little lamp" to stay up reading until 1:00 a.m. or later. "So now I have to go to bed with the lights on, which is unfortunate." Her husband recently bought her a sleeping mask. (It helps.)

"The three Cs – communication, commitment and compromise – will get you through almost any sort of conflict," says Regina Leeds, a Los Angeles-based professional organizer and author of the 2003 book "Sharing a Place Without Losing Your Space: A Couple's Guide to Blending Homes, Lives, and Clutter" (Alpha Books). In her work with cohabiting couples, she has learned that one of the most frequent sources of disagreement is over where to put, and indeed whether to keep, the innumerable things that accrue over the course of their lives.

"People usually bring too much stuff with them," says Leeds. "And then they make assumptions about that stuff. I'll presume that you're going to love my mother's pink china - and that this is what we will be using on the holidays. And I don't talk to you about it, because, well, surely, if you love me, you can see how beautiful this is. You, on the other hand, are presuming that I see how beautiful your mother's beige china is."

Both presumptions are wrong, she suggests. "Especially in a small space, you need to divest yourself of everything that is not critical. That can mean tossing things. But it can also mean getting a storage space, or better yet, asking Mom and Dad if you can store things in their garage, or in your old room."

That idea worked for Brad Koons. When his parents moved from Arizona to a nearby suburb in Maryland, he persuaded them to let him keep his car and his copious outdoor gear at their house, rather than at the minuscule English basement he and his wife, Cynthia, share near Dupont Circle. Though it's a one-bedroom, their apartment appears to be smaller than the Hailes' studio. (They don't know how many square feet it is, and have never asked. The figure wasn't disclosed in the original "for lease" listing.

Imagine that.)

But the Koonses — he's a lawyer, she just received her graduate degree - aren't complaining. "We think of the size of the apartment as the price of getting to have a completely walkable lifestyle," Cynthia says. "We really appreciate that we can walk to anything we need in the neighborhood. 

Columbia Heights, Soaring

Condo market, retail development sizzle in Columbia Heights

When Marty Zupancic moved to Columbia Heights in Northwest Washington more than five years ago, he was disappointed by the lack of services and hangouts in his new neighborhood. "It's kind of shocking when you realize that there's nothing here," said Zupanic, now 32. "That's the big problem in Columbia Heights right now: There are so many people and so

few establishments. When I moved here, I assumed that I could get out of bed and get a cup of coffee. I walked about two hours in each direction, and didn't find anything."

But instead of decamping to a more happening 'hood, Zupancic took action. He opened Columbia Heights Coffee (3416 11th St. NW; 202-986-0079) nearly three years ago, enlisting the services of neighborhood contractors to create a cozy café. Now, this space with with exposed brick walls and black-and-white photos of D.C.

draws laptop-toting caffiends with free wi-fi, and avid readers with its relative peace and quiet. Since opening the coffeehouse, Zupanic has seen the neighborhood turn into a real-estate hot zone, in part because people like him didn't give up on a neighborhood with so much untapped potential.

New businesses, a Green Line Metro stop and a revitalized sense of community have also lured condominium developers with dollar signs in their eyes. The most notable ventures include the long-



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anticipated DC USA project -a500,000-square-foot retail center scheduled for completion in early 2008 – and the Tivoli Square project, which encompasses a new Giant Foods store, GALA Hispanic Theatre, condos and several eateries. The multiuse complex makes its home in the grand 1924 Tivoli Theatre, a former movie palace. Other tenants expected soon: a restaurant called Rumberos (April), a Carvel Ice Cream shop (May) and Ruby Tuesday's (July).

Among the many new condo buildings popping up, Columbia Station at 3500 13th St. NW has been selling for only nine weeks. Buyers have already snapped up 23 of the 40 total units, priced from \$249,000 to \$449,000; developers expect a sell-out in the next three months. "Buyers seem excited to be [moving in] at the beginning of one of the hottest neighborhoods in Washington," said John Fitzgerald, a partner with Tenacity Group, which is selling the Columbia Station units. "Because of DC USA, a lot of them have this really nice vision of being in a walking community. The Giant Foods has a lot to do with it."

Columbia Heights is bordered on the west by 16th St., on the east by Georgia Avenue, on the north by Spring St. and on the south by Florida Avenue. Within those boundaries, buyers can choose from about a dozen current and future condo complexes. While the developer touts Columbia Station as an affordable choice, many properties list at higher price points. Highland Park, which will encompass 229 luxury condo units as well as street-level retail on 14th and Irving streets NW after its 2007 completion, offers condos with asking prices of up to \$744,900. (Highland

Park has reserved 30 percent of its units to be sold at belowmarket prices.) And The Lofts of Columbia Heights, going up at 2750 14th St. NW, boasts units ranging in price from \$464.000 to \$700,000. Slated to be completed this summer, the Lofts will also include first-floor retail space with Continued on page E20



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

Kevin Powers, a 26-yearold communications strategist who currently lives in a Dupont Circle studio apartment, recently purchased a condo in Columbia Station. Powers seems excited about moving to the neighborhood, particularly because of the impending retail explosion. "It seems to be one of those areas with ambitious development plans," he said. "The idea of living within walking distance of a Best Buy is fantastic."

