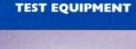

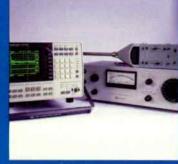

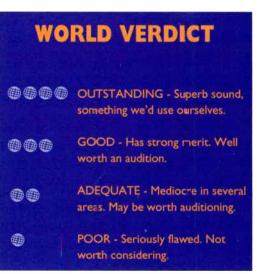

Trade winds

CD SALES GO INTO DECLINE

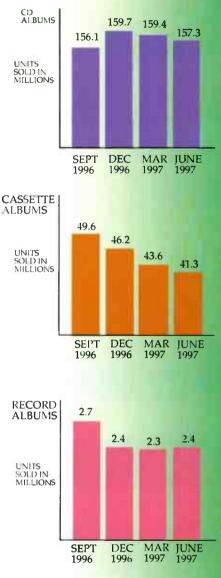
For the first time since the end of 1992 the number of CDs sold has dropped. The start of this decline showed up in the figures for January to March this year as a 1% dip in sales compared to the same period last year. Confirmation that there might be a trend here came with the statistics for the second quarter of 1997, where that 1% had become 6.8%, which translates into 29 million CDs, down from 31 million. While the British Phonographic Industry's Quarterly Review says that there were signs of an up-turn in sales towards the end of June this is still worrying news for the music industry given the growth in the numbers of CDs sold (from just under 100 million up to 160 million) between 1992 and late 1996.

Mind you, CD looks positively buoyant next to cassette albums. Prerecorded tapes continued their freefall, slumping by a massive 31% in the first quarter and 27% in the second quarter.

LP was looking like another casualty, 23% slashed from last year's figures for the first three months of 1997. "Looking" is the operative word here, as LP bounced back to the tune of a 12% rise between April and June this year (from 605,000 copies for those months in '96 to 676,000 in '97). With only 2% of the album market though, this isn't something the BPI take much consolation from. Still, total album sales for all formats amounted to more than \pounds | billion, so the music business is a fair way from the breadline yet.

CD's fortunes were rather different when it came to singles. Where vinyl (both 12in. and 7in.) and cassette both turned in lower figures than for the previous year, the silver beermat jumped 21% and then 10% in the first and second quarters this year. Cold comfort perhaps, considering even in this area CD's growth is slowing. But vinyl manifested another blip here, with 7in. sales actually rising (from 447,000 to 491,000 over consecutive quarters this year) in spite of the fact that it continues to be an increasingly incidental participant in format figures as a whole. Strangely enough, as the decrease in CD sales steepened, so the opposite happened with LPs, 12in. and 7in. singles, with the 12% rise mentioned above for LP and a 33% slump for the 7in. (10% for the 12in.) turning into 18% (7%, 12in.) Long may this black-disc trend continue!

RECORDABLE DVD FORMAT WAR LOOMS

If you thought that the large corporations had learned the lesson that format wars can be costly for them and confusing to the public, think again.

Wrangling among the ten members of the DVD Consortium (which includes companies like Toshiba, Matsushita, Sony and Philips and was set up to deal with issues like patent ownership and technical standards) has dogged DVD's early days. In April, for instance, Sony, Philips and Pioneer began to license DVD patents to other companies on their own where the plan had been for the Consortium as a group to do it.

While Philips and Sony will toe the DVD Consortium line on non-recording discs for audio and video (Sony will continue to make playback-only DVD machines), they and Hewlett-Packard are moving away from the Consortium when it comes the M1. to re-recordable discs.

Their new optical disc is to be called DVD-RAM. The battle between this and recordable DVD centres around the computer market more than the audio or video market. Whichever format wins could get the lion's share of storage medium sales, thought to be worth as much as a whopping \$6billion world-wide. In DVD-RAM's favour is the fact that it can store three gigabytes on each of its two sides, giving it 15% more capacity than recordable DVD.

With Philips' recent announcement of re-writable CD (see our September issue) in the face of music industry worries over copyright and falling CD sales, it seems likely the future of high-quality hi-fi lies with re-recordable discs - and in particular the winner of the battle brewing between DVD and DVD-RAM.

NEW FORMAT ON THE BLOCK

With the standard for audio DVD still not finalised, Philips are all set to put the cat amongst the pigeons with the introduction of their first domestically available CD-RW (CD-ReWritable) machine. The CDR 870 should be on sale from October onwards. Its price has yet to be fixed as we go to print, but expect something around the £500 mark.

Blank CD-RW discs will be in the shops at the same time and will initially cost about £19, although Philips expect prices to drop rapidly. Replay of CD-RW discs on standard CD players is a hit and miss affair - only 30% of existing players are capable of doing so but the next generation of Philips players will have the necessary coding to guarantee playback compatibility.

UP THE CREEK

Following in the footsteps of their Moving Magnet and Moving Coll phone stages released recently are Creek's new A52 power amp and two integrateds, the 5250 and 4330

Setting the A52 apart from much of the competition at its £500 price is the fact that it has two fully balanced inputs for each source, allowing different A52s to be daisy-chained together to cut down on electrical spaghetti. Most unusual of all is the fact that the low frequency roll-off point of the amp can be user-set thanks to adjustable DC servo circuitry, aiding room and loudspeaker matching according to Mike Creek, the designer.

For an extra £100 you can net yourself the SE version of the A52 which hoasts a qual-mono power supply with a pair of hefty toroidal transformers that boost output to 100watts hannel.

The Inte-level 5250 integrated also comes in regular and SE flavours, the standard amp (£450) pushing out 50watts, the SE (£165) 20 witts more. Upgrading and bi-amping are catered for with the provision of Pre-Amp Out and Power Amp In ockets

Last of the line-up is the £279 4330, a 40watt integrated that can be fitted with an optional MM/MC phone stage or active pre-amp stage for bi-amping

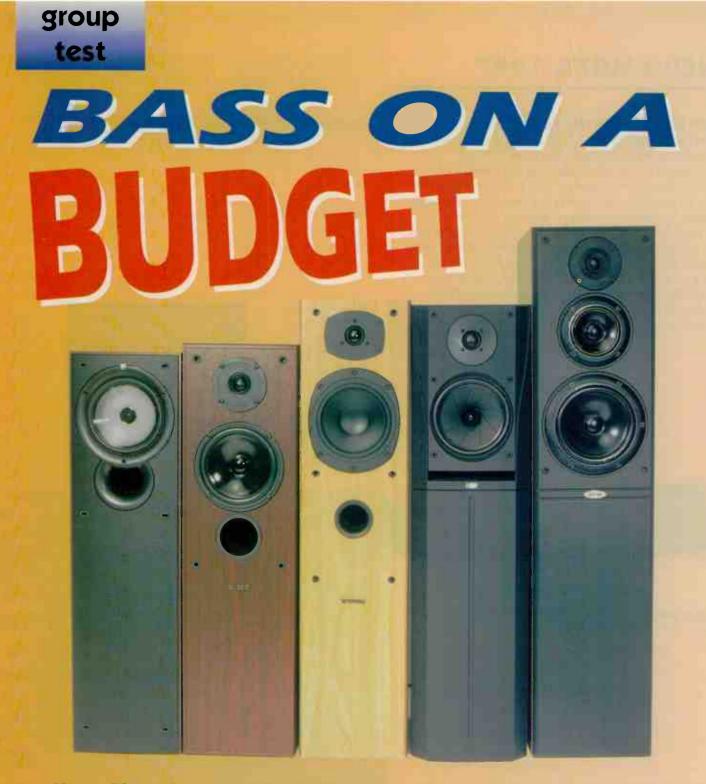
New to these shores is Sunfire's 'Load Invariant' Stereo Power amp. This £2500 beastie is a real rarity in the world of power amplification because it doesn't use any heatsinks.

Keeping the amp running cool at all times, even when operating at its claimed maximum of 2400watts RMS into Johm, is its Tracking Downconverter power supply. This measures the voltage swing required by the output transistors to reproduce the input signal and varies the voltage on the power supply rails accordingly. This means the output transistors dissipate very little wasted energy as heat and so always run cold. It also means they can deliver large amounts of current according to the designer, Bob Carver, who gives a figure of 240 amps as peak current.

ew of us have enough disposable income to buy the loudspeakers of our dreams. Unfortunately, what that usually means, judging from the many letters we get on the subject, is a shortfall in bass. And music without the support of a firm, fast and deep bottom-end is like fish and chips without salt and vinegar.

The problem is, for big bass you really need a big cabinet and they don't normally come cheap. Of late, however, 'speaker companies have woken up to the fact that there's an army of shoestring audiophiles out there queuing up to part with their money in return for bargain bass. You can now get loudspeaker boxes that do more than just boom for as little as £200 and that's what we have gathered together here.

All the floor standers in our group test are reflex loaded. This means the mid/bass unit is bolted into a cabinet fitted with a 'port'. The port acts to extend downwards the loudspeaker's response by boosting the useful output from the mid/bass unit. The alternative to reflex loading is the Infinite Baffle. otherwise known as a sealed box. There's no port in an Infinite Baffle enclosure and as a result, bass starts rolling off earlier, which is why almost all modern loudspeakers are reflex loaded.

All of the contenders in this test were powered by an Audio Analogue Puccini SE Integrated amp (£600) with a Roksan Caspian CD player (£900) supplying the signal. Interconnects and loudspeaker cables were DNM's Reson (£36/m and £6.95/m respectively).

JPW MILLENNIUM 910 £299.99

THE TECHNOLOGY

The JPW is the only three-way design in this test. Sitting at the top of the chunky, 32mm-thick double-section front baffle is a 19mm fabric-dome tweeter with ferrofluid cooling to increase power handling. This then crosses over to a 100mm dedicated midrange unit whose doped-paper cone is mounted in a polymer chassis. According to JPW, this is better damped than a metal chassis which can ring at certain frequencies. Final y, a 165mm doped-paper woofer loaded by a large rearfiring port deals with the bass.

SOUND QUALITY

JON SAYS

It took a while to get the positioning of the JPWs right before they really sounded comfortable. They need to be a couple of feet away from the back wall and about eight feet apart to open up the sound stage and produce their cleanest and best balanced bass.

With the Spice Girls' album the 910s had little difficulty with the rhythm section, pumping out the kind of boppy basslines that'll get even the most wallflower of dancers on their feet. The extended bass impressed for not imitating the slow, indistinct waffling that some lesser 'speakers come up with when quantity wins out over quality, although leading edges could have been swifter. A sound stage possessed of fine width and depth gave the music space to breathe - these are not boxy, small sounding floor standers - although individual images didn't have the crispest of outlines.

It was only in the upper midrange and treble that the JPWs proved slightly less amenable. At times, cymbals, especially on John Lee Hooker's Boom Boom CD, were detached from the rest of the proceedings and lacked the detail and tonal range that makes them truly convincing. That said, they never became unpleasantly hard and spitty.

JPW's Millennium 910s may not be perfect but with their deep, powerful bass and substantial sound they'll put a smile on the face of even the most hardcore of Reggae and organ music fans.

KETAN SAYS

My first impression of the JPW was, "Good value." For \pounds 300 JPW have come up with a large three-way 'speaker finished in an eye-catching veneer. Unfortunately, JPW (like a lot of other manufacturers) have yet to master the art of securing the spike sockets at the base of the cabinet - two of these

immediately came undone when I put the spikes in.

There's no better test of a floor stander's bass than organ music, so I tried Bach Is Back by lain Simcock. This CD showed up the JPW's strengths as well as weaknesses. Low notes were reproduced with plenty of weight and power and, though the cabinet occasionally vibrated in sympathy, it wasn't enough to spoil the performance. There was also a certain amount of looseness and blurring but then not too many £300 'speakers even come close to going this low.

Less impressive is the tweeter and its lack of integration with the midrange. The driver used is of necessity cheap, which shows up in its rather sharp and relatively unrefined treble. The ML 910 will leave you in no doubt as to what's going on in your favourite basslines. I can see its control and depth going down a storm amongst bassheads throughout the land.

Predictable start.

KEF Q35 £349.95

THE TECHNOLOGY

Like the KEF Q15 stand mounters we reviewed in Feb 1997, the Q35s use a single Uni-Q point-source driver. In fact, the driver itself is identical - it has just been fitted to a larger, floor standing cabinet strengthened with a diagonal internal brace. Sitting at the centre of the opaque 160mm polypropylene mid/bass cone is a 19mm soft-dome tweeter (the two joined by the crossover at 3.3kHz). This arrangement usually gives good imaging, as does the gently curved front baffle which cuts down on diffraction effects. Reflex loading the mid/bass cone is a large, flared port just below the Uni-Q driver.

SOUND QUALITY

JON SAYS

Low down the KEFs packed a rather lightweight bass punch. Pushing them closer to the rear wall (about a foot away) helped but the inevitable trade-off was fuzzier imaging and flatter sound staging. That said, bass focus and speed were both quite good although the Q35s produced a relaxing listen more than an exciting one, even with the likes of the Spice Girls.

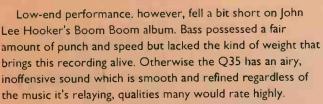
One aspect of the KEF Q35s' performance which is going to win them a lot of fans in showrooms across the land is their delicate and finely-detailed midrange and treble. Whether it was Jazz, Classical or Pop warming the pointsource driver's voice coils, strings, voices and percussion had power, precision and sweetness - a heady combination in a £350 'speaker.

This refinement and finesse allowed the KEFs to capture vividly the feeling of openness around instruments and voices. Surprisingly, this ability didn't extend to recorded acoustics, leaving the Q35s a bit short on atmosphere and sound stage depth.

If you like your music mellow and your treble sweet you'll love the Q35s. If, on the other hand, blood, guts and pile-driver bass that'll flap windows are what you seek you might want to search out a more assertive alternative.

KETAN SAYS

In this latest version of the Uni-Q drive unit KEF have really sorted the tweeter out - treble is excellent in terms of detail, integration and refinement, and wouldn't be out of place in a 'speaker considerably more expensive.

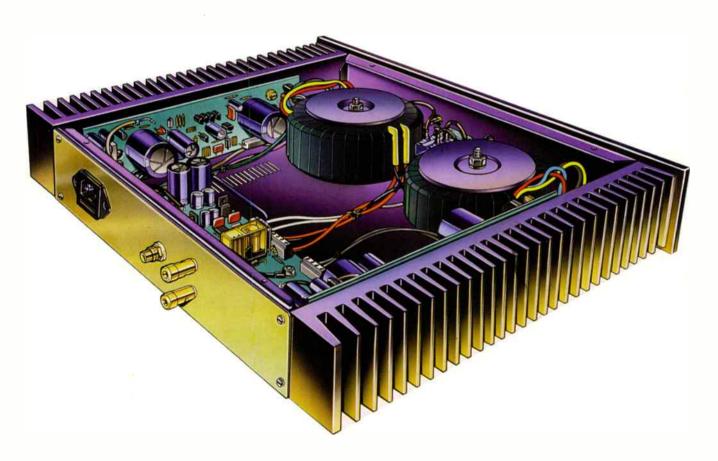


Sound staging wasn't as good as I had hoped, part of the problem has to do with a lack of projection - the sound remained disappointingly box bound no matter how the KEFs were positioned.

I was left feeling the Q35 is almost a great 'speaker - its treble quality and overall refinement are highly commendable, especially at this price. On the other hand, the relatively dry bass means the Q35 misses out on the drive and scale of floor standers that delve deeper.

TANGENT MONITOR 11 £199.95

THE TECHNOLOGY

There's nothing radical in the technology that's gone into the Tangent Monitor 11. The long-throw mid/bass unit uses a 165mm doped-paper cone allied to a 25mm soft-dome tweeter with ferrofluid cooling. A large port on the 18mm front baffle reflex-loads the mid/bass driver while a small plug round the back can be removed to fill the bottom of the cabinet with sand, which tightens bass and reduces enclosure resonance.

SOUND QUALITY

JON SAYS

Considering the Tangents cost a measly $\pounds 200$ I was worried budget constraints might start to take a toll on sound quality. I needn't have troubled myself. These small floor standers (which were sand filled by Tangent themselves for optimum results) boasted beefy bass and an open, detailed midrange and treble.

There were a few rough edges - kick drum and synthesiser notes, though weighty, had a rather artificial 'thrum' due to the cabinet and their decay was curtailed. And upper bass, while commendably punchy, was blurred, as John Lee Hooker's vocals demonstrated. Making up for these shortfalls was the power basslines had and the gusto with which the Tangents handled music.

The sound stage from these 'speakers stretched wide and deep, and was filled with clearly defined images in the face of even the most explosive of orchestral crescendos. Thanks to a generally well-balanced tonal character the Tangents are also happy with whatever music you care to feed them.

The Monitor 11s are all about emotion thanks to their extended and controlled bottom end which lends real scale to music. And for $\pounds 200$ that's no mean feat.

KETAN SAYS

The Monitor 11s' bass might not possess the ultimate extension of pricier floor standers but it's more than respectable for its size and cost, though it does have a 'tubby'



quality at times. Making it easy to overlook this is the speed and impact basslines enjoy which puts rhythm into whatever the Tangents are playing.

Handling the organ music from Bach Is Back the 'I Is impressed with the large acoustic they presented. The two drive units are well matched tonally, which helps - there are none of the tonal differences that you can find when a characteristically 'cold' metal-dome tweeter is partnered with a warm sounding polypropylene mid/bass unit, for example.

A budget 'speaker such as the Tangent invariably has its compromises but it's easy to forget them when the good qualities combine in such an effective manner. The Tangents are truly bass-on-a-budget 'speakers rather than over-priced boom boxes that pack no real punch at the bottom end.

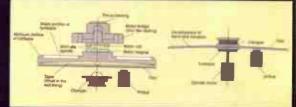

TANNOY MERCURY M3 £239.95

THE TECHNOLOGY

Singing the highs in the Mercury m3 is a 25mm soft-dome tweeter which is lightly horn loaded to increase sensitivity. The crossover point is set at 2.4kHz, which is 100Hz lower than in the stand mounting Mercury m2. Rolling in at this frequency is the long-throw 6.5in. mid/bass unit with its paper cone and chunky magnet.

The cabinet is hewn from those hi-fi favourites MDF (22mm thick in the front baffle) and particle board (15mm thick everywhere else). The m3s look a little out of step with the times for their lack of bi-wiring terminals though.

SOUND QUALITY

The first thing I noticed with the Mercury m3s was how even and smooth their sound is. There are no nasties like waffling bass and tizzy treble lurking in wait for the unsuspecting audiophile.

Set six to eight feet apart and about a foot and a half from the rear wall (the Tannoys aren't unduly fussy when it comes to positioning) these 'speakers dealt consistently with the Roksan Caspian's signal. Bass was focused and tight, revealing subtle changes in pitch, and it was nice to hear the cabinet joining in only on occasional double-bass notes. This is in marked contrast to the boxes of some 'speakers which seem to put out more low-frequency information than the mid/bass driver! That said, lower registers that went a touch lower would be no bad thing.

Midrange and treble weren't quite as transparent as the bass, as the Mercury's slightly flat front-to-back perspectives demonstrated. Tonal definition could also have been better the tweeter produced a rather one-note rendition of cymbals, for example.

While I admired a lot of what the Mercury m3s do technically I have to say they never really grabbed me. Their mid/bass driver puts out some of the cleanest and most detailed bass around but, for me, it didn't result in the foottapping and head-bobbing that keeps me glued to my hi-fi system.

KETAN SAYS

The Tannoy m3s are definitely smarter and better finished than your average sub-£250 floor stander. With the same driver array as the highly successful Mercury m2 stand mounter they promise much, and, to a certain extent, deliver.