Though many condo buildings are going up north of Columbia Road NW, the southern portion of the neighborhood has also attracted new developments. Gail Montplaisir, the developer — and a resident — of The Lofts at Meridian Hill at 2307 and 2311 15th St. NW, is also behind southern Columbia Heights' City Overlook, a condo development at 1454 Belmont Rd. NW set for completion this summer.

The building houses 18 units priced between \$300,000 and \$1 million. "Everything has become extremely dynamic, and the dynamism was actually here before the development," Montplaisir said of the blocks surrounding City Overlook. "We like to find places where the neighbors are welcoming and friendly."

Those neighbors hail from a variety of income brackets, countries and cultures, which gives Columbia Heights a distinctive, polyglot atmosphere. The multiculti, urban vibe attracts cultural organizations as well as condoseekers. The Dance Institute of

Washington, which specializes in arts education and sponsors the Washington Reflections Dance Company, is building a performance facility at the corner of 14th and Monroe streets NW.

Last January, GALA Hispanic Theatre became the first tenant at Tivoli Square. The 20-year-old company performs works in both Spanish and English. "This is the heart of the Latino community, and it's close to 14th St.'s theater scene. It feels right that we're here," said GALA's production manager, Alessandra D'Ovido. "And since we bring other arts organizations in - Washington Performing Arts Society, school groups - it seems like we're adding to the neighborhood."

The surrounding St.s themselves also yield a variety of art, from African-inspired sculptures on Belmont St. NW to the fountain- and statue-rich Meridian Hill Park, which often hosts performance artists and regularly features a drum circle on Sundays, said Montplaisir. "It also tends to be a gathering place whenever there are demonstrations in the city."

Further north in Columbia Heights, there are days when 14th St. feels like part of Central or South America. The singsong sounds of Spanish echo in corner stores and conjunto beats buzz on car stereos.

Luis Marroquin, a native of El Salvador, has lived in or near Columbia Heights for the past 37 years. He has also lived in Mexico, which inspired him to open Taqueria Distrito Federal (3463 14th St.; 202-986-1138), a down-home spot with lime-colored walls, a shrine to the Virgin of Guadalupe and servers who rarely speak English. Marroquin decorated his restaurant with bright colors, folk art and photos to evoke south-of-the-border climes.


Marroquin prides himself on offering traditional Mexican cuisine. He even imports his Pepsi and Coca-Cola from Mexico because he said they taste different than the U.S. versions.

"Even though I'm Salvadorean, my cooks are Mexican," he said. "There are plenty of places where vou can get Salvadorean food."

local food critics, and the customers keep coming back. Marroquin said non-Latinos often point at what they want on the menu, which includes beef barbacoa and goat, plus tacos, burritos and other dishes.

Marroquin, who has two young daughters, said he believes crime

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'Hood hangout has movie nights, cool brews and live bands

Sure, the beer's always cold and the crowds usually convivial at Columbia Heights' funky Wonderland Ballroom. But it's the weekly events — a Monday trivia game, a Wednesday happy hour for parents (with kids in tow) and a Sunday movie screening — that make this laid-back corner bar stand out. The second level "ballroom," really a moderate-sized room with a small stage, a bar and second-hand sofas, hosts bands and live DJ nights, and there's also a loaded jukebox.

Husband and wife owners

Matthew McGovern (a former bartender at Madam's Organ) and Rose Donna opened the joint a year and a half ago. They decked the walls with metal beer signs and quirky artifacts (a barber's pole, vintage album sleeves) and filled the drinks menu with Double Diamond English ale, Bürgerbraü Czech lager and Delirium Tremens, a high-alcohol Belgian beer.

A diverse crowd of neighborhood residents shows up here most nights, but aging hipsters often dominate. Expect many of them to turn out for movie nights in April, when a four-week festival of Coen brothers flicks begins mid-month. R.R.

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

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Home Front

The Washington Post HOME **STAFF** share their decorating advice every Thursday at 11 a.m. on washingtonpost.com/liveonline.

I'm looking for moderately priced patio furniture, but I haven't seen anything I love. Any suggestions on where to look, other than Lowes, Home Depot and Crate and Barrel?

Restoration Hardware has a great new collection — it's very substantial, outdoor-room stuff. (No straps.) But you'll pay big for it. Grandin Road, the little sister to Frontgate, has a good looking wicker lounging-around line (grandinroad.com). Also try outdoor living stores like Offenbacher Pool 'n' Patio. The new Smith & Hawken line for Target is worth looking at. as is Martha's line for K-Mart.

An area rug can really pull a room together, but the home I just bought is fully carpeted. Can I put an area rug over carpet, or is that a big decorating no-no?

Gary Lovejoy of Washington, one of our top-tier designers, said it's just fine to do that. But the wallto-wall carpeting needs to be very low pile for it to work. You generally don't need a non-skid rug pad because the carpeting serves that purpose.

I love the look of sisal rugs with the colored "tape" along the edges, but want something softer on my feet for my family room! Any suggestions on where to buy a soft sisal look-alike?

We are soooo over those sisals with the two-inch binding in green or brown or leather or whatever. We need some new looks in inexpensive carpeting. Check out some of the great rugs at West Elm at Tysons Corner, CB2.com or capelrugs.com.

I don't need decorating help so much as I need arranging help. Is there someone who can come to your house, look at your rooms and your stuff, and then say, put this here and that there?

Yes. There are people who specialize in makeovers. And you can find one through your local chapter of the American Society for Interior Designers. In D.C., that is 202-488-4100.

Any recommendations on where a do-it-yourself decorator on a budget might find ideas? I'm trying to find books, magazines, etc., but everything seems too high-end.

We like Domino, Cottage Living and Budget Living magazines. Also check out "\$500 Room Makeovers" by Lisa Quinn (Clarkson Potter, \$22.50). She gives you lots of tips on color palettes, inexpensive window treatments and theme rooms.

We are trying to decide whether to get stainless steel or white appliances. Our kitchen doesn't exact-Iv have a modern look, nor does the rest of the house. What do you recommend? We have white cabinets with silver knobs and the kitchen is pretty much microscopic.

Kitchen gurus are already saying that stainless is on its way out. So go with white, which will always be in.

I'm having trouble finding a smaller-than-2x3-foot accent rug for a small powder room. Can you recommend a store?

Have you tried Linens 'n' Things or Bed Bath & Beyond? Bloomingdale's has a great bathroom department too.

Besides Home Depot and Great Indoors, where else can I find traditional drawer pulls for my dresser?

Restoration Hardware has a great collection.

Any idea where I can find ovalshaped seat cushions for a pair of wicker chairs?

That's a tough one. Sounds like you need to find a friend who sews to make them for you.

Any recommendations for local places I can buy mohair upholstery fabric? (The kind of mohair with a straight pile — kind of like velvet with a longer pile.) I want to have a few pillows made with it.

We just called Discount Fabrics USA in beautiful Thurmont, Md. (discountfabricsusa.com, 301-271-2266). They try to carry mohair all the time.

Can you offer some color suggestions for the classic old-style black-and-white bathroom - small

black-and-white tile floor and white tile with black trim on the walls about halfway up. The hall carpet is brown and the walls are light grayish-green. The bathroom doesn't have to match the hall colors, but I don't want it to clash, since the door is always open when its not in use. I've got maroon in there now on the towels and curtains, but I'm ready for a change.

Black-and-white bathrooms are the best — anything goes. You can choose towels in bold colors such as hot pink, yellow, kelly green or marine blue. You could paint the walls a high-gloss white, then vary the towel colors. The shower curtain can be stripes, dots, geometrics, florals etc.

I've got a guest bedroom question. I recently purchased all-new linens — beautiful, crisp whites and I'm looking to paint the walls a nice, inviting color, perhaps a shade of blue. (Right now, the walls are also white.) Any thoughts on what might work well? I don't want the room to feel too masculine or too feminine, and I'm trying to stay away from the neutrals so there will be good contrast with the linens. Seen any color combos you can recommend?

Sherwin Williams Hinting Blue is a kind of pale grayish blue. It will look different in morning and afternoon sun. If you want something stronger, try Vast Sky, a pale Wedgwood blue.

What type of flooring is appropriate in a kitchen/family combination room? I need something sturdy because I have kids and pets.

We keep plugging wood laminate for high-traffic, high-kid, high-pet areas. It works. Jura's got Pergo that is 7 years old, and even cat's claws haven't damaged it. Nor teenage boys. Nor golf cleats.

After two years of living with us in our small townhouse, our son and his family are finally moving out and facing the world on their own. We need a lot of work done. How can we make a significant but affordable change to pep up our empty nest?

What we would say is, first, enjoy your new space. Clean it up, toss or give away stuff you don't need and paint the walls a nice semi-gloss neutral like a warm Behr Eggnog. Don't start filling it up again for a little while. Space is a luxury.

I have 17-year-old daughter who'd like to update her room. She'll be leaving for college in a year, so a complete redesign isn't necessary but a "face-lift" is certainly in order. Any suggestions? She's a trendy girl who favors pinks and greens.

Check out Pottery Barn Teen (pbteen.com). They have a lot of pink and green. Some new sheets, a new coat of paint, new pillows and things like that will help make the room look fresh.

I am in search of area rugs for a new baby's room, as well as a master bedroom (which seems like an overstatement for a room that is 12x12, but what can you do). I would like the rugs to cover most of the floor. I've had trouble finding something nice and soft that's the right size and the right price. Is a trek out to Greenfront in order? Any other suggestions?

We consulted "DC Baby," a great book by Sarah Masterson. She likes IKEA for kids' furnishings, and IKEA has great inexpensive rugs. Also try Pottery Barn Kids.

I'm looking for a valance or window treatment for a window in a dining room. The walls are light brown and the dining table is a contemporary glass-top. Silk may be too fancy. We're having difficulty choosing the style, fabric and color.

Sage green would be nice with the light brown. A latte color might also be nice. JCPenney has a great window treatment department. Also, Bed Bath & Beyond has expanded its collection to include lifestyle diva B.Smith's line.

What area stores can you recommend for a wide selection of lighting? I need sconces to place around my living-room fireplace.