On John Lee Hooker's Boom Boom CD the Tannoys proved they have an even, well-balanced delivery. The bass provided a solid platform for the sound and remained



unflappable during complex, high-powered passages. It could have been freer though - at times it sounded almost too controlled, as though it didn't want to let its hair down. Treble was pleasingly smooth and well integrated, if not the most detailed - it failed to distinguish subtle high-frequency information. In addition, there was a slight veiling and graininess across the midrange and treble which denied these 'speakers the transparency of the best.

The m3s don't rate highest in the rhythm stakes but dynamically they did better, never sounding flat. They proved this with a track from Bomb The Bass called 'Tidal Wave' which has a thumping great bassline thanks to numerous drum machines working overtime. The Tannoys remained listenable and kept control, which is more than most budget 'speakers manage. For this reason I'd be happy to give housespace to a pair.

THE TECHNOLOGY

Setting B&W's DM305 floor standers apart from the crowd is their Prism system panel that sits behind the two drivers. This has been moulded with a series of 'wedges' pointing into the cabinet, which are similar to those that line an anechoic chamber. They work in the same way too, diffusing the sound waves coming from the rear of the mid/bass driver and breaking up standing waves.

The cabinet itself has two ports, one letter-box shaped that fires forward and one circular that vents backwards. Otherwise, the two drivers are fairly standard, with a 26mm soft-dome tweeter and a 160mm mid/bass unit with a paper cone which has straight wave guides stamped into it to minimise standing waves within the cone itself.

SOUND QUALITY

JON SAYS

I was looking forward to listening to the DM305s again (they were first reviewed in March 1997) thanks to their grininducing bass extension and midrange clarity. Even before I'd optimally positioned them (about seven to eight feet apart and a couple of feet from the back wall in our room) that rhythmic bass was making itself felt on John Lee Hooker's Boom Boom album and its bass guitar and drums. And where the Hammond organ on 'Same Old Blues Again' often gets pushed to the back of the music and submerged under the vocals, guitar and percussion, the 305s' separation allowed the Hammond its own space.

The treble wasn't quite on a par, however. With strings and percussion the tweeter betrayed its presence with a slightly sharp edge and a lack of tonal colour on Classical music.

Sound staging and imaging? Here these 'speakers shone, spreading crisply delineated images out beyond the two cabinets and painting an acoustic with greater depth than the bulk of the competition at the price. As for bass, the DM305s are worthy of any bass-lover's attention because they have the impact, weight and control to bring music to life.

KETAN SAYS

The B&Ws didn't make a good first impression on me. Taking them out of the box I was disappointed by their insubstantial build and the tacky plastic mouldings of the front panel. Fortunately they sounded much better than they looked.



Low frequencies were characterised by a refreshing agility and speed which worked a treat on Orff's Carmina Burana, turning it into an edge-of-the-seat experience. This piece also showed the treble to be free of any sort of harshness although it can be rather monotonal.

Sound staging was superb, as was the tight focus of the choir and orchestra which, combined with great dynamics, served to make 'O Fortuna' an engrossing listen.

Moving on to Bomb The Bass proved the B&Ws could pound out rhythm with the best of them - they were always in command and stayed unfazed by this synthesiser and drummachine onslaught.

What the DM305s do well is make life-size music underpinned by realistic bass and it stays that way as the volume level rises.



CONCLUSION

Working out our favourites from among this bunch of floor standers wasn't easy as, like any hi-fi components, each has its own sets of strengths and weaknesses:

No1 FOR BASS: JPW MILLENNIUM 910

JPW's lively Millennium 910s aren't perfect - their treble isn't the smoothest or the best integrated, nor do they have the fastest bass of the group - but they make music fun. Listening to them Ketan and I found ourselves nodding along to basslines, a smile on our faces. If you want quality, power and extension and £300 is your limit then the JPWs make a fine choice.

No2 FOR BASS: B&W DM305 The DM305s have no trouble handling rhythms and their bass is nice and deep. In addition, it has fine focus and impact. Where they also leave the competition standing, thanks to their Prism back panel, is in the midrange. This is more transparent and detailed than any other floor stander in this group, which helps the B&Ws produce wider and deeper sound staging too.

No3 FOR BASS: TANGENT MONITOR II

The Tangents make listening to music a truly enjoyable past-time. Their bass has attractive speed and impact which. matched with a smooth and open midband and trebie, means these 'speakers can play a tune superbly And, like any good 'speaker, their bottom end will happily support any musical genre, not just Dance, for instance. At £200 they are a bargain.

No4 FOR BASS: TANNOY MERCURY M3

Tannoy's Mercury m3s score for their very even overall balance and taut, secure bass. In this sense they stand out as one of the best performers in this test. But the bass itself didn't subjectively appear to go as low as the 'speakers above, nor did it have that vital rhythmic fluidity. If they had a more involving presentation and a bit more weight they would really shine.

No5 FOR BASS: KEF Q35

The KEFs may have by far the most accomplished midrange and treble in this group test but they had a rather dry lower bass. Upper bass will go down well with fans of Rock for its speed, but if out and out extension is your desire, then the Q35s might sound a little insubstantial

To probe the bass performance of these 'speakers, we measured 'port' output in addition to 'forward' output from the bass unit. The port of a reflex loudspeaker extends frequency response downward to the loudspeaker's lower limit, but just how well it does this depends upon specifics of design. In this group we encountered some interesting differences.

Ironically, Tannoy and KEF

produced the deepest measured bass, as expected in light of their engineering facilities and knowledge. However, their Mercury m3 and Q35s became unfortunate victims of various effects.

Most significant is the fact that

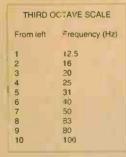
deep bass fundamentals from musical instruments span the range 40-80Hz. The loudspeaker that gives most output in this region will be the one that gives most apparent bass. So it is that the JPW, with its huge +6dB peak at 50Hz gave most bass in our listening tests. B&W seem to have cottoned on to this phenomenon too, peaking their DM305 at 50Hz, but by a lesser amount, +4dB. Tangent offer the best response shape in my view,

note effects.

most enthusiastic in what they do. The KEF and Tannoy are optimally damped in pure engineering terms, but subjectively this does not translate so well. My experience is that bass lift must be used, albeit in the right amounts. Optimally damped loudspeakers (in an academic sense) like the KEF Q35s and Tannoy Mercury m3s usually give their best bass performance when driven hard by big power amps in a fairly large





room, which is how most manufacturers' listening rooms are configured, if not most UK homes. The gap between these differing environments needs to be better appreciated in order to ensure that 'speakers match homes.

Today there are seven audio recording systems. Tomorrow there will be nine! Noel Keywood explains the systems and suggests some good buys.

veryone's confused - in the music business, the audio business and elsewhere. Today you have a choice of seven different audio recording systems, with two more possibles on the way. Here's our guide through the technological maze, with a chart to all recording

chart to all recording formats ever produced, plus our own views to help you sort things out.

The burgeoning computer industry, which recognises few standards, is driving this situation. It has taken the audio CD and turned it into a

powerful storage device, the CD-ROM (Read Only Memory). So digital audio discs can store computer data, and conversely computer data discs can store digital audio. That's why we have included, at the end of our list, the latest computer storage device, DVD-RAM - not yet released - as a possible audio recording format. With Sony and Philips behind it, dedicated audio use is likely. A capacity in excess of 5Gb (Gigabytes) means DVD-RAM can hold eight times more music than CD (0.65Gb), and future double-sided, double-layer DVD-RAMs will hold up to 18Gb we are told. In theory, studios could sell 24-bit, 96kHz-sampling-rate professional recordings direct to the public on a disc like this and sound quality would, of course, be phenomenal.

In the meantime, Philips hope you will buy CD-RW (ReWritable), intended specifically for audio. And Sony hope you will buy MiniDisc, also intended for audio. But should you buy either?

If you believe matters can only get



better and can afford to wait a year or so while the market sorts itself out, stay with cassette. If you buy a new Dolby S machine - aim to spend £250 minimum - and then use ferric tapes, this is a relatively cheap option. Ideally, car players and portables should have Dolby S too, for compatibility with recordings made at home, but every S equipped domestic recorder also has Dolby B and C to ensure compatibility with such non-S models. And you can play Dolby S recordings on B/C equipped players without too much loss of quality.

If you really want a high-quality recording system now, for use at home and to make recordings for car and portable stereos, MiniDisc just cannot be beaten. What it lacks at present is pre-recorded software. The few discs available are mostly Bruce Springsteen and Bob Dylan from Sony music, if London's Oxford Street Megastores are anything to go by. Also, blanks cost from £5 upward, and pre-recordeds £15 or so. This does, unfortunately, make it for the well heeled, even though

> Sony have tried to pitch it at the under-25s. Bear in mind that MD is big in Japan, so it won't disappear overnight. And a whole new slew of recorders are about to appear, using ATRAC 4.5 compression, which offers the best sound yet.

If you already own a car CD player and perhaps a portable CD too, then MiniDisc makes no sense. Although it might seem a pain in the whatsits, compiling a CD-R is probably the best option. If you make a mess up, throw the disc away and start again; they cost only $\pounds 2.50 \pounds 3$ each. CD-Rs will play on any CD player, so you do not have to buy new Multi-read players, as you do with CD-RW.

The catch with CD-RW is that the discs have such a low contrast ratio they can only be read by new Multi-read players with uprated sensitivity.The blank discs are also very expensive. CD-RW isn't a great option until blank disc prices fall.

DVD is for technos who are well heeled and can wait. It's probably best to ignore this option, for DVD is just not aimed at the audio enthusiast.

WIRE RECORDER (1898-1950)

We mention the wire recorder for the sake of completeness. Recordings were made on a steel wire passed between poles of an electromagnet. It was the first magnetic recording system, patented by Danish engineer Valdemar Poulsen in 1898. Although not common in the home, domestic wire recorders did become available. FOR - Tough and simple AGAINST - Extinct





CASSETTE (1963-)

Narrow, slow running analogue tape in a protective plastic case. Introduced as a dictation medium, cassette's advantages have been small size, ease of use and durability jamming apart. When Dolby B noise reduction appeared in 1968 to reduce hiss, the cassette took off in popularity, driven by the Japanese who steadily improved its performance.

FOR - Low price, portability, convenience, durability AGAINST - Mediocre sound quality, slow track access, jamming, in decline

8-TRACK CARTRIDGE (1967-1975)

The 8-track cartridge was an American closed-loop, 3.75ips tape system of good quality, but prone to jamming. For a while it challenged the cassette, but the introduction of Dolby noise reduction countered cassette's main weakness, hiss, causing the clumsier 8track cartridge to fade from the marketplace, first in Europe, then in the USA.

FOR - Good sound quality and durability AGAINST - Extinct



DAT - DIGITAL AUDIO TAPE (1986-)

A miniature, all enclosed digital cassette the size of a slim matchbox. Developed by a consortium of Japanese manufacturers as a high-quality domestic tape recorder offering the same sound quality as CD. Tape duplication was difficult and expensive. Thought to threaten music sales by encouraging home taping and piracy, it was boycotted by the (Western) music business. As a result of these drawbacks, pre-recorded tapes never became either common or affordable. As complex as a VHS video recorder, machines and tapes remain expensive. Popular with studios. Poorly conceived for domestic use.



FOR - Excellent sound quality and durability AGAINST - Expensive, rare, prerecordeds unavailable

OPEN REEL (1930-1980)

Analogue tape that can be run slowly for long playing time or fast for superb quality. German Fritz Pfleumer produced a paper tape coated with magnetisable iron oxide as early as 1928. The Nazis recorded with it during WW2 and the Americans, intrigued, shipped these recorders and tapes back to the States after the war. Ampex of the USA are commonly credited with commercialising the system and open-reel recorders remain in use today, mainly in studios. Semi-pro machines can be used in the home but blank tapes are now only available from specialist suppliers. FOR - Excellent sound quality free of digital nasties

AGAINST - Complicated and inconvenient, difficult to buy tapes



ELCASSETTE (1976-1979)

A large, high-quality cassette containing 1/4in. blank tape introduced by Sony. It was designed to provide open-reel quality with cassette's convenience and durability. Overly complex and expensive, larger than cassette and unavailable in pre-recorded form, it disappeared after a few years. FOR - Excellent sound quality and durability

AGAINST - Large, costly, no prerecordeds

DCC - DIGITAL COMPACT CASSETTE (1991-)

A digital cassette developed by Philips specifically as a replacement for the old analogue cassette. It used a normal cassette mechanism fitted with digital heads in order to be easy and cheap to mass produce. Players worked well and sounded very good, but tapes were difficult to find and over-priced. Slow access times and use of 'old-fashioned' looking cassettes acted against it. Poorly marketed by Philips, who must have known that recordable CD was coming (see CD-RW), it never caught on. FOR - Fine sound quality, durability, low cost

AGAINST - Slow access times, limited tape availability, now defanct



CD-R - CD RECORDABLE (1992-)

A record-once-only CD. Original seen as a temporary and inflexible solution to recording onto CD, intended mainly for professional audio use until CD-RW (originally termed CD-Eraseable) arrived.

However, since CD-R drives have become cheap and popular as CD-ROMs (CD Read Only Memories) for computers, disc prices have dropped to just £2.50, making CD-R look attractive in terms of cost, if not flexibility.

FOR - Cheap blank discs, compatibile with all CD players, old and new

AGAINST - Record-once discs best for professional and computer use

MD - MINIDISC (1991-)

A miniature recordable CD in a protective plastic case (caddy). Introduced by Sony in 1992 as a direct competitor to DCC and a replacement for the cassette. Designed to avoid the difficulties that sank DAT, pre-recorded MDs can be easily and quickly duplicated (stamped) and access times are fast. The MiniDisc itself is small and, being enclosed by a case, durable, clearly distinguishing it from recordable CD.

Mediocre sound quality, high prices and poor availability of early models held MD back in Europe, but it became successful in Japan. Designed with portable and car use in mind, new versions sound superb. May yet catch on. FOR - Excellent sound quality, small size, durability, fast access AGAINST - Expensive blank discs, poor general availability

CD-RW - CD-REWRITABLE (1997-)

The big idea - a CD that can be recorded as many times as you like. Trouble is, it's way behind schedule, being first proposed by Philips (as CD Eraseable, or CD-E) a decade ago. Held up by the music business, even though CD-RW is new to the marketplace and intended for audio, it is now yesterday's technology, due to be overtaken by recordable DVD in a year or so's time. Blank disc prices are high at £20 or thereabouts. Discs cannot be read by old CD players (unlike CD-R); new 'Multi-read' players compatible with old CDs and CD-RWs must be used. FOR - Intended for audio, flexible in use AGAINST - Discs incompatible with all today's CD players, expensive blanks

DVD-RAM (1998-)

In frustration at being faced, with DVD, by the same copying disputes that dogged DAT and CD-E, plus realisation of the future dominance of computers, Philips, Sony and Hewlett-Packard, all strong players in the computer market, have broken away from the 10-strong DVD Consortium to market a rival DVD disc recording system aimed primarily at the computer market. Dubbed DVD-RAM (Random Access Memory) it will hold around 15% more information than DVD.

Whilst DVD-RAM is not intended for audio use, audio-processing home computers are now appearing, which are able to process, compile and load audio onto DVD-RAM. The discs will play in CD-RW compatible 'Multiread' players. Dedicated DVD-RAM audio recorders may follow.

FOR - Massive recording capacity intended for computers, pre-recorded discs compatible with CD-RW players AGAINST - Audio recorde-s initially unavailable

DVD - DIGITAL VIDEO DISC (1997-)

A new high-capacity CD conceived by Toshiba primarily for video purposes. Able to hold eight times as much info (4.7Gb) as CD, DVD has been marketed to Hollywood studios as an ideal replacement for the ubiquitous VHS cassette. Audio and computer usage were seen as secondary - likely a fatal error (see DVD-RAM). In an attempt to counter this narrow focus it has been awkwardly re-dubbed Digital Versatile Disc, but the film industry has hampered its progress to market just as the music business hampered DAT then CD-E.

DVD has become bogged down in standards and patents licensing disputes. No audio standard has been agreed for pre-recorded discs, although super-quality six-channel surround sound looks likely. Recordable DVDs are at least one year away. FOR - Capable of storing studio-quality digital sound

AGAINST - Not intended for audio use, recordable DVD unavailable at present

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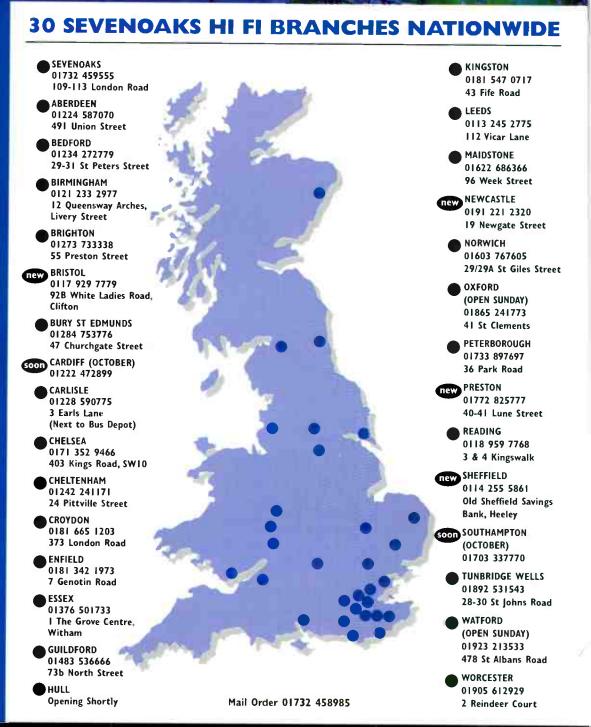

Cassette's days may be numbered but with recorders like Teac's V-6030S at least it's going out with a bang, reckons Jon Marks.

iniDisc, CD-R and now CD-RW are all looking to knock the compact cassette off its perch as the world's de facto domestic recording medium. Adding to cassette's troubles is the fact that sales of pre-recorded and blank tapes are falling and it seems the writing may be on the wall for the format. This hasn't deterred companies like Teac from building quality cassette decks like their £550 V-6030S. And as we found out in August 1995 with the superb V-8030S, the '6030's more expensive sibling, cassette still has an ace or two up its sleeve

TEAC

The main difference between the two decks is in the capstan department. Quartz-locked direct-drive capstan motors in the '8030S are replaced by belt drive in the '6030S. Where the two share technology is in the mounting of the transport on a separate sub-chassis from the main casework to isolate it from vibration and in their siamesed record and playback heads which are wound with PC-OCC copper wire.

In facilities and operation as well the two are similar. Both are fitted with Dolby B, C and S to ensure low hiss and compatibility with pre-recordeds and home recordings. An MPX filter ensures FM's 19kHz pilot tone won't confuse the Dolby systems. If you listen through headphones, a headphone socket with volume control means you won't need a pre-amp. And if you find popping open the drawer a real chore, Teac considerately fit a powered door.

The knobs on the V-6030S's front panel start looking less standard when it comes to recording. There are separate level and bias controls for each channel as well as an overall channel balance potentiometer. In use, these split controls ended up in the same position, so I have to wonder why Teac fit them. That said, as our measurements of the Teac's on-board calibration show, it gets bias and sensitivity right more often than most decks even if it's not as comprehensively automated as Pioneer's CT-S740S reviewed in lune 1996 where the FLEX calibration system could alter replay and recording responses (as well as sensitivity and bias) for optimum results. On the Teac, you press 'Calibration Start' and set sensitivity manually against the fluorescent display; press it again to set

bias. Simple and effective.