Dominion Electric Supply is currently having a 15 percent off in-stock lighting sale. The Great Indoors is a particular favorite of Annie's. Illuminations is high-end, but the style and service is terrific — it's located both in Cady's Alley and at 8th St. NW. Restoration Hardware has great sconces. Annapolis Lighting has locations all over, too. Gaylord's in Bethesda is more traditional but has great service — and they often can fix your lamps while you wait. New Luxury Condos across from **Branch Avenue Metro** and the Town Center at Camp Springs

Sin City In Rosslyn

An ultra-luxe Vegas complex will have a little sister in Virginia

So what do Arlington and Las Vegas have in common, you ask?

Why, an ultra-luxury condo tower being built by South Florida developer Turnberry Ltd., of course.

Never heard of Turnberry? You're probably not traveling in the right circles. Think Miami condos, the Fairmont Turnberry Isle Resort & Club and Aventura Mall in South Florida, a planned redevelopment of the iconic Fontainebleau Hotel in Miami Beach, an earlier Vegas condo project that was the first on the Strip, a joint Vegas hotel-condo venture to connect to the MGM Grand casino, and resorts in the Bahamas and Orlando.

There are some differences, though, as you might expect, between what's happening in Sin City and right here in Rosslyn.

At Turnberry Towers Las Vegas, the dual 45-story towers are a three-minute walk from the Strip. The apartments cost from \$500,000 to more than \$1.3 million. The project is right across the street from the company's first ultra-expensive Vegas project, Turnberry Place — and from the showgirls at the Sahara.

Turnberry Tower Arlington, to be built on the site of what's now a Best Western hotel near Key Bridge, will be just 26 stories. But that's enough to qualify it as the tallest condo building in Rosslyn or Arlington and maybe even in the region, according to Turnberry and Arlington County planners who approved the tower by different names in 2001 and 2004.

The high-rise at 1881 N. Nash St., scheduled to be finished in the spring of '08, will have 247 units, ranging in size from 1,312 square feet for one bedroom and 1½ baths to 5,304 square feet for the tower suite — three bedrooms, a formal dining room, a library, a lounge, a staff suite and 5½ baths.

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

than in Vegas. They range from \$800,000 to a little more than \$6 million for the penthouse, according to Jim Cohen, vice president of sales and marketing of Turnberry Ltd. in Miami.

Turnberry Tower Arlington won't have access to casinos; the 176-room Best Western sits next door to a Holiday Inn. But it will have those Rosslyn views of Georgetown, the monuments and the Potomac.

And it will have amenities including private elevators, a spa and fitness center, an indoor swimming pool, Italian cabinets, Miele appliances, Jacuzzi tubs and floor-to-ceiling windows. Plus, it will be "green" building certified, for environmentalists with a lot of green.

But aren't both ventures big gambles in two overheated condo markets?

After all, Arlington and Fairfax counties have 14,000 condo units under construction and 28,000 more planned or proposed, but only 4,000 units there sold last year, according to Kenneth Wenhold, director of the Virginia-Maryland division of MetroStudy, a Houston-based market research firm.

And in Las Vegas, where some had estimated last November that as many as 50 towers were being built or planned, the climate appears to have become way too cool lately, leading several developers to pull the plug. Among those leaving: Ivana Trump, ex-wife of Donald, who apparently doesn't vanna build her Ivana Las Vegas anymore, and Related Cos., which took 500 luxury units off the market in January.

Turnberry, however, sees no problem in either market, Cohen said.

Before deciding to enter the Washington region about a year and a half ago, "we watched that market," he said. "And it really had a good feeling as an area of need for luxury. We specialize in luxury, that's the basis of the whole business."

Since a sales office opened in the back of the Best Western about five months ago, around 120 condos have sold, including a \$4 million unit, he said.

The experts can be wrong on such things, Cohen added.

"All the experts said not to go into condos in Las Vegas," said Cohen, because tourists wouldn't desert the hotels for their own luxury suites. "But we went against all the experts and had tremendous success."

Vegas still is "very strong" for developers who are careful, he explained. And that means catering to buyers who will live in the buildings, not those who are simply making a speculative investment. "We didn't jump on the investor market. We take a 30 percent deposit on a condo ... and that takes away a lot of the investors," Cohen said.

In the Washington area, "we

know that the investor market has dried up quite a bit," he said. "But our sales pace is just as we estimated it going in."

The project "has wonderful amenities" and "the model looks great," said Ann Worley, an agent with McEnearney Associates in McLean, who had clients who considered buying there. She noted that the tower has lots of competition at the high end, in Rosslyn and Georgetown.

Her clients, who were in their seventies, decided not to buy because "it will take three years to build" and because "the best views are already gone."

Turnberry is partnering on the project with Facchina Development Co. of La Plata. The luxury tower was originally approved in mid-2001 as an even more swank building, with only about 176 units and a different developer. But the plan was suspended after Sept. 11, 2001, and re-approved with a different name and more units in 2004. SANDRA FLEISHMAN (THE WASHINGTON POST)

Lauren and Chris Abi-Najm moved to the Washington area from Georgia last winter with a plan: They would save up and buy a place of their own. And to save up, they would move in with his parents in Lorton.

With two good jobs - he's a computer network engineer and she's an occupational therapist it seemed feasible.

The couple, still stunned by high home prices here, found a \$423,000 condo they liked in a new Shirlington development. And then they had to contend with another big number: a 5 percent earnest-money deposit.

"Twenty-two thousand? I definitely thought, that's a lot of money," said Lauren Abi-Najm, 28. She and her husband were thousands of dollars short.

Throughout the recent housing boom, many Washington area residents have relied on low- or no-down-payment mortgages to purchase houses they otherwise may not have had the cash to afford.

So-called 103 percent loans even cover closing costs. But even in these times of low down payments, first-time home buvers are finding that they still need cash - and yes, a lot of it sometimes.

That money goes to up-front deposits, often referred to as earnest money. For new homes, the deposit amount is set by the builder and paid to reserve a unit. In resales, the amount is more loosely defined. In the recent buying frenzy, the size of the deposit sometimes became the determining factor in who won a bidding war.

Because deposits represent up to 10 percent of the purchase

price, they have mushroomed along with home prices. After five years of double-digit gains in home values, even entry-level buyers in this region now face earnest-money deposits that can easily equal a year's salary.

That has sent would-be homeowners scrambling for cash from parents, second jobs, even retirement funds.

Some, real estate agents say, have resorted to more creative measures, such as negotiating signing bonuses on their first jobs, selling belongings on eBay

and, in at least one case, pawning a family heirloom.

"The earnest money is one of the single biggest problems for young people," said Donna Evers, president of Evers & Co. Real Estate Inc. in the District.

"It is a dilemma for young buyers who don't have a history of savings. Most people aren't going to take their houses off the market for a tiny earnest money deposit," said Denise Champion, a Districtbased real estate agent with Long & Foster in Chevy Chase.

So just how much earnest money should buyers offer?

There is no written rule, and customary deposits vary by location and type of housing.



Heather and Brett Huhman scraped together only \$2,000 in earnest money, but found a zero-down mortgage, which allowed them to buy a Derwood townhouse.

Local real estate agents said they have seen earnest money as low as a \$1,000 deposit on a condo in Prince William County. Champion recalled one buyer who offered to put 100 percent of the purchase price of a Northwest Washington house into escrow, and thus beat out the competition in a bidding war.

Generally, though, a good guideline to follow is 5 percent to 10 percent of the purchase price, Evers said. For a \$400,000 house, then, buyers can expect to put up \$20,000 to \$40,000 in earnest money.

For sellers, that kind of cash serves as a safety blanket, because buyers risk losing it if they back out of a deal.

For buyers, the deposit is a way Continued on page E32

to show they are sincere about their offer. The bigger the deposit, the thinking goes, the less likely the buyers are to walk away.

Earnest money is not given directly to the seller; it's put into an escrow account. If the offer is rejected, the money is returned to the buyer. If it is accepted, the cash is generally used toward the down payment or closing costs, or returned to the buyer at settlement.

Heather and Brett Huhman, who moved to Montgomery County last year after graduating from the University of Missouri at Columbia, consider themselves among the lucky ones.

They did not have much

to offer in the way of earnest money. In fact, they had only \$2,000, scraped together from cash gifts they had received at their wedding in June.

"To us, that was a lot of money," said Heather Huhman, 22. But it represented just half a percent of the asking price on a Derwood townhouse. "We were definitely concerned. But we didn't really have other options."

Of course, it helped that the three-bedroom unit had been on the market for a while. (The seller had moved out.)

And the Huhmans' offer had other strengths. Both have good credit: They learned that they could buy a home through a zero-down loan for a monthly payment that was not much more than the rent they were paying for

They also have good jobs: He is an electrical engineer for L-3 Communications Titan Group; she is in public relations.

The seller was willing to work with them. To avoid paying closing costs up front, the couple bid \$15,000 above the asking price and the seller in turn paid the closing costs.

"We thanked the seller profusely at closing," said Heather Huhman, who now works for a public relations firm whose clients include Evers, the real estate agent.

One way to come up with a solid earnest-money offering, of course, is the old-fashioned way: save. But increasingly, real estate agents and mortgage brokers said, not too many are patient enough to do that.

"We as a society can get everything we want immediately," said ter," said Maura Sullivan of Long

Mark Chilli, a loan officer with Mortgage Capital Investors in Woodbridge. "If I want a car, I can get it now with a lease. If you go to Best Buy, you can buy a plasma screen TV for zero percent financing."

To come up with their deposits, buyers have located cash in unexpected places. Some have temporarily liquidated their stocks, while others have sold their cars, real estate agents said.

One young couple hawked a diamond necklace, a family heirloom, for half its value for a \$5,000 deposit, said Todd Hetherington of Century 21 New Millennium in Alexandria.

Another buyer turned to her boss for a \$20,000 earnest-money deposit.

"She had been working for this guy for a long time. He kind of looked at her almost as a daughter," said Maura Sullivan of Long



& Foster in Woodbridge.

Danielle Canonico, 26, relied on her parents' help for her earnest money. Two years ago, Canonico's parents chipped in the \$12,000 deposit for a Centreville condo. She recently bought a unit in the same Shirlington project as the Abi-Najms. This time, she came up with the deposit money herself.