Given the Teac's accomplished measured specifications, especially its extremely speed-stable transport, I was hoping for a crisp, punchy sound with solidly located images; relatively large amounts of wow and flutter tend to produce images that wander around in the sound stage.

Dealing with Heaven 17's The Luxury Gap album, the Teac fulfilled its measured promise, particularly on tracks like 'Lady Ice And Mr Hex' with its heavy basslines which tend to come through budget decks as a confused, distant rumble. Through the V-6030S they were powerful and punchy, adding to this track's rhythm rather than tripping it up. Hiss was low too, although it was obviously present on inter-track silences on this Dolby-B tape.

What really lodged in my memory was that, with this tape, the Teac managed to capture all the differing tempos of the various songs. In my experience, a lot of tape decks can fall down when it comes to rhythm.

The piano causes more problems for

review

more cassette decks than any other instrument. Rather unsurprisingly, the V-6030S and its secure transport shrugged off the pitch-stability problems which can make some piano recordings sound like they were made under water. The real give-away was the solidity and impact of leading edges where they often sound loose and blurred. Once more, the V-6030S showed it was a master of rhythm and expression with one of the most engrossing replays of Vladimir Ashkenazy making his way through a selection of Chopin's works that I've yet heard. Still, good though it was, it wasn't big-league Nakamichi standard the Teac would need better sound stage depth, overall clarity and dynamics for that to be the case. For £550, this deck was doing a fine job of making a good name for itself.

Cassette's main raison d'être is its ability to record. I plucked a fresh TDK AR from its wrapper and used the Teac's accurate bias and level calibration to get it set up correctly for some recording from our Pink Triangle Da Capo DAC and the P-30 from the same stable as the V-6030S. With the near-obligatory Dolby S in place to prevent saturation and reduce hiss, I tested the Teac with a couple of pieces from the Schidlof Quartet's CD of Shostakovich's string quartets, as strings are cassette's second bug-bear.

Well, there were no speed problems as a smooth but powerful violin showed. And with Dolby S, there was no audible hiss either. This piece was as dynamic and tonally colourful as it had been on CD, the woody resonance of the instruments captured almost complete by the Teac. The only differences between original and copy were a slightly brighter midrange and treble, and a narrower sound stage. Considering the P-30/Da Capo cost about £4500 and the V-6030S about 15% of that, that's not bad for ferric tape.

Stepping up to TDK SA-X chrome formulation, I found confirmation of our readings on the bias levels in the V-6030S - setting bias for this tape type accurately wasn't possible, although the mismatch wasn't great. Everything else about the Teac was a joy - peak-hold fluorescent meters and a resettable numerical reading for the maximum peak made getting recording level right a piece of cake.

Again, there was little divergence between original and SA-X recording apart from a more prominent midrange on the latter and slightly less smoothness which came across as a hint of reediness on strings. Still, hiss was conspicuously absent, sound staging broad as well as deep, tonal colour wide-ranging and the music's ebb and flow intact. In short, thumbs up once more.

Now for metal. TDK MA in the drawer, I tried taping some wellrecorded Indie Rock in the form of Silkscreen's Relief album. With a tape like MA and Dolby S, the V-6030S was capable of producing seriously good recordings. The overall tonal balance was more even than on ferric and chrome, dynamics were faster and harder, low-level detail better and the sound as a whole was smoother basically all the improvements you'd expect metal to show over more budget formulations. Even with the drummer going mental on his cymbals, they refused to become splashy or hard and the intense power of this album came across vividly. OK, returning to the CD saw a veil lifted off the sound. but then there's that price differential between digital source and V-6030S to bear in mind.

Teac's V-6030S uses capable electronics built around a tasty transport, and it shows. It has no weaknesses whether you want the best playback or recording. Alongside Pioneer's £430 CT-S74OS, it's one of the standard bearers for the good old compact cassette.

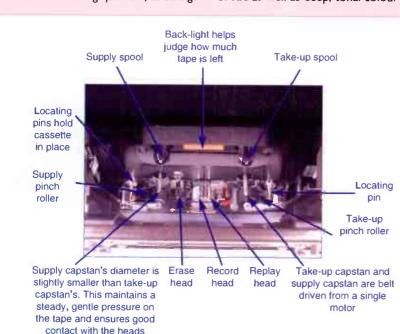

GRAND PLAYER?



LFD's new £1000 Mistral CD player looks a million dollars but does it have sound to match, asks Dominic Todd.

hat a relief! It really is a refreshing change to see a smaller high-end manufacturer like LFD using a little design flair when it comes to the styling of their CD players. More standard offerings tend to be mass-manufactured boxes with a few stick-on graphics and bland controls. But LFD have put rather more effort into the new Mistral CD player. Its exterior gives it an expensive feel, but look closer and details such as glue smears on the tray show LFD still have some way to go in consistency.

Lift off the heavily damped lid and you'll discover the Mistral uses a Sony transport on modified mounting points and a tweaked CDP500 DAC board (also from Sony). A substantial toroidal transformer supplies the juice.

At £1000, the LFD faces some stiff competition. I hooked the player up to my own system alongside a Cambridge CD3/DAC3 and a Marantz CD-17 for comparison.

Divine Comedy's 'Euro Pop' started the ball rolling. The first thing I noticed was the LFD's relatively lightweight bass. While you might not think it lacking if you heard it in isolation, when compared with the Cambridge and Marantz players it missed out on their sense of presence and authority. On a more positive note, the separation of vocals and instruments was a text-book example of what we've come to expect from better single-bit designs. Fine tonal colour, space between instruments and a general lack of 'grain' also ensured the Mistral was easy on the ear.

Unfortunately, when it comes to rhythm the LFD suffered the digital bugbear of sounding as though it was simply going through the motions. It failed to draw me in, due to a lack of punch and rather average timing. Disappointingly, front-to-back perspectives were matched by a Marantz CD-63 KI-Signature at half the price. A crystalline treble and fine vocal texture bolstered the Mistral's performance, but the end result was still rather uninvolving.

Chamber music made a better match. The politeness that had previously been a hindrance suited a Corelli quartet right down to the ground - the sweet tone of the violin ebbed and flowed in sympathy with the music.

The LFD is a machine I really wanted to like - it looks great and is a joy to use. But in the final analysis, it misses the mark sonically, and by quite a margin too. Against rivals, especially Roksan's £900 Caspian, it lags in areas like bass response, spaciousness of sound and sheer involvement with anything but the simplest of music. In truth, the Mistral is a victim of the excellence of cheaper machines whose refinement has vastly improved over the past seven years or so. Perhaps if they enjoyed more of the exterior's flair, the electronics could be further tweaked to produce superior results. But until then, the LFD Mistral remains just a pretty face.

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DISCRETE DIRECTION

New from Creek is the OBH range of discrete transistor phono stages. David Price listens in.

emember the super Creek Audio Systems 4040 amp and 3040 tuner from the early Eighties? They were so good that designer Mike Creek couldn't make enough of them which led him to sell his company to the TGI Group, responsible for the likes of Tannoy, Goodmans and Mordaunt-Short. But big corporations weren't Mike's style, so now he's back flying solo with Creek Audio Limited.

Along with the A42/P42 pre/power combo, 4240 integrated and a new tuner due out soon, Creek now offers a range of phono stages comprising the £99 OBH-8 for Moving Magnets, the £110 OBH-9 for Moving Coils, plus the £160 OBH-8SE, a tricked up reworking of the standard OBH-8.

I decided to take a listen to the 8SE, the 9, and the two power supplies; the standard OBH-1 and the optional highpower, voltage-regulated OBH-2 costing £20 extra. All the phono-stage variants use the same Class A, singleended circuit with passive RIAA equalisation and - unusually - discrete transistors rather than IC op-amps. Mike's a passionate advocate of discrete circuitry, which he says is faster and, "employs skills that have long been forgotten about" by op-amp merchants!

VVell, listen to these little black beauties and you might think he's got a point. I tried the £160 OBH-8SE MM with the OBH2 PSU driven from a Michell Orbe/SME V and Goldring 1042 cartridge, and was seriously impressed. The way it combined real smoothness and refinement with genuine musicality and tunefulness was a joy.

Where lesser phono stages appear fast by adding an artificial edge to the sound, the Creek used good oldfashioned grip. The heavily modulated bass sequencing on Inner City's 'Good Life' proved it could stop-start far faster than rivals like Rotel's IC-based RQ-970BX, without sounding the least bit hard. Rather, the Creek was satisfyingly smooth from bottom to top, if a touch bass light - Mike admitted the warp filter comes in rather earlier than necessary and says it will be lowered on production models. Sound staging was another high point, the Creek projecting lead vocals right out into the room, while allowing backing tracks to hang well back in the acoustic.

Moving to the OBH-9/OBH1, things weren't so impressive - sound staging was flat and detail poor. I swapped back to the OBH-2 PSU, and, hey presto, depth, power, solidity and focus reappeared! The opening piano and acoustic guitar parts of Fleetwood Mac's 'Sara' took on a delicacy and finesse the Rotel just couldn't match; vocals were smoother and more powerful, and drumming had far greater pace and feel.

So, two highly impressive phono stages providing you avoid the OBH-9's standard power supply - whatever you do, pay the extra £20 for the OBH-2. Criticisms? None at the price. Even after a very expensive valve phono stage, both these Creeks still seemed eminently musical, if slightly rough around the edges. True, cymbals did sound a little processed, there was a lack of real low-level detail and bass was less than generous, but that beautiful, rhythmic midband more than made up for it.

I'd say these new Creeks are easily the best low-price phono stages on the market - you'll need to spend £300 on LFD's Mistral to truly better them. Use a decent budget deck (like a Systemdek 2X2/RB300) and a cartridge with some real bass punch (Goldring's 1042 MM or Ortofon MC 2SE MC spring to mind), and you're away •

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WIN AN LFD MISTRAL AMP, CD PLAYER AND PHONO STAGE WORTH £1800



This month our prize consists of LFD's stylish Mistral integrated amplifier with the matching CD player and phono stage.

lacton-on-Sea is not perhaps the first place that comes to mind when conversation turns to hi-fi specialists, but it is here that LFD reside. While they used to concentrate their efforts exclusively on highend components with a range of well regarded amplifiers, DACs and cables, this has changed with the introduction of the new mid-price Mistral range.

The £499 Mistral amplifier is a line-level, direct coupled, 40W MOSFET design which possesses five inputs and a tape loop. The essence of this amplifier is simplicity, both inside and out. Internally the components are mounted on a small circuit board with particular attention paid to the power supply, clean grounding and short signal paths. Carefully selected high-quality components have been used throughout, including Rubycon electrolytic capacitors and an Alps volume potentiometer.

When David Price reviewed the Mistral amplifier in June 1997, he wrote, "Moving to Lonnie Smith's 'Twenty-Five Miles', the Mistral gave one of the most communicative, least artificial renditions I've heard. Setting up a huge, sumptuous groove with a big, fat bass guitar, the amp sounded beautifully smooth and clear in the midband. Ronnie Gruber's baritone sax was powerful and breathy without the slightest hint of harshness, while Lonnie's Hammond was rich and subtly syncopated with the delicate cymbal and drum work. Superb with rhythms and the little

dynamic accents that make music such fun, this amp pulled me into the song and kept me listening". David closed the review by awarding the Mistral four globes and concluding it is, "An extremely enjoyable, lucid little amplifier that really gets to the heart of the music".

The second part of this prize is the £999 CD player which makes an ideal source for the amplifier. At this player's heart is a Sony transport and Digital to Analogue Convertor which were chosen for their quality and design. The DAC, for example, has the master clock mounted directly on top of it to reduce jitter.

In the power supply both the digital and analogue sections are fed from separate secondary windings on the main transformer and each has extensive regulation. They are star earthed separately too, as this was found to reduce noise. As with all the Mistral range, the passive components are carefully chosen for optimum sound quality - capacitors from Rubycon and Wima are used alongside tantalum and metal film resistors by Beyschlag and Roederstein. LFD haven't skimped on the exterior either, as can be seen from the goldplated, solid-brass controls.

The last part of this competition will please the vinyl heads among you. As the basic amplifier is line-level only, LFD make a switchable £299 Mistral phono stage. Nick Tate reviewed this in the September 1997 issue and was so impressed that he said, "If you've got a highish-output cartridge and want a taste of the high end, buy the Mistral - it's a gem". Nick concluded his review by awarding the phono stage four globes and summed it up as, "The most lucid and musical budget phono stage around - a true audiophile bargain".

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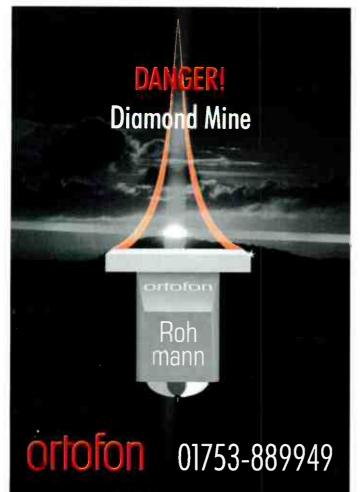

Ketan Bharadia finds out whether Musical Fidelity's HDCDX-DAC is more than just a pretty case.

he X Files have a lot to answer for. Is the X-DAC by association meant to be Musical Fidelity's search for the truth or just a weird name for an average product? When you first lay eyes on the X-DAC though, the average-product theory goes out the window. The last thing Musical Fidelity want is for you to mistake this Digital to Analogue Convertor for something else. The same goes for a whole new range of identically styled components which includes a pair of monoblocs, a linelevel pre-amp and two DACs. The X-DAC is the more expensive of the two thanks to its 24-bit HDCD filter. the performance of which has impressed us greatly in the past with both standard and HDCD discs.

Digits from Dave Brubeck's Take Five were the first from Teac's P-30 transport and the X-DAC shone immediately. Its presentation was articulate and airy with plenty of drive. Though the sound was a tad brighter than neutral (our measurements show gently rising treble from about 5kHz to 21kHz) this didn't undermine all the good things the X-DAC was doing. Paul Desmond's alto sax, for instance, flowed with a rare liquidity and had believable texture and tone. To the X-DAC's credit, this quality of reproduction extended to every instrument. Strangely, despite all the

space around individual images the sound stage itself was a rather twodimensional affair.

The X-DAC maintained control well at frequency extremes. Treble, though slightly forward, was clear and smooth but it was the bottom end which really impressed. Double-bass had plenty of depth and power making even our reference Pink Triangle Da Capo sound slightly soft and stodgy by comparison. Just as outstanding was the detail and definition of these bass notes that made it so easy to follow what Eugene Wright was doing.

'O Fortuna' from Carmina Burana followed. This early digital recording from Decca has a tendency to sound shrill and small scale. Here, the X-DAC was revealing enough not to hide these faults but remained sufficiently engaging to do justice to this intense music. Helping out was the fact that the chanting throughout this piece was clear and intelligible, dynamics were crisp and bass, especially on timpani, was firm and extended - the X-DAC has the enviable trait of never sounding rushed or confused even during the most complex passages. On the negative side, a lack of sound stage depth was apparent, although the sound was projected forward of the plane of the 'speakers just enough to avoid the criticism of being box bound.

Testing the HDCD performance

with Stravinsky's 'The Firebird Suite' showed off the advantages of this encoding system (which has now been used on over 500 releases). Tonal colours were better, the spaciousness of the acoustic opened up and there was a solidity and warmth present that just wasn't there with normal discs. I'm pleased to say the X-DAC's other strengths were still evident as well.

STOP PRESS: Jon Marks previews CD's possible replacement: 24-bit digital code at 96kHz sampling rate. This is a massive technical improvement upon CD - and it's coming tomorrow - but how does it sound? Jon listens to recordings from Data Conversion Systems of Cambridge. An in-depth article will follow in December's issue.

'hichever genius in Philips' marketing department came up with that slogan, "Perfect sound forever" obviously wasn't an audiophile. Compact Disc has had its detractors from day one, and for good reason - it's far from being the ultimate audio format. Vinyl-lovers have vociferously complained about CD sounding hard, flat, uninvolving and artificial.

Enter DVD. While the main thrust of DVD is, at the moment, as an A/Vmedium to take over from the VHS video cassette, there are negotiations going on to set standards for its use as a high-quality audio format. This would most likely take the form of a music signal sampled at 96kHz (more than twice as fast as CD's 44.1kHz) with a resolution of 24-bits (CD has a very basic 16-bit resolution). Because the standards have yet to be set though, there are no DVD players with dedicated 96kHz, 24-bit compatible DACs.

The technology necessary for building this kind of DAC is new. It has been put into production by very few companies, one of which is Data Conversion Systems (DPA will follow

suit shortly with their proprietary SX128, SX256 and SX512 DACs - see this month's News). So we arranged a listening session to find out just how good 96kHz at 24-bits might sound with dCS's (they use a lower case d) £8500 Elgar DAC (digital to analogue convertor) plus a Nagra D digital openreel tape deck playing custom recordings.

The Elgar convertor was first fed a normal CD-quality signal of 44.1kHz and 16-bits. Considering the Nagra costs £15000 to £20000 (depending on its spec.) and the Elgar £8500, this combination was bound to sound pretty good anyway, and it did. Sound staging was spacious in terms of both width and depth, and images were threedimensional. The only problems were a general hardness and a lack of truly foot-tapping funk to the bass. Still, we had 96kHz at 24-bits to look forward to.

What I had expected was more of everything but in a CD-esque fashion. How wrong I was! What emerged from our Jamo Concert 8 stand mounters was some of the most 'analogue' sounding music I have come across. Tonal colours were full and rich, bass

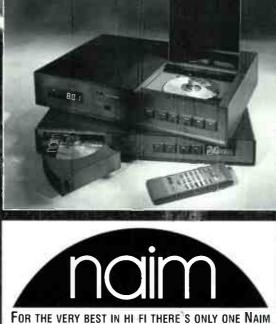
had that power, depth and rhythmic characteristic only displayed by LP up until now, and the sound stage was big enough to make an aircraft hanger feel cramped.

In addition, there was a smoothness and a complete lack of hard metallic grain which set the sound of 96kHz sampling at 24-bits apart from 44.1kHz at 16-bits. By comparison, the latter sounded flat, hard, arrhythmic and artificial. Yes, the Nagra D and Elgar would strain any cheque book, bar the very fattest, but the sounds they produced, especially on a custom recording of a marimba piece, were literally spell-binding. Ketan and I sat there just dreading the time these components would be boxed up and whisked out of the listening room at the end of the day.

In next month's issue, we'll take a longer look at this Nagra/Elgar set-up and find out about what the future might hold with dCS's Marketing Manager Robert Kelly and DPA's head designer Rob Watts. In the meantime, rest easy. There's a format around that wins out over even 96kHz 24-bit recordings and which Robert Kelly uses as a reference: it's called the LP!

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NARDLY MOBILE

Ken Ishiwata was happy to put his name to Marantz's latest tweaked and upgraded Signature amplifier, the PM-66 KI-S. Dominic Todd finds out why.

ou've got to hand it to them, Marantz have the knack for marketing better than anyone else in hi-fi. They were the first with tweaked Special Edition models, a designation that everyone and their dog uses these days. And now, occupying a higher plane of modification, we have the KI-Signature models. KI stands for Ken Ishiwata, the talented designer who has already turned class-leading Marantz CD players into superlative ones.

This time he's turned his attention to the PM-66SE integrated amplifier. The main changes are a new copper chassis and back panel, an upgraded toroidal transformer and an improved phono stage (still Moving Magnet-only).