She plans to sell the first condo. From the profit she expects, Canonico said, she will pay her parents back in full.

"They were willing to help out. They knew it was going to be a good investment," she said.

The Abi-Najms also turned to what Evers calls "the Bank of Mom and Dad."

Last June, Francois and Regina Abi-Najm accompanied their son and daughter-in-law to one of the project's quickly booked sales appointments, and put down the \$22,000 deposit on the spot.

Chris and Lauren Abi-Najm expect to move into the twobedroom condo, which has a sunroom, open floor plan and

hardwood floors, after construction is finished in July.

"It was impossible to afford anything right away," said Lauren Abi-Najm, now the mother of a baby boy. "I really don't know how we could have done it without them."

Her in-laws said it never occurred to them not to pitch in. It doesn't matter if they get the money back or not, they said.

"We come from a large family, and we all help each other," Francois Abi-Najm said.

Jokingly, he added, "It's not for them — it's for my grandson." томоен мигаками тse (the washington post)

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

Condo Crazed?

Va. man debates pros and cons of buying a place in Arlington

James Cave, 34, navigates smoothly through the congested streets of Arlington on a recent workday afternoon. He's wearing a baseball cap and driving a new black SUV. He's the very picture of urban cool, but he is simmering hot with rage. Shaking his head and waving his arms in frustration, he points out what he sees as the rising signs of insanity all around him.

He gestures to one newly built condominium tower where he had considered buying. "\$350,000 to \$1 million," he snorts. "Next to a gas station and a fast-food restaurant. Smell it! Smell it! You can smell the fast food cooking!"

Cave points to another rising edifice. "You can see the signs — luxury condos for \$800,000. What could be so luxurious in a condo?"

He nods toward another pricey

building, mockingly noting that it overlooks a bus parking lot. "That's no view," he says.


Real estate has become an obsession for a lot of people in this region, and Cave is one of them.

With 11 years of work experience as a graphic designer, secure in his job, climbing in his field, Cave is the kind of young man who normally would have already moved into the ranks of smug homeownership. He has spent the past eight years saving for a down payment. He is ready for the nesting phase of life, would like to buy and has identified the neighborhood he wants, but now it all just seems too uncertain, too expensive. And so he waits.

Instead, he spends at least part of every day thinking about real estate — what's for sale, how much it costs, what it looks like. He wonders how people can afford it, whether home prices can continue to rise and what would happen if they were to fall. He worries most about what would happen to him if values were to fall after he finally bought.

A University of Maryland graduate who grew up in Prince George's County, Cave recalls a time when he was about 20, during the real estate slump of the early 1990s, when houses in his family's Bowie neighborhood sat unsold for months, finally changing hands for much less than the owners had hoped.

Cave and other would-be firsttime buyers are part of the reason *Continued on page E36*

the Washington area market has slowed down. Instead of leaping into the market as others did in the past few years, more prospective purchasers are taking their time, agonizing over the decision and, in some cases, deciding to take a wait-and-see approach before committing.

"There are probably the same number of buyers as before, but they are not in any rush to buy," said Rick Bosl, a real estate agent who specializes in the Arlington condo market and works with Keller Williams Realty. And there are just so many more homes for sale, he said.

The multiple listing service lists 462 condos available for sale in Arlington, he said. There are several hundred more units available in new buildings and new condo conversions that aren't listed on that service.

"In some markets, we've seen prices go down, and nobody wants to buy in a falling market," he said. "On the other hand, there can be more opportunities, because if your house has been available for sale on the market for a while, you might be willing to sell for anything that comes along." He added that many condos have appreciated so much that the owners could decide to accept a \$150.000 profit rather than \$200,000, if they wanted to sell quickly.

Houses are now on the market in Arlington for an average of 59 days, up from 22 days a year ago, according to the most recent statistics from the Metropolitan Regional Information Systems, and the number of condo offerings is mounting. In February 2005, 94 condos and coops were for sale in Arlington; in February 2006, that number had increased to 444 units.

But many buyers can't afford condos even at today's prices. When Cave does the numbers, he finds it hard to justify the expense. A couple of years ago, he noted, one-bedroom condos were selling for \$175,000,



and now they are listed at twice the price.

Sitting at the computer in the video production firm where he works, Cave calculates how much he could afford to pay, at various interest rates and with different amounts of down payment. Take, for example, the Arlington condo he rents for \$1,400 a month. Units similar to his have sold for \$480,000. Recently the investor who is his landlord offered to sell him the place for \$440,000. Cave could buy it, but he turned down the

offer. He figured out it would cost him more than \$3,000 a month to own the place, assuming a 20 percent down payment, taxes, insurance and the condo fee.

"It seems like the moorings are coming undone from reality," he said. "It's like the Internet stock craze - you'd sit there and say something doesn't compute here What's happened in the last three years? My salary hasn't gone up anything like that."

He reflects on the old rule of thumb that people shouldn't pay more than one-third of their income for housing. When did that change? Some of his friends, he said, say they are paying 60 percent of their income for housing, doing it with interest-only loans, facing the prospect of balloon payments.

He worries that too many investors bought condos in recent years and that their speculative purchases do not reflect real demand.

"They can flip it and leave someone else holding the bag," Cave said. "That's the world we live in now. They don't care if you're hurt or if you can't pay your mortgage."

So now Cave watches carefully, walking his target market, which

runs from Clarendon to Ballston in Arlington, checking out construction sites to see what is planned, and visiting the models when they become available. He does a lot of his searching on the Internet.

He clicks into one Web site he frequently visits, arlington condo.com, which shows both existing for-sale listings and new complexes, to see what is available. He quickly notes that there are now 47 new complexes being advertised for sale, which strikes him as a lot. He had been noticing that prices seemed to be dropping, and now when he visits the site, he notices that the listed prices are no longer available.

"It's like they're hiding the prices now," he said. "They've all taken the prices off the list."

Still, he said, his friends keep urging him to buy. They say the Washington area market is different than that in other parts of the country because there is so much job growth here and because so many jobs pay well. They talk about the tax advantages they are enjoying.

And, he said, they tell him, "You're throwing your money away." KIRSTIN DOWNEY (THE WASHINGTON POST)

How can people afford to buy homes in D.C.? I have several degrees, make around \$100K a year, have no debt and no dependents, and could make \$170K in profit if I chose to sell my condo. But the best I could buy would be another, probably smaller condo (the one I have has three bedrooms). Why can't I buy a single family home in a reasonable neighborhood? And I am not interested in commuting from West Virginia or Pennsylvania. Most of the mortgage calculators say I can afford about \$400K — enough for a onebedroom condo. Is everybody here rich or what?

Well, unfortunately for you, many people here ARE rich, at least in comparison with other areas of the country. And many of them are married or otherwise have partners, so they can combine two good incomes.

How do they afford it? Two highincome earners in a household, and equity from the old house. A single, first-time buyer, even with a good income — which is what I was, eight years ago — is just not going to be able to do it in today's market.

Yeah, that really is the way that people afford those houses: Equity

built up over the years. Million-dollar houses are not starter homes. They just aren't. Many young folks do indeed feel closed out of the market, and they may be. But paradoxically, as long as interest rates remained relatively low, houses here were more affordable than at some times in the past, despite the high price tags. That's one reason so many of them changed hands.

That was an interesting story in the Post about the explosion of the D.C. exurbs in Virginia, with people moving out from close-in suburbs. What is your take on this phenomenon? Are people leaving because they can buy more affordable, larger homes out there? Is the crime scaring them away? It's a big trade-off to take on a com-

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mute like that.

It's a big, big trade-off, but more and more people are making it. And the reason is pretty clear: Housing costs. I doubt crime is having all that much to do with it. Fairfax County isn't exactly the crime capital of the East Coast.

I heard that a flat income tax for D.C. has been proposed. What will that will do to real estate and to homeowners?

I suspect this isn't something to realistically worry about. Every few years, it seems, some Congresstype proposes using D.C. for a lab test of the flat tax or something similar. And then the proposal fades away.

I am buying a home. I have excellent credit and very little money. I'm single and make about \$60,000. Although I am very responsible, I am getting approved for very low amounts on a loan. Help. I need more money, I will pay it back, I promise! But the houses are so expensive. What can I do?

Sorry to hear about your problem — because, as you know, you are not alone. The alternatives are not fun. If you have very little cash, you need to save more cash. And that means looking closely at all your expenditures.

My D.C. row house is adjoined to a home that's being rented and is very poorly maintained. I am very concerned about my property values and am embarrassed to have any visitors. I am pretty sure that the home is a Section 8 rental property, and I am hoping I can complain to a local housing agency. But I'm not sure what rights I have.

You can definitely complain. In the District, housing inspections are overseen by the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs (dcra.dc.gov). Now, we all know that dealing with the D.C. government isn't always a barrel of laughs, but there are some hard-working housing inspectors who can help.

How do you suggest researching schools in a neighborhood in which you might want to purchase a home?

School quality is key to the homebuying decision. And there's lots of info out there. Check out the Web sites of the school districts that interest you. Also, see the package of stories the Post ran recently about the No Child Left Behind act, which makes even more school ratings available.

When my husband and I took out an equity loan on a house, we found some people named as "trustees" listed on the deed. We thought the deed should only mention us as the owner and the bank as the lender. Who are the trustees and what is their role on our deed?

Throughout this region, what we think of as a "mortgage" is usually a "deed of trust." The trustees are always those odd names that you see. It's a legal formality that allows the bank to foreclose on you if you don't pay, basically.

I am attempting a For Sale By Owner (FSBO). According to Internet real-estate sites, there are 28 comparable properties in Bowie with a median price of \$369,900. My asking price is \$359,900. Do I have a reasonable chance of selling without my house being listed in the MLS or using an agent? If so, what is the best method of advertising to use now?

Well, that's 28 market competitors who may be easier to find than you are. So if you're going to compete, you have to be aggressive. Start with an ad in The Washington Post, both paper and online. List elsewhere on the Web. And don't forget a lawn sign.

My wife died last month and I need to sell our house. The house was in both our names. What do I need to do before I can sell it?

I'm sorry for your loss. For the exact steps required to tidy up the deed, contact the recorder of deeds office in the county or city where the house is located. You'll need to file a few forms. It's not complex or expensive, usually.