I approached the '66 KI-Signature in two minds. I found the original PM-66SE rather flat and uninspiring. With Oyster Band's 'Tin Cans', I was pleased to find obviously greater depth and weight than the PM-66SE. Having said that, it still missed out on some of the solidity present in other £400 rivals. There was a trace of muddle in the lower midrange too, but good timing prevented this from being a serious distraction.

I had few complaints with the treble. Plenty of attention was lavished on percussion, in this case castanets, that can often disappear into the background and sound staging possessed good width to match its new-found depth. Despite this, there was still a degree of the original's grey tonality, which showed up on cellos as a lack of natural warmth.

I decided to try the phono stage using an Audio Technica AT-110E MM fitted to my Roksan Xerxes X turntable. Muddy Water's 'Long Distance' showed the PM-66 KI-Signature in a good light. Vocals emerged from the 'speakers with real presence against a suitably sparse backdrop. Snare drum and guitar lost that last degree of incisiveness, hence the piece's raw emotion was diminished. Timing remained spot-on though, and kept me listening throughout this album.

Divine Comedy's 'Becoming More Like Alfie' provided something a little more up to date. As with Muddy Waters, lead vocals were almost tangible and while bass wasn't especially deep, it gelled well with midrange and treble. The balance achieved by the Marantz also gave a decent insight into the music with details such as the decay of a cymbal easy to make out. Very little 'grain' or 'glare' was apparent either, which is an improvement over cheaper Marantz amps of yore.

There's no doubt that Ken Ishiwata has done an excellent job in tuning what I felt was a rather disappointing amplifier and making it competitive. Even at £400 it manages a well balanced sound that misses out on just that last touch of bass weight and tonal colour. The PM-66 KI-Signature's sound should suit larger 'speakers perfectly. With stand mounters on the other hand, it might be a little lean. This amp may not be the definitive class-leader, but it still ranks as first division, and not all that far from premier league either •

The "newly revised ATRAC" is a move from ATRAC 4.0 (which

the Kenwood DM-7090 relies on) to its update, ATRAC 4.5. Version 4.0 was generally reckoned to be the first MiniDisc coding system that really cut the mustard in hi-fi terms. Prior to that most MD players had sounded rather flat, grey and mechanical.

And as with any young format, there are improvements from one generation to the next in areas like the player's internal DACs, power supplies and general componentry.

best in sound from MiniDisc, hold off shelling out until these new machines make it to our shores at the end of this year. **JM**

UPGRADE-PROOF AMPLIFIER

My system comprises a Marantz CD-63 mkll KI-Signature CD player, NAD 304 amplifier and B&W 601 'speakers, bi-wired with Cable Talk 3.1.1 am looking to upgrade the amplifier soon within a budget of £700 and, later on, the 'speakers to floor standing models below the £500 mark.

My amplifier short-list consists of the Audiolab 8000A or 8000S. Densen Beat B-100 and LFD's Mistral integrated. Which one of these would work best with my present 'speakers and whatever new ones I get in the future? For the 'speakers I'm thinking along the lines of Acoustic Energy AEI20 or B&W 603, but any suggestions would be welcome. I listen in a small room to a very varied selection of music. C. J. Wood Marchington, Staffs.

There are many good integrated amplifiers within your budget but two are outstanding. My first choice would be the £595 Audio Analogue Puccini SE which we reviewed in the September 1997 issue. This amplifier is as natural and detailed as any l've come across under £1000.

An alternative, albeit at a higher price, is the £695 Roksan Caspian reviewed in June 1997. This provides a powerful, smooth sound that is full of tonal colour and comes with the added bonus of a remote control.

Out of the amplifiers you've short-listed certainly audition the LFD Mistral it's very enjoyable to listen to and excellent value at £500. As for the 'speakers add Castle's Eden stand mounters to your list as they are highly musical all-rounders. KB

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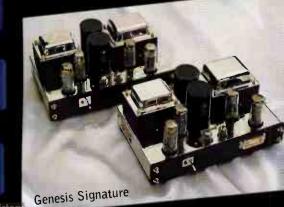

when played through the CD player lacks space and air. It is also bass light and could be a bit livelier. The tuner is more open than the CD but the overall sound could be bolder - i.e. more authoritative and involving.

I am intending to buy a new pair of 'speakers as well as 'speaker cable and interconnect. The amount I'm willing to spend on 'speakers is fairly flexible but preferably not more than £900. I would be grateful for any recommendations that you can give me (other than Mission 753s).

Given the fact that I'd like to go the bi-wire route, which cables can you recommend - I am using good old QED 79-strand at the moment? And what interconnect (presently Monster Inter Link 400) would you suggest? Would it be preferable to use a different one according to the sonic characteristics of the CD and tuner?

I listen mainly to acoustic music, Dance and light Rock in a room which measures 7m by 4m.

Lurking at £700 are Castle's very revealing and musical Avon floor standers. These are a twoway design with a reflex loaded carbon-fibre mid/bass unit and a polyamide tweeter that have a fast, detailed sound although they can be a touch bright in the midrange and treble. However, if you match them with, say, a five-metre biwire length of LFD's warm

but dynamic Aeroflex loudspeaker cable (£110 ready terminated) the Avons should work well.

If you're looking for a bit more bass on Dance tracks (the Castles roll off at about 40Hz) another contender is Rogers' £250 LS33 two-way stand mounter and matching £350 AB33 column subwoofer which doubles as a stand. And if you'd prefer a stand mounter, B&W's £600

CDM1 would be a good bet. Interconnects to consider are DNM's Reson (£36/1m) and DPA's Slink 2 (£41/1m). IM

FRONT-END CHANGE

My present system is made up of a Ringmatted Roksan Radius turntable fitted with a Tabriz Zi tone-arm, Corus Black cartridge and the XPS 3.5 power supply. This runs into a Cyrus III/PSX-R and a pair of Mission 752s, bi-wired with DNM Reson. The front end sits on a dedicated steel frame wall-shelf and the 'speakers are spiked onto your budget. If you have around £300 to spend and want to keep your cartridge (which really is rather good) I would strongly recommend LFD's new Mistral phono stage, which, while it is switchable between Moving Magnet and Moving Coil tends to favour MM because it is rather noisy on MC. On the other hand,

speaking, I thoroughly enjoy the sound of my system. However, I sometimes feel it could do with greater 'attack' and tonal colour, particularly with drums and percussion. Perhaps a tad more control in the bass wouldn't go amiss either.

Several people, my dealer included, have suggested that I could get a very worthwhile improvement by either upgrading to a high-output MC or adding a phono stage and buying a low-output model. Is either a good idea in the context of this system and, if so, could you give me your opinion of the best options in each case? I listen to just about every kind of music except for Country and Western. J. T. Kyle

Your system is, on the whole, well balanced. I suspect that the problem really lies with the Cyrus III's phono section, which we found wasn't quite up to the high standards set by the line stages. The solution to this depends on While Mission's Cyrus III integrated scores with line-level sources, its phono stage is bettered by units like LFD's Mistral.

some point you do intend to step up to a Moving Coil such as Ortofon's £250 MC 25FL with its Fine Line stylus and can stretch your budget, then a better bet would be Roksan's Artaxerxes X which at £395 is excellent. To power this you would need one of the dedicated supplies which provide a ready upgrade path, prices starting at £150 for the DSU. KB

QUALITY CONTROL

Having been a reader since the beginning, I'd like to offer some constructive criticism.

The success that Hi-Fi World has achieved - and will long continue to achieve, I hope - is the result of much hard work, initially by Noel and a small, hard-working team. But with that success has come a larger team of disparate individuals. Each of them has their individual preferences, opinions, background and experience which is, again, as it should be.

The downside is that, with individuality and freedom of action come also a lack of standardisation and increasing problems with consistency as the team grows larger. This is where a certain lack of what we should call Quality Control begins to make its absence noticed.

For example, let's look at September's review of the Densen and LFD phono stages. Let's also start with the test results at the back of the magazine. (By the way, which do you do first - the main listening sessions and review writing, or the lab tests?)

In the test results for the Densen DP-02, you quite correctly conclude: "The Densen is for super-high-end MCs only." This after reporting the extremely low input noise and overload threshold that (presumably) arise from the unprecedentedly high gain achieved by this discrete design.

Why then did Nick Tate start his review of sound quality by saying that, "both [phono stages] benefited from the MC15's high output (0.35mV)"? Firstly, the MC15, whilst a very good cartridge at its price point, is certainly not "super-high-end". Secondly, how could he describe the use of a highoutput cartridge as "beneficial", when clearly the opposite is true?

I submit that, in fact, the relatively reserved review of the Densen was due to the fact that the input was, much of the time, being overdriven. What really makes this 'oversight' so bad is that, in the closing paragraph of the review, Nick wrote: "the Densen, . . should work well with low-output MCs". This suggests that he was far from unaware of the design parameters for the Densen. To be unaware would, itself, be quite unforgivable, but to carry out and report findings knowing the method used to be improper is an error that would surely never have occurred in HFW's early days.

As a final thought aimed at enhancing and maintaining the high quality of the magazine, could you please try for greater consistency between the results of your reviews and the list of World Favourites. It doesn't exactly go unnoticed, you know, that your favourites' list remains essentially unchanged for months at a time, often after you have reviewed some newer unit so favourably that it should have joined the list, if not actually replaced something on it! **Nigel Hamlin** nigelh@pobox.com

To answer your first question, we tend to have a preliminary listen to every component

that gets sent so that we can get a brief impression of how they sound. Any components which we feel don't merit inclusion in the magazine on the basis of sound quality (space is always at a premium) are returned to the manufacturer for confirmation that they are functioning correctly. If they aren't, then we're happy to have another listen to a second sample.

The next stage is to test the component in question before the main review is carried out so that we can pick up any problems which show up more in measurement than in listening. Again, if there's a problem here, the manufacturer is contacted.

The final step is the indepth listening session that makes up the reviews you read. Obviously our reviewers rely on a combination of their experience and comparison with similarly priced products which they have to hand.

In our preliminary listening tests we connected the Densen, LFD and a DPA 50S phono stage to a fullspec. LP12 system featuring Linn's new Arkiv MC (output 0.4mV, price £1200). Our conclusions on the Densen's sound quality agreed closely with his when using this cartridge.

The Ortofon was not the

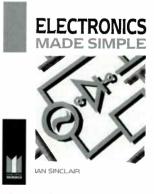

only cartridge Nick used - as with all our reviews, we rely on a range of companion components. Audio Technica's AT-33E MC (output 0.35mV, price approximately £600 depending on exchange rate) was hooked up to the Densen too. This MC went unmentioned because it was an import from Japan and isn't available in this country.

As far as updating World Favourites goes, our apologies. As you've noticed, Favourites can go unchanged for a while at times. This is down to time constraints imposed by the production of the rest of the magazine's editorial content. This is, however, a situation we are hoping to remedy soon. JM

DOWN TO EARTH

As a Sextet owner, I was interested to note JM's observations in September's letters. On the advice of Heybrook (notably the extremely helpful Mike

Jewitt) my Sextets have recently been upgraded (I believe they are now in Mk4 guise) and I can confirm that this would, indeed, be a worthwhile move.

In placing the Sextets on a solid base, should the base (being on carpet) also be spiked? In moving from single to bi-wire, should I use the same cable (in my case van den Hul CS122) or maybe a solid core for the high frequency? The perceived wisdom (and that of Heybrook) is use the same, but comments elsewhere in this issue possibly suggest otherwise!

Finally, what about taking Ken Ishiwata's advice and earthing the negative 'speaker terminals at the amplifier how could I best achieve this? Geoff Jackman geoff.tmd@btinternet.co. uk

In answer to your first question, yes. The ports which reflex load the Sextets' bass drivers fire out of the bottom of the cabinet and need to be lifted off the floor if they're to function properly.

Bi-wiring is, like so much in hi-fi, a matter of personal taste. If you find you get better results with different cables serving high and lowfrequency sections of the crossover then that's the route

> to go. Something like DNM's Reson might work well in the upper frequencies while The Chord Company's Rumour could deal with bass, from our experience. Ken's advice that you earth the amp's negative loudspeaker

terminals is basically a way of providing a proper connection to real ground for the amp. It won't work with bridged amps, as he said in September's interview, and not all other amps are compatible - speak to the manufacturer before you do anything as you could well invalidate guarantees. It's fine with most Japanese amps (as a generalisation).

In a lot of buildings, the mains' earth is bonded to incoming water pipes or the shielding of electrical cables in order to provide a ground. Trouble is, these days water pipes are plastic so there's no assurance of good earthing and electrical cables' shields may only be earthed at the local distribution transformer end. If you live a long way from this, then the cable's resistance can become significant. The current flowing to earth from electrical appliances

multiplied by this resistance gives rise to a voltage (Ohm's law, V=IxR). This voltage will then flow in any equipment plugged into sockets hooked up to that cable

The solution is to sink a large copper plate into your garden and connect your house mains to this. You should not even think about attempting this before consulting a fully qualified electrician though - messing around with the mains can be lethal. **JM**

I have been out of the hi-fi world for a couple of years now and am currently putting together a system. I have just purchased an Albarry PPI amp and have a pair of Monitor Audio floor standing 'speakers. The problem I have is choosing a CD player.

I have about £500 to spend and have been thinking about either the Meridian 200/203 or the 208. My musical tastes vary from Classical/Ambient through to Rock and Dance.

Are there any other players in this price range that you could recommend, new or second-hand? **Troy (no surname supplied) troy.beach@virgin.net**

Another couple of secondhand worthies to look into are Marantz's CD-42 MkII which tends to go for around £450 if the condition is good. This player is extremely musical and has bass of great power, control and rhythm. You don't see too many of these around though as their owners generally know they're on to a good thing.

Another choice is Technics' SLP1200. These are built like battleships in the tradition of Technics' flagship models, benefiting from cast zinc casework damped with a specially developed nonresonant

compound. There are also separate transformers for digital and analogue sections which help the SLP1200 sound rather good. In fine fettle these go for around £450 as well. I think you'll find both of these more involving and gutsy than the Meridians. KB

Simple, just go for Quad's new matching 707 power amp, of which Douglas Floyd-Douglass said in his July 1997 review, "The 707/ESL 63 combination is pure music, made for the gods." Possibly the only problem here is its £800 asking price seeing as you're thinking of a kit or second-hand amp as an alternative.

The '63s are an extremely nasty load to drive and they have a cripplingly low

sensitivity of 81dB-82dB so they need a lot of power. In a small room, K5881 MkII would get reasonable volumes out of '63s but if you have a large room you could try Technics' £400 SE-A1000 100watt solid-state power amp (reviewed in Feb 1997). This has great power and control for the price and a slight warmth to it that should suit the '63s nicely. IM

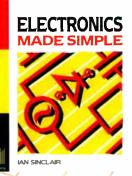
My problem is, the stylus on the V15 III has died and I need to be able to play discs. I have the following choices: replace the stylus with a new VI5 III Micro-Ridge (£85), fit a cheaper standard replacement stylus (£30) or buy a new cartridge like the Goldring 1042 (£100). I can't afford the Slate Brazen which sounds really good. How does the 1042 sound compared to the VI5 III and would it be suitable for use in the 3009S2? Any help or other recommendations will be gratefully received. John Benson john@tollesby.demon.co. uk

As a one-time owner of a Shure V15 III I have to say that Goldring's 1042 is vastly

superior. The V15 III may have an attractive warmth to its sound but it's about as dynamically exciting as a stale pancake. The Goldring has a crisper, more detailed and transparent sound allied to a seductive sweetness. Going for a Micro-Ridge stylus would help but as Slate have found from their Brazen conversion, the plastic body and stylus grip on the V15 III greatly colour its sound and a new stylus alone won't change this.

SME's 3009 was designed in the days before heavy, lowcompliance Moving Coils came into vogue and will work very well with a relatively lightweight MM like the 1042. JM vvvv_hi-fivor

Picture the scene: Curiosity Killed The Cat are Britain's next Great Pop Hope, Johnny Marr has just left The Smiths and 'Randy Andy' and 'Fergie' are consuming the tabloids' collective imagination.

Elsewhere the Yuppie look is in and the nation is awash with naff stripy shirts and even naffer Brogues. Inspector Morse is sauntering around a picture-postcard Oxford, while EastEnders is full to brimming with 'Okay, Ya' wine-bar types where once were salt-of-the-earth Cockerneys. Yes, that's right, it's 1987.

Hi-fi was also a very different place 10 years ago. CD was very much a Yuppie fashion icon -Philips ads appeared in The Face with chisel jawed young men pouting in front of a CD 160. The real hi-fi scene was dominated by Linn turntables, Naim amps and Epos 'speakers, while valve amps seemed but a fading fragment of history. Transistors ruled, and if you believed anything else you were bordering on the certifiable.

Big stories? Ivor Tiefenbrun of Linn said CD sales, "have probably peaked" (ha-ha). Exposure launched its first integrated amp - the X - to rave reviews, and Marantz announced their new budget blockbuster CD-273SE. But what was really buzzing was Sony's new format - Digital Audio Tape, or DAT. And boy, was it a buzz! Hi-Fi Review's front cover had a picture of a Technics SV-D1000 DAT recorder, above which a big red caption proclaimed "DAT WIPES OUT CD!"

The national press ran similar stories, one of the main protagonists being a Mr N. Keywood. DAT was said to be the future, the format to make both CD and analogue cassette obsolete. Oh the freedom of it, and the potential! But then, suddenly, the copyright organisations went ballistic, and the likes of the IFPI (International Federation of Phonogram



and Videogram Producers), the world-wide mouthpiece of the music biz, were throwing writs around like coins in a fountain.

What transpired was that DAT was effectively put on ice for a couple of powers that be quite as much as you'd think. Why? Because after DAT's huge media splash at its launch, nice, respectable, nonrecordable CD had gained a foothold and no longer seemed under threat anymore.

The IFPI argued that the CBS Copycode system be used, a draconian solution that notched out half of the midband if you tried to record anything digital that you shouldn't. That it destroyed the purity of the digital signal even when used legally was of course completely irrelevant to the great minds of the IFPI.

DAT really reached the world's hi-fi shops by 1990, with SCMS to show for all those years of legal squabbles. Serial Copyright Management System let you make one digital copy of a disc - for your own purposes - and that was it. The fact that black boxes were available for under \$200 that busted SCMS didn't seem to worry the

After so much fuss, the glittering prize of recordable digital tape seemed to have lost some of its lustre. Pros loved its quality, compactness and convenience, but the pro market was minute compared to the domestic. DAT was left to high-end hi-fi enthusiasts, archivists and tape nuts. A handful of companies introduced prerecorded music DATs -Factory were quick off the mark with Durutti Column and New Order releases but it was all too late.

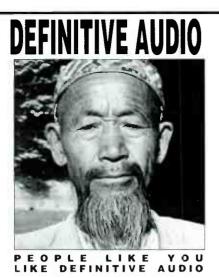
Sad really, because I still use DAT to this day. I bought my first Sony DAT portable - a TCD3 - in Tokyo's Akihabara district (the so-called 'Electric Town') in spring 1991 and for years it was one hell of a good way to listen to music on the move.



Recordings from my then Linn LP12/Ittok LVIII/Supex 1000 front end could be made on visits back to the UK, stuffed in a top pocket and listened to on the Tokyo subway as I travelled to work. The quality was superb, with just a touch of dryness to distinguish the Sony from my distinctly unportable vinyl front end.

In the car too DAT excelled. I tried in-car CD players but they were useless - first sign of a speed bump or a pothole and that was the end of your song. Not so the TCD3, which just kept on going - even in my jacket pocket as I ran for a train the Sony would be fine. Now, 10 years since DAT first surfaced, I have a TCD7 to play my many compilation tapes made from turntables past and present. I've also got a number of live recordings made from a small Sony electret condenser microphone or direct from the mixing desk. Either way the quality trounces anything from CD or vinyl.

So here's to a great little format that never quite found its feet after the music biz tried to strangle it. But perhaps all the aggro DAT endured has had some positive results, because we're now poised for rewritable CD and DVD and the principle has been established that musiclovers have the right to record what they want, how they want within reason. For that, DAT, we salute you •



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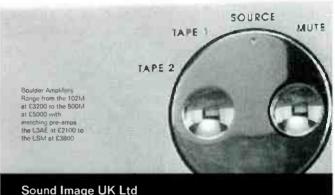

e-like you I'm sure - can barely believe the recording format farrago reported on in this issue (see p23), but don't expect it to shake down into some simple order where just one system comes to dominate. We are moving out of one era into the next very rapidly and it is perplexing and confusing for everyone, including the music business and most of the traditional audio business. And a long-term, standardised solution dished out by large conglomerates or corporate groupings is unlikely to happen. For what looks like commercial anarchy today will become - fingers crossed - a new freedom of choice.

The changes are being rung by the US computer and software industry. Companies like Microsoft, IBM, Intel, Motorola, Adobe, Netscape, Compaq, Oracle, etc, employ tens of thousands of people and drive an industry that has a powerful dynamic with global impact. It may well be that many European countries are relatively unaware of the power of instant global communication and information exchange through the Internet, but America and the Far East, linked across the Pacific, are not. The size and importance of the computer industry cannot be overestimated.

Whilst the computer business ponders how to get a computer into every home, the US and the European Union have recently announced rival digital TV standards. Intelligent, interactive digital TVs are the way in which the traditional **Consumer Electronics** industry (radios, TVs, portable stereos, etc), which includes professional broadcast, hopes to become involved in the Internet.

How does all this affect audio recording? Simple. All information generation and transmission systems

are going digital and will rely on computer manipulation in future. This means you will soon be presented with computer-based digital audio recorders of huge capacity, but of no agreed standard. In fact, it looks like audio standards may become a thing of the past. There will be no new CD The company ran into severe problems with Video 2000 as well, which flopped, and now DCC has faded from view. I always found it curious though that Philips never really put any serious marketing effort behind DCC; now I know why. Their heart wasn't in it. Philips' engineers saw that the

code, I believe, because there will be no need to agree one. You will buy a recording on a digital carrier, and it could be any of a number of carriers, but most likely a CD or DVD. The music can be to any code/quality standard - it doesn't matter which because the player will recode to suit its own onboard digital-toanalogue convertor or any external one. I have suspected as much for the last year or so, but some recent announcements and a long talk to a Philips representative have confirmed that this is the way things are going.

It's best to see it from Philips' point of view. They got lucky with the Compact Cassette, a Philips invention and subsequent world standard. They had a hard time trying to convince the world in 1983 that CD was worth buying. future did not lie in trying to create another inflexible audio standard and that DCC could cause more harm than good to the company by becoming a bottomless drain upon resources.

Philips, like Sony, know all about format wars and doubtless neither company would like to suffer the sort of losses they incur ever again. Now there is a new, safer alternative: no formats. When I read about the new DVD-RAM group comprising Philips, Sony and Hewlett Packard I guessed immediately what was going on. My longterm contact within Philips confirmed it. All three companies have become big in areas of computing. Having been through decades of argument and failure attributable to the restrictive practices of the music business, they are not about to get tied up in



yet more bickering and manoeuvring by the US film industry, which by all accounts is even worse! Nor are they keen to get involved in setting worldwide standards. Instead, this grouping are content to let Toshiba and its allies suffer whilst they appeal to the broader, more dynamic and relatively unrestricted

> computer industry. DVD-RAM is not an audio format. But it can be turned into a no-format audio carrier in the tweak of a microprocessor. Any amount of music can be stamped or burnt onto a DVD

disc, in any digital code. You will either process music from a DVD through a home computer, or, more likely in the immediate future, through an intelligent DVD/CD recorder/player that will decode it for you. My guess is that today's CD code, 16bit at 44.1kHz sampling rate, will become a background standard, higher resolutions and sampling rates being offered in addition. We recently listened to a couple of 24-bit, 96kHz digital convertors - one of which could become a DIY project! That means YOU will be ahead of THEM (Sony, Philips, et al), for the first time ever, no less. And that's the way it is going to be in future. So what looks like commercial anarchy today will become freedom of choice tomorrow, but it will be a very different tomorrow •

Supplement. This year it ran over August 8th-10th in the capital, Kuala Lumpur. As always it was my opportunity to catch up on what's happening in the Far East, not only in hi-fi but in food like Nasi Lemak, Rambutans and Tandooris dragged smoking from clay ovens hotter than the sweltering nights.

> Malaysia is always a great place to be so I don't like to inject any pessimism, but this year the country's go-go tiger economy has slowed a little and with it demand for audio equipment. "Times are tougher this year. The market has been in decline for some time," said Vincent Chen of Sapphire Audio Systems, Malaysian importer of Audiolab and Monitor Audio.

The A/V Fest, held in the massive 37-floor Crown Princess Hotel, looked a little subdued on its first day, but activity picked up over the weekend. Organiser and Editor Sujesh Pavithran told me the

I spotted an impressive looking tubed CD player, the VK-D5, from Balanced Audio Technology of the USA, unavailable in Britain. It's a new product sporting all-valve (tube) analogue stages and HDCD compatibility.

Otherwise, the interest and action this year were more in LP than DVD or CD, believe it or not. Whereas last year I was asked to talk about D.I.Y. to Malaysian enthusiasts, this year I was beseeched to do a lecture on the LP: "Noel, you're the only one old enough to know about this medium", Kuldeep Singh of The Star told me with brutal sincerity!

Ambient temperatures of **35degrees** Celsius accompanied by humidity levels that hover close to maximum take their

toll, although most homes are air conditioned these days.

As a reminder of how fluent Malaysians are with technology - and remember both national newspapers support hi-fi shows - I had the pleasure of hearing one of the finest LP systems I have heard for a long time, perhaps ever. It was being demonstrated by importers Audio Image and comprised a Benz Micro Glider Moving Coil cartridge mounted in an Immedia RPM2 tone-arm sitting on an Immedia RPM1 turntable, isolated by an Immedia Noise

Block air isolation platform to eliminate external disturbances. The platform was fed from a distant air reservoir through plastic tubing! The Benz was working into a Graaf Venticinque amplifier driving Sonus Faber Concert Grand Piano loudspeakers.

Two features of this system's sound struck me. One was an almost total absence of surface noise, which was uncanny but is the sign of a top-flight LP system. The other was impressively stable and full bodied stereo images. As always, there was the complete absence of hardness and shakiness (for want of a better description) that characterises CD and helps make vinyl reproduction seem so much more natural and attractive to the ear.

Another peculiar phenomenon was the appearance of real UK made

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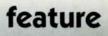

Lowther drive units in locally built horn loudspeakers, as well as 'improved' clone drivers from a Californian company REPS mounted in a Canadian Lamhorn 2 loudspeaker, imported by Octave Electronics (who also carry World Audio Design kits). Priced at a mere £12,000 or so, a pair of Lamhorns were sold to a Singaporean straight away. I could understand why too; they had a delicious mid-band with great projection, and sweet treble. As a result their sound staging was superb.

If anything, Malaysians are more acquainted with this standard of fidelity as a goal of hi-fi than the average Briton, who thinks the sound of a Midi system is where it's at. So 'speakers like the Lamhorns have a ready market in the Far East, something that brought a smile to the face of proprietor Robert Lamarre, who'd travelled about 20hrs to get to the show from Quebec. By contrast London is relatively close to Kuala Lumpur - just a 12-hour nonstop flight in a 747 Megatop •

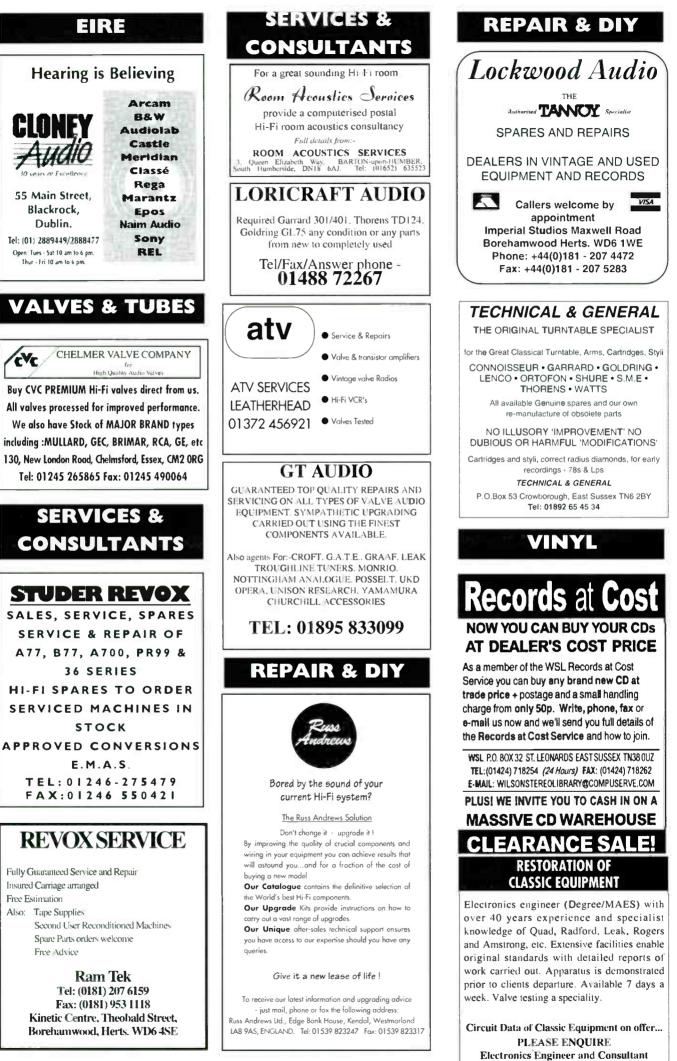

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Sat at the side of me right now,

playing a little bit of Jazz music, is a pair of Goodmans' diminutive mid-1960s Maxim loudspeakers. They stand a mere ten and a half inches tall, a little over five inches wide, and seven inches deep. And as far as I'm concerned, they are simply one of the most competently engineered little loudspeakers I've ever heard.

A sweeping statement? Perhaps. But the box is amazingly solid considering the Maxim's 'radiogram' vintage and the woofer and tweeter are fixed to a sturdy metal baffle, which adds rigidity to the case work and mass to this important area.

The bass unit has a massive alnico ring-type magnet, with a tiny 2in. longthrow doped-paper cone in a very compliant surround, which yields a low free-air resonance frequency. The surround itself is covered in a sticky substance (I have yet to find out exactly what this is), presumably to aid damping. Add to this a very well sorted crossover, of expensive proportions for such a small loudspeaker, and what you have comes close to a miniature work of electronic art.

The Maxims were not budget loudspeakers - £34 was a lot of money in 1965 for a pair of loudspeakers smaller than your average shoe box when you consider a single Tannoy 12in. dual-concentric driver would have set you back around £30. The Maxims' quality of construction helps to explain their price. The whole package is rounded off with a pair of decent binding posts recessed into the back of the cabinet and a clip-on detachable grille (upholstered in the usual 1960s' 'Targan' which makes most 'speakers look so old-fashioned, although the Maxims seem to get away without appearing too dated).

The first loudspeaker to break the 'nothing less than a decent wardrobe in size will do' rule was the AR3 loudspeaker, designed in the United States by Ed Villchur. When the 1950s' pre-stereo cult was to fill a room corner with some monstrous great sand-filled enclosure, the AR3 must have come as quite a shock! But this was still hardly a small loudspeaker by present UK standards whereas the little Maxim is absolutely tiny yet produces a very spacious sound.



At 2in. the Maxim's use a bass cone the size of some modern tweeters. A chunky alnico magnet, long-throw voice coil and a very compliant surround help extend its usable frequency response downwards and stop the 'speaker from sounding excessively lightweight.

These Goodmans don't play very loud, they're not particularly sensitive (around 85dB), and will only handle

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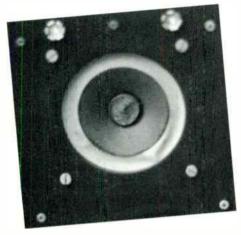
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The weak link in the chain is the Maxim's original paper-cone tweeter. This can be replaced with something a bit more up to date like a tweeter from Advanced Transducer developments.

about 8watts. However, mounted correctly in a small room, they have amazingly deep, clean bass. Put them flat against rear walls or hard in corners - it doesn't upset the midrange and does wonders for the lower bass. The bass obviously does roll off, but very smoothly, and it was not engineered to give the usual mini-box bass lift at 100Hz. The treble also performs the same roll-off trick, as if to balance the bass end out. Part of the reason for this is because the Maxim's tweeter is a cone instead of a dome type like that used by Leak in their Sandwich loudspeakers covered in July.

The first time I ever heard a pair was quite a shock. They were being driven by a rather tatty looking Quad 33/303 amplifier and a Goldring/Lenco turntable. While the turntable was a bit of a weak link, the overall sound considering the Goodmans are tiny boxes left a lasting impression on me.

It's the easy, musical presentation that sets this little loudspeaker apart from some of its contemporaries. They are very laid back and allow music to flow with great fluidity thanks to an almost complete lack of 'boom' and 'tizz'.

Due to the Maxim's cabinet dimensions stereo, imaging and detail are both to a very high standard and levels of coloration throughout the bass and midrange are low. The biggest flaw is the slightly cardboard sounding tweeter. It's not offensive, it just isn't in the same class as the bass unit. These two drivers were actually engineered together specifically for the Maxim and I can't help but feel that Goodmans spent too much money on the bass unit and so ended up compromising the quality of the treble.

These 'speakers are a little vulnerable to being damaged by excessive amplifier output, and even using an amp as low-powered as 20watts could destroy the drivers very quickly. Absolutely no spare parts are available, so be warned; you should only buy examples which are functioning perfectly and then handle them carefully. Hooking them up to a 100watt power amp for party use isn't recommended.

Another thing to look out for is the inferior MkII version.



Distinguishing the MkI from the MkII are the former's binding posts. The MkII used an RCA phono connector instead. Other differences in the later model include ceramic magnets instead of alnicos and a wooden front baffle in the place of the MkI's very rigid metal one. Outwardly, this looks pretty much the same, apart from a phono plug 'speaker terminal on the back panel. But pull the grille off and you'll find a very different kettle of fish. Gone is that attractive, futuristic metal baffle the drive units are just screwed into the wood. Pull the drivers out and you'll see the alnico magnets have also been replaced by more humble ceramic types. In Goodmans' defence, there is little way they could have made any money on the original given the quality of its construction and components, and 'modern' ceramic magnets were all the rage in the late 1960s. Basically the Mklls really are best avoided.

I have chosen to upgrade the tweeter in my pair to a driver from Advanced Transducer Developments (available from Audio Classics, tel: 01942 257525), which is a massive improvement on the old one and turns the Maxim into a real high-end performer, albeit one with very limited SPLs.

If you're looking to buy a pair, it really is a car-boot sort of find and can be picked up for very little money. If you purchase from a dealer you'll find that some know about the little things while others do not. This means prices vary widely, from literally a few pounds up to around $\pounds 60$ for an immaculately preserved set.

Even today, there are no 'speakers quite as small as the Maxims, although a lot of stand mounters have gone down that route. A power handling of only 8watts and low maximum volume put a lot of people off the Maxims. But try hiding the Goodmans between a few books on a bookcase and invite some friends around to play hunt the loudspeaker - most of them will think you're using a subwoofer!

The Maxim is a real piece of 1960s' style. For a second system or for a small room, I can think of no other second-hand vintage loudspeaker to recommend so highly. Thirty years on from when the Maxims first saw the light of day and small 'speakers are all the rage, nobody has yet made a more listenable and accomplished all-round performer so petite ●

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Fair Views

from Dominic Todd, our man in retailing

Ye always been a bit cynical about the old cliché, "The best things in life are free". Yet a recent trip to the doctor provided one of the best tweaks to my listening pleasure since taking the plunge with vinyl in preference to CD four years ago. And, best of all, it was totally gratis on the NHS.

Ever since being bullied into attending a 'soundoff' where proud car owners demonstrate their ear-bleeding in-car 'hi-fi' systems, my hearing hasn't been

quite the same. The thing is, my ears did bleed - not with anything as dramatic as blood but a healthy surge of self-defensive wax.

After a couple of weeks of realising that something wasn't quite right with my hi-fi, I decided to get my ears syringed. Sure enough, out came enough wax for a set of Christmas tree candles. And what a difference! Those of you who've already had your ears 'done' will know what I mean.

The instant I put my jacket back on in the waiting room and clearly heard every swish of the inner lining I knew that listening to my hi-fi was going to be a treat. Picking up on a dozen new squeaks and rattles driving back in the car did make me think that I might also notice a few nasties not so obvious before.

I need not have

worried. Treble detail was vastly improved, not only in its timbre and clarity but in its direction too. The whole sound seemed far more focused, with a more consistent sound stage. This is probably due to there having been more quality that don't involve your hi-fi or potentially expensive room-tuning. Nearly everybody these

days knows the best spot for siting their 'speakers but where and how the listener sits can make a considerable difference to

wax in one ear than the other which impaired stereo separation. Upper midrange benefited as well, which was especially apparent with female vocalists. Each syllable was more finely etched than before, with better defined texture and character. The only possible downside was a marked increase in sibilance, but this was only really annoying on poorquality recordings.

Of course, nothing's perfect - the bonuses will wear off in time. I've also heard that once your ears have been syringed, you need to continue having them done. I'm a believer in the old maxim, "If it ain't broke then don't fix it", so it's something I'd only recommend if you and your doctor feel it's necessary.

However, there are a few more off-the-wall routes to better sound

your enjoyment of music. The height of the listening position is especially important. The loudspeaker's tweeter should be at the same height as your ear when you're sitting down. Some 'speakers are less likely to show improvements than others in this respect. For example. loudspeakers with an inverted driver layout where the mid/bass driver is placed above the tweeter have normally been engineered this way because their response is smoother off-axis than onaxis.

With traditional driver arrangements, one way to better results can be to adjust the spikes at the top or bottom of a stand in order to tilt the 'speaker upwards towards the ear. At the same time, make sure the spikes are nice and tight. If you're using top spikes, you could

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damp the point with a speck of Blu Tack.

It's also important not to sit too close to a rear wall. If your favourite chair sits directly against the back wall try moving it forward a metre or so. It can be quite surprising just how much the sound stage appears to 'tighten up', with individual instruments showing greater focus.

Next, make sure any coffee tables, foot rests and other clutter are cleared out from between you and the 'speakers. What's the point in spending thousands of pounds on a decent system, if your favourite pouffe is playing havoc with the sound stage?!

Then there's the chair itself of course. The main priority is to get something comfortable, as trying to relax to music sitting on a

> straight-back wooden chair defeats the object somewhat. A word of warning though something with too high a back and padding around the head can have the effect of dulling the sound.

Another pointer is simply to turn the lights down low

and close your eyes! Seemingly, by having less sensory information to 'number-crunch' the brain is more receptive to sound.

Finally, for those of you who, like me, wear glasses, take them off. I remember being somewhat bemused when I first read this suggestion from Nick Davis ('World Writes', Nov. 1995 issue) but it does make a difference. I'm not sure whether it's down to sonic reflections from the lenses or deformation of sound waves caused by the frame but wearing glasses doesn't help your hi-fi give its best performance.