I graduated from college, paid off my loans and am ready to buy a home. I often see foreclosed homes in the Post and wonder how much money I would need to buy one of them. I will be borrowing against my government TSP (like a 401k). Also, should I get a Realtor or can I go to court alone without feeling too intimidated?

Foreclosure houses are a traditionally risky form of real-estate investment — they sound like the



bargain basement, but they have problems for the inexperienced. If you're really truly serious, you may want to talk to a real-estate agent who has experience in the field. Also, take a look at the HUD (the Department of Housing and Urban Development Web site, hud.gov) to find out more about investing in government foreclosures.

I rented a condo in January and the fire alarm for the building has beeped since then, despite my complaints to the D.C. City Council and the fire marshal. Is there anything more I can do? The alarm is so old the plastic cover fell off.

I'm assuming that you have complained in writing to your landlord, to building management and to the condo's board of directors. Your landlord has a responsibility to provide you with living quarters that don't beep; you may want to explain that cordially to him or her. I'm guessing this is more complicated than it appears on the surface, because normally condo owners would rise up in protest at something like this within, oh, say, an hour. Why aren't your neighbors - who, after all, own the building - complaining, too? Or are they all renters? If the latter, perhaps you'd get more oomph by complaining together to your councilmember and the fire marshall.

I bought a brand-new condo in Southwest last year, anticipating a break with the first-time home buyer credit of \$5K that the D.C. government has been advertising for several years (and that many of my friends and colleagues who have bought property have received). While doing my taxes, I found out that D.C. is phasing out the tax credit, so based on my adjusted income tax (single filer. well above \$70K), I will see virtually no tax credit. I find this to be false advertising by the D.C. government AND my real estate agent. **Do I have any recourse?**

Since the first day of the tax credit, it has phased out depending on income. It disappears completely at about \$90K per year. That's pretty clearly set out in every pamphlet, article or tax thing I've ever seen. I think you could logically be expected to have done your due diligence. I'm trying to figure out whether I can create a bedroom with some of the extra space I have, so that when I'm ready to sell I'll have a four-bedroom house to list rather than a three-bedroom house.

Check with your county building department — but the usual answer is a window, a closet and a door that leads to the hall, rather than simply to another bedroom.

My husband and I live in the city as renters, but really need to start to look at buying a home. We have a moderate income, so our options are few anywhere inside D.C. or Virginia (Maryland is too far away from work). Could you recommend some books to guide us through the buying process or other resources?

There are lots and lots of books out there. Get yourself to the library or bookstore. Avoid anything that implies you will get rich quick. I continue to like "Homebuying for Dummies," but there are other good ones, too.

My partner and I are looking at buying a unit in a condo duplex. The condo has been self-managed by the two owners and they haven't paid condo fees in a while. The owners of the unit we're interested in (the larger one) has been paying the insurance and water bills for the building out of their own pockets. And the building is under-insured — in other words, they're paying hazard insurance for about half the entire building's value. Does this sound too messy? We're thinking of consulting with an attorney before making a decision on whether to make an offer, but we're not certain it's worth even that effort.

That sounds like a real mess. You would need to have a lengthy and honest discussion with the OTHER condo owner — who will, in effect, become your coowner. And you need to read the condo documents very closely — if you are seriously considering this, I would DEFINITELY have a lawyer read over them.

I am seeing lots of homes on the market that have been available for a long, long time. Is there an appropriate time to wait for a house to be on the market before one can offer less than asking? *Continued on page E40*

If so, when? And when offering a lower amount, what is a reasonable percentage? Is this all subjective?

Oh, the new things we all have to learn! Can we all spell "negotiate"? Yes, there are more homes on the market. Yes, they are staying there longer. That means you can indeed make an offer that is below the contract price. The seller can accept it, reject it or make a counteroffer (i.e., start negotiations). There's no prescribed level under the asking price that you should bid, or any prescribed time. You will want to look at what competitive properties are actually selling for (ask your agent), as well as what they are asking. Then offer something reasonable. If your offer is insultingly low, the buyer may indeed reject it outright. Hint: Offering 50 percent of the asking price is usually considered insulting. You are bargaining for a house, not for a souvenir in a street market.

My husband and I are moving to D.C., and we may stay only five years. Should we buy or rent? We are thinking of a two-bedroom somewhere in Dupont Circle. If we buy, we think it would cost around \$800,000. What do you think?

Five years is usually the conservative estimate in favor of buying. It's enough time to ride out little waves. Look around, see what you can rent for your money vs. buy.

I will be moving into my fiancee's house in the next couple of months. I am trying to decide if I should rent or sell my condo. I bought it I4 months ago, so I have not yet lived there the two years I need to exempt capital gains taxes. I paid \$285,000 for it and would hope to sell for \$350,000 or rent at \$1,650 per month. If I do sell and invest my earnings in my fiancee's house, would I avoid paying taxes? What is the best option?

Taking your profit and investing it in another residence where you will live — whether it be your fiancee's or any other house — will NOT affect your tax situation. You have an investment property, not a residence; you need to think about it that way. If you want to defer taxes, then you need to do a Starker exchange, rather than a straight sale.

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