So there you have it. A few easy (and free) tweaks to help you get the best out of your hi-fi as the long evenings once more draw closer. And remember, the next time someone asks you to listen to their car stereo, take along some ear plugs just in case!



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David Price looks at that great forgotten recording medium, open-reel tape.

owadays with digital discs increasingly ruling the roost, it's easy to forget just how important plain old-fashioned magnetic tape once was. Without it, hi-fi as we know it would never have existed, so dramatic has been its effect.

Sound recording was a very tricky process before tape was invented - you only have to look at Thomas Edison's cylinder phonograph recorder from 1877 to see how crude and unreliable it was. Ten years later, Emile Berliner's direct-to-disc recording system appeared, but this was also far from ideal - grooves were cut acoustically onto 78 rpm discs by huge horn 'microphones', with no electronics involved at all!

Poulsen's magnetic wire recorder

followed in 1898. This was probably the first recognisable ancestor of the modern tape recorder although a fossil by comparison. And then variations like the Marconi-Stille system appeared using 1/2 inch steel tape which wasn't too practical because when the 'tape' broke the ends had to be welded back together!

After the first commercial electrical

feature

recording in 1925, the whole equation changed and by the early Thirties discs were routinely cut electrically with valve amplifiers powering the cutters. Then in 1934, Telefunken and EMT developed a new system using paper tape coated with magnetic oxide running past a pick-up head. Despite its tendency to snap, things at last looked promising.

Finally, modern tape using a magnetic oxide coating on a plastic base arrived. More durable than paper and less dangerous than wire or steel, it established a sound recording medium that took over fifty years to replace.

In 1947 EMI recording studios abandoned direct-to-disc and suddenly the likes of Bing Crosby were recording onto 'high-fidelity' magnetic tape. By the late Fifties, tape technology had come on in leaps and bounds. Superior coatings meant that studios no longer needed to spin the tape past the head at 30in. per second and 15ips became standard.

Better heads and electronics began to offer real hi-fi quality, and recording techniques improved noticeably. Costs came down and soon open-reel tape made the transition from a professional to a domestic format.

Suddenly 'tape recorders' became the latest consumer durable and

countless designs appeared either ready-made or in kit form. British companies like Collaro, Garrard, Windsor, Pye and Vortexion began marketing units built into a case, complete with amplifier and 'speaker. EMI offered a range of 'Stereosonics' prerecorded tapes, and the golden age of open-reel was on in earnest.

Although popular machines like Grundig's TK85L cost upwards of £70 a lot of money in those days home recording took off, the novelty of buyers recording themselves and their favourite bands proving hard to resist.

Another reason for tape's explosion in popularity was records. First seen in 1948, long playing 33 1/3rpm microgroove records offered superior sound and long playing times. Like Compact Disc three decades later, they provoked plenty of interest in home music reproduction, fuelling a mini audio boom in the process. LP's main drawback however was the ease with which it could become scratched or damaged by the primitive pick-up cartridges of the day. Recording your expensive new LP on reliable, durable open-reel tape was the answer, and

machine sales soared.

By the mid-Sixties, tape decks were getting cheaper still - £60 would buy you a solid multispeed recorder with valve amplifier, 'fullrange' loudspeaker and glowing 'magic eye' level meter.

Meanwhile, the popularity of the new stereo LPs, first introduced here by Pye in the early Sixties, further boosted the market. A number of exotic stereo machines followed, probably the

most famous of which was the Swiss Revox G36. Its superb build

and serviceability made it a sensation with both recording studios and wellto-do enthusiasts.

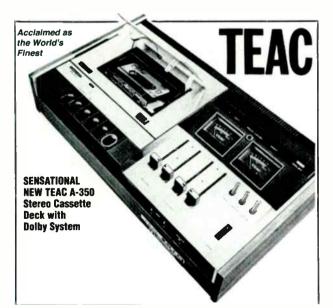
By the early Seventies, a stereo tape deck was the mark of any decent hi-fi system. New decks from Japan like Akai's 4000D and Sony's TC366 brought increasing levels of quality to the bottom end of the market. At higher prices, Revox's A77 and B77 cleaned up against the competition, forcing rivals to develop ever more sophisticated machines.

Auto-reverse was now being fitted, making open-reels at least slightly more convenient. Multi-head, multi-capstan machines duly appeared and everything got bigger, better and more complex!

Open-reel seemed unassailable. Budget decks were worthy of real hi-fi status, while high-end models vastly outperformed all other formats including LP. But then something strange happened - 'hi-fi' cassette decks appeared.

At first they were considered a joke - after all, Compact Cassette was the preserve of cheap mono portables barely up to recording speech. Owners of open-reels sneered at such aberrations: how, they asked, could a tape format that ran at | 7/8 inches per second on tape half the width of domestic open-reel possibly be taken seriously? It was hissy, unstable and had a dreadfully limited bandwidth. But two things happened to change the odds

First, Dolby Laboratories, purveyors of noise-reduction systems

to professional studios, licensed 'Dolby B' for use on cassette machines, greatly reducing hiss.

Second, a small Japanese company called Nakamichi started producing cassette decks like no one before them. They caused a storm in professional circles, and stories spread about top Nakamichi cassette decks outperforming the then king of domestic reel-to-reels, the Revox A77! Open-reel had been dealt a blow from which it would never recover.

Soon, Japanese manufacturers were making affordable three-head, dualcapstan Dolby decks. As prices plummeted, new chrome tape formulations from BASF and Philips and ferrochrome from Sony boosted cassette's performance still further.

Reel-to-reel sales dropped like a stone and, by the late Seventies, the writing was on the wall. Ironically though, in open-reel's dying days some of the very best decks were made -Japanese giants like Technics, Teac, Akai, Pioneer and Sony all offered super-sophisticated, mega-bucks machines with stunning sound quality.

Even in open-reel's natural habitat of the recording studio it was under siege, as digital Pulse Code Modulation recording on Sony U-matic video machines took over. As digital recording eliminated all of open-reel's faults, recording engineers took the new system's superiority as read.

Unfortunately, enlightened engineers didn't discover digital's failings until analogue tape recording had all but disappeared from the world's top studios. A great shame, but given that it was one of audio's most basic technologies, it's remarkable that it lasted as long as it did!

BUYING

Aside from pro and semi-pro machines, the only option is to buy second-hand. This needn't be too daunting because properly maintained, even 20-year-old budget machines will outperform 99% of modern cassette decks, while highend Ferrographs, Revoxes and Sonys will eat Super DAT and CD-Recording for breakfast. Many machines like



Akai's 4000 saw the light of day in 1967 as one of the first affordable open-reels.

Revoxes are serviceable today and most are built so well they'll still be going when DVD appears on Antiques Roadshow.

Tapes are available but they're either new and expensive or secondhand and cheap - look in your local free-ads paper. Decks turn up everywhere from boot sales to classifieds. The only catch is that they require expert servicing to work properly, so splash out on the best preserved deck you can find.

AKAI 4000DS/DB, £50-£100

Popular mid-Seventies budget machine with 7in. maximum spool-size, three heads and primitive single-capstan transport. DB model featured Dolby B noise reduction, of dubious value on open-reel decks. Sound is good but not brilliant. A reliable cheapo deck.

SONY TC377/TC399/TC766-2, £75-£250

The 377 was an affordable three-head machine with performance comparable to Akai's 4000DS. The 399 brought better looks and sound but retained 7in. maximum spool-size and three speeds (max 7 1/2ips). The £700 766 offered NAB spools, 15ips, full logic and excellent sound, arguably superior to high-speed Revox B77s. All very good used buys.

PIONEER RT-707, £150

Rack mounter restricted to 7in. reels. Good auto-reverse with full logic, three quartz locked direct driven motors, dual-capstans and four glass/ferrite heads. Sound was very good with superb speed stability and excellent noise levels. Desirable then and now.

REVOX A77/B77/PR99, £150-£600

A77, quintessential semi-pro machine with good sound and parent company Studer's pro credentials. B77 replacement offered solenoid operation and superior sound. 'Pro' PR99 had similar performance to the B77 but sturdier build, balanced outputs and rack mounting. A fine second-hand buy.

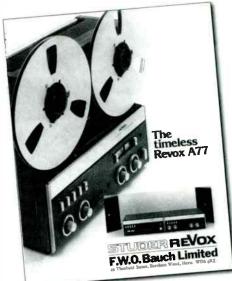

PART 1 QUANGO 524 294-2

Dubmission is exactly what it sounds like - a mission into Dub. This delicious slice of Reggae from the Mango vaults has some of the most influential sounds spanning the last 20 years and reads like a who's who guide to the Jamaican musical aristocracy. If you haven't yet heard of legends like Lee 'Scratch' Perry, King Tubby and Bunny Lee then you have probably never heard of Reggae and have, in fact, been living on a remote island all this time.

Practically all the chestnuts are here, making this a perfect opportunity to get an education in Reggae. It also helps to explain where Ragga, Drum 'n' Bass and Jungle, the true bastard offspring of Dub Reggae, come from.

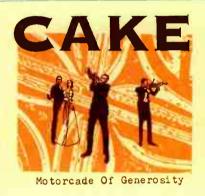
A brief history: Dub originated from

Reggae producers paring down completed songs and removing the vocal, isolating the bass and drum, and then adding various flavas like reverb. But the most important ingredient however, if all else failed, was simply to CRANK IT UP! And maximally crankedup bass is what you get, starting with the exceptional talents of Sly and Robbie, one-time members of the Wailers and considered one of the hardest rhythm sections in the whole of Jamaica. On Dubmission they give us two brilliant songs in 'Destination Unknown' and 'Demolition City'.

Listening to these tracks and the following Black Uhuru number 'Ion Storm' you cannot avoid being struck by how spartan and mellow the numbers are; it's like listening to, say, a Metalheadz Dubmix being played at 33rpm. With a touch of piano thrown in there is little of the modern Breakbeat savagery to be found in any of these tunes.

A range of solid Dub versions by some of the UK contingent is included too, with tracks from Linton Kwesi Johnson and Aswad. But the best by far are the efforts of the Reggae vanguard, Burning Spear's classic Dub 'I and I Survive' and Gregory Isaac's rare instrumental version of the international hit 'Night Nurse'.

Dubmission is an innovative and cool slice of true musical history. One for any discerning Reggae-head with a taste for the irie.



MOTORCADE OF GENEROSITY STAMEN STACD 37

This band hail from Sacramento and they could very soon put their city on the American music map alongside REM's Athens or Pearl Jam's Seattle. Maybe not, but they are going to try hard, that's for sure, even if they are going to travel backwards to achieve it. On the success of their last album Fashion Nugget, the boys have decided to re-release this, their 1995 debut album.

Cake are a group who record on a shoestring, creating music for people who live on a shoestring. Still, it seems obvious that even this LP was recorded in something that clearly doubles up as a telephone kiosk. But I'm getting away from the point - what we have here is clearly a song-writing talent in its

infancy.

John McCrea sings in a seductive Jonathan 'Roadrunner' Richman voice and writes songs in the Pavement vein. He has even taken a leaf out of Mark Eitzel's book (he of American Music Club fame) in conceiving songs which have the bizarrest of titles - 'Jesus Wrote A Blank Cheque', for instance. Songs run the musical gamut, from the deranged style of the Violent Femmes to Country music and Gospel via Funk. There are even some great trumpet licks in there.

Highlights are 'Up So Close', 'Jolene' and 'Rock 'n' Roll Lifestyle' which all capture the understated simplicity of the vocals and melodies that are the essence of Cake.

If you like Pavement, Tex Mex and Country music wrapped up in a lo-fi package, buy some Cake and especially the Motorcade Of Generosity.



SPAWN: THE ALBUM

With a soundtrack to accompany the screen version of the super-cult US comic Spawn, the film's creators decided it was a millennial milestone and would therefore need mutant versions of that most current of musical forms, Digirock. In their infinite wisdom they hired Happy Walters, Immortal Records' supremo and the man responsible for mixing Rap and Rock artists in the music for Emilio Estevez and Dennis Leary's dud Judgement Night. Nope, we hadn't heard of it either but he apparently quite successfully paired off Cypress Hill with Sonic Youth and Slayer with Ice-T.

And so to this latest enterprising venture. As if boasting an executive producer by the name of Happy was not weird enough, just wait till you listen to the hybrid contents of this particular CD. To give you an idea of who it brings together, we have, amongst other bizarre musical specimens, Orbital and Metallica, together for one night only! Surely the culinary equivalent of chalk and cheese, or does it make for

FAT OF THE LAND

God gave America Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young, Bruce Springsteen and Michael Jackson. He gave Essex Keith Flint and The Prodigy. The Yanks must therefore be a touch confused that their good ole Pop chart has just been invaded by Britain's

most unruly anti-establishment band since the Sex Pistols. Starting with housewives' favourite 'Smack My Bitch Up', The Prodigy have become one of only four British groups to go straight to number one in the US

album charts. Launched in songwriter Liam Howlett's Braintree bedroom in 1990, The Prodigy first hit the Top Ten with catchy House single 'Charly'. Having whipped up the crowds at raves across the country, it became a milestone number, paving the way for underground rave to become

a chart-topping entity. Seven years on and the unthinkable has come true - a House band has lasted more than a year.

The follow-up to 1995's highly acclaimed Music For The Jilted Generation, which coincidentally went to number one as well, Fat Of The Land is a classic crossover album - it has the knack of keeping all the youth cults interested. Essentially House, it also comprises a good deal of Rock, Punk and even Hip-Hop.

Anchored by the two brilliant singles 'Breathe' and 'Firestarter' with all their ire and spite, it is the rest of the album that needs judging. Kicking off controversially with 'Smack My



Bitch Up', we have a bass-driven mother of an intro. Repetitive, spooky and subversive, this track casts a chilling feel over the album, particularly with its humming rhythm and breakbeat, punctuated by the haunting Asian vocals of Shahin Bada.

Hip-Hop, it seems, is a major influence on the Prods these days certainly much more so than on the Techno-centric Music For The Jilted Generation. This is obvious on 'Funky S**t' which samples Beastie Boy Ad-Rock for a lunging dancefloor track while 'Diesel Power' has more conspicuous links in its full-on collaboration between our Keith and Rap pioneer Kool Keith.

But this is a truly experimental band and they are not beyond trying out ideas with the unlikeliest of candidates. Hence we have Crispian Mills of Kula Shaker dropping by to help record the mesmerising 'Narayan'. Apparently the boisterous Saffron from Republica also contributes somewhere on the album.

Fat Of The Land is resolutely not a Dance oriented album (with the exception, perhaps, of the Techno 'Mindfields'). It is the most up-front, aggressive album to be released since Never Mind The Bollocks. Prodigy shock and baffle audiences with music and performances which are neither

Rock nor Dance - let's just say they're cutting edge. Like Johnny Rotten, Keith Flint is rapidly becoming the world's most reviled cultural icon. Will this cat get the cream and live the high life in California alongside Johnny or will he retire early as a stray to the Isle of Dogs? Nobody yet knows but wherever he goes, Prodigy will, on the strength of Fat, be catapulted into more than just Outta Space.

Spawn opens up with Filter and The Crystal Method's 'Trip Like I Do' which rocks along nicely before changing up a notch mid-song to a more direct Techno block-rock direction. This is actually one of the album's magical tracks. Grizzly rockers Metallica provide some interesting moments too, guitarist Kirk Hammett bonding well with Orbital over the brooding 'Satan', while their foray with DJ Spooky in 'For Whom The Bell Tolls' is a fine Ambient track splintered with Kirk's crunch chords.

By far the most inspirational and creative inputs are from those bands that already have some experience of crossover, and we're talking Prodigy with Rage Against The Machine's Tom Morello and Moby with The Butthole Surfers, the latter a dead-pan vocal delivered over an Ambient backdrop and a killer bass hook.

Then there are combinations where all parties concerned should stick to their day jobs, like Henry Rollins and Goldie's Ambient poetry contribution. Slayer and Atari Teenage Riot do not fare better - their messy Cock-Rock effort is truly awful.

All in all Spawn displays little consistency; occasionally inspired beauties buoy up a cosmic mess. And we knew all along that Rockers don't take E.



THIS IS NOT A LOVE SONG RCA 74323496262

There is Nothing Like This. And really there was nothing like this when Omar's debut single jetted up the charts in the early 1990s. The handsome crooner with the lop-sided pineapple of a haircut soon became the darling of the dancefloor. Now, we're four albums down the line and not a whole lot has changed.

Omar still sounds like 1970s Stevie Wonder and still makes the perfect bedroom Soul; maybe not quite up to the faultless standards of the original walrus of love Barry White, but I can see this man going down under a hail of panties. For Omar is sticking resolutely to his true path while much of the current crop of Soul is being consumed by faddish loops, samples and Hip-Hop: R. Kelly, Puff Daddy, etc.

Tagged Nu Classic Soul, for want of a better term, Omar's quickly recognisable brand of music is possibly more aptly named Old Soul: ie, real instruments and proper lyrics. The step forward is crisp production and Reggaestyle bass sounds.

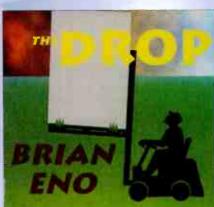
Regularly lumped in with the likes of Maxwell and D'Angelo, strictly speaking Omar is nearer the wonderful and sadly long-forgotten sound of the Young Disciples and Carleen Anderson - he's been doing this for years, don't forget!

There is a distinct US influence for all to see as the album kicks off with title track 'This Is Not A Love Song', a piano-based track which sounds something like a number on a lost Stevie Wonder album. Somewhere between 'Music Of My Mind' and 'The Secret Life Of Plants', 'Fallin', the fifth track, is floating and mature. And if that were not enough, he has gone and hired Syreeta Wright (Wonder's ex-wife) to sing on two tracks, 'This Is Not A Love Song' and 'Lullaby'.

That easy Jazz/Soul feeling permeates the entire album and is very difficult to find fault with. There's a touch of 1970s Commodores-type Funk in 'Spring Step' and a couple of lush ballads, 'Lullaby' and 'World Of You', where Omar's greatest strengths lie.

Other songs are standard Omar with the exception of 'Say Nothin' which features Wu-Tang Clan's Ol' Dirty Bastard as guest vocalist, and the surprise re-working of The Stranglers' 'Golden Brown'.

All said, however, there is nothing quite as infectious as that original cracker of a single, 'There's Nothing Like This'. That aside, This Is Not A Love Song is bound to do well: it's musically competent, lyrically mature and catchy in its entirety. It deserves to be a hit. After all, there is a lot more to life than stroking the goatee and wondering why success has eluded you for so long.



THE DROP ALL SAINTS ASCD32

Pop Egghead-in-chief Brian Eno's records vary in sound and intent so markedly you never know what to expect. His Ambient meanderings have always been designed as backgrounds to other (in)activity - such as waiting in airport lounges or travelling in a lift. We even had a series of Music For Airports albums and other cerebral escalator musics.

For those of us who never paint anything more engrossing than the bathroom ceiling, the effect would soon backfire and cause us to drift off on the stepladder and we would inevitably find ourselves interfacing with the floor. Yes, and The Drop is as interesting as that.

Then again we have Eno's two other personae, the maverick Dance music and sampling pioneer, the latter best represented in his collaboration with David Byrne in their acclaimed My Life In The Bush Of Ghosts.

His new non-vocal project The Drop falls somewhere between the two with the diverting, often gentle, pulsating beats lacking the hard-edged grooves of his excellent Nerve Net (heavily Dance-oriented) or the haunting beauty of, say, On Land.

This is distinctly an album of two halves. The first 16 tracks are 1990sstyle experimentals, similar to his Another Green World album. Then the closing track 'Iced World' is 25 minutes of Satiesque piano ebbing against gently insistent percussion.

As a whole The Drop seems inconsequential and often grates like a naff sci-fi film soundtrack. But then trying to find the purpose or reason behind any Eno creation will leave you floundering. That's just the point and The Drop is no different.

EVENT HORIZON LONDON RECORDS 828 939-2

Musical pioneers like Orbital are few and far between. Who else has both the confidence and ability to even begin to attempt a Dance crossover into the realms of Classical music film scores? Forget the Trainspotting-style new breed of pounding club-land film soundtracks - Orbital are engaged in a chalk-and-cheese collaboration with Michael Kamen (acclaimed composer of both the Die Hard and Lethal Weapon scores) on Paul Anderson's Event Horizon.

The album opens with and moves through traditional orchestral sequences

encompassing strings, woodwind and dramatic blasts of brass. At particular points in each movement, the Orbital contribution kicks in, generally in the form of their unmistakable off-beat rhythmical thwack. It works quite well, surprisingly well, but then Orbital can make anything sound good - take that Belinda Carlisle 'Heaven Is A Place' remix, for example. This time, however, the Hartnoll brothers' influence is much more subtle. Like old professionals, they've blended Michael Kamen's rather dull orchestral finesse with their own red-hot, synthesised rhythmic energy. I can guarantee that you've never heard anything quite like it before.

Event Horizon stands alone as a progressive new perspective on Dance music. Even Classical-music aficionados may find themselves slowly brainwashed by the hypnotic chemical chimes. It would be nice to think that fans of both musical styles will find their minds opened by this sound but it's more difficult to imagine either actually going out and buying it. Hardcore Orbitallettes who enjoyed the natural melodic flow of the earlier and more experimental Green and Brown albums will, perhaps, find Event Horizon appealing. Hopefully they won't be alone.



ACCESS ALL AREAS 2 POSITIVA TIVA 1015

Access All Areas 2 is a classic album for all those unashamed House fans among you out there. Firmly set in the up-for-it anthem mould, Positiva's follow-up to Access All Areas I again throws pretensions to the wind with a smoothly mixed beat and melody handsin-the-air offering.

Access 2 kicks off with hefty bpms in the form of DJ Quicksilver's recent stormer, 'Free'. Within seconds we're dropped into Diddy's 'Give Me Love', from the days when catchy tunes were all anyone cared about. The mix selected is Tony de Vit's, queen of unaccommodating acidic distortion and abusive bassy beats. But before you can even think about saying the words "largin' it", Jeremy Healy and Amos' 'Argentina' rushes in to take its place, only to be swiftly followed by Amen UK's chart-fringe surfer 'People Of Love'.

Such tracks make for an unrelentingly Housey flavour and even as the mood evolves into a Garagesque groove towards the end of the first side with B-crew's 'Partay Feeling', key changes and vocal power maintain a funky lift which makes you feel, well, all glowy inside.

Access All Areas 2 should be enforced pre-club listening to ensure plentiful dancefloor hugging. Dave Lambert and Kevin Robinson must have had a field day in the studio with this little set of corkers. They've rolled up an absolutely seamless montage of House anthems. With mixes tighter than Julian Cleary's leather trousers, the tunes take the form of catchy samples on a bed of smiley House music. Don't invest in this album if you're after a favourite featured track; Access 2 is about flow and vibe.



EAT STATIC SCIENCE OF THE GODS PLANET DOG BARK CD029

Eat Static have always generated an experimental and truly idiosyncratic Dance music energy. Synthesiser spinoffs from Rock/Trance hippies The Ozric Tentacles, their sound is a constantly evolving interpretation of modern styles which holds true to its musical roots. The complexity and sheer range of rhythm, tone and effects on Science Of The Gods are typical of the Eats and should even impress serious music buffs. Already initiated fans will be surprised to hear Eat Static going Drum 'n' Bass on this album - it looks like Merv and Joie have been hanging out with their pals the Propellorheads and are now heading off into a sunset of Hip-Hop-fuelled sweet music with them. The result: infectious electro crackle, swirly breakdowns, distorted tempo and banging tribal jives, all of which can be sampled on pretty much every song on this release, but on none more so than the title track 'Science Of The Gods' itself.

The Drum 'n' Bass vibe is prominent throughout the album but is always combined with massive sound effects. Let your imagination fly and you'll hear drinking straw bubbles in a milkshake and hyenas armed with kazoos.

The recording quality of Science is a little fuzzy, but Eat Static have always been a 'live' band whose raw creativity isn't really suited to confinement on a plastic disc. The strengths of this latest release lie in its musicality, originality and complexity. If you think Dance music is about beats and bleeps, check out Science Of The Gods and ingest the energy.

SYSTEM 7 GOLDEN SECTION BUTTERFLY BFLCD27

When I first heard System 7 a few years back, they were making epic plinky-plonky Ambient tracks. The sound was always a little moody, but the tunes had an uncanny knack of making you feel all emotional.

It must have been their adolescent stage because the maturity and eclecticism of Golden Section are definitely twenty-something at least. Gone are the deep, meandering, hormonal chords that typified earlier efforts and in their place is a fresh diversity of sounds brimming with self-confidence.

Opening with the bouncy Chumbawumba-type summer release 'Rite Of Spring' the album moves through a wide variety of styles. On 'Don Corleone' System 7 get cultural

> with a modern experimental Jazz piece complete with chugging choral chants and trumpet sampled from the late Don Cherry. 'Wave Bender' and 'Sinom X Files' find System 7 travelling into the rainforest where they take acid

for the first time and listen to tribal chants. 'Y2K (Beatnik mix)' is in a System-7-go-to-a-gigwith-old-universityfriends-for-guitarfeedback-and-wah-wahlayered-on-fine-Ambience vein, while the 'Back To The Future' mix of the same track is tinted with reminiscences of early Pink Floyd albums.

Some of the Trancier tunes can drag but the rest will crawl straight under your skin and blow you away. Although Golden Section illustrates a maturer System 7, it

looks like Hillage and Giraudy will never grow out of their ability to really move you. A good recording like this will sound awesome on a good system. Music for all ages to laugh, cry and shag to •

STEPHAN MICUS THE GARDEN OF MIRRORS ECM 1632

Over the course of the last two decades, the 44-year-old German composer, singer and multiinstrumentalist Stephan Micus has forged a unique body of work. Unfortunately, at best this has all too regularly been overlooked and, at worst, almost deliberately misinterpreted. The vast bulk of his output has been released in recorded form on either ECM or else ECM's subsidiary label JAPO and amounts to over a dozen albums in total.

With its singular packaging, impeccable production techniques and an A&R policy often steeped in a certain austere, deeply spiritual seriousness, ECM as a label has often been accused of, if not giving birth to, then at least being midwife to the birth of the whole New Age music movement that swept across America and Europe in the early '80s. It certainly wouldn't take an art history student to point out that the movement's most successful record label, Wyndham Hill, packaged its releases in sleeves that openly, if utterly hamfistedly, aped ECM's.

This, of course, was always a preposterous suggestion, for reasons we need hardly go into here. Of all ECM's large roster of artists, there's little doubt that Stephan Micus is the one musician to whom the tag New Age could be most easily attached. Some of those album titles say it all: Koan, Listen To The Rain, The Music Of Stones, Oceans. But Micus' musical career - if one can use such an 'industry' word as career to describe a path which has more truly been a calling - has been one of such dedication and, to be frank, length, as to effectively gainsay any crass zeitgeist marketing or flip gibes.

Since his teens, Micus has travelled tens of thousands of miles around the world, observing dozens of musical cultures in action, and learning to play a bewildering diversity of 'ethnic' instruments, stringed, percussion and woodwind. Not that he has done this in the spirit of ethnography. For all that he has steeped himself in the cultures from which he has acquired instruments, he has never sought to actually learn to play indigenous music. In this sense, he could certainly never be put into the 'world music' pigeonhole. Instead he has brought the instruments and techniques he's gathered to his own music, a music of genuine richness and lyrical beauty, if nonetheless shot through with a deep asceticism. One might, then, see some analogues between Micus' work and the American trumpeter/composer Jon Hassell's ongoing Fourth World project. This is an attempt to form a nonidiomatic, utterly new 'world music' out of components drawn from all over the world and from any point in its history. Yet, this concept aside, Micus' introspective, solo, acoustic music could not be further from Hassell's electronic, collaborative bacchanalia.

The Garden Of Mirrors is Micus' fourteenth album, and if it's typical of his work, it's also among his best. The album features a suite of nine pieces, some performed solo, some multitracked. Again, we find him playing some extraordinary instruments: the bolombatto and sinding, both West African harps; West Indian steel drums; the Japanese shakuhachi flute; the suling, a Balinese reed flute; the Irish tin whistle; and the Egyptian nay, another reed flute. He also makes regular use of a technique he thoroughly explored on 1994's Ethos: multi-tracking his own sonorous voice to produce choral textures that recall plainchant. When combined with other instruments on, say, 'Violeta', where he combines 20 voices with seven tracks of bowed sinding, the effects can be spell-binding.

This music, then, may be an acquired taste, but attentive listening bears rich fruit. Deep stuff •

BILLIE HOLIDAY PRICELESS JAZZ COLLECTION GRP 98712

Several new releases of old material have come my way of late, and, although I have a certain antipathy towards reviewing them, some selections do have a noteworthy quality, such as Robert Parker's re-masters reviewed recently, or Decca's authentically oldstyle '60th Anniversary' series.

This Priceless collection falls between these two camps in being remastered tracks from the extensive back catalogues of Commodore, Chess, Decca, Impulse! and GRP. The engineers have succeeded in retaining much of the ambience of the originals without allowing them to sound like a certain brand-name breakfast cereal. The accompanying notes also steer clear of the completism of the Parker series or the Rough Guide To Jazz.

The idea is simple - a nice, clean presentation of the recording with the minimum of fuss, and with each CD covering the work of just one artist. The chosen tracks are pretty much a 'best of' selection - this CD covers 16 tracks including 'Good Morning Heartache', 'Baby I Don't Cry Over You', 'Lover Man (Oh Where Can You Be?)', 'Crazy He Calls Me' and (predictably) 'God Bless The Child'. If you're already a Billie fan, you'll have all these tracks by now but if you're new to it, this must be the most complete round-up available.



CHARLES MINGUS PRICELESS JAZZ COLLECTION GRP 98772

'Better Get Hit In Yo' Soul', 'Hora Decubitus' and 'Mood Indigo' are some of the numbers on this nine-track CD, which almost manages to encompass the many facets of Mingus' musical character. It runs the work of the Mingus Big Band a close second for me, which is surprising considering all the advantages that band have over a single compilation CD.

SONNY ROLLINS PRICELESS JAZZ COLLECTION GRP 98762

It may seem this should be named the 'incredible shrinking Jazz collection' since this CD gives you only seven tracks. Or is it just that Rollins put more into a single track than Holiday or Coltrane? Work it out for yourself by listening to 'Three Little Words', 'Blue Room' or 'Alfie's Theme' on this album. Your choice.



JOHN COLTRANE PRICELESS JAZZ COLLECTION GRP 98742

With the same format as the Billie Holiday release, this one covers only nine tracks, but these number 'Bessie's Blues', 'Alabama' and 'After The Rain' among them, and provide a very tasty morsel of the man's work.



CHICK COREA PRICELESS JAZZ COLLECTION GRP 98782

This last of the series features 10 Corea tracks including 'Trance Dance', 'Make A Wish' (parts one and two) and 'Blue Miles'. It serves its purpose as well as any other CD in this group, and that's much, much more than I can say of many other similar series \bullet

Choral music by Georgy Sviridov, Alexander Gretchaninov, Victor Kalinnikov, Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky, Arvo Part, Henryk Gorecki and Knut Nystedt James Bowman, countertenor; Holst Singers; conductor, Stephen Layton HYPERION CDA66928 (DDD/79.04)

At first glance, almost eighty minutes of generally slow-paced choral music derived from the tradition of the Eastern Orthodox Church may seem heavy going, yet from the outset this disc, beautifully performed and recorded, is utterly spellbinding. Even at its most quiescent, the fervour and intensity underpinning this music grasps the senses, and it is easily capable of being simultaneously haunting and uplifting.

The programme is derived from concerts given by the Holst Singers in Arundel, Southwark Cathedral and London's Greek Orthodox Cathedral during 1996 and the magical atmosphere of those occasions clearly transferred itself to the recording sessions. The choir displays an astonishing command of what must have been both truly unfamiliar repertoire and an alien style, and the ensemble singing is without fault, regardless of textural complexity. Intonation, too, is outstandingly secure and the dramatic inflections are impeccably judged. These singers could just as easily have hailed from the St Petersburg Conservatoire as from St Paul's School in London's Hammersmith!

Opening with seven pieces by Georgy Sviridov, the Holst Singers then interlink works by Gretchaninov and Tchaikovsky, including a setting by each composer of the Cherubic Hymn from the Liturgy of St John Chrysostom (Tchaikovsky's is a choral gem). Sviridov's music, clearly influenced by predecessors such as Tchaikovsky but without sounding at all dated, is exquisite, and all the more remarkable for having been written in defiance of Soviet decrees which banned religious music.

Arvo Part's spare, simple, yet eloquent and touching setting of the Magnificat makes for a stark contrast with the comparatively rich choral textures of Tchaikovsky, while Gorecki's Totus Tuus, composed for Pope John Paul II's visit to his native Poland in 1987, confirms itself as one of the finest inspirations of this somewhat overrated composer.

Finally, two works are premiered here: Victor Kalinnikov's Radiant Light, which is as glowingly rapturous as the title would lead you to expect, and Knut Nystedt's homage Immortal Bach which takes one of the German master's chorales, Komm Susser Tod (Come, sweet Death), to a quite unexpected sonic plane.

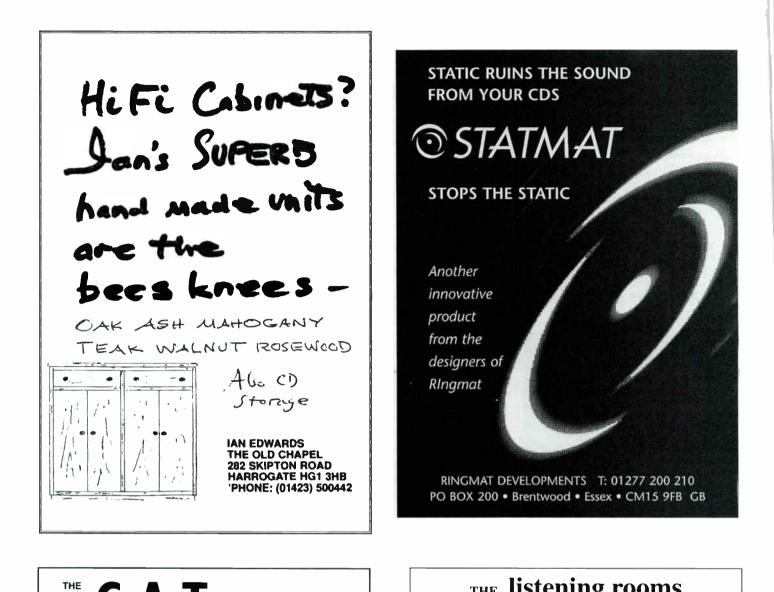
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RISTORAL DE MORALES

Missa Mille Regretz for the Feast of St Isidore of Seville (with music by Cabezon, Gombert et al Gabrieli Consort & Players; director, Paul McCreesh DEUTSCHE GRAMMOPHON ARCHIV 449 143-2 (DDD/76.13)

The 'liturgical reconstruction' has become Paul McCreesh's trademark, with several such recordings on the Archiv label. And neither McCreesh's enthusiasm for this original form of presentation, nor his stock of likely subjects seems on the point of exhaustion. This latest reconstruction takes the listener to Sixteenth-century Spain, to the cultural centre of Toledo around 1590. Here, in the cathedral, the feast of St Isidore of Seville is being celebrated, on April 4th during the Lenten season prior to Easter.

The centrepiece of the service is a Mass setting by a composer who had been described by one of his contemporaries as "the light of Spain in music" - Cristobal de Morales. Only later was Morales' pre-eminence to be eclipsed by the fame of his compatriot, Tomas Luis de Victoria. However,





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Morales, like Victoria, was employed for a large part of his career in the service of the church in Rome. He returned to Spain in 1545 to the job of choirmaster in Toledo but was beset by ill-health and financial problems and resigned within two years.

Despite his brief tenure in Toledo, Morales left the cathedral with a substantial musical legacy. It continued to use his music after his death in 1553, hence the inclusion here of the Missa Mille Regretz, from his Roman years.

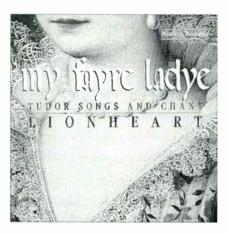
The Mass is a typical 'parody Mass' of the period, based on a chanson attributed to Josquin Desprez, and a tune much enjoyed by the Holy Roman Emperor, Charles V.

During his visit to Rome in 1536, the Emperor heard Morales' Mass sung in the Sistine Chapel although, as Douglas Kirk argues in his liner notes, given the monarch's refined musical ear, the version performed was probably more contrapuntally elaborate than the score of 1544.

Taking the Missa Mille Regretz as his starting point, Paul McCreesh then places it in the context of the highly elaborate ceremonial which would have typified a feast day in Toledo Cathedral. This, after all, was the richest and most powerful religious establishment on the Iberian peninsula and there is ample evidence to suggest that the service would have been punctuated with contributions from the organ and from a wind band made up of cornetts, sackbuts, shawms, dulcians and recorders. While these instruments did sometimes double with the voices. generally their involvement was confined to accompanying certain sections of the liturgical rite: entrances, exits, processions and the movements of the celebrants during, for example, the elevation of the host. Pleasingly, a great deal of this instrumental music. much of it derived from 'minstrel' manuscripts, is far from solemn - some

pieces are positively dance-like, and what a delicious contrast it makes with the heavenly sonorities of the Mass and the plainchant.

The effect of this diverse and colourful musical tapestry is utterly convincing, with outstanding playing from the wind soloists and organist, Timothy Roberts. The Gabrieli Consort, too, is in fine voice. The singing of the plainchant choir is similarly arresting. Both as an evocation of an exotic musical past and as a showcase for some rare vocal and instrumental jewels, this recording succeeds in every respect.

Bring together the medieval ideals of courtly love with the cult of the Virgin Mary, which was so fervent during this period, and you have the basis for this attractive programme from the American ensemble Lionheart. The choir, which is a new name to me, consists of six New York-based scholars-cum-singers and specialises not only in early polyphony but also in contemporary vocal music. The keystone of Lionheart's repertoire, however, remains plainchant and their feel for the form is evident in the performances of six items of Sarum chant included here.

Sarum chant, I should perhaps explain, had its origins in the rituals observed at Salisbury Cathedral and, while other ecclesiastical establishments developed similar forms of plainsong -Canterbury, York and Hereford, for example - it was that of Salisbury (the original site of which became known as Old Sarum) which came to prevail throughout Britain and even parts of mainland Europe.

The inclusion of the chant adds variety to the well-chosen sequence of polyphonic pieces, among which the contributions of two great English composers of the Fourteenth and Fifteenth centuries - John Dunstable and William Cornysh - stand out. The former's Ouam Pulchra Es is an exquisite miniature, while two of the three songs from the pen of Cornysh -A Robyn, Gentyl Robyn and Blow Thi Horne, Hunter - are sheer delight. But by far the grandest and most complex work here comes from the Eton Choirbook compiled sometime during the 1490s. This is the only source of the music of John Browne whose votive anthem, O Regina Mundi Clara superbly sung here - gives the measure of his considerable talent. The rich interweaving of the anthem's six vocal lines, soaring to a majestic climax, is in sharp contrast to the gossamer delicacy and simplicity of most of the other pieces here.

The refined, beautifully tuned singing of Lionheart is matched by Nimbus's clean and focused recording, although the relative dryness of the ambience is unusual for a label known for its ample acoustic.

fair share of internationally acclaimed musicians: composers such as Liszt, Dohnanyi, Lehar, Kodaly and, the subject of this new Philips

CD, Bartok; instrumentalists such as Sandor Vegh, founder and first violin of an eponymous string quartet whose recordings of Beethoven remain among the most illuminating; and then there have been the great orchestral conductors - Szell, Ormandy, Kertesz and Solti to name a handful. The curious fact is that none of those conductors

has been able to conduct a Hungarian orchestra of a quality commensurate with their talents. For whatever reason, Budapest has never hosted a symphony orchestra to match those of its neighbouring capitals of Prague and Vienna - until now.

As anyone who heard its Prom concert during August will testify, under the guidance of Ivan Fischer the Budapest Festival Orchestra has joined the front rank of European orchestras, and is peerless in the music of its fellow-countryman Bela Bartok. Two of the items included in that hugely enjoyable and memorable programme reappear on this CD, which couples a wealth of Bartok's Folk music transcriptions with one of his most startlingly original orchestral scores the ballet, The Miraculous Mandarin, here given complete, not in its usual truncated form as a suite.

In a time when we have access to indigenous music from every corner of the globe, it is difficult to appreciate the effect that the discovery of the Folk traditions, not only of Hungary but of neighbouring countries such as unpleasant characters (only the unfortunate mandarin is likely to evoke any sympathy, and his motives must be mistrusted), this is far removed from the fairy-tale ballet world of a Delibes or a Tchaikovsky. It is Bartok's most powerfully dramatic score and Fischer, to his credit, makes no attempt to sanitise or dilute the impact of the piece.

The Budapest orchestra's performance is a match for their rivals under Boulez and Abbado (both DG) and, for me, has the edge in allowing all

> of Bartok's instrumentation, all the orchestral 'voices', to be clearly differentiated and layered - you homogenise this music at your peril. Trombones growl menacingly in the chase scenes and the

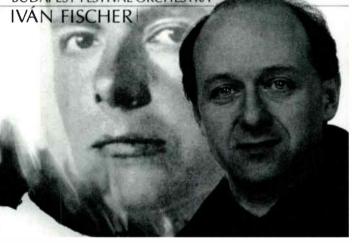
chase scenes and the strings have an almost unbearable vehemence. It would be facile to

say that Hungarians have this music in their blood and that idiomatic playing such as this is only to be expected. The Miraculous Mandarin calls for considerable virtuosity, and an equal measure of perception on the part of the conductor, which it certainly receives here.

But if intelligence is called for too, then perhaps instinct does hold sway elsewhere - witness the utterly Magyar rubato in the dance pieces and the disarming pathos of the woodwinds in the Hungarian Sketches. There is no doubting that Fischer and his colleagues are aware that this music was rooted in a living, vital tradition. There is simply a 'rightness' to everything here, which includes the vividly immediate recording, engineered using the Bit-Stream system in Budapest's Italian Institute •

Romania, had on Bartok. It was to prove the catalyst for his genius, and be at the heart of virtually everything he composed, albeit harnessed to classical forms and subjected to his own highly original harmonic language.

In a way, these delightful and characterful Folk-inspired pieces, originally written for piano but here given in their orchestral transcriptions, make an incongruous coupling for the lurid violence and seedy eroticism of The Miraculous Mandarin. Set in a squalid brothel and peopled with deeply

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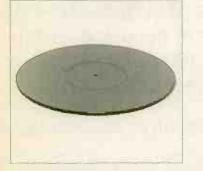
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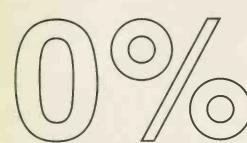

CREEK OBH-8SE AND OBH-9

The Moving Magnet OBH-8SE has a warp filter that comes in at 67Hz and applies bass cut below this frequency. Its slow roll-off introduces -7dB attenuation at 10Hz, the frequency below which warp signals become significant, which is useful but not great. It is likely this will lighten bass. Equalisation above this frequency was accurate right up to and beyond 20kHz, so the tonal balance will be smooth and accurate.

Noise was low at 0.45µV (Equivalent Input Noise) and gain around normal for MM at x96. However, input overload was on the low side at 26mV. Luckily most cartridges get nowhere near this output, managing 12mV or so maximum before flying out of the groove. But 40mV or more is usually taken as the safe lower limit for MM input overload. The Moving Magnet stage is a good all-rounder, but may well have less bass weight than some.

The Moving Coil OBH-9 also has a warp filter, but it introduces cut even higher than the OBH-8SE, at 90Hz no less. This will again result in light bass. It is usual to roll off bass below 40Hz when a warp filter is included, preferably fast at 12dB/octave - not a difficult task designwise. This stage also possessed more noise than is usual with MC stages, measuring 0.13µV equivalent input noise. I look for 0.1µV or less. The Creek has around 6dB more hiss than many dedicated MC stages, especially the Linn and Densen tested by us recently. This makes it a budget design, best suited to high-output MC cartridges. Gain measured x670, again best suited to high-output types; low-output MC stages have up to x2000 gain. The overload margins were adequate at 7.5mV in/5V out. The input load has been set at I kohm. The MC stage is for low-cost, high-output cartridges and, like its MM brother, will have light bass. **NK**

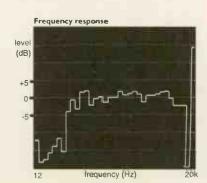
LOUDSPEAKERS

JPW MILLENNIUM 910

The large three-way JPW Millennium 910 has a modestly sized bass driver and a large rear port. It has rising treble on the tweeter's axis and the tweeter integrates poorly with the midrange unit above its axis, so the ideal listening position is in line with the midrange unit, not above the treble unit. This 'speaker will sound a little bright no matter what though.

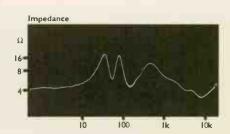
Forward output holds up well down to 80Hz (-2dB), below which the port starts to take over. This 'speaker was the only one with significantly more (+6dB) port output than forward output. In effect the port lifts overall output steadily below 100Hz, driving the room hard down to 30Hz. As a result it will very obviously have powerful bass in all but the smallest rooms, so the Millennium 910 offers measurably more wallop than its rivals in this repo**rt**.

The big JPWs should be sensitive, because big 'speakers have the potential to be so. They came in at a very respectable 90dB, plenty good enough by any standard, doubtless aided by the 50Hz bass peak. At

5.1ohm impedance was low, so they will draw current and need a good amplifier, if not a lot of power. The impedance curve drops down to a low 3ohms at 8kHz but for the most part has smooth slopes, indicating low reactance, making them a reasonable load. **NK**



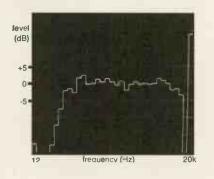

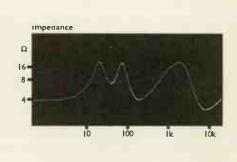
KEF Q35

The KEF Q35s have a remarkably smooth and flat frequency response, with a gentle roll-off in treble above 10kHz, just enough to avoid sharpness. They will have good detail, due to the flat midband, plus an even tonal balance.

Forward response steps down below 100Hz but the port makes up the loss exactly, ensuring a net flat response. Below 100Hz port output rises by 1dB or so, running flat right down to 20Hz no less (-3dB), so the Q35 goes very low indeed although a large room will be needed to appreciate this. Sensitivity was high at 90dB for one nominal watt (2.84V) input, aided by a low-ish overall impedance of 4.70hm which causes the Q35s to draw a bit more power from an amplifier. The impedance



curve dips down to a low 30hms at 7kHz and high slopes indicate heavy reactance, meaning the Q35 is not an easy load. **NK**

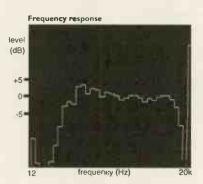


TANNOY MERCURY M3

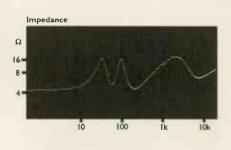
The Tannoy Mercury m3 floor standers have a very smooth and well integrated forward response, with a lift at lower frequencies to ensure the loudspeaker has plenty of body to its sound. The roll down in upper treble, above 12kHz, ensures there will be no sharpness to the sound.

The m3 acts like a proper reflex with the foam bung removed, whereupon the mid/bass driver's forward output is curtailed sharply at the port frequency, measuring -2dB at 80Hz. This is perfectly balanced by port output, the two adding together to give a net flat response down to 20Hz (-2dB) - a very low figure. The m3s went as low as the KEF Q35s and both extended farther down than all the others in our group.

With the bung in place, by the way, the m3 acts more like a sealed box (infinite baffle), giving faster sounding in-phase forward output, but less downward extension. In some situations, like a boomy room, this may be beneficial.



Sensitivity was mediocre in this group, measuring 88dB sound level for one watt input (2.84V). I thought this would be due to high impedance but it was not, for the m3s measure out at 5.60hms overall. However, by current standards the m3s are still quite sensitive and their impedance curve is reasonably amplifier friendly. **NK**

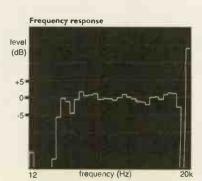


B&W DM305

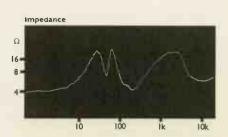
The B&W DM305s have one of the flattest frequency responses of any loudspeaker. Looks good, but it is wise not to be too academic with loudspeakers; I usually aim for upper treble roll-off to avoid brightness, plus a little bass lift for body (see Tannoy Mercury m3). Looking at treble output, I'd expect the DM305 to sound a little bright, but it has a super-flat midband.

Forward response of the bass unit extends smoothly down to 63Hz (-3dB). Both ports peak at 50Hz, ensuring the DM305s drive rooms really well with plenty of deep but reproducible bass. There's strong output down to 30Hz, but below this it falls away fast. All bass fundamentals will be reproduced strongly as a result.

The B&Ws were up with the rest of



the group in sensitivity, producing 89.5dB from one watt (2.84V) input. Impedance measured 6.6ohms, dipping to around 4ohms minimum, a reasonable load, if not the lightest. **NK**

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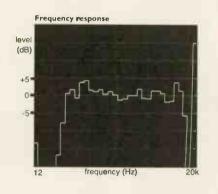

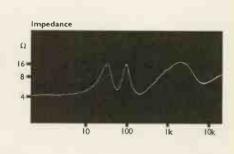

TANGENT MONITOR II

The Tangent Monitor I Is had a reasonably flat forward response, albeit with a treble peak at 12kHz. Bass output lifts from 160Hz down to 120Hz, by around +5dB. This is enough to add body and warmth to the sound. Forward response from the bass unit rolls down at 80Hz (-2dB) but the port more than compensates, being +2dB up at this frequency which is maintained down to 40Hz. Port output only starts to roll off below this point, being -3dB at 30Hz and -6dB at 25Hz. This ensures bass fundamentals are reproduced with power. The Monitor IIs proved to be very sensitive at 91dB, making them the best of the group. Lightweight paper cones help here. Impedance was 60hms overall, the impedance curve showing a fairly gentle characteristic that hit 40hms minimum, making these 'speakers a reasonable load. **NK**





CD PLAYER

LFD MISTRAL

The LFD's frequency response is characterised by a roll-off of the treble which should make the sound warm and smooth. Distortion figures were very good with the -30dB trace showing only small amounts of non-harmonic distortion. Dynamic range is good at 107dB and spurious outputs were well suppressed, typically being -72dB or better. This is a well engineered player. **KB**

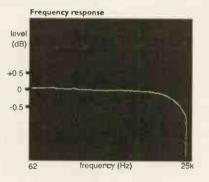

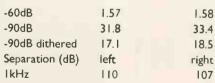

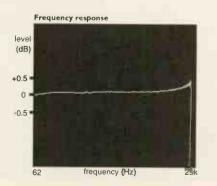
The X-DAC's distortion figures are higher than average but not disastrously so. The -30dB trace shows high levels of harmonic distortion but this is predominantly evenorder. 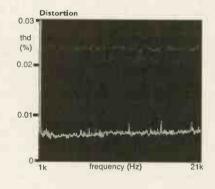

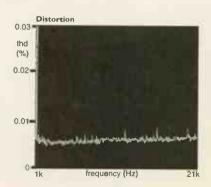

HOWEVER, IT HAS TAKEN 3/4 WEEKS FOR THE A100 TO SOUND GOOD AND I DO WONDER IF THE REVIEW SAMPLE HAD BEEN SUFFICIENTLY RUN IN. IT IS CERTAINLY A BARGAIN AND IS VERY AGILE ON DYNAMICS, THOUGH YOU HAVE TO PARTNER IT WITH CARE, BUT I DON'T KNOW OF ANOTHER 100 W/CH AMP FOR ONLY £650, AND IT CAN BE BI-AMPED WITH MATCHING P150 POWER AMP. THAT EXTRA POWER DOES HELP WITH SMALL SPEAKERS PARTICULARLY.

AMPLIFIER

MARANTZ PM-66SE KI-S

The PM-66SE KI-S has plenty of power, developing 78watts into a normal 80hm load and no less than 132watts into 40hm loads. American and European loudspeakers will draw the higher power figure; UK 'speakers the lower one. There's plenty enough power here for most rooms and requirements though.

The line-input stages have a high 200mV sensitivity and a wide bandwidth of 12Hz to 150kHz. With low noise and good channel separation, the amplifier measures well. It will likely have plenty of bass depth and fairly open sounding treble. Distortion was minimal at 0.005% in the midband and reached a maximum of 0.05% at full output, a low figure, although it did comprise odd harmonics (3rd and 5th).

The disc stage is for Moving Magnet cartridges only. It has a 47k input impedance with little capacitance (around 220pF). Bandwidth measured 35Hz-112kHz within 1dB limits, the lower value being set by the presence of a warp filter that introduced a useful -9dB reduction in output at 10Hz. Although this does perceptibly lighten bass a little, it also prevents cone flap in today's reflex loudspeakers. Hiss was very low at -80dB and sensitivity and overload normal at 3.5mV and 185mV respectively.

The Marantz PM-66SE KI-S measured very well in all areas and should give good results with all sources. **NK**

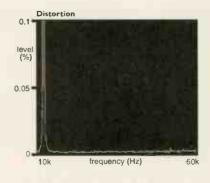

The dual-capstan transport of this machine held speed tightly, as the sharpness of the test-tone 'spike' shows. Capstan 'shoulders' are low and flutter, further out in frequency, is well suppressed, giving a fine result. I'd expect good, steady tone and clean backgrounds, free from the 'paperiness' of many decks.

The semi-automatic tape-tuning system was superb, giving a flatter frequency response than auto-tune systems. TDK MA metal tuned flat, but TDK MA-XG, a dual-layer metal, displayed the usual midband dip that no tuning could cure. Chromes like TDK SA showed a hump at 3kHz and overload ceilings were peculiarly low. Dual-layer TDK SA-X proved best, but bias had to be wound up to maximum.

Ferrics generally tuned flat and their response extended from 10Hz right up to 20kHz, so I'd expect a good ferric from TDK or Maxell to give superb results providing Dolby S is engaged to reduce hiss and counteract treble saturation.

The V-6030S records well without

Dolby, but it is not a Nakamichi, managing only +3.5dB relative to IEC0dB (+5 on the display), against a Nak's +6dB to +9dB.

Replay response was accurate on both channels, ensuring accurate tonal balance with pre-recorded tapes. It's only a pity Teac don't fit Play Trim.

The V-6030S was a delight to use and measured well in all areas. As today's cassette decks go it's a cracker. **NK**

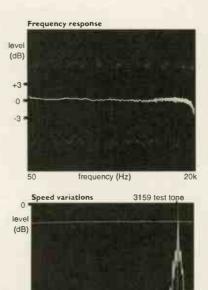

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David Price looks at Celestion's controversial Eighties' classic, the SL6 loudspeaker.

ntil the early Eighties Celestion were regarded as a conservative company, rather pipe and slippers and Gin and Tonic. Like Quad, they'd lived off the success of a popular range through the Seventies without much need for change. But the Ditton range was fading, and an exciting new design to get buyers back was called for.

Enter 1981's SL6, born of advanced laser-interferometry techniques pioneered by Graham Bank, who'd done much of the ground work for his previous employer, Wharfedale. This technique meant engineers could accurately plot the behaviour of a 'speaker cone and its break-up modes three dimensionally. Designers could therefore tune out distortion and coloration far more accurately than before. As a result, what Celestion arrived at was a copper-dome tweeter designed to act as much like a pure piston at audio frequencies as possible, and a one-piece mid/bass driver with no glue joints between the surround, cone and dust cap.

It was an instant hit with most of the hi-fi press, its metal-dome tweeter a particular revelation. Although Yamaha had done something similar five years previous with the NS1000's titanium unit, Celestion became widely regarded as starting the trend for metal domes. The SL6S followed several years later, this time with a lighter aluminium tweeter design plus a thinner, braced cabinet, and got equally enthusiastic reviews from certain sections of the press.

Without doubt the SL6 was different to what had gone before. Seventies' loudspeakers had generally been big multi-driver boom-boxes with wobbly cabinetry and proprietary drive units, making for a coloured and usually rhythmically slow sound. By contrast the new Celestion was extremely clean and clear, as well as being quick off the mark and good at imaging. How could it fail?

Well, arguably that clever metaldome tweeter that inspired so many other Eighties' designs was the SL6's undoing. True, it did behave well at most frequencies, but there was a very nasty break-up mode at 19kHz. Celestion rightly spotted this, but their way round it was a sharp notch filter that kicked in just below where the trouble started. But this wasn't without problems, and apart from the need for lots of sound-degrading crossover components it meant much of the signal's high-frequency content went AWOL.

The result was a rather dull sounding 'speaker. Reviewers called it "nasal" and "congested", as well as accusing it of lacking sparkle - true

enough,

and proof that it polarised critical opinion. The problem with assessing 'speakers is that what sounds good isn't necessarily accurate, and in Celestion's quest for neutrality, many believed they'd engineered out the life. The jury's still out, even today. Many Classical fans swear by the SL6s, praising their electrostatic-like clarity and imaging while others point out that they can't play a tune to save their life.

Suffice to say that they're an acquired taste, but if you already have it there are plenty of second-hand SL6s around at very reasonable prices - pay between £150 and £250. Later derivatives such as the SL600 with its Aerolam cabinetry (an aluminium honeycomb construction) are rarer and more expensive, but take the family sound further - from dry and neutral to extremely dry and more neutral. Match them with powerful transistor amps like Quad's warm but muscular 606, 606/2 or 707 - 84dB sensitivity and a tough load means single-ended triodes are out! So, if you like that BBC monitor sound, never stray from Classical and aren't too fussed about frequency extremes, a well preserved pair of SL6s could be the used bargain of the century •

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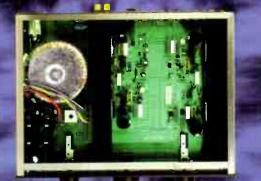
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
